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



Sharing the Gospel in Oslo, Norway By Franklin Graham

Dear Friend,

"Truth is flexible"—that's the brightly lit message above a popular pedestrian bridge in the heart of Oslo, the capital city of Norway. The bridge is

Norway is a beautiful, friendly, and prosperous country, but that sign is an illustration of how far Norwegian culture has drifted from its long and rich Christian heritage. Nearly 9 out of 10 Norwegians are members of a church, just as their parents and grandparents have been for generations. But today not even 1 in 10 actually goes to church. As secularism has taken root and spread, many in Norway—as in our own country—believe that truth is what you want it to be or what feels right to you. Yet when we take our last breath on earth, that thinking won't stand. Each of us steps into eternity in one of only two places—Heaven or Hell.

To show us the only true way to salvation and eternal life, the Bible points directly to "the message of truth, the gospel" (Ephesians 1:13, NASB) and tells us that the "truth is in Jesus" (Ephesians 4:21). Jesus Himself said, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life; no one



comes to the Father but through Me" (John 14:6). That's the most important truth anyone can hear, and it is what I went to Oslo to preach.

"This has been very revealing to me," one woman in Oslo said after going forward Sunday night during the invitation. She explained that she remembered making a spiritual commitment years ago but had not been going to church or living for Christ. Instead she had settled comfortably into the culture of materialism and apathy all around her.

She told a prayer counselor that God spoke to her heart through what she called "Franklin's short, straightforward" message on sin and grace. She realized she needed to repent and turn away from sin, asking Jesus Christ to forgive her and change her from the inside. "I feel like a new person," she said afterward. "I really needed this tonight." Now she wants to realign her life to focus on the things that really matter.

The Bible says, "God has given us eternal life, and this life is in His Son. He who has the Son has life; he who does not have the Son of God does not have life" (1 John 5:11–12, NKJV). I thank God for doing a mighty work in the hearts of many of those who heard His truth in Oslo, and I thank Him for all those who responded by giving their hearts and lives in repentance and faith to the Savior Jesus Christ. To Him be the glory.

As we look back to the Christmas season, remember that the reason we celebrate is because God sent His Son to earth on a rescue mission. The great wonder of Christmas is that "Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners" (1 Timothy 1:15).

God wants lost people found and rescued before it is too late. We are not meant to be merely spectators in this. It is an urgent mission, and we must take care not to neglect our part in the task. That is why I have just preached in Norway and why the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association (BGEA) proclaims the life-changing Gospel of Jesus Christ at every opportunity in every place possible.

Our hearts are broken over the unthinkable church massacre in Sutherland Springs, Texas. We immediately sent crisis-trained chaplains from our Billy Graham Rapid Response Team to offer spiritual support in any way they could. The chaplains' ministry is very personal—they comfort and care for individuals and families in the Name of Christ, one at a time, listening to people's stories, praying with them, and sharing God's love. During their time in Texas, chaplains prayed with more than 1,000 people affected by the mass murder.

Billy Graham Rapid Response Team chaplains ministered to the people of Sutherland Springs, Texas, following the church massacre there.

Although our chaplain teams can't end the pain or answer all the questions, we are thankful for the special opportunity to bring the love and hope of Jesus Christ into shattered lives and a grieving community. People need to know that He is present and working through both the suffering and the healing. And when God creates the right moment with someone who does not know Christ, the chaplains are always ready to share the Truth that brings lasting comfort and hope. As our nation and the world seem to grow more troubled and chaotic by the day, the Baby born in Bethlehem is the only answer that will last. He is the One who died on the cross for us and rose again, conquering death and rescuing us for eternal life. It is through Him, and Him alone, that we receive God's gift of forgiveness and salvation.

For so many today who suffer under the threat of conflict or acts of terror, Jesus is the Prince of Peace. For people dealing with doubts and discouragement, Jesus is the Wonderful Counselor. For those staring death in the face, Jesus is the Resurrection and the Life. For those who lack strength to face difficult challenges, Jesus is Mighty God.

In 2018 we will be preaching in cities along our nation's West Coast to penetrate the "blue wall." Politicians refer to California and the Pacific Northwest as the "blue wall" because it is a stronghold of liberal politics, but I'm talking about the deep-rooted secularism that dominates the region. Fewer than 1 in 3 people there today



believe that Biblical values—or any religious values, for that matter—should be the ultimate guide for our lives. We want to penetrate this region for Christ. We'll hold prayer rallies and share the Gospel in 17 cities. Pray with us as we plan this strategic tour to pierce the blue wall—not for politics, but for the Gospel and the glory of the Lord Jesus Christ.

We also plan BGEA evangelistic Crusades in over a dozen other cities in North America, Latin America, Australia, Asia, and Europe. To do all this, we gratefully rely on your prayers and your gifts.

The Mystery of the Incarnation

When you read the record of the coming of Jesus into the world—born in a stable, born of a woman, reared in the woodshop of a poor Jewish carpenter—you could not grasp the truth that He was the God-man if the Scriptures didn't reveal it.

This great mystery of the incarnation is the crux and the core of the Christian message. It is the mystery over which

the rationalists stumble, by which the humanists are offended, and by which the world is bewildered.

The natural mind is not equipped to grasp this truth that transcends human wisdom. Paul—after reasoning with the Greeks, who majored in knowledge, and with the Romans, who majored in justice—said, "Without controversy great is the mystery of godliness: God was manifested in the flesh, justified in the Spirit, seen by angels, preached among the Gentiles, believed on in the world, received up in

glory" (1 Timothy 3:16).
I would like you to consider with me three facts regarding the incarnation.
"Christ's coming in the flesh—His invading the world, His identifying Himself with sinful men and women—is the most significant fact of history."

First, the incarnation is a Scriptural fact. The recurring theme of the Bible is the incarnation of Jesus Christ. The prophets wrote of it, the psalmists sang of it, the apostles rejoiced and built their hopes on it and the epistles are filled with it. Christ's coming in the flesh—His invading the world, His identifying Himself with sinful men and women—is the most significant fact of history. All of humanity's puny acts, accomplishments and attainments pale into nothingness when compared to it.

Isaiah said, "Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a Son, and shall call His name Immanuel" (Isaiah 7:14). Even the Savior's entrance into the world was mysterious, transcendent, beyond the grasp of the natural person. But as God, in the person of Jesus Christ, walked and talked with people, they were conscious of the fact that God had manifested Himself in the flesh. Hearts that had been repelled by empty forms of religion ran to Him as starving men and women to a feast.

The distant heavens and the remote earth, the elusive God and the wayward human, were brought into proximity to each other. The fact runs throughout the whole Bible: "God was in Christ reconciling the world to Himself, not imputing their trespasses to them, and has committed to us the word of reconciliation" (2 Corinthians 5:19). "But when the fullness of the time had come, God sent forth His Son, born of a woman, born under the law" (Galatians 4:4). Again, the Bible says, "Being found in appearance as a man, He humbled Himself and became obedient to the point of death, even the death of the cross" (Philippians 2:8). And we read in John 1:14, "The Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we

beheld His glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father, full of grace and truth." And in Philippians 2:7, "But [Christ] made Himself of no reputation, taking the form of a bondservant, and coming in the likeness of men."

Men and women were incapable of coming to God, so God in love and mercy came down to earth to interact with humans. The creature could not come up to God, so the Creator condescended to come down to redeem His creation. Wonder of wonders! God incarnate! God clothed in a human body in the person of Jesus Christ. The Scriptures unite in one voice to declare this.

But He did not come just to be identified with humans—that would inflate our pride all the more. He came not only for identification, but for reconciliation. "God was in Christ reconciling the world to Himself" (2 Corinthians 5:19). "Who being the brightness of His glory and the express image of His person, and upholding all things by the world of His power, when He had by Himself purged our sins, sat down at the right hand of the Majesty on high" (Hebrews 1:3). We exclaim with the song writer, "Amazing love! How can it be that Thou, my God, shouldst die for me?"

Second, the incarnation is a historical fact. Christianity has its roots in the deep, firm soil of history. The doctrine of the incarnation means that God came right down amidst the din and confusion of this world. It means that God was capable of participating in our pain, our suffering, our conflicts and our sorrows. It proves to us that His love was not just a vague theory sung in ancient sonnets or proclaimed by shepherd mystics of the back country, but that it was real, vibrant and realizable.

His incarnation—His being born in human flesh—was for the record. He came to the world, once and for all, that we might forever know that He has an absorbing interest in the way we live, the way we believe and the way we die. He came to demonstrate to us that God and mankind belong together. He came to mankind to mend the gap and fill the gulf that separated the creature from his Creator.

Every move He made, every miracle He performed, every word He spoke, was for the purpose of reconciling a lost world to a loving, compassionate God. "God was in Christ, reconciling the world to Himself."

The historical fact of the incamation is that at a specific time, and at a specific place, God invaded the world with His presence in human form.

I was walking near my home, and I looked down and saw an anthill that had just been crushed. I saw that the carefully planned home was ruined and that several ants had been killed and many had been injured. As I watched them writhing in agony and confusion, I wished for a moment that I were an ant. I wanted to be one of them, so I could explain that I wanted to help them and tell them that I was sorry for the disaster. But I had no way of communicating with them, so I went on my way.

But when God looked down and saw the world devastated by sin, He did not go away! "For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that

He had some buyer's remorse for sure. Sometimes we can feel that way about our lives. We can feel that we went after the thing that glittered and shone, only to find out it was a lemon to us. New Years is about new beginnings. It is a time when we take inventory of what is behind, and look with great expectation to what is ahead.

Looking at what is behind can be uplifting, or it can be discouraging. It is probably a little bit of both. Even more distressing is the expectation society puts on us for success. Due to social media and other outlets, it can seem that our every move is scrutinized. The added pressure can lead to depression, suicide, addiction, or other serious mental health issues. It may seem that you have done many things right this past year, but the few mistakes you have made outweigh all the good you've done. Viewing life this way leads to slippery slopes and destructive

behavior patterns. God has a much different way to view life. Jesus said, "Come to me all that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest." Jesus gives rest from weighty expectations, unrealistic views of ourselves, and others' opinions. Jesus forgives us of our sins and forgets our sins, Hebrews 8:12. If he can forgive and




forget, so we should forgive ourselves. Paul sums it up like this in Philippians 3:13, "forgetting what is behind us, and pressing on to what is ahead for us." If it is behind us God has forgiven us, so move forward. As we begin a New Year, what is it that you need to forgive and forget so that you can move on? Maybe you need to forgive yourself, maybe you need to forgive someone else, or maybe you just need to forget it? Whatever it is that God is calling you to do, you can't do it with a weight tied around your neck. Don't buy the lemon of unforgiveness, buy the message of the grace and mercy of God, and live in 2018!

