The most trauma possessed ones involved will probably be the mothers of the new kindergarten children that will be leaving home and the nest for the first real time! I still remember my first grade teacher, Mrs. Byrd, at Tipton Hill School where I attended many, many years ago and how exciting it was.

Today, many things are the same as they were then, and many things have changed. The school environment is very different in so many ways, some changes may be good, but many are not beneficial to the children enrolled today. The major difference today is not really in the schools though, it is in the change of the family structure itself and the teachings that were being taught in the home. Today we Christians tend to fault the school systems because we cannot have prayer like we used to, in fact, our days started with a morning devotion read over the PA system to the entire school and having prayer in our classroom was not uncommon at all. We all know this is not allowed any more and while I wish it were and do think it has nothing but positive influence on the children, the courts will no longer allow this. What we really need to work on is the family unit, starting with the marriages. The world of social media and instant access to all kinds of things has had a dramatic impact upon each of our personal lives, and can be good or bad, depending on how we use it. Sexting never used to exist and Snapchat was not even though of. The promotion of sexual images has become totally overwhelming. These things can certainly destroy marriages in a moment. We need to pray that our marriage may be strong and Christ centered, that we get couples to take time to be sure that they are evenly yoked in their beliefs and are willing to truly commit to each other that marriage will be until death do us part. Fathers need to step up and be the spiritual leaders in the family, reading the devotions and taking the family to church, not sending them. When we lose the family values and Christian values we see the drug addition skyrocket as it has in the past few years, the going to church and praying together is not a guarantee that bad things will not happen, but it does lessen the chance. It at least gives the children a base to fall back on if things go wrong, and they sometimes will.

Longing for the "good old days" will not change the things that need to be changed unless we change at home. The school are not tasked with that, you and I are! Certainly, pray for our schools, our principals, our school boards and staff and especially our teachers, understand though that you and I are the home front, we are the front line of offense and defense against the devil's workshop. If the children are to be taught right from wrong, respect for authority and good work ethics, it is up to us. Make sure your children are clothed in the total Armour of God because, like it or not, they will be facing a battle for salvation in this old world, school included.

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

If I told you I hadn't been on the struggle bus lately, I'd be telling a big one. Truth is, I've been riding the struggle bus twentyfour hours a day in attempts to recollect myself.

Drowning in doubt, comparing myself to others, worrying myself sick over past occurrences, worrying about things that haven't

even happened yet, trying to fix everything.... the list could go on and on. Surely, I'm not the only one who does this.

It sounds silly, but this has been me on level 10 lately. My mind is truly my worst enemy. Often, I feel like God laughs at my feeble attempts at trying to plan out, fix, and repurpose my life. Anybody else feel like they really try, but really just flat out fail? Yeah, me too. Welcome to the life of me, Chelsea. Who has always given 100 percent in attempts of trying to make her life the way she feels it should go. Ya know, perfect.

Bahaha.... what weak attempts I have at being in control of my life and thinking my ways are what's best for me. Funny right?

I sit back and think what causes us to run and be filled with doubt and unbelief or feeling unqualified for Gods plan and only one excuse that covers it all comes to mind. . FEAR.

Fear holds us back from SO many things, doesn't it?

I AM SO GUILTY to question God and his plan for my life.

I have a simple little notebook where I collect my favorite quotes, scriptures, etc. that stand out to me and that I never want to forget. It had been a rough couple of days covered in fear, doubt, regrets, and feeling unqualified so I picked up my notebook. Inside were the words written in scribble smudged ink pen . . . .

#### BE WHERE YOUR FEET ARE

I immediately began to ponder on these few simple words. I began to glance down and up at the literal place my feet had landed. Tears filled my eyes as I thought about all the places my feeble feet had been. The places Jesus has carried me. In times of fear, failures, and heartbreaks he followed and guided my footsteps leading me to the current place my feet reside. And to think I am fearful of the great things he has in store?

Often when feelings of inadequacy and fear settle in I think about the story of Moses. I read about Moses and I often am quick to think of myself. Doubtful and fearful of the plan. God has ahead of me.

We read that God showed up to Moses through a burning bush. God began to call out to Moses to receive his attention. I just love what God says next as he grasps the attention of Moses, as he tells him to take his shoes off for the place he stood was Holy ground. Up until recently I never really understood the power or meaning in this statement. But now I see that where my feet are and where Jesus meets, is certainly a Holy ground. God calls Moses to deliver his people and Moses is fearful. He begins doubting the plan God has for him and he questions his ability. GUILTY, Moses had a speech problem and he was sure God couldn't have just asked him to do the very thing he felt poorty at completing. So, Moses begins to try and run away from the plan God has called him to do. GUILTY, again,

"But God, I can't speak well, what if they don't understand me?" But God, why me?"

These words hit me so hard as I began to think about all the times I have questioned and

doubted the duty God had for me.

Although Moses doubted, God reassured him time and time again. Don't you feel him do that to you as well?

But the words spoken to Moses in reply to his fears speak utter volumes suddenly crushing every fear or excuse Moses could have as God speaks:

TAM THAT I AM.

If they ask who sent you, tell them THE I AM sent you."

I think that God came down to Moses and snuggled him up a little as he spoke these words into Moses, I AM THAT I AM. His reassurance provided Moses with strength in his weakness as he whispered these words. There is something comforting in knowing that in a time of fear there is one who is in fact all we need. No explanations, no if's or but's but a simple answer that covers all.

"But God I fear ... ""

"But God, I need you to tell me what is next"

"But God, I need you to promise me it is gonna be okay."

"But God I need you to show me my heart won't be broken again before I will trust."

He replies with the same fear shattering answer, I AM THAT I AM.

Man, isn't it so comforting to know that no matter what you may face HE IS in the fact the answer to it all.

I soon felt his invitation as I heard these words.

The invitation to be where my feet are, a Holy ground, where I have the most personal one on one connection with Jesus. The one where nothing else matters and every fear runs at the sound of His name.

"Welcome to the party, you are invited. No dress code, makeup, or directions needed."

Just you and me.

#### A Historical Common Thread of Cultures in Decline

The prophet Isaiah was a towering figure in his day. He was not only a prophet of God but a tremendous statesman. A consultant to Kings Ahaz and Hezekiah of Judah, Isaiah displayed a remarkable understanding of the international affairs of his day. Sometimes his wise counsel was heeded and other times not.

Chapter 28 of the Book of Isaiah is a fascinating passage about a nation on the brink of collapse. It reads:

"And these also have wandered through wine, and by means of strong drink have strayed; the priest and the prophet have wandered by means of strong drink; they have been swallowed down by wine; they have strayed by means of strong drink; they have wandered in vision; they have staggered in judgment: for all their tables are full of vomit and filth; not one place is clean" (Is. 28:7-8).

The text concerns the people of Judah as distinguished from the people of Isra-

el, who had separated from Judah. (Incidentally, the ten tribes are referenced as Ephraim in verses 1 and 3 of the same chapter and a similar charge is made against them.) The period cited is likely to be the dark time which followed the ephemeral splendors of Hezekiah's reign.



The drunkenness mentioned in the passage should be interpreted both literally and

spiritually. The physical effects of inebriation are made to portray Judah's moral unsteadiness. The irregularity of the movements of an individual who is consumed by alcohol - unable to walk straight - unable to see matters clearly - unable to navigate directly to a precise point - is demonstrative of the nation's erratic spiritual and moral behaviors. Add to this the filthy way the drunkard discerns life, the filthy language used, and the filthy displays of impropriety so that everything is made unclean. The country's character, says the prophet, is like its drinking.

Sir Angus Watson once wrote, "The three rocks on which frail humanity most often makes shipwreck are drink, gambling, and immorality, which are intimately related, and of these three drink by far is the most common."

As it was with Judah, the widespread use and overindulgence of alcohol is historically a common thread among cultures in decline.

Freedom had her birth among the hills of Greece. Her writings are still studied by intellectuals today; military leaders admire the exploits of her Grecian officers; students of structural engineering and architecture dig among her ruins. But little is known about the rigid abstinence from alcohol which helped produce the mental and political giants who made ancient Greece.

By the time of the Apostle Paul, when he gave his sermon on Mars Hill, the priests of the many gods of the land were leading worshippers into the lewdest forms of debauchery. After the Panhellenic Empire came into power, the idolatry took on even greater forms of perversion and degeneracy. Within time, the Free States would lose their authority and influence. Local autonomous political units faded, and large population groups moved from the rural and small-town settings and into the urban centers where the consumption of wine increased by colossal proportions. Consequentially, the circumstances which produced the mighty heroes of Greece disappeared, and she was perfectly conditioned to fall to Rome.

Rome would also get caught in the mesh of wine before its fall. After the conquest of the Mediterranean basin, heavy drinking and degeneracy would replace the traditional values of temperance.

The Romans had methods that gave aid and assistance to excessive drinking. They would drink on an empty stomach to get drunk faster, vomit, then eat food, drink more wine, and play drinking games. Mark Antony, the Roman politician and General, was well-known for taking pride in destructive drinking behavior. The once great and mighty Rome would eventually turn aside from the kind of character suitable to defend itself against invaders from the North.

The point made here is not that alcohol was the sole reason for the destruction of these civilizations, but instead to argue that a culture's easy acceptance, widespread and excessive use of alcohol, is unquestionably an accelerant for every form of decadence, dissipation, and dissolution. Such is symptomatic of a people treacherously sliding downward.

Someone once used this illustration: If a man riding a spirited horse loosens the reigns, the horse may go faster, not because the horse has been excited, but because the restraint has been taken off. The man who imbibes an alcoholic beverage is like a rider who loosens his lines or throws them away. This principle is not only true for the individual who drinks, but also for a nation that celebrates lcohol and other recreational drugs

Today in America, even the prophet and priest have wandered on this issue. Its rare to hear a sermon about alcohol use from the pulpit anymore, much less a message faithful to the Bible's teaching on the subject. Rarely do clergy engage in the policy debates about the need for alcohol's regulation and control.

All the while, this nation reels in a morally drunken stupor, seemingly unable to walk a straight line in its political endeavors, suffering blurred vision, and unable to set the course for a bright future. Corruption, obscenity, and licentiousness have contaminated everything. Our national character is very much like our drinking with all of its associated problems.

Our nation must literally and spiritually sober up, lest it fade into obscurity as other great civilizations before it.

Months ago, I presented the need for volunteers and financial contributions to this community that would be required for the events of this day to take place. Ever so slowly, the required monies/people began showing up. Prayer and repeated pleas flowed from my heart as I thought of the children whose lives would be touched by God's Love in action during this very special One Day with God Camp. I knew that I could not let my fear of failing these children and their fathers overtake me. I knew I needed to trust God, and that I simply needed to watch and see what God would do ...

Through miraculous provision, as the Lord touched the hearts of people like yourself, the resources of Heaven arrived just in time! Thanks to the willingness of compassionate people, our Camp was fully funded once again this year and sounds of joy echoed all around!

