
Back to School, Back to Commitment

It is becoming more evident each passing year that the moral fabric that has made the United States of America so blessed and favored by God is rapidly deteriorating. I can think of no better time to talk about our children than now. It is September and our little ones (and some not so




As the very far-left and radically liberal minority continues to be the "squeaky wheel that gets the grease", it seems like we conservative Christians sit complacently by and watch as our country undergoes a frightening shift away from the very principles that made us so great to begin with. Like many of you, I am becoming alarmed and wonder often what I can do about it. I am just one person, right? Well, I believe that first and foremost, each of us has an opportunity to make a difference, and we can start by becoming more involved in our school system.

Our children are the future citizens and leaders of this great nation, and if we want them to have the same opportunities that we have been blessed with, we must start paying attention to what's going on in our communities and especially in our schools. As they go back to school, let's get back to commitment!

Proverbs 22:6 "Train up a child in the way he should go: and when he is old he will not depart from it"

We've heard and read that verse of scripture many times. Each of us has a mandate from God Himself to "train up" our children. This includes monitoring and interacting with those who spend almost every day with them in positive and productive ways. Your child will most likely spend 8 to 10 hours each night in bed, and another 6 or 7 hours in school each day. That only leaves around 6 to 8 hours for family. Many of us work and aren't home when our children get home, and, between other activities our children are involved in (sports, dance, church, etc.), we are really getting just a few hours each day of our children's time. Your child could be spending more one-on-one time with those in the education system than they are with you!

Teachers and other school staff who are responsible for providing education to our children should be aware that you are a concerned and responsible parent, and they should also understand that you are there to support them, as educators, throughout the school year. We need to be concerned enough that we take the time



Meet each of your child's teachers. Get to know the principal and other school staff. Parental involvement is a morale-booster for those educators. Most of them want your child to be successful and appreciate knowing that you are taking an active interest in your child's learning, that you are a TEAM united for the same goal – the success of your child. This will give you a chance to ask important questions about your child. What observations are the teachers making about your son or daughter? Which children are their friends? How can you help?

Take time to be involved with activities at your child's school. All Title I schools in the state are required to hold a Parent Math Night and a Parent Reading Night each year. Find out when these are taking place and be there. Also, most schools still have active PTOs or PTAs. Make sure that you join that organization and attend the meeting (usually they are incorporated into other events happening at the school at the same time). Is your child in the chorus or the band? Does he or she play a sport or are they involved with a club? Make every effort to attend these events. This shows your child that not only are you supporting them, but that you are also supporting their school and teachers!

Most importantly, you should pray for each teacher every day, by name, and have your child participate in these prayers as well so that they recognize the importance.

Another very important thing you can do is find out who is on the local school board. What kind of morals and values do they represent? When it's time for new elections, you have an obligation to know as much as possible about those running for the local school board. Get other parents and citizens around you involved as well. Then, you must vote for those that you know are governed by God in their personal lives. According to greatschools.org, "An effective school board plays an important watchdog role in keeping your local school on track and setting policies that affect your child and your school. The school board sets the vision and goals for the school district and holds the district accountable for results."

Being a parent is not easy today. In many households, both parents work fulltime jobs, leaving very little time to practice the previously mentioned tasks. We
are competing with technology and many other distractions. But, it's not up to the
local church or local school to raise our children. Yes, they each play a very important role, but, ultimately, it is our responsibility as parents. God equips each of
us to fulfill all that He has commanded us to accomplish. Joshua 1:9 says, "Have
not I commanded thee? Be strong and of good courage, be not afraid, neither be
thou dismayed: for the Lord thy God is with thee whithersoever thou goest."

The very future of our way of life is at stake. You CAN make a difference!

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



I Have Visions for You to See

God's desire is for you to manifest something for others to behold: to make a way for His divine purpose to be revealed in the eyes of others. In most of the world, people spend their entire existence on survival, neglecting a relationship with God. In the USA we spend most of our life being entertained. In John 9 we have the story of a man born blind from birth. The



disciples asked if the man was blind because of his own sins, or if he was blind because of the sins of his family. Jesus answered, "Neither hath this man sinned, nor his parents: but that the works of God should be made manifest in him." This is God's desire for all Christians. Jesus took clay and spit, and anointed the blind man's eyes. The clay represents the earth from which we were formed, and the spit is the divine anointing of mankind. The man was told to go wash his eyes in a nearby pool. When he did, through faith, he received his sight. The water represents the Word of God and through faith in God's Word we receive the Holy Spirit.

When Adam was in the Garden of Eden he received daily visits from God. As they walked and talked, God revealed to Adam many things so their relationship grew on a daily basis. When Adam chose to please Eve over God he lost the spiritual connection between God and man—it was broken. So it is every time we sin, and every time we show no regret for our wrongdoings. This is why we do not have spiritual communion with God. He has made available to us through His Word, through meditation and prayers, and through visions and dreams, what He wants to reveal to every individual. Through our connected spirits, the works of God should be manifest in us.

When we accept the knowledge and experience the holy reverence of the awesome nature of God, bowing down before Him with all praise, honor, and glory, we permit ourselves to be a conduit to divine truth. When we marvel at the workings of His universe—the stars, the planets, the glory of all creation—we adamantly admit we know little about the operations of things around us. When we spend time daily with the Word of God, living obediently to His teachings, showing remorse for our sins, and placing our faith only in Him, we make ourselves available to the inner operation of the Holy Spirit. Through these channels, we receive new revelations and scripture becomes clearer and clearer. We permit ourselves to receive revelations from God.

These anointings can come through further understanding of the Bible, they can be received through visions and dreams, or they can come through past recollections. The important thing is to get your mind pure before God. A humbled heart, submitted to God, ready to be corrected and receive instruction on righteous living, will permit the Holy Spirit to reveal God's desires to you. All Christians are capable of receiving dreams and visions. We are to communicate this knowledge to fellow believers so that the entire family of God receives instruction. "I will pour out my spirit upon all flesh; and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, your old men shall dream dreams, your young men shall see visions" (Joel 2:28).

Upright living is the key to getting our mind to pay attention to what God is trying to tell us. He doesn't try to push anything on us, but with a soft and loving voice, He instructs us in righteous living. Tune out for ten days. Turn down your phone, turn off your TV, and make your home quiet so you can hear. Empty your mind of all thoughts. This does not come easy at first so try meditating on some question you would like to ask God. With questions come answers, with answers comes growth, and growth brings us to our true purpose in life—sharing the Gospel of Jesus Christ with others.

Bearing fruit is the responsibility of every Christian. In John 15, Jesus explains to us that He is the Vine, and His Father (our Father) is the Gardener. We are the branches, and if the branches do not bear fruit they are cut off and thrown into the fire. We can sit in a pew all our life and never make it to the Promised Land. We can have faith, but faith without works is nothing more than a bunch of dead branches that will find themselves cast into the fires of hell. The fruit is that fragrantly sumptuous and delicious knowledge of God's grace given to another person in all love and understanding so they too may become acquainted with the redemptive work of Jesus Christ. The greatest experience I have ever had is watching another person come into the understanding of the justice and righteousness of God.

Dreams, visions, and recollections are to be compared with scripture to certify their authenticity. Never let another person reveal to you what a dream or vision means; if your dream has meaning, the Holy Spirit will be the One who reveals it to you. Failing to follow these steps will result in false doctrines and ignorance. Where there is no vision, the people perish: but he that keeps the law, happy is he (Proverbs 29:18). Visions and dreams are your choices. God has already chosen to communicate with you in this manner. God's truth is shown throughout all of His creation. When the truth is properly understood, all scripture, visions, and recollections will be in harmony.

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



Rehoboam: Son of Solomon, grandson of King David. Following the death of his father, he became king over all Israel, at age 41. His first major decision came





Foster Grandparenting — Ministry Opportunity for Seniors

In 2018, 16,796 children were placed in North Carolina's foster care system. Baptist Children's Homes of NC (BCH) responded to these numbers by launching "Family Foster Care." While continuing to provide

residential care, the ministry now trains and licenses individuals to provide foster homes to children. BCH also trains churches to come alongside foster parents, as a church body,

and provide support and Christian community to both them and the children who come into their families.

Providence Baptist Church in Harrisburg and Salem Baptist Church in Dobson have couples in their congregations who have become foster families through BCH's training and licensing process. Currently, seven children have been placed with foster families from Salem's congregation. Six of those children are siblings

— two siblings each living with three of the families. These brothers and sisters are able to worship together and celebrate birthdays together. Co-parenting between the families adds another benefit.

Dr. Sandy Gregory, director of North Carolina Baptist Aging Ministry (NCBAM), envisions senior adults supporting BCH Family Foster Care



as "foster" grandparents. "All children need the special relationship that only a grandparent provides and foster kids desperately need it," says Gregory. He and his wife Renee received foster parenting training through BCH. They have fostered several children and are currently fostering to adopt.

Gregory offers a 90-minute workshop for senior adults who attend BCH Family Foster Care churches. The training includes information about the foster care system, the needs of foster families, responding to emergency situations, how to foster grandparents can serve as mentors and share their Christian legacy with a foster child—possibly changing a life forever.

One of NCBAM's newest outreaches, "One Hope," will also intersect with BCH Family Foster Care. One Hope engages socially isolated and lonely seniors with community activities, such as foster grandparenting.

James 1:17 Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, and cometh down from the Father of lights, with whom is no variableness, neither shadow of turning.

I bent, twitched the washcloth from the cabinet and blotted my face. When I opened my eyes, the sight catapulted me back thirty-seven years. Draped over my

hands lay a present from our wedding. It had survived unbelievable odds, incredible feats of cleaning, and two teenagers, its memories, helping me celebrate our wedding anniversary today. My hands had handled that same washcloth so many years ago, a gift from close friends who wished us well on our matrimonial journey. The power of that gift still gave me pleasure and sweet memories years later. How could a white washcloth last thirty-seven years? Through countless swipes at chubby baby cheeks, narrowly missed destruction by teens racing headlong through life, and precarious clinging to the same family proved miraculous. And, yet, here its somewhat faded glory lay calmly in my palms. But, oh the signifi-

cance of that faded white proved priceless to me.

The lush pile, worn to a thin layer by two generations reminded me of a spiritual analogy in the Bible. There, gifts weave the threads of generosity, reconciliation, affirmation, and, most importantly, spiritual blessings into Bible stories of epic proportions. For example, the Israelites bestowed so much upon the builders of the tabernacle



that they had to tell them to stop giving so generously. (Exodus 36:7) Jacob gifted Esau with 550 animals as a sign of his willingness to restore their broken relationship. (Genesis 32:14-15) And the wise men bestowed upon the baby Jesus gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh, affirming that He was King, God, and Savior. (Matthew 2:11) Many times in the Scriptures, the word picture of a gift switches to a heavenly perspective. It was so horrible to witness that I almost shut my eyes, but I am so glad that I didn't because what I was about to see can only be described as a miracle.

Both children had become entangled in some obstruction in the waters and were struggling to keep their heads positioned to breathe.

Suddenly, the television screen was filled with people. A man grasped a nearby tree and a human chain formed before my eyes. Within seconds, a man reached out and took hold of the first child who instinctively climbed from person to person to land. Mere moments later, all were soaked-but safe and alive!

The testimonies of those who had become this chain of life for the children

all said essentially the same thing. When they heard the father call, they could do no less than risk their own lives for someone in need. One woman even said that she gave no thought to the fact that she couldn't swim, she just saw the urgency of need and responded.

I have witnessed similar miracles here in this community. We have had our share of tragedies in recent years. But with each tragedy, there has also been beauty. Human chains have formed, reaching out to those in crisis, reaching not just with hands but with hearts. Your selfless ministry is an inspiration to me. You hear the cry for help and give nothing short of yourselves in response.

Churches and Politics: 'Doesn't Fit Their Vision'

Summer months for the Christian Action League of North Carolina can be fiscally challenging. It's the period when contributions are the lowest.

As the League's executive director, it's my responsibility to find the needed funds, which precipitates making some phone calls to individuals and churches for help.



Recently, I contacted a church that had once supported the Christian Action League but had reassessed their missions giving and stopped. They were under new leadership now, and their missions' director said the League "doesn't fit their vision."

I knew what that expression meant. "Doesn't fit their vision," was just a nice way of saying, "As a church, we intend to stay away from politics. We don't share your conviction that we should engage every aspect of the culture and shape it for righteousness sake." As I see it, this is a sad response, because churches unwilling to bring the terms of God's Word to bear on the great issues of our time are actually being quite short-sighted in their vision.

The gospel and Christian discipleship are much wider in scope than trying to get people into heaven and filling church pews. The gospel is about redemption for the whole man, and it stretches into every realm of life in which humanity operates.

In earlier generations, Christians in America understood this. Allow me to share a lengthy excerpt from what is now a book long out of print, The Gospel and the American Dream, written by Bruce L. Shelley. Shelley writes:

"In 1835, a generation before the Civil War, the well-known New England minister, Lyman Beecher preached one of his more popular sermons. He called it 'A Plea for the West.' The oration reveals Beecher's deep-seated belief that a vast new empire was opening in the American wilderness. Nothing less than a whole culture was at stake. Christians should seize the opportunity, he said, and shape 'the religious and political destiny of the nation.'

"And how did Beecher propose to do all that? He called for the preaching of the gospel, distribution of Bibles, the planting of churches, the establishment of schools, and the reform of American morals.

"This vision of a Christian America dominated evangelical thinking and generated what historians have called the 'Righteous Empire.'... As evangelicals faced the challenge of winning a nation to Christian obedience, two instruments were available to them: revivals and voluntary societies.

"America's first Great Awakening created an evangelical fixation upon revivals as God's special instrument for reforming the American people. As the nation spread westward, spiritual awakenings occurred in the newly settled regions between the Alleghenies and the Mississippi and proved to be a primary channel for the spread of Christianity and the civilizing of the wilderness.

"Since the then-recently adopted American Constitution and Bill of Rights rejected any thoughts of a 'holy commonwealth' by ruling out any direct influence of the churches upon the government, how were these growing numbers of Christians to fulfill their responsibilities for public life and morals? That is where the voluntary societies came in. William Carey and other English evangelicals had designed the voluntary society to carry the gospel to India and to fight the slave trade in the West Indies. The societies allowed individual Christians, without regard to denominational identities, to mobilize their efforts for moral and religious causes. They simply contributed their money, and in some cases, their lives, to advance their cause at home or overseas...

"American evangelicals seized the idea for their own purposes. It seemed the perfect instrument for America's free society. Thus early in the nineteenth-century scores of societies sprang up to shape some aspect of American life: Bible Societies, Sabbath Societies, Mission Societies, Temperance Societies. 'One thing is becoming daily more evident,' said Beecher in 1830, 'the grand influence' of the church and the triumphs of the last forty years are the result of the 'voluntary association of Christians.'

"That grand influence of the churches included the shaping of American morality and many commonly shared religious beliefs...

"When [Alexis] de-Tocqueville visited the country in the 1830s, he expressed his admiration for the democratic process at work in the numerous small communities throughout the nation.

"He held that American democracy was always in danger of disintegrating into a selfish pack of mutually antagonistic individuals. But he found a bulwark against such a mass society in America's small towns, where most people were self-employed, civic-minded, and influenced, directly or indirectly, by the Christian faith.

"This vision of a democratic America, linking Christian values and republican principles, was probably the prevailing vision throughout the nineteenth century. Few dared to stand and challenge President Woodrow Wilson when he said, 'America was born a Christian nation for the purpose of exemplifying to the nations of the world the principles of righteousness found in the Word of God."

May I suggest that because this vision no longer fits much of the church today, America is on the brink of complete disaster, and Christians are starting to feel like aliens in their own country!

For a church to say that addressing what's happening in politics "doesn't fit their vision" is also a way of admitting to selective blindness.

