The Damascus Road



In the scriptures, there are many recorded accounts of the miracles performed by Jesus during His earthly ministry. The Samaritan woman at the well (John 4), the Centurion's servant (Matt. 8), the demoniac (Mark 5), and countless others were changed and transformed when they encountered the Son of the Living God. Even Saul of Tarsus (Acts 9), a Pharisee who lived his life persecuting followers of Jesus, had an eye-opening experience when he was blinded on the road to Da-

mascus. The conversion of Saul, renamed Paul, shows us how Jesus can even turn great wickedness around for His glory and for the advancement of His kingdom. Like Paul, everyone who knows Jesus Christ as their personal Savior has a "Damascus road" story. Although I know now that the path to my salvation was plotted long before I was born, my redemption story goes like this:

My Backstory

I grew up in Mitchell County, I did not have a perfect hildhood, nor was there anything about me that was perfect. I was an illegitimate child who was not pretty or exceptional in any way. I sought solace for the imperfections of my life in friendships and through social acceptance, thinking that if other people liked me then





As a young boy, I was very blessed. I grew up in church and was expected to be there every time the doors were open. My mother was the youth leader at Cane Creek Baptist Church and not only taught the word of God to us, but lived it too. As a child, my mother grew up in a home where alcoholism was an issue, so it was never tolerated or accepted in our home. As time passed, and I was given more freedom, I began to fall into the hand of peer pressure. As young teenag-

ers, we were allowed to start camping on the weekends. With this new found freedom came bad decisions. It started with stealing alcohol from family members and later led to drug abuse. Teenagers often feel that it's cool to drink beer, liquor, etc....but I can honestly say it was the beginning of destruction. Destruction that lead to over a ten year addiction for me. As the camping trips became more frequent so did my habit. What used to take a few beers to ma me feel good, now was taking much, much more....and sad to say it just didn't give me the high that it once did. Up until this point in my life, I had had a good group of friends. The kind of friends that would last



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

a lifetime. But, one night I choose to go in a much worse direction. A distant family member asked me to help him track down a deer that he had shot. Instead of keeping my plans with my high school buddies, I went with him. That night I stared the face of Satan straight on. I was introduced to meth. He told me that meth would make everything better, that life couldn't get any better...and sure enough I felt like Superman (I was on top of the world). But that only lasted a short time. Each time I used, the effect just wasn't the same. Before I even realized it, I was hooked, I couldn't live without it ... and a lot of it. Throughout the next ten years, I lived each day for the next high. I used whatever I could get my hands on (pain pills, marijuana, cocaine, etc.), chasing a high that I would never reach again. I found myself falling, losing control of the things that use to matter to me. I stared a mother and father, a sister and brother in the face that loved me so very much and could see the disappointment and hurt that I was causing. But no matter how much I knew I was hurting them, I just could not overcome the drive for that next high. Later, I was blessed with two special little girls. Sad to say, I loved them...but my desire to stay high seemed to be more important. I let over 5 years pass by, missing out on some of the most important days of my life. Addiction overshadowed how so very precious the birth, first steps, and first words of my children were. My sin and addiction lead to the downfall of my marriage-- divorce. With all these memories taking place in my life I was losing control.....I was in such a depressed state that I was ready to take my life. One night, I came to my mom's with all intentions of saying goodbye. I was higher than I had ever been, I left her house and went next door to mine. I found myself outside, left with no hope...Screaming if there is a GOD out there HELP ME!!!! My mom came as quick as she could, knowing that she would find her baby boy dead. She was at the point that all hope was gone; she had prayed and prayed--was God ever going to intervene. The next day God moved and when He moves things start happening! As hard as it was, my brother and brother-in- and law had me involuntarily committed (thank God for their obedience). After running from the law, wandering through the woods, it came to an end the night of August 10, 2015. I was handcuffed and taken to Saint Joseph's Hospital in Asheville. For the first time in 10 years, I felt free. Through many prayers, tears, and heartaches my

family's prayers were being answered. A few weeks prior, my sister and brotherin-law had invited me to Bear Creek Baptist Church to listen to Chris Allen give his testimony. Of course, I declined their invitation, but they had continued to keep in contact with Chris Allen. Chris Allen had prayed with my family, and asked that God work in haste. He had continued to keep in contact with my sister and brother-in-law, offering help when I was ready. The time had come that I was ready, and I knew that the help I needed would only come through God the Father. While spending 5 days in the hospital, God had dealt with me and I was ready for a new life, I was ready for Christian rehab. My brother-in-law contacted Chris Allen for direction on what facilities were out there. He told my brotherin-law, Southeastern Carolina Crossroads, was his choice. He told us that Bruce Cannon has helped establish this facility and he knew that God's hand was upon it. Was he ever right!!! From the moment my feet touched the ground of this facility...God was moving. I felt his presence like never before. God helped me and he used me. I experienced a change in myself and was able to be a part of seeing men being renewed, set free, and finding salvation for the first time. Upon reflecting back at the months leading to rehab, God was orchestrating His plan for my life. He aligned the right people, obedient people, and the right resources before us. God makes no mistakes!!! I am a living example. It's amazing that God would allow someone like me who was so deep in sin, as far down in the valley as someone could possibly be, to the top of the mountain...overflowing with the abundance of His mercy, His grace, His love. He has delivered me and I am forever grateful. Why did God deliver me? Because He has a plan for my life... a calling. I know that part of my plan is to tell my story. Psalms 40: "I waited patiently for the Lord; and he inclined unto me, and heard my cry. He brought me up also out of a horrible pit, out of the miry, clay, and set my feet upon a rock, and established my goings. And he hath put a new song in my mouth, even praise unto our God; many shall trust in the Lord." He has established my goings, I am a new creature, a new man, a dad to my girls. Oh what a blessing, Oh what a Savior! He has restored my life, opened doors, and continues to replenish the important things in life. He continues to add new friends (Christian friends), advocates that uplift me and acknowledge that "all things are possible with God".



You Can Live Conflict-Free

Can you think of a time when you had an ongoing issue with someone in your life? Then, just when you thought you couldn't take another minute, God asked you to hang in there one more time and not give up?

Maybe you've thought, God, I have held my tongue and kept a good attitude with this person so many times, and

now You want me to play the peacemaker again? This is just too much to ask!

God calls each one of us to be an instrument of His peace. Many times this
means being the first to ask forgiveness or sticking with someone who has tried
our patience over and over again.

These situations are perfect opportunities God will use to build our character, because He can use other people to be the "sandpaper" that smooths down the rough edges in our personality.

You're probably familiar with Matthew 18:21-22 (AMPC). Peter asked Jesus how many times he had to forgive someone who sinned against him. I'm sure he thought he was being generous when he said, "Up to seven times?" But Jesus answered Peter by saying, "Not up to seven times, but seventy times seven."

You see, God is asking us to be longsuffering with the people in our lives. He wants us to go the extra mile and stay determined to do the right thing, even when other people do the wrong thing. And I have found that it's almost impossible to stay in conflict with someone if you refuse to argue!

Over the years, the Lord has used my marriage to teach me important lessons in this area. I can vividly remember one occasion when my husband, Dave, and I had been arguing, and afterward, the Lord spoke to my heart and said, "I want you to go apologize and ask for his forgiveness."

I said, "But God, he started it! Dave should be the first one to say he's sorry!"

The Lord was asking me to be the peacemaker, regardless of what Dave did
or didn't do. He wanted me to see how taking this action brings unity and allows
Him to bring healing in our relationships.

Conversely, if we always wait for the other person to apologize or be the peacemaker, we actually harm ourselves and hinder the potential for peace.

The Lord instructs us to pursue peace with others and "seek it eagerly" (1 Peter 3:11 AMPC). It's not always easy, but as we take steps to follow God's Word in this area, it opens the door for Him to bless us in so many ways.

One of my favorite examples is the story of Abraham and his nephew Lot. Genesis chapter 13 tells us how they each had a tremendous number of livestock. In fact, their possessions were so great that there wasn't enough land for both of them, and it inevitably led to strife. But look at how Abraham handled the situation:

"Abram said to Lot, Let there be no strife, I beg of you, between you and me, or between your herdsmen and my herdsmen, for we are relatives. Is not the whole

land before you? Separate yourself, I beg of you, from me. If you take the left hand, then I will go to the right; or if you choose the right hand, then I will go to the left "(Genesis 13:8-9 AMPC).

Because of Abraham's willingness to keep peace in the family, the Lord blessed him abundantly. In verses 14-17, God says to Abraham:


"Lift up now your eyes and look from the place where you are...for all the land which you see I will give to you and to your posterity forever. And I will make your descendants like the dust of the earth, so that if a man could count the dust of the earth, then could your descendants also be counted. Arise, walk through the land, the length of it and the breadth of it, for I will give it to you."

I encourage you to apply this lesson to your own life. Maybe somebody's trying to stir up strife and you find yourself in a situation like Abraham's. If so, let peace begin with you, even if you know you're right.

No person or relationship is perfect, and there will always be things to work through. However, when you make a firm decision to pursue peace, you can quench the spirit of strife and put a stop to conflicts before they ever really begin.

And remember, even if no one else notices, God always sees. And when you choose to do what's right because it's right, He will reward you in some of the most marvelous ways.

Drug Use

The headlines are terrible! Drug use is up across the nation and is up in North Carolina.

- Four North Carolina towns make the national top 25 list for opioid abuse. (1)
- Nearly 16,000 people die every year from prescription drug overdose. (2)
 - Heroin deaths in our state have skyrocketed more than 584 percent. (3)
- Nearly one out of every three opioid prescriptions, insured by employers, is being abused. (4)
- Approximately 8 percent of North Carolina residents reported past-month use of illicit drugs. (5)

Drug and alcohol use and abuse does so many bad things to the person using and to their family. It bankrupts families either by the user actually taking money designated for food, bills, etc. and using it to purchase drugs or by the theft and sale of family assets to support their addiction. It is the leading cause of imprisonment in North Carolina and nationwide. It is a leading culprit in marital breakup. Drug and alcohol addiction robs children of food and proper housing.

Alcohol and drug use among employees and their family members can be an expensive problem for business and industry, with issues ranging from lost productivity, absenteeism, injuries, fatalities, theft and low employee morale, to an increase in health care, legal liabilities and workers' compensation costs. (6) The problem has now reached epidemic proportions in North Carolina and around our nation! The question that must be answered by everyone is: what are we going to do about it? There is not enough prison space available, nor can we build enough prison cells, to house those who will need to be incarcerated if our society continues to breakdown and does not address this problem head-on.

Opioid prescriptions must have more restrictions and limitations placed upon them. Nearly one out of every three (32 percent) opioid prescriptions, which are subsidized by America's employers, is being abused. (7) We simply cannot continue to write prescriptions for mass doses of opioids and not maintain very strict control over their distribution. These drugs end up on the streets way too easily!

Help is available to those struggling with addiction and to their families. Beginning on Thursday, January 5th, 7:00pm Bear Creek Baptist Church, 327 Bear Creek Church Road, Bakersville, will begin offering Celebrate Recovery. Still in Need of Prayer

As we close out 2016 and begin a new year fresh, I want to say thank you for the support you have provided through your prayers and your financial gifts. I look back over the year and thank God for the incredible opportunity to go to all 50 states, stand on the capitol steps, share the Gospel, and call tens and tens of thousands of people to prayer. It was amazing. Never did we dream there would be such a harvest of souls at these rallies. We

wouldn't have been able to do this without you standing with us. And yes—God answers prayer!

The need for prayer for our nation didn't end with an election, a new administration in Washington, or a new year. America still needs the message of "repentance that leads to salvation" (2 Corinthians 7:10, ESV). We are looking at going back to all 50 states in the next few years. In May, we will start with the Decision America 2017 Tennessee Tour, going to four cities—Chattanooga, Murfreesboro, Jackson, and Memphis. And then in the fall, we will go to seven cities across the Lone Star State with the Decision America 2017 Texas Tour. These are one-night events, saturating each region with the hope of the Gospel and a call to prayer and repentance.

This is a time of both great opportunity and tremendous challenge for our nation. By the time you read this letter, we will be preparing for the inauguration of a new president who has a clear vision for America's future. As Christians, we have a responsibility to pray for our president, vice president, and new leadership in Washington, that they will look to Him for wisdom and direction. The Bible directs us that "prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made ... for kings and all who are in high positions, that we may lead a peaceful and quiet life, godly and dignified in every way. This is good, and it is pleasing in the sight of God our Savior" (1 Timothy 2:1–3).

In addition to Decision America 2017, we have a full slate of Crusades across North America and around the world. In February I will hold a Crusade in San Juan, Puerto Rico. This island, a U.S. territory, is facing an epidemic of drug abuse, corruption, and poverty. Will you be praying for an outpouring of the Holy Spirit and that hearts there will be open to the Gospel? 

my feelings of worthlessness, and my self-loathing were all carefully tucked away behind a mask of laughter which I had been forging from birth to cover my weakness and insecurity.

