Forgiveness...a Sweet Fragrance

We entered the sanctuary of the church and immediately breathed in the sweet fragrance of the Easter Lilies. Not only was the air scented, but even the graceful, pure white blossoms seemed to invite joyful praise.

While celebrating the glorious resurrection of Jesus Christ, we can't forget the forgiveness of

Good Friday. Without the excruciating pain of Friday's betrayal and unforgiveness by the mobs, we wouldn't have the Sunday celebration of the empty tomb.

Forgiveness was the hallmark of Good Friday and made it 'good' for all who would believe in Jesus Christ's finished work on the cross; past, present, and future.

From the cross, Jesus cried, "Father forgive them for they don't know what they are doing," Luke 23: 34 NLT. As he shed his blood in our place, he opened the way to forgiveness and restoration; deliverance and hope.

Even the thief on the cross recognized him as the only way to eternal life and asked Jesus to remember him when he came into his kingdom. And Jesus replied (vs. 43), "I assure you, today you will be with me in paradise."

And then we come to the empty tomb.

It does not smell of death. It is pulsing with fragrant life. He who overcame sin and conquered death have burst forth offering us the gift of new life in him.

Forgiveness is costly. But in Colossians 3: 13 NLT we are reminded, "Make allowance for each other's faults, and forgive anyone who offends you. Remember, the Lord forgave you, so you must forgive others."

A saying attributed to Mark Twain says it superbly. "Forgiveness is the fra-

grance the violet sheds on the heel that has crushed it."

I like to imagine deep purple violets and pure white lilies miraculously blooming as Jesus walked out of the tomb. With open hands and hearts, let's spread the fragrance of His forgiveness and joy.

Extravagantly given forgiveness results in joyful praise.

He has risen. He has risen indeed! Selah

Bringing financial crises on a level not seen in America since the Great Depression. There is panic, fear, and delusion touching every home around me. Don't misunderstand me. Let's not lose our savor or be extinguished because of fear. There are many seeking the answer's that you and I have through a saving relationship with Jesus. Let's remember the words of God, "fear not."

Fear Not!

Wow! Things sure have changed since last month! Our nation has experienced a series of rapid changes from travel restrictions, gathering restrictions, foodservice has gone to take out and delivery only, and many grocery stores are out of stock on many things, etc. These new restrictions have caused many churches to cancel services and strive to minister through social media and online sources. Last night I was so restless with the decisions that needed to



be made about my church. We want to minister to people's spiritual needs while at the same time honor our president's request to be sure we are doing our part to help stop the spread of this virus. My advice to you is to support these decisions that pastor's and church leaders have had to make. It's not an easy one and it is even harder when others are putting pressure on you one way or the other.

One thing that has stood out to me through all of these concerns and changes that have taken place is how people have reacted in fear and panic. Panic buying of food and supplies, to be honest, has taken me by surprise. Toilet paper is the big purchase, which I've not figured out yet. To me, if one was low on food, that would be the first thing to purchase. Cleaning supplies followed and then on to the food. The problem that arises from this panic purchasing is it makes it hard on everyone else, especially the elderly who only go shopping every so often and on those who may be less fortunate financially. When folks react this way out of fear, it makes it harder for everyone else. Imagine how smooth things would have gone for everyone had many not allowed the spirit of fear to control them, especially those who are Christians. This behavior shows that we are selfish and only looking out for ourselves. It breaks our Savior's command to love our neighbor as ourselves.

Fear has a way of causing us to make rash and chaotic decisions if we aren't careful. Fear can take control of people completely which leads to folks losing common sense! There's a verse that I've been sharing repeatedly since all this began that needs to repeated, memorized, quoted, written down, and read over and over again! It's from 2 Timothy 1:7: "For God hath not given us the spirit of fear; but of power, and of love, and of a sound mind."

Paul was writing to young Timothy. This would be Paul's last letter before he would lose his life for preaching the Gospel of Jesus. Timothy would be left without his mentor and friend. No longer would he have Paul to encourage, teach, and challenge him in his walk with Christ and call to preach the Gospel of Jesus. He was exhorting Timothy to not allow the spirit of fear to control him. Obviously, this spirit of fear was not from God and was sent to hinder Timothy's ministry. You see, fear of what might happen will stop what should happen. How many times have we allowed this kind of fear to hinder us from doing what we should do? Not only that, but fear can cause people to do things out of panic that they shouldn't do (such as hoarding food & fighting at the supermarket). It causes people to react in ways that are not the way the Lord would want us to behave.

Paul reminded Timothy and us, that here is what God has given us through His Holy Spirit that indwells us who are believers. We need to remember these truths when we are faced with seasons in life that Satan uses to stir up the spirit of fear in us and keep us from trusting Jesus.

#1. We've been given the spirit of power. This is the power or strength to act, the freedom of action, or the right to act. Through Christ and the Holy Spirit, we have been given the freedom to act and do what God wants us to do. Fear tries to hinder us from that. Fear makes us weak spiritually, but God gives us the power to trust, to act, to serve, to behave, to speak the truth, etc.

#2. We've been given the spirit of love. I believe Paul is reminding us that when fear attacks, remember how much we are loved by God. Even during troubling times, His love for us does not change. Fear tries to strip us of that comfort. 1 John 4:18 states this: "There is no fear in love: but perfect love casteth out fear; because fear hath torment. He that feareth is not made perfect in love." The weapon to combat fear is love. Reminding ourselves in scripture, prayer, worship, etc., that God loves us and commands us to love others. When we react in His love, love casts out fear!

#3. We've been given the spirit of a sound mind. The phrase "of a sound mind" here means "a calm and well-balanced mind with discipline and self-control". Basically, Paul is saying that the Holy Spirit gives us the wisdom to make sound decisions when circumstances come into our lives that the devil tries to use to stir up fear. The wisdom of God through the Holy Spirit will help us make wise choices during a time of trouble. Knowledge is what we know. Wisdom is how we use what we know to benefit ourselves, those around us, and most importantly, bring glory to our Savior Jesus! We can have a lot of knowledge but not have the wisdom to use it to our benefit. Imagine how different things would be now if people would have used a little wisdom during this time in our nation instead of allowing fear to cause confusion.

Some advice I would personally like to leave you with. Turn off the news! Get the info you need but don't sit in front of the TV for hours. The media counts on that to cause people to react in fear so they'll have even more stories to cover. Intentionally spend time in God's Word and prayer. This is something we all should have been doing already. If you haven't, it's a great time to start. Prayer and study will help stop fear from influencing our attitude and actions. Last, of all, let's do our part to help. Whether you agree with all the decisions that have been made that have caused us to have to change a lot of our plans, let us be seen by the world as Christians who are trying to help things get back on track. Our president and government are not asking us to stop believing, praying, preaching, worshipping, etc., they are simply asking us to do our part to help ourselves and those around us. Serve others, help the elderly, stop hoarding food (selfishness), stay calm, and make wise decisions to protect yourselves, your family, and those

around you. We may have to minister in different ways but that's ok. I will be preaching on my Facebook page. That's new to me but I'm going to use this opportunity to spread the hope of Jesus.

I believe that God will get us through this like He has other things we have faced before. When we react in fear as Christians, we are basically telling the world that WE don't even trust God! Let us have faith and not fear! Let us be a testimony to the world around us to "FEAR NOT!"



- Crisis opens them up to having conversations about Christ. Lost and hurting people aren't asking theological questions. They aren't waking up and saying, "Oh no, I am going to hell." They are waking up and saying, "Oh no, I am going through hell." We don't ignore theology, but we have realized that it isn't the doorway to begin the discussions about Jesus. Start with felt need and introduce them to the One who can meet it.
- They are not asking the right questions, but you can help them: Most in the younger generations aren't "seekers." They aren't asking the right questions. But, with the right content, you can crawl behind their mask and encourage them to consider truly meaningful things.

The Potter And The Clay

"The Lord God formed man of the dust of the ground and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life, and man became a



In Biblical days, back in the Old Testament, the people had one kind of container that served a host of purposes: it was a clay jar or pot. If they needed a different size, they simply made or purchased the size clay jar or pot needed. All were made of the same material dirt (clay), and water. The image of a potter and clay is recorded frequently in Scripture beginning in Genesis 1:7. God actually shaped and made Adam from the clay (dirt), the dust of the earth and breathed life into him. Adam became a living soul being a human.

Look at the Scripture, 2 Corinthians 4:7. Paul referred to our bodies as earthen vessels, made of the earth, shaped and molded similarly as a clay vessel may be shaped and molded. We are the clay in the hands of the Potter, acknowledging God's handiwork as the Master Potter, creator of our physical body. It is the authority of God to shape us inwardly, to spiritually fashion us into a vessel to be fit for His use in our servanthood and discipleship to His Glory. God wants to form us to be a vessel unto honor, sanctified and fit for our Master's use, and prepared for His good work (Reference 2 Timothy 2:21; also read Job 10:9 and Isaiah 29:16, 45:9). God is the Divine Potter and humanity is the clay. An expression of God's Sovereignty over all people and our need to yield to His divine plan to find a purpose for which we have been made.

Our life rests in God's hands! Like a skilled potter, God knows how to apply accurately the pressure, when to relax His grip, how to embrace and push gently – all of which gets our attention and increases our fitness as a vessel for His use. At times God, our Master Potter, places us in the kiln or furnace where the fires of life turn us into stronger vessels. God permits trials in life as a tool in the skillful hands of our Master Potter to mature, develop, and conform us into the image of Christ according to His purpose and plan (Reference Romans 8:28-29).

God, who is our Heavenly Father, uses the events we encounter each day as tools to shape and sculpt our life, to deepen our faith, to develop within us a quality of perseverance, and to make us containers of His love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control; which is, in reality, the fruit of the Spirit (Reference Galatians 5:22-23). Experiencing pressure, we can visualize the skillful hands of our Divine Potter using it for the good in life. Trusting our life to God, we can echo the prayer of Isaiah: 64:8; "But now, O Lord, thou art our Father; we are the clay, and thou our Potter; and we are the work of thy hand." Jeremiah 18:1-6

A Potter retrieves clay usually from a clay bank which sometimes is enclosed or covered with a structure. The bank is dirty, dark and smelly. In Bible times the potter felt for the right consistency of clay to be used with great care. He didn't just take any clay. He spent a great deal of time choosing the exact clay he wanted. Think of the time this took and the dirt he had to sift through to find the clay. Now think of the horrible pit from which we were drawn when our Master Potter came looking for us, He found us filthy with our sins. "He brought me up also out of a horrible pit, out of the miry clay, and set my feet upon a rock, and established my goings" (Psalms 40:2). God had to exercise endless love and patience with many of us as we resisted His Spirit's call to Salvation. His grace and mercy extended down into that horrible pit and gave us the gift of Salvation. He didn't turn away from the dirty, sinful place where He found us!

With infinite care, the potter kneads and molds the clay. He searches out and removes any impurities. This reminds us of our spiritual lives. God turns the spotlight of His Holy Spirit on our lives and points out areas of impurities that need to be removed. The process can be painful but is necessary for us to be useful to God's service. We must be open and receptive to the Holy Spirit as He instructs us in areas we need to remove from our life. (Reference John 14:21, 23-24). Only as we surrender to God and allow Him to clean out the impurities from our lives will we become vessels fit for our Master's use.

The potter forms the clay as he begins to turn it. As the lump spins on the potter's wheel his hands shape the clay. As the potter works the clay, he may push it down and start over. He will do this until the vessel is formed to his liking. And sometimes the potter will completely change direction and make the vessel quite different from what he started to make. The potter may take the broken piece of clay and make an exquisite vessel from it. As the masterpiece is finished, he looks upon it with great pleasure.

Sometimes we know the area God (the Potter) is trying to change in our lives, but because of our stubbornness, He is not able to make us useful in His service as He would like. We need to allow God's Spirit to work and shape our lives. We need to develop a sensitivity to the Spirit's voice in our lives. We need to listen for His direction and obey Him when He instructs us in His Will. God is a specialist in taking broken, ruined clay vessels and making precious vessels out of them. The secret lies in our confession, repentance, and submission to Him.

After the potter is finished the unfired vessel is placed on a shelf for drying. The vessel will break and be useless if it is fired before it has properly dried. In relation, sometimes we experience times of dryness in our spiritual lives. God can use these times to prepare us for greater service. It is important we rest and keep pursuing God's Will. If we persist, God can use our dry times to build maturity into us and increase our usefulness to Him. We should be patient and look forward too many wonderful blessings being prepared for us in our eternal life.

Today some of us are in God's furnace filled with trial and heartache. But God, the Master Potter, is perfecting and refining you into a beautiful vessel. (Reference 1 Corinthians 10:13). Allow Him to wrap His arms of comfort around you, as we all should, and lean on His everlasting arms of His mercy allowing Him to make you a vessel fit for His use. (Reference Isaiah 40:31).


After the firing of the vessel, it is ready for use. The potter makes the vessel as

he sees fit. The clay that yields to the potter's touch brings happiness and satisfaction, a source of joy to the potter. Just as those of us that yield to God allowing Him to cleanse the impurities from our lives, and surrender to His Will, will be a source of joy and pleasure to our Master Potter. God, the Master Potter, is calling each of us to yield to Him so He can shape us into beautiful vessels to be used in His Kingdom.

For we are a chosen potter's vessel unto God, a vessel made unto honor, sanctified and made worthy of God's use, and prepared by God that we may be thoroughly furnished to do His good works. Our wounds are healed and become scars that tell a story.



I was privileged to serve for twenty-one years in the Army Reserves. Fifteen of those years as a member of the NC Army National Guard. At the ripe 'old age' of 17, my father drove me to the Recruiter's office and waited for me to "volunteer" for service. I had become part of what is known as the "All-Volunteer" Force. I admit that I was


powerless in the face of my father's demand. 'Volunteer' was what you might say was a "relative term" ...

They are known by the name, "Volunteer".

Some come to teach, some to preach, all to encourage. The Truth is that they come freely, giving of their time, talents and testimonies. They come in response to a call, and they come issuing a call. They challenge those they serve to grow

and to become the very best versions of themselves. When one sees it happening, one can hardly resist being moved.

I have witnessed this reality many times. Volunteers are compelled to come and share their knowledge, their talents and their wisdom with those who are cut off from these opportunities as a result of their incarceration. These volunteers



arrive from a variety of places and bring a broad spectrum of experiences with them. They undergo training to gain access to the institutions they enter. They agree to operate within the guidelines of the Department of Corrections. They come knowing that they might have a room full of men to share with or just a few men. Still, they enter the gates seeking to offer hope and wisdom. And they exit each time having left an imprint on those whom they offer their efforts.

