




### Youth Led Tabernacle Revival April 2018

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

### Climactic Moment in History

The Greater New York Billy Graham Crusade, in June 2005, was Billy Graham's final Crusade, although he preached later at two Franklin Graham Festivals (New Orleans and Baltimore). The following sermon, preached on the final night of the New York Crusade, carried the same message that Mr. Graham proclaimed throughout his nearly 80 years of ministry: We are all sinners, but God loves us and will forgive us when we turn from our sin and by faith put our trust in Jesus Christ.



Almost everyone today understands that we are approaching a climactic moment in history. The world is going to come to an end.

In the New Testament the new birth is mentioned nine times. Repentance is mentioned 70 times. Baptism is mentioned 20 times. The coming again of Christ is mentioned hundreds of times. Jesus Christ said that as the days of Noah were, so shall also the coming of the Son of Man be.

When the situation in the world becomes the way it was in Noah's day, you can know that Jesus' return is near. In Noah's day the world was filled with wickedness, corruption, violence—every imagination of man's thought was evil. It was a world in which marriage was abused and violence prevailed.

Think of the headlines of our papers today. All of that is happening today, and I believe that today God is warning us.

Noah was a good man. The Bible says he walked with God. He was a man of moral integrity. He worshiped God. The Bible says by faith Noah, being warned by God of things not yet seen, moved with fear. People ask, "Is it legitimate for a person to come to Christ out of fear?" Absolutely. Many people in the Bible came to God because of fear.

But God is a God of love. The primary message about Jesus in the New Testament is that God loves you. Some of you feel unloved. Some of you feel depressed, or you feel you don't have purpose and meaning in your life. God is there to rescue you from that situation. If you repent, He will forgive your sins, because when Jesus died on the cross God laid on Him the sins of all of us.

It would be great if you could go home tonight and know that you're different, that you have a new strength with God, by faith in Christ.

When I read the news today, the only bright spot I see on the horizon is the return of Christ. I believe He is coming back. In the New Testament there are so many passages about the coming again of Christ. I could spend all afternoon reading them. Jesus said, "I go to prepare a place for you. And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and receive you to Myself; that where I am, there you may be also " (John 14:2-3). If I died right now—and that's a possibility—I'd go straight into Heaven and see Jesus.

Most of the interviews that I've had here in New York have asked the same questions about death— "What happens when you die? Are you looking forward to death?" Yes. I'm looking forward to death.

We are going to die. We're all under judgment. War does not increase death. Did you know that? Think about it. Some may go a little quicker than others. Thousands of people were killed when the Allies invaded Europe in 1945 at Normandy. And thousands of people have died in Iraq, Vietnam, Korea and many other places. But that does not increase death, because we are all going to die; we're going to join them in death.

"The Scriptures declare that we are all prisoners of sin."

-Galatians 3:22, NLT

But when we die, we're going to be divided. Some will be eternally lost and some eternally saved. We are saved through Jesus, if we put our faith in Him.

Jesus loves us, and He went to prepare a place for us. When Christ was ascending into Heaven following His death and resurrection, the angels asked His disciples, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand gazing up into heaven? This same Jesus, who was taken up from you into heaven, will so come in like manner as you saw Him go into heaven" (Acts 1:11).

Jesus is going to come back. Are you ready? Now when is that going to happen? When Jesus and the disciples met together, the disciples asked, "Lord, will You at this time restore the kingdom to Israel? 'And He said to them, 'It is not for you to know times or seasons which the Father has put in His own authority" (Acts 1:6-7). He also said, "But of that day and hour no one knows, not even the angels of heaven, but My Father only" (Matthew 24:36).

But the Scripture says, "For the Lord Himself will descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of an archangel, and with the trumpet of God. And the dead in Christ will rise first" (1 Thessalonians 4:16). There's going to come a day when you'll hear a gigantic noise from Heaven, a shout, and then the archangel is going to speak. At that moment, those who have died—your fathers, your mothers, your relatives, your friends who are dead in Christ—are going to rise from the dead. "He who believes in [Jesus Christ] will not be disappointed."

—1 Peter 2:6, NASB

For years, every time I would come to New York, I would pass a graveyard on the way to Times Square. I don't know the name of it, but there are graveyards all over New York. And those graves are going to be opened, if they are people who knew Christ as their Lord and Savior. And we're going to join them. Those of us who are left here, who are still living, are going to join them in the air on our way to Heaven.

Then the Bible teaches us that there's going to be a great coronation, with millions of angels. Thousands of people who have followed Christ in their life here on earth are going to have a gigantic banquet called the Marriage Supper of the Lamb. Jesus is the Lamb. He's going to be crowned King of kings and Lord of lords, and what a glorious moment that will be.

I'm looking forward to that. In fact, George Beverly Shea, whom you just heard sing "How Great Thou Art," is 96, and I'm 86, on my way to 87. I know that it won't be long before both of us are going to be in Heaven.

Jesus said, "Therefore you also be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect" (Matthew 24:44). The Bible says, "Prepare to meet your God" (Amos 4:12). Are you prepared? Have you opened your heart to Jesus? Have you repented of your sins?

You ask, "What is repentance?" Repentance means that you say to God, "I am a sinner, I'm sorry for my sins, I'm willing to turn from my sins. But Lord, You have to help me to turn. I've tried so many times to give up things I know that are wrong, and I just can't do it."

Here in the South "Bless your heart" is probably one of the most common phrases I know. One day I decided to keep count and I heard those words uttered at least a dozen times. Yet each time the meaning was different. Think about it.

Someone offers you an unexpected kindness. "Well, bless your heart." Another person is experiencing a world of hurt. "Bless your heart" with an added hug. And over

there—- well he's just pure foolish. It doesn't look like he's ever going to be able to get it together. "Bless his heart."

There's a whole lot of blessing going on out there and you'd better be on your toes if you're going to catch it all. Not every "Bless your heart" is necessarily a blessing. Many of us have gotten careless with some pretty important words. I love you. I'm here if you need me. Bless your heart. These powerful words and

important promises are often spoken far too casually.

The Hebrew word that we translate as "blessing" encompasses an entire world of meaning—a bowing down, an offer of praise, to make holy, to offer thanks. It is an increase of God's abundance and an affirmation of God's continuing desire to share more of Himself.

Maybe that's what the old hymn is trying to tell us when we

sing "Come thou fount of every blessing." God's love overflows and runs over the sides blessing everyone in its path.

If God has blessed you with a new car, but no one else gets to ride, you haven't been blessed. If your house is warm, but no one else is welcome to sit in its warmth, where is the blessing? Are you headed for a nap after Thanksgiving dinner while your neighbor's children go hungry? Right again. You haven't been blessed.

When we share our blessing we become part of God's desire to consecrate and make holy. Hold it tight and it dies. Set it free and watch what God will do with "your" blessing.

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### Substance Abuse Task Force

### Opioid Deaths Prompt Ohio To Reimagine Classroom Lessons, Starting With Kindergarten

Ohio, a state where 4,329 people died of drug overdoses in 2016, a death rate second only to neighboring West Virginia, is taking the fight against the opioid epidemic into the classroom with a new style of drug-abuse-prevention education.

Ohio's plan, controversial in a state that prizes local control over schools, features lessons that begin in kindergarten. Instead of

relying on scare tactics about drug use or campaigns that recite facts about drugs' toll on the body, teachers are encouraged to discuss real-life situations and ways to deal with them and to build the social and emotional skills that experts say can reduce the risk of substance abuse.

Joy Edgell, principal of Belpre Elementary School in southeastern Ohio, said that, until recently, kindergarten safety efforts typically focused on stranger danger and on avoiding household hazards. But three years ago, a first-grader brought a heroin needle to school in her backpack. She explained how her father used the needle and said that she brought it to school to keep a younger sibling from stepping on it.

"I gave her a hug," Edgell said.

Then she called the police.

"This is here. This is real," Edgell told her staff.

This year, Belpre began a pilot of the Health and Opioid Prevention Education, or HOPE, program, developed by Kevin Lorson, a health and physical education professor at Wright State University and a team of educators with a grant from the Ohio Department of Higher Education.

In one lesson, 25 children sat on a carpet and helped their teacher make a chart. "What is an adult?" the teacher asked, writing responses on a large notepad affixed to the wall.

"What does the word 'trusted' mean?"

Finally, she put the two key words together and asked pupils to brainstorm about people who could help them make healthy choices and feel safe, people they could identify as "trusted adults."

A second lesson emphasized the importance of never taking or touching medicine "unless a trusted adult helps you." That prompted one child to tell the class

about the time he fell, and his thirdgrade sister offered him pain medication she had been prescribed for an injured arm. "I told her I couldn't take her medication!" the boy announced.

From the mouth of this "smart cookie," as his teacher called him, came one of the core goals of HOPE: to instill in children at an early age the ability to make healthy choices and ultimately curb what Ohio Attorney General Mike DeWine called "the worst public-health crisis in our lifetime."

HOPE also fulfills a practical need,

one created in 2014 when the Ohio legislature passed a bill requiring schools to teach the connection between prescription opioid abuse and heroin addiction.

"You do know no one is doing this, right?" Lorson told state leaders in 2016 during a discussion of the bill's requirement. Schools lacked the tools to follow through, he said.