Towards the end of my senior year in high school, my fears of inadequacy gained significant momentum as I was preparing for the next phase of my life. Although I had been accepted to college, I was more frightened of failure than ever before. It was during this time that I made a fateful mistake; I started drinking with some of my friends from school. Alcohol offered a long-awaited refuge to my fear and pain, and like most people who have problems with addiction, I was good at drinking. Drinking gave me false courage and I used it to muster up the nerve to go on to school as was expected of me. Shortly after moving into the dorm, I started smoking marijuana and thus begun my descent into drug addiction. Within two years, I flunked out of school, I started using methamphetamine, and I got in trouble with the law. I sought help through psychiatry and drug rehab; however, neither worked and I continued to use.

Over the course of the next fifteen years, I tried to forge a life for myself out of the chaos of addiction by getting married and having children. Although I managed to stay clean while I was pregnant, having children did not stop my drug use and my addiction just kept getting worse. By the time by youngest child turned two years old, I was using OxyContin on a daily basis and methamphetamine whenever I could. After my marriage fell apart, during my second attempt at managing my addiction through methadone maintenance, I started attending a local church with my parents. I was still abusing drugs, I had an open case with DSS, along with other assorted problems associated with my addiction, and I went to church hoping God would take all the negativity out of my life. Although I wanted God to remove all the bad, unwanted aspects of my life, I did not want to give up what had become my life: getting and using drugs. What I did not realize at the time was that God was working, but for my life to get better, it was going to have to get worse. I was not ready to give up the drugs.

Gradually, however profoundly, my addiction cost me everything: my marriage, my possessions, my self-respect, and eventually my children. Once DSS stepped in and removed my children from the home, I made one last feeble attempt to get clean in an impatient detox and rehabilitation center. I no longer believed that I could ever go back to living a normal, clean life, therefore, I did not believe that this stay would "fix" me, just as the other attempts at getting clean had not worked in the past. Needless to say, even though I learned some new things about myself and my addiction, this stay was no different than the rest, it did not change me. Utterly hopeless and desperate to escape, I cut all remaining ties with the people who showed any concern for me and I set out to destroy myself. Living out of a backpack on the street, staying with whoever would put me up for the night without any regards for my personal safety. I was consuming more drugs than ever, living the life of a reprobate. I did not have any intentions of returning to the life and the people I had known, I never thought I would see my children or my family again, but the LORD had something else in mind.

The Road to Damascus

I am sure the Apostle Paul, and probably most anyone who encounters Christ at some point in their life, thought nothing special would happen on that day, or on that journey, but when the Lord shows up, He shows up in a big way. For Saul (Paul), he was on his way to Damascus to punish followers of Jesus Christ when the voice of the Lord spoke to him and then he was rendered blind for three days (Acts 9). For me, I thought I had been forgotten by God, an outcast and menace of society, an individual without hope who was destined to die in their addiction. That is when the Lord Jesus Christ stepped in and changed my life forever.

I'll never forget the knock of intervention on the door of the home of which I happened to be, "Cassie, we know you are in there, so might as well come on out." Well, I thought, it is finally over. No more running, no more hiding, whatever happens next has to be better than this. I grabbed the couple of backpacks which held the few possessions I had left, and I stepped out the door to face the consequences of my actions. Four members of the Yancey County police department were waiting to take me into custody, and as they put me in the car, an inexplicable relief washed over me. On the way to the police station, I thought about the choices I had made that led to this event, and quite honestly, I was surprised that this was to be the end of my running, rather than the death I had been so actively seeking. I did not care what happened next, at least the life I had been living was over.

I had been in jail for about three weeks—the drugs were out of my system, when the moment I had been dreading was upon me, the moment when I would have to face all the mistakes I had made. I did not have anything to mask my feelings, no pills and no meth, only the raw, undiluted truth of what all I had done. The weight of my sins, the guilt, the shame, and the sorrow crushed me into oblivion, but it was in that moment of brokenness that I met Jesus. In what seemed almost like a dream, where time has no meaning, He was there; I could feel His presence. He revealed to me in that cell that although the burden of sin is heavy and the punishment for sin is death, He already bore my sin to Calvary and died on a cross to pay my debt. Jesus Christ changed my life in a jail cell in Yancey County, and from the moment He showed me the truth, my life has not been the same. Although I had lost all faith in myself, I was given faith in a power greater than myself by the One who spoke creation into existence, my Savior, my Redeemer, and my Friend, Jesus Christ.

A New Life in Christ

Over the last six years, God has truly blessed my life. First of all, I am a living witness to the love, the mercy, and the power of God. I am blessed to be an encouragement to those who have loved ones suffering from addiction and a beacon for those who may be seeking help themselves. What Jesus has done for me also serves as a reminder that although the world may try to discount His existence, He is still very much alive and performing miracles the same as always. He is true

and faithful to His Word, He came to seek and save those that are lost, choosing the foolish of this world to confound the wise and the weak to confound the things which are mighty (1 Corinthians 1:27). When you put your faith and trust in Him, you can do all things through His power and His strength (Luke 1:37), even overcome addictions that seem impossible to defeat.

Not only have I been clean and sober since the Lord changed my life, I have been granted a new life in Christ. In 2012, I regained custody of my children and God has restored and renewed my relationship with them and my other family members. I have also been recently blessed with two more children that I acquired when I married my husband in November of last year, a man who also happens to be another one of God's miraculous conversions.

When the Lord changed my life, He gave me a heart of service and a burning desire to help others like myself. I felt led to go back to school so that I could pursue a career in substance abuse treatment. In 2015, I graduated from the Human Services program at Mayland Community College where I earned my Associates in Applied Science degree in Human Services Technology. Among Mayland scholarship recipients, I was honored to be chosen by Mayland's scholarship committee to speak at D.R.E.A.M. Day (Dreams Realized Every Day AT Mayland Day), and I was recognized by the faculty at Mayland as an outstanding graduate for both my academic and leadership skills. At the beginning of this month, I started my last semester at Lees-McRae College where I am earning my Bachelors in Applied Science in Human Services. I currently hold a 4.0 GPA and I intend to eventually pursue my Masters in Addictions Counseling.


Like each one who is a redeemed child of God, we all have a conversion story. We were all dead in our trespasses and sins until the Lord Jesus opened our blinded eyes and wrote His truth on our hearts. I am sure I will never come close to being as influential as the Apostle Paul, the only similarities we share is being chased down by a Holy God despite the magnitude of our sin. I know that it is only by His love, His grace, and His mercy, that I am where I am today. Although my life is still fraught with obstacles and I still lack faith in myself, I have complete faith that the One who called me out of the darkness will finish His good work in me until He calls me home, or when the trumpet sounds at His glorious coming.



Even little Geneva made several comments about it being Jesus birthday and that she was glad she was a Christian. At her age I have to compliment her parents for teaching her those things because I am not really sure that she has reached enough maturity to really understand, but what do I know! I am not sure what it looked like from the eyes of a ninety two year old, but I could see signs of joy and also signs of sadness and loneliness in Mother's eyes. She made the statement several times that it was hard and I can only imagine what life would be like to have lost your mate of almost seventy years, to feel like you were no longer an integral part of

the activity that was taking place around you. To not really be able to maintain a conversation thread for more than a few moments, to really not know what was taking place with children, grandchildren, great grandchildren and great great grandchildren.

As I look forward to the New Year, I hope I am able to place myself in the shoes of the four year old and the ninety two year old and show love and compassion for all those of all ages around me. It is so easy to get angry and frustrated with both ends of the spectrum, and also the middle at times. I look at how children are being treated today, sometimes with no love, no discipline and no teachings of the real meaning of life is so many cases. As I write this

Q: I've decided that the hardest thing about Christmas is getting our four children to write thank you notes afterward. Am I expecting too much of them? I admit I get tired of trying to get them to do this. — Mrs. S.G.



A: I suspect many parents could echo your frustration! After all, expressing thanks doesn't come naturally to most children; it's something they have to learn. And if they don't, they'll most likely be selfish and inconsiderate the rest of their lives.

This is why I hope you'll keep urging your children to write thank-you notes for the gifts they've received (or to express their thanks in other ways — a phone call or email, for example). Take time also to explain why it's important to thank people for what they've done for us. It's not just a social custom or a matter of courtesy; it's a way to help us look beyond ourselves, and to be grateful for the love of others. The Bible says, "Do nothing out of selfish ambition. ... Rather, in humility value others above yourselves" (Philippians 2:3).

Remember too that our children learn not only through what we tell them, but through what we do. Is your life characterized by "an attitude of gratitude"? Is thankfulness a sincere part of your life every day? The Bible says, "Give thanks in all circumstances" (1 Thessalonians 5:18).

Most of all, however, encourage your children to give thanks for the greatest gift any of us can ever receive — the gift of God's own Son, Jesus Christ. Christmas is over for this year — but shouldn't Christmas be part of our lives every day, as we thank God for sending His Son into the world for our salvation? Make Christ the center of your family's life during this coming year.



Seek Christ's assistance to lift you out of despair

Q: I always feel kind of depressed after Christmas, and I've never been able to figure out why. It usually takes weeks and weeks for me to begin feeling normal. Why is this? — M.B.N.

A: I'm not a psychologist, of course — but I've noticed that some people do tend to feel somewhat "down in the dumps" after they've been very busy. It's not just physical exhaustion (although that may be part of it); often it's emotional exhaustion as well.

I often think of Elijah in the Old Testament. He was one of God's greatest prophets and a man of deep faith, and he had experienced God's provision during very difficult times. In one of the most dramatic scenes in the Bible, Elijah confronted hundreds of pagan priests who denied God — and God rewarded Elijah's faith by answering his prayers and rejecting those of his opponents. (You can read about this in chapter 18 of 1 Kings.)

And yet immediately afterward Elijah became depressed, and even asked God to take his life. Why? One reason was because he was physically depleted (the first thing God provided for him was food and rest). But he was also emotionally and spiritually drained, feeling he had failed because the king and queen refused to give up their opposition to God.

I don't know, of course, what your experience has been during the holidays. But get rest if you need it (and seek to control your schedule next year). Most of all, ask God to help you recover the true meaning of the Christmas season: the coming of Jesus Christ into the world for our salvation. Open your mind and heart to Christ, and allow His love to saturate your soul. The Bible says, "Set your hearts on things above, where Christ is, ... not on earthly things" (Colossians 3:1-2).

He tells her that her parents have turned their backs on her and she disgusts them. Drug Addiction tells her he is the only thing she can count on. He tells her to pull out and leave. However, in a soft voice the passenger in the back seat speaks and tells her to go into my building. He tells her that he has warriors inside who will help her. He tells her that his warriors will not judge her because they have faced their own demons in life. He tells her those warriors will help her up when she stumbles, will work to get her children back to her, and will give her every resource available to get her on her feet. He tells her that her family loves her no matter what because parents never stop loving their children. He tells her he knows this because all his children have let him down many many times and he always forgives them and never stops loving them. The passenger in the back tells her she has never been alone-- that he will never leave her. He tells her that Drug Addiction is no match for his love for her. In that moment, she feels no judgement. There is no hatred. There is no condemnation. There is just a peace. In that moment, she makes a choice and, as I watch, she heads toward the doors of Social Services. As she is walking in the door she feels a hand take hers and she knows that it's her back-seat passenger. She feels his strength and she whispers to him-- I know that you've got this Lord!!

It's the start of a new year and with that comes the belief that we can start afresh and wipe the slate clean of all the bad that happened to us last year. There is a hope inside of us that the New Year will bring us exciting things. I believe that statement to be true-- a new year can be a fresh start and a chance to change your life. Every day at Social Services we see those who are struggling with the demon of drug addiction and day after day we see that demon take away everything they have. We see the loss of jobs, homes, family, and their own precious children. We see the total devastation that comes with the use of drugs. However, there is hope for those struggling with that Demon and, as long as there is breath in your body, you can change your life. I believe that hope comes from the Lord and His presence in your life will overcome anything. The Lord has put His servants at Social Services to help those with drug addictions by helping them get the resources they need to get clean, to get jobs, and to get their children back home with them. Those servants will do everything they can to help you they need is for you to want to help yourself. Nonresistance to alcohol compromises marijuana resistance By Rev. Mark H. Creech

The votes for advancing alcohol sales across the Tar Heel state were alarming this year. A total of 27 alcohol referendums were held in Alexander, Bertie, Burke, Camden, Cleveland, Davidson, Davie, Gaston, Haywood, Johnston, and Stanly counties. Every referendum succeeded with votes in favor of greater access to alcohol besting limited sales by an average of 62.3% to a 37.1% margin.



It used to be 30 to 40 years ago, if there was an alcohol referendum on the ballot in some city or town in North Carolina, nearly every mainline church would join forces to defeat it. There was a general consensus among churches that easier access to alcohol was inherently problematic, bringing with it hosts of social problems. Today, however, it's difficult to find a handful of churches willing to oppose an alcohol referendum.

Thus, the primary reason pro-alcohol forces bent on making new markets for wine, beer, and spirits had a banner year in North Carolina.

Pastors rarely, if ever, preach on the subject of alcohol use and abuse in their churches anymore. A few years ago, a pastor asked me to come to his church and preach on the topic. After I finished my sermon, several people came up to me afterward and said it was the first full sermon they had ever heard on the subject.

What concerns me is another threat coming down the pike that was also up for a vote on Election Day, not in North Carolina but in other states. And the compromise of our churches on the alcohol issue, I believe, places us in a vulnerable position to effectively resist it.

