



She shared memories of how she used to cook three meals a day for the sawmill camp where she and my grandpa worked. She always shared about times when the Lord answered prayers for her and the family. "Don't ever be doing something you wouldn't want to be doing when the Lord comes." she would say. Always, always, she would encourage me, "Live for Jesus, Chris, you'll never regret it."

Seems like every year when I'm working my own beans, there's always something else about our conversations that will be brought to my memory. Often times a sad feeling comes over my heart because I'd like to go back and sit on that porch again with Mammie. Maybe I wouldn't take it for granted as much as I did back then. For sure there would be a whole lot more listening and taking in what she said during those conversations. While sometimes those memories of days gone by make me feel a little sad because I miss them, there is a hope that keeps me going. The same Jesus she served is the same one I serve. Because of Him, we have the hope of being reunited one day with our saved loved ones. Most importantly, we get to see Him, the one who has made it all possible.

Jesus is always there to remind us and bless us with hope, even while stringing and breaking beans.


Walking in the Prosperity of God By Ken Day



The Love That Conquers Racism

The tragic death of George Floyd in Minneapolis shocked and outraged our entire nation as well as other countries around the world. This was a repulsive act of evil that should have never happened. Racial discrimination of any kind is wrong, and police brutality must never be tolerated.

And George Floyd isn't the only one to meet such a fate. It is heart-wrenching that many, many others have suffered similar injustices over the decades.



Racism has caused deep wounds in our nation. But regret is not enough. We must make corrections, we must improve, we must act to bring positive change. The Bible is very clear that all people are created in God's image (see Genesis 1:27). No skin color is more or less important to Him. The Bible teaches us to love others as we would love ourselves. We should treat others the way we want to be treated. And even more, we are to treat others as God has already treated us in Christ—with grace and mercy.

Jesus dealt with issues of racial discrimination when He told the parable of the Good Samaritan. He pointed out to his listeners that a man of ethnicity they looked down on, even despised, was the hero, doing the right thing in helping a victim of violence and injustice. And Jesus told us, "You go, and do likewise" (Luke 10:37).

I personally remember segregation. As a young boy, I went to a segregated school. Restaurants were segregated, bathrooms were segregated. I didn't understand it, and it bothered me, saddened me, even repulsed me. As a nation, we have come a long way since then, but we have a long way to go.

Unfortunately, until Christ returns, we will continue to see acts of violence, prejudice, and injustice because we live in a broken and fallen world that is under the evil influence of Satan. The Bible calls Satan "the prince of the power of the air, the spirit that is now at work in the sons of disobedience" (Ephesians 2:2). He wants to steal, kill, and destroy, and all around us, we see the horrific results of his activity.

But there is an answer: The love of God that comes through Jesus Christ. Throughout the ages, Christ's followers have experienced the wonder of Christian love and fellowship that obliterates hostility, whether it's between individuals or between races. The Apostle Paul explained it this way: "For in Christ Jesus you are all sons of God, through faith. … There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free, there is no male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus" (Galatians 3:26, 28).

Our job as followers of Christ is to make our Savior's Name known. We are to tell a hurting world that Jesus shed His blood and died for our sins. He was despised and rejected by men. He was falsely accused and beaten beyond recognition. The Bible tells us, "by His stripes we are healed" (Isaiah 53:5, NKJV). He took the punishment for sin that we deserve, and if we will turn away from sin and put our trust in Him, He will forgive us, save us and fill us with the love that conquers racism and hatred.

Jesus has called us to go into the world and make disciples of all nations. This is what all of us as Christians should be doing, and it is what we are going to continue doing at the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association—calling people to be reconciled to God through faith in His Son, Jesus Christ.

In proclaiming the message of reconciliation, we must remember that prayer is our most powerful weapon. We need to pray for peace, because "the anger of man does not produce the righteousness of God" (James 1:20). Pray also for perspective, because "the wisdom from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, open to reason, full of mercy and good fruits, impartial and sincere" (James 3:17). Pray for patience, because of God's "kindness and forbearance and patience" toward us all (Romans 2:4).

And the Bible commands us to pray for our leaders. They need our prayers especially now, as our nation faces not only the effects of longstanding racism but also the global COVID-19 pandemic that has killed hundreds of thousands and put millions out of work.


Paul instructed Timothy: "First of all, then, I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for all people, for kings and all who are in high positions, that we may lead a peaceful and quiet life, godly and dignified in every way. This is good, and it is pleasing in the sight of God our Savior, who desires all people to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth" (1 Timothy 2:1-4).

When we pray like this, we're not just praying for a trouble-free world. We are praying for a world where the truth will prevail and many will come to Christ in repentance and faith—a world transformed by the relentless love of the Lord Jesus Christ.



One of the best programs they offer is Kids 4 Christ, getting youth involved in serving their community. "Kids are a shining light. When kids show up to help it makes people happier because they show love and kindness to others."

Teaching the next generation the importance of volunteering is critical because our volunteer base is aging out and are stretched across many organizations meeting many different needs in Avery, Mitchell, and Yancey counties. We need the kids and young people to get involved now to become the future volunteer base. Alan stated "We all have to work together to end hunger, homelessness and help those that need it. No matter how young or old you are, sow that seed of hope and let's forget judgment."

WAMY became involved with Neighbors Feeding Neighbors through their involvement in the Community Housing Coalition. WAMY depends on volunteers like Alan and Amy Hoilman, who know firsthand the condition of some of the homes they deliver to. There are often many needs in a local household, from food assistance to major home repairs. The Community Housing Coalition is tasked to undertake the problems of housing repairs, as well as affordability and availability. There is not enough decent housing for rent in Avery, Mitchell or Yancey counties. There is also a shortage of affordable homes for sale. I just had a conversation with a full time working mother of three that was describing the rental she paid \$600 a month to live in. I was horrified by her story! To me, \$600 a month is a significant part of anyone's budget and should afford hard-working people at minimum shelter against the weather and outdoor pests. WAMY Community Action is working with partners like Neighbors Feeding Neighbors and volunteers like the Hoilman's to address some of the issues facing the tri-county

To quote Pastor Rick Schilling, UMC Spruce Pine, another volunteer serving on the Housing Coalition, "God wants us to be the answer to people's prayers. God's primary way of acting in this world is through people." Neighbors helping neighbors. 



Ancient Egyptians loved to have cats for pets. They even worshiped a half-cat goddess named Bastet. The Egyptian's law for killing a cat was death. They loved their cats so much that they would even shave off their eyebrows to show mourning when their beloved pet cat passed away.



House cats have almost the same genetic make-up as tigers. They can run up to 30mph which is fast enough to get a ticket for speeding in a school zone!

Cats can jump up to five times their height with ease. Cats don't always fall on their feet but most of the time they do. This is because the cat can twist his backbone while falling to position it where his feet will land first. Along with being able to balance themselves while up high cats also have a walking sequence. They walk moving both right feet at once followed by both left feet. 
I called, "Thomas! Thomas! Come inside quickly!" I yelled until I almost lost my voice.



Answer the Highest Calling of Your Heart By Tracy Jessup

"Let me hear what God the Lord will speak, for he will speak peace to his people, to his faithful, to those who turn to him in their hearts. Surely his salvation is at hand for those who fear him, that his glory may dwell in our land. Steadfast love and faithfulness will meet; righteousness and peace will kiss each other. Faithfulness will spring up from the ground, and righteousness will look down from the sky." --- Psalm 85:8-11



Civil rights leader John Lewis passed away on July 17, 2020. Shortly before his death, he wrote an essay to be published upon the day of his funeral. In the essay, entitled "Together, You Can Redeem the Soul of Our Nation," Mr. Lewis urged his fellow Americans "to answer the highest calling of your heart and stand up for what you truly believe."

Borrowing from the words of the Apostle Paul, Mr. Lewis did not lose heart. Even though his outer nature was wasting away, his inner nature was being renewed day by day (cf. 2 Corinthians 4:16). He expressed hope in what he viewed as a transformation that seemed to be taking place in our land. "While my time here has now come to an end, I want you to know that in the last days and hours of my life you inspired me. You filled me with hope about the next chapter of the great American story when you used your power to make a difference in our society. Millions of people motivated simply by human compassion laid down the burdens of division. Around the country and the world, you set aside race, class, age, language, and nationality to demand respect for human dignity."

The image in today's scripture is of a world transformed by God's salvation. Specifically, four aspects of salvation are mentioned – steadfast love, faithfulness, righteousness, and peace. God's steadfast love amid hardship, uncertainty, and even our rebellion against God is proof that God is true to the covenant he has made with his people. Steadfast love is met with God's faithfulness. The love we know in a relationship with God is a love on which we can rely. Righteousness - knowing and doing what is right - is integral to the nature of God's salvation. This righteousness embraces peace, reminding us that salvation ultimately results in wholeness and completion for those who follow God.

These aspects of salvation work together, bringing us into a right relationship with God and one another. Even creation will display God's salvation as "faithfulness springs up from the ground, and righteousness will look down from the sky" (Psalm 85:11). But the most beautiful expression of God's salvation was manifested in the person of Jesus Christ. Grace and truth came through him (John 1:17), and in his gospel, the righteousness of God is revealed (Romans 1:17).