Also, we need to look ahead. We need to ask God to create in us His supreme desires. It is really important to understand that a New Beginning starts with a heart transplant. Isaiah 43:19 says, "Behold, I will do a new thing now it shall spring forth; shall ye not know it? I will even make a way in the wilderness, and rivers in the desert". Many of us celebrate Christmas and Easter, two symbols of God's ability to do the impossible, but attempt to live life as if God can't or is unwilling to do the miraculous in our own lives. God is willing and able to bring about change of heart and mind in the New Year. God wants you to forget all that stuff that is behind, and believe in all the good he has for you in the future. Your past is forgiven, your present is secure, and your future is bright, when you choose to follow Jesus. When we put our faith in the promises of Almighty God, then we can be sure He is going to respond with a miracle. He specializes in taking the mundane and ordinary, and turning them into miraculous Spirit Beings. John 3:16 says, "For God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believes on Him should have everlasting life." When you ask Christ to come into your heart and life through the power of the Spirit, he makes you a New Creation.

2 Corinthians 5:17 says, "Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold all things are become new." The New Year is about a new opportunity to be transformed by the power of God, to forget those mistakes and sins, and to move, by faith, in the direction God has for your life. When you confess your sins; "Lord Jesus, I have sinned against you, I have done wrong"; when you repent of your sins; "Lord Jesus, I don't want to be this way anymore"; and when you ask him to save you, "Lord Jesus, forgive me and save me", you become a child of the living God. When you become a child of God, you trade in all the lemons for what is real and substantial. May God bless, and Happy New Year.

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High Country Prison Ministry

"You" By Jody Griffin Mitchell and Avery County

Then Jesus said to them again, "As my Father hath sent me, even so send I you." (John 20:21, KJV) Hey "You"! Yes, "You"!

"You" come from all walks of life, in a variety of colors, shapes and sizes. "You" bring the gifts of knowledge, skill and compassion. "You" are the critical ingredient that transforms a prison from a place of containment to a place of opportunity and change! "You"

are volunteers and "You" are providing for the incarcerated a true service! From my perspective as a chaplain, "You" are truly heroes! Every week, I see men and women entering the gates who have come to offer their time and their energy to provide for those who long for someone to encourage and equip them for a new and better life.

"You" serve in a variety of ways! Some are religious volunteers who provide religious education and spiritual inspiration. Others are non-religious, but provide a contribution that enhances the journey through the prison system that helps the inmate see the beauty of life through education, art, music, and more. Some of "You" serve on the Community Resource Council as a liaison between the institution and the broader community. Others of "You" serve as volunteers with AA/ NA. At AMCI, "You" are about 80 strong in number! And "You" make an incredible difference!

I have been part of the everyday life in correctional ministry for some time and I can assure you that without volunteers who are willing to come inside the walls, the person who walks out of the prison at the end of their sentence would be much

less equipped to reenter society in a healthy way.


what you are doing could help to get a program started that could help even more children. We are certainly not in competition because there are too many children who need help.


How many children nowadays are free to run and play and hang upside down in the old apple tree, where their world is safe and innocent.



Food Insecure Children

Nine hundred plus (900) children in Avery County, under the age of eighteen, are food insecure!

That is what I was told some six years ago when I arrived to serve a church appointment in Avery County. Food insecure? What does that mean and whatever it means how in the world could there be nine hundred kids in Avery County seemingly afflicted by it?



The statistic is shocking for certain; yet even to this day I meet people who have no idea the massive number of children in Avery County who have no idea when or where their next meal might come from! Yet, I can't tell you how many times I hear something like, 'Pastor Ted, there is no way. We have RAM, Feeding Avery Families, the Senior Center, and maybe one or two other programs offering food!' Yes, we do have all those wonderful programs in the county and there is still need.


I believe what most people either don't understand or misunderstand is that each program can only offer families three to four days of food. So, there is always a gap, especially in the winter months and in the summer, when school is out, and kids don't have access to reduced or free lunches.

The Avery County Missional Network (ACMN), after much prayer, research, and discernment officially launched in November of 2013. The goal was to work closely with the School System to identify at risk children and provide additional food for the weekends during the school year. The ministry began serving one school with an average of twenty (20) backpacks of food each week.

Today, with the assistance of folks from a variety of local churches and denominations, grants from outside the county, several silent financial partners, support of the Avery County School system, several Avery High School groups, students from Lees-McRae College, as well as many local law enforcement professionals, the ACMN can fill the weekend gap and provide nutritious food to hundreds of

children in the ten schools in the county every week of the school year! In addition, the ministry is also able to provide food for the Summer School program as well as the 4-H summer WOW program.

The reality is teachers already have their hands full in keeping the attention of kids today, they need all the help they can get. A child who has eaten breakfast is always more receptive to learn than one who has a growling stomach because they haven't eaten most of the weekend!



Imagine what it would be like to have more children coming to school on Monday morning ready to focus on their studies and school work instead of the pangs of hunger. The outcome ultimately could be children with higher test scores, higher grades, lower dropout rates, and hopefully more children adequately educated for the job market and /or ready for college.

The ACMN is an ecumenical ministry that operates under the auspices of the 501(C)3 of Linville United Methodist Church in Linville, NC. Please lift the program and the children of Avery County in your prayers!

The winds of time have passed away New life's beauty to unfold The sweetest smile on a baby's face And peace in the eyes of the old.



Sacrifice

Greetings! Happy New Year!! Last week I read an article about an earthquake that startled villagers living on a Japanese seashore over one hundred years ago. They were accustomed to earthquakes, and would soon settle back into their normal activities. One day, after another earthquake hit, above the village on a high plain, an old farmer was watching from



his house. He looked out to the sea, and saw a wall of water approaching. His one thought was to warn the people in the village. He called his grandson, "Bring me a torch! Make haste!" In the fields behind him lay his great crop of rice. Piled in stacks ready for market, it was worth a fortune. This elderly man hurried out with his torch, in a moment the dry stalks were blazing. Then the big bell rang in the village below: Fire! Everyone in the village came! They came to try to save the crops of their neighbor. As they reached the plain, the elderly man shouted at the top of his voice, "Look!" He pointed at the sea. At the edge of the horizon they saw a long, lean, dim line. This line was the sea, rising like a high wall and coming swiftly toward them. Then came

a shock, heavier than thunder. The great swell of water struck the shore, sent a shudder through the hills, and destroyed the village. It struck again, and again, and yet again; then it returned to its place. On the plain no words were spoken. Then the elderly man spoke, saying gently, "That is why I set fire to the rice." While his action did not make sense to the



villagers at first, in the aftermath of the tidal waves, they recognized that his sacrifice saved 400 lives.

Over two thousand years ago on another hillside, another man made a sacrifice that saved countless lives. The Bible says, "Jesus suffered death, so that by the grace of God He might taste death for everyone" (Heb. 2:9). Jesus tasted what everyone must taste - death. Jesus died for everyone, for you and me. But why? Jesus died so that we might live. As He looked at the tidal wave of our sin, from the cross, He willingly experienced the tortures of death, so that we might know the splendor of life. Let me ask you a question? Has anyone ever sacrificed for you? Parents, friends, employees, employers, teachers, relatives, neighbors, and maybe many others.

The sacrifice of Jesus did for us what we could not do ourselves. "God made Him who knew no sin to be sin for us, so that we might become the righteousness of God" (2 Cor. 15:21). The result of sin is that it separates us from God. God made Jesus a sin offering on our behalf. Jesus not only took our place, He took our sin. Jesus had to bear the weight and burden of sin alone in order for salvation to be complete. He died alone in order to save us. He identified Himself with us to make it possible for us to be forgiven and accepted by God. "The curtain of the temple was torn in two from top to bottom" (Mark. 15:38). The veil was torn to symbolize that the death of Jesus had opened the way of access to Him for every person. (Heb. 4: 15, 16). Jesus made the way for us to come to Him, and as our heavenly High Priest, He applies the benefits of the cross.

What Christ has done for you and me, reminds me of the farmer on the plain who torched his rice crop so that the villagers were saved. Jesus is the Son of Man who died so that we might live. As we contemplate what Jesus has done for us, as well as what He is doing for us today; may the impact of His sacrifice and His High Priest ministry in heaven, challenge us to honestly evaluate our relationship with Him. And as we begin this New Year, may it be with a new resolve to be faithful to Jesus; He who gave His all. May His example inspire us to give our all, to love Him and live for Him. Let every purpose we form, every work in which we engage, and every pleasure we enjoy, be to the glory of our Lord. As we await his glorious appearing, may the language of our hearts be: I am thine, O Lord, to live for You, to work for You, and to sacrifice for You!



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Inherited Capital

In the Gospel of Luke, Jesus told a parable about a son who took the inheritance bequeathed to him and wasted it on "riotous living" until he became destitute. When he realized the foolish way he had acted, he returned to his father in hopes of being received as a simple servant, but instead, the father restored him royally. Many call it the parable of the Prodigal Son.



Not long ago, I found a copy of an old devotional written in 1942 by the Episcopal Church based on the story of the Prodigal Son. Its head-

ing read Inherited Capital.

The devotional shared a story about a man and his wife who said to a clergyman, "We both graduated from college, agnostics. We don't go to church. We have two children, seven and nine years of age. We have tried to teach them Christian ideals of right and wrong. Somehow, we have failed. And we have begun to realize that we cannot by ourselves and without belief in God, pass on to the children what we inherited from our church and our church-going homes. Will you give us some books to read that we may regain our faith?"

The devotional then went on to make the point: "The Prodigal Son had used up his material wealth: this couple their spiritual. Only a return to the Father could replenish it. Have we not been living on inherited capital in every phase of our life? This inherited capital may last through the second generation but not through the third. Christian standards of right and wrong lose their strength and dynamic without convictions of God and Christ. Let us return to our Father."

Interestingly, we are now coming to the end of three generations since that devotional was written. And it's abundantly clear that the inherited capital of our Christian culture has been extravagantly wasted and is now in tremendous depletion.

One of my favorite books is by the authors, the late Dr. D. James Kennedy and Jerry Newcombe, titled, What if Jesus Had Never Been Born? The book irrefutably demonstrates the unprecedented impact for good that Christianity has had on the world, especially western society.

Here are a few highlights from the book:

Most of the world's greatest universities were started by Christians for Christian purposes. Literacy and education for the masses, capitalism and free enterprise, Representative government, the separation of political powers, civil liberties, modern science, the abolition of slavery, the elevation of the common man, the elevation of women, a higher sexual ethic that has protected the human race, a high regard for human life, higher standards of justice, the greatest works of art and music, and countless lives changed from liabilities to assets, have their roots firmly in the rich soil of the Christian religion.

