Redeemed!

Genesis 3:3 But of the fruit of the tree which is in the midst of the garden, God hath said, Ye shall not eat of it, neither shall ye touch it, lest ye die.

Psalm 103:4 Who redeemeth thy life from destruction;

Psalm 103:4 Who redeemeth thy life from destruction; who crowneth thee with lovingkindness and tender mercies;



You are busily poking into an old box full of musty papers when you spy an aged piece of parchment that resembles the Declaration of Independence. Imagine the thrill of discovering that the \$2.48 you paid transforms into \$477,650 because that dusty tattered paper turned out to be the 36th copy of 200 copies that Congress ordered from William J. Stone back in 1820. A hopelessly forgotten document is redeemed out of obscurity and uselessness and into the light and enjoyment of a whole nation, bringing fame and fortune.

Redeemed! What a glorious word that gathers despair and flings it to the farthest corners of the universe! We, as Christians, are rescued, released, delivered,
and retrieved from our prisons. No longer a slave to our own minds or the whims
of others, we dance to the pulse of His love, throwing back our heads and laughing with the sheer joy of freedom. Christ is our Redeemer, for "in him we live,
and move, and have our being" according to Acts 17:28. He not only redeems us
from destruction as Psalm 103:4 (above) shouts triumphantly, but He allows the
power of it to gild with golden hues the negatives of our lives.

- 1. He redeems our pain, infusing it with purpose. Jeremiah 29:11
- He rescues us from vindictive attacks by friend and foe, declaring eternal triumph over them. Exodus 15:21
- 3. And He delivers us out of our sin when we turn to Him, declaring us a precious jewel to any who would dare malign us and claiming us unreservedly as the apple of His eye. Zachariah 2:8

To be redeemed embodies all of freedom's thrill, the heart-racing surge of being snatched from the jaws of evil, and the breath-taking passion of discovering Him. Psalm 103:4 declares that God redeems our lives from destruction. By definition, "lives" includes our actions, character, innermost thoughts, passions, words, and influences that define us. When God redeems these things, He crafts an heirloom tapestry of our lives that reveals the beauty of His grace and love.



Like the Bargello quilt I saw hanging in a local sewing store, the intricacies and beauties of its design delight the ones who treasure this gift for generations. When God redeems our mistakes, He creates a masterpiece of His grace and mercy, bringing immense value to our lives.

Even in the microscopic details of our poor choices, God redeems that single tiny sinful word that complicates our lives and thwarts His redeeming power. During Eve's conversation with the devil in Genesis chapter 3:3, she added a word to God's instructions about not eating of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. She said that God had told them not to TOUCH the fruit when, in fact, He did not instruct them so. This darkened God's words and may have allowed the devil to accuse God of being unreasonable according to Dr. C. Wieland, Managing Director of Creation Ministries International on his website: www.creation.com Whatever the reason, Jesus, in His love and mercy, took her word, stained with sin, and redeemed it in the New Testament. Three of the five women whose stories of miraculous healing are told for all eternity involve the use of touch.

- Peter's Mother-In-Law was sick, and Jesus touched her hand according to Matthew 8:14-15.
- The woman with the issue of blood touched the hem of His garment according to Luke 8:43-48.
- 3. And, Jesus laid his hands on the crippled woman in Luke 13:10-17. How amazing that God decided to include this tiny word in the stories of healed women that He chose for His eternal Word! It is as if He is saying that even though we try to alter our lives in our own way, God redeems our choices, miraculously healing and blessing us when, in fact, we actually deserve His condemnation for twisting His truths to fit our own agenda. God is redeeming Eve's sin in our lives today as we, like her, choose, wrong words, twist the truth, and create our own agendas. He takes our words and changes them into words of beauty and love, awash with His majesty and power. And we walk in the light of the power of redemption!

Just as Michael Sparks, the Tennessee native who redeemed the 36th copy of the Declaration of Independence revealed the magnificence and importance of this rare and valuable find, so our Maker and Savior redeems us from the dust of defeat and the pit of despair, anointing us with His love and mercy and conferring upon us the title of "adopted son"! You Must Obey God

There is nothing more fundamental to the Christian faith than the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

The Apostle Paul said: "For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures" (1 Corinthians 15:3-4).



So, great is our sin that the greatest act in all of history—the brutal crucifixion of our Savior, and the glorious power of His resurrection that proclaimed Christ's triumph over sin and death—was necessary to save us from its penalty of eternal death.

Every New Testament apostle witnessed the risen Christ, along with more than 500 contemporaries.

When Peter stood in Jerusalem immediately following the outpouring of the Holy Spirit on the Day of Pentecost, he preached the cross of Christ and thousands were converted. Soon after, while preaching at Solomon's Colonnade, Peter was arrested by the temple guard and hauled off to jail because the apostles were "teaching the people and proclaiming in Jesus the resurrection from the dead" (Acts 4:2).

When warned not to speak again in the Name of Jesus, Peter and John replied,
"We cannot but speak of what we have seen and heard" (Acts 4:20). There was absolutely no way the disciples of the Messiah would ever stop talking about the most marvelous, supernatural event in history.

When officials sought to obstruct their obedience to Christ, the apostles made it clear that they would always obey Christ rather than man. Their allegiance and loyalty to the risen Savior superseded the laws of men who sought to restrict the clear command of the Lord to go and preach the Gospel to all nations.

So it is today.

While believers in Christ are commanded to pray for all those in authority, and to honor the Lord by obeying the laws of the land, the Scriptures also make it clear that the exception is when those laws violate the principles of God's Word. We are citizens of two kingdoms, the civil kingdom of this world as well as the heavenly kingdom. "But our citizenship is in heaven, and from it we await a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ" (Philippians 3:20). As citizens of that heavenly kingdom, our allegiance lies with the kingship of the Risen Christ, to whom belongs all rule and authority and might and dominion.

That is the principle that 72-year-old grandmother Barronelle Stutzman follows as she stands by her firm religious conviction to decline floral design services for a gay wedding in the state of Washington. She has employed and served gay people for several years—proving she does not discriminate. However, she does not believe she should be forced to violate her sincerely held religious belief in the sanctity of marriage between one man and one woman.

Her case wound through state courts and bureaucracy for several years before finally coming to the Washington State Supreme Court in February where state justices ruled unanimously against her.

I had the privilege of meeting Barronelle last year when our Decision America Tour went to Washington. She is standing up for her faith, based on the clear teaching of Scripture, and is planning to appeal her case to the United States Supreme Court.

I admire Barronelle's resolute faithfulness to the Lord Jesus Christ and encourage you to remember her in prayer in the days and months to come. If the Supreme Court agrees to hear her case—and I certainly hope they will—the ruling
will be a landmark decision for religious liberty. Can Christians hold to their firm
convictions without being prosecuted by authorities for doing so? Will the free
exercise of religion be allowed in the public square, or only within the confines of
church walls?

In the adjoining state of Oregon, Aaron and Melissa Klein are awaiting a ruling from the Oregon Court of Appeals. In 2013, the Kleins, who owned Sweet Cakes by Melissa in Gresham, politely declined to provide a cake for a gay wedding. The Kleins were sued by the lesbian couple, and an administrative law judge assigned by the Oregon Bureau of Labor and Industries ruled against the Kleins. An egregious fine of \$135,000 was levied against Aaron and Melissa, and their business has since been forced to shutter—all of this simply because they abided by their firmly held religious belief in the sanctity of marriage between a man and a woman—the same definition held by virtually every society in the world for millennia.


Those are but two cases where civil authorities have targeted businesses run by evangelical Christians who have taken a Biblically informed stand for their religious liberties and suffered persecution and harassment. In case after case, religious freedom has been trumped by the new sexual ethic that is hostile to Christian doctrine and faith.

Christians are not protesting and interrupting same-sex marriage ceremonies. Yet many Christians do not believe it is right to participate, celebrate or engage in activity the Bible clearly defines as sin. For Barronelle and the Kleins, state laws are forcing them to go against their deeply held beliefs about marriage. They are not hostile toward homosexual persons—they simply don't want to participate in unbiblical conduct.

Like the Apostle Paul, like Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego in front of Nebuchadnezzar, they disobeyed what St. Augustine called an "unjust law."

I believe God has given our nation a brief window of opportunity to come to our senses and protect men and women who want to do nothing other than worship and follow the Lord Jesus Christ and His teachings.





Community Support

Praise God, people are beginning to recognize the importance of dealing with the drug issues head on. This region, as well as the entire state and region, are losing too many young people to this horrible disease. What's to be done, though. Many community agencies, churches, and law enforcement are beginning to come together. For some time, I have felt the faith community has been working on their own and the other entities have been



doing the same thing. Our community is coming together with a representative panel of interested people to try and come up with some directions we can all go

A meeting for Celebrate Recovery is held each Thursday at 7:00 pm at Bear Creek Church but it is not just a church ministry. It is a community effort with multiple pastors, concerned citizens, users, recovering users as well as family members.

This past Thursday, Doug and I attended and heard a heart-rending testimony from Josh Wise. (We ran his story in the paper this past January.) The response of the law enforcement so touched me. They were Christians and they were such a support for him. If we as the Christian community could wrap our minds around the fact that these are good people. They are God's children. They deserve the love and concern from us that anybody does. We never have to like or love the act, but God does expect us to love and be concerned for the person. We need to wrap our arms around these people. So often we hear from young people, how they feel inferior or left out or ... Many times, this leads to peer pressure to do things they know are wrong. Many times, they start on prescription medicine to make them "feel" better. What if some of these kids on the fringes had a person they felt comfortable with and could go to, to talk to and help them work through these issues. Sometimes parents can fill that role but not always. We as a united community need to fill that role also. Sometimes all we can do is pray, but that is essential to resolving some of these issues.