At Avery Mitchell Correctional Institution we are blessed beyond measure through the men and women who come volunteering their time and energies in so many ways! And each year the volunteers who serve are recognized at an event honoring them for their service. A highlight of our year, the Volunteer Appreciation Banquet includes a guest speaker, refreshments, music, and inspiring words from select offenders whose lives have been positively affected by our volunteers' service. It never fails to be a meaningful time.

What may seem to be a total disaster to us can be used to give glory to God in ways that are totally beyond our comprehension. When we are in the deepest depth of despair, God still has the reins. Maybe we, you and I, were born for such a time as this.

"For if thou altogether holdest thy peace at this time, then shall there enlargement and deliverance arise to the Jews from another place; but thou and thy father's house shall be destroyed: and who knoweth whether thou art come to the kingdom for such a time as this? Then Esther bade them return Mordecai this answer, Go, gather together all the Jews that are present in Shushan, and fast ye for me, and neither eat nor drink three days, night or day: I also and my maidens will fast likewise; and so will I go in unto the king, which is not according to the law: and if I perish, I perish." Esther 4:14-16 KJV

Maybe today is your day to shine, your day to touch a life for eternity, your day to be a shining example of what God put you on this earth to do. Maybe a Godordained meeting with someone that will change you and another person, open your mind and heart to the possibilities rather than the problems you may be facing. All things do work for good to those that love the Lord and are called to His purpose (Romans 8:28). Seek out the good and think on that, not the bad.

One day at a time, one life at a time and the willingness to be used as God sees fit is a critical part of being willing to serve. As many of you may know, and some may not, two years ago I was diagnosed with terminal leukemia and told I had months to live. Two weeks ago I went back to Duke to start my 24th round of chemo for three weeks, well past my projected life span. Now I cannot claim that this is a fun trip, but it is amazing how our God orchestrates things. Our first appointment was at 6:50 AM and we arrived at about 6:30 and set down to wait for the labs to open at 6:40 AM. We had just set down and another couple about our ages came in and set down beside us. In a few moments of conversation, we realized that they were in distress, their first trip after a serious diagnosis. To make a long story short, we were able to actually stand there in the lab and pray with them and share the gospel of Christ and His scriptures. Folks were looking at us kind of crazy but that was okay. Tears were streaming down all our faces. I say this to say that God has a purpose for each of us daily, I guess my purpose is to deal with chemo three weeks out of every five so I will be put in a spot to touch a life in some small way. Learning to rejoice in the trial is the greatest challenge, but the reward is so great. I tell you this not to bring glory to myself, but to make you aware of how God uses our situations to further His Kingdom if we are willing to be used. I have made the statement many times in the past two years that leukemia has been a life-changing blessing and I just pray that I am pliable enough to allow me to be molded to His purpose.

Now I am not suggesting that you pray for some critical illness to strike you, just that you be willing to accept His good and perfect will to equip you to better serve His purpose. We do not have to be pastor or Preacher, deacon or Sunday school

teacher, just be yourself and be conscious of the hurting folks around you. Be willing to unashamedly reach out and touch someone that is struggling in doubt and fear, be the voice of Jesus, and be the Bible that they may not have read.

As a side note, for the first time in two years all my blood levels came back in the normal range, some very low normal but normal any way, maybe, just maybe, God is honoring and thanking me for being willing to serve, not that he needs me to accomplish anything because he is all-powerful and can do it all, I sure don't know the answer to all those questions, and have no idea how long my days may be on this earth. I can only pray that He will say, well done good and faithful servant. Praying that I will have the courage to stand and be faithful in the face of adversity. I am telling you these things not to put me on a pedestal, but to hopefully give you faith that the Holy Spirit will give you the strength to say the right words and do the right things when you are presented with the opportunity, He promises us that he will.

When you are at your lowest point, search your mind, heart, and soul to find ways you can turn your challenges into an opportunity to serve, to make your challenge be a blessing to someone else, to lead another into the fold of everlasting life. Rather than having a pity party, throw a praise party

"And he that searcheth the hearts knoweth what is the mind of the Spirit, because he maketh intercession for the saints according to the will of God. And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to his purpose." Romans 8:27-28 KJV

"Rejoice evermore. Pray without ceasing. In every thing give thanks: for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning you." 1 Thessalonians 5:16-18 KJV

Don't get angry with God over your challenges, trust His good and perfect will, search for a purpose to bring glory to Him through your struggles. Ask the Holy Spirit to lead you and show you the way, the truth and the life that is promised, you and those around you will be blessed!

Who is in your boat? The waves and storms will come, sickness, death, disappointment, and tragedy are a part of life. The comforting thing for us Christians is that when we have Jesus in our boat, then the Master of the seas has control, all you have to do is to call on him, wake him up as the disciples did, all you need to do is trust and turn things over to Him. I know this sounds simplistic, and the amazing thing is that it really is, the challenging part is to have faith rather than fear. There is no way that both faith and fear can dwell together in your mind, one or the other will rule, you decide.

"And he was in the hinder part of the ship, asleep on a pillow: and they awake him, and say unto him, Master, carest thou not that we perish? And he arose, and rebuked the wind, and said unto the sea, Peace, be still. And the wind ceased, and there was a great calm. And he said unto them, Why are ye so fearful? how is it that ye have no faith?" Mark 4:38-40 KJV


The song "You'll Never Walk Alone" says it this way:

We started out in Barcelona and stayed there for two nights. We enjoyed the city and went to a couple of museums. We also enjoyed a bus tour of the city with no Americans on the bus that second day. At the hotel our last night we met a young couple from England on the hotel rooftop. We enjoyed the beautiful weather and view of the city. Little did we know that those two days in Barcelona would be the only days that would include our own plans. God had other plans for us. We already had reservations to leave Barcelona by train that Saturday morning and made our way to a beach area on the west coast of France so my husband could enjoy some surfing. When we arrived in Lacanau, France we found out, by messages from the young English couple, that they could not go in the streets or even leave the hotel in Barcelona. Police were making everyone go back inside if they saw anyone out on the streets. This is one of the many and obvious places we saw God working in our journey. We left Barcelona and got into France just in time for Barcelona to close their borders.

After we got settled in our rental we went out for a meal and found a little restaurant where we met some local surfers. They let us know that at midnight that night France ordered that only necessary services/shops could stay open, like groceries, pharmacies, and doctors. We woke up each morning praying for guidance from God to let us know we when needed to leave. That morning we left our rental to walk on the beach and saw people everywhere. Even though restaurants and shops were closed people were out enjoying life at the beach. It was a beautiful sunny day.

Because of the closings, surf shops were also closed. We went back to our rental and decided to do some organizing of our packed clothes and other things. While doing this my husband slid the closet door open and guess what was in there? A wetsuit, just his size. We were not sure about a surfboard so I decided to contact our renter and ask him if he knew anyone that would be willing to rent a board. He replied that he was a surfer and that my husband was more than welcome to use his board. See how God not only cares about our safety and protection but he also wants us to be happy. He provided what we needed and more than we could have ever imagined during this time.

Because of the shutdown, we could not enjoy the museums and sites we had planned to see on this trip so that afternoon we strived to contact our airline to change our return trip home to an earlier flight. I logged onto my account with the airline and they had canceled our trip home with no notice, not even an email. I sent a message to them online, which was their choice of communication during all of the hype. I received an email saying it would be 8-10 days before we would hear from them. We immediately prayed for guidance on this but felt a sense of peace despite what we had just seen online. We did not expect an answer right away but knew that when it was his time, we would know what to do. The next morning, we woke up and I started looking for flights from Paris. We could not go or fly back out of Barcelona, as planned. We found a good price on tickets, so we decided to go ahead and buy the tickets.

We went for a walk after we bought the tickets and I was once again reminded of God's goodness and the fact that he protects us every step of the way. I found rocks with crosses on them as solid reminders that I could see and hold. It was his way of letting us know that we could trust his path for us on this trip. We never felt threatened by the virus or our situation. Our preacher sent this message to us after learning about some of the things we had already experienced God doing for us. "Remember two things: he is always with you (the rocks remind you of that) and do not be afraid (even of death-the cross reminds us of that)."

It is amazing what God can do during times that seem uncertain. Our blessings did not end on the coast. The transportation lines in France were starting to get canceled. Once again God got us out of the small town just in time. We also obtained an early train to Paris. It was a good thing that we arrived in Paris early that day because something else would happen to test our faith. We got off of the train and walked straight to our hotel which I had reserved the night before. When we arrived at the hotel there was a sign on the door stating that the government forced all hotels to close. As we stood there with our luggage in the street, we felt lost. We started walking down the small streets and saw very few people. We walked around a corner and saw another hotel. We saw people inside and the doors were open so we walked in. I asked the person who worked there if they had any rooms for the next two nights. He stated that he was sorry but that he was actually waiting for his last guests to leave, who were in the lobby, and that he had to close once they left. We walked back out into the street and had that small moment of fear that we might be sleeping on the streets that night. All of a sudden, a French man came around the corner and asked us if we were ok. My husband told him that we were not sure what to do because all of the hotels were closing. He spoke very good English and said, "Find a policeman, they will help you," My husband thanked him, and the man smiled and went on his way down the sidewalk. We walked toward the direction that the man had gone and found a fountain where we decided to sit and figure out our next step. We did not see the man again, he just

disappeared. We both know he was sent as a messenger from God.

Before our trip, I had a strong urge to buy a sim card for my iPhone so that I could use the hot spot if needed for work. I have never bought or used one overseas before. Little did I know that I would be using it next to find us a place to stay in Paris. Trust those intuitions when you feel him nudging you. As we sat on the fountain in this big city there were not many people around and a homeless man was sitting near us reading a book. Empty buses



were constantly coming and going in this small square. I turned on the hot spot on my phone so that I could get on my Airbnb account. I found places that were only two blocks away from us and messaged the owners to make sure they could rent the rooms to us right away. I received messages from two of the three immediately. We decided on one of the places and the owner let me know that someone would call me with directions on how to get into her place. I had not used the phone number with the sim card because it was a French number but thankfully it worked when the person called me. My battery was low on my phone and here is a place where God also showed his sense of humor despite the stressful situation. We arrived at the address the owner gave me for the apartment. The person who would give me directions called and gave me a code to get into the outside door of the building AND then a different code to get into a second entrance. We would take an elevator up to the 5th floor where we had to find a lockbox behind a door and then type in another code to get a key out that would open another door in that hallway. Inside that room, we had to find another lockbox (with another code) that would give us the key to our apartment, which was up another flight of stairs. Four different codes later we couldn't help but laugh once we got into the cute little apartment with a great view of the city and Eiffel Tower.

We stayed there for two nights. Outside of the building, there was a large group of policemen watching the streets since there were restrictions for locals. After we got settled in our rental we went outside. My husband asked one of the policemen for directions to the market/grocery store. He told us how to get there and saluted my husband with a smile when we left. They stayed outside our building day and night, which made us feel safe. That is what the messenger was telling us earlier that day when we did not know where to go.

Sometimes things do not go as planned. Europe was closing all around us yet God guided us in uncertain situations. He is always there whether we recognize it or not. We could also feel the prayers of loved ones back home. We had good food, comfortable beds and rest, good exercise, rare views of empty cities, great weather and reminders everywhere of his love for us during this trip. We also came home healthy and happy!

During this crisis, we cannot fear to live the life God gave us. Are we fearful and hiding because of the fear of sickness or death? Only God knows the plan for each of our lives. It is not for us to know or understand. I am not saying to go out and be "unsocially distant" but we cannot let fear take over our faith, joy, and trust in God. What does his plan for your life look like during this time? Ask him. Prayer can heal. You can find joy in the midst of all of this. God is committed to taking what we perceive as bad and using it for good. Trust Him. His way is the only way to follow during these uncertain times. We have proof! (Psalm 91: 1-4)

Do we still owe?

Dear Dave,

Should you still pay debts that are in collections, even if they have been dropped from your credit report? The one in question is from 2011, and I assume it isn't showing on the credit report anymore because it's nine years old. Sam



Dear Sam.

There are two good reasons to go back and deal with this debt. One, even if it's off your credit report, you may still legally owe the money. Even if the statute of limitations has run its course, things like this have a habit of popping up and causing problems at the worst possible times. About the time you decide to buy a home, this is liable to raise its head again and mess things up. So, the fact that something doesn't appear on a credit report doesn't mean you're not legally liable, or that they won't bother you about it later.

The second thing to think about is a simple matter of fact—you owe the money. Regardless of what the legal system or credit report says, you morally owe the money. I'd contact the creditor and begins negotiations to settle the debt. You might be able to reach an agreement where they'd accept less than the original amount owed. Regardless, get any type of settlement offer in writing. That way, you're truly cleaning up your life and getting rid of any financial skeletons in your closet! —Dave

The simple thing is the right thing

Dear Dave

I recently found out my former employer never stopped contributing to my health savings account (HSA). Apparently, this has been going on for about nine months, and they just sent me a form to sign so they can get the overpayment back. The amount totals a little over \$1,000, so should I sign the papers or is there another way to handle this? Ellie

Dear Ellie,

You know, if I were as incompetent as your former employer, I'd be too embarrassed to ask for the money back. But hey, the point is it's not your money. Sign the forms and let them take the money out. Keep an eye on your HSA balance, though, and make sure they take out the only amount they overpaid—not one penny more or less.

Keep it simple, Ellie. You didn't earn this money, and it wasn't expected or agreed upon. It was a mistake, so just do the right thing. Control the scenario and stay on top of this situation until everything is resolved correctly. —Dave

Protecting your assets

Dear Dave,

We live in Colorado, and we need some advice on protecting our assets. My wife is a teacher, and I'm a nurse. We make around \$180,000 a year combined, and we're set to pay off our home next month. We also have two teenagers who are both driving, so we were wondering about the best way to protect everything if one of them has an accident and we get sued, or something else tragic happens. Spencer

Dear Spencer,

With your income and the stage you're in when it comes to wealth building, I think it's time to add an umbrella policy. This is a liability policy, and you could

probably buy an extra million in liability coverage for around \$250 a year. It attaches to the liability policy that's already part of your homeowners and car insurance.

With a couple of teenage drivers in the house, it might run a little more than \$250, but I wouldn't think it would be much more if any. It would just add an extra million to the mix, just in case, someone decided they were going to come after you because of a bad situation.

