A Father's Example By Caron Cline Burke County

Growing up as a pastor's daughter had its fair share of charms and challenges. As a child, my father pastored a quickly growing church that included many families with children my age. We were a tight-knit group and most Sunday evenings after the service, 25-30 people made their way to our house for homemade ice cream. It was during these times that my love for a church family took root. When I

y

was fourteen, the Lord called my dad to Pleasant Hill Baptist Church in Morganton and for a season, I was convinced my life would end in loneliness and despair. As God would have it, just a few weeks after the move, I suddenly realized that Morganton was the best place on earth. The decision to relocate was also difficult for my parents but the desire to be in the center of God's will took precedence. As a new and young pastor, my father began systematically visiting every church member, seeking to build relationships with his new flock. There were many senior citizens in the fellowship and he immediately won their hearts and they his. The role of a pastor is multi-faceted. Preaching and teaching the word of God, as well as visiting the sick, were witnessed by all. However, behind the scenes, there were midnight phone calls from those who struggled with alcohol; evening counseling sessions with couples amid serious marital issues; and late-night deliveries of food to hungry people. On multiple occasions, my dad chopped wood for widows in need, drove members to doctor appointments and the grocery store, and even painted a few houses. Countless times, this pastor sat by the bedside of the sick and dying and held their hand as they took their final breath. Whether it was Christmas, Thanksgiving, or any other day of the year, my father was only a phone call away. Surely the flock under his care felt his deep love for each one of them. Subconsciously, his example of serving and loving others was being instilled within my heart. As an adult, I understand the importance of putting others before yourself. Unfortunately, I am still struggling to follow my father's example in this area, although it is indelibly ingrained in my mind.

As any pastor, my dad had his fair share of critics, some harsher than others. In one particular situation, a church member created a petition asking for his resignation from the church. There was no basis for this demand, therefore, it was dismissed. Later, when the same man was hospitalized with a very serious issue, my dad laid aside his hurt and made his way to the hospital to visit and pray for healing. This action was a major lesson for me in humility and I was amazed at his willingness to forgive such a betrayal. My father does not waste time and energy harboring unforgiveness but moves forward in grace and mercy. He has always accepted people for who they are, where they are, but is intentional about sharing Christ and the hope and peace He offers. Those who have come to know the Lord Jesus Christ through his ministry will only be revealed in glory, but I believe the number is incalculable.

Fathers have incredible influence and impact on the lives of their children. A child's first opinion of God is formed based on the example set by their father. What a huge responsibility! I am still seeking to emulate Larry Cline in the areas of love, service, humility, and forgiveness. I desire to be the example to others that he has been to me!


Eternity & Eternal Security

Limit The Potential For Damage

Dear Dave,

My husband started working at a new company about a year ago. As part of his sign-on, they gave him \$5,000 in company stock. The stock has nearly doubled in value since then, and we were wondering if we should buy more, considering how well it has done.



Dear Cathi,

I totally get why you two might be excited over a stock that doubled in value over a year. But what you're talking about doing right now is a very risky proposition. The truth is any stock that doubles in value over just one year is highly volatile. It's unusual for stocks to do things like that, and it also means it could go down just as fast—or even faster.

I don't know where you and your husband are in your overall financial situation, but I recommend people become debt-free except for their homes, and have an emergency fund of three to six months of expenses saved up before investing. Once you reach that point, I strongly advise you to begin putting 15 percent of your income toward retirement before you start any outside investing.

Don't get me wrong, I don't mind a little selective and educated dabbing here and there once the basics are taken care of first. However, I'd never recommended putting more than 10 percent of your nest egg into a single stock. The reason? If the single stock tanks and you lose it all, then your loss is only a blip on your financial radar.

Of course, it would be fantastic if this single stock went through the roof and you two made a ton of money. Just make sure you limit the potential for damage in this kind of scenario by limiting your exposure.

"Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye stedfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labour is not in vain in the Lord." -1 Cor 15:58

Consistent... what does that word mean to you? Regardless of our personal definitions, according to Miriam-Webster the word consistent means "of the same quality;

As I spoke, I noticed that she was visibly touched... and later told me that she was very thankful that I "remembered that about her daddy."

What is unique, it that this man passed away many years ago and has been in Heaven for at least 30 years... yet I still remembered things about him that brought his family joy. His faithfulness to God, his quick smile, and the love that he had for others were very evident to me, even at a young age. Why? Because he was steadfast... consistent... "firm and immovable" in his faith. He was "good each time." The life that he lived and the testimony that he carried made a lasting impression on my life, and to this day I remember him fondly as a man of faith and Christian love.

Many will remember their Dad as a leader in the home. If not, then possibly you recognize a male role model such as a grandfather, uncle, brother, or some other church or family member. This is someone whose paths we can follow, and that our children can see as an example. This should be a Christ-like example since the way children view their fathers influence how they will view God in many ways. Marlene's Meditations

Live Out Your Biblical Paradoxes

Talk less to say more. This is a paradox. The Cambridge Unabridged Dictionary says that a paradox means "a statement or situation that may be true but seems impossible or difficult to understand because it contains two opposite facts or characteristics" For example:

- The same sun that melts the ice hardens clay.
- Failure leads to success.
- Social media disconnects us from each other.

Here's how to construct a paradox according to the website https://literarydevices.net/paradox/ You need to create:

- 1) a statement or situation which initially appears contradictory.
- 2) the statement or situation that appears contradictory must, after consideration, be a logical or well-founded premise.

We live in a world of paradoxes, and this rings true in writing. "In literature, a paradox is not just a clever or comical statement or use of words. Paradox has serious implications because it makes statements that often summarize the major themes of the work they are used in. One of the reasons that writers use paradox is to beckon the reader to observe carefully the plot and look backstage to guess how action develops. Paradoxes create intrigue and help our brains to think rather than react emotionally.

God uses paradoxes in the Bible to intrigue us and capture our attention as we try to figure out His plan. "Readers enjoy more when they extract the hidden meanings out of the writing rather than something presented to them in an uncomplicated manner."

God, the Master Storyteller, uses paradoxes to mirror the action in the book of Esther. In chapter four, fear gripped the exiled Jews when an evil plot by wicked Haman threatened them with death. (Esther 4:3) But Queen Esther, her smooth complexion unmarred by the tragedies of time, thwarts Haman's wicked hatred and saves millions of Jews. The literary device of paradox mirrors the story. The paradox is that a young woman outsmarts Haman, an experienced vizier who manipulates the king in ancient Persia. But, when we sense God moving behind the scenes, we understand her power. We understand the paradox.

Divinely-told drama weaves riveting stories in the Old Testament, using paradoxes to help us discern God as the Master Director behind the scenes.

- An old woman, past child-bearing years, delivers a son. (Genesis 18:11; 21:1-7)
- A helpless Hebrew babe rescues millions of his people from slavery. (Exodus 2:5-6)
- Dry bones live. (Ezekiel 37:1-14)

Even in the New Testament, we learn, as Christians, that we carry within us the power to live out spiritual paradoxes.

- Paradox: When I am weak, I am strong. As a child of God, sometimes we feel helpless against the onslaught of evil. But the Apostle Paul teaches us that our weaknesses actually portray God's power. (2 Corinthians 12:9-10) Like the helpless women who arrived at Jesus' tomb early in the morning, we know that God's might far outweigh any of our powerlessness. The women could not topple the Roman government, roll back the stone, or raise Jesus from the dead. Yet they belonged to the One who could...and did. Roman soldiers faint, helpless as babies, and God rolls the heavy stone away, raising His Son from the dead.
- Paradox: If we desire to honor, we must be a servant. (Mark 9:35; 10:42-44) To receive honor publicly is acceptable and good for worthy acts of service. But to crave centerstage above Christ brings glory only to ourselves. Washing others' feet as we feed the hungry, clothe the homeless, and protect the innocent brings honor in the courts of our King Jesus and points others to Him.
- Paradox: If we take upon ourselves the yoke of Christ, our burden will be lighter. (Matthew 28:11-30) Sometimes, life presses down on our souls, and we succumb to the pressure. But, the Bible reverberates with the sounds of reinforcements when we don the armor of God. The Word energizes our days and splashes refreshing water that cleanses the soot of evil from the windows of our souls. A lifetime of learning and growing in knowing God makes our daily woes and troubles take flight.

When life gets tough, know that God works powerfully. Realize that your strength lies not in physical abilities, like Goliath (See 1 Samuel 17.) but in the Lord God. And when you take care of your neighbor reject ulterior motives and embrace the authenticity of serving. The next time you lift a heavy load and experience relief when someone takes it from you, remember this. Encourage others who despair. Live out your biblical paradoxes.



Stuck in my head.







"But Jesus answered them, My Father worketh hitherto, and I work." (John 5:17)



thesiologist, because he puts people to sleep for a living!

We still had the spring house where we would get the water and carry it in.

Why I am writing this I really don't know except that I miss lots of it! I could no longer work like I did then and it probably looks better looking back than it did when I was in the midst of it all and sweat was pouring off my young body, no shirt on most of the summer. Heaven forbid we get sunburned today. Oh we are going to have cancer! Times sure were simpler in so many ways back then. I am reminded of the scripture in Joel 2:28 where it is talking about old men dreaming dreams and young men seeing visions and I guess I am in the dreaming stage rather than the vision stage in many ways.

So I guess this life lesson is about valuing the past but also preparing for the future, carrying as much of the good with you as possible as we prepare for a new day and a new way. Sow the Right Seeds

Garden season is well underway for those of us who attempt to grow their own taters, maters, beans, etc. It's been a little bit of a struggle to get the garden going here in the mountains, for me anyway. A couple of late cooldowns in the weather seems to have slowed things a bit with keeping the ground temps lower. This growing season we have elected to wait and plant later in hopes the harvest



will come in after we return from our planned vacation this summer. We don't like being away from home knowing some beans need to be picked!

Growing up here in the mountains planting a garden was of necessity and not just a hobby. Our family depended a lot on what was grown and harvested in our gardens. Dad and Mom put a lot of hard work in through the growing season which also meant that we kids were right there with them for the most part. I've spent many long, hard days behind an old front tine tiller trying to help Dad plow up the garden spots on those steep hills around our house. To be honest, I never really looked at it as a hobby, enjoyable, or even satisfying. Let's just say it wasn't my favorite summertime activity! For us kids, it was hard to look ahead to how much we would enjoy the fruits of our labor in the winter when we just wanted to be off playing somewhere. Between our garden and my grandmother's, there was a lot of tater digging, corn shucking, stringing and breaking beans, canning, etc, going on in the holler! While the labor wasn't all that enjoyable, the eating made it tolerable.

Every year when it's garden time we begin preparing the soil early. After cleaning off the garden spot it has to be plowed and tilled to make the soil soft and manageable. I usually put some lime and fertilizer on mine, till it under and let it set in the soil for a couple of weeks before planting. I plant by the moon phases as stated on my gardening calendar. Someone else smarter than me came up with that! And sometimes I just plant when it's dry and time is available. Every year while working and planting it seems the Lord always brings to my heart what He says in His Word, "Be not deceived; God is not mocked: for whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap. For he that soweth to his flesh shall of the flesh reap corruption; but he that soweth to the Spirit shall of the Spirit reap life everlasting." Gal. 6:7-8

There is a fundamental truth that applies not only to the physical side of life but also speaks to the spiritual state of man. In the physical, when you or I plant a certain kind of seed in our garden, we labor with the expectation that come harvest time, what we planted is what we will reap. There are three rows of potatoes in my garden and come fall when its time to dig, Lord willing, when I turn those rows up, "taters" will roll out of them. The beans that will be planted will produce beans, tomatoes will produce tomatoes, squash seed will produce squash, etc. There will be squash, cucumber, lettuce; all these seeds, with the Lord's blessing, will yield the same as what was sown. We do not harvest corn from bean seeds. We cannot harvest potatoes from a squash plant. This principle truth is pretty well accepted in the physical. The concept that the seed that is sown in the ground will yield the same come harvest time is simple yet profound. However, for some reason, this same truth is abandoned in the spiritual side of life.