Get rid of just some of the addictions and you also solve overcrowded prisons, much of the poverty, and lower the number of children in foster care.

Some of the things each of us can do:

- 1. Help law enforcement --share if you know where some of the drugs are being passed or used. Ask them to help with your loved one if that is appropriate
- Get involved in your schools and your children's lives—know where they are, and not just physically.
- 3. Get information on what is available in our area to help
- Change attitudes on the worthiness of these individuals
- Donate time to be a mentor to a child who doesn't have that support system.
- Keep prescriptions put up and out of way of children or others

Charity House Mission (CH) is a new, non-profit organization in Burnsville. Charity House will be celebrating its two year operations with an open house on May 5th, Friday from 10 to 2pm. Please drop by and help celebrate by getting to know Charity House, and sharing with some treats. Charity House began as a vision of local Christians touched by the needs of local displaced people. Charity House has been tending to needs of Yancey, Mitchell and Avery county folks through food distribution and goods donated by the wonderful members of the

local community. When an individual or family is burned out of their home they may receive furniture, appliances and materials to help them re-establish their home. People out of work and living outdoors may receive bedding to keep them off the ground, clothing and references for work. Word is beginning to spread in the community that Charity House and



its Director, Jewell Huskins is here to help. No one has unlimited funds, however the Lord only asks us to be His hands and feet to do whatever can be done, even though it be little. Local people have given to Charity House with the vision to help those that are disadvantaged with true Christian charity. The word "homelessness" sometimes provides the picture of begging at street corners. That does not happen in our community. 

Constant worry won't do you any good



Mothers teach us that children are a precious gift from the Lord and that with a little patience they will grow up and all the little things they got into will be stories we laugh about when they are grown.

I always liked the way my mom and my wife would fight off a pack of lions for me or for our children. When it comes to protecting children there is nothing more furious than a mother's wrath. I get tickled when I am at a ball game and the dads are watching calmly, but the moms are ready to go onto the field and tell the ref a thing or two. My mom always made sure I respected adults and if I was in the wrong you better believe mama was going to spank me. However, if mama thought I was not being treated fairly, she was there to defend me. That is a mother's instinct to protect her children. I remember one time when I made a mud pie and it fit perfectly onto a neighbor's face. The only thing you could see was the poor kid's eyes peeping out through that mud. I thought I was going to get into trouble because with child in hand the other mother came down to the house to discuss what had just happened. I was looking out the window to see if I could tell what mama's reaction would be because the boy's face was still covered in mud and mama could see what I had done. Mama came in and started to laugh at the mud mask my neighbor was wearing. Mama knew what had happened and that I was taking up for my little brother. I connected with my mom that day be-

cause I knew that no matter what happens mama would have my back. Mama would make me mind and respect adults, but she would also be there for me when I was in

the right.

A mother's love is incredible. I believe it is the closest expression to God's love. I will never forget a picture I saw in the Holocaust Museum in Jerusalem. We were looking at the documentary of atrocities of the Holocaust (Hitler's persecution and annihilation of Jews during World War II) and I saw a picture of a mother holding her toddler in her arms caressing the child's cheeks making him laugh. Little did the child know he was standing in a massacre line of Jewish families just before they



were riddled with bullets from machine guns by German soldiers. But this brave mom facing the firing squad not concerned about her own life, but for a little bit of joy she could bring her child before death. I left the museum crying, knowing that a mother's love for a child is somewhat comparable to God's love for us.

God gave His only Son for us. Jesus died so we might have life. I know that my wife and mother would give their life for their children. A mother has a self sacrificing love. I think about Mary the mother of Jesus. Even though the birth of Christ is a miracle, I cannot help but think how Mary must have felt to see Jesus ffering on the cross. And while Jesus was on the cross he looked at John said "behold your mother", and the Bible says that disciple took Mary into his home and took care of her. Praise the Lord for God's incredible love we cannot explain but a love we can know through the shed blood of Jesus Christ. Upon receiving Christ as Savior and Lord, the Son looks at the Father and says behold your child, and the Father receives us into His family and patiently cares for us, protects us, and loves us unconditionally.

I would like to pay tribute to my mother-n-law, Inez Self. She is with Jesus now and we miss her terribly. Thank God for all godly mothers. We love you. "Grief, A Battle of The Mind"

"For our struggle is not against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the powers, against the world forces of this darkness, against the spiritual forces of wickedness in the heavenly places." Ephesians 6:12. We sometimes don't really see the town for the houses as the old adage says. When we are in the middle of grief, all we may see is doubt, depression, despondency,




and a foreboding sense of doom. Seldom do we identify the source of these feelings. We can't help our feelings, but we can help what we do with them. These feelings are normal, but when not examined and dealt with, they can lead to long-term problems. Grief that is not examined in the context of God's word leads to false beliefs. These false beliefs can be varied, but usually include the following: God doesn't love me; I am never going to get through this; I will never change; and I am all alone. These thoughts come from feelings that can dominate a person's life and paralyze them with fear and depression.

So where do these thoughts come from? Some thoughts come from ourselves. Some thoughts that we have are perfectly normal responses to grief. Some thoughts we have come from people, well-meaning people offering "help". Some thoughts come from Satan. I don't want you to go look under your bed for the devil tonight, or to be afraid, but at the same time you need to be aware that every thought is not your own. The thoughts that lead to suicide, self-harm, harming others, or chemical dependency come from the pit of hell. So what are we to do with these thoughts during the most difficult time of life? Well, the last source of our thoughts are God himself. God gives us His thoughts in the Bible. So how do I replace negative, destructive thoughts with God's life giving message?

2 Corinthians 10:4-6 gives us specific instructions on how to fight this battle in our minds, "4 (For the weapons of our warfare are not carnal, but mighty through

God to the pulling down of strong holds;) 5 Casting down imaginations, and every high thing that exalteth itself against the knowledge of God, and bringing into captivity every thought to the obedience of Christ; 6 And having in a readiness to revenge all disobedience, when your obedience is fulfilled." The battle begins in our minds. Before we believe everything we think, we need to follow



the instructions that God gives us especially at times when we are grieving.

Step one: Believe. "Our weapons are mighty". My God is able to do above and beyond what I ask or think. God can enable me to conquer my greatest fears, help me through my grief to a place of healing and acceptance. I place my grief in the hands of my God who created heaven and earth. He is all powerful, He is all present, and He is all knowing. He and Satan are not equals; He is mighty to save

to the uttermost, those who cry out to Him.

Step two: Battle. "Casting down imaginations and every high thing that exalts itself against the knowledge of God." We must be willing to do spiritual battle with how we think. Fear is the opposite of Faith. When I place my Faith in God, then I must take the facts and tear down erroneous, destructive thoughts. When I examine what is plaguing my mind and cast that down as false, I begin to take charge of my mind. Remember what you believe in your head becomes what you feel in your heart. That is why the Bible says, "As a man thinks in his heart so he is". Wrong thinking produces wrong actions. Right thinking produces right actions. Examine in your head what you are feeling and thinking, then cast down, or in other words throw away negative false beliefs. My question should be-does this thought reflect the knowledge of God, and His love for me? If it doesn't throw it away.

Step three: Bring it. Bring it to Jesus. Take Gods word and examine what He says, because he is the final authority in your life and not your feelings. Jesus is the great Counselor. Jesus is the great Emancipator of the faith life. Through studying His word you can change how you think and take control of your feelings. You do not have to be driven by feelings, you may be driven by facts: "and bringing into captivity every thought to the obedience of Christ;" We need to put our faith in the facts. God loves us unconditionally, God did not intend for us to suffer, but uses suffering for our good, God is in sovereign control of this world and the world to come, and God has a plan and purpose for your life.

Your life is like a train. You need to place your faith in the facts, and let your feelings be the caboose. Faith is the engine (your mind); what you believe is the direction your life goes. Facts (God's word to you through His Spirit) are the fuel which makes the engine go down the tracks. Feelings are the caboose, they need to follow behind.

You and I are in a Spiritual battle every day. If Satan can get us to belief falsehoods then he can get us to harm ourselves or others. When we take every thought captive and place it under the authority of God's word, then we will begin to see change amidst the most difficult circumstances. Remember God is on your side, fighting on your behalf.

The Promise of My Father...

"Behold, I send the Promise of My Father upon you; but tarry in the city of Jerusalem[i] until you are endued with power from on high."-Luke 24:49

Nothing excites me more than when someone brings up the power of the Holy Spirit.

In my life, there has been nothing as real and as powerful as the feeling when one is endued with the power on

high. It is understood that for some, this statement is only that, a statement of words that are indescribable since there is nothing for which they might perceive to compare it with. Now before I go any further, I want to reiterate with the utmost integrity, that this is not being boastful or prideful; it comes from the perspective as one awakening to a new feeling that until now, might have been missed or even overlooked. To understand what I mean, I must begin at the beginning. Then, and only then, we might come to have a basis for what it is to "Receive" the Holy Spirit.

In Jesus time, he repeatedly spoke to the disciples of how they would receive the Holy Spirit, the Helper, as he called it, who would be with them after he was gone. "But the Helper, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in My name, He will teach you all things, and bring to your remembrance all things that I said to you."-John 14:26

Their eyes seemed to always be on the present, unable to grasp the prophecy to which Jesus was constantly alluding. Who can blame them? Here they were in the midst of the true Son of God, the Messiah, the miracle worker. Daily they witnessed the unbelievable, every day they saw gross deformities become healed, the demon possessed cleansed, and the dead arise from their deathbeds. How could they look beyond when there were so many amazing things happening right before them? It's ironic that today, unlike those of the disciples, we are distracted by the plans of the coming day, the week ahead, the calendar, and all that must be done in the days' time. We are so focused on what is next, we too often miss what is right before us, and this is where we begin to overlook the obvious, the miracles in our lives that appear and are gone before we take the time to reflect upon them. Unlike the disciples, we cannot focus on the present, when all we do is look ahead. They were the opposite, unable to look ahead due to what was before them. Call it the irony of God.

