


#### Life Lessons



#### Blue Ridge Christian News Statement of Faith

#### What We Believe

Here are some of the essential elements of our faith at the Blue Ridge Christian News:

#### God

God is the Creator and Ruler of the universe. He has existed eternally in three persons and chooses to manifest Himself in these three ways: as God the Father, as God the Son, and as God the Holy Spirit. These three are co-equal and are

(Genesis 1:1, 26-27; 3:22; Psalm 90:2; Matthew 28:19; 1 Peter 1:2; and 2 Corinthians 13:14)

#### Jesus

Jesus Christ is the eternal Son of God, who is fully God and fully human in His incarnation. He lived a sinless human life and offered Himself as the perfect sacrifice for the sins of all humanity by dying on a cross. He arose from the dead after three days to demonstrate His power over sin and death. He ascended to heaven and will return again to reign as King of Kings and Lord of Lords. (Matthew 1:22-23; Isaiah 9:6; John 1:1-5; 14:10-30; Hebrews 4:14-15; 1 Corinthians 15:3-4; Romans 1:3-4; Acts 1:9-11; 1 Timothy 6:14-15; Titus 2:13)

#### The Holy Spirit

The Holy Spirit is the very Spirit of God, fully divine, manifested in the life of every believer from the moment of salvation. He is equal with the Father and the Son as God. He is present in the world to make men aware of their need for Jesus Christ. He provides the Christian with power for living, understanding of spiritual truth, and guidance in doing what is right. The Christian seeks to live under His daily control.

(2 Corinthians 3:17; John 16:7-13; 14:16-17; Acts 1:8; 1 Corinthians 2:12; 3:16; Ephesians 1:13; Galatians 5:25; Ephesians 5:18)

The Bible is the divinely inspired, authoritative, infallible, living and active Word of God to all men. It was written by human authors under the supernatural guidance of the Holy Spirit. It is the ultimate source of truth for Christian beliefs and living. In it we find a guideline for right relationship with God and God's creation, and a blueprint for personal, emotional, and spiritual growth. #### Humanity

Humanity is designed and made by God in His image. We have been created as cognitive, moral, ethical, and physical beings and have been equipped by God for both relationship with Him and with one another. Both male and female are gifted by the Creator with characteristics which equip them for the purpose for which they have been created: relationship, dominion, and responsibility. Although God designed us to have fellowship with Him, we became alienated from God through disobedience. As a result, all human beings are born with a sinful nature and choose to sin against God. We are incapable of regaining a right relationship with God through our own efforts.

(Genesis 1:26-28; Psalm 8:3-6; Isaiah 53:6; 59:1-2; Romans 3:23; 5:22; Colossians 1:21; 2 Corinthians 5:17)

#### **Eternity & Eternal Security**


Our soul, the essence of our being, was created by God to exist forever. That forever is spent in one of two places: eternally present and in union with God because of His forgiveness and salvation or eternally separated from God because of sin and unbelief. At the moment that our physical body dies, those who are saved are immediately taken to heaven. Those who have rejected God's gift of salvation will spend eternity separated from God in hell. Because God gives man eternal life through Jesus Christ, the believer is secure in that salvation for eternity. Salvation is maintained by the grace and power of God, not by the selfeffort of the Christian. It is the grace and eternal power of God that gives this security.

#### Salvation

Salvation is God's gift of redemption and reconciliation to Himself and is offered freely to all who accept, by faith alone, Jesus Christ as God's only son and receive Him as Lord and Savior. We can never make up for our sin with selfimprovement or good works. It is only by trusting in Jesus Christ as God's offer of forgiveness that you can be saved from sin's penalty. Eternal life begins the moment you receive Jesus Christ into your life by faith.

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

#### Grain Of A Mustard Seed -Northern Israel – 1 Kings Chapter 12

It is hard for us to imagine the culture and what people were like back in Jesus' day. In reading 1 Kings chapter 12 your imagination will swell. You can feel the Old Testament come to life. The kingdom and the twelve tribes of Israel are divided. In this chapter, Rehoboam, son of Solomon, is now the king of the southern kingdom, and Jeroboam, son of Nebat, is the king of the northern kingdom, and neither king is obedient to God's ways. Tel Dan located in Northern Israel is at the foot of Mount Hermon and is not a place Christian travelers would go to learn the foundational truths about their faith. Tel Dan is one of two sites in which King Jeroboam built altars that were set up as an alternative place of worship. The king took counsel and made golden calves for each altar saying it was too much for the people of Israel to journey to Jerusalem to worship. This thing he did became a sin: for the people went before one of the two altars to worship (verses 26-30). Jeroboam was always on the list of bad kings and not someone you would want to try to be equal to or rival with.

Tel Dan does come alive as we read 1 Kings 12:31. Jeroboam also made shrines on high places – built up high – and made priests from the ranks of the lowest of people that were not Levites. These places were not hidden or protected from sight. Everyone could witness what was happening as sacrifices were being offered on the altar as if being lifted up on a stage. Actually, in today's time those teaching, preaching, or leading worship stand up on a raised platform leading and directing us to the One God we are to worship. This ancient high place at Tel Dan is a good reminder of the influence those standing in front of us on a platform have on people today. We need to keep in mind if the wrong person is on the platform leading and instructing as was true all those thousands of years ago, they can lead many people astray and away from the One true God.

There is trouble in our thinking as this passage of Scripture points out the danger of worshiping solutions of our own making; and isn't that what these idols represent. In 1 Kings 12:33, we see that Jeroboam built alternate places of worship, made golden calves to worship, and even changed the time and season of worship. God had been clear in His directions of how to worship, but somewhere along the way Jeroboam in his thinking thought he knew better than God.

Don't we sometimes do the same thing? We say we trust God and we believe He is working in our lives, except when we don't see or feel His working at the time. Don't we try to interfere trying to modify His plans or change things to fit our schedule or our situation? At times like this we try to take control trying to create our own way; disobeying God; and maybe, unintentionally leading others astray

It is painful looking at the truth of how often in life we (or in my case I) have departed from trusting God. I have been impatient with God so many times and trusted myself more than God. But this is where God never fails us, leaves us, or forsakes us. Always we can look back and we can see the one set of footprints at these times of struggles in our lives, and we know without a doubt that God has been with us - this is when He carried us - to keep us on His straight and narrow path. I can say that God only let me move so far away till He pulled me back in line and I mean pull ... I want to do things my way sometimes so badly, yet He graciously and tenderly lets me know I am in the wrong. He lets me know His way is the right way. Honestly, I have given God some really hard times wanting things done my way because I was not seeing results that I thought I should be seeing in the time frame that I thought they should be happening. But God holds steadfast keeping me in line with His Will. This verse in Matthew 17:20 has come to mind so often. The Lord reminds me our faith only needs to be the size of a grain of mustard seed and no high place, a false idol, or mountain can stand against it. Truly I have learned what it means to "be still and know that I am God". In Hebrew "be still" means let go. God tells me like it is. God lets me know that He is in control and I need to let go and follow His direction. He makes this clear in a way that is kind and loving yet with a firm grip. I have learned to listen and hear God's love, leadership, and direction. I have learned a lot about being patient and persevering. God works in His own time frame. Our timing is not God's time. He is still working on me and I thank God for His grace and mercy in my life!

Israel is a reminder of God's great faithfulness. Instead of our looking up to the high places and trying to reach Him, God came down low. Jesus' birth was in a lowly place to a humble couple. Angels came down to announce His arrival to the meek and lowly shepherds in the fields for anyone to see. Jesus lived an ordinary, and yet extraordinary life as the son of man and the Son of God as we read in the Gospels. Then Jesus ascended back to His heavenly Father from the Mount of Olives, one of the lower elevations on the Judean mountain range.



Eventually, Sister had a series of life-threatening events wherein her faithful sisters were told she likely would not be with them much longer. Time after time this frail bodied little believer would astound physicians, her family members, and preachers by rebounding. She was such a tough one! Time after time she would speak of her trust in the One.

Most impressive about her was the fact that in the years I knew her, I never once heard Sister complain. Not once did she bemoan her fate. Not once did she

question why she had to endure life without her sight. No, this woman's faith in God through Christ Jesus her Lord was all she needed to endure. She trusted God with all of her heart.

Towards her last days, I had been granted access to a collection of favorite Scriptures that my friend had compiled to read to his mother. I purchased several copies of this compilation and



took one to Sister. Explaining to her that I wanted to give her a gift of neverending value, I opened the book and began to read the Scriptures written therein. Sister lay there with an expression of peace that truly was beyond all understanding.

One day she had some sort of "event" and one of her siblings requested I hurry to her bedside. Arriving I found Sister lying in the bed, writhing in pain, and greatly agitated. So I did what I had been doing with her so frequently, I read aloud God's Word. This particular day Sister's condition had rendered her unable to speak or move. But as I read the sweet Word of God's promise to her, tears began to flow from her eyes. She couldn't see, but she could listen. And as she listened, the Lord moved...

She died soon after and I realized that I had been allowed into her room that day to witness the Truth of this verse. Sweet little blind Sister had experienced the lamp of God for her feet and the light of God for her path! And that path had led her into her eternal dwelling.

COVID restrictions currently prevent offenders from attending corporate worship services. To offset this temporary loss, as Chaplain I have begun positioning myself near where every one of the men pass on their way to/from their meals. Each day I have offered to those who will receive it, a passage of Scripture that will encourage, uplift, and bless them. One man told me that he looks forward to receiving that Blessing every day because he goes back and reads that passage immediately. And when he does, the Lord "opens his eyes to the glory of God"! #### How Dry the Bones?

August can be a dry month even in the rain forest that is Western North Carolina. The worst drought we can imagine, however, would never compare to



the dryness confronting Ezekiel in the 37th chapter of his book. In this famous passage, the prophet is led "in the spirit" to a place reminiscent of the mythical, African valley where elephants supposedly make their last journey to die among untold thousands of their fellows. The fable of the elephant graveyard endures because such a place would provide boundless wealth to its discoverer. So much ivory without the mess and bother of killing or smuggling.

Ezekiel's vast, above-ground graveyard reveals a promise which dwarfs the value of a boatload of ivory: eternal life with Our Creator. The Valley of Dry Bones is one of many scriptures that ties the beginning of God's book to the end. Genesis 2:7 tells us that God formed man from dust and breathed His life into this creature to make him a living soul. The Hebrew word translated "soul" means "the union of dust and spirit." We do not have a soul, we are a soul. Even the name Adam underscores this fact since it can be translated "creature of dirt."

When the animated wad of dust chose sin and death over direct communion with God, he learned the stark repercussions of that choice: "You are dust, and to dust you will return." The only hope for formerly animated dust is resurrection. Unobtainable resurrection. Unimaginably expensive resurrection. Graciously purchased and freely given resurrection. Resurrection detailed near the end of that best-selling book which chronicles the relationship of Holy God with walking dust. Revelation 20:4 says that faithful, obedient piles of dust will be resurrected, reunited with the breath of God, and privileged to rule with the Messiah in the Millennial Kingdom.

With perfect symmetry, Ezekiel's vision unites creation and resurrection. His valley of bones was nothing more or less than irrefutable evidence of dust that once walked and talked. Under divine imperative, he spoke the Word of God to all that dust, and an immeasurable army of corpses reassembled before his eyes. Once again they looked human, but they were still lifeless dust. They lacked life's crucial element. "I prophesied just as He commanded me. The Spirit came into them, and they lived. They stood up on their feet, a vast army."

At this point, God does a marvelous thing. He tells Ezekiel—and us—the identity of this army. "These bones are the whole house of Israel.... Prophesy and say to them..., 'I will bring you up out of your graves, My people. I will bring you back to the land of Israel." I was taught from the cradle that when Messiah died, God abandoned Israel and His promises to them. This is a lie from perdition. If God can renege on any promise, what is to stop Him from lying about every promise.

But the Holy One never lies. He assures us often that He will raise His chosen nation from their graves and bring them back to the land they squandered through disobedience. When Messiah died, the penalty for that disobedience was paid. We who were not born into Israel were granted adoption through faith and obedience. The problem we still face, however, is that our dust so often constrains our spirit. The dryness of our bones inhibits our ability to fulfill the destiny for which we were created: glorifying God Almighty.