The signs that drug misuse was affecting some children in Belpre, a city of 6,500 separated from West Virginia by the Ohio River, had been appearing with more and more regularity, school officials said.

More kindergartners exhibited trouble regulating emotions and outbursts. In some cases, grandparents and other relatives served as primary caregivers, stepping in because a parent was struggling with addiction. And in 2015, Hunter Burkey, a popular senior at Belpre High School, died of a heroin overdose.

In response, the district added training to recognize signs of trauma and adverse childhood experiences. Educators learned to look at the circumstances that might be affecting a student with behavior problems.

Edgell described what might happen to a boy whose father was in jail. "He's living with Grandma. Grandma is sick. He's going to have a rough week."

With the drug epidemic affecting their small community, carving out time from core subjects to teach HOPE "wasn't a hard sell," Assistant Principal Elizabeth Braun said.

The lessons have helped illuminate complicated home lives. Fourth-graders doing a role-playing exercise to practice standing up for themselves and refusing drugs wanted to make sure the teacher knew a parent "was still a good person" even if he or she had trouble with addiction.

And a few sixth-graders "got emotional," teachers said, while thinking about misusing prescription and over-the-counter drugs. The reality at Belpre Elementary and other Ohio schools in the state is that some children's ADHD medication—Adderall is an easily misused stimulant—is taken or stolen by family members.

"We want our kids to know they are not alone. We want them to know that we continued on page 11 A Meditation

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

As the customers began to leave the store, I was finally afforded the chance to speak to Trina about the papers being in the right spot. She assured me that they were fine and that they had run out.

"Several folks have been in picking them up," she reported with a smile.

"That's great," I replied, then continued, "I thought I'd drop them off while I

wait for the line to go down."

"Oh wow," she responded, "We were lucky, and somebody brought us ours," she said pointing at the styrofoam to-go containers behind the counter.

"Good for you." I looked out the window again to see if I could get in now without having to wait in the rain.

"They're having a fundraiser for the little girl with cancer."

At the sound of her answer to the question I had not asked, my heart sank.

"There's probably a lot of folks coming from out of town that normally don't come which is why it's so busy."

All I could do was shake my head yes. I thought of little Sam Holt back in Goldston and how I had come to know his family through the JAM program. When he was diagnosed with a cancerous brain tumor, many thought we'd never see him grow to become a young man, but the community of Goldston came together, not only in fundraising but as a community of believers in prayer.

Sam is still with us today, thanks be to God.

"Looks like I can make it now without getting too wet. Have a blessed evening I called back," as I headed out the door.

"You too," she said, waving.

The parking lot was full, so I parked over by the old medical center and walked. The front door of the Ruritan building was open with a few more people still filing out the door, but at least now the line was well within the shelter of the porch roof. Back in the day in Goldston, I would have already seen or spoken with several people I would have known, but now, in this new place, I rarely know anyone. So, I stood, scanning all the faces within, thinking of all the stories and testimonies that awaited to be told. There was nary an empty seat.

At this point, I still didn't know who the little girl was we were raising money to help. The thing that stood out was the number of people wanting to come to her aid. Not only were there people there to eat, but there was the army of volunteers working to provide the food, serve the tables, clean up, and to take the money As the door swung open wider to allow guests to leave, a familiar face appeared who happened to be standing in the line; finally, someone I knew. It was one of my Facebook friends that had come out of a connection back to Chatham County, through his cousin Sam Cooper; John Fletcher Church and his good friend, Anna. The first and last time we had met in person was when they came to the last Lay Speaking engagement I had given in Sugar Grove, NC. There we formally introduced ourselves and John told me that most of his friends just call him "Fletch." It was an honor to know someone that I had only seen on Facebook had shown up to hear me speak. But when I find myself thinking in those terms, I try to remind myself, that it is God writing through me, and that it would be God speaking through me that they come to hear. In all that we do, we should always know that when we truly serve the Lord, we do all for him and not for self. Once we were finally seated and squeezed around the table, Fletch's friend Anna asked the rest of the table if they wouldn't mind if we said grace. They all were more than happy to oblige. From the corner of my eye, I could see hands reaching out to hold others. It was then I began to see the world of connections open for my new friends. It seemed that nearly everyone in the place had been part of their lives at one point, yet they had never lived in Collettsville, which made it all the more

It all began innocently enough when Anna asked the lady across from her if she used to drive Brownies to a camp in a station wagon. The lady was still chewing her Chicken and Dumplings when Anna asked, so it took her a minute to swallow. You could almost see the wheels turning in her mind as she thought back through the many years. "Well, actually I drove Girl Scouts, she finally said, and that would have been when I was at Zion U.C.C."

"Are you Mrs. Lloyd," Anna continued.

"Yes, I am."

"Oh, my goodness," Anna replied almost dropping her fork. She was immediately transported back in time to when she was a young girl in 2nd grade. Mrs. Lloyd had only driven her once to a day camp for Girl Scouts, but they had brought Brownies along for the experience. You could see them both connect back to a time when their lives were much different. The elderly lady explained how she would drive them to camps in that old station wagon. From that point on, there were so many things to catch up with, children to share, and a lifetime of living.

As people passed by, either Fletch or Anna would wave to people they hadn't seen or spoken too in years, each barely recognizing one another.

As Anna was sharing with Mrs.

Lloyd, the lady next to her spoke up that she thought she remembered Anna from somewhere. It wasn't long before Fletch's friend had rediscovered Mrs. Eunice Watson, a former EC teacher at Patterson Elementary School. The myriad of tiny one-room school-houses came to mind on the map that I had seen earlier in the store as they continued to recall their shared work experiences. It was as if God



had given me a glimpse of what was to come.

Then a lady, who was obviously related to the elderly lady Anna had made the connection too, sat down next to me. Her plate had been there for some time, untouched. She began to eat as she shared with Mrs. Lloyd how she had done all she could do to help.

At this point, I noticed Fletch intensely gazing at the lady that had sat next to me. He finally broke his silence when he called to her, "Mary?"

She looked up, again almost as stunned as Mrs. Lloyd had been when Anna had reconnected with her.

"Yes," she paused.

"John," she replied, smiling broadly.

"That I am," he grinned from ear to ear.

really are a safe place. Your parents didn't make a good decision. You are still going to be okay," Braun said. Teacher feedback about HOPE has been positive, particularly because the 20-minute lessons are developmentally appropriate, easy to implement and do not feel like "one more thing," Braun said.

But while early prevention education sounds good in theory, the state can't force its more than 600 school districts to follow a specific approach. Ohio is "a very strong local-control state," said Kenna Haycox, senior policy consultant at the Ohio School Boards Association. "Boards have the authority to determine their academic curriculum."

Ohio law prohibits the State Board of Education from establishing health-education standards. It is the only state in the country that lacks such standards.

"You have the state with the opioid epidemic and a state without health-education standards," said Wright State University's Lorson, former president of the Ohio Association for Health, Physical Education, Recreation, and Dance.

The extent of opioid abuse in Ohio has galvanized the state's leaders to take the fight into the classroom.

Vernon Sykes, the ranking Democrat on the Ohio state Senate's education committee, has spent a year and a half working on a bill that would allow for state health education standards. He has been trying to overcome resistance from legislators who are concerned it will affect the state's abstinence-only approach to sex education.

Bumper stickers on state vehicles tout Start Talking!, a campaign Gov. John Kasich championed to connect communities with resources for discouraging misuse of drugs. The initiative also promotes HOPE on its website. DeWine, the attorney general, led a committee that last year endorsed prevention education beginning in kindergarten.

"We teach reading and writing every year," he said in a telephone interview.

"What makes us think we can wait until the fourth or fifth year to do something about the drug problem? If this is as important as I think it is, we need to get serious about it."

"Prevention is not about one drug," said Michelle Miller-Day, a professor of communication studies at Chapman University in Orange, Calif., and an expert on prevention curriculum. "It is about social, emotional development in kids so that when they are faced with stressors or boredom or a quick fix for pain or 'I need to stay up late to study,'" they can deal with emotions naturally.

Social context is important, she said, and telling kids to simply say "no" is not enough when "the good-looking captain of the football team is offering me a beer," said Miller-Day.

Knowing how to make effective decisions (assessing options, reflecting on what will happen) should start long before hearing messages such as "Don't do drugs. This is what it does to your brain and liver," she said.

Reaching kids when they are 6 or 7 and forming habits and behavior is important, said Melanie Lynch, an award-winning health teacher in the North Allegany school district in Pennsylvania. By the time students are in high school, Lynch said, "I'm not doing a whole lesson on vaping. I can't afford that kind of time." HOPE also relies on the classroom teacher rather than an outside guest or a special assembly.

"The teacher is so important. They are there every day. They are an insider. We trust that person," Lorson said.

The long-term effects of drug education are difficult to measure. Tim Bruckner, an associate professor of public health at the University of California at Irvine who has analyzed prevention programs in other states but is not familiar with Ohio's efforts, said effectiveness is based on many conditions, including funding, enforcement of best practices and engaging, interactive delivery.

"It's really hard to change people's behavior or delay initiation of adverse behavior," he said. Only 10 percent of substance-abuse-prevention programs used in middle and high schools show evidence of effectiveness, he said.

