# What Happened to Our Society

In 1962 the Supreme Court ruled that prayer needed to be taken out of our school system and guess what has happened since that time. When we remove God from our society we are asking for trouble. Following are some results from an article entitled "America: To Pray or Not to Pray" that really make us stop and think!

#### A. Young People

- 1. For 15 years before 1963 pregnancies in girls ages
- 15 through 19 years had been no more than 15 per thousand After 1963 pregnancies increased 187% in the next 15 years.
  - For younger girls, ages 10 to 14 years, pregnancies since 1963 are up 553%.
- Before 1963 sexually transmitted diseases among students were 400 per 100,000. Since 1963, they were up 226% in the next 12 years.

#### B. The Family

- Before 1963 divorce rates had been declining for 15 years. After 1963 divorces increased 300% each year for the next 15 years.
  - 2. Since 1963 unmarried people living together is up 353%
  - Since 1963 single parent families are up 140%.
  - Since 1963 single parent families with children are up 160%.

#### C. Education

- The educational standard of measure has been the SAT scores. SAT scores had been steady for many years before 1963. From 1963 they rapidly declined for 18 consecutive years, even though the same test has been used since 1941.
- 2. In 1974-75 the rate of decline of the SAT scores decreased, even though they continued to decline. That was when there was an explosion of private religious schools. There were only 1000 Christian schools in 1965. Between 1974 to 1984 they increased to 32,000.
  - a. That could have an impact if the private schools had higher SAT scores. In

checking with the SAT Board, it was found that indeed the SAT scores for private schools were nearly 100 points higher than public schools.


- b. In fact the scores were at the point where the public schools had been before their decline started in 1963 when prayer and Bible reading/ instruction was removed from the schools.
  - c. The scores in the public schools were still declining.
- Of the nation's top academic scholars, three times as many come from private religious schools, which operate on one-third the funds as do the public schools.

#### D. The Nation

- Since 1963 violent crime has increased 544%.
- Illegal drugs have become an enormous & uncontrollable problem.
- The nation has been deprived of an estimated 30 million citizens through legal abortions just since 1973.

I wonder if it is time for REVIVAL? What do you think?

#### An Unforgettable Sunrise

For what is your life? It is even a vapor that appears for a little time and then vanishes away. – James 4:14

We can no more know what will be in 20 years than we can know what tomorrow will bring; it is like being

able to see what is not visible. We ourselves are like the mist, as scriptures tell us, "Whereas you do not know what will happen tomorrow. For what is your life? It is even a vapor that appears for a little time and then vanishes away." Will my body be capable of traversing what my mind's eye can see? Will there be the breath of life left within my soul? All of these things and more cannot be answered, nor should they. Our faith should sustain us through all that is, and all that will be to come.

One may project themselves mentally into that point beyond their horizon, that which tells of a distant time and place which none can know. From that place, they may reflect back upon all that might have transpired. From such an appointed place we may see with more clarity what we should find of value; of meaning; of purpose. We can take away from our reflection in that distant horizon such that, when our life's journey has come to fruition, we all would like to say with assurance, "We have run the race well."

To run that race well, there are a few moments which I hope to find, which many may find as their own: to see my children grow into adulthood, to see them become parents with successful careers; to hold that first grandchild in my arms; to see the end of a successful career of teaching; to see my wife and I gracefully grow old together; to see with mine own eyes, the bridge at Salbertrand; to see the sunrise from the top of the Chisone Valley as did those brave men on their march through the Glorious Return; and lastly, but not least of all, to lead others to Christ through the blessings God has bestowed upon me. These are but a few of all that I hope to find on that day, so far from now.

Yet, in the blink of an eye, it will be here.

Time is a precious commodity none of us can take for granted.

The bridge between now and the end of our time here on earth grows shorter with each passing day. We are aliens upon this earth, put here by our creator, and when we pass, we move on to the place He hath created for us; a home eternal. What we do with the time we have left is as much our choosing as is our choice of deciding if we want to live beyond this life, through the salvation Christ has given to all, should they choose.

When we stand on that future mountain top and look back, one should hope to see how they have lifted up others in their wake, being as Christ-like as possible. To become the light is all we should seek.

To get there from here, we must take one step at a time. Each new footprint, insignificant as each one may seem, leads us to the eventual destination if we can remain focused. In our hearts, we know the words, "Yeah though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil, for thou art with me, thy rod and thy staff comfort me..." All around us, the dark peaks of struggle are pitched against us. The fog of doubt and uncertainty shroud our way. Yet, we push onward, one step at a time. We must not look back when the sorrows pull us down. We cannot relive what has gone on before us. We cannot return the dead to the living; we must push onward.

Closing my eyes, I drift off to that future time and place.

From that distant vantage point, my breath is labored. The height at which we have achieved to gain this point is substantial in altitude. The air is thin up here. In my mind, I'm standing upon the highland overlooking the Chisone Valley; the year is 1689. Darkness is before me, it is night. Behind me, I can hear men struggling up the side trying to reach the summit. We are nearest to Him on this imagined peak. What we left behind to obtain our position is a haunting reminder of how our lives have been shaped by perseverance. Like Amaud, his men having fought past the bridge at Salbertrand, seeing the miracle of 600 men routing over 2,500, they are now the survivors of the ten days of forced march. They have avoided the main roads, taking the goat paths and cliff faces in their march. They have fought through one village after another. After this late day battle, they are now struggling through the night to reach the summit. Exhausted, they will fall asleep almost before their heads hit the ground. Arnaud stays awake well past what his body will allow making sure the few sentries he has posted remain awake. He doesn't know I'm here, but together we watch as the coming dawn begins to lighten the eastern sky.

With trepidation, we await, as the sound of men scattered about us sleep in fitful slumber. The wounded moan as they turn to find comfort upon the hard ground; there is little to relieve their pain. The campfire is nearly gone, its embers glowing red, like the horizon that begins to hint of the coming day.

As the dawn broke before them on that glorious morning, the sunlight filtered into their homeland, those ancient valleys of granite and raging torrents. Their faith was at a zenith, they knew this was not the end. Before them lay the unknown. God had surely delivered them to this point for a reason. Yes, they had made it. Yet, the battle to reclaim their valleys had only begun. The dead that they had left behind, now almost half their number, cannot be forgotten; yet, they must not allow the darkness to consume their fate. Before them, the mountain falls away, revealing the Chisone. Some are eager to get down below; family homesteads occupied by the enemy burn in their minds. Liberation of their own farms begins to overwhelm them, but their leader, Pastor Arnaud, recognizes this inner strife and calms them once more with prayer.

"Men, let us bow our heads, ...God, your hand has been upon us each and every step of the way. We thank you for all that you have given us to this day, but Lord, you know better than we, that if it is your will, this place which you hath pre-



pared for us in the beginning, will once more be returned to us again. We ask for the forgiveness of our sins, for taking another man's life is something we do not dismiss easily from our hearts, but at the same time, we ask that you forgive those that seek to destroy us. We must do all that we can to bring them back to the faith of our ancestors, to bring them the salvation for which they were once freely given.

Each knows from whence they came.

Each knows that the going forward will not be easy. Time is against us all, no matter when we face it, but with our faith, we can find our way. We are not alone. "We can do all things through Christ who strengthens us," and in that, we can face tomorrow.

We know not what tomorrow may bring, but with faith, we can face tomorrow. In all that we do, let us serve Him, and to never forget, Thanks be to God.

#### He Will Convict

"And He, when He comes, will convict the world concerning sin and righteousness and judgment" (John 16:8)

The word "He" in this verse is important for a couple of

First, it emphasizes the Personhood of the Holy Spirit. He is not an "it"; some impersonal "force" as Gandhi taught. Rather "He" is a Person. the 3rd Person of the Triune Godhead. Thus, He relates personally to God the Father and God the Son as we see evidenced in this chapter; He can be "grieved", as Paul asserts in Ephesians 4, etc. "He" is a Person.

And the "He" here is also significant because it reminds us that the conviction of sin in a person's life is HIS job, not ours. "HE ... will convict the world of

sin ...". We can preach; we can teach; we can admonish — but our role is limited. Only "HE" can actually "convict ... concerning sin." And that conviction makes all the difference.

When Hudson Taylor was on mission in China in the late 1800's, he wrote of the following experience:

"An old man found us, I know not how, and followed me to our boat. I asked him in and inquired his name.

'My name in Dzing,' he replied. 'But the question which distresses me, and to which I can find no answer, is — What am I to do with my sins? Our scholars tell us that there is no future state, but I find it hard to believe them Oh, sire, I lie on my bed and think. I sit alone in the daytime and think. I think and think and think again, but I cannot tell what is to be done

about my sins. I am seventy-two years of age. I cannot expect to finish another decade. "Today knows not tomorrow's lot," as the saying is. Can you tell me what to do with my sins?" (Hudson Taylor's Spiritual Secret, p. 198)

This kind of conviction of sin can only be the work of the Holy Spirit; and there is no substitute for it. John 16:8 is a good reminder to us: we can't convict people of sin. Only "He" can. So, do your part — and pray — and leave the conviction to Him. "He, when He comes, will convict the world concerning sin ...".


There is a God Who has intervened in their circumstances to place them in

#### Haiti By Rev. George Patton, Jr Burke County and the World

We have not been back from Haiti but for a few weeks and the images that I saw while I was there still haunt me. I lived in this very remote area for 3 years. It is really the poorest of the poor, even before the Hurricane last October. The nearest electricity is about 30 miles and the nearest hospital is the same. The hospital did not have much when I was there and now even less after the Hurricane. Our team of 7 arrived in the capital



of Port au Prince and stayed the night. We really did not see that much in the way of any damage in the capital. It is as Haiti has always been. The next day we took the 6-hour bus ride to Les Cayes and the 4 ½ hour motorcycle ride up into the mountains. The motorcycles carried us across rivers and through gorges. Finally, we arrived at our base camp in the location of Joligibut. As we got deeper and deeper in the jungle I was horrified at the lack of vegetation that I found. In some places, I could not even recognize the area. The Hurricane from last October has devastated the entire zone. Houses were gone. Some houses had fallen in. It was the saddest thing I believe I have ever seen. Having traveled to over 80 countries, that is saying a lot. Upon arriving at our base camp we were warmly greeted by our pastor. He began to tell me what had happened. Thousands had died in this area. They had no way to prepare and no way to escape. Most of their houses are built from mud, rock and straw. They have dirt floors. No indoor plumbing. The building that we had been using as our base had been turned into an orphanage. Many of these children's parents had been killed in the hurricane. There are 35 children there. The pastor has no income for them. Only trusting the Lord day by day to supply their needs. We spent the entire week going village to village.

