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#### What We Believe

Here are some of the essential elements of our faith at the Blue Ridge Christian News:

#### Cod

#### The Holy Spirit

The Holy Spirit is the very Spirit of God, fully divine, manifested in the life of every believer from the moment of salvation. He is equal with the Father and the Son as God. He is present in the world to make men aware of their need for Jesus Christ. He provides the Christian with power for living, understanding of spiritual truth, and guidance in doing what is right. The Christian seeks to live under His daily control.

#### The Bible

The Bible is the divinely inspired, authoritative, infallible, living and active Word of God to all men. It was written by human authors under the supernatural guidance of the Holy Spirit. 
#### **Eternity & Eternal Security**

Our soul, the essence of our being, was created by God to exist forever. That forever is spent in one of two places: eternally present and in union with God because of His forgiveness and salvation or eternally separated from God because of sin and unbelief. At the moment that our physical body dies, those who are saved are immediately taken to heaven. Those who have rejected God's gift of salvation will spend eternity separated from God in hell. Because God gives man eternal life through Jesus Christ, the believer is secure in that salvation for eternity. Salvation is maintained by the grace and power of God, not by the self-effort of the Christian. It is the grace and eternal power of God that gives this security. #### How Israel Rescued the Promised Land From Devastation and Neglect

"And I will turn back the captivity of My people Israel, and they shall build the cities which are desolate, and they shall live in them. And they shall plant vine-yards and drink their wine. They shall also make gardens and eat their fruit. And I will plant them on their land, and they shall no more be pulled up out of their land which I have given them, says Jehovah your God." Amos 9:14-15

"But you, O mountains of Israel, you shall put out your branches and yield your fruit to My people Israel; for they have drawn near to come. For, behold, I am for you, and I will turn to you, and you shall be tilled and sown. And I will multiply men on you, all the house of Israel, all of it. And the cities shall have people, and the wastes shall be built. And I will multiply men and beast on you, and they shall increase and be fruitful. And I will make you dwell as before, and I will do better to you than at your beginnings. And you shall know that I am Jehovah." Ezekiel 36:8-11

Last week I toured much of northern Israel, from the Jezreel Valley and the Lower and Upper Galilee regions to the Golan Heights. The natural beauty of this part of Israel, as well as the explosive proliferation of agriculture, was striking and inspiring.

The abundance of flora in Israel today makes it easy to forget that this land at the turn of the 20th century was a parched wasteland. It also raises the questions: How did this miraculous transformation take place, and who was responsible? On his visit to Palestine in 1867, Samuel Clemens (Mark Twain) called the Sea of Galilee "a solemn, sailless, tintless lake, as unpoetical as any bath-tub on earth." On the other hand, last week I found the Kinneret (its Hebrew name) a sparkling blue jewel surrounded on its north, south, and west by vegetable fields, orchards, and forests. Traveling by horseback through the Jezreel Valley, Clemens noted: "There is not a solitary village throughout its whole extent--not for 30 miles in either direction. There are two or three small clusters of Bedouin tents, but not a single permanent habitation. One may ride 10 miles, hereabouts, and not see 10 human beings."

Clemens continues, "Of all the lands there are for dismal scenery, I think Palestine must be the prince. ... Palestine sits in sackcloth and ashes. Over it broods the spell of a curse that has withered its fields and fettered its energies."

According to Allon Tal's 2002 book, Pollution in a Promised Land, the Jezreel Valley around 1900 remained an undeveloped swamp--described as "barren and boring, a miserable plain without a tree or river ... all in ruins." Tal relates how one traveler in 1905 described mud so deep that the mules fell and the donkeys almost vanished in it. It wasn't until 1924 that Zionist settlers finished the herculean two-year task of converting these marshes into the rich, fertile farmland of today. Later, in 1918, following the defeat of the Ottoman Empire in World War I, Herbert Samuel was named British High Commissioner of the Mandate for Palestine. In his 1921 "Annual Report on the Civil Administration," Samuel wrote: "It is obvious to every passing traveler, and well-known to every European resident, that the country was before the War, and is now, undeveloped and underpopulated. The methods of agriculture are, for the most part, primitive; the area of land now cultivated could yield a far greater product. There are also large cultivable areas that are left untilled.

The summits and slopes of the hills are admirably suited to the growth of trees, but there are no forests. Miles of sand dunes that could be redeemed are untouched, a danger, by their encroachment, to the neighboring village. The Jordan and the Yarmuk offer an abundance of water-power, but it is unused... "After the persecutions in Russia forty years ago [1880] ... Jewish agricultural colonies were founded. They developed the culture of oranges and gave importance to the Jaffa orange trade. They cultivated the vine and manufactured and exported wine. They drained swamps. They planted eucalyptus trees. They practiced, with

Palestine's devastation can be attributed to many factors, mostly centered on poverty. At the turn of the century, an estimated 70 percent of the area's Arab inhabitants were subsistence farmers. They took what they needed from the land-including unreplenished wood for fire--and allowed unrestrained sheep and goat grazing, as well as the hunting of native species, like the Syria bear and small deer, to extinction.

modern methods, all the processes of agriculture."

While early Zionists saw Palestine as " a land without people for a people without land," some 700,000 people were living in the area at that time, most of them Arab.

However, Jewish immigration--bearing great intention and aspirations--had begun. Within a few generations, it would transform this neglected, relatively barren territory into a lush cornucopia of food and forests with a majority Jewish population.

Fast-forward to the fruitful land I witnessed in northern Israel last week. What happened in the 100 years between 1920 and 2020?

Wisely, the Zionists focused on agriculture to support Israel's growing population of both Jews and Arabs. The new immigrants purchased largely semi-arid land, much of which had become untillable due to deforestation, soil erosion, and neglect. These pioneers cleared rocky fields, built terraces, drained swamps, planted trees, fought soil erosion, and desalinated salty land.

Today, Israel is a major exporter of fresh produce and a world leader in agricultural technologies, notwithstanding the reality that Israel's geography is not naturally hospitable to agriculture. More than half of Israel's land area is desert, and its climate and dearth of water resources discourage farming.

Imagine: Only 20 percent of Israel's land area is naturally arable. Yet Israel now produces some 95 percent of its own food requirements.

Much of this success, of course, is owed to Israel's phenomenal, groundbreaking inventions in agricultural and food technology--starting with drip irrigation continued on page 7

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#### A Pastor's View

"Find Me at The Feet Of Jesus" (Luke 10:38-42)

In the 1700s, Thomas Scott was a young man who felt a call to go into the ministry, but he didn't know much about it. He became acquainted with John Newton, the author of the hymn "Amazing Grace," who was pastoring a church at nearby Olney, England, at that time, and they began corresponding. Newton wrote to him: "The first lesson in the school of Christ is to become a little child, sitting simply

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at his feet, that we may be made wise unto salvation." (Newton, Letters, p. 248) Newton's words pierced Thomas Scott's heart, and he became an evangelical Christian, who walked 14 miles on Sundays to preach to patients in a London hospital. He served in the ministry the rest of his life and wrote a Bible commentary that was named after him. Undoubtedly that "first lesson" Newton gave him, made a strong impression, and guided him to his successful ministry: "simply sit at His feet." That is the key to an effective Christian life. And that is just what we see in Luke 10, in the passage about Mary & Martha:

"Now as they were traveling along, He entered a village; and a woman named Martha welcomed Him into her home. 39 She had a sister called Mary, who was seated at the Lord's feet, listening to His word. 40 But Martha was distracted with [a]all her preparations; and she came up to Him and said, 'Lord, do You not care that my sister has left me to do all the serving alone? Then tell her to help me.' 41 But the Lord answered and said to her, 'Martha, Martha, you are worried and bothered about so many things; 42 but only one thing is necessary, for Mary has chosen the good part, which shall not be taken away from her.'"

Jesus tells us here that THE single most important thing in life is what we see Mary doing here: verse 39 says she was "seated at the Lord's feet, listening to His word."

This is a position of humility.

This is a position of worship.

This is a position of learning.

In Acts 22:3, the Apostle Paul tells the Jews in his defense that he was "a Jew, brought up in this city, educated (literally) "AT THE FEET" of Gamaliel, the great Jewish teacher. So being "at the feet" is a place of humility, and especially learning from a teacher.

This passage tells us that Mary humbled herself to worship Jesus, and to learn from His word. This is the kind of person who gets God's attention.

In the last chapter of Isaiah (66:1-2), God says: "Heaven is My throne and the earth is My footstool. Where then is a house you could build for Me? And where is a place that I may rest? "For My hand made all these things, thus all these things

came into being," declares the Lord. "But to this one, I will look, to him who is humble and contrite of spirit, and who trembles at My word."

God says here, that He is a great King. Heaven is His throne. All the earth is merely His "footstool." Who will He look to here on earth? Who will have His attention? NOT the great athlete or warrior (God says in Psalm 147 that He "takes no pleasure in the legs of a man") but to the one who has a "humble and contrite spirit, and who trembles at (His) word." THAT is who gets His attention. God doesn't turn His face towards those whom we call "great": the Lebron James, or Bill Gates, and others whom men consider great. He says His face will be turned towards the one who humbles himself before Him, and trembles at His word. That gives hope to every one of us. You don't have to be some "great person" in the eyes of the world, to be great with God. You just have to love Him, humble yourself to worship Him daily, and seek Him in His word. That is what Mary did. That is what got Jesus' attention here — NOT all the "busy-ness" of Martha (that should be a good lesson for us today too! All of our "busy-ness" doesn't get the Lord's attention; instead it is humble worship and attention to His word that catches His eye!)

This should happen in our lives every day. If you want an outline for your devotional time at home, this is it, in summary: just humbly "sit at Jesus' feet" in worship, and "listen to His word":

1) Have a worship time in prayer; You might read a Psalm or a few verses of praise from the Psalms; sing a worship song or two to the Lord; and give Him thanks — and then pray for the requests that are on your heart — keep a prayer list to use. Spend some time with the attitude of being "at His feet" in worship.
2) And then secondly, spend some time paying attention to His word. Have a book of the Bible that you are reading through, and don't JUST "read" it, but really "sit at the feet of the Lord" and LISTEN to His word.

Did you notice the word "listening" here? One of the things that characterize Mary in this story is that she was REALLY LISTENING to Jesus' words. As we know, it is very possible to "hear" something on a surface level, but not really pay that much attention to it; it is possible to "read" it, but not truly internalize it. As we spend time in God's word we need to ask ourselves, are we really "listening" to it as Mary did? Are you giving it your attention, to apply it — to DO it?

To help you with that, before you start reading, make sure you have a notepad ready to write down what the Lord is showing you as you read. Then read until you find something that God is speaking to you about, and write that down and pray about it. I was telling someone the other day: that is my reading plan. I don't typically read "so many chapters a day" or anything like that: I read "until God speaks." Until I get something that speaks to my heart or life: a teaching to understand, a sin to confess, something to pray for, a verse to memorize, or whatever. But read UNTIL ... "until" God gives you something. And have your notepad, or iPad, or computer, or whatever you use, to write that thing down on, so you can remember it, go back and pray about it, and share it with others.

But these are the 2 basic things that need to happen in our daily time with the Lord EVERY DAY: 1) we need to sit at Jesus' feet and worship, and 2) we need to listen to His word. IF we will do those two things every day, then just like Mary, it will make a huge difference in our lives.