Over the next couple of months, I hope to share some of the incredible things I saw that day. But for now, I must begin by giving all praise and honor to God for what has been done! There are a number of what I call "preliminary" miracles that need to be known by all.

First, the divine appointment I experienced through no knowledge or connection of my own. A few months out from our Camp day the funding shortfall was significant. From my perspective, I doubted that it was possible for this day to happen. My heart was heavy for the children who would miss this opportunity and for their fathers whose hearts were being turned to their children in a new way as a result of this opportunity being presented to them. It was an incredible burden to me as I sensed that it was somehow my responsibility to make this day happen. (Silly me...

Our Faithful Heavenly Father was at work in spite of my doubts! A miracle was about to take place! A member of our institution staff and myself had sent a request to an organization looking for ways to be used as Blessings in the Name of the Lord, expecting that they would do something but with NO idea they would challenge us the way that they did.

"Raise one half of your needed funds before we send you a check." they said.

"And we will match what you have raised."

That 'half' equated to \$4500 and we had a current balance around \$3000! My heart raced, I tossed and turned each night. Our donation stream had slowed to a drop by drop pace. I called Forgiven Ministry who conducts these wonderful camps in prisons around our state and our country, even around the world.

My friend Karen, who manages the office of this incredible ministry said to me in the calm-



est, most faith filled tone, "Chaplain, we just need to stand still and watch our God do what our God does." That wasn't all she said...but it was all I needed.

That's it! I just needed to stand still! This could only be done in complete confidence in the One Who Provides All Things!

Within days, we had met (and exceeded) our goal of \$4500. Our 'miracle' match was on the way, and I just stood there and took it all in with utter amaze-

To all of you who prayed, who gave, and who believed that this day would come and to all of you who served the children and their fathers in any way I testify to you this day, that OUR GOD IS FAITHFUL! To GOD be the Glory! Great things He has done!

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
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#### Life Lessons

Thirty years ago, my wife Barbara and I were home one weekend and took time to sit down with her mother, Belle

Two years later, Barbara's mother, Belle Buchanan, passed away but we had years of visiting and being with her that are totally precious to us and I know were to her as well. She had been at home but went to stay with Barbara's sister

in Hickory and her heart just stopped while she was there. This past week my mother, Geneva Harrell passed away at our home after being with us for six years, most of which required 24-7 care. Fundraising

According to the Oxford Dictionary the meaning of the word "Fundraising" is the seeking of financial support for a charity, cause or other enterprise. One source said that the term "fundraising" was first used in 1869 but actually raising funds for a particular cause existed long before then. We know for sure it was practiced in the Old Testament. A noted example is found in Exodus 35. The Lord instructed Moses to have the people who "were of a willing heart" to contribute items for




the construction of the Tabernacle. More than enough gold, silver, bronze, fine fabrics, animal skins, oil and precious stones were given. The "Tabernacle Building Fund" was a huge success!

Today with most fundraisers those contributing to the cause receive something in exchange. It might be cookies sold at the store entrance or magazines, popcorn and candy being offered at your door by neighbor kids. Pancake breakfasts, spaghetti suppers or fish fries are often used as fundraisers for service clubs. Church youth groups raising money for a mission trip are well known for their car washes!?! (If they're willing to take a week out of their summer break to repair a house or conduct a backyard Bible club I'll gladly contribute in spite of the smudges!).

What if contributing to a fundraiser would assure you that at your death you would go to heaven? Would you "buy" into it? The Catholic Church teaches that the souls of those who are deceased are kept in "purgatory". Purgatory is defined by The Catechism of the Catholic Church as a "purification so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven." Members of the church are given the opportunity to reduce the amount of punishment for sins and lessen the time spent in purgatory by way of "indulgences". Indulgences are earned by performing good deeds and quoting certain prayers. In the 1500's plans were in place to build the new St. Peter's Basilica, the most predominate building that stands even today in Vatican City. Knowing that it would take a lot of money to construct such an elaborate building it became necessary to raise funds. "Ah ha!" said the Power

That Was, when the lightbulb lit up over his head. Rather than by just good deeds and prayers, what if one could "buy" indulgences? The idea became a reality and the practice of indulgences being granted in exchange for money became the "Basilica Church Building Fund". "Want to get to heaven faster? Toss you gold coins into the pot."





Archbishop Albert with Pope Leo X's approval. Tetzel could have easily earned the title "Fundraiser of the Decade". Standing at pulpits throughout the land he would give the following "sales pitch":

"Indulgences are the most precious and sublime of God's gifts ... Draw, near, and I will give you letters duly sealed by which even the sins which you shall hereafter desire to commit shall all be forgiven ... There is no sin so great that indulgences cannot remit. Ye priests, ye nobles, ye wives, ye maidens and you young men, hearken to your departed parents and friends who cry to you from the bottomless depths. 'We are enduring a horrible torment', they scream, 'a small alms from you would deliver us. You can give it now if you will'."

The saying "As soon as the coin in the coffer rings, a soul from purgatory springs" is attributed to Tetzel. At one of his "fundraising events" it is said that a man asked Tetzel if it were "really" possible to receive a letter of indulgence for a "future sin." Tetzel, eager to make a sale, answered with a resounding, "Yes". The man handed over his money to Tetzel and Tetzel added it to his bag with all the other collections. As Tetzel was leaving town he was attacked by the aforementioned man and robbed of all the collected money. The man told Tetzel that this attack and robbery was the "future sin" he had in mind!

About the same time Frederick the Wise, Elector of Saxony (Germany), had an ongoing fundraising event for "The University of Wittenberg Building Fund". It was in the Castle Church of Wittenberg that Frederick displayed his prized collection of over 19,000 "authentic" relics. People came from everywhere for the opportunity to walk through the exhibition. Upon purchasing their tickets they got to feast their eyes on things like "a twig from the burning bush, soot from the fiery furnace, hay from the manger, fragments from Jesus' crib, milk from Mary, a thumb from St. Anne (Mary's mother), bread from the Last Supper, a thorn from the crown Jesus wore and fragments of bones, teeth, and hairs from various saints". Not only did a purchased ticket give opportunity to enter the museum of "authentic" relics it also included indulgences. I imagine that as people exited the building they were handed a "letter of indulgence."

Ironically a former Wittenberg University student, a Catholic monk named Martin Luther, began questioning the sale of indulgences. It was on the massive wooden door of Frederick's Castle Church that Luther posted his Ninety-five Theses in opposition to the non-biblical "fund raising" practice of granting indulgences. This act was the beginning of the Protestant Reformation restoring the original teachings of Jesus and the apostles, who made no references to the granting, much less selling, of indulgences. The granting of indulgences is still practiced by the Catholic Church by reciting the prayer or act of charity assigned. Receiving indulgences in exchange for money, however, came to an end shortly after Luther took a stand against it. Well, so much for that fund raiser!

#### Freedom Through Truth

Men and women today are seeking various kinds of freedom. In many places of the world, people are gathering in crowds and shouting, "Freedom!"

Some time ago I was at a World Fair and saw the tremendous prospects of science presented in the exhibitions. I thought of what Einstein said shortly before he died. "I feel," he declared, "like a man chained. I get a glimpse of reality and then it flees. If only I could be free from the shackles of my intellec-



tual smallness, then I could understand the universe in which I live."

Not only do we want political and intellectual freedom today, we also want moral freedom. We have sexual expression on a scale unknown in modern times. We thought it would make us happy, but we are miserable with it. We have found it destroying not only our morals, but our souls.

We say we want freedom from prejudice, freedom from ignorance and freedom from poverty. We even say we're searching for religious freedom. There are groups in North America that want to throw out all Christian emphasis, all religious symbols. They wish to be free from such "bondage." They say, "Do away with the recognition of God in national life."

Our forefathers did not feel that way. They desired that we should have freedom of religion, but not freedom from religion. "Blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord" (Psalm 33:12). If we push God aside, may God have mercy upon our nation!

The Scripture teaches that the only truly free people in the world are those who have made Christ their Savior, Master and Lord. Jesus Christ said, "You shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free" (John 8:32).

What, then, is truth? People seek for that, too, as they seek for freedom. The scientist seeks truth about the physical universe. The philosopher tries to discover truth about human existence. The psychologist looks for truth about the action and reaction of the human mind. At the end of his life, Gautama Buddha said, "I am still searching for truth."

But here is a man, a giant among men, who appears on the horizon. He stands before His neighbors and friends and declares, "I am the truth!" (Cf. John 14:6). What an astounding claim. "I am the secret of all truth—all psychological truth, all sociological truth, all scientific truth, all philosophical truth, all religious truth."

#### The Secret of the Universe

The Scripture says that "by him all things were created" (Colossians 1:16) and "in him all things consist" (Colossians 1:17). There is something that holds matter together, and the scientist cannot tell you what it is. I believe that someday we are going to learn that the secret of it all is Christ: that if He took His hand off us for five seconds, we would blow apart. He is truth! Ultimate truth!

Now, you can reject this truth and think that you are free. You can say, "I have rejected Jesus Christ, I have rejected God, and now I am going to live it up." But you will find yourself in a bondage far greater than any you knew before. You end up with inner conflicts, guilt complexes, inferiority feelings, fears and neuroses, and your so-called freedom is a new enshacklement.

When Christ told His disciples, "I am the truth" (Cf. John 14:6), He was either right and was telling the truth, or He was a blasphemous deceiver who knew that He was not the truth and was lying. Or He thought that He was God, and He did not know the difference. That would have made Him a maniac—a person who thought He was God when He really wasn't! Which was it? That is a decision you will have to make. You will have to decide who Jesus Christ is—a liar, an egoma-

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niac, or what He claimed to be: God in the flesh, the ultimate reality and truth in the universe. If He is God and the truth, and He tells me to follow Him, I would be a fool not to do so.

#### God Demands a Commitment

We are all interested in truth, and Christ is the truth. When you give yourself to Him, He opens the doors of your mind in the most glorious way. You see a new dimension of life that you have been previously blind to. When you open yourself to Christ—to truth—your life lights up. Your whole inner life glows, and there comes a peace and joy and security that only He can give.

So, God demands a decision, a commitment, a surrender, a conversion. Jesus said, "You must be born again." It wasn't optional. He said, "You must be born again" (John 3:7) before you can get into the Kingdom of Heaven.

When you come to Christ, He gives you a freedom that is real: "Therefore if the Son makes you free, you shall be free indeed" (John 8:36).

What is this freedom? First, He frees you from the penalty of sin. I could preach from morning until night, describing what sin is. But I do not need to.

You know that you have sinned against God.