As you continue building wealth later as if you get into real estate and start buying rental properties, make sure you put those in a limited liability company (LLC). You're not there quite yet, but it's always a good idea to plan ahead and do whatever you can to keep the size of the target on your back relatively small. — Dave

Control your own destiny

Dear Dave,

I have a pension plan that will pay me 80 percent of my top three highest years' income. Should I continue to invest 15 percent towards retirement? I will top out at \$79,000 yearly, and I plan on retiring in 28 years. Jordan

Dear Jordan,

You should always put 15 percent of your income into retirement once you reach Baby Step 4. I would never count on a pension as my only retirement income because the truth is many pension funds are very poorly managed.

You'll probably get the pension when the time comes. I'm not predicting it will go broke or anything like that, but there's no way I would leave the financial state of my retirement in other people's hands. That's exactly what you're doing when your plan is to count on a pension or Social Security. With Roth IRAs, 401(k)s and so forth, you're building wealth that you control.

You have to control the controllable, Jordan. There are plenty of things in our lives we have no control over whatsoever, but you have to take charge of the stuff you can control in order to win. Building wealth is one of those things! —Dave

The Resurrection

"Do not be afraid; for I know that you are looking for Jesus who has been crucified. He is not here, for He has risen, just as He said." Matthew 28:5-6 The fact of Jesus' resurrection is the climax of redemptive history and the essential basis of the Christian faith. Without the Resurrection, our Christian faith would just be a lot of wishful thinking, no



better than human philosophies and speculative religions. Our Savior's resurrection is truly of great importance in Christianity, so great that His being or not being the Messiah stands or falls with it: From its very early accounts, Scripture has contained the message of resurrection hope. Death has never been the end for the believer, but simply a gateway to eternal life in Heaven. Abraham was ready to sacrifice his only son Isaac because in faith "he considered that God is able to raise men from the dead" (Heb. 11:19). The Lord assured Daniel that believers "will awake ... to everlasting life" (Dan. 12:2). The Resurrection was the focal point of Christ's teaching to the disciples about His sufferings and death: "The Son of Man must suffer many things and be rejected by the elders and the chief priests and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again" (Mark 8:31). It is therefore completely understandable that Matthew and the other three Gospel writers all included a historical account of Jesus' resurrection in their narratives. Paul knew that without the Resurrection our salvation could not have been possible. He was also convinced that the truth of the Resurrection must be believed or else salvation cannot be received: "If you confess with your mouth Jesus as Lord, and believe in your heart that God raised Him from the dead, you shall be saved" (Rom. 10:9). It's no wonder that Paul, the other apostles, and every leader in the early church continually proclaimed Christ's resurrection as the culmination of His ministry. Those men were so captivated by the significance of the Resurrection that they could not help but preach it.

And that should be our attitude today. Thank God for the truth of John 1-1:25, which gives us the hope of resurrection in Jesus' own words. In 1 Corinthians 15, we have a living Lord (1–19). Jesus is alive, and the gospel message is true! Witnesses who saw Him have passed along their testimony to us. When you trust Him, you receive resurrection life, eternal life (John 5:24); death can hold you no more. We have a living hope (20–49). Jesus Christ will come again, and the dead in Christ will be raised. We will have glorified bodies like Christ's body (1 John 3:1–3). Keep in mind that resurrection is not reconstruction. God does not reassemble the original body that has turned to dust. Like flowers and fruit from the planted seed, the glorified body is related to the "planted" body but different from it. We have a living dynamic (50–58). We have no reason to give up because Jesus has conquered sin and death! If you believe in the resurrection and return of Jesus, verse 58 will characterize your life. The best is yet to come, so let us give Him our best now.

Do you want and need proof of Christ Resurrection? The Bible recorded fourteen appearing's of CHRIST after his Resurrection We find there are no less than fourteen recorded appearing's of Christ before Paul wrote to the Church of Corinth, and fifteen if we include Christ's manifestation to John in the Isle of Patmos. The fourteen appearing's are as follows; 1.To Mary Magdalene (John 20:14; Mark 16:9). 2. To the other women (Matt. 28:9). 3. To Peter (1 Cor. 15:5; Luke 24:34). 4. To the two disciples on their way to Emmaus (Mark 16:12,13; Luke 24:13-32). 5. The day He appeared to the disciples, in the absence of Thomas (John 20:19-24). 6. To the disciples when Thomas was present (John 20:24-29). 7. To Galilee, at the sea of Tiberias, to Peter, John, Thomas, James, Nathanael, and two others (John 21:1-14). 8. To the disciples on a mount in Galilee (Matt. 28:16). 9. To more than five hundred brethren at once (1 Cor. 15:6). 10 To James the apostle (1 Cor. 15:7). 11. To all the apostles assembled together (1 Cor. 15:7). 12. To all the apostles at His ascension (Luke 24:50,51; Acts 1:9,10). 13. To Stephen, when he was being stoned to death (Acts 7:56). 14. To Paul (1 Cor. 15:8; Acts 9:3-5; 22:6-10). Such a mass of evidence attesting any given fact would be accepted as proof positive as to its validity in any court of justice. Phil 4:23







Me: "Yeah, what's that?"


Doug: "If they don't die beforehand, that will be some mighty sweet-tasting BBQ next fall!"

New Dimensions Charter School

Unprecedented Times

We are certainly living in unprecedented times. During my lifetime, I have never known a time when all schools in North Carolina were closed by order of the Governor. I do remember the schools in Avery County being closed for a month due to snow during my senior year, but this is on another level.



Closing schools for at least two weeks due to executive order 117 leaves us with many questions and concerns as a community. Some information about schools in North Carolina was provided on March 14 by the Governor's office and the Department of Public Instruction. Here are some issues and information to consider:

- 1. Class Time the requirement for NC Public Schools is to have a minimum of 1,025 instructional hours. At this time, New Dimensions would have 1,060 instructional hours which would take into account the half days we have in the calendar, the two days we missed for inclement weather, the projected two weeks we will be closed and the full 6-day spring break that is scheduled. Thankfully, our extended school day has placed us in a good position unless the mandated closure is extended.
- 2. Online Learning plans are in place to provide opportunities for online learning for our students. We realize that this is not a perfect solution for all our students, but we will do the best we can. The primary objective will be to keep students actively engaged academically the best we can. Plans are being made to provide paper copies for students with no internet access. Also, for those that have access to Spectrum, families can get free internet access while school is closed. Work sent home must be practice exercises to help sustain academic achievement. At no time should home assignments be graded from a punitive approach and must only be used to help foster academic support. The staff at New Dimensions is using a variety of online platforms to reach students and their families.
- 3. Student Contact The New Dimensions Faculty and Staff is making sure every student/parent is contacted personally each day. To assist with this and online learning, students have been allowed to check out a school Chromebook to use at home
- 4. Field Trips and Athletics Until April 6, all field trips and athletics have been canceled or postponed. We are working with our travel agent to reschedule our middle school Washington trip. Grade levels are also attempting to reschedule field trips.
- 5. Our custodians are doing a tremendous job cleaning and disinfecting our school. They have worked tirelessly since we first received word of the coronavirus.

It is important to understand that we all play a role in reducing the likelihood of a coronavirus outbreak in our school community. We encourage everyone to practice good habits, including:

- Wash your hands regularly, especially after using the restroom and before preparing or consuming food. Wash for 20 seconds, using soap and water.
- Avoid coughing or sneezing into your hands or in the air. Always try to cough or sneeze into a tissue, and then throw the tissue away. If you don't have a tissue, cough/sneeze into your arm.
- As much as you can, avoid touching your eyes, mouth, and nose.
- If children are feeling sick, please keep them home from school. Allow them some time to feel better so that they do not risk infecting others.

All North Carolinians can better prepare for COVID-19 by getting up-to-date information directly from reliable sources like NCDHHS and the CDC. The COVID-19 outbreak has been accompanied by a global flood of misinformation from unreliable sources. Be thoughtful about what you read or hear about the virus and make sure you are separating rumor from fact before you act.

Again, thank you for your spirit of cooperation and your concern for our students. We continue to pray for those impacted by the Coronavirus and for our entire community.

Is God the Great Provider?

Are there times in your life that you wonder will God truly provide for you in a time of need?

We're going to have a look at another animal that God provided and continues to provide for.

Sparrows are mentioned in the Bible. There are many types

of sparrows, but we are going to take a look at the House Sparrow because they are very common and you more than likely have them around your house. I'm sure you have seen them before because they like people!

The house sparrow was brought to Brooklyn, New York in 1851 from Europe. They can be found all over North America except in upper Canada and Alaska. House sparrows live wherever there are people, you will not find them anywhere else (except for the group of house sparrows that live in the Central Asian Steppes who are more cautious around people). House sparrows are a small fat bird with a short tail along with a big head. These sparrows grow up to 16cm long and normally live up to 3 years except for a female that lived almost 16 yrs. in Texas. This widespread songbird makes a shrill monotone chirp. They are very noisy despite their tiny size. The house sparrow hops when not flying instead of walking on the ground and they love to take frequent dirt bathes.

House sparrows have a large variety of things they like to eat: grain, seed, livestock feed, ragweed, crabgrass, buckwheat, people food, especially pizza! Except for the house sparrows that live in Central Asia, house sparrows have

special genes that allow them to be able to eat starchy grains, that is why they love people food so much. In the summer they enjoy snacking on insects. The adult birds will also catch insects and feed them to their young in these months. Close to dark, you can see them hanging around lights hunting for bugs. They will also jump on insects in the air or behind mowers.

House sparrows build their nests out of rough dry vegeta-



tion, also grass, weeds, twigs, and trash. On the inside, they are lined with soft feathers or other soft materials such as paper or string. They will often reuse their nests and sometimes make small bird communities by building their nests beside each other. House sparrows will also make homes in birdhouses meant for other birds such as bluebirds. They will build nests in holes and cracks in houses and buildings.

These birds can have anywhere between 1-8 eggs at a time and up to 4 times a year. Their small eggs are white, bluish-white, or greenish-white with gray or brown spots. It takes 10-14 days for the babies to hatch. Both parents will take turns taking care of their young until they leave the nest in approximately 2 weeks.

In Bible days, there were a lot of sparrows in Israel. So many that you could buy them very cheaply. But God loved them so much that He made sure they had what they need to survive. He provides them with food, water, and shelter. "Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? Yet not one of them will fall to the ground outside your Father's care." Matthew10:29 NIV

We are even more cared for by God. If He is willing to care so much for a small bird that is common and doesn't mean much to people, how much do you think He cares for us? "Are not five sparrows sold for two pennies? Yet not one of them is forgotten by God. Indeed, the very hairs of your head are all numbered. Don't be afraid; you are worth more than many sparrows." Luke 12 6-7 NIV.

We are made in God's image, He loves us so much that He knows our every move, and even how many hairs we have on our head. Do you know how many hairs you have? There's no way! See if you can count them! I have tried but have lost count so many times!

God is omnipresent, meaning that He is everywhere at once. He can be with you when you are sick and at the same time be with a mother who is giving birth, who lives on the other side of the world!

God provided for the Israelites when they wandered in the desert for forty years. Did you know that their shoes and clothes never wore out? He sent them more than enough food to eat from heaven every day called manna and provided them water to drink. Do you think God loved them more than us? Or that He no longer cares for His people? Of course not! "So don't worry about these things, saying, 'What will we eat? What will we drink? What will we wear?' 32 These things dominate the thoughts of unbelievers, but your heavenly Father already knows all your needs." Matthew 6 31-32 NLT

There are many more examples and stories in the Bible of how God provided for his children over and over again. The biggest thing we can do is trust in God. Have faith that He will do the exact same thing for us because He loves us too. Do not be scared of what is going on around us and, in the world, today. If you are troubled, scared or need God to provide something for you, pray and ask God for it. "Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you. 8 For everyone who asks receives; the one who seeks finds; and to the one who knocks, the door will be opened." Matthew 7 7-8.

Did you know that God tells us not to be afraid in the Bible 365 times? That is one time for each day of the year. God wants you to know every day that He is in control and He will take care of you regardless of what is going on.

I want you to go outside when you wake up in the morning and watch for spar-

rows and other birds. What you will notice is this. The first thing birds do when they get up is singing to God, they are happy and thankful for each new morning, and don't have a care in the world. They are thankful for another day. You will also see them finding more than enough food to eat and water to drink. Last but not least, you will see many places for them to find shelter in the storm. There is a lot we can learn from birds.

So next time when you feel scared or wonder if God will provide for you remember that God said, "so don't be afraid; you are worth more than many sparrows" Matthew 10:31 NIV He loves all the sparrows and provides for them, and He loves all of us even more.

Dear Lord, I pray that you will be with each one of us. Help us cast all of our fears on You and trust that you will take care of what is worrying us. I pray that each one of us will have faith that You are our great provider who performs miracles, raises people from the dead, can feed and take care of the common sparrow, and who even knows everything about us down to the number of hairs on our head! I pray that we will solely rely on You for our every need! In Jesus's name, I pray, Amen!

Anyone Thirsty?

"Jesus said to her, 'Everyone who drinks of this water will be thirsty again, but those who drink of the water that I will give them will never be thirsty. The water that I will give will become in them a spring of water gushing up to eternal life.'" --- John 4:13-14

After Haiti's 2010 earthquake, a man survived for 14 days in the rubble thanks in part to a two-gallon jug of water nearby.

On May 10, 2013, rescuers pulled out a female survivor 16 days after a factory collapsed in Bangladesh. In the last two days, she had nothing but water and drank only a limited quantity to save it.

In May 2019, a woman survived after being lost in the Hawaiian jungle for 17 days. The 35-year-old physical therapist and yoga instructor hiked for seven days until she reached a waterfall, living on insects, wild berries, and stream water.

According to Randall Packer, an expert on the body's water balance at George Washington University, "Under extreme conditions, an adult can lose 1 to 1.5 liters of sweat per hour. If that loss is not replaced by drinking, the total volume of body fluid can fall quickly and, most dangerously, blood volume drops" (Maggie Fox, "Pulled from rubble after 16 days: Water secret to survival," nbcnews.com, 5/10/13).


Water is the best fluid for survival. And water is at the heart of today's text. The disciples have gone into the city to buy food, and Jesus, tired from his journey, stop to rest at Jacob's well, where he encounters a Samaritan woman who comes to the well to draw water. In contrast to the social norms of the day, Jesus initiates a conversation with her – a conversation about water. Unlike Nicodemus who comes to Jesus at night, this conversation takes place in the middle of the day for anyone to see.

Jesus is thirsty, so he asks the woman for a drink. She is confused and responds, "How is it that you, a Jew, ask a drink of me, a woman of Samaria?" (Jews do not share things in common with Samaritans)" (John 4:9). At this point in the story, Jesus turns the conversation to the living water gushing up to eternal life that he will offer her and for which she will ask.

