Thanksgiving

"Enter into his gates with thanksgiving, and into his courts with praise: be thankful unto him, and bless his name." (Psalm 100:4, KJV)

There are times when the intersection of the language of Scripture and the language of modern life can cause some confusion for the reader of the Bible/seeker of understanding. But then there are also those occasions when that same intersection brings a message of utmost significance!

In the familiar words of King David found in this verse comes a clear and contemporary call for all people! '*Enter his gates with thanksgiving and enter His courts with praise*'! For some readers, these words offer comfort and blessing. Place those same words into the context of the correctional facility and they suddenly have new meaning!

For example, in the experience of individuals affected by the reality of incarceration, the very suggestion of '*entering the gates*' of prison with thanksgiving is rarely seen as appropriate...Who do you know that would express thanksgiving for being held within the 'gates' of a prison? And who would praise and rejoice at the opportunity to enter the 'courts' facing judgment for their actions? Yet one of the greatest blessings for a Chaplain is to witness the spiritual journey of those individuals who receive this Word for themselves and adjust their attitudes/actions accordingly.

A case in point: A young man I had the privilege to serve on his spiritual journey while incarcerated had grown frustrated by the reality of his circumstances. He had tried everything he could think of to find the answer to his 'inner angst' or to address the gnawing sense of personal failure which led him to feel shame and hopelessness. Imagine his reaction when it was suggested that he thank God for his being arrested, convicted, and incarcerated! The very thought that God would use this difficult time of life to protect him, to teach him, to lead him to a greater understanding of life and God and grace just seemed impossible. Still, he allowed that suggestion to remain in his heart and mind for some time. Then one day he approached with great enthusiasm.

"Chap! I was reading my Bible last night and BAM! There it was, right before my eyes! Never had it occurred to me that I should be thankful for the days inside the courtroom that led me to this place, or to be thankful for the gates that I've lived my life behind for so long now! But if that's what it took to help me find the Truth of God's Love for me, then let me just tell you, I am thankful because it was worth it to find this peace I have found!" From that day forward until the day of his release, he focused his energies on being a positive role model to his peers and a testimony to the power of God to provide a paradigm shift of epic proportions.

I remember thinking at the time that so many of us could benefit from such a revelation. If only we can learn to be thankful as the apostle Paul wrote to the believers in 1 Thessalonians 5:18 "*In everything give thanks: for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning you.*"

Give thanks. Wherever you are whatever you are going through. Because doing so will Bless His Name!

Thanks, Be to God. Amen.


Eternity & Eternal Security

Cindy was overcome by the sparse facilities that the teacher in charge had to work with. But what overwhelmed her the most was the godly and selfless attitude of the teacher, Elianor. Even though the teaching conditions were extremely difficult, Elianor made the most of them.

When the Spirit of our Lord moves in His children, something profound happens. Cindy was moved with compassion and returned to her country with an immense desire to help. Cindy taught at a Christian school. A plan was created to raise funds to build an adequate structure for the children and teachers. After sharing the needs of the children and the people where she visited, the school community enthusiastically got on board. The student leaders came up with a plan to raise funds called BRICK BY BRICK. The goal was to raise ten thousand dollars to build a new Ministry Center.

This is where the story gets even better. Money started to come in little by little. A major school fundraiser had been scheduled for various schoolrelated needs and activities. However, one segment held near the end of the fundraiser was arranged so people could give to this far-away Ministry Center. The announcer challenged the audience - ten thousand dollars could be raised in just minutes. This could happen if ten people who are moved by God each gave one thousand dollars. Guess what? THAT IS WHAT HAP-PENED!!!! So the ten thousand dollars needed was raised in just minutes...

The school decided to keep raising funds so that the building could have bathrooms, a cement floor, and other amenities. ARE YOU READY FOR IT?

Another twenty-five thousand dollars was raised! Can you sing this with me..... OUR GOD IS AN AWESOME GOD!!!!!!

There is more. After some time had passed, the school then wanted to raise funds to buy furniture for the Ministry Center. The students called this new endeavor CHAIR BY CHAIR. Various fundraising events were held and before you know it another ten thousand dollars was raised.

The Ministry Center was fully constructed and the time had come for the grand opening. Pictures of this event would bring tears to your eyes. About an hour before the program began, one could see families walking from all directions to the Center. I was honored to be at this occasion and was able to be an eyewitness to this most glorious and emotional sight.

A brief ceremony was held to celebrate this miraculous building. The Ministry Center was packed with families and was about to get a new name. One of the members of the Students International staff shared a brief history of how this edifice came into existence. He went on to say that the Ministry Center was now going to be called El Faro. In English, that translates into The Lighthouse. The speaker declared that this new center is going to be a bright light like a lighthouse in this area for Jesus. He also mentioned that because of the central location of El Faro, it would be able to serve two communities rather than just one. His words sure resonated with all in attendance.

This wondrous incident occurred because a sister in Christ saw an opportunity to help in the name of our Savior. The opportunity was then communicated to others who wanted to assist and get involved. I hope you are now bursting with JOY about how our Lord works in the hearts of His people. I am hoping that you are also motivated to get involved with an area of ministry either close to your home or in a foreign land. Wouldn't you agree......... There is nothing better than serving others in name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

This article is kinda like writing a eulogy for a funeral of a good friend, only this time it is for the closing of a business in Spruce Pine that has touched the lives of so many Christians in Mitchell County and many of the surrounding



counties, Dellinger's Christian Book Store. This business has served the community, churches, and Christians throughout the area since 1974 when Jewel went in business with a person that was then their pastor. In 1978, Linda, her sister-in-law bought out that half of the business, and the two sisters-in-law went into what was to be a career that would last the remainder of their working lives. I personally worked closely with them and their business for the ten years that I owned and published Blue Ridge Christian News and was always blessed by the relationship.

The business originally started in the building across the corner from DT's at the corner of Crystal Street and Lower Street and moved to several different locations in Spruce Pine before purchasing and moving into their current location in May of 1986. Jewel made the comment that she told Linda when they moved there she was never going to move again, this was it and where they would stay the remainder of their years in business.

One of the most thankful things that both Linda and Jewel talked about during

the time we were visiting and discussing this article was how thankful they both were for the kind of customers they had been blessed with over the years. The comment was made several times that the customers that came into their business were Christians and the vast majority, acted as such and had been such a blessing. The fact is that there was hardly ever anyone that came in with a chip on their shoulder, but they often had repeat customers that were summer residents that would come in and tell them that they could not wait to get back to get the warm smiles and hello's they were welcomed with when they walked in the door.

Another thing that had touched both of the ladies was the fact that they were able to help those in need of guidance, pray at

times with those that were hurting and rejoice with those that were rejoicing. They felt like their business was more than a business, that they also had a ministry that touched lives in many different ways.

When asked about being able to work together for such a long time and remain



close, the comment was made that communication had always been the key. That there were times that they saw things differently but that they had always been able to talk through the issues, whatever they were.

When they felt the time had come to self out and close the store several different people were interested in the building. They commented to me that they felt as if God had inhabited the building for years and they wanted His presence to continue to be present for whatever the building was to be used for. They were very selective with the sale. No doubt they could have gotten more money by going another direction but decided upon what that they felt the Lord would be happy with.

We regret the closing of any business, but it is especially tough to see businesses that promoted and supported the entire Christian community in the way that Dellinger's has over the past forty-six years! We want to thank you for your faithfulness, smiles, prayers, and love that your business has provided for this little community over the years. May your days continue to be blessed and may the smiles and love for Christ continue to radiate from your faces in the coming years. Thank you, Jewel and Linda Dellinger, for your many years of service, from all of us that you have both meant so much to. May God bless you both in a mighty way.



He looked over at the student and said, "You did just fine flying the plane, but your landing was the worst one I've ever seen." That's when the student looked at him and said, "MY landing? I thought YOU were handling the landing!"

When you seek God's will regarding a decision and then do that will, the landing for that decision becomes God's responsibility. Conversely, when you do your own will regarding a decision, God isn't responsible for the landing. Unfortunately for God, His reputation has taken many a hit simply because He got blamed for a landing in which He had no part.

So many times we go our own way, do our own thing, and then somewhere in the middle of it all say, "Lord, please bless my efforts as I do Your work." God must think to Himself, "MY work? Do you really think you are doing MY work here?" The term "rubber stamp a decision" is a metaphor that means that the person who is technically in charge of an operation robotically approves what his underlings think should be done. This approval is evidenced by the person opening his desk drawer, pulling out the custom-made rubber stamp that has his signature embossed on it, and pressing that stamp down onto the official document that sanctions the project. Needless to say, God doesn't "rubber stamp" anything that isn't His will.