We break the laws of God. We fall God. We fall short of His requirements. We are sinners. And this sin has done something—it has alienated us from God. Our sin comes between us and God, so that He has to hide His face from us and will not hear us. You may laugh at this. But remember: The Bible says that "fools mock at



sin" (Proverbs 14:9). You can say that your offenses are small and don't amount to anything. But God is a pure and righteous and holy God, and in His sight, you have caused offenses; you have caused a cloud to come between you and God. You are separated from God so that your prayers cannot be answered, and all of our religious actions mean nothing in His sight. You can try to cover up your sins, but God says that you cannot get away with it.

But here comes the glorious part: Christ took the penalty of our sin. That is what the cross is all about. He died on that cross for people like you and me, sinners who had failed Him and had broken His laws. On that cross, God took all of our sins and laid them on Christ, so that He became sin for us. He took the judgment of our sin; He took the hell of our sin. And the moral accountability that you would ordinarily expect to face at the judgment, you will not have to face if you claim Him as your Savior.

I will not be at that judgment. Oh, yes, I have sinned; I have broken God's laws a thousand times, but I will not have to face the judgment. I will not have to give an account. Why? Because on the cross the Lord Jesus Christ took the accountability for me. He took the sin and judgment for me. That is the glorious grace and mercy of God that none of us can fully understand.

Oh, the depth of God's grace! Oh, the height of God's mercy, the breadth of God's love, that He is willing to say to you and to me, "I forgive you. You will never have to face the judgment!" When that gets through to you, you can go to bed and sleep a new kind of sleep.

The full penalty has been paid. The Judge will never say, "I pronounce sentence on you," because Christ has accepted that sentence for you. In Christ you are free. Accept it by faith and go your way rejoicing.

#### Freed from Sin's Power

Second, we are freed from the power of sin. Jesus said, "Whoever commits sin is a slave of sin" (John 8:34). Are you a slave of sin? In bondage to jealousy, to pride, to selfishness, to immorality, to gambling, to some drug, to sinful pleasure, so that sin has become your slave driver?

It may be that sin stands over you with a whip and lashes you across the back. You protest, "But I don't want to commit this sin. I don't want to tell this lie. I don't want to get drunk. I don't want to get involved with that person." But you yield to the domination of sin—you are a slave to sin. The very thing you say you will not do again, you do. It becomes worse and worse as you grow older. Your heart gets harder and harder, until finally there is death and judgment and hell.

But when you know the truth, the truth shall make you free. How wonderful! Sin is no longer in the throne room of my life. Christ sits there, and as I daily, moment by moment, yield my members to Him, He puts my life in order. Satan no longer has the power over my life that he once had. Sin is no longer in command. Oh, to be sure, I slip and fall, but Christ is there to pick me up and to put His arm around me and to love me.

Our Heavenly Father has seen everything that you have done. He is just waiting now for you to come and confess it, to acknowledge it and say, "Lord, here I am. I want a fresh start. I want a new day in my life. I want a new beginning. I want a new birth. I want to be yours from this moment." ©1963 BGEA

pilgrims on the earth. They were seeking and desiring a better country, a heavenly home, a place, a city God has prepared for His people!


God's people have always realized that this world is not our real home. Even though there are great blessings in what God has given us here in this



#### Marriage and Grace

Paul Provides a good deal of information in 1 Corinthians 7 about three realities having to do with marriage and grace it takes to sustain it. Reality is a hard thing to live with. We all tend to be idealistic, especially when it comes to our closest relationships. We've all had dreams of our marriage, or for



our spouses, or for ourselves. But we must also take off the masks of perfection and live with the reality of our humanity. The first principle we see in this chapter relates to sexual intimacy in marriage (1 Cor 7: 3-5), and it also applies to the intimacies of life and conversation. Paul speaks of rights and duties, and you will notice that everything is reciprocal. This is the first reality of marriage: Marriage requires mutual unselfishness. The application of this is broader than only to sexual intimacy. To operate completely unselfishly in this or any other realm takes grace-grace to accept, to forgive, to respect, to affirm, and to restrain; grace to give, and grace to receive gratefully. If you are not yet married and if you tend toward being more selfish than not if you're the type who clings to your own rights stubbornly-then please do the world a favor and don't get married. Marriage will constantly challenge you to release our rights and to give without getting back. The second reality of marriage is highlighted in 1 Corinthians 7:10-13 Marriage is a lifelong commitment. Unless you're ready to make one of those, do not get married. Maybe you got married before you knew the Lord, and have now come to know Him, but your spouse has not. That doesn't change your commitment. Yes, there are exceptional circumstances, though they are rare. But the basic rule that I would underscore here is that when you marry, you marry for life. Your spouse expects you to stay for life. It does something to a marriage when you can count on your partner to work through your differences. What does it take to stay? It takes grace! There's a third reality: Marriage includes troubling times. Again, it takes grace to get through them. There is trouble from calamity and disease. Trouble from the old, sinful nature. Trouble from children, neighbors, extended

family, and even church squabbles. Trouble from the times in which we live. On the front end of marriage, you need to realize that you are eventually going to have troubles. I don't care how often you go to Bible classes or how much time you spend in church-you will be tested, and you will need a lot of grace in your home. Truly great people in the Kingdom of God are not usually the ones who make the headlines. In fact they seldom are. I have



found that the folks who really make a difference in homes and hearts are not even known very well in their communities. Great people are people who show love and grace to others without any expectation of external reward. My plea is that you not limit the principles revealed in this chapter to the home, though this passage speaks of that directly. You should understand, whether single or married, that these same qualities are needed in every area of your life for you to become truly great. Let us remember that Marriage is a gift (vv. 1-9), and not everybody has the same gift. Some people have more self-control than others. People remain unmarried for different reasons (Matt. 19:11-12), and each one must know the will of God. Marriage is a ministry (vv. 10-16). He addressed people who had been converted after marriage and who wondered if they should remain with their unsaved spouses. "Yes," said Paul, "because you might win them to Christ." But even Christian spouses can have a wonderful ministry to each other as they grow in the Lord and love each other (Eph. 5:22). Marriage is a calling (vv. 17-24). When you become a Christian, that does not annul what you were before you trusted Christ. Jews are still Jews, slaves are still slaves, and married people are still married. But now, with the Lord's help, you can fulfill that calling in a greater way. Marriage is a challenge (vv. 25-40). Paul does not deny the blessings of marriage, but he does remind us of the burdens that marriage brings, especially when the times are tough. Building a Christian home is a great ministry, but nobody should enter into it lightly or carelessly. "Success in marriage involves much more than finding the right mate. It also requires being the right mate."



In every city, thousands of people filled parks and outdoor venues in the evening to take up the challenge of interceding for the Golden State, where progressive state and city governments have openly targeted churches and Christians through restrictive legislation hostile to Biblical values.

In Berkeley, a center of radical leftism, I preached at beautiful César Châvez Park, named after one of California's best known political activists. I preached on the value of a soul, and the Holy Spirit worked to save and redeem. There, by the San Francisco Bay, we prayed for Gov. Jerry Brown, state legislators, law enforcement and others who make the state run every day.

Members of the Bikers for Christ joined us several nights to pray for our meetings and to ask God to bring revival to California.

At the Stanislaus County Fairgrounds in Turlock, just outside of Modesto, we celebrated the God-given principles called the Modesto Manifesto that were outlined by my father and his evangelistic team way back in 1948. If Americans still lived with that kind of integrity, we would be a far better place.

I called our Tour "Piercing the Blue Wall," referring to California's intolerant, godless liberalism that has overtaken so many universities, school boards, courts

and local governments. The result has been a state that leads the way for the secular-progressive movement. At its core, this is a radical, biased agenda against the Christian foundations that have long undergirded our nation.

On June 5, the day we concluded our Tour in Redding, voters were headed to the polls to cast votes in crucial statewide primary elections. I encouraged the more than 57,000 people who attended our rallies to study the issues and vote for those candidates who were most closely aligned with Biblical values.

Can you imagine the difference it would make if Christians were elected to city halls, legislatures

and school boards, like Tammi Musemici of Las Vegas? What if California were to lead the way? Wouldn't that be something?

That's why I asked everyone to make prayer their first priority. It's Almighty God alone who can change a person's heart, and in whose hand lies all power and sovereignty over men, rulers and nations (Proverbs 21:1). Repentance has always been the key to personal renewal and national revival.

I thank God that as we traveled across the state, scores of men, women and children stood to confess Christ as their Lord and Savior. My hope is that they, in turn, will share their newfound faith in Jesus with families and neighbors. That's the power of the Gospel!

In August, I am headed into another bastion of progressivism and liberalism—the beautiful but spiritually starved Pacific Northwest. Starting Aug. 1, I will begin a seven-city tour of Oregon and Washington—states that have directly targeted and fined Christian business owners like florist Barronelle Stutzman in Richland, Wash.; bakers Aaron and Melissa Klein in Portland, Ore.; and drugstore owner Kevin Stormans in Olympia, Wash., simply because of their Biblical convictions on same-sex marriage and abortion.

The Pacific Northwest is one of the least churched and least evangelized regions of the United States. Evangelicals are far outnumbered by people who say they are unaffiliated with any church. I can't think of a better place to preach the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ and to see souls won for Him.

For Christians who attend, I will encourage them to participate in civic affairs, to cast their votes in important midterm elections and to even consider running for local and state offices. Believers are salt and light, not to be stored or hidden in a corner, but to be openly active in the midst of a corrupt culture.

The prophet Jeremiah preached to Israelites who were enslaved 70 years in the alien, idol-filled land of Babylon. It was a terrible time in Israel's history, but tucked into the Biblical narrative is a surprising verse: "Sook the welfare of the city where I have sent you into exile, and pray to the Lord on its behalf, for in its welfare you will find your welfare" (Jeremiah 29:7).

Rather than let the people of Israel wallow in bitterness and anger against their captors, Jeremiah told them to pray for their rulers and to be constructive.

I don't know what the next few years or decades will bring. Only God does. But I know He has given us a brief window of time to do all we can for the sake of righteousness. We can still call people to repentance and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. We can still pray for revival.

This is no time for Christians to isolate ourselves and withdraw from engagement with our culture. We are not of the world, as Jesus said (John 17:14), but we most certainly are in the world. We have the responsibility for our sake, and especially for the sake of our children and grandchildren, to do all we possibly can to influence our communities with righteous conduct.



John Wesley, the great English evangelist, preached that you should do all the good you can in all the places you can to all the people you can. That's good advice for the believer today. Abraham Kuyper, a fervent Christian and former prime minister of the Netherlands, said, "There is not one square inch in the whole domain of our human existence over which Christ, who is sovereign over all, does not cry, 'Mine!'" God owns it all, and Christians should work hard in every sector of life for His glory and the welfare of all people.

I don't know what the next few years or decades will bring. Only God does. But I know He has given us a brief window of time to do all we can for the sake of righteousness. We can still call people to repentance and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. We can still pray for revival.

There is still a chance for our nation to call on the Name of the Lord and turn back to Him.

That's certainly my prayer, and the reason we at the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association are always going to obey 2 Timothy 4:2, which says, "Preach the word; be ready in season and out of season."