A Pastor's View

God's Children: NOT Exempt from Suffering

In early 1865, hundreds of thousands of men from the North were being drafted into the Union Army to help finally bring an end to the war. President Abraham Lincoln's own son Robert was now also being sent. Lincoln's wife Mary did NOT want him to go. She said, "I am so frightened he may

never come back to us!" But Lincoln replied, "Many a poor mother, Mary, has made this sacrifice ...". After sending so many others off to war, Lincoln could hardly exempt his own son. Just because he was the President's son, didn't mean he didn't have to go to war. (Sandburg, Abraham Lincoln, The Prairie Years and the War Years, p. 669)

And so it is with us. Just because we are God's children, does not mean we are somehow "exempt" from various sufferings. In fact, it may rather GUARANTEE them — because God will purposefully use these difficulties to grow us spiritually, and teach us important things He needs us to learn.

Hebrews 5:8, speaking of Jesus' time here on earth, says, "although He was a Son, He learned obedience from the things which He suffered." Being God's Son did not "exempt" Jesus from sufferings — and neither does being His child exempt US! Even though we are God's children, we will suffer in His will, because we will "learn obedience" from it.

Among other things, this means just because you are suffering, does NOT mean that you are not God's child — or that you are not in His will. Sometimes when we face difficulties we might be tempted to think, "Perhaps I am not in God's will? Perhaps He is punishing me?" But this is not necessarily so. God's children, right in the center of His perfect will, may suffer. Just like Jesus, "although (you) are a son, (you) are learning obedience from the things which (you) are suffering."

- So suffering doesn't mean you aren't God's child.
- Suffering does not mean you aren't in His will.
- It just means that God has chosen to use what you are going through to teach you something very important. So walk with God through that difficult time in your life, and be sure to learn the important spiritual lesson(s) your Heavenly Father intends to teach you through it!



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

Making Decisions: What Should I do?

"Therefore as you have received Christ Jesus the Lord, so walk in Him, having been firmly rooted and now being built up in Him and established in your faith, just as you were instructed, and overflowing with gratitude. See to it that no one takes you captive through philosophy and



God's people are faced with making decisions each day of your lives. Some decisions seem to be simple. They don't require much thought nor energy. Because we make these choices every day. For example: getting up, putting on our clothes, eating, working, and sleeping are the types of choices that we make each day. It appears that the decisions that give us the most trouble in life, as Christians, are probably moral, ethical, and spiritual decisions that have to do with relationships. Whether you are aware of it or not, you and I are probably going to make most of our decisions based on what we have learned, what we been taught, and what or how we have been conditioned to choose from our past. Some of that is probably good and helps us make good decisions—but much of it often sets us up to make questionable decisions that affect our life, our testimony, our relationships, and our fellowship with God.

Let me mention "Five Principles" that I have gleaned from a dear mentor, Dr. Clifton Black, that will help you make decisions that: honor God; keep you faithful; bless your loved ones, friends, and brothers and sisters in Christ; and make your testimony of your relationship and walk with Christ stronger.

The Ideal Test

The first question to ask is does my choice or decision line up with the will and ways of God? Does the choice that I am about to make follow the godly, spiritual ideals of God's purposes and plans? Does this choice line up with God's Word and allow Him to use you as a credible witness to His love, calling, promises, plans, and purposes? As a believer, God has called you into a relationship that allows the world to see the power and love of God in action.

Integrity Test

Integrity means what is on the inside matches what is on the outside. A person of integrity acts consistently out of the character of Christ. And, perhaps, the greatest description of the character of Christ is found in Paul's listing of the "fruit of the Spirit" in Galatians 5:22-23. Integrity is a strong sense of right or wrong, and courageously choosing right no matter what the circumstances. Integrity is trading in our flesh for the working of the Spirit of Christ in our lives.

Paul wrote in 1Peter 2:16, "Act as free men, and do not use your freedom as a covering for evil, but use it as bondslaves of God." If whatever issue or question

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that demands a decision bothers your conscience, then it is likely that the Holy Spirit is giving you an immediate testimony that you are facing a challenge to whether you are going to be a man/woman of integrity or not; whether you are going to choose to act like a disciple and follower of Christ or not; or whether you are going to be a spiritual leader and encourager of faith or not. If it bothers your conscience, you had better avoid it! Whether it's right or wrong, permissible or not—if it bothers your conscience, you had better forget about it.

A guilty conscience always tries to cover up by making excuses or rationalizing. When Adam sinned in the Garden of Eden, do you know what the first thing that he did? He ran and hid in the bushes. God knew where Adam was. The problem was that Adam didn't know where Adam was. Children of God, you can't hide from God. There is no use in trying to cover up sin. The Bible gives us this warning in Proverbs 28:12-13, "When the righteous triumph, there is great glory, But when the wicked rise, men hide themselves. He who conceals his transgressions will not prosper, But he who confesses and forsakes them will find compassion."

Improvement Test

Paul wrote in 1 Corinthians 6:12, "All things are lawful unto me, but all things are not expedient; all things are lawful for me, but I will not be brought under the power of any." The great apostle and missionary of Christ says everything is allowable in the Christian life because we are free, but not everything is beneficial. Paul then gives a couple of tests in this verse that are aimed at guiding the believer through the decision-making process. Let me translate them into modern terms: Will it make me a better person? Is what I'm going to do constructive or destructive? Is it a help to my life or a hindrance to my life? Is it useful to my life or is it useless?

The longer I live my life I become more and more convinced that many things are not necessarily wrong, they're just not necessary. James Wright said, "Life's too short to give it up reading an inferior book." In other words, life is too short to waste it on nonessentials, on things that really don't make the most of your life. So, the third test in decision-making is, Is it beneficial? Is it helpful to my life? Often the good is an enemy to the best. Don't settle for being average.

Does it have a tendency to control me or do I control it? Does it dominate my life, or do I dominate it? Anything, any habit, any hobby, any activity, anything. Whatever controls your life is your god. God Almighty declared, "You shall have no other gods before Me." If it's addicting for you, it's out! If it tends to control your life, it's out! The bottom line is if it's not the most helpful thing for your life, then you must choose, "No!"

Influence Test

Here in America, we have freedom of speech. We are free to say anything that we want to say. We are also free to do any lawful thing that we want to do. But for the follower of Christ, sometimes is it better (for the cause of Christ) to not say what's on our mind nor do what we freely want to do. Why? Because our Christian influence and testimony of Jesus living in our life is at stake. Whether you like it or not, your testimony is always on trial. You are not on trial, as perhaps it so often seems—but rather the presence of Jesus and the credibility of Christ's call upon your life to discipleship and service is on trial.


Paul was asked by new believers what choice should they make concerning "eating meat that had been sacrificed to idols?" He responded (1 Corinthians 8:10-12), "For if someone sees you, who have knowledge, dining in an idol's temple, will not his conscience, if he is weak, be strengthened to eat things sacrificed to idols? For through your knowledge he who is weak is ruined, the brother for whose sake Christ died. And so, by sinning against the brethren and wounding their conscience when it is weak, you sin against Christ." Sometimes, is it an amazing spiritual opportunity to limit our freedom because we don't want to hurt another person or cause them to stumble over the most important decision that they will ever make in their life—what will they do with Jesus? Therefore, as a believer, there are legitimate and powerful reasons to limit your own freedom—your Christian influence and testimony for Christ.

Investment Test

Your decisions, whether you realize it or not, reveal what is important to you. They divulge, disclose, display and exhibit whether you are serious about being a man or woman of God, a follower, and disciple of Christ, and a witness of God's grace, mercy, and love. The decisions that you and I make daily concerning marriage, family, personal spiritual growth, finances, time, energies, and many more things—reveal whether you and I are going to live in Christ and walk in His Spirit—or we are going to live for self and ramble in the world. Each and every decision is important to the Lord.

And so, "...as you have received Christ Jesus the Lord, so walk in Him, having been firmly rooted and now being built up in Him and established in your faith, just as you were instructed, and overflowing with gratitude."





For the most part, we like the familiar. What I mean by that is we do not care a whole lot for unplanned changes in our lives. We tend to get comfortable with how things are in our lives and we are pretty resistant to anything different coming along. I can honestly say that I am the same way. Even though there are changes that will often work out to be quiet a blessing, sometimes I have trouble



looking ahead at how God will use a change to grow me spiritually. We especially do not like change when it takes control away from us. For example, we may not mind changing careers when we are the ones who decided we wanted to change. However, if we have to change careers because of being laid off or a company closes down, we get all upset because something has happened that we had no control over. Here are some things to remember that will help us during times of change or transition.

First, change is inevitable. Like it or not change happens. Even in different stages of our lives, it is absolutely going to happen. We go from grade school to college, from single life to married life, from a couple to parenthood, from parent-

ing our children to empty nest syndrome, from working life to retirement life, etc. etc. See what I mean about change being inevitable. It is a fact of life that life is full of change! There are some things that we just must accept and these kinds of changes and many more are "par for the course".

Secondly, regard-



less of what may change, we are still in the hands of God. Instead of wringing our hands or losing sleep over things that we cannot control, why don't we simply realize that whatever comes our way, we still are God's children? Those changes in life that we didn't see coming did not take God by surprise. I believe that there is nothing that comes into our lives that God has not already seen and allowed. Even though I may not understand the reasons why, I do trust Him with what He may be doing. Sometimes circumstances happen in our lives that we want God to take away. We need to pray and ask the Lord what He may be doing in our life instead of asking why He allowed something in our life. One of my professors use to say this, "Faith is not if we believe enough God will deliver us from something. Faith is trusting and believing God whether He delivers us or not!" (Example: Shadrach, Meshach, & Abednego Daniel 3)

Last, of all, God may be doing something that we will realize later. Now I know that some things happen that never make any sense regardless of how much time goes by. But I also have experienced changes that did not make sense until later. Sometimes even years have passed and I may not have seen what God was doing behind the scenes, and then suddenly the Holy Spirit speaks and opens up my understanding to say something like this: "Chris, for you to be where you are today, this had to happen 4 years ago! Now, do you trust me?" Those are moments in our lives that we come to realize that we really can trust God with all those changes and unforeseen circumstances that come our way.

Now I need you to do me a favor. Promise me that you will remind me of this article I've written when I am going through one of those unforeseen changes in

my life. When you hear me doubting and wondering why God has allowed something to happen, remind me that I can trust God in times of change!

Anyway, if y'all will tolerate me I want to share some of my hair raising farm stories. We'll call them "Clint's Chronicles on the Funny Farm" – names will be changed to protect the innocent, and chances are I may exaggerate the facts a wee bit. It will go something like this:

'Twas a beautiful day at Harrell Hill Farms, crystal clear sky, a torrid 93 degrees as I headed for the garden to harvest a couple bushels of blue lake bush beans. So I donned my overalls, long-sleeve shirt and high boots for an adventure in the bean patch.



All of you no doubt have a loving memory of Ms. Hattie. Seems like everyone called her that, Ms. Hattie. It's difficult to say when that started but every new church and communi-



ty we would move to people would just start calling her that. She didn't ask them to. No one had told them to. It was just a natural act of endearment. And she embraced it. She loved children. She would always work with children at church when the opportunity would arise. She probably worked with many of you, in either Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, Girls In Action, or Mission Kids. She loved them all. She also adored when children would come into our home. She would always have something for them to snack on, something to play with or do. And the elderly? She adored the elderly. She especially had a love for the elderly women of the church and community. Visiting them at home, in the hospital, or at the nursing home, she found joy in being with them and learning about them and from them. No matter who she met, Ms. Hattie made an effort to befriend them.

Ms. Hattie was a hard worker. Being brought up by a single, widowed mother and the youngest daughter of 5 girls and 4boys, she learned about hard work early on. Married at 17, mother by 18, pastors' wife by 24, and mother again at 28 would mean hard work for her would continue for some time. She occasionally worked a public job: knitting mill, hardware store, florist shop, teachers aid, baby-sitting, etc. And she was educated. Even though she dropped out of high school to get married, she later got her high school diploma. She was a member of the first graduating class of Mayland Community Colleges (then Mayland Technical College) Nurses Aid program. She never worked in that field but the knowledge she gained from it served her and her family well over the years. She took a home course of Flower Arranging and Floristry through Lifetime Career Schools in California and turned around and taught Flower Arranging through Mayland's Continuing Education Program. She was artistic, not just with flowers but teaching herself and her family to do macramé and make baskets.

But her primary focus was family. She pursued it with diligence, love, and joy. It was what she was created for. She wanted the best for us. And she gave 'her' best for us. She was a cook, homemaker, maid, nurse, policewoman. She was storyteller, book-reader, game-player, taxi-driver, referee, mediator, detective, prosecuting attorney, defense lawyer, judge, and jury. She advised, counseled, soothed, comforted, mentored, hugged, kissed, patted, reminded, scolded and so much more.

But, most importantly, Ms. Hattie was a prayer warrior. You might think mom always knows and always has the answers. But Ms. Hattie knew she didn't. That's why she prayed. You see, sometimes mothers don't get the answers they want when they ask the questions. They worry about rashes, bumps, and scrapes. They may not know what all the medical terms are, but they know when you just aren't yourself. They worry about the older kids that come around their children, and what happens at school or the playground. In the case of Ms. Hattie, she worried if her sons would be bumped into in the hallway, causing them to lose balance and fall possibly getting hurt, and needing someone to help them get back up on their feet. She worried about her husband traveling to-and-from the hospital, visiting the sick, comforting families, or finding himself in some foreign land preaching to the lost. As her children got older, she would find herself troubled by her children's rebellious looks, hateful remarks, shifty eyes, strange words, reluctance to go to church and resistance to do the right things that had never before arisen. She knew about the vulnerability that comes as you enter changes in your life. She could see the pain when someone was cruel to either one of us. She saw our spiritual struggles and rejoiced the days we each decided to make Jesus our Savior. Sometimes, she didn't like the relationships we had. At times she would see the far-off look in our eyes, and it troubled her. But our spiritual well-being was the single most important thing in her life. And so she prayed. Sometimes, she felt like she just couldn't get through to us. She couldn't watch us all the time. She didn't know all the influences we might be under. And so, she prayed.

Ms. Hattie's last couple of years were more difficult than usual. Following surgery to remove her thyroid, her health started to deteriorate. Weakness grew, difficulty in eating increased and finally, she was unable to stand on her own and her voice was just a whisper. Still, a strong heart and a will to stay with her family she struggled on. But God wanted Ms. Hattie with Him. And that's where she is now. In the presence of her LORD and Savior. No more struggles, no more pain. She is perfectly healed. PRAISE HIS NAME! While she finished her race well, we encountered an overwhelming and unknown course: Facing life as sons without a mother, daughter-in-law without a mother-in-law and a husband without a wife.

Grief is a personal and intense journey that all of us have experienced or will experience at some point in life. Although death does not 'sting,' 'emotional hornets' still swarm around those of us left behind. Separation anxiety, loss of identity and immeasurable tears are just a few of those 'hornets'. As Christians, we rejoiced at her reunion with the Heavenly Father. As sons, as a daughter-in-law, and as a husband, we mourn our own great loss. We miss her.

Ms. Hattie was a tremendous woman of faith in Jesus Christ. Above all, she trusted Him in all things and you can too. The Bible says in Romans 5:8 "But God demonstrates His own love toward us, in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us."

According to national days alendar.com, there are over 1,500 national days. However, one, in particular, caught my attention this year. March 9th is Get Over It Day. Strategically the midpoint between Valentine's Day & April Fool's Day, Get Over It Day was conceived in 2005 by Jeff Goldblatt, an entrepreneur in Atlanta who was struggling to get over an ex-girlfriend.

The lawyer was partially correct. Eternal life is something to be inherited. However, to receive an inheritance, one must be an heir, and no amount of "doing" will make one an heir. Keeping God's commandments is the way of life, not a way to life. The account of Jesus visiting Martha and Mary makes this clear.