Galatians in Context

Regrettably, few Christians consider the Bible "absolute truth." Among those who do, many dis-



miss the books of Genesis through Malachi as allegorical or irrelevant. They are viewed as a source for children's stories, comforting poetry, and a few treasured prophecies. Few believers apply the term "literal" to the first two-thirds of the Bible. Doing so would impact the way they live.

A certain method of meeting active resistance from Christians is to point out clear Bible teachings: God's Sabbath is the Seventh Day of the week, eating unclean meat is an abomination, the observance of pagan holidays and worship rituals is a slap in God's face, the observance of God's feast days and celebrations is not optional. "We are not under all that 'law stuff," they insist. At this point, the book of Galatians is invoked.

Paul wrote this letter to a group of believers living in what is now Central Turkey. Their ancestors were Celts who emigrated from Western Europe around 278 BC at the invitation of King Nicomedes I of Bythnia. Celtic culture was steeped in Druidism, a popular variant of Babylonian, sun-god worship. When Paul chides them for returning to former worship practices, he is not faulting them for anything found in the teachings of Moses. Hebrew worship was not part of their history. The "weak and worthless principles" and the "days and months and seasons and years" he condemns in chapter four were relics from their pagan past.

Many view this epistle as Paul's proclamation that God's instructions for living—Torah in Hebrew, Nomos in Greek, The Law in English—are no longer valid. How could this be true? The core issue of the Biblical narrative is that a Loving God created humans for fellowship, but we made that fellowship impossible by choosing sin rather than obedience. Sin is so horrible that God has no option but to impose the death penalty. Sin is so horrible that only a perfect sacrifice could save us and restore our relationship with our Creator. Sin is so horrible that the Holy Son of God had to die in my place.

But what is this horrible thing? 1 John 3:4 defines sin as breaking The Law. Paul teaches in Romans 7:7-13 that The Law is holy and that by viewing our actions in light of The Law, we learn to recognize sin. Sin is violating the instructions for living given by God in the first five books of the Bible.

In order to believe that The Law is no longer in force, one must conclude that Unchanging God changed His mind, that sin is no longer horrible, and that Jesus died so that all of us can sin without consequence. How does that perspective mesh with God claiming that Torah will be in force forever (Deuteronomy 11:1), with Jesus insisting that The Law and The Prophets will be undiminished for as long as heaven and earth remain (Matthew 5:17-19) or the fact that Paul continued to live and teach The Law until the end of his days (Acts 28:23)?

Many Christians reach the same false conclusion which corrupted First-Century Jews. Jesus lambasted the Pharisees and Sadducees for viewing Torah as a means for justifying themselves. Religious leaders of His day taught that by keeping Torah—especially their made-up interpretations of Torah—they could force God to accept them. Jesus, Paul, and the other New Testament writers state that we can't earn salvation through righteous living.

Modern Christians, however, take that teaching to the opposite extreme. Since we cannot earn salvation through righteousness, many conclude that we have no obligation to be righteous. This is absurd. Ephesians 2:8-9 says that we are saved by grace through faith. Hallelujah! But then verse 10 makes it clear that we are saved for a purpose. That purpose is to perform "good works." Good works mean righteousness or keeping The Law. We are saved by grace so that by grace we may live righteous lives amid a perverse world.

Paul states this point emphatically in the Book of Galatians. He uses the entire fifth chapter to explain our "freedom in Christ." Through faith, we have freedom from sin's penalty, but we are never given the freedom to sin. Remember that sin is breaking The Law. The "yoke of slavery" he references in 5:1 is not The Law. Slavery comes from sin—violating The Law—not from keeping The Law. We who are justified by faith have work to do (Ephesians 2:10). That work is keeping The Law.

Paul hammers this fact in 5:19-21. He lists specific sins which he calls "works of the flesh. People who practice sexual immorality, impurity, indecency, idolatry, witchcraft, hostility, strife, jealousy, rage, selfish ambition, dissension, factions, envy, drunkenness, carousing, and similar actions will not inherit God's kingdom. Each of these actions is a violation of commands found in The Law. If Paul is teaching earlier in the book that The Law is abolished, it would be impossible for him to now claim that violating The Law will keep us from inheriting God's kingdom.

In fact, Paul never teaches that The Law is abolished. This widespread misunderstanding is due in part to the difficulty of translating ancient Hebrew and Greek texts into modern English. It is due in part to the fact that a lie oft repeated appears to take on the ring of truth. It is due mostly to the fact that few believers are willing to study and understand the first two-thirds of God's Word. Until we do so, we will never be able to "rightly divide" the Word of Truth.



As Thanksgiving approaches, we should reflect on the many things we should be thankful for in our lives. This story is meant to do just that. Hopefully, it will allow you to step back and think of life through another lens.

Our story begins at the weekly Bible study known as the Men's Connection.

As brother Richard recently spoke at our morning Bible study, he spoke of what it was to sacrifice, to serve without expectation of receiving. His dear, beloved Ann had passed earlier in the year, and he was leading us in a study of death and how we should face it. But more than the discussion of terminal illness, his message invoked the feeling of how we should not be more than we ought to think of ourselves – to be humble, with all gentleness in our servitude. On this last day of his series, he brought to light the importance of Spiritual Gifts and the Fruit of the Spirit. Again and again, those in attendance were moved by his message.

As Richard spoke, my mind began to drift to other moments reinforced by his words.

It was the middle of the summer, July 18th, to be exact. My journal recorded the event because of the profound nature of the encounter. It was an unseasonably warm day for Boone, which made me yearn for a cup of ice cream. Sometime in the middle of the afternoon, I took a break and made my way up to King Street to one of my favorite snack shops. Walking out of the establishment into the bright, sunshine a thought occurred to me, "How are you going to reach others when you came alone?" Usually, I try to find a student or faculty to walk and talk with, but there wasn't anyone around that could go on this day, so I was alone. Feeling a bit guilty in my singular pleasure, another thought arose, "Why not head over to the shady spots on the hill?"

So, with these thoughts in play, my feet began walking toward the old, refurbished gathering place in the middle of Boone, The Jones House. It is a natural oasis in the middle of all the hustle of downtown. There sitting on a hill, girded by massive Oaks and Ashe trees, overlooking the comings-and-goings of the small town below, sits an old home with a wide front porch littered with rocking chairs that invite you in with welcoming arms. Usually, it is the headquarters for the Junior Appalachian Musician program, along with other Old-Time music and various music events in the community. But on that particular day, it was merely the quick stop for visitors looking for a public restroom or just a quiet place to sit and rest.

As I found my way up the steep steps from King St., it was there that the realization of my hopes to sit alone on the porch to savor my sweet treat was not going to happen. For there, in one of the rocking chairs was another person, seemingly well planted, for his belongings were comfortably resting next to him, and his phone was plugged into the outlet by the window charging. Beside him was an empty rocking chair that beckoned. The words came back to me as I approached the porch, "How are you going to reach others when you came alone?" Walking up the front steps of the porch, I asked the young man if the other chair was taken, to which he replied, "No."

Thankful to find the shade of the large porch, I eased back into the weathered wood, that like a glove, embraced my weary soul. Looking out at the town below, through the whispering breeze that blew the leaves on the trees, we two strangers sat. For what seemed an eternity, we said nothing but continued to watch the world go by. Eventually, the calm overtook me, and I had to speak, so I asked, "Beautiful day isn't it?"

"Yes, it is," he replied, nodding as he spoke. His dreadlocks were a bungled flurry of contradiction. He was not of traditional college age. His eyes were hidden behind dark sunglasses, so to fully grasp his demeanor was even more difficult. Trying to think of how to approach one such as himself, I surmised his situation. He appeared homeless and was using the porch as a temporary abode, but one shouldn't judge oth-



ers too quickly.

"I'm sorry, but I didn't introduce myself. My name's Tim."

"I'm Adrian."

"Are you from around here," I probed, not trying to be too personal.

"Yes and no." He then bent over from his sitting position, reached into his backpack, and pulled out a cheese stick. As he unwrapped it and began to chew on its sustenance, it became evident to me that my inability to share with him had manifested itself into his own realization of hunger.

Curious to understand what "Yes and no meant," my questioning continued, as the seasoning on the meal before you begin to eat. "Have you served in the military?" "Yes, in the Navy."

"I was in the Air Force," I responded, and he shook his head in confirmation. From there, it was as if a door had been opened. Adrian shared with me, in broken terminologies, of what the world around him had become. His life was dark and lonely. When I asked what he did in the service, he said he couldn't tell me. Acknowledging that I understood, he continued. He said that in his dreams, the "Eaters" are revealed to him. When I asked for clarification, he pointed to the food we were just finishing. It was still unclear what he meant, for his mind seemed to drift in and out of consciousness. It seemed as if the soul in this man was battling demons that no one could see but him.