According to the Washington Post, "Voters in California, Massachusetts and Nevada approved recreational marijuana initiatives Tuesday night, and several other states passed medical marijuana provisions, in what is turning out to be the biggest electoral victory for marijuana reform since 2012, when Colorado and Washington first approved the drug's recreational use."

Maine also voted on a recreational marijuana initiative, but the vote is so close that it will take at least a month to determine whether it succeeded. The Huffington Post also notes that "[e]ven without Maine, 66.9 million Americans living in seven states and the District of Columbia – or 21.4 percent of the U.S. population – will soon have access to legal marijuana."

Does this concern you, citizen Christian? If not, it certainly should. On top of all the quantifiable damage done to individuals, families, and society caused by alcohol — on top of all the quantifiable damage caused by tobacco to the public's health — now there is a movement with serious momentum to legalize recreational marijuana — something some of the most reputable studies from Europe and the United States have found has multiple significant adverse outcomes.

Interestingly, the same arguments made in favor of legalizing recreational marijuana are essentially the same made when an alcohol referendum proposes lifting restrictions on alcohol sales in our state:

- · It's needed to generate more tax revenue
- It's needed to enhance economic growth
- It will create new jobs and new opportunities
- · It will provide better control, ending the business of illegal sales.

Just as these always prove to be false promises for communities that vote in favor of an alcohol referendum, they'll prove over time to be false for any state that legalizes marijuana.

Of course, one can never talk about alcohol and marijuana in the same sentence without someone quickly pointing out that Prohibition was a failure, and, therefore, the current prohibition on marijuana needs to also be lifted.

Such claims, however, don't stand up to scrutiny. It is true Prohibition didn't end alcohol use altogether, but it did succeed in reducing consumption and its harms.

William J. Bennet and Robert White in their book, Going to Pot, reference journalist Daniel Okrent's recent research in his book on Prohibition, titled Last Call. They write:

"Prohibition had the effect of reducing alcohol consumption by 70 percent in its first few years. Furthermore, the highest rate of consumption of alcohol in American history was 2.6 gallons of pure alcohol per person just before Prohibition. It stayed below that for a long time, even long after repeal, not reaching that level of 2.6 gallons again until 1973."

The authors also cite research from Professor Mark Moore of Harvard's Kennedy School of Government noted in an article from the New York Times:

"Cirrhosis death rates for men were 29.5 per 100,000 in 1911 and 10.7 in 1929. Admissions to state mental hospitals for psychosis declined from 10.1 per 100,000 in 1919 to 4.7 in 1929. Arrests for public drunkenness and disorderly conduct declined 50 percent between 1916 and 1922...[V]iolent crime did not increase dramatically during Prohibition. Homicide rates rose dramatically from 1900 to 1910 but remained roughly constant during Prohibition's 14-year rule. Organized crime may have become more visible and lurid during Prohibition, but it existed before and after."

To contend Prohibition didn't work is an untenable argument, no matter who makes it. What is more, to claim the current prohibition on marijuana hasn't worked is just as untenable because, like alcohol, legalization won't reduce consumption or harms but only increase both.

Since 2008 there has been legislation filed in the North Carolina General Assembly to legalize medicinal marijuana, which is simply the first step toward legalizing recreational pot. Each year, these measures have been rejected.

Still, the point here is that this issue will continue to push North Carolinians for a decision in its favor. And if churches don't start taking on alcohol as a threat to their communities, if preachers don't start preaching against alcohol use and encouraging abstinence, if citizen Christians are unwilling to resist alcohol for what

it is — America's number one mind-altering drug that destroys more lives than all the other drugs combined — then there seems to be little ground for standing on to defeat weed.

Don't misunderstand me. Prohibition is a dead issue and it isn't coming back. Nevertheless, the less resistance there is to alcohol, the wider the door swings for marijuana legalization to sashay in.

Dear Friends and Supporters of the Avery County Schools:

As we return to school for the second semester, I would like to say thank you for the important role you play each day in helping our school system foster student success. There is evidence of your support and service in many areas and we want you to know that we greatly appreciate what everyone in our community offers to our schools. Your interest and involvement in the



Avery County Schools is truly a lasting gift and one that not only benefits our students and teachers, but the entire community.

As I reflect upon the fall semester, many special highlights come to mind. The following are just a few examples:

- The Avery County Schools had the highest graduation rate in the state. (For 4 out of the past 5 years, Avery County has been in the top 4 in the state in graduation rates [4th, 1st, 3rd and 1st]).
- The Avery County Schools and the Avery County Commissioners worked together to refresh our one-to-one technology program for students.
- STEM-students from every school in the district participated in Hour of Code Activities to encourage interest in Computer Programming. Many schools are developing maker spaces thanks to the work of Nancy Carver, media specialists and various grants.
- A record number of our students participated in our local and regional science fair with forty-four moving on to state competition.
- A system of common assessments has been implemented to strengthen instruction in grades 3-12.
- We have implemented the HillRap reading program in all elementary and middle schools along with the FUSION program at Avery High School. HillMath will be implemented at the beginning of the new year.
- The Avery County Schools Child Nutrition Program continues to serve a mutritious breakfast and hunch at each of our schools.
- The Avery High Marching Band completed one of its most successful seasons ever, achieving one of the highest scores ever at the ASU marching band contest.
- The Avery High JROTC School supported the "Trees for Troops" program and the cadets competed in several state and national competitions.





- The Avery High Construction Classes supported Habitat for Humanity, assisting in the construction of new homes for our community.
- The Avery High FFA attended the national convention and had a record number of former students named American Scholars.
 - Our students collected an unprecedented amount of food and toys for needy families.
- We had one of the largest groups ever inducted into the National Honor Society and National Technical Honor Society at Avery High School.
- The Avery High Key Club had one of its most successful years ever with members providing more hours of community service than ever before.
- Each of our schools inducted a record number of students into the Beta Club.
- The Avery STEM Academy was recognized as one of the top 500 high schools in the nation by Newsweek.
- The Avery STEM Academy was also recognized by NCDPI for having a 100% Graduation rate
- Avery High School was recognized by NCDPI for having a graduation rate above
 95%
- Avery Middle School implemented PBIS along with holding a school wide Heritage Day. They have also created TAG competitions and implemented challenging enrichment opportunities based on student interest.
- Banner Elk Elementary School had 4 Odyssey of the mind teams representing the school and the Banner Elk Kiwanis. The teams are made up of 4th and 5th graders along with a team of 6th graders. Junior Appalachian Musicians (JAM) will begin again in February after a very successful program during first semester. This old-time string music program will be open to adults and students from all schools. Project Lead The Way Robotics was taught in the 4th and 5th grade Science classes and the Learn to Ski and Snowboard program with Sugar Mountain is set to begin.
- The Blue Ridge Academy received the NC Works Governor's Award of Distinction.
 Innovative Partnership. The students also worked with Feeding Avery Families to pack food boxes for our community members.
- Cranberry Middle School continues to focus on being a STEM middle school and was awarded a \$7,000 arts council grant.
- Crossnore Elementary School was named a national Distinguished Title One Rewards School. The school also obtained grants that helped purchase bicycle kits to be put together by members of their bike club.
 - Freedom Trail Elementary School completed its Outdoor Classroom.
- Riverside Elementary helped establish an active Girl Scout Troop that led a toy drive for children during Christmas. Riverside hosted the Over the Mountain group and participated in their Revolutionary War program in a partnership with Unimin. Riverside students sang Christmas carols for residents of the Bryan Center.

These areas of student participation and success can only be credited to our staff members, our parents, and members of our community.

With continued teamwork and a dedicated ACS staff, we will exceed the level of past accomplishments and experience even greater growth and accomplishments in 2017. Quality public schools are vital to the economic development of our county. Therefore, our school system is dedicated to preparing our children for successful, productive citizenry.

There are many opportunities for this semester, and one of the most exciting is contimiing to offer any family that has a three or four-year-old that is not currently enrolled in a Pre-K program SCOTTIE (Supporting Children's Opportunities through Technology, Innovation, and Education), a mobile pre-kindergarten classroom that is housed in a renovated North Carolina school bus. SCOTTIE, a state-endorsed program, will continue to travel to ten designated locations in the county and offer an abbreviated schedule of educational activities for children enrolled. Currently we have 90 students enrolled on SCOTTIE. This program is designed to allow parents and their children to have early childhood educational opportunity near their homes. Children who are accepted into the program will be met with a highly qualified, birth-kindergarten teacher and credentialed assistant. Wrap-around services will be offered as well as opportunity for parental participation. We believe that a successful start to the school-age program must be an expectation for all children in order to ensure a 100% graduation rate Avery County. We also believe that early exposure to literacy and other educational skills will foster students' success as they journey through their educational pathway. Interested parents may contact my office, Angela Vitale, EC/ Pre-K Director or Renee Banner, Administrative Assistant at 733-6006 to register a child or for more information.

Lastly, I would like to mention one more exciting partnership with our local Williams YMCA. ACS along with the YMCA is offering a Snow Camp to families that may need childcare on days when school is not in session due to inclement weather. Snow Camp, staffed by YMCA professionals, will be hosted at the YMCA for students in kindergarten through sixth grade and will operate from 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Daily activities will consist of craft time, games, sports, indoor/outdoor activities, swimming and tutoring. Transportation to the YMCA and a bag lunch must by provided by parents. Students will need to bring outside clothes, homework, bathing suit and towel to be used. The cost is as follows:

- \$15 per day (with \$10 pre-registration fee)
- · \$20 daily drop in rate

Substance Abuse and Domestic Violence By Beth Davis

The nice lady was on her way home from church one recent, rainy, dreary Sunday night. On a whim, she stopped by a local store to pick up a few Christmas trinkets that she really didn't need. That's where the nice lady saw her sitting on the curb.... cold, damp, wearing a thin, worn hoodie. Crouched over, with her arms wrapped around her legs, she rested her head on her knees. The nice lady



immediately knew why she was drawn to the local store; she asked if the 30-ish woman was OK (she wasn't), and what could she do? "I never pray, but I finally prayed for help." With the help of Mitchell County Law Enforcement, the nice lady brought her to Mitchell County SafePlace.

She's been married for 10 years; they have a kindergarten-age child. She loves her husband, but he's always kept her isolated: she wasn't allowed to drive, get together with girlfriends, and, worst of all, seeing or talking to her family were rare. She certainly wasn't allowed to have a job! He never hit her, but he put her down and made her feel worthless almost daily. She couldn't do anything right, no matter how she tried.

Yeah, he drank sometimes. You know the drill: hanging out with the guys, unwinding after work, watching the game. It sure didn't bring out the best in him. About two years ago, he started using meth....and started smacking her around a bit. A little over a year ago, he started shooting up meth. Not surprisingly, that's when things went from bad to much, much worse. He beat her regularly, and the beatings got worse as time passed. Remember, she couldn't leave because she wasn't allowed to drive. How could she possibly explain this to her "distant" family and friends? Of course, she had no money.

A few weeks ago, he started making incendiary devices. Why? He was going to throw them at her if she did anything wrong.....specifically if she had any ideas about leaving! All the while he was regularly, savagely beating her. Then came that rainy, dreary Sunday night. His plan? He told her he was "going to just get rid of her completely." His plan was to kill her, then cut her up in little pieces so no one would ever find her body. What did it matter? She was so alone, so isolated, nobody would miss her anyway. She managed to sneak out, on foot in that nasty weather, until she found herself with nothing but the clothes on her back, sitting on the curb of that little store.

Yes, we're all painfully aware of the destruction drug and alcohol abuse is to our beloved family members and friends. We worry ourselves sick, pace the floors, spend many sleepless nights. We pray and pray some more. We beg the addict to go to rehab, to go to counseling, to get help.....any kind of help! We bargain with the addict; we bargain with God. We beg the addict to get back to church. Many times we beg our pastor to please try to intervene, to form prayer chains.

According to co-director of EMERGE, the nation's first and one of the leading programs for the treatment of abusive men, Lundy Bancroft, an internationally renowned expert in domestic violence and its root causes, "No one wants to believe that his or her own son or brother is an abusive man. Parents don't want the finger pointed at them, so they say: 'Our child wouldn't abuse his partner. We brought him up right.' Family loyalty and collective denial of family problems are powerful binding agents." Sometimes they blame the victim. Maybe they've seen how she 'overreacts' to his actions, but they don't know what he's been doing to her behind closed doors - even before the drugs or alcohol have entered the picture.

Sometimes we blame the victim. We even beg her to "just don't make him mad," "try not to push his buttons." Or lay a guilt trip on her. "Divorce is not an option." "Remember your vows - for better or for worse." "You made your bed, now lie in it." "Think of the children - they need their father. And he'd never hurt them!"

We're quick to blame drugs and/or alcohol addiction on abuse. But, just think about it for a minute. Remember, for 8 years this man kept his wife completely isolated.....no driving, no working, no money, no access to family or friends. Over time, he pulled her down, down, down, stripping her of any self-esteem or self-worth. And don't forget that he smacked her around at times. The fact is, he chose to do these things. He chose this power, this control, this abuse.