One village after the next was destroyed. Only 2 churches in an area of about 3000 people are left standing. These 2 were American built. I have never been more heart broken at the loss of many of my friends. They told me how the wind had started getting stronger and stronger that night. They shared with me how their houses were ripped apart, some of their family members were carried off as well as their chickens, even some of their cattle, goats and sheep. It looked like a war zone. However, in the midst of all this despair the people's faith still stands. Every morning at 6am just as the sun was coming up many of the people in the village we were in, would come and gather at one of the only churches left standing and start praying and singing praise to God. This was every morning. Every day we would back pack to another village, some of them taking 2 1/2 up to 5 hours to get to. We would usually arrive between 11 and 12. We would tell the people that at 3pm we are going to have a service at your church. Dear friend by 3pm the church that used to be, was so full of people that there was standing room only. Even though there was no walls. Even though there was no roof. Even though there was no air condition or padded pews, they would come to hear the Word of God. For many of these villages the church

served as the school as well as

the church. Now many of them are left without. Without church or school, and so many more without homes. And yet they still take time out to come to the church, without any publicity, other than word of mouth, to pray and sing praises to God. I am sure you might be asking, "What do they have to sing praises to God about?" LIFE. They are praising God that they are alive and that someday they are going to heaven because they have put their trust in Jesus Christ. We have many trips this year going back to Haiti to help rebuild and to encourage the saints there. #### Revival Needed Now!

If we ever needed guidance, if we ever needed stability, if we ever needed strength, if we ever needed faith, if we ever needed integrity, if we ever needed righteousness, if we ever needed a Heaven-sent revival, it is at the present hour.

We need a revival of Christian faith, of Christian experience, of God-consciousness. God has said, "If My people ... seek My face" (2 Chronicles 7:14). If we will rediscover that He is holy, righteous, real,

absolute and personal, and that He is a God of love and mercy, then this reality will be transferred to the world and revival can come.

The church holds the key. It is within our grasp. Will we rise to the challenge? Will we dare pay the price? The supply of Heaven is adequate for the demands of our spiritually starved world. Will we fail to offer that supply?

I once asked a university professor what he thought our greatest need was. He considered it carefully before answering. He said, "I could give you a variety of answers all the way from tax relief to disarmament. I may surprise you, because I'm not a religious man, but I believe that the greatest need that we have at this hour is a spiritual awakening that will restore individual and collective morals and integrity throughout the nation."

To bear the name "Christian" is not enough. If our conduct doesn't measure up to Christian standards, condemnation will be ours: "You have a name that you are alive, but you are dead" (Revelation 3:1).

SUBSCRIB NOWTo attend church is not enough, either. If we fail to let Christ be Lord and Master of our lives, we must come under the judgment of God, who said, "These people draw near to Me with their mouth, and honor Me with their lips, but their heart is far from Me" (Matthew 15:8).

A hostile world is seething with hatred, intrigue, lawlessness and godless aggression. The wicked prosper, and in many areas of the world the righteous suffer. People are confused, unstable and unhappy. Scarcely, if ever, has economic prosperity been accompanied by such widespread unhappiness, lawlessness and rebellion.

The heart of the world is aching for peace, for reality and for God. The Prophet Habakkuk once stood in the midst of a people who had been showered with every conceivable blessing but who had lost their spiritual sanity, and he cried, "O Lord, revive Your work in the midst of the years!" (Habakkuk 3:2). That is the heart cry of thousands of people everywhere. It is our greatest need.

Spiritual revival has been important in the life of the United States. God has not blessed us simply because a few pilgrims prayed at Plymouth Rock. We have been favored because periodically as a nation we have returned to God in repentance and corrected our manner of life before the hand of judgment fell.

Too little is said in secular history about the part that spiritual revival has played in the United States. Soon after the colonists arrived, people's minds turned to gold rather than God. The country bogged down with greed, the churches were poorly attended and the tide of atheism rushed in to fill up the vacuum left by the absence of religion.

But a group of people in New England began to pray for revival. In 1734 in Northampton, Mass., Jonathan Edwards preached his famous sermon on the judgment of God, and in a single service, hundreds repented of their sins and sought God. People everywhere returned to Christian decency and righteous living. In a short time, nearly one-sixth of the nation's population was won to Christ. The churches were filled with devout worshipers, and revival made its impact on the social life of early America.


In 1783, liquor manufacturing began in the United States. Saloons sprang up everywhere. The nation went on a colossal binge. Home life degenerated, morals plunged, gambling was widespread, infidelity thrived and corruption was prevalent in high places.

But in Richmond, Va., prayer meetings broke out. God's people became concerned about the evil forces that were thriving to the utter peril of the nation's spiritual life. Revival fires began to burn across the land. Sobriety was restored, homes were rebuilt, infidelity lost its grip and thousands of lives were transformed by the power of Christ.

American-based foreign missions had their birth in this awakening, and the nation was saved from a fate worse than death. In answer to the cry of His people, God revived His work "in the midst of the years."

Woodrow Wilson once said, "America was born a Christian nation for the purpose of exemplifying to the nations of the world the principles of righteousness found in the Word of God." John Adams, the second president of the United States, said, "The destiny of America is to carry the Gospel of Jesus Christ to all men everywhere." And Franklin Roosevelt once said, "I doubt if there is any problem, social, moral or political, that could not melt away before the fire of spiritual awakening."

"If we ever needed guidance, if we ever needed stability, if we ever needed strength, if we ever needed faith, if we ever needed integrity, if we ever needed righteousness, if we ever needed a Heaven-sent revival, it is at the present hour." These are prominent leaders who have had the faculty of weighing and evaluating our needs. They put God and spiritual revival at the center, where they belong. If we ever needed guidance, if we ever needed stability, if we ever needed strength, if we ever needed faith, if we ever needed righteousness, if we ever needed a Heaven-sent revival, it is at the present hour. "But how," you may ask, "do we achieve renewal and revival? What are the steps to spiritual awakening?"



Let your soul be anguished; let the tears flow; let your heart be burdened for the lost. Tears are appropriate, for God's Word says, "He who continually goes forth weeping, bearing seed for sowing, shall doubtless come again with rejoicing, bringing his sheaves with him" (Psalm 126:6).

Second, we must forsake our sins. The Bible says, "Let the wicked forsake his way, and the unrighteous man his thoughts; let him return to the Lord" (Isaiah 55:7). Again, the Bible says, "If My people ... turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven" (2 Chronicles 7:14).

The bickering, the prejudices, the ill will, the envy, the jealousy, the bitterness and the criticism among Christian people today must end before revival can begin. The revival must begin in the hearts of Christians before evangelism can be brought effectively to the world.

When Christ's disciples settled their differences, gave up their selfishness, confessed their sins and allowed God's Spirit to fill them, revival came. We must forsake our evil ways. God's Spirit cannot operate in a climate of dissension and quarrels. We must forsake our pettiness, our peevishness, our littleness and our whims.

The enemy of souls has weakened the effectiveness of the Church because we have majored on controversy and dissension rather than on going forth weeping and bearing precious seed. May God forgive us and help us to forsake our wicked, contemptuous ways!

Third, God must be real to us. The Bible says, "If My people ... seek My face ... then I will hear from heaven" (2 Chronicles 7:14). In a world filled with crass materialism, we have tried to whittle God down to our size. We have created a god in our minds who is not the revealed God of the Bible.

Many say, "It's all right to go to church, and a person ought to be decent, but I don't believe in going overboard on religion." They think the Christian faith is a phobia, bordering on mental incompetence.

If Christianity is important at all, it is all-important. If it is anything at all, it is everything. It is either the most vital thing in your life, or it isn't worth bothering with.

You can know God. Millions of Christians are saying with assurance, "I know I have passed from death to life" (Cf. 1 John 3:14). "I know whom I have believed" (2 Timothy 1:12).

We need a revival of Christian faith, of Christian experience, of God-consciousness. God has said, "If My people ... seek My face" (2 Chronicles 7:14). If we will rediscover that He is holy, righteous, real, absolute and personal, and that He is a God of love and mercy, then this reality will be transferred to the world and revival can come.

Don't give lie to the Christian faith by professing Christ without possessing Him. Don't lock the church door with the key of inconsistency and keep the lost from coming to Christ. Don't hinder revival by your unbelief and prayerlessness. Don't cheat yourself out of spiritual victory by allowing sin to imprison you. Seek God's face and turn from your wicked ways. Then He will hear from Heaven.

The church holds the key to revival. It is within our grasp. Will we rise to the challenge? Will we dare pay the price? The supply of Heaven is adequate for the demands of our spiritually starved world. Will we fail to offer that supply?

Have you accepted Christ as your Savior? If not, you will admit that deep down inside you is an emptiness that needs to be filled. Your heart yearns for peace and joy and forgiveness. There is a void that the world cannot satisfy.

In the center of history, on a low hill in Palestine, a cross was erected—the cross of Christ, the Son of God. By some wonderful miracle known only to God, all who look to the Lamb slain on the cross have life—not just the good, the respectable and the decent, but the vile, the despicable and the outcast. A thief dying with Jesus looked believingly upon Him and was assured of life everlasting.

The Bible says that Jesus "made peace through the blood of His cross," and that by Christ, God reconciled all things to Himself" (see Colossians 1:20).

#### "Choices"

Have you ever attempted to make a difficult decision and people say well just pray about it? Sometimes we, at Yancey Hospice and Palliative Care, see people struggle with the most difficult of decisions such as: whether or not to continue aggressive treatment for illness, what physician to use, what to put in their will, or whether or not to sign a DNR.


When you get right down to it, life is one big sequence of choices. We can, however, become very enthralled with our choices ending us up at a perfect destination. I talk with bereavement clients who worry about end of life decisions that were made and question, "If only I would have chosen this treatment or that Doctor for my loved one they might not have died." Some struggle with decisions they make for a lifetime wondering what life might have been. Sometimes we are told, just listen to the Spirit and you will be in the perfect will of God, but I personally have found that to be a slippery slope that isn't sustainable for long periods of time. I think we need to focus more on God's will as a way of living--- That God's will means I am doing what God has called me to do. People say, "If I only knew what God's will was, then I could make the right decision." Romans 12: (1-2) describes Gods will for everyone as Paul writes, "I beseach you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service. 2 And be not conformed to this world: but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God."

God's will doesn't have to do so much with a place, person, job, or circumstance as it does with being a Godly Person. God wants us to surrender our will to Him. He wants our whole heart and all of our time, talent, and treasure. God wants to conquer us in a sense. Paul expresses this in 2 Corinthians 2: "12 Now when I came into the Troas to spread there the Good News about the Christ, even though in the Lord's providence a door stood open before me, 13 yet, obtaining no relief for my spirit because I did not find our brother Titus, I bade them farewell and went on into Macedonia. 14 But to God be the thanks who in Christ ever heads our triumphal procession, and by our hands waves in every place that sweet incense, the knowledge of Him. 15 For we are a fragrance of Christ grateful to God in those whom He is saving and in those who are perishing; 16 to the last-named an odor of death predictive of death, and to the others an odor of life predictive of life."

The church at Corinth was composed of some of Paul's biggest critiques. They criticized him, accused him of stealing money, accused him of being weak, and in the context of this scripture, were accusing him of not going where God wanted him to go. Paul describes a great door of opportunity that opened to him. Why didn't he go? Was he not a man of his word? Did he not care about the people in that community? Paul says, "It didn't work out because I had no peace in my Spirit and I couldn't find Titus." He had some anxiety about being in this place

and about his decision. He was worried about his friend so he went on to Macedonia. We might look at this and say, "Paul was totally out of the will of God for leaving!