Seek the well-being of your city, wherever you are. Pray for it. Get involved in every corner of public life you can for the sake of the Gospel. Live boldly for Christ, and trust Him completely. Work while it is still day (John 9:4), and let's see what God will do. \$\pi\$2018 BGEA

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

#### A Deficit in Honesty Equals a Deficit in Peace

Proverbs 11:3 tells us how critical integrity is. It says, "The integrity of the upright shall guide them: but the perverseness of transgressors shall destroy them." Simply put, honesty develops and sustains life, but dishonesty tears it down.

In December of 1994 syndicated columnist Bob Greene told an inspiring story about a teen named Rob Mouw



The Wheaton fans cheered exuberantly, while the Waubonsie Valley fans cried foul saying that the time had run out.

In that moment, Rob had a fateful choice to make. He could be silent and avoid a loss. After all, it was the referee's job to decide the calls. Or he could do what was right.

Rob then asked the referee whether the official time was kept on the scoreboard or the referee's stopwatch. The referee said the scoreboard time was official and then ran off the field. Rob went to his coaches and explained that just before his kick; he had seen zeros on the scoreboard clock. Since he hadn't heard a whistle, he kept playing. Still, his goal was late, and he didn't think it should count.

His coaches agreed, and so they went over to the opposing coaches, explained what happened, and conceded victory to Waubonsie Valley.

Bob Green ended his article with this quote from Rob Mouw:

"Every time in your life you have an opportunity to do right, you should be thankful. For a person to know what right is, and then not to do it — that would be a sin. To have won the game — I mean, really, who cares? Doing the right thing is more important. It lets you have peace."

I suggest that we have a tremendous deficit of peace today, largely in part, because we have a tremendous deficit in honesty. A deficit in honesty equals a deficit in peace.

Lying seems to be the modus operandi of our politics. Some would argue it's always been that way, but it seems worse than ever nowadays.

As a registered lobbyist for the Christian Action League of North Carolina, I was stung by a state lawmaker's lie this week. In fact, it may not have simply been one lawmaker's lie but a party of lies that snookered this preacher.

I'll leave off mentioning names and circumstances. It's enough to say that lying always conjures up a host of emotions from the deceived: anger, frustration, betrayal, just to mention a few, especially when you've been operating with others in good faith.

Several years ago, Paul Burka wrote an article titled, Honesty is the Best Politics. He said:

"Lying is one of the two constant temptations of politics. (The other is money.) We even have a lexicon of political lying: spin, disinformation, misspeak. Politicians have an unwritten code that sanctions deceit under certain circumstances. If you are asked a potentially embarrassing question, for example, you don't have to tell everything you know. A few years back, a state legislator was asked by a reporter if he had received a gold watch as a gift. The answer was no. Later the reporter called back — what about a gold colored watch? "Yea," was the reply. "I got that one."

Burka says that politics is like a poker game "in which players agree that sending misleading signals is permitted." Burka adds, "Most politicians see their professions in this light. The best politicians know instinctively what the limits are, and the worst ones never learn."

Burka's assessment was spot-on.

Someone protests, "This is terrible! What can be done about it?" The cry of many is to "throw the burns out of office." But the problem is really more complicated than the politicians who lie; it's the culture of lying we have come to accept as normal. This culture of deceit is the enemy of our faith in each other, without which

there can be no peace.

There's an old story about a little boy who was once asked by his mother to define a lie. He replied, "Mother, a lie is an abomination to the Lord, but a very present help in time of trouble." This is the problem with duplicity, double-dealing, trickery and guile. It seemingly



produces a blessing for the moment, but it's one that ultimately morphs into a curse. It's hard to believe that politics will ever be devoid of the pervasiveness of lying. Nevertheless, a few in the profession with the integrity and courage of a young Rob Mouw could significantly change everything.

It could happen. Let's pray for it. Let's work for it. We should start to expect it. It's the way of peace.

gressive piggies earlier in my stay on the farm.



#### A Plea for Godly Leadership

Shortly before Moses passed from the scene, he cautioned the children of Israel against an attitude of complacency in the midst of blessing. After describing all the blessings, they would simply receive, he cautioned, "Then [at that point in time] beware lest thou forget the LORD, which brought thee forth out of the land of Egypt, from the house of bondage" (Deuteronomy 6:12). Moses recognized that man's natural



tendency would be to grow complacent in the midst of blessing. Tragically, Israel failed to heed Moses' warning and became complacent. They did not drive out the inhabitants of the land and soon became just like the surrounding nations. They lost their distinction.

To try to bring them back to Himself, God sent various prophets whose message was largely unheeded and even mocked at times. Eventually, God had enough and allowed the Assyrians to conquer northern Israel in 722 BC and the Babylonians to conquer the southern two tribes ultimately in 586 BC. For seventy years, God's people dwelt over nine hundred miles away in a pagan land.

At the end of the seventy-year captivity of Judah by Babylon, God moved in the heart of an ungodly king named Cyrus to issue a decree in 539 BC that enabled the Jews to return to their homeland to rebuild the temple. Zerubbabel led the first wave of Jews over the nine-hundred-mile journey from Babylon to Jerusalem. When they arrived, they eagerly began work on the temple. The first order of business was the altar, followed by the foundation of the temple. By 536, the altar had been erected, and the foundation laid. Then came the problems. Opposition set in and the work of God ceased. For the next sixteen years, the work of God sat idle. Meanwhile, God used two prophets named Haggai and Zechariah to minister and stir the people to complete that which they had begun.

In 458, Ezra led a second group to Jerusalem. His primary focus was on the spiritual restoration of the people, for the spiritual conditions were deplorable. In 444 BC, over ninety years since the original decree was issued by Cyrus, God moved Nehemiah to return to Jerusalem to rebuild the walls. Why the delay? Was it merely a matter of timing with God? Were the people content with the status quo? Were they overwhelmed by the nature of the project? We do not have answers to these questions, but God led Nehemiah to direct this badly needed project. The time in which he accomplished it was truly amazing. For nearly a century, thousands of Israelites dwelt in the ruins of Jerusalem. For sixteen years, they were content to build their own homes while God's house lay waste. Two leaders redirected a large group of people to reconsider their priorities. For over ninety years, they were content to dwell in a city that was anything but secure. God led one man to lead a project that would alter that nation for years to come.

Without a doubt, we live in perilous times as a nation. God is increasingly less welcome in our society; tragically, He is not even welcome in many of our churches. Many Christians are not passionate for God and do not want a life of holiness; they prefer instead a life of convenience and entertainment. Without a doubt, there is a great need for God's people to stand up and lead in a direction that is pleasing to the Lord. Are you one who will be with the status quo of society? Or are you willing to be that individual whom God uses to be different and lead accordingly? Will you be a Zerubbabel, Haggai, Zechariah, Ezra, or Nehemiah and rise up against the current and popular trend for God?


#### Forgotten Gospel: The Nations

One of my favorite shows is Dr. Who, and one of my favorite moments is always the first time a new character



In Revelation 7:9-10, we see a clear picture of this grand overarching Kingdom theme. And I looked, and there was, surrounding the throne, bowing down in worship before God, a great, uncountable number of people. People from every nation, from every people group, from every race, language, socio-economic status; anyone and everyone who has trusted Jesus was standing around the throne, united in one singular purpose. The Worship of their creator and savior. Of course, I am paraphrasing, but this is the heart of what this passage is trying to communicate. God

is creating – in the words of Dr. Tim Mackie – "one large multi-ethnic family."

Russell Moore said, "The Church is a preview of the coming attraction of the Kingdom," and if Revelation 7:9-10 is how the coming kingdom will look, it is how my Church should look right here and now. My Church is not the most diverse Church out there, but we're doing better than we were. We are not becoming a Church who accepts people from other races, we are becoming a Church who desires them, who is learning to seek this kind of Kingdom diversity out. We pray that God would send people from other nations and tribes to us because we want our Church to accurately represent what God's Kingdom is going to look like.



A while back my wife bought me a new razor. Unlike the multi-blade razors that promise the closest shave you've ever experienced, this razor is equipped with a single, double-sided blade. To change the blade you twist the handle and two little "doors" open. Replace the blade, twist the handle in the opposite direction to lock it in place and you're ready to go.

Some of you older folks might remember. It's not a razor that easily plows through two days of beard. You have to take your time and concentrate in order to get a close shave.



I soaked my beard with a hot towel and broke out the shaving mug. Starting at the edge of one sideburn, I slowly drew the razor toward my chin. Every stroke that followed was deliberate and methodical resulting in a perfectly close shave.

Looking into the mirror I smiled and remembered. This is the way my daddy taught me to shave. Too many times to count, I watched him from preparation to end. He never altered his routine.



Hot water in a mug was transformed into a thick lather that was applied with a badger-hair brush. Long strokes were punctuated by distorted facial expressions that stretched the nooks and crannies of his face.

I always knew when he was finished. He ran his hand over his face, cocked his head back and forth and swished the razor one last time before tapping it on the rim of the sink. A couple of swirls of the brush cleared the sink of whiskers and it was over.

Shaving was merely a task Daddy chose to perform daily. Yet, I think he would agree that those times when we "shaved together" were moments made holy through the ritual of an ordinary act.

Help someone across an icy parking lot. Break bread together. Sit with someone and cry together. Teach a child to whistle. Deliver a casserole. Anoint someone with the precious ointment of grace or hope or peace. Do whatever needs to be done and do nothing when there is nothing to do but simply be present.

You might be surprised by something you weren't counting on, something you needed before you knew you needed it. Something that reminds you that nothing is really ordinary at all.

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

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## Penland School of Crafts

#### Contemporary Glass at Penland Gallery

Alchemy was an early science famous for its attempts to turn lead into gold. Today, it's used to describe miraculous transformations. This makes Alchemy a fitting title for the current Penland Gallery exhibition of work by artists using glass in remarkable ways. The exhibition runs through September 16 with an opening reception on Saturday, August 4 from 4:30-6:30 PM.

Glass is a material with almost limitless artistic possibilities. The twelve artists in this exhibition

create objects of mystery and complexity by working with the material's chemical makeup, its optical properties, its ability to hold incredible detail, and the possibilities of layering and combining multiple processes.

Mark Peiser, who lives near Penland School, is represented in the show by two cast forms. They are made from glass that separates light into different colors, so the apparent color of the pieces can change depending on how they are lit. Nickolaus Fruin's vessels, by contrast, are completely clear but have visible patterns created by combining different formulations of clear glass that each refract light a bit differently.

Penland resident artist Dean Allison has several three-dimensional portraits included in the show. His complex process begins with a rubber impression of his model's head. After many intermediate steps, the end result is a detailed bust cast from colored glass. Nearby is Amber Cowan's piece: an intricate assembly of glass leaves and flowers sculpted from recycled commercial glass waste and incorporating several vintage glass objects. Also, on display are several pieces by Kit Paulson, one of which is a flexible snake made from hundreds of linked glass rings. These are just some of the

wonders that are waiting for visitors to Alchemy, which is part of the regional Summer of Glass. For information about all of the glass activities in the area, visit exploreasheville.com/summer-of-glass.