Not long ago I went to the grocery store to get a few things for the week, and as I was checking out, the cashier asked me with a very weary voice, "So, did YOU have a good day today?" I said, "You know, actually I did. I got a lot done. I had a pretty good day!" She said, "Do you mind telling me how you were able to have a good day — on a Monday no less?!" (I was like, why don't you just tee up an easy witnessing opportunity for me there!) I said, "Well, I started today by reading my Bible, and by spending some time with God in prayer. I begin every morning that way, and it really makes a lot of difference in my day." I would have loved to have talked to her some more, but of course, we were in the checkout line, and she had to send me on, but she did say, "You know that WOULD be the best way to start the day," and she thanked me for sharing. I've prayed for her, and for the other lady who was sacking groceries, and for the others who could hear us talk, that God would use that little conversation to draw them to Himself every day in His word and prayer. It really does make such a difference, when we begin the day with God, doing just what Mary did here: sitting at His feet in worship, and listening to His word.

There's a lot more to be said about a daily prayer and Bible reading time. But for now, these are two basic things that need to take place in your time with God every morning: "sit at the feet of Jesus" in worship, and "listen to His word." If you're doing those two things in some fashion, then you are doing the most important things you can do in a day. And they are a little foretaste of what we will be doing in the Lord's presence for eternity as well!

#### A Major Or A Minor Miracle?

First of all, ... we are not to major on miracles as, in comparison to the Greatness of our God Himself in all His wonder, power, and glory, all miracles are minor. It is sometimes easy to have our attention shifted from His person to His works. We can stay on guard against this happening ... and His Word shows forth Who He is and



how He first speaks to us and needs to be First, above miracles, in our lives. However, I did experience what I consider a Major miracle God granted me in

answer to an immediate need this morning. To someone else, it might be considered only minor. Miracles could possibly be judged by the depth of the need they are meeting. And to me, mine was major ... whereas to others who enjoy and have more computer abilities and experience with finances it would be a minor miracle.

I have 4 electric bills to pay each month. This month they were due on the 4th. My Social Security check arrives at my bank account on the 3rd of each month which it did today. And each month I use the information already entered into the Make a payment segment of the French Broad Electric Company to pay each bill separately. This has been a very easy and efficient way to pay.

But this morning it would not let me into my payment information page saying my Username and Password were incorrect. This has never happened in all the months I've used their computer site to pay my bills. All I knew to do was to try and change my Password and when I clicked on that request, I was asked to enter the answer to my Security questions I had entered when I set up the online payment account and I finally found these among all the information pages I keep posted on my bedroom wall. I hadn't needed this in so long it took me quite a while to locate it. Then I came back to my computer and entered these in the appropriate place. And the response when I clicked on that page was that my answers were invalid. And I was given no further options and I had no way to pay my bills which were due by tomorrow. The power bills were for my house, the two renter dwellings, and our security light. I was concerned that there wasn't time to mail in the payments by postal mail and have them received until several days late and in the past, I had found that paying by telephone was complicated enough for me to not be successful at that without great difficulty.

Ordinarily, when I need the Lord's help I pray in general, but this time I felt the urgency to pray in the faith which is more important, and which isn't easy for me to do. But I managed to make a specific faith prayer request. And then I decided to go back to the computer and see what options I had or what I could try next.

My first attempt earlier had indicated the Username was not Correct but my now my 2nd attempt indicated a problem with both the Username and the Password. Therefore, I entered the only User Name I had and this seemed to be all right this time so then I counted the dots hiding the Password and the number of dots was one less than the Password I had typed on my printed information on my bedroom wall. I tried the only thing I could think of and that was to erase the 8 hidden-digit Password and retype in the 9-digit Password that I had saved on my wall. And then when I clicked enter it went right to the Payment Site and I was immediately able to pay all of the electric bills as usual.

How did one digit of my hidden password become missing is the question? And which of the letters or the one number had become missing? But there is no way to know how or how that could have happened between the date I last paid all the electric bills and today as I hadn't even gone to the Website since I had used it before to pay all of the electric bills.

So, to me, this was a major Miracle. Because, If I had had to hire someone to drive me to the local County FBEMC, even if I could have located such a person or if my usual driver was available in time, I would have had to pay them about \$50 to come way out to this mountain I live on to drive me way over to the office about 20 some miles away and then, of course, drive me way back to my town and then drive way back to their town in the neighboring town plus all the time involved, would have been somewhat expensive and time-consuming.

I learned how important it is to pray a faith-filled prayer and not just a casual prayer. And it gave me some food for thought about exactly what can be considered a Major Miracle vs. a Minor Miracle.



side the still waters' (Ps. 23:4).




The Truth of the Gospel of Jesus Christ is that God is in pursuit of EVERY person, every day. Few people fully grasp this incredible message...



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

An Encouraging Word: A Shelter from Discouragement By Dr. Jack R. Hodges, Jr. Burke County

A new year has dawned. 2021 is here! When 2020 rolled around last year, none of us could have predicted the bizarre future that we would face in this past year. Indeed, viruses and sicknesses have been around since the dawn of



There aren't many words of encouragement being offered nowadays! Instead, all that we hear are discouraging words. Doom and gloom abound. The airwaves are filled with hatred and animosity and just like Isaiah predicted (Isaiah 3:5), "People will oppress each other—man against man, neighbor against neighbor. The young will rise up against the old, and the contemptible person will assault the honored one." The prophet Micah prophesied (Micah 7:6), "For son treats father contemptuously, Daughter rises up against her mother, Daughter-in-law against her mother-in-law; A person's enemies are the people of his own household." Then Micah makes a powerful statement of faith and encouragement (v. 7), "But as for me, I will watch expectantly for the Lord."

Where will any encouragement come from? Who will offer an encouraging word? It might or might not come from a friend or family! It certainly won't be offered by our enemies or adversaries! Try as they may, the leaders of this country have failed to offer much hope for peace and/or security. Efforts to unify the divided groups, which are about as far apart ideologically as this country has ever seen, have failed to dispel fear—and have failed to offer us any real hope beyond mere survival. The future looks bleak and there aren't any real answers beyond the political jargon and empty promises. If I sound like a doomsday prophet, I don't mean to be—but let's face it, this world is an evil and cruel place. And we all know that prophetic scripture warns us that it is not getting any better—despite our best efforts to share the gospel of Christ Jesus, who alone offers hope and promise of a bright future.

Frowning faces, drooping shoulders, pleading eyes, argumentative spirits, anger, sadness, fear, and hatred abound. Everyone is longing for some hope. All are looking for some assurance and some encouragement. All are searching for some relief and yearning for answers. All are looking for someone to listen and hear



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them as they cry out. There seems to be very little compassion and very little care. Do you hear the cries for help? Do you see the wounds and feel the dark, heavy clouds? Would you agree with me that very little care, concern, and compassion is to be found? And why is that? Perhaps part of the answer to that question is that everyone finds themselves in the same boat. Surrounded by the helplessness and hopelessness that is seen today, people, neighborhoods, towns, and cities are in desperate need of something. The world needs an encouraging word!

From where will encouragement come? It will only come from the Lord and from His Word of assurance and hope! Who will speak a word of encouragement? The Lord God, our Redeemer, Savior, and friend will speak to His children with uplifting words. He will answer your questions! He will respond to your needs! He will pour out His grace and mercy upon you and He will lift up your hearts and your souls—for you are precious to Him. You are His child and you belong to Him now and forevermore!

You don't have to look very far to see the heavy and overwhelming burden of discouragement that we all are carrying. As the citizens of this world emerge from a time of trauma, fear, and helplessness, they are heavy laden and full of discouragement. The reasons for such discouragement are countless. They are not new—for humankind has been facing the devastating results of sin and rebellion since the Garden of Eden.

As you and I face discouragement, what do we really need? The Word of God tells us what we need—we need a shelter or a place of refuge.

The Psalmist wrote (61:1-4), "Hear my cry, O God; Give heed to my prayer. From the end of the earth I call to You when my heart is faint; Lead me to the rock that is higher than I. For You have been a refuge for me, A tower of strength against the enemy. Let me dwell in Your tent forever; Let me take refuge in the shelter of Your wings. Selah."

The story is told of a time when the devil once advertised his tools for sale at a public auction. When the prospective buyers assembled, there was one oddly shaped tool which was labeled "Not for sale." Asked to explain why this was, the devil answered, "I can spare my other tools, but I cannot spare this one. It is the most useful implement that I have. It is called Discouragement, and with it, I can work my way into hearts otherwise inaccessible. When I get this tool into a man's heart, the way is open to plant anything there I may desire." The legend embodies sober truth. Discouragement is a dangerous state of mind because it leaves one open to the assault of the enemies of the soul.

Is there an encouraging word for us today as we begin to live for Christ in 2021? You bet there is! It starts with Jesus! It continues each day with Jesus! And it ends in glory with Jesus! As Rick Warren once said, "The starting point in your healing is to get to know your Healer. You need to say, 'Jesus Christ, I don't know how You did this, but You took the guilt for every sin in the world—the ones have done to me and the ones done by me. You took that abuse on Yourself. I want to learn to love You, and I want You to come in and heal my heart and my mind and my body."

Jesus, as Lord and Savior becomes your shelter and your refuge from all that seeks to break you down, tear you asunder, push you into the dirt, and trample all over you. The Lord is the lifter of your soul. He is the bright and morning star. He is the Alpha and the Omega. He is the first and the last, the beginning and the end—and all that we hope and trust begins and ends with Him!

You have a shelter in Christ. The Psalmist would proclaim (91:2-7), "My refuge and my fortress. My God, in whom I trust. "For it is He who delivers you from the snare of the trapper And from the deadly pestilence. He will cover you with His pinions, And under His wings you may seek refuge; His faithfulness is a shield and bulwark. You will not be afraid of the terror by night, Or of the arrow that flies by day; Of the pestilence that stalks in darkness, Or of the destruction that lays waste at noon. A thousand may fall at your side And ten thousand at your right hand, But it shall not approach you." And in verse 10 he spoke with assurance, "No evil will befall you, Nor will any plague come near your tent."

Time and time again the Psalmist spoke words of encouragement over and against discouragement and fear. "For You have been a refuge for me, A tower of strength against the enemy. Let me dwell in Your tent forever; Let me take refuge in the shelter of Your wings. Selah." (Psalms 61:3-4) "For in the day of trouble He will conceal me in His tabernacle; In the secret place of His tent He will hide me; He will lift me upon a rock." (Psalms 27:5)

And in Psalms 27:4 he prayed and asked, "One thing I have asked from the LORD, that I shall seek: That I may dwell in the house of the LORD all the days of my life, To behold the beauty of the LORD And to meditate in His temple." Are you overwhelmed with discouragement? Are you paralyzed with fear? What do you need? Encouragement! Who do you need? The Lord! You need the One who is your only shelter from the storm of life. You need the Savior who has willingly laid down His life for yours; who shed His blood for you and gave His life so that you could find shelter in Him. He offers you peace amid war and strife. He gives you hope in the face of helplessness and hopelessness. He hands you assurance when your heart is weak and your mind is overwhelmed. He draws you close to Himself, covers you in the shelter of His wings, and leads you to the path of righteousness for His name's sake.

We have heard and have been instructed over the previous year to "shelter in place." That's a term that has become for many of us, a discouraging threat to our freedom and an inhibitor of our self-pursuit of happiness and prosperity. But today, I want you to hear the blessed words of your Savior. He says "I am your refuge and strength. Come shelter in my place." He invites you, "Come unto me, all you who are weary and heavy-laden—and I will give you rest." Glory and hallelujah!

#### He Holds All Things Together

"The Son is the gleaming brightness of God's glory. He is the exact likeness of God's being. He uses His powerful word to hold all things together." Hebrews 1:3 That is an amazing statement. It is put in the present tense, saying that He is the One who is keeping things going right now.