As Christians, the Bible is teaching us that if we expect to reap a spiritual harvest in our lives, we cannot sow fleshly seed. This should be a simple truth but for some reason, many have a hard time grasping it. How often over the years in ministry have I sat and counseled with someone who has lived to satisfy the sinful desires of the flesh. The decisions they have made have shown no desire to please God, to live according to His word, or even acknowledge His Lordship over their lives. They have sown fleshly seed and are reaping the consequences of destruction. When they are confronted with this truth, they often get upset, defensive, and angry. They say things like this, "How could God let this happen to me if He loves me?" We sometimes do the opposite of what God desires of us and then blame Him for the outcome. They are harvesting what they have sown. When we sow to satisfy sinful flesh, we reap the consequences that come with it. We become deceived in believing that somehow that truth doesn't apply to us. We are the exception to the rule, that won't happen to us.


The opposite is also true. When we sow to the Spirit, we reap a Spiritual harvest. Our relationship to Jesus, prayer, Bible study, worship, obeying God's Word, etc; all are Spiritual seeds that we can sow with the expectation of reaping Spiritual fruit. We will get out what we put in. As we labor to sow into our lives what God desires of us, we can wilh joyful expectation look forward to the harvest of Spiritual blessings. Today's sowing is tomorrow's harvest.

As you are working in your garden this spring and summer, you are looking forward to reaping what you planted. Let it be a reminder to us all that as we labor to serve our Savior, as we strive to live a life that brings glory to Jesus, that the kind of seed we sow into our life is the harvest we will reap. Let us sow Spiritual seed that leads to everlasting life. If we sow the right kind of seed in our lives, we will reap the right kind of harvest!

President Biden's National Proclamation of Prayer to No God

During last week's National Day of Prayer, President Joe Biden issued a proclamation that spoke of the "power of prayer" and urged Americans to "give thanks," but it made no mention of God. No President in American history has ever omitted "God" in his proclamation of National Day of Prayer proclamations.



It's difficult to understand how prayer has any mean-

ing aside from God. Omit God from the equation, and what do you have? Little more than religious sentiment amounting to a pleasant smile on a dog. To whom do we give thanks? Perhaps it's a generic god – a god who is a jack of all trades but the master of

Biden's proclamation reminds me of a prayer recently offered by a Senator in the North Carolina General Assembly. At the beginning of the session for the day, she offered a prayer, if you can call it that, which omitted the name of God and called on "Holy

I understand that in our system of public life, we preserve and protect the freedom of every religious persuasion. Still, Judeo-Christian values built this country. Noah Webster rightly said, "The religion which has introduced civil liberty is the religion of Christ and his apostles."

So, when a country prays and makes an appeal for help and guidance, it needs to be to someone who can actually grant its petitions. It should be lifted to the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob – the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the God of our fathers, the God of our nation's founders. To do otherwise is just a form of idolatry. To do otherwise offends God, and that's not very smart at a time when we desperately need him.

Contrast such prayers with the ones recently offered at a National Day of Prayer service in front of North Carolina's Legislative Building in Raleigh. Approximately two dozen lawmakers from the House and Senate called upon God in public prayer, imploring him to bless and save our nation.

One lawmaker at this same service even called on God, asking the Lord to reveal himself to people who didn't know Christ as Savior. In my forty-one years of ministry, that was the first time I ever heard a public official offer an earnest prayer for, as he said it, "the lost." Powerful!

This week was Crossover week in the Tar Heel state's Legislature. Crossover is when lawmakers feverishly work to get their bills passed and "crossed over" from one chamber to the other before the deadline, lest their bills are no longer considered for the rest of the legislative biennium. At the beginning of the last day of Crossover, the Senator who gave the opening prayer highlighted the need for every person to "cross over" from darkness to light in a personal relationship with Jesus Christ. That was a powerful prayer too!

The Bible tells us, "Fear of the LORD is the foundation of wisdom. Knowledge of the Holy One results in good judgment" (Proverbs 9:10).

Although President Biden's proclamation omitted God, interestingly, it included a statement about the role of prayer in confronting "the crisis and challenges of our time from a deadly pandemic to the loss of lives and livelihoods in its wake, to a reckoning on racial justice" etc.

The President added, "Let us find in our prayers; however they are delivered, the determination to overcome adversity, rise above our differences, and come together to meet this moment in history."

The President's proclamation unquestionably reflected the longing of many Americans for help and healing to overcome our significant problems, but then proudly refused to acknowledge the only One who could provide it.

Dr. George Sweeting, former president of Moody Bible Institute, tells a story about a woman who once told him that she longed for peace and the wisdom to deal with her difficulties. Following High School, she had married, but it didn't make her happy. She had very little communication with her husband beyond the physical level. She had one baby after another and soon was living just for her four children. Her life was an empty routine of strife and overwhelming confusion.

One day she was invited by a friend to attend an evangelistic meeting where she heard the Gospel and realized a personal relationship with Jesus was the one thing that could address her seemingly impossible needs. Upon accepting Christ as her Savior and Lord, she said she literally came alive.

Still, despite the tremendous joy she had realized, there remained a great gulf between her and her husband. In counseling her, Sweeting advised that her husband also needed to know Christ and she was the key to winning him. This prompted her to pray to God and substitute her own understanding with the wisdom that comes from the Lord and his

Dr. Sweeting said soon she was learning how to avoid unnecessary strife. Her housekeeping improved. She became gentle and easy to entreat. She even decided to work off some excess pounds to improve her personal appearance.

One day she came back to Sweeting and said to him, "You know, Dr. Sweeting, the other day my husband kissed me and said, 'Things have certainly been different, darling!" Then she said, "You know, it's working."

Yes, acknowledging God and substituting our ways for his, works. And what worked for that woman on a personal level, and millions of others like her will also work corporately for us as a nation.

Prayer is not promised to be effectual unless we humble ourselves, repent of our proud, stubborn sinful ways, acknowledge God as sovereign, his Son, Jesus Christ as Savior, and earnestly entreat and trust him for what's needed.



Continuing with his presentation, Miller "spoke of the beauty of morality" and the benefits of making the right choices when tempted to sin. And then he told of the splendor of heaven, "and how great it will be to walk on streets of gold."

This is how Miller describes what happened when he finished the lecture:

"I rested my case and asked the class if they could tell me what it was I had left out of this gospel presentation. I waited as a class of Bible college students...sat there for several minutes of uncomfortable silence. None of the forty-five students in the class realized I had presented a gospel without once mentioning the name of Jesus."

The story bears repeating: I presented a gospel to Christian Bible college students and left out Jesus. Nobody noticed...To a culture that believes they 'go to heaven' based on whether or not they are morally pure, or that they understand some theological ideas, or that they are very spiritual, Jesus is completely unnecessary. At best, He is an afterthought, a technicality by which we become morally pure, or a subject of which we know, or a founding father of our woo-woo spirituality" (pp. 158-159).

Nearing the end of his first epistle, John begins to disclose the motive and aim which have directed his writing – "I write these things to you who believe in the name of the Son of God, so that you may know that you have eternal life" (1 John 5:13). Today's passage emphasizes the object of faith, not just the experience of believing. "Everyone who believes that Jesus is the Christ has been born of God" (1 John 5:1a). Christian faith has distinctive and irreducible content. Put together the first part of verse 1 and the last part of verse 5 and we see what it is. Christians believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God. That is not just an article of faith, it is faith. It is this alone that makes a person a Christian (David Jackman, The Message of John's Letters, p. 134).

Prayer: Lord, we believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God. Help us to act on that belief as a channel through which your love flows to others.

To Walk With God

"And after he became the father of Methuselah, Enoch walked with God 300 years and had other sons and daughters... Enoch walked with God; then he was no more, because God took him away." Genesis 5:22, 24 This account says twice that, before he was taken up, Enoch walked with God. I



love the story of the little girl who was telling her mother the story of Enoch. She said Enoch used to take long walks with God. One day he walked so far God said, 'It's too far to go back; come on home with me.' That is what happened to Enoch. What does it mean to walk with God? Here is a man who, amid a brilliant but godless generation, walked with God. What does it mean? Enoch did not literally walk with God; this is unquestionably a figurative expression, but a figurative walk involves the same thing today as it did then.

First, it means he went in the same direction God went. He was moving the way God was going. God is forever moving in human history. He is moving now to accomplish certain things in human life, and He has been doing so for centuries. The person who walks with God is the person who knows which way God is going and goes the same way. Now, what is that? Perhaps we cannot indicate it positively, but we certainly can negatively: God moves always in unswerving hostility toward sin. He is opposed to that which destroys and wrecks human life. No matter how good it looks, no matter how attractive it seems, God is against it. And the person who walks with God is the person who walks in unswerving hostility toward sin in his or her own life and refuses to make up with it or permit it to rule or to reign. That is the first thing in a walk with God. Second, it means to keep in step. You cannot walk with somebody if you do not keep in step with him or her. Sooner or later there comes unbalance, and one of you bumps into the other. A walk is not like moving on one of these endless belts. It is not smooth; it is a repetition of almost falling. Have you ever analyzed your walk? Every time you take a step you almost fall. You allow your body to go off balance, and then you catch yourself with your other leg. Then you shift to that one and you almost fall again, only to catch yourself. The man or woman who walks with God is the man or woman who lives on the verge of a fall. That is an adventurous life. That means if God is not there to support and strengthen you, down you go. You are counting on Him to come through and to keep you steady. That is what a walk with God involves. It is always a walk of venturing out. It is never satisfied with the status quo, never content to remain in a quiet state, doing nothing, waiting, enjoying one's self. It is forever moving at the same pace God moves. It means taking a step when God insists. The third thing is that there was no controversy between God and Enoch. They agreed. "Do two walk together unless they have agreed to do so?" says the Scriptures (Amos 3:3). They must be in agreement. And this is how we must be. There must be no controversy between us if we are going to walk with God, but we must agree with things as He sees them. What changes this makes in our lives! Lord, may it be said of me as it was said of Enoch: He walked with God. I want to go in Your direction, keeping pace with You. Jesus' name Immanuel means God with us (Matthew 1:23). What does it mean today to walk with God? What are three things involved in walking with God?



How Faith in God Can Impact Your Life By Joyce Meyer

Life in Christ is absolutely amazing when you learn to live by faith. And Romans 1:17 says that those who are believers in Him "shall live by faith" (NKJV). It's the key to experiencing the abundant life Jesus died to give us, a life we can enjoy, "and have it in abundance [to the full, till it overflows]" (John 10:10 AMP).



The question is, how do we live by faith? What does it look like, practically speaking, to release, or use, our faith in our everyday lives?

Faith That Brings the Dead to Life

In John chapter 11, we read about the time when Jesus raised His friend Lazarus from the dead. Lazarus and his sisters, Martha and Mary, were good friends to Jesus, and He'd had been to their home multiple times.

But when Lazarus was sick and his sisters sent word to Him saying "he whom You love is sick" (John 11:3 NKJV), Jesus didn't come right away to heal Him. His immediate response was, "This sickness is not unto death, but for the glory of God, that the Son of God may be glorified through it" (v. 4).

Jesus wanted them to trust Him and believe that no matter how bad the situation was, He could still do something to make it right. But that's not the reaction He received.

When Mary, Lazarus' sister, came out to meet Him, she said, "Lord, if You had been here, my brother would not have died" (John 11:32 NKJV). The Bible says that Jesus was "deeply moved within [to the point of anger]" when He approached Lazarus' tomb (John 11:38 AMP). He was visibly disturbed.