Those who are longing to see the power of God's salvation and forgiveness should be able to witness it on display in the lives of those who have experienced it. "From childhood, when Lewis preached to chickens on his family farm, to his twilight years, when he urged National Prayer Breakfast attendees to 'be a blessing to our fellow human beings,' faith was the fuel of Lewis's life" (Adelle Banks, Religion News Service, July 18, 2020). It is my prayer that everyone who professes to follow Christ will embrace God's steadfast love, faithfulness, righteousness, and peace so that all people may see the salvation of our God.

Enjoying Everyday Life

Burnt But Not Bitter – How God Rewards Our Suffering

I don't know anyone who gets excited about going through hardship, and yet it's unavoidable in everyone's life at some time or other. When trouble comes, a natural response is "Why is this happening?" or "I can't believe this is happening to ME!"



But the Bible tells us that hard times are actually good for us. James 1:2-3 (AMP) says, "Consider it nothing but joy...whenever you fall into various trials. Be assured that the testing of your faith [through experience] produces endurance [leading to spiritual maturity, and inner peace]."

These verses are saying that we can learn to go through hard times with joy and hope, knowing God will use them to make us better in the end.

Resist the Urge to Run

When things get tough, our initial reaction is to want to run from the pain and escape the situation, but what we need to do is take a firm stand in our faith and face it. Jesus promises us in John 16:33 that if we will trust Him amid the struggle, we can have peace and confidence that we will overcome it because He is on our side!

Now, we don't just overcome the problem, but in the process of going through it, God uses the very thing that is causing our pain to develop endurance, patience, and perseverance in our soul. This is how we build our faith in God and grow up spiritually.

The Value of Patience and Endurance

The Greek Dictionary says patience is a fruit of the Spirit that grows only under trial. In fact, the word patience comes from the root word hupone, which means "to remain under."

Patience has to do with being steadfast, disciplined, and committed—not running from difficult things, but sticking with them all the way through. It's about having a good attitude while you're waiting for your breakthrough or the fulfillment of something you desire.

Patience has a lot to do with endurance. I've come up with my own definition of endurance: "to outlast the enemy." It reminds me not to give up when I'm weary because I never want to give in to the temptations Satan brings my way or let him win the battle.

We all get weary at times and wonder if we'll ever get our breakthrough when we've been fighting the same battles for a long time. But the ones who refuse to give up are the ones who will have a testimony in the end!

The Test of My Quality

In 1 Peter 4:12, we see that painful experiences test the quality of our faith. When our quality is tested, we learn things about ourselves, because we don't really know what we would do in a tough situation until we're in it. God allows us to go through hard times to reveal what's in our hearts.

I remember a season in my life when I was praying for God to change me and make me more patient, sweet, merciful, and loving. He answered my prayer at the grocery store.

I used to be very impatient when it was time to check out at the supermarket, and I somehow managed to pick the slow line every time. I can vividly remember one day when a new clerk was being trained and everything was taking longer than usual. I was frustrated, and I made sure they knew it! I sighed loudly and mumbled under my breath.

These times at the grocery store were tests meant to develop patience and endurance in my soul. Over time, as I continued to grow in my relationship with God, I began to pass these tests more often. I came to the point where I could wait in the slow line with a good attitude—without opening my mouth or making a sound.

The Reward Always Outweighs the Pain

My example of developing patience at the grocery store may seem trivial compared to the trial you're facing today. But I want to encourage you to find comfort in the truth that God is with you and He knows exactly what you're going through. He loves you more than you know, and He has the answers you desperately need.

There have been many times when I've walked through devastating pain, and Galatians 6:9 has been an encouragement to me. It says, "Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up" (NIV).

And God promises in Romans 8:28 that if we will trust Him and keep doing what is right in each situation, He will work it all out for our good. He will take every moment of pain and use it to develop priceless fruit, such as love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control in our soul (Galatians 5:22-23).

That's more than enough reason to keep going, one day at a time, and never give up!

Mike Adams: The Fault Lies With Those Who Make-Up the Audience

Back in 1967, there occurred a raging furor over remarks made by an Episcopalian rector, Dr. Cotesworth Pinckney Lewis. Lewis was then serving at Bruton Parish Episcopal Church in Williamsburg, Virginia, when in his sermon; he took up the subject of the Vietnam War. That day, President Lyndon Johnson was in the audience.



In his remarks, Lewis never mentioned the President by name, but he did raise poignant questions. "We know the necessity of supporting our leader. But we cannot close our Christian consciences to consideration of the rightness of actions as they are reported to us – perhaps erroneously, perhaps for a good cause (of which we have not been apprised), said Lewis. "We are mystified by news accounts suggesting our brave fighting units are inhibited by directives and inadequate equipment from using their capacities to terminate the conflict successfully. While pledging our loyalty, we ask humbly, 'Why?"

Lewis' remarks were not well-received. Life magazine reported that the President simply said, "Thank you" as he left the church, while Lady Bird Johnson said, "A wonderful choir." Both the Vestry and Virginia's Governor sent apologies to the President. Lewis was charged with "exquisitely bad taste," while others suggested that he overstepped his bounds. The media had a field day citing the criticisms. Numerous government officials, religious personalities, and self-styled experts voiced their opinions and issued their denunciations.

Strange, isn't it, what a few words spoken in a particular context, will do to stir animus, proving it's not always the speaker's fault, but who makes up the audience.

Mike Adams, the Criminology Professor at the University of North Carolina-Wilmington, who had garnered national attention for his successful court battle over free speech rights, and was also an electrifying speaker and columnist, suddenly and shockingly died last week. Religious and political conservatives deeply mourned his passing.

K. Walker wrote in Clash Daily that Adams was "an absolute titan when it comes to debating the pro-life position, advocating for free speech, and exposing the rot in our colleges and universities."

Indeed, and many hated Adams for it, referring to his words as controversial, vile, racist, misogynistic, homophobic, xenophobic, transphobic, etc. The media excoriated him. But for those who knew Adams, the fault was not so much with him, as it was with those who made up his audience.

Even some Christians disdained Adam's speech. One of Adam's friends eulogized him in a column. Though he spoke more of what he believed was Adam's better qualities and contributions, the eulogizer said he could find Adams to be frustrating and outrageous. He said he had an "intemperate edge" and was sometimes "acerbic."

I can't say there was ever any speaker or writer that I often read with which I always agreed. Nevertheless, I disagree with the later characterization of Adam's communicative skills and believe it fails to recognize the value and legitimacy of his forthright, sharp, and sometimes satirical rebukes.

The Bible has many examples of speakers who used such speech and were never condemned or censured by the Scriptures for having employed it.

When the prophets of the false god Baal danced around the altar they had made and futilely sought to call down fire from heaven on the sacrifice of a bull, Elijah mocked and taunted them. "Shout louder, maybe he's gone out for the day," ridiculed Elijah. "Maybe he's on a trip, maybe he's relieving himself, or perhaps he's asleep and needs to be awakened," Elijah added. Was he over the top? Not according to the Bible.

When the Pharisees and Sadducees came out to hear John the Baptist, John called them a "generation of vipers" in need of repentance and baptism. He publicly and scathingly denounced King Herod's divorce and incestuous remarriage, which ultimately cost John his life. Interestingly, Jesus said that among those who ever lived, none was ever greater than John the Baptist.

When Stephen was arrested for preaching the truth about Christ, he boldly charged his audience, including their forefathers, as "stiff-necked and uncircumcised in heart and ears," persecutors of the faithful, betrayers of the truth, and murderers. Strong language, don't you think?

When Paul was dealing with agitators in the church who kept suggesting circumcision was necessary for salvation, Paul said he wished they would go the whole way and emasculate themselves. Such speech today would likely garner severe disapproval, but Paul was right and his strong words served to show the absurdity of the troublemakers' arguments.

Even Jesus utilized what might be deemed by some as offensive language. He referred to King Herod disparagingly as a sly fox. He called the religious authorities of his day, whited sepulchers, full of dead men's bones.

The point is not to say that we're justified in throwing off sensitivity when trying to share the truth with people. The point is, abrasive, offensive, confrontational expression, has its necessary place among God's Kingdom tools. Figuratively speaking, some people need only a popgun fired at them, while others both deserve and need an elephant gun.

A fearful and misplaced takeaway from Mike Adam's death would be that the way he wrote and spoke was utterly unacceptable and best avoided. I completely disagree! I firmly contend that if America had only a thousand preachers with the courage to speak truth to power as Adams did, our nation could be morally renewed and reclaimed for Christ.

Adams was under extreme pressure from his detractors for years. The New Hanover Sheriff's Department ruled his death a suicide. Perhaps it was. A couple of weeks before his death, I spoke with him on the telephone. He seemed slightly

depressed and reflective about his life. In retrospect, drawing from some of the things he told me, I question if he had started to believe his critics. If he did, it's understandable how he might have been led to despair and consequently commit a desperate act. Perhaps the suicide wasn't even related to his controversial style, but something entirely different and unknown to anyone except himself. Maybe it wasn't a suicide, but a homicide. More than a few believe this not only to be possible but plausible. We shall probably never know.

One thing, however, is almost certain. Mike Adams was an incomparable truthteller. We have more than enough speakers and writers who soothe people in their sins, who give them verbal opiates while the disease preys upon their vitals. Mike Adams wasn't one of them!