Dee Harrison, who also practices the EMERGE philosophy in her Batterer Intervention Programs (BIP) in Mitchell, McDowell, and Burke Counties, explains, "Most of the abuse is focused on the intimate person in their lives. For abusers, the majority of their 'outside' relationships are conducted in a respectful manner, which indicates that they already know how to behave respectfully towards others [bosses, coworkers, other family members, friends, the mailman] when they decide to. The belief of EMERGE is that abusers decide that it is socially acceptable to use abuse and control with their partners and children in order to get what they want in that immediate situation. To them, the short-tem gain is much more important than the long-term damage, and loss that they experience because of their abuse.

Dee goes on to emphasize that "abusers tend to have a view of the world that is negative and self-centered. They view themselves as victims." The goal of the EMERGE model is for the abuser to accept responsibility, and learn to co-exist respectfully with the partner.

As you can see, this is a very complex issue. According to Tracy Black, Associate Director for Mitchell County SafePlace, "It is our hope that directing these abusers to meaningful, effective treatment will one day bring an end to domestic violence that plagues our communities."



One ray of hope is that abortions have been declining in the past few years but the numbers are still staggering. "The Church is a sign-post, a preview to the watching world of what the coming reign of God in Christ is to look like." — Russell Moore

"Our Father in Heaven...Your Kingdom come Your will be done on Earth as it is in Heaven" – Jesus (Matthew 6:8-9)



Last Spring while reading through Russell Moore's book, "Onward: Engaging the Culture Without Losing the Gaspel," I inadvertently commented something to the effect of, "This guy is right on. Moore is the Chairman of the SBC's Ethics and Religious Liberty Committee (say that three times fast), and his crime; opposing Donald Trump for president.

I fully understand evangelical support for Trump – think about the alternative – though I don't necessarily share the enthusiasm that many Evangelicals have shown; I describe my position as 'cautiously optimistic.' Over the past year however, Moore has been very critical of Trump and to a lesser extent of his Evangelical supporters, echoing the sentiments of Albert Mohler, who wrote that he couldn't support Trump without having to "apologize to former President Bill Clinton." As you might imagine these two Conservative Christian heavyweights have raised the ire of many Conservative Christians and particularly of those in the SBC, who employs Moore. Recently, several prominent SBC Churches and Pastors have even begun the call for Moore's removal from his position.

I find this troubling; this issue is bigger than a presidential election. What is at stake may be no less than the role of the Church in the political arena and the focus of the Church's mission in the world. Jack Graham, a prominent Texas pastor, publicly worried that Moore would have "no access, basically, to President Trump" and others have recently mused that his criticism of the president-elect may end up "costing Baptist's a chance to capitalize on a victory for the religious right." Is that what we are doing now? Capitalizing on political victories? Is this the Great Commission that Jesus called His Church to in Matthew 28:19-20? Go to Washington, influence policy, lobbying for all I have commanded and boycotting my opponents. Are we actually now worried that Moore's stance on the centrality of the Gospel may jeopardize Baptist political power?

I don't know Russell Moore personally but I whole-heartedly believe his views are born, not out of political disagreement with or personal distaste for Donald Trump, but out of a passion for the surpassing worth of Jesus Christ and His Gospel. I believe Moore sees a Conservative Christian movement that, in recent decades, has become far too cozy with certain politicians and political parties and I believe that he takes his dual-role in the Convention seriously; a role that his beloved predecessor Dr. Richard Land described as "to speak to Southern Baptist and on behalf of Southern Baptists." In other words, Moore understands that his primary mission is not lending Evangelical credibility in the political arena, but being a Gospel-centered voice informing Believers on issues and then drawing us back to the centrality of the Gospel. I am thankful for this voice that continues to remind me that the eternal nature of the Gospel and the surpassing Glory of the coming Kingdom are far too important to sacrifice on the altar of political influence. I pray for Moore and for His Gospel-focused voice to continue to ring out loud and clear in Washington and in the hearts and minds of believers across the nation

You may be surprised to learn that such occurrences are commonplace throughout my lifetime, even pre-farming days. For example, one day I will recount for you how I was run over by an outboard mo-

As we visited around the dinner table Doug surmised that he had "been thinking...", always a scary scenario. Usually this meant we would soon embark on a wild and crazy venture of some sort and I would go along kicking and screaming, my body and life hanging in the balance.

As Barbara and I digested her fine home cookin', Doug offered me a second piece of Hawaiian Sunset cake...a sure sign of impending doom for me! 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

No Regrets Family--Help My Teen is Rebellious

We would all like to have teens who always did what they were told and never gave us any trouble, however that is not always the case. I remember giving my mom a fit. I would have been labeled as a rebellious teenager. Now I regret ever arguing with my mom. Bless her heart she deserves a gold



Well there is no magical formula or spell a parent can cast on them. But I think we can do some things to help. It is true that most teens do not like to argue with their parents. Teens would rather avoid the argument and confrontation with a parent. I know I did not like to argue with my parents. Arguing just led to more frustration and unresolved issues; someone once told me— if I am not part of the solution then I am part of the problem.

One huge factor we tend to overlook about teens is their relationship with God. As a parent I cannot expect my child to act like a saint if the Son of God does not live in their heart. A Christian's heart has been transformed by the work of the Holy Ghost. The Bible describes a Christian as a new creation, "old things are passed away behold all things are become new." What that means is that within every Christian is a desire to please God. We often mistake what we call a backslidden. child for what is actually the "prodigal son"; one who grew up in a Christian home but never truly surrendered their life to Christ. A heart surrendered to Christ will desire to obey their parents, because that same heart wants to obey God. Every parent will have some conflict with their teen child, but problems will soon be resolved because a Christian will come under the conviction of the Holy Ghost and the discipline of God. (Heb. 12:7) Give your teen every opportunity to go to Church and experience God. Pray for their salvation or a very serious rededication to God. as Lord and Savior. Then this same teen that once slammed doors and disregarded rules will now have a new nature and the direction of the Holy Ghost in their life. It is so much easier to communicate spiritual convictions with a teen who is a child of God. Your number one advocate is the work of God in your child's heart.

Second, choose your battles wisely. Many arguments with teens can be avoided simply by clearly defining the important issues. Let me speak clearly on this subject. What are we more concerned about—keeping our teen off drugs and alcohol or the kind of music they listen to or the way they wear their hair. In his younger teen years I was not always in agreement with the way my son wore his hair, but I did not go to battle on that particular issue. However Pam and I will go to battle and stand firm on issues like alcohol, dating, curfews, questionable friends and other things we fear would draw our teen away from their relationship with Jesus. Our children's relationship with Christ is our number one priority. I have seen parents argue over insignificant issues while totally ignoring the more serious problems teens face. Clearly communicate what is expected and be willing to discuss and compromise on issues that do not directly hinder their relationship with Christ. For example we are willing to bend on curfews and cell phone texting to a teen that is showing maturity and responsibility. We try to allow for opportunities to build trust. 11 Even a young man is known by his actions—by whether his behavior is pure and upright. Prov 20:11 (HCSB)

Third, focus on character. We tend to focus on behavior; however, God wants to build character in your child's life. The whole book of proverbs is directed at molding a young person to fear God and gain Godly wisdom to navigate through life. God spent years developing a young shepherd boy to be the king of Israel. In 1464, Agostino di Duccio was enlisted to produce a statue for the local cathedral. However, Agostino abruptly abandoned this project.

In 1476, Antonio Rossellino was commissioned to salvage the marble and complete the project; yet he soon abandoned the effort as well. Finally, in 1501 twentysix-year-old Michelangelo was contracted to attempt to save the project. He would not finish until 1504. When he put down his chizel, the statue of David remained, representing one of the greatest masterpieces by human hands. What had seemed beyond hope or repair, in the hands of the master, became a breathtaking achievement. (pg.72, Experiencing God at Home, Blackaby)

The idea is God is at work in your child's life (Philippians. 1:6). He is concerned about developing a Christ like nature in him. So, rebellion is just part of the problem. I sat down with my son the other day and encouraged him to examine his character and the type of man God wanted him to become. David had a group of men that followed him when he was running from Saul. The Bible describes them at first as rag tag outcasts, but latter on they became known as mighty men of valor. Why would these men risk their lives to follow David? Because David was a man whom God molded his character. Sure, David had his share of problems but all in all he had a godly character. So as a parent my job is not only to discipline behavior, but to focus on character that produces behavior.

When the rules or actions of a teen are in direct rebellion then discipline must follow. A parent who practices what they preach and mean what they say will be respected. As parent I cannot participate in the vices I am trying to get my kid to stop or not do. If I do not want my kid to become a drunk then I must abstain from alcohol. If I do not want my child to cuss, then I have to have a clean mouth as well. If I want my child to respect their body then I must respect mine. Character is huge; I cannot expect my child's character to be any deeper than my own.

What Grace!

1 Peter 5:10-14 says the following: "But the God of all grace, who hath called us unto his eternal glory by Christ Jesus, after that we have suffered a while, make you perfect, stablish, strengthen, settle you. To him be glory and dominion for ever and ever. Amen. By Silvanus, a faithful brother

stablish, strengthen, settle you. To him be glory and dominion for ever and ever. Amen. By Silvanus, a faithful brother unto you, as I suppose, I have written briefly, exhorting, and testifying that this is the true grace of God wherein ye stand. The church that is at Babylon, elected together with you, saluteth you; and so doth Marcus my son. Greet ye one another

with a kiss of charity. Peace be with you all that are in Christ Jesus. Amen." Notice how v.10 begins. The first words of that verse say, "But the God of all grace." The conjunction "but" draws a contrast. The Apostle Peter in the verses just prior to our passage in this study deals with two main things which draw a contrast to verses 10-14.

The first contrast has to do with our cares mentioned in verse 7. Christians today have many cares but one day they will be no more. We deal with great concerns and problems today; but, it is good news to know that we can take them to the Lord. One old song says, "Take your burdens to the Lord and leave them there." Above and beyond that fact, there is coming a day when we will deal with cares no longer.

The other contrast involves Satan and the opposition he throws in our way. He goes about trying to cause problems in our lives, seeking to turn us away from the Lord. Verse 8 uses the word "devour" when it comes to disclosing Satan's objectives in our lives. In our King James Bibles, we find that word "devour" is translated in other places in the New Testament as "drown" and "swallow up." It is kin to the Greek word that is translated to "fall down." Satan certainly has no good intentions at all for our lives.

The key is this--no matter what your problems are, God will see to them through His matchless, marvelous, and mighty grace. No matter how problematic things are in your life now, they will be better sooner or later.

God Has Grace To Give To All (v.10)

1 Peter 5:10 refers to, "The God of all grace, who hath called us unto his eternal glory by Christ Jesus." "Of" is a source word. It tells us where something originated or came from in life. All true grace comes from God. When you need grace, all you need to do is ask Him for it, and to draw near to Him to receive it.

All saving grace, keeping grace, serving grace, settling and satisfying grace, every manifestation of grace, comes from God who gives it abundantly and freely to those who are willing to receive and believe on Him.

There is not a person on the face of the earth that Jesus did not die for at Calvary. But that does not mean everyone is going to Heaven. One must personally receive Christ to be able to walk on the streets of pure transparent gold in the New Jerusalem (John 1:12).

God's Grace Is Part Of An Eternal Plan (v.10)

Peter speaks of "eternal glory by Jesus Christ." While in this present world, we face suffering in some form about every day of our lives. Sometimes it looks like our pain and suffering will never end. When you compare our present sufferings with eternity, they just last a little while. We are assured of a day when there will be no suffering- Rev. 21:4. We are called into God's eternal glory. That was the plan before the worlds began, when there was no one in the universe but God.

That plan involves several different matters. Never forget God is making you through the circumstances of life, both positive and negative. Certain things will happen after we have to undergo times of suffering.

First, the Lord will perfect us. That word "perfect" means to "arrange, to set in order, or to adjust." It is used of the mending of the net of James and John (Matt. 4:21). There is always mending to be done in our torn and tattered lives.

Secondly, the Lord will stablish us. "Stablish" is translated "steadfastly" in Luke 9:51. It means to turn steadfastly in a certain direction. It comes from a word that means "to make stiff, solid, or stable." What wonders the Lord can do in our lives!

Thirdly, the Lord will strengthen us. This is a promise to believers, pledging the help of Almighty God through the problems of this life.

Fourthly, the Lord will settle you. "Settle" means to "lay a solid foundation." It is a building term. In order to stand buildings need a solid foundation.

God's Grace Brings Praise To Christ (vs.11-13)

It is a perpetual praise. The praise of verse 11 is to be "forever and ever." The scheme of grace is that God gets the glory, rather than man, because man is saved by grace and not through his own works (Eph.2:8-9). If man could produce his own salvation, then men would get the glory rather than God.

It is a provided praise. Two men are mentioned here in the last verses of the Book of I Peter-those being Silvanus and Marcus. Silvanus was a faithful brother who spread the word about the things God was doing through Paul. Marcus must have referred to John whose surnamed was Mark or Marcus. Mark spread the word also about how God should be praised. What are you doing to get that message out?

Also, the church at Babylon did their part in getting the word out about the worthiness of Christ to receive worship and praise.

God's Grace Brings Love And Peace (v.14)

All of those who are in Christ Jesus have two very important parts of those who receive salvation. There is charity, or love, which every believer possesses. Romans 5:5 says...."the love of God is shed abroad in our hearts by the Holy Ghost

which is given unto us." God gives us a sufficiency of love to love others that we could not bring ourselves to otherwise love.

