There is nothing in this world as important as teaching our children and youth about the Lord Jesus Christ. In today's politically correct environment it has become increasingly difficult to do this in public places outside our homes. Good News Bible Club, part of Child Evangelism Fellowship, is very active in our local area with 41 active clubs in Avery, Mitchell, Yancey and McDowell Counties plus others in Burke County that I may not be aware of. There were 2177 children enrolled in these clubs last year, plus enrollments at two YMCA's in the area, and there were twelve 5-day camp programs that took place also. Out of this last year, there were over 200 professions of faith made for Christ. God is great!

The greatest needs are twofold, financial and volunteers. It costs approximately \$1000 per school year per school to fund the program and that is important, but even more important is the need for volunteers. Normally there is a need for at least six volunteers that can meet with the club once a week, and the volunteers need to be at the school or location from about 2:00 PM until about 4:30 PM on the day the club is meeting.

My friends, as a father, grandfather and great grandfather, I can truly say that there is nothing as important in this life as touching the lives of our children. Below I have reprinted, by permission, some of the information from Child Evangelism Fellowship that describes more in detail what Good News Bible Club is all about.

Good News Club

What is Good News Club?

Good News Club® is a ministry of Child Evangelism Fellowship in which trained teachers meet with groups of children in schools, homes, community centers, churches, apartment complexes, just about anywhere the children can easily and safely meet with their parent's permission. Each week the teacher presents an exciting Bible lesson using colorful materials from CEF Press. This action-packed time also includes songs, Scripture memory, a missions story and review games or other activities focused on the lesson's theme.

As with all CEF ministries, the purpose of Good News Club is to evangelize boys and girls with the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ and establish (disciple) them in the Word of God and in a local church for Christian living.

Can We Really Teach the Bible in Public Schools?

Yes! The Gospel has been taught freely in public schools all over the world for some time. Now children in the U.S. have that opportunity, too! In 2001 the U.S. Supreme Court ruled in Good News Clubs v. Milford Central School that Good News Clubs can meet in public schools in the United States after school hours on the same terms as other community groups. Children attend Good News Club only with their parents' permission.

Some Things Just Don't Make Any Sense!

Every time I read the paper or watch the news I am amazed and often dumbfounded at what is going on in our country. There are some things that just don't make much sense to me. We seem to have educated ourselves into losing all common sense. Things that should be simple, common sense issues have been made into such complicated debates that most people

can't even understand what the debate is about! Let me give a few examples.

This goes on every single day in this country. Babies are killed in a mother's womb and a lot of people seem to be ok with it. Just doesn't make much sense to me.

In our school systems today, our children can study and read a book written by Adolf Hitler called "Mein Kampf". And probably if one wanted to, one could even invite someone into the classroom to talk to the children about this book. They could answer questions and even explain to the children about Hitler's

worldview. Now we are talking about a person who was responsible for the slaughter of millions. For the most part, this would seem by some as educational and productive for children. However, if I as a pastor were to be invited to speak to the children about the teachings of Jesus, how do you think that would go? If I taught the kids they were created in the image of God, and that He loves them and has a plan and purpose for their lives, how do you think some people would react? What if I taught the children about how Jesus teaches us to love and care for others, would that be ok? What if I taught the children about being honest, respectful to their elders, honor their parents, and treat others how they would want to be treated?



These are just a few basics that are found in the Bible. Most likely, I would be on the next evening news and probably the focus of a lawsuit before long! Just doesn't make much sense to me.

In our nation there is a debate going on over marriage. We have same-sex couples who believe that their relationship should be recognized as a legitimate marriage relationship. Now for us as Christians, this should not even be up for debate! The only way one could come to the conclusion that this is right is to ignore what the Bible teaches. One of the basic understandings of Biblical marriage is the bearing of children in a marriage between a man and a woman. Would someone please explain how this is possible in a same-sex relationship? Even if one does not believe the Holy Bible or simply chooses to ignore it, even nature itself teaches that this is not normal behavior. Anyway, just doesn't make sense to me.

Right now, there is probably someone who is reading this article and they are boiling over. Why, you may ask? Because I would have the audacity to actually call something wrong. Right now, I am being called a religious fanatic, hatemonger, proponent of hate speech, judgmental, intolerant religious bigot, etc., etc., all because I do not agree. The very ones, who go about teaching everyone to be tolerant, are right now being intolerant of my views simply because they do not align with their views. And somehow, I am the intolerant one! Just doesn't make sense to me

Right now, in our country, our national debt continues to grow and grow. Yet, even though we do not have the money, our leaders continue to spend that which we do not have, and they know we do not have it. Now folks, when I was in elementary school, learning the three R's (Reading, Riting, and Rithmatic) I was taught the basic financial principal that one cannot spend what one does not have! It's pretty simple to understand that if a candy bar cost a dollar and you only have a quarter, you wait until you get the dollar before you buy the candy bar. If you do not have the dollar, my Daddy always told me you had to go to work and earn it! Somehow, we have missed this along the way. Just doesn't make sense to me.

The examples could go on and on. We as a nation, and often as individuals, constantly ignore the teachings of Scripture. In spite of what the Bible teaches about respect for human life (even in the womb), marriage, raising children, right and wrong, finances, etc., we seem determined to do the opposite. We don't want to follow what God teaches us to follow and yet we want God to continue to bless our nation. We elect leaders who we know are not going to follow the scriptures and we expect God to bless our nation. We continually give in to voices of unrighteousness all in the name of tolerance, and we expect God to bless us. We want to do that which is right in our own eyes, and we expect God to bless us. Someone once said, "Those who choose to ignore history are destined to repeat it!" Our nation is destined to repeat what has happened to other nations in history if something does not change. The Bible teaches us that it is righteousness that exalts a nation (Proverbs 14:34). We cannot be a nation that winks at ungodliness and expect a God of holiness to bless us! Blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord...Psalms 33:12.

A young boy stepped onto the baseball field with a ball in his hand and a bat over his shoulder. Looking out to deep center field he said," I am the greatest batter in the world" as he threw the ball into the air and swung his bat with all his might. "Strike one" he said. Again,


taking his stance looking deep into the outfield, "I am the greatest batter in the world. "Strike two". Determined to make the hit the boy

threw the ball into the air swung the bat with all his might. "Strike three". Then with a smile on his face the little baseball player said, "Wow I am the greatest pitcher in the world." One of the greatest things you can give your child is confidence and self-worth.

This is so important to their development as a child and adult. I have noticed children who are trained Biblically in a Christian home with a loving father and mother are very confident. I am not talking about a prideful or arrogant confidence, a haughty spirit or better than others attitude. I am talking about a confidence that trusts in God and helps that child mature in their relationship with Jesus Christ, and when they get out on their own they have the confidence to stand alone in a world system that is ungodly.

Psalm 139:14 (KJV 1900) 14 I will praise thee; for I am fearfully and wonderfully made: Marvelous are thy works; And that my soul knoweth right

I speak with first hand experience. My mom encouraged me, but my dad, bless his heart struggled in that area because he was an alcoholic. My dad failed to realize as a young boy I needed his praise, I needed his encouragement, I needed to hear him say "atta boy" you did an excellent iob. My dad learned to do this after I became an adult and had a family of my own; however, though I appreci-



ated his approval the damage had already been done. As parents we cannot turn the clock back and have a redo.

So as a child and young teen I longed for the approval of male role models in my life. I looked for approval. It is very important for your child to know that you love them and approve of them. This does not mean you approve of the things they do wrong, of course not. You discipline them when they do wrong, and then you hold them and love them and praise them when they do right. You build their confidence up.

Our daughters need approval from us as well. They need to hear that they are beautiful, and God has created them in a beautiful way. I do not like to go shopping, but when I am asked to help look for a prom dress I go along because when my daughter comes out of that dressing room she is looking for my approval. That is important because she wants to know what I think. I do not always approve the dress or jeans. But when she does find that one that she likes, and I like I want her to know how beautiful she looks in it. This is important because when God brings that special person into her life to wed she will also be looking for my approval and that is very important to me and Pam.

You can go to about any playground where kids are playing and in a brief time pick out the ones who have confidence and those who do not. I am not talking about being shy. A child can be shy by nature but still have confidence. Confidence is built by a healthy relationship between a child and their parents.

What is a healthy relationship between child and parent? The Bible says for children to honor their parents. This means children respect their parents and obey them. A wise parent understands how to discipline their children in love. "Fathers who provoke their children to wrath" are overbearing in nature and expect demands out of their children that they cannot possibly deliver. It is like the dad who expects his child to play a sport like a professional athlete and gets mad when the child does not do well on the field or court. Can you imagine how this child feels when they do not receive the praise from their dad or mom they so desire to hear. We can push our children so hard that we drive them away from the things they love.

When dad and mom love and respect one another their children will learn to love and respect others. We model in front of our children behavior. My child will learn confidence when they see me act in confidence. When we trust God in times of adversity and pray in confidence our children will see this in our lives. The way I live my life for God, treat my wife, and love my children will often play a key role in the way my child will conduct his life as an adult. Is this a one hundred percent guarantee, no, it is not but I will guarantee that your child will have a far better chance succeeding in life and loving God and others if they understand their self-worth is found in their relationship with Jesus Christ. What a privilege and honor it is to have children and see them grow into confident young adults.

God's Love

For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life. (John 3:16, KJV)

I have discovered since beginning to write about the ministry privilege granted me to serve as a correctional chaplain, that no matter the perspective offered, some who read these words will affirm them, while others will reject them. Some will feel validated while others will feel violated. It is a heavy responsibility. But it is also inspiring at times in ways that defy explanation.



One day a young man declared that God could not love him. I asked him why he felt that way. He said that God could not love him because of all the things that he had done. My response was to share the above promise with him. And another from John 5:8, "But God commended his love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us." Then Romans 8:1, and so on and so on. He shared openly his doubts. I shared openly my faith in the Power of God's Promises.

He laid out his reasoning to me in detail...graphic detail. Human logic called out that he was right about one thing. It would be very difficult for many to have love for him. My mind wandered a bit as I thought of those who had been injured physically, emotionally even spiritually as a result of his actions. There has been no contact from any of them. He reasoned that if they hated him, it just made sense that God did too.