Stanford University is the site of a linear accelerator, a


mighty two-mile-long atom smasher. It is a great lever with which scientists try to pry the lid off the secrets of matter and discover what is in the miniature world of the atom, the neutron, and the proton. Linear Accelerator scientists have discovered a complexity they never dreamed of, and they have found particles that they cannot even invent enough names for. But one thing they are consistently discovering is that there is some strange force that holds everything together. They do not know what to call it, and they do not know how to identify it. They talk about a kind of cosmic glue that holds things together. Isn't it fascinating that here in the Word of God you have that exact kind of terminology used of Jesus! If you want a name for the force that holds the universe together it is very simple: His name is Jesus. He sustains the universe by His powerful word.

That is not only true of the physical universe, including our bodies and all that we are, but it is true of all the other forces and powers in the universe — physical, psychological, social, spiritual, whatever; He is in charge of them all. After the resurrection, when our Lord appeared to the disciples by the Sea of Galilee, in the most forthright terms, simple, artlessly, He said to them, "All power is given unto me in heaven and in earth." Matthew 28:18 This means He not only controls all the physical forces of the planet and the universe, but He controls all the events that occur upon them. This is something Christians tend to forget. We get so used to seeing things through the secular eyes of the media, and other information forces around us, that we forget that behind the events that fill the pages of our newspapers is a mighty controlling hand that brings them all together, permitting some things to happen, restraining other things.

I know that these events that capture our attention today are likewise going to seem faded and trivial soon. Yet they are not without meaning. The Bible tells us a mighty hand is shaping the destiny of nations and of individuals. All of these things have been and will always remain in the power of Him who sustains the universe by the word of His power. Lord Jesus, thank you that you are the One who holds all things together. Teach me to trust in you, even when things seem to be falling apart. Do we have a world view in which the Lord Jesus Christ is the centrifugal force? Is this merely intellectual -- or does the power of His Presence translate into confident trust in the everyday events of our lives?

The events of 2020 have placed a lot of hardships upon most all folks. The emotional, mental, physical, and financial consequences will most likely be felt for a long time. A lot of folks are right now in some of the direst circumstances they have faced in their lives. For sure this past year will be talked



about in history lessons (if it is allowed) for years to come if God allows time to stand. Do you know how our grandparents used to tell us of things they went through? Well, if we live long enough, we'll be telling our grandchildren about 2020!

We have endured a pandemic, clowns in politics, the bias in news media, one of the most ungodly attacks on a sitting president on either side of the political aisle, nonsensical mandates handed down by people who have no idea of the struggles of everyday working people, division on a scale not seen in decades, riots from special interest groups who just want to cause chaos, etc, etc. In the middle of all this, the politicians, and media, who for the most part aren't affected that much by the decisions that they are insisting everyone but themselves abide by, are overlooking the effects this mess is having on the regular citizen.

They insisted that businesses close down or operate at a reduced capacity without any regard for how the owners or employees will provide for their families. What little help was given ended because of the division across the political landscape. While they were arguing about trying to secure funding for things that had nothing to do with helping people, American citizens were the ones scrambling to pay the bills while the rich politicians did not have to worry about anything but reelection.....just saying.

Not only has there been the economic toll, but there has been a human toll that goes beyond what the numbers the media throws at us every single day. Now before you start getting all ruffed up at me thinking I don't care about anybody, let me share a few things. I personally know folks that died or had loved ones that have died because of the effects left behind by COVID. My mom has been in the hospital for over 4 weeks recovering from it. Several members of my extended family have had it and some are now sick while I'm sitting here writing this article. Matter of fact, I've had it myself. Not for a minute am I downplaying the seriousness of this illness. Daily I pray for those who are sick and for the protection of others. Masks, social distancing, drive-in services, online services, etc., are things we have done in my family and church family to help. And you know what, folks still got sick....just saying. If you're not too mad at me to keep reading, let me share something personal that has taken place in my own family. A story and many others like it that the media and politicians are ignoring on purpose.

For many years, my mom's health has been in decline. The last 2 years have been especially tough. She was in and out of the hospital many times. During this time, my dad very seldom left her side. Keep in mind that he is almost 83 years old. He has sat at her bedside often day and night. Several times I pleaded with him to let me take him home and rest, but he would refuse. On the few occasions he did, early the next morning he was back at her side. To be honest, a few times when she was in for rehab, Dad would take her home before she was ready. This only made things worse in the long run, but all they could think about in their minds was being home together. Eventually, Mom's health declined to the point where she could no longer stand or walk. As it was no longer safe for either one of them for her to be home, she made the hard but reluctant decision to enter a local long term care facility. She didn't want to go, Dad didn't want her to go, we didn't want her to go, but her declining health condition forced a necessary decision. Dad went to see her every day. Some days staying all day till just before dark. Each evening he left, there would be tears as Mom would want him to stay. When he would get home, he called my phone saying he wanted to bring Mom home. Many times the conversation got heated between me and Dad because he thinks she can come home but her health just will not allow it. He still tells me almost every time we talk, he wants Mom home.

Now fast forward to last March. As the news of the virus came to the forefront, suddenly, my parents who have been married for over 61 years were told they cannot see each other. Dad would sometimes go to the door three times a day to see Mom only to be told he can't. He would come home and call me to tell me they wouldn't let him see her. This was a daily occurrence for months. They were only allowed phone calls, a few visits through windows, and a few outside visits with no contact. In no way am I accusing nor blaming the wonderful caregivers at our local facility, they are only doing what has been handed down to them. To Dad and Mom, however, all they could understand was that they were being kept apart. Dad was already struggling with memory issues. When he wasn't allowed to visit Mom, these issues accelerated tremendously. Since March, I have slowly watched the life and joy fade from my Dad's eyes. A man who was full of jokes, life, and busyness is dying from depression and loneliness. My Dad will most likely die because of COVID, but not in the way many would think.

We can do better. Somewhere in the middle of all this our society, especially those making blanket decisions, needs to have compassion and considerations for situations like this. The sad thing is that tens of thousands of people are suffering the same way. I've talked to many workers who share the suffering that is going on in these facilities not because of the virus, but because of loneliness. Several times both my parents have said they have nothing to live for now.

Certainly, I'm not claiming to know exactly what to do, but somewhere, somehow, someone needs to see that it is better for folks like my parents to at least be able to see each other. Many don't have but a few years left and for our society and government to force them to live it out in loneliness and misery is unethical

and immoral. Financial and health complications leave many with no other option but to have loved ones in long term healthcare facilities.

Jesus will never leave us nor forsake us; we can count on that. These have been difficult days and according to scripture will continue in that direction. I'm certainly not losing hope for my hope is in Him. My grandmother, Mammie, would pray for death or Jesus to come. As a young man with my whole life before me, I just couldn't understand why anyone would pray for that. As I've watched my parents and all the events transpire over the last year, now I understand. Keep looking up children of God, Jesus is coming soon. Even so, quickly come Lord Jesus.

"He which testifieth these things saith, Surely I come quickly. Amen. Even so, come, Lord Jesus." Revelation 22:20

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

Isaiah was already a prophet in Israel when King Uzziah died, after reigning for 52 years. He was a king 'who did right in the eyes of the Lord'. (2 Chronicles 26) The temptation must have been strong to place the hopes and dreams of a nation upon King Uzziah rather than God. Satan deceives many into believing that the problems in our land are political and cannot be resolved otherwise. Isaiah must have struggled with the same thoughts until God realigned his focus. Isaiah 6:1-5 are his own testimony: "In the year of King Uzziah's death, I saw the Lord sitting on a throne, lofty and exalted, with the train of His robe filling the Temple. Seraphim stood above Him, each having six wings: with two he covered his face, and with two he covered his feet, and with two he flew. And one called out to another and said, 'Holy, Holy, Holy is the Lord of hosts, the whole earth is full of His glory'. And the foundations of the thresholds trembled at the voice of Him who called out, while the temple was filling with smoke. Then I said, 'Woe is me, for I am ruined! Because I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips; For my eyes have seen the King, the Lord of hosts'". Isaiah received a revelation that God was on the throne and that He had all power in heaven and in the earth. His reign was eternal and no one can thwart His purposes. Instead of focusing on the political scene, the dangers of a mysterious and deadly virus, and a volatile economy, the writer of Hebrews commands us to fix our eyes on Jesus, the author, and perfecter of our faith. (Hebrews 12) After all, "our citizenship is in heaven from which we eagerly wait for a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ; who will transform the body of our humble state into conformity with the body of His glory..." Settling the question of Who is on the throne of our lives will restore our worship.

The angels surrounding the throne of God are in a constant state of worship. Isaiah witnessed their unending praises for the One who holds all things together by the power of His Word. As John was given the Revelation of Jesus Christ on the isle of Patmos, more snapshots of heavenly worship are released. Revelation 4:8-11 says, "And the four living creatures, each one of them having six wings, are full of eyes around and within; and day and night they do not cease to say, 'Holy, holy, holy is the Lord God, the Almighty, Who was and Who is and Who is to come'. And when the living creatures give glory and honor and thanks to Him Who sits on the throne, to Him Who lives forever and ever, the twenty-four elders fall down before Him Who sits on the throne, and will worship Him Who lives forever and ever, and will cast their crowns before the throne, saying, 'Worthy are You, our Lord and our God, to receive glory and honor and power; for You created all things, and because of Your will they existed, and were created'".

Never-ending worship is our eternal destiny and as we bring the sacrifice of praise before the throne of grace while here on planet earth our troubles will diminish in a crescendo of thanksgiving. God always inhabits the praises of His people and His Presence extinguishes the schemes of Satan, our adversary. As we realign our focus and restore our worship the Lord will set before us an open door that we might resume our mission. That mission, if we choose to accept it, is the proclamation of the gospel of Jesus Christ. #### Facts First!

The world's most famous detective never existed. Or did he?

Sherlock Holmes is a fictional character, but his astounding deductive reasoning is rooted in reality. It existed in the mind of Sherlock's creator, Sir Arthur Conan Doyle. Remembered as an author, Doyle also practiced medicine. During med school, he clerked for one of his professors, Dr. Joseph Bell. Bell's keen powers of observation and frequent collaboration with the Edinburgh police were inspirations for Holmes. Bell's abilities also nurtured Doyle's talent for deduction.

Once while walking with a friend, Doyle and his companion noticed a fresh set of bicycle tracks. The other man speculated that the tracks may have been made by a person known to both parties. Doyle casually observed that such could not be the case because the man mentioned used a different brand of tires. Sherlock Holmes is the brainchild of his creator

As Holmes, Doyle often commented on the scarcity of logic. In A Scandal in Bohemia, he said: "Never theorize before you have data. Invariably you end up twisting facts to suit theories instead of theories to suit facts." I call such defective thinking "reverse twist" logic.

Reverse twist is the foundation of a number of common attitudes: Why do I have to study history? I don't live in the past. Why do I have to study algebra? I'm not going to be a math teacher. Why do I have to know to whom the book of Galatians was written or what was going on back then? I just want to know what it means today. Why do I have to read the stupid Old Testament? It's gross and boring, and Jesus did away with all that. Why do I have to know anything about doctrine? That's so old fashioned. My preacher tells me what I'm supposed to believe.

Reverse twist ignores the certainty that knowing the past prepares one to better understand and negotiate the future. It obscures the fact that the most valuable benefit of studying mathematics is learning logical thought. No passage of scripture can be understood without the context that led to its creation. The first two-thirds of the Bible is the context for the part most refer to as "New Testament." Reverse twist logic lulls one into forgetting that no preacher or teacher or spiritual guide or "mommy" will be with us when we stand before God Almighty and give an account of how we responded to His claim on our lives.

The tendency to twist facts to suit theories is rampant in the church. I recently watched a video where a Christian radio-show host referred to Matthew 5:17-19. Jesus said that He did not come to abolish the Law or the Prophets. The radio host commented, "That doesn't mean that the Law would never be abolished because it was when He fulfilled it." The only way this man could have made such a "wretched" statement is that his theory told him a proclamation by the Son of God had to be "twisted" in order to fit his convictions rather than his convictions changed to reflect the Word of God.

