Hate

I recently had the privilege to pray for our nation and its leaders at a gathering led by President Donald Trump.

I asked for God's help and wisdom for our president and Vice President Mike Pence, along with our congressmen as they attempt to help steer our troubled country through some very turbulent times.

America has flaunted its sexual immorality to the world.

We've neglected many of the poor and suffering and are guilty of much injustice, pride and self-indulgence. We are broken spiritually, adrift morally and divided politically and racially—following whichever

direction the bankrupt culture seems to drive us.

Sadly, the voices of hate have grown increasingly loud and insulting, and it was my

prayer then, and now that God would silence these voices like he shut the mouths of the lions when Daniel was harled into the den.

While those hateful voices have been raised on both sides of the political aisle, we must realize that ultimately, what is transpiring in our nation is an increasing hatred of God, His Word and His ways.

As we learn to love righteousness and hate sin, we must never, ever, turn to hating

In my lifetime, I have never seen such blatant and incessant animosity toward Christ and His followers. We should not be surprised, because the Scripture tells us that if they hated the Lord Jesus Christ, they surely would despise those who worship and serve Him.

I think of the recent ruling from the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in the case of Bremerton, Wash., high school football coach Joe Kennedy. For eight years, Coach Kennedy took a knee and prayed silently after games. But in 2015, he was suspended by the school district when he refused to discontinue his prayers, and his contract was not renewed.

The federal appeals court said in their appalling ruling: "When Kennedy kneeled and prayed on the 50-yard line immediately after games, while in view of students and parents, he spoke as a public employee ... and his speech, therefore was constitutionally unprotected."

Can you believe it? A coach, public or parochial, is not allowed to simply bow and silently pray because it might offend someone? Not only that, but in the eyes of the court this violates the First Amendment, which is supposed to guarantee and protect our religious freedom! As First Liberty Institute, which defended Coach Kennedy, said: "[This] is simply wrong. It is not American, and it is not the America contemplated by our Constitution."

So, let's be clear. While believers should never raise voices of hate against anyone, the real object of hate in our nation (that has been so blessed by God) is none other than God Himself. What has been historically called good and righteous is now called evil, and what was evil is now called good. The Bible says, "Woe to those who call evil good, and good evil, who put darkness for light and light for darkness" (Isaiah 5:20).

In what I can only describe as unbelievable, the Southern Poverty Law Center in Montgomery, Ala., has labeled a number of Christian organizations—such as the Family Research Council led by my friend Tony Perkins, and D. James Kennedy Ministries—hate organizations simply because they hold to the teachings of the Bible on key social issues like same-sex marriage. Powerful contributors to the SPLC include Apple President Tim Cook and financial services giant J.P. Morgan. The leftist-progressive media frequently reference the SPLC in their reporting.

The only things I believe the Bible says we should hate are the very things God hates:

"There are six things that the Lord hates, seven that are an abomination to him: haughty eyes, a lying tongue, and hands that shed innocent blood, a heart that devises wicked plans, feet that make haste to run to evil, a false witness who breathes out lies, and one who sows discord among brothers" (Proverbs 6:16-19).

"Abhor what is evil; hold fast to what is good" (Romans 12:9).

"The fear of the Lord is hatred of evil. Pride and arrogance and the way of evil and perverted speech I hate" (Proverbs 8:13).

"The Lord tests the righteous, but his soul hates the wicked and the one who loves violence" (Psalm 11:5).

"O you who love the Lord, hate evil!" (Psalm 97:10).

However, as we learn to love righteousness and hate sin, we must never, ever, turn to hating our fellow man. "Whoever hates his brother is in the darkness ... and does not know where he is going" (1 John 2:11); "Everyone who hates his brother is a murderer" (1 John 3:15).

So, while the world ratchets up its contempt and cruelty, especially toward disciples of the Lord Jesus Christ, we are called not to return evil for evil, or insult for insult (1 Peter 3:9). Instead, we are to love our enemies and pray for those who launch attacks against us.

Jesus said, "And this is the judgment: the light has come into the world, and people loved the darkness rather than the light because their works were evil. For everyone who does wicked things hates the light and does not come to the light, lest his works should be exposed" (John 3:19-20).

We need to pray for those who hate the Gospel, those who hate the Name of Jesus, those who hate His followers—that they will come out of their self-imposed darkness and into the light of God's forgiveness through faith and repentance in Christ, who gave Himself for our sins.

The love of Jesus is the supreme antidote against the hate of our culture. It is the love that saved us from our iniquities and will save whomever will call on His Name.

Brett Loftis to Teach Advocacy Workshop

Leaders in area nonprofit organizations are often called on to advocate on behalf of their organization, whether to the elected officials and the administrators who make the policies that affect their clients or to potential funders. Brett Loftis, CEO of The Crossnore School, and a highly suc-





cessful advocate on issues affecting children, will be the presenter for a WNC Nonprofit Pathways lunch-and-learn workshop "Effective Advocacy" on Tuesday, November 14, from 11:00 a.m. to 2:00

p.m. at the ARC, upstairs of the TRAC Gallery at 269 Oak Avenue in Spruce Pine. The cost is \$20 for the first registrant from an organization and \$15 each for up to three more from the same organization. Lunch is included in the fee.

Participants will learn how to make an impact on the public policies that affect the people their nonprofits serve. Using examples from participants, Loftis will distinguish between legislative and administrative advocacy. Nonprofit leaders will leave the workshop with the knowledge to craft their own public policy, the confidence to use their own voice to implement it, and the assurance that they will not be jeopardizing their nonprofit status when they do.

Brett Loftis, J.D., is the CEO of The Crossnore School and previously was the ED of Charlotte's Council for Children's Rights. He has spent over two decades serving children in need. Early in his career he worked in a residential program for at-risk children, served as a volunteer Guardian ad Litem and worked as a youth minister. After graduating from law school, he became a child advocate attorney and nonprofit executive. He was Executive Director of Charlotte's Council for Children's Rights before joining The Crossnore School in 2013.

His workshop on advocacy is intended for nonprofit

Lessons About Abortion From Abraham's Test Of Faith

Genesis chapter 22 is one of the greatest chapters in the entire Bible. It records the supreme test of Abraham's faith. God called upon his servant to sacrifice what was dearest to his heart – his own beloved son Isaac. The circumstances seemed to shatter all of Abraham's hopes for the future.

Atheists and skeptics have commonly referred to this

biblical account as proof that the God of Scripture is monstrous, cruel, and immoral.

"What kind of God would require a father to slaughter his own son?" they accusingly ask.

It must be remembered that Abraham would have been familiar with human sacrifice. In his day, it was practiced by the godless people that lived around him, and so the command in itself wouldn't have been a real shock to him.

With respect to the Divine aspect of the command, God may choose to accommodate the moral and spiritual standards of a certain dispensation without endorsing them, but instead, use it to demonstrate his own will. God knew the end from the very start, and it was never his intention that Isaac should actually be sacrificed. What God really desired from Abraham was his implicit trust. Moreover, God used Abraham's test as a means of differentiating himself from the other gods of the world in relation

to human sacrifice.

W.H. Griffith Thomas in his
commentary on Genesis 22 rightly
contends, "By this action God bore
unmistakable testimony to the
error of the heathen as to human
sacrifices, and it is a striking fact
that from this time forward the
Jews never adopted the practice
of human sacrifices until they had
sunk to the level of the heathen
around them."

The Bible records Israel's sad descent into the practice of child-

sacrifice. In the name of Molech, the god of the Ammonites, an idol made of bronze that outstretched his heated red-hot arms, the Israelites placed their children to die an unspeakable death.

The book of I Kings says even King Solomon was drawn away from God and into the idol worship of other nations, which included child-sacrifice. According to 2 Kings, Israel's wicked King Manasseh offered his son as a sacrifice. The prophet Jeremiah noted that the evil of human sacrifice was one of the reasons the Lord punished the Israelites by sending them into Babylonian captivity.

Of course, one might be tempted to believe enlightened modern nations like our own are far above such atrocities, but that assessment would be terribly wrong. In America alone, approximately 60 million children have been offered to the idols of convenience, immorality, the supremacy of self, a person's so-called right to privacy, women's equality, etc. These little babies were ripped and dismembered by the abortionist's knife with only today's scientific expertise distinguishing them from the blades of the Canaanites, the Ammonites, the Moabites, the Aztecs, the Incas, and the Druids of Europe.

We enthrall ourselves as having moved forward, when in fact, we have regressed to the very conduct God condemned millennia ago and which also precipitated his judgment.

But I suggest there is still one other lesson to be seen in the testing of Abraham's faith. Like Abraham, God desires our unreserved trust when we find ourselves in seemingly impossible situations — confusing situations where everything looks incredibly bleak with no good outcome likely — situations that may require the loss of some prized possession, promise, or possibility. It is in such moments God is closest to us and able to perfectly provide.