Running concurrently with this exhibition is a smaller show of contemporary jewelry titled Wear that includes work by artists who use materials in new ways to create exceptional wearable pieces. The Visitors Center Gallery has an ongoing display of objects that illuminate the history of Penland School, and the Lucy Morgan Gallery presents a selection of work by dozens of Penland-affiliated artists. On view outside the Penland Gallery are large sculptures in stone and steel by Daniel T. Beck, Hoss Haley, and Carl Peverall, plus a structure designed by artist Meredith Brickell that invites visitors to stop for a few minutes and observe the clouds.

The Penland Gallery and Visitors Center is located at Penland School of Crafts on Conley Ridge Road, just off Penland Road in Mitchell County (near the town of Spruce Pine). It is the first building on the right as you enter the Penland campus. The gallery is open Tuesday through Saturday, 10:00 AM-5:00 PM and Sunday, Noon-5:00 PM; it is closed on Mondays. For more information call 828-765-6211 or visit penland.org/gallery.

Penland School of Crafts is an international center for craft education dedicated to helping people live creative lives. Located in Western North Carolina, Penland offers workshops in books and paper, clay, drawing and painting, glass, iron, metals, printmaking and letterpress, photography, textiles, and wood. The school also sponsors artists' residencies, an outreach program, and a gallery and visitors center. Penland is a nonprofit, tax-exempt institution which receives support from the North Carolina Arts Council, an agency funded by the State of North Carolina and the National Endowment for the Arts, which believes that a great nation deserves great art. What You Will Never See

Psalm 106 is a retelling of the history of Israel. In summary, the Psalmist confesses both his sin and the sin of his fathers (vs. 6). They rebelled at the Red Sea, "yet He saved them for his name's sake." Once they crossed the Red Sea "they believed his words; they sang his praise." They had to see God work and then trust Him.



However, verse 13 gives the sad reality: "They soon forgot his works; they did not wait for his counsel." Sin was followed by sin, disobedience multiplied by disobedience. Things got so bad that God was ready to kill them. "Therefore he said he would destroy them—had not Moses, his chosen one, stood in the breach before him, to turn away his wrath from destroying


them." (vs. 23)

It didn't get any better.

"Then they despised, murmured, did not obey, yoked themselves to Baal, ate sacrifices offered to the dead." A plague broke out among them. "Then Phinehas stood up and intervened, and the plague was stayed." (vs. 30)

Two times they were near extinction--two times someone stood in the gap for them. Someone interceded. But it wasn't enough. Moses and Phinehas died. Israel sinned even more.

Until Jesus. He came as the ultimate intercessor. On the cross, he stayed the wrath of God, interceding not only for Israel but for anyone who will trust Him. "For our sake, God made Him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in Him we might become the righteousness of Christ." (2 Corinthians 5:21)



And Jesus' work didn't stop there. Three days later he resurrected. Then he ascended. Now he intercedes.

Who is to condemn? Christ Jesus is the one who died—more than that, who was raised—who is at the right hand of God, who indeed is interceding for us. (Romans 8:34, ESV)

Consequently, he is able to save to the uttermost those who draw near to God through him, since he always lives to make intercession for them. (Hebrews 7:25, ESV)

My little children I am writing these things to you that you may not sin. But if anyone sins, we have an advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ, the righteous. (1 John 2:1-2, ESV)

Moses' intercession was limited to a certain event and time. Phinehas interceded and died. Jesus died to intercede! Now he lives to intercede! What you will never know is what he has intercepted in your life today. You will never know the pending danger, the looming temptation, the "almost" catastrophe that he stayed away by interceding. He saved you then and he's saving you now--to the uttermost! Thank God today for what you don't know.

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## Mountain Community Health Partnership

#### To Receive Grant Funds

Mountain Community Health Partnership (MCHP) is pleased to announce they are one of twelve organizations to receive onetime grant funding to combat the opioid crisis. Governor Cooper

has announced that a total of \$1.5 million in grant awards will be given to the twelve organizations. The purpose of these funds is to advance the goals of the NC Opioid Action Plan. It will enable MCHP to implement activities in our community that improve access to harm reduc-

tion, treatment, and recovery supports. "Community efforts to turn the tide on the opioid crisis deserve our support," Governor Cooper said. "These grants are another example of the collaborative effort we need to fight overdoses, save lives, and connect people to treatment statewide." Mountain Community Health Partnership is a Federally Qualified Health Center

serving Mitchell, Yancey, and surrounding counties. MCHP will use this funding to establish a network of peer support specialists and post overdose response teams who can meet with people who are struggling with addiction where they are. Our residents are in desperate need of assistance in fighting the opioid epidemic. It has become increasingly clear that if we are to make an impact on this problem, we must move beyond the walls of our clinics and into the community to engage our neighbors.

"I am thrilled to begin collaborating with community agencies in order to develop a post overdose team. This effort is fueled by the needs of our communities, which like

many others have been hard hit by chronic stress and overwhelm. MCHP is dedicated to helping our communities address the opioid crisis and this is the next step in a natural progression as we build and create programs to support families and treat individuals who are struggling with this medical, chronic, relapsing disease. People who are using drugs are surrounded by other people who are using drugs. Even when the person has a desire to quit using. treatment can be difficult to access and restoration of health seems unattainable. The team at MCHP already includes medical and behavioral health providers who work collaboratively to treat patients with substance use disorders. This grant will enable MCHP



to add Peer Support Specialists to our team. While working together with community agencies, we will strive to support and link folks with treatment and community resources, create opportunities for change, transform life threatening events and enhance community resilience." - Amy Earnheart, LCSW, LCAS

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
#### Tim's Treasures

#### The Truth

"I've always thought that the most powerful weapon in the world was the bomb and that's why I gave it to my people, but I've come to the conclusion that the most powerful weapon in the world is not the bomb but it's the truth."

- Andrei Sakharov



In an effort to maintain our sanity, we must filter the cloud of noise; purging the false, or more popularly referred to as, "fake news," from the truth. In my grandfather's milk barn, there was the room where he kept the Separator, as it was known. In my mind, I can still picture the stainless-steel piece of equipment that stood about chest high. Grandpa Tron would pour in the whole milk, that which was straight from the cow, and it would spin the cream away from the milk, where it could then be collected and used to make the other by-products of the dairy; cheese, butter, and etc... It was obvious when the Separator was done. Unfortunately, cleansing the input into our mental pallet is not as easy.

In a documentary in the early 1990's Bill Moyer, an ordained minister in 1954, and a reporter for CBS and NBC News, presented a vision of the future as part of a special documentary, "A World of Ideas," whereby he predicted we would soon be living in the "Age of Information." However prophetic his words were at that time, albeit too soon for what was really to come in 1990; we now live in that time. From the traditional nightly news to the other end of the spectrum where anyone with a keyboard and access to social media can output information, be it true or false, we face a world of a constant barrage of data. More and more, unlike in what now seems ancient times, there is little to no references given, no facts to back up said purported info. There are sound-bytes thrown like frisbees, tossed into the mix sometimes simply to cause a sensation; their aim is to go viral, another operative of many that dwell in this spectrum.

What say you then of what Christ would say to those Jews who were on the fence of becoming believers, "And ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free." -John 8:32

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To know the truth is to be the truth. "If it were only that simple," you might respond.

Winston Churchill, "Truth is the most valuable thing in the world, often it is protected by a bodyguard of lies."

Today, we struggle to resolve fact from fiction, not only in the obvious manner in which we often think, but also what is relevant to our purpose in Christ.

Churches and denominations across the globe face an attack from a force not of this world, trying to sway their leaders and congregations into softening their stand for the truth. Giving into the world was not an option in the Apostle Paul's time. As he spoke to the church in Corinth, he was brutally honest when he told them, "For I think that God hath set forth us the apostles last, as it were appointed to death: for we are made a spectacle unto the world, and to angels, and to men. We are fools for Christ's sake, but ye are wise in Christ; we are weak, but ye are strong; ye are honorable, but we are despised. Even unto this present hour we both hunger, and thirst, and are naked, and are buffeted, and have no certain dwelling place; And labor, working with our own hands: being reviled, we bless; being persecuted, we suffer it: Being defamed, we entreat: we are made as the filth of the world, and are the offscouring of all things unto this day."

Paul was making an ironic statement about the apostle's sake. These words are something which could be taken totally out of context in today's world and often are literally used against unknowing Christians, being misquoted to advance other ideologies. The lies once more surrounding the truth. Paul and the apostles were anything but fools in Christ although, they were despised and hated by the Jews of their time. They were always under attack of defamation of character and literal persecution. Yet, as they would leave a town, either after a miraculous healing or near-death torture, they would, as my new-found friend Jimmy Clark would say, "Rejoice in their labors of the Holy Spirit." Jimmy had been part of a mission team to South Africa a few years back. There, they were scheduled to visit a prison where the mission team was to speak to some of the prisoners as part of their mission. work. On their walk to the prison facility, Jimmy said he was overcome with a message that God had given to him; so much so, that he asked the others if he might be able to share his vision when they arrived, to which they agreed. He described walking back to the hotel from the prison after his sermon as it being one of the greatest feelings in his life, his rejoicing in the Spirit had begun. Our path isn't always lit with the best of lighting.

As we strive to walk down the pathway which we feel God hath set before us, we must feel like the psalmist when he wrote the words to the 23rd Psalm, "Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: for thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff they comfort me." No matter where you are in the world, no matter where you are in your walk of faith, if you have begun, you still encounter the world in which you live. Through this manner of perspective, we must give insight as to the physical and emotional challenges that being of the flesh entails.

Although your journey may be obvious, there will be at times where you will face avalanches of problems and trials. Nothing ever comes easy when you finally find yourself walking in faith. As one of my good friends and missionary Jeffrey Canada said to me once, "You know you are going in the right direction, with regard to faith, when you feel that significant headwind in your face." Just as Paul wrote to the church in Corinth, we are buffeted, and nothing is for certain. Sometimes it feels as if you can barely hang on, when another wave crashes over the bow of your ship, swamping you once more. Slowly, your grab on to the railing and pull yourself up. Taking a deep breathe you stand to your feet and take another step forward.

Do we give up?

Do we quit?

No, for we must not be vanquished. "For God, who commanded the light to shine out of darkness, hath shined in our hearts, to give the light of the knowledge of the giory of God in the face of Jesus Christ. But we have this treasure in earthen vessels, that the excellency of the power may be of God, and not of us. We are troubled on every side, yet not distressed; we are perplexed, but not in despair; Persecuted, but not forsaken; cast down, but not destroyed; Always bearing about in the body the dying of the Lord Jesus, that the life also of Jesus might be made manifest in our body."-2 Corinthians 4:6-10

He, Jesus Christ, is the way, the truth, the light.