Thinking of a way to bring faith into the conversation, I asked a pretty bold question, "Do you read the Bible?"

"Do you," he replied, almost in self-defense. Granted, I deserved his response, but it made me take a step back about my own attitude. How self-righteous of me to imply that he should read a book of my faith when in fact, he may belong to another religion entirely.

"Everyday," was my answer, but now I was feeling almost guilty for putting him on the spot. Thankfully, he continued.

"I couldn't go to church for ten years while I was in the Navy," he answered. "Now they won't even let me into their temples because I smell so bad."

This was the confirmation that I had suspected of Adrian being homeless. It was then that I realized he hadn't asked for anything, no food, no money. He simply needed rest and time to be himself. It was as if he had allowed me to join him in his home for that brief moment in time.

"You don't have to go to a church to worship the Lord."

At this, he looked at me over his sunglasses with a curious glance, then I continued. "Jesus spoke of the temple of his body, and that after the great temple was destroyed, the new temple is now our own bodies, in which God can dwell if we let him."

Before I left him, I asked if he had any prayer requests. He lifted with an outstretched arm, palm down, to the yard before us, as if he were calming the seas. I didn't understand the gesture entirely, except to mean that he wanted to pray for everything and everyone beyond where we existed. Nevertheless, it touched me in a way that I hadn't expected.

There, on a sunny afternoon, in what seemed like a wasted break from work, my world met someone of the world of those that fall through the cracks of our society. Their lives are a cloud of confusion and darkness. Most cannot find adequate help or refuse it for fear of being institutionalized. Instead, they live off the support of charities and the kindness of strangers. Me with my cup of self-righteousness, eating in front of a man that probably only got one meal every other day if he is lucky, was like those Pharisees who touted their own religiosity. In retrospect, it was very humbling.

From what brother Richard taught us when we are blessed with gifts of the Spirit, we should learn to use them to help those in the world around us. If we do, we find that the fruits of the Spirit begin to manifest themselves. Without using those gifts, those fruits, those trees become barren. It is up to us to recognize those gifts and not let them lie dormant and waste away.

So, it was on that July day, there on the front porch, two strangers met. A world in chaos met another seeking to help those out of chaos – each wanting to find a way to the other.

Before I left, I asked Adrian if I could pray for him. He nodded yes. When we finished praying, God indeed was listening, for something quite unexpected, at least on my part, happened.

Adrian said, "Thank you,"

As we said our goodbyes, the feeling that God had just done something despite myself seemed to echo my departing footsteps.

C.S. Lewis said, "A world of nice people, content in their own niceness, looking no further, turned away from God, would be just as desperately in need of salvation as a miserable world—and might even be more difficult to save."

As we go through our days, let us not miss an opportunity to reach out to someone in need. It isn't always the material or the sustenance of organic goods that are needed, but simply the comfort and compassion of a loving heart are all that is required.

As the time of Thanksgiving approaches, once more, let us reflect on our many blessings. At the same time, seek those who are less fortunate in this world, those who need comfort, or those who just need someone to talk to. Share those gifts and give someone the fruits of your spirit.

It will make all the difference in the world.

The Inspiring Word

This month I prayerfully begin a verse-by-verse exposition of the fiftieth Psalm. Whether written by Asaph or written to him is not of concern here. It is the word of God. It transcends centuries and continues to accomplish God's purpose. Join me as we investigate verses one through six this month.



From Psalm 50:1-6 we hear the Lord summoning His creation to hear His declaration. Psalms 50:1-6 A Psalm of Asaph. "The mighty God, even the LORD, hath spoken, and called the earth from the rising of the sun unto the going down thereof. (2) Out of Zion, the perfection of beauty, God hath shined. (3) Our God shall come, and shall not keep silence: a fire shall devour before him, and it shall be very tempestuous round about him. (4) He shall call to the heavens from above, and to the earth, that he may judge his people. (5) Gather my saints together unto me; those that have made a covenant with me by sacrifice. (6) And the heavens shall declare his righteousness: for God is judge himself. Selah." Verse one, "The mighty God, even the Lord." Both Elohim and Jehovah, are names of God, they are used here to glorify him. To make the address more impressive, the names Elohim and Jehovah are mentioned, just as in all royal decrees, the names and dignities of monarchs are placed in the forefront. Here the true God is described as Almighty, as the only and perfect object of adoration, also as the self-existent One. "Hath spoken, and called the earth from the rising of the sun until the going down thereof." The dominion of God extends over the entire earth, and to all mankind is His decree directed. The east and the west are called to hear the God who makes His sun rise on every quarter of the globe. An item worth mentioning, there is no beginning or end to the east or west. When we begin traveling east or west, we continue that route, limited only by geography or transportation. Will we dare provoke him to anger by slighting his call? Verse two, "Out of Zion, the perfection of beauty, God hath shined." The Lord is seen not only speaking to the earth but revealing the glory of His presence to an assembled universe. Instead of God only dwelling in Zion among his chosen people, here the glory of His splendor is described as shining forth upon all nations. The sun was mentioned in the first verse, but here we see a far brighter light. The majesty of God is most evident among His elect but is not confined to them; the church is not a lantern unlit, but one shining the light of the glorious gospel. God's glory shines not only in Zion but out of her encompassing the world. Zion is picture-perfect in beauty by His indwelling, and this beauty is seen by all observers when the Lord shines from her. Notice how with a trumpeting voice the infinite Jehovah summons the heavens and the earth to attention for His word. Verse three, "Our God shall come." The psalmist speaks of himself and his brethren as standing in immediate anticipation of the appearing of the Lord upon the scene. "He comes," they say, they can hear His distant voice and discern the splendor of His imminent appearing. We should do likewise, watch and wait for the long-promised appearance of the Lord from heaven? "And shall not keep silence." He comes to speak and plead with his people, He comes to convict and judge the ungodly. He has remained silent and patient, but soon God will speak with power. What a moment of awe when the Omnipotent reveals Himself! Imagine if you can the reverent joy and humility when the scene of this Psalm becomes an actual reality! "A fire shall devour before him, and it shall be very tempestuous round about him." This sentence is a word picture of God's divine appearance. Verse four, "He shall call to the heavens from above, and to the earth." Here we hear God calling to Angels and men, the upper and the lower worlds, are called to witness this solemn scene. All creation will stand at attention to testify of the earnestness and truth of God's divine declaration. Both heaven and earth will con-

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demn sin; the guilty will have no appeal. Both angels and men have seen the guilt of mankind and the goodness of the Lord, they shall therefore confess the justice of God, and say "Amen" to his sentence. A question to those who deny God! What will you do and where will you flee? Christian, we should remember that judgment begins at the house of God. He will separate those who play church from his true church. Charles Spurgeon had this to say, "My soul, when this actually takes place, how will it fare with thee? Canst thou endure the day of his coming?" Verse five, "Gather my saints together unto me." The Lord cries, to His messengers, to separate and gather the elect of the Lord from the world. Gather those long scattered, but elect people, known by my grace to be my sanctified ones, and assemble them in my presence. All are not saints who claim to be-a separation must be made; God knows every heart. "Those that have made a covenant with me by sacrifice;" A covenant is ratified by blood, the cutting and dividing of offerings; this the righteous have done by accepting by grace and through faith the great propitiatory sacrifice of the Lord Jesus Christ, yet those who play church have claimed sainthood in an outward form. We will be gathered before the throne for trial and testing, and as many as having really ratified the covenant by grace and through faith in the Lord Jesus shall be attested before all as the objects of grace, while the rest will learn that outward Christianity is in vain.

Verse six, "*And the heavens shall declare his righteousness.*" Nothing remains to be done before God begins judgment. *"For God is judge himself.*" This judgment is not given to anyone, Elohim, Jehovah himself assumes his rightful place to judge the hearts of mankind. "*Selah.*" Accepted as the Hebrew word indicating a pause. Therefore, we may well pause in reverent prostration, searching our heart, in humble prayer, and awe-struck expectation.

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Heartbreak Hill

"If I go forward, he is not there; or backward, I cannot perceive him; on the left he hides, and I cannot behold him; I turn to the right, but I cannot see him. But he knows the way that I take; when he has tested me, I shall come out like gold." (Job 23:8-10)



Heartbreak Hill is the name given to a stretch of the Boston Marathon course where races have been won and lost. It comes about 20 miles into the race from Hopkinton to Boston when runners are challenged with forcing their already fatigued legs and bodies up the half-mile slope. Heartbreak Hill is an iconic landmark in the sport of marathoning and an article for Boston.com, Dialynn Dwyer recounts how Heartbreak Hill got its name.