Our nature is to cling to dry bones. We latch onto tradition rather than divine communication. We exalt man-made doctrine over God-breathed instruction. We desperately grasp some imagined notion of "freedom in Christ" instead of His clear call: "If you love Me, keep My commandments." The root of much of this misplaced allegiance is ignorance and apathy regarding God's Word. Many believers attend Church meetings to hear from some pastor or minister or teacher what they are expected to believe. This is the anthesis of "study to show thyself approved."

Temporarily animated dust cannot afford complacency. No amount of emotionally gratifying "praise and worship," no repeated exposure to talented musicians and singers, no accumulation of "lessons" from the most gifted Bible teachers can take the place of picking up The Book and reading it from the beginning. Only then do we discover what it says. What little Bible reading most of us do is merely to shore up what we've been taught. We should rather imitate the noble Bereans and discover if what we have been taught is true.

An even dryer bone than willful ignorance is intentional disobedience. The Bible teaches that everyone will be resurrected. Some will be told, "Well done, good and faithful servant." Others will hear, "Depart from me for I never knew you." He will never know us as long as we insist that "grace" allows us to ignore the terms of His offer of salvation.

When the Bible says that Abraham "knew" Sarah, it refers to vastly more than intercourse. Yada is Hebrew for entering a covenant. The situation described in Matthew 7:23 gives Jesus no option but to say, "I never knew you." He addresses those who have chosen to not fulfill the blood-bought covenant He offers. 1 John 2:3-4 spells out our responsibility, "By this do we know that we know Him if we keep His commandments. If we say that we know Him and do not keep His commandments, we are liars, and the truth is not in us." Those who will hear "I never knew you" will wish that their dry bones had stayed in the dust.




My little lady and I am watching God TV... this wasn't even a scripture mentioned but I guess the Lord just spoke to me... it's been a while.

## An Apology, A D-Minus, and God's Forgiveness

"Praise is due to you, O God, in Zion; and to you shall vows be performed, O you who answer prayer! To you all flesh shall come. When deeds of iniquity overwhelm us, you forgive our transgressions. Happy are those whom you choose and bring near to live in your courts. We shall be satisfied with the goodness of your house, your holy temple." --- Psalm 65:1-3



A few years ago, I read a news story in The Washington Post about a college student who received an apology letter from his ex-girlfriend. Nick Lutz said the four-page note, handwritten on lined white notebook paper, appeared under the windshield wiper of his truck in the winter of 2017. It came from an ex-girlfriend whom he had blocked by phone and on social media. According to the article, "she wanted to say she was sorry, and she took some liberties with spelling and grammar in the process."

Lutz, who was still feeling betrayed by the breakup, marked up the letter. "Like a teacher grading a paper, he took a bright red pen and savaged it, correcting mistakes and leaving comments in the voice of a perturbed copy editor." He also gave her a grade, a D-minus, and wrote that he would accept "revision for half credit."

Then he posted a picture of it to Twitter and captioned the tweet, "When your ex writes you an apology letter so you grade it to send it back." It went viral, shared 121,000 times and liked 337,000 times, "and spurred a swarm of journalists from across the globe to write about his 'savage' words.

The University of Central Florida, where Lutz was a rising senior, suspended him over the viral tweet because, the school said, "it violated the student code of conduct for being 'disruptive' and 'harmful' (Katie Mettler, "A student graded his ex's apology note - D-minus - then tweeted it. He got suspended." 7/19/17). Lutz appealed the decision and eventually, the charges were dropped.

In today's passage, the Psalmist praises God for answering prayer and offering forgiveness. He understands the experience we all share in that our sins overwhelm us and separate us from God. We know what it is to experience life and we know ourselves to be sinners. And if God were a God who kept a record of our wrongdoings or graded us according to our performance, none of us would stand a chance. Even the temple, which was to be a meeting place between God and his people, was a continual reminder that the people met God there on the basis, not of their merit, but of his grace. Everyone, including the high priest, was a sinner in need of forgiveness, and "without the shedding of blood, there is no forgiveness" (Hebrews 9:22). Ultimately, God brings us near through the shed blood of Jesus Christ, who when lifted up (John 12:32-33), draws us near to live in God's presence.

Prayer: Lord, we all arrive at your doorstep sooner or later, loaded with guilt. Our sins are too much for us. Thank you for getting rid of them once and for all (adapted from The Message, Psalm 65:3).

In the gospel of Mark (10:17-22), there is a parable of a rich young ruler who runs to Christ asking Him what more he can do to inherit eternal life. Christ tells him to keep the last six of ten commandments on 'human to human' relationships. To which the young ruler quickly responds that he has kept these since youth. And Christ looks on him with love and states, 'you lack one thing, go and sell all your possessions and follow me'. The young ruler goes away sad for he had many possessions. This young ruler had perfected the 'art of backing up his trailer', the letter of the law, yet missed the spirit of the law, which is our relationship to Christ. Just as in the Ten Commandments, the first four are our relationship with Him, followed by our relationship with our fellow man. In a similar story in the gospel of Luke we see a lawyer asking Jesus what he needs to do to inherit eternal life; And a lawyer stood up and put Him to the test, saying, "Teacher, what shall I do to inherit eternal life?" And He said to him, "What is written in the Law? How does it read to you?" And he answered, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself." Luke 10:25-27

The relationship with God comes first and is the small coupling to the 'trailer' that follows-- our service to our neighbor. It is so easy to get lost in the 'doing' that we lose sight of Him whom we serve. Our works should be a by-product of our relationship to Christ, not something we do to earn eternal life like the young ruler, or the lawyer who was seeking God's grace. It is a gift. It is free, although it comes with a tremendous cost. It is free to all who will believe. I believe that God gives us the commandments to remind us of our insatiable need for His grace and mercy, as well as a reminder of the order we are to follow. His yoke is easy, and He will give us rest, and life in Him will be like a boat leaving the ramp at the end of a beautiful day.

#### Apple Fun At The Orchard

Once again, changes abound at the Orchard at Altapass. Doors of the red barn will now be open from Thursday through Sunday, giving folks another day to spend in the sunshine and along the trails that wind through now colorful, trees laden with not quite ripe apples. From the 400 in our nursery, not more than two feet tall, to the grand, 100-year old "father trees," with just enough life in them to keep going and green.

#### Off-Road Dump Trucks

The pleasant afternoon erupted with cries of surprise and pain as my four-year-old son wobbled to his feet and stumbled to my comfy chair in the shade. His copper-colored hair glinted in the sunlight as he neared me, crocodile tears flowing down his chubby cheeks. He intended to show me his scraped knee with its crumbs of dirt and reddened skin. But, when he was just twelve

inches short of arriving, a strange expression flitted across his face. He stopped, abruptly turned, and, without further ado, returned to his miniature off-road dump truck and its load of dirt.

Twenty-seven years later, I still smile at this tiny memory of parenting, but I'm amazed at its spiritual parallel in today's confused and wounded world. My son's intense immersion in his fascination with all things construction distracted him from his pain. He forsook a band-aid, a kiss from mom, and perhaps even a popsicle to return to his first love: his trucks.

I've often followed his lead when I fell and hurt myself on this world's sharp edges. As my heart cried tears of genuine and justified hurt, I ran to the typical first-aid stations of life such as lamenting my pain to friends. That is a good choice if the friend is wise and experienced in God's ways. But, ultimately, I realized that being immersed in my relationship with Jesus and fascinated by

all things Christian, I could be distracted from the crumbs of the world's dirt embedded in my wounded soul and return to a fascination with the Lover of my soul: my Redeemer and Friend,

I enter His Presence, and the world's hurts fade as I hear Him; the King of kings singing over me! (Zephaniah 3:17) And I feel comforted and close to Him when



I realize how much He thinks about me as shown by Psalm 139:17-18 which says, "How precious also are thy thoughts unto me, O God! how great is the sum of them! If I should count them, they are more in number than the sand: when I awake, I am still with thee.'

The Gospel enfolds me and draws me into praise for my Redeemer. The stories He tells in His Word rebalance my perspectives and the companionship we share refreshes, my weary grief-filled soul.

When we become so immersed in seeing Jesus face to face, in talking with him every day, in concentrating on our relationship and His Word, we can often be distracted from our hurt. The more serious the hurt, the longer it may take, but, eventually, tiny wisps of time with the one Who "hath borne our griefs and carried our sorrows" (Isaiah 53:4) can bring hope and healing.

Underneath our grief flows the current of the Holy Spirit's comfort; the hope of future joy, others' prayers for us, and the healing passage of time.

My four-year-old taught me how to operate a spiritual off-road dump truck to haul off the negative emotions from life's storms on that long-ago sunlit moment in his play. Try following this biblical map to help you offload the world's hurts.

Meditate on Scripture

Articulate and define your experience, setting it apart from yourself

Pray Psalm 51:10

Sing a praise song

#### The Greatest Sorry On Paper

Historians have fittingly nicknamed her the Nine Day Queen. The royal bloodline of England has had a fair amount of backbiting and backstabbing, especially when the throne was occupied by the Tudor family. And as if the Tudor family were not bloody enough on their own, throw in the mix the Protestant Reformation and England's execution-



ers put in a lot of overtime. The Nine Day Queen would be a young lady named Jane Grey. Her title was Lady Jane and she was the cousin of King Edward, who was dying. But King Edward's illness had been kept a secret. He was dying of what we call today, tuberculosis. King Edward was fiercely protestant. And when Edward died, since he had no children, the throne would have automatically gone to his half-sister, Mary. That would have been the natural succession. But there was a problem. Mary was a staunch Roman Catholic. While at the same time, Lady Jane was protestant.

On his deathbed, King Edward, guided by his royal court officials who were all protestant and followers of the Church of England, bequeathed in his last will and testament, the throne to his cousin, Jane Grey. The king dies and still the news is kept secret. Parliament is told that Edward has bequeathed the crown to his cousin and Jane Grey is quickly brought to the palace where she hears for the first time, Edward is dead and that he had left the throne to her. Jane at first flatly refuses to accept. Jane knows that others in the royal bloodline are ahead of her as far as occupying the throne. But with the overwhelming influence of King Edwards palace staff officials who are wanting to keep the church-state, the Church of England instead of going back to the Roman Catholic Church, they twist Jane Grey's arm hard enough that she finally agrees to be Queen of England.

Mary, Edward's half-sister, along with the rest of England are only told that Edward had died after Lady Jane had been crowned Queen. Mary immediately calls on the Roman Church to rally behind her and to gather the support of the military. After acquiring the backing of the military, the military comes marching into London and Queen Jane has no choice but to surrender the throne. Jane had been Queen of England for nine days.

Mary is crowned Queen and she would have Jane arrested for treason and she would be given a sentence of death. And so, on February 12th, 1554, Jane was brought to the scaffold where she would be given the opportunity to speak. Jane knelt down and proceeded to quote from memory, Psalm 51. Why was Psalm 51 chosen by Jane?

The Bible informs us that David was the author of Psalm 51. And we are even told when David wrote it. David wrote the song after he had been exposed as an adulterer and a murderer.

The celebrated English minister and preacher, best remembered as the author of the Christian allegory The Pilgrim's Progress, John Bunyan, would make this statement about Psalm 51. John Bunyan would write that Psalm 51 is the "greatest sorry" the world has ever witnessed. I agree with John Bunyan. David's repentance on display in Psalm 51 is truly a stunning sorry. "For I acknowledge my transgressions, and my sin is always before me...Purge me with hyssop and I shall be clean; wash me and I shall be whiter than snow...Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a steadfast spirit within me." Indeed, a stunning sorry! How's my sorry and how's your sorry? Intellectual religion is not enough. Only a repentant heart can be cleansed. May you and I deal truly with our own soul. Be as earnest, as persistent, as you would be if your mortal life were at stake. The Nine Day Queen, Lady Jane, would choose Psalm 51 as the words she would say with her last breath. She was 17 years old. John Bunyan wrote that Psalm 51 is the "greatest sorry" the world has ever witnessed. May we all, make the prayer of David our own.

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
#### No Regrets Family -Coronavirus and the Christian

Is God able to preserve me?