"The religion of Jesus Christ has done more to elevate moral standards than any other force in history," wrote Kennedy and Newcombe. This same Christ who changes the soul has also changed the whole world for the better.

But the authors also noted the way that many in the West now reject Christ and the clear teachings of God's Word. "We have created a morals-free, values-free society, and now we are reaping the whirlwind. All of the scandals we've seen

in America — in government...even in the Church — are simply the pimples on the surface that are arising from the moral corruption within," they wrote.

The late R.C. Sproul spoke of this same problem in a sermon titled, The Parable of the Mustard Seed. Sproul said:

"You look at our own culture and it seems as



if the church is in decline. You look at Western Europe and you read that in most of the countries in Western Europe the attendance in church on Sunday morning is about 2 percent. The great cathedrals have become, in the words of the skeptics, mausoleums of a God who is dead. And the historians say of our own nation, that now we live in the post-Christian era, where if Christianity is not dead, it is at least rendered irrelevant. The federal government of the United States has declared independence from God, interpreting the separation of church and state to mean the separation of the state and God. The things of God are banished from the public square, from the schools, from the halls of Congress, from the courts, unless or until there is a national catastrophe like 911, and then all of a sudden the churches are revisited for a little while until all the panic subsides."

Yes, we've been living on inherited capital for a long time, but we've wasted and neglected what was passed down to us to the place that today we're spiritually destitute – spiritually bankrupt. If we don't change our direction, if we don't change our ways, the incredible good that we have enjoyed and sadly taken for granted won't be there anymore for our children.

Every New Year provides us with a new start — a new chapter to be written. Isn't it time that we came to our senses like the Prodigal Son? Isn't it time for you to turn from your sins and surrender completely to Jesus Christ? Isn't it time to get you and your family into a strong Christ-centered church that respects the authority of the Holy Scriptures? Isn't it time to return to the Father?

If we're sincere in our repentance, he will restore us royally.

The Book (Continued)

From the now exposed bare floor beneath the tree I retrieved an unopened gift. It was wrapped in what appeared to be ancient parchment paper and tied simply with brown twine. With trembling hands I untied the string and gently peeled away the fragile paper. Inside was a book and with the book was a note, "To You, from Martin."



Opening the book I read the first line, "In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth." Flipping ahead I continued to read. God created man in His own image...male and female He created them. The Lord God said to the woman, "What is this that you have done?" Then I read about the Passover and the sacrifice of the unblemished lamb. Several pages later I read that an angel of the Lord said, "Today in the city of David there has been born a Savior, who is Christ the Lord." The Book I was holding in my human hands was not just words on paper but rather the Bible, words inspired by none-other than most Holy God.

The Martin I referred to in my fictional story above was Martin Luther, born 1484 in Eisleben, Germany. October 2017 marked the 500th anniversary of his posting of the Ninety-five Theses on the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg. Germany. That was the beginning of the Protestant Reformation and the revival of the written Word of God which had basically been lost for several centuries. Trying to pursue heaven by way of the Holy Roman Church proved to be an impossibility for Luther. No amount of confession of sins even to the extent of becoming a monk and obtaining the position of priest satisfied his craving for perfection. That is until the day he had access to the Book.

It's hard to believe, but the Bible was not required reading for monks. Only during a short time as a Novice Monk while in his 20's did Luther have access to the Bible. After becoming a monk, one was not allowed to have a Bible but Luther, having tasted the Word, made good use of the copy in the monastery library during his private time. His life would never be the same as he learned that salvation is not by works, but by faith alone. No longer able to tolerate his writings and sermons, the Holy Roman Church and Pope Leo X excommunicated Luther in 1521.

One of the things that Luther pursued from that time forward was to make the Bible available in the language of "the common people." The original Scriptures were handwritten on leather or parchment scrolls, Old Testament in Hebrew and New Testament in Aramaic and Greek. They remained that way for one hundred years after Christ, before they were compiled into book form. In AD 405 Saint Jerome translated the Bible into Latin for the Holy Roman Church; however, it lay dormant for nearly a thousand years, basically ignored by the Roman Church and was certainly unknown by the common man.

In 1523 Luther translated the Bible into the German language and for the first time "the common people" in the Holy Roman Empire could read the inspired words of God for themselves. John Wycliffe, in the 1380's, was the first to translate it into the Middle English language of Chaucer. In 1611 King James of England had it translated into what was the common English language of his time, Shakespearean English. The New American Standard Version, translated from the original Hebrew, Aramaic and Greek, is said to be one of the most accurate literal translations in our modern day English.

The Bible is now the most printed book ever and is available all over the world in various languages. At the same time it's the most ignored book by many, even some who confess to be Christians. In the past, men have dared to take a stand for the Bible, putting their lives at risk, some killed and some burned alive at the stake. We must never take for granted how blessed we are to have such easy access to the written Word of God.

Five hundred years ago Martin Luther in his search for the truth discovered the armor of God and the "Sword of the Spirit". It was then that he took a courageous stand and wrote these powerful words, "A simple layman armed with Scripture is to be believed above a pope or a council without it."



We have wonderful preachers, teachers, books, commentaries, lessons, studies of the original languages, Bible Colleges, seminary schools, etc. God has used great Christians in the past to study the Bible, write, and pass wonderful teachings along to future generations. When it comes to equipping ourselves in the study of God's Word, we have no excuse, at least in our country, anyway. Many Christian's ineptness in the Word simply comes from being too lazy to spend time studying.

Not only is the Word of God to be studied, but it is also for us to apply. What I mean by "apply" is that God's word is to be lived out in our everyday lives. A professor of mine when I attended Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute used to say this: "When we chose to not apply the Word of God to our lives, it's like staring at a bottle of medicine, never taking it, and wondering why we're not getting better!"

One of the most outstanding portions of scripture on applying God's Word to our lives comes from the book of James Chapter 1:22-25 But be ye doers of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving your own selves. For if any be a hearer of the word, and not a doer, he is like unto a man beholding his natural face in a glass: For he beholdeth himself, and goeth his way, and straightway forgetteth what manner of man he was. But whoso looketh into the perfect law of liberty, and being not a forgetful hearer, but a doer of the work, this man shall be blessed in his dood. James uses the illustration of someone looking at themselves in a mirror, seeing all that needs to be changed, walking away, and forgetting about what they saw. Most all of us have mirrors in our house. We stand in front of those mirrors, so we can see what we look like. We'll comb our hair, wash our face, shave, straighten our shirts and ties, etc. These mirrors are used to show us what we actu-

ally look like so we can fix those things that aren't right. James teaches that those who only hear and refuse to apply the word, are like someone who looks in the mirror, sees their hair all messed up and walks away without combing it! Those who only hear but never do.



never get to experience the blessing of walking in God's Word.

God has allowed me to be involved in Christian ministry for around 25 years, almost eighteen of those as a preacher and pastor. I'll be the first to admit that I'm still learning. There have been times where I studied like I should and times I didn't. One thing is for sure, my Savior has brought me a long way from where I started. He has taught me that the real blessing of this Christian life is being a "doer of the Word". There have been times that I've experienced the blessing of walking in His Word and times that I've experienced the consequences of not walking in His Word. Over these many years I've encountered people who can quote more scripture than me, but their life is in constant shambles. They hear, study, and even memorize the Word of God, but for whatever reason, refuse to apply it. They have the medicine but refuse to take it. They have the light but won't turn it on. They have the bread but neglect to eat. All the while, they keep struggling and struggling in their lives and can't seem to realize the answer to their problems has already been given to them: be a doer of the Word!

Starting a new year always makes us think of new beginnings. Perhaps for our health, for our relationships, our careers, etc. If there is one resolution that we all need to make it is that we would be doers of the Word and not just hearers only. There is a quite a difference between knowing the Word and living the Word. May God help us to live the Word and be blessed!

City-folk rarely encounter such simple pleasures.

Houses and Warm Clothes

On Thursday, November 30, at the weekly meeting of the Rotary Club of Spruce Pine, members and guests received an informative and inspiring program provided by members of the Mitchell-Yancey Habitat for Humanity and by two recipients of the current Habitat home located in Ledger in Mitchell County. The program was introduced by Rotarian

Arch Woodard and led by Gary Ray, President of the M-Y Habitat for Humanity Board of Directors. Assisting Gary were staff: Jim Erlandson and Steve Bruton. Comments were also provided by Jessica Hoyle and Joey Stout whose Habitat home is under construction in Ledger and nearing completion. Gary discussed options Rotarians and others have as potential volunteers with Mitchell-Yancey Habitat and explained the initiation of a Neighborhood Revitalization (NR) pro-

gram starting in Yancey County in early 2018 and in Mitchell County later in 2018. This program typically serves older residents who choose to "age in place" in their homes, yet have limited financial resources and are in need of home repair and remodeling services. Jim, who serves as Chair of the Construction Committee, presented an excellent slide show of the progress from the beginning of the Habitat home in Ledger, including time-lapse photos of the exterior walls being completed in one hour and forty-five minutes.

The slideshow brought viewers right on site, as the project progressed to date. Jessica and Joey gave real meaning to what Habitat is all about, as they described the impact of a new home on their lives with their son, Waylon. Rotarian Marvin

Walker has served the local Habitat as a board member, volunteer and a member of the Family Selection Committee for Habitat affiliate homes for many years. When requested by Gary Ray, several Rotarians raised their hands as having volunteered for constructing homes.

Ruby Greene, a member and Past President of the Rotary Club of Spruce Pine, led the club members in donating, collecting and delivering winter clothing for homeless veterans in Asheville, North Carolina. These generous donations were delivered by Ruby to the Asheville Buncombe Community Christian Ministry (ABCCM), Veterans Services of

the Carolinas. Ruby stated that, when she arrived with the clothing, the trailer where they are stored was almost empty, showing how much the clothing is needed. With the encouragement of Spruce Pine Rotary President, George Nero, Ruby announced in several weekly club meetings her plans to collect and deliver winter clothing for homeless veterans in Asheville. Club members responded with generous donations of winter clothing for men and women.

ABCCM's Homeless Services program is made up of two transitional housing facilities: The Veterans Restoration Quarters for men and the Steadfast House for women and children. Both of these facilities provide housing, food, case management, education and connection to both mental and physical health providers to their residents. All residents are supplied three meals per day and have access to a nurse, computer lab, gym and laundry room privileges. They also receive transportation services to the VA Medical Center and downtown Asheville. The goal of these programs is to move the resident from a state of homelessness to a position of self-sustainability.

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
Tim's Treasures

North Carolina Under the Siege of Tyranny

Charles de Montesquieu, the French lawyer, writer, and political philosopher, whose works had a profound influence on America's founders, once said, "There is no crueler tyranny than that which is perpetuated under the shield of law and in the name of justice."

perpetuated under the shield of law and in the name of justice."