What is the common thread between the two ironies; the presence of Jesus Christ of course?

When He is with us, we are relieved of our daily burdens. The future is a distant memory. Those distractions that kept us from our daily scripture slowly fade to dark as the light of the Word illuminates our hearts with the truth. Like those disciples, we have little concern for the future when all we need is here with us.

Yet, too many times, we slip in our walk of faith and fall back into that daily rut of trying to keep pace with the world around us. At this same time, we also miss the opportunity to accept and to recognize when we are in the presence of the Holy Spirit. We rush from one appointment, one event to the next and miss what often matters most. In these precious moments, we too often fail to accept the power from on high. When, and only when, our minds are one with God, can we fully embrace and receive Him. It is then when we are still and listening to that small voice that we are suddenly flooded from head to toe with a power so incredible, so electrifying, that one can barely keep their feet upon the very ground upon which they trod. It is then when we are overflowing with the Spirit that we find ourselves at a new and higher ground in our spiritual walk with God; greater than ever before.

Yet, this is not just something we can call upon, for it to happen. It is a power from on high, and as such, is only Heaven sent. That's why Jesus told his disciples to go to Jerusalem and wait; wait for the Holy Spirit. They were instructed to call upon the Spirit, but to wait. Although their eyes had been opened to the scriptures, they still were required to wait for the Spirit.

One can have all the knowledge, knowing, and understanding of the entire Biblical encyclopedia but without the Holy Spirit, it is just that, only knowledge. The true power to go and do His will is when the two are combined as one: The Holy Spirit with the mind of the disciple. This is what Jesus had prepared his followers for, once he was gone. He knew that without the Helper, they would be fearful of what they did not know, they would be hesitant to journey to those distant lands; therefore, they needed something that was greater than they were capable of conceiving, the Holy Spirit.

Walking with Jesus each day, we now have Him within us, as we carry the Word. With our understanding comes wisdom. Yet, it only takes us so far, we must also wait for that Spirit to be endued within each of us, lest we fall and stumble before we are ready to set out on our mission.

So now we are ready to speak of what it is to receive the Holy Spirit.

As we continue our daily walk in faith, we learn more and more about what it is to be a Christian or Christ-like. When we do, journey in our faith, we slowly awaken or become aware of things we might have overlooked that we now understand. Scriptures we once read as a matter-of-fact take on new meanings. The world around us becomes brighter, for in everything we see, we see the Creator's hand. Our senses become heightened to new realities we never understood. One of these is when we are filled with the Holy Spirit; whether we believe it or not. Now for some, the realization, or the indwelling of the Spirit comes as a shock. For them, it is an instantaneous blast of heavenly power that is absolutely, positively, without-a-doubt, the Holy Spirit. Sometimes these people, in that moment of receiving the Spirit, lose their conscious minds and fall to the floor. In these cases, there is no mistaking when that person has received the Holy Spirit. I've witnessed these before and just to be there in their presence is as powerful as their receiving; it is a moving and emotional experience for all.





Then there are the subtler occasions when we have only been induced from without by the power so subtlety that one might mistake it for a chill, rather than the Spirit. Those moments when we see the unexplainable, like the light from spirits moving before a camera when there were just seconds before and saw nothing. Or the time when someone spoke a word, then the door blew open and a cold breeze wisped across your feet. Or the time when you felt the hand upon your shoulder pull you back, just as you were about to step off the curb just as the out of control car blew passed where you were about to step. When you turned to thank them, there was nobody there. These are the events that might escape our perception if we are not one with Him. Many explain them away as mere coincidence while others bring in the pagan beliefs of ghosts or hauntings. The realization of the truth escapes them. It is not until they call on His name, do they start to realize what it is to be overcome with the Spirit.

In time, we eventually awaken to the Holy Spirit. It is then, in those rare moments when we finally recognize that surge of voltage through our core, that shakes the nerve endings into a tingling sensation that almost lifts us off the floor; these are the God knowing moments when your world changes forever; the enduing. Those who have felt it sometimes cannot explain it. Like Ezekiel trying to explain what he couldn't understand in the vision of the Heavenly being, there are God things that are beyond our comprehension. We only can explain what we know, and in that manner, our words are sometimes not enough.

Many have felt the presence of the Lord, and in various forms. Their stories are a testimony to the power of believing.

A good friend and brother in Christ, Doug Stuart, experienced the power of the Spirit at a time when he needed it the most; his mother's funeral. Doug was preparing to sing and speak at her service when he was suddenly overcome with doubt and fear. I've known Doug for several years, and to hear him say that he would be unable to speak or to perform would be unbelievable, yet there he was, moments away from failing his mother's dying wishes. At that moment, he knew there was only one thing he could do; to pray to God for strength. It was then he described what it was to feel the power of the Holy Spirit come over him, like a gentle warmth of the Heavenly Father, wrapping him in love, lifting him up and giving him the strength to carry on. Yes, God was with my friend, and within my brother. He not only sang but spoke at length of his mother's wonderful life. The son testifying for his mother, a love known like no other.

My cousin Davetta got the phone call from her mother telling her that my father had awakened out of the coma he had fallen within during one of the later hospital visits in his life. I remember that day as well. It was a miracle in and of itself. The doctors had said that they should call the family in since the end was near. Davetta said that she felt the power of the Holy Spirit come over her after that phone call. She remained lifted up from that feeling for the remainder of the day. The same thing happened when her Aunt had the same experience, she once again was endued from on high and was renewed with a feeling of Spirit so great that it literally changed each of those days in her life. She was blessed each time by the hand of the Lord.

Personally, I had felt the power of the Spirit before, but it was something that I didn't understand or able to recognize. It wasn't until I openly committed my life to following the Lord that I became aware of when the Spirit was with me. It started when I was serving at the Trail of Faith. Again, and again, there would be the tour where we would be witnessing about the story of the Waldensian people, when suddenly, never at the same place, never at the same time in the tour, the power of the Holy Spirit would come down upon myself and those around me. It wasn't something that I singularly felt because those before me would speak, shout, or sometimes cry with joy. It was an utterly rapturous experience, time and time again. There was one tour in particular that I will never forget. Pastor Rick was there with his wife and a friend. We started out early that day because the visitor had to be heading back to Michigan. Something about the tour was different from the start. We began the tour at the map inside the Visitor's Center, which was not uncommon. For special guests or tours, we often would begin the tour with a prayer. That day, the Holy Spirit came on us immediately. We continued feeling blessed already, but it wasn't the end of the story. Sporadically as we made our way down the trail we would stop and pray, each time, once again, the Spirit came down. Each time it happened, the power grew greater. The final time, we stopped in the parking lot as they were about to depart and said a final prayer. It was then I felt as if I were being lifted off the ground, so great was the electric continued on page 13 surge through my body. The hands of those I held could feel it through me as well. It was something to behold, and something that I'll never soon forget.

However, this was not to be the last. God's plan was not yet finished.

Before I knew it, the place I thought was to be the fulfillment of my calling turned out to be just a stepping stone.

Whenever, and wherever God leads, once you begin the journey, you must go.

No matter the circumstance, no matter the location, there is purpose in everything
we do.

So, when they day came that I found myself employed part-time at the Ski Slope in Blowing Rock, I had to shake my head in bewilderment. Somewhere in that place, there was a purpose for my being there other than to pay for affordable ski lift tickets for my children. Within a few hours of my second day, the purpose was unveiled, and eventually, I would find a brother in Christ in need. Week after week, we came to know one another and in that time, when we would spend extended lunch sessions studying scripture, there He was once more with us. In that dimly lit corner of the ski lodge, brother's in arms became united in spirit, being filled from on high by the one true Spirit. We found purpose and another brother found his calling. More than once as we witnessed to each other, and soon, those around us, we both felt the power of the Holy Spirit moving in one of the unlikeliest of places.

In my journey, there is one thing I have discovered. You may never know when and where it will happen, but one thing is for sure, to witness to others is one of the best ways to make it happen.

As one of the last final commands by Jesus to his disciples was to fulfill the great commission, to go unto all foreign lands after having been endued with the Holy Spirit, making disciples for Christ. "But you shall receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you shall be witnesses to Me in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth." — Acts 1:8

We too, are to go out into the world once we have truly received Christ into our hearts, and having been filled with the Holy Spirit. It is our purpose and our calling as Christians to go and witness the wondrous truth of God's love and the victory we have over death when we follow the one who died for all our sins.

We have a choice. Allow the Holy Spirit to fill you to overflowing, and when you have received, go forth and share.

You'll never look back.

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

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SAF-T at Mitchell County SafePlace

Mitchell County SafePlace was established 22 years ago as a safe refuge for victims of domestic violence and sexual assault. Since its beginning SafePlace has been sensitive to the need for victims to be able to save their animals from

the retaliation that is often inflicted on them by the abuser after the family flees. We had an agreement with Mitchell County Animal Rescue to board these pets while the family was in shelter as we feared liability issues surrounding having these animals at the shelter. That all changed in November of 2007.