Paul then explains God's will by using an analogy. In verses 14-16 he describes the procession held in Rome for a conquering hero. Someone who had gone into battle and won a great victory, coming back into the city to a parade. In this parade would come the army in front, and in the back the conquering hero with a whole procession of conquered slaves chained to the chariot. They were lead through the city to the center. There many of them died and some lived on to serve their masters for life




In other words Jesus is the Conquering Hero. He defeated death, hell, the grave, sin, and Satan by the blood of His cross and the resurrection. We (followers of Jesus) are the ones who are chained to the chariot. He conquered us and now leads us to the place of death and service. During the procession the incense would be symbolic of both death and life. Burned for those who would die and those who would live. We die to ourselves and live to Christ. Paul is saying wherever I go, wherever I stay, wherever I am, I am led by the one who conquered me. I am dead to myself, and alive to Christ Jesus. I can't go anywhere that he isn't already there, because he goes before me. God's will is for me to die to myself and live for Christ. Wherever I go from that point on, I am in the purposeful will of God.

Refuse to let past choices define you, refuse to be dominated by your circumstances, and refuse to allow others to be critical of your choices and make you question yourself. Does this mean choices do not matter? Certainly not. It does mean that when we make our choices as a sold out child of the living God, we can trust Him to go before us. No choice we make surprises God, "He leads His dear children along, some through the fire, some through the flood, but all through the blood, some through great sorrow, but God gives a song, in the night season and all the day long".

Sell out to Jesus, pray and ask for His wisdom, go where you feel there is peace, and make your choices. Make them with the confidence that God is leading you no matter what, and there is nowhere that He hasn't gone before you, already making the way.

#### Truth

The society in which we live has become a society that is for the most part offended by truth. One group speaks one "truth" and immediately another group will begin shouting their "truth". Both claim to be right about whatever the subject may be, even though the "truth" each group proclaims completely conflicts what the other group is proclaiming.



Then, there is the group that proclaims that there are no absolute truths in this world. They believe that truth is relative. That just means that everybody's truth is right, no one is wrong, and nobody can claim that their truth is above someone else's truth. Each person can believe whatever truth they want even if it conflicts someone else's truth and all are equally valid. Even though 2 plus 2 equals 4, we cannot make that the final and absolute answer, because someone else may believe it to be something else! And we don't want to offend someone. Again, even if the "truth" each one believes is completely opposite to each other, no one is wrong and everybody's truth is right. Yea, that feeling of "What????", you're having right now is how I feel when I hear people say stuff like that. According to these folks there are no moral absolutes. What one person believes is wrong, another person may believe is right. Mankind apparently just drifts along and comes up with whatever truth he or she likes and everybody is supposed to hold hands and agree that everybody is right. Everyone does that which is right is their own eyes. We are commanded by society to get in line and cooperate with whatever truth someone comes up with, even if that truth is conflicting with ours. You "absolutely" have to believe this and go along with all people's belief or unbelief, whichever it may be. Wait.....are they saying that there is absolutely no absolute truth? Aren't they proclaiming an absolute truth? Uhhhh...confused yet? That's the whole purpose of it all: "confusion". Satan has done a pretty good job of confusing people.

What are we as Bible believing Christians to do is such a society? What about those who say they are Christians and yet proclaim and support so called "truths" that conflict with what the Bible teaches? Do we just keep silent? Do we hide behind the walls of our church buildings because we are afraid someone will accuse us of being "judgmental" if we state what the Bible teaches? Paul gives a young preacher named Timothy some advice when it comes to preaching and teaching the truth.

First: begin with the correct source of truth, the scriptures. II Timothy 3:16-17 All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness. That the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works. Timothy lived in a time not much different from our own when it comes to all the differing opinions of truth. False religions, idol worship, ungodly religious rituals and even those who believed in nothing. Same mess, just a different time. Paul was reminding Timothy that it was the scriptures that were the source of truth in a world that was proclaiming so many different opinions of truth. The phrase, "given by inspiration of God" means "God breathed". Not just some scripture, but "all scripture". We can't choose to believe and accept some and refuse and disregard other portions of scripture. People are always quick to accept the truth of "God is Love" but will often refuse to accept that God is also a God of justice and wrath against sin and

wickedness. The standard by which we should always measure the "truth" so many claim in this world is God's word. If it doesn't meet the standard declared in God's Holy Bible, then it isn't truth.

Secondly: Tell the truth, even when the world doesn't want it! Paul charges Timothy in II Timothy 4:2 Preach the word; be instant in season, out of season; reprove, rebuke, exhort with all long-suffering and doctrine. Paul was telling Timothy to preach the truth of God's word whether it is popular to the masses or not. Just proclaim the truth because it was what God had called Timothy to do. Paul warns in verses 3-4 For the time will come when they will not endure sound doctrine;

but after their own lusts shall they heap to them-



selves teachers, having itching ears; And they shall turn away their ears from the truth, and shall be turned unto fables. Paul warned Timothy that there would be those who would reject God's truth to make up their own. These would raise up their own teachers to proclaim not what God wanted them to hear but only what they wanted to hear. "I am grateful and ecstatic that I pursued the process and did the research on what it would take to be a Habitat

Partner family. I have always been a single mom. I feel so much better about myself because I can provide a home for my children. I want them to know now and as they finish high school and college and move on with their lives that 'a place called home' will always be here for them," expressed Tanya.

On a sumny Saturday afternoon at Riverside Park in Spruce Pine, I sat with this wonderful family to talk about what lies ahead. Tanya was happy to see her children, Seth (16), Daymion (13), Ayden (12), and Kinda (8) so enthusiastic as they shared their thoughts about moving. They were excited about themselves, their interests and accomplishments, as well as, those of their siblings. Tanya is an avid reader and has definitely passed her passion along to her family, who can't wait to have bookshelves in every room of their new house. Everyone understands the shared responsibilities ahead to help build their first new home.

All Habitat families are required to provide 200 hours of "sweat equity" on their own homes and work alongside staff and volunteer crews. The boys are anxious to get to it. They already have considerable experience with constructing walls and putting up insulation from helping build their aunt's house. Daymion is most excited about using a nail gun. No one confesses much enthusiasm for painting; however, I assured them that Habitat crews are not usually keen on the kids doing that job.

The family currently lives in Burnsville in an old and very small two-bedroom, one-bath trailer. Their trailer belonged to Tanya's parents, Gary and Marlene Hudgins, who live only a few houses away. Each family member shared bittersweet sentiments about the new house and eventually leaving grandparents in the old neighborhood in Burnsville.

Kyndal, the youngest and often the spokesperson for the family declared, "The one-bathroom situation is a whole lot of trouble for me." Mom shares a room with her while the three boys bunk together in the other bedroom. Tanya has done her best to keep up their home; however, it has been difficult to manage with such limited space and with no closets. They all envision a new life with a big



yard, their own bedrooms, and of course, in time, a big dog. They all are looking forward to the privacy and independence that comes with one's own room.

"My kids have a more positive outlook because of this opportunity. They can see that everything is possible if you keep trying and work for what you want. God will help you find it," says Tanya.

Tanya was raised in Tipton Hall near Bakersville and is living now in Burnsville. For the past ten years, she worked as a Head Start Teacher at Roan View
Child Development Center in Bakersville. As a single mom, working full time
and raising four children, she went back to school when one child was an infant
and the others were eight years old and under. She received her diploma from
Mayland Community College in Spruce Pine in 2006 with an Associate Degree in
Early Childhood Education. Two years ago, Tanya became the Director of Roan
View Development Center.

When the family moves to Mitchell County, no one will have to get up at 5:00 AM on school days any longer. They all attend schools in Mitchell County where Mom is employed. Currently, to make it all work, Tanya drives from Burnsville to Mitchell County every morning at 5:30. The family helps her open up the Child Care Center and they are off to school from there.

Gary and Marlene Hudgins talk about how proud they are of their daughter, Tanya. "She has always been very independent, persistent, and hard-working. We made sure all of our children went to school and graduated. She has followed this example and always helped her children through school and encouraged their interests. She has made sure every one of her children know they are loved."

Gary works as a long-distance truck driver for a company in Mars Hill. He and Marlene always look forward to taking the children on the road with them whenever possible. The family is close to their papaw and mamaw, who have helped Tanya tremendously over the years with the children. Living farther apart from their grandchildren in Mitchell County will be an adjustment for the family. Marlene assures, "We will always stay closely involved in each other's lives."

Seth Elsaesser (16) is the oldest son and a sophomore at Mitchell High School. He is on the wrestling team and now competes in the 132-pound category. He works part-time for his coach doing landscaping and yard work. Seth accompanies his papaw, Gary, on the road whenever he can. He has traveled to half dozen or more states in the South to date. He loves working on old tractors and 4-wheelers with his papaw and sees himself working as a mechanic after finishing school. He will have his own room in the new house and plans to fill his space with his media collection of football and basketball paraphernalia of the Golden State Warriors and the Carolina Panthers.

Daymion Heidel (13) is in 8th grade at Bowman Middle School and claims to

be the biggest bookworm in the family. He loves to read fantasy and gets a real debate going among his brothers and sister about who is the biggest Harry Potter fan. He also shares a love of music, specifically playing the drums, and has an interest in karate with his brother Ayden. They will be roommates in the new house and have some exciting ideas about creating Do-It-Yourself platform beds with storage and cubbyhole areas. However, they still are at odds about one's choice for a black, red, and bright yellow color scheme. Having recently turned thirteen, he was allowed to make his first long-distance truck drive with papaw to Florida this summer. Daymion thinks truck driving may be a career he would enjoy.

Ayden Farris (12) is enrolled in advanced math classes, his favorite subject, in 7th grade at Bowman Middle School. He sees himself as a chemist in the future, or possibly, a video game designer. She excitedly raced through the list of a few of those princesses before I got lost: Snow White, Cinderella, Aurora, Ariel, Belle, Jasmine . . . It was no surprise to hear that, so far, she has her sights set on moving to New York City and becoming a fashion designer.

The board and staff of Mitchell-Yancey Habitat for Humanity welcome this fine new partner family. The location of their home is still pending as the affiliate seeks a suitable lot in Mitchell County preferably in Ledger or Bakersville. They will work alongside Habitat volunteer crews and local contractors to build their home and receive a no-interest 25-year mortgage. Tanya will be required to pay a monthly mortgage, land taxes, and insurance. Their home will be the 23rd home built by Mitchell-Yancey Habitat for Humanity since 1992 providing safe and affordable housing for 27 deserving families since that time.

Soon Mitchell-Yancey Habitat for Humanity will be seeking volunteers to help us build Tanya's family home. One summer's eve, Doug, Barbara and I were resting in the kitchen at their farmhouse at Harrell Hill. I was celebrating the fact that we actually had a short work day, by Doug standards anyway, a mere 12 hours. As we visited around the dinner table Doug surmised that he had "been thinking...", always a scary scenario. Usually this meant we would soon embark on a wild and crazy venture of some sort and I would go along kicking and screaming, my body and life hanging in the balance.

As Barbara and I digested her fine home cookin', Doug offered me a second piece of Hawaiian Sunset cake...a sure sign of impending doom for me! Recently, I read an article about a mom's experience backing out of her driveway. Her three kids were sitting in the back seat, when suddenly her four-year-old cried out, "stop!" Mom stopped suddenly, and inquired, "What's wrong honey?" Her four-year-old said, "You almost ran over Boopsie!" Boopsie was her four-year old's invisible friend.