I would like to draw your attention to 2 Timothy 4:18

18 "And the Lord shall deliver me from every evil work, and will preserve me unto his heavenly kingdom: to



In other words, when we are saved God rescues our life. While on the cross the mob yelled at Jesus "He saved others, but He cannot save Himself." Jesus did not rescue His life from the cross, so He could rescue my life.

So, I cannot save my life and I cannot preserve my life. Jesus has already done that. If I cannot save my life the only thing, I can do is lose my life for Christ. Right now, our instructions or directives are Stay apart 6 feet, wear a face covering, stay at home, do not be in crowds of ten or more. And we know that people who are in contact with someone who has coronavirus may get sick.

These are not bad directives, but are they always necessary for a Christian and could they possibly cause anxiety and fear?

God's word tells us to minister to people, pray with people, lay hands on people, fellowship with people, gather with people, and witness to people. Am I to temporarily suspend my Christian directives for a time to comply with what institutions are telling me to do?

This has been very conflicting for me as a pastor and I have not been able to fully comply with our state mandates. Does this mean I do not have wisdom, or lack intelligence or tempting God?

If you think about wisdom in that way David would have never fought Goliath, Moses would not have crossed the Red Sea, Peter would have never walked on water, and Paul would have never been a missionary.

An eighteen-year-old girl from Georgia jumps out of a plane in a tandem parachute attempt. The parachute does not open properly and spins out of control the reserve parachute is deployed too late. And both young girls and 35-year-old instructor die.

Both the teenage girl and instructor were taking a known risk jumping out of an airplane. The instructor had probably made hundreds of successful jumps. Many people have died from failed parachute attempts. The young lady probably signed some type of waiver releasing the parachute company of any liability. Knowing the risks did not stop either of them from making the jump.

Trusting God during this pandemic is not like jumping out of an airplane with an instructor taking a risk trusting everything goes well. With a possibility, there may be a problem. That is not faith, but this is the way many Christians are living in this pandemic. We are afraid something is going to happen to us outside of God's control. And that causes fear.

Look at a couple of examples. First Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego in Daniel 3:16. They are living for the Lord and their faith is put to the test. They are thrown into a fire.

Second Stephen also a man doing the Lord's work in Acts 7:56. Stephen is stoned to death. Answer the following questions about these two events.

- 1. Are both men living for the Lord?
- 2. Are both men's lives put at risk of death?
- 3. Does God love one less than the other?
- 4. Do both men see Jesus?
- 5. Are both men willing to die for their faith?
- 6. Does God receive the Glory in both events?
- 7. Can I trust God through this pandemic with my Life?

I want to show you something about the word preserve and save or rescue.

1. The Lord Jesus did not save Himself so He could save you.

Luke 23:35 (KJV 1900)

35 "And the people stood beholding. And the rulers also with them derided him, saying, He saved others; let him save himself, if he be Christ, the chosen of God."

2. Jesus Christ saves people from sickness.

Matthew 9:22 (KJV 1900)

- 22 "But Jesus turned him about, and when he saw her, he said, Daughter, be of good comfort; thy faith hath made thee whole. And the woman was made whole from that hour.
- 3. Jesus Christ will preserve me.
- 2 Timothy 4:18 (KJV 1900)

18 "And the Lord shall deliver me from every evil work and will preserve me unto his heavenly kingdom: to whom be glory for ever and ever. Amen.'

The God who saved your soul is the God who heals you when you are sick and manifests Himself in your life for His glory. Just like the people in the Bible. Continuing to be the church is not about bravery or courage on my part, it is however about trusting God.

If God brings you to it, He will get you through it.

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#### The Inspiring Word

2 Corinthians 1:3-4 "Blessed be God, even the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of mercies, and the God of all comfort; (4) Who comforteth us in all our tribulation, that we may be able to comfort them which are in any trouble, by the comfort wherewith we ourselves are comforted of God."



If we step back and take a look at the world we live in it will horrify us; especially if we allow only what we see to shape our viewpoint. After all, there is anger, violence, terrorism, corruption, greed, and selfishness just to mention a few human behaviors. However, if we allow the Word of God, our Bible, to provide our viewpoint we still see all the bad stuff but we also receive comfort. The reality of God's comfort is what I want to give you this month. As the Lord led Paul to pen this letter to the Corinthian church, he began with a prayer. Paul began his prayer with a deeply focused description of God. Paul reminds us that God should be blessed; in other words, God is to be given praise and honor by all. We are not reading about any god, we are reading about "the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ" the Son of God and God the Son, mankind's only redeemer and salvation from sin. Jesus came to live and die among us and His death was not any normal experience of human suffering. The death of Jesus upon Calvary's Cross is the means God uses to make forgiveness available to stubborn, rebellious humans. This makes God "the Father of mercies" and the source of compassionate forgiveness.

God could have stopped there and it would have been more than any of us would have deserved, but He didn't, God's concern goes beyond His forgiving mercy. He is "the God of all comfort." God in heaven knows that His people experience physical, emotional, and, spiritual discouragement, suffering, and setbacks. We know from experience that God does not deal with the issues of life as we would, often God deals with the issues of life among His people by encouraging us and providing the sustaining strength we need to endure. Remember, whatever problem you are facing or will face, in the long run, God's comfort is greater.

Do you realize the word comfort, or a form of that word, is used in our passage five times? God's comfort is a central theme of Paul's prayer for the people of Corinth and likewise should be for the church as we minister today. Notice the God of comfort ministers to His people during every "tribulation" (trouble) large or small they are met with heavenly sustenance. Romans 8:32 reminds the born again Christian that God will not abandon His people during times of trouble.

We who have received God's comfort have also become agents to provide that comfort to others. Later in second Corinthians Paul reminds us how the presence of other Christians encouraged him as he endured life's tribulations. Today, God's comfort comes to the world we live in through the Church; those who belong to God through Christ. I hope you can see that we as the Church have the ability and responsibility to share with others during their time of need; for example, we should share our experience, encouragement, assurance, and resources. Being the hands of Jesus creates a connection that is empowered by the Holy Spirit and provides empathy, encouragement, and reassurance that God's love and comfort are made real and tangible as His people become vessels that carry to others what God has already given to us. Of course, as we share, we should never forget to share the soul-saving power of Jesus Christ. We have not just a commission but a Great Commission to reach everyone within our influence with the witness and testimony of Jesus Christ. Until we meet again in print or person, may God Bless you is my prayer.

#### Alcohol Use Disorder (AUD)

How do you know?

We are sober alcoholics. We are a paradox.

It was an icy-cold, winter Sunday afternoon in January 1992. We were living in New England when my wife gave me an ultimatum: "Quit drinking or move out!!!"

Opening the kitchen refrigerator door, I withdrew the remaining bottle of beer and hurled it as hard as I could into our backyard woods. The bottle made a violent, smashing sound as it collided with an old birch tree, tiny shards of glass splintering as they fell to the fresh snow below.

A paradox, as I had to surrender to win my battle against my cunning foe, Alcohol.

Alcohol-induced loneliness, despair, and depression which had become unbearable, and I became aware of my dark thoughts of suicide. I was at my bottom! I was physically, mentally, and spiritually bankrupt-and realized that continuing to drink meant certain death, jail, or being institutionalized.

As a young person, I, like many of my friends, "enjoyed" drinking; but how much is too much? For me, there was no such thing as "just having a drink." How could anybody drink "just one?"

It is not uncommon for people to deny that they have a drinking problem. Denial ("deNile") is not just a river that flows through Egypt!

Technically speaking, what is a "drink?" One standard drink, according to the American Medical Association (AMA) is a 12 oz. can of beer, a 5 oz. a glass of wine or a 1.5 oz. the measure of any liquor. For men, low-risk alcohol consumption is considered drinking four or fewer drinks on any single day and fewer than 14 drinks during a given week.

The guidelines for low-risk drinking for women are lower. The National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism (NIAAA) guidelines suggest low-risk drinking for women is having three or fewer standard drinks per day and no more than seven drinks per week. Heavy alcohol use is defined by the AMA as drinking five or more drinks for men and four or more drinks for women on the same day on each of five or more days within a given month. I have spilled more than this! Alcoholism is a chronic, progressive disease with varying symptoms including an insatiable desire to drink despite negative consequences with work or relationships and health-related problems. Alcoholism is oftentimes referred to as a family disease as it is frequently passed genetically among extended family members. For years, I did not, and you may not, recognize the signs of alcohol abuse in yourself or someone else. If you have to ask, "Is my drinking a problem?" it probably is a problem.

Even the description of the disease of alcoholism has become subject to political correctness. It is now being referred to as Alcohol Use Disorder (AUD).

AUD is considered by mental health experts to be a chronic, relapsing, brain disease characterized by an impaired ability to stop or control alcohol use despite adverse social, occupational, or health consequences, i.e. death, jail, and/or institutions.

Following the American Psychiatric Association (APA), if a person exhibits two or more symptoms from a list of eleven criteria, he or she is diagnosed as having AUD, which includes degree classifications of mild, moderate, and severe. My family doctor never questioned my alcohol intake amount or frequency and, if he had, I would have lied.

The statistics regarding AUD are not encouraging. Research originating with the National Council on Alcoholism and Drug Dependence (NCADD) reports 17.6 million people in the U.S. to suffer from alcohol abuse or dependence. This equates to one in every thirteen adults.

The Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) estimates that annually 88,000 people, approximately 62,000 men, and 26,000 women, die from alcohol-related causes. This makes alcohol the third leading preventable cause of death in the United States, the first being tobacco use and the second, poor diet and physical inactivity.

How do you know if you are an alcoholic or AUD positive? There is no disposable, COVID-19-type test that provides same-day, positive or negative results. I was painfully aware I was an alcoholic long before my January 1992 sobriety date. It was a dark and lonely secret I kept from my family and Christian friends for years.

How did I know I was an alcoholic? Perhaps, you too can identify with some of my earliest symptoms.

For years, I told myself I could stop drinking any time I so desired. However, I discovered at an early age there was no such thing as "just one" glass, shot, bottle, or can of anything containing alcohol and once I started, I could not stop. My self-discipline and ability to manage my alcohol intake had essentially evaporated. On too many occasions to count, I promised myself and others I would have just one drink. However, I ignored these promises, failing miserably in my attempts to keep them, every time.

Trying to be funny and popular among my peers, I would announce to anyone listening, "I only have a drinking problem when there is nothing around to drink." I secretly wished well-meaning family members and friends would mind their own business, not tell me what to do, and stay in their lane when discussing my drinking. I was completely unaware of experiencing the alcohol-related personality changes I was accused of. My drinking had progressively become more important to me than my job, my wife, my children, my Christian family, and friends. My alcohol-induced behavior included attending only those events that allowed me to drink and socialize with others who drank as I did. I began to not trust people who did not drink. My repeated attempts to stop drinking lasted over a weekend or two, but sobriety never lasted more than a couple of days.

When I did stop abruptly, "cold turkey," I noticed mental and physical symp-

toms including insomnia, tremors, mood swings, and depression. Occasionally, I would just drink beer or wine, steadfast in my belief that nobody could be an alcoholic if he or she just drank beer or wine.

It was not unusual behavior for me to obtain "extra" drinks methodically and skillfully at "open-bar events" for fear they would run out. Also, to eliminate my anxiety, I routinely consumed several drinks "prior" to attending any event. I carefully calculated the distance to be traveled and always measured the number of beers I would need to bring and drink on the way. Once at a party, I would refrain from eating anything that might jeopardize my sought-after "buzz."

A trip to pick-up a pizza or run a local errand included the same routine of bringing a designated number of beers with me to correlate to the length and time of the round-trip drive. I never considered this behavior reckless as my children in the back seat were always safely buckled into their seatbelts. Yikes!!!

I continued to use alcohol despite negative emotional effects such as depression, anxiety, and memory lapses. It never occurred to me that alcohol itself was a depressant and that depression coincided with my alcohol abuse. Guilty of missing days at work due to calling in sick, aka, hangovers, had become far too frequent. The weekend mornings were riddled with dry-mouth and throbbing headaches.

Toward the end of my drinking career, I was living to drink and drinking to live and had become sick and tired of being sick and tired. My abusive drinking eliminated any chance of what I believed to be well-deserved work promotions. This resulted instead infrequent job performance failures and numerous involuntary terminations.