But the stakes are visible every day in Washington County, where Belpre sits near Ohio 177, a highway for heroin and cheap methamphetamines from Mexico, according to Josh Staats, a lieutenant with the Washington County sheriff's office. Earlier this year, 11 high school students in the region tested positive for methamphetamine. And a lab reported a batch laced with fentanyl. Crystal methamphetamine is cheap and abundant.

"I don't know if HOPE is the magic bullet," Lorson said. "But the focus on these key concepts and skills has given folks a place to rally around."

As the opioid epidemic rages, the fight against addiction moves to an Ohio courtroom

As this article shows, schools around the country are beginning to understand the importance of educating children early on about substance use and abuse - especially around prescription drugs. We are thankful that both Mitchell County and Yancey County Schools have partnered with the Mitchell Yancey Susbtance Abuse Task Force and our Youth to Youth programs to implement this education in Kindergarten - 3rd grades through Samantha Skunk! Samantha Skunk teaches children not to touch or take any medication unless it is given by a trusted adult. If children are not sure whether something is candy or medicine, they are instructed to ask an adult before tasting it.

We are also thankful that Yancey County Schools is planning ways to utilize a partnership between PATH and RHA to provide substance use/abuse education in the classrooms next year.

Mitchell and Yancey may be small, rural counties, but we are utilizing cutting edge strategies for substance use/abuse prevention strategies in our communities! Thank you to our school systems and other partners for working to implement this prevention programming!

Ask for his powerful voice.







And I look back on that time and wonder why?


Instead of joining in, we watched others live in victory while we stood in the corner and played the victim.

### God Still Tames Lions

Have you ever had a bummer of a day? My guess is yes. We all have had days and situations that we do not care to repeat—ever. But often, after the fog clears, we realize that that tough time taught us something that made us a better person or at least challenged us to grow.

One of my favorite persons of inspiration is Corrie ten

Boom. I never tire of reading the amazing difficulties that she went through, yet only to see beautiful triumphs following the valleys.

The following is a thought that a friend shared once that reminds us once again that God and His angels are always surrounding us.

The story that was shared and that maybe you are familiar with starts with one cold winter day toward the end of World War II, when a woman walked out of what had seemed even worse than a lion's den. She was leaving the Ravensbrück concen-

tration camp, where countless human beings had been systematically starved and worked to death. As the heavy iron gates closed behind her, Corrie ten Boom could hardly believe that she was alive—and free.

Corrie had been arrested by the Nazis for hiding Jews in her home in Holland. She and her family believed in a God who



gives refuge to all, and they committed themselves to this dangerous work. This quiet matron in her 50's had not imagined she could survive the horrors of a labor camp. But God had sustained her during the ordeal. Corrie saw many women brutalized at Ravensbrück. Many perished, including her dear sister Betsie. But many of those women died with the name of Jesus on their lips because of the witness of those two sisters. "Those women," Corrie wrote, "were well worth all our suffering."

Finally, as a result of what turned out to be a clerical error, Corrie was released. One week later all the women her age at Ravensbrück were gassed.

As she walked out of this lions' den, Corrie had learned something invaluable. Around the world she gave this testimony: "There is no place on earth so dark, so deep, that God's love is not deeper still."

God's love penetrates prison camps and lions' dens. Wherever God's people are, He is there. The old hymn states it well: "Just when I need Him, Jesus is near, just when I falter, just when I fear, ready to help me, ready to cheer, just when I need Him most." The God who sent His angel to shut the lions' mouths for Daniel is steadfast forever. Are lions roaring in your ears today? The lions of doubt and discouragement may loom in your pathway. You may feel like you will be consumed by the lions of anger and resentment. The lions of lust and sensual allurement may appear about to eat you up. But God still shuts lions' mouths and delivers from their dens.

When the devil "walks about like a roaring lion, seeking whom he may devous" (1
Peter 5:8), God still tames lions. He did it for Daniel, and He will do it for you.
You can rejoice today because God still tames lions.

My God sent His angel and shut the lions' mouths, so that they have not hurt me, because I was found innocent before Him; and also, O King, I have done no wrong before you. —Daniel 6:22NKJ

In honor of Valdese celebrating 125 years since their founding in 1893, the Valdese Public Arts Commission and the Town of Valdese have come together to create a commemorative art piece that will be located across from Valdese Town Hall on Massel Avenue. The art installation will depict the arrival of the original Waldensian settlers who came to Valdese on May 29th, 1893 as they departed the "No. 11" train at the Valdese Depot.

The installation will be created by the artists of Oak Hill Iron & Wood of Morganton and will feature a full-scale train and sil-

houettes of original settlers made out of iron. Standing between twelve and fifteen feet tall and extending parallel to Massel Avenue for over thirty feet, the installation will honor those who founded Valdese. The original settlers will be listed on a bronze plaque which will be created by the Waldensian Heritage Museum. The project will be installed during the summer months of 2018 and will make its debut at the Waldensian Festival on August 11th, 2018.

The cost for the installation has been pledged by the Valdese Public Arts Commission, the Town of Valdese, and Waldensian Heritage Museum. Dear Dave,

Why don't you recommend having short-term disability insurance while doing the first three Baby Steps of your plan? It seems like a good time for it, when you're in the beginning stages of getting your finances in order.

Bob

Dear Bob,

You could certainly do that if you want, possibly even through your place of employment. I'm a big fan of folks having long-term disability insurance when they're in their prime wage-earning years. But short-term disability is something I've always considered to be gimmick insurance, and that's something I don't recommend or buy.

I get the argument, too, that short-term disability coverage usually isn't very expensive. But during the first two Baby Steps — getting a \$1,000 beginner emergency fund set aside, and paying off everything but the house — you're trying to limit expenses as much as possible. Chances are you wouldn't need it in Baby Step 3, because that covers your full emergency fund of three to six months of expenses.

Hope that helps, Bob!

Dear Dave,

My husband and I are trying to buy a house, but we both have low credit scores, so we're having trouble securing a loan. We've heard you talk about getting a mortgage loan with no credit score. Is this the same as a low credit score?

Laura

Dear Laura,


No, it is not. No credit score, means you don't have any credit or your credit score is "indeterminable." A low credit score indicates you've had — or still have — debt in your life, and you haven't done a good job of paying creditors on time. Two things will help solve the problem of having a low credit score. One is time. If you've had instances of late payments from years ago, time will help heal that to a degree. The older late issues become, the less they count against you.

But my guess is you two probably have some bad debt. By bad debt, I mean things that were never paid, or accounts that are in collections. If that's the case, you need to contact those people, and settle those debts in full — and in writing — as quickly as possible. Officially close the accounts, too, before you try to buy a home.

When it comes to buying a home, Laura, I always advise folks to first be debtfree and have an emergency fund of three to six months of expenses set aside.

The Bible uses several images to describe the nature of the Christian life. One of the more common is that of a race. This race is not a sprint; it is a marathon. We are not in this race for a short burst of time; rather, this race is a life-long course that entails many obstacles and dangers. Paul expressed his desire "That I might finish my course with joy" (Acts 20:24). Paul makes it very clear that each believer has a course designed



by God. My course is not the same as your course; nor is yours the same as mine. We are each responsible to run the course which God has given to us as individuals. As believers, our motivating passion should be to hear the words "Well done, thou good and faithful servant." What does it take to finish well?

- 1. A passionate love. Our love for God should be so strong that every other relationship should pale in comparison. The Bible teaches that we are to "love the LORD thy God with all thine heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy might" (Deuteronomy 6:5). Jesus said, "If any man come to me, and hate not his father, and mother, and wife, and children, and brethren, and sisters, yea, and his own life also, he cannot be my disciple" (Luke 14:26). If we do not have a passionate love for God, we will not finish well.
- 2. A focused pursuit. Jesus taught, "But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you" (Matthew 6:33). Mary was commended for choosing the one thing that was needful (Luke 10:42). We are far too easily sidetracked by too many things. A disciplined runner knows the importance of keeping his focus solely on the finish line. A focused pursuit is vital to finishing well.
- 3. A frequent evaluation. We must take time to prayerfully consider where we are on our journey. With no time for evaluation, many have tragically veered off course. David prayed, "Search me, O God, and know my heart: try me, and know my thoughts: 24 And see if there be any wicked way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting" (Psalm 139:23-24).


Let's determine to implement these principles into our lives so that we might finish our race well.

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


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### **Enjoying Everyday Life**

The First Step to an Exciting Life By Joyce Meyer

It's so amazing to me that God wants to be involved in every area of our lives. I remember when I got this revelation, and it changed my life.

At that time, I was part of a bowling league and we played once a week. I remember one night when I wasn't bowling very well, and I heard this prompting in my heart

that said, "Ask Me to help you." Immediately I thought, "I can't ask God to help me bowl!"

But the truth is He wants to help us with everything we do. And when I started letting Him be involved in every area of my life – following the leading of the Holy Spirit – that's when life got really exciting!