Several weeks ago, on my weekly radio program in Burnsville, I started a new preaching series on Hebrews. The other day, I was reading Hebrews 11: 23 – 27. In verse 27, it mentioned that he (Moses) endured as seeing Him who is invisible. How did Moses see the invisible? To me, Moses had his first lesson seeing the invisible at a very early age. Remember Pharaoh had issued a decree that all the male babies born to the Hebrews should be killed. His parents made the decision to hide him. Moses mom modeled faith. (Read Hebrews 11: 23). She prayed and trusted God to take care of her son. What happened next? Pharaoh's daughter found baby Moses. His sister Miriam stayed close to her baby brother. Miriam

said to Pharaoh's daughter,
"Shall I go and call to thee a
nurse for the child for you?"
Jochebeds faith had been
rewarded. As she cared for her
son, she faithfully used this
opportunity to educate Moses
about God. She taught him to
bow down and pray to the living God, who would hear and
help him. She must have told,
and retold the story about how
God had preserved his life during Pharaoh's decree. When



Moses left to become Pharaoh's daughter's son, he did not lose the impressions received during childhood.

Moses' life as Pharaoh's daughter's son had been crammed with the visible. He grew up with pomp and circumstance. All this changed when he had to flee to Midian. Suddenly his life changed, from the palace in Egypt to the wilderness of Midian. Yet, in the wilderness, through the school of self-denial and hardship, he learned patience, and learned to be trained to obey God. In some way, we may be walking through the wilderness today. It may seem that everything we value is falling apart. Yet in spite of our circumstances, the Rock of Ages stands. It may take the visible clutter in our lives to fall away before it becomes easier for us to see the invisible. Seeing the invisible - can be a challenge. But through our eyes of faith, (read Hebrews 11:1), we see Him confident as we learn to trust in Him. As believers, we have been called to walk by faith, not by sight. The Bible says, "the just shall live by faith." (Read Habakkuk 2:4; Romans 1:17; 2 Corinthians 4:18). We are to call upon Jesus by faith. (See Jeremiah 33:3). Jesus hears our prayers, and invites us to look to Him by faith, to answer our prayers according to His will. Our God is mighty and powerful! In the solemn mountains of Midian, he was reminded of the power and presence of God. In nature, Moses just seemed to be standing in His presence.

What is the result of seeing the invisible? Like Moses, God will give us the strength and grace to endure. I believe what I need to possess is unwavering loving obedience, unwavering loving dedication, and unwavering loving commitment. What about you?

Where do we find true hope, peace, encouragement, strength, purpose, and promise? How can we endure as we live now and wait for the second coming of Jesus? To me there is only one way – we can endure, "as seeing Him who is invisible."

#### It Looks Like a Weed to Me

My wife and I were working in our flower garden getting ready to mulch and set out new plants. I stepped into a portion of one bed to thin some tiny flowers that had re-seeded from the previous year. Carefully I began to pull the tiniest plants from the ground leaving behind the largest and healthiest plants. From another portion of the garden, Tammy asked what I was doing. I explained that I was thinning flowers that had "volunteered" from last



year. She watched as I painstakingly pulled one small plant after another leaving space between the largest ones. Finally, she exclaimed, "Well they all look like weeds to me!" I looked up at her standing with her hands on her hips and we began to laugh. I said, "Trust me. They're flowers; wait and see."

If my wife had started her work in that particular section of the garden I don't guess there would be a single flower left to bloom later this summer. All those "weeds" would have ended up on the compost pile.

Pulling weeds in general is not rocket science. Weeds are easily identified. If a plant of some sort or another doesn't belong in a particular place or you simply don't want it growing in a certain area, then you pull it. It's easy to see how one person's weed could easily be another's flower.



It occurs to me that our lives are not so different from working in the flowers. Moment to moment we're faced with decisions. Accept this, reject that. Go or to stay, embrace or pull away.

While we generally take time to think over the important decisions, most of our day-to-day choices are made with a minimal amount of reflection. The pace of life demands that we make decisions quickly

and move on. We don't always have adequate information. It's easy to be careless. Have you ever gotten in a hurry or not been paying attention only to realize that you've pulled up a flower instead of a weed?

Even what appears to be an insignificant choice can possess the power to change our lives in profound ways. Sometimes it is the simplest choice that can make all the difference. Stop and listen to the stranger who needs someone to hear their story. Offer appreciation to someone who's working in a thankless job, but obviously cares about the quality of their work. Invite someone to dinner who is lonely. Push aside your fear and judgment and reach to someone who needs a second chance. Or— you can simply pull the weeds.

More times than not, I happen to see more flowers than weeds. God provides the seasons each of us requires to grow and become so I try to be careful. Flower or weed?

#### God Makes No Junk

The events of the past week cannot go unnoticed. Demonstrations. Protests. Hatred. Bigotry. Confusion. Murder. Statues toppled.

Beneath the fallen statues, the bantering of the media, and the seemingly endless analysis of political pundits lies an unalterable truth: life matters. The framers of the Declaration of Independence thought so:



We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness.

So does God:

For you formed my inward parts; you knitted me together in my mother's womb. I praise you, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made. Wonderful are your works; my soul knows it very well. (Psalm 139:13-14, ESV)

One only has to travel back a few decades in world history to discover a regime that idolized blonde hair and blue eyes and killed six million Jews. Jews weren't the only ones who lost their lives:

- 7 million Soviets died.
- 3 million Soviet prisoners of war died.
- 1.8 million Polish Civilians died.
- 220,000 Gypsies, 1900 Jehovah's Witnesses, and 70,000 asocials died
- 250,000 disabled people were killed...for being disabled

Black people matter. White people matter. All people matter. I'm afraid we've lost sight of this. This week CBS ran the story about Iceland's eradication of babies with Down Syndrome.

Since prenatal screening tests were introduced in Iceland in the early 2000s, the vast majority of women — close to 100 percent — who received a positive test for Down syndrome terminated their pregnancy.

Other countries aren't lagging too far behind in Down syndrome termination rates. According to the most recent data available, the United States has an estimated termination rate for Down syndrome of 67 percent (1995-2011); in France it's 77 percent (2015); and Denmark, 98 percent (2015). The law in Iceland permits abortion after 16 weeks if the fetus has a deformity -- and Down syndrome is included in this category.

The common ground between white supremacists and Iceland's law is eery--life only matters if "I" think it matters.

In 2015, 908,000 babies were aborted.

Abortion advocates, white supremacists and Iceland's "deformity" law advocates find themselves on the same shaky ground: "we" should determine when life matters.

Yet Scripture is clear: life matters for blacks, whites, latinos, unborn babies, down syndrome babies, people with Alzheimer's and dementia, because God created them, and therefore loves them.

Though marred by sin, we are all created in his image.

Then God said, "Let us make man in our image, after our likeness. And let them have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the heavens and over the livestock and over all the earth and over every creeping thing that creeps on the earth." (Genesis 1:26, ESV)

God makes no junk.

And after he created them, when they had blown it, he sent his Son Jesus to die for them.

And Jesus didn't die for junk.

Prosperity often results in our forgetting God. The Israelites were to annually observe



the Passover as a memorial of God's deliverance (Ex. 12:14). They set up a memorial of twelve stones to commemorate the crossing of the Jordan (Josh. 4:7). The Lord's Supper is done in remembrance of Christ's work on the cross (1 Cor. 11:25).

How will you remember the answers to prayer you have experienced? What are the things we will point our family to that commemorate God's work? How are others directed to remember what God has done? We dare not rely upon our memory. Where are the visible monuments in your life?



#### The Apostle Paul of Vietnam

Paul Ai is often referred to as "The Apostle Paul of Vietnam" Former Buddhist monk and witch-doctor con-





#### ABOUT DR. PAUL AI

-- From Buddha to the Bible --

Rev. Dr. Paul Ai was born into a strong Buddhist family in central Vietnam. At a very young age, he was sent to pagoda (Buddhist school) to be a Buddhist monk. As he grew up, he realized there was no hope and no power in the doctrines of Buddhism, so he decided to study




black magic and became a witch doctor. He served 3,366 gods, but became disappointed in the devil's power when a Christian festival came to his town in 1970. Paul was determined to stop the Christian meetings with the power of his gods, but they were no match for the God of the missionaries, and Paul gave his life to the Lord. When he made his decision to follow Jesus, he was discowned by his family, relatives, and friends. He persevered, however, and went to Bible college to learn the Word of God. Just before the fall of Saigon in 1975, Paul became the first General Superintendent of the Assemblies of God in Vietnam.

Only a week after the Communists took over Saigon, Paul was put in prison for being a pastor. Over the next 25 years, he served a total of 10½ years in prison, forced labor camps and re-education camps for preaching the Gospel and starting churches. Even in prison, Paul continued to share the Gospel and his testimony, and many people accepted Jesus as their personal Lord and Savior. When they were released from the prison camps to return to their villages, these Christians shared their testimonies, people accepted Jesus as their Lord and Savior, and new churches were started. The prison camps were the start of many churches in North Vietnam, which of course was not the outcome that the Communists had hoped for or had expected!

During the 25 years that Paul was in and out of prison, he met his wife, Ruth, and they had four beautiful daughters. A curse had been put on Paul after he became a Christian that he would never have a son. His fifth child, a son, showed Paul's family that God's power is stronger than the curse of the devil. As a result, over 300 of Paul's relatives came to know the Lord.

#### Woman Walks After Four Years Confined to Wheelchair

For four years, Marie Cribbs' life was filled with pain. Wheelchair-bound as a result of complications from diabetes, two bouts of breast cancer and psoriatic arthritis, she couldn't lift her arms or legs and dealt with extreme pain every day. "She had chemotherapy and whenever the chemo left her system, her arthritis came back in a fury and left every one of her joints inflamed," explains her husband, Bill, who served as her caregiver during this time. "It made it very hard for her to move, and, because of that, her whole body degenerated, and it was impossible for her to walk."

That all changed in May when Marie, who had been unable to attend church regularly due to her condition, made a decision to go to a service at Magnolia Church in Port Neches, Texas, where Paul Ai was speaking.

"I'm going to go," she told Bill. "I feel like something is going to happen."

Ai, founder of Vision Outreach International, is known as "the Apostle Paul of Vietnam." A former witch doctor, he came to Christ during the Vietnam War and spent 10 years in communist prisons for his faith. He now plants churches in South Asia from a base in Cambodia.

After a two-hour message on prayer, Ai called up anyone who needed prayer

and healing. When Bill rolled Marie past Ai and his wife, Ruth, Marie felt "an intense burning" in her back. The couple then began to pray over her.

"Pastor Paul commanded all my cells and my legs to align with the Holy Spirit," Marie recalls. "Then Ruth extended her hand to me," beckoning her to stand up.

"Immediately, I stood up and started walking!" she says.

The Cribbs' daughter, Lolly, says her mother is "back to walking and jumping and running as if she was a teenager."

"Now, by the grace of God, I am healed. I will be a walking witness the rest of my life," Marie says.

Bill says he's noticed other changes in his wife as well. "She used to wake up in the morning with pain in her face and her brow furrowed. Every night she's had a visitation by the Holy Spirit in her sleep. She wakes up, and her face is glowing."