Peace also is given to believers. The peace Jesus gives is one that passes all understanding (Phil.4:7)

When we think of the supply of love and peace God gives to us through, and all because of His grace, we can do what the Apostle Peter did at the end of this book and say, "Amen." It means "so be it or let it be so." God's grace will prevail.

Dear friends,

Thank you for your continued prayers and support. It has been so refreshing being back on the mission field. We have seen God doing so many great things here in Kenya. Our original plan was to only spend 2 weeks here in the back country and then proceed on to Zimbabwe and Malawi, but because of the cry of the people here and the leading of the Holy Spirit we decided to

come back for another four weeks. We will be going back to the capital on January 23. We have a meeting with some pastors from South Sudan on January 24 and then January 25 we will be flying to South Sudan. The pastors have contacted us from there. 87 churches have come together in the South Sudan to build the first Bible College in the country and we have been invited to join in the work. We will be there for one week then off to Rwanda for 2 weeks and Uganda for 2 weeks then back here to Kenya. We will return back to Morganton on March 14. Every service here has been full. We have had services in little tin churches

as well as large elaborate churches. I was so very sad to hear that there is no pastor or bishop in this entire area that has had any type of Bible training. They have been eating up the training we have been providing. We have been teaching six hours a day and preaching two hours every night. They want so much more. They have told me, "Pastor we are Bible illiterate." It seems so over whelming at times. There is so much they need to know. These pastors are simple people. Many of them are farmers by trade. They will go to their fields early in the morning before the conferences and then at night after the conferences to do their work. We have been try-

ing to take Mondays off.

The Spirit of the Lord has been working in such a way like never before. We have seen so many people saved, delivered, and healed. The people continue to come from far and wide. I believe a person could spend a lifetime here and still not finish all the work that needs to be done. We have not even left the area of Lake Victoria yet. There are still so many unreached areas. The people here lead very simple lives. Our Christmas was anything but commercial. These people sing many of the same songs that we sing about the birth of Jesus such as Away in the Manger and Silent Night, but the difference here is they have nothing to give one another. All they have: all their praise the give to the Lord. Christmas here is celebrated around the church. They come very early and begin with worship. Every age group has its own program; children have a recital program, young people have a dance skit and the older people have a choir. Of course there is praise and worship and then the Christmas message. After the message there is food for all. We had a great Christmas here even through it was difficult to realize it was Christmas when it was over 90 degrees outside. I am so excited about the New Year's Services. Here in Africa they



The Inspiring Word

By the Lord's amazing Grace, we find ourselves at the beginning of another New Year! 2017 is in front of I do with it? By the way it's a healthy question to ask. There is a lot to be said about making plans, commit-

us and once again we are asking the question; what will ments, promises and even the popular resolutions for a coming year. There is even more to say about keeping them. Keeping any plan,

commitment, promise or resolution requires that we embrace with our heart what is necessary to fulfill the expectations placed upon our life. Let's talk about that for a little while. Every year we make promises with the fullest intention of keeping them.

Maybe we're going to drop a few pounds, or quit smoking, or get away from immorality, maybe we're going to get back in church or quit drinking or doing drugs. Too often you keep falling short, year in and year out. With it comes the feeling of being a failure. You let yourself down, maybe even your family, friends or a spouse. Why? Why do you fail? I have the answer, I also have some words of encouragement for you, please keep reading!

First, understand that you do not have what it takes to overcome the pitfalls of life. The pitfalls of life come from sin and within each one of us is a sin nature. Maybe you have never heard of that. Simply put we are born separated from God because of the sin of Adam and Eve. We are told in Romans 3:10 "As it is written, There is none righteous, no, not one:" and again in Romans 3:23 "For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God;" we cannot within ourselves overcome the sin nature within us.

Second, there is a consequence or penalty that comes with sin. Every one of us are headed for this penalty. Notice with me Romans 6:23 "For the wages of sin is death; but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord." Sin has a death penalty. This death penalty is an eternal death, a death beyond our heartbeat. That isn't very good news to begin a New Year with, is it? If we stopped right there we could find no hope and have no confidence moving into 2017, but the Bible continues so let's continue in it! God has a gift. A payment for the penalty (consequence) of sin, a payment that doesn't mean an eternal death. God offers eternal life as a substitute for eternal death.

Third, the eternal life that God offers was provided by Jesus Christ! Jesus paid the penalty for our sin. Romans 5:8 "But God commendeth his love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us." Commendeth is an old English word that simply means God shows or displays, in this case His love. Even while we are living with a sin nature embedded in our lives and having no hope, Jesus died for you! He did this to prevent you from dying an eternal death. All the pleasures you may find in sin; for example, drinking, drugs, immorality, greed, lying, cheating. They are short lived pleasure, short lived because the end is death. It's important to understand, we are not sinners because we sin, we sin because we are sinners! Jesus is the salvation of sinners.

Fourth, how does Jesus remedy our sin nature. I'm glad you ask! Your Bible tells you in Romans 10:9-10 "That if thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved. (10) For with the heart man believeth unto righteousness; and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation." Simply put, confess and believe! Confess that Jesus and only Jesus can save you. There is no other person who can take the place of Jesus Christ as your savior. You must be willing to confess that. To confess Jesus as your savior you must believe that God did raise Jesus from the dead. That's right, it's no fairy tale. Jesus resurrection is a reality you must accept by faith, then by that same faith confess Jesus as the only forgiveness of sin, your sin!

This miracle is called being born again! Having this new life in Jesus Christ gives you His presence daily. That's right, Christ lives within you. In that fact is

the strength you need to fulfill your New Year resolutions. Whatever they may be with Jesus in your life they will be the right decisions made with the presence of godly strength and you will have the faith to let God lead you to success His way in 2017! Several of y'all have told me that you have been proud to see my son Michael working at K-mart — and I have to say that I am proud that he is working too. And he wants to; that is a good thing. I can remember my first job: it was as a stocker and clerk at the little grocery store and gas station about a mile from our house. The manager of the store was a woman by the name of Barbara Conley, and one of the things she emphasized was that there was always something to do: if there were no customers at the register, then stock the shelves, or dust them, or move the cans up to the front (I still do that when I walk in stores today!) But the worst sin was to be caught standing around at the cash register doing nothing when she came. When I was working nights after Mrs. Barbara had left for the day, it was always a good feeling when she came in unexpectedly and saw me straightening the shelves. One or two times, unfortunately, I was standing up at the front, talking to the cashier — and I hated that feeling. I wanted to be found doing what I had been told to be doing when she came.

If that's so with an earthly manager, how much more so with the Lord? If 2017 is the year that Jesus comes back — or if it is the year that He comes for YOU — one of the most important questions of your life will be: are you doing what He called and gifted you to do, when He comes? I can't imagine a worse feeling, than knowing that God gifted me to teach, or give, or serve, or sing, or whatever — and for Him to come and I am doing NOTHING in the church when He comes. Don't be found standing around with "your hands in your pockets" when Jesus comes back. If we are near the end, then SERVE! Be found doing what He called you to do when He comes.

CONCLUSION

We don't know what 2017 is going to hold. But we know that the end of all things is closer than it has ever been before. And even if the end is not this year, it could well be that the end of some of our lives is this year. In fact, it is almost a certainty that some of us who are here this morning, will NOT be among our number if there is a 2018. In light of that, God's word says we need to be "of sound judgment and sober."

I set a goal last year to read 25 books by the end of the year, and I did: I finished my 27th yesterday! One of the longest, and best books I read this year, was a biography on Augustine of Hippo Regius — the man we often refer to as St. Augustine. After being converted from a life of sensuality as a young man, Augustine spent a lifetime of service as a Bishop as an adult. But in his later years, he contracted a deadly fever, from which he would not recover. Those who were with him said that in his last weeks, Augustine had 4 Psalms (the penitential Psalms) posted on the wall around his death bed. He spent his last days in prayer and repentance and preparation for His coming to the Lord.

We would do well to imitate this great saint. If the end is near, let's get ready for it. Peter 4 says do the following things: PRAY. LOVE. SERVE. And even if the end of the world is NOT in 2017, or even if it does not portend the end of our lives, we will not have wasted our efforts. These are the things we should be doing every year, until our Master comes. Remember Jesus' words in Mt. 24:46 "Blessed is that slave whom his Master finds so doing when he comes." Let's rededicate ourselves today, to PRAY; LOVE; and SERVE until He returns

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

Several years ago, I received a call that a near tragedy had taken place in the life of a family I knew. The family wasn't directly connected to the church of which I was pastor, but I felt a heavy burden to reach out and offer to help, if by nothing else, just praying with them.

A couple of days passed before I had a chance to make the trip to the hospital. My heart was broken as I stepped

into the Intensive Care Unit of the hospital. A teenage boy in the family had overdosed and almost died. Though the family hardly knew me, they began to open up when I told them I was a pastor and had heard of their situation and had come to pray with them. Tears streamed down the faces of the family members as they shared what had happened that seemed to lead up to the events of the last few days. To be honest, I struggled greatly to even know what to say or do to help them. Somehow just being there with them seemed to bring comfort. Maybe it was because they just felt that someone cared. Doctors had told the family that they felt the young man would pull through but would likely have permanent effects from the overdose.

Time passed slowly as I witnessed family and friends enter and exit the room. They would walk in, look at their loved one, speak a few brief words, and look at me and then exit. Many young people were there that day coming in and out of the room. Each one entered and if they were not already crying, they would start as soon as they saw their friend. Some would try to speak but could not, and would leave weeping. Many looked at the family and at me. What I saw in their eyes pierced my heart. To this day, I remember the look in their eyes. One could tell that inside their hearts there was hopelessness and emptiness just by looking in their eyes.

After I left the hospital, I too cried, most of the way home that evening. Questions rolled over and over in my mind. As I remember him there in the ICU room, just struggling to hold on to life, I asked myself, "What was he looking for?" Surely lying there in that bed connected to life support wasn't what he was hoping to find, was it? Did he think that somehow the drugs would help him find something or escape from something? What was he expecting to find at the bottom of that pill bottle? Was it hope? Was it meaning? Was it simply an escape to try and forget something in his life? I wondered what he thought he would find as my heart took me back several years.

Many people seem to search throughout life for that one thing that is going to fill up that emptiness in their heart. My search came through alcohol. My friends and I would usually go every weekend somewhere to drink. We didn't drink to be sociable with each other, we didn't drink because it tasted good, we drank to get drunk. The cycle repeated itself over and over again. We would sober up long enough to recover from the previous weekend and by Wednesday or Thursday we were planning for the next. For the most part, I did a pretty good job of hiding what was going on in my life. Some people knew, but most didn't realize the struggle I was having inside me. You see, during this whole time I was attending church services with my girlfriend on Sunday mornings. Some services I felt miserable. Mostly I went to keep Michelle (now my wife of 22 years) off my case! During this time of struggle, a faithful preacher, Buster Yelton, would preach the gospel every service I attended. He shared of how much God loved me, yes me! He talked of just what Christ went through on the cross to forgive my sin and change my life. He taught of God's great plan for my life and that by faith and repentance I could be a new person in Christ. It seemed as if every time he preached, I was the only one in the building! Have you ever felt that way?

One particularly weekend, the whole direction of my life changed. We had drank until about 2 a.m. Sunday morning. This was one of only a couple of times that I had drank until I physically passed out. The last thing I remember was asking my buddies to help me get turned around in the bed of my truck because I was about to be sick. After that, I remember nothing. The next morning I woke up in the same position, hanging over the tailgate. Rolling over in the bed of the truck I felt as if I had been hit by a car. There was no way I could make it to church that morning.

Something different happened that morning though as I lay there looking up through those Hemlock trees with the sun shining through the limbs. For the first time, I knew that no matter how many times I did this, it would always be the same. All that was ever at the bottom of those cans and bottles was nothing. There never had been anything there and there never would be! That emptiness inside me would never be filled by alcohol, or anything else, just by Jesus. Now friends, you can say it was the alcohol or my imagination, but I know what it was. That morning I heard clearly, for the first time in my soul, the God of all creation speak to me. He spoke louder than any audible voice ever could. He said, "Chris, this is not why I created you, this is not my plan for your life. What you are searching for can only be found in Me! I'm waiting for you." That weekend was the last time alcohol would ever control me. Shortly after that experience, I gave my life and heart to Jesus. He gave me forgiveness, hope, direction, peace with God, and a foundation that I can stand on no matter what happens around me.

This is difficult to share knowing that so many who never knew will now know. But I want those who are struggling with alcohol, drugs, ungodly relationships, or whatever it may be, to know that you will never fill up that emptiness inside no matter how hard or how many times you try. All you will ever find is emptiness. Let Christ fill that longing and emptiness in your soul with Himself. Know that what you are in right now is not why God created you. Come to Jesus and find what you have been searching for all along. Years from now, you will be able to look back over your life and see where God has brought you and what He has brought you out of. You don't have to stay where you are at now. God has so much more for you than this. Then one day, together we can lift our hands to the

Lord, and give Him praise and honor for changing our lives.

I often remember as I reflect on what God has done for me that my life wasn't always this way!