"For more than 80 years, the hill has been known by a name that reflects what runners may face on its pitch. It stems from a particular moment of heartbreak for a marathoner pushing for the lead in 1936. On that Monday, runner Ellison 'Tarzan' Brown from Rhode Island set a 'blistering pace,' The Boston Globe reported. The newspaper's sports reporter Jerry Nason wrote that Brown set 'every course record for the 23 of the 26-plus miles crashing to oblivion.' Brown's pace 'literally caused him to race himself as well as the remainder of the field dizzy'... He was more than three minutes above the record pace - until the 'mocking hills' in Newton. It was there, on the last of the hills, that Johnny Kelley of Arlington, who won the marathon the previous year, 'wiped out a half-mile deficit' to catch Brown.

Kelley patted Brown on the shoulder as he went to pass the race leader. And in response, Brown surged ahead, going on to win the marathon in 2:33:40, becoming the second Native American to win the Boston race. 'Nason referred to the incident as breaking Johnny's heart,' Fleming said. 'So that really was thought to be the way that the term Heartbreak Hill became coined.' Kelley came in fifth and had to be 'carted away' from the finish line. He was 'worn, battered to bits,' by the chase over the hills..." ("How Heartbreak Hill Got Its Name," 4/3/19).

In today's passage, Job confronts one of the most difficult questions of Christian theology. How do we explain all the suffering that occurs in a world created and sustained by a loving and gracious God? Job's friend Eliphaz gives an answer that is partially correct when he says the answer lies in human sinfulness. Still, all of us are aware of numerous instances in which no human sinfulness lies behind our suffering. Job finds himself amid such a dilemma and honestly, gives expression to his inability to see, feel, or hear God.

Heartbreak Hill. All of us have been there. So, what do we do? James Newsome writes, "Job points to a dilemma whose solution he "cannot see" (v. 9b), but one for which Christian men and women find resolution in Jesus Christ (although Christians would also confess very imperfect knowledge in the matter). In Jesus Christ, God joined humankind in its suffering, both deserved and undeserved. The cross of Jesus Christ is that point in time and space where, more than any other, God identified with human suffering and experienced it to its fullest extent. Thus Job performs the enormous service of raising questions which he cannot answer and of pointing beyond himself to One who can" (Texts for Preaching, p. 544). Prayer: Lord, thank you that even in the midst of our heartbreak, you know the way that we take and whisper your grace and peace into our lives.

On my most recent trip to Uganda, I was praying for a young boy, probably about ten years old, at a church one day. His belly was swollen in a way that I had only seen on television commercials; except he wasn't starving, he had plenty of food. This young boy's stomach was enlarged because he had been drinking unclean water.




At that moment, I realized how much I had taken for granted the clean water that I have access to every day. It is all that I've known. Every day of my life, I have been able to turn the water on with a twist of my wrist and be able to take a shower, wash my clothes, or get a nice cold drink. But for this young boy, his experience was quite different. He had to walk a mile or two to fetch his family's water. Once he arrived, he would fill up his 5-gallon jerrycan with the same water he was standing in and then carry it back home. This jerrycan once filled, would weigh over 40 pounds. This is what this boy did every day. This was all that he knew. Little did his family realize, that the chore they were sending their son to do every day, was the cause of their son now being sick. As I prayed for this little boy to be healed, I felt challenged to do something to help.

Approximately 21 million people in Uganda are living without safe drinking

water. That's nearly 50% of the population. 8 million of those people are drinking from sources like streams, ponds, and unprotected hand-dug wells. 13 million must walk 1-2 miles because they don't have access or because of overcrowding. 64 % of the population don't have access to a sanitary toilet. 47 % of the population have no handwashing facility. And another 32% have a handwashing facility but no reliable source for soap and water.

As I read these statistics, I became upset, and I wondered how this was possible? How is it possible that in 2021, people in Uganda do not have access to clean drinking water? In America, we have seen all kinds of



should not be. I believe that we can, and we should do something about this. We don't overcome evil with evil. We don't overcome evil by complaining about our circumstances or situations. We overcome evil with good. And it is good for us to help those when it is in our power to do so.

In Matthew 25, Jesus said, "I was hungry, and you gave Me food; I was thirsty, and you gave Me drink; I was a stranger, and you took Me in; I was naked, and you clothed Me; I was sick, and you visited Me; I was in prison, and you came to Me. "Then He said, "Assuredly, I say to you, inasmuch as you did it to one of the least of these My brethren, you did it to Me." When we help people that can never return the favor, we are doing good, we are acting like our Father, God, who gives rain to the just and the unjust.

I would like to ask you to partner with us to help bring clean water to the people of Uganda. Each well costs \$8200. Whether you desire to help as an individual, a family, a business, or a church, we all can do something. So far, by the grace of God, we have been able to dig 5 wells. In the village where we drilled the first well, they had one well for 5250 people. Now they have two. Praise the Lord.

You can see that the need is great, but together we can make a difference. Together we can be the change that we desire to see.



Solomons Temple is one of the Ancient Wonders of the World. This Temple or House of the Lord was the most sacred place Jews worshipped the Lord. Its building and furnishings are described in First Kings chapters seven and eight. The Lord was so pleased with the heart of God's people to follow Him, that at the dedication of the Temple, the Glory of the Lord filled the House of the



Lord in a thick cloud. The presence of the Lord was evidenced by a thick cloud or dense fog that filled the Temple. Wow, could you imagine you and your family being in the presence of God like this?

The Temple was built on Mt. Moriah in Jerusalem. This site has a very significant role in the Bible. It is the location of Abraham's test to offer his son Isaac, where God stopped Abraham and provided a ram for the sacrifice instead of his son. A picture of the grace of Jesus Christ. It is also the threshing floor that King David purchased from Araunah the Jebusite. King David made an altar here and sacrificed to the Lord in repentance of sin to stay the hand of God and a pestilence God had sent on Israel.

In 1 Kings 7:21, King Solomon had two pillars constructed out of brass. These two pillars adorned the front porch of the Temple. A very present help in trouble.

2 Therefore will not we fear, though the earth be removed,

And though the mountains be carried into the midst of the sea;

3 Though the waters thereof roar and be troubled,

Though the mountains shake with the swelling thereof. Selah.

4 There is a river, the streams whereof shall make glad the city of God,

The holy place of the tabernacles of the most High.

5 God is in the midst of her; she shall not be moved:

God shall help her, and that right early.

6 The heathen raged, the kingdoms were moved:

He uttered his voice, the earth melted.

7 The LORD of hosts is with us;

The God of Jacob is our refuge. Selah.

8 Come, behold the works of the LORD,

What desolations he hath made in the earth.

9 He maketh wars to cease unto the end of the earth;

He breaketh the bow, and cutteth the spear in sunder; He burneth the chariot in the fire.

10 Be still, and know that I am God:

I will be exalted among the heathen, I will be exalted in the earth.

11 The LORD of hosts is with us;

The God of Jacob is our refuge. Selah."

In First Kings 8:25 at the dedication of the Temple when King Solomon brought up the Ark of the Covenant to be placed in the Temple, he stood before the altar and prayed to the Lord God of Israel. 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

A Church Named Providence By Steve Bietz Burke County

It happened in Swan Quarter, North Carolina. Swan Quarter is out on our North Carolina coast in the Pamlico Sound area of the Outer Banks, just south of Nags Head. It is a small community, named after Samuel Swan who was a wealthy plantation owner in that area in the 1700s. The population today stands at around 400 people.



In the 1870s, a small group of Methodists wanted to build their own church and began the search for property in Swan Quarter, North Carolina. As I just noted, it was a small group so they did not have a large amount of money with which to buy any expensive property. There was a piece of land situated on Main Street that seemed to be the perfect spot for a church and the small Methodist Church family felt impressed by God to ask the owner of the land if he would sell them the property so that they could build their church. The owner of the land was a man named Sam Sadler. After spending time in prayer, the Methodist Church Pastor and another leader in the church went to ask Sam Sadler if he would sell. Sam was understanding of their desire to build a church but stated that he already had other plans for the property that they wished to purchase and so he would not sell it to them.

Because they did not have a lot of money, the Methodist Church ended up purchasing land that was not ideal. It was described as low land and swampy and prone to flooding if enough rain fell in a short time period. But putting their trust in God and deciding that they would build their white-framed church on brick pilings, they proceeded. What a fantastic day it was when they finished building their church and had the dedication on September 16th, 1876.