Think for a moment how Jesus must have felt. He knows what has happened

and has come to fix the problem, but no one really understands what He's capable of doing. He's surrounded by unbelief. And amid the confusion, Jesus says to the people, "Take away the stone" (v. 39).

Interestingly, Jesus was getting ready to raise a man from the dead but He told them to roll away the stone. He wanted to see their faith in Him through their

Faith That Speaks Louder Than Words

Romans 12:3 says God "has dealt to each one a measure of faith" (NKJV). So you have faith...but are you using it? It's so important for us to use our faith because that's how we grow stronger in our relationship with God and trust Him more in every situation in our lives.

Hebrews 11:6 (NKJV) says, "Without faith it is impossible to please Him, for he who comes to God must believe that He is, and that He is a rewarder of those who diligently seek Him." God rewards our faith when He sees it in action.

Using your faith simply means that you do what you can do—what God shows you to do—and you trust Him to do what you cannot do. For example, if you're praying for your spouse to become a believer in Christ, then don't go to lunch with your friends and complain about how he or she will never change.

When you release your faith, you take some kind of action that shows you believe God will do what He says He will do. You line up your attitudes and actions with God's promises for you, according to His Word, and hold on to those truths when life gets tough. That's what Jesus was asking the people to do when He told them to roll away the stone from Lazarus' grave.

It's Not Too Hard

So many times when God asks us to do something for Him, we look at the situation and say, "There's no way I can ever do that. It's just too hard!"

Maybe you need to forgive people who have hurt you. Maybe you're asking God for a new house and He's telling you to clean up the one you've got. Maybe you're facing a mountain of debt, yet you're still using credit cards everywhere you go.

When challenges are greater than our ability to resolve them on our own, we often say things like, "I can't do it, God. It's just too hard." But that's a lie the devil wants you to believe. The truth is, God is never going to ask you to do something without giving you the ability to do it. Whatever the direction is, He'll give you the strength, understanding, support, resources—anything you need—to do your part when you simply step out in obedience to follow His lead.

In these times, remember Philippians 4:13, which says, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me." In other words, you can do whatever you need to do in life through Christ. You can roll away the stone that stands between you and your miracle!



Do Bluebirds Still Sing?

Canadian songwriter, Hod Pharis, had low expectations when he recorded I Heard the Bluebirds Sing in 1952. Five years later, the popular Nashville



It tells of a young, mountain couple who fall in love: "I courted her for months on end until she promised we would wed. We planned on being married in the spring. All through the long cold winter months, it seemed that spring would never come. And every gloomy winter's day I heard the bluebirds sing."

The story's tension is resolved in verse three: "And when at last spring touched the earth, we were married in the village church. Our wedding seemed just like a dream come true. So many years have come and gone, our love is still as true and strong, as when I found her long ago, and still, the bluebirds sing."

Traditional weddings—often in June—remind us that the home is the foundation of social order, but is that still true? Marriage has fallen from favor with couples from every demographic. Shockingly, many who identify as "Evangelical Christians" now consider marriage "optional." The Bible makes no such claim.

God's plan is not cohabitation. He specifies a lifetime, covenant commitment between one man and one woman. "It is not good that the man should be alone; I will make him a helper fit for him." (Genesis 2:16). "Therefore a man shall leave his father and his mother and hold fast to his wife, and they shall become one flesh." (Genesis 2:24). If God never changes, how can we who claim to love Him now hold marriage in low regard?

The Bible is the story of a loving God going to unimaginable lengths to redeem the object of His affection—the Nation of Israel. Marriage imagery is woven throughout the fabric of the relationship He offers. At Sinai, God promised to be our Husband if we will be faithful to His instructions. Torah was codified in the form of marriage vows. See Exodus 19:5 and Ezekiel 16:8. These vows are serious. The penalty for violating them is bloodguilt that can only be paid by the death of the offending party. The Prophets and the Writings warn Israel to keep her vows to the Most High or face unimaginable pain.

God eventually tired of Israel's ad<mark>ulterous</mark> idolatry. He issued a decree of divorce to the Northern Kingdom, and those ten tribes were dispersed among the Gentiles. Only God's promises to King David kept the Southern tribes of Judah and Benjamin from a similar fate.

At Sinai, we agreed to a contract that would make God our husband. We broke that contract before the ink was dry. Only the blood of Jesus could redeem God's bride from sin. This redemption is celebrated each year in the Feasts of God. One key to understanding those Feasts is knowing about traditional Hebrew weddings.

A young man's father usually chooses the bride. The suitor then negotiates with the bride's father. They agree on terms for the prospective marriage and record those terms as a contract or Ketubah. If the bride agrees to those terms, the couple is then betrothed. The groom pays the negotiated bride price and returns to his home.

The couple is now married in every way except sexual union. They live apart for at least one year. During this time, the groom must prepare a place for his bride. The bride devotes herself to keeping pure, preparing her wedding garments, and maintaining the oil lamps which will be used in the ceremony. The length of the betrothal is determined by how long it takes the groom to prepare the marriage home. The groom's father decides when this task is finished. When he sees that the preparations are complete, he instructs his son to fetch his bride.

A member of the groom's party precedes the group. He announces to the bride and her attendants, "Behold, the bridegroom comes." He underscores this announcement by blowing the shofar. This is the bride's signal to leave her home and join her intended at the place where the ceremony will be conducted.

We who are adopted into God's family by grace through faith are chosen to be the holy bride of the Messiah. Each Spring's Passover reminds us that He traveled to our home and paid our bride price with His precious blood. He promised to prepare our place and return to take us unto Himself. In the meanwhile, we have much to do.

Our time on earth is not about individual desires and ambitions. It is about keeping ourselves pure and accomplishing His work. How can we teach others to observe all things He commanded when we spend so much time and energy quibbling over which of His commands we can ignore? "Not everyone who says to me, 'Lord, Lord,' will enter the kingdom of heaven, but the one who does the will of my Father who is in heaven." (Matthew 7:21)

Spring will at last touch this earth. The Son of God will return for His bride. "In the cities of Judah and the streets of Jerusalem…there shall be heard again the voice of mirth and the voice of gladness, the voice of the bridegroom and the voice of the bride, the voices of those who sing as they bring thank offerings to the house of YHVH." (Jeremiah 33:10-11)

Many will wail as they are shut out of His presence. Only those devoted to keeping themselves holy will be prepared for the wedding. They will know what it means to hear the bluebirds sing.



An Encouraging Word: No Longer Forsaken

God's gracious and merciful gift of a Messiah—One who would save His people from their sins—was the same



Jesus' short life here on earth allowed Almighty God to lean in and draw near to His beloved creation who were separated by their sins, alone in their helplessness and cut off from any hope. God leaned in because He saw the pain, the confusion, the misery, and the tears of humanity. He came near because He was the only one who could do anything about it! Only the designer and creator could reach down into the depths of a human soul and heart—and touch, heal, and remove the filthy stain of our sins. Only a loving God could forgive and cleanse the dark, black hearts within. Only faithful God could promise to never let us go-no matter what! Only God, our Savior, and Redeemer could offer us hope for tomorrow. And only He could keep those promises throughout all of eternity. So, He leaned in! But when He came near, He was brushed off and pushed aside. Israel's promised Messiah was supposed to be a great king like David who would raise a mighty army and deliver them from bondage to their enemies. The concept of "salvation" spoken of by the Psalms and the prophecies of Isaiah and Jeremiah, were interpreted as referring to a mighty military leader who would overthrow Rome. The Hebrew people tended to overlook or ignore the specific prophesies of Isaiah 53, which foretold that the Messiah would suffer and die. They had no use for another Rabbi or religious leader spouting love and acceptance. They needed a scrupulous, hard-driving, militant commander who wouldn't stop for anything to get what he wanted—that is, to get what they wanted.

Today, as the Lord continues to lean into humanity, a nation and a world guided by secular humanism rise up in revolt, just like those of years gone by. Following human reason, secular ethics, and philosophical naturalism while specifically rejecting religious dogma, supernaturalism, and superstition as the basis of morality and decision making, they rely on "what seems right to me!" The reaction goes something like this: "We don't need you, God, nor your truth to teach us about morality and decency. We can and will define it for ourselves. We will instead, call upon science and place our faith in a government led by human reason and situational ethics. We want leaders who will throw off the shackles of religion and faith and allow us to be what we want to be!"

When Isaiah described the suffering servant in Isaiah 53:3-12, we hear of the One who came to save, but instead was abandoned, deserted, discarded, betrayed, and rejected. "He was despised and forsaken of men, a man of sorrows and, acquainted with grief; And like one from whom men hide their face, He was despised and rejected and we did not esteem Him."

C.H.Spurgeon, the great late 19th, and early 20th-century preacher, once asked: What does humanity want? He answered that question in a sermon he titled, "Why Christ Is Not Esteemed." Spurgeon noted that that question "...must be the universal confession of the human race. From the highest monarch to the meanest peasant, from the loftiest intellect to the most degraded mind, from the admired of all men to the unknown and insignificant, this one confession must come: We esteemed Him not." In his sermon, Spurgeon answered the question for his generation. But his answer is just as poignant for ours. He insisted that there are four reasons we do not esteem Jesus—because: (1) we esteemed ourselves so highly; (2) we esteemed the world so highly; (3) we did not know Him; and (4) we were

Truly, our Savior and Lord will not and cannot be lifted up and glorified when a sinner sets up an idol-god (himself/herself) on the throne where God alone ought to sit. And truly, when the world and our flesh are more important than following after the will and the ways of Jesus, then He cannot and will not be worshipped and revered. And truly, when our Creator is not known for Who He really is, then He will not and cannot be loved and served. And truly, when one is spiritually dead in their trespasses and sins, one has no hope and no eternal security. Spurgeon gave this illustration:

Suppose, he says, there is a man (or woman) whom I desire to influence (i.e., share the blessed gospel of Christ). I would "imagine that I am a skillful musician and that I touch the strings of my harp in such a manner as to bring forth the most delightful melody, yet the man takes no notice whatever of it. Then I turn to an instrument of quite another sort—a cornet or a bugle—and blow a blast that startles all of you—yet that one man still gives no heed to the sound! ... I try to attract his attention in another way. I place before him the daintiest dish that the cleverest cook in all England can prepare, or I bring some rare delicacy from a distant land—but he regards the food no more than he did the music. I will try another plan to reach his senses. I will bring Him the choicest flowers that were ever grown. I will hold them close to his face and let their fragrance ascend to his nostrils. Yet he heeds not! What will awake him? Let Heaven's thunder peals roll

like the drums in the march of some mighty war-lord, but the man moves not. Let the lightning flash all around us till it seems as though the end of the world had come, but the man stirs not. What shall I do to awake him? Shall I beat him with a whip, or strike him with a sword? All is in vain and, at last, I perceive that the man is dead and that all my efforts have been wasted! Now the riddle is solved, the secret revealed, the knot untied—the man is dead.

Mankind's most important pursuit is to know Jesus! It is not to know about Jesus—it is to know Him as Lord and Savior. It is to know His presence and goodness. It is to know and feel His love. For when we know God fully—we will love Him fully, and when we love Him fully, we will serve Him fully!

I want to remind you that, although Christ has been forsaken of men, He has not forsaken you and me. He came, He bled, He died! He gave His life a ransom for our sins. He rose victorious over sin and death and took His rightful place at the right hand of the Father. And now, we live and breathe to serve Him and make Him known. I urge you, as Paul urged the Roman Christians, "...by the mercies of God, that you present your bodies as a living and holy sacrifice, acceptable to God, which is your spiritual service of worship."