John 10:9-10 I am the door: by me if any man enter in, he shall be saved, and shall go in and out, and find pasture. The thief cometh not, but for to steal, and to kill, and destroy: I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly. (KJV)

Dear Pat,

When the rules of paying off debts from smallest to largest don't apply, I look at things this way: If you have two debts that are of equal amounts, I would attack the one with the larger interest rate first. In your case, that would be the credit card debt.

I get what you're saying about the car. You guys might be in a bind if something happened and you lost one car. But it's also something you could work around if you had no other choice. So yeah, knock out the credit card first then move on to the car. Going this route will serve two purposes: First, it will save you some money. And second, I've got a feeling it will fire up your wife and get her on board with the plan even more than she already is.

She's taking this seriously if she's eyeballing interest rates, Pat. So use this momentum to work together, and knock out that debt!

Panic gushed through his soul as the pain gripped with an iron hand. It had been seven hours, and he could feel the push of the force that propelled him into the

unknown. Dimly he heard the wail of the siren as he struggled against the darkness and the suffocating claustrophobia. He could barely see the light at the end, but he could sense the intense efforts of those on the other side as they assisted him. Finally, he broke free into the inviting bright light of the emergency room



where a team of nurses, doctors and operating room technicians worked feverishly to assess, aid, and comfort his tiny body. He heard gentle sounds, two of which he recognized from his ninemonth journey, and he relaxed, knowing that all was well. A new adventure had begun. Blevins said she is likely to attend Central Texas College to continue her education.





The HPST Antibiotic

Finally votes have been counted and in spite of ongoing disputes a new United States president has been named. During the campaign both parties, according to their viewpoints, made several promises for the "good of the people". In the meantime Christians were praying around the clock with most of those prayers based on 2 Chronicles 7:14. If my people who are called by my name will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways I will hear



from heaven, forgive their sin and heal their land. When I began thinking on this subject I came up with the catchy title for an article "Administering the HPST Antibiotic for the Healing of America". The ingredients making up the "antibiotic" are Humility, Prayer, Seeking and Turning based on the above Scripture.

As I began getting my thoughts together for my "sermon" on what is required for the healing of America, my attention was drawn to the prayer of Daniel found in Daniel 9. Daniel also was praying for the healing of his nation, Israel. While in the process of studying his prayer I looked at the prayers of others in Scripture. There was one common theme that stopped me in my tracks, Humility. All the ingredients of the "HPST Antibiotic" are required for healing of the land but the "H" is so easily overlooked. Humility – What does it mean and how is it displayed?

The Hebrew word in 2 Chronicles 7:14 translated "humble" means to "bend the knee" – showing subjection. Being privileged to live in a free country citizens of America are not required to bow to a superior ruler. Is it possible that our "freedoms" have made us more insensitive to what being humble really means? Have we become so proud and self-righteous that subjection is not part of our thought patterns? What is God expecting when He tells His people to humble themselves? I think the answer to that question lies in the prayers of many in the Bible. See for yourself the common theme that begins the following prayers.

Hannah (1 Samuel 2) - My heart exalts in the Lord... There is no one holy like the Lord... There is no one besides Thee.

Hezekiah (2 Kings 19) – O Lord the God of Israel who art enthroned above the cherubim. Thou art the God... Thou has made heaven and earth.

Nehemiah (Nehemiah 1) – O Lord God of heaven, the great and awesome God. Ezra (Nehemiah 9) – Thou alone art the Lord. Thou hast made the heavens, the heaven of heavens with all their host, the earth and all that is on it, the seas and all that is in them. Thou dost give life to all of them and the heavenly host bows down before Thee.

Mary - (Luke 1) My soul exalts the Lord...Holy is His name...He has done mighty deeds.

Jesus (Matthew 6) – Our Father who art in heaven, Hallowed be Thy name.

Each of these example prayers began with a common theme, Humility – the acknowledgment of God. I have heard prayers prayed that I believed without doubt had reached the very ears of God. What made those prayers so powerful? It was the emphasis that was put on God, the Creator of all things. The One who sits on a throne surrounded by a host of angelic beings. The One who put the stars and planets in place. The One who causes each of our heart beats to pulsate through every artery, vein and smallest capillary. The One who enables our lungs to take in breaths of life-giving oxygen. God, the God above all gods!

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

NC Senate District 47

The General Assembly was busy in December with three extra sessions. The first extra session in the month resulted in appropriations of over \$200 million of disaster relief to those affected by Hurricane Matthew and the November wildfires that befell portions of my district. Additional disaster relief appropriations will be considered in the upcoming 2017 session.

Another extra session included confirmation of cabinet secretaries, full appellate court panel review, employee status, restoration of administrative authority to the state superintendent, health insurance, board of trustees at UNC institutions appointed by the Legislature, State Ethics and Elections Enforcement Board, clarification of the General Assembly's authority to draw Congressional and legislative maps, and partisan appellate court elections. Following are some highlights of the enacted bills:

- Confirmation of the governor's Cabinet secretary appointees by the N.C. Senate.
- Consolidation of the State Board of Elections, Lobbying Compliance Division of the N.C. Secretary of State's office, and N.C. Ethics Commission into the State Ethics and Elections Enforcement Board with an even split in partisan membership.
 - Clarification that the N.C. Constitution gives sole authority to the General Assembly to draw congressional and legislative districts.
- Restoration of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction's authority to make staffing decisions as the elected head of the Department of Public Instruction.

Governor McCrory called legislators back to Raleigh for a final extra session in an effort to repeal House Bill 2 – Public Facilities Privacy & Security Act. I voted for House Bill 2 in March of 2016 for the same reasons I voted against repeal of the bill in December of 2016 – I firmly believe in protecting and maintaining privacy and safety for women and girls in restrooms, showers, and locker rooms. I will always vote for what I believe is decent and appropriate and in the best interest of my constituents.

"because love covers a multitude of sins." What does this mean, "love covers a multitude of sins"? It means that when you love someone, you overlook the flaws in them, and the sins they commit against you. Think about it: the people that you love are not perfect, far from it. They do things that might but or annoy you all the time. But you overlook it, because you love them. You might say something like: "Oh, I know they did (such and such a thing)"—but you don't care, because you love them. Now some OTHER person, whom you are NOT inclined to love, may do the SAME kind of thing, and yet you are offended or hold it against them. What was the difference? It was not the deed, or the "sin" itself — because you forgave one for it. No, the difference was that you had LOVE for one, and NOT for the other.

For example, I love my little granddaughters. They are just precious treasures. And so I overlook a lot of things that they do. Several years ago, I got my first iPad, and when I did I got one of the best accessories I ever got: a Zagg keyboard case, that serves both as a case for the iPad, but it also folds out into a keyboard, basically making the iPad a laptop — and ever since I've had it, I have hardly ever used a desktop computer or laptop again - I just love it. But one day the grandbabies were over, and Corley wanted to play with my iPad. I generally guard my iPad with my life, but I thought, well, I will let HER sit in my lap and do a few things on it. Before I knew it, she had reached down on the keyboard, and just ripped the "W" right off of it! It never worked again. Now I have got to tell you: if one of Y'ALL had done that, I would have been pretty ticked at you! But when Corley did it, I just laughed — and then a couple of months later, Abigail did the same thing to the "M". It slowed my typing down considerably! But I overlooked their "transgression" because I loved them. Now there are probably other people, who if THEY had done that same thing, I would have been pretty unhappy about them tearing the numbers off my keyboard. What's the difference? It was not the transgression — the difference is MY LOVE for one was greater than for the other. And if you think about it, there are all kinds of examples of this in your own life as well. There are people who do things to you, or say things to you, or forget to do something for you, or whatever — but you don't hold it against them, and the reason you don't is because you are predisposed to really love them. But someone ELSE might do the VERY same kind. of thing - and yet you get ticked off at them for it. What was the difference? It wasn't the transgression; it wasn't what they did — the only thing different is YOUR LOVE: you really love one, and not the other.

Some of us here today need to consider our relationships with others in the church — or maybe even our own families or neighbors or work associates. Are you being critical of some, or holding things against some, when you are forgiving these very same kinds of things in others? Can you see that the difference is not what they are doing, but in YOUR lack of love for them?

God challenges us here in His word to be "fervent in your love for one another". A lot of us in the church may "like" each other, and be "fond" of each other with a brotherly love, but God says it's time for you to grow into real "agape" love for each other: the kind of love that overlooks transgressions in others — because GOD has this same kind of love for YOU!

Listen, you may or may not accomplish what some people will call a "great thing" in 2017.

But if you will LOVE people: love them enough to let them lean on you; love them enough to overlook their slights and transgressions — then you will have accomplished what GOD calls the greatest thing. If the end is near, then LOVE — more than ever before!

III. SERVE

I Peter 4:10 "As each one has received a special gift, employ it in serving one another as good stewards of the manifold grace of God."

We find several truths in this verse about gifts and service in the church:

First of all, we see that every Christian has received a gift or ability to serve. He says: "As EACH ONE has received a special gift." EVERY Christian has a gift. I Corinthians 12:7 echoes this same thing: "To EACH ONE is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good." God has left none of His children out. "EACH" of us has been given a gift with which to serve. It is only a matter of discovering what our gift IS, but if you are a Christian, God has given you an ability with which to serve Him.

Gifts are to be USED. It says, "As each one has received a special gift, EMPLOY it"! God gave you your gift to USE in service. He didn't give you the gift of teaching just so that you could enjoy the fruits of your study for yourself. You were given that gift to USE it in teaching others God's truth.

We see this emphasis here that our gifts are not for us; they are for OTHERS. He says as you have received your gift, Employ it "in serving ONE ANOTHER." You are not to use your gift because it makes you feel good — although I will say there is often a certain feeling you get when you use your gift. But you feeling good is not the purpose of your gift. You are to use your gift to serve others, whether it benefits you in some way or not. I believe that God has given me the gift of understanding and teaching His word, but there may be times when it is hard for me to do that: it may be physically difficult for me to do it, or I may not always "feel" like doing it — but so what — this isn't about me; it is about me using the gift God has given me, to minister to others. This is what Jesus did for us, and it is what we are to do for others as well.

This verse also teaches us that you are accountable to God for the use of your gifts. It says to use your gifts: "As good STEWARDS of the manifold grace of God." A steward is someone who is accountable for what he does with something that has been entrusted to him. The Bible says here that you are accountable to God for what you do with the spiritual gifts of service which He gave you. How will you fare when you are judged for the way you have used your gifts?

In Matthew 24 Jesus spoke of the events of the end, and in :46 He said, "Blessed is that slave whom his Master finds so doing when He comes." In other words, we will be blessed if we are found doing what Jesus commanded us to be doing, when He returns.



The North Carolina General Assembly convened for a special legislative session on December 13, 2016 focusing on disaster relief funding for the ongoing efforts across the state to help recover from Hurricane Matthew and the mountain wildfires. The chamber voted unanimously late Tuesday to spend \$201 million, much of which would go for housing, local infrastructure needs and match federal aid.

Several more bills were filed in a second special legislative session, which was called for Wednesday, December 16, 2016. Several of these bills voted on were very controversial and I would like to give the people of the 85th District background on two of the more important bills and explain why I voted in favor of these bills.



Another bill, Senate Bill 4, was also brought to the floor for a vote during this special session. This bill had five parts, two of which were the most controversial, so I will only comment on those two. Part One of this bill creates the bipartisan State Board of Elections and Ethics enforcement. I am in support of this. North Carolina has very complex and complicated ethics laws. Any time I had questions in my four years in the General Assembly, I received different answers from different ethics related entities, or in some cases, no answer at all. This provision I believe will streamline this process. The second and most controversial portion of this bill, Section 3, will change the elections of Supreme Court Justices and Court of Appeals Justices from nonpartisan to partisan elections. I have supported this over the course of my four years in the General Assembly. Some may disagree with this provision, however, I voted for this and have advocated for this provision in the past.

As you can see, it is much more complicated than a yes or no, up or down vote. Some may question the timing of these votes and that is their right to do so, however, I voted for this legislation and I would have supported it regardless of who is/was Governor. Governor Cooper will still be head of state, have veto power, and the bully pulpit.

On another note, I would like to say thank you for allowing me to serve another year in the General Assembly. I hope everyone had a Merry Christmas and wish you a very happy new year.

The plan to pack the Supreme Court with two more justices during a Special Session was a figment of the imagination of the media and special interest groups.

No, the media and special interest groups did not stop a plan to pack the Supreme Court – such a plan never existed.

Media outlets jumped at the opportunity to fill their pages with conspiracies that insinuated impending doom. Naturally, people want frequent updates on matters that suggest impending doom, and the vicious cycle of rumormongering quickly took on a life of its own.

While a plan to pack the Supreme Court never existed, one thing is for sure: media outlets made a fortune off of misleading the public both here at home and across the nation. If an analysis of advertising revenue generated through pushing such a blatant falsehood were conducted, I would certainly be interested in reading the results.

Special interest groups also undoubtedly made a fortune off of pushing a fairy tale onto the public. The cycle is clear:

- · A special interest group goes to the public to raise money to stop an impending (although completely fictional) travesty;
- The special interest group after having pocketed some of the money raised produces advertisements and other media about the imagined slight, and raises more money;
- The fictional "Supreme Court packing" scheme does not materialize, so the special interest group goes back to the public again to
 raise more money they need to stop the next impending disaster from happening, whether real or imagined.