He was someone who bore a heavy load for each of us, and we owe it to his memory to show similar faithfulness.

No, it's not always the speaker's fault. Sometimes the fault lies with those who make up the audience.



How to Be Calm When You Feel Like Exploding

the camera. For the life of me, I couldn't get the camera button to work. Finally, I read the tiny dialog box. "Apparently, you are already using your camera. Shut that application down and retry." My thinking brain reined in my emotions. Then, I realized that I had tried the videoconferencing platform earlier, just to make sure it worked. I closed the earlier window and then clicked on the camera button. Voila! My interview began...

Today's world steals the extra margins of emotion and time, and I often indulge in reacting to my problems rather than reconsidering my rationale. The fog of my emotions overshadows my spirit, and the smoke of my feelings obscures my potential to think biblically. God gifts us with emotions, but He also addresses our tendency to allow them to rule over us. Like the fire that warms or kills, emotions enrich our lives but can be destructive.

God helps us to defuse unhealthy emotions by tucking Abigail's story into 1 Samuel, chapter 25. He shares with us her secret for being calm when the crisis urged her to explode. Her husband was a jerk. He treated the future King David with disdain and arrogance when David asked for food for him and his 600 men. The platoon of soldiers had been hiding from King Saul. As was the custom in ancient oriental lands, neighbors helped each other by protecting their herds from thieves and wild animals. In return, the owner shared his abundancy with them. David and his soldiers had guarded Nabal and his sheep farm for many months. But their food supply had dwindled, and he requested whatever Nabal could provide. But the man refused, sneering at David for attempting to claim God's promise of kingship to him and accusing him of breaking away from his authority. David erupted in fury, committing to kill Nabal and all his men.

But a servant told Abigail about the crisis, and she responded quickly. Grabbing as much food as she could in a few minutes, she loaded the donkeys, sent the servants ahead with them, and raced to meet David and his soldiers. When she met him, she shows us some simple steps that will help us to be calm when we want to explode. Here is one of them.

1 Samuel 25:30 contains the phrase, "when the LORD shall have done to my lord according to all the good that he hath spoken" underscores a powerful truth that prevents me from exploding. The LORD intends good to all that have accepted Jesus Christ as their Savior.

Don't focus on the grinding anxiety of the moment, but on the good that God intends for you.

King David, the sweet Psalmist of Israel, encourages us to focus on the LORD's goodness.

Psalm 16:6 "The lines are fallen unto me in pleasant places; yea, I have a goodly heritage."

Psalm 23:6 "Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life: and I will dwell in the house of the LORD forever."

Psalm 27:13 "I had fainted, unless I had believed to see the goodness of the LORD in the land of the living."

Psalm 31:19 "Oh how great is thy goodness, which thou hast laid up for them that fear thee; which thou hast wrought for them that trust in thee before the sons of men!"

Psalm 33:5 "He loveth righteousness and judgment: the earth is full of the goodness of the LORD."

The lyrical rhythms of these verses soothe our souls and refocus our thinking beyond our current angst to God's gracious kindness toward us.

Music empowers us to remember the promises of God. I love the fourth verse of Amazing Grace because it reminds me of Abigail's transforming truth, spoken to David when he was consumed with vengeance.

The Lord hath promised good to me, His word my hope secures; He will my shield and portion be As long as life endures.

Think about that. Read the Word of God and believe the Lord's promises for you. Be like King David who, after Abigail's wise advice, refused to relinquish his sword of truth to the enemy of unbridled anger and chose to realize that God intended good for him. God equipped David with the fortitude to follow Him rather than focus on Nabal's rejection of him.

Currently, we as a nation are being encouraged to exercise for physical and psychological health. As you consider physical action, practice the following spiritual exercise to lessen life's frustrations.

But, let me take a moment to think about all the good that God has allowed in my life and all the future good He has planned for me.

Commissioners Pave The Way For Additional Hotspots

The Burke County Board of Commissioners has approved additional funding to Burke County Public Schools to purchase 750 hotspots to help students connect with their teachers during remote learning. The commissioners made the announcement at their regular meeting on Tuesday.



Burke County Public Schools Superintendent Larry Putnam said, "We started school in a way we never have before: remotely. I am proud of our technology team for distributing more than 9,680 devices in the two weeks before school started and our teachers for their ability to adjust to a new way of instruction. Now that students are connecting with their teachers remotely, we are learning the true needs for access to reliable internet connections. In areas of the county with strong cell service, hotspots provide a valuable link for students to learning. We are grateful to the county commissioners for recognizing this need and approving funding for 750 hotspots."

Johnnie Carswell, Chairman of the Burke County Board of Commissioners said, "The Burke County Board of Commissioners recognize the importance of education and are thrilled to be able to provide the additional hotspots. The County Commissioners have worked diligently for years to get internet providers to serve Burke County's rural and underserved areas and it will remain a top challenge/priority for the Board."

Burke County Public Schools conducted a survey early in the summer and 10.5% of the 1,158 surveyed said they lack access to reliable, high-speed internet. Now that students have devices in hand at home, the district sees the need for hotspots is even greater than originally anticipated.

Putnam said, "As we know, hotspots are only as good as the cellphone reception in the area. We have parts of Burke County that have no cell service, and we appreciate the commissioners looking into that need as well. No doubt there are even more students, and even teachers too, who could benefit from hotspots if they had cell service near their homes.'

Burke County Public Schools has mapped out locations around the county that have free, open wifi available in parking lots. In addition to school parking lots, churches, libraries, fire departments, and businesses have stepped up and offered to open up their wifi to students.

Putnam said, "This does not mean that the students have to sit in mom's and dad's car to complete their work. Once they are at the wifi location, they can download their assignments or their teacher's video lesson for the day on their device and then work offline from home. Then they can return to the wifi to upload their completed work and receive their next assignments."

Also stepping up to help fill the need for hotspots are the Morganton Housing Authority and Burke County United Way. The Housing Authority has added wifi access for students and the United Way has launched a campaign to raise community donations to purchase hotspots.

Putnam said, "People's true colors come through amid a crisis, and I am proud to say that our community is shining brightly amid this pandemic. We are so grateful for the Burke County United Way's efforts to rally the community and raise funding to purchase hotspots for our students. In life and in education, technology is a great equalizer. These actions from our county commissioners, the city of Morganton and United Way prove that government and nonprofits can come together and impact the lives of so many of our students, and for this, we are extremely grateful."

A Healthy Church Reaches Out

As believers, we are often tempted to get comfortable. We belong to a church and have Christian friends. We give our time and finances to support the ministry. We may even feel that our faith is increasing as we read the Bible, pray, and worship God. While all these practices are beneficial, if we aren't careful, we can become disconnected and inwardly



focused. Our spiritual growth isn't complete until we share it with others. Jesus, Himself, set the example for us. Reaching out was His primary purpose

in ministry. And everywhere He went, people gathered. They were drawn to Him – His words and His healing touch. The time Jesus spent in prayer and worship didn't just fill Him spiritually. It prepared Him to go out into the world and minister to the needs of the people, pointing them to the Heavenly Father.

He made His calling clear. "It is not the healthy who need a doctor, but the sick. I have not come to call the righteous, but sinners" (Mark 2:17). Before He left the earth, Jesus told us that our purpose was the same – to go and make disciples of all people.

As a church, we can only be truly healthy if we are fulfilling our God-given purpose. He didn't call us to be comfortable, to sit on the sidelines and watch others share His Good News. He called us to go and tell others about the free gift of eternal life, so that they too may be saved.

If outreach is so vital, why does it not tend to be our priority? Churches today are pulled in many different directions. Pastors often serve as teachers, disciples, counselors, leaders, administrators, and so much more. Contrary to what many believers may think, they are not the primary ones responsible for evangelism. We are. It is our responsibility to share Christ with our families, our neighbors, and the people we meet in our communities.

Church-wide outreaches are great, and I encourage them, but evangelism becomes more wide-spread when believers leave the church building and disperse into their neighborhoods, taking the Gospel with them wherever they go. The message of eternal life can be shared in line at the grocery store, while waiting for clothes to dry at the laundry mat, or with a next-door neighbor.

Many Christians stop short of sharing their faith because of fear. They don't want to be rejected. They don't know what to say. Or, they don't know how to even start the conversation. But the good news is that these things can be taught. We have found that when people learn how to begin Gospel conversations, answer difficult questions, and share Jesus effectively, they are often excited to share their

When Christians start spreading the best news of all, people's lives are changed for eternity. The church grows. Our faith is strengthened. Other believers are encouraged to take a step out in faith and share the gift of eternal life with someone they know who needs hope.



To Know His Will

Acts 22:16-22 "And now why tarriest thou? arise, and be baptized, and wash away thy sins, calling on the name of the Lord. And it came to pass, that, when I was come again to Jerusalem, even while I prayed in the temple, I was in a trance; And saw him saying unto me, Make haste, and get thee quickly out of Jerusalem: for they will not receive thy



Paul recounts his own conversion experience to this enraged mob which had just been ready to tear him limb from limb! I am sure that if I had been in his shoes I would have been trying to get out of there as fast as possible. But Paul recognizes this as his opportunity and he wants to be the instrument to reach this stubborn crowd. So he seizes the only opportunity he has, hoping the Lord will give him success, and he tells of his own conversion and specifically the role which Ananias played. The details of this event are etched into the memory of the apostle. Though it occurred thirty years before, he has never forgotten a single detail. This was the moment he was chosen to be an apostle, and Ananias conveyed the commission to him. It had three parts, three aspects of ministry.