Marsha Welch was a frequent caller to our 24hour hotline. Often intoxicated, (many DV victims self-medicate with alcohol or drugs to try to escape the pain) Marsha would talk about the abuse she was experiencing at the hands of her live-in boyfriend. She never asked for shelter or any type of intervention, and it seemed to many of us that she just wanted someone to know she was there. Many times, SafePlace staff became so concerned for her

that we called law enforcement to go and check on her. In the summer of 2006 Marsha was assigned to do community service at SafePlace due to a recent DUI conviction. One of our advocates worked shoulder to shoulder with her cleaning out the basement of our offices. Little by little, Marsha began to open up to this advocate and soon Marsha admitted that she was indeed a victim of domestic violence, but she was unwilling to come into shelter because she could not be separated from her beloved dog. At the end of that summer Marsha had com-

pleted her required service, but she continued to come by and visit bringing baked goods for the staff

In late November of 2007, we received word that Marsha was missing. Her boyfriend told law enforcement that she had left him and he didn't know her whereabouts. Law enforcement was immediately suspicious because Marsha would have never left without her dog. After months of diligent investigation and rigorous

interrogation the boyfriend admitted that Marsha was indeed dead and where they could find her body. After a three year delay the case finally came to trial, the boyfriend pled guilty and he was sentenced to over 30 years in prison.

Soon after Marsha's death, Patricia Beam of MCAR approached us with the question, "Would it have made a difference if Marsha could have brought her dog with her to the shelter? "Sadly, we had to admit that it may have. So, we set about researching how we could alleviate those liability issues and setting up our protocol. Patricia arranged for the donation of a kennel and by the end of 2008 Mitchell County SafePlace was certified as an official SAF-T (Sheltering Animals and Families-Together) program. There are only 4 in the state of North Carolina. Although Marsha's death was tragic, she lives on in the hearts of all of us who knew her, and she is directly responsible for many women and children surviving domestic violence. In the words of the mother of our first SAF-T Client Sparkplug, "After all the love he has given me, I owe it to Sparkplug to not give up and to go on."

Dear Friends,

As late as March of this year I believed I was a country boy. My home is Hendersonville, NC, a nice town of 20,000+ only 1 1/2 hours away. But my perspective changed dramatically in late March when I came to spend a few months with my friends Doug and Barbara Harrell at Harrell Hill Farm near Bakersville.

Doug and I go back more than twenty years, I was executive vice president for GTE Corporation (now Verizon) and Doug was a technology marketer. A "country boy" who done good is the way I often thought of me.

Well let me tell you, I have learned some valuable and unforgettable lessons since arriving in the real 'country' ... I've worked on the farm now for nearly six months and experienced things which could only happen in a Chevy Chase film -

Anyway, if y'all will tolerate me I want to share some of my hair-raising farm stories. We'll call them "Clint's Chronicles on the Funny Farm" - names will be changed to protect the innocent, and chances are I may exaggerate the facts a wee bit. It will go something like this:

Clint's Chronicles on the Funny Farm

A Beast in The Beans!

'Twas a beautiful day at Harrell Hill Farms, crystal clear sky, a torrid 93 degrees as I headed for the garden to harvest a couple bushels of blue lake bush beans. I had been nearly devoured by ticks and yellow jackets the day before - the most aggressive microscopic critters on earth. So, I donned my overalls, long-sleeve shirt and high boots for an adventure in the bean patch.

Now what I found growing there I thought was a string bean but have since learned that there is no longer a string. just a snap. That was a pretty big disappointment to me,

although I'm not sure why. Just so many new farm facts in my head these days I can hardly catalog them all!

Doug told me this was backbreaking work - that I might want to take a threelegged stool along for more comfortable picking. Well I did that but we'd had an inch of rain overnight and the three legs kept getting mired in the dirt so it was breaking my back moving the stool around; I tossed it aside. Besides, I've been on the farm 3 months now, have lost 63 pounds of chubby and ten inches in the waistline. I am fit like a fiddle, strong like a bull, poised and ready to again demonstrate my agricultural prowess.

I was hunched over piles and piles of bush beans, enjoying solitude with the Lord, the land, and the garden. A gentle breeze cooled my sweat soaked clothes, and I was humming praise songs and talking to Jesus. What a wonderful day He

It is important, mind you, that I remain vigilant while harvesting these succulent little pods. For I know that bees, spiders, snakes and other killer vermin can attack without warning. It's simply one of the hazards of being Farmer Clint, yet one I gladly embrace. I chuckled to myself as I thought of the Scripture, "Be self controlled and alert. Your enemy the devil prowls around like a roaring lion looking for someone to devour." 1Peter 5:8. Not that I expected a lion, although a hungry bear was not out of the realm of possibility. Regardless, a farmer cannot be too careful.

Somewhere, about mid-bean-row, I heard a soft rustling in the sorghum cane field. I figured it must be a deer since they had been eating virtually every other crop we'd planted at Harrell Hill Farms. I never knew deer are such destructive beasts and was praying that he wouldn't come over and eat all the beans. It was such a glorious day, I continued to pick and pray, to pick and hum, to pick and thank God for the joy of being one with the farm.

Then, from nowhere and from everywhere a HUGE monster burst from the perimeter of the cane field. .. I heard it coming, running, stomping, growling, moaning - inhuman groans akin to those portrayed in Steven King novels. I stood my ground, poised for war, girded for battle, prepared to lose my life for the blue lake bush bean patch...then I FELT IT, it was on me!

My head dropped quickly, so quickly in fact that my straw hat fell to the ground. And there, I mean right there, moving across my steel-toed boots was the ugliest monster I've ever met. It was BIG...it was BROWN...it had teeth like a SHARK...I screamed like a girl...it looked at me, made some guttural sound and



darted away. My friends, in the midst of picking beans and praising God I stood shoulder to shoulder with my very first KILLER GROUNDHOG. (Okay, maybe not shoulder to shoulder but he was a whopper!)

I always thought groundhogs were like prairie dogs, or tiny and cute like Chip and Dale. Well, now I know...they resemble Simba, or Aslan, or King Kong, or any number of other prehistoric beasts. (You laugh yet you are reading this from the comfort of your easy chair, not staring Godzilla in the face).

I had spilled beans from one end of the garden to the other; lost my threelegged stool, tripping over and destroying many tomato plants, stumbling through young broccoli spears and squishing most of the tender beet sprigs... I jumped into my farm truck - an 1801 vintage Jeep but that's a story for another day - and slammed the door.

My heart was pounding like a sack full of angry opossums, my blood pressure sky high, I'm not sure I had taken a breath during the battle for the blue lake bush bean patch. Yet after a half hour or so, I again sensed the peace of the Lord; all was well with my soul; the monster had slithered into the woods.

I dismounted my jeep and resumed the harvest of blue lake bush beans - confident that I had survived yet another test on the Funny Farm.

Authentic Life And Liberty

Few Americans truly understand to what degree our way of life is being challenged. We are threatened by forces from without, but worse still by forces from within. Our greatest problems are intellectual and moral. Now more than ever we need to connect with those principles that made us who we are, and one of the most important is freedom.

Too often we have consciously and unconsciously

misinterpreted freedom. We seemingly have come to believe it means we can do whatever we want, whenever we want, and wherever we want. We have come to believe that it means no limitations on our thoughts, our words, our behavior, and that this lack of limitation is the essence of freedom.

Jesus spoke about freedom. The Scriptures say, "Then said Jesus to those Jews which believed on him, If ye continue in my word, then are ye my disciples indeed; And ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free" (John 8:31, 32).

Nothing speaks to the issue of liberty more than the Gospel of Christ. Central to its message is that Christ is the great Emancipator. His sacrifice on the Cross provides an internal freedom – freedom from the enslaving power of our broken inner natures – freedom from sin and its penalty, which is death and judgment.

Jesus also said, "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me because he hath sent me...to set at liberty them that are bruised" (Luke 4:18).

Our nation's founders were keenly aware that both the moral ethic of civil liberty and the Christian reality of spiritual liberty were interlocked. History reveals that stable democratic republics in the West were largely drawn from the wellspring of minds and hearts who had embraced the internal liberty that they had come to know in Jesus Christ. The liberty of the Gospel was essentially the spark that lit the fires of the American idea.

Constantly today it seems that a new revolution of some kind is being announced. What we really need in this country, however, is to get back to that driving force which was behind the American Revolution.

What was it? The answer comes as a surprise to many. It was the firm conviction that if Christ would die to set men free to live for him — what right did the King of England have forcing people to live and die for the British crown? Thus, one of the great cries of the American colonies was, "No King, but King Jesus!"

When Daniel Webster in 1851 was reviewing the great history of our nation, he noted this connection between the spiritual and the civil. "Let the religious element in man's nature be neglected," he wrote, "Let him be influenced by no higher motives than low self-interest, and subjected to no stronger restraints than the limits of civil authority, and he becomes the creature of selfish passions or blind fanaticism...On the other hand, the cultivation of the religious sentiment represses licentiousness...inspires respect for law and order, and gives strength to the whole social fabric, at the same time that it conducts the human soul upward to the Author of its being."

A hundred years after Webster, Charles Malik, Ambassador to the United Nations from Lebanon affirmed the same, saying, "The good in the United States would never have come into being without the blessing and the power of Jesus Christ...I know how embarrassing this matter is to politicians, bureaucrats, businessmen and cynics: but, whatever these honored men think, the irrefutable truth is that the soul of America is at its best and highest Christian."

There is an old story about a kite that wanted to be free. He was thrilled the day his master took him out, and he caught the wind and was raised high above the earth. But before long he realized he could fly only so far. His master had quit letting out the string.

"Why am I held back like this?"
he fretted. "If you think I am high
in the sky now, if I could only be let
loose and be given my freedom, then
I would show them how high I could

One day while the kite was fretting in this manner, the string broke. The kite wavered for a minute or two, was blown from side to side, then suddenly it turned topsy-turvy and came floating down, unable to right itself. Finally, it was swept by a strong wind against an electric light line and there it hung helplessly suspended, all tattered and torn. Its freedom was its



It is a false freedom that leaves people at liberty to do whatever they want, whenever they want, wherever they want; true freedom is being tied tightly to our moorings.