Sometimes the only thing to say is nothing, and that's exactly what I did for what seemed like forever. Until what felt at the moment like a feeble pastoral effort drew these verses to my mind and heart. We prayed and asked for God to assure him of God's love that is so great that it is offered to all. When he left he seemed calmer, at peace and appeared to be touched by the love we had spoken of together.

The real challenge for me began later that day. I just could not get his 'story' off my mind. He was overcome with regret for his decisions that led to his incarceration. His shame told him that he was not worthy of God's Love. My own human limitation was challenged by his question and his explanation for feeling that way. Then it struck me. My struggle to be truly 'present' with him in his despair came because deep down, I understood the feeling.

I've had my moments when I have wondered if and how God could ever love me. And in those moments I am compelled to remember that God's love is not like human love. Human love is flawed by selfishness, greed, idolatry and other forms of sinfulness. But God's Love, the kind of love spoken of by those who were inspired to pen the words of Holy Scripture, is different. God's Love is given to all in Jesus Christ, and for those who will believe in him, the benefits are eternal. Sometime later this same young man passed by me on the yard. I said hello and he said, "Some guys in my block told me about what you said to me that day, Chap! I get it now! I got it! God does love me! Now all I want to do is live my life for Him!"

Got back and had to shut the door for a bit. As one called to share God's Love with everyone, I confessed to God my personal struggle to love a person whose decisions had caused such pain. Deep in my heart I knew what the Lord was saying to me.

My own decisions have caused their share of pain for others. Yet, even as I was speaking grace to this person, I was holding his sin against him. Funny how we do that, isn't it? (Not really)

But God, with infinite grace, opened this fellow's eyes to the true meaning of life as God has given it to us. And God, with infinite grace reminded me that my sins are forgiven through the blood of Christ! Thanks be to God!

Moments like these are what this opportunity is all about. Thank God for the honor that I have to represent Christ within the walls! And thank you for praying, and for supporting this work! You make moments like these possible through your financial support!

Is Jesus the Only Way?

We as Christians are often attacked as being too exclusive in our positions about Salvation. You've heard the chorus before, "Who are you to say that you have the exclusive rights to truth? You Christians are narrow minded and egotistical to believe that."

I find it interesting that I never hear this complaint lodged against other major religions. Islam, for ex-

ample, is much more "exclusive" than Christianity, in that, not only do they too believe their religion is the only way to paradise, but they also believe that if you don't agree with them, then you are an infidel and they can kill you. If you doubt me, examine the Quran:

Quran (2:191-193) - "And kill them wherever you find them, and turn them out from where they have turned you out. And Al-Fitnah [disbelief or unrest] is worse than killing... but if they desist, then lo! Allah is forgiving and merciful. And fight them until there is no more Fitnah [disbelief and worshipping of others along with Allah] and worship is for Allah alone.

Translation: convert or die.

While other major religions may not be as violent, they all have one thing in common—a claim of exclusivity of truth. So, to lodge this complaint against Christianity alone is hypocritical.

This takes me to my second point: if all major religions are mutually exclusive in their truth claims, then logic demands that only one can be right. Therefore, the complaints of the accusers of Christianity (usually atheists) would better be spent on examining the claims of Christianity to see WHY we claim exclusive truth. To not do so would be like a student railing against his teacher for insisting that 2+2 can only =4 instead of counting on his fingers to confirm the truth.



These same people will then say they love a spouse or children. Obviously, the manner in which we use the word love differs extensively. In addition, the biblical concept of love is


greatly contrasted with how the world views love. Unfortunately, believers have allowed the world's concept of love to dictate their concept. It is easy to say the words "I love you"; it is truly a challenge to love as God expects us to love.

Many believers are familiar with the famous words of 1 Corinthians 13:4-8. I fear that many who are familiar with this passage do not understand what it means and therefore cannot properly apply it to their lives. Note the following brief definitions of this well-known passage and determine to make this the standard by which you are going to love. You will most likely find as I do that it is easy to say I love you...but do I?

- 1. Charity suffereth long; therefore, it bears up under provocation and is forbearing with others. In other words, love does not react.
- Charity is kind; therefore, it always expresses itself in that which is loving and
- Charity envieth not; therefore, it avoids negative feelings over someone else's

- Charity vaunteth not itself; therefore, love never heaps praise on oneself.
- Charity is not puffed. up; therefore, love never has an exaggerated selfconception.
- 6. Charity doth not behave itself unseemly; therefore, love never behaves disgracefully or acts dishonorably.
- does not devote serious effort to achieve one's own desires. In other words, love is not self-



- 8. Charity is not easily provoked; therefore, love does not cause a state of inward
- Charity thinketh no evil; therefore, love keeps no score of wrongs.
- Charity rejoiceth not in iniquity; therefore, love is not glad in injustice or
- 11. Charity rejoiceth in the truth; therefore, love rejoices in righteousness.
- 12. Charity beareth all things; therefore, love throws a cloak of silence over what is displeasing in another person.
- Charity believeth all things; therefore, love is trusting.
- Charity hopeth all things; therefore, love waits with confidence for that which is good and beneficial.
- 15. Charity endureth all things; therefore, love maintains a belief or course of action in the face of opposition. In other words, it holds out or endures instead of
- Charity never faileth; therefore, love never becomes inadequate for some function

The challenge is indeed great to love as God expects us to love. I challenge you to determine to love those whom God has brought into your life with this kind of love. Imagine the impact Christianity could make if we all simply chose to love this way. Jesus told his disciples, "By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another" (John 13:35).


Many pictures of love are depicted in society today. Valentine's Day approaches with cards, chocolates, flowers, stuffed animals and pictures of couples in love. Love that is depicted on television usually is the puppy love of romance novels, the erotic form of love, or of the Shakespearian tragedy. We can become so confused about what real love looks like that we mistake true love for something else. Sa-

tan uses counterfeit images and messages about love to create chaos in our lives. All temptation begins with attempting to meet a legitimate need in an illegitimate way. So it begs the question what does real love, biblical love look like?

First of all, real love looks like Jesus. If we are looking for the example of real love we look to Jesus. Love is a choice before it is a feeling. The Bible says, "For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son." Love is choosing to give what isn't required without the expectation of receiving anything back. Agape (God Love) is unconditional, unmerited, and unfettered. Jesus gave himself a ransom for many, in other words He died so that you may live. The Bible says, "While we were yet sinners Christ died for us." He made an active choice to love us while we are at our worst. That is love personified.

Secondly, love is an action. Love is a choice, but love is also an action. If someone is saying constantly "I love you", but then demonstrating another behav-

MCAR Dealing with A Surge in Animal Cruelty and Neglect Cases

How the public can help identify and report cases of abuse and neglect

Spruce Pine, NC (January 22, 2018) — In the past few weeks, Mitchell County Animal Rescue has seen a surge in cases regarding animal abuse, abandonment and neglect. These cases have resulted in animals being admitted to the shelter in terrible conditions ranging from broken bones, animals in need of immediate veterinary care, very poor health due to prolonged neglect and cases of advanced emaciation and starvation.



Sadly, in some of these cases, it is possible that neighbors may have known about this abuse but were reluctant or afraid to report them right away, causing unneeded suffering on the part of the animals involved. Because of this, Patricia Beam, MCAR Executive Director, urges everyone in our community to be vigilant about reporting any suspected cases of animal abuse or neglect. "Reporting animal abuse and neglect in Mitchell County is easy, and all calls we receive are looked into. This can be the difference between life or death for some of these animals."

To report suspected cases of animal abuse or neglect, you can call Mitchell County Animal Rescue directly by phone at 828-765-6952. They can also be reached by email at mcardirector@gmail.com. Patricia Beam serves as the County Commissioner appointed Cruelty Investigator for Mitchell Country, NC working closely with local law enforcement. Calls can be made anonymously if you wish and you are under no obligation to provide your name or phone number. You can also reach local and county law enforcement on their non-emergency hotline, Mitchell Communications, at 828-688-9110. If you see an animal emergency, you can also call 911.

MCAR wants the public to know that they are a resource to any pet or pet owner in need by offering free services to help low income families. These services are available to help prevent animal neglect from happening in the first place. Free blankets are provided all winter long outside the front entrance of the shelter, and can be used to help insulate dog houses. They can also be used as bedding for the times when animals should be brought inside in order to remain warm in the coldest weather. They also have a pet food bank available to the public for anyone in need of food. "We have a wonderful pet food bank program, made possible by donations, so that if your pet is hungry and you cannot afford pet food, just call the shelter and we will provide you with free dog or cat food while you get back on your feet." said Patricia Beam. This ensures that no animal in Mitchell County should ever go hungry.

Mitchell County Animal Rescue is here to help both the animal citizens of Mitchell County and the people who love them. This recent influx of animals experiencing abuse and neglect has put a strain on the limited resources of the shelter. If you would like to help them during this time of need, donations may be made by check or online at their website www.mitchellcountyanimalrescue.org. Donations of pet food or other products are also always welcome and a wish list of items needed is posted on their website and Facebook page. Volunteerism is also encouraged for those who would like to work directly with the animals or in

We encourage you to be aware of your surroundings and if you see something that concerns you, please do not hesitate to contact MCAR immediately. Animals need you to be their voice. Mitchell County Animal Rescue, Inc. (MCAR) is a not-for-profit humane organization devoted to the rescue and care of abandoned and otherwise unwanted animals in rural Mitchell County, NC, in the heart of the Appalachian Mountains. Our mission is "To protect, rescue, and care for abandoned and unwanted animals; to promote the importance of spay/neuter in reducing the population of stray animals, to place animals in loving homes; and to educate young people in humane treatment of animals." Founded in 1984 as a mostly volunteer organization, our success in community service led to a partnership with Mitchell County in 1994, ensuring that no animal in need would be left behind. Although we are a small shelter with limited resources, we are highly dedicated to our community and we strive to offer as many programs as our budget will allow including: adoptions, intake of stray and surrendered pets, lost and found, cruelty investigations and prosecution assistance, low-cost spay/neuter programs, low-cost rabies clinics, pet food banks and community education. We currently operate with 4 full-time and 2 part-time employees who are extremely dedicated to fulfilling our mission. And let us not forget our dedicated community volunteers who share their hearts and souls with our animals each and every day. We have an army of 30 regular shelter volunteers, 30 children volunteers each week from the local Montessori School, a 9 member Board of Directors, and 2 veterinarians who work closely with our staff at a reduced cost. We are extremely proud that our little shelter has won the Non-Profit of the Year Award from the Mitchell Chamber of Commerce for the last four consecutive years, 2014, 2015, 2016 and 2017! We have 22 dog kennels, 4 of which can hold multiple dogs in cases of mothers with litters or bonded dogs who should remain together. We also have a special cat area with 39 cages, many of which can also hold multiple cats who enjoy company. Clint's Chronicles on the Funny Farm


The Rest of the Story

What the Issues of Racism and Abortion Have in Common

During the 1930s, the Federal Writers' Project sponsored remarkable interviews with former slaves. The project was based on the premise that no one could better describe the institution of slavery in America than someone who had experienced it. These experiences were recorded for posterity, and today the Library of Congress contains more than 2,000 incredible slave narratives.