Sometimes You Gotta Stir Up the Water


By the time you read this, summer will be well on its way. But at the time of writing this piece, we were in the last vestiges of winter. May you be blessed...

My journey to church this morning revealed the beauty of God's creation in the flowers of spring. There is the reminder even in the third week of May that winter's grasp is not gone. It is Blackberry Winter now in the mountains

of North Carolina. Here and there, depending on your elevation, you can find pockets of white blanketing the landscape. Unlike the frozen precipitation, these are the tiny white flowers of the indigenous wild blackberries. They not only symbolize that in roughly two months, there will be the ripe, delectable berries for

which they are named, but it also symbolizes that the last cold spell is upon us. To many folks, the temperatures drop far below what is considered normal during this time of year. While there have been many summer-like days with temperatures nearing the 80's, during Blackberry Winter, there can even be a late frost with nighttime temperatures dropping near freezing or below.

While this seemingly unseasonable weather is not uncommon, it is still a shock to our senses. We quickly grow accustomed to the more leisurely days of warmth and look forward to the summertime, where living out-of-doors is more pleasant.



Why is it we so promptly become complacent in our lives and take the path of least resistance?

One could surmise that is simply our nature. We perceive the world around us through our senses, our natural instincts. When we rely on these alone, we are nothing more than the beasts of the field. Yet, God made us distinctly different from the wild animals of the forests and the beasts of the field. "That which is born of the flesh is flesh; and that which is born of the Spirit is spirit." Although we are of the earth, we have been given the ability to choose to serve a higher power — Yahweh. But too often, we get caught up in the worries and struggles of living from day to day and forget, if we knew at all, what our purpose is in life. Some never realize this or awaken to know God but live from birth to death in a valley of life where a shadow of death overshadows all that they do. "But the natural man receiveth not the things of the Spirit of God: for they are foolishness unto him: neither can he know them, because they are spiritually discerned."


It was in this vein of thought this past week that the scene of Jesus walking on the sea stood out.

First, in the Gospel of John, "And when even was now come, his disciples went down unto the sea, And entered into a ship, and went over the sea toward Capernaum. And it was now dark, and Jesus was not come to them. And the sea arose by reason of a great wind that blew. So when they had rowed about five and twenty or thirty furlongs, they see Jesus walking on the sea, and drawing nigh unto the ship: and they were afraid. 20 But he saith unto them, It is I; be not afraid. Then they willingly received him into the ship: and immediately the ship was at the land whither they went."

From the Gospel of Matthew, "And straightway Jesus constrained his disciples to get into a ship, and to go before him unto the other side, while he sent the multitudes away. And when he had sent the multitudes away, he went up into a mountain apart to pray: and when the evening was come, he was there alone. But the ship was now in the midst of the sea, tossed with waves: for the wind was contrary. And in the fourth watch of the night Jesus went unto them, walking on the sea. And when the disciples saw him walking on the sea, they were troubled, saying, It is a spirit; and they cried out for fear. But straightway Jesus spake unto them, saying, Be of good cheer; it is I; be not afraid. And Peter answered him and said, Lord, if it be thou, bid me come unto thee on the water. And he said, Come. And when Peter was come down out of the ship, he walked on the water, to go to Jesus."

Now, there is much to unwrap in these few lines of scripture. But if we focus on the idea of how the natural man perceives the world around him, and from this, either believes or rejects the supernatural, then we can find a greater meaning in this miracle. We see not only that Jesus walked on water, but that he called one out of the boat to do likewise. Yet, immersed in the surrounding passages are concepts that apply to us today.

"The disciples went down to the sea and entered into the ship. It was dark and Jesus had not come with them." The ship was their comfort zone. Several of his disciples had been fishermen. Their familiarity with the Sea of Galilee would have made this travel almost routine. Like so many things in our lives, we stick with what is familiar. Going outside of our box is uncomfortable, yet Jesus told his disciples at the end of the gospel of Matthew to, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations..." He wanted them to leave everything behind, going to the ends of the earth



Then there is the point that Jesus did not go with them, "It was dark, and Jesus had not come with them." As with Philip, when he said that "This he said to prove him knowing himself what he would do," it is probably safe to say that Jesus knew in advance that he would purposely surprise his disciples. Yet, he didn't just show up walking on the sea in the dark. It was far worse than that, for, "The sea arose by reason of a great wind which blew." In the last scene of episode 4 of Season 2 of the series "The Chosen," Peter makes a comment regarding the healing of the man by the pool on the Sabbath when Jesus could have easily waited, and Jesus replies, "Sometimes you gotta stir up the water."

The disciples knowingly went out on the Sea of Galilee at night. Was this by choice, or was this planned? The winds often pick up on large bodies of water during the day, so the night crossing would have been safer and easier under normal circumstances. But these were anything but normal circumstances. Remember their comfort zone – the boat? Knowing that these seasoned sailors would haven't been bothered by the night crossing, I like to think that Jesus did a little stirring up of the water that night. When we are shoved out of our comfort zone, it is then we realize we need Him most. So it was, that dark stormy night, after they had rowed 25 or 30 furlongs, they saw Jesus walking on the sea and drawing nigh unto their boat, and they were afraid. Yes, grown men, hardened sailors were now scared, so much so that Christ had to call to them, "It is I, be not afraid."

Now, the Gospel of Matthew next tells of how Peter, possibly not believing that it was really Jesus, calls out to the Spirit, "Lord, if it be thou, bid me come unto thee on the water." We must wonder if it was Peter's disbelief or was it the fact that he was emboldened by the miracle that he called out to Jesus. Nonetheless, Jesus answers and simply says, "Come." Peter then, fully vested in his belief, gets out of the boat.

Friends, this is the moment that we should all gasp!

For this is the exact parallel to our lives today. We have been asked to go to all nations, making disciples for Christ, yet, we cannot leave the church walls before we are swept back into the boat. We fail to even dare step out of our comfort zone for fear of drowning. Yes, it is a leap of faith. Yes, it is daring and will require more of your dedication and commitment than ever before, but think for a moment of those first few steps that Peter took.

For a few brief seconds, a man was walking on the substance that sustains life. It was not frozen; it was swashing all around; the sea was boisterous, scary, and dark. Yet, Peter stood on the water as if it were solid ground, as did the Son of God! For those brief seconds, Peter was able to walk again where Yahweh stood. When we step out in faith, the impossible becomes possible. When we put God at the center of our lives, we are no longer a slave to the sins of this world. We are set free.

Leaving the confines of our comfort level will never be easy. We cannot expect to succeed at every step. In fact, we will be forced to rely on Yahweh all the more. The next few steps that Peter took revealed how quickly we lose focus. For in that brief instance of time, as he stood on water, Peter quickly realized the tumultuous seas around him and began to sink. As John the Baptist told his disciples, "He must increase that I may decrease." And so it is with us. The more we give up, the more we rely on Him to provide for us.

Lastly, we see Peter returning to the ship with Jesus. As the Gospel of John tells it, "*They willingly received him into the ship*." Soaking wet, having nearly drowned, Peter is now humiliated but relieved to be back into the confines of the vessel. However, he is not alone, for Jesus is with them all. As we picture that dark night on the sea of Galilee, those men once more were shown how the impossible becomes possible when we give it all to God.

But there is one last thought to this story, one final twist - Christ got into the boat.

"So, what is your point," you ask?

"For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life. For God sent not his Son into the world to condemn the world; but that the world through him might be saved."

Getting into the boat, Jesus entered into their world. He didn't have to ride in a boat, yet, as God coming to earth in the form of a man, Christ got into the boat so that he could prove he too was the Son of Man.

When the weather turns cold after we've become accustomed to the warm, beautiful cloudless days of sunshine, let us not grow bitter, for the landscape becomes white of blooms of the Blackberry Winter. Let not your world be troubled by the change, but embrace it and seek to go beyond what is comfortable.

Take that step out in faith and watch what impossible becomes possible.

And remember, the first step might be the scariest, but it will always be remembered as the best.

God's Help

Any parent, babysitter, or daycare worker has seen a twoyear temper tantrum. It's not a pretty sight!

When my two-year-old son has one of those famous twoyear-old temper tantrums it's not because he is mad that I've taken away what he wants, or that he's not getting his way. It's because something is wrong, and he doesn't know how to tell me what is wrong.



I've learned that he's either hungry, thirsty, or tired. He knows something is not right, but he doesn't know how to tell me what is wrong. Maybe he doesn't even know what is wrong. He just knows that he is unhappy. So I give him one of those three things until he settles down.

As Christians, there are times in our lives when things aren't the way we think they should be. We know that we should pray, but we aren't sure what to pray for or even how to pray for it.

Thankfully, God helps us in this area. Paul told the believers in Rome, "And the Holy Spirit helps us in our weakness. For example, we don't know what God wants us to pray for. But the Holy Spirit prays for us with groanings that cannot be expressed in words. And the Father who knows all hearts knows what the Spirit is saying, for the Spirit pleads for us believers in harmony with God's own will" (Romans 8:26-27, NLT).

What's even more important, is to note that the Holy Spirit helps us with more than just prayer. For example in verse 26 is an explanatory phrase. Meaning, the Holy Spirit helps us in our weaknesses, and one of the ways that he helps us in our weaknesses is through prayer.

The help the Holy Spirit gives us isn't just a casual help. The text says that he "pleads" for us believers. The dictionary defines "pleads" as a request from someone on behalf of someone else, "To argue a case or cause" (Merriam-Webster's Collegiate Dictionary, 11th edition) or "to make an emotional appeal" (Concise Oxford English Dictionary).

In other words, this isn't a casual thing that the Holy Spirit does. He doesn't help us when he has free time, is in a good mood, or thinks that we deserve it. It's something he actively does on our behalf. It's part of who he is as a person.

My job as a loving parent is to give my son what he needs even when he doesn't know what he needs. And our loving God, who also is our spiritual parent, helps us when we don't know how to pray or what to pray for.





What a Bird's Nest Can Teach Us About God's Will

Snugly tucked away in the Old Testament book of Proverbs is one of the Bible's most beautiful verses on the subject of God's will. Proverbs 27:8 says:

"Like a bird that wanders from its nest is a man who wanders from his place." (N.K.J.V.)



A nest is the best place in all the world for a bird to be. It is nothing less than home. A bird in its nest is safe because predators can't harm it there. A bird in its nest is at rest because no bird can fly incessantly. A bird in its nest is perfectly natural because a bird standing in the middle of the interstate just seems wrong.

Of course, the primary reason why a bird builds a nest is to raise a family. The mother bird lays her eggs. She incubates those eggs. When the eggs hatch, she feeds the baby birds. When they are ready, she pushes them out of the nest so they can fly on their own and ultimately build their own nests.


By the way, this shows us that there is nothing wrong with a person moving away from the "nest" in which he or she was raised. Remember that it was God Himself who told Abraham to leave his hometown of Ur and move to a land that He would show him (Genesis 12:1). For that matter, most species of birds build new nests each year. So, obviously, Proverbs 27:8 isn't the Bible's way of forbidding us from ever leaving home or embarking on some new adventure in life.

Instead, the teaching is simply that each individual should strive to live every day in the center of God's will for his or her life. If His will means staying in the same spot where you've been for the last ten years, so be it. If it means making a change and building some type of new nest, that's okay too. The key is to always be at your post in life, the post where God has you stationed for the time being.

We get ourselves into trouble anytime we prematurely wander away from a nest where God wants us to remain. And most of us have faced this temptation, haven't we? "I'm tired of this job; I'm going to quit." "This town is driving me crazy; I need to try someplace new." "I've been playing this role long enough; it's time for somebody else to do it." "This marriage isn't working; surely there is someone else out there with whom I can be happier." Watch out, little bird, are you sure that leaving that nest is really God's will?