As Jesus passes through the village where Martha and Mary live, Martha welcomes him into her home. During Jesus' visit, Mary sits at his feet and listens to his teaching. Martha, on the other hand, "was distracted by her many tasks." Thankfully, Jesus does not tell Martha simply to "get over it." Instead, he offers an important lesson that while practical service does have its place and certainly is acceptable to the Lord, God's call to follow him does not mean a fluster of service and religious activity undertaken in our own strength. Instead, it is the total surrender of our lives to be willing to deny ourselves, take up our cross daily, and follow Jesus (Luke

In The Message of Luke, David Wilcock writes, "It is only when by God's grace we have become the right sort of people - his people, by the new birth - that we begin to do the right sort of things. The way of Jesus is one of devotion and dedication, both in following him and in heralding him. But the way is not...a matter of assiduous 'religion' and frenzied service, of busy-ness and incessant good works. It means not an achievement, but commitment; not activities, but attitudes; not quantity, but quality" (p. 123).

Prayer: Lord, we are worried and distracted so easily by many things. Give us the grace to choose what is needed most as we follow you.

Creation Answers

Why did Jesus die? The Sacrificial System and Creation

In my article "An Evangelical 'Litmus Test" I talked about the watering down of the term "evangelical". The "litmus test" I suggested as a mark of a true evangelical was an acceptance of a straight reading of Genesis 1-11 since an attack on Genesis 1-11 is basically an attack on the authority of the Bible, and hence God.1 Now many people calling themselves evangelical would dispute such a statement, claiming that the creation-versus-evolution issue is "not relevant" to their faith or that the creation account can be interpreted in different ways. However, I contend that both positions create major theological problems that undermine the Gospel at its foundations.

Here, I will not delve into the science of creation versus evolution as this is well covered elsewhere, but rather expand the theological issues surrounding a question left open in my previous article, namely, "Why did Jesus die?"

No genuine evangelical can suggest that Christology (the study of Christ) is "not relevant" and Millard Erickson states our "understanding of Christ must be central and determinative of the very character of the Christian faith. All else is secondary to the question of what one thinks of Christ."2 However, a lot of theology has been affected by "science" and Christology, in particular, has ignored issues such as Luke tracing Jesus' genealogy back to Adam and Paul stating that death only came into the world with Adam's sin.

Christology is a massive subject in its own right, and space precludes too much detail. Suffice to say there are two main approaches to how we look at Jesus, i.e. from man's perspective (Christology "from below") or from God's perspective (Christology "from above"). The former approach, although technically valid theologically, tends to be the domain of liberal scholars who question the accuracy, and even authority of the Bible. Christology from above is more aligned to the evangelical position with its implied acceptance of the Bible as the inspired Word of God and so I will here focus on that approach and its implications.

If we take a "verse count" in the Gospels to suggest what God sees as important, then the primary emphasis is clearly the cross. There is no direct information. as to Jesus' appearance, His likes, dislikes, etc. Two of the Gospels even omit direct details of His birth. Conversely, well over half the chapters of the Gospels are dedicated to the last week of His life, the events immediately leading up to it, or the events following His crucifixion.

The creation-versus-evolution debate is often fought on scientific grounds, but what about the impact of the creation account on the topic of Christology and, especially, Jesus' death? There are three issues in particular that need careful examination:

- · What is death?
- Why did Jesus have to die?
- What "CV" did He need to fulfill the requirements needed to die for us? All three topics are major and so the following arguments are, by necessity, very brief but hopefully sufficient to show both their importance and relevance to

According to both theistic and humanistic evolutionists, death and suffering occurred for millions, or even billions of years before man either evolved or was created by some process omitted from the Bible. However, what is death and how did it originate?

Both Genesis and the New Testament (Romans 5:12) state that death entered the world through the sin of one man, with the clear implication there was no death before Adam. So why do we ignore what both Testaments say and take for granted the evolutionary assumption that death is "natural"?

Interestingly, evolutionists seem quite happy to accept death as an integral part of the natural selection process, and yet often accuse the so-called "God of the Old Testament" of being cruel for requiring animals', and then Jesus' blood to be spilled on our behalf. The reality is, though, that the author and creator of all life—according to the Bible—has the "right" (using modern terminology) to remove that life. When someone finally does what God has done and creates life from nothing, only then can they moralize over who is entitled to dictate the rules as to what happens to that new life form!

In fact, the first recorded (or implied) death in the Bible was when God killed an animal (a lamb?) to provide skins for Adam and Eve to cover themselves. By this act, God initiated the sacrificial system that required the spilling of blood to cover sin, a system that is then explicitly mentioned in the Cain and Abel narrative in Genesis 4. Furthermore, the first allusion to Christ crushing Satan is in Genesis 3:15. So, by Genesis 4, there is a linking of sin, death and the sacrificial system plus a reference to Christ coming and, linked with the sacrificial system, the need for Him to die.

Now most evangelicals would agree that Jesus Christ had to die and also had to be a) human; b) divine; c) male; d) first-born; and e) perfect without blemish. But why? Where do we establish these criteria? Standard evangelical theological works will readily provide verses to show Jesus' humanity and deity, but the latter three requirements are all part of the sacrificial system.

If the straight reading of Genesis 1-4 is removed, then not only is there no explanation, or justification for the sacrificial system ... but there is also no valid, biblical explanation for Jesus to die.

Although the sacrificial system was present from "the beginning", it is not until Moses that we find any codification and, with that, the "CV" that Jesus had to fulfill to be able to die for us, which provided a unique list of requirements. However, if the straight reading of Genesis 1-4 is removed, then not only is there no explanation, or justification for the sacrificial system (which, like many biblical topics up to and including the Flood is virtually universal), but there is also no

Freedom Through Truth

Men and women today are seeking various kinds of freedom. In many places of the world, people are gathering in crowds and shouting, "Freedom!"

Some time ago I was at a World Fair and saw the tremendous prospects of science presented in the exhibitions. I thought of what Einstein said shortly before he died. "I feel," he declared, "like a man chained. I get a glimpse of reality and then it flees. If only I could be free from the shackles of my intellec-



tual smallness, then I could understand the universe in which I live."

Not only do we want political and intellectual freedom today, but we also want moral freedom. We have a sexual expression on a scale unknown in modern times. We thought it would make us happy, but we are miserable with it. We have found it destroying not only our morals but our souls.

We say we want freedom from prejudice, freedom from ignorance and freedom from poverty. We even say we're searching for religious freedom. There are groups in North America that want to throw out all Christian emphasis, all religious symbols. They wish to be free from such "bondage." They say, "Do away with the recognition of God in national life."

Our forefathers did not feel that way. They desired that we should have freedom of religion, but not freedom from religion. "Blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord" (Psalm 33:12). If we push God aside, may God have mercy upon our nation!

The Scripture teaches that the only truly free people in the world are those who have made Christ their Savior, Master, and Lord. Jesus Christ said, "You shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free" (John 8:32).

What, then, is the truth? People seek for that, too, as they seek for freedom. The scientist seeks the truth about the physical universe. The philosopher tries to discover the truth about human existence. The psychologist looks for the truth about the action and reaction of the human mind. At the end of his life, Gautama Buddha said, "I am still searching for the truth."

But here is a man, a giant among men, who appears on the horizon. He stands before His neighbors and friends and declares, "I am the truth!" (Cf. John 14:6). What an astounding claim. "I am the secret of all truth—all psychological truth, all sociological truth, all scientific truth, all philosophical truth, all religious truth."

THE SECRET OF THE UNIVERSE

The Scripture says that "by him, all things were created" (Colossians 1:16) and "in Him, all things consist" (Colossians 1:17). There is something that holds matter together, and the scientist cannot tell you what it is. I believe that someday we are going to learn that the secret of it all is Christ: that if He took His hand off us for five seconds, we would blow apart. He is the truth! Ultimate truth!

Now, you can reject this truth and think that you are free. You can say, "I have rejected Jesus Christ, I have rejected God, and now I am going to live it up." But you will find yourself in bondage far greater than any you knew before. You end up with inner conflicts, guilt complexes, inferiority feelings, fears and neuroses, and your so-called freedom is a new enshacklement.

When Christ told His disciples, "I am the truth" (Cf. John 14:6), He was either right and was telling the truth, or He was a blasphemous deceiver who knew that He was not the truth and was lying. Or He thought that He was God, and He did not know the difference. That would have made Him a maniac—a person who thought He was God when He really wasn't! Which was it? That is a decision you will have to make. You will have to decide who Jesus Christ is—a liar, an egomaniac, or what He claimed to be: God in the flesh, the ultimate reality, and truth in the universe. If He is God and the truth, and He tells me to follow Him, I would be a fool not to do so.

GOD DEMANDS A COMMITMENT

We are all interested in truth, and Christ is the truth. When you give yourself to Him, He opens the doors of your mind in the most glorious way. You see a new dimension of life that you have been previously blind to. When you open yourself

to Christ—to the truth—your life lights up. Your whole inner life glows, and there comes a peace and joy and security that only He can give

So, God demands a decision, a commitment, a surrender, a conversion. Jesus said, "You must be born again." It wasn't optional. He said, "You must be born again" (John 3:7) before you can get into the Kingdom of Heaven.

When you come to Christ, He gives you a freedom that is real: "Therefore if the Son makes you free, you shall be free indeed" (John 8:36).

What is this freedom? First, He frees you from the penalty of sin. I could preach from morning until night, describing what sin is. But I do not need to. You know that you have sinned against God. We break the laws of God. We fail God. We fall short of His requirements. We are sinners. And this sin has done something—it has alienated us from God. Our sin comes between us and God so that He has to hide His face from us and will not hear us. You may laugh at this. But remember: The Bible says that "fools mock at sin" (Proverbs 14:9). You can say that your offenses are small and don't amount to anything. But God is a pure and righteous and holy God, and in His sight, you have caused offenses; you have caused a cloud to come between you and God. You are separated from God

so that your prayers cannot be answered, and all of our religious actions mean nothing in His sight. You can try to cover up your sins, but God says that you cannot get away with it.

But here comes the glorious part: Christ took the penalty of our sin. That is what the cross is all about. He died on that cross for people like you and me, sinners who had failed Him and had broken His laws. On that cross, God took all of our sins and laid them on Christ, so that He became sin for us. He took the judgment of our sin; He took the hell of our sin. And the moral accountability that you would ordinarily expect to face at the judgment, you will not have to face if you claim Him as your Savior.

I will not be at that judgment. Oh, yes, I have sinned; I have broken God's laws a thousand times, but I will not have to face the judgment. I will not have to give an account. Why? Because of the cross, the Lord Jesus Christ took accountability for me. He took the sin and judgment for me. That is the glorious grace and mercy of God that none of us can fully understand.

Oh, the depth of God's grace! Oh, the height of God's mercy, the breadth of God's love, that He is willing to say to you and to me, "I forgive you. You will never have to face the judgment!" When that gets through to you, you can go to bed and sleep a new kind of sleep.

The full penalty has been paid. The Judge will never say, "I pronounce sentence on you," because Christ has accepted that sentence for you. In Christ you are free. Accept it by faith and go your way rejoicing.

FREED FROM SIN'S POWER

Second, we are freed from the power of sin. Jesus said, "Whoever commits sin is a slave of sin" (John 8:34). Are you a slave of sin? In bondage to jealousy, to pride, to selfishness, to immorality, to gambling, to some drug, to sinful pleasure, so that sin has become your slave driver.

It may be that sin stands over you with a whip and lashes you across the back. You protest, "But I don't want to commit this sin. I don't want to tell this lie. I don't want to get drunk. I don't want to get involved with that person." But you yield to the domination of sin—you are a slave to sin. The very thing you say you will not do again, you do. It becomes worse and worse as you grow older. Your heart gets harder and harder until finally there is death and judgment and hell. But when you know the truth, the truth shall make you free. How wonderful! Sin is no longer in the throne room of my life. Christ sits there, and as I daily, moment by moment, yield my members to Him, He puts my life in order. Satan no longer has the power over my life that he once had. Sin is no longer in command. Oh, to be sure, I slip and fall, but Christ is there to pick me up and to put His arm around me and to love me.

Our Heavenly Father has seen everything that you have done. He is just waiting now for you to come and confess it, to acknowledge it and say, "Lord, here I am. I want a fresh start. I want a new day in my life. I want a new beginning. I want a new birth. I want to be yours from this moment."

The Claims of the Cross

Matthew 27:27-33

... Him they compelled to bear his cross

The cross upon which Jesus died was a pivotal point in the history of the world. It is a symbol of the suffering of Jesus and our redemption. Yet it is much, much more. Once the death sentence was pronounced, we are told that Jesus was led forth to Calvary, bearing his cross. The proceeding hours of suffering and torture were so great that the Roman soldiers thought Jesus would collapse under the weight of the wooded load. We read that, ... they came out, they found a man of Cyrene, Simon by name: him they compelled to bear his cross." (Matt 27:32) Attention should be given to three main areas about the claims of the cross.

The first is the compulsion of the cross. We see in verse thirty-two, that Simon of Cyrene was compelled to carry Jesus' cross by the Roman guard, to a place called The Skull. The word compelled means to impress into service or asking someone to go the extra mile. We know very little about Simon with the exception of information that he is from Cyrene, a Libyan city in North Africa that is west of Egypt. It should be noted that on this day, he had a change of direction in his life. We too can learn from Simon regarding this change, because Jesus challenges us in Luke 9:23 when he says to his disciples, "... If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross daily, and follow me." We must look seriously at our lives to see whether we need to have a change of direction.

A change of direction also requires a change of devotion. Luke 14:27 tells us that Jesus requires us to bear our cross if we want to become his disciples. A disciple is one who follows the teaching. Not a pupil, but adherent, therefore one who is an imitator of the teacher. This change of devotion has great implications for one's personal life. Luke 9:26 says, "If any man come to me and hate not his father, and mother, and wife, and children, and brethren, and sisters, yea, and his own life also, he cannot be my disciple."

The second claim of the cross is the costliness. This cost produces shame, suffering, and sacrifice. The shame of the cross is beautifully written by the writer of Hebrews when he said, "... Despising the shame ... (12:2). Jesus who was despised, beaten, ridiculed, and crucified, went to the cross as a sacrifice for all who would believe. A shameful way to die, much less a torturous physical death.

The suffering he endured by going to the cross has now become our example of the claims of the cross on our lives. 1 Peter 2:21 tells us, "For even here unto were ye called: because Christ also suffered for us, leaving us an example, that ye should follow his steps." We must understand there is a required cost on our lives to follow Jesus.

The costliness of the cross is also a sacrifice. This sacrifice is of one's own life. Galatians 2:20 explains to us that we must live an extinguished life, meaning death to self and sin. This great cost to Jesus was to us a great inheritance. Now

we can live in total dependence on him, and no longer depend on ourselves to live as Christ would have us live. We can reflect back on Simon of Cyrene, who was compelled to pick up Jesus' cross. He is our example of a selfless life.

The third claim of the cross is the compensations it has on our home, church, and The World as a whole. We read



in Mark 15:21 that Simon was the father of Alexander and Rufus. It should be noted that Rufus is mentioned again in the book of Romans 16:13 as being chosen by The Lord, along with his mother. This affectionate phrase is given only to a Christian in Paul's writings. The cross has an impact for generations of the home, and families.

The cross also has a blessing in the church. The word church is a reference to the called-out ones or assembly. We might today refer to the church as a congregation of Jesus' disciples, regardless of the term we use. The vicarious death of Jesus, set into action divine blessing for the church then and today. Acts 13:1 tells that the church in Antioch had prophets and teachers, some well-known such as Barnabas and Simon of Cyrene. Also, Mangen a leader in the church who was the foster brother of Herod Antipus. The cross and its' blessing has attracted people from all walks of life.