Recently, I came across a book edited by Belinda Hurmence titled, My Folks Don't Want Me to Talk about Slavery. Hurmence reviewed and compiled 21 first person collections of the more than 170 interviews by the Federal Writers' Project that were of former slaves from my home state, North Carolina.

Here's an excerpt from that book. The person speaking is former slave, Jacob Manson. At the time of the interview, Mr. Manson was 86 years old and lived on North Haywood Street in Raleigh.

"I belonged to Colonel Bun Eden. His plantation was in Warren County, and he owned about fifty slaves or more...

"Our cabins was built of poles and had stick and dirt chimneys, one door, and one little window at the back end of the cabin. Some of the houses had dirt floors. Our clothing was poor and homemade.

"Many of the slaves went bareheaded and barefooted. Some wore rags around their heads, and some wore bonnets. We had poor food, and the young slaves was fed out of troughs. The food was put in a trough, and the little n@#*@#* gathered around and et. The chillun was looked after by the old slave women who were unable to work in the fields, while the mothers of the babies worked. The women plowed and done other work as the men did. No books or learning of any kind was allowed. No prayer meetings was allowed, but we sometimes went to the white folks' church.

"When bad storms come, they let us rest, but they kept us in the fields so long sometimes that the storm caught us before we could get to the cabins...

"Marster lived in the great house. He didn't do any work...went dressed up all the time, and had n@#*@#* to wash his feet and comb his hair...

"Marster would not have any white overseers. He had n@#*@# foreman...He liked some of the n@#*@# womens too good to have any other white man playing around them. He had his sweethearts among his slave women. I ain't no man for telling false stories. I tells the truth, and that is the truth. At that time, it was a hard job to find a marster that didn't have women among his slaves. That was a general thing among the slave owners. One of the slave girls on a plantation near us went to her missus and told her about her marster forcing her to let him have nothing to do with her, and her missus told her, 'Well, go on, you belong to him.'

"We worked all day and some of the night, and a slave who made a week, even after doing that, was lucky if he got off without getting a beating. We got mighty bad treatment, and I just want to tell you, a n@#*@# didn't stand as much show there as a dog did. They whipped for most any little trifle. They whipped me, so they said, just to help me get a quicker gait.

"I think slavery was a mighty bad thing, though it's been no bed of roses since, but then no one could whip me no more."

Reading such words today, it's hard to believe there ever was a time in our country when the racist subjugation of one group of people was not considered a grave injustice. What's even harder to believe is that members of Christendom in partnership with Muslims in North Africa initiated the slave trade to the New World.

Gilbert M. James in Baker's Dictionary of Christian Ethics notes: "When voices were raised against this inhuman traffic, particularly by influential men and representatives of powerful organizations, the slaveholding interests were driven to find moral justification for enslaving human beings. As a result, a vast body of literature developed on the Scriptural justification of slavery, to which large segments of the church in the South gave support. The churches' defense of slavery

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Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new. 2 Corinthians 5:17

became so wide-spread that: 'the American Anti-Slavery Society observed in their 'Resolutions' of May 7, 1844, that no institution is more hostile to the anti-slavery movement than the professedly Christian church in this country.'"

Throughout the annals of history, one may find professing Christians who led in the way of folly and wickedness. Yet in every case, such evil was never because

of Christianity but in spite of it. It was never because of what Christianity actually taught but a perversion of its actual position.

This same error today, I believe, is being made with respect to abortion. Although it is evangelical Christians and Catholics who are largely making



the case against this wanton and gruesome destruction of the innocent unborn up to more than 60 million, there are still a number of pro-choice Catholic groups. Christian Protestant denominations that have official and long-standing pro-choice positions include the Presbyterian Church (USA), the Episcopal Church, the United Methodist Church, and the United Church of Christ."

Let's not forget that, despite the stain of much of the churches' support for slavery in the past, it was also Christianity which produced a William Wilberforce and the Clapham Saints who had a profound influence in abolishing the slave trade. And it was Christian abolitionists that were the driving force behind ending slavery in America.


The fight against racism and the struggle to end abortion are both highlighted and emphasized in the month of January. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day is celebrated on Monday, January 15th, and Sanctity of Human Life Day is observed on Monday. January 22nd.

Both issues, racism and the sanctity of human life, are addressed by God's creative purpose "in the beginning" to make man after his own image. Every person carries the divine image. Therefore, we should never unjustly disaffect, degrade, or destroy the life of any fellow human being at any stage or station.

Here's a final thought: May God hasten the day when our nation might record and listen with awe to the first-person testimonies of those who were targeted for abortion, and for one blessed reason or another survived, during the sad days when it was still legal.

Q:

How bad is the world going to have to get before God finally steps in and Jesus comes back? I get very concerned when I see all the evil things that are happening in the world today. Are we living in the last times?

A:

The Bible warns us against making precise predictions about the exact time of Jesus' return—but His return is certain, and we may well be living in the last days

before He comes again. The Bible says, "The night is nearly over; the day is almost here" (Romans 13:12).

Shortly before returning to Heaven Jesus told His disciples that someday He would come back to establish His Kingdom. But before that could take place, He said, certain things would have to happen—and we see many of these today. For ex-



ample, He said that before His return the Gospel must be preached throughout the world (see Mark 13:10). Never before has this been possible—but now it is, through radio and the Internet and other modern means of communication.

You also have placed your finger on another sign Jesus gave: Satan's final attempt to halt God's work through a massive onslaught of evil. Our world is no stranger to evil; Satan has always been working to stop God's plans. But God's enemies now have access to modern weapons of mass destruction, and no one can predict what the outcome will be. Jesus said, "You will hear of wars and rumors of wars. ... Nation will rise against nation" (Matthew 24:6-7).

The real question, however, is this: Are you ready for Christ's return? You can be, by turning to Him and putting your faith and trust in Him. Don't take His warnings lightly, but commit your life without delay to Jesus Christ.

Are you ready for Christ's return?

Q: What is the rapture?

There are many Christians who believe that the second coming of Jesus Christ will be in two phases. First, He will come for believers, both living and dead, in the "rapture" (read 1 Thessalonians 4:13-17). In this view, the rapture—which is the transformation and catching up of all Christians, dead or alive, to meet Christ

in the air—will be secret, for it will be unknown to the world of unbelievers at the time of its happening.

The effect of this removal, in the absence of multitudes of people, will, of course, be evident on earth. Then, second, after a period of seven years of tribulation on earth, Christ will return to the earth with His church, the saints who were raptured (Matthew



24:30, 2 Thessalonians 1:7, 1 Peter 1:13, Revelation 1:7). He will be victorious over His enemies and will reign on the earth for 1,000 years (the millennium) with His saints, the church.

Signs of the end of the world? Read this Biblical wisdom from Billy Graham and Franklin Graham.

After 1,000, living unbelievers and the wicked dead now raised to life will be judged at the great white throne judgment. They will then be cast into the lake of fire, while the saved will live forever with Christ in a new heaven and earth (Revelation, chapters 19-22).

Be ready to meet Christ by giving your life to Him today.

Many other evangelical Christians believe that Christ's return and the rapture will not occur until the seven years of the tribulation have ended. As far as the latter view is concerned, the rapture will not be secret, since it will be part of Christ's visible and triumphant return to end this present evil age (1 Thessalo-

nians 4:13-17). At this point, interpreters differ as to whether there will be a literal thousand-year reign of Christ on earth or whether the white throne judgment and the new heaven and earth will immediately appear.

All Christians do not agree on every detail of what will occur in the final events of this world's history. Some of these events and their order of occurrence have simply not been made clear in the Bible. What is important is that all Christians hold in common that Christ will ultimately return bodily, visibly, and gloriously to reign and rule with His resurrected and transformed saints forever and ever. The details of this great event will be made known in God's own time.

What happens to us in the first minute after we die? Do we enter heaven immediately, or do our souls go into some kind of a sleep until the end of time, when our souls and our bodies will be reunited? I've always had lots of questions about heaven.

A

The Bible doesn't answer all our questions about heaven and life after death—
and the reason is because our minds are limited, and heaven is far too glorious for
us to understand. Someday, all of our questions will be answered—but not yet. As
the Apostle Paul wrote, "Now I know in part; then I shall know fully" (1 Corinthians 13:12).

However, the Bible certainly does indicate that when we die we enter immediately into God's presence if we belong to Christ. From our earthly point of view, death looks somewhat like sleep—but not from God's point of view. Paul declared, "We are confident (of eternal life), I say, and would prefer to be away from the body and at home with the



Lord" (2 Corinthians 5:8). Elsewhere he wrote, "I desire to depart and be with Christ, which is better by far" (Philippians 1:23).

Later, we will be given new bodies—bodies that will never age or be subject to death, because they will be like Christ's resurrection body. As the Bible says, "The dead will be raised imperishable, and we will be changed" (1 Corinthians 15:52).

Is your hope in Christ? Death is a reality—but so is God's offer of salvation in Christ. Don't put off your decision for Him, because you could be called into eternity at any moment—and then it will be too late.

Don't wait; invite Christ into your life today.

Q: When a Christian dies, is it all right to cremate the body?