First, he was chosen to know the will of God. Now, that was not where God wanted him to go, or what God wanted him to do. What Paul had to learn was that the will of God is a relationship to his Son. When Paul understood that, he had all the power he needed to do anything God asked him to do. So many young Christians struggle at this point. They think that the will of God is some kind of itinerary they must discover, that if they can just find where God wants them to go, and what he wants them to do next, then they can do the will of God. No. The Scriptures make clear that the will of God is a relationship. It is your attitude of expectancy that Jesus Christ, living in you, will work through you. When you expect him to do that, you are in the will of God. Everything you do is in the will of God. Do anything you like, then, because it will be in God's will, unless the Holy Spirit within you indicates otherwise, according to his Word. That is what Paul learned — the power by which a Christian lives his life.

Next, Paul looks back and says, This is what made me an apostle. I have seen Jesus Christ many times. He has appeared to me and talked to me. He told me, directly and personally, the things that the other apostles learned when they were with him as disciples. That is how I know them. Motivated by the love of Jesus Christ and an awareness of the majesty of his person, Paul pushed on ceaselessly, out into the far regions of the earth, performing his apostolic ministry.

Finally, Paul heard a voice from the Lord's mouth, what his message was to be — to declare what Jesus Christ had said to him. It was the same message Jesus had given to the twelve, in the days of his flesh. That is how they knew that Paul was a true apostle — because he knew what they knew. That constitutes the same message that God has for all of us today — the words of his mouth, which Jesus had given to the Apostle Paul. Father, thank you that you have commissioned me as well to bear witness to your great work in my life. Help me to be faithful to that call. What are three vital aspects of the Apostle Paul's calling which apply to all who seek to know and follow God's will? Do we attempt to define or limit his will to a specific place, a particular activity?

The Cattle Prod

For my college education, I went to Southern University near Chattanooga Tennessee. And although it has been a lot of years since I was a college freshman, I still remember my first class at 8:00 am on the very first day of classes. It was actually a Bible class and the professor gave us what I still consider a wonderfully unique assignment. He asked



us to take these four individuals, Abraham, Moses, David, and Daniel, and pick one verse that contained their name that we students thought best described their entire life. Not so easy. For example, it is said that there are 929 verses in the bible that mention the name of David. Like Lay's Potato Chips, it's hard to pick just one as a synopsis of David's entire life. By the way, I picked 1 Samuel 18:14 for my verse for David. "And David behaved wisely in all his ways, and the Lord was with him." Of course, we cannot say that David really acted wisely at every point in his life. Again, it is difficult to narrow David's life down to just one verse that contains his name.

Yet, this is exactly the case for a man whose name was Shamgar. His name does not show up in scripture 929 times. Shamgar's name shows up only one time in one verse in the Bible and it is in Judges 3:31. "After him was Shamgar the son of Anath, who killed six hundred men of the Philistines with an ox goad and he delivered Israel." That is all there is about the man Shamgar. But from this one verse, we are given quite the snapshot. Shamgar is not said to be a judge of Israel in those days before the Hebrews decided they wanted kings to rule over them. Instead, Shamgar was just a local guy down in the southwest part of Cannan who allowed God to use him. There is a local threat from a people known as the Philistines.

Now what is interesting to me is that Shamgar does not pick up any conventional weapons that one would expect to find on a battlefield. I got to believe that if Shamgar would have had a sword or other conventional weapon, he would have used it. Instead, Shamgar used an ox goad. What is an ox goad you ask? Well, it is a tool that one would have used as he plowed. An ox goad was basically a long stick, around 8 feet long with a sharp point on the end. Today's more modern device would be called a cattle prod. Normally you would use it to convince your ox or oxen to keep moving and pull the plow. Shamgar grabs it and takes it to the battlefield.

Shamgar used what was in his hand and evidently, God gave Shamgar a great victory for His people. He simply used what he had in his hand. Years before, God asked Moses, What is that in your hand? (Exodus 4:2) Moses had been trying to explain why he was not the man for the job because of his shortcomings and God pops the question of what's in your hand. It happened to be a shepherd's rod. And Moses would carry that rod for the next 40 years and would use it in completely unconventional ways, again and again. Just a simple shepherd's rod but look at what God did with what Moses had in his hand.

It was the same for the "one verse man" Shamgar. He had a cattle prod, and by the power of God, he was able to accomplish a great victory for the cause of God...for God's church of that day. What is in the hands of your church that could be used for God's people? Way too much of the time we look at our hands and think I have nothing that God can use. I can't get upfront and speak, I can't sing or play the piano or guitar, and I would not even make a decent greeter at the church entrance. First, don't underestimate what God can do through you. Secondly, God can use the most unconventional item to bring victory for His people. Now I'm not suggesting that we pick up a cattle prod. But this we know, that God uses what we have in our hands, and there is no telling how God will use you. I promise you this, God will use us if we will let Him use what we have in our hands.




Obedient Heart Fellowship

Half Gospel Church?

The Nazi Holocaust and the death of six million Jews are appalling, but even most Christians are unaware of an event which could have exterminated



The Book of Esther is a thrilling story. Through unlikely circumstances, she became the wife and queen of the leader of the mighty Persian Empire. An unscrupulous court adviser named Haman tricked Emperor Ahasuerus into granting Haman permission to exterminate every Jew in the Empire. Since Persia dominated a vast portion of the world, few Jews would have escaped. The plot was thwarted because Esther risked death by confronting her husband.

Speaking to the King unbidden could be a capital crime. While Esther agonized over whether she should take such a risk on behalf of her people; her uncle, Mordecai, asked a question which has reverberated through the ages: "Who knows whether you have attained (your) status for such a time as this?"

Every believer with eyes to see and ears to hear is aware that our world is permeated by clear and present danger to God's people and His agenda. In addition to the manic proclamation of viral pandemic and expanding waves of violence, Biblical values are under assault at every level of society. Practices clearly labeled "abomination" in scripture are now enshrined into law by the Federal Government and every state. People who dare to proclaim and live out Bible teaching often find themselves vilified in person and through social media. Job losses, growing scarcities, and escalating costs for necessities are causing grand-scale desperation. Perhaps the safest thing for present-day believers is to keep their faith to themselves.

But is the safest thing for me the best thing for God's Kingdom? Part of Messiah's clarion call is that His disciples must be salt and light. Significant quantities of either are impossible to hide. They command attention because they alter their context. As the satanic agenda permeates our culture, anyone who attempts to exhibit Biblical righteousness will stand out. Standing out, even for a holy purpose, can be dangerous.

Bible prophecy defines God's people as those who have faith in Jesus and also keep God's commandments. Jesus did not say that having a warm, gushy feeling toward God and a warm, gushy feeling toward people fulfills the commandments. Defining love as any type of feeling is a Greek concept. The Hebrew definition of "love" is obedience. Jesus says bluntly, "If you love me, keep my commandments." He also says that every pen stroke of the instructions for living revealed through Moses will be in full force for as long as heaven and earth remain.

The "true" Gospel is that everyone who exhibits faith which leads to righteousness can be grafted into God's family, the Kingdom of Israel. That is why the core of Jesus' message is summed up in Matthew 4:17, "Turn from your sins for the Kingdom of Heaven is near." He preached this same message throughout His ministry. He never mentioned His own death, burial, and resurrection. Those events became an important part of the gospel message since that was the way He became the perfect sacrifice for sin under the terms of the Torah, but they are only part of the message. Hebrews 4:2 says that Israel received the same Gospel message at Sinai that we now receive.

The Sinai covenant administered through Moses was not about imposing impossible burdens or arbitrary barriers between God and His people. The Torah—falsely labeled "The Law" in Greek and English translations—teaches us to live according to God's standards of righteousness. Jeremiah 31:32 reveals a key aspect of the new covenant: "But this is the covenant I will make with the house of Israel after those days"—it is a declaration of YHVH—'I will put My Torah within them. Yes, I will write it on their heart."" Jesus did not revoke or alter the Torah. He made us capable of hosting the Spirit of Holiness.

Most Christians believe that the Torah is a "burden" from which believers are freed. When we are part of the New Covenant, we have within us a great desire to obey God's instructions for righteous living. That's what it means to have His Torah written on our hearts. 1 John 2:3-4 says that the only true indication of our relationship with the Messiah is that we keep His commandments. James 2:20 says that faith without obedience is dead.

The good news Jesus taught is that God is in the process of establishing a Kingdom where He can once again dwell amid His people. Our age makes light of sin, but sin is what separated us from God's presence. God has, from the beginning, taught His children how he wants us to live, and He made those lessons unmistakable when His Son took flesh and became our example. Jesus' perfect sacrifice nailed the death penalty we deserve to the cross and made it possible for us to follow His example.

Our age cries out for Messiah's disciples to choose obedience underscored by Esther's joyful proclamation: "If I die, I die." Grace is not an excuse for God's people to sin. "Grace" and "obedience" are not mutually exclusive. The message of scripture is that those saved by grace through faith want to lead lives focused on righteous obedience. No one achieves salvation through obedience. Only Jesus was capable of perfect obedience, but the life He lived is our example. How did He live? He kept the Torah. His true disciples will do the same. That is the meaning of, "Take up your cross and follow me."