The text in Genesis indicates Abraham's faith didn't falter even when in preparation to obey God's command his son asked him, "Father, I see the fire and the wood: but where is the lamb for the burnt offering?" Abraham replied, "My son, God will provide." Indeed God did provide by staying Abraham's hand from sacrificing Isaac and producing a ram caught in a thicket by the horns.

So the Bible says Abraham named the place where the sacrifice was to occur, Jehovah-Jireh, which means "The Lord will provide."

I think it's significant that some of the most common reasons given for a woman to have an abortion – some of the most common talking points in favor of the idolatrous practice of contemporary child-sacrifice – are that the woman can't afford to take care of the child, or she isn't in the position mentally, physically, and emotionally to provide for it.

A few years ago, I was talking with a troubled young woman who mentioned some of these factors in weighing whether she would have an abortion. Urging her not to follow through with the procedure, I said, "What God wants from you now is faith. Don't let your trust in him waver. You must know that He is more than able to supply every need for both you and your unborn child. God will never order what he can't pay for."

Fortunately, the young woman listened to that counsel and today she and her son are doing quite well.

There are numerous alternatives to abortion available and sometimes the ones suggested may not seem to fit. Nevertheless, there is always God who is more than ready to reward those that diligently seek him (Hebrews 11:6).

John E. Zoller has beautifully written, "All God's testings have a purpose/Someday you will see the light/All he asks is that you trust Him/Walk by faith and not by sight/ Do not fear when doubts beset you/Just remember he is near/He will never, never

leave you/He will always, always hear."

Sharing the Love

The Bible is full of scriptures about love, sharing, and caring for each other. The first and most important love in our lives needs to be for the Lord Jesus Christ, our loving Savior, for without this life is nothing at all. The next great love for a married person should be the love for our spouse. I know, sometimes that is not easy either. I don't think that any married couple can truly live a life together without at least feeling miffed with the other at some point in the relationship. From a child's viewpoint, after the love of its parents for the child itself, the love of the parent for each other is of vital importance. Once the child is of the age of understanding, they need to see and experience the fact that mother and daddy love each other without fail. The fact that their love for each other is even stronger than the love for the child needs to be evident. I have found that it was critical for me to tell my wife daily how much I love her. This may sound a little crazy, but I think this does two things. The first is that it reaffirms to her that the love for her is there, and it reminds me that I should always be loving her. There are always challenges in life of all kinds and we need to remind ourselves of our vows to each other and the Lord daily.

The love for the children is another thing altogether. So many people try to teach that we are to be our children's best friend and not hurt their little feelings and ego's. This is not scriptural at all, we are to love, guide and admonish our children. God's word teaches us that there are results for our behavior and there are consequences for our behavior. "And I myself also am persuaded of you, my brethren, that ye also are full of goodness, filled with all knowledge, able also to admonish one another." Romans 15:14 KJV. 


The Inspiring Word

Thanks for joining me for another publication of "The Blue Ridge Christian News" and my article "The Inspiring Word".

Over the past couple of months our world has experienced tremendous grief and heartache. Natural disasters, violence and terrorism have inflicted a great deal of pain



Beginning this month, I want to begin a series of articles written to bring HOPE to the readers. Maybe you find yourself struggling with drug or alcohol addiction or abuse, maybe it's sexual immorality, anger, prejudice or loneliness. Each one of us from time to time find ourselves searching for HOPE. These examples are only a few and do not scratch the surface of our struggles.

This month I want to address one of if not America's biggest struggles; our lack of spiritual HOPE. We live in a day where we are told the only acceptable spiritual journey is one which coexists with all others. Regardless of where you place your faith its fine and correct if it doesn't offend anyone else. That may look good on paper and for a moment give a warm fuzzy feeling, but it doesn't provide any hope! For you and me to have spiritual hope we must have an absolute authority in our life. To say there is nothing absolute is an absolute! Where is hope found within an absolute that is nothing? We require an authority of HOPE! This hope exists, please read on.

Many people today know about Jesus, maybe they have been raised in church and followed in the footsteps of their parents, grandparents and other role models. Maybe they have memorized their Bible. Maybe they give to countless charities. Yet, they like the multitudes who have never heard of Jesus Christ lack spiritual hope because they have never entered into a personal relationship with Jesus Christ. Please understand, Christianity is not a membership, it's a relationship which leads to a fellowship. This relationship with Jesus Christ is the spiritual hope that is needed in America. We need less social media and more personal fellowship; first, with Jesus Christ as our Lord and Savior, then with fellow born again believers in the body of Christ. Without a genuine relationship with Christ we find ourselves vulnerable to subtle yet powerful attacks from Satan. If you find yourself smirking right now, I would like to make a bold and sincere statement. You are immortal, you have a soul and you will move from this life to an eternal existence. There are only two options, eternal life (heaven) or eternal death (hell), where there will be no end to the suffering. We cannot make a decision to turn over a new leaf, we can't say I'm going to be a better person and have spiritual hope. We must submit to Jesus. Jesus said in John 3:16-17 "John 3:16-17 For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life. (17) For God sent not his Son into the world to condemn the world; but that the world through him might be saved." Why did Jesus come to save and not condemn? Yes, verse 16 emphasizes love but there is a much deeper truth here. We were already condemned because of sin! The apostle Paul tells us in Romans 5:18 "Therefore as by the offence of one judgment came upon all men to condemnation; even so by the righteousness of one the free gift came upon all men unto justification of life." Making Sense of Senselessness

Words seem insufficient in response to the shooting in Las Vegas. Still we want to make sense of senselessness. We want to make the inhumane, humane. In the absence of explanation, I'll speak to response. How do we think? What do we do?

How do we think?

1. There is no excuse for senseless violence. Any

kind. Anywhere. Since the shooter killed himself we will never fully know why he did what he did. Investigators will try to put the pieces of the puzzle together and find answers. Whatever they discover, we must hold fast to the reality that senseless violence of any kind is reprehensible.

- 2. Words kill like weapons. In the Sermon on the Mount Jesus raised slander to the level of slaying. Words don't just hurt, they kill. When 70,000 fans boo a bad kicker in a football game, something in that kid dies. When politicians and journalists throw verbal daggers at one another, someone dies. Whoever said sticks and stones may break my bones, but words will never hurt me was denying reality.
- 3. Enough is enough. We are becoming desensitized. Push notifications bombard phones. Cable news reports violence all day, every day. Video games turn killing into competition. Music celebrates murder. Even too much news of the Las Vegas tragedy can desensitize. Overexposure deadens the conscience.

What do we do?

- 1. If you see something, say something. Yes, this is Homeland Security's slogan, but it belonged to Christianity long before the government trademarked it. Don't tolerate any form of bigotry, hatred, or violence. Jesus called us salt and light. Salt and light do the same thing: they reveal. Salt is a cook's friend--when the right amount is put in a recipe, it reveals the flavor of the food. No one has ever said, "The salt in this casserole tastes good." Light is a photographer's best friend. People don't look at a portrait and say, "I love how the light is coming in from the front." Rather they talk about the subject of the photograph. As salt and light, we flavor the world without drawing attention to ourselves--rather we reveal Christ.
- 2. Choose your words carefully. James 1:19 says, "Be quick to hear, slow to speak, slow to anger." His statement is both counterintuitive and countercultural. Our culture is quick to anger, quick to speak and slow to hear. Proverbs 18:21 adds, "Death and life are in the power of the tongue." Peter wrote, "Whoever desires to love life and see good days, let him keep his tongue from evil and his lips from speaking deceit." (1 Peter 3:10)
- 3. Filter what comes in. Examine your intake of violence. How much do you see or hear in a given day? Resolve to reduce it. Proverbs 4:23 says, "Above all else guard your heart for everything you do flows from it." What goes in will come out. Kevin DeYoung writes, "Having a conscience is one mark of being a sentient human being. Scripture sometimes speaks of people "who do not know their right hand from their left" (Jonah 4:11), or of "children, who . . . have no knowledge of good or evil" (Deut. 1:39). Knowing right from wrong is what makes us functioning adults. To have a malfunctioning conscience is to be less than human."

Perhaps in DeYoung's statement lies the explanation for the shooter's capacity to cowardly and mercilessly kill 59 people: he was less than human. Something happened to his conscience. Scripture says our conscience can be seared (1 Timothy 4:2) or defiled. Titus 1:15 says, "To the pure, all things are pure, but to the defiled and unbelieving, nothing is pure; but both their minds and their consciences are defiled."

Only Jesus can clean us up and clear our consciences. John said, "If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." (1 John 1:9) Only Jesus can turn senselessness into salvation and make the inhumane, humane.

RATS...BUMMER...HOLY SMOKES...I'm busted! "Yeah, well I did have a slight encounter with some barbed wire from somewhere, but wasn't sure where it came from. Do you think I should tell Betsy?" Again in his 'I'm the boss of you' voice, Doug replied, "No, that's okay. Betsy already knows."