Perhaps today you are contemplating making a major change in your life. If you are, please know that I'm not trying to scare you out of going through with what you are planning. As I said, there are definitely times when God's will calls for us to change nests. Even a casual study of the Bible will offer evidence of that. What I am trying to do, though, is warn you about the dangers of wandering away from a place where God wants you to remain (at least for a little while longer). A bird in its nest is safe and at peace. A bird that has foolishly abandoned its nest isn't. That's why we should always make sure that we are moving at God's bidding and not our own. Keep this in mind as you consider whether or not to leave your current nest, and ask the Lord to always help you to be in your rightful place, wherever that might either keep you or take you.



The Grandpa Fish By Christy Lowman Burke County

the water.

If you haven't realized it by now, I am fascinated by animals that live in the ocean and have been that way since I was young. I recently learned about a fish that I have never heard

of, called a blobfish, fathead sculpin, or Psychrolutes maridus. This fish lives close to the ocean floor anywhere between 2000 to 4000 feet deep. It is about a foot long, its pink, gray, or white skin is gelatinous and its body is soft. They do not have teeth and eat whatever they can find, mainly crustaceans. Scientists don't know much about these fish and aren't sure where they live, but they have been found around Australia, Tasmania, and New Zealand. They know they live there because fishermen catch blobfish in their trawling nets. Most of them die from being caught in the nets, but those that are still alive are usually set free. It is unknown if they make it back to their habitat in

This fish is not a sought-after fish, meaning it's not one people eat. The blobfish doesn't have much flavor and has an odd texture.

the deep waters and survive from the shock of being brought up quickly through

When the blobfish is in its natural habitat it looks like any other fish, but when

it is brought to the surface in the trawling nets it loses its shape and looks like a gelatin blob. This is because deep in the ocean the water pressure is 120 times higher than that at the surface. This quick change in pressure deforms the blobfish. They do not have much body structure, only a partial backbone, and very few muscles. The blobfish does not have a swim bladder either, like most fish. The swim bladder's purpose is to help fish move around and maintain buoyancy, (being able to float in water).



These traits of the blobfish, the gelatin skin, minimal skeleton, and muscles, are common of all deepwater fish. God made them this way so they could survive the extreme pressure in the deep ocean water.

Once out of the water, this fish looks saggy and droopy. It looks like it has a nose, and it reminds me of a really old man.

When I saw this fish, it was a quick reminder of how we need to always make sure the elderly people in our community are taken care of. It's easy to forget them. Sometimes we get too busy or we just don't know what to say. Some seniors end up going to a nursing home to live when they get older, and sometimes it can be uncomfortable visiting there, but we must remember that the older people are valuable and need love and care too. It is our responsibility to help take care of them. They might just need someone to come and take out their trash, mow their lawn, bring them a meal or just come and keep them company. Sometimes they get extremely lonely just like we do when we don't see our friends.

One thing I have learned throughout the years is that if you will take the time out to spend time with these people, you in return will be blessed. I have made new friends, enjoyed hearing wonderful stories, and learned new things from elderly people.

It is especially important to remember them during the holidays when they are missing those that they love who have already passed. The holidays are wonderful times to visit them, bring them a card, and perhaps you will make a new friend. Most importantly, don't forget to tell them about Jesus!

Dear Lord, please help us to remember our senior citizens that live in our community. Help us, minister, to them and show Christ's love. We pray that you will use us to be a blessing to them. No Regrets a Tribute to My Dad

The young teenage boy received a phone call from his distraught mom, "I have caught your dad with another woman...they are at a motel near the house, will you go with me to confront them." The young boy had grown up in a dysfunctional home often seeing his mother hurt over the abuse of alcohol from his father and agreed to go with his mom. The young boy confronted his dad as a police of-



ficer would a criminals: Shoving him on the bed, pointing his finger in his face, almost daring his father to give him the slightest excuse to beat the daylights out of him.

I hope that no child would have to go through an experience like this; however, for many children, life is extremely hard because a lot of children come from broken families. And many are growing up in homes without fathers. I grew up in a dysfunctional family. My mom tried to make the best of a horrible situation. It is extremely hard to try to keep things normal, like birthday parties and holidays, when the occasion is always threatened by an intoxicated parent. To this day, I really do not know why my dad became an alcoholic. Of course, I understand all our vices are the result of sin, inherited and imputed sin nature, and temptation. We are born sinners and bent toward sinful behavior.

My relationship with my dad was not good. When I graduated from high school, I was glad to get as far away from home as I could. Although I always longed for a relationship with my dad. I loved him, but I did not like his drinking and the way he treated my mom. But, my problems followed me, I could not escape my family and my dad's problems.

Things got so bad at home my parents separated, and dad moved back east to the place I was attending college and the city he and my mom started life together twenty-three years prior. Dad was trying to make a go of it and straighten out his life. In less than a year he had been released from two jobs because of alcohol abuse. My problems did not go away, they followed me. I was struggling as well. I gave my life to Christ at sixteen and served the Lord faithfully for a while, but now in college, I was straddling the fence. The Lord was dealing with me and would not forsake me. The Lord chastised me as a Father would a son to get me where he wanted me to be. And, little did I know, God was dealing with my dad as well.

In my second year of college, God called me to preach the Gospel, and I surrendered to follow the Lord and enter full-time ministry. However, this change in my life did not change my dad. I had prayed for my dad for years to be saved and stop drinking. Alcohol had ruined his life and our family. In time, I had stopped praying for my dad. I never doubted God was listening, but my answer did not come soon enough. Dad would go through three rehab programs, but the promises he made would not last long and he would be back hitting the bottle.

My dad was kicked out of a rental house and was now living in a one-bedroom apartment. After an automobile crash and no income, I was forced to take my dad to live with his parents. The next morning my dad said to me "I hate you for bringing me here." The last place he wanted to be as a grown man was with his parents. Over the next couple of years, dad would lose his driver's license, and because he could not get alcohol, he would drink Listerine or any liquid or medicine that contained alcohol. Upon the passing of my grandparents, my dad's health would go down amazingly fast. My aunt never gave up on my dad. She took him in and tried to help him.

Dad was diagnosed with cardiomyopathy, which is a profoundly serious heart condition. Dad was told by the cardiologist if he did not stop drinking, he would not live. Alcohol was killing him. Dad would continue to drink, and his life was in a downward spiral.

In 2005 during Christmas, dad was in Memorial Mission Hospital because he had a major heart attack. He was on full life support with a heart pump and blood pressure medicine keeping him alive. After a couple of days, the doctors told us they had done all they could do. My family had to make the painful decision to stop all medical life support. It is like unplugging everything that is keeping a person alive. We were told we would have about thirty minutes with dad and he would pass away.

For the first few minutes keep my brother, sisters, mom and I held hands and prayed for my dad and what was taking place in that hospital room. What we did was give dad to the Lord and said, "Lord he is in your hands." What happened next is a miracle and according to doctors' records medically unexplainable.

My dad's eyes began to blink, and he looked up and said I want to live. These were the first words he had spoken in three days. We were shocked and rushed and got the cardiologist. Dad began to improve and the life-saving heart pump, life support, and blood pressure drip were not restarted. At nine o'clock that evening the doctor finally said "we are going to treat your dad as a living patient." God saved my dad's life that day and performed a miracle.

My dad gave his life to the Lord Jesus Christ. I was privileged to lead my dad to the Lord. For the next three years, I had a father I never had as a child. The father I longed for. We camped together and vacationed together. He enjoyed his grandchildren and spending time with his family. I praise the Lord. God gave my dad a second chance and dad tried his best to make the best of it. He never went back to the bottle; God set him free. I thank God for my dad, and I miss him terribly but praise God he is in heaven.

I would like to dedicate this article to my dad, Larry Dean Honeycutt. Happy Father's Day and God bless you all.

Founding Fathers and How They Served Our Country—Joseph Warren By David Streater, PhD Burke County

This is an American history educational moment of our Founding Fathers and how they served our Country.

Born on June 11, 1741, Joseph Warren graduated from Harvard in 1759. As a distinguished physician, he cared for

the poor and the wealthy. Some of his patients were John Adams, Paul Revere, William Dawes, and John Hancock.

Warren was a Freemason who supported independence and organized actions leading to the Revolution. He helped write the Suffolk Resolves, was the president of the Third Provincial Congress in Massachusetts, and was active with the Committee of Public Safety.

Joseph maintained his leadership in the Masonic Lodge, becoming the Grand Master of Continent America. Warren continued attending to the sick while establishing a hospital at Boston Harbor to combat smallpox.

On June 14, 1775, Warren was commissioned as a major general. However, Warren fought as a rank-and-file soldier in the Battle of Breed's Hill, commonly known as Bunker Hill, which he promised to do shortly before his commission to demonstrate his loyalty and patriotism. Unfortunately, in this battle, Joseph was shot and killed.

When exhumed from the battlefield for a proper burial, his body was identified by Paul Revere. Revere had made false teeth for Warren, using silver—the first example of "forensic dentistry in America."


Some historians have speculated that had Joseph Warren lived, George Washington would not have been as well known. Can you imagine going to Warren,

Revival

God's power surpasses all others and its most forceful expression is revival. There is no power like it on this side of Jesus' return. True revival must begin within the people of the church as an increased spiritual interest or renewal in the life of a church congregation (1 Peter 4:17). "Revival" means to "bring back

to life," to "restore to consciousness," or to "restore to a previous condition" or renewal of spiritual interest after spiritual neglect. Revival happens when God's people are prepared. It happens when we are ready for it with tender hearts and humble spirits. We can't orchestrate widespread far-reaching revivals, that's God's work. Revival begins within the church, people coming under deep conviction and crying out in confession and repentance for their sins.

A Revival does two things. It always includes the conviction of sin on the part of the Church and it causes the conversion of men and women. Because when our hearts are tender, we humble ourselves and weep before Him, and God hears our cries. Revival is birthed within a heart of humility. Humility is the first action God's people must take to experience revival. Without humility, we will not pray to seek God's face and turn from sinful ways experiencing a pure heart. We must fall before God in humble repentance for our sin, gratitude for His goodness, and dependence on His Spirit's strength. The same humility that is necessary for the lost to find salvation is necessary for the saved to experience revival. The proud fail to see their sin as God sees it, a truth that was illustrated by the life of Saul. "A true revival is nothing short of a revolution, casting out the spirit of worldliness and selfishness, and making God and His love triumph in our heart and life."

We only have a heart of helplessness without our dependence on God. God can only work in our lives when we realize our need for Him. The same Word that proclaims "without me ye can do nothing (John 15:5)", assures that "with God, nothing shall be impossible" (Luke 1:37). When we stand before God, convinced of our inability to serve Him on our own, but yet we are fully persuaded of His far-surpassing power to work in and through us as we yield to His Will; it is our dependence on Him that equips us to courageously fight the battles He has given us to endure while falling on our knees in desperation before Him. A coming revival must begin with great and earnest prayer! A place in a quiet corner, church members gathering together at special times to spend in prayer, in a closet, or behind closed doors personally or within a designated group setting. Bowing in humility we realize we do not deserve any of God's goodness! But, with a heart of gratitude, God will give and will continue to give every single blessing we need to bless others and to be strengthened in His glory. "For all things come of thee, and of thine own have we given thee" (1 Chronicles 29:14). A revival is a new beginning in our hearts and the hearts of church members of obedience to God.