Yet, in all the struggles and tests of our faith, we must not forget that once we come to know Him and truly serve, we can put our trust in Him. In this hope, for it is not simply a mystery, we have a guarantee of life eternal, that of which we cannot begin to comprehend in our earthly realm of consciousness. "But as it is written, Eye hath not seen, nor ear heard, neither have entered into the heart of man, the things which God hath prepared for them that love him."-1 Corinthians 2:9

To know Christ is to know Truth.

Confess your sins to Him, seek Him, knock and the door shall be opened. "That if thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved."-Romans 10:9

Finally, when we are left with little hope, when we have been knocked to our knees for what seems the last time, remember the words of Christ, shortly before leaving this earthly realm, when he spoke these words to his disciples, "Sanctify them through thy truth: thy word is truth."

Know that through all we face, all the trials, persecutions and adversarial relations, there is one thing we can count on; the Word of God, for it, is the ultimatum of truths, and for this, we shall ever be thankful.

## Enjoying Everyday Life

#### Get Radical Results by Changing Your Mind

For many years I went to church faithfully, week after week, but I wasn't living a victorious Christian life. I read my Bible every day, served on the evangelism board and went door-to-door telling people about Jesus because I really wanted to serve God. But even though I was doing those things, I was still miserable most of the time.

While I learned a good foundation about salvation through God's grace at my church, I wasn't learning how to change and be transformed into the image of Christ by renewing my mind, according to God's Word.

It caused me to live in a frustrating cycle that went like this: Go to church on Sunday, fight with my husband during the week, get frustrated with my kids a lot and feel miserable, depressed, angry—like a mess—and then go back to church on Sunday to get "right" with God again. I felt like I didn't know how act like a sane human being.

Ephesians 4:23-24 (AMPC) says to "be constantly renewed in the spirit of your mind [having a fresh mental and spiritual attitude], and put on the new nature (the regenerate self) created in God's image...."

This is so important, because it's impossible to have a positive, peaceful life and at the same time have a negative mind.

But when we take time to renew our minds with God's Word, we learn how to think like God thinks, say what God says, and act like He wants us to act. Then we can have what He wants us to have—abundant life in Christ, filled with His righteousness, peace and joy. (See John 10:10 and Romans 14:17.)

#### How Are You Supposed to Think?

The first thing we need to understand is that when we become new creations in Christ (2 Corinthians 5:17), what is normal for the world is no longer normal for us. There's a way we're supposed to live that reflects the image of Christ in the world.

For example, many people think it's normal to worry, but as a Christian, wor-

rying is not a normal way of thinking. Philippians 4:6 says we are to "be anxious for nothing" (NKJV). This doesn't mean we won't ever feel worried, but when we do, we can pray and give it to God so we can have His peace while we go through the challenges of life.

First Corinthians 2:16 (AMPC) says

And they aren't judgmental or critical of others.
- The Focused Mind: We live in an age of distraction! It's amazing how much information is coming at us most of the time through technology, the media and the busyness of the world around us. I've decided that the world probably isn't going to change, so I have to change. I'm learning how to keep my mind on what I'm doing, rather than thinking about several things at once or what I want to do next.

There is a way to have righteousness, peace and joy in the Holy Spirit—to have victory in our circumstances and not live based on what the world views as "normal." And it all begins with renewing our minds. The choice is up to us.

As you do your part to renew your mind, God will do His. And you'll love the transformation that comes with having a "normal" mind—the mind of Christ!




cheetah! Can you imagine seeing a large yellow/tan cat with black spots pass you while you are riding in the back seat of your parents' car? If you were having a race that is exactly what would happen! The cheetah can reach 75 mph in about 4 seconds. However, they can only hold this top speed for a few hundred yards.

Cheetahs live mainly in Africa and a few parts of Iran. They eat hooved animals like gazelle or wildebeest calves and sometimes rabbits and birds. Since they are only really fast for a short period of time, timing is everything when it comes to catching their dinner. For this reason, these cats will sneak up on their prey in the tall savannah grass. Their long tails are very important to the cheetah. The tail is used to quickly steer the cat which way it wants to go while running at top speed. Cheetahs do not roar like other big cats. They "chirp" instead. Chirping is done mostly when cheetahs are reunited with family members, when they are in trouble, or when the females are looking for a mate. They also purr, bark, and hiss. No two cheetahs look the same. Their spot pattern is unique. Just like people's fingerprints are different and unique from each other.

God equipped the cheetahs with special paw pads on the bottom of their feet for traction. They also have semi retractable claws that help grip while they are running on the hard ground. Even though they don't wear visible shoes they

#### Interruptions

"The apostles gathered around Jesus, and told him all that they had done and taught. He said to them, 'Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest a while' ... And they went away in the boat to a deserted place by themselves. Now many saw them going and recognized them, and they hurried there on foot from all the towns and arrived ahead of

them. As he went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd; and he began to teach them many things. " --- Mark 6:30-34

Think about the last time you were interrupted. Perhaps your sleep was interrupted when you forgot to turn off your alarm on a Saturday you didn't have to work. Maybe a news anchor appeared on the screen during your favorite television program and recited the words, "We interrupt this program for a special news bulletin." One of the most frequent causes of interruptions is technology as our train of thought often is broken by a text, email, or phone call. Even the most carefully planned calendar can dissolve quickly as one thing after another invades our schedule.

Since interruptions are a part of life, the key is learning to handle interruptions gracefully. In the book Out of Solitude: Three Meditations on the Christian Life, Henri Nouwen writes, "A few years ago I met an old professor at the University of Notre Dame. Looking back on his long life of teaching, he said with a funny wrinkle in his eyes: 'I have always been complaining that my work was constantly interrupted, until I slowly discovered that my interruptions were my work?".

No one was more familiar with interruptions than Jesus, and his handling of life's interruptions with grace and compassion is unmatched. In today's passage, the disciples have returned from their mission, having been sent out by Jesus, two by two (Mark 6:7). No doubt, they are excited to debrief with Jesus and tell him about the wonderful things they have accomplished by his power and authority. Sensing their need for rest due to the crowds and realizing that there had been no time even to eat, Jesus says to them, "Come away to a deserted place." (v. 31). However, the crowds are not deterred by the boat ride taken by Jesus and the disciples. They "hurried there on foot from all the towns and arrived ahead of

them" (v. 33). Jesus could have dismissed the crowds and continued with his plans for rest and relaxation, but the Bible says, "As he went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd; and he began to teach them many things" (v.



Jesus' compassion for

those who interrupt his plan takes priority over his concern for a carefully followed calendar. Later in this same chapter, he will dismiss the crowds and go up on a mountain to pray (vv. 45-46), but not before being a shepherd to wandering and desperate sheep. Charles Cousar writes, "It may be better to read this story not from the perspective of Jesus but from the perspective of the crowd, one of those whose frantic and often unfocused life desperately seeks an answer. Jesus seems never put off by our interruptions, by our constant need of his compassion and teaching."

In further addressing the issue of interruptions, Nouwen calls this the great conversion in our life: "to recognize and believe that the many unexpected events are not just disturbing interruptions of our projects, but the way in which God molds our hearts and prepares us for his return... [W]hen we believe that patience can make our expectations grow, then 'fate' can be converted into a vocation, wounds into a call for deeper understanding, and sadness into a birthplace for joy"

Prayer: Lord, give us discernment to see interruptions not as moments of frustration, but as opportunities to be open to your hand at work.

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

My Resolution to Force Transparency

Rep. Jim Jordan (R-OH) and I recently brought our resolution to the House floor—the resolution that will compel the Department of Justice to turn over all remaining relevant documents owed to Congressional investigators within 7 days. The House voted, and the resolution passedWe are incredibly grateful to our colleagues for their support.

Many of you who have been following this story are probably aware by now—this has been an ongoing fight to allow Congress to do its constitutional duty of oversight. For nearly 8 months, the Department of Justice has been given the opportunity, yet refused, to be transparent and answer questions about their conduct—even rising to the level of ignoring subpoena deadlines from Judiciary Committee Chairman Bob Goodlatte and Intelligence Committee Chairman Devin Nunes. If Rod Rosenstein and the Department of Justice have nothing to hide, they certainly aren't acting like it.

We are tired of this Department of Justice giving us the runaround. It is clear they no interest in cooperating, and we are done talking. I'm glad my colleagues joined with us to put this to a vote.

I want to thank my colleagues for their support. One way or the other, Americans will find out what truly occurred at their Department of Justice on their taxpayer dime.

#### Major Supreme Court News

We have had huge news coming out of the Supreme Court recently. As you may know, the Court upheld a pro-life organization's First Amendment rights and prevented government from forcing them to advertise abortion services; they upheld the President's constitutional right to protect the American people and enforce limited travel restrictions for security concerns; and they ruled that public sector employees cannot be forced to subsidize political opinions they disagree with through union dues, which is a textbook First Amendment issue. All of these rulings were absolutely critical and major victories for originalism.

Perhaps most critical, though, was the news that the Court will now have another vacancy this summer with the retirement of Justice Anthony Kennedy. This means President Trump now has an opportunity to nominate yet another originalist Justice—one who will respect the rule of law and not legislate from the bench. President Trump is expected to announce his selection next week.

This was a successful week for a Supreme Court that is hopefully returning to respecting our founding principles of limited government and constitutional order.

## NC Senate District 47

This November when voters go to the polls, they will decide on whether six proposed constitutional amendments will be become part of our North Carolina Constitution. Two of those proposed are a constitutional amendment to expand victims' rights, and a constitutional amendment to protect the right to hunt and fish.

In bipartisan votes, both the North Carolina Senate and House passed legislation to place on the November 2018 ballot a constitutional amendment for voters to consider that would provide better protections and safeguards to victims of crime and their families. A victims' rights amendment was added to North Carolina's Constitution in 1996, which gave some crime victims basic rights to participate in the justice system, but House Bill 551 – Strengthening Victims' Rights further advances those rights by:

- Expanding the scope of crimes under which protections to victims are extended.
- Requiring that victims receive effective and timely notice of all court proceedings.
- Expanding victims' rights to those victimized by juveniles.
- Giving victims a greater voice in the process by allowing them to be heard at plea, conviction, sentencing, or adjudication hear-
- . Creating an enforcement mechanism to allow a victim to file a motion with the court if they are being deprived of their rights.

While protecting the rights of victims, the bill makes sure that those rights do not infringe upon the rights of the accused. In addition to North Carolina, this constitutional amendment will also be on the ballot in five other states.

Both the North Carolina Senate and House of Representatives passed bipartisan legislation that will let voters choose whether to amend the North Carolina Constitution to safeguard citizens' right to hunt, fish, and harvest wildlife. Senate Bill 677 – Protect Right to Hunt and Fish had bipartisan support in both chambers, and voters will now consider the constitutional amendment on the November 2018 ballot. Of the southeastern states, only North Carolina and Florida have not written the right to fish, hunt, and harvest wildlife into their constitutions. Twenty-one other states already guarantee this right in their constitutions, and in all states that have placed this constitutional amendment on the ballot, voters have approved it.