And the cycle continues.

Perhaps the Left-leaning media and special interest groups imagined Supreme Court packing to be a real threat because Gov.-elect Cooper and the General Assembly in which he served at the time packed the Court of Appeals in 2000. The provision, which was tucked into the 233-page budget bill that year, prevented Republicans from gaining control of the court in the election that followed that Fall.

Gov.-elect Cooper voted yes on the Appeals Court-packing legislation.

Whether the people of North Carolina will continue to buy into fake news event after fake news event remains to be seen.

Putnam receives doctorate degree

Burke County Public Schools Superintendent Larry Putnam has received his Doctor of Education degree (Ed.D.) from Appalachian State University. Putnam successfully defended his dissertation "A Case Study on the Self-Perceptions of Novice

Assistant Principals' and Principals' Leadership Abilities Based upon the North Carolina Standards for School Executives" on Wednesday, Nov. 16.

Putnam said. "I consider myself a life-long learner, and have always been a big proponent of everyone, educators especially, bettering themselves by never stopping learning. When we as educators follow this philosophy, it is the students who ultimately win as they gain from our expanded knowledge base. I appreciate the staff at Appalachian State University and my cohort of fellow degree seekers for their support and encouragement. My dissertation was about further developing and supporting assistant principals and principals in their multi-faceted role of ultimately increasing student performance. I chose it because after 15 years of experience as a building-level principal, I realized a need, especially in a time where the job of the principal is forever changing and accountability is higher than any time in the history of the principal role."

Earlier this month, Putnam was recognized as the 2017 Northwest Regional Education Service Alliance (NWRESA) Superintendent of the Year.

He has been superintendent of Burke County Public Schools since April 2012; prior to being named superintendent, he served as interim superintendent for seven months. Putnam has been in education for more than 20 years, and received his doctorate in education leadership from Appalachian State University on Wednesday. He has a master's in school administration from Gardner-Webb University; an educational specialist degree from Appalachian State University; and a bachelor's of



science degree in business education and a business administration degree with a concentration in management from Appalachian State University. Putnam started his career in education as a teacher at Freedom High School, his alma mater, and he held principalships at Broughton Hospital's Enola School, Draughn High School and W.A. Young and Chesterfield elementary schools. His past work experiences include employment with Drexel Heritage and the Department of Corrections. Putnam's community involvement includes Burke County United Way, Community Child Protection and Child Fatality Prevention Team. Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors, Homeland Security Task Force, Sports Medicine Advisory Council-Carolinas Health Care-Blue Ridge, BDI Board of Directors, Morganton Rotary, a local affirmation group of community leaders and past board member of the Strategic Alliance for Burke Youth (SABY).

Gladden recognized as finalist

Icard Elementary School fifth-grade teacher Andrea Gladden was among the education superstars the State Board of Education recognized on Dec. 1. Gladden is a 2016 NC Finalist for the Presidential Awards for Excellence in Mathematics and Science Teaching (PAEMST).

The PAEMST is administered by the National Science Foundation on behalf of The White House. Finalists devote time to professional development, incorporate innovative approaches into classroom teaching and use technology in their class-

rooms. Gladden is one of three state finalists in the science category.

Gladden said she learned much about herself as an educator through the process of being nominated for the Presidential Award, which included her completing an administrative, narrative and video component. She also has made contacts and formed partnerships with educators across the country.




State recognizes Audrea Gladden

She said, "I believe that it is vital in today's society for children to learn to become problem solvers at a young age. Problem solving is a skill that must be encouraged and nurtured so that it can grow over time. My students learn that in life we will experience failures, but it is how we recover from those failures that is most important."

Gladden also received recognition from the Burroughs Wellcome Fund and the National Science Foundation in the Research Triangle Park on Nov. 30 where she presented a speech and was awarded a plaque and gifts. There she met current and previous awardees of the PAEMST award and supporters from NCDPI.

This past year, Gladden was awarded her first Prism Grant funded by the Burroughs Wellcome Fund. She was awarded \$2,000 for science equipment for her project entitled, "What's in a Drop of Water?" She was also awarded the Citgo Fueling Education Award of \$1,000 this summer to spend on classroom supplies. Gladden also has been a part of the Mickelson Exxon Mobil Teacher's Academy, the E4 Study (Exploring the Efficacy of Engineering is Elementary) Study through the National Science Foundation, the Museum of Science, Boston's Engineering is Elementary (EiE) program, and NC State University. This summer she became a certified extended network provider for EiE. This allows her to provide EiE professional development trainings for western North Carolina.



What To Do If The End Is Near

A couple of years ago, I read a survey of Americans which asked what they would do, if they knew the world was coming to an end soon. Two of the top responses included going out and getting drunk, and going on a trip to Las Vegas. I was amazed — but perhaps I shouldn't have been. That is the kind of attitude you should probably expect from a person who doesn't know God: "eat, drink & be merry, for tomorrow we die." But the Christian person, on the



other hand, should have an entirely different attitude. Jesus is coming back. The end is near. We don't know when, but it is closer than it has ever been before. Climactic events could well take place in 2017. What should we, as those who claim to be God's people, do this year in light of that?

We don't have to fabricate an answer, God's word gives us directions for just this case: in I Peter 4:7-11. This passage begins with the phrase: "The end of all things is at hand" (or "is drawing near.") And then he follows that with several admonitions about what we should we do when the end is drawing near.

I. PRAY

I Peter 4:7 "The end of all things is near; therefore, be of sound judgment and sober spirit for the purpose of prayer."

A thoughtless person, contemplating the end of all things, might think that prayer was not of much use near the end. "Eat, drink, and be merry, for tomorrow we die." What time is there now for answered prayers? Everything is about over. But this is really a godless attitude. Prayer is not somehow of LESS importance as we move towards the end; it becomes even MORE important. Think about it:

We are drawing nearer to an appointment with God, in whose presence we will live forever; we must spend even more time preparing ourselves in prayer for our coming to Him. We need to spend more time in prayer purifying our lives from sin as we draw close to the

We need to be praying for lost people to be touched and saved — if we are near the end, then a lot of people we know are about to have their last opportunities to be saved before "the door of the ark is closed"; we need to be even more fervent in our intercessions for them as the end draws near.

And listen: God DOES hear and answer our prayers for the lost! One day last week I received an e-mail from a member of the church in Oklahoma where I served as interim pastor before I came to Pleasant Ridge. We had been praying for her daughter's husband, who had declared that he was an agnostic, and who had left his wife and little baby to be saved. This woman told me that this man decided that he didn't want to be alone for Christmas, so he decided to come home and at least be with his family. He went to church with them on Christmas Day, and the message spoke to him in a personal way. That afternoon he told his family that he wanted to be saved, and they called the preacher over and that son-in-law asked Jesus to be his Lord & Savior, and he wants to be baptized as public profession of his faith! THAT was a Christmas miracle! We had been praying for him for two years that I know of - and others probably longer than that. And I thought of some of us here today, and people we are praying for — DON'T GIVE UP! God DOES hear and answer those prayers! Especially as we get closer to the end, we need to pray more fervently than ever before for our

We need to pray even more for our church to remain faithful amidst the falling away morally and doctrinally which has been prophesied to happen in the last days.

We need to pray that we would personally not be led into temptation, but delivered from evil. "Watch and pray, that you may not enter into temptation", Jesus admonished His disciples near the end of His earthly ministry. He would say the same to us today: "Watch and pray", the end is drawing near.

As Jesus Himself modeled for us in His last hours here on earth, prayer does not somehow become of diminished importance as we draw near to the end of our stay on earth. Rather it becomes even more crucial. So, is the end of all things at hand, as many believe? Then let us heed this verse: "Therefore, be of sound judgment and sober spirit for the purpose of prayer."

I really believe that prayer is one of the biggest differences between the lost person and the person who really knows the Lord. There are some things that we Christian people do, that a lost person may do as well: lost people may go to certain meetings, fellowship with people, give to help someone or some cause, etc. But prayer is one thing that you will only do if you really believe in God. If God is not real, why waste time with it? Why spend 30 minutes or an hour of your prime time and energy at the beginning of the day, if there is not a God who is really hearing and answering prayers. It is a waste! But if you really believe in God, you know it is NOT a waste; it is the best thing you can do with your time. If the end of all things

How has your prayer life been in 2016? Are you faithful in morning prayer? Are you following that up by consistently praying little "spontaneous prayers" all through the day? If you were to make ONE change in your life for the better in 2017, I don't think you could make a better change than to PRAY. Rededicate yourself this New Year to prayer. Peter tells us: the end of all things is near—so PRAY! PRAY!

But he also reminds us in the next verse of THE great priority for the Christian:

II LOVE

I Peter 4:8 "Above all, heep fervent in your love for one another, because love covers a multitude of sins."

The words "above all" here refers to the priority of love. There is nothing more important: I Timothy 1:5 says "the goal of our instruction is LOVE." The end result God is seeking from our teaching isn't "knowledge", but that we might grow in LOVE!

I Corinthians 13:13 says "now abide faith, hope, love; these three — but the greatest of these is LOVE."

Many Christians often think of wanting to do some "big thing" for the Kingdom of God: ler's build a great organization; let's construct an impressive building; let's do something that will make headlines throughout the region or even the world. But what we have to realize is that the Kingdom of God is not really about these things. The Kingdom of God is about LOVE! Love God greatly! Love people greatly! The "big thing" we are to build is LOVE! And then notice what he says in the second part of the verse; this is significant. He says,

A Diet That Work



We're off! Ready or not, 364 days stretch out in front of us, full of nothing but seconds, minutes, and hours waiting to be invested with all our high hopes and new motivation. Tops on the list for a lot of folks is attacking the age-old battle of the bulge. If you question that, just check the magazine rack and




your local newspaper. They are filled with ads, fads, before-and-after pictures, and high-powered promises. Let's face it, though: a diet that works isn't fad or fun; it's tough! I have found no way on earth to get (and stay) trim and fit without being tough on myself. In the final analysis, it isn't all that complicated: the head must rule the body. As concerned as I may be about our physical fitness as we enter this New Year, I'm even more concerned about our spiritual fitness. I know of no Scripture that teaches we'll be weighed in before entering heaven. There'll be no angelic aerobic classes in glory (which thrills me no end). And so far as I can tell, no local celestial diet will be handed to those who pass the pearly gates (surely there'll at least be Hagen Daz strawberry). But I am forever bumping into verses that mention our appearing before the Lord for some type of spiritual accountability. That's what the "wood, hay, and straw" stuff is all about in the 1 Corinthians 3 passage. With a New Year sprawled out in front of you, what's your spiritual game plan? A good guide is Psalm 119:1-16. You'll notice that the first eight verses af-

firm three absolutes: the reality of God's blessing ("How blessed . . . how blessed . . . "), the authority of God's Word ("thy precepts . . . statutes . . . commandments . . . judgments"), and the necessity of God's presence ("Do not forsake me ... "). With that, the psalmist asks the same question all of us ask on the edge of twelve new months: How can I keep my life pure (v. 9)? What's the secret? The answer is found in the next seven verses. If you're looking for a diet that really works, you've found it! Seek the Lord on a regular basis (v. 10). Pursue Him daily. Keep Him involved in the everyday stuff of life. Include Him in your decision: plans, your fun time, your struggles. The key is consistency. Treasure His truth in your heart (v.



11). Commit verses of Scripture to memory. A heart full of treasure leaves little room for trash. Openly tell others of Him (v. 13). Something wonderful happens when we open our own lips and speak to others about how our God has changed our lives. Make this the year you make your fate known. Rejoice and delight in God's workings (w. 14, 16). Smile more. Let your delight shine. Laughter has numerous therapeutic benefits. Spend more of your free moments meditating on His principles (v. 15 Think about them. Weave them into your driving time, your workouts, while waiting for an appointment, before going to sleep. Give God your full respect (w. 15-16). Don't hold back. Trust completely. Make this the year you dare to live by faith. When uncertain hold His precepts in highest regard. Forget the superficial ads and fads. Follow the Psalm 119 diet. You may not lose twenty pounds of fat, but you'll develop spiritual muscles that will make a difference. When you stand before Him at the end of the race, He won't frown and ask, "How much did you lose?" He will smile and say, "Well done! You have finished well!" A finishing touch: If you don't already keep a daily journal, begin doing so now. Get yourself a notebook—any size that's comfortable for you—and start by writing down that which has spoken to your heart today. Be painfully specific.

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
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Emergency Preparedness

Food In An Emergency

- Store at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food. It is unlikely that we would have a two-week emergency, but some authorities recommend a two-week supply of food.
- The easiest way to develop your food supply is to increase the amount of basic foods you normally keep on your shelves. Familiar foods are better than strange foods you

have not tried before. Your family will eat better if they like the food.