Three days after the dedication, a Hurricane-like storm hit Swan Quarter and the surrounding coast of North Carolina. The storm did not pack a punch with major winds, but rather the destructive power was the heavy rains. The small town of Swan Quarter was flooded. The water level rose to the point that it lifted the brand new Methodist Church right off the brick pilings that it had been built on. The church floated out onto Oyster Creek Rd and then made a turn onto Main Street. It proceeded to float down Main Street until it stopped even though the water was rushing down the street. But instead of floating with the flow of water, the church made a mysterious turn and stopped on a vacant piece of land.

As the water level dropped after the storm passed, the town folk came out to see the damage. Many had seen the church float by and wondered where it went. The citizens were stunned to see that the Methodist Church had landed on Sam Sadler's land, yes the very same piece of property that the small Methodist Church family had felt impressed by God to ask Sam to sell it to them so that they could build their church. Well, when Sam saw the white-framed Methodist Church sitting on his property, he was astonished. He said this must be the Providence of God. Sam Sadler was so impressed by the event, that he donated the land to the Methodist Church of Swan Quarter. Everyone felt that God's providence had indeed been the reason that their church had to change its address. So it was decided. From that day forward, the little white-framed church was called the Church of Providence.

I wonder, do we see God's providence in our church and our lives? Many today would have us believe that an indescribable fate determines the course of history. Many suggest that destiny is left to mere chance. They claim that history and the future are just a series of unrelated circumstances. I believe that these kinds of conclusions are false. I believe that God's providence, which is to say God's Hand of guidance, has and will continue to guide in the affairs of our planet, and in particular those who accept the Lord as their Creator and Redeemer.

There is perhaps a no greater example of God's providence in history over centuries but to have the world ready for the incarnation of Jesus. Paul wrote in Galatians 4:4 "the fullness of the time had come." I hope that you and I are anticipating the soon second coming of our Lord and Saviour. The Bible conveys that Christ's soon return is a guarantee.

I would call His plans to come and get us, the providence of a loving God. He has it all planned. All He needs is us to make it complete. May we this Thanksgiving, thank God for His wonderful providence in our lives.

Yesterday's pouring rain gave me time off before my ride toward Memphis, TN. Following a day where the only thing keeping me awake was eating, I turned in early.

The following pre-dawn morning, I struggled to wake up and choked down something left over from two days before.

I managed to dress before wrestling my recumbent trike into the motel hallway. Despite the rest, my legs felt as if they were packed with concrete, and I grappled with a negative attitude.

While pushing my trike through the lobby into the clean fresh air of the cool morning, my years of experience reminded me to "pace myself." After securing my shoes into the pedals, I released the brakes and cruised into the rising sun. Soon I found myself in the rhythm of checking mirrors for inattentive drivers while comfortably gliding at 10-15 MPH. The traffic was sparse and the scenery pleasant, with no hint of the afternoon misery to come.

I had planned adequately for this day's ride, or so I thought and felt good about it even though I had struggled with my health and stamina all week. Making good time by not stopping often worked for me as I ate protein snacks and drank sports drinks on the go. Following about three hours of steady progress, I pulled onto a gravel road to rest and check the GPS to confirm my location. Much to my dismay, the guidance system had all but drained my phone battery. Rather than risk losing my ability to communicate, I immediately discontinued my mapping aid. As usual, the glare from sunlight and a constantly dirty cover made map reading from my phone difficult at best. With this in mind, I made some calls but did not find anyone who could help me navigate. Asking directions from "the locals" usually directed me to an interstate. Traveling on those bad boys while peddling is not only dumber than dirt, but illegal, and can only lead to trouble. Then there was always the local comedian more than willing to lead the weary traveler down a dead-end dirt road, just for kicks. Add to the list vague directions that only one growing up "around there" would make any sense of, and I just headed east and watched for a road sign pointing to Memphis.

Somewhere around noon, I noticed unexpected towns. Like catching a brick in the head, I realized "lost" defined my location. Having missed my turn (again), I decided to rest, get my bearings, and plot a new and improved path to Memphis. Low blood sugar clouded my thinking. While in Hayti, MO, I choked down a couple of half-rotten bananas and knocked back a quart of energy drink so I could focus better. This break did little to refresh me, and I got back on the road before my muscles cooled off too much.

After getting the usual useless advice, I decided to ride parallel to the interstate, I-55 South, knowing it would get me headed in the right direction. While meandering "southish" for an hour, maybe two, the sun and lack of proper nutrition took their toll. In a moment of clarity, I found myself standing on a bridge that crossed I-55.

As I looked in the general direction of Memphis, I could see two roads, one on each side of the interstate and both pointing home. After riding back and forth across the bridge for about an hour, I found myself at an impasse. Already lost, hot, hungry, and thirsty, I had no desire to chance taking the wrong road, as doing so could have been life-threatening. The words, "call the church," echoed through my brain fog. After cleaning Missouri dust off the phone screen, I shaded it from the sun's glare and hit speed dial.

On the second ring, Brother Reggie, whose prayer had prompted God to restore my exhausted legs just two days before, picked up. With no preamble, I said, "I am lost and need help."

I heard Reggie's chair slide across the floor as he headed out of his office to-



ward his colleague, Tony's office. "Tony," Reggie yelled. "Steve is lost and needs our help!"

Tony picked up the phone immediately. "Where are you?" he asked. I assured him, "I have no idea," and we started working with what we knew.... "I'm standing on a bridge crossing I-55 about eighty miles north of Memphis." Tony quickly searched his computer to find a landmark to work with. Due to Missouri's method of marking exits, it took several minutes to determine where I stood. After much work on Tony's part, he said, "The beat-up, full-of-holes road to your right is the one you need to take."

After finally getting off that bridge and making progress, I squeezed my hand brakes and glided to a stop at an intersection. My phone continued transmitting Tony's voice to my hearing aid when a mother and her children pulled up and offered advice. While her children pressed their noses against the window trying to figure out what I was riding, she did her best to give me directions that "might get you to Memphis."

At the same time, Tony insisted her advice was flawed. "Steve, don't listen to her. Steve, that's the wrong way!" he said, still on the phone. I bid the mother and children a blessed day and took Tony's advice as I pulled onto the road that kept me on the straight and narrow.

This little trip into misery drove home two very important truisms when needing advice: first, get over the macho bit and ask for help, and second, avoid the folly of seeking guidance from those who don't know what to do.

I knew Tony and Reggie, both stalwart men of God wanted only the best for me and would do everything in their power to help. This experience marked the second riding day of fighting hills and heat when I sought rescue. These brothers in Christ sacrificed their time to get me to safety.

4:4 *"Rejoice in the Lord always: and again I say, rejoice."* (His mind is on Christ. He remembers how the Lord has blessed him and taken care of him. And he realizes that if God did it in the past, He will do it in the present and in the future!)

4:11) "Not that I speak in respect of want: for I have learned, in whatsoever state I am, therewith to be content." (I, and you, can trust my circumstances to Him. He will always watch over me and take care of me!)

Dear Dave,

I am on Baby Step 2, and I started a YouTube channel earlier this year that led to a new opportunity to make additional income. I try on and review clothing, and I'm paid \$30 for each clip that's anywhere from 30 seconds to two minutes long. Right now, I have about 1,000 viewers. This requires me to buy items from several brands. I usually return the items when I'm through filming, but I'm currently



funding this with a credit card I only use for this project. I only pay the minimum each month until I get the refund, so at any given time there can be up to \$4,000 on the card in rotation. I make about \$86,000 at my normal job, so is this an okay way to fund my project and chalk it up as a business expense? Amber

Dear Amber,

You're taking a risk here, from a business perspective, by playing around with \$4,000 in debt to make \$30 a pop. That's inordinate. And you shouldn't be paying for the clothes in the first place. These brands should be giving you clothes to review—that you keep—for the marketing exposure, but I'm not sure you've got enough eyeballs on you yet to justify them giving you the clothes for free.

Basically, it sounds like you're trying to put yourself in a position to be an influencer. And the way influencers get paid is by monetizing eyeballs. Obviously, YouTube and other platforms will pay you if you can get the eyeballs. But 1,000 viewers really aren't a lot these days. You're getting there, though, and I'm glad you're working at it and trying to make things happen.

You make good money, Amber. I want you to set aside \$2,000 or \$3,000 for this business, maybe out of the business income, and prime the pump one time. By that, I mean open a separate checking account that's for your clothing exchange process only. Here's the thing, let's say you bought \$1,000 worth of stuff from one of these companies, and they suddenly decide they're not taking it back. You just ate that \$1,000. And guess what else? Now, you really have credit card debt.