The blessing of the cross penetrated the world. The Apostle Paul mentions in Colossians 1:23 that "... and was preached to every creature which is under heaven." He also addresses the Roman Church and says, "First I thank my God through Jesus Christ for you all, that your faith is spoken of throughout the whole world." (Romans 1:8) The brothers and sisters in Thessalonica were commended. because of their evangelistic fervor had echoed not only throughout Macedonia and Achaia but had spread abroad. (1 Thessalonians 1:8) The blessing of the cross in the world, have the church marching orders.

There is only one conclusion that one could make about the claims of the cross. These claims require a decision from us about whether we are willing to be compelled and to count the cost of being an imitator of Christ. The cost is great, but compensation has many blessings for your home, church, and the world. Yet, our Lord made the ultimate sacrifice on the cross to die for us, to save us from the destruction of Hell. Will you become a disciple of Jesus? The Bible says in Luke 9:27, "And whosoever doth not bear his cross, and come after me, cannot be my disciple." Are you his disciple?

The Inspiring Word

The Parable of Patchwork and New Wineskins

Matthew, Mark, and Luke all give us an account of this parable. A parable used to illustrate fasting for the coming Kingdom of God. For our study we're going

to use Luke 5:33-39, specifically looking at verses 36-39 to gain insight into the Lord's teaching.

The practice of fasting was widely used in Israel and its history reveals the practice while an individual was in mourning. The Pharisee's had adopted it and perverted it to be an act of piety used by the religious elite as a tool to impress one another in front of the common man.

John the Baptist was using the fast to illustrate the nation's mourning for their sin. The fast of John and his disciples was a confession of their need for forgiveness of sin and spiritual cleansing.

The Pharisees were very observant of Jesus and how He taught His disciples in contrast to their practice and the practices of John the Baptist. The Pharisees were appalled when neither Jesus nor His disciples practiced fasting. It didn't take long for the Pharisee's to confront the Lord about His neglect of their practice.

To answer their confrontation Jesus used the illustration of marriage. After the bride was presented to the bridegroom there was a massive feast. This was a time of joy and rejoicing. Christ depicted Himself as the bridegroom and that generation as those invited to the wedding. Those who accepted would attend the festivities with joy celebrating with the bridegroom. Christ was inviting them to share in His joy, thus there was no mourning and no reason for a fast. The purpose of this part of our study was to present the Kingdom of God was at hand. Both, John and Jesus were making this presentation, but for what purpose?

Jesus begins His parable to reveal the answer to our question. First, the Lord begins with the story of patchwork. There was an old worn-out garment one that was useless in its present condition. Certainly, it could be patched and made to last a little while longer. To do so would require sewing in a new piece of cloth. During the Lords day, the new woven cloth was not dressed, in other words, they would shrink with the first wash. To patch the old garment would mean the work

would only last until the first washing, at that time the shrinkage would tear the old garment and destroy the old garment.

To further illustrate the presentation of the Kingdom of God Jesus spoke of the wine and new wineskins. I sure know that new wineskins were very elastic. They would expand for the fermentation process as grape juice became wine. However, once a wineskin became old it was no longer



elastic. They could be used as water bottles or other containers but not successfully as wineskins. To attempt this would cause the old wineskin to burst as the new wine fermented causing it to be ruined.

The two-fold illustration given by Jesus showed the Pharisees their old system of perverted religion was worthless, useless and outdated. It was impossible to patch it up or introduce the Kingdom of God through their old rigid packaging. The Kingdom of God had to be introduced through unspoiled doctrine. We find two kinds of people surrounded the Lord that day. Those who welcomed unspoiled doctrine like new cloth or wineskins. And, those who like the Pharisees were content with the old cloth, wineskins and religious rituals that were misused and destined to fail the men and women putting them to use.

Folks this parable speaks to the church also. As born-again Christians, we are born again with life. Paul tells us old things are passed away and all things become new. Don't try to repackage a new life inside of an old you. Put the old you away and follow Hebrew's 12:1 KJV Wherefore seeing we also are compassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight and the sin which doth so easily beset us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us.



3 keys to being on Mission Together as Families

I was at a church the other day and while looking at their promotional materials, I saw a tagline that read, "where faith and life collide." To be clear, I think this is an awesome tagline and this church is doing good work. Yet, I couldn't help but think this tagline would be more



Faith and life collide in the home long before any family shows up at their place of worship. The most influential people in a child's life are their parents, so what happens in the home Monday through Saturday has far greater potential at solidifying a Christ-centered faith in the heart of a child than what takes place for a few hours on Sundays. As such, it is essential for parents to live out their faith with their children, but what does that look like? How can families be on a mission to fulfill the Great Commission together?

Regardless of your season of life, there is no greater time to start living on mission as a family than right now.

Be present

Parents, if we are going to be on mission together as a family, we must make it a priority to be physically, and emotionally, present. We need to get off our phones. We need to engage our children (and neighbors) in deep conversations. We need to talk to them about the gospel, why they believe (or don't believe) God exists, what friends they have who are unbelievers, etc. In order to have these types of conversations, we have to be present in their lives.

Be intentional

Intentionally seek opportunities to live out the Great Commission. Take family walks around your neighborhood so you can meet your neighbors, and intentionally engage in conversation with those you don't know. Play in the front yard so you can interact with those people who walk by your house. Take your family where you know people are going to be (e.g. pool, public park, etc.). Allow your children to provide ideas on how — as a family — you can share the gospel in word and deed.

Be relational

Do you know the names of your neighbors? Do you know the names of your child's friends? What about their parents...do you know their names? Are you intentionally engaging them with the purpose of building a relationship? Are you praying for them? Being relational means making it personal. Host a cookout and invite your neighbors, your kids' friends, and their parents, and seek to build personal relationships that lead to gospel-sharing opportunities.

I know that we are all in different seasons of life. Some have toddlers, some have teens, and others have every age in between. While it is easier to cultivate a missional lifestyle as a family when our kids are younger, it is still possible to do when they are older. Remember, you are the most powerful influence in your child's life. Regardless of your season of life, there is no greater time to start living on mission as a family than right now. So, be present, be intentional and be relational — then watch how God moves in the hearts and lives of your children and those around you.




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Depression: Hidden in Plain Sight

I was a law enforcement officer on patrol on South Main. Street when I got the call. The telecommunicator advised me to 10-21 (call) my residence. I heard my wife say between sobs, "I am so afraid of being alone and of what I might do."



I called my sergeant, was released from duty and raced home. There I found my wife, Kathy, sitting on the floor crying. I sat down with her and attempted to console her. I will never forget what she said next. "I have never been so depressed in my entire life."

Even she didn't understand what had happened to her. It just happened. For the next two weeks, I took a leave-of-absence just to be with her.

According to The National Alliance on Mental Illness, an estimated 16 million American adults — almost 7 percent of the population — have had at least one major depressive episode in the past year. People of all ages, racial, ethnic and socioeconomic backgrounds experience depression, though some groups are affected more than others.

Depression was very prevalent in Kathy's family, and she had seen her dad struggle with it all his life. When Kathy and I were first faced with it, we sought help from our pastor. He said it was an issue of faith. Next, we contacted her physician, who prescribed medication.

On church prayer request lists, we read about people who have cancer or heart conditions. There are others who have suffered traumatic events or consequences of sin, but depression is never mentioned. Is it because of shame and embarrassment, or have we failed to properly address depression in the Christian context? In the Bible, we see numerous examples. David, Elijah, Jonah, Job, Moses, and Jeremiah suffered from depression. These are the ones we know about. Even Jesus experienced anxiety. "My soul is very sorrowful, even to death," are the words He spoke in the garden of Gethsemane. Isaiah the prophet refers to the Lord as "a man of sorrows and acquainted with grief" (Isaiah 53:3), which show us Christ's humanity.

Have we failed to properly address depression in the Christian context? So, what can we do to help?

Group life is a beautiful way to encourage people who are depressed. Because of transparent relationships, groups can encourage those who suffer from depression while providing a safe, gospel-centered place for them.

Here are some specific ways your group can help those around you who may be struggling with depression:

- · Begin with unconditional love. (1 Corinthians 13)
- Learn how "The Fall," and the consequences of brokenness, affect the total person mind, body, spirit, and environment. (Genesis 3)
- Even after we are saved, we may have biological or medical issues in life.
 Though God is bringing healing to us, our complete healing does not take place until we have glorified bodies. (Philippians 1:19-26)
- Learn about depression.
- Be real but understand that depression masks the real person.
- Rather than trying to solve their problems, simply walk beside them.
- Encourage them to do things with you like sharing meals, exercising or attending a relaxing community event.
- Do small tasks for them. What is routine for you may be overwhelming to them.
- Stay in contact on a regular basis.
- Understand depression is one of the drivers of suicide.


It's been 35 years since the day I was called home from patrol. Kathy now leads a group of senior adults at our church who are transparent and real. They encourage and walk beside each other, wherever life may take them, and spur each other on for the glory of God.

Though Kathy continues to struggle with depression, she is able to deal with it in healthy ways, such as birdwatching, photography and frequent family gatherings. Kathy gave permission to share her story in order to help others who also suffer from depression.

People who are depressed can benefit from strong family relationships, medical assistance, hobbies and strong community involvement like small groups. Groups are the place where people connect to churches, so they offer unique opportunities to help people where they really struggle in life.

Sometimes people are hesitant to get involved in things they do not understand, but all of us suffer from various kinds of brokenness. Don't be afraid to get involved with people who are depressed. Remember the words of Jesus, "I have said these things to you, that in me you may have peace. In the world, you will have tribulation. But take heart; I have overcome the world" (John 16:33).

Just As I Am

This year, the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association's summer series is taking a look at five popular hymns sung at Billy Graham Crusades—and how those songs fit into our lives today. Known as the signature song of the Crusades, "Just As I Am" is the final hymn in our series.

Just as I am, without one plea But that Thy blood was shed for me And that Thou bid'st me come to Thee

O Lamb of God, I come! I come

How many times have you sat in church feeling the urge to surrender your life to Christ?

The pastor has shared a pivotal message and the Holy Spirit is tugging on your heart, compelling you to walk upfront in response. But you hesitate.

The aisle seems miles long and you chide yourself for not being good enough to come before the throne of God. Doubt and fear creep into your mind, making you feel unworthy. Even if you repent now, you know you'll fail later.

How does God respond to us?

- God welcomes us with open arms.
- He pardons our sin.
- Jesus cleanses us from filth.
- He relieves us from guilt.

You've been told you don't have to be "better" before placing your hope in the Almighty; you simply have to come. Torn between the acceptance of God and man, your life depends on one decision: trust. Do you really believe God is who He says He is?

In 1835, Charlotte Elliott faced that timeless question.

After suffering from a serious illness that caused her to be disabled, Elliott felt purposeless and depressed while watching others constantly serve the kingdom of God. To combat those feelings, the British woman began to write out the reasons she trusted the Lord.

That list was the start of "Just As I Am," which would later become one of the most popular hymns of all time and the classic ending for altar calls at Billy Graham Crusades.

Maybe you, too, can be assured of God's promises by opening your heart to the lyrics of "Just As I Am."

O Lamb of God, I Come

Throughout the Bible, we see people who had an open invitation to follow God. Some of their journeys look different than ours: Moses kicked off his sandals as he encountered God through a burning bush, and Isaiah cried out from his uncleanliness during a vision of God's throne. In both cases, we see the humility of sinful man before a holy God.

"Though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they are red like crimson, they shall become like wool."

—Isaiah 1:18

As Elliott penned "Just As I Am," she recognized her flaws: illness, conflicts, doubts, and fears. Even so, God loved and accepted her just as she was.

According to How Sweet the Sound, a book by Billy Graham's longtime Crusade soloist George Beverly Shea, Mr. Graham once explained that "we have 'no plea'—no claim on God's love or forgiveness—except that Jesus shed His innocent blood to reconcile us to His Father." There's nothing we can do to earn salvation or freedom from sin; we simply must receive it through the grace and mercy of Jesus Christ's death and resurrection.

Ironically, we live in a world that screams for acceptance through careers, social media, and peers, but we often have difficulty receiving acceptance from a Savior.

Like trying to stubbornly wipe a dirty stain off a favorite shirt, we attempt to fix our own problems, wanting to appear better than we actually are. We forget that God created us in His own image and doesn't desire our good intentions, but the very hearts that He designed.

Indeed, as the song "Just As I Am" says, He let us be "poor, wretched, blind," that He may become all we need, giving us "sight, riches, healing of the mind." Behind the Music

Ninety-nine years after Elliott wrote "Just As I Am," a teenage farm boy heard the hymn while attending a revival. He then stepped forward in surrender to God while another hymn, "Almost Persuaded, Now to Believe," was sung.

That man was Billy Graham, who would eventually select "Just As I Am" to play during his Gospel invitations. Chosen for its lyrics of response, "O Lamb of God, I come," and strong Biblical basis, Graham believed the Crusade hymn reflected the choice to follow God. His autobiography would later be named Just As I Am.

Similarly, an 18-year-old George Beverly Shea came forward to accept Christ after repeatedly singing "Just As I Am" during a special week of evangelistic meetings. "I could hardly wait to stand with the congregation and sing 'Just As I Am," he said. "I could sing and comfort my heart, which was so convicted, rather than make that public confession. I was satisfied just to sing and not go forward." However, that Friday evening, Shea did move forward, placing his hope in Christ alone.

More Than an Emotion

In the 1960s, as thousands were responding to the Gospel at Billy Graham Crusades, the media reported it was due to "Just As I Am" playing on the crowds' emotions during the altar call. While certainly the forthcoming lyrics and gentle melody are comforting to one's mind, Billy Graham wanted to prove it was the Holy Spirit doing the work.

After praying through the situation and consulting with his music leader, Cliff Barrows, they decided to skip the hymn during his 1966 Crusade in London. For



30 nights, not a single note of the signature Crusade hymn was sung or played, but people still silently came forward.

"When the reporters began to write about the invitation at Earl's Court, they said that all they heard was a shuffling of feet on the floor," Barrows recalled. "Bring back Just as I Am! The silence is killing us! they wrote."

The key to a Gospel invitation is not within "Just As I Am" or any other hymn but in the promises of God and power of the Holy Spirit. God's love doesn't change to the beat of a song but is an unconditional, steady rhythm flowing through our hearts.

All we have to do is come to Him, just as we are.

Front of the Book

One of the joys of my life is having been exposed to a number of challenging disciplines in math, science, language arts, other humanities, ministry,



the building trades, mechanics, woodwork, leatherwork, and lutherie. I've devoted myself to fly fishing, music, sustainable agriculture, and the culinary arts. In a few of these fields I claim some competence, but I know enough about the others to realize that all difficult endeavors have something in common. In order to achieve mastery, one must first grasp the fundamentals.

Geometry, for instance, begins with a trio of concepts presented as the "undefined terms:" point, line, and plane. On the first day of physics class, Mr. Washburn taught us that, "Hot is a physical sensation." I learned the Greek alphabet before I could spell words in that language. Clear and convincing essays are built on a mastery of punctuation, grammar, syntax, diction, and logic. Without exception, the foundational concepts of any field are presented near the beginning of the book. No one begins studying biology or chemistry or trigonometry two-thirds of the way through the introductory text.

Why is it that Christians believe they can read only the last third of the Word of God and come to a clear understanding of what our Creator desires of us? Many regular church attenders do not even read the so-called New Testament. Instead of studying the Word for themselves, they depend on teachers and media personalities. Be assured that the discipline listed under the course heading: "Faith in God" has a final exam, and cheating will not be an option.

God expects us to love and serve him on His terms, but most of us follow the doctrines of men. Widespread misunderstanding of snippets plucked from Paul's epistles and the book of Hebrews lead many Christians to believe that when our Messiah died, God changed His mind about the clear instructions for living which He gave in the first five books of the Bible—His Torah. How can that be? Scripture makes it clear that God never changes. He says in Psalm 89:34: "I will not violate my covenant or alter the word that went forth from my lips." Anyone of sincere faith has only two options: either God is wrong, and our common understanding of Paul is correct, or God is right and our perception of Paul's teaching is incorrect.