If I've learned nothing else about farming, one thing is sure: Farm people notice EVERYTHING. Hardware Disease?????

But HARDWARE DISEASE? Come now, Farmer Doug, you are messing with me – ain't no such thing as "hardware disease". I mean why must be fabricate a story about some mysterious sickness? Rather than argue, I simply nodded agreement about the scare of hardware disease and went about my business. (Secretly, I wondered if Cousin Betsy was going to beat me up for "raking" down her barbed wire @)...hardware disease indeed!!!

Belly Ache? Eat A Magnet!

A quick internet search confirmed my worst fear...Farmer Doug was right; there is 'hardware disease'.

According to experts, hardware disease is the term used when complications occur after an animal consumes objects such as nails, wire, or even tin cans. This condition is particularly associated with bovine due to the fact that cows have been known to make a lunch of steel or tin objects. Renowned veterinarian C.E. Spaulding states, "Why bovines like the taste of steel and tin, I'll never know; but I've seen a cow happily munching down 16-penny spikes as her owner patched a barn wall."

From my heart to yours I pray this time of the year is very special for you. May you know God's presence and peace in wonderful ways. May your family be well and may you be able to spend time together.



Forgiveness: It's Not An Option

Have you been hurt by someone so deeply that you don't think you have the capacity to forgive them? No doubt evil people do evil things to good people and they aren't worth forgiving. But is that the issue?

In the Jewish culture their system of bankruptcy was to sell themselves to their creditor and work off the debt. God had an interesting rule he wanted his

people to follow regarding this practice. No matter what the debt was, as the end of every seven years, the creditors were to release the debtors. This would give even those with huge debts an opportunity to start over.

During Jeremiah's time, King Zedekiah initially honored this, but look what then happened:

Jer. 34:10 So all the officials and people who entered into this covenant agreed that they would free their male and female slaves and no longer hold them in bondage. They agreed, and set them free. 11 But afterward they changed their minds and took back the slaves they had freed and enslaved them again. 12 Then the word of the LORD came to Jeremiah: ... 15 "Recently you repented and did what is right in my sight: Each of you proclaimed freedom to your own people. You even made a covenant before me in the house that bears my Name. 16 But now you have turned around and profuned my name; each of you has taken back the male and female slaves you had set free to go where they wished. You have forced them to become your slaves again."

Because they broke the covenant and this was the response:

17 "Therefore this is what the LORD says: You have not obeyed me; you have not proclaimed freedom to your own people. So, I now proclaim 'freedom' for you, declares the LORD—'freedom' to fall by the sword, plague and famine. I will make you abhorrent to all the kingdoms of the earth.

This tells me God is serious about our obligation to forgive. He released us from the penalty of every sin in our lives. Therefore, we are to forgive others.

Jesus confirmed this command in one of his parables. In Matthew 18 he tells of a man who was released by the king from a debt of millions of dollars but when he ran across another who owed him a few dollars he demanded payment on the spot or threatened debtors prison. When the king got wind of this his whole attitude changed. "Because I forgave you a large amount you should have forgiven a small amount". Then he had the man cast into prison until the debt was paid in full.

But how could the man pay such a large debt while earning prison wages? He couldn't. There was only oneway out of prison: he had to die.

If we apply this story to our lives we see that no matter what has been done to us by others, it's incomparable to the

debt we owe our heavenly Father. Every sin we have ever committed was forgiven because of what Jesus did for us on the cross (that's the multi-million-dollar debt). Therefore, it is imperative that we forgive others their relatively puny debt. It's amazing how their offense to us shrinks in size when we look at our offense to God.

How do we do it from a practical standpoint? How do we get out of the prison of bitterness and judgment, depression and criticism? There's only one-way out: we have to die. But to take back the forgiveness puts you in the same position the Jews were in in King Zedekiah's time and we know how God feels about that. To "keep on forgiving" keeps us out of our prison and honors our Father at the same time.


family who has lost everything in a house fire or lending dignity to a young man attending his grandfather's funeral, SafePlace tries to bridge the void.

We face real life events that often cause us all to ask the question "Why?" Why did God allow a deranged gunman to open fire on a large crowd of concert attendees, killing many and wounding hundreds? Our community struggles to understand why God allowed one of our own firefighters to be killed while serving our community. Why does God allow loved ones to experience the horror of cancer? Why does God allow loved ones and friends to pass unexpectedly?



These are obviously questions for which there are no easy "cookie-cutter" answers. In some cases, we may believe we know the answer or at least have a good idea regarding the answer. In many cases, we are speechless as we try to rationalize that which God has allowed. If we are honest, we have felt at times that it even seems unjust.

When we are faced with circumstances we simply do not understand, we must learn to respond to these circumstances Biblically. God often does not reveal the reasons behind why He allows certain things; if He did, that would eliminate the need for faith. How do we respond when these things happen?

- Remain confident in God's nature. Regardless of what we face in life, we must remain firm in our conviction that God is always faithful and that God is always good. An unwavering confidence in God's nature enables us to respond properly to these difficult circumstances. When we begin to question God's nature, we will often find ourselves bitter at what God has allowed.
- 2. Trust that God knows best. Often, we mistakenly feel that we have a better idea of how to handle something or how something should be resolved. We have little understanding and certainly do not know what is best. Our perspective is limited; the finite will never understand the Infinite. We therefore place these difficult circumstances in God's hand with the confidence that He knows best.
- 3. Trust that God is at work. He may be using difficulties to draw us back to Him or to draw someone else to Him to be saved. He may be refining our spiritual character. He may be doing many things, but we must maintain an unwavering confidence that God is at work.
- 4. Submit to God's plan. Rather than arguing and questioning His plan, learn to submit to it. We know it is always best, yet we often struggle when our ideas are not reality. These are the moments when true submission to God is evidenced.

It is possible – and even expected – to respond Biblically to the challenges of life. Doing so is essential to maintaining a proper, God-honoring attitude, even when life does not make sense.

Christ is the Only Answer

We are living in days of tangled thinking. Purposes, ideals, motives and ideas are all crashing. Lawlessness and revolutions have now become the spirit of the age. And it has penetrated into every realm of human thinking.

The Apostle Paul warned us that in the latter days a spirit of lawlessness would prevail in the entire world. We are told that this spirit of lawlessness is the spirit of antichrist. The new Testament even warns that this spirit will invade the church and that the church must constantly be on her guard.



Mental revolution is in the air. People are turning consciously or unconsciously against the status quo. In every relationship of life, some of the commonly accepted opinions have been thrown on the scrap heap. Any method or idea that is old has come under suspicion. There is a general opinion that if an idea is to be useful in this generation, it must be new.

There is a revolt against authority of all kinds. Lawlessness is the spirit of the times. Analyze every expression of it, and you will find in it an unwillingness to be controlled. Tradition, substance and precedent are all discarded. Governmental authority is questioned, moral standards are laughed at and the church is considered a useless institution. In the United States, even the Constitution is considered out of date.

Jesus Christ can give mental rest to those who are confused and bewildered. He can quiet your heart and give you inner serenity and joy if you will let Him have control of your mind and heart.

Today there is revolution in the industrial world. It is too bad that in labormanagement discussions selfishness reigns. Selfishness is sin, and people are sinners. The heart must be made right before there can be any proper adjustment of external affairs.

The spirit of lawlessness is in the home. There is very little discipline in many homes. Each child is a law unto himself. The modern rendering of Paul's familiar injunction might well be, "Parents, obey your children, for this is right." In many of our homes, if there is a voice of authority at all, it is the voice of the child. Parents have little or nothing to say about the life of the child. As a result of all this, there is a grand rush for amusement on the part of the children.

If children do not hear in the home a voice that speaks with authority, how can we expect them to obey the voice of the national government? We are now reaping exactly what we have sown for many years. We have allowed our children to run wild without discipline.

There is one answer to the many problems that beset the average home, and that is Jesus Christ. As Christ blessed the home of Mary and Martha long ago, so He can bless your home. If the individuals in your home will put their trust in Him, there is not a problem that you and your family face today but what He has a solution.

There is a revolution in the realm of morals. Never in the history of the world have we seen such a casting aside of moral restraint. Things that a generation ago were considered shocking are now accepted as commonplace. The entire country is obsessed with an excess of sexual individualism. The principal topic of conversation seems to be sex. Why are we suffering from such an excess? Because all the Christian social barriers and moral restraints have been broken down. People have little or no restraint. They refuse to be controlled. They insist on setting their own standards.

If the church raises its voice against the deplorable morals of our day, we are called old-fashioned and puritanical. The moral restraint placed by God upon men and women is now laughed at and ridiculed. Every person wants to do what is right in his or her own eyes. A Congressman once told me that immorality was the curse of Washington. Where will this end? Where will it stop? How much farther can we go without falling apart at the seams?