One of the most damaging "twists" among believers is the widespread belief that the "church" somehow replaced the "Nation of Israel" in God's plan. Amos 3:7 states: "For the Lord, YHVH will do nothing, unless He has revealed His counsel to His servants the prophets." No prophecy claims that Unchanging God will break His promises to love and redeem Israel or replace His chosen people with some other group. The emphatic opposite of that message is found throughout scripture. Zechariah 2:8 says that Israel is the apple of God's eye. Deuteronomy 31:6 says that God will never leave or forsake Israel. Isaiah 11:12 says that God: "will assemble the banished of Israel, and gather the dispersed of Judah from the four corners of the earth." Jeremiah 31:35-37 says that God will only abandon Israel "If the heavens above can be measured, and the foundations of the earth below can be explored." The same promises are found in Ezekiel 37:27, Ezekiel chapters 38 and 39, Zechariah chapters 12-14, and Romans 11:23-27. The woman in Revelation 12 who gives birth to Messiah is Israel. She is protected and nurtured during the apocalypse.

Influential theologians proclaim that the "church" is now "spiritual Israel." This is a grotesque reverse twist of fundamental doctrine: God will never abandon Israel. With the facts of Bible teaching and prophecy properly considered, it is impossible to conclude that Unchanging God has lied and reversed course. Jesus made no such claim. He stated in Matthew 15:24 that He "was sent only to the lost sheep of the House of Israel."

One of the facts replacement theologians ignore or twist is that every time the New Testament uses the word "Israel", it is referring to the blood descendants of Jacob. How could anyone conclude that the Son of God would endure the indignities and implications of the incarnation just to abandon four thousand years of God's relationship with mankind? Jesus did not come to start a new religion. He came to fulfill the many, divine promises made to God's people: Israel.

The actual Good News is that, by grace and through faith in Messiah, we are allowed to be grafted into His chosen people. Ephesians 2:12-13 proclaims joyfully: "Remember that you were at that time separated from Christ, alienated from the commonwealth of Israel and strangers to the covenants of promise, having no hope and without God in the world. But now in Christ Jesus, you who once were far off have been brought near by the blood of Christ." Hallelujah!

**Starting Deep Meaningful Conversations in 2021**By Rev. John B. Sorensen

After a year of quarantines and isolation, I think many of us long to connect with others in a deep and meaningful way. But doing this during COVID-19 has been difficult. I'm thankful for the technology we have to continue to keep in touch with others while social distancing. So how do we go deeper and really connect with others on a personal, emotional, and spiritual level when social restrictions are still in place?



Regardless of what policies are in place in your community, we can have those meaningful conversations at a distance or even over technology. We simply need to be intentional in starting them.

Look for opportunities to connect with others. Many of the people we know or interact with within the community are seeking something meaningful. Pray that God will lead you to someone around you who is ready to engage in conversation.

Listen with both your ears and your heart. Connecting with others is all about building relationships. Begin the conversation casually by talking about work, their family, or their favorite hobbies that they have missed during the pandemic. Build an easy-going rapport, but listen carefully for areas where someone might be struggling. Many people will open up when they feel that someone cares about what they are saying.

Ask questions that lead to a deeper spiritual conversation. While getting to know someone is wonderful, sharing the best news we have – that we can have hope in Jesus Christ – is even better. However, this shouldn't be forced. Ask questions to see where they are in their spiritual walk. While some may be closed to talking about spiritual matters, others will be open.


Here are a few questions you can ask to move from casual conversation to a deeper, more meaningful, spiritual conversation.

- Do you have a spiritual background? Or do you ever think about spiritual things?
- Do you think you have ever seen evidence of God in your life? Or have you ever seen God answer prayer?
- On a scale of 1 to 10, how fulfilling would you say your life is? If God were more a part of your life, would it move one way or the other?

Share your story. Your personal experience about what God has done in your life is powerful. It allows your friend to get to know you better, and it is a testimony of God's love and grace for all of us. Your story could be exactly what the person needs to take that next step towards Jesus.

Connecting with others doesn't have to be restricted to face-to-face conversations. If we pay attention and take the initiative, we can engage in meaningful conversations with others over the phone, on video chat, or standing six feet apart. Take that step and go deeper in 2021.



Question: Dr. Dobson, I have seven grandchildren that I think are just wonderful, but I don't know how to talk to them when we are together. It has been a long time since I was young. How can I engage these kids in conversation and draw them to me? What should I talk to them about?

Answer: Children love to talk about fun things and funny things. They love to play games and solve puzzles and look at pictures. When you interject yourself into their world at



Now, concerning what you should talk about with your grandchildren: One of the most important contributions you can make is to teach them about your family's early history, about the obstacles your family overcame, and what has made their stories unique. Education consultant and author Cheri Fuller applied the lyrics of an old African song to this responsibility. It included this line: "When an old person dies, it's as if a library burns down." You are the "library" for your grandchildren, being able to connect them with their past. It is your obligation and privilege, I believe, to give them a sense of identity within the family.

My great-grandmother helped raise me during my early years. When I was just three or four years old, I remember her telling me stories about her life on the frontier. She told me how she would sit in her log cabin at night and hear the mountain lions come down from the hillside looking for the pigs. She would describe fascinating experiences that helped me understand how different life was then. The time we spent together bonded us to one another. The stories she told me then are still vivid in my memory. They helped open my mind to a love of history, a subject that still fascinates me to this day.

I suggest you gather your grandkids around and start telling them stories about your past—of your courtship with their grandmother, what she looked like, and why you fell in love with her. Then tell them how you came to a relationship with Jesus Christ and what that did for you. I think you'll find your little ones will be eating out of your hand.

Will Graham Encourages Law Enforcement at Appreciation Dinner

Will Graham addressed officers and their spouses at the first Law Enforcement Appreciation Dinner on December 14 at the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association (BGEA) headquarters in Charlotte, North Carolina.

"First and foremost, if there's something I want you to know, it's that the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association loves you. ... We appreciate what you do. You make our community safe, [and] you look out for us."

Mentioning his father wished he could be there, Will Graham explained how Franklin Graham had been the driving force for this initiative after seeing the heavy toll placed on officers the past year.

Altogether, the Billy Graham Rapid Response Team hosted three Law Enforcement Appreciation Dinners in December. In 2021, the ministry plans to expand these events and others to cities that have faced civil unrest.

As officers entered BGEA headquarters, located just behind the Billy Graham Library, they caught a glimpse of Christmas at the Library, an annual Library event each December. They watched as horse-drawn carriages traveled down lit walkways and past brightly decorated trees.

Officers greeted one another before enjoying worship by musician Dennis Agajanian and the Tommy Coomes Band in the BGEA Dining Hall. They enjoyed prime rib and salmon before selecting red velvet cake or peppermint cheesecake for dessert.

"From the beginning [of the night], it gave me chills," said Amanda Walters, a Charlotte-Mecklenburg police officer. She sat with her husband Andrew, a Huntersville (N.C.) police officer. Officers from her CMPD motorcycle unit filled three tables toward the back of the room.

"We just like to sit down and relax for once, and not be on duty while eating together," continued Amanda, who said she used the special occasion to wear a dress for the second time this year. "Usually law enforcement is not mixed with religious events. I think it actually can plant a seed [of faith] in tight groups like the motorcycle unit. It opens the conversation. All we talk about is the rough things we see, and we kind of have a stiff sense of humor, [so] it's just good to break our shield in a different way."

The evening mood shifted from light-hearted talk and laughter to seriousness as Will Graham thanked the officers and shared the Gospel message.

"I feel like people need this really bad, people are thirsty for something positive," Amanda said. She and her husband know firsthand the difficulties of serving in law enforcement, especially within two different departments.

"I feel like there's more light shone on the negative side of law enforcement, like when there's a bad cop that does something," added Andrew, still dressed in uniform from his afternoon shift. "That gets more attention and press than the good stuff. It's nice to be appreciated and attend an event where you feel welcomed and loved."

Graham compared the role Pilate held to law enforcement today, sharing how they both are required to make decisions in real-time.

"This man was hated. He represented the law of Rome and had to enforce it," Graham said.

One decision Pilate had put before him was the fate of Jesus. The Roman leader recognized Jesus was innocent but didn't have the courage to take action and help Him. Instead, he washed his hands of the decision and turned Jesus over to the mob. Jesus ultimately was sent to die on the cross.

"Some of you here today lack the courage to take a stand for Jesus," Graham said. "You have to make decisions on how to get home at night to see your spouse [and] children. You prepare yourself—put on a vest, gun, uniform."

"You get everything ready but you're not guaranteed to come home. Have you prepared for life after death?" Graham solemnly questioned.

"Without Jesus, you'll never spend eternity in heaven," Graham said. "You say, 'Will, I thought you were here to cheer us up.' No, I'm here to tell you the truth. ... [If] you do all of this preparation in your physical job but haven't prepared for life after death, you're gambling with eternity."

The moment hit home for the Walterses.

Amanda's motorcycle unit has been the escort for fallen Mount Holly police officer Tyler Herndon, who was fatally shot in the line of duty Friday, December 11. The Billy Graham Rapid Response Team, which deploys at a moment's notice in natural or manmade disasters, offered a ministry of presence to the devastated suburb of Charlotte and its police department.

"A lot of times the only time you do feel appreciation is when an officer is killed—when people come out and show their support," Andrew explained. He's hoping events like Monday's dinner will be an encouragement to more officers in the future—for multiple reasons.

"It's people's life after this life that's hanging in the balance," Andrew said. "People in our line of work have a higher chance of that coming to an end sooner. You want to make sure your heart is in the right place so if something tragic does happen, you'll spend eternity where you want to be."

Did you know they are usually the first bird you will see at your bird feeder in the morning and they are the last to visit it in the evening?

#### Homeless man now feeds hundreds a day: Finding our empowering purpose through service

Anthony Delgado lived on the streets of Atlanta, Georgia, panhandling to feed his drug addiction. One day, a man and woman told him he should go to the VA hospital. No one around him saw the couple, however. He started panhandling again but developed chest pain. A man stopped to help and gave him a token for a train

ride to the hospital. When Delgado stepped onto the train, the man had vanished.

Delgado made it to the hospital, joined a rehab program, and got help from a pastor. He told the minister the story of the vanishing couple and the man who gave him the train token, and the pastor replied, "Believe it or not, there are angels."

Delgado got a job and then, after a church service about obedience, took bags of bread to the spot where he used to sleep on the streets. Within forty-five minutes, all the bread and pastries were gone. "As I was driving back, I started crying," he said. "Thank you, Father God, I found my purpose in life."

Now Delgado has seven employees, two buildings, seventeen freezers, and two trucks in the organization he founded, I Care Atlanta, Inc. His nonprofit feeds hundreds of people a day and also has a GED training center and financial planning center. During the holidays, they've been distributing new toys to kids and holding food drives.

Delgado told a reporter, "We all need to help each other. We're in a bad state right now. . . . Open your heart. Help your neighbor. Don't be selfish. This me, me, me attitude is not gonna get us anywhere. It's just not."

#### Grandmother shoots buck from the kitchen window: The courage to respond biblically to "the worst event this country will face"

"My kitchen is my deer stand. We take the screen off one of the windows every fall. I can see a pretty good ways from there." So says Virginia Luce, an eighty-year-old grandmother in East Texas who recently shot an eleven-point buck from her kitchen

The four-time cancer survivor retired just two months ago from a twenty-five-year career as a registered nurse. She was making lunch around noon on November 8 when she spotted the buck 175 yards away. After confirming its identity with her binoculars, she shot and killed him with her rifle. Her eighty-three-year-old husband then drove the tractor out and brought it back to the house.