There are three things you can always be sure of in business. One, it's going to cost twice as much as you think it will. Two, it's going to take twice as long as you think it will. And three, you are not the exception to these things. While we're at it, add this to the list of stuff you can always be sure of—you'll never find me advising or endorsing credit card debt! — Dave

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

Life's Journey With A Purpose Honesty With God By Glenda Ward

McDowell County

"For the froward is abomination to the Lord: but His secret is with the righteous."

"The Curse of the Lord is in the house of the wicked: but He blesseth the habitation of the just." Proverbs 3:32-33

"Submit yourselves therefore to God. Resist the devil, and he will flee from you." Draw nigh to God, and He will draw nigh to you." James 4:7-8

God desires our complete honesty. We are as close to God as we choose to be. If you desire to develop a closer relationship with God it will take time and energy. It does not happen by accident, nor does it happen overnight. To gain a deeper, more intimate connection with God we must learn to honestly share our feelings with Him, trust Him, and learn to care more about what He cares about in our life, and desire this kind of relationship with Him more than anything else. We must choose complete honesty with God about our faults and feelings. In Jesus' generation; no matter what He said or did, the people took the opposite view. Jesus condemned their attitude because they were cynical and skeptical because He challenged their comfortable, secure, and self-centered lives. Too often people justify their inconsistencies because listening to God may require a change to their way of life.

Friends of God in Bible times were honest about their feelings, often complaining, second-guessing, accusing, and having differences of opinion with God. However, God doesn't seem to mind this frankness. God allowed Abraham to question and challenge Him over the destruction of the city of Sodom and what it would take to spare the city. Abraham was negotiating God down from fifty righteous people to only ten. (Reference Genesis 22-33). Job was allowed to vent his bitterness during his ordeal, but in the end, God made it clear that Job's friends were wrong. Job was tested, yet refused to give up on God even though he did not understand why these things were happening to him. Job is restored in Job 42:1-17. In response to God's speech, Job humbles himself and God rebukes the three friends for adding to Job's suffering by their false assumptions and critical attitudes. "And it was so, that after the Lord had spoken these words unto Job, the Lord said to Eliphaz the Temanite, My wrath is kindled against thee, and against thy two friends: for ye have not spoken of me the thing that is right, as my servant Job hath" (Job 42:7). God tells them they haven't been honest, either with Him or about Him – not the way Job was.... He also told them that Job would pray for them and God said He would accept Job's prayer. True faith begins in such humility. Those who persist in trusting God will be rewarded.

In another example, God honestly expressed His total disgust with Israel's disobedience. He told Moses He would keep His promise to give the Israelites the Promised Land, but He wasn't going any farther with them in their journey! God was fed up, and He let Moses know exactly how He felt. (Reference Exodus 32:1-8). "And the Lord said to Moses, I have seen this people, and behold, it is stiffnecked people. Now therefore let me alone, that my wrath may wax hot against them, and that I may consume them: and I will make of thee a great nation" (Exodus 32: 9-10). And Moses, speaking as a "friend" to God responds beginning in Exodus 32:11-14. Read this passage to find out how Moses pleaded for mercy, and God spared them. In this event, God even repented of the evil which He thought to do unto His people. God changed His behavior to remain consistent with His nature. When God first wanted to destroy the people, He was acting consistently with His justice. When Moses interceded for the people, God "changed" to act consistently with His mercy. This is just one example of God's mercy. Although we deserve His anger, He is willing to forgive and restore us to Himself.

Bitterness is the greatest barrier to friendship with God! People often blame God for hurts caused by others. This creates a hidden rift with God. Revealing our true feelings to God is the first step to healing. Tell God exactly how you feel. God gave us a worship manual to instruct us in candid honesty with Him. Every possible human emotion can be found in the Book of Psalms. When we read the emotional confessions of David and others, we can realize how God wants us to worship Him – holding back nothing of what we feel. We can pray like David. We can choose to obey God in faith and trust in His wisdom. When we do this, we deepen our friendship with God. Jesus makes it clear that obedience is a condition of an intimate friendship with God. (Reference John 15:1-13). "Ye are my friends, If ye do whatsoever I command you" (John 15:14). As we are friends with our God, we are not His equal. He is our loving leader, and we follow Him. We want to follow Him out of gratitude for all He has done for us. When we nourish and deepen our friendship with God; we are abiding in Christ which means 1- believing He is God's Son (1 John 4:15), 2- receiving Him as our Savior and Lord (John 1:12), 3- doing what God says (1 John 3:24), 4- continuing in faith (1 John 2:24), 5- relating in love to the community of believers, Christ's body (John 15:12). Jesus says the only way to live a truly good life is to stay close to Him, like a branch attached to the vine. Apart from Him, our efforts are unfruitful. We receive the nourishment and life offered by Christ, the vine. When a vine bears "much fruit," God is glorified, for daily, He has nurtured each tiny plant or vessel - as we are and prepared it to blossom. What a moment of glory when our harvest is mature and ready for use! God is glorified when people come into a right relationship with Him and begin to "bear much fruit" in their lives.

Jesus' relationship with His Father is the model for our friendship with Him. God treasures simple acts of obedience. Small opportunities surround us every day. When we do small things for Him out of loving obedience, which may go unnoticed by others, God notices them and considers their acts of worship. (Reference 1 Samuel 15:22).

Jesus began His public ministry at age thirty by being baptized by John. At that event, God spoke from heaven. (Reference Matthew 3:16-17). What had Jesus been doing those thirty years that gave God so much pleasure? The Bible says nothing about these hidden years except for a single phrase in Luke 2:51-52: "And He went down with them, and came to Nazareth, and was subject unto them: but His mother kept all these sayings in her heart. And Jesus increased in wisdom and stature, and in favor with God and man." Jesus lived in Nazareth with Mary and Joseph; and as He lived and grew, He increased in wisdom with God. Thirty years of pleasing God can be summed up in these few words: He lived obediently in God's favor. All is worthless compared to knowing Christ; "and being found in Him, not having mine own righteousness, which is of the law, but that which is through the faith of Christ, the righteousness which is of God by faith: that I may know Him, and the power of His resurrection, and the fellowship of His sufferings, being made conformable unto His death" (Philippians 3:9-10). When we are united with Christ by trusting in Him, we experience the power that raised Him from the dead. That same mighty power helps us live morally renewed and regenerated lives. But before we can walk in the newness of life, we must also die to sin ("be made conformable unto His death"). Just as the resurrection gives us His power to live for Him, His crucifixion marks the death of our old sinful nature.

Just as after Christ's resurrection Christ was exalted; one day we too will share God's glory. What practical choices will you make this week in order to grow closer to God?

It all begins with a phone call to the Call Center from an aging adult needing assistance with a safety concern--such as a wheelchair ramp for a loved one to be able to get in and out of their home safely. Call Center Specialists begin to reach out to churches in the individual's community.

We have been very blessed to partner with Baptist Associations and hundreds of churches and volunteers across North Carolina that are eager and willing to help those in need.

Volunteers donate their time and skillset to build wheelchair ramps. One of the main obstacles is the funding of ramp materials. Many times, older adults are on fixed incomes and have no means to contribute toward materials. Sometimes, churches can contribute both volunteers and funding.

What happens when funding is not available? We seek other community agencies and share a service opportunity. Some Senior Resource Centers receive grant money that can be used to purchase materials. Other times, we may contact local civic groups or Boy Scout troops that may be looking for a service project.

Hearing the hardships of aging adults can certainly pull on one's heartstrings. However, once a ramp has been built, individuals call us to say how appreciative they are for the assistance. The joy in their heart comes through in their voice as they share with us how much of a blessing the ramp is for them. 

As Christians, we are encouraged to befriend and spend time with other believers. Many call this "fellowship." But true Christian fellowship involves so much more than simply hanging out and talking about the news, sports, and weather. True Christian fellowship is purposeful in helping us grow in faith. It's one of the tools God uses to grow us deeper in Christ.



How does He do that? Well, in essence, fellowship is a partnership based on our shared relationship with Christ that strives to encourage, edify, and serve one another. Let's explore that further.

Shared Relationship.

We meet like-minded people every day – in our workplaces, churches, the gym, community groups, and even online. Receives \$25,000 Duke Energy Hometown Revitalization Grant Mitchell County

The Duke Energy Foundation today distributed \$750,000 in grants to help local businesses across North Carolina - from restaurants to retailers - adapt to the unprecedented challenges caused by the pandemic. Mitchell County is the recipient of a \$25,000 grant to support local small businesses.