There is a law of sin that dwells within our flesh. We are weak but also a deciding link. One way leads to God and everything that is truly good. The other way leads to evil (sin, Satan, the flesh, spirit of worldly sin, and everlasting death). We must die to self as we are a product of sin. We have to humble ourselves and put aside those parts of ourselves that we know are not of Divine Persuasion and transform those dark places into light: the Light of God. "For ye were sometimes darkness, but now are ye light in the Lord: walk as children of light: (for the fruit of the Spirit is in all goodness and righteousness and truth;" (Romans 5:8-9). There are forces at work that are trying to prevent our acceptance of God and His truth in His Word. We are to "have no fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness, but rather reprove them" (Romans 5:11). When we recognize our fleshly pride, ask God in prayer to strengthen us to serve Him with humility, and renew our mind daily through God's Word, we can become more like Christ. (Read Romans Chapter 5). With God's strength, we can overcome!

Spiritual life includes a sense of connection to something bigger than ourselves, and it involves a search for meaning in life which, only God can fulfill. It is a journey toward seeking God's face through His Word and prayer. It is our special place with our Heavenly Father, a place of importance to our beliefs and faith in Jesus Christ. Strength of heart and strength of mind must be instilled in us while a growing path toward absolute faith is encouraged.

The fields are full; the workers are few. You can be the spark that ignites the

revival! Revivals don't just happen! No, God must be involved; but it starts with one or two. A personal revival has to begin with absolute faith in the individual's heart, mind, and soul. Whatever is not from faith is sin! It is sin that blocks the Holy Spirit in the human heart. Without our obedience to God, there will be no personal revival when the Holy Spirit speaks to us about the condition of our heart. There is a reason God brings conviction and we must confess our NEED for Revival. It is our opportunity to repent and be revived in righteous living. It is a renewal – a fresh inflow of life, love, and power of God. When revival breaks out, God breaks in. The gospel finds new people who need God in their life, and Christians find new ways of presenting Jesus to those God puts in our path. Revival may start small with two or three, but it thrives in a crowd. Revival happens when God's people are prepared. It happens when we are ready with tender hearts and humble spirits. Revival often begins with people coming under deep conviction. Pray that people will listen and come under God's conviction crying out in confession and repentance for their sins. Revival does not occur outside the realm of prayer. As our world slips into darkness, pray that a small spark will start to build in someone that has turned on the Light, God's Light. Pray that it not only starts in our hearts but right here in our community.

God is wanting to send revival, but He needs channels of believers, Christians. Revival is the outflow of the Spirit of God through the regenerated spirit of man (see John 7:37-39). God took strong men and women to pieces and put them together again for His glory. We are an earthen vessel. Our purpose is to display God's power. The transforming power of God is also the transferable power of God. The Holy Spirit empowered Jesus' followers at Pentecost (Acts 2) and has since been available to all who believe in Jesus as their Savior. If we receive revival, you and I are to be ready to receive the full blessing of God and to be channels through whom that blessing can flow. Please pray that our church will receive a revival and that we may see what God can do.

Limit The Potential For Damage

Dear Dave,

My husband started working at a new company about a year ago. As part of his sign-on, they gave him \$5,000 in company stock. The stock has nearly doubled in value since then, and we were wondering if we should buy more, considering how well it has done.



Dear Cathi,

I totally get why you two might be excited over a stock that doubled in value over a year. But what you're talking about doing right now is a very risky proposition. The truth is any stock that doubles in value over just one year is highly volatile. It's unusual for stocks to do things like that, and it also means it could go down just as fast—or even faster.

I don't know where you and your husband are in your overall financial situation, but I recommend people become debt-free except for their homes, and have an emergency fund of three to six months of expenses saved up before investing. Once you reach that point, I strongly advise you to begin putting 15 percent of your income toward retirement before you start any outside investing.

Don't get me wrong, I don't mind a little selective and educated dabbing here and there once the basics are taken care of first. However, I'd never recommended putting more than 10 percent of your nest egg into a single stock. The reason? If the single stock tanks and you lose it all, then your loss is only a blip on your financial radar.

Of course, it would be fantastic if this single stock went through the roof and you two made a ton of money. Just make sure you limit the potential for damage in this kind of scenario by limiting your exposure.

"Something to Think About" Heavenly Living on Earth

Psalm 139 is a Psalm that I would encourage you to really get familiar with. It teaches us three tremendous truths about God. It teaches us that God is omniscient. Omniscient means all-knowing. He knows our acts, v2. He

knows our thoughts, v3. He knows our words, v4. And notice in v6 that this fact was more than David's brain could take in. In other words, it blew his mind.

Truth number two in this Psalm is that God is omnipresent. Omnipresent means He is ever-present at all times. Look at verses 7-12.

The third truth in this Psalm is that God takes a special interest in every person! Look at v13. The word possessed means to create or to form. The Hebrew word translated reins literally means kidneys. It simply refers to our innermost parts. Back in that day, the kidneys were looked upon as the seat of a person's thoughts, feelings, and actions. David sums up this truth by saying that we are fearfully and wonderfully made in v14. But he's not finished yet. Look at what he says in v15-16. The word substance means embryo. So the Bible tells me that God custom-designed every part and every inch of my body. Then David tells us in v16 that God even wrote down in a book everything about us before we were fully developed. Then in v17-18, David concludes this section by saying that we are continually on God's mind. In other words, He thinks about us day and night. You are so special to God that He never gets you off His mind! WOW---let that sink in for a moment! SO I want to show you how you can enjoy heavenly living on earth by simply embracing the following three simple truths. The first truth is this:

I'm Fearfully and Wonderfully Made—v14 Regardless of how you feel about yourself. Regardless of how big or small you are. Regardless of what kind of personality you have. Regardless of everything about you------YOU are fearfully and wonderfully made. I'm Always on God's Mind—v17-18 If His thoughts of you are like the sands of the sea, then you are always on His mind. If you embrace these three truths you can and will experience heavenly living on earth and that my friend is really something for each of us to think about!

Truth or Consequences

Sharing God's Truth in a Subjective World

Let's face it. We live in a world where our view of truth has become subjective. The moral absolutes that have guided society for thousands of years suddenly have become relative. What's right for one person is wrong for another. And if we question the status quo, we are labeled "intolerant."



Many people don't want to acknowledge an absolute truth because they don't want to face their sin. If there is no absolute truth, then how could there be an absolute morality? And if there is no morality, there is no sin. They believe the absence of absolute truth is a license to do what they want. They see it as freedom. But ultimately, we know that "freedom" is false. Sin is nothing but bondage – a set of chains that leads to destruction and despair.

Regardless of what the world says, there are still many people in the world who are searching for something deeper. They are searching for truth. That truth is only found in Jesus Christ. But they can only know it if we, as believers, are willing to step out in faith and share that truth with them.

So, how do we share God's truth in such a subjective world?

Truth, by its own definition, is very narrow. Only the right answer is true. Everything else is false. Real truth doesn't change. Someone can believe that 2+2 is 5, but it doesn't change the math. The answer is 4. When we talk with others about absolute truth, we can remind them that they can believe whatever they like, but their belief alone doesn't make it true. We can encourage them to pursue truth, not mere opinion, belief, or whatever is politically correct at the moment.

Once someone is truly open to knowing the truth, then we have an open door to present God's truth. But as 1 Peter 3:15 admonishes us, we must do this with gentleness and respect. Don't push. Ask permission before you share about spiritual matters. Some people will be open to listening. Others will not. Respect their wishes, and pray for another opportunity. But if they are willing, proceed with compassion and concern for their eternity.


Share what God has done in your life. Your story is powerful because it is unique and personal. Don't be afraid to be vulnerable and share how God has changed your life.

Keep the focus off what the world says and on what God has said and done. True freedom only comes from knowing the truth. The truth of God's word is what the person needs to be set free (John 8:32). If at all possible, keep distractions at a minimum while explaining the greatest news of all.

Allow the Holy Spirit to speak to the person's heart. Remember, it's not our job to convict people of their sins. That's the Holy Spirit's job. It is our job to share the Gospel. But always ask if they are ready to take that final step and accept the free gift of eternal life through Jesus Christ. They might just say, Yes!



I could go on and on about the enormous outlay of time and money my dad supplied and I could endlessly address the heartache, and yes torture that I caused my father in my youth. I cannot name a single time that my father was not there for me, no matter what. No matter what covers a lot of stuff that I'm too embarrassed to share in this forum. 



The Inspiring Word

Jeremiah 6:16

Jeremiah's ministry took place at a time when the people of Israel were deep into spiritual wickedness. Israel had sinned against God to the point He was ready to give them over to captivity. Israel did go into captivity in just a few short years. While Israel stood on the edge of God's judgment. He still wanted to see Israel repent



and turn back to Him. Jeremiah 6:16 reads; "Thus saith the LORD, Stand ye in the ways, and see, and ask for the old paths, where is the good way, and walk therein, and ye shall find rest for your souls. But they said, We will not walk therein."

From this verse, I get the image of a traveler who has come to a fork in the road. He has the liberty to go any way he chooses, but God wants him to "...ask for the old paths, where is the good way..." Our traveler could blindly choose a path to travel hoping for the best, or our traveler could stop and seek God's direction before moving on. Today in our fast-paced lives filled with GPS and technology galore we often fail to stop and seek God's direction before deciding. We feel we have the answers to life's problems, the simple and complicated. We present ourselves as vulnerable targets for the devil's temptation. The Lord wants His people on the right path one that will lead them in His direction. While this verse was spoken as a word of correction to the Jews many years ago there is a lesson in this verse for today's church. It is my opinion the Lord would still have His people "...ask for the old paths..." We must agree the Lord has warned us against the wrong path and has provided us direction for the right path. His people, the church today, are responsible for walking the one which God has ordained, it is the one He can bless, it is the one that honors Him.

The history of Israel as recorded in the Bible has us understanding God's command to not allow false prophets or leaders to take them astray. This was a fundamental requirement of their faith. The Israel of Jeremiah's day was to look back at men like Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Moses, Joshua, and others for examples to pattern their decisions after. They were men of faith and obedience. God required Israel to not take just any path but to take time and find the right path, the old well-worn path. Even though it will have hills and rocks it is still the best path because it is God's path.

I want to share a story with you about finding the right direction. At the battle of the Bulge during World War II there was a group of German soldiers who dressed in Allied uniforms. These Germans also used captured American military vehicles and went through the German countryside changing road signs. When American troops came to the various crossroads, they were fooled many times being led off in the wrong direction. This deception by the Germans almost gained victory in this key battle. The difference was stopping, taking time to radio ahead, and confirm location and direction. God has provided a way to reach out and a command for us to do so, through our Bibles and prayer.

Too often we come to crossroads where Satan has changed the road signs. Here are a few of the changes he has fooled many into following. Is Salvation only through the Blood, we read in Hebrews 9:22 "And almost all things are by the law purged with blood; and without shedding of blood is no remission." Our belief in Scripture has been wrongly changed, notice 2 Timothy 3:16 "All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness:" There are 66 books, 1,189 chapters, 41,173 verses, 774,746 words, and 3,566,480 letters in the KJV Bible. Every ounce of God's Word is the infallible, inerrant, inspired Word of God. How has our love for the church been changed when we consider Hebrews 10:25 "Not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is; but exhorting one another: and so much the more, as ye see the day approaching." How about the reality of Heaven and Hell being changed considering John 14:1-3 "Let not your heart be troubled: ye believe in God, believe also in me. (2) In my Father's house are many mansions: if it were not so, I would have told you. I go to prepare a place for you. (3) And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again, and receive you unto myself; that where I am, there ye may be also." And Psalms 9:17 "The wicked shall be turned into hell, and all the nations that forget God." Does the lack of concern regarding the sharing of our faith show the value of the human soul being compromised? What does Mark 8:36-37 have to say? "For what shall it profit a man, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul? (37) Or what shall a man give in exchange for his soul?" We also talk about Jesus' soon return but do we follow the right path? Here is what 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18 reminds us to be mindful of. "But I would not have you to be ignorant, brethren, concerning them which are asleep, that ye sorrow not, even as others which have no hope. (14) For if we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so them also which sleep in Jesus will God bring with him. (15) For this we say unto you by the word of the Lord, that we which are alive and remain unto the coming of the Lord shall not prevent them which are asleep. (16) For the Lord himself shall descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trump of God: and the dead in Christ shall rise first: (17) Then we which are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds, to meet the Lord in the air: and so shall we ever be with the Lord. (18) Wherefore comfort one another with these words." And here is God's Word from Revelation 20:12 about the matter "And I saw the dead, small and great, stand before God; and the books were opened: and another book was opened, which is the book of life: and the dead were judged out of those things which were written in the books, according to their works." I will close with one last example and a question. Have we been led down the wrong path regarding God's Holiness? Have we tried to bring God down to man's level? Let's consider Isaiah 6:3 "And one cried unto another, and

said, Holy, holy, is the LORD of hosts: the whole earth is full of his glory." Along with 1 Peter 1:16 "Because it is written, Be ye holy; for I am holy."