My beloved state, North Carolina, is under siege from tyrants who operate "under the shield of law and in the name of justice." The Fourth Circuit Court of Appeals has the state and its future firmly under its iron

rule, and yet, there's been little outrage by the state's citizenry.

Daniel Horowitz, in Fourth Circuit Takes Control of North Carolina, summarizes the way this unelected body has destroyed the state's right to self-determination. He writes:

"They have mandated transgenderism, blocked every voter integrity law, required very specific times and amounts of early voting, criminalized voluntary public prayer, and erased every single districting map – from federal and state districts to even county school board maps in the middle of an election season and after candidates already spent enormous sums campaigning. Again, this was all done by federal, not state courts. They are rendering elections moot and are now ensuring that conservatives can never win elections by ruling Democrat racial gerrymander advantages into law and into the Constitution."

Horwitz's description of the matter isn't hyperbole in the slightest.

Stephen McDowell and Mark Beliles rightly argue in Liberating the Nations, the concept of Constitutionalism in America stretches back to the Hebrew Republic which Moses presented to the Israelites via the Book of the Covenant. It contained the Ten Commandments, as well as a companion body of law. Although these laws were inspired by God, they were handed down to the people for their adoption. Exodus chapter 19 reveals this was necessary for the people to enjoy the benefits of these laws.

God is sovereign. If we break his laws, they will break us. Still, God allows us to choose. He will not force himself upon us. Consent is necessary to know the blessings of his way. We can garner from this example provided in Scripture that tyranny is always from the top down and never operates with the consent of the people.

McDowell and Beliles also note that even when Israel changed its form of government to that of a monarchy, the king was still required to abide within and govern by the Covenant or the Book of the Law – law, by the way, which reflected the character of a benevolent and just God. America's Founders took this concept and wove it into our nation's framework, clearly stating in the Declaration of Independence that "just powers are derived from the consent of the governed."

Certainly, the most fundamental principle of a free society, one governed by Constitutionalism, is the right to vote – the right of the people to decide their own destiny. Nevertheless, "under the shield of law and in the name of justice," the Fourth Circuit has decided it shall decree to North Carolinians in what manner they may cast their votes in the next election.

Once again, let me refer to Horowitz, who gives us the play by play here:

"[A] three-judge panel within the Fourth Circuit and the [U.S.] Supreme Court
struck down both the federal and state [legislative district] maps [that state lawmakers drew] in the Tar Heel State.

"It is first important to recognize that North Carolina received pre-clearance from Obama's Justice Department, and the maps were upheld twice in state court. That should have ended the matter. Federal courts should have no jurisdiction over state legislative maps. Yet the federal courts nullified 28 legislative districts and remanded back to the three-judge panel, which includes two Obama-appointed judges.

"The North Carolina legislature went back and drew a new, clean map that is better than anything Democrats put out when they had control for 100 years. That should have ended the matter. Yet the Obama judges, who have been accorded God-like power over subject matter the Constitution did not entrust to them, want to make sure the maps maximize the Democrat Party advantage. They gave standing to another lawsuit challenging three Senate and nine House districts. Last Thursday, [October 26th], in a written order, Judge Catherine Eagles wrote on behalf of the three-judge panel that she feels the new map doesn't redress the 'constitutional' violation and is 'otherwise legally unacceptable' — in other words, it doesn't contain enough Democrat advantages. So, in the ultimate act of legislating from the bench, the judge said that due to 'the technical nature of determining an appropriate remedy' and 'exceptional circumstances,' the court is appointing a 'special master' to oversee the maps.

"Thus, an unelected federal court with no constitutional jurisdiction over maps cleared by the DOJ [Department of Justice] and state courts is now requiring that de facto veto power over the new maps be given to an unelected 'expert."

The unelected 'expert' chosen by the Fourth Circuit Court is Stanford University law professor, Nathaniel Persily, from California.

Can you believe this? The situation is so egregious and shocking that it's difficult for the average citizen in our state to process. It's so bad that many, without carefully thinking, might simply dismiss it as an unfortunate consequence of Republican gerrymandering.

At the risk of being perceived as partisan, let me say that such a conclusion would be nonsense. North Carolina is in the throes of something unlike anything it's ever experienced in its history since the American Revolution and "no taxation without representation."

Back in October, North Carolina House Rep. David Lewis (R-Harnett) and Sen. Ralph Hise (R-Mitchell) chairman of their respective chambers' redistricting committees have said the "order provides absolutely no legal or factual basis for objecting to the new maps, while also potentially delegating the legislature's constitutional authority to draw districts to a lone professor in California with no accountability to North Carolinians."

Lewis and Hise also rightly contended that to

hand the responsibility of the state's redistricting maps "to a single person on the other side of the country is an outrageous and extraordinary violation of the principle of federalism and our state's sovereignty."

Since making these statements, Lewis and Hise have had the opportunity to review the new maps made by Persily. In a statement released today (December 1) they said that Persily has confirmed their "worst suspicions" and "this entire 'judicial process' is little more than a thinly-veiled political operation where unelected judges, legislating from the bench, strip North Carolinians of their constitutional right to self-governance by appointing a left-wing California professor to draw districts handing Democrats control of legislative seats they couldn't win at the ballot box."

I must agree with Horowitz's conclusion on this matter, "While legislative gerrymandering can be insidious, it is not nearly as tyrannical as judicial gerrymandering, which is unconstitutional and against which there is no remedy."

No remedy? Perhaps. But I'm inclined to believe that if freedom remains precious enough to its beneficiaries they'll find one.


Charles de Montesquieu also said, "The tyranny of a prince in an oligarchy is not so dangerous to the public welfare as the apathy of a citizen in a democracy."

The federal judiciary is off the rails and can only be set right by a citizenry that

will no longer consent to its illegitimate yoke.

The Appalachian trail in Avery and Mitchell counties are some of the roughest and highest



needing to be milked here shortly. Not my favorite job, but the milk sure is good, especially when we just squirt it in our mouths. Sis and I like to make a game with it.





Have you ever opened the door to a new world and knew that you would stay a while? That first contraction, signaling parenthood?, the thrilling initial flight of a new career?, or perhaps the pure joy of finding your soulmate? Tentatively at first, and then more boldly, you peek around the edge to see the possibilities of fulfillment, wisdom, and purpose.

Joshua 1:8 says, "This book of the law shall not depart out of thy mouth; but thou shalt meditate therein day and night, that thou mayest observe to do according to all that is written therein: for then thou shalt make thy way prosperous, and then thou shalt have good success."

Joshua 1:8 opens the door to a world of understanding Almighty God Who formed your heart to function, your mind to create, and your spirit to crave Him. Do this:

- Read about Him (and yourself) in His letter to you.
- Drink in the possibilities of a life with Him as your Guide.

Reading the Bible through offers a little-known aerial view of the Scriptures that is not easily seen in the minutiae of each word and the intricate filigree of verses. As you read, a divine drone sails off into the unknown, scaling impossible peaks of miracles and wonders. It dives into the deepest part of mankind, discovering a yawning maw, a palpable yearning for the God Who created it. Soaring up into the Sonlight, the Word of God changes all it touches and gilds our lives with the laser light of His glory, lifting our spirits and filling us with His love. All brought about by this idea: Just. Simply. Read. Start anywhere in the 66 books of the Bible. Or, begin with a plan. Perform aerial stunts such as reading a book backwards to observe its structure. But do this: Just. Simply. Read.

Typically, we think of reading the Bible through as defined by a year. But this is not necessarily the case. My daughter read through the Bible in 35 days. (A minor part of that was listening on the way to work and back.) What happens when you Just. Simply. Read.? In her words:

- I learned more truth by simply reading through the Bible.
- Reading the Bible through changed my whole year even though I participated actively only 35 days. The blessings continued far past the actual challenge.
- Reading the Bible through changed my thoughts because the Bible was always fresh on my mind
- · The daily reading reminded me of the Bible's relevance to my life and how it connected to daily situations.
- God cleared my schedule, (canceling a whole semester of classes in a music program), to provide more time to read His Word.
- I realized that reading through the Bible was so doable and simple. God gave me the strength to make it through.
- I would do it again because I see the benefits, how meaningful it is to life, and how God honors the reading of His Word.

Simply. Read the Bible through. Know this:

- that God will smile on you;
- that you will be changed;
- and that the door to a new world filled with the God Who created you will beckon you in.

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

Suffering... Hope's Distant Cousin

For God alone, O my soul, wait in silence, for my hope is from him. He only is my rock and my salvation, my fortress; I shall not be shaken. On God rests my salvation and my glory; my mighty rock, my refuge is God. (Psalm 62:5-7 ESV)

David returns to his opening thought. (see verse 1) For God alone, O my soul, wait in silence. Why? For

my hope is from him. As I am writing this the forecast is calling for snow tomorrow. I hope it snows—I really do! That idea of hope is not what David means here. Most of the time we use the word hope for "wish." I wish it would snow tomorrow. I wish the Panthers would win. I wish...

Biblical hope is far more than a wish. Biblical hope is the sure promise of future reward. Paul talks about this kind of hope in Romans 5:

Therefore, since we have been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ. Through him we have also obtained access by faith into this grace in which we stand, and we rejoice in hope of the glory of God. Not only that, but we rejoice in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, and hope does not put us to shame, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us. (Romans 5:1-5)

Paul tells the believers in Rome that they can rejoice in sufferings. Why? Paul isn't advocating an emotionless response to the very real pain of life. No! Rejoicing in suffering is possible for the same reason a mother endures the pain of giving birth to a child: the hope of holding that child in her arms as a newborn. Our hope is fixed on the glory of God—we live to honor Him. And strangely enough it comes through waiting and suffering.

Suffering initiates a domino effect: suffering produces endurance, endurance produces character, and character produces hope. Hope grows best in the soil of suffering. Notice the distance between suffering and hope. Suffering is followed by endurance (which takes time). Endurance is followed by character (which is built over time). Character produces hope.

For some of you this has been the worst year of your life. Your suffering is so intense that hope seems a distant dream, a far-flung idea. Don't despair. Hope is coming! Endure—don't quit!

David writes: He only is my rock and my salvation, my fortress; I shall not be shaken. On God rests my salvation and my glory; my mighty rock, my refuge is God. Today, lean in on God. Wait on him-quieten yourself before him. He is your refuge, your safe place...your hope.