My activity caused painful financial strife and difficulties for my family, creating stress that was seemingly unbearable and initiating yet darker and increased episodes of depression. My self-esteem deteriorated. I noticed simple things like my hands shaking and difficulty making direct eye contact with others in social and business settings.

I became increasingly aware of the many mornings I met the bathroom mirror staring back at bloodshot eyes and broken capillaries beginning to appear on my nose and face. My continued inability to show up for scheduled meetings on time and my loss of focus and concentration in social and business settings got progressively worse.

I began making excuses for not attending social and family gatherings, as I was spending more time self-isolating and drinking alone at home. I noticed it took me increasingly longer to capture my elusive alcohol "buzz." I constantly compared my drinking to others. I noted, with congratulatory pride, that many of my friends drank considerably more than I did. I envied people who could drink without ever getting into trouble.


Something had to change! That day in 1992, when given the ultimatum, triggered the change. I began attending my local Church's 12-Step meetings and taking the advice of a former prep-school classmate who suggested attending ninety 12-Step meetings in ninety days.

In hindsight, attending ninety 12-Step meetings in ninety days saved my life. I am now sober twenty-eight years (10,220 days and counting) and live a happy, healthy life, second to none. I was able to find a way to like myself again.

If you, a family member, or a friend can relate to any of my described symptoms and story and would like to talk, please call me. And if you do not reach out to me, reach out to someone. There are countless resources available in your community through 12-Step groups, clergy, hotlines, and those who care about you. You do not have to go through what I did alone.

Thank you in advance for allowing me to share my story which helps me stay sober for another day.

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

#### Salvation: A Marvelous Work of God's Grace

Beginning in Colossians 1:10 and continuing through verse 12, Paul described four dimensions of a worthy walk: continuous fruit (vs. 10a), increasing knowledge (vs. 10b), increased power (vs 11), and increased praise (vs. 12). It is this latter dimension of praise that forms the basis of this article. As believers, we should respond with thanks to God the Father for the salvation He has



given, for the work of salvation will occupy the praises of all believers for all eternity. The salvation that believers have today is a work for which God is responsible; therefore, it is a work for which God is to be praised.

The first work that God has done is "made us meet to be partakers of the inheritance of the saints in light." A foundational element of salvation is understanding our condition prior to salvation. Romans 3:23 teaches, "For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God." Mankind is hopelessly lost and unable to save himself. Thank God for Romans 5:8, "But God commendeth his love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us." In our state of sinful and rebellious individuals, God publicly demonstrated His love towards those who are undeserving to provide a way of salvation. That way of salvation is found only by placing one's faith in Jesus Christ. At that very moment, Colossians 1:12 teaches God has "made us meet." In other words, God caused us to be sufficient – not because of ourselves, but because of the work done by Jesus Christ. We are given the "power [right, authority] to become the sons of God." We are declared by God to be fitting to have a share in the inheritance that belongs to all believers. At the very moment, we placed our trust in Jesus Christ, we were made adequate and

The second work God has done is He "hath delivered us from the power of darkness." Ephesians 2:1-3 describes the state of every unbeliever by teaching, "And you hath he quickened, who were dead in trespasses and sins; 2 Wherein in time past ye walked according to the course of this world, according to the prince of the power of the air, the spirit that now worketh in the children of disobedience: 3 Among whom also we all had our conversation in times past in the lusts of our flesh, fulfilling the desires of the flesh and of the mind; and were by nature the children of wrath, even as others." At the moment of salvation, God rescued us and freed us from the imprisonment of the power of darkness. Once again, we are unable to do this. This is a work that belongs to God alone. We have been rescued out of the domain of darkness. We have been rescued out of the sphere in which Satan's power is exercised, the realm of spiritual darkness. Understand that the moment you were saved, you were delivered from the domain and rule of spiritual darkness. Therefore, you do not have to sin; you choose to sin.

The third work God has done is He "hath translated us into the kingdom of his dear Son." As unsaved individuals, we operated in the realm of spiritual darkness. The moment that we placed our trust in Jesus Christ, God the Father transferred us from the domain and rule of spiritual darkness and placed us into the kingdom of His dear Son. Therefore, He is the One under whose rule we are now under. No longer in Adam, the believer has been placed in Jesus Christ. It is a position of absolute security from which we can never be taken, regardless of what we may experience or what we may do. John 10:27-30 teaches, "My sheep hear my voice, and I know them, and they follow me: 28 And I give unto them eternal life; and they shall never perish, neither shall any man pluck them out of my hand. 29 My Father, which gave them me, is greater than all; and no man is able to pluck them out of my Father's hand. 30 I and my Father are one.'

It is in Jesus Christ that we discover the fourth work of salvation: "redemption through his blood." The term redemption is a theological term that pictures an individual standing on the auction block to be auctioned to the highest bidder. When the bids are cast, those who have placed their trust in Jesus Christ have been purchased by Him. Therefore, they have been released from sin and the bondage that it entails. No longer under the slave master of sin and death, the believer is forever a servant of Jesus Christ. He is redeemed and set free from sin. The means through which this is done is the blood of Jesus Christ. Those who place their complete trust in the finished work of Jesus Christ are saved. Romans 10:13 promises the individual who calls to Him in faith, "thou shalt be saved." This saved person is now set free from the bondage of Satan, sin, and death. Redeemed, how I love to proclaim it!

Finally, the fifth work of salvation is "the forgiveness of sins." For some, forgiveness is a difficult reality to accept because we often base it on feelings. Forgiveness is the act of freeing from an obligation, guilt, or punishment. As difficult as this is to comprehend, forgiveness is the complete pardon and cancellation of sin. When God forgives, God forgives completely. The moment a person is saved he experiences God's forgiveness of all sin – past, present, and future. Psalm 103:12 teaches, "As far as the east is from the west, so far hath he removed our transgressions from us." Psalm 32:1-2 teaches, "Blessed is he whose transgression is forgiven, whose sin is covered. 2Blessed is the man unto whom the Lord imputeth not iniquity, and in whose spirit there is no guile." Hebrews 10:17 states, "And their sins and iniquities will I remember no more." God wills to remember them no more. God never recalls to mind that which He already forgave. The recall is either Satan, self, or both.

Rejoice in the salvation that you have been given. If you are a believer, embrace who you are in Jesus Christ. Each of us will quickly acknowledge that we are completely unworthy; remember it is not what you have done; it is what God did. You only need to trust Him.

#### Understanding Faith and How It Works

What is faith? And what does it look like to actually live

These are important questions because we receive and experience the blessings God has for us through faith.

Hebrews 11:1 says, "Faith is the assurance (title deed, confirmation) of things hoped for (divinely guaranteed),

and the evidence of things not seen [the conviction of their reality – faith comprehends as fact what cannot be experienced by the physical senses]" (AMP).

I like to define faith as the hand that reaches out and receives what God has for us. By faith, we believe what God says in His Word is true, that it's for us, and that we will receive everything He wants to give us. We believe we have His promises before we get them or experience them.

Everyone has faith, but not everyone puts their faith in God. For example, when a person sits in a chair, they have faith that the chair will hold them. People drive to work because they have faith in the traffic laws that make it possible to travel on the roads.

But first and foremost, we need to put our faith in God and the truth of the

Romans 1:17 says, "For in the gospel the righteousness of God is revealed, both springing from faith and leading to faith [disclosed in a way that awakens more faith]. As it is written... 'The just and upright shall live by faith.'

This verse reveals that we're saved by faith and we are created to live by faith. In order to live by faith, we have to release it, and there are three ways we do that: praying, saying, and doing.

#### The Privilege of Prayer

Prayer is the greatest privilege we have! Amazingly, we can personally communicate with Almighty God, the Creator of the Universe. That means we can talk to Him and He hears us, and He wants to talk to us.

One of the main ways we hear God's voice is through His Word, which is why it's critically important for us to study the Bible. When we diligently study the Word, we get a revelation of who God is, how He loves us, and what His will is for our lives. We learn how to pray for the things He wants to give us...the kind of life Jesus died for us to have.

James 4 says that people live in strife, quarreling, and fighting because they try to get what they want and they're jealous of what others have, but they can't make it happen for themselves. Verses 2-3 say, "You covet but cannot get what you want, so you quarrel and fight. You do not have because you do not ask God. When you ask, you do not receive, because you ask with wrong motives, that you may spend what you get on your pleasures" (NIV).

Have you been trying to get something or make something happen and you're frustrated because you can't achieve it? Maybe you're struggling because you're striving to do it in your own strength or you're going after things that aren't right for you or in God's plan for your life.

We need to pray and ask God for what we want, but we need to ask for the blessings He wants to give us. I often pray like this: "God, I'm going to ask You for everything I want, but if I ask for something that's not right for me, please don't give it to me. I really only want what YOU want for me because You know what's best for me."

#### **Praying for the Promises of God**


There are some situations where we may not know for sure what God's will is, and that's when we need to trust that if we don't get what we think we want, it's because He has something better for us. But there are many things we can ask for with assurance and confident expectation that God will give them because He promises them to us in His Word. Here are a few...

- You don't have to be lonely because God is always with you (Psalm 73:23; Hebrews 13:50).
- You can have peace in every situation (John 14:27; Philippians 4:6-7).
- You can have God's wisdom for every decision (James 1:5).
- You have the strength, in Christ, to do whatever you need to do (Philippians

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

#### Stand Fast In The Lord – Philippians 4: 1

The book of Philippians is a letter from Paul to the Philippians, thanking them for the gift they sent him, after learning of his detention in Rome.

In V.1, Paul's words to "Stand fast in the Lord" are encouragement, but it is more than that. It is actually a commandment from Paul. He knew they also faced struggles,



There are many other notables in the bible who continued to "stand fast in the Lord". When young David determined to stand against the giant Goliath, he "hastened and ran toward the army to meet the Philistine". This courageous act was only possible by "standing fast in the Lord". Daniel is another great man in the bible, who was also willing to die for his faith. He knew he worshiped a living God and refused to worship another god, even when his life was threatened. Words of strength often fail when faced with reality. When Daniel was taken to the lion's den, he was faced with what would be considered certain death. Daniel had committed that he would die instead of worshiping a false god. As he stood fast in the Lord, he was delivered.

Who would you include among the list of great men who "Stood fast in the Lord"? Moses, Abraham, Stephen, Sampson, Apostle Peter? How did these men stand fast – by realizing they were not standing alone but "in the Lord". The word "stand" appears in 669 instances in the bible. We cannot show a position of strength or determination if we are sitting or lying down. Our standing must always be combined with "in the Lord" for we cannot do it alone. We first stood fast in the Lord when we surrendered our life to Jesus Christ and trusted him for salvation. When we feel weary and want to give up, remember the scriptures and the examples in the bible of those who stood fast. As with Paul and men of old, Jesus, our defender, is always available to us; we never stand alone.

What do we need to stand fast from? From the workings of the devil, as he brings temptation, conflict, persecution, worries, or doubts to us. By standing fast in the Lord, we can rejoice in our circumstances and overcome them. We will gain strength and courage as we go forth in the work of the ministry.

Most of you are familiar with a Christian hymnal entitled "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus. As a child in bible school, we would march around the auditorium, carrying the American, State, and Christian flag banners, as we sang this song. In 1858, George Duffield, Jr. assisted a fellow minister (Dudley Tyng) in a revival of evangelicalism in Pennsylvania. Over 5,000 men attended with over 1,000 converts resulting. Tyng died the following month in a farming accident. Duffield wrote the song, based on the previous revival message of "Go now ye that are men, and serve the Lord". He recited the new hymn, at the memorial, as a tribute to his friend.

Stand up, Stand up for Jesus, Ye soldiers of the cross. Lift high his royal banner, It must not suffer loss....

When we face difficulties, let's remember they are nothing compared to Paul and others in the bible, as we Stand Fast in the Lord.

#### Kenyan Missionaries From NC Feed Thousands During COVID Crisis

Travis and Laura Sawyer have welcomed visitors to their Kenyan mission station for the past 15 years. Moving from Robbinsville, NC, serving a large Massai bush village in Sekenani, Kenya has been their passion. The Sawyers, along with their four girls, are integrated into the community in almost every senset of village life. The rights and sounds of the

most every aspect of village life. The sights and sounds of the village are surprisingly breathtaking.