"When I saw all those horns, I thought I was seeing things," Virginia said. "I got so excited about that deer that I can't even remember what I was fixing for lunch."



#### Being a Nurse in the Time of COVID-19

In this time of disruption and uncertainty, the pandemic brings poignant reminders of what we can celebrate. And nothing is more worth lifting than the care and dedication of the nurses among us who are working to save lives and ease the suffering.

That's the theme of "An Infusion of Gratitude for Nurses," a four-part series of radio portraits produced by SEARCH in partnership with WKYK/WTOE. The series is part of "M-Y Health Matters," a weekly look at health care in the mountains, and it's available in the "Close Up" section of www.ourlocalcommunityonline.com.

The four nurses who share their experiences with host Bruce Ikard work and live in both Yancey and Mitchell counties. Between them, they have decades of experience, but they say that nothing in their careers challenged them or upended their lives like the pandemic. Still, to a person, they say they find ways to love their jobs.

"In every single, possible way we could be affected, we have been affected," says Amber Grindstaff, a nurse in the Bakersville and Spruce Pine offices of Mountain Community Health Partnership.

"We've had nothing but changes," echoes Carrie James, a nurse in the Emergency Department of Blue Ridge Regional Hospital.

One obvious change is having to wear protective gear: gowns, masks, gloves, face shields. It's uncomfortable, but what really bothers them, the nurses say, is how the gear gets between them and their patients, making them into strange, almost scary figures.

Instead of a human being with a smile, James says, patients "sort of see this big, robot-like person coming at them." In that way, "the PPE makes it feel like a barrier between us and patients."

And that's just one example of the way the virus isolates patients from their families, friends, and medical caregivers, the nurses told Ikard.

As a clinic supervisor for the Toe River Health District, part of Christy Duncan's job is to call people who test positive and walk them through what they need to do to quarantine themselves and keep others from getting sick.

It's a call very few people are prepared for, she says. "They are scared to death"

Fortunately, most recover. In the most extreme cases, however, the forced isolation magnifies the physical ravages of the disease, forcing patients to fight for their lives without friends and family at their side.

Shannon Tipton, a nurse educator for Hospice and Home Care of the Blue Ridge, sees how that compounds the pain of facing life's end. "People are dying alone, and it takes a toll on everyone."

In the spring, Mitchell and Yancey's counties were largely spared the virus' ravages. But the recent surge has hit full force. At the health department, nurses work seven days a week to deliver the results of COVID tests and counsel those who test positive.

For Duncan, the flood of questions about how to cope with the pandemic is never-ending. "Pretty much my whole day is spent on COVID," she said, al-


though the health department continues to provide other clinical services. She fields calls from businesses, schools, churches, and individuals ask-

ing about safety protocols and quarantine procedures. "Anywhere I go out in public, questions and people are calling and texting pretty much continuously," she says. Even at the end of the day, the disease follows them home. James and Grindstaff both speak of feeling the need to shower and change clothes before interacting with their children. "It's weird," Grindstaff says.

On the other hand, she says, one thing that inspires her to keep going is the example she can set for her two daughters. "Just because things are tough, that doesn't mean you give up," she says. "You just have to work that much harder to figure things out."

At Blue Ridge, James says, the bond nurses feel with their patients reinforces the will to keep fighting. "Our patients are our families, our neighbors, friends, people we

might see every day or at the grocery store or church," she says. "We just love working for our community."

For Duncan, inspiration comes from knowing she can make a difference in the life of someone who's just been told they have COVID. "To know you can be that reassuring, calming voice ... can give them that comfort," is her greatest satisfaction, she says.

For the hospice staff, drawing on God's strength and comfort gives them the strength to comfort others, Tipton says. "We do have a strong faith base that we rely on a lot. We pray a lot."

For each nurse, Ikard had one last question: What can the public do to help support them?

Tipton and James had a single message: Follow the health guidelines put out by national and local health officials.

"Wear masks and stay six feet apart and wash your hands," James stressed. "Those things really do work."

Duncan and Grindstaff pleaded for patience, the recognition that doctors, nurses, and other caregivers are struggling with more work and, in many cases, less staff. Rather than be annoyed by delays or uncertainties, Grindstaff said, people can choose "to give us the grace to know that we're just trying to figure things out and doing the best we can."

Lastly, she said, a few simple words of appreciation can make all the difference. "'We're thinking about you. Thank you guys so much for what you're doing.' That means so much to us."

Sometimes siblings must be placed separately when coming into foster care, due to a lack of foster homes able to care for sibling groups.

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

#### Playing the lottery robs you of your future

Dear Dave,

I've been struggling financially for the past few months, so I've been playing the lottery once a week. To me, the chance to win millions is worth a few dollars a month, even if things are tight. Paula

Dear Paula,

You've told me you're having money troubles, and at the same time, you're throwing money out the window every week? Honestly, the small amount you're talking about doesn't make a difference. Even if it's just two or three bucks a week, that action represents a lot of financially irresponsible behavior in your life.

I'm going to be very blunt with you. The lottery is a tax on the poor and people who can't do the math. Your chances of winning are bleak at best. Did you know the odds of winning the Powerball jackpot are about 1 in 292,000,000? There are plenty of other very unusual things that are much more likely to happen to you than winning the lottery. Your chances of making a hole-in-one on the golf course are about 1 in 12,500. Even your odds of having quadruplets are around 1 in 11 million.

When times are tough and you're strapped for cash, the last thing you need to do is spend what little you have on gimmicks. My advice is to focus on working hard, living on a tight budget that cuts out all unnecessary expenses, and saving every penny you can. Unlike the lottery, this is a plan that works every time. When you start living on a budget and get out of debt, it provides a little bit of breathing room in your life. You might even feel like you got a raise!

Don't let your finances—and your dreams—be hijacked by the lottery. — Dave

#### How to Test Your Faith

"Examine yourselves to see whether you are in the faith; test yourselves. Do you not realize that Christ Jesus is in you—unless, of course, you fail the test?" 2 Corinthians 13:5 NIV

We are to desire what is right - There are many here on earth doing what is wrong. It is very easy to fall into the crowd and go along. I find it challenging to do what is right. Striving to better ourselves is rewarding in many ways. It makes us more confident in our relationship with Christ. It builds the courage to share our testimony with others. We develop Christian character. We are more successful with our relationships with friends and family. "For you are the temple of the living God. As God has said: "I will dwell in them and walk among them. I will be their God, and they shall be My people." Therefore "Come out from among them and be separate," says the Lord. "Do not touch what is unclean, and I will receive you." "I will be a Father to you, and you shall be My sons and daughters, says the Lord Almighty." Therefore, having these promises, beloved, let us cleanse ourselves from all filthiness of the flesh and spirit, perfecting holiness in the fear of God." (2 Cor. 6:16—7:1) (NKJV)

But someone will say, "You have faith; I have deeds." Show me your faith without deeds, and I will show you my faith by my deeds. You believe that there is one God. Good! Even the demons believe that-and shudder. You foolish person, do you want evidence that faith without deeds is useless? James 2:18-20 (NKJV)

We are to serve God in some sort of capacity. The Body of Christ has perhaps 22 spiritual gifts. Combine those with the diversity of mankind and you have untold billions of spiritual combinations. Each person serves Christ in their own special way. We all have a ministry in Christ. We just don't go to the church on Sunday and listen to the minister. We are ministers, every single one of us. If you aren't,

you have failed the test of faith. You can't just sit back in a pew and let other people do all the work. God requires a service from you. The least of which is that every single person you come in contact with personally, it is your responsibility to share the gospel of Jesus Christ.

"You see that a man is justified by works and not by faith alone." James 2:24 (NKJV) Listen to me very carefully. We are justified by faith through our works. Through this relationship with the Holy Spirit, we learn our spiritual gifts and what our ministry is to others. One goes hand in hand with the other. Pray to God to reveal your gifts and ministry. 



I was a Christian for years before I learned how to access God's grace—His power—to live my everyday life. First, I had to get an understanding that once I was saved, God didn't expect me to live right by my own strength.

Just as I couldn't "earn" salvation through my own works or effort, I also couldn't really change my heart or behavior in my own strength. Jesus says in John 15:4 (NIV), "No branch can bear fruit by itself; it must remain in the vine. Neith can you bear fruit unless you remain in me."

Every day we need to come to God and tell Him, "God, I can do nothing without You. Nothing in my life is going to work without You. Apart from You, there is nothing good in me. My confidence is in You. I need You all the time. I believe You and trust You, Lord."

When we humble ourselves before God and ask Him for help, we can access His grace through faith.

To help you do that, I want to share three things that commonly short-circuit our faith, cutting off our access to God's power: complaining, self-pity, and pride.

- Complaining is a negative attitude that keeps us from being thankful for all God has done, what He's doing, and what He will do. It is a sin we need to repent of, and then be determined to thank God in all things, at all times. His grace and blessings always outweigh the things we think are wrong in our life.
- Self-pity is simply a "poor me" attitude. It is a form of idolatry because it causes you to focus on yourself and think, "What about me?" We can't be pitiful and powerful at the same time, so let's decide to give up all self-pity.
- Pride takes credit for what God has done and steals His glory. It makes us independent of God, and we can't bear good fruit apart from Christ.

Before I learned how to live my life by God's grace, I was a magging wife, manipulative, and controlling. And I wasn't satisfied living like that. Then God helped me by opening my eyes to see that I couldn't really change until I started taking His Word seriously, trusting Him to change me.

When I made a firm decision to pray and study the Word in areas where I was weak, then God's grace gave me the power I needed to overcome the wrong things. And I keep going forward in my journey with God the same way today. God has all the power you need to do anything you need to do. He loves you and wants to give you His power to live your everyday life with joy. Trust His wisdom and goodness, and you'll live with God-given confidence!



#### Sigogglin

Do you remember growing up in the Blue Ridge Foothills and hearing the word "Sigogglin?" The word seems to have originated from the Irish/Scottish heritage brought to the mountains of Appalachia. Sigogglin means anything that is unusually crooked; skewed or out of balance; not built correctly. Sigogglin is used to describe a crooked fence, an unevenly paved winding road through the mountains, or a door that is not square



to the door frame. The word sigogglin can even take on a greater meaning to describe anything that appears not to make sense. Sigogglin is a word that says a lot without having to say a lot of words to describe what you mean, which is what I just did.

Do you know the meaning of the word sigogglin is in the Bible? Yep, it is in the Bible. Take, for example, the word crooked. In Ecclesiastes 1:15, we read, "What is crooked cannot be made straight, and what is lacking cannot be numbered." The meaning of crooked in this verse translates well with the word sigogglin. The author of Ecclesiastes is saying that humanity is not able by all its wisdom to make straight the crooked or sigogglin path of life.

However, God declares in Isaiah 42:16, "I will bring the blind by a way they did not know; I will lead them in paths they have not known. I will make darkness light before them, and crooked places straight. These things I will do for them, and not forsake them." Only God can make man's sigogglin paths straight. Thanks be to God the Father that he sent his Son, Jesus Christ, by giving us the gift of his Son's righteousness and taking on our sigogglin, our crookedness, our unrighteousness upon Himself.

Knowing the straight-way of God is very important to Landis Orthodox Presbyterian Church. Therefore, Landis OPC is all about worshiping the Triune God who, by his Word, straightens out our sigogglin lives by preaching and teaching straight doctrine. Like sigogglin, the word orthodox is a word that says a lot.

While the ever-evolving social media landscape can make it difficult for adults to keep up with the way their children are interacting with these platforms, parents can help protect their kids by communicating regularly and by using new tools.