Jesus is offering more than water. He is offering himself. Later in John's Gospel on the last day of the Feast of Tabernacles, Jesus cries out, "Let anyone who is thirsty come to me, and let the one who believes in me drink. As the scripture has said, 'Out of the believer's heart shall flow rivers of living water.' Now he said this about the Spirit, which believers in him were to receive..." (John 7:37-39). This living water is mentioned yet again in Revelation as Jesus is pictured as the Lamb at the center of the throne - a shepherd guiding believers to springs of the water of life (7:17). Then in Revelation 21:6, Jesus, the Alpha, and Omega, issues a proclamation reminiscent of the one extended to the Samaritan woman at the well: "To the thirsty I will give water as a gift from the spring of the water of life." Prayer: Lord, help us to drink deeply of the living water of your Spirit, and may we point others, who are thirsty for your grace, to your eternal spring.



Nothing Like God's Book

2 Timothy 3:16 says, "All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness."

The greatest book in the whole world, past, present, and future is the Word of God. It has much to say about itself. There are three significant words we use in reference to the Scriptures. Those words are inspired, inerrant, and infallible.

The word "inspired" comes from the Greek New Testament word which simply means "God-breathed." Thus, the Scriptures are the very breath and the exhaling of divine truth to holy men of God as they penned down God's mind to men.

The word "inerrant" means the Bible is not a book of error. It is accurate in all it speaks about to men; it is fully trustworthy. It is not a book of science but what it says concerning science is all right and true. It is not merely a book of philosophy, but what it says about life is spot-on. If the Bible were plagued with errors, how could we believe it? I believe the Bible to be the Word of God without any taint of error. If someone said there are errors in the Bible, they have failed to interpret the Bible accurately.

The word "infallible" means not capable of erring, to be entirely exempt to make a mistake, not liable to deceive or betray a confidence. You might argue that men wrote the Bible, but they did so "moved" by the Holy Ghost. 2 Peter 1:21 declares, "For the prophecy came not in old time by the will of man: but holy men of God spake as they were moved by the Holy Ghost." That word "moved" is a nautical term. It can refer to the sails of a ship being moved in the direction which the wind blows. God's Spirit so moved these men to the point they wrote without error.

On what basis do we say there is nothing like God's Book the Bible?

Its Principles Are Unchanging

Psalms 119:89 tells us, "Forever, O Lord, thy word is settled in heaven." Times are changing around us, and not necessarily for the better, but for the worse. Though that be true we have a book whose principles are unchanging, fixed and invariable. The Bible stands with principles that will never be outdated or irrelevant.

Its Reliability Cannot Be Rivaled

When you pick up a book and read from it, you do not know if all the information contained therein is all trustworthy and reliable. There may be an error in stating a number of statistics or a host of other areas, but that is not the case when you look toward the Scriptures. If you read it, you do not have to determine what part of it is trustworthy and what is not trustworthy. You can trust all of it or you cannot trust any of it. It is one way or the other with no middle ground.

It is Invaluable to Educate The Mind

Today in our educational system, there has been a movement to eliminate the Bible from our public education. William Lyon Phelps of Yale, one of America's highly esteemed professors, said, "I thoroughly believe in a university education for both men and women, but I believe a knowledge of the Bible without a college education is more valuable than a college course without the Bible."

I think I should repeat what Phelps said, "A knowledge of the Bible without a college education is more valuable than a college course without the Bible." What a good statement from a public educator! He obviously realizes the importance of the Bible in enlightening the mind.

It Adds Sweetness to the Soul

Psalms 119:103 informs us of, "How sweet are thy words unto my taste! yea, sweeter than honey to my mouth!" The people who are sweet in spirit are those who spend much time with God's truth. To neglect or refuse God's truth through His written word is to invite bitterness and sourness into one's life.

Someone asked George Mueller, "How many times have you read the Bible through?" Mueller responded by saying, "I have read it through sixty-six times and now I am going through it the sixty-seventh time. It gets more interesting and sweeter every time I read it."

If you want to be sweet in spirit and soul as the senior years come, spend a great deal of time with God's Word when you are young.

It Is Miraculous in Its Conception

The Bible is a collection of sixty-six books, written by forty different authors, on three different continents, in three different languages, over a period of 1500 years. Yet, all sixty-six books have a marvelous unity. Forty men have never written with more unity and agreement that these men. The Bible has proven itself to be from God scientifically, historically, and archeologically. It is truly a miracle! No other book with forty authors could produce the unity the Bible possesses throughout its pages.

It Is A Most Effective Tool Against The Devil

The Psalmist said, "Thy word have I hid in mine heart, that I might not sin against thee" (Psalm 119:111). Satan endeavors to lead us into sin, while the Lord seeks to draw us away from sin.

In Ephesians 6, the Bible is likened to a sword. A sword is an offensive weapon. When it comes to Satan, we must go on the offensive and not just the defensive. Ephesians 6:17 says, "And take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God."

If you recall, when the Lord Jesus was being tempted in the wilderness (Matthew 6), he responded to Satan's temptations by using the Word of God. He used the statement "It is written" and quoted Scripture each time Satan sought to make Jesus sin. That is a pattern for us to follow. We should quote the Bible to Satan when he tempts you and me to sin against God, repelling him with it.

It Is Not Just A Book- It Is A Mirror

It shows us as we really are. Since men are born sinners (Rom.5:12), it reveals us as we really are before salvation. Before our new birth, according to Ephesians 2, we were dead, deprayed, detoured, disobedient, and doomed. "Children of

wrath" is what the lost man is referred to before a salvation experience.

You may think you are real good looking, but all it takes is to look into a mirror and the truth comes out. A standard mirror does not lie; it will reveal you as you actually look.

How frightful is the reflected image of the unregenerate man as he sees himself in God's mirror, the Bible! The Bible is the only Book present which depicts accurately the true condition of mankind in his lostness: Isaiah 1:5-6 declares: "Why should ye be stricken any more? ye will revolt more and more: the whole head is sick, and the whole heart faint. From the sole of the foot even unto the head there is no soundness in it; but wounds, and bruises, and putrifying sores: they have not been closed, neither bound up, neither mollified with ointment."

It Changes Lives Like No Other Book

2 Corinthians 5:17 says, "Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new." There is a transformation takes place when a person repents of sin and trusts the Lord Jesus Christ that nothing else can cause but the Bible.

Through the Scriptures, people become new creatures or new creations. It is because when we are born again or born of God, we become partakers of a new nature. Peter puts things this way in 2 Peter 1:4, "Whereby are given unto us exceeding great and precious promises: that by these ye might be partakers of the divine nature, having escaped the corruption that is in the world through lust." The verb "escaped" is an aorist verb, which means it points to a particular time in the past. We escaped the corruption that is in the world by God giving us a new nature, new desires, and new impulses that would change us completely.

The Bible says, "Old things are passed away." Again, the verb tense for "passed away" is an aorist verb. Things began to change in the past when we were saved by God's marvelous grace.

It also says, "All things become new." The verb for "are become" is in the perfect tense, which means at that pointed time in the past, when we were saved, all things became new and results from that experience continue in the future with ongoing results.

There is nothing like God's book divine. Cherish your Bible.

Discipleship & Social Distancing: When My Small Group Can't Meet

"How do I disciple our small group when we can't meet?"

That was the question that went through my mind when I received yesterday's news that our church was putting our groups on "hiatus" due to COVID-19. This is the right call since our government leaders have asked us to keep our distance.

Many are saying this is new territory for the church. But is it?

We are not the first generation to have to disciple over a distance. After all, the New Testament epistles were written to churches or church leaders to discipline them even over a long distance.

Just because we cannot be in the same room does not mean our group has to stop. Here are some tips to help you keep leading while your group is on hiatus.

1.Keep caring.

Group leader, you are on the front line of pastoral care in your church. Check-in with group members frequently during the crisis. Ask how they are doing and how you can pray for them. Make sure they have their needs met. Personal touches, even by text message, are priceless in uncertain times.

2. Keep teaching.

People need the encouragement of the Word of God now more than anything else. Your group can still meet for Bible study virtually. Use Google Hangouts, Zoom or another meeting platform to meet at your scheduled time via video.

Keep reaching

Encourage your group members to serve their neighbors. Suggest that they reach out to at-risk or elderly neighbors to see if they can run errands for them. They can also offer to help via their neighborhood's Facebook or Nextdoor groups. Encourage them to use these times to verbally share the gospel as they are meeting needs.

4. Keen praying

Invite your group to pray together virtually throughout the week using the platforms already mentioned. Host a virtual meetup and pray through the Psalms, interceding for the power of God. You can also pray missionally for your neighbors using an app like Bless Every Home.

5. Finally, keep your group informed.

Group messaging apps like Band or GroupMe enable you to check-in, share prayer requests and give information about what's happening. You could also start a private Facebook group.

Keeping your distance doesn't have to keep you from disciplining. You can leverage technology to stay in each other's lives and stay in the Word!



Getting What You Really Want in Life

The things we pursue in life have everything to do with our joy and fulfillment. While it's certainly not wrong to desire success, a better paying job, or a higher standard of living, the Bible tells us that seeking after "things" and making them our priority will make us miserable in the



Seek is a strong word. It means "to crave, pursue, to make sacrifices to get, to go after with all of your strength and all of your heart."

I encourage you to take a moment and ask yourself, "What am I seeking? What am I spending most of my time talking about? Where do I invest the majority of my energy?"

Romans 14:17 (NIV) says, "For the kingdom of God is not a matter of eating and drinking, but of righteousness, peace, and joy in the Holy Spirit."

In other words, the Kingdom of God is not about us simply trying to get what we want. Instead, it's about seeking a relationship with God and experiencing true Kingdom benefits. It's about having a greater understanding of His righteousness (our right standing with Him through Jesus Christ), His peace and His joy in our lives. Only then will we find what we are truly looking for.

In the beginning of our relationship with God, it's all about us...and for a while, this is fine. I believe this is where we all start. We come to Him with our list of needs and desires. We bring Him our problems and want Him to fix everything. But eventually, the time comes for us to grow and mature.

I remember coming to a point in my life when I had a lot of "things" but realized I simply wasn't happy. After praying and asking the Lord what was wrong, He spoke to my heart and said, "Joyce, you are too shallow—it's time to go out into the deep."

That was difficult to hear, but I knew exactly what He meant. It was time for me to start living the "deeper life"—to begin seeking God for who He is and not just what He can do for me.

You see, shallow Christians want the fruit, but they are not concerned about the roots. I love Isaiah 37:31. It says, "... *Take root below and bear fruit above*." Just look at nature. Large trees with thick, full branches have a massive underground root system that spreads both deep and wide. Without this support system, the tree could never weather a storm.

In the same way, we must develop deep spiritual roots before we can truly enjoy the big, full life God has intended for us. This includes cultivating a relationship with the Lord, finding out what He says about us in His Word, and becoming rooted and grounded in His love.

Many times, we come at it the wrong way. We want to have all of the benefits—more privileges, more influence, more "stuff"—before we ever establish our roots. But without a strong foundation in God, these things can actually hurt us more than they can help. And without deep roots, we'll never endure the storms of life. The truth is, the Lord is more concerned about your inner life than your outer life. He knows that when you are spiritually strong on the inside, then you can handle any situation that arises in your life on the outside.

I think sometimes we're afraid that if we stop chasing after all of the "things," we'll never get what we want in life. But the exact opposite is true...

Psalm 37:4 says, "Take delight in the Lord, and he will give you the desires of your heart."

As we place our focus on God, we not only begin to experience His righteousness, peace, and joy...but He even causes our desires to be in line with His plan and what's best for our lives.

Years ago, while I was praying (probably for something I wanted), the Lord spoke a life-changing truth to my heart. He said, "Joyce, seek My face and not My hand. If you seek My face, My hand will always be open."

Matthew 6:33 says it this way: "But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well."

I can tell you from experience that when you make God your number-one priority, He not only fills your life with His amazing peace, joy, and satisfaction, but He also gives you the desires of your heart.

Decide today to pursue the One who matters most. Seek God for who He is and make your relationship with Him a priority. As you do, I believe you'll discover what you've been looking for all along.

Habits of the Heart: A Study of the Spiritual Disciplines "Study"

If followers of Jesus Christ are to grow into the likeness of Christ, a deep commitment to grow spiritually and practice spiritual disciplines is essential. I am sharing

twelve biblically based Spiritual Disciplines throughout this year's BRCN monthly publications. These "Habits of the Heart" are drawn from Richard Foster's book, Celebration of Discipline. [Note: You can look back at previous publications to catch up. You may also go to the Pleasant Hill Baptist Church website (www. pleasanthillbc.church) to watch a more in-depth presentation of each of these studies]. So far in this series, I have shared about the first three of four "Internal" disciplines: meditation, prayer, and fasting. Today, look with me at the spiritual discipline of "study."

Paul wrote this powerful instruction to young Timothy, "Be diligent to present yourself approved to God as a workman who does not need to be ashamed, accurately handling the word of truth." (2 Timothy 2:15)

There is, perhaps, no more important or essential spiritual discipline than the study of and intake of God's Word. Nothing can substitute for constant and disciplined Bible study. For us to strengthen ourselves for the daily spiritual battles that we face and for us to bulk up and tone our spiritual muscles—we must seek to hear God speak to us through His Word. And we must practice the daily exercise of studying what God is saying to us. What is so powerful about hearing from God through His Word is that we experience and understand that: (1) God does want to and will communicate with us; (2) we do take in and receive a "pure breath" of truth (e.g., taking in oxygen); and (3) we are set free from our debilitating thoughts and habits.

Unfortunately, a large portion of Christians, for various reasons, neglect daily hearing from God's Word. Why? Perhaps the answer is found in two things—busyness and laziness. John Grezlak says, "Reading the Bible is work and studying it even more so. Yet it is a labor with the sweetest of payment." Take a look at a 2019 graph from Barna and the American Bible Society which defines and depicts five different segments of Bible engagement which measure Frequency (how often people interact with the Bible), Centrality (how the Bible shapes their choices) and Impact (how the Bible transforms their relationships).

N.T. Wright asks some probing questions concerning the Bible, "How do we understand the narrative, the real-life story of God in the New Testament? How should we view the story which reached its ultimate climax in Jesus of Nazareth and which then flows out, in the power of the Spirit, to transform the world with his love and justice? How do we let the poetry of the early Christians, whether it's the short and dense poems we find in Paul or the complex imagery of the book of Revelation, transform our imaginations so we can start to think in new ways about God and the world, about the powers that still threaten darkness and death, and about our role in implementing the victory of Jesus? How do we make the New Testament matter? How do we study the New Testament for all its worth?" The answer is—we study this living Word of God! We study it intending to make it matter in our lives, our churches, and our communities. We study it to hear God speak. We study it to see and understand the character of God. We study it to learn!