A Worthy Walk

In Colossians 1:9, we read of Paul's desire that these believers would be filled full with the complete knowledge of God's will in wisdom and spiritual understanding. Wisdom is the practical application of knowledge. Without wisdom, knowledge is little more than an accumulation of needless facts. Spiritual understanding is discernment in spiritual matters.

In Colossians 1:10-12, we discover that Paul had a specific goal in mind when he prayed. He prayed for the

purpose that "ye might walk worthy of the Lord." The increase of knowledge described in verse 9 is intended on impacting how we live. The truth of the Word of God is to be studied so that it might be applied to our lives. We are not to merely study so that we might increase our knowledge; we are to study so that we might become more godly in our walk with the Lord. Our goal is to walk in a manner that is worthy of the Lord. Such a walk is pleasing to the Lord and is characterized by four dimensions.

The first dimension is "being fruitful in every good work." Genuine salvation inevitably produces fruit. It includes but is not necessarily limited to the fruit of the Spirit mentioned in Galatians 5. Believers have been called to live in such a way that fruit produced by the Holy Spirit is evident for all to see.

The second dimension is that of "increasing in the knowledge of God." A life that is a worthy walk is a life that is continuously advancing in a greater knowledge of God. This knowledge is more than acquiring more facts about God; this knowledge encompasses a great knowledge of Him. As believers, we should be conducting our lives in such a way that we come to know God. Too many Christians are content to know about God.

The third dimension is being "strengthened with all might, according to his glorious power, unto all patience and longsuffering with joyfulness." It is through the divine power given to the Christian that he can endure and persevere. Amid all the pressures and difficult circumstances we endure in the Christian life, God's strength enables the believer to do so with joyfulness. This is why Paul said in Philippians 4:13, "I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me." Far too often, we rely upon our own power, rather than the power of God. Philippians 3:10 teaches that believers can experience the very same power of God that raised Jesus Christ from the dead.

The final dimension of a worthy walk is that of continuous praise unto the Father. The content of this praise will be developed more in the subsequent verses in which Paul directs our attention to the wonderful salvation we have been given for God. If you are a believer, you are to be continuously giving thanks for that which God has done in our lives, especially in our salvation.

A worthy walk is characterized by increasing fruit, increasing knowledge, increasing power, and increasing praise. Strive to live a life that is worthy of the Lord





Local Man Fighting for His Life Witnesses God's Love

Terry Jamerson may only have months to live if he doesn't find someone to donate a kidney very soon.

Terry and his wife of 20 years, Sarah Jamerson, live in Bakersville, North Carolina and they are desperately seeking a donor to replace Terry's failing kidneys. Terry had suffered a serious heart attack back in February, which is often called a "widowmaker" or a one hundred percent blockage in the left anterior descending (LAD) artery. He was able to have stints put in but then found out that

his kidney function is failing due to severe high blood pressure. If a donor isn't

found, he may have less than a year to live, according to doctors

Terry has been on dialysis at the DaVita Dialysis Center in Spruce Pine several times each week for about three hours each session. Unfortunately, Terry's kidneys are only functioning at eight percent and Sarah says that the doctors have told them he may have less than a year to live without a donor's kidney.

As most people know, finding a donor isn't easy and the short time Terry was given has made things very stressful in the search. Sarah said that many people can live for

years while on dialysis but in Terry's particular case, time is of the essence.

Terry has been accepted by both Wake Forest Baptist Medical Center and the University of Tennessee Medical Center for Transplant Services but, so far, there has been no kidney available for Terry.

Despite their heart-wrenching plight, Sarah told me one of the best things that happened during their search was when a potential donor gave his life to Christ!

A 46-year-old man from Missouri volunteered to be a donor but had an alcohol problem. The man, determined to help the Jamersons, stopped drinking for the required time to become a donor. Unfortunately, the doctors determined that the man was pre-diabetic which disqualified him from the program.

The man, realizing his own need for a Savior, gave his life to Jesus! Tears streamed down Sarah's face as she recounted the story and gave thanks that even though they were so desperate, God used Terry's illness to save another person. "In the evenings, we go down to the Toe River and there's a rock there next to the river, and we hold hands and pray," Sarah said. "It's quiet and peaceful and we pray at the river".

Sarah and Terry are praying for a miracle. They are praying someone will read this article and at least contact them to find out if they might be able to help. At this point, the doctors are willing to use a donor with any blood type to save Terry's life.

"But do not forget to do good and to share, for with such sacrifices God is well pleased" Hebrews 13:16

We can say, I believe truthfully, occasionally we all find ourselves searching for HOPE!

Maybe you find yourself struggling with addiction or abuse, maybe it is sexual immorality, anger, prejudice, or loneliness. Each one of us from time to time finds ourselves searching for HOPE. These examples are only a few and do not scratch the surface of our struggles.

This month I want to address one of if not America's single largest struggle, our lack of spiritual HOPE. We live in a day where we are told the only acceptable spiritual journey is one that coexists with all others. Regardless of where you place your faith it's fine and correct if it doesn't offend anyone else. That may look good on paper and for a moment give a warm fuzzy feeling but it doesn't provide any hope! For you and me to have spiritual hope we must have authority in our life. To say there is nothing absolute is an absolute! Where is hope found within an empty absolute? We require the authority of HOPE! This hope exists, please read on.

Many people today know about Jesus, maybe they have been raised in the church and followed in the footsteps of their parents, grandparents, and other role models. Maybe they have memorized their Bible. Maybe they give to countless charities. Yet, they like the multitudes who have never heard of Jesus Christ lack spiritual hope because they have never entered into a personal relationship with Jesus Christ. The first thing I want to bring up is that God made us in his image, he does not make us flawed so that some things just wear out too quickly, as I have heard from many people. A particular occurrence I would like to point out when people show up at my office with a "wore out hip", Most of the time it is just one hip. I like to ask questions, so I usually ask, why is one hip wore out more than the other? Aren't they both just as old?

That tends to get you thinking. It could be that you had an injury-causing it to wear down faster, it could be that something is out of alignment in the pelvis or elsewhere. Think of the front end of your car, if it's out of alignment, what does it do to the tires, you guessed it, they wear down unevenly and prematurely. Let's face it, we all get older and some wear and tear is expected. If we kept 21-year-old bodies into our 80's I think we would all get into the way too much trouble, God knew what he was doing when he planned out our life cycle.

So, when we see one hip or one knee or one area of the spine wearing down faster than the rest, start thinking about "why is this happening". If it's an alignment problem, that can usually be fixed, if it's a tight muscle, that can be fixed. There is a lot you can do for yourself other than just thinking "I'm getting old, so I guess I'll just have to get used to it".

The first place I recommend you start is with some simple stretches. Get on your phone or computer and search for "stretches for hip pain" and you will see lots of choices. I suggest you try several different ones; obviously, pick something you feel you can actually do. I say that because some of them will have you looking like a pretzel and possibly make you worse off than you were. Pick from 1-3 different stretches and make it a habit at least once a day to do them, you may be surprised at the results. If that does not work then you may try a chiropractor or massage therapist, just taking something for the pain every day will just about guarantee a hip replacement sooner than later.

Remember our body is the temple of the Holy Spirit, and temple maintenance is a requirement.



"We hope to educate our kids about the Orchard and its heritage in an engaging, entertaining way," Hilton added. Children will be able to have their pictures taken as a worm in an apple, playing the banjo, riding a tractor or a train, buzzing or flapping, all while experiencing the magic of the Orchard ecosystem of trees, fresh air, verdant trails, critters both creeping and flying, and an occasional ripe fruit off one of the hundreds of heirloom apple trees. Since the COVID-19 shut down, Freedom Life has remained open and continued to provide full support service opportunities to justice-involved individuals in the McDowell community.

"With the understandable funding loses experienced as a result of COVID-19, maintaining full operational capacity in meeting the urgent needs of the men and women we serve may not have been possible without the foresight and generosity of the State Employees' Credit Union Foundation," said Danny Hampton, Executive Director of Freedom Life, "God provides in awesome ways. While we continue to pray for the dedicated supportive partners of Freedom Life who are themselves struggling in this difficult time, we thank God for His provision through the SECU Foundation. I prefer to deal with reality and facts. If I can find an income that you cannot outlive at a reasonable cost isn't that what your original goal for saving was? Absolutely. This addresses the first concern of a retirement income plan. Now let's look at the second concern, taxes. This should be a huge concern for most retirees. The reality is that COVID-19 will have a significant impact on future taxes. With the national debt expected to exceed 30 trillion dollars most believe that taxes will have to rise to pay for this. Currently, we are at the lowest personal income tax rates in modern history, but that will change. The Trump tax rates sunset or go away in 2026 and will return to higher rates. This creates an opportunity to both save now and reduce the taxes you will pay on your retirement plans in the future. It takes a strategy, but I believe this is one of the most important areas that you can minimize risk. The risk of paying higher taxes in the future. The third area of concern and this is probably the single biggest risk based on the likelihood of a long-term care event is Long-Term Care insurance. Currently, 69% of people today rely on spouses, family, and friends for care. This is very taxing on all of the above and as we have seen recently results in moving into nursing homes. After COVID-19 this is not an outcome that people want. More than 50% of COVID-19 deaths were related to Senior living facilities. Having a plan for at-home care for most people is the preferred option. With the proper planning, you can create a plan that protects your family and friends and allows you to be cared for in the comfort of your own home.