One of the most ignored passages in the New Testament is 2 Peter 3:15-17.



Peter cautions that some of Paul's teachings are difficult to understand. He goes on to warn against twisting Paul's words to make it appear that he is teaching "lawlessness." Peter makes it clear that only unstable people take that approach. He teaches that such a misunderstanding of Paul results in destruction. He does not teach that Paul is wrong, but he does say that Paul can be difficult to understand. Consider some examples:

Based on Galatians 5:1, many believe that Paul refers to the Torah as bondage. This cannot be true because Psalm 119:44-45 says that Torah is liberty.

Galatians 3:13 causes many to believe that the Torah is a curse. Deuteronomy 30:16 makes it clear that if we obey Torah, then God will bless us.

The common understanding of Hebrews 8:6 is that the Torah has been replaced by something better. Psalm 17:7 says that Torah is perfect. By definition, perfection cannot be improved.

Many believe that Hebrews 8:13 teaches that the Torah is obsolete and in the process of vanishing. Deuteronomy 29:29 makes it clear that Torah is forever.

First Timothy 4:1-5 does not teach against the dietary instructions found in Leviticus. For that to be the case, Leviticus 11 would have to be labeled a "doctrine of demons" and a "lie-in hypocrisy." I would be terrified to refer to any passage of scripture in such terms. According to the front of the Book—Psalm 119:142—God's Torah is truth.

It is impossible for Paul to teach against the Torah. To do so would not only put him at odds with Jesus, it would also make Paul a false prophet according to Deuteronomy 13. Paul was not unstable or schizophrenic. Romans 6:14 says: "For sin will have no dominion over you since you are not under law but under grace;" however, the next verse says that we must not use grace as an excuse to sin. Sin is defined by scripture as "lawlessness" or not keeping Torah.

Romans 10:4 says: "Christ is the end of the law for righteousness to everyone who believes," but Romans 3:31 says "Do we then overthrow the law by this faith? By no means! On the contrary, we uphold the law."

In Romans 7:12, Paul teaches that the Torah is holy, righteous and good. Why would God take away something so wonderful? Is Paul talking out of both sides of his mouth, or is the difficulty in understanding him our fault because we are not familiar with the first two-thirds of the Bible?

In our fellowship, many Bible teachings begin with reading Luke 24:44. It says,
"These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you, that everything
written about me in the Law of Moses and the Prophets and the Psalms must be
fulfilled." Jesus makes it clear that the Torah, the Prophets, and the Psalms all
describe and point to Him. How can we understand Him, His mission, or our
role in His Kingdom unless we are willing to master the entirety of the only valid
textbook for a life well lived?

Using the Bible to Share the Gospel

We have many tools at our disposal to help us share our faith with others: tracts, story illustrations, and of course, our testimony. These are all great tools, but it is Scripture, not our words, that convicts someone of sin.

Hebrews 4:12 says, "For the word of God is alive and active. Sharper than any double-edged sword, it penetrates even to divid-

ing soul and spirit, joints and marrow; it judges the thoughts and attitudes of the heart."

We cannot share the Gospel without pointing to the Gospel. While there are many

We cannot share the Gospel without pointing to the Gospel. While there are many scriptures that help us explain the Good News to others, here are a few that I have found work well:

Romans 6:23 - "The gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord."

Like any gift, eternal life is not earned or deserved. The Bible tells us that we are saved through faith, not our works (Ephesians 2:8-9). Every other religion teaches that people must earn their way to Heaven. Christianity alone proclaims that God's favor and entrance into Heaven are absolutely free.

Romans 3:23 - "All have sinned and fall short of the glory of God."

The Bible states that man is a sinner. Sin is anything that falls short of God's perfect standard: an action, a word, a thought, an attitude. Because we are sinners, we cannot save conselves.

Exodus 34:7 - God "does not leave the guilty unpunished."

God is merciful and does not want to punish us. The Bible tells us that "God is love" (1 John 4:8), but it also teaches us that He is just and must punish our sin. This presents a problem. The problem is not God's, it is ours.

John 1:1, 14 - "In the beginning was the Word and the Word was with God and the Word was God... And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us."

Jesus Christ is both God and Man. While Jesus had many great accomplishments, His most important was that He died on the cross to pay the penalty for our sin...and rose from the dead to prove He had purchased a place in Heaven for us.

Acts 16:31 - "Believe in the Lord Jesus and you will be saved."

Faith isn't simply knowing about Jesus. It also isn't trusting in Jesus for temporary things, like health, safety, and finances. Saving faith is trusting in Jesus Christ alone for eternal life.

Remember, each verse, alone, maybe a lot for someone to process. Be patient. While we should know the reference when we quote Scripture, all we need to say is that "the Bible says," or "We read in the Bible," and then quote the verse. The Holy Spirit will speak to the person hearing the Scriptures.

Kidney Needed

Hello, my name is Ryan Carpenter. I am 23 years old and have been living with kidney disease my entire life. At birth, I had malformed, partially functioning kidneys and lived a life of normality until I was 1 year old. At that time, I develop acute renal failure. After a vigorous 6-day treatment with steroids, it was as if a miracle occurred. My

kidneys began to work on their own. I was followed by the nephrology team at Pitt Memorial Hospital until I was 8 years old. I then began seeing a nephrologist in Goldsboro, N.C. After several years, I was referred to UNC-Chapel Hill's pediatric nephrology team. At that time, a kidney transplant was inevitable. The next step was to find a donor.

My Mother was a blood match, but she has diabetes and was not considered. My Dad is a universal donor, he was tested and become my donor. Shortly after taking transplant education classes, my transplant date had finally arrived. I was admitted to the hospital the night before to get me prepared for surgery the next morning. The next morning, the transport team arrived to take me to the pre-op areas, at this point, my anxiety really began to sink in. After my family wished me well, it was just the anesthesiologist, my Mom and me. The time came for Mom to leave, and me to travel to the operating room. The next thing I remember was waking up in ICU (Intensive Care Unit).

The next seven years were the best of my life. Other than not playing contact sports, I got to have a routine high school experience. After graduation, I was ready to follow my dream of being a chef. Nothing could have prepared me for the multiple bouts of organ rejection, serum sickness, and all the biopsies that came with it. I started peritoneal dialysis in 2016 and continued through 2018 until the nephrologist changed my life again. I developed two abscesses in my abdomen and in turn, started hemodialysis. I have been on this regimen 3 times a week for eight months.

I pray for a kidney that will match and take me to a life that I have longed for since I was a child. Thank you for reading this article, and I hope to inspire you to pass my story along for a much-needed kidney and blessing.





Two Mass Shootings In Two Days: God's Question For His People Today

Horror. Anger. Grief. Anguish. Heartbreak. Mourning. Shock.

These are some of my emotions this morning. But surprise is not among them. And that is one of the tragedies of these tragedies.

A man opened fire at an El Paso shopping area Saturday

morning, killing at least twenty people and wounding twenty-six others. He was apprehended at the scene.

Early the next morning, another shooter opened fire, this time in an entertainment district in Dayton, Ohio. At least nine people were murdered, including the gunman's sister, and twenty-six others were wounded. The shooter was killed by police.

There have now been 251 mass shootings in America this year. And 2019 is a little more than seven months old.

A murderer living twenty minutes from my home

Watching the national reaction to these tragedies, it seems to me that despair has captured our collective soul.

We are afraid that no place in America is safe today. We can't put metal detectors at every store, mall, movie theater, and office building. And even if we did, murderers would just attack us in the parking lot.

How do you know that wherever you're going today won't be next? The fact is, you don't. Dallas is not safer than Dayton. A garlic festival in California is not safer than a Walmart in El Paso.

A young man living in Allen, Texas (twenty minutes north of my home) drove ten hours to massacre people in El Paso and is now one of the most infamous mass murderers in American history. Perhaps someone living in your community will be next.

On a morning like this, it's easy to wonder how the Christian message can possibly be relevant to the crisis of mass shootings. How can the gospel protect us from the next massacre? How can it make a difference in this epidemic?

What mass shooters have in common

Tomorrow, I plan to answer our question in the context of the racist worldview that reportedly motivated the El Paso shooter. For today, I'd like to respond more personally.

In the wake of the El Paso massacre, the Los Angeles Times published a vitally important op-ed by Jillian Peterson and James Densley. These university professors run The Violence Project, a nonpartisan think tank dedicated to reducing violence in society and improving policy and practice through research and analysis.

Weeking on a project finded by the research arm of the US Department of Pastice.

Working on a project funded by the research arm of the US Department of Justice, they have studied mass shootings since 1966, along with media, social media, manifestos, suicide notes, trial transcripts, and medical records. They have discovered four commonalities among the perpetrators of nearly all the mass shootings they have studied:

One: The vast majority experienced early childhood trauma and exposure to violence at a young age.

Two: Nearly every mass shooter reached an identifiable crisis point in the weeks or months leading up to the shooting.

Three: Most of the shooters studied the actions of other shooters and sought validation for their motives.

Four. They all had the means to carry out their plans by obtaining weapons legally, illegally, or from family members.

As a result, Peterson and Densley recommend tighter control of media sites that validate violence, improved security and weapons control, and proactive responses to those in personal crisis.

The darker the night, the more crucial our light

While society should obviously take all effective measures to protect itself, here's my biblical point: Jesus can change any life he touches. He can heal any trauma. He can redeem any crisis. The God who turned a murdering Pharisee into a missionary of grace can transform anyone.

Do you believe that any person stands beyond the transforming power of our Savior's love? What about the person planning the next massacre?

The more secularized our culture becomes, the more evangelistic our churches must become. The more people during a crisis ridicule our prayers, the more they need our prayers. The more traumatized and victimized our society, the more vital our compassion. (For more, see Ryan Denison's "The Gilroy Garlic Festival: Moving forward by not moving on.")

The greater the threat of violence, the more urgent our message.

That's why we must do all we can to reach the next shooters before they strike. We must use our influence to permeate our broken culture with biblical truth and grace. We must share God's word and love with everyone we can in every way we can.

God's question for his people today

Jesus is weeping beside twenty-nine graves today (John 11:35). He is calling us to join him with heartbroken compassion for the victims and their families and a renewed commitment to our gospel mandate.

We are still the only "light of the world" (Matthew 5:14). The darker the night, the more crucial our light.

One lesson of El Paso and Dayton is that every community is a mission field. As a result, every Christian is a missionary.

This morning, I hear our Lord asking, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" (Isaiah 6:8).

What is your answer to him?



As my wife and I were shopping at Walmart, I noticed the diversity in the people around me. People with many shades of melanin. People from all around the world. People with heritages different from my own. As I observed them, my heart sank thinking of the tragedy at the Walmart in El Paso



It is simple to blame an act of terror that claimed more than 20 lives in Texas on political ideologies, video game violence, firearm availability, healthcare access, or even the hatred inside the heart of the murderous terrorist that carried out this atrocity. The answer, spiritually speaking, runs much deeper.

These things happen because Hell hates Heaven. Hell hates that when I look around me and see people "from every tribe and language and people and nation" (Revelation 5:9), I think about Heaven. 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

This month I want to talk about brain health. Let me start with this statement from the "British Journal of Clinical Pharmacology", 2013

The prevention of Dementias such as Alzheimer's is a growing public health concern due to a lack of effective curative treatment. Current epidemiological data are in favor of a protective role of certain micronutrients.

The micronutrients mentioned above are vitamin supplements, herbal combinations and amino acids, most of which can be purchased at our health food store and doctors' offices which specialize in natural health care. The reason this is important is that we can and MUST be taking control of our health and of our minds before it is too late. As the quote above states, we cannot go along as if nothing is happening and when it finally gets bad enough that everyone notices you go to the doctor expecting them to fix it for you. Hopefully, it's not too late. Just visit any nursing home and see the result of waiting too long.

Nothing much has changed since 2013 except that the research is showing positive changes in people who are willing to help themselves and take control of their

Fundamentals of brain health

For our brain to be healthy we must have 3 key ingredients. Oxygen, a steady supply of blood sugar and stimulation. There is a relatively new term being used called brain plasticity. This refers to our brain's ability to develop multiple channels of communication which continues as we age. The key to good brain function is to maintain communication channels (plasticity). The opposite of plasticity is brain degeneration. Plasticity is dependent on stimulation and a good chemical environment. Studies have shown that people with Alzheimer's lesions had no symptoms when they remained mentally stimulated. Television does not stimulate the brain. Plasticity can improve at any age with a good environment. Mental stimulation can include brain games, puzzles, learning a new language or playing a musical instrument. So, the brain games you see advertised are capable of helping with stimulation.

Neurotransmitters - These are chemical messengers our neurons produce to communicate with each other. Inflammation, hormones and blood sugar can determine the health of neurotransmitter function. Neurons need oxygen, glucose, stimulation. Brain degeneration will happen if any one of these is compromised. Blood sugar is critical because it will also affect oxygen levels in the brain. (2) strikes) It has been my observation that many of the people we have tested have blood sugar problems. This hit home with me especially. When I had myself tested it was apparent that my blood sugar had been high for a while. I had no idea because I exercise regularly, and I thought I was eating well. It turns out my affinity for bread (even whole grain and sprouted grain) was part of my problem. People with swings in blood sugar are often labeled as bi-polar and put on psychotropic drugs. Imagine having an unsteady gas supply to your car. It can and will alter moods. A high carb diet not only affects swings in blood sugar, but it promotes inflammation and brain degeneration. A diet with good combinations of proteins & Healthy FATS prevents blood sugar swings, energy crashes & inflam-

Stress - The brain can adapt to stress giving the illusion that you may work well under stress. If the high stress goes unattended long enough, brain inflammation will overtake you leading to brain degeneration – crash – burnout – nervous breakdown. Taking the time regularly to "be still and know that I am God" is the best prevention I know of.

So, what can I do?

A regular blood workup is essential, but don't just take your doctors word for the results, I recommend you get a copy of the labs and see for yourself. I am constantly having patients bring their labs from other offices and they were told everything is fine when it clearly was not. It seems some things are ignored unless you are having obvious symptoms. Remember the key is to catch this BEFORE you have symptoms.

A normal fasting glucose should be 70-100, but even better have your doctor order an A1c which gives you a number indicating the average blood sugar over 90 days. A CBC which is a normal part of routine labs will usually pick up any anemia. Keeping your brain stimulated is essential but will be up to you. I recommend many brain games available free on the internet.

Annual Health Care Enrollment Ahead

It is almost that time of year. The time when people choose to overpay for healthcare. A 2016 Commonwealth Fund study said that healthcare accounted for over 10.1% of family budgets which is up from 6.5 only a decade ago. The study also said that healthcare was also outpacing income but had slowed slightly. Without getting into politics, and that

is a challenge when you discuss healthcare, my goal is to help people understand the options available and to remove the risk that people have by simply choosing either substandard healthcare or none at all.

The first thing one should consider is whether or not you qualify for subsidies for the ACA plans. These plans offer unlimited coverage and have no restrictions on pre-existing conditions. Depending on your household income you could pay as little as 2.08% of your income to as much as 9.86%. So, if you made \$100,000 and had a family of 4 you would be expected to pay \$9,870 a year for your family healthcare. This is \$822.50 a month and if you are this close you may fall off what is known as the "cliff". This means if your income exceeds the maximum limit even by \$1 you could be responsible for the entire cost of the healthcare plan you choose. This comes as a surprise to many and will show up on your tax bill when you file.

Fortunately, there are alternatives that do not come with all the variables and you can sign up for them at any time. That is right anytime. This means if you are currently in a plan and one of these plans better fits your needs you can sign up today and start saving money. It is also beneficial if you think your income may exceed the limit and minimize the penalty that you will have to pay for making too much money.