There are many different models and techniques that have guided sojourners into and through the powerful words that God has used throughout the centuries to speak and guide His people into right relationship with Him. Study can take on several forms: individual Bible reading, group Bible study, preaching, and/or teaching.

Richard Foster argues that the spiritual discipline of Bible study includes the study of verbal (books and lectures) and nonverbal messages (nature, events, actions, etc.) in God's world. He outlines four steps in acquiring wisdom through study:

- 1. Repetition—a way of channeling the mind in a specific direction, thus ingraining habit of thought.
- 2. Concentration—the second step in a study that requires that the person focus or concentrate on what is being studied.
- 3. Comprehension—the third step leads to insight and discernment. It "provides the basis for a true perception of reality," argues Foster.
- 4. Reflection—as we understand and comprehend what we are reading and studying, the final step involves reflection. Reflection brings us to see things from God's perspective. We see both God for who He really is and ourselves for who we really are. That, of course, is God's ultimate design and desire for communicating with His creation—so that we will: (1) know Him (He is Almighty God, Creator, Sovereign and powerful in all things; He is Love, Grace, Mercy; He is redemptive, forgiving; He is long-suffering and patience, etc.); and (2) know who we are (His wonderful creation built for an eternal relationship; made in His image—so we have the capacity to love, forgive, create, and be in an intimate relationship with Him and others).

If we haven't completed these four steps, we haven't really done the discipline of study. It is time to sink into God's Word and meet our glorious Savior in and through every page of scripture. God is serious about meeting you there—so if you are serious about meeting Him there, then get ready and prepare yourselves for Bible study. It doesn't just happen! Satan will try every trick to keep you from going deeper into knowing and experiencing God in Christ. But when we practice the spiritual discipline of the study of God's Word, we can join Grezlak in proclaiming that it is a "labor of the sweetest payment."

The Template of Trust

The green plastic template teased me with its hidden meanings as I stared at the instructor. Its blank look and meaningless holes glared back at me, daring me to discover the mysteries of shaped holes and an unknown process. How could this inexpensive guide give me the power to make an A in my computer programming class?




I found a place for that valuable rectangle, secured inside my notebook and available at a moment's notice. And I did get that A. The programming template I used decades ago reminds me that templates prove to be powerful tools to reach upwards towards something greater than our current position.

A template can be a concrete object made of wood, plastic, or metal that produces a practical tool for building projects such as a stencil, building marketable products. They can be a plan, process, or program to help others recognize a brand or product. Many software programs create templates that reduce the time needed to produce sales fliers, memes for social media, and email newsletters. Templates cross the broad spectrum of all layers of society, improving our lives.

My past and current use of templates remind me of the importance of choosing a spiritual template. My friend's Christian counselor advised that she adopt a plan (a template) for coping and even emerging as a stronger Christian when life overwhelms her. His included templates found in the Bible that offer rich resources for handling the unknowns, for making decisions in

uncertain times, for focusing on the Lord rather than the worry or fear, and for tracking God.

One of my favorite templates for surviving any crisis is tucked into 2 Chronicles 20:12 which says, "We have no might against this



great company that cometh against us; neither know we what to do: but our eyes are upon thee." A great multitude of enemies was advancing toward the kingdom of Judah, and King Jehoshaphat reacted in fear: a normal reaction, to impending doom. But I love his template (both before and after his crisis) for transforming terror to trust. When he filled in the spaces with his needs, God empowered him to win over his most critical enemy: his own fear.

If you read chapters 19 and 20 of 2 Chronicles, you will see how the king used this powerful spiritual template to emerge victoriously. Through its use, God granted triumph to the king over his enemies. These two chapters reveal the king's spiritual template:

- 1. He took away the things that prevented him from seeking the Lord. (See 19:3)
- 2. He prepared his heart to seek the LORD. (See 19:3)
- 3. He set his spiritual house in order, commanding those under his authority and influence to focus on the LORD in their work. (See 19:6)
- 4. Finally, the king gathered together the whole country to ask the LORD for help and to seek Him. He led this corporate gathering of prayers and reminded them and himself of God's omnipotent power and might, His incredible ability to help them, and the sanctuary that they created to cry out to Him in time of need. He reminds himself of God's larger template for the nation of Judah. (See 20:4-11) 5. He admits his own insufficiency and commits to keeping his eyes upon the LORD. (See 20:12)
- 6. He worships. (See 20:18)
- 7. He appoints singers, specifically to praise the beauty of holiness and to praise the LORD for his mercy. (See 20:21)

And, that's when the LORD moved in power and strength. He made Judah's enemies to turn on each other and kill themselves. King Jehoshaphat and his soldiers didn't fight at all; they simply took the jewels and other treasures.

What is my template in times of trouble? I plan to use the same one that King Jehoshaphat and a host of other Bible heroes used. Filling in the designated spaces from his 7-step template with my unique situation, I rest assured that the Lord will bring victory over my enemies of worry and fear. And then I'll watch as the Lord uses my completed template to unveil the beauty of His holiness!



What I am most happy about, however, is the way that current events have occurred to direct us to this mindset. Much of our congregation—as well as our communities here—are North Carolina basketball fans. As has been seen by Tar Heel faithful all around, the team has been dreadful this year (I am a Duke fan, so this fails to hurt my feelings), and I have not heard much about college basketball this year as a result. Another man in my church, Roger—whom I also hold high regard for and look up to, brought this point to my attention. To paraphrase, Roger (a faithful North Carolina fan) said after church one morning that it's a good thing that the team is not doing well because people can focus more on the things we ought to focus on. I believe he was alluding to Christ and revival, and I agree wholeheartedly with Roger.

In our hustle and bustle world, it is easy to lose sight of what truly matters. We get tied into the political world, the sports world, and every other world that we put before God and therefore idolize. I did this with youth basketball this year, as I worshipped my competitiveness over the true calling of why I decided to coach sports. The Lord, as he often does, uniquely illustrated to me; this time through listening to SonicFlood's "Heart of Worship." Covered by many groups over the years, the song's chorus stays the same: "I'm coming back to the heart of worship, and it's all about you; it's all about you, Jesus. I'm sorry Lord for the thing I've made it when it's all about you; all about you, Jesus."

You see, friend, before we are to be revived, we must center our hearts and minds toward Him, and not the things of this world! When you got saved, all of your focus was on Him. When you were last excited about Jesus, all of your focus was on Him. Remember that.

Back to Mackay's hymn. If you open your hymn book and find that song (or Google it, you know), you will find that every verse is deliberately addressed to Christ. The first two verses start with "We praise thee, O God" and the third starts on "All glory and praise to the Lamb that was slain." THEN, we sing the fourth: "Revive us again—fill each heart with thy love; may each soul be rekindled with fire from above." We must direct our thoughts and efforts to Him, engaged in fervent prayer, and then we must direct our praise to Him before we are to be revived. It is all well and good—and oftentimes necessary—to engage in conversation about the political, economic, and social temperatures of our country, but at the core of it all, the Lord commands your full attention.

My last point is in the scripture I've shared with you. When we look at Psalm 85:1-5, we see the Psalmist first writes on the favor that the Lord has shown to his land, saving them from captivity. Then we see that the Psalmist has recognized that the people (including self) have turned away and he is attempting to act as an intercessor for the people to be revived. Much could be said about our own country, our church that has fallen away and has become lethargic in their walk with Jesus. Have you noticed this? Is the Lord nudging you to be that Psalmist today? We need revival now. Read and sing Mackay's "Revive Us Again." Talk about it constantly in your church and fall in love with Jesus again yourself. Read the Gospel and read about the wonderous things He did. Spend a great deal of your time reflecting on everything that He has done for you and your family. He is a mighty and wonderous God that loves us unconditionally who sent his Son to die for us that we may spend eternity with Him in the Kingdom, and we need to share that with the world that we live in! Brothers and sisters, my prayer for you is that you see the need, and that you fervently pray alongside with me for revival, that a lasting, inconsumable fire for Jesus spreads across our country. Amen.



Last month we examined the benefits and blessings that are ours through Jesus Christ. Paul has thrilled our souls with this information. He has prayed that every believer would have the eyes of their hearts enlightened to understand these great truths. Jesus is seated at the right hand of God far above all the powers of the enemy and He is the head over all things in the church, which is His body. After



Paul discusses the authority and superiority of Christ, he rolls right into these next words. "And you were dead in the trespasses and sins in which you once walked, following the course of this world, following the prince of the power of the air, the spirit that is now at work in the sons of disobedience—among whom we all once lived in the passions of our flesh, carrying out the desires of the body and the mind, and were by nature children of wrath, like the rest of mankind". (Ephesians 2:1-3) How can we be dead and still alive? Before salvation, the body is alive; the soul is alive; the spirit is dead. According to Galatians 5:19-21, the body is alive but corrupt. Psalm 19:7 instructs us that the soul is alive but unconverted.

The spirit is dead because there is no connection with God. We are born with a disconnect to all that is holy. That cord was severed in Eden.

Chapter 2 is a sobering reminder of who these believers once were; people who were living a lifestyle of sin; completely held captive to do the will of Satan. We are always following and serving someone, God or Satan. Until we receive Jesus, we are following the course of this world whose ruler is the prince of the power of the air. It is a walk of destruction.

Many Biblical texts indicate that Satan is enthroned in the atmosphere between earth and heaven. This is why he is referred to as the power of the air. His goal is to grow his kingdom by increasing unrighteousness in those already disobedient. Satan and his cohorts entice unbelievers to move increasingly toward their doom of a Christ-less eternity. Sometimes we forget that the devil has children just as God has children. Not all people are children of God, only those who have accepted the adoption proposal. Satan has dominion in this world because Adam and Eve gave it to him when they disobeyed the word of the Lord. Therefore, we are all born under his dominion. This is the spirit at work in the sons of disobedience. But Paul reminds these readers that their destiny had been forever changed by one thing: the mercy of God.

Ephesians 2:4-10 continues, "But God, being rich in mercy, because of the great love with which He loved us, even when we were dead in our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ—by grace you have been saved—and raised us up with Him and seated us with Him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus so that in the coming ages He might show the immeasurable riches of His grace in kindness toward us in Christ Jesus, For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, not a result of works, so that no one may boast. For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them".

The mercy of God has closed the door to hell for those who receive the free gift of salvation through faith in Jesus. He raised us from the dead and then He raised us above the prince of the power of the air and seated us with Christ in the heavenly places. We are in two places at once. Physically we are still on planet earth, but relationally and positionally, we are already seated in heaven. Jesus went to the cross and died for the sins of the world, but we must individually believe and receive the truth that our sins were placed upon Him. Then He was buried. Once we believe that He was our substitute for sin and that His blood completely washed us clean, we become one with Him in His death. The most important step was the resurrection of Christ, which signified God's acceptance of His sacrifice for our sins. Because of God's mercy, every believer is raised up with Jesus and seated in heavenly places. In the mind of God, we are already exalted far above all rule and authority and power and dominion. (Eph. 1:21) No one can snatch us out of His Hand or out of His Heaven.

And He did it all to show the immeasurable riches of His grace in kindness toward those who believe.

The definition of 'immeasurable' in this passage is: 'too large, extensive or extreme to measure'. His grace toward us in extreme!!

Once we are saved, Paul reminds us that we are His workmanship, created for good works. We are no longer walking the broad course of this world as a child of wrath; we are walking a road filled with opportunities to serve our Father and others. We have good works that God has prepared for us to do before the foundation of the world was laid. These works are perfectly selected based on the gifts and talents preordained for the children of God. In the Greek, the word for 'workmanship' is 'poiema' and can mean 'a product' or some type of fabric. We get the English word 'poem' from this Greek word. We are like a poem that our Father is writing, and this masterpiece will remain under construction until we see Him face to face.

By the immeasurable grace of God, we are no longer children of wrath, but children of mercy. We are no longer dead, but alive forevermore; seated in the heavenly places in Jesus. Just as Jesus was resurrected to die no more, so we will die no more, spiritually. Someday we will move out of this earthly tent, but we will never move out of His presence.


Don't quit. Don't give up...do not sit down.

Too Young, Too Smart, Too Rich to be an Alcoholic

It's like a Jeopardy game show question: "What are the three reasons oftentimes given as to why Christians with a drinking problem cannot get sober?"

What is too Young, as "I'm only (__) fill in the blank, years old. How can I possibly be an alcoholic, I'm too young?" "Yes, my mother and father drink too much and

probably alcoholics but they are in their mid-seventies." "Not me, I'm much too young to be an alcoholic." The undeniable truth is that alcoholism affects both Christian men and women of all ages.

What is too Smart, as "I have an MBA from a very good school and have received excellent grades throughout my entire academic career. I believe only high school and college dropouts can be alcoholics. Not me, I'm much too smart to be an alcoholic.

"Besides, I have a great work history and a promising career." The undeniable truth is intelligence is no more a factor as who may be an alcoholic than the day of the week they were born on.

What is too Rich, as "I don't live outdoors, I didn't spend last night under a bridge. I have an excellent paying job, a home in a nice neighborhood and a BMW in my garage. No. I'm definitely too well off financially to be an alcoholic." The undeniable truth is that money and an individual's wealth play no role as to who may or may not be an alcoholic.

My personal and professional experience in the rehab, recovery and treatment world suggests strongly that it is either one, a combination of all three of these reasons why Christians believe they cannot have a drinking problem.

In my case, it was all three reasons, "the trifecta" as I like to refer to it, as to why I could not possibly be an alcoholic.

I was 38 years old, a college graduate and a successful, small business owner who attended Church each Sunday. How could I possibly be an alcoholic? Besides, I had a lot of friends and especially relatives that spilled more than I drank. I used to say, 'I only had a problem when there was nothing to drink.'

The craving started most weekdays between 2:00p and 3:00 p.m. It was at this time each day that I would start romancing the idea of having a few cold, "Tall Boys" on the drive home. Winter or summer, hot or cold, it made no difference. Stopping each late afternoon at the local convenience store or "packy" as we say in New England and purchasing what I considered my just reward for completing yet another day at work became a ritual.

I had become like Norm on Cheers. How else was I supposed to make my way home through the late afternoon Boston traffic? Besides, I worked hard each day and deserved a few beers on my way home, didn't I?

I had always believed alcoholics were dirty, lived outdoors, and people who drank cheap wine from screw-top bottles.

Arriving at home each day before taking my winter or suit jacket off, I would routinely reach into the fridge for another of my trusted friends, my Buds.