#### Why Don't We Do Family Discipleship Anymore (part 2)

This is part two of a series examining the importance of family Discipleship, exploring some of the reasons that many seem to avoid this, and overcoming some of the obstacles to training our kids to live well as Disciples of Jesus.



#### Objection #2: We Don't Have Time

Again, short answer: Yes, You Do!!! The key here is intentionality rather than addition. When I say we need to train our children up in the faith most of us have the idea that I'm saying we need to add more activity into an already busy day, but that may not be the case. Do you eat dinner? Do you do homework? Get up in the morning? Do bath time? Attach it to one of those things.

I remember several nights when my children were young, reading a bible story to them while they were in the bathtub. Maybe before dinner time, you sit down, say the blessing and take five minutes to read a few verses of Scripture together. Maybe you plug it into homework time; after math and reading are done, we have a few verses of Scripture we need to go over and a couple of questions we need to answer together. There are tons of ways to make Discipleship apart of your daily life without adding more activity into an already packed day. Maybe you need to go to bed 10 minutes later or get up ten minutes earlier. We don't have a problem doing this if we have sports practice, or if homework didn't get finished the night

I'm going to resort to guilt tripping here - which I rarely do - but I'll make an exception on this one. Is Jesus as important to you as sports or good grades? If you're not willing to carve out five minutes in your day for Jesus and you are willing to do that for these other things. He's not, plain and simple.

#### Objection #3: I Don't Know Enough About the Bible

For some of us, this is probably the most legitimate objection. It can be intimidating to be responsible for the Biblical Education of another person, when many of us feel weak in our own knowledge of the Scriptures. Fortunately, we live in the information age, and there is no reason that says that you and your children can't learn together. It just might take spending a few dollars on some good Gospel-centered resources.

Get a good study bible to help with understanding more difficult passages of Scripture as well as the overarching message of God to humanity. My favorite is the ESV Study Bible, but the Christian Standard Bible and the Life Application Study bibles are good choices as well. There are bible dictionaries that contain a wealth of resource on just about every biblical topic you can imagine, and probably a few you've never dreamed of. And there are tons of good books out there



for kids and adults that can help you as you grow together in your knowledge of the Scriptures. Whatever the reason, whatever the obstacle, the most important thing is that we are committed to the importance of raising our children to know and follow Jesus.

HUGE church services, filled with hungry people ready to receive all the Lord had for them, salvation, physical and emotional healing? Plus, 150 young people activated to do the ministry time?

It was amazing! Each service was powerful and had huge responses to our invitation for salvation. After the salvation call, there was time for healing prayer. It was our time to step into activation. We made a line across the front of the church and stood with our Brazilian translators (Brazilian youth who went through the same

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touch from the Lord.

Holly prayed for a lady who came forward in response to a word of knowledge given for a "crushed right ankle". She had broken her right ankle five years prior and had a platinum plate and multiple screws placed in her ankle. She was in constant pain even after the surgery. God touched her that night, and restored full mobility to her ankle and took away ALL pain! Praise Jesus!

Aaron prayed for a lady who had been burned in a food industry accident. She had bad scaring on her face and hand, big white blotches on her beautiful brown skin. Aaron tuned his ear

Aaron asked her, through a translator, what was happening and why she was rubbing her face. She told him that she was having a tingling sensation and felt new skin growing! Where the skin had been stark white, it was brown, almost a perfect match. It felt soft and fresh, like baby skin. We could hardly believe our eyes!

During the second phase of the trip, the 150 were divided into 15 ministry teams. We were sent out into the smaller churches in the community, to be fully activated to do every aspect of the ministry, even the preaching and teaching. It was wonderful to see young people stepping into these roles. During the day we walked the neighborhoods and visited homes to pray for the sick. In the afternoons there was teaching and in the evenings, preaching and ministry time, all conducted by the young people! It was beautiful. God continued to show Himself mighty on the behalf of those giving and receiving ministry. Many hearts were touched and many bodies restored. Praise His Name!

On one of our evangelistic outreaches, our small group was invited into a local home in response to our invitation for prayer. The very small house was home to

11 people, with four generations of family represented.

of breath from years of smoking and dizziness when she
walked. God healed all three
health issues! This opened

hour by hour.


Each level of commitment brings with it a level of refreshment, but as we have all learned at the pool, the greatest refreshment comes when we make a total commitment

#### Lees-McRae President to Retire in May 2018

Banner Elk, N.C. — Lees-McRae President Barry M. Buxton announced that he will retire in May 2018 and that a search for his replacement has begun. Buxton has served as the president of Lees-McRae since June 1, 2010 and is the 15th president in the 116-year-history of the institution.

In announcing his retirement, Buxton expressed gratitude to Lees-McRae students, faculty, staff and the Board of Trustees. "I am humbled by my years at this sacred place, but the people of Lees-McRae have left me truly grateful and blessed," he said.

Throughout his tenure, the college experienced enrollment growth, balanced operating budgets, expansion of curricular offerings, and saw its regional accreditation reaffirmed by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. Under Buxton's leadership, the college broadened its educational reach with the addition of online programs that grew from 49 students to almost 300 students in four years.



The historic campus witnessed a physical transformation with construction of 30,000 square feet of additional student space, including the May School of Nursing and Health Sciences, the May Wildlife Rehabilitation Center and the Lauritsen Technical Theatre and Design Studio. Buxton also oversaw the renovation and modernization of the intellectual center of campus – the college library – in to the Dotti M. Shelton Learning Commons.

During Buxton's eight and half years as president, Lees-McRae completed \$7.5 million in additional physical improvements. Over the same period, the college net assets grew by 58 percent and institutional debt

was reduced by 38 percent. Buxton returned the campus to its residential roots with more than 90 percent of Banner Elk students living in college facilities. He also established Lees-McRae as one of the nation's only pet-friendly campuses and led the effort to be designated a Bicycle-Friendly University.

Buxton currently serves as president of the NCAA Division II athletics conference, Conference Carolinas, as well as on the executive committee of the North Carolina Independent Colleges and Universities.

A. Hope Williams, president of NCICU, summed up his service to Lees-McRae and the state saying, "Dr. Buxton cares deeply about students and their success, about the college and about all of higher education. His warmth, sincerity, energy, and creativity will be missed by the college community and by all his colleagues in higher education in North Carolina."

In a diverse career spanning 35 years, he has been a teacher, researcher, publisher, editor and community leader. In 2016, Buxton received the prestigious Order of the Long Leaf Pine from former North Carolina Gov. Pat McCrory. The award is one of the highest civilian-focused honors the governor of North Carolina can bestow.

Prior to Lees-McRae, Buxton served as Vice President for Special Projects at the Savannah College of Art and Design, where he was responsible for major gift solicitation, leadership development and foundation relations.


A native of Blowing Rock, North Carolina, Buxton has a long history of involvement with non-profit organizations in Appalachia. During the 1980s, he

served as Executive Director of the 16-member Appalachian Consortium. Buxton holds two degrees from Appalachian State University, where he received his teacher certification and was an E.F. Lovill Fellow, and a Ph.D. from the University of Nebraska.

"I am so proud of all we have accomplished together, and know there is more to achieve," Buxton said. "I look forward to my time remaining at Lees-McRae, and will continue to work with faculty and staff to elevate everything that we do."

To date, over 500,000 pills (from 2010 to 2013) and 466 additional pounds of drugs (from 2014-2016) have been collected and safely disposed of. #### The Power of Fragrance

Slowly my daughter opened the file folder, sneezing at the musty dust drifting upward into the morning sunlight. Papers littered with long ago importance slipped off her lap. Tattered bits of memories teased the edges of her thoughts as sounds of long ago laughter bubbled somewhere near her heart. Ten years stretched behind her with its faint traces of friendships, shared joys and halved



frustrations. Grades and grins traced the pathways of her mind as she traveled long forgotten paths. With a simple whiff, we often are transported instantly to the exact same emotions and reactions that may have surged within us a decade ago.

The next time you pop a couple of almonds in your mouth, think of a twin set of brain structures that are named after the almond. They are tiny components whose name comes from the Greek which means almond. They are called the amygdala, they help us to recall the emotions associated with events. These small segments of the brain's memory system empowered my daughter to recall with lightning clarity the memories of years past and to relive the emotions associated with that time.

In an online article from NBC news, an expert confirms that smell is connected to our memories. "Smells do bring back memories," says Dr. Ken Heilman, James E. Rooks Jr. Distinguished Professor Neurology and Health Psychology at the University of Florida and a member of AAN. "Smell goes into the emotional parts of the brain and the memory parts, whereas words go into thinking parts of the brain." The article goes on to quote him as saying, "When you smell things you remember your emotions ... it's very, very true,"

How infinitely wise our Creator is to design us with the sense of smell, connect it to our emotional memories and then bath the experience of smell with the weight of spiritual significance! We understand the power of a memory of fragrance to bring pleasure, recall joyous times and attach an emotion for a lifetime. The following verse uses the word picture of fragrance to explain its spiritual significance. Just as a new baby exudes sweetness and love with his or her newborn smells, so God considers us as newborn babes in Christ, a sweet reminder of His Son and the mystery and majesty of the spiritual new birth. Upon accepting Him as Savior, we immediately desire the "sincere milk of the word." (1 Peter 2:2) And all around are sisters and brothers who catch a whiff as they snuggle the new life.

2 Corinthians 2:15 says, "For we are unto God a sweet savour of Christ, in them that are saved, and in them that perish:

When we belong to God, we become a sweet savour of Christ, wafting the fragrance of His love and longing for all to come to Him and find rest for their souls. Just as warm cinnamon buns fresh from the oven create a longing to taste one, so we, as Christians, can create that same longing as we allow the sweet fragrance of His love to waft from us and into the direct path of those around us. Practically speaking, Philippians 4:18 and Proverbs 27:9 advise us how to send the sweetsmelling gifts of the fragrance of Christ into the hearts of those around us. It is through the:

- 1. gentle everyday gifts of meeting needs and the
- sweet counsel of a friend that is willing to listen and to enter into a conversation designed to heal and to help.

My daughter found what she was looking for in that tattered file folder. However, the memories lingered, following her gently throughout the day, and they became topics of conversation as she remembered her college friends and the good times of youth. Much like these memories, the fragrance of our Christianity lingers after we leave the presence of others, perhaps prompting them to further talk about the sweet fragrance of Jesus and His love. The next time you immerse yourself in the fragrance of nostalgic memories that bring a smile, remember that a life of pure devotion to Christ can bring a sweet fragrance into the heart of those whose lives are desperate for a gentle reminder of God's all-encompassing love for them!

North Carolinians cannot conceive of a scenario where they could be fired for misconduct or lying on their application forms and then get their jobs back. However, the Internal Revenue Service has made a practice of just this and, for the second time, has been caught by the IRS watchdog.

A recent report from the Treasury Inspector General for Tax Administration (TIGTA) found that 200 of the 2,000 employees that were rehired to work at the IRS from January 2015 to March 2016 were originally fired for substantiated performance or conduct issues, including willfully failing to file taxes. While working for the government agency responsible for collecting taxes.