The majority of our volunteers work approximately four hours per week. Looking back, 2017 has been a truly outstanding year at BUCM. With the support of our sustaining churches, community donors, volunteers and staff the needs of many have been met. Almost 63,000 meals were served in the soup kitchen, about 700,000 lbs. of food was distributed in our food pantry and over 100,000 in our mobile pantries, over 1,000 clients were assisted in our clothing closet and over 9,000 clients were provided with some type of that assisted with these drives. With the support of the HOWI (Homeless tee, assistance was provided to over showers, food to encouragement, we take very seriously our ministry to the

crisis assistance. Also, the many food and clothing drives in 2017 have been instrumental in allowing us to minister to our clients. A big thanks to schools, clubs, churches, businesses, and others Outreach Warming Initiative) commit-270 homeless clients. From clothes to homeless of Burke County.

The successes of 2017 have motivated BUCM to expand our ministry for 2018. The need for education advancement is a need for many we work with at BUCM. Because of a very generous donation from the employees of James







Tool and principal owner, Jeff Toner, a computer lab and education resource room will be established at the Burke Mission Station. The Mull Foundation has also provided funding for technology upgrades. With this new computer lab and the support of Western Piedmont Community College, the Burke United Christian Ministries will be offering GED and ESL classes for anyone in our community who need them. Our vision for the future for the computer lab will be to also offer evening and summer tutoring for our younger clients, provide clients the opportunity to take online college classes, provide job skills training and budgeting classes, and provide clients access to job vacancies. By working closely with the Community Foundation of Burke County, cooking classes, nutrition classes and food preservation classes will be offered. We have been able to purchase a pickup truck with a grant from the Huffman-Cornwell Foundation to harvest fresh produce that will be used in the food classes. BUCM truly believes that education is the key to enhancing the quality of

The Burke United Christian Ministries' facility will also be getting a facelift in 2018. With funding from the Community Foundation of Burke County and the Rostan Foundation, an awning has been placed at the food pantry to allow clients to move food to their vehicles out of inclement weather. Changes are also being planned to expand the food pantry and create a new welcome center. With a grant from the Cannon Foundation, the plan is to move our pantry to the old clothes sorting area and convert the current pantry into a welcome center and meeting space for agencies to use to meet with clients. The Cannon Grant also provides funding to upgrade our soup kitchen in order to better serve our clients.

These upgrades and enhancements provided by our community will be instrumental in supporting those we serve into the future. With continued support, encouragement and prayers of the supporters of BUCM the future looks very bright. My God richly bless you in this new year.

Living Amazed by God Every Day

I used to be one of the most negative people I knew. My motto was, "If I don't expect anything good to happen, then I won't be disappointed when it doesn't."

However, God's way of seeing things is just the opposite! He wants us to live our lives filled with hope, expecting Him to do something great at any moment.

What is hope? One definition of hope is "a favorable and confident expectation."

It's a positive attitude and the happy anticipation that something good is going to happen.

Real hope is not a wishy-washy, vague "let's just wait and see what happens" attitude, but it's believing and trusting that what God promised, He will do. God is just looking for opportunities to be good to His children and He wants us to expect and look forward to it!

The Bible says that hope is the anchor of our soul (see Hebrews 6:19). When things look dark and we don't have an answer, that's when hope kicks in to remind us that our new beginning is right around the corner.

For instance, when it looks like everybody else is getting blessed and we're tired and feel like giving up, it's hope that steadies our heart and helps us hold on to our faith in God's promise.

In 1 Thessalonians 5:8, hope is described as a helmet. So, what we think must be pretty important. Our attitude and what we're expecting has everything to do with what we're thinking and saying!

I encourage you to take control of your thoughts and words first thing every morning. When you wake up in the morning, don't settle for thoughts like, Well, I guess I'll try to make it through another day.

Instead, anticipate good things from God. Think and declare things like:

"God, thank You for this day! I know that You love me and You have a good plan for me today. Apart from You, I can do nothing, but in Christ, I can do whatever I need to do. And with Your help, I am going to have a good attitude and positive thoughts."

Then expect your breakthrough and new beginning. Say, "Today could be the day!"

It's important to realize that we can't live by how we feel if we want to have a positive, hope-filled life. When negative feelings come, if we don't give in to them and feed them, they will die.

So, don't allow yourself to get caught in the trap of waiting to feel hopeful, but instead, decide to be full of hope. When you make a conscious decision to think positive, faith-filled thoughts throughout the day, your feelings will eventually catch up with your decision!

God's Just Waiting to Amaze You

Several years ago, I asked the Lord, "Why don't I have exciting, special things happen in my life anymore?"

God spoke to my heart and said, "Joyce, I still do those things all the time. You have just gotten used to it."

You see, God wants us to live amazed by His goodness in our lives...to actively take notice of the truly wonderful things He does for us. Why? Because when we live amazed, we will never be without hope! Let's look at the story of Abraham...

God had blessed Abraham abundantly. However, there was one thing that he and his wife, Sarah, didn't have—a child. Abraham said, ""...Lord God, what reward will You give me, since I am [leaving this world] childless...?"

"And the Lord brought Abram outside [his tent into the night] and said, 'Look now toward the heavens and count the stars—if you are able to count them.

Then He said to him, 'So [nu-

merous] shall your descendants be " (Genesis 15:2, 5 AMP).

Although Abraham's circumstances looked hopeless, the Lord brought him out of his tent to amaze him and remind him that He can do the impossible.







Bill to Combat Opioid Crisis

My office introduced a bill recently that we've been working on for months: The Opioid Abuse Deterrence, Research, and Recovery Act, a bill to combat the rapidly spreading opioid crisis in America.

The opioid crisis has rocked the United States since the 1990's. In that time, it's become widely referred to as an epidemic—or a rapid acceleration of prescription and non-prescription drug abuse. It's an issue that's been felt heavily right at home in our state—4 of the top 20 cities in America suffering from opioid abuse are in North Carolina, including the number 1 city, Wilmington. Over 12,000 North Carolinians have died as a result of the epidemic since 1996.

Law enforcement officials, physicians, and treatment centers across the country have done an admirable job attempting to contain the problem, but the epidemic has left communities overwhelmed as they try to address the root causes and help rehabilitate those suffering from its damage.

This crisis has got to end—and I believe Congress has an opportunity to lead by helping establish standards that benefit doctors, patients, and treatment centers alike. We can beat this together.

I want to thank my colleague Jim Renacci (R-OH), the lead cosponsor on this bill, for his efforts as well. I'm grateful we could introduce this bill to begin a process of seriously addressing this crisis that has impacted so many.

Additionally, I want to thank two of the best in the business—Rodney Buchanan, owner of Buck's Tree Farm in Mitchell County, and Jennifer Greene, Executive Director of the NC Christmas Tree Association-for delivering a Christmas tree to my Hendersonville office! They are always so gracious every year and we appreciate their friendship and service to our community.





The House and Senate have both taken huge steps forward in our years-long effort to reform our nation's tax code, and the Senate just took another big stride. We are about to finally unleash the American economy by putting more money back in the hands of the hard-working Americans who earned it.

The merits of this bill have been well-covered: it simplifies the code for the vast majority of Americans by doubling the standard deduction and reduces rates on all

Americans while keeping popular deductions for mortgage interest, student loans and charitable giving. Under the Senate bill, a family of four making the median family income will save roughly \$2,200 in taxes. And, despite what you may hear, this has been an open process from the start.

This is an historic opportunity to reform a broken tax code that hasn't worked for the people of this country in years. We have a responsibility to do what you, the

We have a responsibility to do what you, the voters, sent us to Washington to do: make changes to our government so that your taxes are lower. We can do that by simplifying our incredibly complex tax system, making sure businesses hire and keep workers here in America, and trusting the American citizen with their own money. Another step closer to the President's desk.

This week, Congress has continued moving forward on tax reform. Both the House and the Senate voted to go to a Conference Committee to reconcile the differences in the bills each chamber passed. Once that process is complete, each chamber will vote to finally bring tax relief to the millions of Americans who need it.

I will keep working to ensure that our new tax code will be simpler and fairer. I'm confident my colleagues on the Conference Committee will produce a final reform bill that will unleash our economy and get Americans back to work again.

As the Conference Committee completes its work, I will also remain focused on completing the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence investigation into Russia's meddling in the 2016 elections. I've said it before – we will finish our work once we've exhausted the list of people we need to talk to. Our committee is dedicated to getting this right and sharing as much as we can with the American people.

According to a recent Forbes ranking, North Carolina is the Best State for Business in the country. This is welcome but not unexpected news. Over these past several years, Republicans in Raleigh have pursued regulatory and tax reforms and a controlled and responsible budget which have brought us to this very sweet spot for recruiting and keeping industries in North Carolina. This translates to higher levels of employment, better jobs, and increased revenue for our state.

As good as this news is, I think we can do even better by reducing occupational licensing requirements, which create barriers to work. Our state's burdensome licensing requirements create a negative financial effect that disproportionately impacts those who need jobs the most. A white paper published by the Foundation for Government Accountability in October, How Occupational Licensing Inhibits Economic Opportunity, found, not surprisingly, that lower-income individuals, young workers, military families, those with criminal records, and would-be entrepreneurs are most negatively impacted by burdensome licensing requirements.

Another white paper, Right to Work, published in November by the Institute of Justice, ranked each state in three criteria: number of lower-income occupations requiring licensing, most burdensome licensing laws, and the degree of burden imposed by licensing laws. Our state licenses 67 of 102 lower-income occupations, more than the majority of other states. We rank 41st in most burdensome licensing laws and 17th as the most broadly and onerously licensed state. Opticians, for example, are required to have 912 days of combined education and training, much greater than the average of 714 days for the 21 other states that require licensing for opticians. Some occupations in our state have heavier licensing requirements than occupations which are linked, to a greater degree, to public health and safety. For instance, a barber license requires 722 days of education and experience, while an EMT only needs 43 days of education and experience.

Citizens of our state should have the right to work in their chosen occupations without burdensome requirements and expense. Often, they do not have the financial resources or time required to fulfill extensive licensing requirements. I would like to see my constituents, and citizens across our state, pursue the occupations they choose without the expense and burdensome constraints of many unnecessary licensing requirements. Safety and consumer interest cannot be ignored, but there are many alternatives to licensing, such as workplace inspections and voluntary certifications, to name a few. I will support legislation that reduces or eliminates burdensome licensing requirements for many occupations. And our state will become an even better place to live and do business!



Plumtree Team Goes to Uganda

I was lying in bed one morning in early October and God spoke to me. He said, "I want you to go to Uganda before the end of this year." The next morning, I heard God say it again, "I want you to go to Uganda before the end of this year." I had in mind to ask two of my friends from church to go with me. I checked the cost of the



flights and it was around \$1000 each. Immediately after this I checked my email and someone had made an online donation to our church for \$3000 and labeled it "missions". That was the confirmation I needed.