Oftentimes I would proceed to have several additional ice-cold beers in arm's reach while taking a hot bath or sitting in a bubbling jacuzzi.

Just one or two more before supper and I'd have captured once again that elusive beer buzz that I so craved at the end of each day.

I thought I could stop drinking at any time if it became necessary. The simple truth was I was living a lie and had a secret I could not share with anyone. I knew deep down inside I was not able to stop or control my drinking.

I began to worry that it was just a matter of time before I too hit what I had heard referred to as a "bottom" and lost everything. I discovered there are two "bottoms" an alcoholic will experience. There are what are referred to as High bottoms and Low Bottoms.

Examples of an alcohol addict's Low bottom oftentimes includes DUI's, divorce, bankruptcy, job loss, hospitalization, house arrest or jail.

But again, how could I be an alcoholic? I was only 38 years old, a Christian, a college graduate, and owner of a sailboat and a BMW.

It wasn't until a Sunday afternoon after Church in 1992 my wife gave the ultimatum and choice between continuing to drink or losing my marriage and children. I finally surrendered and sought relief. I was desperate and sick and tired of being sick and tired.

It was in taking another Christian's advice and attending twelve-step meetings that allowed me to come to grips with the fact that I had become powerless over my alcohol consumption and that the loss of my life, health and family were truly at risk.

I proceeded to attend ninety meetings in ninety days. In hindsight, this saved my life. The gratitude I have today stems from the fact that I didn't have to lose everything as so many others had before I succumbed, surrendered and acknowledged my alcoholic disease.

Today, with 28 years of continuous sobriety I chuckle to myself and oftentimes cannot help but laugh out loud when I hear another Christian say they are too young, too smart or too rich to be an alcoholic. As now I know better.


What Do You Do in Times Like These?

4th Paul tells us that there are prizes to be won. Paul says (I press toward the mark for the prize Phil 3:14) It's never a bad thing to remind ourselves of the prize awaiting those who live to please God. I believe Paul often did this so he could keep on going. The Christian prize that awaits them on the other side of this World Heaven. Remember God didn't make us to sit in this world but to come out of this world.



President Trump Shook Hands With A Man Who Had Contact With An Infected Person: Three Ways Jesus Responds To Fear

In related news, Christ Church Georgetown suspended services last Sunday after its rector, Rev. Thomas Cole, was diagnosed with coronavirus at the hospital Saturday evening. This is the first time the church has closed since a fire in the 1800s. Health officials are asking hundreds of people who had potential contact with Rev. Cole to self-quarantine.

Closer to home for me, the county where I live now apparently has its first case of coronavirus. A man in his thirties traveled to California and is self-quarantined at home with his family while additional testing is done.

The president and the White House coronavirus task force held a press conference yesterday evening in which they announced economic steps intended to assist those who are at financial risk, especially those who cannot afford to miss work. They also announced practical ways Americans can protect themselves and others from the spread of the disease.

Three ways Jesus responds to fear

As the epidemic spreads across the US and the world, fear is spreading as well. This is a new disease to humans (thus the "novel" coronavirus description). As a result, we have no acquired immunity such as we have developed to existing flu strains. There are also no approved vaccines or therapies for coronavirus as there are for flu. And its death rate at present stands at 3.4 percent, compared with far less than 1 percent for those infected by the flu.

Since anyone can get COVID-19, everyone can get COVID-19.

One-way Christianity is different from other religions and worldviews centers in Jesus' redemptive response to fear. Consider three lessons he offers his followers

One: We should live in the present and trust the future to God.

Jesus taught us, "Do not be anxious about tomorrow, for tomorrow will be anxious for itself. Sufficient for the day is its own trouble" (Matthew 6:34). This day is the only day there is.

Someday there will be a global crisis that seems frightening and unmanageable, but before it accelerates, Jesus will return for us or you or I will go to him. This could be that crisis. That's why "now is the day of salvation" (2 Corinthians 6:2). We are one day closer to eternity than ever before, and we have only today to be ready. So, live in this day and trust tomorrow to the providence of your Father. Two: Worry is fruitless.

Jesus asks us, "Which of you by being anxious can add a single hour to his span of life? If you then are not able to do as small a thing as that, why are you anxious about the rest?" (Luke 12:25–26).

Worry provides the sense that we are doing something about our fear, but this is an illusion. Rather than worry about the future, we should prepare by doing what we can do and trust God with what we cannot.

Three: Our Father is Lord of the universe.

He asks: "Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? And not one of them will fall to the ground apart from your Father. But even the hairs of your head are all numbered. Fear not, therefore" (Matthew 10:29–31).

The virus is one nine-hundredth the width of a human hair. Our Father measures the universe with the palm of his hand (Isaiah 40:12). He is on the throne of the world. Let's be sure he is on the throne of our hearts today.

How John Newton found God's amazing grace

On this day in 1748, John Newton converted to Christianity during a huge storm at sea. (Due to calendar adjustments in 1752, the date was later reconfigured to March 21.)

Newton was born in 1725, the son of a ship commander. He went to sea at the age of eleven and eventually became the captain of a slave ship.

He had received religious instruction from his godly mother, but she died when he was a child and he gave up any religious convictions. However, during a violent storm, he called out, "Lord, have mercy upon us." He believed that God addressed him through the storm and that his grace had begun to work on his life. He called March 10, 1748, his "great deliverance."

Newton eventually became a disciple of George Whitefield and came to admire John Wesley. He taught himself Latin, Greek, and Hebrew, and surrendered to a call to ministry. He eventually wrote 280 hymns for the church, of which the most famous is "Amazing Grace."

John Newton later moved to pastor a church in London, where he influenced William Wilberforce. Though he lost his sight in his later years, he continued preaching until his death in 1807.

I visited his gravesite several years ago, where I found these words: "John Newton, Clerk, Once an infidel and libertine, a servant of slaves in Africa, was by the rich mercy of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ preserved, restored, pardoned, and appointed to preach the faith he had long labored to destroy."

Jesus used a storm to bring his amazing grace to a lost soul, and through him, to the world.

What fears would you trust to that grace today?

Following the action in February of a three-judge panel that issued an injunction to indefinitely suspend our state's voter ID law, I, in my official capacity as chairman of the Senate Select Committee on Elections, joined Senate President Pro Tempore Phil Berger, House Speaker Tim Moore, and Rep. David Lewis, chairman of the House Select Committee on Elections in filing a motion for an "en banc rehearing," which would have all 15 judges on the Court of Appeals hear the case and vote on whether to permit Constitutionally-required voter ID. The vote to amend our Constitution to require voter ID passed with support from over 55% of North Carolinians voting in the 2018 election.

In our court filing, we outlined the errors, flaws, and lack of legal basis in the decision issued by the three-judge panel against our state's Constitutional requirement for voter ID. The all-Democrat panel ignored binding legal precedent and exculpatory expert testimony and absurdly concluded that it is unconstitutional for the legislature to enact Constitutionally required voter ID legislation until some Republican legislators retire. The all-Democrat panel also bizarrely concluded that a law mandated by the voters and sponsored by an African American Democrat was motivated by racially discriminatory intent against other African Americans.

In 2018, two of the three judges, John Arrowood and Toby Hampson, responded to the People's Alliance PAC 2018 Questionnaire for North Carolina Appellate Division Judicial Candidates. Arrowood and Hampson each stated their intention to vote against the Voter ID amendment on the November 2018 ballot. Obviously, these two judges were not unbiased and should have recused themselves from this case.

Along with Arrowood and Hampson, the third judge on the panel, Allegra Collins, was elected in the 2018 election. These three judges will not be up for reelection until 2026; however, five other seats are on the ballot in the upcoming general election in November.

In addition to filing a motion for the en banc rehearing, we also filed a motion for another Court of Appeals judge, Chris Brook, appointed last year by Gov. Cooper, to be recused from the case. Brook previously worked against a 2013 voter ID when he was employed as a lawyer by the ACLU. Following our motion, Brook did recuse himself, so when the case is reheard it will be before the remaining 14 judges.

Interim Committees are now in full swing – with committee assignments completed by the Speaker, many are traveling to Raleigh to attend. Most recently, Rep. Presnell was here on March 5 for the Joint Transportation Oversight Committee and the Global Engagement Committee. She serves on both of these committees in addition to the House Select Committee on Strategic Transportation Planning and the House Appropriations Committee that will be meeting on March 30. These committees are packed full of information requested by the members and reporting of statistical data required by the various agencies in the state government. These meetings are generally held Jointly with House and Senate members participating. There are no votes taken during the Interim meetings.

Voter ID Case twists and turns – A three-judge trial court panel found that the plaintiffs in Holmes v. Moore were unlikely to succeed on their challenge to North Carolina's voter ID law, but an "error-ridden decision that took a one-sided look at the record" from an appeals court panel reversed the ruling.

"This liberal, activist appeals court panel was wrong to reverse a bipartisan trial court's ruling and tread on the will of voters in this state. The Court of Appeals must grant the request for a full hearing on voter ID given the people's voice in the democratic process is at stake in this litigation," stated Speaker Moore.

North Carolina's voter ID law was passed pursuant to a constitutional amendment approved by the voters, was vetoed by Governor Roy Cooper, but enacted by the state legislature in SB 824 Implementation of Voter ID Constitutional Amendment. North Carolina is the last state in the Southeast not to have some form of voter ID.

Sanctuary Cities – A court ruling has put President Trump in the position of being able to withhold funds from sanctuary cities. North Carolina sheriffs refusing to cooperate with federal detainers can put the public at risk and threaten the risk of federal funds.

Coronavirus Update- The N C Department of Health and Human Services along with the NC Emergency Management are working closely with the CDC, local health departments, and health care providers across the state to quickly identify and respond to any potential isolated cases that might occur in the state and prepare North Carolinians to be ready in the event of more widespread, CO-VID-19 transmissions.

The stock market's recent, dramatic drop has caused concerns among investors generally and all whose financial well-being may be linked to how the economy is doing. Those concerned certainly include retired North Carolinians who have pension funds in the North Carolina retirement system. The North Carolina retirement system is currently the ninth-largest public pension fund in the country. It was recently valued at around one hundred billion dollars. The North Carolina system provides retirement benefits for more than 950,000 North Carolinians, including current and retired state employees, teachers, and local government employees. Recently, North Carolina Treasurer Dale Folwell released a statement indicating that the stock market's activities will have no effect on pension payments. Folwell noted that North Carolina's state pension plans are down much less than the overall stock market because of his conservative and responsible management as well as under previous state treasures going back as far as fifty years.

Treasurer Folwell also cites a report from Moody's Investors Service, a leading, national credit rating agency. Moody's found that North Carolina's retirement system is the best-funded in the nation when considering its "Adjusted Net Pension Liability". In addition, The Pew Charitable Trust, nonprofit and nonpartisan research and policy organization, conducted "stress tests" on state pension plans. According to Pew, a "stress test" evaluates the potential impact of investment risk and contribution risk on both pension balance sheets and government budgets. "Investment risk" is risk associated with ups and downs in the value of the pension funds' investments. "Contribution risk" is the risk associated with whether those contributing to the pension funds will continue to do so at levels needed to maintain the promised payouts. The Pew Charitable Trust found that North Carolina's "stress test" results come out especially well, due to "strong funding policy and funding levels."

For many people in our country, Easter has become a lot like Christmas - gourmet dinner with family; extended time away from work; special seasonal outfits; many smiles for the children; Happy Easter greetings and maybe even a vacation. As we celebrate Easter, many Christians will attend 'Good Friday' services. But what is "good" about a day on which an innocent man was mocked, tried, and then beaten until unrecognizable? What is "happy" about Easter where the man, who many thought would bring hope to Israel, suffered violent and cruel beatings only to be nailed to a cross to die by asphyxiation? What was happy or good about a mother and friends having to watch their innocent loved one die a terrible death, worse than anything ever conceived by man?

The truth is, if the Easter story ended on that Friday with Jesus' death on a cross, there would be nothing good or happy about it. Thankfully it didn't. If it had, Jesus' death would merely be another example of human persecution, injustice, cruelty, and barbarism. I can only imagine that all hope was lost for Mary, the mother of Jesus, and His friends and disciples. It is still difficult today for me to look back on history and understand why this amount of suffering was part of God's plan. Perhaps there is a correlation to Joseph's statement in Egypt to his brothers, "You meant it for evil, but God meant it for good." Yes, some good came on that crucifixion day almost 2000 years ago. One of the thieves hanging on a nearby cross called out to Jesus defended him from a scoffer and asked Jesus to remember him when he came into His Kingdom. This thief had likely led an evil life, but at that moment the thief knew deep inside his heart that Jesus was a kind man who had done no wrong. God had allowed the thief to recognize Jesus' deity. Still, the good continued when the veil in the Temple was ripped in half, a sign that the perfect sacrifice for sin had finally been paid. But- there is still more to the story.

Shortly after Jesus breathed His last breath, wealthy disciples prepared His body for burial in a fashion that they could afford. In an effort to ensure that the body of Jesus would stay entombed, the Romans placed armed guards at the entrance of Jesus' grave. Can you imagine what it was like for Jesus' followers on that Sabbath? A day that was meant for worship, joy and rest, had turned into mourning, sorrow, fear, and despair. As the context of all these events begins to sink in, one of the disciples—probably John—had a sudden flood of memories of all the times that Jesus tried to tell them that 'good Friday' and 'resurrection Sunday' would come. Jesus had said, "What I do thou knowest not now; but thou shalt know hereafter." (John 13:7); and, "Destroy the temple and I will raise it again in three days." (John 2:19). Soon after His resurrection, Jesus appeared to the disciples and had the exchange with "Doubting Thomas" that we know so well. "Because thou hast seen me, thou hast believed: blessed are they that have not seen, and yet have believed." (John 20:29). In the days that followed, the resurrected Jesus appeared to over 500 people, out of death-life, out of despair-hope, out of sacrifice-redemption.

I hope that this Easter you and your family will pause to reflect on the unending love that Christ had for us, love that led Him to the cross, where He fulfilled the truths of John 3:16: "For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish but have everlasting life."

And that is why it's Happy Easter.

We have an anti-dote much more powerful than the poison! Have devotions



Will Graham's Daughter Shares Nashville Tornado Experience, Helps Others

It had been a regular day for Will Graham's daughter, Christine Jane—better known as "C.J."—when she went to sleep Monday, March 2, in her Nashville

However, that night was far from normal.

At 12:45 a.m.—just hours before early morning weight training—the Lipscomb University soccer player and nursing student slept through tornado alarms until she was awakened by a friend.