In response, I have reintroduced the Ensuring Integrity in the IRS Workforce Act of 2017. This bill, S. 1643, would bar the IRS Commissioner from rehiring employees separated from the agency due to such issues. The rampant abuse at the IRS has continued and thrived for far too long, and the time to put a stop to these atrocious practices is now.

The American people are sick and tired of Washington at its worst. We have Americans paying the salaries of IRS workers who have repeatedly cheated the very government they took an oath to serve, and a Commissioner who won't hold them accountable. I've had enough, and I know you have too.

This month, the Senate Democrats ceased their blockade of the President's key staff, allowing more than seventy nominees to move through the Senate. More individuals were confirmed to important posts across the federal government in one afternoon than in the previous six months combined. Hopefully this is a sign of things to come so that we can let experienced individuals get to work in critical positions to serve the American people.

I was proud to have led hearings for a few of these individuals: David Glawe of Iowa, the new Under Secretary of Intelligence and Analysis for the Department of Homeland Security, and Susan Gordon of Virginia, the new Principal Deputy Director of National Intelligence. These dedicated public servants have spent their lives working to protect their country, and I'm thankful for their willingness to serve their country yet again.

I am also humbled to see several former staff members going on to important positions throughout the administration. I am grateful for their work on behalf of North Carolinians, and I know they'll bring the same dedication to all of the Americans they now serve.

The astonishing level of obstruction in the Senate has come to a brief lull, and I am encouraged to see Senators working together for the betterment of the American people. There are still many nominees that have been considered by their respective committees but have yet to be confirmed. When Congress returns, we should pick up right where we left off.

Since 2007, the National Human Trafficking Hotline has received 3,700 phone calls and logged nearly 900 cases regarding human trafficking in our state. This ranks North Carolina in the top ten most trafficked states in the nation. Even more cases go unreported, making this lucrative criminal

# activity a difficult one to control and prosecute. Our state can do better. In this spirit, and with a commitment to curbing a damaging cycle of servitude, danger, and violence endured by the victims, the General Assembly passed Senate Bill 548 which deals a blow to the criminal and inhumane activity of human trafficking. Behind escort services, the second highest prevalence of human trafficking is found in the massage and bodywork industry. While many massage and bodywork establishments are reputable, some operate as a front for human trafficking.

Senate Bill 548 —— Strengthen Human Trafficking Laws/Studies, sponsored by Senators Randleman, Daniel, and Brock, combats this illicit trade, through the following:

- Establishes standards for and requires licensure of establishments providing massage and bodywork therapy services through regulation by the N.C. Board of Massage and Bodywork Therapy.
  - · Requires massage and bodywork therapists to obtain a statewide privilege license.
- Makes it a Class 1 misdemeanor to employ any person to provide massage and bodywork therapy services to the public who is not licensed to provide such services and is not exempt from licensure requirements.
- Increases the felony level for human trafficking. Now, adult trafficking is a Class C felony and child trafficking is a Class B1 felony.
- Directs the Department of Health and Human Services to study the feasibility of providing human trafficking training to health care providers, emergency medical providers, and relevant first responders.

Not subject to regulation are on-site massage performed at the customer's location; establishments within a hospital, nursing home, or similar facility licensed by DHHS; massage and bodywork therapy provided by a sole practitioner; student clinics operated by a Board-approved school, or massage and bodywork therapy programs offered by accredited community colleges, colleges, or universities; and chiropractic physician offices in which massage and bodywork therapy is provided only by a massage and bodywork therapists licensed in North Carolina.

This bill provides law enforcement, as well as the massage and bodywork therapy's regulatory and licensing board with the necessary tools to stop the crime of trafficking at its source, before it can even begin.

The destruction of monuments and other objects of remembrance throughout history did not erase the history they represented.

- In 1944, Nazi Germany destroyed numerous buildings, castles and parks in Poland.
- From 1959 to 1964, Nikita Khrushchev closed and/or destroyed more than 10,000 mostly-rural churches as part of his anti-religious campaign in the Soviet Union.
  - In 2001, the Taliban destroyed 6th century Buddha statues they declared to be "heretical idols."
  - ISIS has destroyed countless historical monuments and artifacts. Their acts have been referred to as a "cultural cleansing."
     We are Americans. We preserve our past and our heritage so we may learn from our successes and our failures.

Destruction of monuments dedicated to historical figures and heroes of our past will not delete the history they represent. In fact, their destruction will only divide us further.

Today, the target of cultural cleansing is Civil War and Confederate monuments. If you support destruction of monuments to that part of our shared history, who is to say monuments to a part of history you want to protect won't be a target tomorrow?

Destruction of monuments is a slippery slope, indeed.

Hundreds of thousands of Americans died during the U.S. Civil War. Monuments and statues across our state commemorate the sacrifices of some 40,000 North Carolinians who died during the war – and the families who sacrificed with them.

In 2015, I voted in favor of a bill that protects all monuments across our state equally from destruction and removal. I stand by that vote, and I will not vote to lessen the protection of monuments should the occasion arise.

If you were to dedicate your time and energy to erecting a monument today, would you want future generations to tear it down in a fit of short-sighted rage? No, you dedicated your time and energy to that purpose because you wanted future generations to remember something significant.

Monuments that our forbearers built should remain so we and future generations may learn from our past.

Willful destruction of property against monuments dedicated to our past and the general lawlessness and violence that surrounded acts of the past week cannot be tolerated. I support the Durham County sheriff's decision to charge those involved in the destruction of a monument in Durham on Monday.

Gov. Roy Cooper said this week that monuments should come down, and the history they represent belongs in museums and textbooks. If he got his way, removal of that history from textbooks and museums would be next.

You cannot rewrite our history, Gov. Cooper. I will not be party to any attempt to do so.

Biting into it, sweet juices ran out of the corners of my mouth and off my chin. I had a thought flood my mind from my youth. One summer, my Uncle Dewitt Buchanan had gone to SC and gotten a pickup load of peaches. I happened to be at his house on the day he was going to sell them. In the 60's, salesmen would go door-to-door. My cousins, Brooks and Keith, helped their father and I got to ride along.

Selling peaches door-to-door may have been a job for some families, or it could



have been considered a ministry even though money was involved. It gave many people the opportunity to have fresh fruit they may not be able to have otherwise.

Fruit and produce wasn't the only products that a salesman might deliver to your door. Encyclopedias, Bibles, cookware, vacuum cleaners and religion were all sold in that fashion. Yes, religion came into our

communities by way of door-to-door salesmen who often shared false doctrines. In some states, this still occurs. I've often heard discussions as to why those determined people were eager to go door-to-door. Yet most Christians do not visit their neighbors to share Jesus.

Now stop for a moment and consider how times have changed. Technology has brought so much more into our homes. Nearly every item you once had to go to a store to purchase can be bought online. We are no longer visited by door-to-door salesmen who may also bring one false doctrine. Our minds are challenged constantly by every religion known to man. Whether it reaches us by way of radio, television, computer, smartphone or video game, as Christians we've got to know what's right and wrong. As Ephesians 6:13 (KJV) reminds us:

Wherefore take unto you the whole armour of God, that ye may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand.



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
#### The Inspiring Word

Probably the most intense moment at the beginning of August would arguably be America's standoff with North Korea. Anyone having real knowledge of world events knows that even though North Korea is very small and very poor they are also controlled by a very unstable dictator Kim Jong Un. Our current focus has been turned to N.K. ability to deliver a Nuclear warhead to the U.S., but let's not forget they also possess Chemicals and the ability to deliver biological weapons as well.

America's leadership found themselves in a very delicate situation. Making the wrong move at the wrong time would have escalated a dangerous threat into a situation being lived out for America and North Korea. While we don't agree with Kim Jong Un we do not want to bring the misery of Nuclear war to any human. However, our leaders were not going to allow that threat to be carried out against our people either. To say we were in a tense situation would be an understatement.

As I reflect on this event and the tension it brought to our lives, I am reminded of a passage from God's word. Luke 21:25-28 "And there shall be signs in the sun, and in the moon, and in the stars; and upon the earth distress of nations, with perplexity; the sea and the waves roaring; (26) Men's hearts failing them for fear, and for looking after those things which are coming on the earth: for the powers

of heaven shall be shaken.

(27) And then shall they see the Son of man coming in a cloud with power and great glory. (28) And when these things begin to come to pass, then look up, and lift up your heads; for your redemption draweth nigh."



As the Lord taught His

disciples about things that would take place shortly in Jerusalem He also spoke to them on a broader level. Part of that teaching was given in the previous paragraph. While the events may not be in numerical order they are given as a general warning and indication of Christs return. Distress of nations is obvious today. The distress of nations like N.K. is obvious, but looking beyond North Korea, we find distress which is just as dangerous, but very close to home. Recently in Charlottesville VA. we saw an ugly situation escalate to a national level with violence and deception creeping into the hearts and lives of people everywhere. Racism, once thought to be largely a part of our history and something we had grown through and put behind us nationally, has suddenly been resurrected. At least the fear of racism has been resurrected. I will not use this article as an opinion piece for Charlottesville, racism, the alt-right or alt-left. I will say this, racism is unjustified anger toward another person because of their color or race. There is no place for it in the heart of a born again Christian. To blame racism on anything other than unconfessed sin is a sin itself. Tearing down history and even rewriting it will not erase it. Pretending sin doesn't exist doesn't erase it either. When Jesus said, "looking after those things which are coming on the earth", He spoke about being distracted by events caused by sin and eventually result in greater sin. I fear what we witnessed in Charlottesville was a testimony of this statement. A horrible act of violence perpetuated by Satan to destroy people for his pleasure. Let's be careful and not get so wrapped up in the drama and the trauma that emotion takes us to a greater sin than we have already witnessed. I fear if we are silenced over the tearing down of monuments we will soon find ourselves facing the removal of God's word because it is considered offensive. The precedent for that argument is being set today. Let's prayerfully, and with love seek the Holy Spirit's direction through God's word and seek the right remedy for the crisis and concern we face.

Our time has come and gone, until next time may God keep you firmly in His grip!

## SafePlace Tips for Back to School Safety

Mitchell County SafePlace is all about keeping ourselves and our children safe. This concern is not just centered around Domestic Violence but in every aspect of life including Back to School. This month I'd like to use our space to give everyone some tips on how to keep your children safe.

#### For Parents

- . Be very clear with the school as to who may, not only check your children out of school, but who can pick them up as school lets out or at bus stops. We suggest you keep this list short; possibly yourself and one trusted friend or relative.
- Children know that we expect them to listen to their teachers in school but do they also know that you expect them to listen and follow the instructions of the

bus driver? If not, make sure the children understand that the bus driver is looking out for them and is trying his or her best to make sure they remain safe.

- If your child's bus driver informs you of behavior issues, PLEASE, take it seriously! It doesn't mean your child is bad, just that it could distract the driver and jeopardize the safety of 20-30 other children.
- If you have a Domestic Violence Protective Order in place, make sure the school not only has a copy on file but also discuss with them how the school will respond if the order is violated on school grounds or at school sponsored events.
- · Make sure you and your child have a "safe" word that only you and they know. Your child will know that anyone who tells them you sent them to get them isn't telling the truth if that person. doesn't know the "safe" word.