What does it mean to be led by the Holy Spirit? Some may refer to it as being filled with — or sensitive to or anointed by — the Spirit. It sounds really spiritual, yet being led by the Spirit is actually a very practical part of living the Christian life. Simply put, to be led by the Holy Spirit just means to be obedient to Him. The Holy Spirit does such awesome, yet practical work in the lives of God's children. He is our Comforter, Counselor, Helper, Intercessor, Advocate, Strengthener and Standby. He teaches us and guides us into truth... and He even brings the things we learn back to our remembrance as we need it.

And the best part of it all is that He lives in each of us. Ephesians 3:16 (AMPC) tells us that He enables us to be "...strengthened and reinforced with mighty

power in the inner man by the [Holy] Spirit [Himself indwelling your innermost being and personality]."

He comes to live in our hearts when we're born again, and then He teaches and guides us according to God's plan and purpose for us. One of the ways He does this is by convicting us of the sins in our life, and we learn what's right and



wrong as we grow in our faith. We may get by with things that are not right for a while, but the time comes when we need to grow up.

I remember when I would go to church every Sunday and then gossip about the pastor or whatever I didn't like about the service. Of course, I was not a very happy Christian during that time. And I couldn't have been a very good example of one to others either. Critical and judgmental attitudes like that, or murmuring, being unthankful, and complaining hinder our relationship with God and our representation of what a Christian is.

But eventually, I began to get this nagging, uneasy feeling every time I would say something negative about the pastor...or anyone else for that matter. I could feel that what I was saying was wrong, and I knew in my heart it was the Holy Spirit telling me it was time to grow up and mature spiritually.

I've come to the point in my relationship with God where it doesn't take long for me to be aware when I say or do something that is not pleasing to God. And this is what He wants for all His children: to develop sensitivity and obedience to His voice as He leads each of our lives. Romans 8:14 (AMPC) declares that "all who are led by the Spirit of God are the sons of God." This term "sons" indicates a level of maturity and intimacy in our relationship with Him.

God is not looking for spiritual robots; He doesn't want us all just following a bunch of rules for the sake of obedience. Jesus made a way, through His perfect sacrifice, for our sins to be completely washed away and removed from us so we can have a personal relationship with God. We are free to obey Him simply because we love Him, and we know that everything He tells us to do, or not do, is for our good. We just need to learn to follow His lead.

It's actually exciting to follow the Holy Spirit, and He wants to lead us all according to the plans God has for each of our lives. I'm not saying it will always be easy. King David was called a man after God's heart, but we know it wasn't because he did everything right. However, David had cultivated a passionate heart for God's will. He learned how to recover from his failures and move on in God, and because of that "God testified concerning him: 'I have found David son of Jesse, a man after my own heart; he will do everything I want him to do" (Acts 13:22 NIV).

In our relationship with God, our part is to pray, study His Word, and learn to develop our own sensitivity and obedience to the Holy Spirit's lead. His promise to us is, "I will give them one heart [a new heart] and I will put a new spirit within them; and I will take the stony [unnaturally hardened] heart out of their flesh, and will give them a heart of flesh [sensitive and responsive to the touch of their God]" (Ezekiel 11:19 AMPC).


The Asheville Museum of Art has recognized students from Patton High School and Liberty Middle School with Regional Scholastic Art and Writing Awards. Winners from Patton are:

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
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

And thus, finally, began the Women's Social Club that SafePlace Bilingual Advocate, Jennifer Arteaga, had so carefully planned.



### Forgotten Gospel

This is the second article in a series on some of the central truths of the gospel that are slowly becoming endangered in today's Church culture.

#### The Kingdom

The word Gospel literally mean "good news." It was used to describe a town-crier running through the streets with an announcement. Sometimes, it would also have

been used of a herald going into a town ahead of the King, announcing the King's arrival to the people. I wonder if that's what Early Christian's had in mind when the coopted this word and made it their own?

So, if the Gospel is an announcement, what are we announcing? Today's Church seems to lack a generally agreed upon consensus of what this primary announcement is. If we are carrying a message, what is the message that we are carrying? To some, the announcement is a list of rules to keep and behaviors to avoid, for others it is feeding the hungry or digging wells, for others the announcement is that God loves you, or maybe even that you're valuable and you need to believe in yourself because God believes in You. All these announcements except the last one – are important pieces of biblical teaching. We are called to feed the hungry and dig wells. We are called to avoid sin, and to recognize and rest in God's love for us, and while these are all important teachings, they are not the central message that God has given us to announce.

In Matthew 24:14, Jesus said, "And this gospel of the kingdom will be proclaimed throughout the whole world." The gospel, the good news, is the announcement concerning The Kingdom of God coming into the world. John the Baptist said the same thing, Matthew 3:2 summarizes his message as, "Rapant, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." And according to Mark, Jesus, in the early days of His ministry, took up a similar mantra, "the kingdom of God is at hand; repent and believe in the gospel (Mark 1:15). I could go on and on, text after text, verse after verse, old testament and new, all showing that the primary focus of the Gospel message revealed to us by Scripture is The Kingdom.

Unfortunately, this message of the Kingdom of Heaven is largely absent from our gospel conversations today. If I were to summarize the message of the Church today the way Matthew and Mark summarized the messages of John and Jesus, I would have to say something like:

"Ask Jesus into Your heart, because He has a wonderful plan for your life." Or, "Come feel the Spirit and have confidence that God is going to handle all your problems."

Or maybe, "pray to receive Christ so you don't go to hell."

There's nothing wrong with any of these messages. They're not unbiblical or incorrect, but they are incomplete. And to be honest, these messages don't even compare to the glorious announcement that the King has arrived, that He has taken our sins upon Himself, paid the price, and granted us participation in His work by placing His Wisdom and His Spirit inside us. These modern messages ring hollow and unexciting in comparison. But the King has come, the Kingdom has been established in the hearts and minds of His people. And while we are still foreigners living in a foreign kingdom plagued by sin and death, the Kingdom of Heaven is alive and well in our hearts and minds as we persist in the hope that He will soon return to fully and finally set up His glorious reign on the earth. Now, that's good news.

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### Marlene's Meditations

### The Right Angle

As I watched, the confident young man lurched back just in time to narrowly miss tumbling over the cliff. But, wait, that couldn't be! We were in the middle of a busy city street. My eyes couldn't fathom the tangled jungle of branches and frightening drop-offs in front of me. While my heart slowly resumed its normal beat, I saw him carefully look at what had caused his near miss



with death. Across the chasm, the anamorphic drawing leered menacingly, mocking our surprise. But, when I looked at it from a different angle, I realized that it was simply two dimensional, not three. What the young man had feared did not exist. What he had assumed was irrelevant. And the sudden change of direction was unnecessary.

Do you know the definition of anamorphic art? According to the Britannica.com website, Anamorphosis, in the visual arts, [is] an ingenious perspective technique that gives a distorted image of the subject represented in a picture when seen from the usual viewpoint but so executed that if viewed from a particular angle, or reflected in a curved mirror, the distortion disappears and the image in the picture appears normal. [It] was first employed in the 17th century, ... The first examples appear in Leonardo da Vinci's notebooks.



Look up http://tracyleestum.com/portfolio/ for some examples of street art using this anamorphic method. They look so real that it's difficult not to react to the emotion of what your brain is assuming. The clever angles distort reality and absorb our minds, distracting us from walking on down the sidewalk.

This method of art reminds me of a biblical principle. Sometimes, our lives slither into distortion when we view it from our perspective rather than the Bible's insight. Our issue becomes frightening, looming like an ogre. But, when we look at the problem through the particular angle of Scripture, our lives return to normal, and our fears slink away, possibilities bloom and hope is reborn! The following verse urges us to look at the correct angle of our lives, through the eternal perspective rather than an earthly one.

2 Corinthians 4:18 While we look not at the things which are seen, but at the things which are not seen: for the things which are seen are temporal; but the things which are not seen are eternal.

This correct perspective will restore our hope and trust in the LORD who designed the portrait of our lives with His own palette of stunning colors. The right angle to assessing our own situations is so succinctly stated in Philippians 1:6 Philippians 1:6 Being confident of this very thing, that he which hath begun a good work in you will perform it until the day of Jesus Christ:

The women in the Gospels underscore this critical idea of looking at life through the right angle of God's Word. Mary Magdalene was from the town of Magdala, a prosperous Galilean seacoast village even in biblical times. But to Mary, the town held unimaginable memories of the horrors of demon possession. The anamorphic picture of her past labeled her with the shame and fear of her tormentors. The roaring lion of evil had possessed her with his immense power and hovered on the verge of consuming and consigning her to hell. But a miracle of epic proportions instantly changed her life when Jesus cast out seven demons. She gratefully followed him, traveling and serving with him in his 2.5 to 3.5-year ministry. Magdalene was the name for her ugly past, and she was forever linked with its humiliation. Sometimes our past follows us inexorably into the future, mocking our efforts to lose it.

But, once I learned that the word, Magdala, actually means tower, the first verse that occurred to me was

Proverbs 18:10 The name of the LORD is a strong tower: the righteous runneth into it, and is safe.

The LORD Himself had become her Magdala, her strong tower! From her new angle, the degradation and terrors no longer frightened or condemned her. She was Mary, and her past had been redeemed by her Magdala, her strong tower! She had run into her strong tower, Jesus, and was safe! Safe from the possibility of falling into the anamorphic pit of her past! Safe from the shame of falling into the deep dark of inadequacy, poor choices and gossip! Safe from tumbling into a life of aimlessness and desperation! Her past was two-dimensional and powerless before the King of the Universe!