The Bible does not give specific directions for the disposal of the body following death. Bible-era practices are described in Unger's Bible Dictionary as follows: "Interment in Bible times followed soon after death, as is evident in the narratives of the burial of Sarah (Genesis 23:1-20), Rachel (Genesis 35:19-20), and Rebekah's nurse (Genesis 35:8). The Hebrews did not normally cremate, except in most unusual cases of emergency, as in the case of Saul and his sons (1 Samuel 31:11-13).

Later Babylonians burned their dead and deposited their ashes in ornate funerary urns, as did Greeks and Romans. Hebrews in later time, indicated by the numerous ossuaries found in New Testament Palestine, also practiced cremation." Christians will want to show respect for the body. Even though the essential person or spirit has moved on to an eternal destiny, the body is the tangible reminder of all that person meant to us. In addition, the body is destined for resurrection,

transformation, and reunion with the spirit at Christ's return.

Whether burial or cremation best expresses that appropriate respect is a very personal decision. The wishes of other close family members and friends should also be considered in any decision, because they are the ones who will live with the decision and with the memories.

At the resurrection it will not

make any difference whether a person's body has been buried or cremated. God knows how to raise the body, either in the resurrection of life or the resurrection of condemnation (John 5:28-29). The new body of a Christian will be a radically changed and glorified body like the body of the exalted Christ. It will be an eternal, spiritual body never again to experience weakness, disease, suffering, or death (1 Corinthians 15:35-54 and Philippians 3:20-21).

: Does a Christian have to tithe?

Christians who want to please the Lord often have questions about tithing. The dictionary defines the word "tithe" as "a tenth part of something paid as a voluntary contribution or as a tax especially for the support of a religious establishment." It was a common practice in the Old Testament and was required of members of the nation of Israel.

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Many Christians believe that this principle of giving one-tenth should be carried over to the New Testament in giving to the church and other Christian organizations. Billy Graham would fit into this category. He has said, "We have found in our own home, as have thousands of others, that God's blessing upon the nine-tenths, when we tithe, helps it to go farther than ten-tenths without His blessing." However, even then the question as to whether to tithe from one's net or gross income is not answered in Scripture, nor is the question of whether to give it all to the local church or to include other ministries. We feel that such decisions should be based on personal conviction.

Other Christians who tithe do so simply because they respect the Old Testament principle and find it a helpful place to begin in their giving. They do not believe, however, that tithing is a New Testament obligation. It is not mentioned in the New Testament except where it is describing Old Testament practices or in the Gospels where Jesus is addressing people who were under the Old Testament law. Note Jesus' comments to the Pharisees in Luke 11:42.

A New Testament teaching on giving which may be helpful to you is found in 1 Corinthians 16:2: "On the first day of every week, each one of you should set aside a sum of money in keeping with his income." This passage brings out four points: we should give individually, regularly, methodically and proportionately.

The matter of your giving is between you and God, and He always takes into account our circumstances. He knows when they are beyond our power to direct and control. The important thing is that we see giving as a privilege and not a burden. It should not be out of a sense of duty, but rather out of love for the Lord and a desire to see His kingdom advanced.

Second Cotinthians 9:6-7 says: "Remember this: Whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows generously will also reap generously. Each man should give what he has decided in his heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver."

The deeper question, you see, is this: What has priority in our lives? Is Christ really first—or do we put ourselves and our own desires first? Make sure Christ is first in your life, and then ask Him to guide you.

February is a month famous for one thing, LOVE. I'm thinking Valentines Day! We set aside February 14th every year to recognize our love and affection for husbands and wives. I realize there is no Valentines Day in the Bible, if you're a student of God's word you know that everyday should be Valentines Day for the husband and wife united by God.



I write specifically to husbands and wives because God ordained this relationship from creation. From Adam and Eve and throughout God's word, we find the relationship of a man and woman as husband and wife equally yoked as God's plan for the family and procreation.

It is heartbreaking to see what man has done to marriage and human sexuality. Consider the book of Genesis and begin there. The fall of man in the Garden and Sodom and Gomorrah are both examples that took us down a dark path concerning sexuality. Today man tries to justify many things; same sex relationships, couples living together outside of marriage, adultery, pornography, bi-sexuality and even pedophilia as legitimate expressions of love. God calls these and more like them sin. For the Christian marriage, Valentine's Day is not about sexual perversion, it is a celebration of Godly love. There is no genuine love apart from the love God calls a man and woman into as husband and wife. For example, in Hebrews 13:4 we read "Marriage is honorable in all, and the bed undefiled: but whoremongers and adulterers God will judge."

I want to take this time to honor biblical marriage. Not just marriage, but biblical marriage. There is a difference. In Deuteronomy God told Israel not to marry into the neighboring people. Not because of race, but because of idolatry. The neighboring people did not know the God of Israel, they worshipped false gods and images made by their hands. God did not want that influence in His people. From 2 Corinthians 6:14 "Be ye not unequally yoked together with unbelievers: for what fellowship hath righteousness with unrighteousness? and what communion hath light with darkness?" This passage goes much deeper than marriage, it relates to every aspect of the believer's life. Yet, it does include marriage. This is written to the believer. We are responsible for how we approach marriage.

Like many pastors, I counsel. Too often this counseling involves marriages. I

have heard too many husbands and wives tell me if they only knew the other person was not saved. Before I marry anyone, I ask specifically if both are saved, are they born again. This is the foundation of a Godly marriage. I will not marry a couple unless both have a testimony of being saved, and both have a home church to reference back



too. I counsel singles to know the spiritual condition of the person you're dating. Just claiming they are a Christian isn't enough. There are too many definitions of a Christian floating around today. Ask pointed questions, where do they go to church, how long have they been going there, what work are they involved with, what is the pastor's name, visit with them and listen to the conversations with others. If they are well known or not, the conversation will tell you quickly. I'm not trying to break up dating couples, I'm trying to save future marriages.

A man or woman with a lustful heart will tell you anything you want to hear so they may fulfill their fantasy. It may be sex, money, power, influence or even a quick escape from an unwanted home life. What ever the reason, if it isn't a Godly marriage or hasn't become one through the salvation of husband and wife it has little chance of surviving. If the devil helped make it, he will destroy it. It is always God's desire for a marriage to be successful. A Christian should never give up on their marriage. The Christian can be the testimony God uses to win the spouse. That doesn't mean a Christian should live in dangerous conditions. Separation and divorce are two different things.

A Godly marriage is a beautiful marriage. A man and woman both born again by grace and through faith in Christ alone. Christ is the foundation of their lives and will be the foundation of their marriage. These marriages have problems too, all marriages do. There are faults and failures, even sin from temptation. Where Christ reigns there is HOPE! Divorce will not be mentioned in the Christian marriage, why, because the Christian marriage has a foundation that will not crumble and both husband and wife will want to fight for it. If you and your spouse are both born again praise God for that, many today can't say that. Enjoy Valentine's Day as your special day of the year to worship God for His creation of marriage. The apostle Paul talks about this in Galatians 1:10. He says: "Am I now trying to win the favor and approval of men, or of God? Or am I seeking to please someone? If I were still trying to be popular with men, I would not be a bond-servant of Christ" (AMP).

He's basically saying, "If I were trying to be popular with people, I wouldn't be serving God and know that He loves me."

I can say with certainty that if I was trying to be popular with people, I wouldn't be doing what I'm doing today. When God spoke to my heart about His call on my life to teach the Word, I didn't receive much support from those around me.

As I began to step out and do what God placed in my heart, some of my friends and family told me I shouldn't be doing it. I was even asked to leave the church I was attending at the time, and I ended up losing friendships that I thought were important to me.

It was a very difficult season, but I discovered that while it's not always easy to do what God calls us to do, obedience to Him is always worth it in the end. Doing things God's way is the only thing that works in the long run. There are people in your life—I'm talking about people other than your spouse and children—who may come and go over time, but God will always be with you because He loves you and He promises to never leave you nor forsake you (see Hebrews 13:5). The bottom line is you are valuable because God loves you and He gave His only Son, Jesus Christ, to die for you. Your worth is not based on how you look, who you know, your title at work or any of the other superficial things the world considers impressive.

After Paul met Christ and became a born-again believer, he came to realize that everything else was meaningless compared to the priceless privilege of knowing God. I absolutely love what he says in Philippians 3:8:

"I count everything as loss compared to the priceless privilege and supreme advantage of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord [and of growing more deeply and thoroughly acquainted with Him—a joy unequaled]. For His sake I have lost everything, and I consider it all garbage, so that I may gain Christ."

The truth that God loves you is what makes you valuable. He created you because He loves you and wants to have a personal relationship with you. He has wonderful plans and purposes for your life, and His love for you is unconditional—He loves you just as much on your worst day as He does on your best day!

No matter what your past is like, where you're from, what you've done, or where you are today, God is there for you and He loves you! He loves us all the same, and He wants to meet us right where we are to heal our wounded souls and bring us out of the messes we're in—whether it's a mess we've created or the result of what other people have done to us.

After the years of being abused by my dad and abandoned by my mother (who knew what he was doing but didn't have the courage to stand up to him), I was so messed up! I felt worthless, guilty, damaged, used, condemned and terribly insecure. I tried to find my worth and value in many things, especially in work. And living this way just made me more miserable, angry and messed up.

It was so wonderful to discover that God loves me and to find the healing and restoration I desperately needed through my relationship with Him. The truth is God is so much more important to us than any person in the world could ever be! I want to encourage you to spend time seeking God in prayer, studying what the Bible says about who He is and how He loves you. Meditate on scriptures like Ephesians 1:4-5, Romans 8, Psalm 27:10 and Isaiah 38:17. Ask God to help you learn to receive His love and find your true worth in Him. He chose you on purpose...He wants you and He loves you...and there's nothing more valuable than that.



Here Paul shares the essence of the Christian message. Both what this message is, and what it is NOT, are signifi-

The message we have, Paul says, is "the unfathomable riches of Christ." Jesus Christ Himself is the Christian message. He is "the way, and the truth, and the life, and no one comes to the Father but through (Him)." (John 14:6) In Him is found "every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places" Ephesians 1:3 tells us. So just as Paul shared in I Corinthians 1:23, "We preach Christ crucifled ...". HE is our message.

This message is also NOT what many "Christian" ministers and ministries focus on today:

- It is NOT a proclamation of physical healing and material prosperity.
- It is NOT "positive thinking."
- . It is NOT merely "family values."
- It is NOT "church growth."
- It is NOT conservative politics.