Quickly, the university evacuated students to a basement where they waited out the storm. Ravaging a 145-mile stretch of Central Tennessee, the weather system spun off six tornadoes and killed 25 people. Dozens more were injured as their homes were leveled or destroyed.

C.J. Graham and her friends remained safe through the storm, but several faculty and students from her university lost their homes.

"Here's it like, 'Wow, this is 10 minutes down the road from me, and it's like watching the news and seeing that's my community that needs help," C.J. Graham said. "It's totally different than anything I've ever been through."

On Saturday, she met her dad, Will Graham, and uncle, Edward Graham, along with their family friend and musician Michael W. Smith, at a devastated apartment complex that was condemned following the storm. They served alongside Billy Graham Rapid Response Team and Samaritan's Purse volunteers to comfort discouraged residents and help put their belongings in moving trucks.

"Here, I have the opportunity to invest in other people's lives. I can actually witness and be a testimony to those who have absolutely nothing and help them find everything," she said. "I have the opportunity to be a light when it's dark for someone else. Maybe I can use some of my stories from my past that may not directly involve the storm, but maybe they're going through a hard time at school, having a hard time with just their image, there are so many different things I can

Nearly the whole time, C.J. Graham was just a step behind her father, quickly offering to help. For years, she's watched her dad share the Gospel during evangelistic events called Celebrations, so this was a special moment of hands-on ministry for them to share.

On Sunday, she again returned to help her tornado-ravaged community. This time, she served as a Samaritan's Purse volunteer, bringing several friends from

C.J. Graham enjoyed serving her Nashville community with friends. "During

school, I've always been taught the ways of Jesus and so here, I have a way to implement that. It's really scary ... I'm scared a lot. I don't want to say the wrong thing to the wrong person and then have them not see the Lord through this," she said. "So, my heart is for these people because they are suffering. When I see people suffering, it disheartens me to see their pain.

"I decided to help them pose to their pain—and by finding the purpose to your





And even though C.J. Graham was serving as a Samaritan's Purse volunteer, her desire was ultimately the same as the chaplains'—for people to know God. "Not only are we working with the homeowner with his physical needs, but we are also loving on him and showing him the love of Jesus," she said.

Over Christmas break, the 18-year-old went and saw the destruction in the Bahamas months after Hurricane Dorian hit, but this has affected her differently. "My heart has always been to help people and I've [gotten] to witness that a lot especially traveling with my grandfather [Franklin Graham] and even my father [Will Graham]," C.J. explained. "But I felt like I've always been in the shadows behind them and so today especially, I've been able to be on the front lines."



West Africa

I would have never imagined when I came to West Africa that the Lord was going to do all that He has. I knew that He had something great instore. Even before I left the USA, the Lord had pressed upon my heart to take 1,000 baptismal certificates with me. I have been in 87 countries now but this by far beats all I have ever seen. In less than 4 weeks we have seen 155 people baptized, 28 leaders trained and ordained and 12

I am not sure if it is because they are so familiar with death, as these two countries were the hardest hit by the Ebola virus, or if it is that they just have a hunger for the things of God. sit eagerly listening to the Word of God. I have never seen such. Just yesterday I was leaving a church that I had been ministering to where 5 people came committing their life to Jesus. We were coming down the road when a young man in his twenties came up to us. He began sharing with me how he used to be a slave to drugs and alcohol. I shared with him how I too, as



a young man was in the same bondage but how the Lord Jesus had delivered me and now, I was traveling the world preaching Jesus. He said that the drug dealers here keep people in bondage. He shared with me how he had been delivered from the drugs and alcohol but that he had not been saved. I ask him if he had ever repented of his sins and been baptized. He said, "no but pastor, but I want to. By this time, we are standing beside the road. I ask him "Do you want to repent and turn from your sins today trusting in Jesus?" "Yes, pastor, I do." Right there on the side of the road, we knelt in the dirt and this young man committed his life to Jesus Christ. This Sunday he will be getting baptized. He asked me, "pastor, will you please come back to this village?" He said "I have so many friends who are still in bondage and Jesus can set them free too." I told him that we would definitely come back. In so many places the people are coming to us hearing we have the good news of Jesus. Truly revival is breaking out here. So far, we have been working primarily in the capital of Monrovia in Liberia and Freetown in Sierra Leone. Next week we will be going to the remote areas. We have already sent scouts ahead to inform the people we are coming. Please continue to pray. The jungles here are so vast. They still practice a lot of the ancestral voodoo practices, but I know that the Lord can break this. Also, the roads are so difficult back in the bush so please pray for the vehicles that we will be traveling on. One great praise report is that the Corona Virus that seems to be causing such a stir around the rest of the world but has not come here yet. Truly after battling Ebola, the last thing they need is this virus too. I love you folks so much. I will be back in the USA on May 20. Socialism: Lipstick on a Pig

During the 1980s, North Carolina's U.S. Senator, the late Jesse Helms, wrote an interesting article about America's drift from her religious and political moorings. Helms wrote at that time something powerfully astute. He said, "It is debatable at just what point the United States began to drift away... But I think we reached that point when many Americans turned away from the idea of salvation through Christ to that of salvation through technology or science or material affluence or the welfare state."



Helm's statement is at the heart of the legitimate assertion that Socialism is anti-Christian. As early as 1917, Charles R. Erdman, a professor at Princeton Theological Seminary, said that Socialism is defective in that it places the physical above the spiritual needs of humanity. Erdman wrote: "It insists that bet-

ter social conditions will produce better men; Christianity teaches that better men are needed to produce better conditions. Socialism seeks to elevate individuals by elevating society; Christianity contends that society can be elevated only by the regeneration of individuals. To secure such regeneration is the supreme effort and function of the Church, and its chief message to Socialism is that 'life is more than meat and raiment.' To those



who are crying for equality and opportunity and improved material conditions and fondly dreaming of a new age of universal plenty and comfort and happiness, the Church repeats the divine message, 'Ye must be born-again."

Last summer, Julie Roys, who is the host of a national talk show on the Moody Radio Network called "Up for Debate," wrote an op-ed piece for the Christian Post, rightly arguing that Socialism is based on a completely materialistic world-

"To socialists, suffering is caused by the unequal distribution of stuff – and salvation is achieved by the re-distribution of stuff. There's no acknowledgment of spiritual issues. There's just an assumption that if everyone is given equal stuff, all the problems in society will somehow dissolve.

"This worldview contradicts Christianity, which affirms the existence of both a material and non-material world – and teaches that mankind's greatest problems are spiritual. The Bible says the cause of suffering is sin, and salvation is found in the Cross of Christ, which liberates us from sin. Because of sin, though, there will always be inequalities in wealth. As the parable of the talents [by Christ] shows, those with good character tend to accumulate more; those with bad character [are more subject to] lose everything they have. Yet, even if we are unable to accumulate wealth [especially in situations beyond our control], Christianity teaches that we can still have an abundant life. That's because the quality of life is not determined by how much stuff we have, but by our relationship to Christ."

The late world-renowned evangelist, Dr. Billy Graham, in discussing man's hopes of self-salvation used to say that you can scrub a pig, sprinkle Chanel No. 5 on him, put a ribbon around his neck, and take him into the most exquisite palace in the land. But when you turn him loose, he will jump into the first mud puddle he sees. Why? Because even though he may be wearing lipstick, he is still a pig. That's the pig's nature.

You may think this is a pessimistic way to look at life or the prospect of selfimprovement. But it's not at all. Christians are not pessimists. It's just that we know where real hope is found. We understand that every effort, whether it be personal or corporate, that leaves out the Savior of the world, Jesus Christ, that doesn't make God central to the need, is no solution but just lipstick on a pig. Whether it be education, or science, or psychology, or any kind of social planning pursued that is without the redeeming and regulatory touch of a benevolent and gracious God, it is nothing but lipstick on a pig.

And that is why, I say, Socialism is just lipstick on a pig.

We should beware of earthly utopian visions. The Scriptures reject them as untenable because of the brokenness of humankind's sinful nature. The Bible resoundingly declares that Christ, and Christ alone, is the Savior of the world and not the government.

Some who embrace Socialism and promote it may be well-intended, but by nature, it is thoroughly anti-Christian and will bankrupt body, soul, and country. This editorial is developed from a few excerpts of a speech by Dr. Mark H. Creech, titled: "Socialism: Lipstick on a Pig."



Surely That is in the Bible

"God helps those who help themselves." I heard this stated so often and so confidently that I was sure it was scripture. It is not. The concept is trace-



lish political writer, Algernon Sidney. Benjamin Franklin did not coin the phrase. The only way to know what the Bible says is to read it. My campaign for the Year of Perfect Vision is to encourage every believer to read the Bible start to finish over twelve months. If you do that, you will discover that God's Word does not instruct His people to observe an event that most Christians hold dear: Easter. Some of the background of Easter is mentioned in scripture. Genesis chapter 10 tells the story of Noah's great-grandson, Nimrod. Verses 10-12 list the cities he established. One of them was Babel. The next chapter tells how a famous tower in Babel was a direct affront to God. Babel was the beginning of the nation of Babylon, and Babylon was the source of polytheism. The Babylonians were particularly fond of worshipping the sun.

After God confounded the languages and dispersed the people of Babel, they carried sun god worship across the earth: Ra in Egypt, Zeus in Greece, Mithra in Rome. Sun worship is universal. The Babylonians called their sun god Tammuz. Their legends tell that Nimrod married Semiramis. When Nimrod died, he was taken to heaven and turned into the actual sun. After Nimrod's death, his widow was impregnated by the rays of the sun. On December 25th, she gave birth to a boy which she named Tammuz. At the age of forty, Tammuz was killed by a wild boar. He was taken to heaven and became the sun god.

Those same legends say that when Semiramis, Tammuz's mother, eventually died; the gods sent her back to earth in a giant egg. It landed in the Euphrates River at sunrise on the first Sunday following the vernal equinox. When she burst from her egg, she proved her divinity by changing a bird into an egg-laying rabbit. Semiramis, the wife of Nimrod, mother of Tammuz, became the naked fertility goddess of Babylonian sun-god worship. Following her rebirth, her name was Ishtar. The name later changed to Eestra.

Every spring, Babylonian sun-worshippers set aside forty days of mourning for Tammuz—one day for each year of his life. This period culminated on Ishtar Sunday. On that day, they avenged the death of Tammuz by killing a wild boar and eating ham. The priests of Ishtar made a ritual of impregnating virgins during her celebration. One year later, they sacrificed the three-month-old babies and dyed eggs in the infant's blood.

The fact that so many of these pagan rituals have come to be considered "normal" aspects of Christian worship is testimony to the tenacity and influence of political and ecclesiastical power centered in fourth-century Rome. Roman society of that age was built on sun worship. The thin veneer of Christianity implemented by Constantine I was a political ploy. The adoption of sun god festivals and practices made it easier for the Roman church to appeal to that culture.

The net result is that many centuries later, most Christians enthusiastically engage in the rituals of sun god worship convinced that they are actually worshipping the Creator of the universe. When confronted with the origins of those rituals, they typically respond, "Well, that's not what it means to me." I have yet to find any passage of scripture where God gives us the right to redefine worship as we see fit.

On the other hand, the Bible is packed with accounts of how God hates pagan worship. He called Abraham out of Babylonian sun-worship so that He could begin His chosen nation. He rescued His chosen nation from Egyptian sun god culture so He could lead them to Canaan. He commanded His chosen nation to eliminate entire Canaanite nations partly because they were devoted to the practices of sun god worship. He referred to those practices using the strongest Hebrew word. That word is typically translated into English as "abomination."

Deuteronomy 12 gives God's perspective on pagan worship. The entire chapter is sobering. Verses 30 and 31 tell us that we must not worship Him in the same way that the pagans worship their gods. Many Christians tell me that Christ has "redeemed" pagan worship practices, but the Bible teaches that we should flee from them. Israel did not learn this lesson until their pagan worship finally led them into captivity in Babylon, the source of those abominable acts of worship. Scripture specifically mentions practices we associate with Easter. In Ezekiel 8:14-17, the prophet tells of seeing Israelite women weeping for Tammuz at the entrance of the Temple and Israelite men in that same location facing the east and worshipping the sun. "Weeping for Tammuz" involved ritual prostitution. God tells Ezekiel that these practices are abominations.

This year, the threat of viral pandemic will keep many Christians from holding up their hands to the sun as it rises, sharing the ham dinner, and hiding colored eggs; but most will wish they were doing those things. They would tell me that "God knows their heart." Indeed, He does. His clearly-stated position is that pagan worship rituals are still an abomination, and that a heart which deliberately disobeys Him is not attuned to His ways.

Do not take my word for any of these things. Please study and discover for







The latter is, in essence, preparing for the future and what is yet to come. The thought of mountain trails and springtime began to creep into my bones this past week. On the mountain, the snows have all but melted. That still small voice seemed to whisper to me, "Now is the time to prepare..." That being said, I soon found myself - thanks to the help of my IT colleague, Shawn Whitener - in the bowels of the Varsity Gymnasium on the campus of App. State University.


The wall in front of the treadmill was made of cream-colored, painted cinderblocks. To the left, hung a flat panel TV which was turned off, its blank screen a reflection of a modern-day torture chamber in which I stood. To find this place, you have to traverse a series of doors, hallways, and stairwells, continually spiraling downward, like seeking the depths of an ancient dungeon. I was in the newly renovated staff exercise center, better known as the basement of the Varsity Gym. To the right of where I stood, hung a chart describing the various parts of the body that were being rewarded by all of the implements of torture lining both walls of the room. Below the treadmill, just to the right, was a wire, metal fan blowing with all its might, an attempt to give one the impression of being in the real world. Slowly, after reading over the various mechanisms necessary to safely operate the machine, my legs begin to move on the magic carpet beneath my feet. The "Rolling Hills" workout option caught my eye, so when the button was selected, immediately, little red LEDs indicating the intensity of the incline that was about to kick in began blinking.

As my eyes remained transfixed upon the blinking dots, a pulsating echo of time washed through my being.

Beneath me, my legs started to churn a familiar pattern. Before long, without even knowing it, the road of yesteryear began to appear. It's funny how the body can fall so far behind what the mind remembers. Some call it muscles memory. I prefer to think of it as the countless miles of training etched into your soul. Whatever it is, before I knew it, my stride had returned to shadow of the former self, and as it did, the pace began to pick up until there was a smoothness. It was then the mind started to find its niche. No longer was there a blank wall before me, but rather, the open road of my youth, the asphalt-covered country roads that ran like veins through the patchwork land of cornfields in the southern Indiana countryside.