So, today, when we look at our own lives, we, like Mary Magdalene can choose to look at it from a different angle. We can look at it from the angle of Romans 8:28 where God redeems our victimization, our betrayals and our shame. Jesus Christ our Savior gives us a new angle full of hope and forgiveness and tells us to walk on in faith!

As he stumbled backward a couple of steps, the sidewalk traveler realized the art designed to trick him, and then simply walked confidently over the crevasse of the jungle, ready to resume his journey in life.

So, the next time you are tempted to believe what your eyes see, take a step back, look at your problems, perceptions and pleasure from the biblical angle of eternity as directed in 2 Corinthians 4:18. It'll clear up the distorted images of life, relax the soul and provide powerful biblical thinking to overcome the anamorphic misperceptions of life!



### Jesus Is Still The Answer

Because he will be away from home in June, and knowing my love for old books, my son recently gave me my Father's Day gift early. It's a first edition copy of Joseph Angus' Bible Handbook: An Introduction to the Study of Sacred Scripture, dated 1856.

As I thumbed through its tender pages, I came across Angus' beautiful description of Christ and his ministry. It reads:



How marvelously succinct are Angus' words! They are so eloquently stated that it seems almost sacrilege to say that they reminded me of the bumper sticker I placed on my car not long after giving my life to Christ as a teenager. It simply read, "Jesus is the Answer." For me, Christ had addressed every issue of the human condition. My conviction then has in no way diminished through the years.

What is it that Christ has not touched for the better? What problems does his person or purpose not solve? Did he not say, "Behold, I make all things new"? (Revelation 21:5)

Before Christ, human life was exceedingly cheap. But it was Christ who gave it dignity – dignity for men and women; dignity for children; dignity for every race, red, yellow, black, and white; dignity for the slave; dignity for the poor; and dignity for the elderly.

Poverty has been a part of every era, but it was Christ that inspired relief for the impoverished as no one before him or since. Were you aware that before Christ there was hardly a trace of an organized charitable effort? But when he came, and the Bible was spread throughout the world, charity began to thrive.

Education is something that has always been around, but it was almost exclusively for the elites in society. But because of Christ and the interest manifested by him for all men, there developed the motive for providing education to the masses.

It was because of the Savior that the concept of civil liberties was born. Noah. Webster put it this way:

"Almost all the civil liberty now enjoyed in the world owes its origin to the principles of the Christian religion...The religion which has introduced civil liberty is the religion of Christ and his apostles, which enjoins humility, piety, and benevo-

lence; which acknowledges in every person a brother, or a sister, and a citizen with equal rights. This is genuine Christianity, and to this, we owe our free constitutions of government..."

I suggest the issue of civil liberties has never belonged to the ACLU but instead is really the domain of Christ who gave rise to civil liberty.

It might even be argued modern science would have never existed were

it not for Christ. The American Evangelical Theologian and Philosopher, Francis Schaeffer, writes about this and rightly contends:

"Both Alfred North Whitehead (1861-1947) and J. Robert Oppenheimer (1904-1967) have stressed that modern science was born out of a Christian worldview. Whitehead was a widely respected mathematician and philosopher, and Oppenheimer, after he became director of the Institute for Advanced Study at Princeton in 1947, wrote on a wide-range of subjects related to science....Whitehead [in his 1925 book, Science and the Modern World] said that Christianity is the mother of science because of the medieval insistence on the rationality of God."

So many other proofs of the incomparable impact of Christ on the world might also be given.

But Robert J. Hutchinson, a veteran religion writer, eloquently summarizes the question, saying:

"What is undeniable to the honest historian is that this one man's life, teaching, and symbolic acts eventually created a social and cultural revolution that reverberated far beyond Palestine and altered almost every institution on earth – and is still felt today.

"In short, Jesus changed everything: politics, art, science, law, the rules of warfare, philosophy, sexual life, the family.

"Even Napoleon was amazed: 'Alexander, Caesar, Charlemagne, and myself founded empires; but upon what foundation did we rest the creations of our genius? Upon force. Jesus Christ founded an empire upon love, and at this hour millions of men would die for him."

Think of it. If Christ changed the whole world in this manner, how much more could be change your little life if you were to personally trust him for the forgiveness of sins? Think of what he could do if you were to completely turn everything over to him.

Yes, Jesus solves every dilemma – every problem – every challenge. Jesus is still the answer.

Perhaps that message would make a great new bumper sticker.



Holding the Department of Justice Accountable

Many of you have probably seen the news recently about former Deputy Director of the FBI, Andrew McCabe. Attorney General Sessions fired McCabe late last month for lying to the FBI about his conduct during the Clinton email investigation.

As more and more information continues to come to light, one thing becomes clearer: we need a second special counsel to investigate the inappropriate conduct that seems to have occurred at the Department of Justice. Remember, Andrew McCabe was a central figure to the investigations leading up to the 2016 presidential election, including the investigations of the Hillary Clinton email server and the Trump campaign. His firing is an important indicator of why we need more information about the Department of Justice's activities. Rep. Jim Jordan (R-OH) and I interviewed with Laura Ingraham on Fox News about the issue.

In the coming days, weeks, and months, I will keep working with my colleagues to ensure that officials in our federal justice system are honest, transparent, and forthcoming about misconduct that has occurred. You deserve nothing less than the full truth about what occurred. We will keep working to get it to you.

#### Working to Fight the Opioid Epidemic

I recently had the chance to meet with some of our local team in Hendersonville for the Henderson County Opioid Leadership Forum.

Our local officials and law enforcement are doing an incredible job to confront this problem.

As a reminder, if you haven't done so already, I want to encourage you to visit my website and read about the bill my office introduced recently on this issue—H.R. 4482, the Opioid Abuse Deterrence, Research, and Recovery Act. You can read the full bill, a section by section summary, and letters of support from experts like those at the American Association of Neurological Surgeons. We want to do everything we can at the federal level to help provide appropriate resources and assistance for our local officials to combat the problem of opioids.

### NC Senate District 47

The media has widely covered the Atlantic Coast Pipeline infrastructure project and the fund set up by Gov. Cooper in January into which energy companies paid \$58 million prior to the governor's issuance of a permit allowing construction of the pipeline to begin. Many questions have been raised about the ethics and legality of the \$58 million fund. Through a public information request, WRAL-TV obtained selected documents from the Cooper administration. However, the documents provided no details on how the funds would be distributed and the governor, despite being required by law, has not responded to lawmakers who have made multiple requests for the same documents.

Legally, control and disbursements of state monies is under the control of the legislature, not the governor. An overwhelming bipartisan majority of legislators took action in February and passed House Bill 90, shifting the \$58 million from the governor's fund to
school districts in the pipeline corridor. Although Gov. Cooper has repeatedly claimed that increased spending on schools is a priority
of his, he has made clear his intention to halt the flow of money to school districts in the affected counties and place it back into his
fund, which he claims is for economic development and environmental mitigation. Gov. Cooper and his brother own several properties in close proximity to the proposed pipeline and could stand to benefit from this pot of money.

On February 12, Sen. Bill Rabon, Senate rules committee chair, and Rep. David Lewis, House rules committee chair, sent a demand letter for answers to fifteen questions regarding the fund. Gov. Cooper's office gave either no response or partial response to the questions. On March 7, Sen. Rabon called for Senate President Pro Tem Phil Berger and House Speaker Tim Moore to initiate a formal investigation into the governor's pipeline/slush fund arrangement. A week later, state GOP leaders filed a complaint with the U.S. Department of Justice asking for an investigation into whether Gov. Cooper violated the Hobbs Act in requiring a pay-to-play scenario for issuance of the Atlantic Coast Pipeline permit.

I urge the governor to be transparent and answer truthfully and completely all questions posed by Sen. Rabon and Rep. Lewis; turn over all requested relevant documents; and end his effort to return to his personal slush fund the \$58 million that the legislature transferred to school systems in the counties affected by the construction of the Atlantic Coast Pipeline. Instead of being self-serving, do the right thing, Gov. Cooper!

### NC Senate District 46

As the General Assembly prepares to reconvene for the 2018 short session, I thought I would recap some of the recent accomplishments that we hope to build on this year.

For the past several years, tax reform has been a top priority for the Republican majority. In October 2017, the nonpartisan Tax Foundation ranked North Carolina 11th best for business, up from a low of 41st, passing 30 states in 3 years. North Carolina is also currently ranked as Site Selection magazine's most competitive state for business, as Forbes' No. 2 best state for business, Chief Executive Magazine's No. 3 best state for business, and CNBC's No. 5 best state for business. This sharp increase in our economic competitiveness means more jobs, higher wages and better opportunities for North Carolina families and businesses.

In 2017, the General Assembly again reduced the tax burden on families and small businesses by cutting both the personal and corporate income tax rates. The 2017 budget, which was passed over Governor Roy Cooper's veto, includes several large tax changes.