There has never been a nation in the history of the world that has ever improved morally apart from a revival. Nearly all great nations of the past have been destroyed by disintegration of moral character. That is now happening in the United States. History gives us only one remedy, and that is a spiritual revival. As revival injected into Great Britain brought a new moral fiber during the days of Wesley, so turning to Christ can save us now.

I warn you—the issue in the United States at this moment is not political. It is spiritual. What are we going to do with Jesus Christ? That's the question that should confront every person today. The modern expressions of revolutions are the natural results of a lawlessness in the hearts of men. We are rebels against God.

Thank God, however, there is a splendid company of people who have not bowed the knee to Baal. The true child of God has nothing to fear in all of today's threatening situations.

God is not surprised at these happenings. He is not dependent upon our puny plans and political conventions for a solution. The hope of the world is the Man whom the world has rejected. It is for us to uphold that God-man, Jesus, as Redeemer and Savior and leave the rest to Him.

There are times when revolts and revolutions are right and just. Great Britain has the Magna Carta because of her revolution. The United States has its Declaration of Independence because of a revolution.

We have come to a place where we must have another revolution if we are to be saved. The church must lead this revolution. We must have a revolution against corruption in high places, against immorality, licentiousness and sensuality, which are pervading every realm of our society. We must have a revolt against alcoholism and drug trafficking. We must have a revolt against lying, cheating and cutting corners in business. We must have a revolt against discrimination because of race, color or creed. We need a revolt against hypocrisy,



spiritual indifference and slothfulness on the part of church members.

I call upon the church today to fall on its knees before God and ask the God and Captain of our salvation to lead on in a spiritual revolution that will shake the very foundations of the social structure.

Christianity is not a religion for weaklings. The challenge of the hour in which we live is so tremendous that it calls for the very best in us. We must be strong, virile and dynamic if we are to stand. The only thing that can give us this moral spiritual strength is a return to Christ. Unless we turn to Christ, I despair for our future. I am convinced that unless we have a great spiritual revival, we cannot endure much longer. We are at enmity against God. We have disobeyed His laws.

We are fighting and rebelling against God and His plans, laws, statutes and commandments. The Bible says that we are enemies of God. However, thanks be unto God, there is a way to be reconciled to Him. The Scripture says, "For if when we were enemies we were reconciled to God through the death of His Son, much more, having been reconciled, we shall be saved by His life" (Romans 5:10).

An enemy, reconciled, is a friend. A disturbed relationship has thus been made right, and the result is one of joy and satisfaction with each other. This is what God has done through Christ Jesus. Man, the enemy of God, has been reconciled through the death of Jesus Christ and having been reconciled to God, the Bible says, "...much more, having been reconciled, we shall be saved by His life."

The Bible teaches that you are at enmity with God, that you are separated from God. The Bible teaches that there is no way back to God except through Jesus Christ. And if God says that to the individual, God also says it to the nation. Until this nation humbles itself and prays and seeks God and falls upon its face and receives Christ as Savior, there is no hope. There is only one road—one way out—and that is through a personal knowledge of Jesus Christ.



Swordfish

Have you ever heard of a swordfish? They are an amazing fish that is believed to be the fastest and strongest fish in the seas. They can swim up to 50 mph! Swordfish are predatory fish that bunt at night and migrate to different warm waters for food. Born with smooth two-toned, brown skin (no scales), the

swordfish's favorite food is tuna, flying fish, squid, and barracuda. The Swordfish do not have teeth, but who needs teeth when they can thrash and slash their long sharp swords around to knock out, slice, and chop up their dinner!

These fish love to jump out of the water, sometimes it's to catch prey, other times it's to rid themselves of parasites.

Swordfish can grow up to 15 ft. long and weigh as much as 1400 lbs. Did you know that God gave swordfish a super power? Their super power is called cranial endothermy. This gift allows the swordfish to heat their large, tennis ball eyes, and their brain up to 60 degrees warmer than the current water temperature while the rest of its body stays cold. This allows their big, blue eyes to move and work ten times faster than the fish that have cold eyes. The swordfish are then able to capture light quickly in the dark depths of the cold ocean and find fish to eat. Swordfish protect themselves from Mako sharks by ramming them in their gills and stomach with their sharp swords. These fish have also been known to ram their swords in the planks of small boats when they are harpooned by fisherman. Did you know that God has equipped us with a sword? He sure has, it's part of the armor of God. Do you know what our sword is? It's the Word of God that is found in your Bible! A Life Lived Not Lost

One generation shall praise thy works to another, and shall declare thy mighty acts. Psalm 145:4

The loss of a child ripples through the lives of loved ones and those who hear about the tragedy. Many parents live on in disbelief, wondering how they could have outlived their child. Even King David in the Bible com-

pletely shut down his governmental activities and concentrated wholly on praying for his newborn baby who was desperately ill. His tiny son died, and David was able to pen divine inspired words that have comforted a multitude of parents.

I shall go to him, but he shall not return to me. 2 Samuel 12:23

This biblical baby emphasizes the fact that all human life is precious and makes a powerful statement beyond their earthly existence. King David's son's short life has shown to us that love transcends the loss of a child and underscores the significance of a life lived, not lost.

Michael and Cynthia Staton lost their sixteen-year-old daughter, Victoria, to Cystic Fibrosis on November 9, 2012. The grieving process urged her to write a book about her path through the grief and her daughter's influence on Cynthia's journey of faith.

The core message of the book, A Life Lived, Not Lost, chronicles Cynthia's journey of hope. She saw the miracles of faith through Victoria's eyes as she struggled with her disease and then saw them through her own eyes after her salvation. Cynthia's path to faith emerged from her daughter's love for the Lord.


In a recent interview with Cynthia, I asked her more about her book, A Life Lived Not Lost.

Interviewer: Why did you write this book?

<u>Answer:</u> Victoria touches thousands of lives even today, five years after her passing. I wanted everyone to know that God is always there even though we don't

see Him. Victoria pointed me to God through her kindness and exampling His love to me. I watched Victoria and learned God-sized lessons. One time, as she waited on her gurney to enter the operating room as a little girl, Torrie (Victoria) noticed a young woman crying on her own gumey across the room. Although Tomie had already received a relaxant, she slipped off her bed, crossed the room and snuggled her special surgery companion, a crocheted angel doll, to the 19-year-old and talked with her. It was simple acts of love such as this that I remembered. and they helped me to understand God's love for me.

When I got saved, Torrie knew as soon as she came down to breakfast that I had received Christ. My eyes were opened, and I saw Victoria



differently. Torrie assured me that Jesus would never drop me. Although it hurt to relive the memories, this was my purpose. The hardest part of writing the book was that I wrote the second half of the book first which recorded my thoughts after she passed away.

What is the core message of the book?

<u>Answer:</u> God is always with you. For each person, God has a purpose. Victoria's purpose was completed, pointing me to God. I could now carry on her legacy because her body could no longer carry her.

Which chapter of the book is most meaningful to you?

Answer: The last chapter, #24-Completing the Circle, is the most meaningful to me. When my father discovered his liver cancer, his hardened heart softened, and I was able to lead him to the Lord. I explained to my father about God in the same way that Victoria had explained Him to me, slowly and lovingly. I found my purpose in helping others such as my father to find God.

A few months after that, Gerald Kaye, my father, died at Coney Island Hospital in Brooklyn, NY. I had pointed him to Jesus just like my daughter had pointed me to the Savior of the world.

Do you plan to write another book?

Answer: I'm working on a devotional to help others walk through grief in the loss of a child.

2nd Highest Performing Community College—Again!

For the second year in a row, McDowell Technical Community College has been ranked second highest performing college among the 58 community colleges in North Carolina.

The ranking is an annual assessment by the North Carolina Community College System (NCCCS) to determine how each of the state's community colleges stack up against seven performance criteria that measure student success.



"I've said it before and I'll say it again—our faculty and staff are some of the best anywhere," said Dr. John Gossett, McDowell Tech's president. "While we have much more limited resources than schools in wealthier communities and with larger endowments, our folks continue to perform better than almost all of those colleges, whether you're talking about larger schools, smaller schools, more wealthy schools, schools whose students enter college with better academic performance and so on."

The 2017 Performance Measures Summary identifies seven key areas that state education leaders use to measure performance progress: Basic Skills Progress, English Success Rate, Math Success Rate, First Year Progression, Curriculum Completion Rate, Licensure and Certification Passing Rate and Transfer Performance. Results of each measure are compared in several ways, including individual college performance measured against a baseline, performance measured against the average performance of all 58 colleges and performance measured against an "Excellence" standard established by NCCCS administrators.