Ahead of me, ran the bronzed figure of my friend and training buddy, Scott Kearns. He was at least six-feet tall and had a natural stride. He was half Cherokee and often teased me that it made him a natural runner. His long black hair bounced off his shoulders as he slowly pulled away. He made it look easy as I fought to try to stay near him. The heat of the summer was on my back. My body drank it in, thirsting for the warmth of radiant energy. The air was heavy with the rich smell of the cornfields that lined both sides of the road. The sound of the wind rustled through the multitude of leaves that formed the canyon walls of corn stalks that seemed to reach to the sky. There were no cars, no hubbub of life other than the sound Scott's fading footsteps, and that of my heartbeat matching the pace of my feet upon the road. Off in the distance, I could hear an old grain truck rattling down a nearby highway. We were on the three-mile circle that started and stopped on our road that connected to the loop. It was the first time I had ever run any length of distance. It would be the length to which my life would be measured. Scott had assured me that if we could run this "country mile," we could easily make the Castle High School Cross Country team.

Sweat began to trickle down my temples as my body worked to cool itself. In that former image, my entire being was already swathed in a thick layer of perspiration. This present workout, much like that of before, was preparation. Now, it was to find where I was physically and to see if I might be ready for the open road. Then, it was to see if my body was capable of trying out for the team. My Biology teacher, Mr. Edwardson, had invited me to try out, and so when I had mentioned to Scott, he suggested we prepare so that when we showed up, we wouldn't be blown away. Little did we know back then what it would take to endure a season of training and racing in order to compete. It would take far more than a simple three-mile run. Now, much like then, there was much to consider.



One might say, that what started today in the gym was the preparation to go out beyond the four walls of the Varsity Gym and out into the roads and by-ways of Boone, which, if the plan would allow, to find myself running the trails along the parkway when the weather improved; to once more return to that feeling of being one with God. To those who know, there is a uniqueness



when running when your body can achieve a certain level of fitness where there is little to no exertion. It is then that my mind seems to be more able to listen to God than at any other time. The preparation reminded me of more than just the physical training, but also that which we should work toward every day: reading and sharing God's Word.

Set in the remote valleys of the Cottien Alps, the tiny enclave of stone structures lay hidden upon the Alpine mountainside. Their inhabitants, students of the Gospels and their teachers known only as "Barbi," which they were called in the ancient language of the valleys, which meant Uncle. There, through the long brutal winters, the students studied the Word, memorizing scriptures and testing one another. As the Bible says, "Iron sharpeneth iron; so a man sharpeneth the countenance of his friend." Just like my friend pushed me in my youth to obtain a greater level of strength, so too did these Theological warriors, as they prepared for what lay beyond the four walls of their granite college. It was the turn of the first millennium, and the Roman Catholic Church wanted to control the souls of humanity. To do so, they chained their Bibles to the Church pulpits, disallowing anyone to read or hold in their possession a copy thereof.

This cluster of stone rooms became known as the "Barba College," and from it, the people of the valleys, known as Waldensians, would go forth across Europe, evangelizing the Word of God nearly 600 years before the Reformation. They knew from what others had discovered, that their lives depended upon knowing the Word beyond just being able to simply read the Hebrew and Greek scrolls, but that they would also have to know it in their hearts. Paul tells us, in his letter to Timothy, "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." The penalty for being caught with the written Word of God was death.

It was a desperate time. Fear could have kept them hostage within those four walls, but they knew that there was a purpose in all that they did, and because God had given them the Word, it was their duty to share it with all of mankind. As the young men trained through those harsh Alpine winters, they grew stronger not only in their abilities to survive physically but also in the defense of their faith. Capable of hiking for miles in the arduous Alpine terrain, their bodies became has hardened as their faith became emboldened. They didn't just know their Bible; they lived it. When the spring thaws began to break open the heretofore hidden passes, they would leave the safety of the valleys. It was their duty. As Jesus had commanded, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world. Amen."

It is said that the seeds of the Reformation were planted with the blood of the Waldensian martyrs.

Today, as we train to go forth, both physically and mentally, let us not be blinded for reasons that offer a little reward, but rather strive to seek a purpose for which is much more profitable. Awaken to what purpose you were made and prepare for what is to come. We know not what tomorrow may bring, so in all things ready yourselves. "And that, knowing the time, that now [it is] high time to awake out of sleep: for now [is] our salvation nearer than when we believed."

The little red dots are blinking, one heartbeat at a time. Can't you hear those mountain pathways calling?

Turn off the TV, and the media's relentless pursuit of pandemonium, and think of what you can do to prepare for what is next. Don't let the fog of society's fear keep you frozen.

There is a purpose in everything we do. You have been afforded this time for a reason. Don't waste it.

Time is short.

Are you ready to run?

Thanks be to God.

Dogwood Health Trust Awards More Than \$ 3.7 Million in Immediate Opportunities and Needs (ION) Grants to 259 WNC Organizations

Asheville, N.C. – Dogwood Health Trust has awarded more than \$3.7 million to a diverse range of 259 nonprofit and government agencies from every county and the Qualla Boundary in Western North Carolina through its Immediate Opportunities and Needs (ION) grant program. Of the 492 applicants, 53% were awarded a grant, with the average award amount totaling \$14,600. Of those funded, 34% of requests will advance equity or reduce disparities.

"Originally, we planned to begin funding in fall 2020, but the board was eager to begin investing in the community at the start of the year," said Janice Brumit, chair of the Dogwood Health Trust board of directors. "The purpose of this round of funding was to meet immediate needs and build initial relationships throughout our region. We plan to use what we learned from this round of funding to inform the work we're doing now to design our strategic initiatives. Meeting immediate needs is one thing, but what we really want to do is move the needle on key issues and make lasting change."

An initial budget of \$2.5 million was allocated to the ION grant program. "Our goal throughout the ION grantmaking process focused on awarding grants to a diverse representation and on inclusion in our 18 counties and Qualla Boundary region," said Jackie Simms, chair of the programs and grants committee. "We gave particular attention to smaller nonprofits headquartered in the counties and tribe served by Dogwood and to organizations led by people of color. Choosing recipients was a challenging and awe-inspiring task; so many organizations are doing such important work in our region."

ION grants awarded will support affordable housing development, dependable cars for working families, cybersecurity improvements, roof repairs, and a portable X-ray device, to name a few. The Hendersonville Rescue Mission located just off Seventh Avenue in downtown Hendersonville received a grant to offset unforeseen costs associated with their Day Center expansion project. This expansion project will take the current Day Center space from 788 square feet to 2700 square feet, providing much-needed space for personal hygiene and health needs, resources for job seekers, and a charging station for its clients. Once complete, the Day Center expects triple the number of client visits, dramatically impacting the disparities associated with people who face extreme poverty, including those who are homeless or have inadequate housing conditions, have limited access to sanitation facilities, or access to community resources. "We are so grateful to Dogwood Health Trust for walking alongside us to address this growing need in our community," said Anthony McMinn, CEO of the Hendersonville Rescue Mission. "This additional funding will allow us to address unexpected costs and complete the Day Center expansion."

ION grants awarded were in alignment with Dogwood's work to improve health and wellness and address the social determinants of health in the region. Windows Of Heaven

In 2 Kings, Chapter 6, a serious famine was in Samaria, resulting in starvation and even cannibalism. King Jehoram, ruler over the southern kingdom tribes of Judah and Benjamin, blamed Elisha and planned to have him killed. However, in Chapter 7, God revealed to Elisha the king's plans and that flour and barley would be available the next



day. The messenger did not believe Elisha's words. He was looking at the reality of the situation: the starving people, the diminishing animals and the duration of the famine. Also, the army of Syria was besieging Samaria. The word that food would be available tomorrow was almost too good to be true. He doubted the power of God and the messenger of God. He replied "Behold, if the Lord would make windows in heaven, might this thing be? His reply questions the truthfulness of God's promises, that a new thing or sudden thing cannot be true. He was looking at the situation, the starvation, and suffering and did not have his eyes on God. Elisha's reply was it will happen, and you will see it with your own eyes, but you will not eat of it. This was a harsh judgment upon the King's officer.

As I read these scriptures, I wondered if his response of disbelief was typical of most who do not know the power of the Lord. We may hear the word of God from God's anointed, but not believe it will happen, and thus, we do not benefit from a miracle or promises of God. Belief takes faith. Are we too prone to look at circumstances, rather than belief through faith? If we don't believe the word, then we have no basis to believe for a miracle. We must believe with our heart and not our head, remembering nothing is impossible with God. It doesn't matter how good or how bad things look. God is still on the throne, and he can do anything if we will have faith and believe. Unbelief stops God from working in our lives. That will keep the Windows of Heaven closed for a miracle. While the King and his messenger did not have faith, Elisha did, and God had a plan to once again save his people, Israel.

The Hebrew word for windows of Heaven refers to sluice gates. Imagine an enormous dam, water backed up behind it into a great lake. When the sluice gates are opened, rushing torrents of water are released. It is the same way with God's word and promises.

The phrase "windows in Heaven" is mentioned two more times in the bible. Genesis 7:11 "In the six hundredth year of Noah's life, in the second month, the seventeenth day of the month, the same day were all the fountains of the great deep broken up, and the windows of Heaven were opened". The surging torrent represented judgment on the world.

Malachi 3:10 "Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be meat in mine house, and prove me now herewith, saith the Lord of hosts, if I will not open you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it." God wants his people to give their tithes, and then He will provide even more blessings for them.

We can open the windows of Heaven in our personal lives, to receive blessings and miracles. We must feed on the word of God, thereby increasing our faith in believing. It's also important to "do something"! In verses 3 & 4, the lepers rose up at dusk and went into the Syrian army where they found food and were sustained. They also informed Samaria there was food in the empty enemy camp. There are many scriptures indicating that action must take place to receive a miracle. Example: "Rise up and walk", "Go wash in the pool of Siloam" and "Go show yourself to the priest".

When we believe and do something, we will see the windows of Heaven open up to meet our needs.

I am writing to you this month to express compassion and hope to those among my readers who are deeply troubled today by the uncertainty of our times. While our nation and our world have reason to be concerned by the coronavirus that stalks the human



My wife, Shirley, wrote a book entitled, Certain Peace in Uncertain Times, which speaks to our fears and anxieties. She shared, "We all want peaceful lives and contented hearts. Yet, with threats to our tranquility growing at a seemingly exponential rate, is it any wonder that many of us succumb to worry and fear? More importantly, is there a solution? Can we know certain peace in these uncertain times? The answer, of course, is yes. .1 When problems threaten to engulf us, we must do what believers have always done—turn to the Lord for encouragement and solace."2

Shirley emphasizes prayer as a spiritual act of worship. Throughout the Bible, and especially in the Psalms, we see prayers of adoration, proclamation, and petition. And God, who is rich in mercy, hears the prayers of His people. Psalm 10:13 tells us, "You, Lord, hear the desire of the afflicted; You encourage them, and You listen to their cry."

Sanity in These Crazy Times

During this Corona Virus Pandemic, it seems the extremists are getting the most attention. We have the general media whipping everyone up into a frenzy thinking we are all going to die like in some of these movies that have been popular with similar themes (my favorite was the recent Planet of the Apes).

Or those that are ignoring all caution as if nothing is happening and it won't affect them. What's important to remember is that God is still real and in control so there is no need to panic. I still don't understand what all the commotion about toilet paper was about. We should pay attention to our government officials and the CDC. Stay home, getting out only when needed, avoid close contact with others, when you are around others be sure to wash your hands and keep them away from your face until you do. The problem is that there are probably quite a few people with the virus, and they don't even know it. For most it may not affect them more than a common cold, so they think they are fine and end up taking it home to their grandparents or others who may be immune compromised.

In my humble opinion, the best thing we can add for our protection aside from the CDC recommendations is to take action to keep our immune systems strong. There are lots of measures one can take to do this, some I will point out shortly.

It is an unfortunate part of our healthcare system that more effort is not made towards educating the public about lifestyle habits that sustain our health: things like the foods we eat, exercise or the lack of it, and the air we breathe. We may think living in the mountains gives us clean air to breathe, but if we go home to a moldy house, it will compromise our immune system (mold and its' effect on our health is a good discussion for another time). Whenever faced with an important decision to make and even the simple ones I ask myself 3 simple questions. 1. How does this affect my walk with My God? 2. How does this affect my walk with my wife and family? 3. How will this affect my health?

It was through my faith in my God that I knew that it will be alright, that I had nothing to worry about, the doctors would do their part, my body would heal as it should and my wife would keep the business running. I can honestly say I had no worries through both ordeals.

It was through my confidence in my body's ability to heal that I knew no matter how bad the situation looked; my body could heal. I knew this because I do all the things I know we should do but most people don't because its' not convenient; like exercise, eat nutritious foods, take vitamins regularly and currently taking extra of the things to stimulate a healthy

It was through my confidence in my wife that I knew she would do the right things. We have spent the time together and trained together so I knew she was capable. I am a physician and she comes with me to most of my conferences and trainings so if you spoke with her, you would think she is a doctor, but she is not. Jesus says He would rather us be hot or cold... if we are lukewarm, He will spew us out of his mouth, which in Greek literally to violently vomit. But God gives us all the tools through sanctification to progress toward being who and what He has called us to be and does not end until we leave this world. As long as we live, there will never be a stopping point for spiritual growth. The need for this is the same for someone who has been saved for fifty years as it is for a new Christian. Let us strive by God's grace to be all that He wants us to be so we can enjoy His blessings, not only in this life but in the next.

Are You Shifting the Blame?

"The people spoke against God and Moses, 'Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? For there is no food and no water, and we loathe this miserable food." (Numbers 21:5)

Numbers 21:4 says the people of Israel "became impatient because of the journey" in the wilderness. But as people

often do, they vented their anger in the wrong direction. Verse 5 says that "The people spoke against God and Moses, 'Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die ...'." Why were they blaming "God and Moses"? The reason they were dying in the wilderness was entirely their fault. Numbers 14 tells us that the people refused to enter the Canaan at the direction of the Lord through Moses, so God sentenced them to die in the wilderness instead of inheriting the Promised Land (14:35). It was not God's fault they were floundering and dying in the wilderness. It was their own.

But like many of us today, the people of Israel were looking for someone else to blame. It can be hard to own up to our mistakes, so we often look to "shift the blame" to someone else: our spouse, child, a supervisor, co-worker, a classmate — or even, like Israel here, to God Himself.

Are you doing this? Are you suffering the consequences of your disobedience to God in some area of your life, but you have not been willing to admit it? Is there someone you have been angry with — maybe even God? — instead of admitting that you have brought this upon yourself? If so, you never will make any progress before God or man, until you first stop trying to shift the blame.