#### Bruce Springsteen and New Songs

"Praise the Lord! Sing to the Lord a new song, his praise in the assembly of the faithful. For the Lord takes pleasure in his people; he adorns the humble with victory." --- Psalm 149:1, 4

The concert film "Western Stars" recently opened in theaters nationwide. Based on Bruce Springsteen's first studio album in five years, "Western Stars" is the only opportunity

in which fans can see him playing all thirteen songs on the album. A band and a full orchestra accompany his performance under the cathedral ceiling of his historic nearly 100-year-old barn. "Touching on themes of love and loss, loneliness and family and the inexorable passage of time, the documentary film evokes the American West...weaving archival footage and Springsteen's personal narration with a song to tell the story of Western Stars" (Movie Details, AMC app).

Springsteen published a 500-page memoir, Born to Run, in 2016. In a story for Vanity Fair coinciding with the book's release, David Kamp wrote about Springsteen's issues with his father, Doug.

"One of the book's most moving passages occurs a few days before the 1990 birth of Springsteen and [Patti] Scialfa's first child, their son Evan. As was his impulsive want Doug embarked on an impromptu road trip, driving 400 miles south to Bruce's house in Los Angeles from San Mateo, where he and Adele had made their home. Over beers at 11 A.M., Doug, uncharacteristically, made a small peace offering to his son. "Bruce, you've been very good to us," he said. And then, after a pause: "And I wasn't very good to you."

"That was it," Springsteen writes. "It was all that I needed, all that was necessary."

I asked him if he ever heard the words "I love you" from his father.

"No," he said, a little pained. "The best you could get was 'Love you, Pops.' [Switching to his father's gruff voice.] 'Eh, me, too.' Even after he had a stroke and he'd be crying, he'd still go, 'Me, too.' You'd hear his voice breaking up, but he couldn't get out the words" (October 2016).

Psalm 149 calls on God's people to sing a new song to the Lord. Images of singing, gladness, rejoicing, dancing, and playing musical instruments express different ways in which our praise is offered to God. Verse 4 proclaims the primary reasons for our praise. The Lord "takes pleasure in his people" and the Lord "adorns the humble with victory." God not only has told us that he loves us, but he has demonstrated his love in innumerable ways. We have not done anything to deserve God's love and pleasure, but through Christ, God has reconciled us to himself. He has set his affection on those who recognize their utter helplessness and their need for salvation.

Hans Wiersma writes, "In Jesus, the Lord God has indeed done - and continues to do - new things: finding the lost, redeeming the worthless, forgiving the sinner, feeding the hungry, healing the sick, freeing the bound, raising the dead. Such new things deserve a new song" (workingpreacher.org, 11/7/10).

Prayer: Lord, thank you for your love and for teaching us how to sing the latest God-song, a praise-song to you (adapted from Psalm 40:3 The Message).

Two promises from Daniel are also connected to stars:


- 6. Daniel says that when we are wise, we become bright pointers to the world, much like the Christmas star that led men considered wise by the world but needing spiritual wisdom.

#### 'Churches Should Suspend Services During Pandemic.' I Respectfully Dissent!

For the last few months, I've been on the telephone with hundreds of pastors, asking them how their churches are navigating the Coronavirus Crisis. The stories of low attendance are disturbing, despite churches employing health protocols to keep people as safe as possible. Many are saying that their churches are now in jeopardy of failing.



Now Christian geneticist and U.S. National Institutes of Health Director, Francis Collins, advises that churches ought to postpone in-person services due to the virus until the summer of 2021 when most Americans have received a vaccine. Collins says churches should either go remote or virtual.

I respectfully dissent!

There's a mental health crisis occurring in conjunction with the pandemic. Drug and alcohol abuse are exceedingly high. Suicides are through the roof. More than ever, the doors of the church should be open, with services provided regularly. People need a place that they can go to find spiritual counsel, comfort, and hope.

Years ago, I heard an old faithful preacher advising a woman who said she could go to church just as well by radio and television as she could by attending church services. He wisely responded, "Lady, going to the church via television is about like kissing your boyfriend over the telephone. It just ain't the same."

In one of the great passages of exhortation in the Book of Hebrews, the readers are strongly admonished, "...not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near" (10:25 RSV).

Just as the government coerced lockdowns to kill businesses during the pandemic and closed church doors it seriously injures churches and their mission. Church attendance for so many is habitual, and getting out of the habit can be devastating to one's spiritual life. Someone put it this way: "We first make our habits, and then our habits make us."

I don't doubt the reality of the virus. I recently spoke at the Memorial Service of a close friend who died of COVID 19. Nevertheless, our government's response and the way many church leaders have acquiesced to closing church doors and canceling services has been beyond the pale. Moreover, too many professing Christians, who could attend church services, are staying at home for fear of catching the virus.

Is this the proper response for a people who should be facing death with the assurance of eternal life?

Think of the early Christians who often met in hiding, knowing they might be put to a torturous death if they were caught meeting together for worship.

And we are afraid of a virus in which ninety-nine percent of the people who get it recover, and less than one percent die from it?

Think of the apostles of Christ, all of which, except John, died horrendous deaths for the practice of their faith. Andrew was crucified on an X-shaped Cross. Matthew was impaled to the earth by spears and then beheaded. Bartholomew was flayed to death by a whip and torn to shreds. Thomas died from a stabbing. Philip was impaled by iron hooks in his ankles and hung upside down to die. James, Jesus' brother, is thought to have been beheaded by King Herod near Palestine. Jude was crucified. Matthias was stoned and then beheaded. Death hung over them every day like a Damocles sword for the practice of their religion. And we're avoiding church because of a virus from which the overwhelming majority of people recover?

Brian Kingslake, in Out of This World, addresses the question of why going to a church building or a specific gathering place best serves our faith. He eloquently writes:

"The whole subject of the relationship between the externals and the internals of religion is very interesting. Just as the stone walls and locked doors of a church building protect the altar Bible, the Communion vessels and the rich carpets of the sanctuary (and, I may add, the tape recorder and P.A. system) so the externals of religion can protect and preserve the more precious worship of the heart. The fact that we discipline ourselves to attend service in a certain building at a definite hour, and take part in a certain ritual that has evolved during the ages, can help to preserve and protect our spiritual consciousness. To depend entirely on one's spiritual vitality is beyond the capacity of most of us. Structure can get in the way, but without any structure, there is a tendency for our thoughts to dissipate and degenerate into trivia and superficial or sentimental nothingness. We need to get together with our friends from time to time to 'fill our tanks at the filling station,' so to speak, to recharge our flat batteries."

I suggest this can't be effectively done by setting up your laptop, iPad, or smartphone and watching church staff online.

I'm not saying the church is brick and mortar. The church is God's people. I'm not saying the stained glass windows confer the forgiveness of sins or the gift of eternal life. I'm not saying the pipe organ with its exquisite music is what brings the sinner to repentance. It's not the choir singing while gorgeously robed, or the hymns sung by the congregation, or the lighting of candles, or even the powerful message from the pastor that define what it means to be a Christian.


Neither do I mean to say we should throw caution to the wind. What I am saying, however, is that our churches should be open with proper health protocols, including taking temperatures, wearing masks, hand washing stations, etc. And if your health is not already seriously compromised by your age or a serious underlying health condition, you need to be in church!

Yes, you need to be in church, even during this pandemic.

In addition to Republicans maintaining a majority in both the North Carolina General Assembly and Council of State in the November 2020 election, all contested judicial races for the North Carolina Supreme Court and Court of Appeals were won by Republicans. Senior Associate Supreme Court Justice Paul Newby ran against Chief Justice Cheri Beasley for her seat and ultimately won by 401 votes, after fruitless recounts initiated by Beasley to maintain her seat. On December 12, 39 days after the election, Beasley finally acknowledged her loss and conceded the election to Newby. In addition to Newby, two other Republicans – NC Court of Appeals Judge Philip Berger, Jr. and former state senator and attorney Tamara Barringer – won seats on the NC Supreme Court, changing the balance on the Court from one Republican, six Democrats to three Republicans, four Democrats. All three Justice-elects to the NC Supreme Court are constitutional conservatives and have pledged to refrain from legislating from the bench. This is a significant gain for our state as our current governor, Roy Cooper, has reflexively turned to our state's courts time and again to change laws passed by the legislature in his effort to "sue until blue" and move forward his liberal agenda.

Thanks to the urgency introduced by "Operation Warp Speed," we appear to be at a turning point in our battle against COVID-19. Operation Warp Speed is the private-public partnership instituted by President Trump that mobilized the finest research minds in the private and public sectors to develop one or more vaccines that disable the COVID-19 virus. Because of Operation Warp Speed, scientists were able to discover and develop vaccines with unprecedented speed while still adhering to the highest levels of safety required in the United States. The vaccine will be free to all. UNC-Chapel Hill, Duke University, and private research teams in the Research Triangle Park have been major contributors in deciphering the workings of the COVID-19 virus and developing therapies.

In October, North Carolina submitted to the Center for Disease Control (CDC) a plan for how the vaccine will be allocated in our state. As soon as the Food and Drug Administration okays the use of one or more vaccines, the CDC will issue final distribution guidance to the state. There are to be four phases of distribution. The timeline for distribution after Phase 1A is uncertain. As the availability of vaccine becomes more certain, distribution timelines will come into focus.

- Phase 1A: Healthcare workers and medical first responders who face a high risk of exposure to the virus. Staff in long-term care settings are also included in this priority group. (Est. population: 140K-161K people)
- Phase 1B: Residents in long-term care settings, people with two or more chronic illnesses, also known as comorbidities, who live inside and outside of congregate living settings such as jails, prisons, and migrant camps -- including residents of such locations who are over the age of 65, front line workers with two or more comorbidities, and staff in congregate living settings. (Est. population: 587K-790K people)
- Phase 2: All other residents in congregate living facilities, firefighters and police officers, food packaging, preparation, and processing workers, manufacturing workers, construction workers, transportation workers, some retail and grocery store workers, child care workers, adults with chronic conditions, people over the age of 65, and staff in K-12 schools and colleges/universities. (Est. population: 1.18M-1.57M people)
- Phase 3: Energy/telecom workers, water/waste/energy operators, all other retail workers, religious leaders, and other membership associations, students in K-12 and colleges/universities (Est. population: 574K-767K people)
- Phase 4: Everyone else not identified in Phases 1-3 (Est. population: 3.6M-4M people)

#### Dementia Related Psychosis: Four Caregiver Facts You Need to Know

(StatePoint) Approximately 2.4 million people or 30 percent of people living with dementia in the U.S. may experience hallucinations and delusions associated with dementia-related psychosis. These symptoms might include seeing something that isn't there or believing something that isn't true and can be frequent, persistent, and recur over time.

According to advocates, improving the management of these troubling symptoms starts with recognizing and understanding what patients are experiencing. To learn more, UsAgainstAlzheimer's, the Lewy Body Dementia Association (LBDA), and Acadia Pharmaceuticals surveyed patients and their caregivers. Findings highlighted important, infrequently discussed, considerations for caregivers:

1. Symptoms can happen frequently: The most common symptoms of dementia-related psychosis reported by surveyed patients were visual hallucinations (89 percent), auditory hallucinations (54 percent), and distortion of senses (54 percent) and such symptoms can happen frequently. In patients who reported recent visual hallucinations, 61 percent indicated they occurred at least weekly. Also, the majority of care partners (77 percent) reported paranoid delusions as occurring at least weekly.

"Given their potential frequency, being prepared to recognize, report, and manage these symptoms is critical," says Theresa Frangiosa of UsAgainstAlzheimer's, one of the survey authors. "My mom experienced these kinds of symptoms associated with her Alzheimer's disease and in talking with other caregivers, many people think this could never happen to their family until it does."