Dr. Gossett and Ladelle Harmon, Director of Institutional Effectiveness, shared specifics from the performance summary with MTCC Trustees at the board's monthly meeting in mid-September. Harmon told trustees that all 58 colleges were scored according to how many measures met or exceeded the "Excellence" standard, how many exceeded the average of all colleges but did not meet the "Excellence" standard, how many were above the baseline but did not meet the average of all colleges and how many did not meet the baseline.

"We were above the baseline in all seven measures, exceeded in the 'Excellence' standard on four measures, and exceeded the state average of all community colleges on two additional measures," said Harmon.

Board members were very proud and complimentary of the college's faculty

and staff, particularly since the college not only performed well in the overall performance ranking, but had first, second and third place rankings in three of the seven individual measures: Credit Math Success. Credit English Success, and Licensure and Certification Passing Rate, respectively.

Credit Math Success measures the percentage of first-time Associate Degree seeking and transfer pathway students who pass a credit-bearing Math course with a "C" or better within two years of their first term of enrollment. Credit English Success measures the same thing, but in English. Licensure and Certification Passing Rate measures the aggregate institutional passing rate of first-time test takers on state-mandated licensure and certification exams required before becoming an active practitioner in a MTCC President, Dr. John Gossett particular profession.



In overall performance, McDowell Tech trailed first place finisher Coastal Carolina Community College for the second year in a row. Only one measure separated McDowell Tech from Coastal Carolina's ranking: Curriculum Completion Rate. MTCC was one of 21 colleges who fell just below the state average in this category. 7 colleges did not even meet the baseline for this measure.

"We know that we have to continue working on our Curriculum Completion Rate," said Gossett. "We had already begun putting measures in place that we think will help more of our students complete their degrees, but it takes time for those efforts to pay off for us."

The college is working more pro-actively with students who appear to be falling behind in completing their degree. "We have to help people overcome the obstacles that stand in the way of them completing a degree and becoming successful," Gossett continued.

"In addition, we are doing things like making diploma programs available in some curriculum areas for students who decide in mid-stream that they do not want to complete a full associate degree in their chosen field, but are able to complete a shorter diploma program," said Dr. Penny Cross, Vice-President of Learning and Student Services. "Having that credential will help open more doors for them professionally as well."

Gossett thanked the board of trustee members for their support and accolades. "It is great to see our performance and the success of our students in black-andwhite," Gossett concluded, "but it is even more important for our folks to know that they are valuable and valued. We have been providing quality education in McDowell County for 50 years now, and this ranking proves it."



Learning from Children

The Scripture which I have referred to in the beginning of this article, has reference to a coming time that we call the Millennial Reign of Christ upon the earth in a future day. The church will be raptured out of this world (Revelation 4:1). After that there will be a seven-year Tribulation Period upon the earth, a thousand-year earthly reign of Christ that will follow, and finally new heavens and a new earth (2 Peter 3:10-13).

The literal interpretation of Isaiah 11:6 is that children will be able to lead wolves, leopards, and lions in the coming 1,000-year reign of Christ on the earth. Those kinds of animals during that time will lose their desire for meat and will eat vegetables. It will be safe for a little child to have animals for pets that are listed in our text verse. That is the primary interpretation of what that verse says.

I am going to make a secondary application. In our text verse we have children leading previously wild animals. However, I want us to consider this verse in the light of children teaching adults valuable lessons. We seek to teach and train children, but there are many things we can learn from them if we observe them carefully.

Lesson About Unconditional Love

One of the most needed traits, adults need to possess is an unconditional love. This is a reference to love without conditions. Sometimes we want to love a person because they meet all of our expectations for them. What about those times when someone does not always do the way, act and react the way you want them to do? That is where love without conditions steps in and takes over. This kind of love still loves when there are few reasons to love. Kids do not love on the basis of conditions but rather spontaneously.

God loves us with an unconditional love. He knows everything about us and still yet He loved you and me. God declares in Jeremiah 31:3, "I have loved thee with an everlasting love..." The love of God for us will never end no matter what we do or say.

Lesson About the Spirit of Forgiveness

I have been privileged to raise four children and have thirteen grandchildren. I have observed some very important things in kid's relationships to one another. I have watched grandchildren fight and struggle with one another. They can become mad enough with one another to about choke each other and look as frustrated as a bull in a china closet. In a short while they go outside to play with one another, acting as though nothing ever happened.

Adults are so different. When an adult is wronged by another person, he or she tends to want to hold a grudge and not forgive the one who gave the offense. That is not the course of behavior the Lord wants us to take. Matthew 6:14-15 says: "For if ye forgive men their trespasses, your heavenly Father will also forgive you; but if ye forgive not men their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses."

That is plain, pointed, precise language.

Many people miss blessings because they will not forgive someone who they felt has wrong them. Let's be more like little children in the sense of being willing to forgive those who trespass against us. Since the Lord forgave us when we believed, we should be ready to forgive those who trespass against us. Keep short offense accounts with others.

Lesson About Friendliness

So many adults are lacking in social skills. Some complain about not having friends when they will not make themselves friendly Proverbs 18:24 says, "A man that hath friends must show himself friendly..."

Most kids will smile and are friendly with a stranger. I love to smile at little kids and see them smile in response, even when I do not know them. So many folks come to church looking like they have lost their best friend, and as though there is no hope. Come to church to be a friend and plan to be friendly to those who are gathered there to worship. Don't be a discouragement to others, be an encouragement.

Lesson About Perseverance

I watched one of my grandchildren many years ago building a structure with blocks. Time and time again he tried to stack the blocks, but they would tumble down before he could ever use them all. The little fellow did not give up very easily. The blocks would fall, then he would pick them up until he finally stacked every one of them in their proper place.

Adults give up too easily. The Bible says, "In due season we shall reap if we faint not" (Galatians 6:9). That word "faint" means "to break up, to dissolve, or to melt." God's people need a backbone like a saw log to stand in these evil days. We cannot give up when the going gets tough in life.

Lessons About Laughter

Kids do a great deal of laughing. They laugh about some of the silliest things but at least they laugh.

Some adults have forgotten how, thus the trials and problems have piled upon them, hindering the quality of their lives. The Scriptures tell us in Proverbs 17:22, "A merry heart doeth good like a medicine, but a broken spirit drieth the bones." We adults need to learn from the example of little children to laugh more than we do.

Lesson About Activity

Most children are very active. They want to do something so sometimes they get into things they should have no part of being involved with in daily life. They are moving and doing something all the time, even if it is nothing more than playing with the controls on a video game or touching the screen on a tablet.

Adults need to be more active for the Lord. The spiritual "harvest truly is plenteous, but the laborers are few" (Matthew 9:27).

Lesson About Trust

Overall children are more trusting than adults are. Adults have seen so many things happen in life, thus, they do not trust as easily as kids do.

We may not always be able to trust others. On the other hand, we can certainly trust God in life for power, provision, guidance, and help as we go through this present world. Psalm 37:5 says, "Trust in the Lord, do good; so thou shalt dwell in the land and verily thou shalt be fed."

We should follow Jesus' example in giving thanks. When Jesus fed the five thousand, he "took the loaves; and when he had given thanks, he distributed to the disciples, and the disciples to them that were set down; and likewise of the fishes as much they would." (John 6:11) When Lazarus, the brother



of Martha and Mary, died, the women sent for Jesus, but Jesus delayed his coming. When he did arrive, he went to the tomb. "Then they took away the stone from the place where the dead was laid. And Jesus lifted up his eyes, and said, Father, I thank thee that thou hast heard me. And I knew that thou hearest me always: but because of the people which stand by I said it, that they may believe that thou hast sent me." (John 11:41-42) To whom should we give thanks? First of all, we should give thanks to God. "And I thank Christ Jesus our Lord, who hath enabled me, for that he counted me faithful, putting me into the ministry; who was before a blasphemer, and a persecutor, and injurious: but I obtained mercy, because I did it ignorantly in unbelief." (I Timothy 1:11-12) For what should we give thanks? We should give thanks for everything. "In everything give thanks: for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning you." I am glad for an annual day of Thanksgiving, but thanksgiving must be more than an annual event. We need to think and thank God, the faithful source of our blessings, continually. "It is of the LORD'S mercies that we are not consumed, because his compassion fail not. They are new every morning: great is thy faithfulness." (Lamentations 3:22-23) "Every good gift and perfect gift is from above, and cometh down from the Father of lights, with whom is no variableness, neither shadow of turning." (James 1: 17) As God's children we are often unfaithful and unthankful. "The ox knoweth his owner, the ass his master's crib: but Israel doth not know, my people doth not consider:" (Isaiah 1:3) Let us remember to think of the goodness and generosity of God to sinful man. "He did good, and gave us rain from heaven, and fruitful seasons, filling our hearts with food and gladness." (Act 14-17)



On October 20th at the Spruce Pine Fire Department, I was pleased to attend the kick-off for the initial phase of Smart Start's statewide expansion of Dolly Parton's Imagination Library. I first learned of the Imagination Library several years ago when I attended Childfest in Mitchell County with my twin sons and signed them up to receive a free monthly book. At that time, I expressed to Jennifer Simpson, Executive Director of the Blue Ridge Partnership for Children, my desire that the program go state-wide.