Some of these things may be good, or have certain good elements. But they are not to be the focus of the message of a Christian church or ministry. Only Jesus can save (John 14:6). And every spiritual blessing is found "in Him," Ephesians 1 repeatedly shows us... So as Paul points out here, our message is "to preach ... the unfathomable riches of Christ."

The body may forget, but the mind relinquishes the memories less. Slowly, the pace increased until there was a smooth cadence. My fingers pressed the speed button on the treadmill up until it felt

When our muscles are torn in the process of exercising, the endorphins buffer the pain, allowing us to push ourselves farther than we might otherwise. The more we become physically fit, the greater the number of endorphins are released. Once we become one with our body, we can almost achieve a feeling of running on air. So, it was this evening, at least for a few sparse moments, when I had finally found a rhythm that matched its pace and was back in the groove. It felt good, but I knew it wouldn't last. The belt on the treadmill flowed beneath as the gray sky outside the fitness center faded away.

"I've got to get out of this prison cell," Freddie sang. The image of this earthly body came to mind, and the day when we meet Jesus in the sky, in our new bodies, made whole and anew. "Then we which are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds, to meet the Lord in the air: and so shall we ever be with the Lord."-1 Thess. 4:17

It felt as if I were being lifted beyond that cursory station in life, away from the toil of keeping that decaying shell fit. Before me was the image of the cross. 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

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
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Vickie A. Hogan Multidisciplinary Simulation Lab

McDowell Tech

McDowell Technical Community College in Marion recently dedicated a new simulation lab for health science students in the Hemlock Building on the college's main campus. The Vickie A. Hogan Multidisciplinary Simulation Lab will be used to train and educate students preparing for careers as nurse aides, practical nurses, registered nurses,



Funding for facility renovation, equipment and related expenses was provided by generous gifts and grants from A.C. "Bud" and Thurlene Hogan, Appalachian Regional Commission, Bank of America, Cannon Foundation, Kate B. Reynolds

Charitable Trust, and The Mc-Dowell Endowment.

"We are grateful to each of these individuals and organizations for their support of the college and our programs," said Dr. John Gossett, MTCC President. "We are especially thankful to Bud and Thurlene Hogan, who helped us conceive and initiate plans for this facility before Mr. Hogan's death last February."

The Multidisciplinary Simulation Lab was dedicated in honor and memory of the Hogan's late daughter, Vickie, who had dreamed of becoming a medical missionary, but was unable to do so because of a series of strokes that began when she was in elementary school. She went on to finish nursing school, became a nurse and eventually worked with stroke patients at what was then Thom's Rehabilitation Hospital in Asheville, where she herself had been patient years earlier

"Research has shown that simulation labs allow students in clinical programs to get important hands-on experience performing procedures they will later use with real patients in hospitals, medical facilities and in emergency, field-based settings," said Dr. Penny Cross, Vice-President for Learning and Student Services.

"The main difference," she said, "between providing care in a simulated lab and in the field, is a live person and surroundings that mimic real life. However, our newest mannequins are extremely life-like, without the risk

our newest mannequins are extremely life-like, without the risk of injury to live patients as students begin their practical training. Our ambulance box, exactly the same size as a real one, has been set up to teach EMT students

how to provide quality medical care in the confining space of an ambulance."

"MTCC is the first college in North Carolina to have the most up-to-date version of Victoria, a medical simulation mannequin," said Judy Melton, Dean of Health Sciences, who has coordinated the creation of this lab. "We are excited to have the latest, cutting-edge technology on campus to assist our health science students in attaining their educational goals."

"I am convinced that students trained in our new lab will be some of the bestprepared health care providers anywhere," said Gossett, the MTCC President. "We are raising the overall skill level of our students and they, in turn, will raise the level of patient care in medical facilities and emergency settings throughout the region."

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Dave Says:

Dear Dave,

At what point can you spend, and have a little fun, when you're following the Baby Steps plan? Jen

Dear Jen,

Everyone likes having fun, and there's nothing wrong with spending some cash if you can afford it. I just want people to make sure they have their finances in

I recommend completing the first three Baby Steps before you run out and buy a bunch of toys. Just to review, Baby Step 1 is saving \$1,000 for a starter emergency fund. Baby Step 2 is where you pay off all debt — except for your home — using the debt snowball method. In Baby Step 3, you go back and fully fund your emergency fund with enough cash to cover three to six months of expenses. Completing the first three Baby Steps puts you on pretty solid financial ground. At this point, once you've saved up the cash, it's okay to take a vacation or buy a reasonably-priced toy. But don't have so much fun that you forget about the other Baby Steps. Baby Step 4 means putting 15 percent of your income into pre-tax retirement plans, like mutual funds and Roth IRAs. Don't neglect saving for college if you have kids. That's Baby Step 5. Baby Steps 6 and 7 are paying off the house early and building wealth and giving like never before.

Remember, there are only three things you can do with money — spend, save, and give. You can do all three without putting yourself in a bind by following my plan!—Dave

Dear Dave,

I have cousins who are thinking about moving back to Connecticut from Virginia. They'll be renting for a while, and I have an unoccupied rental house. Do you think renting to family is a bad idea? Katherine

Dear Katherine,

Renting to family can work out just fine, as long as there are clearly understood rules and boundaries in place ahead of time. Both parties should understand there must be a landlord and tenant relationship with regards to all aspects of the rental agreement.

Tenants have the right to expect a landlord to make needed repairs promptly, pay the taxes and insurance on a property on time, and do all the other things a landlord should do as outlined in the rental agreement. As a landlord, you have the right to expect the rent to be paid early or on time, and for the tenant to respect the property and guidelines in the rental agreement. A landlord also has the right to evict a tenant through fair, legal process if they violate the terms of the agreement. When it comes to these business dealings, you're wearing the landlord cap, and they're wearing the renter's cap. At Thanksgiving, Christmas, and other family events, the caps come off and you're family. But you don't get to play the cousin card as a way to keep from paying rent, and you don't get to play that game to avoid your duties as a landlord.

Phrases like, "Well, I just thought because you're my cousin" have no place in these situations. Make plans to have a full-blown, in-depth conversation about every aspect of the rental agreement and relationship before anything is signed. If you don't, there's a possibility someone will develop a sense of entitlement about something.

And that's no good in any type of relationship!-Dave

Dear Dave,

My sister has bad credit due to a lot of late payments. She has finally started to change her ways and get control of her finances, because she and her finance want to make an offer on a house. The bank won't approve it if she is on the loan, and his income alone isn't enough to get the amount they need. His parents are well-off, and they have offered to co-sign on the loan. Is this a bad idea? Rhonda

Dear Rhonda


It's a really bad idea. Those two have no business thinking about a house right now, and his parents are about to make things even worse with their loving, misguided help.

If you need a co-signer, you're nowhere near ready to buy a home. They need to slow down. I mean, they're just engaged. They don't even need a house at this point. They should get married, live in a cheap apartment for a while, and work on paying off their debts. After that, they need to save up an emergency fund of three to six months of expenses, then start setting cash aside for a huge down payment on their first, modest home.

These two have a bad case of house fever. And mom and dad need to step back, look at things objectively, and realize they would not be blessing these kids by helping get them into a home they obviously can't afford!—Dave

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The Light Shines in the Darkness

The Darkness Is Spreading—Rapidly.

Every day, it seems like yet another menacing cloud has spread its dark shadow across the land.

The relentless reporting of widespread sexual harassment has dominated the news cycle for months. Television hosts, congressmen, Hollywood elites, journalists and businessmen have all confessed to grievous acts of sexual harassment. The repercussions have been enormous, as women across the country have accused employers and co-workers of inappropriate behavior.



And that's just the tip of the iceberg.

Online pornography use is at an all-time high. Gay and transgender characters are now a common sight on television, even in programs for small children. Atheists are hell-bent on eradicating any mention of God in town halls, schools and sporting events. Drug addiction, especially to new opioid painkillers, is an epidemic in many parts of the country, particularly in rural areas with high joblessness.

Mass shootings are no longer a rare occurrence, and they happen in once-sacred places like churches and historically safe spaces like schools and public venues. The weapons of terrorists are no longer just homemade bombs but also cars and trucks, which can run down citizens in broad daylight on busy city thoroughfares.

Abroad, the darkness is just as widespread.

Christians across the Middle East suffer intense persecution from Islamic terrorists and oppressive governments. In so many parts of the world, it's never been a more dangerous time to be a follower of the Lord Jesus Christ.

Some think we are on the verge of nuclear war as North Korea continues to ratchet up the very real threat of an atomic conflict that could have catastrophic consequences for the entire world. The thought of multiple nuclear weapons being



launched from countries like North Korea and Iran (which the North Koreans supply with arms) and reciprocal military responses is frightening indeed.

The Bible is clear that moral and spiritual darkness has always been the case for a world that rejects and refuses to acknowledge God. Describing a godless culture that hates God, the Apostle Paul said that "they became fittile in their thinking, and their foolish hearts were darkened" (Romans 1:21).

Moral darkness invariably leads to unruly, disobedient living that defies God's commandments and principles, setting the stage for lifestyles and behavior that eventually reap destructive consequences.

What I believe is happening today that I certainly haven't seen in my lifetime is the incredibly swift spread of darkness across virtually every sector of our culture, here at home and in practically every region of the globe.

The Judeo-Christian worldview that once was predominant has seen serious erosion. The forces of evil are working on every front to undermine and destroy the foundations of a morally healthy society—respect for authority, the sacredness of the marriage union between a man and a woman, the sanctity of life for the unborn, and our freedom to take a stand for values that we know are right.

The Bible is clear that such moral chaos comes because people reject the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ.

"And this is the judgment: the light has come into the world, and the people loved the darkness rather than the light because their works were evil. For everyone who does wicked things hates the light and does not come to the light" (John 3:19-20).

Jesus is the Light of the world. In fact, there is no light other than Christ. Those who walk in darkness are those who don't know the Savior of the World, the Author of Light.

For those of us who have repented of our sins and placed our faith in our Lord and Savior, "He has delivered us from the domain of darkness and transferred us to the kingdom of his beloved Son" (Colossians 1:13).