So, what are the options I am talking about? These are Health Sharing Plans. They are not insurance but provide coverage to cover the cost of healthcare and they come in many forms. I think they break down into affordable options in three areas depending on what you can afford and what you need. Most come with limits for pre-existing coverage for major illness, such as hospital or surgeries. The most basic plan is a MEC, which means Minimum Essential Coverage. These are the most affordable plans and start at \$69 a month. They provide telemedicine for family, annual physical and a limited number of Doctor visits a year. They are designed to provide routine healthcare for cuts, breaks, and colds. They things you would normally go to your doctor or urgent care to treat. They do not provide any hospital or surgical care. They are a good option compared to no coverage at all and can save you money overpaying for routine care out of pocket. The next area is catastrophic care. This is the opposite of the MEC and provides only Hospital and Surgical Care. These plans are to provide a safety net for a major health event. They do have pre-existing condition limitations and a lifetime cap on the amount they will pay out but compared to the risk and cost of paying for a hospital stay yourself it is a good option. The last option is a comprehensive plan that combines both the Doctor and Hospital care in one plan. This is where if you are currently on an ACA plan you should compare the cost versus the benefits to see if you can save money with these plans.

I help people evaluate all these plans and determine which way to cover your healthcare is best for you and your family. There is no cost for this analysis. 

Rep. Meadows Introduces the "America Stands with Israel Act"

Washington, D.C. – Today, Rep. Mark Meadows (NC-11) introduced the America Stands with Israel Act—a bill to provide defense and security assistance to Israel.

The America Stands with Israel Act empowers the President of the United States to deal with imminent threats to Israel's survival in two ways. First, it authorizes the President to take whatever military steps may be necessary to protect Israel from an existing or imminent military threat. Second, it allows the President to send immediate and unrestricted defensive measures and services to Israel necessary to assist in its defense.

Rep. Meadows released the following statement on the bill:

"The Middle East region remains a hotbed of terrorism, largely dominated by a country hostile to America in Iran. Israel is one of America's closest and strongest allies. It is crucial that the Israeli-U.S. partnership remains strong for us to ever have hope for any stability in the Middle East. If Israel's survival is ever threatened by revisionist regimes, transnational criminal organizations, or extremist terrorists, the United States must stand ready to defend our friend with the full strength and force that our nation has to offer.

Today's global security environment is becoming more and more complex. The United States and Israel must work jointly to face modernized threats together.

I came to Congress to firmly stand for and defend our friend, Israel, and their right to exist as a peaceful, free, and prosperous nation.

My hope is that this bill will be a step toward that end."

BUDGET IMPASSE STILL LOOMS - Schools will be starting soon and it is only now that the teachers, staff, faculty, and others will begin to feel the "real effect" of operating without a current budget approved. As a result of the veto, we will be operating under a "CR" Continuing Resolution of a budget approved from the previous biennium. There will be no salary increases appropriated for Teachers and State Employees.

BLUE RIDGE ELEMENTARY OPENS - What a treat it was for me to visit recently. I got to spend several hours in this new crisp, clean, sparkling school. They put me right to work volunteering in the library, BOOKS, BOOKS, and more BOOKS to clean and assemble in the bookcases ready for the students! It was work, but meaningful work. This new school will incorporate Beelog, Bald Creek Elementary, and Clearmont Schools. I couldn't be more excited for the students, parents, and the new principal Andrea Allen. BILLS OF NOTE

SB 380 - Reestablish NC Milk Commission

The NC Milk Commission was initially established in 1953 and was repealed in 2004. This bill would re-establish the North Carolina Milk Commission. The Commission would be authorized to regulate the production and sale of milk in the State. This bill would provide needed support and relief to our dairy farmers. The bill was heard recently in the Ag Committee and unanimously was voted to move the bill forward to the House Judiciary Committee for a further hearing.

SB 86 - Small Business Health Care Act

This bill allows for small business, sole proprietors, and independent contractors to form large group plans that offer affordable insurance for association members. The bill has passed both Chambers and has been sent to the Governor.

HB 615 - NC Consumer Fireworks Safety Act

This bill would permit cities and counties to sell consumer fireworks. It would also levy a 5% excise tax on the sale of such fireworks. The bill ran into stiff opposition when discussed in the Reg. Reform Committee and ultimately the sponsor of the bill pulled it without a vote. The bill has now been sent to the Rules Committee. Many members spoke against this bill along with the Fire-Chiefs simply due to the danger of the products and lack of facilities to store fireworks once used.

We are continuing our sessions in hopes of getting passage on the Governor's veto of the budget bill. We are over a month into this process!

NC Senate District 46

Even as we wait on the state budget impasse to be resolved, there were some important pieces of legislation that were acted upon by the General Assembly.

First, Senate Bill 86 Small Business Health Care Act is now on the Governor's desk after passing both chambers with bipartisan support. The legislation allows small businesses, sole proprietors, and independent contractors to form large group health plans that offer affordable insurance for association members. These Association Health Plans (AHPs) would be subject to state and federal consumer protections, including covering those with preexisting conditions, and would expand access to coverage for working North Carolinians. The plans are expected to reduce the cost of healthcare coverage for hundreds of thousands of North Carolinians by treating small businesses the same as large corporations, through new insurance products regulated by the state Department of Insurance (DOI).

Another important piece of legislation is House Bill 74, Taxpayer Refund Act. If passed into law, the NC Department of Revenue would mail a refund to every taxpayer in the amount they paid in state taxes, up to a maximum of \$125 for an individual or \$250 for a couple. The refund will return \$663 million to the people and is not eating into any of the Reserve Fund appropriations that were in the vetoed budget. (The Reserve Fund currently has \$1.3 billion in it. The vetoed budget added another \$700 million.) The Taxpayer Refund Act instructs the Department of Revenue to issue checks as soon as possible. The Department must mail checks by December 15, 2019 for those who filed before August 1, 2019. As of publication, House Bill 74 is expected to pass the Senate and the House before going to Governor Cooper for his signature....or his veto.

The third piece of legislation was House Bill 370, Require Cooperation with ICE Detainers, which received final approval from both the state House of Representatives and Senate in late August and would require NC sheriffs to comply with federal immigration authorities when dealing with suspected illegal immigrants already in jail for committing other crimes that have detainer requests from U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE). The bill authorizes the removal of a sheriff from office for failing to comply with ICE detainers and is supported by the North Carolina Sheriffs' Association as a "high priority," but Governor Cooper vetoed it anyway. Over 90 of the 100 sheriffs in NC supported the bill.

New Trails Provide New Opportunities

Recently, I was pleased to be the lead sponsor for state legislation that adds two trails to the State Trails System: the Overmountain Victory National Historic Trail and the Wilderness Gateway Trail. The new law co-designates the Overmountain Victory National Historic Trail with the federal government so that the trail is now both a state and federal one. The Overmountain Victory National Historic Trail is a project of the National Park Service to recognize and honor the important route of patriot militias in the Revolutionary War. It is located mostly in western North Carolina, with segments in both Tennessee and Virginia. The trail ends across the North Carolina line at the site of the Battle of Kings Mountain in South Carolina. Many historians refer to that battle as a turning point in the Revolutionary War in the South. It is my hope that North Carolina's authorization of this trail will result in mutually-beneficial collaboration between state and federal officials and lead to a partnership beneficial for the western North Carolina portion of the trail.

The Wilderness Gateway State Trail authorization directs the state's Department of Natural and Cultural Resources to establish it as a completely new trail. It would begin in Catawba County on the east and extend westward through Burke and beyond. The Jacob Fork and Henry Fork rivers both have their origins in South Mountain State Park in Burke County and flow east to a confluence in Catawba. Hugh Blackwell@ncleg.net Conceptually, the new trail would likely intersect or follow one of those rivers with loops and variations to provide access across and under I-40 to make it more user-friendly to those traveling or living north of the interstate. This new trail will hopefully create a "gateway" to the wonderful wilderness and recreation areas of the South Mountains. In turn, I hope this new trail will provide increased hiking, camping and other outdoor opportunities for both the citizens of our area and also for tourists.

Achieving childhood literacy by third grade is foundational to desired educational outcomes for our children. I co-sponsored Senate Bill 438 – Excellent Public Schools Act of 2019 which was filed April 1st. Before the beginning of the school year, the bill was passed by both the Senate and House, ratified, then sent to the Governor on August 14th. As of this writing (7 days later), the Excellent Public Schools Act of 2019 is awaiting Gov. Roy Cooper's signature. The bill was created through coordination with Gov. Cooper's appointees to the State Board of Education. I certainly hope that Gov. Cooper will have signed the bill that his own administration was involved in writing. Possible outcomes are that he will sign the bill, not sign the bill (which will become law within 10 days without his signature), or veto the bill.

This bill, which focuses on early childhood literacy programs, was created with input from a wide range of educational stakeholders who looked with legislators at the best practices, as well as areas for improvement, here in North Carolina as well as in other states. Building on and fine-tuning the Read to Achieve Program, which was passed by the NC General Assembly in 2013, Excellent Public Schools Act of 2019 implements improvements and changes to several key areas which data shows contribute to early literacy in third. grade, an important indicator of future academic success. Changes to the North Carolina Read to Achieve Program will do the follow-

- Establish individual reading plans for students who need extra help in reading
- Establish a Digital Children's Reading Initiative
- Establish a Comprehensive Plan to Improve Literacy Instruction (Comprehensive Plan)
- · Require the North Carolina Center for the Advancement of Teaching (NCCAT) to prioritize and provide aligned professional development in early learning and literacy instruction.
- Require educator preparation programs to provide literacy training in programs for elementary education teachers
- Require the literacy curriculum and instruction provided by local school administrative units to align with Read to Achieve and the Comprehensive Plan
- Require approval of plans for local reading camps
- Study phasing out some alternative assessments for third-grade reading
- Create a uniform reporting structure for Read to Achieve data
- Provide for continuing education credits related to literacy for certain reading camp. instructors and allow retired K-3 teachers to serve as reading camp instructors
- Expand the Wolfpack WORKS program.

Preachers of The Gospel

2 Corinthians 4:5 says, "For we preach not ourselves, but Christ Jesus the Lord; and ourselves your servants for Jesus' sake."

Being a preacher of the Gospel is not a mere vocation or a job opportunity, it is a calling from Almighty God. In 1

Timothy 1:12 the Apostle Paul said, "And I thank Christ Jesus our Lord, who hath enabled me, for that he counted me faithful, putting me into the ministry. According to what the Apostle Paul says in that verse, the ministry was not just something he chose, rather it was a calling from the Lord Jesus Christ." Being called, God counts on His servants to be faithful in preaching the Word, loving the people, while guarding and feeding the flock of God (the local church over which the Lord has assigned Him).

It has been my privilege to preach the Gospel of Christ now for some fifty-one and one-half years. Having experienced a call from God, I will keep on going on in the ministry when negative experiences are encountered. I have been a pastor in three different Baptist churches over those fifty-one and one-half years, but the good experiences have always dominated over the bad ones.

Preaching is a tremendous responsibility that no man should consider lightly. Many men who are in the ministry have been called by the Lord and some were not beckoned by the Lord to preach. Some take on the ministry on their own without God putting them into the ministry.

Preach with A Born-Again Experience

If a man is to tell others how to be born again, he needs to have a born-again experience for himself (John 3:3). I know of an incident years ago when a pulpit committee was considering calling a certain man to be their pastor. He told this Baptist church search committee something like this: "I do not believe in being born again just like you do, but I have been trained in one of the best seminaries, and if you call me I will make you a good pastor." The tragedy is that some on the committee wanted to present him to the church for them to vote on him as their shepherd. What ignorance on the part of some!

Preach with A Sense of Responsibility

Romans 14:12 says, "So then every one of us shall give an account of himself to God." One day we will answer to God for our ministry." Were we faithful to preach the whole counsel of God without the fear and favor of men? The pastor is accountable to the church, but his greatest accountability is with Almighty God Himself.

If we say we are "accountable" before God, that means we are liable to account



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for our actions and our attitudes to Him. That should motivate us to do our best for the Master. One day when life is over when the last page of our lives is written, we will stand before the Lord in Heaven.

It is not only what we have done that will come into play on that day, but also the attitudes we had. Did we do what we did in life for the glory of God or did we do it to just further some agenda we had in mind? Did we help someone to advance ourselves or to help them along the way? Not only are our actions important in our accountability to God but our attitudes as well.

Preach with a Clean Life

Isaiah 52:11, "Depart ye, depart ye, go ye out from thence, touch no unclean thing; go ye out of the midst of her; be ye clean, that bear the vessels of the Lord." Note the words, "Be ye clean that bear the vessels of the Lord."

God's ministers should be physically clean and maintain the right attire and appearance before others, however, there is more in Isaiah 52:11 than that fact. We are to keep ourselves right spiritually.

What you do in private others may not see, still, God sees everything. Nothing is hidden from His gaze. Hebrews 4:13 tells us, "Neither is there any creature that is not manifest in his sight: but all things are naked and opened unto the eyes of him with whom we have to do." We might hide wrong thoughts and deeds to others. In contrast, we cannot hide anything from our all-knowing and all-seeing God.

If God's servants do not keep themselves clean, they will forfeit God's power and the fullest of God's blessings, because the Holy Ghost is grieved in their lives (Eph.4:30). God will not pour the richest of His blessings and the fullness of power into a life that is plagued by personal sins.

If a preacher does not have a clean life it will hinder his effectiveness for Christ

Preach with Divine Power

Zechariah 4:6 says, "Not by might, nor by power, but by my spirit, saith the Lord of hosts." The way we accomplish things for time and eternity in the work of the Lord is to have the power of Christ upon our lives.

Acts 6:8 declares, "And Stephen, full of faith and power, did great wonders and miracles among the people." How did Stephen accomplish great wonders and miracles among the people? He did it through faith in God and through the power of God.

In speaking of God's power, we make reference to His enabling us to be effective in our work for Him. Why preach and not be effective in doing so? We should greatly desire good results from our labor. That is impossible without the power of God moving and carrying us along in God's work.

In 1 Corinthians 2:4-5 the Apostle Paul wrote. "And my speach and my preach.

In 1 Corinthians 2:4-5 the Apostle Paul wrote, "And my speech and my preaching was not with enticing words of man's wisdom, but in demonstration of the Spirit and of power; that your faith should not stand in the wisdom of men, but in the power of God."

The Apostle depended upon God's power as he labored in the work of the Lord. Because of that power was successful in his spiritual labors and was one of the greatest men for the cause of Christ that ever lived.

Preach with A Love For the People

Jesus told Peter in John 21:16 and 17 to "Feed my sheep." It is not enough to love to preach, but beyond that, we should love those to whom we do preach. Love means that you give yourself to take care of them. You seek the good of the congregation and their welfare, not merely your own.

That is why we do all three things Paul told young Timothy to do. We reprove, rebuke and exhort with all long-suffering and doctrine (2 Timothy 4:2). Exhorting is easy but reproving and rebuking can be difficult to do, but it must be done. A man of God needs a balanced ministry of reproving, rebuking, and exhorting.

Love is tough. That means we do unpleasant things if it will better and further the members of the church. God has not called us to tiptoe through the tulips but to tell the truth.

Preach with a Determination to Keep Going

God has blessed me to pastor the good folks at Zion Hill Baptist Church now for over 25 1/2 years. I do not plan to retire until they no longer need me or until my physical condition would not allow me to pastor any longer. If I do have to someday retire from being a pastor, as long as I have breath, I will continue to preach the Word of God. Don't let small, annoying matters that come up make you ready to throw in the towel and give up trying to minister.

Preach with a Good Knowledge of the Bible

I will close our study today with a verse out of 2nd Timothy. "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." (2 Timothy 2:15). No man is qualified to lead God's people if he does not spend the proper time in study. With so many excellent study resources today, there is no excuse for being an unprepared preacher.

May God help us to be all we can for Him!

The Road Taken...