And so, I have worked to make that happen. I started with Senate Bill 280 – Early Literacy Initiative/Funds, which became a provision in the Senate budget. Sponsors of the House companion bill, Representatives Josh Dobson and Justin Burr, helped shepherd the provision through the House and the Smart Start Reading Initiative became an appropriation of the state budget for \$3.5 million for 2017-18, and \$7 million for 2018-19. Once fully implemented in fiscal year 2018-19, access to the program will be statewide.

This early literacy program mails high quality, age-appropriate books to each registered child on a monthly basis, from birth through age five, providing each child with a library of 60 books by the time they start school. I believe taxpayers get the biggest bang for the buck when dollars are focused on children's earliest development years, before they enter school. Literacy is a cornerstone of success in school and beyond, and investing in literacy for every child will result in the educational outcomes we need for our citizens to have enriching, productive lives

This week, the Senate passed the National Defense Authorization Act. This legislation is critical to accomplishing the federal government's most important responsibility: keeping our country safe. As the Chairman of the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence and your Senator from North Carolina, I am all too aware of the wide-range of threats facing our nation and how versatile our military must be to fight them. We cannot stand idly by as Iran, North Korea, Russia, ISIL, Al-Qaeda and others present a threat to the United States.

For the previous eight years, our armed forces have been asked to carry out an ever-growing range of missions without the necessary resources to do so. At the same time, Secretary of Defense Mattis and America's military leaders have consistently stated that budget cuts have hindered their ability to address the troop training and readiness shortfalls they currently face. The National Defense Authorization Act addresses these concerns and includes \$358 million for military installations in North Carolina. As the home to Seymour Johnson Air Force Base, Marine Corps Base Camp Lejeune, Marine Corps Air Station Cherry Point, the Army's Fort Bragg, and several more, North Carolina's military bases are especially well-served by the investments made in this bill.

This legislation also includes a provision I wrote that will improve standards for child care centers on military bases. It also requires child care providers on military bases to go through a criminal background check before they can work with the children of our troops. Our military families have enough on their plate to worry about when they are working to keep our country safe; they should not have to worry about whether their children are in safe hands during the day. I was very proud to see this common-sense provision included in the legislation.

Overall, the National Defense Authorization Act will give our troops the tools they need to defend the United States and her interests abroad. I will continue fighting to honor our troops and veterans and restore America's military strength.



The Beginning of the Story

When God controls the story of your life He adds things you could have never dreamed, calls you deeper than you ever thought you could go, and demands more than you thought you could ever give. In that place of the great big unknown of God is where we find ourselves today.



God has given me (Stephynia) songs for several years. In 2015, I was sitting at my keyboard and heard the line "somebody love me". I knew that this was the heart cry of a child. I knew the song had something to do with a foster community, perhaps a fundraiser song. I began looking for someone who needed the song but could not find a place for it, so I put it on the back burner.

In spring 2016, I tried to find a place for the song again but did not hear any direction from God. I was in school full time, pregnant and taking care of a two year old, so once again I laid the song down. In late 2016 God told me I was supposed to record an album. I had no idea where to start or what to do, so I kept it to myself, but God began pouring songs into my heart faster than they had ever come before.

During the same time, John and I became friends with a couple from the church we were attending who had five adopted children. They asked us to help pray

whether they should open their home to one more child. In February, they received a call asking them if they would take a three day old girl who was taken into DSS custody at birth. We received a text asking us to pray for wisdom for them. The next day our friends called to let us know they were taking the baby and were allowed to name her. Baby Charis (which is Greek for God's grace) became a



part of their family and unknown to us, a part of our story.

A few days after Charis came home from the hospital we were honored to be asked to come and pray over her dedicating her life to God. The next morning while having a conversation about Charis, I heard God say "that song is for Charis". I knew immediately which song he meant. Before I could tell anyone, I again heard Him say, "and the name of your album is The Charis Project: Live it out and it is to fund The Charis Foundation". I was so overwhelmed; all I could do Was CIV.

Later that day, I shared what I heard with John. I told him I had no idea what the Charis Foundation was but I thought it had something to do with foster children. John quietly said "I know what it is'. Then he began sharing, with tears in his eyes, the vision God had been speaking to his heart about building a foster community... And the Charis Children's Foundation was born.

The vision for Charis Children's Foundation is to house children in multiple houses in a community setting with permanent foster parents. We know the vision will change and grow as we do, but our heart is to provide long term Christian homes for foster children sharing the love of Jesus and the hope of the Gospel will always be our mission.

We believe God has uniquely trained and called us through our life and career experience to create The Charis Children's Foundation. Children have unfortunately been lost in the madness of a world that promotes materialism, selfishness, and hedonism. Judeo- Christian values are shunned in this modern era of acceptance and tolerance.

We believe God created marriage, between one man and one woman. He cre-

ated family. It is all to reflect who He is and His relationship with us. He sets the standards by which man should live.

Our goal is to bring the hope and love of the true gospel to a generation of kids who have been thrown away. We want to see the church rise up and take its place as the center of family and community again. We want every child that God allows us to reach to feel the safety of knowing there is a God that loves them and a family that does as well.

The first phase of the Charis Children's Foundation includes the building of a community health center that will provide medical care, social support services and recovery services for the foster children, their families and the community. We are donating a home near Burnsville to Charis Children's Foundation which will be remodeled and enlarged to serve as the community health center. Phase

one is necessary to receive the credentialing required to be licensed to house foster children in a community setting

We believe the foster care issue is the mandate of the church to address, not the government. We believe no



one can address the wounds caused by addiction, abuse and neglect without the power of the love of Jesus. We can provide housing and services, but only Jesus can make a wounded heart whole again.

The Charis Children's Foundation is currently in the planning and fund raising stages. The Charis Project album is being recorded at Cross the Bridge Ministries in Spruce Pine, NC. We are prayerfully taking each step as God directs. We believe that God will bring to fruition what he has started. We are challenging the body of Christ to partner with us to care for these children.


Senior starts book drive for former elementary school

Helping Our Farm Families

The Mitchell County Farm Bureau Women's Committee has been very active this year in furthering our mission statement of supporting agriculture through legislation and education. Agriculture has always been a fundamental part of life here in the county. According to data from the USDA's censuses of 2007 and 2012, Mitchell County has lost 15% of farm acreage, as well as

seen a decrease in the number of farms and animals produced. It seems though that the way farmers sell their products is changing, as we are seeing a substantial increase in sales directly to consumers. There has been a 25% increase in veg-

etable farms with a 17% increase in sales over this same five year period. Local farms accounted for nearly \$1 million added to our local economy. Agritourism, or tourism centered around a farm or farming activities such as a corn maze, winery or farm store, is growing rapidly.

For the last 3 years, MCFB Womens Committee has awarded a scholarship for a local student to pursue an education in an agriculturally related field. We have tried several different ways of raising money for this scholarship. This year, we raised money at the Rhododendron Festival selling rhododendron raised here in the county and hosting a Cow Patty Bingo game. The game is played by releasing a Cow into a field marked by a grid and waiting to see where the first cow patty lands. Squares were sold ahead of time and a \$500 prize was awarded to the owner of the square, which this year was given to Kim Slotnick.

This August, we planned our first Agriculture Science Night for county 3rd and 4th graders. Student teachers came from Lees McRae College to assist us. Our sessions included parts of a plant, an agriculture fact or fiction quiz, Christmas tree farming, healthy snacking and composting. There were lots of hands on activities for them to do, dinner was served, and we finished up with door prizes and individually made ice cream desserts. The students had a wonderful time learning the science of agriculture and the parents all agreed it was a most informative evening. We hope to continue the Ag Science night annually for the benefit of local students. Children get excited about agriculture. Understanding where food comes from and ways to get involved in growing their own can certainly help today's children make better choices as consumers . A scholarship helps insure those with a passion for agriculture will learn and pass on their knowledge for the improvement of all. Agriculture affects all of us, every day.

Storms

Several years ago, I turned off the TV, not just for the evening or for the day, but for what I thought would be forever. People would ask me why? "Are you tired of all of the violence?" "Are you tired of all the negativity?" "Do you find that you now have time to read, fish, talk with your wife...?" As much as I would like to have given those folks some lofty, noble reason for turning off the TV, I could not. I was not trying to spend more quality time with Caroline. There were no books

begging to be read. My garden did not have any less weeds in it. Much like Forrest Gump when he said, "I just felt like running." I Jim Hart is the student pastor of Crossnore School in Crossnore, NC just felt like turning off the TV.