On Monday, November 27th David Mark Gillespie, John Stevenson and I went on a wild adventure to Uganda, Africa. We landed in Entebbe at 10:20 pm Tuesday, (they are 8 hours ahead of us) and met up with the local pastors at the airport. We prayed together in the parking lot, thanking God for a successful journey there and requesting success for our upcoming ministry adventures.

We arrived at the Vinetea Hotel in Kampala close to 1 am. The rooms were nice with running water, showers, electricity, AC and WIFI. The hotel had a connected restaurant where we could order anything we liked.

Wednesday morning we meet up with Pastor David and crew shortly after 9 am. We drove through town and exchanged money at the bank and made a few other stops for supplies. It was a three-hour drive but with the traffic and road conditions, we probably averaged 35 miles an hour.

We arrived in Gomba around 1:30 pm. They were so excited to see us. For many of them, it was their first time seeing a white man. We got out of the van and went right into the meeting. They introduced our team and we shared a little about our journey. Then we had a break for lunch.

After lunch, I spoke on the 5 step prayer model for healing. It went well, but with no microphone, it was a little challenging. Around 20 people were healed.

After the meeting, we went to a nearby guesthouse. This one was not as nice.

The toilet was a squatty potty with no running water or shower. The smell coming from the toilet was very bad. I kept my bathroom door shut all night.

Thursday morning we had breakfast at Pastor Thomas' house around 9 AM. He lived in a small home with a metal roof with one small solar panel on top. They had no electricity or running water. But they made us feel right at home.

After breakfast, we went to deliver food and supplies (rice, beans, sugar, soap) to five very poor widows. We prayed for each one as they had a need.

The most notable miracle we saw that morning was George, whom we met along the way. George used to have a good job working in town. But a witchdoctor placed a curse on him and he lost his mind. When his father introduced us to him he said that he was a madman. We prayed for George and God quickly restored him. He started speaking to us right away. We asked him if he had any pain in



his body and he had pain in his chest and shoulder. God healed that as well. His father (a Muslim) was shocked and said, "What is George doing speaking to these white men. He hasn't spoken for over 6 years". George then told us that he wanted to receive Christ as his personal savior. We led him to the Lord and he followed us to church.

We went on to the next home and there prayed for a sweet widow who lived in a grass but. She really appreciated our gifts and prayers and she blessed us with a big stalk of bananas and some beans. I think she gave us more then we gave her.

Our security guard
Emanuel noticed all of
these miracles we were seeing and asked for us to pray
for him. He was having
trouble with his vision. He
knew English pretty well.
I teased him saying, "You
mean to tell me you are carrying around an AK47 and
you have bad eyesight?" He
laughed and said, "Yes".
His eyes were blurry and
would sometimes water
when he would read. We



prayed for Emanuel's eyes and God quickly healed him. John handed him Randy Clark's book, There is More and he randomly selected a page to read. To our amazement, the paragraph he read was about a man's eyes being healed. Then Emanuel told us that he wanted to receive Christ as his savior. His wife had been praying for years for him to get saved. But he was often hostile to her requests for salvation. He told us, that his wife was going to be so happy. Emanuel didn't own a Bible so John gave him his. This was all before church started.

On the way back to the church David Mark carried the bananas on his head like a native. An elderly man stopped him along the path saying that in all his life he had never seen a white man carrying bananas on his head.

We got to the church around 11 am and worship had already begun. That

morning we had seen 5 healings and 2 salvations all before church even started. As I glanced around the church I saw George sitting there in his right mind in the service. I couldn't help but pause and thank God for this miracle.

Pastor David was so moved by George's miracle that he took off his shoes and gave them to him. Pastor David stood there on a dirt floor church in his socks because he had literally given the shoes right off of his feet. He then told George to go to his suitcase and pick out any outfit that he wanted. George did and came back looking sharp. Pastor Jonah took off his suit jacket and gave it to George as well. I was overwhelmed by this display of generosity among such poverty. Then to top it off they took up an offering for him. People gave George corn, potatoes and money.

After worship, I shared on Words of Knowledge for healing. Several more were healed.

On Friday we left around 6 am. After a short distance, we stopped at a large outdoor market. People were selling fruit, vegetables etc. We bought some sweet apple bananas which were very good.

Along the trip, we crossed the Nile River on a ferry. We had to get out and pay to cross. They gave us pieces from a cardboard box for tickets for the ride.

We arrived in the Eastern Region of Buyende around noon. When we pulled up to the church everyone began to shout. The service began, after praise and worship, I shared the 5-step prayer model for healing. It went really well. There were many healings. I asked people to come forward and share testimonies about what God had done for them. Everyone was so excited.

After this, we went back to the guest house for lunch and a break. The guesthouse didn't have running water, showers, toilets, electricity, appliances, etc. We set up our room, and had a rest until the evening crusade at 6 pm.

At the crusade, the people and especially the children were staring at us like we were aliens. Many of them had never seen a white man. I shared from Luke 15 about the loving Father willing to take back His prodigal son. We then had an altar call for salvation and healing. Many responded and were saved and healed. After the service, they watched the Jesus movie on a bed sheet screen. They were so excited. For many, it was their first movie ever.

Saturday we left for the morning conference at Pastor Peter's church. On the way, we stopped by and prayed for Pastor Peter's mother. She was 81 years old. She had pain in her thigh. We prayed for her and the pain totally left. She was shocked and very happy that the pain was gone.

There were a lot of children outside. We noticed a girl (named Rose) there with a shriveled hand. Her arm seemed

paralyzed from the shoulder down. We prayed for her arm but nothing noticeable happened. We were then informed that she was deaf. We prayed for her and both of her ears opened. She was hearing everything we said. In a short time, she was repeating our sounds and saying, "mama". It was beautiful.

We arrived at church for the conference and worship was great. I shared on Words of Knowledge for healing. I asked does anyone here have stomach pain? Many people put up their hands. I prayed a quick prayer and 20 people were instantly healed. It was awesome! What an amazing sermon demonstration.

I had asked David Mark and John to ask God for words of knowledge (WOK)

and they had some. Everyone they prayed for was healed. Others shared WOK as well. Some WOK were for emotional healing. As far as I know, all who responded to the WOK and received prayer were healed. We prayed for many others and they were healed too. The service concluded and we went back to the guest house for lunch.

After lunch, we tried to rest but it was so hot and humid, it was a struggle. We didn't have a fan so we used baby wipes on our skin to help cool off.

Around 5:30 pm we left for the crusade. When we arrived the place was already booming with excitement. The worship had begun and it seemed like everyone was dancing. It was the largest crowd so far probably 2000-3000, maybe more.

I shared my message called Face to Face with God encouraging people to draw close to God. After the message, many and the second s

responded to the altar call for healing and salvation. John and David prayed with many people and saw great miracles. After the service, they had another film to show them.

Sunday morning David Mark shared at one church, John shared at another church and I shared at Pastor Peter's church where the conference was held. This was probably my favorite time sharing. It flowed so well. The people were really getting it. As I proceeded with the message I could feel the weight of His glory resting on the people as they began to understand the gospel. I saw tears running down faces all across the sanctuary. They spontaneously started praising God for

His mercy and grace.

After we prayed for healing we heard many testimonies. One young lady shared how she had walked 50 miles (one way) with a bad back to attend the conference and crusade. She was very hungry for more of God. She told us how God had touched her and she was now healed. One after another, shared how God had touched them; backs, necks, knees, headaches, stomach pain, wrist pain, shoulder pain, etc. healed in Jesus' name.

That afternoon the local pastors baptized around 250 new converts at the lake. They each received their own baptism certificates by the end of the night.

After lunch, we tried to take a nap but this was the hottest day yet. We laid there and eventually gave up. We took three chairs and sat outside under the mango tree. The children from across the road started working their way closer. David Mark climbed up the tree and then swung down and scared them. It was really funny. We showed them how to do the bottle flip game. Then David Mark showed them how to do cartwheels, flips and how to walk on their hands. They all were eager to try something new.

Then we ventured out for the final night of the crusade. What a powerful time we had. John and David Mark prayed for many for healing while I shared the message. At least 50 more received Christ that night and many others were healed.

On Monday around 10:30 am we left to go fishing. It was an amazing experience. We rented canoe type boats that leaked and we used bamboo for our fishing poles. They took us out in groups of 3, roughly 200 feet from shore. We paddled out to a big rock and fished. The biggest one we caught was around 2 inches. But it was still fun and the scenery was beautiful.

After the tour of the River Nile we ventured back to Kampala to spend the night at our hotel. We were looking forward to this as we had not had a shower for 3 days and the hotel had AC. After a long, hot, dusty, bumpy ride, with crazy traffic we arrived around 10 pm.

On Tuesday we had a meeting with local pastors, went to the zoo and then on to the airport to begin our long trip home.

On this short trip we saw God heal many, many people, we also witnessed over 300 people get saved in five days. To God be the glory great things He has done!

Economically they may manage, intellectually they may manage and socially they may get by. But down underneath the surface is a vacuum—a void that can be filled only by Jesus Christ.



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Darkness for Light

January is the month when we observe National Sanctity of life Sunday, a day in which many churches deal with the topic of Abortion. Honestly, I've struggled with thinking about how to address this problem, because it is an issue that has been co-opted and politicized by both political parties in recent years.



However, as I think and pray through this topic, I realize that at its core, this is not a political issue, it's about the forty-two million unborn children every year who are being denied their most basic human right. The right to exist. It's about the fact that in the last generation there are almost 100 million little girls around the world who never saw the light of day, simply because they were little girls and not little boys.

Most of us would agree that this is tragic, but abortion is just one part of the Sanctity of Life issue. Sanctity of life is also about the 5 million children world-

"It's not really that bad," we say, "It's not like I was actually lying, I mean I can't help if they got the wrong impression." We rationalize away our bad behavior all the time, and it's a very slippery slope, which Scripture tells us will end in destruction. This attitude is equally destructive whether we're talking about global humanitarian issues or the

secret desires that still haunt physical bodies. At some point in our lives, all of us have been guilty of looking into a sewer and trying to believe that it's a swimming pool, but we instinctively know what's true. We know that Murder is always wrong, and protecting life is everyone's responsibility. We know that gossip always hurts, racism is always destructive, and life is precious. No matter how hard we try to talk ourselves out of it – deep down inside – we all know it's true.

Listeners of regional Christian radio station 106.9 The Light pledged enough money on Dec. 5 to provide 71,391 meals to local residents through the station's "Hope to the Hungry" campaign. For the first

time, 106.9 The Light partnered with seven local rescue missions to raise money to feed the local community during this Christmas season.