Jesus taught that there is a framework to liberty – a group of principles and laws within to which we must adhere. More importantly, Jesus said that he was the embodiment of those principles and the very fulfillment of those laws. To know him is to know the truth, and to know the truth is to be free indeed.

William R. Inge has wisely said, "Christianity promises to make men free, but it never promises to make them independent."

The sacrifice of our own wills, death to ourselves, for God's sake and that of our fellowman is what results in authentic life and liberty.

On the way home, we talked of the many memories we have of the past. Mi-




what they mean to me.



Hundreds gather annually for Run For Holland's 5K and 10K race each Spring. The race is designed to both raise awareness and funds for the local disabled community. To date, over \$31,000 have been granted to various organizations. The size and purpose of grants differ based on the need of the organization. Here are just some of the amazing projects made possible



through their grants: Camp Funshine was able to put on four seasonal events for the disabled community, Intermountain Children's Services, Inc. used a grant to purchase screening tools to assess learning and maximize each child's abilities, Gouge Elementary and Greenlee Primary both were able to purchase SMART

Boards to aid in creative lessons that can adapt to individual learning styles, while Mitchell-Yancey Partnership For Children received a grant to acquire toys specifically designed to promote sensory stimulating activities. These were all made possible by the generous local Sponsors and proceeds from the race fees. Run For Holland was started by Adam and Brooke Burleson in 2014. Just five months into their pregnancy they received a test result that indicated a 99% chance that their baby girl would be born with Down Syndrome. Scared and uncertain, with support from family and friends they pressed on with a new outlook. One of the resources their Genetic Counselor provided was a short story titled, "Welcome to Holland" By Emily Perl Kingsley. It's a story that describes their journey like that of a couple who planned a dream trip to Italy only to find themselves in Holland. While at first, the couple was questioning why they were sent to Holland while all their friends were celebrating their trips to Italy, they realized that Holland wasn't a horrible place. It was just a different place. Everyone they knew was busy coming and going to Italy. "And the pain of that will never, ever, ever, ever go away... because the loss of that dream is a very very significant loss. But... if you spend your life mourning the fact that you didn't get to Italy, you may never be free to enjoy the very special, the very lovely things ... about Holland." And with the reading of that story, the Burleson's decided to name their lovely daughter Holland. But when you run for Holland, you're not just running for their Holland but for every family that has and will travel to Holland when they thought they were going to Italy. How to Build a Home and a Church Psalm 127

There is much talk today of finding new ways to make the Church strong and vigorous. The reason being, "the more we are together the stronger we will be." This makes good sense in the eyes of the world. This is good business practice, companies uniting to pool their resources and to cut down



their overhead expenses. This would be an excellent idea, except for one fact -the Church is not a business. In the eyes of God, and in the light of the Scriptures, it is the Body of Christ. The unity already exists within the Body. The Church is not an organization but an organism. There is also only one Body. Just as Jesus is the way, the truth, and the life so the Church is the Body. Improvement to a body does not come from without, but from within. A good medical doctor does not treat the symptoms of a man's illness as individual items to be dealt with one at a time. He examines the symptoms and uses them as a guide to help him diagnose the illness. Successful diagnosis is essential to successful treatment.

One other important thing to remember is that the Lord builds His Church with families-and not with individuals. This is something we seem to have forgotten these days-the importance of the family in the life of the Church. I have been much impressed lately, as I have been in the Orient, to see the way many of the pastors and missionaries have been gripped with this idea. They concentrate on winning families to Christ. This is their aim, their prayer and their whole purpose. A church is as strong as its families are strong. Notice the importance of the Christian home in the days of the early Church-the home was the Church. They had no special buildings set aside to be used for church worship and church activities. The church met in the home. Romans 16:3 and 5 We need to distinguish between the Church, the one Church, the one Body of Christ and the church, the local group meeting in the local building, which is a part of the Body of Christ. Recognizing then the importance of the home, we need to find out what the Bible has to say about it. Any truth and teaching from the Scriptures which will help strengthen the home is vital to the life of the church. Psalm 127 has much to say in this connection. We can link this Psalm once more with the words of our Lord. If we can only get the risen Christ in the home, and keep Him in the home, and see His relevance to the day-by-day running of the home-then blessing is inevitable in all areas. This Psalm begins with the most important truth in building a home: "Except the Lord build the house, they labor in vain that build it." It is a truth so simple in its telling, but so difficult in the doing. This verse is teaching us that there is only one builder in the home, and that builder is God. In like man-


ner, there are those who are called laborers-the husband and the wife. It is at this initial point that we can see the seeds of all future failure in a Christian home. There is only one builder. He devised the plans be-cause He is the architect as well as the builder. He knows exactly what He wants to do in the lives of the Christian couple. So often in the early



days of a marriage there is a silent, secret struggle for power. Failure is inevitable if there is not one Builder and two laborers. Because God is always building, then we must be always laboring. If you do not keep on laboring, then it will be in vain. The only way to build a successful Christian home is to work at it, and keep on working at it! I want to suggest three special areas in which the laboring must be absolutely sincere and kept up to date.

First there must be "a continual application to the task at hand letting the Lord be the builder. The second special area is in "a continual adjustment to circumstances." These are the circumstances that make up the stuff of daily living. The adjustment can be a development in the boring things of life, a continuing experience in the ordinary, Faith can always claim and hold fast the promises of God. In Corinthians 15 Verse 58 of this same chapter provides an appropriate verse for our present line of thinking: "Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labor is not in vain in the Lord." Notice, it is the work of the Lord-the One who is the builder, and your labor is not in vain! There is a third special area in which the laboring must be constant. This follows on from that with which we have just been dealing. It is "a continual acceptance of situation." Psalm 127: 1 says, "Except the Lord build the house, they labor in vain that build it." The Lord is always building, but are you always laboring?

Many of the people of Jamaica are fortunate if the can have 1 meal a day. Many don't get that and yet they come to Church and Praise the Lord for His Blessings. We as God's people here in America ought to be ashamed to complain about anything! God truly has blessed us and we should be willing to share Him both at home and around the world!

Your Works Testify

"But the testimony which I have is greater than the testimony of John; for the works which the Father has given Me to accomplish — the very works that I do — testify about Me, that the Father has sent Me." (John 5:36)

Jesus was speaking to the Jews who were seeking to kill Him because He claimed to be equal with God, and He was giving them "evidence", in a sense, that He really was who

He claimed to be. He referred to the testimony of John in :33, but then He added here that there was a greater testimony to who He was: "the works which the Father has given Me to accomplish — the very works that I do — testify about Me ...". Jesus was able to point to His works to prove that He was who He claimed to be.

This should occasion some soul-searching among those who claim to be God's people today. Are you really what you claim to be? Are you really a Christian? If this is true, what does it say about the validity of your claim to be a follower of Christ? Just like Jesus, it's not merely what you SAY about yourself that proves who you really are, but what you DO. Jesus' works testified clearly and consistently that He was truly the Son of God. What do your works testify about you?


As I read this I remember John Newton's apt words: "Although my memory's fading, I remember two things very clearly: I am a great sinner and Christ is a great Savior."



God's Design for Marriage

Mark 10:7-8 "For this cause shall a man leave his father and mother, and cleave to his wife; and they twain shall be one flesh: so then they are no more twain, but one flesh."

God has a design for marriage. When you get ready to build a house, you find the proper blue-print that sketches out the design you have in mind for your dwelling. God's plan is always best. Though men may cling to plans devised in their own mind, the wise person will seek to discover what God's arrangement might be by looking into the Word of God.

Actually, God reiterates the truth of Mark 10:7-8 in three other passages. It is found in Genesis 2:24; Matt. 19:5; and Ephesians 5:31. This statement is found once in the Old Testament and three times in the New Testament. The Holy Ghost sees to it that there is one mention of it before man fell into sin, and three times after the fact.

God gives a once and for all blue print for having a good marriage. It is one thing to have a marriage and another thing to have a good one.

Too many marriages today are experiencing unhappiness, hostility and turmoil. It is true not only of lost people, but also of people who say they are saved and love the Lord. Their failure to follow God's blueprint is a major reason why so many relationships are not working efficiently today.

Our text verse can be divided into three different levels of study. If we summarized these three areas and divided them up, these words would apply: leaving, cleaving, and weaving.

Leaving

"For this cause shall a man leave his father and mother" Does this verse teach us we forsake or abandon our parents? Certainly not...the Bible teaches that children are to "honor" both father and mother (Exodus 20:12).

To "honor" is the opposite of forsaking or abandoning. You do not have to move a thousand miles away from your parents.

What does it mean to "leave" your parents when it comes to a marriage relationship? It suggests that you establish an adult to adult relationship with your parents. You must be more concerned about your mate's ideas, opinions, and practices than those of your parents. One must not be overly dependent upon his or her parents for affection, counsel, approval or assistance. A person needs to remove all bad attitudes toward parents or you will be emotionally tied to them no matter how far away from them you live. Leaving father and mother means you stop trying to change your mate just because your parents do not like him or her.

Living close to parents at the start of your marriage gives opportunity for nosey and over bearing parents to interfere in a marriage. A parent can be so involved in

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the life of a child that the child becomes an emotional cripple; however. that is a mistake.

Parents. when your



children are married, you should not try to run their lives. Encourage him or her to make their own decisions and to look toward the marriage partner as his primary resource of guidance, companionship and affection.

Too many today look for divorce as an easy way out. They say, "If our marriage doesn't work, we can get a divorce." There is nothing easy about divorce, especially when children are involved.

The word "leave" is also translated "forsake" in our King James Bibles. The word suggests to us there is a priority relationship once two people are married. That relationship is the husband and wife relationship.

Cleaving

"and cleave to his wife"

The word "cleave" is an interesting word. The word means "to glue or adhere or stick to something or someone." It can also mean "to bind."