- Individual Income Tax: On January 1, 2019, the individual income tax rate will decrease from 5.499 percent to 5.25 percent.
- Standard Deduction: The standard deduction will increase in 2019. For single filers, the deduction will increase from \$8,750 to \$10,000, while the deduction for married filers will increase from \$17,500 to \$20,000.
- Corporate Income Tax: Also on January 1, 2019, the corporate income tax rate will decrease from 3 percent to 2.5 percent.

These changes continue the major tax reforms Republicans have made since taking the majority in 2011. In 2011, the top personal income tax rate in North Carolina was 7.75 percent. By 2019, it will have fallen to 5.25 percent. At the same time, the standard deduction has grown from \$6,600 for married filers in 2012 to \$20,000 in 2019; and the corporate income tax rate will have decreased from 6.9 percent to 2.5 percent in 2019.

2017 was also a record year for employment in North Carolina, with unemployment rates reaching a 17-year low and the creation of over 91,000 new jobs. All of this was accomplished while eliminating a 2.5 billion dollar deficit, paying off a 2.5 billion dollar debt to the federal government, and increasing the Rainy Day Fund to a record high 2 billion dollars.

Despite all of this good news, there are still major challenges before us: the recent security crisis in our state prisons, as well as the national focus on making our schools safer and more secure. The NC House recently created a Select Committee on School Safety to make recommendations for the General Assembly to consider, and I am currently working on a school safety bill which I plan to introduce as well. More to come on these topics after the General Assembly convenes on May 16th.

Senator Burr Introduces Military Medic Program Expansion Bill & Take Our Daughters and Sons to Work Day Resolution

I was proud at the end of last week to introduce legislation with Senator Patty Murray which would expand upon a successful public-private partnership between the U.S. Army Special Operations Command, the Carolinas Healthcare System, and Wake Forest University, effectively shortening the time of post-military Physician Assistants' certification from 2 years to 5 months for military medics. The bill would require the Pentagon to partner with medical schools and healthcare systems in states with a Special Operations (SOCOM) presence to allow military medics to transfer their field experience into credit for a Master's Degree to become Physician Assistants (PAs).

There's no question that our nation's medics in the field have substantial experience in saving lives. Doctors and hospitals across the country would benefit from the skills medics already have from their service, and with this bill, medics can get their certification to become a physician' assistants in one quarter the time under current law. This pilot program is successful here in North Carolina, and the universities and medical professionals agree. Rolling this out nationwide is a great solution and I look forward to the Senate's passage of this bill.

I also was honored to introduce the 'Take Our Daughters and Sons to Work Day' Senate Resolution with Senators Heitkamp and Tillis this week. This year marks the 25th anniversary of the program encouraging parents across the country to bring their children to work to empower and inspire them through the example they set in their professional workplaces. The key to every child's bright future is in their education. This program exemplifies the tangible results of a good education and shows each child what they're working towards. I couldn't be more proud that the Take Our Daughters and Sons to Work Foundation calls Elizabeth City, North Carolina home and with 40 million kids involved annually, I know this program will only grow and continue to help show each child his or her full potential.

#### SpaceX gets satellite internet approval

When I took office in 2013, only about 22% of K-12 schools had access to broadband internet.

Today, 100% of public K-12 schools in North Carolina have access to high-speed, broadband internet. 98% of those schools have a dedicated fiber connection.

While students benefit greatly from high-speed internet access at school, many of my constituents -- especially in more rural areas -- lack access to high-speed internet at home.

On March 29, the FCC released its approval of SpaceX's plan to launch satellite internet that would provide worldwide coverage.

Traditional methods of building internet infrastructure present unique challenges in mountainous Western North Carolina. Entities that build internet infrastructure may be inclined to avoid large investments in infrastructure that only serve a handful of homes.

SpaceX's ambitious satellite internet plan, which they call Starlink, holds great promise in alleviating infrastructure concerns caused by Haywood's, Madison's and Yancey's terrain.

Most current satellite internet service providers have satellites that orbit about 22,000 miles above the Earth. Even as internet traffic is sent to and from these high-orbit satellites at the speed of light, users on the ground experience slow internet speeds due to the great distance signals must travel.

SpaceX plans to launch their Starlink satellites into orbit at an altitude of 715-790 miles above Earth's surface, which will reduce latency and improve end-user experience.

As part of the FCC's approval, SpaceX is required to launch half of the 4,425 satellite array by 2024, and the full array by 2027.

#### A Biblical World View

In late January, the United States Senate failed by nine votes to pass legislation that would have banned abortions after the 20th week of pregnancy. Since Roe v. Wade made abortion legal in 1973, more than 60 million children have been murdered in their mothers' wombs.

In New Mexico, Oregon, Colorado and Washington, a photographer, bakers and a florist have all been fined and accused of illegally discriminating against same-

sex couples for not participating in a gay wedding. Businesses have been shuttered and livelihoods taken away by government authorities.

The nation's highest court infamously ruled in 2015 that states must allow same-sex marriage.

At the University of Iowa, the school tried to ban a Christian group from campus after they refused to allow a practicing homosexual to lead in prayer.

In many European nations, especially France and the United Kingdom, fundamentalist Islam has gained a strong foothold. Despite its brutal treatment of women and complete disregard for their basic rights, opposition to it is designated as "Islamophobia."

In Canada, the mere preaching of the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ and God's authoritative Word has the potential to be branded and treated as a hate crime by provincial authorities.

In each of these scenarios, and most every aspect of personal and public life, a worldview lies at the heart of the prevailing thought, sentiment and ultimate judgments. A worldview is the way a person views the world and himself. It is the lens through which an individual sees issues and relationships, and it becomes the foundation and framework for all decision making.

For example, just recently, a tragic shooting occurred at a high school in a small Kentucky town, killing two students and injuring 18. Kentucky Gov. Matt Bevin, a social conservative and strong evangelical with a clear, Biblically informed worldview, quickly responded that more gun laws were not the solution.

Gov. Bevin instead challenged Americans to "wake up," recognize that such shootings are a "cultural problem," and to determine their "root causes." The governor went on to say that "we can't celebrate death in video games, celebrate death in TV shows, celebrate death in movies, celebrate death in musical lyrics and remove any sense of morality and sense of higher authority and then expect that things like this are not going to happen. Our culture is crumbling from within."

Courageously, last summer, Gov. Bevin proposed a bold, Bible-centered approach to address a scourge of violence that has gripped Kentucky's largest city, Louisville. Bevin called for Christians to gather in "small groups of 3-10 people ... quietly walking one block, in one troubled neighborhood at 7 p.m. several days a week for one year, praying as they walk."

Gov. Bevin believes in the power of prayer, but as you can imagine, his comments were met with disdain from the secular media and institutions, who obviously don't consider prayer of any particular importance or value.

An individual with a Biblical worldview looks at the world and sifts all information through the lens of God's Word. Scripture informs his thinking and behavior, guiding his intellect and moral determinations. The Bible is the bedrock that undergirds his entire life.

First and foremost, the Biblical worldview says emphatically there is a God who has created all things in Heaven and earth. Think about it for a moment. The evolutionist is always searching for how to describe the origin and development of life in purely quasi-scientific or materialistic terms. He completely dismisses any notion of a Creator God, and thus is forced to come to ridiculous and preposterous assumptions, unsubstantiated by proof.

The secular worldview dismisses God as irrelevant in the affairs of men and government, and views critical moral issues as independent of God's moral character and principles. Clear definitions of right and wrong are impossible to determine, having been replaced by cultural whims and situational ethics.

Over and against every competing worldview, the Bible forcefully declares, "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind" (Romans 12:2). In other words, the only way to see all of life accurately is through the transforming lens of Scripture.

The Biblical worldview says there is a God—One who is personal, powerful and caring—who created the world and everything in it. It states unequivocally

that man is created in God's image, living in essence as God's co-regent over
creation. Mankind—born and unborn,
rich and poor, able and disabled—has
intrinsic worth. Almighty God is a
sovereign God, ruler over nations,
states, empires and governments. He is
to be worshipped and obeyed through
the precepts and principles revealed in
His infallible Word. He not only exists,
but He is sovereign over all of history
according to His wisdom and purposes,
and He is intimately involved in every
aspect of life.

The Biblical worldview also asserts the existence and reality of sin and evil. "All have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23). War, disease, violence, injustice and the myriad of problems that beset the world are the result of man's rebellion against God. No amount of higher education, no



enlightened political agenda or social program can cancel or remove the devastating consequences of sin. "The heart is deceitful above all things, and desperately sick" (Jeremiah 17:9).

The Biblical perspective also recognizes the active opposition of a personal adversary, the devil, who is constantly on the prowl to tempt and destroy. The devil aggressively opposes God and His people, wreaking havoc in virtually every arena. A deceiver, a liar and a murderer, he seizes every opportunity to carry out his diabolical schemes.

Any attempt to create a utopian society, to permanently solve global problems, is doomed to fail.

For now.

But one day soon, as the Biblical worldview triumphantly proclaims, the Lord Jesus Christ will return to earth, meting out eternal judgment to those who have rebelled against Him while gathering to Himself the saints, who will rule along with Him in a new Heaven and a new Earth. There will be no more sickness, no more death, no more disease, no more violence, for our enemy will be cast into an eternal lake of fire, and sin will be no more (Revelation 20:10).