A larger than life sunset blazes above the grasslands of the Massai Mara. Cowbells ring like music as boys lead the long lines of goats and cattle back to the home pen for the night. Women can be seen still sitting in circles, finishing up their elaborate beading projects. Children are chasing each other around the family mud huts, while the fires inside are heating up for the evening meal. Men are gathered around a large tree for an evening chat and if you look hard, the zebra and gazelle are in for their evening graze. Simple, happy. ....until COVID.

Kenyan authorities reacted as did many other countries and placed quarantine guidelines and a lock-down for businesses and gatherings. Bush life is inevitably hard, due to the remoteness, but now there is no trading of those goats and cattle for income. The women are unable to sell that elaborate beadwork to tourists or shops. Children are unable to go to school, not having the meal normally provided for them there. Men have no way to make money due to quarantine guidelines and no markets are available to purchase food.

.....People are starving.

Laura said, "It is almost unbearable to see your friends going hungry" and of course, they did something about it. Straight Up Missions, the Sawyers independent mission survives on donations. Travis said, "We did not know in the beginning how many we could feed, but we had to try".

In the first week of April, the Sawyers began to distribute food bags and were excited to feed a total of 25 families in week one. Each bag costing \$5, contains enough food for a family of eight for three days. The Sawyer's efforts have grown exponentially with God's grace! They quickly grew within weeks to feeding over 400 families twice weekly and have expanded into other nearby villages that are in desperate need as well. The food distribution has been so expansive, the Kenyan government has recognized the Sawyer family. Even with these amazing efforts, this is still not enough! Travis says "Despite Kenya beginning to relax some guidelines, it may take months to impact the bush". A video from their Facebook site, The Sawyers In Kenya, shows villagers in such need for food, they happily take leftover rotten cabbage. The videos which they post weekly, show lines of villagers almost as far as the eye can see, waiting for their bag of food. Unfortunately, some do walk away unfed due to the demand and lack of funding. Laura said, "We will not stop as long as God gives us strength".

The Sawyers have no intent on slowing their efforts. Galatians 6:2 tells us "Carry each other's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ". Their mission exemplifies selfless love and carrying the burden, as the entire family spends countless hours preparing and packaging food each week for distribution. To continue with food distribution, donations must continue to support the efforts.

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


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#### Burke County Public Schools Opens Burke County Virtual Academy

Burke County Public Schools will open Burke County Virtual Academy in the fall for students and parents seeking a longer-term, flexible remote learning option. The academy will be open to any K-12 student whether currently enrolled with Burke County Public Schools or in homeschool, private school, or charter school anywhere in the state.



Dr. Christie Abernathy, director of Advance Learning, explained that this tuition-free option offers personalized education to students who want more flexibility in their school day or a blended model partnership between the home and public school. Abernathy said, "The Burke County Virtual Academy is optimal for students who learn best working independently in an online environment. While a traditional school has a more formal structure and schedule, our virtual academy allows students and parents to organize their daily school work routine. The flexible schedule alleviates conflicts between school and other commitments students may have. The Burke County Virtual Academy also offers a personalized learning program that is tailored to a student's needs, and provides parents the opportunity to guide and facilitate their child's education in the home environment."

Burke County Public Schools Superintendent Dr. Larry Putnam said talented, local teachers who are licensed and highly qualified will design the Burke County Virtual Academy courses and provide students engaging and interactive instruction.

Putnam explained how the Burke County Virtual Academy came about and why it would be appealing to homeschoolers. He said, "This virtual academy has been in the works for a while now - even before COVID-19 hit. We saw this as a great opportunity to accelerate its opening and provide families interested in a true virtual academy the option to take advantage of it now. Maybe families have been homeschooling and are looking for something different, something more. The Burke County Virtual Academy is ideal for students in a homeschool setting because they receive additional academic support while maintaining a flexible schedule and personalized learning. Since our academy does not charge tuition, enrolling will eliminate the cost associated with purchasing online content for your children. As for our students already enrolled in Burke County Public Schools, we understand there are uncertainties with how the regular school year will open in August -- face-to-face versus remote or a combination -- but this Burke County Virtual Academy is separate and will not be affected by mandated school openings and closings based on the COVID-19 pandemic."

Abernathy said the ideal student for Burke Virtual Academy is one who demonstrates that he or she can be successful in a virtual learning environment. Students will need access to a computer and a reliable, high-speed internet. She said several examples of students who may be interested in the Burke County Virtual Academy include high school students who are dual-enrolled in college courses and want the flexibility to fully develop a schedule conducive to taking college courses, completing required high school courses and/or working jobs simultaneously. Or students who may be pursuing other interests in areas such as elite athletics, equestrian and similar competitions, or the fine arts.

All Burke County Virtual Academy classes are aligned with the North Carolina Standard Course of Study and include all core content areas: English/Language Arts, Mathematics, Science, and Social Studies. Some elective classes will be offered as well. The Burke County Virtual Academy follows the Burke County Schools academic calendar. While students have flexibility about where and when to complete assignments, they are expected to login and work every school day, and to follow course deadlines established by their teacher. Burke County Virtual Academy students are required to take all end-of-course exams face-to-face at a central location with other virtual students.

For those interested in the Burke County Virtual Academy, there is at least a semester-long commitment. Abernathy said, "Students who start school in August enrolled in the Burke County Virtual Academy are expected to maintain enroll-

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#### God is Bigger

When my brothers and I were growing up, Veggie Tales was one of our favorite video series. Each episode of Veggie Tales included talking vegetables who taught children common Bible stories and basic Christian values. In one particular episode, which I think was the very first one titled "Where's God When I'm S-Scared?" Junior Asparagus watches a scary movie before going to bed. After his



parents took him to bed and turned off the lights, he began to see monsters and dark shadows in his bedroom and became frightened. The video cuts to Larry the Cucumber and Bob the Tomato, who then started to teach Junior Asparagus that he didn't need to be afraid because God is bigger than the boogie man. As the Veggies talk about the problem, they break out into a song called, "God is bigger than the boogie man". I have never forgotten the chorus of the song which goes like this, "God is bigger than the boogie man. He's bigger than Godzilla, or the monsters on TV. Oh, God is bigger than the boogie man. And He's watching out for you and me."

We all have times when we are scared of something. Some of us are scared of snakes and spiders. Some of us are scared of flying. Some of us are scared of trying new things, like new foods because what if it doesn't taste good or going to new places because we've never been there and we don't know what it's like. Being scared, being afraid of something can sometimes paralyze us where we are. Fear is a real emotion that warns us of danger but too often we allow fear too much space in our lives, like being afraid of boogie men under the bed, monsters on tv, and Godzilla.

During the time that Moses was leading the people out of bondage, he sent representatives from each of the 12 tribes of Israel to explore the Promised Land. After 40 days they returned with some of the fruit of the land and this report: "They gave Moses this account: "We went into the land to which you sent us, and it does flow with milk and honey! Here is its fruit" (Numbers 13:27). So far, so good! But then the fear bomb drops! "But the people who live there are powerful, and the cities are fortified and very large. We even saw descendants of Anak there. 29 The Amalekites live in the Negev; the Hittites, Jebusites, and Amorites live in the hill country; and the Canaanites live near the sea and along with the Jordan" (Numbers 13: 28-29).

Some of the men who went and viewed the land began to make excuses for why they couldn't and shouldn't go into the Promised Land. We can't do this because people are more powerful than us. We can't do this because the cities are fortified and too big. We can't do this because we would be surrounded by our enemies and they are a lot stronger than we are. They kept on and on about the problems in the land so much so that the bad news was beginning to overshadow the good news about the land. All they could see was what they were afraid of.

Caleb took a bold stand and silenced the people. He proclaimed, "We should go up and take possession of the land, for we can certainly do it" (Numbers 13: 30). He was the one who looked around in faith and said we can do this. Caleb has the right attitude because he was grounded in faith in the Almighty God. He had a different spirit about him than the other men. Caleb followed God wholeheartedly and was not going to cower in fear or back away with a lack of courage. He knew this was the right time and he knew they needed to act in obedience to God. But as we continue on, we find that negativity, gossip, and fear are a powerful combination. The rest of the men were consumed by fear of the giant people living in the land. They felt like grasshoppers in comparison. They became hysterical and tried to stop the mission (Numbers 13:31-33).

Finally, Joshua spoke up and said, "The land we passed through and explored is exceedingly good. 8 If the Lord is pleased with us, he will lead us into that land, a land flowing with milk and honey, and will give it to us. 9 Only do not rebel against the Lord. And do not be afraid of the people of the land, because we will devour them. Their protection is gone, but the Lord is with us. Do not be afraid of them" (Numbers 14:7-9).

In grief over the lack of faith of his friends, Joshua tore his clothes and pleaded with the people.

He knew that God was with them. Out of the 12 men who went to explore the land that God was promising to them, only the two of them, Joshua, and Caleb, had the faith to move ahead. To the others, it seemed impossible. Fear was the dominant emotion and negativity fed the fear. But the two young men knew that just because the majority seems to agree doesn't mean that it's true. What the Israelites had forgotten was that God is bigger than the problems we face.

Has there ever been a time in your life when you were scared to try something? Maybe you were thinking about going back to school, but you were scared because everyone was younger or more tech-savvy than you. Maybe you were offered a new job opportunity but were scared because you would have to move somewhere new and unfamiliar. Maybe you were feeling led to volunteer for something, but you were scared that you didn't have anything to offer.

If God is leading us somewhere, we don't have to be afraid. And in those times when we are afraid when the problems seem giant-sized and impossible and we are just feeling small, like grasshoppers compared to giants in the field. We have the opportunity to lean on God and to trust him. God is calling us and compelling us to something new and God will provide for us.

Maybe you are facing financial, health or other kinds of personal problems and you're just frozen because you don't know what to do. Friends let me tell you something, God is bigger than the problems we face.

You might be asking what happened to the Israelites. Well in a nutshell the rest of chapter 14 tells us that the Israelites decided not to go into the Promised Land. And because they had given in to fear they spent the next 40 years wandering around in the desert. They spent one year in the desert for every day they explored

the Promised Land. And of the 12 that explored the Promised Land, only Joshua and Caleb got to go and live in it 40 years later. An entire generation of Israelites missed out on going into the Promised Land because they let their fear get the best of them. They didn't trust in God. We must remember, God is bigger than the problems we face.

Let's not miss out on what God may be doing in our lives and our midst because we can't see what the future holds. Let's not let fear stop us from where God is leading us. Let's not let our fear cause us to wander around in the wilderness. We may have problems, but we have a God who understands our problems and is bigger than all the problems we face all put together!

Friends the good news for us today is that God is bigger than the problems we face. And we can take comfort knowing that no matter what we face in life God is with us. As we continue to live in the face of the invisible enemy of COVID-19 and the uncertainty it brings in all our lives today. We can't let fear rob us of the joy of living. It cannot steal our joy and peace with God. We do not need to fear our position with God because no matter what you're facing today, God is bigger than the problems we face. "God is bigger than the boogie man. And He's watching out for you and me."

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

The key verse to understanding the entire epistle of Romans is found in Romans 1:16. Here, Paul declares that he is not ashamed of the Gospel, for it is the power of God unto salvation for everyone who believes. Today, the reason so many churches are blessing same-sex marriage, neglecting the call to evangelism, approving other "paths" to God, and preaching



self-help instead of the doctrines of sin and salvation is that they have not taken this verse to heart. They are ashamed of the Gospel, so they change it and redefine it—blunting the two-edged sword of God's Word and deactivating its power. And our society is reaping the consequences. My friend, the call on your life and mine is to remain unashamed of the Gospel, to lovingly lift high the Truth of our Savior, and to trust Him with our lives. All of us will, at one time or another, be tempted to hide our light under a basket. As you seek to serve and witness for Christ more and more, this temptation may become even stronger. Satan will try to convince you that it's not worth the effort. Beloved, stand firm in that evil day. Remember that it is the Gospel that breaks the iron yoke of sin, shatters the chains of addictions, and flings open the heavy gates of darkness. May God grant us each the grace and understanding to remain unashamed. Have you had moments when you wanted to hide your light before others? Ask God for the courage to be a faithful witness The call to live loud for Christ, unashamed of the Gospel, is clear in scripture. But how do we live with such boldness? The answer is threefold, and it comes from a close look at Romans 1 and the life of the apostle Paul. The first reason Paul could live unashamed of the gospel was because he knew who he was and to whom he belonged. He knew that Jesus was Lord Christ and he knew that he had been set apart by Him to be His apostle (vv. I, 4). Paul knew that his identity was in Christ, and nothing could take that away from him. In a day when so many people are mixed up about who they are, when it is fashionable to question your gender or define yourself by your political party, it is refreshing to see the apostle Paul hold so tightly to his blood bough identity. He was not confused about what his purpose on earth was supposed to be. He knew his identity—he was a servant of Jesus Christ. My beloved friends, this is the healthiest self-perception you can have. Remember, "You also are among those Gentiles who are called to belong to Jesus Christ" (v. 6), Firmly root yourself in this glorious identity today, and you will be anchored regardless of what opposition comes your way. Don't miss out on the peace that comes from knowing who and whose you are! How do you define yourself? Does this align with who the Lord Jesus Christ says you are?