Robert Frost so famously wrote in the final lines of his poem, "The Road Not Taken," "... Two roads diverged in a wood, and I-I took the one less traveled by, and that has made all the difference."

As I stand at another crossroads of my own, God has prepared an unusual circumstance, in that both roads in my journey are "the one less traveled," regardless of which one I choose. Unlike Frost's divergence, where one path

eventually proves morally significant over the other, with my choice, each has the potential to share the Word of God in the duties required. In other words, they both have the ability to become blessings to others, in that I will be serving the Lord on either journey; or that, yes, that fact truly makes all the difference.

As a matter of confirmation, I was afforded an opportunity to interview with a school the first part of this week. I had just got through sharing my testimony with a friend when the phone rang. Like Abraham at the altar, Isaac lying bound below his knife blade, the feeling of his muscles' s tightening in his shoulders as he was about to drive the blade into his son; my path seemed perfectly clear, the decision to follow through with what God had provided was made, there was no turning back. But then, in my case, the phone rang. In Abraham's, God sent an Angel of the Lord. The parallel, as it ran through my mind, literally made me laugh as I answered the call. The caller was from a school that I had applied for many months ago, so it was a bit of a surprise when they called Monday morning asking if I could come in Tuesday for the interview. Knowing that God has prepared one path already, I was a bit hesitant, but thought that at least I should perform my due diligence.

"Was this God seeing how committed I was to finally accept the position at the Children's Home, and then providing me an opportunity to go on to a job that would allow me to more easily provide for my family?" "Was this like Abraham, where he could see that I was going to follow through with it, no matter the cost?" It was with these questions in mind that I drove to the school the next day for the interview. I felt wonderful, and it was a beautiful day; clear blue skies, low humidity, and a feeling inside that God was with me, no matter what. The interview went very well, and it seemed that I was always one step ahead on the panel's questions. They told me before I left that they would have an answer within a couple of days. By the next morning, Wednesday they had made a decision; one that didn't include me.

In many ways, the news was a relief. I thanked God out loud, for it was as if He had chosen for me. He knows us better than we know ourselves, and that being the case, would understand how hard it would be for me to decide between the two. Comforted once more that God is in control, I returned to work on the Retreat; there was always one more thing to be done.


Thursday came, and once more, there was another knock on the door. I opened the email, and there was another opportunity to interview with another potential employer that I had applied for many weeks earlier. They had moved my application to the next round of the selection process, which meant they were giving me 72 hours to perform the interview and submit it for review. Once again, making sure I performed my due diligence, I logged into the web site on Friday and began answering the question. Before beginning, I prayed that if this was God's way of holding the best until last, then so be it, but that I was already more than well pleased with the choice He had provided. The questions were not of the customary type, but rather, asked things like, "How do you grow and maintain your walk with Christ?" "What was your personal testimony with regard to accepting Christ, and how have you continued that walk?" In each case, there was so much I wanted to share, but the challenge was a one-minute time limit on each response. Needless to say, it took a lot of effort to pare down all that I wanted to say and get it to fit into the concise timeframe required.

Thankfully, there was no limit on the amount of time given to think about each question, and as I peered out the vista before me, I began to reflect on all that had transpired this past summer and how it had been one of the most challenging periods of waiting for God to speak to me in my life. My setting for the interview was at the Lodge, a place in our community that literally sits on top of a mountain that provides a 360-degree long-range view of mountains, as far as the eye can see. From my mountain top vantage, there was the feeling of being literally closer to God. One question after another, my reflection kept reminding me that I had never been alone, even when I felt the loneliest. Looking back, those solitary moments were steppingstones to the answers that would play out. In the waiting, there was the feeling that God was working on something big; something that would make it clear there was much to do in order to make it possible. Because, with God, nothing is impossible.

Finally, after the last question, I hit the submit button.

Have you ever completed something and wondered how well it went? Did you get the sudden feeling that there many things you hadn't said that you could have? These questions and others began to form in my mind, but as they did, there was the comforting hand of God upon me, consoling me, assuring me that this was all that was needed. There was nothing left to be done.

Lowering my head in prayer, I began to thank God for the opportunity, regardless if I got the position or not. In my heart, it felt as if God was allowing me to see that He was covering all the bases. Should I finally, and ultimately land at the Children's Home, I will have the comforting sense of satisfaction knowing that all the other doors of possible paths had been covered and provided. Each one. even though they chose another candidate, allowed me to see that He was listening and that he had put me where he needed me the most. In the end, although I initially felt like Abraham at the altar, I realized that God was just letting me know



The birth of my middle child, Alex, would forever change our family's path in this life; although, we didn't know it at the time. Over the course of the first two years of his life, we started a journey that caused fear and heartache with lots of God's bless-



ings in between. Alex was born with approximately 55 genes missing off chromosome 19. Technically, there is not a name for this particular chromosome abnormality. His speech is difficult to understand, and he'll need care for his entire life. We made the mistake of looking up chromosome disorders on the Internet- That was a mistake. Bad news after bad news. We ran from doctor to doctor looking for answers on how to help him. We tried everything! We were so scared and didn't understand. We were sad when we thought about what the future held for Alex and us. Since fear can be paralyzing, we knew we couldn't allow this fear to grip us anymore; so, we surrendered to God. That is exactly what He had been waiting for us to do. We started memorizing verses such as Jeremiah 29:11 and Psalm 139:14 and claiming them over our son. As we have watched Alex grow, God has blessed him with a heart of prayer. He is a prayer warrior. Anytime he hears sirens- no matter what time of day, he prays. Now, he doesn't even have to hear a siren, anytime he sees someone stopped on the side of the road or in trouble, he prays. When someone is sick, he prays. We prayed that He would unloose Alex's tongue so that he could talk to us and sing praises to the Lord. Oh, how we wanted this for our son. For 13 years, this was our prayer. 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Place to Start

The Old Testament book of Nehemiah, along with Ezra and Esther, covers the period after the Babylonian captivity when Israel had returned to Jerusalem and had begun again the worship of Jehovah in the restored temple. Ezra, the priest, led an early return to Israel and restored worship in the rebuilt temple in Jerusalem. Nehemiah, who was a contem-



porary of Ezra, led a later return. Nehemiah was a layman, a butler to the Persian emperor, Artaxerxes I. Persia is now the modern nation of Iran. Nebemiah is the historic account of the rebuilding of the walls of Jerusalem, which took place in fifth century before Christ. But Nehemiah did more than rebuild a wall. This book is also the story of restoring people from ruin and despair to a new walk with God. Jerusalem is not only a historic city, that for centuries has been the center of the life of the nation of Israel (and, in fact, the center of the biblical record), it is also a symbolic city. Jerusalem is also used in a pictorial sense throughout the Scriptures. What it pictures is the place where God desires to dwell. When God first designated to King David that Jerusalem was the place where He wanted him to build the temple, he was told that this was the place where God would dwell among His people. However, it is only a picture--it is not the actual place where God dwells--for, according to the New Testament, people are to be the dwelling place of God. God seeks to dwell in the human spirit. That is the great secret that humanity has largely lost today but which New Testament Christianity seeks to restore. Paul's great statement in the letter to the Colossians is, "Christ in you, the hope of glory "(Colossians 1:27). This is God's provision and desire for us. Jerusalem-in-ruins, therefore, is a picture of a life that has lost its defenses against attack and lies open to repeated hurt and misery. The book of Nehemiah depicts the way of recovery from breakdown and ruin to a condition of peace, security, restored order, and usefulness. When I heard these things, I sat down and wept. For many days I mourned and fasted and prayed before the God of heaven. Nehemiah 1:4 Nehemiah clearly has a deep sense of personal concern. He is willing to face the facts, to weep over them and tell God about them. That is always the place to begin. There is nothing superficial about this. A famous song says, Don't worry, Be happy. But that is mere salve over deep cancer. What is needed is to honestly face the ruin, whatever it may be, and, without blaming or attempting to involve somebody else, telling it all to God. God always welcomes a broken spirit and a contrite heart. Follow the pattern of Nehemiah's prayer. First, he recognized the character of God. The ruin you are concerned with may not always be yours personally. You feel like Nehemiah, and you want to weep and mourn and tell God about it. That is always the place to start, for God is a responsive God. He gives attention to the prayers of His people. The second thing Nehemiah did was to repent of all personal and corporate sins. This was honestly facing his own guilt. Notice the absence of self-righteousness. He did not say, Lord, I am thinking of those terrible sinners back there in Jerusalem. Be gracious to them because they have fallen into wrong actions. No, he put himself into this picture, saying, I confess before you, Lord, the sins of myself and my father's house. There was no attempt to blame others for this. It was a simple acknowledgment of wrong. Then, third, Nehemiah reminded God of His gracious promises. In the book of Deuteronomy 28-30 Moses prophetically outlines the entire history of Israel. He said they would disobey God; they would be scattered among the nations; they would go into exile. But if they would turn and acknowledge their evil, God would bring them back to the land. Nehemiah reminded God of that gracious promise. The fourth thing Nehemiah did was request specific help to begin this process. It was not going to be easy, but he knew what he had to do. It was going to take the authority of the top power in the whole empire. That was not easy to arrange. But Nehemiah believed that God would help him. And so, he started to pray and asked for grace and strength to carry out the steps that were necessary to begin recovery. Thank You, Father, for this wonderfully practical book that sets out a safe guideline to recovery and usefulness. Help me to begin where Nehemiah began: to tell the whole story in Your ear and thus begin the process of recovery.

valid, biblical explanation for why Jesus had to die.

So, just how does Jesus fit the requisites of the "CV" set some 1,500 years before He came? In the New Testament, we find that Jesus was male and first-born (e.g. Luke 2:2), He was born of a virgin with the Holy Spirit being the 'father' (Luke 1:26–38) to break the line of inherited sin, and that He was without blemish (Colossians 1:22; 1 Peter 1:19). He was also human and divine, so we have a complete match!

However, this is where the creation-versus-evolution issue, and the associated issue of long ages, ceases to be "irrelevant" but is inexorably interlinked with the authority of the Bible, Christology and, ultimately, our own redemption.

Quite simply, to suggest the account of Adam and Eve (and the associated issue of sin and death) is a myth, or needs "reinterpretation", is both a direct attack on God and the authority of Scripture, and also brings into question the whole purpose of Jesus' death. It is an attack on both the Old and New Testaments since Luke traces Jesus' genealogy back to Adam (Luke 3:23–38), Paul refers to Jesus as the "last Adam" (1 Corinthians 15:45) and there are other New Testament references to Adam (1 Timothy 2:13-14; Jude 1:14). Sin, and with it the introduction of death, is also linked with Adam in the New Testament (Romans 5:12). So, if Adam is not a literal, historical figure, then effectively nothing of the Bible can be taken at face value, a fact that atheists seem to appreciate more than many evangelicals! Even worse, the whole justification for Jesus coming to die for us is destroyed and, with it, our redemption.

That only leaves long ages prior to Genesis 1:2—but for what purpose? If we are to accept the Bible from the creation of Adam onwards, why would we even question God with the remaining few verses?

But can God still have used evolution and what about long ages?

If Adam and Eve are historical figures, then clearly there is no need for evolution from that point on as evidenced by Jesus' genealogy in Luke. Furthermore, if there was no death prior to Adam (Romans 5:12), there is no room for evolution at all—it is completely ruled out.

That only leaves long ages prior to Genesis 1:2—but for what purpose? If we are to accept the Bible from the creation of Adam onwards, why would we even question God with the remaining few verses? Why would anyone want to concoct a "gap" between Genesis 1:1 and 2, or want to see the days in Genesis as being "God's days, not man's days" or some other "explanation", denying the straight reading of Genesis? The only reason is purely to adopt a non-biblical, non-supernatural, humanistic worldview into one's theology, which requires long ages for evolution to work!

The Bible teaches that Jesus Christ is the "last Adam" (1 Corinthians 15:45) who came to die for our sins and, by dying on the cross, has provided us with the means of being reconciled to God and to be able to spend eternity with Him. As Paul says in Galatians 1:6-7 any other "gospel" is not really a Gospel!

Dear Dave,

Why do I need a will if I'm still young and haven't acquired a lot of wealth?

Dear Laura,

In a case like yours, you don't need a complicated will. But you do need an inexpensive, basic will. The larger

and more complicated your estate is, the more you'd spend on estate planning and a will in order to ensure everything is properly addressed—and to keep the government's hands-off everything.

Let's say you're in your early- to mid-twenties and single. You have a car and a bank account, and that's it. In this kind of scenario, it's going to be easy to work through your estate. But it's going to take your parents—or whoever's left—a whole lot longer to get those few simple transactions taken care of if you don't have a will in place.

The other thing you'll always want to have in your will package is a healthcare power of attorney directive. This includes things like who's going to make medical decisions for you if you're unable to make decisions for yourself. As a part of this, you'd want to fill out the paperwork on whether to disconnect life support systems in the event of a coma. These things aren't fun to think about, but doing it will take a huge burden off the people you love. And all this becomes even more important if you have children because the state will step in and decide what happens to them if you don't.

Having these things laid out ahead of time, and sharing them with your family and close friends, is a very thoughtful and mature thing to do for those who would be left behind in the event of your death. They're already going to be distraught and grieving, and you don't want to make it worse by leaving them with a lot of important, difficult decisions to make.

My wife and I are on Baby Step 2, and the only debt we have is \$90,000 in student loans. We bring home about \$90,000 a year. In addition to this, we have almost \$60,000 in equity in our home. We also have a toddler, plus another baby on the way. Do you think we should sell the house, and rent for a few years while using the money from the sale of the house to pay down our student loan debt? Chris

Dear Chris,

No, I wouldn't sell your home in this situation. You're going to be out of debt in a couple of years or so, anyway. You'll just have to lean into it and make sure you're living on a strict, written budget. I'm talking about no vacations and no eating out. You shouldn't see the inside of a restaurant unless you're working there. And the new kid's crib may have to come from a garage sale, but so what? Mine did, too. Want to know something else? I survived without having a rich kid's nursery, and so did my kids.

There's a price to be paid anytime you decide to get serious about gaining control of your money and cleaning up a financial mess you've made. You're going to have to work like maniacs and have no lives for a while. That might even mean picking up a part-time job at night or on weekends. You've got a tough couple of years ahead of you, but I think it's worth the tradeoff.

The Jesus Christ Lizard

Did you know that there is a lizard named after Jesus? The Basilisk lizard's nickname is "the Jesus Christ lizard." Can you guess why?

The Basilisk lizards can grow up to 2 feet, this is including the length of their tail. Their life span is about seven years


if grown in captivity. They are related to the Iguana. The adult males have three crests, one each on their head, back and tail. The female has one crest on her head and can lay as many as 20 eggs at a time.

The Basilisk lizard lives in Central America and South America in the rain forests around streams and rivers. It lives mostly in the trees that hang over bodies of water. When a predator is after them while they are in the trees the lizard will fall from the tree limb to the water below and run across the water to the other side to escape.

Yes, you read that correctly! The Basilisk lizard is named after Jesus because it can run on water! They are able to do this from hatchling age to adult lizard. The younger lizards are able to run the distance of 10-20 meters on the water surface while the adults can only run a few meters before sinking in the water because of their weight. They are also able to run supernatural speeds of almost 7mph on

land and 5mph on water. This helps "the Jesus Christ lizard" be able to escape its predators and catch food. This is why they will always be found near the banks of a body of water. They are also able to hide under leaves on the ground and stay motionless for a long time.

Would you like to know how this



lizard is able to travel on the water's surface? Being lightweight, and super-fast are just two of the contributors. The Basilisk lizard also has very long toes and small flaps of skin on their feet that open up in the water creating little air pockets under the lizard's feet lifting them to the top of the water. The lizard then pumps, and churns their legs rapidly like a bicycle, hitting their feet hard on the water's surface. If the lizard does sink in the water, there are no worries, they are strong swimmers and can stay underwater for up to 30 minutes!