The station dedicated a day to promoting the campaign at no cost to the rescue



missions, reminding listeners that for just \$2 they could provide a warm, life-changing meal to someone in need. The flood of responses showed how much the community cares The Light for its residents. One woman messaged the station and told her story. She was about to donate when she got a call from her husband. Her husband rarely listens to the

Throughout the campaign, on-air hosts shared with listeners stories from people in need. One woman from the Charlotte Rescue Mission said, "I was living on the street... There were days I didn't eat. Sometimes there was weeks I didn't eat... When I first came in, everybody welcomes you. They say, 'welcome home.' And then

you get to go and get a plate of good food and something to drink. My prayer this morning over breakfast consisted of, 'Thank you God for this food." "106.9 The Light's goal for 'Hope to the Hungry' was to invite

listeners to join us in an act of unconditional love for people who are too often overlooked in our communities," said Jim Kirkland, executive director of Blue

Ridge Broadcasting. "During a span of 13 hours, 1,599 individuals took us up on the invitation to provide 'Hope to the Hungry'. We're humbled. All credit goes to our Lord and the listeners who answered His prompting upon them to partner."

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Dave Says

Dear Dave.

What do you think about online investing apps, and the way they allow you to jump in and out of stocks for really low fees? Anonymous

Dear Anonymous,

I don't think about them, and I don't use them. And I don't play single stocks

There's a ton of research out there showing that people who play individual stocks on their own — or with their broker, or with a golfing buddy — see a rate of return of about seven percent on average. You can make anywhere from 10 to 14 percent, on average, with good growth stock mutual funds.

I could probably play single stocks more intelligently than most people, but why? If the average is noticeably less than I'm seeing with my mutual funds, why bother going there? Plus, with a mutual fund portfolio, you've got someone who does this kind of thing for a living managing and researching your investments for you in your best interest.

I don't have an app on my phone that lets me trade stocks, nor do I plan on getting one. There's nothing wrong with apps, in general, but I'll never recommend jumping in and out of single stocks as a method of investing.

Dear Dave,

What's the difference between a credit union and a bank?

Dear Jake.

A bank is owned by stockholders. When the bank makes a profit – and they should make a profit - the stockholders, who are owners of the company, get that profit. It can be dispersed in the form of dividends, or the value of their stock is increased. A credit union is run more like a cooperative. Technically speaking, it's operated not for profit, and the owners are the credit union members, who are also

As a customer of a credit union, whatever you pay into the credit union – the "profit" - is returned to the members in the form of increased services or actual dispersements. Sometimes, you actually get a check from the credit union.

A lot of banks don't like credit unions, and say they have an unfair advantage because of their non-profit status. This really isn't true. Credit unions, with whatever "profits" are made, put that money right back into creating cheaper checking accounts, better interest rates on loans, or higher interest rates on savings.

A bank could do the same thing, if it were willing to make less profit. So, there's no disadvantage. They're just trying to keep stockholders happy and sell stuff to customers. But really, that all means nothing if you don't get good service from the organization!

Stars draped their splendor over the inky night sky. However, I could barely see myself putting one foot in front of the other.

As we reached our car and drove the dark Colorado country roads, our headlights weren't enough. Only high beams could penetrate and give us enough light to gauge what was ahead.

High beams are wonderful. But, they're hazardous when they are shining in your eyes from another vehicle coming towards you. Even having them bore into your car from behind is distressing.

Recently, I was reading in Matthew 5: 14, NKJV, where Jesus tells his disciples, "You are the light of the world."

What kind of light \sim a high beam that blinds as it approaches or pushes and prods from behind? Or the kind of light Jesus described \sim a lamp on a lamp stand to give light to all who are in the house.



Keeping Purity in Your Marriage

Purity is a major concern of a God who is holy. The Bible says in 1 Peter 1:15-16 "But as he which hath called you is holy, so be ye holy in all manner of conversation; Because it is written, Be ye holy; for I am holy."

The term "holy" can definitely refer directly to purity of

life. The believer's living hope based on their new birth should lead to a lifestyle of holiness. The price paid for the believer's redemption calls for reverence and obedience.

There are three basic reasons for living a holy life. First, God Himself is holy. God is the embodiment of absolute righteousness, purity, sinlessness, and godliness. Secondly, God has called believers to be holy because He is holy. To be with Him one day, we must be like Him; we must be holy. Thirdly, Scripture demands holiness. Leviticus 11:45, "For I am the Lord that bringeth you up out of the land of Egypt, to be your God: ye shall therefore be holy, for I am holy."

A part of our personal holiness involves the marital relationship. There are some actions a person can take to help make that possible.

Face Up to Your Own Faults

Any marriage suffers when you have even one of the partners who will not admit he or she has done wrong. Human pride will often lead a person to never admit wrong doing. You need to admit you have done wrong, even if the other marriage partner will not do the same thing. You cannot be right with God if you are not dealing justly and honestly with your marriage partner.

James 5:16 says, "Confess your faults one to another, and pray one for another, that ye may be healed." We confess our faults or sins to one another, so we might pray one for the other.

One of the best things a person can do in a marriage relationship to maintain a right one is to learn to say, "I was not right. I did wrong and I want you to forgive me."

Be Responsible for Your Own Actions

Lake 6:41-42 states: "And why beholdest thou the mote that is in thy brother's eye, but perceivest not the beam that is in thine own eye? Either how canst thou say to thy brother, Brother, let me pull out the mote that is in thine eye, when thou thyself beholdest not the beam that is in thine own eye? Thou hypocrite, cast out first the beam out of thine own eye, and then shalt thou see clearly to pull out the mote that is in thy brother's eye."



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Closed Sunday -Go to Church How can your marriage partner fully trust you if you will not own up to and be honest about your own actions? It is easy to blame wrong behavior on your marriage partner when that is often not justifiable.

If you feel like a troubled marriage is all your partner's fault, then you are probably not taking responsibility for many of your own actions. Faults



normally are found in more than one direction. Since we are all sinners, none of us are all we ought to be all of the time.

Don't Retaliate When You Think You Have Been Wronged

Revenge, or trying to get back at your marriage partner, will make an existing problem much worse. If someone has done you wrong, God says in Romans 12:19, "Dearly beloved, avenge not yourselves, but rather give place unto wrath: for it is written, Vengeance is mine; I will repay, saith the Lord."

God can give you grace to not respond in a negative way when you feel that your spouse has wronged you. If you will keep a right attitude, it is possible that your spouse will be ashamed for the way he or she treated you. The Bible teaches we are to respond to evil with good.

Jesus said in Luke 6:28, "Bless them that curse you, and pray for them which despitefully use you."

He also said in Luke 6:31, "And as ye would that men should do to you, do ye also to them likewise." Instead of getting on the level of the one who wrongs us, it pays for us to have a better attitude than he or she might have.

Learn to Forgive

The Bible says in Matthew 6:14-15- "For if ye forgive men their trespasses, your heavenly Father will also forgive you: But if ye forgive not men their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses."

Occasionally, there is a marriage that just doesn't work. But, on the other hand, many troubled marriages would work if couples would learn to forgive. You might say, "My marriage partner does not deserve to be forgiven." In all reality, we did not deserve for the Lord to forgive us, but he did through his Son the Lord Jesus Christ.

There are two horrible consequences if we do not have a willingness to forgive personal wrongs. First, the Lord will not forgive us if we are not willing to forgive others. Secondly, it will also influence your heart in a negative way. An unforgiving spirit leads to bitterness in one's life. Even the root of bitterness defiles (Heb.12:15).

If you forgive someone, you do not periodically bring up the past to bring accusation against the other marriage partner. Horrible things done to us cannot be erased from our minds, but we can decide we are not going to bring up past trespasses.

Pray for Your Spouse

You cannot always make your marriage companion what you want that person to be. However, you can pray to God about that person. God is able to change men's hearts to reverse wrong behavior.

James 5:16 says, "The effectual, fervent prayer of a righteous man availeth much." Since that is true, who knows what the Lord might do for the one who prays for their mate? Prayer can make the impossible possible.

Be Honest and Open With One Another

We are told in Ephesians 4:15 that we are to "speak the truth in love." An open and honest relationship is the best kind. If something is seriously bothering you, don't hesitate to speak in love to your spouse. It is so important to talk through and pray through that which may be bothering you in your relationship. If you continue to be angry and do nothing about it, if you let the sun go down on your anger, you give Satan a beachhead, a place to operate in your life. No one needs a marriage of secrets from the past.

Have Friends That Are Pure

1 Corinthians 15:33 states, "Be not deceived: evil communications corrupt good manners." Associating with bad people will ruin decent people. Wrong friends will destroy you. Evil company does damage to good behavior. We tend to become like the company we keep, we should not associate with those who hold to error and false teaching. If we associate with them—accept them as friends and companions—they will influence us and corrupt our behavior, leading us into sin and error.

It is extremely important that we keep our marriage where it ought to be. Both partners need to recognize this great responsibility and obligation.

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

I am thankful for those in the church family who step up and work to maintain and manage the physical property and resources of the church. The deacon who serves as a true deacon. The membes who take it upon themselves to work in and around the church building and grounds. Everyone who prays for our church and their pastor.

For the bi-vocational pastor to be successful others play a key role; for example, the church must step up and be the working, teachable ministers spoken of in God's word, those led by God's man, yet responsible in their individual calling. The bi-vocational pastor's wife is a woman of unique quality and honor. My wife

takes on many roles in the home and church. She serves as my personal assistant, taking calls when I'm not available, listening to folks and offering a tearful prayer of love and kindness. She offers counsel to ladies inside and outside the church. She looks for mission's opportunities and teaches our grandchildren and the children of the church.



She is my help mate. She is often my counselor when I become overwhelmed, and make no mistake, I do. She does these things because she feels led to, I don't ask nor expect them.

As I look back I see my skewed view of God's work truly straightened. My commitment to God and His work remains one of faith and learning and dedication. Regardless of where He may lead me.

Why do I share this? We all have a tendency of skewing God's calling in our life. I encourage you to look at your calling and examine how you see it in contrast to how God has laid it out. Burke County Schools To Improve Outdoor Activity Spaces 15 Schools To Benefit From Healthy Places NC Grant

Fifteen schools in the Burke County Public Schools district will receive funding to add or update outdoor activity spaces for student as well as community use.

The funds are a result of a \$555,169 grant to Burke County Schools from the Kate B. Reynolds Charitable Trust.

Burke County Public Schools Superintendent Dr. Larry Putnam informed the Board of Education of the grant award during the Nov. 27 board work session. Burke County Public Schools will provide a \$61,686 match for the grant. In addition to athletic equipment, tracks and courts, the funds will go toward playground equipment, including some for children with disabilities, a football field restroom and a kids' fitness course.

Putnam said, "This generous grant will allow us to establish and update areas where our students as well as community members can enjoy the opportunity to walk, play basketball, play on playgrounds and exercise to maintain a healthy lifestyle. We are very grateful for the folks at the Trust for granting our proposal, and we are looking forward to getting started on these projects."