Before a book is bound there are a number of separate pages. Most books are glue bound at the spine. With the glue, all of the separate pages become one book. That is a picture of what is to happen when two people are joined in holy matri-

God's preference is that a marital relationship last. I believe the Lord gives an exception clause in Matthew 19:9- "except if be for fornication" or sexual immorality. Some couples find a good marriage counselor to seek to heal a broken marriage. If there is any way possible, a couple should seek to work out differences and dissension. I recognize that sometimes it is not always possible due to deep seated emotional problems on the part of one of the marriage partners. Children should not be subject to scenes that can contribute to their emotional instability due to seeing parents fight, fuss and fume all the time. The kids have to be considered when one evaluates the longevity of a relationship.

Cleaving speaks of dependence. Marriage partners are to be dependent upon one another, not their parents, for the stability they need for daily living.

Cleaving speaks of devotion. Married people are to be devoted to each another in good times and in bad times. There is a loyalty that must not be broken as long as there is a workable relationship between a man and a woman.

Cleaving speaks of determination. People often give up too easily on relationships. It helps to possess a resolve you are going to do all you can do to make your relationship what it ought to be by God's divine assistance. Determination alone is not sufficient, but it does help promote longevity.

Weaving "And they twain shall be one flesh, so then they are no more twain but one flesh"

Knitting is a form of manual weaving. My dad worked for years in a cotton mill where the cotton strands were woven together to make material by a machine. But, there are



those who knit by intricately weaving strands together by their hands. It is called

Recently I was in a rest home and one of our members was sitting in her chair manually, with her own hands, weaving or crocheting a baby blanket. All the strands were becoming one beautiful baby blanket.

How does this come about in marriage? First, the couple should realize they are a team. Do what you do for the sake of the other person. Be concerned about the other persons needs, whatever they may be.

Secondly, they should share as much as possible together. They share their possessions, bodies, ideas, abilities, problems, successes, sufferings, failures and whatever else might be added to this list. Sharing is an evidence of caring.

Thirdly, don't let differences hinder your unity. Husbands and wives can be different in so many ways. Differences should not hinder unity in marriage because it is God's will and plan that there be unity in the marital bond.

Fourthly, live a holy life and avoid sinning. Sin destroys relationships. It will not bring you together, it will certainly divide. When sin entered the Garden of Eden, Adam and Eve hid in the garden. There is no need to try to hide sin from the Lord. He has an all-seeing eye- He knows. Sins like pride, selfishness, bitterness, ingratitude, harshness, cruelty, unhealthy speech, impatience and a host of other things destroys the oneness of husbands and wives.

Realize God's design for marriage and work within that divine plan.

"As a graduate from the Cleveland Institute of Art, I've taught and worked in clay for over 50 years and am looking forward to an exciting event this June."

Galen Sedberry is another following in a parent's "footsteps." Galen will be showing in his new studio—Sedberry Pottery—with Ken (#51). "My interest in clay peaked during a year off from college when I began helping my father in his studio and learning the basics of throwing, glazing and firing. I returned to college, received a degree in Appropriate Technology, and after several years, my hands have found their way back to clay."

From the Penland area, Tom Jaszczak (#79) joins the tour in his resident artist studio at the Barns on the Penland School of Crafts campus. "My pots are minimal and are rooted in the traditional Minnesota pottery I grew up admiring, I want my work to be paired down to the essentials emphasizing the fundamentals of pots and


be truly useful. Form communicates a pots gesture; it speaks of utility, my pots reference common shapes and engage one's imagination."



There is nothing like a Godly Mother. They are always there for you and they never seem to forget the things you like. My mom was a Godly lady, she kept the family in line and in church all the time, because she loved God so much. Each night she would read me Bible Stories and pray for

me at bed time. She taught Sunday School for over 40 years, and I have many years of her notes that she used to teach Sunday School. I am so thankful that my mom was always faithful to God and God's House. Through her faithfulness, she showed me how important it is to place your Faith and Trust in God, in all things that happen in life, whether they are big or small.

Then about eight years ago on an Easter Sunday, we were having a cookout that evening at my parents' house. My mom loved to eat steaks cooked on the grill. She looked at me and she said, "you tell Steve I want mine cooked medium." I thought she was just joking when she said, "tell Steve to cook it medium," because I was Steve. I said, Mom I am Steve, and she said, no you are not, and I said, "yes mom I am." At that time, my eyes were opened and I saw something was happening to my dear mom. I'll never forget the confusion and hurt I felt the day my mom forgot me. I know it was not her fault, but it is a disease that was starting to take control of her body called Alzheimer's. From then on, we started seeing mom go down. She would have her good days and she would remember who I was, and some days she would have bad days and forget who I was.

It hurt me to see this happening to her because she was the person I could talk to and ask her to pray for me, and she would. I remember talking to her about going to Fruitland Bible Institute when God called me to preach. She Prayed. There were times I could not find things in the Bible that I was looking for; I could call her and she would help me find them. When I was confused about church matters she would pray about them, and for God to give me knowledge on what I needed to do. She was a great inspiration to me and I believe my greatest prayer warrior. Then eight years ago as I have already mentioned, Alzheimer's hit my mom. But the most amazing thing I found out during my mom's Alzheimer's was, she never forgot how to pray. She may have forgotten me from time to time and even other people and things, but she never forgot her Lord and how to pray to Him. The reason I say this is I found myself many times just needing to talk to her about things after she developed this awful disease. I would kneel by her chair at the Brian Center and share with her my heart and how I was struggling and how I needed her to pray for me. I don't know how much she understood about what

I was telling her, but I do know when I placed my head in her lap, hurting, she would place those sweet hands on my head and pray to God for me. She may have not prayed for the things I asked her to, but she Prayed very clearly and directly to the God she knew and had lived for almost all of her life. It was great to know even though my mom may have forgotten who her son was, she never forgot her Lord.

PS. My Mom prayed for me to have a Godly Wife and I Do. Her Name Is Beverly Williams and now

NC Senate District 47

This is a busy season here at the NC General Assembly. Members of both the House and Senate work to get their bills heard in committees and voted on for passage in their respective chambers so as to meet the crossover deadline of April 27. Each bill must be passed in the Senate and the House to become law. A bill originating in the Senate must cross to the House where it works its way through the committee process before being voted on during a House session. Likewise, a House bill crosses over to the Senate to be heard in the committee(s) to which it is assigned, before being voted on in a Senate session. Some bills are not subject to the crossover deadline. These include redistricting bills for House, Senate, Congress, or local entities; ratification of amendments to the U.S. Constitution; bills introduced on the report of the House Committees on Appropriations, Finance, or Rules, for example, the bill which sets our state budget; bills providing for action on gubernatorial nominations or appointments; and adjournment resolutions of both chambers.

After the crossover deadline, bills that are eligible continue to be heard in both chambers, while work on the budget bill becomes the primary focus. Although the process is lengthier, passing the budget bill follows the process of any other bill. The House and Senate alternate, from one biennium to the next, which chamber drafts and passes the budget for consideration by the other chamber. For this biennium, the Senate will be presenting its proposed budget first. After the Senate finishes its version of the budget it is voted on by the full Senate and, when passed to the House, the same process begins again. Differences between the Senate and House budget bills are resolved in conference committees. Once these differences are resolved, each chamber again votes on the budget bill. After the bill is passed by both chambers it is submitted to the governor for signing. If he chooses not to sign the budget, he can veto it or let it become law without his signature.


Budget work is underway here in Raleigh, and will continue through at least July 1. I look forward to a final budget which funds our core priorities of education, infrastructure, and public safety. Deciding how the state spends the dollars of hard-working taxpayers is a serious undertaking and responsibility.

House considers hunting with dogs bill

My office and I have received hundreds of calls and emails from people who are opposed to House Bill 648 – Responsible Deer Hunting.

I intend to vote no on the bill if given the opportunity. The bill would give too much authority to the state Wildlife Resources Commission, which would be given rule-making authority over some aspects of hunting with dogs in our state.

House Bill 648 had been scheduled for a hearing in the House Wildlife Resources Committee on Wednesday, but the meeting was canceled. Another meeting of the committee has been called for April 24, but the agenda for the meeting had not been announced as of this writing.

People I have spoken to about the issue are concerned the bill would be a step toward ending hunting with dogs in North Carolina. I tend to agree with them. Given I support hunting with dogs and the freedom generally to hunt in our state, I cannot support House Bill 648.

A particularly interesting take on the bill came from one of my constituents in Yancey County. He noted that during the time preceding the founding of the United States, people moved to the new world in part because of the tyrannical restrictions placed on hunting in Europe.

In England, he said, only royalty and wealthy landowners could hunt. I will vote no on any bill that may move our state toward a heavily commercialized approach to hunting, which, in the long run, would lead to exclusion of those who aren't wealthy enough to afford commercial hunts.

As Ted Nugent once said: "Take your kid hunting and you won't have to hunt for your kids." Hunting feeds families and keeps them close.

French Broad EMC spreads internet

French Broad Electric has been working diligently – road by road – to spread internet service through Madison County.

They use power lines that are already in place to provide internet connectivity to people in more isolated parts of the county.

While Yancey County is already covered by internet, people in more isolated parts of Haywood County could benefit from internet connectivity as well. Perhaps the Haywood County EMC could take a look at the approach being taken by French Broad Electric.

The long session of the North Carolina General Assembly is the busiest time of the two-year cycle for the legislature. It is not widely known that you only have a small window in the two year cycle to get bills passed both chambers and signed by the governor. This is that time. Part of the fast pace of legislation is due to something called "crossover".

April 27 is the Crossover Deadline, the date by which most bills have to pass either the House or the Senate to stay alive for the remainder of the session.