"Since the Spring of 2020, our local businesses have been doing everything they can to survive the effects of the pandemic and have shown amazing resilience. The Duke Energy Hometown Revitalization Grant program will allow us to support and assist our small businesses in their continued efforts to come back from the previous 18 months and grow in this new business environment," said Patti Jensen, Executive Director, Mitchell County Chamber and Mitchell County Development Foundation.

The Mitchell County Chamber and Development Foundation partnered on the grant application to Duke Energy to request funding to support local Mitchell County small businesses. A grant committee will be established to review grant applications. Local small businesses should watch the news for announcements of the grant application process.

The total of the Hometown Revitalization Grants represents a 50% increase over the \$500,000 in funding announced in April due to the breadth and quality of the funding applications. As a result, the Hometown Revitalization grant program will now support 30 communities throughout the state rather than the original 20 planned at the program's inception.

"After our success in supporting the Downtown Raleigh Alliance, which was the model for this program, we knew that a series of targeted grants could do wonders to help North Carolina businesses and storefronts recover," said Stephen De May, Duke Energy's North Carolina president. "We were astounded by the number and quality of the applications, so we decided to increase the foundation's commitment and help even more downtown communities bounce back."

The Hometown Revitalization grants were awarded to the following 30 community organizations – quotes from each on the impact of the grants can be found here:

Each community was awarded \$25,000 through a partnership with these local 501(c) (3)-administering nonprofits. The administering entity will establish a small-business support microgrant program to deploy the funding within their local community. Microgrants may range from \$500 to \$2,500 per individual business.

The Hometown Revitalization grant program was inspired by a successful collaboration between the Downtown Raleigh Alliance and Duke Energy that provided nearly 100 grants to downtown Raleigh storefronts. The grants allowed the establish-

ments the opportunity to create outdoor seating and serving opportunities, develop e-commerce websites, repair window fronts, and upgrade health and safety elements. Nicole Thompson, president, and CEO of Downtown

Durham anticipates a similar impact in her community. "Downtown Durham small businesses have weathered an extremely challenging few years, from an explosion that damaged multiple businesses in the Brightleaf District to the economic devastation brought on by the pandemic," she said. "The Duke Energy Hometown Revitalization Grant program will provide vital support and help to strengthen these small businesses as they recover, rebound, and reinvent to succeed in this new economy."

In Charlotte, the strongest application was put forth by the Latin American Coalition.

"Here in Charlotte, many Latino small businesses were Hometown Revitalization Grant started by immigrants or the children of immigrants," said Jose Hernandez-Paris, executive director of the Coalition. "They are hard-working folks who need help recovering from the effect of the pandemic. The Home-

town Revitalization Grant from Duke Energy will provide small-business owners a lifeline to stabilizing their business as we continue to recover. We are grateful for the support from Duke Energy and their commitment to our community, our families, and to our small businesses."

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


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

Burned At The Stake

A little math in our year of 2021 puts us more than 500 years past the Protestant Reformation days of Martin Luther. Judgment and salvation are clearly on display over these past 500 years of time which spiritually represents the number five in the Bible; or multiple 100's of #5, i.e., 5 wise and 5 foolish virgins, five loaves, five hundred reeds, five thousand men. The year 1517 marks the start



of the Protestant Reformation (a Christian crusade against the Roman Catholic Church) brought about by Martin Luther rejecting the doctrines and various dictates of the Catholic Church.

The focus of the reformation was the failure of the RC Church in England to allow Bible translation from Latin into the common man's language or dialect. The Vulgate (Greek, Biblical texts translated into Latin) was the official Latin Bible of the Catholic Church. A particularly grievous doctrine was that of indulgences; (a theology reducing your time in purgatory, a place of sin cleansing) by paying \$\$ to the Church for sin forgiveness prior to death; the doctrine of Purgatory is not found in the Bible.

The corruption uncovered in the RC Latin Vulgate Bible translation was massive as various scholars such as Erasmus, who assisted Tyndale, proved the Latin's deception when translated into Greek. The Vulgates' trustworthiness soon began to crumble and was considered doomed by the evil doctrine contained within it. Pope Leo X's declaration that "the fable of Christ was very profitable to him" enraged the people of God. Luther declared his intolerance with the church corruption on Halloween, 1517, by nailing 95 Theses of Contention to the Wittenberg Church Door.

The invention of the printing press allowed for the spread of the Greek and Hebrew knowledge of the Scripture. John Wiclif (old English) or Wycliffe (Wiclif Bible_1380) gave an English translation in the script from the Latin Vulgate. William Tyndale (Tyndale Bible_1534) was the first to publish in print the New Testament and parts of the Old Testament in English from the original Greek and Hebrew.

Tortures and torment on account of The Word of God were horrific and many. A prohibition on possessing any part of the Bible's Scripture in English was religiously enforced. Any English translation of the Scriptures was considered to be poison. Anyone found with English Scripture in their possession was consider to be a heretic (Rejecting RC Church Doctrine) and was subject to a burning death. William Tindale was reported to be at the age of sixty when he was tied to a stake, strangled, and burned. His only crime was printing Bibles in the English language! His dying prayer was written in old English script, "Lord, open the King of England's eyes". Surely the hand of the LORD was upon these men, and many others, for their awe-inspired devotion to bringing the Word of God to the multitudes of mankind.

In the city of Coventry, England, seven persons were burned for having taught their children and families the Lord's Prayer and the Ten Commandants from an English translation found in their possession.

"And when he had open the fifth seal, I saw under the alter the souls of them that were slain for the word of God; and for the testimony which they held; And I John saw these things, and heard them" Revelation 6:9, Rev.22: 7,8,9.

Five major English Bible translations stand out in history which steered the Reformation of Christianity to the final translation of the King James Bible. Wiclif-1380, Tyndale-1534, Cranmer-1539, Geneva-1557, Reims-1582, and finally The King James-1611. The King James Bible is revered as God's Book, The Lamb's Book of Life. 2 Peter 1:21 "holy men of God spake as they were moved by the Holy Ghost." Proverbs 30:5; "Every Word of God is pure: he is a shield unto them that put their trust in Him."

The King James Bible translators numbered about fifty men. They were divided into six companies, each company being responsible for a certain section of the Scriptures. Among the translators were Lancelot Andrews (1555-1626), Dean of Westminster, Edward Lively (1545-1605) Regius Professor of Hebrew at Cambridge, and John Harding, Regius Professor of Hebrew at Oxford (1591-8 and 1604-10). The results of their labor were subject to mutual criticism and then underwent nine months of final revision by the King's committee sitting in London. 2 Timothy 2:15; "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that

needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth."

The King James Bible was printed in England under the King's copyright. During the American Revolution, the Congress of the United States would usurp the King's copyright and authorize the first English printing in the "New World". That event set the stage for America to bring the Light of the World, The King James Bible, to the masses by means of the great Bible Societies like the American Bible Society formed in 1816. John 8:12 "*Then spake Jesus again unto them, saying, I am the light of the world: he that followeth me shall not walk in darkness, but shall have the light of life.*"

Founding Fathers and other Influencing Citizens. How They Served Our Country—Phillis Wheatley

This is an American history educational moment of those who made a difference during the Revolutionary War era and how they served our Country.

In 1753, a girl was born in Africa. At seven, she was abducted and transported to America to be a slave.

During the summer of 1761, Susanna Wheatley was in Boston at the Beach Street pier. She was seeking a young person for domestic duties. Mrs. Wheatley saw a humble girl who was frail, toothless, and naked. Susanna was reminded of her daughter, who was about her age when she died ten years before.

Back home, Susanna named this girl Phillis Wheatley. Her name came from the delivery ship and her own last name. Within a year, Phillis was reading the Bible, studying humanities, including geography and astronomy.

She was a prodigy being tutored by Susanna and her children. Phillis also started writing poetry. When her first work was published in 1767, she was recognized and given financial support by the Countess of Huntingdon. This recognition gave her passage to London and publication of her book of poems, "the first book written by a black woman in America". Phillis's astute writings received accolades from Americans John Hancock, George Washington, and English poetscholars Pope and Gray.

All social classes, including abolitionists and slavers, enjoyed reading her poetry. When Mrs. Wheatly died in 1774, Phillis immediately returned home. The Revolution became her primary interest—supporting the colonies while opposing slavery.

As bequeathed a freed slave upon the death of Susanna, Phillis continued to write. Unfortunately, her second book was not a financial success. Phillis married John Peters and their three children died during infancy. Phillis was employed as a domestic worker and died at 31 during labor. Her literary work helped support the American Revolution and abolition movements. If she lived now, Phillis would have been a poet laureate.