#### NCBAM Connects with Retired Pastors through Servant Care

In late March, when many churches stopped meeting and senior adults were advised to self-isolate, regional directors at North Carolina Baptist Aging Ministry (NCBAM) immediately heightened efforts to communicate with all Servant Care participants—making 200



contacts in the first month. NCBAM's Servant Care outreach provides priority access to ministry services to pastors, music ministers, and missionaries (65+), including their spouses or surviving spouses. The outreach also offers fellowship and educational opportunities for participants through ENCORE programs and regional events.

"It's such a blessing to connect with Servant Care participants," said Charity Johnson who serves the southeast region. "It makes me feel God placed me in this ministry for a purpose. He's equipped me with skills that I can give back and help take care of His pastors and His ministers who have dedicated their lives to God's people. They have always put others first and now it's time for us to put them first."

Rev. H. is a Servant Care participant whom Johnson calls regularly. After serving as a Baptist pastor for more than 50 years, Rev. H. was widowed in 2014. Now at age 87, failing eyesight makes cooking for himself difficult. In addition to providing friendly calls and cards, Johnson also connected Rev. H. with a ministry at her church and now three homecooked meals are delivered each week to his home. "It's a blessing to help meet his needs," said Johnson. "He is so grateful."

Another of Johnson's Servant Care participants is Rev. M., a retired pastor, and director of missions. "In addition to calling, I also send notes. Rev. M. called me back in tears. He said the Bible verse I had included in my note was a blessing to him as he was just starting chemo treatments. It blessed me that God used me in that way. It wasn't me. It was God using me to encourage someone."

Johnson says that social isolation imposed by the COVID-19 pandemic greatly heightened the loneliness many Servant Care participants were already experiencing. "With not being able to attend church or even see family, their only human contact each week might be wearing a mask and going to the grocery store at 6:00 am. Many need prayer right now and of someone just to talk to. It's such a blessing to connect with these people of God."

Samantha Allred, north-central regional director, sees a common thread among the Servant Care participants she connects with. "I'm so glad we're reaching out to them because I feel it is ten times harder for pastors and ministers to talk about their needs. They're used to serving others; it takes pressing to discover what their needs might be."

Allred says that blessing is hers when connecting with Servant Care participants. "Rev. B. was very grateful for my call but told me right away, 'Don't bother with me; call someone who needs it more.' Now, he is most likely to initiate a call; he is graciously mentoring me as a young person in my first years of ministry work. He's very encouraging and I appreciate the advice he's offered me."

Allred has also befriended Mrs. F., an 86-year-old widow. "She is newly isolated because of the pandemic and takes seriously the recommendations to self-isolate. Her son delivers groceries and apart from doctor visits, she doesn't leave home. We've bonded over sewing and quilting. She tells me about her projects and encourages me to take it up as a hobby. Every time we hang up she thanks me and says, 'Please keep calling.'"

Allred had made regular visits to the home of Rev. and Mrs. P. since 2018 and now they communicate through cards and phone calls. "She recently told me, 'Please keep your cards and letters coming. We get so excited when we see them."

Allred is grateful for the special relationships she has with Servant Care participants. "During times like this, small things can have the biggest impact. It blesses me to know I can make a difference through a simple phone call."

Angie Gregg, west regional director, has been especially touched by widows she has connected with during the pandemic. "Mrs. C. is in her 90s and although still active, she's very appreciative of the calls and loves to talk about her late husband's pastorate and their lives in ministry. When I mentioned one of his accomplishments, she was so pleased and said, 'Oh, you know about that?!'


Gregg had an especially poignant conversation with another widow, 91-year old Mrs. K. "When I asked about her current church, she replied that she still attended the one where she had grown up and where her husband had served. She said that since they had stopped holding services due to the pandemic, she had not heard from anyone there."

More than 700 individuals are included in NCBAM's Servant Care outreach—with 64 new retired ministers added in June. Participation is not based on financial need. Servant Care participants receive regular phone calls and birthday cards. Frail participants receive assessments by an NCBAM regional director. (In-home assessments are currently handled remotely.) NCBAM regional directors work with Baptist Associations to confirm and share updated contact information for retired ministers.

NCBAM's ministry director, Dr. Sandy Gregory, sees Servant Care as one of NCBAM's most important outreaches. "Many pastors join a new church when they retire and so the strong connections to the people who would be most eager to minister to them are lost. NCBAM is helping to fill the gap by giving Servant Care participants the love, honor, and care they so richly deserve."

#### The Doldrums of COVID

Here and there were wisps of clouds barely enough moisture to collect to form a whiteness, yet they were there. It was as if time had stopped. Likewise, our walk-in faith is like those ancient sailing vessels. When we are facing a headwind, we know we are going in the right direction. "Many are the afflictions of the righteous: but the Lord delivereth him out of them all." As the Apostle Paul would remind us, "Beloved, think it not strange concerning the fiery trial which is to try you, as though some strange thing happened unto you: But rejoice, inasmuch as ye are partakers of Christ's sufferings; that, when his glory shall be revealed, ye may be glad also with exceeding joy." It is when the winds cease, those opposing forces suddenly stop, that we should be concerned. For it is then, when you are no longer finding the world against you, that you should take stock and see if you are not going along with the whims and will of the evils that surround you. "And be not conformed to this world:.." "Be sober, be vigilant; because your adversary the devil, as a roaring lion, walketh about, seeking whom he may devour:"

Floating there in the pool, my mind's eye could see the glistening mirrors of glass surrounding their vessel as the sun beat down on them like a mighty drum. This absolute stillness was their valley of death. The very breath of life hung in the balance. The maritime sailors of old, even in their mighty sailing ships, were at the mercy of the prevailing winds. It was as if without the hand of God pushing them, they were helpless. Their vessels might sit for days or even weeks in the area known today as the Intertropical Convergence Zone (ITCZ). It stretches from 5 degrees above to 5 degrees below the equator. As the broiling heat beat down upon them, their sails hung limp, lifeless – mirroring the direction their lives seemed to be heading.

When there is nothing to occupy the mind, it becomes like a fertile field where our sinful fleshly desires and thoughts begin to take root. We've all heard the phrase, "An idle mind is the devil's playground." It is here, in the empty void of life that our wanton, wayward thoughts begin to fill the space where once an occupation, a job, or a study once filled. The news media, if we allow it, is happy to provide us more than enough constant chatter to overwhelm even the most ardent theologian. Then there is the social media, where a thread of distrust can become the next great conspiracy to add to the overflowing closet of skeletons in our mind. Those empty, lifeless ocean experiences were not only deadly because of the physical limitations. Here where the mind became one's worst enemy, the mutinies were formed and men began to doubt not only themselves but their creator as well.

One description held by nautical experts is as follows, "Doldrums holds a distinct place in maritime history, having developed a reputation as a potentially deadly zone which could strand ships for weeks on end, causing them to run out of food and drinking water. In those days, with supplies running low, and scurvy setting in, delirium, starvation, and cabin fever could all set in – and getting through this mysterious patch of Atlantic Ocean quickly wasn't just a matter of first or last place, but life and death."

Today, we seem to be in a similar predicament. Many of your friends, neighbors, and even family are facing perils that remain hidden until it's too late. The isolation created by this perceived pandemic has in a sense, made us all drift into the doldrums – some say, the effect being more deadly than the cause. The ship in our world can take on various forms: our country, our daily lives, and even our soul.

Our nation has become mired in turmoil and panic, held captive by those that want to seemingly halt our way of life using the foil of a pandemic with which to incite fear – cause it to stall until the point it falters, and some might even say, fail. In this epic of ever-growing restrictions and confinements, the feeling of being held captive in our society begins to seep into our psyche. With each growing day, we find a new restriction dictated by "science" forcing us to obey or else. We find fear beginning to seep into the most educated minds to the point they seem consumed to follow the rules, whereas; heretofore, they were some of the most liberal types seeking rebellion of societal norms at every turn. Those that are held in esteemed positions begin to spread the fear in their implication of pursuing the "science" while disregarding those who might find a different mindset all together; one of fearing not. For many, they do not know what it is to find comfort in the arms of a Savior. Their lives, like so many who remain lost until the day of judgment, find themselves glued to the media, like a junkie waiting for the next hit, looking for the next "aha sound bite" that will send shockwaves through our culture, sending yet another wave of fear over our nation.

It is in these moments of doom and gloom we should seek the calm and peacefulness of the Comforter, the Word of God. Sadly, many find the darkness growing stronger rather than the day of jubilation when Christ's return sounds the final trumpet. The torment permeates their being until it becomes real.

The imposed isolation has revealed cracks in even the most perceived solid of relationships. Some may feel that they are trapped in marriages whereby they have no recourse. For whatever reason, the days of intimacy have evaporated like

#### The Shield of Faith

Life has continued to bring new challenges each day as we navigate through perilous times. If we ever needed to put on the whole armor of God, it is now! In the last few months, we have examined our belt of truth, which is our foundation for living; our breastplate of righteousness, which is our right standing before God, our Father. We have shod our feet with the readiness of the gospel of peace



so that we can carry the good news of reconciliation between God and man. We learned that we can have peace with God and possess the peace of God, regardless of the circumstances of life. Interestingly, the pieces of the armor of God have already been described in detail throughout this letter by the Apostle Paul. As the letter reaches its conclusion, we see an abbreviated list set in the context of a Roman soldier's uniform. What a creative and unique word picture to ensure that readers could remember these important principles! Now we move to the next piece of armor listed in Ephesians 6; the shield of faith. Paul commands all believers to take up this shield for we will surely need it in this evil day. Looking back at Ephesians 2:8-9, we read these words: "For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, not a result of works, so that no one may boast".

We are saved by grace through faith. It was God's grace that provided a means for salvation, but we had to choose to believe, or in other words, exercise faith. Ephesians 3:12 and 17 also speak of faith. "In whom we have boldness and access with confidence through our faith in Him". "...So that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith...".

Verse 12 adds another benefit of faith; our access and confident boldness to the God of the Universe through Christ and verse 17 reminds us that through faith, Christ, Himself is dwelling in our hearts.

Ephesians 4:5 and 13 include more references to faith. Verse 5 reminds us that we have one Lord, one faith and one baptism while verse 13 continues this thought, 'until we all attain to the unity of the faith and the knowledge of the Son of God, to mature manhood, to the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ'.

Paul calls for unity in the body of Christ by reminding us that every believer is connected by one faith, one Lord, one baptism, one hope, and one God and Father who is over all, through all and in all. The goal for all believers is to attain unity in the faith and knowledge of Jesus.

We should now have a picture of the faith that Paul is asking us to take up as a shield. It is a faith that saves eternally, provides access to the throne room of God, and connects every believer as one. Yet faith is considered something mysterious and unexplainable and without intelligent definition. Have you found yourself struggling to define faith?

Hebrews 11:1 tells us that 'faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen'. The Greek word for 'faith' is 'pistis'. It is defined as 'the kind of belief that leads to a personal conviction, especially reliance upon Christ for salvation.' 'A firm persuasion'. Many translations of the Bible use the word 'substance', which is a better translation. The Greek word for 'assurance' or 'substance' is the word 'hupostasis' and it means 'the ground of confidence, assurance, guarantee of proof'.