This is the only worldview that sees clearly, rightly and rejoices the heart for eternity. ©2018 BGEA

### What Comes First

This generation has been accused of being a generation that lacks commitment. That may be true in a sense but actually if this generation is guilty of anything its being overcommited. That is to say we commit ourselves too much to things that we could really do without. Our society has conditioned us to believe that if we aren't busy all the time with something we are missing out on a full life. Social media posts are replete

with photos of all the activities families are involved. Recently an automotive commercial highlighted an SUV that has all the room to carry the things needed for a family that fills up their entire schedule. The parents proceeded to tell their neighbor about all the activities in which the family was involved. Obviously, the point was to sell the vehicle, but what caught my attention was the fact that the family portrayed had their entire calendar filled with so much.... too much.

What I have witnessed being a pastor for around 17 years is how so many Christians and their families seem too busy for the things of God, but always have time for all the other activities. When called upon to serve in some capacity in the local church the response in often, "Well pastor, I just don't think I have time to commit to that. Let me pray about it and I'll let you know." For the most part what they are hoping is while they are "praying about it" someone else will commit to it. The problem is that most everyone else is thinking the same thing and churches have about 10% of their members doing 100% of the work while the 90% who have been "praying about it" complain about what the 10% are doing!

Talking with other pastors over the years this problem is rampant in most churches. Christian families commit to so much stuff they have no time or energy left over for serving the Lord through the local church. The things of God are scheduled around everything else when everything else is supposed to be scheduled around the things of God. Not only is it hard to find Christians who are willing to step up and serve in their church, it's getting harder to find Christians who will place a priority on even attending services regularly. While larger churches may not feel the effects as bad, smaller local congregations often struggle from week to week because Christian families do not place a priority on worship attendance or discipleship. Parents who should be leading their children to church

and setting the example of church attendance will all too often teach their children that it is okay to let everything else come before worshipping or serving the Lord with other Christians. What many parents don't realize is that they have shown by example that church



attendance is not important. Each generation will place less and less priority on the most important thing a family should be doing together, worshipping together with the church. God's plan for teaching our families always begins at home. We as parents are ultimately responsible for discipling our kids. If we are so busy and committed to so many things that we don't have time to lead our children to church, folks we are too busy!

The Bible teaches us that the church is like a body with many different members (1 Corinthians Chapter 12). Each member of the body has a specific function. Even though each member is different with different gifts, each one is needful for the body to function properly. If you have ever experienced an injury to a member of your body, say your foot, the entire body is affected by having to compensate for the member of the body that isn't functioning as it should. Paul wrote that the eye cannot say to the hand that it has no need of it anymore. The head cannot say to the feet that it has no need of feet anymore (vs 21). Just as our physical bodies need all members to function as it should, the church as the body of Christ needs all the members to function as it should. I've heard people who proclaim they are Christians say that they don't need to attend church. That statement goes against scripture my friends. Whether we want to acknowledge it or not, we need each other! We need every member to fulfill the function God has given them as part of the body of Christ. The eyes guide the hand to grasp, just as the hand grasps what the eyes see. The head guides the feet on a path, the feet carry the head down the path the head wants to go. We are many members of one body. There is to be no division in the body so that the members have the same care one for another (vs. Just as a member of a physical body would wither and die if separated from the rest of the body, so would a Christian who has separated themselves from the body of Christ, the church body.

As a pastor, over the years I have personally witnessed this happen to Christian individuals and families. It happens a little at a time. Miss a service here, miss a service there, miss several in a row; miss a month; attend only on special occasions, etc, etc. Then before you know it there's no desire at all. The excuses began to flow, sin begins to creep in, the spiritual life is drained, and often a total collapse of morality takes place and consequences begin to raise their head. Many times, the one who walked away from the very thing that was sustaining them with life giving nourishment, is what they will blame for the consequences they are suffering! They'll blame God, blame the church, blame some individual, etc, etc. And remember, this all started because they allowed everything else to come

between them and Jesus and His church.

The point I'm trying to make is this: Let's keep our priorities in order. Let's not forget that learning about, serving, and worshipping Jesus should be the most important thing in our lives. He is to be first and foremost in our life and family. Would you stop for a while and take stock of what is going on in your family? What does your family as a whole place a priority on? Is it the things of God or the things of this world? Are you as a parent leading your family to worship with His church or are you leading them to believe its ok for anything or everything else to come before Him? Would you pause for a moment from all the chaos and ask yourself. What comes first?

Hebrews 10:24-25 And let us consider one another to provoke unto love and to good works: Not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is; but exhorting one another: and so much the more, as ye see the day approaching.

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

### Thus, It Is Written

This month we will be looking at Luke 24:44-48: And he said unto them. These are the words which I spake unto you, while I was yet with you, that all things must be fulfilled, which were written in the law of Moses, and in the prophets, and in the psalms, concerning me. Then opened he their understanding, that they might understand the scriptures, And



from the dead the third day: And that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in his name among all nations, beginning at Jerusalem. And ye are witnesses of these things. Bless the Lord for his Holy Word, which brings us wisdom, guidance, comfort, and countless other blessings. Rejoice that its message can transform our grief into joy, just as it did for the two who met Jesus on the road to Emmaus. LORD, we praise you for the wonderful gift of your written Word. Thank you for the example of Jesus, who faithfully followed and taught the Scriptures. Instill in us his deep love and regard for your Word. Give us understanding so that we might teach your truths to others and proclaim the good news of your gospel to a needy world. Sharing the Word (46-53). God opens our eyes (v. 31) and opens our understanding (v. 45) so that when He opens the Scriptures to us (vv. 27, 32), we may open our mouths and tell others about Him (v. 48). Jesus gives us the commission, the power, and the message. There is no reason to be silent! When we experience joyful worship (vv. 52-53), we will have little problem giving the world a joyful witness. We reflect on Luke's version of the Great Commission. In it the risen Lord summarizes the gospel in five truths, each of which is double. Firstly, there is the double event, namely the death and resurrection of the Messiah (v. 46). The Good News begins with history. It was an event before it could become an experience. Secondly, there is the double proclamation. On the basis of the name of Christ crucified and resurrected, forgiveness (the gospel offer) and repentance (the gospel demand) are proclaimed. True, the gospel is a free offer, but what is free is not always cheap. We cannot turn to Christ without simultaneously turning from evil. Thirdly, there is the double scope. The gospel is to be made known "to all nations, beginning at Jerusalem" (v. 47). That is, in opening the door of faith to the Gentiles, God did not close it on the Jews. We must firmly reject the extraordinary teaching of a "two-track" gospel, which maintains that there is no need for Jews to believe in Jesus because they already have their own covenant with Abraham. But everybody needs to come to Christ! Fourthly, there is the double accreditation of the gospel. On the one hand, there is the Old Testament witness to the Messiah (vv. 44, 46), while on the other, "you [the apostles] are witnesses of these things" (v. 48). Thus, the death and resurrection of Jesus have in the Old and New Testaments a double attestation. Fifthly, there is the double mission. The Great Commission involved a double sending (v. 49)-the sending to them of the Holy Spirit and the sending of them into the world. The two missions go together, for the Holy Spirit is a missionary Spirit. Thus, the risen Lord has given us a beautifully balanced and comprehensive account of the gospel. We are commissioned to proclaim repentance and forgiveness on the basis of him who died and was raised, to all humankind (Gentiles and Jews), according to the Scriptures (Old and New Testaments), in the power of the Spirit given to us.

Q. Are you thinking you would like to know more about the history of Israel or more about the Bible??

A. If you answered "yes", then you might like to join Bible Study Fellowship International now! BSF is a multidenominational organization that offers in-depth Bible study. You may join now locally and finish out the current study of Romans and get your name on the registration list for next September when we delve into a new study, "People of the Promised Land". "People of the Promised Land Part I" covers the history of Israel's leaders from Joshua to Solomon and includes some of Psalms and Proverbs.

Q. You may be asking, "Isn't that a lot of material?"

A. Yes! That is a lot of material, but we only meet once a week during the school year and you may take time to study during the week. BSF starts a study each year after Labor Day - Sept. 13th through May 3rd (this year). They have developed 10 studies designed to be presented during the school year. Participation in a discussion of questions in class is encouraged but not required, and no one should be put "on the spot". Like any class, "you get out of it what you put into it" to a point. The hope is that God will speak individually to participants through the Scrip-

tures as they study the Bible. Q. What is Bible Study Fellowship

(BSF)? A. Bible Study Fellowship is a multi-denominational, multilingual, multi-ages Bible study which meets in whatever local church opens their doors and has internet facilities. Their headquarters is located in San Antonio, Texas. The "multis" above means that there are Ladies, Men'.



Young Adult, and Children's Classes and there are English, Chinese, Hispanic, classes which have printed Lessons written in their language. There are over 2,000 Classes all over the world and those classes extend via Satellite to 39,000 Satellite classes who receive the class teaching both by video and the printed Lesson notes each week. Spruce Pine classes are an extension of Asheville classes. Asheville Day BSF ladies class has over 500 members including 3 Satellite locations; two in Spruce Pine and one in Sylva.