For me and my practice, I like to incorporate all three of these areas into one retirement income plan. With proper planning, these risks can be reduced or eliminated. If you can come up with a plan that gives you the certainty of income, certainty of taxes, and security of long-term care. This allows you to enjoy the freedom of retirement that most say they want. 

Census 2020

Would you trade 10 minutes of your time for more than \$18,000?

What if those 10 minutes would mean that your children's school could hire the additional teachers and install the protective equipment it needs to reopen safely? Or that your EMS department got to buy a badly needed new ambulance? Or that your medical clinic could do more to help people addicted to opioids? Or that the county transportation department could schedule additional trips to get you where you need to go?

Money to do all those things – and dozens of others that determine what it is like to live here in Yancey and Mitchell counties – depend on how many people complete the census. For every resident that fails to answer the simple questionnaire, the county will lose more than \$1,800 a year for the next 10 years, or a total of over \$18,000.

"The census affects every aspect of public service as well as COVID funding," said Jeff Howell, the director of emergency services for Yancey County. "The more folks we have living and working in Yancey County determines the number of ambulances, EMS workers, fire departments, etc. that are needed."

"Our federal and state grants both are allocated by the census," said Sheila Blalock, director of transportation for Mitchell County. "Our funding is not based on performance but on population."

Also, the Dogwood Health Trust is offering counties in Western North Carolina \$1,000 for every percentage point increase in census participation above the level of 2010.

And here's another reason to either mail in the paper form, answer the questions by phone, or complete the census online: If you don't, a census taker will come to your house. And, if you're like most people, that's something you'd like to avoid. (See below for details on how to complete the questionnaire.)

Perhaps you don't like to share information about yourself with government agencies. That's understandable. But, by law, that information can be used only to compile the huge, anonymous sets of numbers that determine how money and political representation are distributed.

It is a crime for any census employee to share information about any person with another individual or group, even within the government. That includes law enforcement, the IRS, or the immigration service. A census employee who breaks the law can be fined up to \$250,000 and go to prison for as long as five years.

At last count, the response rate in both Mitchell and Yancey counties was lower than in the state or nation as a whole. As a result, people in our counties pay state and federal taxes at the same rates that people in other places do, but they receive fewer benefits in return. Also, because census numbers are used to determine how many federal and state representatives each area gets, our counties have less political clout than they deserve.

The only way to fix that is to make sure every resident gets counted. To help make that happen, SEARCH (Sustaining Essential and Rural Community Healthcare) is working to get the message out to all residents of Yancey and Mitchell counties.

There are three ways to respond:

- Online at www.my2020census.gov
- By phone at 844-330-2020
- By mail by returning the questionnaire mailed to your home to

U.S. Census Bureau National Processing Center 100 Logistics Avenue Jeffersonville, IN 47144

Here are all the things asked on the census form:

- How many people live in your home
- · How they are related to each other
- Whether you own or rent your home
- Whether it is a house, an apartment or some other type of home
- Your phone number (only used if the census needs to contact you to clarify one of your answers)
- The name, age, birth date, sex and race(s) of each person, and whether or not they are of Hispanic, Latino or Spanish origin

There is NOT a citizenship question.

The census happens only once every 10 years. Do your part now, and you won't have to deal with it again until 2030.



Founding Fathers And How They Served Our Country – Sam Adams By David Streater Burke County

Samuel Adams was born in 1722 and graduated from Harvard in 1740. Adams was a remarkable statesman and politician, but an inferior business-person. As a banker, Adams was fired due to excessive time talking about politics. His father then gave him a large sum of money to start a business, but Adams gave half to a needy friend

and squandered the remainder. He then worked in his family's brewery, ultimately sending it into bankruptcy.

Hired as the tax collector for Boston, Adams did a poor job by relieving many skivers of their taxes. With his faults, however, Adams was a true American patriot. He and Patrick Henry spoke forcefully in favor of separation from Britain. Using numerous pseudonyms, Adams wrote countless editorial letters opposing British control to as many colony newspapers.

Paul Revere, John Hancock, and others were tutored by Adams to be rebels, and they recognized him to be their "political father". Adams avoided capture due to Paul Revere's famed nighttime ride, announcing the "British are coming". Adams also crafted the Boston Tea Party ploy and formed the Sons of Liberty—who destroyed and ruined British properties. Among other monikers, the British referred to Samuel Adams as the "most dangerous man in Massachusetts" (Fardin, 2002, p.4).

Among other honors, Adams was hailed as the "Father of American Independence", and the "Father of the Revolution". If the British had won the Revolutionary War, Adams would have been executed as a war criminal!





Apostasy Predicted

In a Day of Declension

2 Timothy Declension, "a falling away" – the act of professed Christians who deliberately reject the revealed truth of God's Word



A time will come when Apostates' will not endure sound doctrine and will make the choice to follow after their own pleasures of the world. These people will gather their own teachers for their own ears to hear; they being turned away from the truth and turned to fables or stories that are not true of our living God, Salvation, Jesus Christ and eternity, (4:3-4).

Apostates depart from the true faith but not from showing the outward profession of Christianity, (3:5). Apostate teachers teach of worldly things and pleasures and have their own multitude of followers, (4:3). Apostates are false prophets among people denying redemption by the blood, bringing upon themselves swift destruction; and the way of the truth – Jesus Christ – will be evil spoken of, (2 Peter 2:1-2 and read 2:3-19).

The righteous, dwelling among these kinds of people seeing and hearing, troubled their righteous soul seriously from day to day concerning these people and their unlawful teachings and doings. We are to keep in mind that the Lord knoweth how to deliver the Godly out of temptations and to reserve the unjust into the day of judgment to be punished. (Reference Psalms 134:17)

Please Note: Chiefly those that walk after the flesh in uncleanness, and despise government; those that are bold, straight forward, overconfident, and take liberties, are self-willed people that are not afraid to speak evil of dignities. These people speak evil of the things that they do not understand; and they will utterly perish in their own corruption receiving the reward of unrighteousness as they that count it a pleasure to riot in the day time, sporting themselves with their own deceiving's while they feast among us, (Jude verse 11).

They have forsaken the right way, God's way, by going astray. Isn't this a description of what we, as Christians, are seeing here on earth today, (2 Peter 2:10)? Apostates turn way from the faith. For it would have been better for them not to have known the way of righteousness, than after they have known it, to turn away from the Holy commandment delivered unto them. (Read the Book of Jude) Apostasy in the church cannot be redeemed and awaits judgment, (2 Thessalonians 2:10-12; 2 Peter 2:17,21; Jude 11-15; Revelation 3:14-16).

The Lord cometh to execute judgment upon all that are ungodly among us, of all their ungodly ways and deeds which they have committed, and all their hard speeches which ungodly sinners have spoken against our Lord, our God! Nevertheless, the Lord, our God shall stand with us all of true faith and Christianity, strengthening our faith in Him; through the teachings of Scripture and the detailed account from Paul, an apostle of Jesus Christ, that will prevail upon the earth during the last days, (2 Timothy 3:1-9).

Habits of the Heart: A Study of the Spiritual Disciplines "Confession"

In this monthly series of articles, I have chosen to survey twelve spiritual habits of the heart or spiritual disciplines that we must pursue in our faith journey to

maturity in Christ. Richard Foster, in his book Celebration of Discipline: The Path to Spiritual Growth (Harper & Row, 1978), divides these twelve into three categories: Inward disciplines; Outward disciplines; and Corporate disciplines. After having completed the first two categories in previous issues, we now turn our attention to the final four spiritual disciplines, which comprise the "corporate" disciplines. They are confession, worship, guidance, and celebration.

College basketball (in a normal year) has the "Final Four." The College Football Selection Committee selects four college football teams to play in a final tournament to determine its champion. College hockey calls their championship tournament the "Frozen Four." These "final four" perhaps represent the crowning achievement of the work of the Holy Spirit of God in the believer's life.

What God most desires for and from those whom He has set free from sin through the sacrificial death of Jesus Christ on Calvary's cross, is that His newly adopted spiritual children live out the gospel message of salvation. We are to live for Him. And if we are going to be faithful to live the gospel, we must not just speak the gospel, but also allow others to see the gospel being lived out. We practice (live-out) our faith by practicing and living the habits of the heart. Not just a few of them—but all of them.

If the child of God is to grow into the likeness of our Savior, then we must commit ourselves to learn from Him, grow in Him, and live for Him. Each of these spiritual disciplines is a call from God to become like Christ. The inner disciplines prepare us to meet without Savior daily. The outward disciplines ready us to be used as living witnesses in a lost, dark, and dying world. God equips us through learning and practicing the disciplines of simplicity, solitude, submission, and service to present us and use us as His powerful witnesses.