"Substance" in Roman times was a legal term referring to the sum of all documents concerning a person who owned property and possessions secured in an archive that provided proof of ownership. Some suggest the translation could read, 'Faith is the title-deed for things hoped for". Our faith, when mixed with action, is a title-deed or guarantee for what has not yet been seen. The writer of the book of Hebrews describes faith-filled followers based on their actions. Faith is what moved them to believe God and do what He asked them to do.

For example, Hebrews 11:7 says 'By faith Noah, being warned by God concerning events as yet unseen, in reverent fear constructed an ark for the saving of his household. By this he condemned the world and became an heir of the righteousness that comes by faith'. This is one of many examples outlined in this chapter.

Hebrews 11:6 is the most convicting verse. "For without faith, it is impossible to please God, for whoever comes to Him must believe that He is and that He is a rewarder of those who earnestly seek Him".

If we plan to please God, we must take up our shield of faith. Why does Paul liken faith to a shield? What does a shield provide? Protection!

The Roman army used large, slightly curved rectangular shields, generally made of two layers of wooden strips laid at right angles to each other and heated in order to be pressed into a curved shape. They were then covered by 6 layers of animal hide. Such a shield could become dry so the soldiers carried olive oil for rubbing the surface of the shield. The Roman shields were about 4 ½ feet high and about 3 to 4 feet wide and looked like a door. These shields could be joined together so that the soldiers formed something like a wall during battle. Many times, the soldiers in the middle lifted the shields over their heads, and the ones on the outside squatted behind their shields. This was known as the 'tortoise'. Paul could have been referencing Ephesians 2:18-22 when he considered this use of their shields. Believers are to operate as one unit in order to provide maximum protection from the enemy.

We need serious protection against the schemes of the devil and Paul warns us in this verse that Satan is shooting flaming arrows at us constantly. During the first century, the Roman soldiers used 3 types of arrows. One was a normal arrow with a pointed, metalhead. The second arrow had a metal tip covered with a pitchtar-like substance, which could be lit and released. The third kind of arrow had a stem filled with a combustible substance. When the tip of this arrow was lit and hit its target the impact of the strike split the stem of the arrow and caused the fire

to spread. Soldiers also had 'fire darts' which were long spears with 3-foot iron heads, which when set on fire could penetrate through the armor. Paul is warning us that Satan will throw some dangerous thoughts into our minds. Thoughts set on fire by hell. He wants to distract us from our main purpose as believers. Remember what the soldiers carried? (Olive oil) They consistently oiled their shields to keep them from becoming dry and brittle. Interestingly, Isaiah 21:5 commands the princes to 'oil or anoint' their shields to prepare for battle.

In the OT, the oil was symbolic of the Holy Spirit and once a priest, king, or any spiritual leader was anointed with oil, the Holy Spirit would come upon them (1 Samuel 16:13). We must be very intentional about seeking the filling of the Spirit so that we might walk by faith. A believer controlled by the Spirit will be empowered to use their faith as a shield of protection which will extinguish the flaming darts of the devil.

What are these flaming darts? Thoughts of doubt concerning God's goodness and His mercy are at the top of the enemy's list. Remember, without faith, it is IMPOSSIBLE to please God. What causes people to stop believing God? Many times, it is the death of a loved one; disappointment in a relationship; chronic pain; loss of a job; divorce; etc. There are endless possibilities. Remember, in all circumstances, hold up the shield of faith.

Satan has one goal in mind: to steal, kill, and destroy and our faith is his greatest target. He cannot have our soul but he can render us useless in the kingdom of God. If we do not believe God, we will miss His perfect will and never believe the hope to which He has called us, the riches of His glorious inheritance within us, and His immeasurably great power toward us. (Ephesians 1:18-19)

Romans 8:28 is one verse that every believer should memorize. "And we know that for those who love God all things work together for good, for those who are called according to His purpose".

Faith believes this verse. God is always working all things together for good to those who love Him.

Habakkuk 2:4 and Romans 1:17 remind us that the just shall live by faith. Everything was falling apart in Israel during Habakkuk's time. God was bringing judgment on His people for their disobedience, but the righteous were going to suffer along with the unrighteous. Yet God expected His people to trust Him and keep their eyes on Him even amid the struggles. Paul preached the gospel and everywhere he went all hell broke loose, yet He said that he was not ashamed of the good news of Jesus. He repeated this verse from Habakkuk that said he would live by faith in the God who had called him. He had been shipwrecked, stoned, cursed, jailed, and everything else imaginable but Paul never lost sight of the love and grace of God.

We must keep the same attitude.

How do we develop great faith? Let's go back a bit. Romans 10:13-17 connects the good news of the gospel to faith. Faith comes first to those who hear the gospel, believe the gospel, and receive the gospel. God gives us a measure of faith to be able to believe. The Bible mentions 2 types of faith; little faith and great faith. Little faith: Matthew 8:23-27 The disciples had seen Jesus perform amazing miracles and they had heard Him preach amazing sermons, yet, these things weren't quite as personal to them as the threat of death. These men knew Jesus before, but they knew Him in a completely different way after personally experiencing a near tragedy. His Word to the storm brought a new understanding of Who He really was and the power He really possessed. But fast forward just a bit. Read Matthew 14:22-33. Another similar incident, except this time, Jesus was not in the boat with them. He was giving them a chance to exercise their faith in another frightening situation yet their faith was still considered 'little'. Jesus had told them to go to the other side which meant they were going to make it. As the storm increased, Jesus showed up, walking on the water. Peter's faith must have been stronger than the first time because he asked Jesus to let him come out on the water. But it dipped about the time he looked away and began to sink. Jesus reached out and took Peter's hand. Again, Jesus asked him why he still had 'little' faith. Jesus and Peter entered the boat and immediately, the wind stopped. Both of these incidents led to a greater revelation of Jesus and a new level of worship from the disciples.

Little faith was still enough to rescue them from disaster.

Great faith: Matthew 8:5-13 is the story of a Roman centurion who came to Jesus begging Him to heal his paralyzed servant. Jesus said, 'I will come', but this man did not consider himself worthy of such honor. However, he wholeheartedly believed that Jesus needed only to speak a word and his servant would be healed. Keep in mind, this was a Gentile, a man considered a pagan by the religious people of the day and yet Jesus called his faith greater than the faith of His followers. Matthew 15:21-28

Here is another example of a Canaanite woman, again someone considered a foreigner, coming to Jesus for help. Her daughter was possessed by a demon but for a bit, it appeared that Jesus would not grant her request. He told this woman that He was sent only to the lost sheep of Israel. This did not deter her from continuing to seek a miracle, and she didn't leave until she received one. Once more, Jesus called her faith greater than the faith of His disciples.

Faith is simply taking God at His Word, believing that with Him all things are possible.

Matthew 17:20-21 is Jesus' response to the failure of the disciples to cast a demon out of a young boy. These men who had been given authority to heal the sick and cast out demonic spirits could not understand what had happened this time. Jesus explained that it was because of their 'little' faith.

The disciples wanted great faith, but Jesus said it only takes faith the size of the smallest mustard seed to grow to gigantic proportions. The bottom line is simply believing that Jesus can do what He says He can do. The Roman centurion and the Canaanite woman simply believed that Jesus could do anything. They believed that His power was greater than the power of the devil. Once we believe as much, we will see Jesus move in our lives as never before. Every word He speaks into

#### Using Scripture for Evangelism

The Word of God is powerful. In Hebrews 4:12, Paul says it is "sharper than any double-edged sword." As believers, we should depend on the Bible to help us grow, mature, and become more like Jesus Christ.

The Scripture is also a critical tool for us to use when we share our faith. Think about it. We cannot share the Gospel

without pointing to the Gospel. The Word of God shows us the path to eternal life. All we have to do is share it with others.

"The gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord." (Romans 6:23)

Like any gift, eternal life is not earned or deserved. The Bible tells us that we are saved through faith, not our works (Ephesians 2:8-9). Every other religion teaches that people must earn their way to Heaven. Christianity alone proclaims that God's favor and entrance into Heaven are absolutely free.

"All have sinned and fall short of the glory of God." (Romans 3:23) The Bible states that man is a sinner. Sin is anything that falls short of God's perfect standard: an action, a word, a thought, an attitude. Because we are sinners, we cannot save ourselves.

God "does not leave the guilty unpunished." (Exodus 34:7)

God is merciful and does not want to punish us. The Bible tells us that "God is love" (1 John 4:8), but it also teaches us that He is just and must punish our sin. This presents a problem. The problem is not God's, it is ours.

"For God so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son..." (John 3:16) God sent us a solution: Jesus Christ. Jesus died on the cross to pay the penalty for our sin...and rose from the dead to prove He had purchased a place in Heaven for

"Believe in the Lord Jesus and you will be saved." (Acts 16:31)

Faith isn't simply knowing about Jesus. It also isn't trusting in Jesus for temporary things, like health, safety, and finances. Saving faith is trusting in Jesus Christ alone for eternal life.

Remember, each verse, alone, maybe a lot for someone to process, especially for someone who has never read the Bible. Quoting Scripture can come across as overbearing. While as Christians, we should know each reference, we don't need to show off our knowledge of the Bible. Simply say, "the Bible says," or "We read in the Bible," and then quote the verse. Let the words of the Scripture sink in. The Holy Spirit will speak to the person who is hearing the words.

Be patient. Sometimes, it takes time for the meaning of the Word of God to absorb. If they are not ready to decide to follow Jesus, allow them time to think over what you shared. Plan to meet with them again to ask questions or share how God is speaking to them personally.


Continue to pray that they will come to know the truth that will set them free.

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those prevailing winds on the ocean. They quit counting the days of quarantine – the novelty lost at sea. Now, their relationship is distant, cold, and anything but bliss. For some, these are the "worse" parts of the vow. Unrelenting to yield to divorce, praying that God will find a way to replace their spouse's heart of stone, they remain - trapped and disheartened – their life has become nothing more



than a dead sea, upon which no breath of wind dare cast a ripple of hope.

Afflictions of the flesh can come in all shapes and sizes - drugs, alcohol, or sex. Each person has their own inner struggles. Once, when there was a society of normalcy, one might compare their daily grind to others. Yet, now, kept to themselves, the questions begin to creep inside the dark confines of the heart. The darkness feeds upon these. Allowed to grow, they become more than thoughts. They begin to manifest themselves into actions that might otherwise have abated had the flow of life been allow to continue. It is in the trials that we discover who we really are. For those without faith, it is as if all hope is lost. If we allow Satan to enter in, giving in to temptations, we deepen the despair by which those afflictions feed – like sharks circling our languishing ship, watching, waiting to whom they may devour, so is the devil.



## Habits of the Heart: A Study of the Spiritual Disciplines - "Service"

In this monthly series of articles, I have chosen to survey twelve (one each month) spiritual habits of the heart or spiritual disciplines that we must pursue in our faith jour-



Moses, shortly before he handed over leadership to Joshua, addressed the new generation of Israelites who were destined to possess the land of promise. As he began his farewell speech, he reminded them, as he had done so many times before, of what the Lord God both desired and required from His people. In Deuteronomy 10:12, Moses declared, "Now, Israel, what does the LORD your God require from you, but to fear the LORD your God, to walk in all His ways and love Him, and to serve the LORD your God with all your heart and with all your soul." The prophet Samuel would later repeat this same recipe for humble obedience and committed service, writing in 1 Samuel 12:24, "Only fear the LORD and serve Him in truth with all your heart; for consider what great things He has done for you."

Many years ago I read Charles Swindoll's wonderful book on Christian service entitled, Improving Your Serve. What really grabbed my attention was the subtitle: The Art of Unselfish Living. At the heart of the spiritual discipline of service is self-denial. Jesus said (Mark 10:45; also Matt. 20:28) that He did not come to be served but to serve. "For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give His life a ransom for many." Jesus explained that the reason that He was here on earth was to serve and to give. Not to be served or to gain the spotlight or notoriety. He wasn't interested in fame or success. He didn't want to draw a crowd to show His eloquence, intelligence, or charisma. He went out looking for those who were lost, alone, and confused to serve them and then offered them something that would save their lives—a personal relationship with God's Son. Jesus invested His whole self, being, energies, and focus on serving and giving.