Q. Where are the class meetings held?

A. Locally, the Ladies' classes are held at First Baptist in Spruce Pine on Thursdays 10:00 AM-11:30 and Grassy Creek Baptist 5:30-7:00, on Tuesday evenings. The Men's Evening Class meets at Higgins Methodist Church in Burnsville at 6:55on Tuesdays. All denominations, all ages of adults, come together in unity to study God's Word and classes meet all over the world in various churches, office buildings, wherever doors are opened studying the same Scriptures.

Q. How do I join?

A. You are welcome to join and the more cultures, denominations, ages we have, the richer the discussion. Newly published lessons written in Spanish are now available, as well as on-line Spanish Teaching Leaders give lecturers in Spanish. Lessons are available in 2 dialects of Chinese language and in English. We are all studying the same Scriptures in the Bible. To join us, you are invited to attend a class and register. There is no fee, however, optional donations for lesson materials are accepted. Lesson notes are 8 pages of Bible notes researched by several theologians and cost approximately \$3.50. Just show up at class time or for more information for the Men's class contact Pierce Bingham at 828-208-0299 ; for the Day Women's class contact Angie Duncan 828-467-1091, for Evening Women's class Angie Woody at 828-467-3830. You may also go on-line to the BSF website at www. bsfinternetional.org to locate a class. Some materials are available on-line to download for non-members, including Home Training Lessons for Children. "Lesson Notes" are currently available only to registered class members during classes. 

### The Importance of Pain

Last month I wrote about the importance of worship and reconciliation. This time I want to look at something we often try to escape. Pain. I think we all understand the value of physical pain that teaches us long term safety. But is there a spiritual value to pain? I think so

Remember the story of Jacob wrestling with The

Angel of God? When the match was over Jacob would not let go of Jesus. "I won't let you go until you bless me!" What did the Lord do? He touched his hip socket dislocating his hip. From that day on Jacob limped through life.

Gen. 32:32 Therefore to this day the Israelites do not eat the tendon attached to the socket of the hip, because the socket of Jacob's hip was touched near the tendon.

Even today, the orthodox Jews commemorate not Jacob's cleverness, ingenuity or intelligence—they commemorate his pain.

But let's look at another character in the Bible who was very familiar with pain. We find a lame man in John 5:6 When Jesus saw him lying there and learned that he had been in this condition for a long time, he asked him, "Do you want to get well?" 7 "Sir," the invalid replied, "I have no one to help me into the pool when the water is stirred. While I am trying to get in, someone else goes down ahead of me." 8 Then Jesus said to him, "Get up! Pick up your mat and walk." 9 At once the man was cured; he picked up his mat and walked. The day on which this took place was a Sabbath, 10 and so the Jewish leaders said to the man who had been healed, "It is the Sabbath; the law forbids you to carry your mat." II But he replied, "The man who made me well said to me, 'Pick up your mat and walk.'"

12 So they asked him, "Who is this fellow who told you to pick it up and walk?" 13 The man who was healed had no idea who it was...

"Wahoo, I can walk!" he shouted. "wait a minute" the leaders said, "who healed you." "I don't know, I'm just so happy that the pain is gone!" Later we would see Jesus scolding this pain free man.

You see, one of the purposes of pain is to lean on Jesus. We need to talk to him, get insights from him and to be intimate with him, not just say "Wahoo" and forget about him.

I would love to be free from all pain, but not at the expense of forgetting about Jesus.

God knew that Jacob would have a great impact on his descendants. But He said, Jacob I can only use you if you empty yourself of all your "talents" and lean on me so I'm going to have to hurt you.

Think about those you respect and love the most. Do they hold that position because of the money they've made or their popularity or power? Not likely. It's more likely because you've seen how they have endured under pain.

Mom and Dad, the degree that your friends, kids and grandkids see you limping through life and drawing from Him strength, character and depth is the degree that they will cherish your legacy.

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

When a child has one parent leave, his biggest concern is that the other parent will stay. As the staying parent, I had to answer those tough questions from my pre-school child.

He was seeking stability in the roots of his family. Would those roots dig deeply enough to keep him emotionally secure and physically

protected? I prayed and trusted God to help me give him security.

By creating a loving, nurturing and safe home where our children are cherished, they dig deep roots. This is home and it is good. This is family and family loves, cares and protects.

Once a child feels secure at home, his 'wings' itch to spread a bit further. By giving our children appropriate freedoms according to their age, abilities and trustworthiness; we have turned the key to self-confidence and adventure. But, there is another key that is essential. That key opens the door to grounding them spiritually.

Their roots and wings will be more effective when their anchor in God holds fast. With faith in God through an abiding relationship with Jesus Christ, our children can face the storms that may threaten their roots or render them incapable of flying for a time.

As moms, we have the awesome privilege of training our children in the things of the Lord and helping them get to know God personally. As we love God with all our heart, soul and strength, we can teach our children by our words and behavior as seen in Deuteronomy 6:7, NKJV, where it says, "You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, when you walk by the way, when you lie down, and when you rise up."

Ron Powell, Traditional Arts Program for Students (TAPS) instructor at the Yancey middle schools, looked on with pride at these current and former TAPS students. Presented by the Blue Ridge National Heritage Area (BRNHA)



on behalf of the NC Arts Council, the concerts series, "JAMming Across the Blue Ridge," offers the public a unique opportunity to experience up-and-coming traditional musicians from the mountains of North Carolina.

"This is one of our most exciting programs because it allows us to sustain the diverse traditional arts that are valued in our communities," said Wayne Martin, executive director of the NC Arts Council. "When we inspire future generations to

learn about their artistic heritage we are celebrating and strengthening the unique character of our state."

TAPS is made possible, in part, through grants from the NC Arts Council. This year Toe River Arts is pleased to announce the receipt of a \$1,000 grant from the scholarship fund of the Wayne C. Henderson Music Festival, Inc. The money will be used to help bring the region's

musical heritage to life as part of a TAPS experience. The ETSU Old Time Ramblers, booked to perform and work with the kids in the program this spring had to postpone due to weather. Monies received from the Wayne C. Henderson Festival, Inc. will help defray additional costs as the Old Time Ramblers kick off the program in September and perform at the Harris School auditorium.

Each year, since the festival began in 1995, a percentage of the proceeds has been set aside to fund scholarships to "aid young, local, traditional musicians in continuing their music exploration and education" and "non-profit organizations teaching traditional music to students." More than \$198,500 has been awarded through the 2017 festival organization. And this year, Toe River Arts was chosen as a recipient.

Toe River Arts' TAPS is one of the most successful programs in the organization. Each year, middle school students in both counties are given an opportunity to play old time music on instruments loaned from the arts council. They meet weekly to learn the basics of their banjos, guitars, or Appalachian dulcimers, and the heritage music and stories so prevalent in our region. Last year, over 30 local children participated in the program. Toe River Arts hopes that number will continue to grow over the coming school years.

"If you love biking, sharing, and spending time with other folks," the CMA is here for you, Carswell says. "It's not a gang and it's not a club." The organization's motto is "reaching the world one heart at a time."





### The Sin of Indianation

"Hearing this, the ten began to feel indignant with James & John." (Mark 10:41)

This verse highlights a danger that good Christians need to beware of. James and John had just asked Jesus that they might sit on His right and left in His glory. This was overambitious, prideful, and over-reaching. Jesus dealt with them

graciously (thankfully He does the same with us!) but :41 indicates that the fallout from their request was now infecting the other ten disciples in dangerous way:

It says when they heard this conversation that James and John had with Jesus, "the ten" (the other disciples) "began to feel indignant." It was one thing for James and John to sin with their ambitious request. That was indeed wrong. But now the difficulty was not that of the two brothers — they had been corrected by the Lord — now the danger lay in the RESPONSE of the other ten towards those two. Hard feelings could hinder their fellowship, tear the group apart, and destroy their ministry. So, Jesus called them to Himself (:42) and spoke about the importance of serving one another.

Christians today need to beware of this same temptation to indignation. It is one thing for someone we know to sin, whether it is a sin like James & John's or something different entirely. The Lord will deal with that person, just as He did with the brothers in Mark 10. But those who know the sinful person now face the same temptation which lured the ten in this passage: becoming indignant towards the sinful one. Our bitterness over what they have done, is just as much a sin, and can be just as harmful, as their original trespass!

The older brother in the story of the Prodigal Son (Luke 15) is an example of this. The younger brother was the "original sinner" here. He is the one who left

home and squandered his fortune on loose living. But the older brother also ended up sinning: by becoming indignant towards what his younger sibling had done. In fact, his bit-



terness towards his brother, if never resolved, may have been the more damaging, longer-term sin. We face similar dangers with erring brothers and sisters today.

Indignation is especially a temptation for the very "moral," "religious" person. Like the older brother in Luke 15, they may feel that they themselves are walking the narrow road, so their temptation is to despise the brother who is not. So even when we are not the instigator of a certain sin, we may still be lured into sin through our own bitterness at the sinner! These are SUCH difficult waters to navigate. No wonder the Lord told Cain in Genesis 4:7: "Sin is crouching at the door, and its desire is for you." Sin is so deceifful; so insidious.

So, our own bitterness towards a sinning person, may end up doing as much damage as the sin of the person we have grown to despise! We must be on guard not to be tripped up by indignation, what we might call "the sin of the older brother."

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