Democrat Leader Chuck Schumer went so far as to say he "will oppose him with everything [he's] got." I believe most Americans are turned off by these knee-jerk reactions, and believe the life and work experiences of a nominee deserve thoughtful and considered study by their elected leaders. They want us to ensure that the next Supreme Court Justice is qualified, and can be trusted to uphold the Constitution and our rule of law. I intend to do just that as the Senate carries out its duty. I hope my fellow Senators will also treat the confirmation process for our nation's highest court with the respect the American people deserve and expect.

Legislature overrides Farm Act veto

The House and Senate voted this week to override Gov. Roy Cooper's veto of Senate Bill 711 — NC Farm Act of 2018. Frivolous lawsuits against farms of all sizes are putting farmers and their families at risk. The Farm Act simply defines very clearly the types of nuisance suits that may be brought against farms in North Carolina.

People have been buying property around hog farms that were established well before they bought the property, then suing the farmers for nuisance – sometimes from many miles away. That's just not fair. The farm was there first, and the Farm Act limits these suits to properties that lie within one half-mile of an operation, and to within one year after a farm is started or a farm makes major changes.

Attorneys in other states, particularly in Iowa, have brought numerous suits against farming operations. In North Carolina, attorneys are showing up at the front doors of people who have lived near farms their entire lives and saying, effectively, "If you sign this piece of paper, I'll win you millions of dollars in court."

We are bombarded with fake news about farming operations. We are told by the media and special interest groups that farmers have no regard for people who live nearby.

An example of fake news about farming operations has been the media's and special interest groups' portrayals of the recent Smithfield Foods lawsuit. In court, the judge in the case did not allow photos. A plaintiff in the case said a hog farming operation was spraying her home with manure from eight feet away, but an aerial photo of the area plainly showed the farming operation was a mile-and-ahalf away.

There is false information everywhere meant to build a narrative that puts money in the pockets of out-of-state attorneys. How else could a farming operation a mile-and-a-half from a home be portrayed in court and in the media as being eight feet away from a home? Despite deeply erroneous and slanted characterizations of lawsuits, the Farm Act does not affect any pending lawsuits in any way. The target today is hog farms. Once a handful of parasitic attorneys have juiced that industry for as much money in frivolous court damages as they can, chicken operations, cattle operations and others will be next.

Agriculture is our state's number one industry. As of 2017, there were 47,800 farms in our state operating on 8.1 million acres with a total annual economic output of more than \$80 billion. I will not stand idly by as attorneys try to skim off the backs of hardworking farmers and literally take food off of people's

Legal practices seeking to win frivolous nuisance suits are playing the media and special interest groups like fiddles. The media and special interest groups then turn and play the people of our state like fiddles as they seek advertising dollars and donations.

Reports in the media and from special interest groups are simply not true. If you want to see for yourself, I would encourage you to visit some farming operations in North Carolina.

Agritourism is an up-and-coming industry across our state, and personally witnessing the dedication of farmers to their trade may be a good excuse to visit

North Carolinians have a right to participate in agricultural activities without a pervasive, real fear that their assets will be taken by frivolous, unjustified lawsuits. People who are truly negatively impacted by agricultural activity would Rally for Ag in Ralaigh on Monday. still have recourse in court with the passage of Senate Bill 711.

Most people eat three times a day, and the food they eat does not originate at Ingles – that food is grown and harvested on a farm. Senate Bill 711 strikes a balance between farmers and property owners who live nearby, and, therefore, I voted to override the governor's veto of the bill

The bill is now law.

#### Legislature puts constitutional amendments on ballot

North Carolina voters will have an opportunity to vote on several constitutional amendments this November.

Constitutional amendment bills were passed by the House and Senate by a three-fifths majority this week. In accordance with our state constitution, the governor cannot veto them.

- House Bill 1092 Const. Amendment Require Photo ID to Vote
- Would amend the Constitution of North Carolina to require that every person offering to vote in person present photo ID before voting in the manner prescribed by law
  - Senate Bill 75 Const. Amd. Max. Income Tax Rate of 7%
  - Would lower the maximum income tax rate for families and businesses allowed by the state constitution from 10% to 7%
  - Senate Bill 814 Judicial Vacancy Sunshine Amendment
- Would not change the process for regular judicial elections, but only reforms the process for filling vacancies in the state courts
- Establishes a Nonpartisan Judicial Merit Commission and local merit selection committees appointed by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor, and the General Assembly
  - None of the three branches appointing authorities could be granted a majority of appointments to the commissions
  - Senate Bill 677 Protect Right to Hunt and Fish
- Proposes a state constitutional amendment to voters providing that the people of North Carolina have a right to use traditional methods to hunt, fish, and harvest wildlife, subject only to certain limitations promoting wildlife conservation and resource management

As the legislative short session winds down, the Senate turned our attention this week to looking at constitutional amendments to be put on the ballot this November for North Carolina voters to consider.

Senate Passes Bill to Put Constitutional Amendment Protecting Right to Hunt and Fish on Ballot This Fall.

In a 44-4 vote, a bipartisan Senate passed legislation Wednesday that will let voters choose whether to amend the North Carolina Constitution to safeguard citizens' right to hunt, fish and harvest wildlife.

If Senate Bill 677<https://www2.ncleg.net/BillLookup/2017/S677> passes the House of Representatives, voters will consider the constitutional amendment on the November 2018 ballot. Twenty-one other states already guarantee this right in their constitutions. Hunting and fishing are integral parts of North Carolina's heritage, economy and conservation efforts. I believe that North Carolinians deserve to have their voices heard when it comes to protecting these rights and I am confident voters will be eager to ensure that North Carolina remains a sportsman's paradise for future generations.

Voters Could Choose Merit System to Fill Judicial Vacancies Between Elections Under Proposed Constitutional Amendment Voters would have an opportunity to amend North Carolina's Constitution this fall to implement a non-partisan, merit-based system to fill judicial vacancies between elections, under a constitutional amendment proposed Wednesday.

If Senate Bill 814, the Judicial Vacancy Sunshine Amendment, <a href="https://www2.ncleg.net/BillLookUp/2017/s814">https://www2.ncleg.net/BillLookUp/2017/s814</a> becomes law, voters will consider a constitutional amendment on the November 2018 ballot that would:

Empower the people of the state to nominate candidates to fill judicial vacancies.

Authorize a non-partisan merit commission, appointed by the Chief Justice, the governor and the General Assembly, to evaluate those nominees and rate them based on their professional qualifications and merit.

Direct the General Assembly to review the qualified nominees submitted by the nonpartisan commission and forward at least two nominees to the governor for consideration.

Provide that the governor will appoint the nominee he or she considers most qualified to serve a provisional judicial term.

Require the appointed judge to stand for election following the governor's appointment in order to continue holding the judicial ofce.

The Judicial Vacancy Sunshine Amendment would not change the process for regular judicial elections. But it would end the practice of patronage judicial appointments like WRAL's report of former Gov. Bev Perdue's appointment of three of her employees to judgeships on her last day in office<a href="https://www.wral.com/outgoing-nc-governor-appoints-4-new-judges/11929263/">https://www.wral.com/outgoing-nc-governor-appoints-4-new-judges/11929263/</a>.

After various House and Senate committees spent months - including dozens of hours of public hearings - considering the issue of how North Carolina selects its judges, it was clear to us that North Carolinians want to elect their judges, and that they want a transparent and accountable process for selecting judges. The current process of filling judicial vacancies has no transparency or accountability whatsoever, with governors placing whomever they want on the bench. This amendment fixes that broken system and ensures that vacancies are filled based on candidates' qualifications, rather than their political connections.

Senate Overrides Governor's Vetoes

The General Assembly this week voted to override Gov. Roy Cooper's politically motivated vetoes of two bills -Senate Bill 486<a href="https://www.ncleg.net/Sessions/2017/Bills/Senate/PDF/S486v4.pdf">https://www.ncleg.net/Sessions/2017/Bills/Senate/PDF/S757v6.pdf</a>, which tightens election security measures to protect against the threat of outside influence and Senate Bill 757<a href="https://www.ncleg.net/Sessions/2017/Bills/Senate/PDF/S757v6.pdf">https://www.ncleg.net/Sessions/2017/Bills/Senate/PDF/S757v6.pdf</a>, which makes changes to judicial districts in four counties.

Senate Bill 486 protects the state's elections from outside interference by implementing a number of security measures. It requires criminal record checks for election officials with access to sensitive materials and forbids any voting system used in an election to be connected to a network, both of which were suggested by the bipartisan NC State Board of Elections and Ethics Enforcement.<a href="http://www.newsobserver.com/opinion/op-ed/article201289749.html">http://www.newsobserver.com/opinion/op-ed/article201289749.html</a> Additionally, it prohibits a new party from selecting a candidate who was on a primary ballot in that year for another party and lost.

Although we shouldn't be surprised at this point by Gov. Cooper's continued willingness to put his personal political interests over the interests of the citizens of our state, I was still disappointed that he was willing to jeopardize the security of elections in our state by vetoing Senate Bill 486. Making sure that our elections are secure, so the public can have confidence in the outcome is of the utmost importance and I am happy that we were able to override his vetoes and strengthen the integrity of our elections.

#### NCSSM Morganton Update

A new second campus of the North Carolina School of Science and Math (NCSSM) is being built in western North Carolina. Although located in Morganton in western North Carolina, and perhaps having heightened appeal to students and families from the region, it will serve junior and senior high school students from the entire state. Once the school opens in fall of 2021, each student applying can specify his or her first and second preference as to either the new Morganton or older, existing Durham campus. Students accepted will be residents on campus for their last two years of high school. Each school will operate under the control of the University of North Carolina Board of Governors.

The new Morganton campus is now in the planning phase with two steering committees whose primary focus is to actively engage communities and individuals from across the greater western part of the state. These committees include representatives from UNC, community colleges and K-12 education as well as from state and local governments, business and industry.

The External Engagement Steering Team is tasked with raising \$5 million for a 1:3 match with a \$15 million appropriation which we in the legislature approved in June. The additional \$20 million, along with funds approved by state voters in the statewide NC Connect Bond issue, will go towards building the full Morganton campus as laid out in the approved master plan. With funding needs met, the project should be completed in 2021 and a first class of 150 students admitted in August 2021.

A second team is Campus Operations. It has two main charges. First is to advise on "nuts and bolts" issues- such as schematic designs, business procedures and school infrastructure. The second focus is another form of community outreach and engagement. This involves building partnerships with businesses and industries that may provide internships or lab experiences for students. It will also include promoting collaboration and campus recognition for the new Morganton campus with other educational institutions in our region of the state.