Twelve months, seven days and thirteen hours later (or there about), I decided to turn the TV back on. It was one of those old school console TVs with the dial. The kind that your mom or dad used to tell you to get up and change while your brother went outside and turned the antenna. The kind folks now turn into aquariums. I just walked up to it and turned it back on. It spit and sputtered and blinked back to life after a year of service as a collection area for keys, wallets and plants that needed more sun. And just like that, I sat down in my favorite chair and started watching TV again.

Today, I still sit in my favorite chair and watch TV. Gone is the old console model covered with spare change, keys and plants needing more light. In its place is a fancy swanky, super thin 60inch plasma TV. For all its attributes, it is not a good place for your wallet or plants that need more sun. They fall right off. However, there is still one holdover from my yearlong sabbatical from the tube. I still do not watch the news or the weather. Caroline always asks if I am worried if it's going to be cold or if it's going to rain. How about if something important happens in the world? You will miss out. If I walk outside and its cold, I put on a jacket. If it's downright cold, I put on two. When I look out the window each morning, if I see rain, there is a 100% chance of rain for the day, so I wear a rain coat. If the wind is blowing, I know it's a bad day for squirrel hunting or fly fishing. When Caroline informs me that something bad or important has happened in the world, I pray and reflect on how I can help. Simple, real simple!

That all changed in the month of September. I became fixated on the news and the weather. My morning routines and daily schedules were disrupted by the looming monster Hurricane Irma. Where would it make landfall? How could anybody in the Caribbean survive such a storm? Will it hit Southern Florida and make a beeline for the mountains of North Carolina or will it go east and destroy Wilson, where my mother lives. I was so consumed with this storm that I forgot to do the things that are such a part of my daily life, of who I am. I had failed to do what Paul urged the church in Thessalonica to do in his epistle, "Be joyful always; pray continually; give thanks in all circumstances, for this is God's will for you in Christ Jasus" (1Thess. 5: 16-18, NIV). I let a storm far out in the Atlantic drive a wedge between me and God. I had let fear of the unknown pull me away from living a life that is itself a living testament of scripture reading, prayer, thanksgiving and discernment. I was afraid for the wellbeing of my loved ones. Something that was completely out of my control had taken control of my life, yet I was fixated on it, trying to find some control in the chaos.

Storms will come. There will be things that are completely out of our control that will deeply affect our lives. There will be hurricanes and crashing waves in our lives, storms that deeply affect our hearts, minds and souls --- blowing winds that make us bend, drive wedges between us and God and ultimately cause us to break...if we let them, if we only focus on the storm.

Living with the diagnosis of ALS, Ed Dobson, pastor emeritus of Calvary Church in Grand Rapids, Michigan wrote, Seeing Through The Fog. Facing only a few years left in his life, Ed shared his journey of finding joy and hope in the midst of the storm of a failing body. Searching for answers and healing, Ed aske pastor friend to anoint him with oil and pray over him for healing. He was not just looking for someone to pray the words, "God, heal him if it is Your will." He wanted someone to pray who deeply believed Ed could and would be healed. He wanted someone to pray the words, "God, heal him!" His Pentecostal friend and pastor did just that and then told Ed, "Don't become obsessed with getting healed, Ed. If you get obsessed, you will lose your focus. Get lost in the wonder of God, and who knows what He will do for you."

Today, as I sit here looking out the window of my office at Crossnore School and Children's Home there is 100% chance for rain. I heard it pelting the roof this morning, so I wore a rain coat. Since Irma, I have turned off the news and the weather and picked back up where I left off in my morning routine - pray the Psalms, give thanks, breath...focus! I pray that when the next storm comes, and it will, that I do not become obsessed with the healing, with



the diverting. with asking to spare me and my family. I pray that I get lost in the wonder of the storms and God's amazing grace in the midst of the chaos.



Running the Race

Most folks probably wouldn't believe it by looking at me now, but back in the day I ran track. Matter of fact I was a sprinter! Hard to imagine I know, but it's the truth. After many years and pounds have passed, those days are over for sure! If you see me running, look behind me, because there must be something really big chasing me!

Being a good runner takes discipline and hard work. An athlete doesn't just decide one day that they are going to run a marathon. To build up to



The writer of the book of Hebrews (whom I believe is Paul) makes a comparison of the Christian life to a race. In chapter 12 verses 1-3, he gives some foundational truth of how we can run this race of faith and be successful and most importantly, faithful to the Lord in the process.

First of all, we are to learn from those who ran before us: "Wherefore seeing we also are compassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses..." I believe he is referring to the ones he wrote about in chapter 11. Chapter 11 is what I call the Great Hall of Faith. He gives us a list of those who ran the race of faith before us. Ones such as Abel, Enoch, Noah, Abraham, Sarah, Jacob, Joseph, etc. etc. In other words, we can look to the example that has been set by those we read about in the scriptures. But I don't believe it just stops there. There are those in our families, our church families, among our friends and peers whom faithfully run the race of faith that we can learn from. They can teach us by being our example of what it takes to be in the race.

Secondly, we must rid ourselves of hindrances: "let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us..." One thing you will notice about runners is that for the most part they are skinny! Now you know why I walk! There are no excess pounds that they have to carry that would hinder their performance. Not only that but notice how their clothing is so lightweight. No big, bulky, or heavyweight uniforms are used. The less weight one has to carry the better they can compete. Essentially, Paul is telling us the same thing in our spiritual race. We must get rid of the excess baggage that weights us down spiritually. Repentance of sin in our lives should be obvious. Hard to run this race with Jesus when there is sin in our lives. Sin breaks our fellowship with our Savior and hinders His work in our lives. We must get rid of the extra weight spiritually that we shouldn't be carrying.

Next, we must recognize the kind of race we are in: "and let us run with patience the race that is set before us..." The word "patience" in this text means endurance. The race that you and I are in is not a short sprint and then we cross the finish line. This race of faith is a lifelong marathon. When training for long distance running an athlete must work over time to build endurance. Each day they push themselves a little more and work a little harder. This kind of endurance doesn't come in days or weeks, but over months and years. The reason many Christians struggle in this race of faith is they keep thinking they are sprinters.

instead of long distance runners!
Like a seasoned runner that chooses to train every day, we have to wake up every day and choose Jesus. Being a Christian is a lifetime commitment where we choose to run this race of faith every day, understanding that we are



in this for the long haul!

Lastly, and most importantly, we must keep our eyes on the prize: "looking unto Jesus the author and finisher of our faith; who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is set down at the right hand of the throne of God." The goal of the athlete who competes is to win the prize. All the hard work, long hours of training, and discipline happen because they focus on what they want to achieve: The prize! Notice how proudly an Olympic competitor stands on the podium when they receive their medal. All the time and energy spent was to hopefully be on that podium to see all the hard work pay off and receive that medal. Tears often overwhelm them as they realize they have achieved their goal. As we run this race of faith my friends we must never take our eyes off the prize. Jesus, who is the author and finisher of our faith, is the one who ran His race in obedience to the Father. He is our example, He is our Savior, He is the reason we entered this race to begin with. Never, ever, take your eyes off of Jesus. When we cross the finish line one day, it will be worth it all! Keep on running the race my friends and keep your eyes on Jesus!!!


No Regrets Family Ministry-A Dark Place

It made me think of how we often cross our own rivers.

Both my mother and father have gone on. They have both crossed their River of Jordan to reach that far distant shore. Each passed in their own way, but it was my blessing to have had the opportunity to say goodbye to each of them before they stepped into the current and began their journey across; God made that possible. I was not there on the other side to welcome them home, but in some instance, I know they both had steep embankments up which they had to struggle; death did not come easy. As Christ suffered on the cross for our sins, he too felt the painful anguish of death's sting, but he was not defeated by it. The stillness was broken by a shrill snort. Behind me on a tree-covered peak beyond where I stood, a buck huffed irrever-



ently at me; my presence had encroached upon his domain. One couldn't help to think that perhaps he was as enamored with the scene as was I. The crickets spoke of the coming darkness, so I made my way back down the slope to home leaving the deer to his peace. My thoughts meandered back to the clear flowing waters. Tomorrow I would try once more to find myself wading the waters to reach the sanctuary, challenged but not diminished by what it took to reach that distant shore. The first step is always the hardest.

Likewise, when we decide to take our leap of faith and commit our lives to serving the Lord, the first step is the most difficult. Stepping from the safety of the shore into the unknown can be enough to cause us to reconsider our decision. We think it is all our doing, that we'll have to make it on our own. What we often fail to realize is that once we begin our journey with Him, that is Him, God, that will be there to help make up the differences we cannot fathom. So, when we finally realize that we are not alone, we can make that first step.