2. Dementia-related hallucinations and delusions greatly impact a patient's overall health and quality of life: Most surveyed patients said their activities of daily living (75 percent), sleep (63 percent), family life (56 percent), and safety (about 56 percent) were affected by dementia-related hallucinations and delusions. Care partners reported that symptoms make it difficult for their loved ones to know what is real and what is not real, contributing to their anxiety, and impacting their personal relationships.

Jo Anne, 70, from Maryland, was surprised by her husband's hallucinations. "Before Ed was diagnosed with Lewy body dementia, he would tell me that he saw mice or insects in the house so, of course, I'd go check! When these experiences increased in frequency, I knew that we needed to talk to his doctor about why he was having persistent hallucinations."

Research shows that this kind of neuropsychiatric symptoms may pose challenges. For example, studies show that the presence of psychosis in Alzheimer's patients was also associated with 1.5 times increased likelihood of death.

- 3. Care partners are affected too: Dementia-related hallucinations and delusions are symptoms that can be associated with all forms of dementia such as Lewy body dementia, Alzheimer's disease, Parkinson's disease dementia, vascular dementia, and frontotemporal dementia. Unfortunately, caregivers of people with dementia compared to non-caregivers can experience high rates of emotional and physical stress as well as depression, an increased likelihood of comorbid conditions, hospitalizations, and doctor visits. In fact, caregiver burden is associated with increased desire to place people with dementia in long-term care.
- 4. Getting help as early as possible is key: Living with dementia-related hallucinations and delusions takes a toll on both patients and caregivers. That's why advocates urge caregivers to get educated about what to expect from dementia-related psychosis and find support.

"If you see your loved one exhibiting new symptoms, then take the initiative to tell their health care provider, who can offer advice on how to cope," urges

January is School Board Appreciation Month, and the New Dimensions Charter School wants to say, "thank you" to all our board members who do so much for our school. New Dimensions is represented by eleven dedicated board members who devote countless hours to make sure our students are served in the best way possible. Chair Regina Rhodes, Vice-Chair Kristen Rodriguez, Secretary Shanna



Wall, Treasurer David Martin, Pamela Harrison, Tracy Jones, Dorie Evans, Jamie Smith, Casey Kinard, Chris Beam, and Brad Buchanan are true advocates for the students of New Dimensions, developing policies and making decisions that help shape the future of our school. Our school board oversees more than 384 students, 48 employees, and an annual budget of over \$3,000,000. I am proud to work with our board, and I congratulate them on their excellent leadership and vision for the students of New Dimensions.

I also want to remind our school community of the new anonymous tip line, Say Something, that our middle school students and staff currently have available to them. New Dimensions joins schools around the nation as users of this program. Say Something is a school safety program for students – developed by Sandy Hook Promise – that enables students to anonymously report tips about school safety concerns via a mobile app along with a phone call. The tips will be received by school administrators and law enforcement, who will respond appropriately based on the type of tip.

We want to be sure our students have a voice when it comes to feeling safe at school, and that's why we are a part of this program. This app gives students the ability to remain anonymous while reporting instances of bullying or fighting involving themselves or others, or if they've seen a weapon at school, with assurances that their tip will be seen and investigated. The Say Something mobile app allows users (who can include students, teachers, and parents) to provide tips in categories that include bullying, illegal drug and alcohol use, fighting, weapons, and a report category for all other types of tips. Students can submit digital photos or videos along with text information from their cell phones directly to the school administrative team and school resource officer. The app allows students, if they choose, to bookmark a tip so that they can follow-up on the status of their tip, or anonymously text back and forth with administrators to provide additional information. Additionally, if a student has a suicide or mental health concern, they can reach out to trained professionals by using the app. The app is available for download from the Android Marketplace and the Apple App Store.

The Center for Safer Schools, created in March 2013 as part of the N.C. Department of Public Safety, worked with Sandy Hook Promise in response to a concern noted by students, teachers, administrators, and law enforcement during community forums, of a need for a standardized method for students to report safety issues to school administrators, teachers, and school resource officers.

• Why it exists

Over 160,000 school children miss school each day in the United States out of fear of being bullied. Being able to report their fears is paramount in reducing these absences. Over 90 percent of students say they would use an anonymous reporting tool if they had one available. This is also important because over 80 percent of school shooters tell someone before they act. An anonymous reporting tool could help prevent school shootings and other safety concerns on school campuses.

In 2013, one of the first activities of the North Carolina Center for Safer Schools (NCCFSS) was to tour the state and hold community forums at several schools. These forums included meeting with students, teachers, administrators, and law enforcement in the afternoon followed by an open community forum in the evening. One of the concerns that arose from these meetings was that students needed a truly anonymous, standardized method to report their concerns to school administrators, school resource officers (SROs), and teachers. The NCCFSS heard this call for help and began developing a plan to find and implement an anonymous reporting application for students that could also be available for their parents and teachers. Say Something is a tangible anonymous application for smartphones that has been developed with the needs of North Carolina's school children in mind.

Continuing the safety theme, New Dimensions is fortunate to partner with the City of Morganton to place a school resource officer at our school. Officer Casey Kinard will celebrate his first anniversary as the New Dimensions SRO this month. Officer Kinard is the lead person on the Say Something anonymous tip app. Our students, staff, parents, and visitors are in very capable hands.

New Dimensions has installed security cameras throughout our building and grounds. These cameras are making a safe school even safer.

Open enrollment at New Dimensions begins on Monday, January 4, and ends on Wednesday, March 31 at 4 p.m. Applications for the upcoming year will be posted on our website and will available at the school beginning on January 4. Virtual tours will be developed and posted in January. Just give us a call (828-437-5753) or email us at dburleson@ndschool.org if you have questions about our school.

At the end of the enrollment period, it will be determined if there are more applications than spaces available for each grade. If the number of applicants for a particular grade does not exceed the number of available spaces for that grade level, all students who have applied by the deadline will be accepted. If the number of applicants for a particular grade level exceeds available spaces for that grade level, a lottery system will determine admission eligibility. Students who are not offered enrollment will be placed on a waitlist. After all spaces for a grade level are filled, the lottery will continue until all applying students have been assigned a priority number on the waitlist. The waitlist will not carry into the next school year.

The support of our community and the shared desire to keep our students safe is greatly appreciated.

#### Don't Live to Regret It

An old cliché came to me this morning through the words of a song, "You'll live to regret it..."

Many will look back on 2020 and realize it was more than the year of unprecedented events, but sadly for many, will become a year of regret. Then there is the introspective thought,

"How many things have we passed through in this life to only live long enough to regret them?"

Meriam-Webster defines regret as the following: re·gret | \ ri-'gret \ 1a: to mourn the loss or death of, b: to miss very much, sorrow aroused by circumstances beyond one's control or power to repair, an expression of distressing emotion (such as sorrow).

The longer I ponder on this line, the more corollary aspects of it come into play. For it can mean more than not having appreciated someone or something; can it not? Life is a never-ending journey of choices, and with them, we often face missing an opportunity, albeit good or bad. Like a fork in the road, there is always more than one path that we may take. As the saying goes, the one less traveled is often the one that will enrich our soul all the more. I once had a phrase back in my youth when my ambitions were to pursue the lusts of the flesh, that I was the "Unluckiest, lucky man alive." In other words, God was watching over me even when I wasn't seeking him. As much as I tried to run from him, I soon found out there was no place to hide. My life was as the psalmist wrote, "Whither shall I go from thy spirit? or whither shall I flee from thy presence? If I ascend up into heaven, thou art there: if I make my bed in hell, behold, thou art there. If I take the wings of the morning and dwell in the uttermost parts of the sea; Even there shall thy hand lead me, and thy right hand shall hold me."

Time and time again, when my path should have led to utter destruction, there was another miraculous occurrence that delivered me safely out of the jaws of the lion. In those many narrow escapes of a poor choice, it was as if I could feel the prayers of my family's spiritual leaders blanketing me when I was woefully unworthy. They would pray that those early teachings they had sown would someday blossom. Thankfully, those seeds of faith my elders had planted in me took root, and once they began to germinate, God's plan for me began to come to fruition. But it would take many years and many knocks upon my proverbial door before my hard head would allow him in.

As Christians, is not our pathway more judicious than those who wander like ships tossed upon the sea? "Commit thy way unto the LORD; trust also in him, and he shall bring it to pass." While we might ponder those many missed opportunities, we should not live in regret. For there was and always is a purpose in the next step we take. While it may seem as if a choice were a mistake when the longer journey reveals the road traveled, when we look back over the dawn of time, we can almost, if not always, see how that passage through which we endured was one in which there could not have been a more perfect plan provided. These are the moments, when we allow them, that magnify the essence of God. "And he shall bring forth they righteousness as the light, and thy judgment as the noonday. Rest in the LORD, and wait patiently for him: fret not thyself because of him who prospereth in his way, because of the man who bringeth wicked devices to pass."

Take, for instance, just a couple of nights ago, a decision to remain in Boone and run a couple of errands before heading down the mountain cost me in time but could have cost me much more.

Why do I say this? Allow me to explain.


My own "plan," if you will, was to leave work a little early and run while the snow was still falling. Besides the novelty of running in the snow, there was the hope that I would be able to capture images for future use in devotional postings to social media. The trails that crisscross the Moses Cone Memorial park offer a neverending vista of God's creation. With each changing season, so do those familiar spots where the camera's eye catches one's attention.

The run was challenging in that the bitterly cold wind bit into my exposed flesh. But as is most often the case, as I continued quoting scriptures, the pain of the outer body diminished until the point it was only a mild nuisance. Thankfully, there were several good scenes from which to choose. The falling snow's pace was merely a flurry at best by the end of the run, so it didn't seem unwise to go ahead and stop by a local store to pick up another Christmas gift. While I was in the spirit of getting things done, I also decided to go ahead and run to Lowe's for a couple of things on my list. While in the store, hunger began to gnaw at my insides. One who has trained long enough or worked in a physical capacity for an extended time knows the difference between a little hunger pang and one of greater magnitude, for that latter one was one that hit me while picking up those supplies. Seeing that there was a greater need than a want, I decided to go ahead and grab an early supper as well. The hot soup and sandwich hit the spot as I sat in the parking lot of Chik-Fil-A and dined alone. Outside the car, the flurries continued as the last vestiges of light faded from the sky. Street lights seemed hazy in the falling snow, but there was nothing at this point that created any sense of dread. The thermometer on the car's display read 23 degrees.

Driving out of Boone and eventually into Blowing Rock, there was still nothing to indicate that this was nothing more than a beautiful end to a snowy day on the mountain. Christmas lights were already hung in several stores and homes. Their ambiance warming the soul within as my car drove past. Then, as the curve past the last light in Blowing Rock began to fall behind me, there ahead were the seemingly endless line of red tail-lights. An unending line of cars wrapped around the curve ahead and far below the mountain.

There would be no usual drive home that night.

Later, I would find out that a tractor-trailer had jack-knifed one of the icy curves. With it, several cars were also wrecked and maligned across the roadway. So, for the remainder of the evening, for over an hour or so, there I sat.





how lucky it was that my drive home was paused in the manner it was, for my fate could have been much different; either crashed or worse, injured – to the point of death

The night following, Pastor Greer led us through the study of Romans 10 and, in so doing, mentioned the Roman Road to salvation. The term is often used to describe the scriptures in the book of Romans, which are often used to lead someone to Christ. Along this virtual road, one can find eternal salvation if they so choose to make the drive. As some choices in life afford one the ability to know the result ahead of time, and so it is when one takes this route – the Roman road. Eternal life, one in which you would inevitably be able to live long enough to see if there were any regrets, would ironically allow you also to know that there couldn't have genuinely been any regrets, for the path you took was the one in which God would have planned.