All these factors are how the Basilisks can run on water. Jesus however, wasn't equipped with any special features. He came to earth as an ordinary person like you and me.

Did you know that it is a miracle that Jesus walked on water? Scientists have calculated that a person weighing at 175 pounds would have to run at 65 mph to stay affoat as the basilisk lizard does. But Jesus was able to walk on the top of the water with no effort at all! Jesus performed many miracles and answered many prayers while He was on earth. Did you know that He is still doing these things even today? Think about it. Can you remember a time that God answered your prayer? Or have you witnessed a miracle in your life or someone else's? If you can't think of an example look closely over the past week. I bet you will see God working in your life, answering prayers or performing miracles on your behalf. Sometimes these are not as large as walking on water but are very small. Look closely! Also never be afraid to ask God to answer your prayers or to perform a miracle for you. Remember the Bible says "I am the Lord, the God of all people. Nothing is too difficult for me." (Jeremiah 32:27)

Beside Still Waters

Three boys and their Dad out for a hike that led to a quiet lake with not even a ripple; it was a perfect day.

Then Dad said, "Watch this."

Picking up a smooth stone he sailed it out over the water where it skipped along making ripples appear that hadn't been there before.

"How do you do that?" they chorused. "I want to try!" they each exclaimed.

And, so, the skipping rock lessons began. Some just plopped into the water
and sank. Others sent out a ripple or two. But, it took time for them to master the
technique.

However, once they did, there almost weren't enough stones for them to skip.

One after another he heard, "Watch me! Watch this one!"

The times when I was along, I loved sitting back and watching this display. I even tried it a time or two. But, the guys always had me beat.

That memory of still waters and ripples makes me think of the verse of Scripture found in Psalm 46: 10, NLT that says, "Be still, and know that I am God."

Besides our bodies being in constant motion, what other parts of us seem to go non-stop? I think it is our minds. If we aren't preoccupied with worries, to-do lists, schedules, meetings and more, we're trying to solve problems for our children and others. There's hardly a few moments when we can be as still and undisturbed as lake water on a calm day.

We have come beside still waters while hiking in Rocky Mountain National Park in Colorado. These lakes so high into the mountains are gifts of God to each of us when we unexpectedly come upon them. Mirror images of trees and clouds reflect back in the stillness.

I wonder if God would like us to quiet our minds for at least a few minutes a day so that He can gently drop His thoughts across our minds. Think of the ripples such thinking would create...ripples of purpose, meaning, and values; ripples of love, forgiveness, mercy, and grace.

As such thoughts skipped across our minds from Him, we would be "fixing our thoughts on what is true, and honorable, and right, and pure, and lovely, and admirable," as it says in Philippians 4: 8, NLT. If we continue to receive His thoughts, we will be thinking about things that are excellent and praiseworthy.


Then our minds will once again become like that peaceful lake reflecting Him clearly because "the God of peace will be with you." Selah

How Churches and Families Can Partner in Making Disciples

"When I get home, I am going to talk to Jesus!" my redheaded preschooler son called out as we pulled out of the church parking lot after another robust Sunday at church. My husband and I glanced at each other. I responded, "Yes, little love, you can talk with Jesus any-



where at any time." We smiled because we knew these few words were God's gift to our family. They represented a partnership between our home and our church one that we treasure, and one that we cannot parent without.

Busy family units

Hudson Taylor was a 19th-century missionary who said, "All of our difficulties are only platforms for the manifestation of His grace, power, and love." Many families that attend church each Sunday are in a season of life that is ruled by a difficulty called perpetual busyness. It's a season that is burdensome and overwhelming. Busyness can overflow into all areas of family life, and families need ministry leaders to come alongside them in support and encouragement. Therefore, children's ministry leaders must ask how they can partner with families who are in the grit of busy lives.

Called to encourage

Psalm 78:4 serves as a humbling reminder to those of us leading children in our churches. It reminds us of our calling, "Tell the coming generation the praiseworthy deeds of the Lord, and His might, and the wonders He has done." What a weighty and joyous gift that we have been given! Children's ministers hold a great responsibility to partner with parents in this task — the task is marked with the highest stakes imaginable but also the greatest eternal rewards.

Children will spend only an hour or two, at most, in church each week. While the timing may be short, it's invaluable in the hearts and minds of the kids. Take every opportunity to preach the gospel in every situation. Consider how your team interacts during parent pick-up. Use pick-up time to inform families of what their children learned at church while encouraging them to keep the conversation moving during the week.

Children's ministry leaders may have only an hour or two on Sundays, but parents have 167. Ministry leaders should be parents' greatest encouragers on Sundays and throughout the week as well.

Worlzing together

As a ministry leader, you can equip your families for discipleship opportunities that parents might have when they are sitting at home, walking along the road, when they lie down and when they get up.

Ministry can be hard, and there is no perfect recipe. As you pray and ask how God may lead you to overhaul your family discipleship strategy, think about the kids in your ministry as you would an unreached people group. What do they love to listen to? Where do they hang out? Why do they read certain book series? Remind your parents to do what works best, when it works best, and how it works best to lead their kids to Jesus and grow in their relationship with our Savior.

J.C. Ryle once said, "He who has trained his children for heaven, not for the earth, for God rather than for man — he is the parent who will be called wise at the last." Ministry leaders, you are tasked to encourage and equip parents as they strive to train up their children for heaven as they are sitting at home, walking along the road, when they lie down, and when they get up. Do not grow weary!





Hope & Help from Addiction Through Christ

GriefShare

I stood with several people I didn't know by the side of the road, and finally, two State troopers approached me. The showed me Jimm's license, asked me to identify it as my husband's, then informed me gently that he had died in the accident. Even this many years later, there are no words to adequately describe my anguish at that moment. My son arrived soon after, and I was taken back up to my house. Family, friends, and food began pouring in as is the usual custom when a death has occurred. The first few days I was in shock and welcomed the distraction of planning the Celebration of Life service. I had no real-time to focus on the grief-that would come later, when I was alone.


Fast-forward several months, when school began in August, and I had resumed my teaching position. When I would get home from work, I would allow the tears to flow. A friend had given me a stack of books on grief, which had been given to her when she had lost her own husband the previous summer. I devoured the books, seeking relief from the pain. It was in the appendix of the last book I was reading, late one Saturday evening, where I discovered a reference to GriefShare. The website explained the support groups, and eventually, I was able to locate one in Boone that fit my schedule. It was then about 8 months since Jimm had died. I attended with a friend, and by the end of the 13-week cycle we agreed that Mitchell county needed a GriefShare support ministry. We enlisted the help of a retired pastor and his wife to get started.


Over 11 years have passed since that first session, and many people attending have been able to find help, hope, and healing through this ministry. Some of you who are reading this may have been helped through GriefShare or have referred someone to the ministry. My own healing continues to this day, and the loss is ever-present, but the intense pain has subsided. Healing comes in stages, but ultimately, true healing is found only through Jesus Christ. GriefShare makes no apologies for a Christ-centered, Bible-based foundation on which the curriculum is built. Our community has suffered much loss in the last few years, but GriefShare is a vehicle God is using to help others find their way in their "new normal." I have been asked, "Why should I attend GriefShare, where people just sit around and cry about their loss? It would just make me feel worse." It's true, tears do occur, but GriefShare gives you permission to express your grief in a safe place where others truly understand your pain. Telling your own story is part of the healing process, along with the video and workbook.

I invite those of you who are walking this journey of grief to join us in the fall cycle of GriefShare at Western Carolina Church at 31 Cross Street, Suite 289. We have already met for Session 1, but you can join in anytime. We meet on Thursdays at 6:00 pm in the Wing of the church, which is in the old Hampshire Hosiery building. There are signs posted to guide you. A light meal is served, and you will be warmly welcomed. There is no charge to attend. The Workshop Lesson

My grandfather, my dad's father, was a farmer for much of his life. My grandparents, David and Edna Bietz, lived in the small farming community known as Cleveland, North Dakota. My grandparents owned right at 1000 acres of land where my grandfather planted and harvested barley year after year. I enjoyed my young years of mostly being in my



granddad's way I suspect, as he let me ride in the cab with him in his green John Deer combine tractor. Up and down and back and forth we would go all day across the fields of barley.

But the day would come, while my grandfather was still in his 50s when he would have a severe heart attack. Though he would survive, it was felt that it would be best if my grandparents sell their farm. My grandfather would live into his 80s, no longer farming, but still active in retirement.

Actually, it was after my grandparents sold the farm that I saw the extent of my grandfather's gifts that went beyond farming. I discovered my grandfather was a carpenter. He could build you a house, but his passion was roll-top desks, footstools, end tables, china cabinets, rocking chairs, and on and on. Much of his work he sold, but so many times, he just gave the items away.

My grandfather's workshop was the basement of their home, which was now in town if you can call Cleveland North Dakota a town. There was a constant aroma, as you entered my grandfather's workshop, of wood stain. Scattered all over the place were the wood shavings and sawdust from his work.

One summer, I spent several weeks in Cleveland North Dakota with my grandparents. I was somewhere around 13 or 14 years old. As I got out of bed one
morning, I heard noises coming from the workshop in the basement. Still, in my
pajamas, I headed downstairs to see what grandpa was up to so early in the morning before breakfast. He was working on a rocking chair, but almost immediately
I could sense that he was frustrated. I wasn't sure what the problem was, but
finally, my grandfather sighed and set down on his stool.

He looked at me, with a slight grin on his face and said, "well Steven, this is why we call this place a workshop...because sometimes it doesn't work." After grandma fixed us breakfast, back to the workshop we went. I watched as my grandfather took apart the rocking chair that had not met his approval. He would remake several of the rocking chair pieces and then rebuild it. That late afternoon, I was pleased that grandfather gave me a brush so that I could help with the staining of that rocking chair.

I wish I knew what became of that rocking chair. But I have no idea where it sits today and who might be sitting in it and rocking away. But I do know the lesson of the workshop that I learned and how connected it was to the wisdom we find in a loving Carpenter named Jesus Christ.

This world is not heaven. However, it is a workshop where God's people are

being chiseled, sawed, and sanded. The Great Carpenter, Jesus, tenderly builds our characters. He has had to do a lot of sanding on me and has also taken me apart and put me back together when I just don't fit right. But, like my grandfather, I sense a grin on my Lord's face as he says to me, "it's ok Steven, that is why



we call this place and time, a workshop."

Christ, our carpenter, sands and saws and chisels away at each of us, until our characters are stained by His blood and sealed by His Character. There is a poem written by Paul Warren, that I like as it describes the work of a carpenter, in this case, the carpenter Jesus.

"He selects the wood very carefully/ The grain and color so beautifully/ Looking along the edge it's straight/ And feeling it, it has a good weight/ Remember to measure twice and cut once/ Is the rule of thumb before you pounce/ He knows the work and the craftsman's tools/ As He saws, planes and sands to carpenter's rules/ The joints are a woodworker's art and a pleasure to see/ When glued together with strong and straight it will be/ The last piece of the Carpenter's work is at hand/ To finish is to wax the wood for a look that's grand."

Thoughtful words. I sometimes forget that Jesus was a carpenter. Fortunately, the psalmist didn't forget: Unless the Lord builds the house, those who build it labor in vain. Psalm 127:1

May we gladly lay on the workshop table that belongs to our loving Carpenter, Jesus. May we welcome the necessary sanding, cutting, and waxing, till our Great Carpenter's Character glows in each of us each day.

A Balanced Perspective

Most likely, you have had moments in your life when you questioned if things were truly worth it. To be sure, these moments were probably not moments of great answers to prayer in which God showed Himself to be God. These moments were probably not when the bank account had more than sufficient funds to meet the immediate

demands. Nor were these times when God gave you the amazing privilege to lead a soul to Him. These were times when nothing seemed to be going right.

A man by the name of David can truly identify with this reality, and he recorded much of his feelings in the book of Psalms. One of the reasons we love studying Psalms is because of the candor with which the various psalmists wrote. They

wrote what we often think. David was appointed by God to be the next king of Israel. This was not the result of some selfish ambition or aspiration of David; this was God's choosing. But the years leading up to his eventual assuming the throne were anything but favorable. He was forced to flee into the wilderness and live in undesirable locations. He was not granted the privilege of any degree of security, including the place



from where his next meal might come. As we read through the book of Psalms, we find many examples of the inward struggles this man faced.

But David balanced these struggles with the reality of who God is and what God does. He wrote, "The steps of a good man are ordered by the LORD: and he delighteth in his way" (Psalm 37:23). He acknowledged that every step he took was ordered by God. Therefore, God knew all that he was experiencing, including the internal struggles that perhaps nobody else knew. Contrary to what some have erroneously concluded, God is good. Inasmuch as His actions flow from His nature all that He does is good. James 1:17 reminds us, "Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, and cometh down from the Father of lights, with whom is no variableness, neither shadow of turning." Therefore, we can face challenges with the confidence that God will turn everything into something beneficial for my life (Romans 8:28).

Are you struggling today? Keep a balanced perspective by remembering it's not your problem; it's God's! Serve Him faithfully; His plan is always best.



Throughout my years in ministry, I've discovered that living by faith requires us to take risks because God's plans for us are always bigger than what we could ever do on our own. I love Ephesians 3:20, which says that God "is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us" (NIV).



The bottom line is anybody who is not willing to risk anything will never do much in this world. I know this is true from personal experience.

When God put it in my heart to start teaching a home Bible study, I had a fulltime job and made good money, so we didn't have any financial pressure. But I didn't know the Bible very well and needed more time to study. I couldn't do that with a full-time job and three children, and I knew God was speaking to my heart to quit my job.

Now I'm a responsible person, and that didn't make any sense to me because our bills would exceed our income if I didn't work. So, I bargained with God and quit my full-time job but got a part-time job.

It's like I was telling God, "I don't want to do that, but how about I do this?

I'm still obeying You, but I've got a back-up plan." But God didn't want part-time obedience! I had to let go of my back-up plan and learn to trust Him completely.

Well, I got fired from my part-time job. I was a good worker and yet I couldn't do anything right at that job. It became obvious that God wanted me to totally trust Him and stay home full-time.

At that time, we were short \$40 a month to pay our bills. It wasn't a huge sum of money, but it meant we needed to believe God for a miracle every single month to meet our needs. And I had to take a step of faith to do that.

You know, sometimes we think when we take a big step of faith, God is just going to shower us with blessings right away. It's easy to have the attitude, "Look at this sacrifice I made today. I can't wait to see what God is going to do for me tomorrow!"

But for six years, we had to trust God to provide for our most basic needs. I found a journal where I had written a prayer list to God, asking for 12 new wash rags and a new skillet. I can't even tell you how excited I got when the doorbell rang one day and a woman I didn't really know was there and she said, "I hope you don't think I'm crazy, but I felt like God told me to bring you 12 new wash rags."

When you're learning to trust God, and He does something for you—even if it's a tiny thing—that's what prepares you to believe for bigger things later on in your life.

I didn't know then why I had to go through all those hard things, but I know now. In the ministry we have today, we need a lot more than \$40 a month to pay the bills. And God is faithful to provide everything we need! Our bills are paid on time and we aren't in debt.

I don't think that anybody will ever do anything of any magnitude without going through some tests. If you're going to live by faith, it means you'll have to take step one before you know what step two is. And you won't have everything figured out before you move forward, doing what you can do to follow God's plan for your life.

The amazing thing is that you get so close to God when all you have to depend on is Him. And that's when life is really adventurous and exciting!

I want to encourage you today to refuse to settle for a life that doesn't fulfill God's plans for you. Don't let the devil discourage you with his lies, telling you that you can't do it or you're not good enough for God to use you.

It's so important for you to see yourself the way God sees you, because what you believe about yourself is much more important than what anybody else believes about you. When you really know He loves you, then you can boldly approach God's throne of grace with confidence, knowing Jesus will give you grace to help you in your time of need (Hebrews 4:16).


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