Paul put it this way as he described the Lord's commandment to him in his preaching: "I am sending you to open their eyes, so that they may turn from darkness to light and from the power of Satan to God" (Acts 26:17-18).

Hell, itself is not only the absence of light, but it is complete, utter, total darkness. The Scriptures call it "outer darkness," a place that is reserved exclusively for the devil, fallen angels and unrepentant man.

But the Light that is from above, the Light of the World, will be the single source of all light in the new Heaven and the new earth. "And night will be no more. They will need no light of lamp or sun, for the Lord God will be their light" (Revelation 22:5).

And we know that however great and wide the spread of darkness over the world may be, it can never extinguish the True Light. "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it" (John 1:5).

While I can—for as long as I can—as God gives me strength, I will proclaim Jesus Christ as the way, the truth and the life (John 14:6). In the coming year, I will be proclaiming that Gospel in 18 cities along the West Coast of the U.S., as well as in Portugal, England, Armenia and Mexico.

It's our responsibility as believers to let our light shine before men, and to honor and glorify God by our good works and godly life, regardless of how evil the culture has become. The Bible calls us to be "blameless and innocent, children of God without blemish in the midst of a crooked and twisted generation, among whom you shine as lights in the world" (Philippians 2:15). ©2017 BGEA.

As a deer pants for flowing streams, so pants my soul for you, O God. -Psalm 42:1 (ESV)

Burnout-it's real, and it can have major consequences. It can leave you empty, discouraged and exhausted, with little energy left for God. Sound familiar? Maybe it's time to replenish. Start here.



Come away by yourselves to a secluded place and rest a while. - Mark 6:31, NASB

You don't have to use vacation days or drive far away to take a break with God. You can pick a place close by to relax and simply enjoy His presence. Here are some ideas: a community park, a pool, a hammock or rocking chair, a quiet corner of an ice cream or coffee shop, a book store or library, or a spot by the water. You might even bring some music or a journal.

If you like to be active, try going on a hike or bike ride, kayaking, taking a oneperson picnic, gardening or painting. Getting away doesn't have to mean a change in your physical location, as long as you're getting away from daily stresses to spend time with God.

Be still, and know that I am God. -Psalm 46:10a, NASB

Taking time to "be still" may be harder today than ever. So much screams for our attention in this fastpaced, digital world. What is pure.


What is lovely and admirable.

Signs to Look for in an Abusive Personality

I'm trying to stop using the term "domestic violence."

It leaves too much out. Too many women think that if
they're not being physically abused then they're not in a
dangerous, abusive relationship. Nothing could be further
from the truth. In reality, it only takes being hit one time

for the victim to know what the abuser is capable of. From that point on, all he has to do is use gestures (loading and unloading a gun, for instance), looks, other actions to remind her what he's capable of.

Many people refer to abusive men as "batterers." Wrong term, in my opinion. We're talking about a complex set of tactics that are strategically employed by the abuser. These tactics all fall on a continuum. From a dozen red roses to a gun held to her head, they're all part of the same thing: his sense of entitlement, of male superiority/supremacy. The goal is to first gain, and then maintain control of/over the victim/s. And it's never, ever just about him and what he does. It's also about the deeply, dangerously patriarchal systems that aid and abet his abusive behavior. Abusers come from all walks of life. They are uneducated, homeless men and they are doctors, lawyers, and bank presidents. The idea that abusers and victims are all uneducated and poor is a dangerous myth. Unfortunately, that myth continues to hold sway, even in 2018. We are stunned when we hear about domestic abuse murder or murder/suicide when it happens in a part of town that does not comport with our belief system. And yet it keeps happening.

Lists like this have been created many times. They're typically used by advocates to help survivors be able to identify what they've been living with. The survivors always have their own unique/tragic/outrageous stories to tell, and they're all heartbreaking and infuriating. But they're also all about raw, determined courage and wisdom.

I'm going to do some editing to the list we typically use. These additions are based on what I've learned over the last 30+ years.

- 1. Morbid jealousy: This is not your garden-variety jealousy, the kind of jealousy that is a normal, human emotion everyone feels at some point in time. (Your best friend gets a A+ on a test that you got a B on, despite studying like mad. You might feel a twinge of jealousy.) In abusive relationships, the jealousy is the If-I-can't-have-you-no-one-can! kind of jealousy. He expects you to constantly prove your love/undying loyalty to him, and he keeps moving the bar. He checks the mileage on your car. He constantly texts you and demands that you respond to him immediately. He has the bizarre notion that, you're having a fling with the produce guy at the grocery store. (Please!) Mind your antennae. If it seems off the wall and controlling, it is.
- 2. Controlling behavior: C'mon, baby, let's hang out all weekend! Just you and me! It sounds/feels good at the beginning, but when you tell him you want to go see a movie with your best friend or simply have a night to yourself and he freaks out and starts in on you, pay attention! Controlling behavior represents invisible building blocks he's using to wall you off from everyone else. Guilt, shame, whatever works, he'll use it. And it will only get worse.
- 3. Quick involvement: I've never been able to talk with anyone like I can talk with you! (Classic.) It's normal to want to be with your new lover a lot, but when that also comes with "Let's move in together", that's a massive warning sign. If he's acting like he wants to "sweep you off your feet", stop and think about that. Being swept off your feet is destabilizing, kind of the object of the exercise for men who want control over you. Taking time is a good thing!
- 4.Unrealistic expectations: Abusers tend to be highly insecure. They rely on their partners to give them a sense of connection and stability, but what they're really looking for is someone to blame everything on when things don't go the way they want them to. No one is perfect, and no one should be held to unrealistic standards or standards that continue to move. Not fun. Impossible.
- 5. Isolation: Isolation is not just a geographic issue; it's a state of mind. Once he sets up shop in the victim's head, he tends to be able to run the show even if he's nowhere in sight. He will try to cut the victim off from friends and family, or make the victim "choose" who she "really loves." Lots and lots of guilt is applied. Women can live in an apartment building surrounded by other people and still be isolated. Cell phone technology has added entire new dimensions to his ability to isolate the victim because he can monitor her at all times. It's quite terrifying.

 6. Blames others for his problems: He refuses to take any responsibility at all for the choices he makes to be controlling and abusive. It's always the fault of the victim and/or someone else. ALWAYS. And unfortunately, women are also blamed by other people and institutions (church, the criminal justice system, family, friends) who might say to her, "What did you do to make him angry?" which does nothing but reinforce her subordinate position and provide him with reinforcements.
- 7. Blames the victim/s for his feelings: YOU TICKED ME OFF! People do get angry. Anger, for an abuser, is a tactic. He will use anger when other tactics don't "work" for him. Even if the victim has done something that he perceives as upsetting, that does not give him the right to express his anger in a tactical way, or a way that frightens the victim. This is one of the most important tactics to be mindful of. He is responsible for how he expresses himself 100% of the time. It's called being a grownup.
- 8. Hypersensitivity (aka He can dish it out, but he can't take it): He feels entitled to make hateful, hurtful comments to the victim(s), but the minute someone says something to him he doesn't like, or doesn't respond to him the exact way he feels entitled too, he lashes out. Very, very thin skin. Unable to and not interested in listening to others. His way or the highway. Exhausting. Literally exhausting.
 9. Cruelty (to children or animals): Huge warning signs. Sometimes the cruelty



can be quite sadistic. Perhaps he was abused/taunted as a child and now he wants to be the one with all the power. Even if he was abused as a child, that's not an excuse for him to be abusive and hurtful. He must recognize that his choice to be hurtful is not acceptable and commit to changing his behavior. If he doesn't, there's nothing the victim can do to change him. Nothing.

10.Emotional abuse: Words cut deep. We do not pay as much attention to emotional abuse as we should. Victims cannot call law enforcement if they're being emotionally abused unless they're being threatened. By not paying attention to emotional abuse, victims might think they're making a "big deal out of nothing." Nothing could be further from the truth. Emotional abuse is, in my opinion, one of the most horrendous forms of abuse because it is invisible, and it doesn't take much to cut someone in half with words. If you know someone who is being emotionally abused, please listen respectfully to them and tell them they do not deserve to be talked to/yelled at like that. Emotional abuse is REAL, and it is a significant abusive tactic.

DACA Negotiations

As many of you know, the House and Senate are in the middle of negotiating immigration reforms and principles before the coming deadline in March. I wanted to make sure you're updated on a few of my key concerns:

First, you may have heard some discussion about possibly including DACA reforms in an upcoming spending bill and combining the two issues. I am completely opposed to this and believe DACA should NOT be included in a spending bill. It should be addressed as an independent, standalone item.

Second, I fully believe any solution on immigration must do four specific things before we do anything else:

- Secure the border
- 2. End 'chain migration'
- Institute e-verify
- End the 'Diversity Visa Lottery' program

Doing those four things, among others, would go a long way in fixing our broken immigration system.

The bottom line: There is no reason why House Republicans can't pass a stand-alone, responsible immigration bill that secures our border and promotes conservative priorities in line with President Trump's agenda. None. It's time to put aside the excuses and get to a solution. If we resolve to put American interests first and keep our promises we made to the voters in 2016, we can get this done. FBI Investigation Continues

Jim Jordan (R-OH) and I, along with several of our colleagues, are continuing our push to 'investigate the investigators' as information continues to come in suggesting that in 2016, high level officials at the FBI engaged in activity that raises questions about whether they sought to undermine then-Presidential candidate Donald Trump.

As I've said before, this really comes down to a critical set of questions: Did the FBI use a Clinton campaign paid-for political dossier to justify spying on the Trump campaign in 2016? Did President Obama's DOJ compromise our security in order to target political opponents?

"So, Jacob served seven years for Rachel and they seemed to him but a few days because of his love for her." (Genesis 29:20)


Surely this is at least one of the most romantic verses in all of the word of God. Jacob loved Rachel so much that he was not only willing to work seven years to earn her hand in mar-

Reading Commission

I was very pleased that the legislature, as part of the two-year budget adopted last June, approved provisions for a new education initiative that focuses on reading proficiency for students at all grade levels. The initiative's main goal is to improve students' reading skills and literacy in general. The program will thus help bolster the necessary educational credentials that North Carolinians will need to equip them to be both self-sufficient and ready for the workforce in the years that lie ahead.