#### For Kids

- . If you have to cross the road getting on the bus, wait for the bus to stop, the door is open and the bus driver motions for you to
- ALWAYS cross the road in front of the bus, NEVER behind it.
- · Don't wear headphones on the bus, especially during loading and unloading
- Never bend down to tie your shoe or pick something up when you're crossing in front of the bus. The driver can't see you and you will be in danger.
- · Follow all of the rules of the bus. They are there for your protec-
- · Have a "safe" word with your parent(s). NEVER go with anyone who doesn't know this word.
- · Be a good role model. Your younger brothers and sisters are watching you and it is your duty to show them the right way to act. For Drivers
- Slow way down in school zones!
- Don't change lanes in a school zone, there may be a child cross-
- · Be extra cautious near high schools. There will be a disproportionate number of new, inexperienced drivers. We were all young once so let's look out for them!
- Stop at least 10 feet behind a school bus. The driver needs to be able to see you in his mirror. They are responsible for these young lives so they need to be able to see every potential hazard.
- NEVER, EVER, EVER pass a stopped school bus. Remember, where there are buses there are children!

Keeping these few tips in mind, we can have a safe, happy, fun school year. Together we can make the 2017/18 school year the best ever!!!



Mia Hall Selected as the Next Director of Penland School of Crafts By Robin Dreyer Mitchell County

Penland School of Crafts is pleased to announce that artist, educator, and administrator Maria "Mia" Hall will be its next director, succeeding Jean McLaughlin, who has led the school since 1998. Hall is currently interim chair of the Department of Art and Design at the University of Arkansas at Little Rock (UALR), where she has been a faculty member for ten years.

During her time in Arkansas, she worked on the development of the department's curriculum, served on six hiring committees, helped design and establish a visiting artist workshop series, and organized public events that increased awareness of the university's craft program. She has also been involved with the funding, design, and construction of the new,

In addition to her many activities at the university, she has served on several foundation boards.

Hall's personal work, primarily furniture and mixed-media sculpture, has been shown in numerous exhibitions at venues such as the Arkansas Art Center, 108 Contemporary (OK), University of the Arts (Philadelphia), and Blue Spiral 1 (NC),

Hall describes Penland School of Crafts as "one of the leading institutions for the study of craft-based art making," going on to say that, "in a society that puts increasing value and importance on science, technology, engineering, and math, promoting the hand skills, decision making, ingenuity, inventiveness, and analysis that are required to practice skilled making is not only necessary, but essential."

Alida Fish, chair of the Penland board of trustees and a member of the search committee, says that the committee saw in Hall the kind of skills and experience it was looking for in a new director. "We were particularly struck," she says, "by her genuine interest in people and her commitment to Penland. This, combined with her forward-looking and innovative thinking, is sure to result in a winning outcome for the school."

In accepting the position, Hall said, "I am honored and humbled to be chosen as the next director of Penland School of Crafts. Jean McLaughlin has for years been a formidable role model for me, and I find the Penland staff truly inspiring. My family and I look forward with great enthusiasm and excitement to being part of this phenomenal institution's future."

Hall is married to metalsmith and educator David Clemons, a long-term artist-inresidence at UALR and a regular instructor at Penland. They have a ten-year-old daughter, Fiona. Mia Hall will become Penland director on January 1.

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
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## Pause...and Consider

"Aha!" Exceedingly abundantly above all we ask or think! Imagine...that's beyond trustworthiness. Selah

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
Aha! And we must do the same.

## Honor Saluting Honor

I would like to share something taken directly from The American Patriots Almanac by William J. Bennett and John T.E. Cribb.

"The Civil War came to an end, for all practical purposes, in April 1865 when Robert E. Lee's starving, exhausted Confederate army found itself hemmed in by Union forces in Virginia. On April 9, Lee met with General Ulysses S. Grant in a farmhouse

at Appomattox Court House to offer his surrender. Grant's terms were generous: the Southern soldiers were to be pardoned and could go home with their private property, including their horses, which could be used for a late spring planting. Officers could keep their side arms, and Lee's hungry troops could receive Union rations. "This will have the best possible effect upon the men," Lee observed quietly.

"Three days later the formal surrender took place as Confederate troops marched to stack their weapons and lay down their flags. The Union officer in charge of the ceremony was Joshua Chamberlain, a hero of Gettysburg. Leading the Southerners was General John B. Gordon, who had been wounded many times in combat.

"Chamberlain watched Gordon approaching. As he later described it. "The General was riding in advance of his troops, his chin drooped to his breast, down-hearted and dejected in appearance almost beyond description." Something stirred in Chamberlain's breast. He gave an order, a bugle call sounded, and his men came to attention with their rifles on their shoulders. It was a salute of honor.

"General Gordon looked up in surprise. Recognizing the gesture, he wheeled his horse, dipped his sword, and ordered his own men to return the salute. Lee's defeated veterans stepped forward with heads high and eyes level – honor saluting honor.

"Then it was over. The Union had been tested and had survived. With a salute of soldierly respect, the nation's wounds began to heal. Both sides faced a new beginning as Americans all."

If these men, participants in that horrible War Between the States, having

watched their comrades fall in battle, and at the end of that great conflict turn to honor and salute each other, how can we dishonor their memory with lesser behavior?

People gathered around a statue of Robert E. Lee holding it up as a symbol of white supremacy is exceedingly vile and ungodly.



But there is no sin, no threat to our Union, in visiting such monuments recognizing as Dr. Jerry Newcombe has eloquently stated it, that historical figures are not always "two-dimensional cutouts in a simplistic morality play of obvious good versus obvious evil."

We can honor our past without being in bondage to it.

## Why Children Should Obey Their Parents

We are living in an age of rebellion and defiance. It is evident both in our homes and in society as well. Years ago, defiance from children was not tolerated, but it seems today we have become too lenient in regard to it in our families.

Discipline is taught in the Word of God. Proverbs 22:15 says, "Foolishness is bound in the heart of a child; but the rod of correction shall drive it far from him." Children should be made to obey their mother and father. It should not be an option in the home but a requirement.


There are blessings that come through obedience. Of course, the word "obey" means to do what a law or a person says to do." In the Word of God, obedience is spoken of highly. I Samuel 15:22 reminds us, "Behold, to obey is better than sacrifice, and to hearken than the fat of rams." Obedience reveals wisdom, respect and love. Those elements are missing in so many homes in our generation.

Why should children obey their parents? There are several good reasons that I am going to share with you today.

#### The Bible Commands It

In Ephesians 6:1, the Bible says, "Children, obey your parents in the Lord: for this is right." Look closely at what that verse says to us. If it is right to obey your parents, then it stands to reason, it is not right when children refuse to obey the wishes of their mom and dad. If something is right, it is correct, it is the thing to do. The word "obey" is in the Greek present tense, which suggests an ongoing continued action. As far as the mode goes it is imperative mode, which means it is not an option but a command from the Lord. It is absolutely necessary to have an orderly society that children obey their parents in the Lord.

The phrase "in the Lord" suggests there is a limit to the child's obedience. When a parent is not acting in the Lord, he is not to be obeyed. The Lord has nothing whatsoever to do with the filth of unrighteousness and abuse of precious children. If a child can break away and free himself from such parental corruption, he has every right to be freed from his parent. The Lord came to set men free from the abuse and the filth of sin, not to enslave men to it, and especially not to enslave children to it. One of the most severe warnings ever issued in all of history was issued by the Lord Jesus to adults who abuse children (Mark 9:42-48). The abusing parent had better heed, for one of the things that God will not tolerate—absolutely not tolerate—is the abuse of a child. We must proclaim the Word of God: children are to obey their parents, but they are to obey only if the parents' desire and instructions are in the Lord. If a parent is beating a child black and blue or sexually abusing a child, the child should go to some other adult he feels close to



and ask for his help. And we as ministers of the Lord—ministers who are called to proclaim Christ and to do what we can to bring His righteousness to earth—must teach the truth from the pulpits of the world\* (Preacher's Outline and Sermon Bible).

#### Longevity Encourages It

God told Israel in Exodus 20:12, "Honour thy father and thy mother: that thy days may be long upon the land which the Lord thy God giveth thee." Although that was spoken to Israel it certainly can be applied to us today.



I believe God many times will honor the child who is obedient and shows the proper respect to his or her parents, with longevity of life. Some young people's lives have probably abruptly come to an end because they were not wise enough to listen to what their mother and dad had to say to them.

In the Old Testament, some children were taken by the elders to the gates of the city and stoned because they would not co-operate with their parents.

Deuteronomy 21:20-21 tells us, "And they shall say unto the elders of his city, this our son is stubborn and rebellious, he will not obey our voice; he is a glutton, and a drunkard.

And all the men of his city shall stone him with stones, that he die: so shalt thou put evil away from among you; and all Israel shall hear, and fear."

The people of the past and the Word of God takes disobedience to parents as a very grave and serious matter.

#### Order Demands It

If we are to have an orderly and decent society, children must be taught to obey when they are young. Rebels and anarchists in society often come out of homes where they were not taught to be under authority.

There is a chain of command in the home, and even so in our society. The Bible teaches us to be in submission to the authorities that be so that things can be done decently and in order. Kids must learn to put themselves under the authority of the mom and dad, to prepare them to be responsible citizens, when they become late teens and enter adulthood.

### Love and Respect Produces It

If a young person respects his parents and has the love for them he ought to have, then obedience will flow out of that love and respect. Where love and respect are missing, there is chaos, confusion and turmoil in the home. Why not let the love of God flood your soul and love and respect for the parents will come supernaturally?

### God Smiles Upon It

Since God commands us to love our parents, He smiles upon us when we are doing what He wants us to do. If a child is to have the smile of God upon his life, then he would be wise to listen to what his parents have to say to him. Then, he should co-operate fully with them as they seek to guide his life until he is in the place to make his own decisions. I had rather have God's smile than God's frown.

### Peace of Mind Accompanies It

Paul the Apostle said to the church at Philippi-"Those things, which ye have both learned, and received, and heard, and seen in me, do: and the God of peace shall be with you" (Phil.4:9). When we do not do, what we know we ought to do, there is a lack of true peace in our hearts. It is best to just do the will of God and we will have peace and serenity of heart in a troubled and confused world.






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## Son of a Preacher Man

As the son of Billy Graham, Franklin Graham learned many lessons from his father. Read more about his journey from rebellion to reverend.

For all his youthful rebellion, Franklin Graham learned where he started—with family and the church—was where he always belonged

Fast cars. Fast motorcycles. Fast planes. "Anything that blows smoke and goes fast, I like it," says Frank-



lin Graham, son of world famous evangelist Billy Graham. His hankering for adrenaline-pumping experiences hasn't changed even though he parted ways with the rebellious days of his youth and followed his father to the pulpit.

When he crisscrosses the globe on international relief missions, Franklin buckles himself into the cockpit and pilots the plane to whatever destination he's headed. "I've been flying for around 35 years," he says. "Aviation is the one thing I learned in school that I use every week. We have 14 aircraft in the organization, and I fly all of them except the helicopter."

Franklin maintains a hectic schedule of world travel for two organizations. In 1979, he became president and chairman of the board of Samaritan's Purse, an international relief agency with corporate offices in Boone. There, he helps provide assistance to victims of natural disaster, war, disease, and famine in more than 100 countries. He's also the CEO and president of the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association—roles he took on in 2000 and 2001, respectively.