Over the next week, legislative committees will be hearing numerous bills, and both chambers—House and Senate—will be holding long sessions to vote on the bills coming out of these committees. Many of the bills are noncontroversial and will pass quickly. However, in the rush to make crossover, my experience has been that some bills will receive favorable votes without full vetting. Since all bills have to pass both chambers, making crossover is just the next step in the legislative sausage-making business.

My hope and my goal is that by the time "crossover" has concluded I will have passed 8 bills out of the House Chamber. So far I have been fortunate to pass 6 bills out of the House. Three in particular are listed below.


HB 299 addresses the state health plan. It gives more autonomy to the State Treasurers office to plan for our long term obligations as a state. Our state employees and retirees are crucial to the success of our state. HB 299 will help assure that our state health plan is sustainable for the long term.

HB 353 is one of my few non health care related bills that I was fortunate to pass out of the house with almost unanimous support.

HB 353 is an act to add three areas of our state to the state park system. One of which is in my district. (Bob's Pocket in McDowell County) I believe we do need to preserve what we can in a common sense way for future generations.

HB 248 is a bill to form a study committee to exam how best for North Carolina to address the aging population. North Carolina currently ranks ninth in the nation for the size of the age 60 and older population and tenth in the nation for the age 85 and older population. From 2015 to 2035, the age 65 and older population is projected to increase sixty-seven percent (67%) and the age 85 and older population is projected to increase one hundred two percent (102%). By 2019, North Carolina will have more people that are 60 years of age and older than 21 children age 0-17. It is recommended that the Subcommittee examine the range of programs and services for older adults throughout the continuum of care. The Subcommittee is encouraged to seek input from a variety of stakeholders and interest groups including: The Division of Aging and Adult Services and the Division of Social Services, Department of Health and Human Services; the North Carolina Coalition on Aging; the North Carolina Senior Tarheel Legislature, and the Governor's Advisory Council on Aging. The needs of our seniors are vital to the long term success of our state. I look forward to hopefully getting this bill to the Governor's desk soon.

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The Inspiring Word

Thanks for returning to another publication of "The Blue Ridge Christian News" and our article "The Inspiring Word".

This month open your Bible to Matthew 7:12 and follow along as we continue with the study of "The Sermon on the Mount."

From our March article, we were blessed with an understanding of ask, seek and knock. Jesus revealed

to all of us how we should approach God and be persistent with our prayers and petitions. Our approach must be tempered though. That is where we find ourselves with this article. Notice the first word in Chapter 7 verse 12, "Therefore." It refers to something previously stated. With this thought we understand this article gives deeper clarification to the previous passage while opening a fresh perspective to every born-again believer. With your Bibles open to Matthew Chapter 7 verse 12 we read: "Therefore all things whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them: for this is the law and the prophets."

This verse clearly has a theme of equity and justice, a theme which will regulate our relationships, with God and one another. The golden rule is encompassing both economies, the O.T. and N.T.: we see the O.T. law being applied through N.T. gospel. The connection between these two, then, shows that in the practice of the golden rule Christians are to consider not only how they would be dealt with by men, but by God Himself. This elevates the understanding high above the ethics of the world. I speak to Christians because that is who the Lord spoke to as He delivered the sermon on the mount. It still applies to the body of Christ because we are His elect! We have a testimony of being born-again into a new life that is eternal and abundant. We are to follow the standard set within God's word as conviction leads us --not obligation.

Christian, how does God's word reveal His handling of His children? Would the word merciful provide the answer? The golden rule then tells you and I to treat others the way God treats us. Remember the word "therefore"— the golden rule is there for understanding what has previously been given. The lost cannot do this, they are not indwelt with the Holy Spirit. God doesn't leave you and I alone to struggle with molding our lives into this order. He provides us with a comforter. The Holy Spirit will move us according to God's word to be the people God has saved us to be. Therefore, we are expected to submit to obedience and humble ourselves to the work of the comforter. How can we expect God to be merciful with us if we are eaten up with selfishness? Let's not forget the need others have of us is the same need we have of God.

This brings us to a very necessary question; how am I to determine what is good for my neighbors? Look at our verse: "all things whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them:" Our answer can be summarized as: Whatever you consider best for yourself were you in their place, that is what you must do for others. The understanding of verse 12 is found in these three things.

(1) We must do to our neighbor what we ourselves acknowledge to be fit and reasonable, considering the discovery and understanding of the circumstances. (2)



We must consider other people on the same level with ourselves, and understand we are as responsible to them as they to us. Being saved does not make us better than anyone. We are all sinners, some are saved sinners and others are unsaved sinners. We all have come short of the glory of God. (3) We can very easily find ourselves in equal or worse condition than we find others in. All of us live under a sover-

eign God, yet it is His children who are called to be salt and light. The golden rule is a guideline for meeting that expectation.

So, does this mean we can expect to be treated by others the way we treat others? The verse doesn't say that, unfortunately many of us have read into it that very result. The lost, the immature, the selfish, the self-righteous and many others will never be able to return the grace of God until they experience or have renewed the grace of God. But, isn't that the reason our Lord has given us this directive. We can be God's grace extended to those who do not seek it, cannot ask for it and will not search it out. For this very reason, the golden rule is the physical expression of the great commission. Christian, lets reevaluate our understanding of the golden rule and seek Gods glory through it in our lives. Until next time may God keep you firmly in His grip!

FHS student scores prefect on ACT

When Freedom High School junior Jack Swanson received an email in his inbox from ACT informing him that his test score was ready to view, he was understandably anxious.

The test gauges college readiness, and colleges and universities use students' scores in the admissions process, so Jack knew a lot was

Thinking back to test day, Jack recalls feeling "overly-prepared," and since he had not taken any formal prep classes or read any official books related to acing the test, he was relying on his school experience and his AP and humanities classes at Freedom to perform well.

And perform well he did. Jack scored a perfect 36 on the ACT.

It was actually during school," Jack said, remembering where he was when he learned of his score. "I felt as if a weight had been lifted from my shoulders. A lot of emphasis is placed on standardized testing today, so getting this out of the way was a great relief for me."

He said, "I am particularly involved in the Young Democrats Club, where I serve as president and recently won election to the State Executive Board."

It is his interest in politics that may drive Jack's future.

He said, "Quite a bit has changed in the last few weeks, and I feel more confident on a career path than ever before. Over the past year, I've become heavily involved in politics on the state and local level, and had the wonderful opportunity to attend a state convention last weekend. Meeting with wonderful and inspiring speakers from around the country made me realize what it is I love doing. With that being said, I am now strongly considering a career in government and inter-

national affairs, with a possible extension

into the legal field."

With a perfect score on his ACT, he won't have any trouble getting into a school of his choice. He said, "I'm looking to apply to an array of colleges, and am particularly interested in Chapel Hill, Duke, Harvard, Yale and Georgetown."





RELAY OF THE BLUE RIDGE SPOTLIGHT – SURVIVOR'S BRUNCH AND MAIN EVENT


Have you ever wondered how the Relay for Life fundraising dollars are used or what happens at a RFL event? Hopefully, this will answer those questions and more!

Relay for Life is the signature fundraiser for the American Cancer Society. Events are held to help reduce the burden of cancer in our communities. Over 1.5 million people are expected to be newly diagnosed with cancer this year. Here are a few ways that your contributions are being utilized. In 2015, \$150 million was used for cancer research grants. Over 361,000 nights of free lodging were provided at American Cancer Society Hope Lodge facilities. In addition, 316,000 rides to and from treatment were provided. Locally, more than \$35,000 was raised in 2016 to help fight all types of cancer and ease the pain and suffering of this disease.

What is Relay for Life? It is a team fundraising event where team members honor cancer victims, survivors and caregivers. This briefly describes what to expect at an RFL event: (1) Welcoming Ceremony, (2) Survivor Lap – involves people affected by cancer who walk a designated track, (3) Caregiver Lap – recognizes those who provide support to loved ones during treatment. Both survivors and caregivers are cheered and supported by their attendance, (4) Teams then walk the track to begin the celebration, (5) When not walking, participants visit other team sites, participate in activities, enjoy games and entertainment, (6) Since darkness is symbolic of the fear that cancer patients may experience, luminaries are lit after sunset to remember those we have lost, to celebrate cancer survivors, and show that anyone who is affected by cancer is not alone, and (7) Closing ceremonies wrap up the event as we are reminded to participate in RFL until cancer is no more!

The Survivors' Brunch will be held on Saturday, May 6th at 10 AM at the Spruce Pine Fire Department and Ms. Anne Castro will be the guest speaker. Spring and Forward

By looking at the calendar, spring is officially here but we have had some days that make us wonder. We all that know that late March and early April can bring some snow and bad weather to Avery County. This year's winter was kind to us as we missed only eight school days.



Because of the extended time that was added to the school day, the Avery County Board of Education, during its March 21 meeting, voted to move the last day of the school year for students to Friday, June 2 if no more days are missed for inclement weather. Spring Break and Easter Vacation will be from Friday, April 14 through Friday, April 21. This is the first time in many years that the Avery County Schools have had a full Spring Break.

Our calendar committee has worked very hard to develop the school calendar for 2017-2018. The recommended calendar has been presented to the board of education for a first reading. The proposed calendar is very similar to this year's calendar. If the calendar law does not change and the proposed calendar is approved, students will head back to school on August 21, and the scheduled last day for students is June 6. Our plan for next year is to continue to add the additional twenty minutes to the school day as we have done for the last two years, starting with the very first day. Doing this allows us to not only bank some time for snow days but it will also allow us to finish our first semester before Christmas at the high school. Based on this year's weather we feel like, along with our calendar committee, that finishing first semester before Christmas is advantageous not only to our students, but to our entire community.