All North Carolina high school students in the 11th grade take the ACT test at the end of that school year to assess their readiness for either entering the work force or continuing their education at some higher education institution, community college or university. The ACT includes an assessment of each student's readiness for career or higher education based upon their reading ability. Sadly, less than 40% of our high school juniors are able readers. With reading being the key to success in most modern-day jobs and other subjects studied in school, this lack of readiness by our students is a huge drag on their futures as well as for our businesses needing capable employees, whether just out of high school or after completing additional schooling after high school. Moreover, when students leave high school unable to read at a competent level, those attempting to go further with their education most often find themselves first paying for remedial courses before they can even get to the courses that they believe are important to their future. That is assuming they do not become discouraged and drop out.

In recent years, the North Carolina legislature has invested heavily in trying to enhance reading in kindergarten through third grade. That program has been called, "Read to Achieve". It seems, thus far, to be meeting with noticeable success. However, there are still substantial numbers of students leaving third grade without adequate reading skills. In addition, experts tell us that students, about the fourth grade, begin to need different reading skills as they get into more substantive subjects in which reading is key. In short, it may be said those students need to learn to read not just to pronounce or recognize and say words. Rather, students need to understand what the words mean and they need to be able to use words to explain their understanding.

It is this latter reading approach, that of comprehension and communication, that the new Reading Commission is formed to address. The commission is headed by State Superintendent of Public Instruction Mark Johnson. The members of the commission consist mostly of educators with expertise and understanding of different ways to teach reading in grades 4 through 12. The idea is not to prescribe what schools and teachers must do as much as to identify a variety of successful methods or approaches from which they may choose. Ultimately, the goal is that, as a state, North Carolina will dramatically increase the percentage of our students who are capable readers when they leave high school.

NC Senate District 46

One of the big topics of discussion across our nation last month was the federal tax reform bill that was passed into law on December 22, 2017. Having a front seat to the many tax reforms we've implemented in NC, (Carolina Journal), I have found the negative reactions to tax relief to be very interesting. Similar to the objections to tax reform we heard here in NC, last month there were national leaders denigrating the idea of returning a 'paltry sum of \$2000' to the hands of the taxpayer. In other words, to liberals, government knows how to spend your money better than you do. For the average citizen, an extra \$2000 would be helpful, and the equivalent of a few month's rent, a couple mortgage payments, a down payment on a car, etc. But just as we saw in NC, the liberal left in Washington. D.C. made outlandish statements implying that the economy would collapse if the government lowered tax rates. As President Reagan. once said, "The difference between them and us is that we want to check government spending and they want to spend government checks." I believe the facts bear out that the tax reforms NC has implemented over the last few years have put our State on a very positive economic path. Since December 1 of 2017, Burke County has entertained three different jobs announcements that will add 440 new jobs in Burke County. In Cleveland County, officials were also able to announce hundreds of new job opportunities due to hundreds of millions of dollars in business expansion and relocation in the county. More North Carolinians are employed now than at any time in the history of our state. The General Assembly's nonpartisan Fiscal Research Division has recently reported that, "the economy is on solid footing and remains in a stable growth pattern.... Employment continues to grow at a steady pace.... The state's growth is starting to outpace average national growth.... The economy is stronger than it was a year ago and is beginning to look like an economy that has entered into a true expansionary phase." That's good news for our State, and you can read the entire economic report at NC General Assembly Fiscal Research Division. As these federal tax reforms continue to take effect, I expect that there will be more good economic news on the horizon. Happy Valentine's Day to each of you, and I hope that you will take the opportunity this month to let the special people in your life know how much you love and appreciate them.

N.C. retirement plans put \$5.7 million back in retirees' pockets in January Implements President Trump's Tax Package in a Matter of Days

The following is reprinted from the Office of State Treasurer Dale Folwell.

(Raleigh, N.C.) – North Carolina State Treasurer Dale R. Folwell, CPA, announced today that January benefit payments to North Carolina retirees will increase by a total of \$5.7 million this month thanks to the Retirement Systems Division (RSD) beating the clock on an IRS deadline.

The deadline was the result of the new federal tax reform law, which lowered the amount of federal taxes that should be deducted from 2018 benefit payments to North Carolina retirees and benefit recipients. Employers have until February 15, 2018 to update the federal withholding tables used to calculate how much is withheld from individual payments. The RSD Operations Team within the N.C. Department of State Treasurer was able to update the tables ahead of the IRS's deadline.

"I'm very proud of our team for taking the initiative so quickly after the new tax law was passed by Congress and signed by President Trump. While we are in the check delivery business, it involves more than just buying ink and stamps," said Treasurer Folwell.

"This is a testament to the outstanding job that our career public servants do to serve government workers."

New streamlined processes continue to help RSD create operational efficiencies, including releasing 2017 tax forms weeks ahead of schedule and at the fastest pace in six years. This comes despite a steady increase in retirements and new payment disbursements that set another record for RSD: over \$500 million is now paid out each month to more than 312,000 retirees and benefit recipients.

"Our team, led by Tom Causey and Susan Fordham, decided not to wait until February to enact this increase in our members' benefit payments," explained Steve Toole, Executive Director of RSD. "By updating these tax schedules sooner, our members will see larger January benefit payments."

The January benefit payments will be disbursed to retirees and benefit recipients on Thursday, January 25, 2018. Background:

Department of State Treasurer manages the North Carolina Total Retirement Plans, which administer the retirement benefits of more than 900,000 of North Carolina's state and local government, law enforcement, judicial and legislative employees, as well as teachers and fire and rescue workers. 


"The LORD hath appeared of old unto me, saying, Yea, I have loved thee with an everlasting love: therefore, with lovingkindness have I drawn thee." (Jeremiah 31:3) The tragedy of sin is that it keeps God from being to us all that He wants to be--- Our Lover (1-6). The image of marriage is frequently found in both Jeremiah and Hosea. When we disobey God,

we sin not only against His law but also against His love. We break the heart of God when we give our love to what He hates. Perhaps no doctrine in Scripture is as clearly stated as that expressed in our text and in many other passages. God loves us! His love is an "everlasting love" and compels Him to act strongly and lovingly on our behalf.

"Herein is love, not that we loved God, but that he loved us, and sent his Son to be the propitiation for our sins" (I John 4: 10). This theme finds glorious expression in the grand hymn of the last century entitled "I Am His, and He Is Mine." Loved with everlasting love, led by grace that love to know; Spirit, breathing from above, thou hast taught me it is so! O this full and perfect peace, 0 this transport all divine-In a love which cannot cease, I am His and He is mine. Jesus prayed, "I in them, and thou in me, ... that the world may know that thou hast sent me, and hast loved them, as thou hast loved me. Father, I will that they also, whom thou hast I given me, be with me where I am" (John 1 7:23-24). The Father will never allow us to part from Him or our Savior. These precious facts are taught to us by the "inspired" (literally "God-breathed") Scriptures (2 Timothy 3:16), and "the Comforter ..., the Spirit of truth [who] will guide [us] into all truth" (John 16:7, to himself (Ephesians 1 :4-5). "Behold, what manner of love the Father hath bestowed upon us, that we should be called the sons of God" (1 John 3: 1).

The answer to that question is Everything. Sincere biblical love is a rare thing in this world. There are plenty of exhibitions of fleshly and worldly love, but sincere, biblical love is hard to find! The Bible tells us that God's Love is Endless, in Jeremiah 31:3 The Lord hath appeared of old unto

me, saying, Yea, I have loved thee with an everlasting love: therefore with loving kindness have I drawn thee. The Bible also tells us that God's love is Unbiased, in John 3:16 For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life. The Bible also tells us God's Love is Unchanging in Rom. 8:38-39. For I am persuaded, that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor powers, nor things present, nor things to come, [39] Nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature, shall be able to separate us from the love of God, which is in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Let's look at what the Bible tells us in 1 Cot 13:1-7 1 Though I speak with the tongues of men and of angels, and have not charity (love), I am become as sounding brass, or a tinkling cymbal. 2 And though I have the gift of prophecy, and understand all mysteries, and all knowledge; and though I have all faith, so that I could remove mountains, and have not charity (love), I am nothing. 3 And though I bestow all my goods to feed the poor, and though I give my body to be burned, and have not charity (love), it profiteth me nothing. 4 Charity (love) suffereth long, and is kind; charity (love) envieth not; charity (love) vaunteth not itself, is not puffed up, 5 Doth not behave itself unseemly, seeketh not her own, is not easily provoked, thinketh no evil; 6 Rejoiceth not 7 Beareth all things, believeth all things, hopeth all things, endureth all things.

This passage in I. Cor 13:1-7 shows us two very important things about biblical love in the Christians Life; First it shows us the Importance of Biblical Love. See it's one thing to speak love, but it's a whole different story to show it to others. It's easy to say I love you because all that is, is words I've spoken. I've heard sometimes our words are cheap. Showing our love for our fellow man is going to take us out of our comfort zone, could even cost

you time and money, and may even take a great effort. The Bible says in 1 John 3:18 "My little children, let us not love in word, neither in tongue; but in deed and in truth." Second this passage paints us a Picture of Sincere Love. Verses 4-6 shows us Loves Action. A Sunday School teacher asked her class if they knew the



difference between kindness and loving kindness. One little girl said she knew the difference. She told the teacher that kindness is like when you ask your mother for some toast and she gives it to you, but loving kindness is when you ask your mother for some toast and she gives it to you with butter and jelly on it. And that's the way God is. God, in his loving kindness, is an exceedingly generous giver. He doesn't just give you some blessings, but He gives some blessings with some butter and jelly on it. That's the way True biblical love should be.

"We do need help with supplies, but no matter

what God will supply our need. We hope there will be a lot more involvement," said Gossett.

All the leads were attached to me correctly. Yet the doctor couldn't get a reading from the cardiogram machine.

I lay there praying against the trepidation of what he might find.

That was many years ago. But I can still hear the doctor saying, "I don't see anything on the screen. I don't know what's wrong."

Quietly, I said, "I'm still here."

He quickly turned and said, "Oh, it's not you! It's the machine."