Much more can be written about this subject, but I will not indulge myself with any more of this publisher's precious space. Friends when the Lord tells us to "ask for the old paths, where is the good way" it's because those old paths have been walked out by men and women of faith who have their walk recorded in the pages of our Bible. Let's be careful to not allow Satan the opportunity to misdirect us.

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. (April 21, 2021) — The commercial sexual exploitation (CSE) of children in North Carolina and the United States is a growing public health crisis, disproportionately impacting young people served by the child welfare and mental health systems. Crossnore School & Children's Home and Youth Villages are excited to announce a new partnership to address this issue for children in North Carolina's child welfare system. The partnership is called Project Safe Home: A Pathway to Resilience. Youth Villages serves young people in 24 states across the country by providing a wide range of programs that utilize evidence-based and research-informed interventions to help them thrive. In North Carolina alone, Youth Villages serves more than 5,000 young people annually through community-based family services, high fidelity wraparound, and transitional living services. King David acknowledged his sin and knew in his heart God had heard and forgiven him.

There are many benefits we get from praying. Philippians 4:6-7 "Be careful for nothing; but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which passeth all understanding, shall keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus." Paul wrote these words to the church at Philippi while he was under arrest. One of the most important bills of this legislative session is Senate Bill 405 – Born-Alive Abortion Survivors Protection Act, of which I am a cosponsor. Primary sponsors are Senators Joyce Krawiec, Lisa Barnes, and Amy Galey. This bill is very similar to Senate Bill 359, of the same name, which I sponsored in 2019. Gov. Cooper vetoed Senate Bill 359 and Democrats' votes in both the Senate and House sustained the Governor's veto of a bill to require health care practitioners to provide the same care for every living baby in North Carolina, even those born alive despite an abortion. So here we are this year with a very similar bill, which includes the following:

- Recognizes that a child born alive despite an abortion is a legal person under the laws of North Carolina.
- Requires health care practitioners to use the same level of care for children born alive during an abortion, as they would for any other child born alive at the same gestational age, and also preserve the life and health of that child, including transporting and admitting the child to a hospital.
- Charges a health care practitioner who does not provide that care with a Class 1 misdemeanor, which could include up to 120 days of jail time with a fine of up to \$250,000.
- Requires health care practitioners or any employee of a hospital, a physician's office, or an abortion clinic to report a health care practitioner who does not care for a child born alive. If they do not, they would be charged with a Class 1 misdemeanor, which could include up to 120 days of jail time with a fine of up to \$250,000.
- Protects the mother by barring her from prosecution for not providing medical care or reporting a lack of medical care for a child born alive despite an abortion.
- Creates a civil claim for a woman whose child was born alive despite an abortion and the healthcare provider failed to provide care, and if care was not provided and it was not reported by someone required to report.
- Amends the existing murder statute to include "an intentional, overt act performed after the child is born alive."

It is truly heartbreaking that this legislation is even needed. Although Gov. Cooper claims that this practice does not exist, numerous accounts do exist of infants left to die following an abortion either overtly or from lack of care. Jill Stanek, a nurse who worked at a Chicago hospital that performed induced birth abortions, witnessed an aborted Down syndrome baby, born alive, who was thrown in a soiled utility room to die. She said, "I could not bear the thought of this suffering child dying alone, so I cradled and rocked him for the 45 minutes that he lived."

I look forward to the House passing this bill so it can be sent to the Governor. And I would call on Gov. Cooper to sign this bill that clarifies and strengthens the punishment for not providing care to a living, breathing newborn infant.

The month of May has been a particularly busy at the General Assembly. Several deadlines for legislation to be introduced and for passage of certain bills in the House or Senate occurred in May. I would say that it was certainly one of the busiest times of the legislative calendar. Over 1200 bills have been introduced in the NC House of Representatives alone. Bills that pass the House are sent to the Senate. Bills that passed the Senate then go to the House. If a bill is approved by both House and Senate, it then goes to the Governor for his signature or veto.

I have been selective in only sponsoring 83 bills. Of these 83 bills, I am a primary sponsor of 23. In all that I sponsor and support, I am animated by the belief that government exists to protect our God-given natural rights. Government power over our individual lives should be limited as much as possible. However, we know that is not the world we live in. So, it requires vigilance to monitor the legislative process in the effort to limit encroachments appropriately. Thus, several of the bills I am supporting represent an effort to reclaim and expand personal choice in education, health care, public safety, and social services.

The legislature now moves on to crafting a budget that I am confident will continue our commitment to fiscal responsibility, staying within the parameters of population growth and inflation on spending, and continuing to carefully lower tax burdens. This year's budget process starts with the Senate. The Senate will adopt a budget and submit it to the House. The House will respond with its own budget proposal. Senate and House then will appoint members to achieve a single budget document by resolving differences between the two. Once this is done, the budget is submitted to the governor. As you may recall, Governor Cooper vetoed the last budget. "Minibudgets" were developed to address some issues on which the governor would agree. However, there were important issues left unresolved from the veto. It is certainly to be hoped the governor will decide to support this session's new budget once it is finalized by the legislature. We continue to talk with his staff in hopes of arriving at a budget he will sign.

It is hard to believe we are almost halfway through 2021. My wife and I have been enjoying weekend hikes in the cooler weather but with June arriving, western NC residents know to prepare for hotter days ahead.

In business taking place at the NC General Assembly, we are preparing for the release of the state's biannual budget that this year originates in the NC Senate. As co-chair of the Senate Committees on Finance and Appropriations on Justice and Public Safety, I have been personally involved in preparing the JPS budget and formulating a robust tax reduction package that will continue to focus on responsible budgeting and the philosophy that taxpayer money belongs to the people who earned it, not to the government. The proposed Republican tax cut plan would reduce the personal income tax rate from 5.25% to 4.99% (It was 7.98% in 2010), increase the standard deduction from \$21,500 to \$25,500 (it was \$6000 in 2010), and increase the child tax deduction by \$500 to \$3000 per child. With these changes, a family of four would pay zero income tax on the first \$31,500 of income. These changes would be a 21% tax cut for a family of four earning the median household income of \$54,000. For the past decade, North Carolina has led the nation in tax reform policy under Republican leadership, and as a result, our state's economy is booming and people and businesses are moving here at record levels. This is evidenced by the fact that NC was just allocated another congressional seat in the 2020 census. Our Democratic colleagues have often criticized Republican tax cuts saying that we won't have enough money to operate the government. Yet our state revenues are at an all-time high and we have had strong budget surpluses for 6 of the past 7 years. North Carolina's average teacher pay ranking has gone from 47th in the nation to 29th since 2011, and now our teachers have the second-highest average salary in the Southeast. Per pupil spending has also increased by 39% under Republican leadership. As we enter a new decade, I look forward to continuing the conservative philosophy of reducing taxes on our citizens, so that they -rather than state government- can keep and spend more of their own hard-earned money.

I wanted to update you on what my team and I have accomplished this month: From Washington:

Over the course of this month, I introduced and co-sponsored several important bills, including the Veterans Fellowship Act. This bill prioritizes our veterans and opens up new and unique pathways towards employment. This new fellowship program will build upon the success of other fellowship programs across the country. I am confident that it will empower unemployed veterans to find meaningful work in this post-COVID economy. There are immense benefits that will come from this legislation. It will give eligible veterans the ability to find relevant job experience while earning a necessary monthly stipend. I will always fight for our courageous veteran community in NC-11, and this bill is a bipartisan measure that puts veterans and their interests first. I am happy to report that the House Committee on Veterans' Affairs passed an amendment that includes this legislation I authored. Following the passage of this amendment out of the House Veteran Affairs Committee, the next step for this legislation will be a vote on the House floor!

I am proud to announce that I introduced the "Donument" Act on the House floor. This bill would protect the southern border wall built by President Trump by creating a "Southern Border Wall National Monument." This is the first step towards finishing the wall and protecting the longevity of our immigration security.

I also introduced H.R. 2389 on the House floor. This vital bill establishes a mental health framework to provide adequate mental health care to Capitol Police officers. Specifically, this bill prevents the Chief of the United States Capitol Police from retaliating or imposing "undue" disciplinary actions against officers who seek wellness services, including trauma counselors. It authorizes the USCP Chief to appoint a such number of trauma counselors as is necessary to maintain high morale and instructs the USCP administration to investigate the feasibility of outside vendors providing trauma counselors.

I co-sponsored Rep. Biggs's bill, the No Vaccine Passports Act. This act prevents a federal agency or a federal property from issuing or requiring a COVID-19 Vaccine Passport. COVID-19 passports have no place in our society and should not be mandated by the federal government. Our country needs less government control, not more.

I am proud to be an original co-sponsor of the Finish The Wall Act. This bill requires the Secretary of Homeland Security to FINISH THE WALL! This bill actively prevents the Secretary of Homeland Security from canceling border construction contracts. It requires that all appropriated funds sent to the wall are spent accordingly. The Finish The Wall Act requires the Secretary of Homeland Security to send a plan to Congress regarding the implementation of border wall system elements and technology. In addition, this bill also protects all agreements regarding the border wall with associated parties.

I was proud to join Rep. Perry as a co-sponsor of the WINGMAN Act. This bipartisan legislation will cut months of bureaucracy, so veteran advocates can support our veterans with claims in the Department of Veterans Affairs. This bill will help our heroic NC-11 veterans get the support they deserve.

This month I also signed various letters alongside my colleagues to address several topics relevant to NC-11. I joined my colleagues in writing to Speaker Pelosi, who invited President Biden to deliver his first Joint Address to Congress on a day when the House isn't even in Washington. We requested the joint address be rescheduled to a day when all Members of Congress can be present.

I signed an important letter requesting the Biden Admin to eliminate the records request backlog at the National Personnel Records Center. These requests come from veterans and their families who need these records to attain essential resources. Our veterans need our support. Absent these records, veterans and their families cannot receive COVID-19 vaccinations, GI Bill education benefits, V.A. loans, medical benefits, burial benefits, disability compensation, life insurance, and other resources. I urged the Biden Administration to address this issue immediately.

I also signed a letter to the Director of the CDC requesting they provide us with info regarding how they concluded that children ages 2+ should wear face masks to mitigate the spread of COVID-19. Children have difficulties with wearing masks, especially those with disabilities. The evidence indicates that there is a lower risk of contraction and spread of COVID-19 amongst children. My constituents shouldn't have to be mandated to force a mask on their young children. The families of NC-11 deserve answers to these questions.

I was also proud to join my colleagues in writing to Secretary Vilsack regarding his decision to cancel the Farmers to Families Food Box Program. This program was created with bipartisan funds to help our agriculture supply chain and provide food for vulnerable populations during the pandemic. We urge Secretary Vilsack to continue the Farmers to Families Food Box Program, an essential program in my district. This program supports farmers in NC-11 who provide food and support to our communities who are in need.