The corporate disciplines are designed by God to remind us that we are not alone. As an act of His love and mercy and by our response to His invitation of salvation, God grafted us into His universal family. By faith, we become children of God. We then become a part of His family—each one of us valuable members of that family, which Jesus called "the church." (ekklēsia—έκκλήσία; i.e., "the called-out ones")

These disciplines serve to move us toward a deeper sense and reality that we are a part of God's family. A deep, true spiritual journey is not only about our own private, individual devotion and pursuit of Christ—it is equally about our commitment to be an integral and functional part of the community of faith—God's Church. His Church is made up of living stones made alive in Christ. Placed together by the Lord, each believer becomes a part of the "Body of Christ." Jesus called us, His Church, His bride! And as His bride, we have the glorious privilege of loving, honoring, and serving our Savior.


In Mark 3:33-34, Jesus responded to a crowd who informed Him that His mother and brothers had arrived and were looking for Him. "Answering them, He said, "Who are My mother and My brothers?" Looking about at those who were sitting around Him, He said, "Behold My mother and My brothers! For whoever does the will of God, he is My brother and sister and mother." The new birth, Jesus insisted, would usher humankind into a new spiritual existence and possibility in which men and women would become brothers and sisters in faith. Barnhard Anderson (The Living Word of the Bible, Westminster Press, 1979, p. 146) adds, "The church, as the family of God, sets forth a new criterion of worth, a new form of parity, and a new context of belonging for each person in the kingdom of God." You and I are the church and we are expected to be a part of God's functional family.

Christians who do not commit themselves to the "Body of Christ" or to these "family" disciplines will remain as spiritual infants—in self-induced isolation, vulnerable, weak, and immature. God cannot and will not be glorified!

The Spiritual Discipline of Confession begins with our acknowledgment of the reality of sin and rebellion in our lives. We are accustomed to thinking of sin as purely an individual act of disobedience to God. That is true in one sense. But the scriptures go much farther. Since we are a part of God's family, our sins not only affect our relationship with Jesus but also radiate outwardly and affect our relationships with our fellow family members. God's spiritual remedy for the broken relationships caused by sin was the sacrificial death of His Son, Jesus, the unblemished Lamb of God. We can remove the power and consequences of our sin by way of accepting and receiving God's gift of forgiveness. We become righteous, not in and through what we do, but rather who we receive. Paul made it so very clear in Romans 5:17, "For if by the transgression of the one, death reigned through the one, much more those who receive the abundance of grace and of the gift of righteousness will reign in life through the One, Jesus Christ."

Jesus accomplished our forgiveness and salvation through His sacrificial death. But it has to be activated by both our acknowledgment of sin and our faith and acceptance of His gift of grace and mercy. When we acknowledge our sins, we are actually agreeing with God about the status of our spiritual being (i.e., we are sinners and as a result, are lost and separated from God by our sins). The gift of salvation comes to us full and free! What do we mean by "full?" God makes us fully right with Him! What do we mean by "free?" We didn't do anything to obtain it! Remember, Jesus came to the cross out of love, desiring to make a way for God's creation to receive the Father's forgiveness and pave the way for God to offer His beloved His very best.

The cross made God's forgiveness accessible to all of His marvelous creations. But it is only through the Spiritual Discipline of Confession is it possible for us to



That process began when we received Christ as our Savior. We confessed our sins and invited Jesus to be the Savior and Lord of our life. Paul wrote (1 Timothy 2:5), "For there is one God, and one mediator also between God and men, the man Christ Jesus..." By faith, we agreed with God that only Jesus could save us from our sins. By faith, we agreed with God and accepted Jesus' sacrifice as payment for our sins. By faith, we agreed with God that once the payment was made and received, that God's cleansing is our free gift. We no longer have to live under the weight of sin, guilt, or shame. John stated (1 John 1:7), "but if we walk in the Light as He Himself is in the Light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus His Son cleanses us from all sin." And in 1 John 1:9, he continued that marvelous truth, "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and righteous to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness."

There are many things in this journey of life that seek to stand in the way of receiving God's forgiveness. One is continuing to live in ungodly and unbiblical patterns of sin. Another is a misconstrued theological viewpoint, which sets the stage for other emotional and spiritual snags. Salvation has often been errantly tied in with ecclesiastical authority—and confession and penance have been used throughout the history of the church as a method to convey salvation and forgiveness.

The Protestant Reformation shifted that theological perspective. As a rallying cry, the Reformers pointed to 1 Peter 2:5 where Peter wrote, "you also, as living stones, are being built up as a spiritual house for a holy priesthood, to offer up spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ." And in verse 9 he proclaimed, "But you are A CHOSEN RACE, A royal PRIESTHOOD, A HOLY NATION, A PEOPLE FOR God's OWN POSSESSION, so that you may proclaim the excellencies of Him who has called you out of darkness into His marvelous light..." This "universal priesthood of all believers" stands as the cornerstone of our evangelical faith. We stand before Almighty God as a kingdom of priests, each and every one subject only to the authority of God and the Lordship of Christ. Each one is responsible to God as a member of the body of Christ. We need no other priest, except Jesus who is our "High Priest."

Confession then ceases to be the means by which we appease God and secure our forgiveness and salvation. Confession becomes an act of obedience and worship—as we come before the presence of God acknowledging His Lordship and authority, as we humbly kneel acknowledging our sins and rebellion, and as we lift our hearts as redeemed and forgiven before our God thanking Him for His mercy and grace which has already accomplished our salvation and forgiveness. In truth, the spiritual discipline of confession draws us to expose our sins to God and others—so that we no longer hold any false guilt or shame. We have been forgiven! There is a renewed sense that nothing stands between God and me—for He has already removed both the stain and the power of sin.

Richard Foster sums it up so eloquently, "The Discipline of confession brings an end to pretense. God is calling into being a church that can openly confess its frail humanity and know the forgiving and empowering graces of Christ. Honesty leads to confession, and confession leads to change." That is the essence of the spiritual discipline of confession. Blessings!








A Grateful Girl

The Helmet of Salvation

We have studied the belt of truth, the breastplate of righteousness, the shoes of peace, the shield, and faith and now we arrive at the helmet of salvation. Paul tells us to 'take the helmet of salvation'. The Greek word for 'take' is 'analambano' and it means 'receive up; take unto'.

Psalm 3:8 and Jonah 2:9 remind us that salvation belongs to the Lord and can only be received as a gift from Him. We

cannot purchase it, earn it, or steal it. But what is it? In the OT, we constantly see references to the salvation of God as He came in and rescued His people: Exodus 14:13-14-Deliverance at the Red Sea for the people of God; Psalm 62:1-7-Deliverance for David as he fled from his enemies

Psalm 69:29 and Jeremiah 17:14-Deliverance from sickness; and Isaiah 35:3-4 promises that our God will come and save us.

Paul pulls two of the descriptions of the armor from the book of Isaiah. In Isaiah 59:14-20, the prophet likens righteousness to a breastplate and salvation to a helmet.

These passages are based on God's salvation of His covenant people. However, we know that the Redeemer that came was Jesus Christ and although He came to the Jew first, He also came to the Gentile.

Isaiah 49:5-6 "And now says the Lord, who formed Me from the womb to be His Servant, to bring Jacob back to Him, so that Israel might be gathered to Him (For I am honored in the sight of the Lord, and My God is My strength), He says, 'It is too small a thing that You should be My Servant to raise up the tribes of Jacob and to restore the preserved ones of Israel; I will also make You a light of the nations so that My salvation may reach to the end of the earth".

The bottom line is that God wants to save people more than people want to be saved.

Matthew 1:21-23 is the account of Gabriel's visit to Joseph after Mary had announced her pregnancy. Joseph was troubled concerning this news, but Gabriel told him that this child was conceived by the Holy Spirit. Joseph was to name Him, Jesus, for He would save His people from their sins.

The name Jesus, which came from the Hebrew name Joshua, means salvation. God provided a Savior, Jesus, the God-man. He came to live a perfect life in the flesh of a man and die as the Son of God, the ultimate and perfect sacrifice. Jesus' death, burial, and resurrection bridged the gap between sinful man and a holy God. He purchased salvation for all who would believe in His Name and He offers it as a free gift. He has discussed salvation in depth throughout the letter to these believers. In Ephesians 1:13-14, Paul wrote that when we hear the truth of the gospel and believe, we are sealed with the Holy Spirit, Who is our guarantee of eternal salvation.

In Ephesians 2:8-9, Paul states that our salvation is based on the grace of God, not on anything that we can do.

In Ephesians 2:13-14, we learn that we have been brought near to God by the blood of Jesus

In Ephesians 2:19 we discover that we are now members of the household of God

And lastly, in Ephesians 4:22-24, Paul announces that we have the power to put off our old lifestyle and put on the new because we are renewed in the spirit of our minds

We must put on our helmet of salvation because the enemy of our soul desires to destroy our confidence concerning our true identity in Christ. Our brain is command central and controls every movement in the body, however, our mind controls our decisions, our words, our thoughts, our will. The mind is the battlefield of Satan.

Have you ever doubted your salvation?

When true believers doubt their salvation, their productivity in the kingdom of God drops tremendously. Satan understands that causing us to struggle in this area limits our confidence to present the gospel to our family, co-workers, friends, etc. So how can we be confident in our salvation? The word of God and the Holy Spirit will guide us into all truth. We must spend time reading and meditating on God's promises, standing firm on every word that proceeds from the mouth of God.