- Select foods that require no refrigeration, preparation or cooking, and little or no water.
- Include a selection of ready to eat canned meats, fruits, and vegetables.
- Put foods that come in packages or plastic bags into screw top jars or air-tight cans to protect them from moisture and pests.
- Open foods boxes carefully, so they can be closed tightly after use.
- If food must be heated, you can use sterno cans with a rack, a propane grill or stove, a charcoal grill or the fireplace. CAUTION: Do not use charcoal grills or other portable cooking devices indoors because of fire danger and harmful and noxious fumes. Don't forget to open cans first and take off the labels.
- Select foods that are compact and light weight.
- Keep foods in a dry, cool dark spot if possible.
- Use foods before they go bad, and replace them with fresh supplies, dated with a
 marker. Place new foods in the back of the storage area and the older foods in the
 front. Six months is a good cut off time for keeping most foods.
- Inspect all foods for signs of spoilage before use.
- Include vitamin, mineral, and protein supplements to assure proper nutrition.
- Food can be rationed safely, unlike water, if activity is reduced. Children and pregnant women need more food. Take in enough calories to enable you to do necessary work.
- Try to include foods high in protein and liquid content. Stay away from foods high in fats and very salty.
- Keep in mind individuals in your family who need special diets and stock these items
- If the electricity goes off, use perishable foods in the refrigerator first, then the foods from the freezer, and try to minimize opening these doors. Then use your non-perishable foods last.
- Be sure to have a non-electric can opener available.
- Several sizes of pots or pans to heat up food over the fireplace, on the grill or camp-stove.
- Need utensils to stir the food with and to empty the cans.
- Use paper plates, plastic eating utensils, and paper or plastic cups and glasses.
- Have plastic storage containers for leftover food that is not perishable.
- Use saran wrap, aluminum foil and plastic baggies to cover food.

MENU SUGGESTIONS:

Breakfast--Canned or powdered milk, canned juice, dry cereal, sugar, crackers, peanut butter, jelly, Pop Tarts, Swirls, coffee and cocoa mix, and dried or canned fruit.

Lunch--Canned or packaged soup, spaghetti, spaghettios, ravioli, chili, pork & beans, beans & wienies, crackers, cheese, dried or canned fruits, canned juice or sodas.

Snacks--Cheese & crackers, tuna or Spam or chicken, on crackers, peanut butter & crackers, nuts, dried fruit, granola bars, sugar- free hard candy, raisins, and trail mix.

Dinner--Canned stew, chili, canned soups, spaghetti, crackers, dried or canned fruits, canned juice or soda, canned or powdered milk.

If you have fresh milk, vegetables, fruits, bread, eggs, frozen meats, frozen foods, then use them first.

Addiction Challenged

"The Grandfather Challenge" Hiking Program (Helping At-Risk Kids, One Hike at A Time)

James & Cheryl Nipper, the parents of Jason Matthew Nipper, are pleased to provide an update on their unique and challenging hiking program taking place at Grandfather Mountain for at-risk youth, with a focus on those individu-



als who suffer from mental disorders and/or drug addiction. Our goal in this article is not only to introduce our program to local churches to explore whether we might be able to serve at-risk kids, but to also introduce readers to Appalachian Mountain Leadership in Boone, which hosts a unique two week wilderness based leadership training course each July for aspiring church youth.

Jason's Story:

Jason was a happy, outgoing, and gifted child with a keen sense of humor and engaging personality. He loved music, reading, and all aspects of nature. His favorite times growing up were those spent with his family at their cabin near Plumtree, NC. Although he was greatly troubled by



mental illness, he found that the days he spent hiking brought him great peace and satisfaction. Jason always wanted to help other people, and found great joy when he could help a friend.

Life changed for Jason when he reached his mid-teens. He started developing symptoms of mental illness and soon found life more challenging. Despite many struggles, he still succeeded in earning an International Baccalaureate (IB) degree in high school, and was awarded a full, four year scholarship to his favorite school, the University of Florida. Jason lived in Gainesville, Florida off and on for three years and tried his best to be a "normal" student pursuing a degree, but was eventually forced to withdraw from the University due to the continuing progression of his mental illness and severe anxiety.

Jason continued to struggle with everyday life, and tried valiantly to cope with his mental illness. Through it all, he found that the days which he spent mountain hiking brought him the greatest peace and satisfaction.

Like so many others with severe mental illness, Jason self-medicated with substances, which ultimately only complicated his mental condition. Jason passed away at age 26 on June 24, 2014. He is greatly missed both by his family and everyone that ever knew him.

Creation of Foundation and Mission Statement:

More than anything else, Jason wanted his life to have "meaning." His parents James & Cheryl Nipper have sought to fulfill that desire and honor their son's memory by forming a non-profit corporation called The Jason Project, Inc., which has qualified as a tax-exempt Charitable Foundation under IRS Regulation 501 (C) (3). They hope that Jason's intense love of nature and hiking, coupled with his desire to help others, will live on through the young persons who participate in this program. Their greatest desire is that at-risk youth participants, including those youth who are suffering from mental illness and/or drug addiction, will, through this program, learn meaningful life-lessons, and find it easier to over-

come some of life's challenging hurdles.

Because of Jason's abiding love of the outdoors and mountain hiking, one of the Foundation's goals is to organize outward-bound type, intercept wilderness excursions and similar programs which are designed to build self-confidence in struggling youth, as well as trust and a positive rapport with adult men-



tors. As part of their "outreach" efforts, they have established a special program called "The Grandfather Challenge," through which at-risk youth, through a series of four hikes, navigate all of the hiking trails at Grandfather Mountain, NC. One of these hikes takes you to the highest point in the Blue Ridge Mountain chain, and affords incredible views along the crest of Grandfather Mountain. These hikes are normally conducted in four consecutive weeks, and the hikes get progressively more difficult as the course proceeds. As these hikes take place, adult hike leaders strive to teach these young people to respect this very pristine and special nature preserve, and to recognize and appreciate God's beauty and creation. Each hike is led by two highly qualified and experienced adult hikers, and each child is mentored, encouraged, and supported by caring adult leaders who try to instill

self-confidence, trust, respect, and a strong commitment to complete a rigorous, challenging physical goal. The organizers of "The Grandfather Challenge" strongly believe these experiences enhance self-confidence in our youth, and will encourage them to rise above their challenges in life. A special Certificate, hiking boots, and other recognition is given to each young person that completes this program.



Jason's parents fervently believe that this type of program or activity can not only provide enjoyment to those who participate, but can also build confidence and trust in others, similar to the ideals pursued in various "outward bound" programs, and will thus allow them to fulfill their goals expressed in their Mission Statement:

To provide healthy and rigorous outdoor excursions and challenges where atrisk youth can be encouraged and inspired to rise above their adversities and excel mentally, spiritually, and in life.

Community Support and Alliances:

Although they eventually expect to receive referrals for at-risk youth candidates to complete this Challenge from multiple sources including children's homes and ju-

venile court pre-trial intervention programs, the program's first priority was to form an alliance with the Avery County School system.
Dr. David Burleson, as superintendent of the Avery County
School system, was the program's
first partner to work with them
in implementing The Grandfather Challenge. The non-profit
organization has now also formed
alliances with the Catawba and



Caldwell County School systems, representing a total of 14 high schools and 9 middle schools. Also, the Grandfather Mountain State Park of North Carolina (through its Superintendent Sue McBean) has issued a Special Use Permit to the project, and the Grandfather Mountain Stewardship Foundation (with the support of Jesse Pope and Harris Prevost) has sanctioned the program and issued a special pass for entrance to the Grandfather Mountain attractions.

Foundation Pays All Expenses of Program:

The Jason Project, Inc. provides hiking boots, backpacks, socks, raincoats, Grandfather Mountain entrance fees, professional guides, and all other costs associated with this program. There are no costs to participants or referral agencies. At the successful completion of each round of hikes, the youth participants are each given a Certificate of Completion and a gift certificate at an awards ceremony in their honor.

Hike Regimen Highlights:

The hiking trails at Grandfather Mountain State Park offer some of the most rigorous and challenging hiking trails in the Southeast, and include areas rated as either moderate or strenuous. Some areas feature ropes and ladders, and provide some of the most phenomenal views existing in the High Country. "The Grandfather Challenge" features



four major hikes, culminating in the following "Granddaddy" hike along the crest of the mountain to MacRae and Calloway Peaks, then down the east side to the Blue Ridge Parkway:

From the parking lot on top of Grandfather, hike the Grandfather Trail up to MacRae Peak via ladders and ropes; climb The Chute and visit Attic Window, Indian House Cave, and Alpine Meadow; hike through Calloway Gap, and on to Calloway Peak, the highest point of the Grandfather Mountain ridge trail; then descend down the East side via the Daniel Boone Trail to the Blue Ridge Parkway. This is the most challenging hike of the program, and will require a full day of hiking and climbing.

Appalachian Mountain Leadership:

The inherent value and effectiveness of our program is directly dependent on the experience, qualifications, and spiritual fiber of our hike leaders. Our hikes

are supervised and conducted by Appalachian Mountain Leadership (AML), in Boone. We are extremely pleased with the professional and Christian manner in which these young men and women conduct themselves and lead youth groups not only through the "Grandfather Challenge" hikes, but also through various extended wilderness excursions.



You can visit AML's website at www.amlnc.
org. As you can see, AML provides a diverse range
of adventure/servant-leadership activities, including single day hiking or rock climbing, hiking,
multi-day camping and wilderness excursions, and a
very special Created For Purpose program, which is
tailor-made for church youth. AML's emphasis is on
servant leadership, and they link wilderness activities

with their mentoring skills and training, creating a unique experience that cannot be matched by any organization in the Southeast. At the AML website, please look at the "Adventures" page, then the "Created for Purpose" tab, to learn about their next wilderness excursion which will take place in July of next year.

From AML's website, here are some things that students have said about their experiences in the Created for Purpose program:

Day 11: "These past few days, I have been truly blown away by how beautiful and awe inspiring everything is. From the smallest plant to the biggest mountain, everything seems so much brighter. Colors are more vibrant. and I suddenly seem

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so small. I have pushed through this journey, troubles, pleasures and all. I have pushed onward in a spiritual journey as well. The Lord is teaching me great things in every breath I breathe. Purpose is something I have always struggled with, and I had hoped my purpose (where the Lord is leading me) would suddenly become clear to me on this trip. I feel like I am just picking up the pieces that will one day lay out to make the bigger picture. I just have to be patient and have FAITH. We ALL have wonderful purpose and I can't wait to continue my journey of life to see what it is. It all leaves me breathless, I have no words great enough to describe how a life with the Lord feels."

"Day 13... (the end of the beginning) It is the last day of our trip and I feel bitter sweet about leaving. These past two weeks have been filled with teaching, learning, leading, loving, laughter, sadness, awe, and so much more! I have learned a lot about traveling the trail and a lot more about traveling through life, especially as a leader..."

You can see from these testimonials that the Created for Purpose program has a very powerful effect on youth, and assists them in their search to find their own "purpose" in life, and helps equip them to become leaders in their own churches and local communities. We have never seen or heard of any two-week wilderness based leadership training program that matches the Created for Purpose program offered by Appalachian Mountain Leadership each summer. As you can see from their website, the program consists of 10 days of backpacking through the Pisgah National Forest in the Blue Ridge Mountains of North Carolina; two days of rock bouldering, and two days of local community/mission service. Equally important, the program requires a serious eleven month commitment from a church mentor to work closely with, guide, and encourage these youth participants to closely assess their personal and spiritual lives and learn how to value and implement the concepts of servant leadership and thus become future leaders in their respective communities and churches.

BCPS receives Golden LEAF grant for technology

Project DETAIL (Digital Education Teaching and Individualized Learning) -- an initiative by Burke County Public Schools -- has received support from the Golden LEAF Foundation in the form of a \$200,000 grant. The purpose of the grant is to provide funding to Burke County Public Schools for implementation of a one-to-

initiative for middle school students and teachers. The initiative will have a strong focus on building teacher leaders, said Dr. Melanie Honeycutt, chief information officer for the district. The funds will assist the district in pur-

chasing devices for

sixth-grade students

one digital learning



and teachers and assist in professional development through a partnership with the Friday Institute for Educational Innovation to strengthen the district's evaluation plan.

Honeycutt said, "Outcomes of the project include individual student growth as reflected in their digital portfolio, improvements in math proficiency scores and increased use of technology as an educational tool."

Burke County Public Schools Superintendent Dr. Larry Putnam said the emphasis is on sixth grade as a continuation of the one-to-one learning opportunities students are exposed to in elementary school. He said, "Federal Title 1 allotments have allowed the district to focus on digital learning in the elementary grades and now, thanks to this opportunity from the Golden LEAF Foundation, when our students enter middle school, they will not take a step backward in instruction and student-centered learning due to the lack of devices available for staff and students."

Over the past few years, the Burke County Board of Education has been committed to improving the technology infrastructure and increasing the number of devices in our schools. Project DETAIL comes on the heels of a rollout of 2,000 Chromebooks taking place now in the middle and high schools.

Putnam said, "Project DETAIL will add another 900 devices to secondary education and will not only put more devices in the hands of students but also allow for professional development for teachers on how to get the most out of the devices for instructional purposes. I thank our school board members for their support in this and other technological initiatives."

Honeycutt said the district started working on the Project DETAIL proposal in August and received official word from Golden LEAF on funding earlier this month. Professional development for teachers will start in February and current fifth graders can look forward to using the devices in August in their sixth-grade classrooms.

Successful implementation of this grant could lead to future grants, and the Project DETAIL grant committee already has plans in place to apply for future Golden LEAF grants to further the mission of the initiative.


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