After serving God throughout the world, Franklin anticipates returning to his home, located on more than 100 acres in Boone, and his wife, Jane Austin Cunningham Graham—a hometown girl he met when he was eight years old. It's also the place where they raised their three sons, William, Roy, and Edward; and daughter, Jane Austin.

"It's the only home my wife and I have ever owned. We were just kids when we first came up here to Boone," he says. "I've lived all my life in Western North Carolina, and I can go anywhere in the world. But there's something special when you land in Charlotte, and you see the mountains to the west."

That notion, that he can be anywhere in the world but chooses to come back to the familiar, is a theme that runs through Franklin's life—professionally, personally, and spiritually.

## Battle for Control

Franklin's features are strikingly similar to his father's, especially his magnetic eyes. On the day of this interview, he's dressed in black jeans, purple shirt, and a black Harley Davidson ball cap. He looks more ready to jump onto a motorcycle than lead the faithful and help the needy.

His oversized office provides more insight into his personality and interests. It features an executive desk and conference table, along with a luxurious sitting area that resembles a living room decorated with the leather sofa and chairs and oriental rugs. Some of his hunting conquests—deer and elk—are preserved over the stone fireplace; Franklin has enjoyed the sport since he was a child. And antique guns are displayed on the walls. A multitude of family photos are showcased on the walls, as well as framed photos of his parents arranged on the bookshelves. There were times in his youth when his choices and behavior gave his parents pause as they wondered about the direction their fourth child would take in his life. His teenage years were riddled with fights, cigarettes, and alcohol. In his book, Rebel With a Cause, Franklin writes: His parents "knew much more clearly than I did pressures I faced of being a 'preacher's kid' as well as the oldest son of a 'Christian legend.' I'm sure God gave them wisdom to know that if they pushed me too hard to conform, I might take off running and never come back—not just away from them, but perhaps from God, too."

His parents sent him to a boarding school—Stony Brook in New York—when



he was 13. Enduring his freshman and sophomore years there, he then intensified efforts to persuade his father and mother, Ruth, to allow him to finish his studies at Owen High School near their home in Montreat. They finally agreed to a transfer following Christmas of his junior year. But he continued to be a handful and Owen's principal quickly suspended him for fighting. Franklin also pushed the limits by staying out late and resisting wake-up calls to go to school.

His mother devised creative tactics to wake him, including stuffing a little firecracker under his door and crawling across the roof to knock on his window when he locked her out of his room. Her meddling made him "madder than a hornet," but today he admires the spunk she showed and credits her for his bold spirit. "Mama always had a sense of adventure," says Franklin. "I remember one day there was a rattlesnake in the yard. She took a marshmallow fork and tried to pin the head of the snake down because she wanted to pick it up by the tail. I said 'Mama, what are you going to do with that snake when you pick it up?' She said she just wanted to pick it up. I don't think she ever knew what fear was." Ruth wasn't afraid to dish out tough love to her wayward teenager, but tensions continued to flair at Owen. The principal agreed to let Franklin finish his high school credits while attending LeTourneau College in Longview, Texas. "I did get a diploma from Owen, but I wasn't there my senior year," explains Franklin. "I think they threw the diploma at me." When LeTourneau officials kicked Graham out for breaking rules, he returned home and spent two years at Montreat-Anderson College (now known as Montreat College).

Then in 1972, during a trip to Jerusalem, Graham underwent a personal transformation and committed his life to serving Jesus Christ. He writes, "that night I had finally decided I was sick and tired of being sick and tired. My years of running and rebellion had ended. I got off my knees and went to bed. It was finished." He believes the rebellion he experienced as a young man helps him relate to people he encounters through his ministry. "I went through a period of my life when I questioned and when I didn't want God to be the Lord of my life," says Franklin. "I wanted to be in control. I don't think there's anybody who's ever lived who didn't want to be in control. I found out that trying to be in control only messes things up worse. I think there are a lot of people who are where I was at one time. It just allows me to say, "Hey, I've been there. I know what you're going through.""

#### Preaching a Familiar Message

Franklin has witnessed much suffering during his missions for Samaritan's Purse. He saw "bodies everywhere" and breathed in a "stench that was unbelievable" after a tsunami pulverized Thailand on December 26, 2004. He's comforted people in war-torn countries, and he's helped provide food and medicine to those suffering from dreadful diseases all around the world.

He recently talked with a man in Uganda who shocked him by saying he was thankful he has AIDS. Through his disease, and through the support of Franklin's missionaries, the man found a relationship with Christ. "I've never had anybody tell me that before," says Franklin. "It made me so grateful for our team of men and women who showed love and compassion for him."


As Franklin has matured into his role as an evangelist, it's common for people to compare him with his father. But they are separate individuals, with very different styles. "There's only one Billy Graham," he says. "There will never be another Billy Graham. My father and I are a lot different, but the Gospel that we preach is the same."

Franklin is not the only grandchild to follow in his father's footsteps; many of his close family members are involved in his work. All his siblings, including sisters Anne, Ruth, and Virginia, and his younger brother Nelson have a history of operating the family's organizations. And Franklin's two oldest sons, Will and Roy, have also chosen to serve in the ministry.

In the year [2007] marked a period of significant personal concern, celebration, and grief for Franklin. In March, his youngest son, 27-year-old Edward, suffered shrapnel wounds while serving in Iraq. Then, on May 31, Franklin was beside his father, who turned 89 in November, as he greeted a large crowd and three former presidents to officially dedicate the Billy Graham Library in Charlotte. This wonderful family celebration was followed by sorrow, as Franklin's mother died, at the age of 87, just a few weeks later.

Today, Billy Graham is in declining health and no longer conducts his famous revivals. Instead, Franklin has taken on that role. He called the crusades "festivals," and this year alone he's preached to hundreds of thousands of people, both stateside and international venues such as Panama, Ukraine, Ecuador, and Korea. If you were to ask Franklin where he gets the inspiration and the guidance to maintain such a large ministry and be involved in so many support efforts, the preacher in him would likely give credit to a source on high. But the direction he received from a family who never gave up on him is equally evident.

#### Principal meeting focuses on workforce development

Burke County Public Schools hosted its annual administrators strategic planning session July 17 and 18 in downtown Morganton. The two-day retreat focused on economic development and helped directors, principals and assistant principals connect the dots between education and the workforce.



Guest speakers included Ed Phillips, Burke County director of tourism; Sharon Jablonski, Morganton Main Street director; Bryan Steen, county manager for Burke; Alan Wood, president/CEO Burke Development Inc.; Kasey Cotter with the Historic Burke Foundation; and Randy Burns, Burke County Board of Education chair.

The principals toured the Old Burke County Courthouse, Catawba Brewery Company and downtown Morganton as well as several industries, including Leviton, Continental and Seiren. They also visited the site of the future N.C. School of Science and Math West on the campus of the North Carolina School for the Deaf, Broughton Hospital to learn about the proposed re-use project, and the new Mountain View Elementary School construction site.

"This retreat was laser focused on economic development," said Burke County Public Schools Superintendent Dr. Larry Putnam. "We held an intense twoday event and talked about everything from teaching soft skills to enticing our students to stay in or return to Burke County to live and work after they graduate from Burke County Public Schools. We have been getting out and taking industry tours for three years now and have worked hard on relationships with Western Piedmont Community College and our County Commissioners and just wanted to connect the dots for our school leaders on what is made in Burke, how bright our future looks and the role our school system plays in economic development."

Wood told principals the existing industries in the county are doing well and even expanding, including Continental, and there are many opportunities on the horizon for Burke County. "The keys to attracting industries are the education system and the workforce, and I brag about our school system all the time," Wood

Steen said, "You have a very important job in economic development. I am glad you have had this opportunity to see what our county offers as we continue to

At the end of the two-day retreat, the principals reflected on what they had learned and observed.

Several of the principals who have children of their own said. they are excited about what jobs are available for the Burke County workforce and see that the workforce and education communities are taking steps now that will hopefully lead to their kids to coming back home after college.

"As a parent, it is exciting to see what's coming for my own kids," said Heidi Bristol, principal at Ray Childers Elementary

Kristen Edwards, assistant principal at East Burke Middle School, said, "This has helped me to see our purpose and the big picture of what we are preparing our students for and that is to come back to our community and to contribute to our community. My family is a close family, and I'm glad there are things to come back to for my kids."

The industry tours allowed principals to interact with some of their students' parents.

Chesterfield Elementary School Principal Charles Williams said, "It was interesting to see where our parents work and where they spend the majority of their day.





Table Rock Middle School Principal Jennifer Hawkins said she saw real-world applications for classroom lessons. She said, "As a teacher, I always liked to have an application for a concept, and on these tours, I saw some examples of that. Continental had an electron microscope. That will make it real for the students to

Anna Moose, assistant principal at Freedom High School, said, "This retreat has helped me think about what we are doing to help cultivate skills in students that are needed for the workforce."

Lannie Simpson, director of ELL, said, the two days helped show her the importance of instilling life-long learning. "The rate of innovation is so fast and changing so much that we can't train specific skills because they will be obsolete." She reiterated the importance of teaching students to be adaptive and willing to learn new skills.

Burns said, "I see traditional education moving away from the model of giving the students a problem to solve to having student identify the problems that need to be solved and then solving them."

He also thanked the principals for all they do and reinforced his commitment to helping our students by continuing to build upon partnerships with Western Piedmont Community College, local governmental agencies and business and industry. He said, "Everything is about relationships."

The principals also took part in several fun activities, including painting and then hiding rocks for the Color Burke! Facebook project.

#### BCPS elementary schools to start GEMS clubs Activities focus on STEM for girls

Seven teachers and media coordinators from Burke County Public Schools are now Girls Excelling in Math and Science (GEMS) club coaches. Elise Hembree, from WA Young; Karen Breedlove from Forest Hill; Emma Watson from Salem: Karen Goins from Drexel:



Amanda Garrison from Drexel, April Robinson from Oak Hill and Lisa Nichols from Valdese were among the 27 educators from across the region who spent the week of Aug. 7 at the NC Center of Engineering Technologies (NCCET) training to start GEMS clubs at their schools.

The goal of GEMS clubs is to enhance self-efficacy and skills in female students in elementary and middle schools. These school clubs focus on females in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) careers through inquiry-based


This project was developed and implemented by STEM West, the educational arm of Workforce Development of the Western Piedmont Council of Governments, and funded by the Duke Energy Foundation and the Appalachian Rural Commission. STEM West partnered with the NCCET and The Science House of NCSU to provide training.

Dr. Laura Bottomley of Women in Engineering from NCSU kicked off the training. She shared research about females in STEM careers and why these clubs are important to the community. On the second day, GEMS coaches Dee Chinault and Corry Broxterman from Charlotte Mecklenburg shared practical experience they learned from their club of five years. On the third day, Gina Barrier of The Science House/NCSU, trained the coaches in data-collection devices and Makey, Makeys. The GEMS coaches have access to the free equipment loan program to use in their GEMS clubs.

WA Young, Forest Hill, Drexel, Salem, Oak Hill and Valdese will start their new GEMS clubs in the fall. Using grant funds to purchase materials or fund club field trips, they will provide experiences for approximately 30 girls in each club to build their confidence and provide opportunities in the STEM fields.

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
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