If our heart desires to please God by obeying His Word and loving others through word and deed, it is a strong indication that we are a child of God.

2 Timothy is believed to be Paul's final letter and in 1:12, he confidently stated that he knew Whom he had believed. There was no doubt in his mind that his salvation was secure for time and eternity. We must walk confidently through life wearing the helmet of salvation. Refuse the devil even a toe hold in your mind by bringing every thought captive to the obedience of Christ. The defeated foe will flee!






Tim's Treasures


A few days ago I had found myself atop of Nowhere. Therein lies the story – it was part of my run.

Pause...and Consider

Please...I Need More Time

Don't pray for patience some say because then the trials will come that will teach you patience! There's some truth to that.

Early in having combined our two single families some 37 years ago, I found myself thin on patience and short with our boys.

I caught myself one morning as they left for

school. I bowed there at the front door and prayed asking forgiveness and for help to be more patient like Jesus. A short time later, circumstances out of our control demanded extraordinary patience.

Asthma that gripped my husband Ken and persisted several years required immense patience and kindness. Loss of work, taking on more responsibility myself...while still having compassion for his predicament...piled one on top of another; along with caring for our boys and helping them to understand our circumstances.

Suddenly, I remembered my prayer. It was time to see through God's eyes...his perspective.

Looking back, I was learning another facet of patience recently uncovered while studying Galatians 5: 22 NLT which says, "But the Holy Spirit produces this kind of fruit in our lives: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against these things!"

Some translations say, "patience," the ability to wait for something you're longing for; being composed even when things are in upheaval.

But another word for patience is forbearance. I settled in for a deeper look. Forbearance asks something more of me.

Forbearance says, "I'll give you more time."

Something has to give if we are to live in harmony while putting up with someone's poor behavior...ultimately expecting repentance and forgiveness. In fact, that must be the goal or there will be bad behavior indefinitely.

A parable in the Bible tells the story of a person who owed his king millions of dollars and couldn't pay. The king ordered him and his family sold, but the debtor pleaded for patience and received the king's forgiveness.

Is God calling you to forbear with someone? Giving more time is a blessing, especially when the treasure of forgiveness will be bestowed.

But what if bad behavior doesn't accompany forbearance...just faith and trust? I wonder. Do we forbear with God? When his answers seem slow in coming or come in unexpected ways...when in essence he is asking us to give him more time...do we practice forbearance with our Creator who knows best?

His patience with us is beyond understanding.

Psalm 27:14 reminds us so graciously. "Wait on the Lord; be of good courage, and He shall strengthen your heart; wait, I say, on the Lord!"
Forbear. Selah

Witchy Women

An unknown author once said, "We process the world through our words." As a writer, I can certainly identify with that and journaling has been a therapeutic practice for me since I could hold a pen. But let's tweak that quote just a bit

"We process the world through what and how we think and believe about ourselves."

I got this God Thought during a morning devotional on Philippians 4:8

"Finally, brethren, whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report; if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these things."

In a world that seems upside down to many Christians, it's a challenge to practice that which what Paul tasks us. Especially when we are dealing with combative or passive-aggressive people in our work lives. Being confident in who we are as children of God allows us to not only embrace Paul's instructions but to live them out in personal and professional settings. This truth revealed itself recently in a client's work meeting.

I had been helping a client navigate some passive-aggressive behavior from a group of women on the board of the organization she ran. These Witchy Women had been privately pressuring (bullying in the grown-up world) her to support an initiative that went against her Christian beliefs and was not directly related to the mission of the organization. In a team meeting, these women lodged negative accusations about her for what they perceived as not doing enough work (at least

the work they wanted her to do) and in a passive-aggressive way reprimanded her in front of the others for not communicating properly. They never once mentioned the aggressive emails and conversations about the initiative at the meeting, but instead gaslighted her. They were relentless in their accusations and intent on making sure everyone thought about her as they did.

My client saw this coming and, in our work, together we focused on the importance of accountability and how to professionally and as a Christian, manage the impending attacks. She has a heart for service and the Lord, which is what

brought her to this organization in the first place. Her sensitivity can get the best of her like it does us all. Even though she was hurt, offended, and mad, she was able to remain true to Paul's words because she focused on who she was in Christ and refused to believe the false attacks. She had prepared both with practical notes and research and with prayer. She was able to replace their lies about her with truth and show her work to the others.

The efforts of the Witchy Women backfired as several attendees later expressed their concern and disapproval of their behavior to the big boss. My client's ability to remain calm, and not be pulled into their web of destruction, shined the light on her positive behavior and earned her respect.

I admit, when she first came to me with this, I was mad too. I wanted to defend her and expose their hidden agendas and passive-aggressive behavior. (Imagine fist in the air, cape flowing behind me!) But Paul gives us a clear and simple way to bring our minds into the captivity of our Lord Jesus Christ. If you're anything like me, we tend to want to lash out, defend our honor, and lead with emotion. When we do, we stop living for Jesus and place our wounded ego on the throne instead. The idea that we process our world through our words starts with our thoughts. We must first and foremost focus on who we are in Christ and why we were saved. In 2 Timothy 1:9 we are reminded who has saved us called us holy, "not according to our works, but according to His own purpose and grace which was granted us in Christ Jesus from all eternity." (italic mine for emphasis)

We live in a world, especially our digital world, where words are used as weapons, badges of superiority, and to promote lies and belittle others. It can get under our skin and make us in turn have bad thoughts about the author or the speaker. Can you believe we have somewhere between 60K and 80K thoughts per day? This makes my head swim. I was having not-so-nice thoughts about the Witchy Women, but Paul's words convicted my heart. It brought me back to my God Thought;

"We process the world through what and how we think and believe about ourselves."

As Christians, we are called to remember what God says about who we are--not what the world says. Ground yourself and your identity in these truths:

- We are made in His image (Gen. 1:27)
- We are redeemed (Luke 1:68)
- We are washed white as snow (Isaiah 1:18)
- He died so that we could live (John 3:16)

When we see ourselves as loved, cherished, and covered by our loving Father, the weapons-whether words from Witchy Women or Facebook friends--can not penetrate to the core of our being--our heart and soul.

I realize that when I allow the world and its ugliness to capture my attention, I think bad thoughts. Now in the case of these women, the ability to recognize the threat is the gift of discernment from God. The gift of discernment is so that we may take proper care. This is the truth revealed. At this point, recognizing they



have ill intent is not "thinking bad thoughts"--at least not at this point. You are merely recognizing a threat. God gave us the ability to assess and reason along with our basic survival skills. Once we are aware of the threat, how we deal with it is informed by what we believe about ourselves. Do we feel, "I deserve this treatment?"

If we believe we deserve bad treatment, we begin to self-shame. The human physique can only handle so much self-abuse. We then turn our anger outward to the perceived cause of the pain--the Witchy Women. Allowing our thoughts to get to this level is when we let sin in.

But let's present God's view of us. He loves us, we are precious in His eyes, we were created in His image and adopted into His Kingdom family as sons and daughters! That's something to rejoice over. We must replace the lie of unworthiness that the enemy tells us with the truth of who we are in Jesus Christ. That's not to say we don't accept responsibility for our own wrongs, we must. If we don't we lose His protection. Proverbs 18:10 tells us that, "The name of the Lord is a strong tower; the righteous man runs into it and is safe."

The Bible offers us the tools to handle situations like Witchy Women. The fact that these women intended harm is an informative statement--not a judgment statement. We also must understand that these women are sinners just like us and have allowed the enemy to rule their thoughts and actions in this situation. We are not called to assess the state of someone's soul! That's way above our pay grade. The purpose of learning to be aware of and acknowledging intentional harm against us is to inform us, not to judge.

When we feel intimidated, threatened, or are being bullied in a professional or personal environment, remember this:

- The threat, insult, et. al. is to inform us of our next move according to God's word.
- Hateful words, lies, and insults must be replaced with who we are in God's Truth.
- Let who we are as God's child inform how we respond (we are never required to react to aggression.)
- Let the knowledge that we are ALL created in His image inform how you interact with the aggressive or passive-aggressive person.



Everyone has a good laugh and Bennia will say again, slowly so the digital friend can understand, "Alexa play Amazing Grace" and she does.

A word about the musical selections each Sunday. There is no church in the world, no matter how big their choir or their music budget, which can match the diversity of musical wonder and spiritual inspiration in every single Sunday Worship on the Lawn. Friends have enjoyed getting to know neighbors' favorites, some familiar, some new. In a single morning, the Lawn Worship Congregation might enjoy "A Mighty Fortress is Our God" by the Mormon Tabernacle Choir. "No Hard Feelings" by the Avett Brothers. "The Prayer" by Josh Graban and Celine Dion, "The Lord's Prayer" by Andrea Bocelli, "I'll Fly Away" by the Blind Boys of Alabama, "Be Still My Soul" by the King's College Cambridge Choir and "Oh Happy Day" from the movie Sister Act.

Someday, when things get back to "normal". The Sunday Lawn Worship congregation will most likely dissolve as people return to their individual churches and familiar routines. But there is no question, each person who has attended will remember this special, spiritual, and unexpected blessing that sprung up during the time of Covid-19. Thanks be to God. Thanks to Jim, Bennia, and Alexa.