However, if we live being regretful, is this not as bad or worse than not forgiving? Worse yet, think of what the utmost regret might be? If you think of life in terms of eternity, then you are on the right track. In this vein of thought, one would have to say that the utmost remorse would undoubtedly be dying without choosing the gift of eternal life through Jesus Christ. This choice would culminate after one's physical life on earth has ended only to wake up in hell, realizing that, and eternally regretting not having believed in the name of the only begotten Son of God.

There is no going back.

For in the gospel of Luke, the account of the rich man that died and was suddenly thrust into the midst of hell paints a vivid picture of someone who realized too late that he had made the wrong choices. "There was a certain rich man, which was clothed in purple and fine linen, and fared sumptuously every day: And there was a certain beggar named Lazarus, which was laid at his gate, full of sores, And desiring to be fed with the crumbs which fell from the rich man's table: moreover the dogs came and licked his sores. And it came to pass, that the beggar died, and was carried by the angels into Abraham's bosom: the rich man also died, and was buried; And in hell he lift up his eyes, being in torments, and seeth Abraham afar off, and Lazarus in his bosom. And he cried and said, Father Abraham, have mercy on me, and send Lazarus, that he may dip the tip of his finger in water, and cool my tongue; for I am tormented in this flame. But Abraham said, Son, remember that thou in thy lifetime receivedst thy good things, and likewise Lazarus evil things: but now he is comforted, and thou art tormented... Then he said, I pray thee therefore, father, that thou wouldest send him to my father's house: For I have five brethren; that he may testify unto them, lest they also come into this place of torment. Abraham saith unto him, They have Moses and the prophets; let them hear them. And he said, Nay, father Abraham: but if one went unto them from the dead, they will repent. And he said unto him, If they hear not Moses and the prophets, neither will they be persuaded, though one rose from the dead."

While it may not be evident to some, the Lazarus in this story is not the same one that Jesus raised from the dead. Yet, the name "Lazarus" is appropriately used in this passage, for in the Hebrew tongue, it translates to, "God has helped." As the beggar Lazarus suffered his earthly life, God knew his heart. Those Pharisees to whom Jesus spoke had hearts hardened like the rich man. They knew the writings of Moses, they knew the law, and they knew the prophets' teachings, yet they could not be persuaded. And the last sentence, as in typical Godly-poetic-justice, Jesus says, "though one rose from the dead." Here he analogizes the Lazarus I this story with the one to whom he raised from the dead. Though the beggar Lazarus had died, he was alive in eternity, as though he had risen from the dead.

Lazarus had no regrets, for his reward was everlasting life, unlike the rich man who now felt the full weight of his errors. Wanting to prevent his own family from the same fate, he begged for Abraham to send Lazarus, for him to return from the dead and go to his house to warn his brothers not to fall to the same fate. Like him, Abraham responded that they already knew the answers, but they too were hardened to the truth.

For they are they which speak of me." In other words, the answer is in Christ. Seek him, and you will find eternal life.

Let the only regrets in your life be those of the past; whereby, you didn't spend enough time with loved ones, or you didn't appreciate those who prayed over you, or that you didn't stop and pause long enough along the journey to appreciate all that God has done for you. Yes, let those regrets be of the past. Going forward, willingly receive Christ in your life and leave all your future regrets behind.

You only have one earthly life to live. Make it count.

#### God's Concern About our Walk

Leviticus 23 is consumed with the walk of God's people. Our next series of articles will deal with the walk of God's born-again believers.

- v.3 "If ye walk in my statutes, and keep my commandments, and do them;
- v. 12 And I will walk among you, and will be your God, and ye shall be my people. v. 21 And if ye walk contrary unto me, and will not hearken unto me; I will bring seven times more plagues upon you according to your sins.
- v. 23 And if ye will not be reformed by me by these things, but will walk contrary unto me;
- v. 24 Then will I also walk contrary unto you, and will punish you yet seven times for your sins.
- v. 27 And if ye will not for all this hearken unto me, but walk contrary unto me; v. 28 Then I will walk contrary unto you also in fury; and I, even I, will chastise you seven times for your sins."

The Bible uses the word "walk" many times. In fact, it is mentioned 212 times in the Word of God, while "walked" is used 122 times in the Holy Scriptures. If something is mentioned that often, it must be a very important matter to carefully consider.

To what does the word "walk" generally refer? It speaks inwardly of our attitude and outwardly to our conduct. It has reference to our deportment, our behavior, our ways, our manners, our actions, and our deeds.

It is certain that how we walk will affect God's reactions to us. The Lord responds in blessing or correction toward us, depending upon how we respond to His commands. The Bible teaches the wayward Christian in action or attitude will have to deal with a response from Almighty God.

Think about the following verses from the Book of Hebrews:

Hebrews 12:5-11

- "And ye have forgotten the exhortation which speaketh unto you as unto children, My son, despise not thou the chastening of the Lord, nor faint when thou art rebuked of him:
- 6 For whom the Lord loveth he chast<mark>eneth, a</mark>nd scourgeth every son whom he receiveth.
- 7 If ye endure chastening, God dealeth with you as with sons; for what son is he whom the father chasteneth not?
- 8 But if ye be without chastisement, whereof all are partakers, then are ye bastards, and not sons.
- 9 Furthermore we have had fathers of our flesh which corrected us, and we gave them reverence: shall we not much rather be in subjection unto the Father of spirits, and live?
- 10 For they verily for a few days chastened us after their own pleasure; but he for our profit, that we might be partakers of his holiness.
- 11 Now no chastening for the present seemeth to be joyous, but grievous: nevertheless afterward it yieldeth the peaceable fruit of righteousness unto them which are exercised thereby."

When we stray spiritually, the Lord responds to all of His children in chastisement or correction. What parent could rightly claim he or she loves their children when their wrong behavior goes unreproved? One sure sign that one is not a believer is that when we do wrong no chastisement comes (Heb.12:8).

Our attitude and actions determine whether we will receive correction or blessing. God would rather bless us that He had to chastise us, but He will do to us what we need to be done because of His infinite love for us.

Observe with me some important points to consider.

#### The Promises for the Right Kind of Walk

God said in v.3 "If ye walk in my statutes and keep my commandments and do them." Then He promises to bless if they would walk before Him as they should. What did God promise them?

He promised that rain would come in due season (v.4a). The human body depends on water as well as vegetation and crops. Rain is an essential part of human needs. No one wants to go through a severe drought.

Also, God promised the land would yield her increase (v.4b). God would bless them with a greater amount of fruit to consume and the land would become increasingly productive.

Also, God said the trees would yield their fruit (v.4c). In comparison, those who obey God and do as He says, are the ones who bear the most spiritual fruit in their lives from day-to-day.

Promises did not stop with the first three promises. God also said, "threshing shall reach unto the vintage." God promises to bless the grain they would harvest and that the grape harvest would continue unto planting time (v.5a).

God also told them "Ye shall eat your bread to the full and dwell in your land safely" (v.5b).

His promises did not stop there; He went further. God promised they would have peace in their land (v. 6a). This means that if they would walk closely to Him, the Lord would deal with their enemies, and they could have peace. In v.6 God promises protection to the degree they could overcome their enemies. Look at how the Lord describes their victory over their enemies. Leviticus 26:7-8 says: "And ye shall chase your enemies, and they shall fall before you by the sword. And five of you shall chase a hundred, and a hundred of you shall put ten thousand to flight: and your enemies shall fall before you by the sword."

Other blessings are promised in this section of Scripture that we do not have writing space to elaborate upon. Look those over and you will conclude that it pays to walk following God and not contrary to God.

Those people who live in a different way than what the Bible prescribes cannot expect the blessing of God upon their lives and their nation. Obedience brings

blessing. Israel had a difficult time learning that lesson.

#### The Problems with a Contrary Walk

In Leviticus 26 there are two verses where God rebukes them for walking a "contrary" walk. It points to a hostile encounter or a non-compliant, self-seeking way of life. If a person is contrary concerning God, it means they are moving in the opposite direction than the Lord is.

Idolatry is a revelation of a contrary walk. The Lord told Israel, "Thou shalt have no other God's before Me." God will not accept rivals for our affection for Him in our lives. How foolish that some of the Israelites worshiped objects that could not hear, speak, or respond to their requests. Anything that becomes more important to us than God becomes an idol to us.

Rebellion is a revelation of a contrary walk. It is a revolt or open resistance to God governing our lives. In fact, rebellion against God is seen in such a negative light that it is compared with the sin of witchcraft (I Sam.15:23). The opposite of rebellion is submission or putting yourself under the authority of another.

What happened to Israel when they walked contrary to the laws God had given them to follow?

First, God appointed terror and consumption (v.16). They would have difficult lives if they went against God's will for their lives. They would greatly suffer for their revolting and resistance.

Then, God said they would have sorrow of heart (v.16b). The only way to be happy in life is to obey and submit to the leadership of God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Ghost.

Also, God said they would sow their seed in vain (v.16c). God would allow their enemies to eat the food the Israelites would plant for their own families.

God would set His face against them (v.17). It would be revealed that God would allow the enemies that hated His people to reign over them and many would-be slain by the enemies of Israel.

Also, the Lord would break the pride of their power (v.19). They would lose their pride of heart. As explained in the next few verses of our chapter, the land would not give forth its crops and the trees of the land would not yield their fruits.

It is a serious matter when we think and walk contrary to the will of God for our lives.

#### The Privileges of a Cooperative Walk

The Bible is full of words of blessings to all of those who walk in harmony with the Lord.


First, there is fellowship. In Leviticus 26:12 God says, "And I will walk among you, and will be your God, and ye shall be my people." That sounds to me like One who wants to fellowship with His people. Sin hinders sharing in common with the Lord.

There will be deliverance. In Leviticus 26:13 God reminds those who are not contrary to him that, " I am the Lord your God, which brought you forth out of the land of Egypt, that ye should not be their bondmen; and I have broken the bands of your yoke, and made you go upright." He delivers those who fear Him.

There will be awe. When we co-operate with and obey the Lord, a sense of awe will be experienced as we learn more about who God is. Several times walking with God is accompanied by fear (Deut.8:6; 13:14; Ne. 5:9). Godly fear results in departing from evil.

We are wise if we go with God and do not struggle against Him. Choose to bless over correction every time.

#### Foundation Fathers and How They Served Our Country—Benjamin Rush

Benjamin Rush was born on Christmas Eve, 1745 in Byberry, Pennsylvania, and was only five when his father died. Being a prodigy, Benjamin left home at 12 to attend Princeton College. He graduated a year later and pursued a career in medicine after considering the ministry and the law.

Rush continued his education, earning his medical degree in 1768 from the University of Edinburgh, Scotland. While in Europe, Dr. Rush met and became a lifelong friend of Benjamin Franklin.

Dr. Rush returned to Philadelphia in 1769 and opened a medical practice focusing on the indigent and those with mental illness. Not only did Benjamin treat all socio-economic classes; he lent his medical knowledge to establishing veterinary medicine. Due to his overarching care for the mentally ill, he earned the title, Father of American Psychiatry.

Dr. Rush was a faithful patriot who strongly advocated independence before being sent to Congress. He and other delegates signed the Declaration of Independence on July 20th, though each knew it could be their death warrant. As a Founding Father and during the Revolutionary War, Dr. Rush was the Surgeon General of the Continental Army. He was nearly captured while treating the battle

After the war, Dr. Rush worked to end slavery and supported public education. In addition to being a patriot and physician, he established two universities, was an author, lecturer, evangelist, social reformer, and Treasurer of the United States

When he died on April 19, 1813, Dr. Rush and his wife, Julia Stockton, had 13 children. Dr. Benjamin Rush was not only a patriotic Founding Father; he left many notable legacies, and the world a better place.



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


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