This investment is part of Healthy Places NC—the Trust's long-term commitment to improving the health of residents in the state's rural, under-resourced counties

"The improved school recreation areas and walking tracks are just one example of the community coming together to tackle health issues, and the Trust is committed to supporting Burke County on this journey," said Dr. Laura Gerald, president of the Kate B. Reynolds Charitable Trust. "There is a joint use agreement between the Parks and Recreation Department and the local Little League that will open these facilities up to the entire community. That's the kind of community collaboration and systems improvement we had in mind when we launched Healthy Places NC."

The timeline for the projects includes starting them during the 2018-19 school year with some going into the 2019-2020 school year. The schools and projects are:

- Forest Hill Elementary Install backstops and other athletic field equipment (soccer goals, etc.) for community and recreational use. Pave a walking track for families and community members to use.
- Oak Hill Elementary Install a walking track for student and community use.
 Purchase and install new playground equipment for school and community use.
- Ray Childers Elementary Install a walking track for school and community use. Install athletic fields for recreational and community use. Install backstops on the softball fields. Install outside basketball courts and goals.
- Drexel Elementary Resurface the walking track. Purchase and install new playground equipment for one of the playgrounds at the school.
- George Hildebrand Elementary Repave the walking track. Improve the basketball area at the walking track by repaving the surface and installing new goals.
 Purchase and install updated playground equipment.
- Glen Alpine Elementary Purchase and install new playground equipment.
 Resurface outdoor basketball courts and update goals. Resurface walking track.
 Install a restroom at the football field.
- Hildebran Elementary Install a walking track for school and community use around the football field. Purchase and install updated playground equipment.
 Update dugout areas at the baseball and softball fields. Resurface small walking track at Kindergarten and Pre-Kindergarten playground.
- Icard Elementary Resurface the basketball courts and replace the goals. Install new backstop on the baseball field.
- Mull Elementary Install a walking trail with fitness stations open to the community.
- North Liberty Purchase and install playground equipment that is more accessible for students with disabilities. The equipment will be designed to fit the needs of the students.
- Valdese Elementary Resurface the walking track located at the athletic field.
 Resurface and update outside basketball courts and goals.
- WA Young Elementary Purchase and install a Kids Fitness Course for the walking track that the students and community may use while walking the track.
- Hillcrest Elementary Repave basketball courts and update goals. Purchase and install new playground equipment.
- Table Rock Middle Total resurface of the walking track due to poor track conditions / large cracks in surface.
- Hallyburton Academy Resurface walking track.

Burke Middle College's Lisa Wall named Regional Teacher of the Year

Burke County Public Schools' teacher of the year, Lisa Wall, has been named the Northwest Region / District 7 Teacher of the Year. North Carolina's current Teacher of the Year, Lisa Godwin, made the surprise announcement at Burke Middle College on the campus of Western Piedmont Community College on Monday during a student assembly. Wall is the English Language Arts teacher at Burke Middle College and has 22.5 years of experience teaching.

Godwin told the students at the assembly that Wall is now in the running for the next North Carolina Teacher of the Year. Godwin said, "I don't know if you realize how enormous this is, but there are over 90,000 teachers in the state of North Carolina, and through this process we found nine teachers, and your very own Lisa Wall is one of those nine."



Godwin read quotes from students and peers who were part of the Regional Teacher of the Year interview process. They included: "Nobody gets as excited as she does when she reads a book." And, "She sees the best in everyone and everything."

Wall also is described as a teacher who makes lessons exciting, inspires students to want to learn, has a contagious, can-do attitude, jumps in and gets the job done when she sees that something needs to be done and is what the school system is all about.

Burke County Public Schools Superintendent Dr. Larry Putnam was among those who surprised Wall with the announcement Monday. He said to her students, "I always say, 'be passionate about what you want to do, and you'll figure out a way to make money at it.' Mrs. Wall is very, very passionate about what she does."

Wall said it is a "huge honor" to be named one of the nine regional teachers of the year across the state, but told her students, "It's an honor for me to be your teacher every day."

She said, "This is not just a job to me, this is something that I love. In all of the process going through this for regional teacher of the year, I have thought of my students. It's a blessing to be able to have an impact on your lives every day." Wall has a bachelor's degree in secondary English education from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, is a National Board-Certified teacher and is licensed to teach Advanced Placement classes. She started her teaching career at Forsyth County Schools in 1992 and came to Burke County Public Schools as a high school English teacher in 1998. Wall has taught at East Burke High, Draughn High and Burke Middle. She is a member of Delta Kappa Gamma Society International and the North Carolina English Teachers Association and has been a presenter at various district, regional and state conferences.

Wall has left her mark on Burke Middle College every day in the classroom as well as through a textbook scholarship program and by composing the school's alma mater. At Burke Middle College, high school juniors and seniors work to complete their high school diploma as well as a two-year associate's degree.

Joining in on the surprise announcement on Monday was Wall's family, including her husband, Tripp, her daughters, Scarlett and Molly, her parents Tom and Mary Keller and her in-laws Trossie and Joyce Wall.

Two years ago, East Burke High School Principal Shane Mace, then at East Burke Middle, was named Region 7 Principal of the Year and last year Putnam was named Region 7 Superintendent of the year. Burke County has had one state Teacher of the Year in its history - high school music teacher James Jerome Williams in 1982. Wall is now eligible for North Carolina Teacher of the Year, which will be announced in the spring.

The Lamplighters Afterschool Reading Program

A visitor who stops by Spruce Pine United Methodist Church on a typical Wednesday afternoon will discover a hive of activity. Schoolchildren wearing grins on their faces and carrying heavy backpacks over their shoulders climb down the stairs of

a big yellow school bus. Soon one gaggle of kids is playing ball on the church playground: another group is devouring a snack of crackers, fruit, and milk. Shortly thereafter the volunteers appear. Throughout the education wing of the building, a peek into each classroom reveals a different scene of focused effort. In one room Reading Buddies are sitting at small tables with individual children, helping each child with his or her reading homework. In another space a volunteer sits on a couch reading a story aloud as a group of kids listen and follow along. Just a little further down the hall, past the line of backpacks now hanging from hooks on the wall, five children are gathered around a teacher as she goes over the pronunciation of specific words. Across the way another group of students is working on a construction paper craft.

At the close of the day the children will stream from their rooms and congregate together in the church sanctuary for Chapel Time. They will help light the candles, be reminded of the Golden Rule, act out a Bible story, pass around Prayer Bear, and be blessed as they leave for home - reminded that they are Lamplighters, beloved of God, and carriers of light.

The Lamplighters Afterschool Reading Program described above is a ministry of Spruce Pine United Methodist Church and community partners that seeks the well-being of children and their families in heart, body, mind, and spirit by helping them to experience Christian love and to grow as readers and as persons. Lamplighters operates on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday afternoons during the school



year, and serves 20 local 1st and 2nd grade students from Greenlee Primary School who are behind their grade-level peers in literacy. Now in its third year of operation, Lamplighters is overseen by a Board composed of church members, community partners, and educators. The program is led by three part-time staff people, including a Program Coordinator (Dawn Hughes) and a Reading Coordinator (Kathey Hollifield), and depends on the contributions of about 15 weekly volunteers who serve as Reading Buddies and as assistants.

The story of how Lamplighters began involves many characters and chapters. It begins with a pastor's prayer that God would fill a barren Sunday School hall-way with children being blessed by adults who love them. It followed a parent's realization that there were too few afterschool opportunities for children in Mitch-

ell County, and was encouraged by a United Methodist initiative called Congregations 4 Children that invited churches to reach out to their local school system. It depended upon a special needs educator with a literacy certification who dreamed of tutoring kids to read in her retirement, a state consultant for afterschool programs who wanted to use her passion and her knowledge to help her church



reach more children, a well-connected lay leader with a big heart for young 'uns, a retired school administrator who has dedicated her life to nurturing kids who have suffered from trauma, staff members who saw their work as a sacred calling rather than as a mere job, and a group of committed and supportive church folks who came together around a vision and were willing to work to see it happen.

The story of Lamplighters was spurred along by an energetic retired elementary-school principal, who, though suffering from the final stages of liver cancer, continued drawing up plans for the program on a yellow legal pad from his hospital bed. It depended upon the open and warm response of local school officials - superintendents, curriculum specialists, principals, and teachers - who saw the program's potential and who were willing to work in partnership with a

local church.

Lamplighters' story is also a lesson about generosity and provision. Start-up funding for the program was provided by the people of Spruce Pine UMC, by individual donors, and, especially, by a generous four-year grant from The Duke Endowment's Rural Church division. More recently, Lamplighters was honored with a \$21,000 award by the Fund for Mitchell County through the Community Foundation of Western North Carolina's



People in Need grant program. This new grant will fund the program's Reading Coordinator position for the next two years, and will also enable her to receive special training to help the program serve children with learning disabilities.

Above all, the story of Lamplighters is a story about the grace of God: about how God has called together a group of




people for a good purpose, has provided them with everything they need, has kept them going amid many challenges, has used them to bless children - and then used those children to bless them just as much.

Through Lamplighters the grace of God is making a difference in the lives of children, families, volunteers, and staff. The children who participate seem truly excited to come to the program: last year one child would wait near the door of his classroom at the end of the school day because he wanted to make sure he didn't miss the announcement about the Lamplighters bus. Parents are grateful to have a safe and nurturing place for their children to be after school. Volunteers tell stories of kids sprinting up to hug them when they run into them at the grocery store. The regular interaction with these loving adults seems to be a true blessing to children who need such nurture.

And yet Lamplighters' impact goes beyond love to literacy. Teachers say that the students are more engaged in class because they have completed their reading homework and because of the additional support that Lamplighters kids receive. Several parents have related that, because of the program, their kids have been reading more at home: some have even asked their parents to read with them for the first time. Test results also seem to point to the positive difference being made by the program: a high percentage of the Lamplighters kids show improvement in their reading scores, and a comparison of the initial test results suggests that students in the program make more progress than similar peers who do not participate in the program.

Such results that suggest that, by the grace of God, Lamplighters is living up to its name.

Back in the 1800s, when town streets had oil or gas lamps to provide light at night, the street lights had to be lit and maintained by a man who served as the lamplighter. The lamplighter would walk down the street at dusk, and would go from pole to pole, climbing up a little ladder, reaching up and in with his stick, and lighting the lamp. Everywhere the lamplighter went he left behind this little pool of light, this circle of illumination.



would later write the book Treasure Island) was sitting once at his window, watching one of these lamplighters go along the street, leaving light in his wake. His parents asked him, "Robert, what in the world are you staring at out the window?"

Robert Louis Stephenson said, "Mom and Dad, there is a man out there punching holes in the darkness!"