I joined my colleagues in writing to Speaker Pelosi and Leader McCarthy opposing the use of two tax provisions that would undermine the financial security of American families, small businesses, farmers, and ranchers in NC-11 and America. These harmful provisions must not be implemented. I also signed a letter to Biden demanding he permits states to claim much-needed tax reductions. Biden's American Rescue Plan unfairly infringes on the ability of North Carolina businesses to operate.

I also joined my colleagues in sending a letter to Sen. Schumer and Leader McConnell regarding the anti-2A Biden nominee for the ATF, David Chipman. The Director of ATF shouldn't be a career gun-control activist and lobbyist. The nominee should DEFEND our Second Amendment rights, not act with his personal bias to attack the Second Amendment and disarm law-abiding Americans.

I was proud to have joined Rep. Dan Bishop urging our North Carolina Governor not to institute a vaccine passport in North Carolina. My NC-11 constituents' constitutionally protected liberties must not be infringed. Vaccine passports are political tools that my constituents want no part of.



Chartwells K12 New Cafeteria Program Promotes Food Sustainability

Burke County Public Schools and Chartwells K12 support food sustainability with a new program called the Piggy Bank that feeds local pigs food waste from school cafeterias. Marty

Browning, a pig farmer in Nebo, picks up leftovers from the cafeteria line each Friday at schools in western Burke County. The food slated for Browning's pigs cannot be donated to local nonprofits or shelters because the food is not sealed or packaged.

Daniel Wall, director of BCPS Child Nutrition, said, "We really appreciate Marty taking the extra food from the cafeterias. Before we just had to dump the food into landfills, so this is a way of making our school system more sustainable by giving the animals something to eat and also teaching the kids about sustainability."

BCPS Interim Superintendent Dr. Mike Swan said, "This new partnership with Mr. Browning is a great way for our cafeterias to make a positive impact on the

environment. We're also glad we can help a local farmer keep his livestock fed. This is an amazing new avenue for the school system to take to become more environmentally friendly."


In the future, BCPS cafeterias plan to expand the program to include student participation. There will be a separate disposal bin, the Piggy Bank, at the trash cans designated for food waste to go to Browning's farm.



Browning is one of the only farmers in western North Carolina the USDA has licensed in its garbage feeding program. To be licensed, Browning has to agree to allow the USDA to regulate his practices to ensure the pigs are eating appropriately. This includes cooking the food waste to a certain temperature and cooling it before the pigs can consume the product. An inspector visits his farm to test pigs' blood to make sure they are healthy.

Browning said "I really want to thank Mr. Wall and the Burke County Child Nutrition Program for their consideration in my effort of feeding pigs and for donating garbage to the program. I appreciate the USDA for allowing me to be a part of the program for 30 plus years."







Does It Really Matter?

We live in a pragmatic society in which individuals believe that the end justifies the means. Those holding to this philosophy regard the means as irrelevant as long as it produces something that is perceived to be good. Therefore, stealing may be justified in certain settings as may lying and many other sins the Bible condemns. This faulty philosophy stems from the idea that truth is relative instead of absolute. By regarding the truth



as relative, individuals are free to create their own standard by which to live. The standard for one may be different from the standard of another, but both may be right, even if both are contradictory. Logica says that two contradictory ideas cannot both be right, though they might both be wrong. Does the end justify the means? The Bible clearly teaches and illustrates that such a philosophy is wrong and must be avoided

During the reign of Saul, the ark of the covenant was foolishly taken into battle as though it were a good luck charm. Israel was defeated, and the ark was captured by the Philistines. After God judged them, they determined to send it back to the nation of Israel. But it was David who determined that it needed to be returned to its rightful place in Jerusalem (2 Samuel 6, 1 Chronicles 13). That which he desired to do was a good thing. In fact, we would most likely commend him for taking this initiative.

David consulted with 30,000 chosen men, and they determined to bring the ark back to Jerusalem. To facilitate it, they got a brand new cart – after all, it was the ark of the covenant. They took great care as they began making their way back to Jerusalem in what must have an impressive processional. There was great celebration as the ark was being returned to Jerusalem.

The festive tone suddenly changed when they entered the threshing floor owned by Nachon. There, the oxen stumbled slightly, causing the cart to shake. To steady the ark, Uzza touched the ark of the covenant, and God immediately struck him dead. The Bible teaches that David was displeased with what God had done (2 Samuel 6:8). To David, God acted unjustly. Rather than continuing the journey, they took it to a man's house named Obededom where it remained for three months.

The problem was not in the fact that David desired to return the ark to its rightful place in Jerusalem. The problem was in the method he chose to transport the ark. God said it was to be carried by the Levites. Although David placed it on a new cart, that mode of transportation was not what God had instructed. When they went to get the ark from Obededom three months later, David had a much different perspective. David gathered the Levites and acknowledged that they "sought him [God] not after the due order" (1 Chronicles 15:13).

Does the end justify the means? David ignored the means of transporting the ark, and it cost the life of Uzzah. Whenever you are tempted to consider a particular method, learn from the example of David and consult God through the Word of God and prayer. Be assured, God will never lead you in a manner that contradicts His Word.





Walking in the Light

1 John 1:6-7 says, "If we say that we have fellowship with him, and walk in darkness, we lie, and do not the truth: But if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship one with another, and the blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth us from all sin."



In the two verses we have read, John draws a contrast between walking in darkness and walking in the light. Have you ever sought to go out on a dark night, with no flashlight, and try to find your way through the darkness and its dangers? It is so much better to do your outside movement when it is daylight. You can see so much better when there is light to help you move from place to place.

Just like in John's day, some people say they are in fellowship with God but are walking in darkness. When you walk in darkness, you are living in such a way that you rarely think about God at all. And if you do think about Him, you do not think of Him as light in whom there is no darkness at all. When we claim to be a member of a church we are saying, "We have fellowship with God." Some may try to present that picture when it is not true in their lives.

When we walk in darkness or sin, we are walking in the wrong atmosphere. The kingdom of darkness is one that has a king. The Scriptures tell us there are two kingdoms in this world. There is the kingdom of God and the kingdom of evil, the kingdom of light and the kingdom of darkness, the kingdom of holiness and the kingdom of sin.

When we are born into this world, we are brought under the kingdom of darkness. That kingdom represents everything this is opposed to God, His holiness and perfection, plus, everything that is in opposition to His plan and His purpose.

The only way to get into the kingdom of light is to know the Lord Jesus Christ as your personal Savior. Jesus said something in John 12:26 we dare not miss. In John 12:46

Jesus said, "I am come a light into the world, that whosoever believeth on me should not abide in darkness."

It is your choice whether you will remain in darkness, or whether you will find a new way of life by knowing Christ as Lord and Savior. Sometimes in life, we make wrong choices, but when it comes to eternal life, you had better not make the wrong choice. It is of the utmost importance that you receive the Light of the World, the Lord Jesus Christ, so darkness can be dispelled from your life.

What does "walking in the light" involve?

The Consid<mark>eration</mark> of a Person

When we think of walking in the light we think of Christ. Jesus said, "I am the light of the world: he that followeth me shall not walk in darkness, but shall have the light of life." (John 8:12). Maybe when Christ spoke these words, the sun may have been rising, so in light of that, He compared himself to the rising sun. To the Jew, the sun was a symbol of Jehovah's God. I John 1:5 says, "God is light."

No one can walk in the light unless they have established a personal relationship with the right person, the Lord Jesus Christ.

Jesus is the darkness-removing person. The way to cure the darkness of the soul without Christ is to let His light shine brightly into our lives.

Light reveals dirt and dust. Look at one of your windows when bright sunlight is making its way into the house and you will see the dust floating through the air, which you did not realize was present. When the light of Christ shines, the wickedness of man is revealed.

Christ is a darkness dispelling person. In describing the believer, the apostle Paul said, "For ye were sometimes darkness, but now are ye light in the Lord: walk as children of light" (Eph.5:8). Our darkness is seen as something that is a past condition and not a present one. The entrance of the light of Christ drives the darkness away. According to the Scripture, "Ye are a chosen generation, a royal priesthood, an holy nation, a peculiar people; that ye should shew forth the praises of him who hath called you out of darkness into his marvellous light" (1 Peter 2:9).

Christ is a delightful person. There is no one exactly like Him in the whole universe. The Bible calls Him "above all" (John 3:31). There is not another person who has lived, who is living now, or who will live that could rightly say they are above Him. Christ is the highest of the high.

Christ is a dependable person. He is many times called "faithful" in the Word of God (I Cor.1:9; I Cor.10:13; I Thess. 5:21; 2 Thess.3:3; Heb.11:11; I Jn.1:9; Rev.1:5). A recognition of and a resignation to Jesus is essential to walking in the light.

The Co-operation with the Word

Remember the man by the name of Enoch in Genesis 5? According to Gen.5:24, he walked with the Lord; he was walking in the light.

When the Lord told Enoch He was going to take him from the earth, from his friends and loved ones, from his earthly responsibilities, there is no evidence he argued with the Lord about it. He could have said, "Now Lord, I would love to go and be with you in Heaven, but I just don't want to leave my friends and loved ones on the earth. Don't take me now. Just wait until a little bit later." There is no evidence that is what had happened. He no doubt was willing to co-operate with the desires of the Lord for his life.

When one walks in the light, he or she is willing to and is cooperating with God's plan. It suggests an adherence to the demands and commands of God's word

In the Psalms, the Bible says, "The entrance of thy words giveth light, it giveth understanding to the simple" (Psalm 119:130).

Know what it says? Some people claim they know what the Bible says but they cannot point you to a verse or passage, rightly divided, that proves their point. Darkness is a result of not being influenced enough with the light the Scriptures give.

A lady on one occasion said to the people who visited her in the home, "I know what the Bible says."

She was asked, "Could you quote me a verse you have memorized?"

Her response was, "The verse I know best is the one that says every tub sits on its own bottom." The problem with what she said is, those words are not found in the Bible.

Believe what it says. Hearing the word of God is to be mixed with faith. We will not act on what the Bible tells us to do unless we have faith in it as the inspired, inerrant, infallible, preserved Word of God. Faith leads to action.

Act on what it says. Those who walk in the light are those who do not just hear what the Bible has to say, but who put those truths to practice in their own lives. James 1:22-25 says, "But be ye doers of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving your own selves. For if any be a hearer of the word, and not a doer, he is like unto a man beholding his natural face in a glass: For he beholdeth himself, and goeth his way, and straightway forgetteth what manner of man he was. But whoso looketh into the perfect law of liberty, and continueth therein, he being not a forgetful hearer, but a doer of the work, this man shall be blessed in his deed." The person who acts on the truths the Bible says has an increasing degree of light in their lives. They radiate their relationship with the Lord Jesus.

The Confession of Sins

1 John 1:7-9 tells us, "But if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship one with another, and the blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth us from all sin. If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness."

When it comes to sin, we are to keep a short account with the Lord. When we do sin, to keep from dimming the light in our lives, we need to deal with it immediately. Sin does not break our relationship with God, once we have been saved, but it does hinder our fellowship with God.

Agree with God. To "confess" comes from two Greek words that mean to "say the same thing about something." When God points out our sin, there is no need to argue with Him, if we want to walk in the light as He is in the light.


Thirst after God. Those that have the most spiritual light inwardly, are those who have an intense thirst for God. Christ in the beatitudes said, "Blessed are they which do hunger and thirst after righteousness, for they shall be filled" (Matt.5:6).

Live to please God. Jesus said, "The Father hath not left me alone, for I do always those things that please Him" (John 8:29). If we live our lives to please Him, then we will experience all the light we need to make it through the darkness of this world.