The freezing water at first is like burning fire, but with time, we become numb to its pain. As we learn to trust in Him, we are able to carry on, pushing forward, becoming numb to our previous fears. The current is strong, and it takes every ounce of strength to take each new step, yet we are not deterred. In our weakness, we become strong in Him. The reward we seek is far greater than the obstacles that try to dissuade us from reaching that distant shore. The cold has lessened the pains; still, we continue on regardless of what others might say or think. Once we find ourselves committed, standing on the brink of the rushing waters, we still struggle to make the crossing. They never said it would be easy. Trial and tribulation buffet us like the coming storms before me this night. Below the surface, rocks make each step painful as our bare feet seek to guide our way. Meanwhile, we are burdened down by the past life; financially and emotionally. The anchor of our self-inflicted burdens become unwanted drag against the current. Breaking free is in some ways as difficult as dying. In essence, we must die to our formers selves so that we may be made anew in Christ. As Paul said, "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; old things have passed away; behold, all things have become new." We tend to try to bring the past with us, and the problems therein. With persistence, we push on. One by one, we set our burdens free, lightening our load. As we learn to walk in our faith, those restraints that kept us shackled to the past are broken away, and we are set free.

With each step, we find a rhythm to the river's bottom, and soon, we are beginning to find the nearing distant shore. We know we are on the right path for the current is against us, like those trials through which we persevere, they build our character, and with each one, we become stronger in our faith. Once we make landfall, we wearily climb up out of the river, careful not to slip and fall back in. Looking down from above, we can see from whence we came. There is peace in knowing that you have made it through the storm. There is peace in knowing that with Him, all things are possible, and because of Him, we have that distant shore for which we may strive.

The choice is ours.

Step into the water and begin your journey.

You'll not turn back, for if it is His will, then it shall be done.

Given many of the ways I hear the word used, humil-



Hospice and Palliative Care of the Blue Ridge

Bridges the Gap

The Fund for Mitchell County in collaboration with the Community Foundation of Western North Carolina awarded a 2016-2017 People in Need grant of \$15,000 to Hospice and Palliative Care of the Blue Ridge for a project called Bridging the Gap. HPCBR, formerly Hospice of Mitchell County, is a nonprofit 501 C 3 organization that serves individuals and families who are faced with a life-limiting



In a recent interview the staff pointed out that when an individual is accepted into their care, that individual receives total care for the remainder of his or her life. Unlike some for-profit organizations HPCBR accepts financial responsibility



for all hospice related needs even when Medicaid or Medicare benefits have been exhausted. Anyone or any family facing the many difficult issues that are eased as fully as possible by the HPCBR staff regardless of income level are encouraged to take advantage of their care and support. Those who do come from lower

income situations are assured of the same loving care for as long as they require it. The purpose of Bridging the Gap is to establish a sustainable program that will finance many of the daily needs faced by clients which are not covered by traditional funding sources. These include transportation, fire extinguishers, nutritional supplements, clothing, household supplies, personal care items, utility bills including heating and cooling, and other often relatively low cost items that many of us take for granted but are beyond the meager budgets of some individuals and

The program is not a one-time project, rather it will be combined with existing fund raising efforts including the in-house staff supported, Radford Fund; the Hospice Thrift Store in Ledger, Annual Golf Tournament at Grassy Creek; and the colorful Cruz-In Car Show in Bakersville. 

Vigil Held for Closing of Labor & Delivery at Blue Ridge Regional Hospital

On September 30 the Labor and Delivery department at Blue Ridge Regional Hospital was officially closed. Despite concern expressed by local residents about the increased risk in childbirth that would result from pregnant mothers having to travel much further to Marion or Ashville while in labor, Mission Health refused to reconsider their decision. Consequently, over a hundred

people gathered on the night of September 30 for a candlelight vigil for healthcare in Yancey and Mitchell counties.

Pastor Tommy James (First Baptist, Burnsville) began the service by praying,
"We gather here at this place and at this time to grieve together as a community.
We grieve because of the injustices of corrupt systems that place profit above people. We gather to grieve because of even greater hardships that will be placed on poor families who are already struggling. We pray for little babies and mothers who lives might be in danger. We pray for health care workers who will lose their jobs and whose families have been disrupted by the closing of labor and deliver at Blue Ridge Regional Hospital. We turn to you because so many politicians don't care — we turn to you because of the pain inflected by corrupt systems that exploit the vulnerable among us."

Pastor Bill Whiteside (Vian's Valley Presbyterian) gave a moving reading from Psalm 38 including "My back is filled with searing pain; there is no health in my body. I am feeble and utterly crushed; I groan in anguish of heart. O LORD, do not forsake me; be not far from me, O my God. Come quickly to help me, O Lord my Savior."

Pastor Jeremy Troxler (Spruce Pine Methodist) recalled the story of children being brought to Jesus (Matthew 19:13-15; Mark 10:13-16; Luke 18:15-17). He said, "We stand here tonight keeping vigil to mark the end of Labor and Delivery services at Blue Ridge Regional Hospital. As a Christian pastor, I am here because I take Jesus at his word: that the degree to which a person or a community is willing to welcome children is the degree to which it is willing to welcome God. I am here because of my concern that the closing of local Labor and Delivery hurts the well-being of vulnerable children in our community: and because I want to be part of a community that does everything it can to provide blessing and healing for every child born into this world.

We give thanks for holy moments in which parents and grandparents laid eyes on the face of their infant for the first time. We express our gratitude for all of those doctors, and nurses, and staff who have served in the history of Labor and Delivery. We have gathered to lament. We grieve that our mothers will not be able to give birth locally under a doctor's care. We lament staff members who have lost jobs or who have been forced to relocate. We mourn that our community feels less strong and self-sufficient than it was before.

Our presence here registers our concern for our unborn children, and for expectant families who now have to travel longer distances to receive the care they feel they need. We are concerned about a trend in which decisions profoundly affecting our community are being made by people far away, people whose own families do not experience themselves the consequences of those decisions. We are concerned . . . about the direction of an impersonal health system that sometimes seem to care more about PR than about the ER, more about dollar signs than vital signs.

The word "vigil" refers to watchfulness, to being awake, to paying attention. In response to the closing of Labor and Delivery many of us are being more watchful, paying greater attention to the state of health care close to home. But as we light candles tonight, we do so in part to express a hope: the hope that this vigil is not merely a wake - but that . . . we might one day be a community again that does everything in its power to take Jesus at his word, and to welcome the little children."

Pastor Whiteside read about Jesus healing a leper (Mark 1:40-44), a woman who had been unable to straighten her back for eighteen years (Luke 13:10-13),

and Jesus healing crowds of sick people (Matthew 9:35-36).

Pastor Mike Lamm (retired Presbyterian minister) spoke about the miracles of Jesus, noting that threefourths of the individual miracles cured illness or disability. In addition, there are sixteen passages that tell of crowds of people



coming to Jesus to be healed. When those are taken into account, we realize that all but a tiny fraction of the miracles of Jesus were healthcare miracles. None of his miracles were enormous spectacular events like the nation-wide plagues that Moses delivered to Egypt. In fact, we are told of times when Jesus purposely healed in private and when he told those he cured to not tell anybody. We only know of two times that Jesus knew the person He healed and there are many times when there is no mention that anyone had faith. Jesus was indiscriminate in who He healed: young and old, rich and poor, male and female, Israelite and foreigner. People weren't required to prove that they were worthy.

While people were impressed by the ability of Jesus to heal, Jesus was less motivated by wanting to impress people than He was by compassion for their suffering (Mark 1:41; Luke 7:13; Matthew 9:35-36 and others). He recognized that all people are precious in God's sight (Matthew 6:26). And Jesus taught that we are to treat other people in the way that we hope they will treat us (the "golden rule," (Luke 6:31). "If we claim to have faith



then there are moral issues that must be addressed if we are to be found faithful. In the parable of the rich man and Lazarus (Luke 16:19-31), Jesus made it clear that the extent to which we overlook the illness of others is a moral issue. Healthcare is a moral issue. And if you consider yourself to be a person of faith, it is a faith issue."

As everyone's candles were being lit, Pastor Travis Wynkoop (Griffith Chapel) read the words to the song, "Light One Candle" followed by Galatians 5:14; Matthew 25:34-40; James 2:15-17 and Matthew 7:12. Then he spoke eloquently about having been born at the hospital in Spruce Pine and closed the service with a powerful prayer. The crowd sat in candlelit prayerful silence for several minutes.

The Vigil for Healthcare was co-sponsored by SEARCH (www.searchwnc.
org) and by the Yancey-Mitchell branch of the NAACP. SEARCH (Sustaining
Essential and Rural Community Healthcare) is a recently formed organization
of concerned citizens that seeks to "empower greater involvement in decisions
affecting the healthcare of our residents" and "to preserve, strengthen and expand
access to essential medical services in our area." The Yancey-Mitchell NAACP
mission "is to ensure the political, educational, social and economic equality of
rights of all persons."