Currently, things are ahead of schedule. When the campus is operational, I am confident it will be a great asset. More of our best students will access a rigorous education to prepare for the "high tech" careers of the future and without having to move to Durham.



door." (Genesis 19:9)

The response of the people of Sodom to Lot when he attempted to protect his guests from the immorality of the



city is very revealing — and unfortunately very typical of our own age.

The residents of Sodom said about Lot: "already he is acting like a judge." Perhaps you have heard this kind of response before? Perhaps you have uttered it? It is so often the response of the worldly person to any-

one who confronts them

about their sin: they claim that the person is "judging"! But think about WHO is saying it here: people who were clearly sinning, and who very shortly, in fact, experienced the fiery judgment of the Almighty! In light of this passage:

— If someone accuses you of "judging", don't take it to heart. Know that was exactly what SODOM said about a righteous person too.

— Don't be quick to pull out the "you're judging!" card yourself, lest you be found responding just as the sinners of Sodom did! It is self-condemning!

— And don't be so afraid of others saying it about you, that you back down and start compromising with the standards of the world around you. You don't have to be a very discerning judge to see that it's becoming a lot more like Sodom every day.

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

### About Gale

For over 20 years, Gale was the victim of unspeakable abuse by her partner.

Almost immediately he isolated her from everyone. He was charming at first, but all the while he was grooming her to "be his." She soon realized that he was possessive, domineering, controlling....not to mention mentally and physically abusive.

Early in their relationship, the first abuse was at a

bonfire. He was ready to leave, but he was drunk, and Gale wouldn't give him the car keys. He punched her in the face, knocked her to the ground, and wrestled the keys from her. Afterwards, his father told him: Boy, you've sure got one now!

Don't get me wrong: Gale was no shrinking violet who just "took it." She fought back, but when she did, there was hell, hell, hell to pay. The abuse was

Not too long afterwards, he shoved her down the hall so hard that her arm went through the window, which resulted in stitches in three places.....all because he was in a foul mood. Gale lied to the hospital, telling them she tripped over her dog. Let me explain, he used threats against her beloved, loyal dog, Sparkplug, to manipulate and control her.

Once, they were at a family Thanksgiving dinner/reunion. She was surrounded by his family when he came from the kitchen, walked straight to her.....in front of everyone....and slapped her so hard that her face snapped to the side, and she heard a loud pop in her neck. Gale asked his aunt to please drive her home. The entire side of her face was bruised....which was highlighted by his hand print. Since then, she's been hard of hearing in that ear and has had ongoing neck prob-

Another gruesome time, Gale was too late coming home from work for his liking. He beat her with a Mag Flashlight, which busted her eyebrow open. When she finally wrestled the flashlight from him, he shoved her through the window. The glass cut her leg in two places deep enough to actually see the bone. He wouldn't let her go to the hospital or seek medical treatment, and he callously told her he didn't care if she bled to death. All she could do was elevate her leg, pour peroxide on her wounds, and wrap her knee in toilet paper, then put duct tape around her knee to pull those her deep gashes back together. She still has the

Fast forward to a camping trip to Pisgah National Forest. He thought they could make a new start in the mountains, and things between them would be much better. He quickly reverted to his typical abusive self; he immediately forbade her to make friends, let alone even talk to other campers. She endured this for nearly three months....cooking on a dirt fire pit, washing clothes in a creek, and living in an old small tent. He gathered old, almost rotten fruit from a dumpster behind a grocery store for food. He was too lazy to get a job. They filled jugs of water from faucets in the public restrooms.

Having grown tired of the camping life, he wanted to go back home.....BUT! They had no money for gas. He forced her to call her elderly mother for gas money. Money in hand, he told Gale he planned to kill her, cut her up in little pieces, then throw her over the ridge. He told her nobody would care, nobody would even look for her. His plan was to drive her car almost home, then ditch it somewhere, and tell everyone she left him in the mountains.

Then he tried to kill her with a steel pipe, splitting her eye open. Gale ran around the car, trying to avoid his wrath. Just by happenstance, a Park Ranger drove up and witnessed him brutalizing her with the steel pipe. Upon Gale's statement, plus the Ranger's eyewitness, her abuser was promptly arrested and taken to jail in Asheville. That was the very last time Gale and her faithful companion, Sparkplug, had any form of contact with her monster.

Thankfully, because this happened on Federal Land, he was sentenced and served 6 years in a Federal Penitentiary. Otherwise, had it happened somewhere else, because of NC State law, he would have maybe been locked up for maybe 90 days - maximum.

Having nowhere to go, Gale and Sparkplug made their way to Mitchell County SafePlace....one of the only four shelters in North Carolina to accept pets.

Years later, Gale found herself in yet another abusive situation while trying to help her daughter. As things worsened and became unbearable, Gale reached out to Associate Director and Advocate Extraordinaire, Tracy Black. Gale had to sneak text messages to Tracy, lest they find out.


Below is an excerpt of some of her desperate texts, and how SafePlace and Tracy got her to safety:

Gale: Hey Tracy, So glad you still love & care about me. I am really alone & hopeless now. I'm very isolated & in need of help. I can't often use this phone even tho it is mine...... They are going to the beach this coming whend. I'm gonna try to call or write to fill you in. Please Tracy, you are the only one I feel I can trust or turn to......I'll try to keep this phone if I can. Please let me call you. They can't know I'm telling you anything. I'll pay dearly if they know I'm trying to get help. I'll call you.

Tracy: Write me at PO Box 544 Spruce Pine NC 28777. Of course I still love you. Time and distance doesn't change that!!! Call me anytime!

Gale: PS I Love you too.

Tracy: You let me know what you need to do and I'll try to make it happen! Gale: I've cried & hurt sooo much thinking of how much you & everyone there helped me. And how I just left & feel I let you all down. I'm crying now, Tracy, I'm so sorry & I love all of y'all. You were closer to me than my own family & it hurts me so much when I think of how I let you down. Please forgive me. I've regretted leaving so very much. Spruce Pine was home to me more than anywhere I've ever been. I've been abused now in ways I didn't realize could happen. I



2 to 3 yrs. My daughter has a man friend He's a control freak, a hateful one. Hates me when I take up for her, I'm clean & sober. No probation now. But they use drugs, cocaine. pills, whatever. He has friends and family in law enforcement here. They have the same probation officer. They're all tight close. He gets away with a lot. So does she. He says if I call the law out here on him he'll say I pushed him & stole from him. Hence I get locked up. Nobody here to set bail for me. He wants to get rid of me and take over this trailer. She sides with him. He supplies her habit. My heart has been shattered by my daughter. She does what he says. Steals from me, abuses me as does he. I've tried everything. She's on the lease agreement. He's her guest. Legally there's nothing I can do. He's done so much to in happier times. ruin me mentally physically and financially. I

pay all the bills & get all the pain. I stay in my room to keep from arguing. They tried to move me to the shed outside 2 months ago. I have no rights here without a fight. I can't even keep my food in the kitchen.

Tracy: Stop your crying there's time for that later. Right now we need to figure out what to do next. Do you want to come home?

Gale: I have never felt so unloved. I truly want to leave here. Before I really get

Gale: Thank you Tracy. Thank you so much. I've got to wait until this weekend while they are gone. If they find out their meal & house tickets are leaving there

will be a fight. I have to find a way to Fayetteville too. 30 miles away from here. I'm coming home tho, if I have to walk. At least I'll be with those I love & love me. I do love you.

Tracy: You let me know what day you want to leave there and I'll have a ticket waiting for you at the bus station. Love you too

Gale: Tracy, Can you get me a bus ticket for tomorrow out of



Sparkplug, a gentle giant.

Fayetteville? I would be ever so grateful & I will not let you down ever again. Love, Gale

Tracy: I'll go into the office in a bit and see what I can do. I'll text you back around 11. Okay?

Gale: Alright, see if everyone is still mad with me too if you can. I'll do all I can to make it up to them. I'm truly sorry for the wrong I've done. I'll be waiting for your answer. Thank you my friend.

Tracy: No one is mad at you, just worried.

Gale: I'm sorry anyway.

Tracy: Your ticket is purchased. You leave Fayetteville on Sunday at 12:45 and get to Asheville at 8:30. Pick up ticket at station in your name, password is spark-

Tracy: Shoot me a text when you get on the bus. Call me when it's safe to do

Gale: OK I will. Just confirmed my ride to the station.

The wonderful folks at Mountaineer Inn in Asheville put Gale in a room right beside their office. Realizing Gale would be hungry, the office manager stocked her room with fruit. Tracy ordered Pizza Hut delivery for her, and the manager covered the Pizza.....and never charged us for it.

The long road to a happy ending -

When Gale got to our shelter, she weighed 97 lbs., was gaunt, pale, and both traumatized and relieved. After several weeks of recovery and nurturing care and encouragement by our advocates, Gale was finally ready to branch out. She found an adorable apartment within walking distance of everything. We found her a sewing machine at our thrift store so she could use her seamstress talents and make a little money. She's gained weight, her face has filled out and finally has her color back.....and she's anxious to share her story in hopes of giving others hope. And, she's a regular fixture at SafePlace. All in all, Gale's finally in a good place.....and that's a good thing!

### Mitchell Yancey Substance Abuse Task Force

Dealing Effectively with Addictions By Schell McCall, PATH Executive Director Mitchell and Yancey Counties

At the July 10th meeting of the Mitchell Yancey Substance Abuse Task Force at the Mauzy Phillips Center in Spruce Pine, members were treated to a special presentation by Dr. Michael Newberry, MD. Dr. Newberry is a practicing Psychiatrist known especially for his research and work in the area of addictions. Among several insights were his contention that addictions must be treated as diseases that in-



dividuals develop, rather than as choices that they make. Helping to prevent addiction diseases, especially with mental health interventions is critical. He pointed out that, since at least 90% of addicted individuals relapse, detoxification must be considered a first step, followed by other immediate treatments.

The Task Force was congratulated by Elizabeth Flemming, Program Director of the Rural Pain Management and Substance Use Disorders Initiative of MAHEC (Mountain Area Health Education Center) as being a model for other communities with its demonstrated successes and inclusive membership which includes two counties, government leaders, law enforcement, education, health professionals, community citizens, business people, and faith community representatives.

On her twenty-third birthday she decided to take her own life. Before ending it all, she wrote letters to her family and her close friends, and she even wrote a letter to God.

Miraculously, at the very time she was writing

these letters, the telephone rang. The person calling had dialed a wrong number, but he immediately sensed Anna's distress. He began to gently encourage her and present her with hope. Then he invited her to some evangelistic meetings that Mark was holding close by her home. Anna came desiring a new life and longing to be healed from her brokenness. She came longing for the pain and hurt within to go away.

Anna sat spellbound as Mark talked about how, in Christ, we're valuable; in Christ we're loved; in Christ we're accepted; in Christ we can be made whole. Anna confronted her self-talk. She confronted the lies swirling around in her head. She accepted the truth that in Christ's eyes she was valuable. The lie that had imprisoned her unraveled.