We laughed a bit and he eventually was able to rule out anything with my heart. Healthy physical hearts are essential to good health. Proper nutrition, good eating habits and exercise are vital. Our spiritual hearts need to be nurtured as well. For example, in Proverbs 12: 25, NKJV it says, "Anxiety in the heart of man causes depression, but a good word makes it glad." 

The Goal

Most of us will probably nod along in agreement as we read the following quotes about the state of the modern Church:

"The Church has lost its hold on the masses. The Church does not hold the young people passing out of its Sunday schools. The Church has failed in meeting the increase of population."



There is no place left for the growth of that faith which realized those frequent conversions which were the glory of previous generations."

Most of us, however, would be surprised to learn that these quotes come from a book called "The Dearth of Conversions" written by Andrew Murray one-hundred twenty years ago. There have always been those who try to live with one foot in the world and one in the Church; maybe it's worse today, maybe not, I don't know. But I do know that unless we renounce our conformity to the world, and begin to pursue the transforming power of the Word and the Spirit that we are promised in

Romans 12:1-2, we will never see God move the way He desires to move in us, and make us into the people He has called us to become.

I can't speak to the specifics of the state of the Church in 1897; Andrew Murray is better equipped to pinpoint the exact deficiencies in His day than I am, but I do think I understand some the root problems in our thought processes today. One of the most critical errors we have made is in the way that we have presented the Gospel (an error which, Murray warned us about 120 years ago). We have told people that the goal of their salvation is to get to heaven. If you asked one-hundred Christians if they agreed that the final goal of their salvation is



to get into heaven, I would be surprised if less than two or three objected. Now, it might seem strange to suggest that a statement like this is incorrect; after all, heaven in our future hope and our promised "blessed inheritance." Maybe it's not incorrect to suggest that heaven is our goal, but, biblically it is incomplete:

Those whom he foreknew he also predestined to be conformed to the image of his Son – Romans 8:29.

He chose us in him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and blameless before him – Ephesians 1:4.

As Christians, heaven is our future home, it has come to earth in the person of Jesus, and residing within each believer in the person of the Holy Spirit, but it is not the ultimate goal of God's plan. The ultimate goal is to make us right with Him; to make us righteous. When we have Churches filled with people who are hoping only in heaven, not in righteousness, we are much less likely to take temptations and other threats to our righteousness seriously. "Well, it doesn't really matter, I'll get to heaven either way."

However, if we understand the ultimate goal of our salvation as being made righteous, our perspective begins to change. "Why would I want to do anything to move myself away from my goal of righteousness before God?" "Why wouldn't I do everything I can to conform my life to the ultimate goal of righteousness before God?" Recovering the understanding of righteousness as the ultimate goal of our salvation is key to reversing the "downward path" that many of us may be on.

It's a problem of gigantic proportions. It affects every family in the United States in some form or fashion. It fills jail cells and court calendars. What is IT? Substance Abuse and Addiction.



Check out these statistics provided by The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), an operating division within the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services:

* 21.5 million American adults (aged 12 and older) battled a substance use disorder in 2014.

*Approximately 5 percent of the American adolescent population suffered from a substance use disorder; this equates to 1.3 million teens, or 1 in every 12.

*About one out of every six American young adults (between the ages of 18 and 25) battle a substance use disorder.

As sad as it is we must understand that Western North Carolina, along with the rest of the state and nation, has a drug abuse/addiction epidemic. Drugs, especially opiates, are readily available and can be easily obtained. Once drugs are misused and/or abused, addiction occurs. And the heartbreaking cycle of theft, deceit, criminal charges, and stays in jails begins. Families go through agony watching a son or daughter, sibling, or parental figure waste away due to this problem.

Drug addiction is no respecter of persons. It affects the rich and poor, churched and unchurched, educated and non-educated, and younger and older.

My burden is to reach youth and children with truth before drug use begins. My plan is to be very plain spoken, to pull no punches, and to sound the alarm of what drugs do. It is to call everyone to the table in Western North Carolina to deal with this problem, develop effective means of prevention and treatment, and to implement those plans.

Help is found and comes when we live no longer in denial that there is a problem, understand that we cannot handle this by ourselves, turn to God for His blessing and provision AND accept responsibility for our situation. Rather than



pretending there is no drug problem or that it is someone else's problem to deal with, why not take responsibility for the solution, seek the Lord's blessings and be ready to join other like-minded citizens who want to see change. We can no longer bury our heads in the proverbial sand.

February is the month for love. I would much rather have written on the blessings of loving and being loved but this is the topic the Lord laid on my heart. How to Avoid Dissension in Marriage

Dissension in marriage is very disturbing and disquieting to a marriage. It is God's plan that there be harmony and closeness in human relationships, especially in the home. The word "dissension" can mean "a disagreement among those expected to cooperate or a conflict among two or more people."



There are some very basic things to consider that we might avoid troubling dissension between a married couple.


Love Your Spouse Deeply

Love should be kept very much alive between you and the one you chose to join your life with in marriage. I heard recently of a young married couple where the husband was upset with his wife and addressed her with a distasteful four-letter word. Where love is what it ought to be, the woman does not have to worry about that kind of thing happening. If love is not what it ought to be, conflict can cause abuse in many forms, verbally and even, possibly physical. I Corinthians 13:7 says of love that it, "Beareth all things, believeth all things, hopeth all things, endureth all things." The word "beareth" means "to cover with silence or endure patiently."

Deal with Self Individually

Too often a person sees their marriage partner as the cause for all of the problems without looking in the mirror at one's own self. Romans 8:13 says, "If ye through the Spirit do mortify the deed of the body..." The word "mortify" means "to become dead" or "put to death."

It is the responsibility of every believer to not allow the flesh (or the old Adam nature) to have its way. We should live unselfish lives. It is important that we do what the Apostle Paul recommended and, "Likewise reckon ye also yourselves to be dead indeed unto sin, but alive unto God through Jesus Christ our Lord (Romans 6:11). The old man within us is not dead when we are born again, but the new nature can overpower the downward pull





of the old nature.

One must look at his or her own weaknesses. If that is done, one will not be as quick to charge the marriage partner as being the one who is all wrong. Fleshly motivation causes intolerance and insensitivity.

It is best to pray for a meek and quiet spirit. A proud heart will not want to admit where it is wrong. It is troubled and retaliates when it seems someone is assaulting your self esteem.

Live Knowledgeably

I believe that means that each marriage partner realizes how weak and full of infirmities each one possesses. We should expect weakness in each other and not live in a dream world that expects either marriage partner is perfect. When weakness shows up in your spouse, do not be surprised about it. You are both imperfect marriage partners and both must we willing to face that fact if harmony and peace are to prevail. When we live with a real knowledge of ourselves, we will be more patient with one another.

Live Consciously

Keep in mind the Bible says, "they two shall be one flash" (Eph.5:31). As marriage partners, you be no more offended with the words or failings of each other than you would be if they were your own. Physically, if your pancreas fails to function as it should, you can become a diabetic. If one ever loses sight of the "oneness" of the marriage relationship there will more dissention than there should be. You are not thoughtless when it comes to your flesh, neither should you be when it comes to dealing with your marriage partner.

Live Agreeably

Seek to agree about matters, especially when major financial decisions are to be made in regard to finances or in regard to the children. We always have to keep in mind that a marriage is two people working together for the common good of both. Marriage is designed by God to be for a lifetime. Why be miserable in marriage when you can work together, respecting one another's opinion, and live a life of complete happiness? Why have to go through an unnecessary divorce due to stubbornness and a lack of cooperation?

Live Cautiously

Beware of the words you speak to your marriage partner. If they are nothing but cruel, harsh, bitter words, they will be in the other person's mind even if he or she has forgiven you. The tongue is something which must be controlled. When you find yourself with an angry spirit, it is best to hold your tongue. James made some interesting statements about the tongue. James 3:5-6 states: "Even so the tongue is a little member, and boasteth great things. Behold, how great a matter a little fire kindleth! And the tongue is a fire, a world of iniquity: so is the tongue among our members, that it defileth the whole body, and setteth on fire the course of nature; and it is set on fire of hell." Nothing is more damaging and dangerous than a tongue without a bridle. If a person is silent in an angry atmosphere peace and calm will come much sooner.

Live Tenderly

Don't respond with anger to anger. It would be best if a person who is dealing with an angry marriage partner would say something like this: "We should not allow this to come between us. Our love for one another should put it to rest. It must be repented of immediately. God is not pleased with this being between us. Let's pray together and not allow sweet and bitter water to come out of the same spring."

If a tenderness of spirit toward God and toward each other would come after prayer then troublesome matters could be easily resolved.

Live Forgivingly

If you have sinned by what you have said or what you have done in regard to your spouse, ask the other party for their forgiveness. Afterwards, you need to go to the Lord in prayer and ask the Lord to forgive you for the trespass. If you will confess to one another and to the Lord, you should sense so much shame that it will discourage the same thing happening again.

If you follow these instructions, they will take care of dissention that can rob a marriage of its happiness and bring about its destruction.

Heritage Middle School teacher Tim Barnsback has founded a nonprofit organization to give homeless students beds. He said becoming aware of the growing numbers of homeless young people prompted him to take action.

Barnsback said, "After learning about several students that

one family, it revealed the depth and complexities of student homelessness. Requests for beds started coming to me at an alarming rate."

When Barnsback learned that one of his son's friends is one of these families, doing nothing was no longer an option. He said, "How can we expect kids to dream about the future when they don't even have their own bed?"

Barnsback founded One Head-One Bed as a non-profit organization dedicated to providing portable beds to homeless students in public schools. He said, "No matter where they stay, students should always have the comfort and security of sleeping in their own bed." Barnsback reached out to a friend at Disc-o-Bed, and a natural partnership was formed.

With the help of generous donations from the Valdese Rotary, One Head-One Bed provided beds for eight homeless students in Burke County Public Schools before Christmas.

Mike Swan, director of student services for Burke County Public Schools, oversees the district's McKinney-Vento Education of Homeless Children and Youth Assistance Act and delivered the beds to the Burke County students helped by One Head-One Bed. Swan said students who meet McKinney-Vento criteria include those who are living in a shelter,

motel, campground or are doubled up with others due to loss of housing or economic hardship. The federal McKinney-Vento act first passed in 1987 and provides educational rights to students no matter their living situation. Those rights include school enrollment, transportation and services.