It makes absolute sense that God, having offered us redemption and reconciliation and a new relationship with Him in Christ (salvation), would begin to build into us the same quality that was displayed in His Son, Jesus. God's intent and purpose were to build in us the same character, the same purposes, and the same heart that was in Christ Jesus—we are to serve and to give!

What a stark contrast Jesus' philosophy of servanthood is with the world's! Jesus saw the difference just as much as we see it. In fact, His declaration of servanthood came on the heels of responding to a request made by the mother of James and John In Matthew 20:20-28 (also in Mark 10:35-45), Mrs. Zebedee came to Jesus, bowed down before Him and asked what seemed to be a simple request. She said to Him, "Command that in Your kingdom these two sons of mine may sit one on Your right and one on Your left."


One might note that in Matthew's account, he specifies that the mother of James and John asked the question; while Mark has it that James and John themselves made the request. Could it have been that James and John put their mother up to it? Or could their mother have seen that her sons, who are referred to as the "sons of thunder," were afraid to ask Jesus the question directly? Frank Stagg (Broadman Commentary) points out that both Matthew and Mark indicate "that the disciples themselves were responsible for the selfish and benighted request," for it is clear that Jesus directed His reply to the two disciples. He saw through their smokescreen and He answered them (in verse 21) with biting conviction, "But Jesus answered, "You do not know what you are asking. Are you able to drink the cup that I am about to drink?" They said to Him, "We are able."

Jesus immediately responded to the boys, "But Jesus called them to Himself and said, "You know that the rulers of the Gentiles lord it over them, and their great men exercise authority over them. It is not this way among you, but whoever wishes to become great among you shall be your servant, and whoever wishes to be first among you shall be your slave; just as the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give His life a ransom for many."

Take a deeper look at Jesus' last statement, "For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give His life a ransom for many." Jesus refers to Himself as the Son of man (hwios too anthropoo—υίος τοῦ ἀνθρώπου). Frank Stagg notes that in this verse, which is one of the most important in all of Matthew, Jesus is interpreting his role as "Son of Man" in terms of sacrificial service. Drawing upon the Suffering Servant passages in Isaiah (cf. Is. 53), Jesus blended the duel roles; that is, God—to whom dominion, glory, and a universal and everlasting kingdom were given; and man—a lowly form of a servant who would give his life a ransom for many.

Jesus states that He did not come to be served (diakonēthēnai—δίακονηθηναι). That Greek form is in the passive tense, meaning "being acted upon." It is also significant to note that this particular Greek word is used rather than several other Greek words which were commonly used in that time to convey the idea of servant/servanthood. Paul often used these different Greek words to express different aspects of servanthood. Among then are doulos (δοΰλοσ)—"servant or bondservant;" oiketes (οίκέτησ)—"a house or household servant;" Hupēretēs (ΰπηρέτησ)—"an officer or minister" (i.e., under higher authority); and misthios (μισθίοσ)—"a hired servant."

Jesus declared, "I came to serve!" I am not a household or a hired servant. I am



The Apostle Paul understood the mission of his Lord and Savior. He writes about the theme, motivation, and purpose of the act and discipline of service in Romans 12:1, "Therefore I urge you, brethren, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies a living and holy sacrifice, acceptable to God, which is your spiritual service of worship." The spiritual discipline and act of service is the free choice of presenting ourselves in obedient, humble, transparent, honest, and genuine service to our Lord Jesus Christ.

We could say that there are three types or kinds of service that are available to the follower of Christ:

- 1. Forced service—I will give and sacrifice because either I have no other choice and/or I will get something out of it.
- 2. Self-righteous service—I will give and sacrifice to satisfy my own self, my own needs, and my own fleshly desires and drives.


  3. Christ like service—I will give and sacrifice and offer true service which hope.
- 3. Christ-like service—I will give and sacrifice and offer true service which honors and glorifies the Lord and accomplishes His plans and purposes. Any Christ-like service is motivated by humility, honesty, transparency, and generosity.

Drawing upon Richard Foster's description of true Christ-like service, we see that genuine Christ-like spiritual service comes from a relationship with our Savior who dwells within. It finds it difficult to distinguish between small or large service (which are one and the same) and rests contented in hiddenness. It does not fear attention but doesn't seek it either. Divine approval is all that matters. True service is free from the need to achieve results. It delights only in service. Real spiritual service ministers indiscriminately, simply, and faithfully because there is a need. It listens tenderly and patiently before acting. It waits upon the Lord and moves at His prompting. Ultimately, a genuine Christ-like service helps build God's community of faith, builds relationships, and seeks to honor and glorify God above everything.

Practicing the spiritual discipline of service allows God's children to shine with the light of Jesus in a world that is hopelessly lost, deeply confused, and perilously alone. In serving God and others, we become Christ's heart, mind, hands, voice, ears, and feet.

At the end of June, the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) issued science-based guidance regarding fall school reopening:

 "All policy considerations for the coming school year should start with the goal of having students physically present in school."

"The importance of in-person learning is well-documented, and there is already evidence of negative impacts on children because of school closures in the spring of 2020... Although many questions remain, the preponderance of evidence indicates that children and adolescents are less likely to be symptomatic and less likely to have severe disease resulting from SARS-CoV-2 infection. Also, children may be less likely to become infected

Gov. Cooper ignored the advice of medical professionals who know the most about children's health and went forward with a plan that allows schools to remain completely closed to in-person instruction. The Governor also ignored that the North Carolina Constitution sets forth that the public-school system exists to provide every student with a sound, basic education for equal opportunities to be successful. At-risk children of lowincome families will bear the brunt of his plan. Without daily, in-person classroom instruction many of these children will fail.

A Wall Street Journal article, "Are They Setting My Children Up for Failure?" delves into the downward educational spiral of children when schools are closed for in-person classroom instruction. Following are some excerpts from the story:

- "Preliminary research suggests students nationwide will return to school in the fall with roughly 70% of learning gains in reading relative to a typical school year, and less than 50% in math, according to projections by NWEA, an Oregon-based nonprofit education-services firm. It expects a greater learning loss for minority and low-income children, who have less access to technology and whose families are more likely to be affected by the economic downturn.
- "Missing those months will leave some children across the country, especially those already behind, struggling to catch up, educators said. 'I think of it as an academic death spiral,' said Robin Lake, director of the Center on Reinventing Public Education at the University of Washington Bothell. 'I don't know how you do algebra without pre-algebra.'
- "Falling behind academically is a top reason why students drop out of school, according to the National Dropout Prevention Center, based in South Carolina.

With low-income families not having the resources to provide supplemental educational tools and experiences for their out-of-classroom children, the very least Gov. Cooper should do is require school districts to provide full in-classroom instruction to children whose parents request it.

North Carolina's state auditor, Democrat Beth Woods, has the responsibility of trying to bring fiscal discipline to North Carolina's state agencies. Over the years, state auditors have exposed financial mismanagement and saved North Carolina taxpayers hundreds of millions

of dollars. State Auditor Woods has found one of the worst offenders with both financial incompetence and mismanagement has been NCDOT. Wood's most recent audit found that NCDOT had overspent its budget by 12% or \$742 million. To add insult to injury, she further found that the NCDOT improperly doled out \$40 million in taxpayer money for raises to select employees. This, in spite of the fact that NCDOT has a staff of 24 internal auditors. Couple this with the extreme revenue losses in the gas tax and motor vehicle fees due to the pandemic and NCDOT finds itself short of cash to complete projects and carry out its maintenance work. Thus, the result of the financial mismanagement and the pandemic is hundreds of project delays. Just look at the incomplete projects in our part of the state.

By failing to put strong, competent leadership at NCDOT, Governor Cooper has put our road system in awful shape. The legislature has worked hard to authorize fiscally responsible management policies and to provide North Carolina with budget surpluses and the financial resources to weather disasters such as we now face. North Carolina used to be known as the "good roads state." The vitality of our economy depends on the superior transportation infrastructure. North Carolina's infrastructure is at risk. Governor Cooper needs to step up and provide the real leadership needed both by him and those he has chosen to run NCDOT.

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

#### New Dimensions School

#### **Summer Vacation**

It is hard to believe that summer vacation is here, and we are making plans at New Dimensions to hopefully welcome our students back to school on September 1. One of the most pressing questions we are all asking is "will we come back to school in the fall and if we do, what will school look like?"



We do know that all schools in North Carolina will need to develop 3 plans for possible reopening:

- 1-minimal social distancing
- 2-moderate social distancing
- 3-complete remote learning

New Dimensions is fortunate that the size of our classrooms in conjunction with our reduced class size in grades K-5 (1:16) would allow us to operate at 50% capacity and still accommodate all students who are currently projected to be enrolled. This, along with additional guidelines, allows us to fully comply with plan 1 or plan 2.

The New Dimensions Reopening Task Force is working on the most appropriate and safest way to return to in-school instruction in the fall without our school resembling a prison. This task force is made up of board members, parents, community members, and staff. Many great ideas and suggestions have been generated by this group.

The 2020-2021 school year at New Dimensions will look a little different than what it did in past years. The most significant adjustment will be the opportunity for parents to choose between face to face instruction and remote instruction. This hybrid model will allow families to select which method best serves the needs of their families. The hybrid instruction model at New Dimensions will provide for the following:

- The plan will be different from the remote learning that was done in the spring.
- Students would be required to follow along with the teacher. Students would get breaks and specials with students who are physically in the class.
- Students would be in the class but virtually.
- Attendance will be counted remotely just as it would in a seated class.
- Assignments will be provided and returned in Google Classroom (Grades 2-8) or Seesaw (Grades K-1).

To make our school as safe as possible for students, staff, and guests the following guidelines will be implemented:

- Face masks will be optional for students.
- Students and staff will have temperature checks when entering the school as well as reviewing the symptoms checklist.
- Plans will be in place to strategically place vulnerable populations away or distanced from others.
- Visitors and guests will be screened and a special area for guests to eat with students will be designated.
- Students will go to the cafeteria with only their grade level to have lunch.
- Students will go to recess by class. Classes will rotate between the athletic field, blacktop, and playground.
- Each classroom will have a touchless thermometer as well as the receptionist area and student entry areas.

The following changes will be made to the school building and classrooms:

- A special disinfecting and sanitizing system will be applied before students and staff return.
- Our custodial staff will continue to frequently clean with an approved cleaner. Our cleaners meet the requirements of the NCDHHS. High touch/high traffic areas will be cleaned more often.
- Touchless water dispensers to fill individual water bottles have been installed.
- Individual desks have been purchased so we can social distance in the class-room.
- Floor decals for social distancing will be utilized.
- Plexiglas barriers will be installed on the sink areas in the restrooms.

This summer, New Dimensions has had the good fortune to partner with the YMCA to provide a Day Camp for students in our community. Students may enroll weekly and there are still open slots for any interested family. Just give us a call at the school at 828-437-5753.

Next year, New Dimensions is anticipating over 375 students to be enrolled in our school. I want to take this time to thank our entire community for their support of our school and each student we serve. When we recruit teachers to our school, we share with them the support we receive from parents, businesses, and the community.

I encourage each student this year to set goals to make this the best year they have ever had, to work hard, and to get involved in a school. I also appreciate the way our students represent our school and encourage them to continue to take the lessons they have learned at home, in the faith community, and at school to be good citizens in our community. It is always encouraging to hear the positive stories of how graduates of New Dimensions make a difference in our community and the lives of others.

My hope and prayer are that this school year will be the best for our school and for each student we serve. If we, as a school, can help you, we want to hear from you. We have an open-door policy, and we encourage you to visit us at your convenience. If you are unable to stop by our office, please feel free to call me. I would love to discuss your concerns and suggestions regarding our school. We are always open to ideas on how we can better serve our community. Thank you for your support of our school and our children. I am honored to serve as your school director.

With everything all of us have been faced with in terms of COVID-19 restric-

tions, economic downturns, budget cuts, budget uncertainty, and school closure, we have experienced incredible accomplishments and it is due to dedicated people, positive attitudes, and community support.

Please accept a thank you from me on behalf of the New Dimensions School for all you do to help make our school successful. I am looking forward to the new year and working with the greatest educational team ever as well as our community partners.