Even though we are not finished with this school year yet, we are already planning our summer programs. Our goal is to provide our students who need a little extra help and support, the opportunity to get that during the summer months through summer school. Our plan is that summer school for kindergarten through fifth grade will begin on Monday, June 12 and will run until Thursday, June 29. Summer school for middle and high school will also begin on Monday, June 12 but the ending date has not been determined. Again, this year, the Read to Achieve legislation requires additional support for students in third grade who are not proficient in reading. Students who fail to meet this requirement will have the opportunity to attend summer school. We will provide bus transportation, breakfast, and lunch for all our students who attend summer school. We will have an excellent staff in place, and based on our last three years of summer school it has been a very rewarding experience for our students. Our goal is for this to be supportive and helpful, not punitive in any way. We stand ready to answer any questions you might have about summer school.

Not only are we planning for summer school, but have also geared up for next school year by registering our eighth graders and high school students for the courses they will take next year. This is a very important time for our students and their parents as they consider the courses they need to take next year to prepare them for their future. Our high school and middle school staffs have worked very hard to prepare registration materials and meet with students and parents about their scheduling needs. If any parent has a question about registration or high school courses, he or she should feel free to contract a counselor or principal.

We are also grateful to the High Country Council of Governments, Mayland Community College, their staffs, and the staff of our school system for working together to provide a program for our eighth graders to discuss different career opportunities and the courses students need to select while in high school to prepare them for those jobs and careers. I am especially appreciative of the work Mrs. Kim Davis and Mark Parlier have done in coordinating the program along with our high school and middle school counselors and administrators. Our goal is to make this process even better year after year so our students are provided the best information possible, and parents are also given the information they need to work with their students and encourage them to take the courses that are most beneficial for them. Our hope is that our students' experiences, especially in the high school courses they take, are preparing them for their life's career. We have a very strong academic program along with a career and technical education program that provides the foundation for each of our children's future. We would encourage parents to be intricately involved with their child's education in the Avery County Schools.

We have lots going on this spring, and we certainly appreciate the support of everyone in Avery County as we work to meet the needs of each of our children that we serve. Thank you for making Avery County such a special and wonderful place for all of us. We wish for you and your family a very Happy Easter!

Emergency Preparedness

Part 7: Planning By Nancy Yantchook Mitchell County

Families can cope with disasters by preparing ahead and working together as a team. Local officials and relief workers will be on the scene, but they cannot reach everyone right away. We have already listed what you can do to be prepared as far as your water supply, your food supply, and items and materials that you should have available in your disaster kit. Your disaster kit should be



in one place and easily accessible to use in your home or to take elsewhere. There are a few other things you should think about and do before a disaster strikes.

- Be aware of what type of disasters would occur in your community and request information on how to prepare for each type.
- Learn what your community's warning signals are, what they sound like, and what you should do when you hear them. The warnings may be by radio, shortwave radio. TV, or by word of mouth.
- Learn what your workplace disaster plans are and how to follow them.
- Learn what your children's school or daycare plans are and discuss them with your children.
- Meet with your neighbors and discuss what you all should do in the event of a disaster. This means working together.
- Think about your elderly or disabled neighbors or relatives and how you could help them.
- Plan what you will do to care for your pets and animals if a disaster occurs.
- Set up a disaster plan with your family and discuss what each of you would do if a disaster occurred and you were not altogether.
- Post emergency telephone numbers near your phones in the home.
- Teach your children how to call 911 or local medical services for help.
- Pick two places to meet in the event of an emergency.
 - Right outside your home, in case of a fire for example.
- Outside of your neighborhood in case you cannot return home. Know the address and phone number.
- Ask an out of the state friend to be a "family contact". After an emergency, it is frequently easier to call long distance. Everyone should know the phone number.
- Also, it is best to not tie up the telephone lines any more than necessary because emergency personnel need to use the phones.
- Make sure you have adequate insurance coverage for your home and belongings.
- Be sure you have your important papers in a waterproof, portable metal container.
 - Wills, insurance policies, contracts, deeds, stocks and bonds.
 - Passports, social security cards, Medicare cards, immunization records.
 - Bank account numbers.
 - Credit card account numbers and companies.
 - Inventory of valuable household goods, important telephone numbers.
 - 6. Family records (birth, marriage, death certificates
- It would also be a good idea to have copies of these records in your car with a small disaster kit. You could be caught in a flash flood or snowstorm.
- · In your home:
 - Conduct a hazard hunt.
 - Know how to operate an A-B-C type fire extinguisher.
- Know how to evacuate your home quickly and efficiently.
- 4. Show each member of the family how to turn off water, gas, and electricity at the main switches and when they should do it. Don't forget special wrenches may be necessary and should be nearby valve or switches.
- Install and maintain smoke detectors on each level of your home, especially near bedrooms.
- Determine which rooms are the safest in the event of an earthquake or tornado.
- Check your home for damaged utilities, such as leaking gas. Use flashlight, not matches or electrical switches if you suspect dangers.
- Clean up spilled medicines, bleaches, gasoline, or other flammable liquids immediately.
 - Stay away from downed power lines.
 - Be dressed warmly with protective clothing and sturdy shoes at all times.
 - Lock your home if you must leave.
- Be aware of where the shelters are and have the travel routes memorized.
 Have a map available in the event that some routes are impassable or dangerous.
- Be sure to keep your car gasoline tanks full at all times. It may be difficult to get gas.
- It would also be a good idea to have some cash on hand at home, as credit cards and checks may not be accepted during an emergency.
- ABOVE ALL, REMAIN CALM AND PATIENT AND PUT YOUR DISASTER PLANS INTO ACTION. IF NECESSARY GIVE FIRST AID AND GET HELP FOR INJURED PERSONS.

Saving Babies

If you build it, they will come.

Members of the Rotary Club of Spruce Pine on Thursday, March 30, were presented a slideshow by Spruce Pine First Baptist Church members Robin Buchanan, Robert Stroup and James Byrd, who is also a Rotarian, about their recent mission trip to Johannesburg, South Africa.



Buchanan, Stroup, Byrd and Diane Pritchard spent two weeks in South Africa helping build Hope Village, which helps meet needs of abandoned, abused and orphaned children in South Africa by providing a stable, Christian environment. Hope Village is a refurbished house on 62 acres that is an ancillary facility for toddlers associated with the Door of Hope, a stainless steel "baby bin" that allows

baby bin" that allow mothers to leave unwanted babies in the care of the Berea Baptist Church in central Johannesburg. An alarm sounds to notify caregivers when a baby is placed in the bin.

Berea Baptist Church pastor Cheryl Allen started "Door of Hope" in 1999 after a high number of newborn babies were being abandoned – between 40-50 babies

per month at that time.

More than 1,500 children have been placed through the Door of Hope, including two while the group was on the mission trip, Stroupe said.

"Many of the children are the sons or daughters of prostitutes," Stroup said.

"Many more are single mothers who just can't care for the child for some reason or another."

Buchanan said an average of three babies are abandoned per day in the Johannesburg metro area, which has a population of 12 million people and of the 18.5 million children in South Africa, approximately 5.2 million are orphans.

"Abandonment is increasing and the number of adoptions decreasing because of changes in the adoption laws," she said.

The first baby adopted through Door of Hope, Georgina, is now a freshman at East Carolina University, Stroupe said.

Have you ever prayed something like this, "Lord, I don't know what you want me to do with my life but, I am willing? Just show me what it is and I'll do it. Open the door and I'll walk through it"

I have. And I think it's a wonderful prayer. But there can be a problem with it.... Complacency.

There is a tendency after uttering that prayer to sit

back in our rocking chair and just wait. I can remember self-righteously thinking, "I don't have to do anything now, I'll just wait until I see this wide-open door in front of me with a flashing neon sign saying, "this is your destiny, enter with confidence".


While that can happen, I don't think that's the way God normally works. I think after we say that prayer, a better approach we can take was modeled by one of my heroes, Jonathan, son of Saul.

1 Sam. 14:8 Jonathan said, "Come on, then; we will cross over toward them and let them see us. 9 If they say to us, 'Wait there until we come to you,' we will stay where we are and not go up to them. 10 But if they say, 'Come up to us,' we will climb up, because that will be our sign that the LORD has given them into our

What was he saying? "Lord, I'm available, if you want me to fight, I'll fight. If you don't that's ok too. Just give me a sign." That much is very similar to prayers you and I have prayed but note the difference: Where did they position themselves to hear from God?

11 So both of them showed themselves to the Philistine outpost. "Look!" said the Philistines. "The Hebrews are crawling out of the holes they were hiding in."

Notice they exposed themselves. They weren't in the caves waiting on God, they were standing on the edge of a cliff in full view of the Philistines. I guess you could say they were pushing God-not to force Him for the answer they wanted. But, they



There is no telling how many opportunities we have missed, exciting adventures we never experienced, or lives we failed to invest in because we were in our caves waiting for God to open a door. A door we can't even see from the cave. We need to be like a runner in his starting blocks ready to bolt through the door at the first glimpse of light as it cracks open.

What does that look like practically? It means we need to be willing to take a chance. We don't often know if an opportunity is God sent, or just coincidental. We need to expose ourselves and stand on the edge. Do something, give the door a push if necessary. In short, be brave and courageous and take a chance. What's

> the worst that could happen? We might be taken advantage of or made to look like a fool. Is that really so bad? I think, even then; our Father is proud of us for our motivation. But look at the potential reward. As Jonathan routed a stubborn enemy and inspired his country, we could be just action away from a life changing moment. A moment that could change our destiny or the destiny of others.

The Lord has promised to close doors no man can open and to open doors no man can shut (Rev. 3:7), but you can't see the door from inside the cave. Get out there and engage and pursue. Be like Jonathan!

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
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