Since Prophecy Predicts Things Will Get Worse, Why Engage the Culture? By Rev. Mark Creech

There are many reasons pastors and other Christians offer for avoiding politics and other forms of cultural engagement, but one I find particularly annoying is based on eschatology. The argument claims that the Bible prophesies matters will only worsen before the Second Coming of Christ; therefore, nothing can

be done to stop the current trajectory of evil and injustice. Except for seeking to win others to faith in Christ before Judgment falls, it's mostly a waste of time to attempt changing the direction of a sinful society.

Frankly, there are many biblical responses to refute this point of view, but allow me to share one that's not so often given. It was a renowned Christian evangelist, Dr. Billy Graham, someone we don't typically think of as a social reformer, who articulated it quite well in his book, Approaching Hoofbeats. Graham wrote: "I believe the judgment of God can be withheld for a period of time. It doesn't even take the repentance of a whole city to delay God's judgment plans. Abraham was granted a delay if he could find a mere ten righteous men in Sodom. Still, the Judgment Day is coming. The distant sounds of the four horsemen grow louder every day. How long will God postpone the judgment? We do not know. But we do know from this wonderful vision of John [John's vision of the four horsemen in the book of Revelation] what we believers must do in the meantime. Those who have died in Christ must patiently wait for that day. Those of us still alive in Christ must continue working as God's allies in the salvation of the lost and social justice."

Graham's use of the phrase "social justice" didn't carry with it the Marxist trappings of nowadays. Graham was simply talking about the Christian's responsibility to work for changes in the world that reflect the character of our Creator. Graham stood for the civil rights of blacks in his day. His messages supported the battle against abortion, pornography, and vice.

Graham further admonished Christians in his book:

"We must not be content with easy answers. The call to follow Christ is not easy. It is easy to receive salvation – but there can never be 'cheap grace.' Our redemption by the Cross of Jesus Christ was costly to God. So, also, we must be willing to deny self and take up a cross and follow Christ. It is not easy to follow him. It is not easy to decide what tasks you can do and what tasks you must leave for others. It is not easy to take a stand when issues are complex and two-sided. It is not always easy to witness for him. It is not easy to work against evil that judgment might be postponed, but it is the task to which we are all called."

In Luke's Gospel, Jesus told a parable about a man who owned land and wanted a tree cut down. He wanted the tree removed because it wasn't producing fruit. When he instructed one of his workers to destroy the tree, the worker replied, 'Sir, leave it for a while just yet. Let me dig around it and fertilize it. Perhaps after doing this, it will bear fruit, but if not, you can cut it down' (Paraphrase of Lk. 13:6-8).

Certainly, this parable demonstrates delayed judgment to allow the endeavors of God's people to attempt to turn things around. And throughout history, it seems clear this has happened.

In his book, Graham mentions two times from the Bible. There was that time when the reluctant prophet Jonah was sent to Nineveh to preach God's imminent judgment. But the people turned away from their gross wickedness, and Nineveh was spared for another 150 years. Huldah, the prophetess, told the people of Judah that God's judgment was going to soon fall. The King responded by humbling himself before God. So, the Lord said to him, *"Therefore I will gather you to your fathers, and you will be buried in peace. Your eyes will not see the disaster I am going to bring on this place"* (2 Kings 22:20). Judgment was delayed until after the King's death several years later.

What are these but examples of delayed judgments, in part due to the obedience of God's servants, whose actions worked to that end?

Two great spiritual awakenings in America – one which took place before the Revolution and the second afterward, unquestionably saved this nation from destruction in its formative years. Because faithful preachers, men like Jonathan Edwards, George Whitfield, and many others were bold in speaking to the sins of their time, numerous revivals broke out, resulting in God sparing the country from what would have likely been a great fall.

I know what I've written will throw some prophecy hawks into a tizzy. But as Graham said, "[T]he Bible's prophecies are in such stark contrast with the synthetic predictions of the computer. The Bible takes human nature into account."

In other words, everything that God's Word predicts will come to pass. But exactly when or how these prophecies will pan out is not always so clear. What is abundantly clear, however, is that what God's people do and the way the world responds is factored into it.

Therefore, the Rapture isn't an excuse for the church to be raptured from responsibility now. Our task is not simply to prepare ourselves, our families, and others for the next world. We have a mandate to work to better God's creation – which is a reference to this world. We can't do that and avoid politics. We cannot reasonably keep it out.

When Christ finally does come again, "it will be good for that servant whose master finds him so doing" (Mt. 24:46).

Missionaries Kidnapped In Haiti: An Update And God's Call To Courage By Jim Denison

"God gave us a spirit not of fear but of power and love and self-control" (2 Timothy 1:7).

"Please pray for us! We are being held hostage, they kidnapped our driver. Pray pray pray. We don't know where they are taking us."

This call for help was posted in a WhatsApp group Saturday as seventeen missionaries and family members were being kidnapped by a street gang in Haiti. The group included sixteen Americans and one Canadian and was made up of five men, seven women, and five children.

The missionaries work with the Ohio-based Christian Aid Ministries and were returning from a site visit to an orphanage when they were abducted. Authorities believe the "400 Mawozo" gang, one of the most powerful in Haiti, is behind the kidnapping. As of this morning, no ransom demands have yet been made public.

The Washington Post notes that Haiti is reeling from a power vacuum following the assassination of its president earlier this year and the August earthquake that killed more than 2,200 people and left tens of thousands homeless. One result is that Haiti has the highest per-capita kidnapping rate on earth; recorded kidnappings so far this year have spiked six-fold over the same period last year. Doctors, preachers, entire busloads of people, and even police on patrol have been kidnapped by criminals.

Why would missionaries risk themselves and their children to serve in such a dangerous place? Assuming their answer is that God called them there, why would he? As we will see, these questions are relevant not just to missionaries in dangerous countries but to every Christian on earth.

Let's consider three biblical facts.

One: No place is safe

Last Friday, a member of the British parliament was stabbed to death inside a church where he was meeting with constituents. The next day, a deputy was killed and two others were injured in what authorities described as an ambush outside a Houston bar.

In other news, floods in India have killed at least twenty-six people. Meanwhile, authorities are warning that flooding could shut down a quarter of all critical US infrastructure in the future.

Last Wednesday, the largest cyberattack on an Israeli health system in its history forced it to shut down its technology network and caused delays in care. Understandably, a new poll shows that nine in ten Americans are concerned about hacking that involves their personal information, financial institution, government agencies, or utilities.

I placed these stories next to each other to illustrate the fact that no place on our fallen planet is truly safe. What happens overseas can happen in the US and vice versa. This is even more true for Christians: Jesus bluntly stated that "in the world, you will have tribulation" (John 16:33). He warned us: "*If they persecuted me, they will persecute you*" (John 15:20).

If you're looking for a way to live free from all temptation, problems, and pain, you'll have to wait until heaven (Revelation 21:4). There is no such place in this broken world. **Two: God sometimes calls us into or away from danger**

God sometimes calls his people headlong into the dangers of their day. He led the nation of Israel into Canaan despite the challenges they would face (Numbers 13:28–29) with the assurance: "*Do not be frightened, and do not be dismayed, for the LORD your God is with you wherever you go*" (Joshua 1:9).

Peter and the apostles refused to stop preaching even at the peril of their lives (Acts 4:5–12, 19–20). Paul insisted on returning to Jerusalem even after he was warned of the danger that awaited him (Acts 21:11–14). Jesus warned his disciples three times that he would die in the Holy City (Matthew 16:21–23; 17:22–23; 20:17–19).

However, earlier in his ministry, "when he heard that John had been arrested, Jesus withdrew into Galilee" (Matthew 4:12). When the Jews in Damascus plotted to kill Paul after his conversion, "his disciples took him by night and let him down through an opening in the wall, lowering him in a basket" (Acts 9:25).

Clearly, there are times God calls us to serve him in dangerous places and times he leads us from danger to safety. How can we know which is true for us?

Three: We must follow his Spirit to fulfill his purpose

In the book Great Thinkers, we are introduced to the Stoics and told that their philosophy remains "immediately relevant and useful for our uncertain and panicky times." This worldview is described as asserting the fact that we can and will cope with the worst life can bring us; we must learn to expect less from life so that we are not angry when our hopes are unfulfilled, and we should abandon the faith that there is a providential purpose in a world dominated by unpredictable fortune.

By contrast, Jesus prayed at the start of the day (Mark 1:35) and all through the day. Paul taught us to "*pray without ceasing*" (1 Thessalonians 5:17), to be "*filled with the Spirit*" (Ephesians 5:18), and to surrender our lives continually to God as a "*living sacrifice*" (Romans 12:1).

Jesus declared, "*I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will not walk in darkness, but will have the light of life*" (John 8:12). The key is that we must follow him—not just believe in him, read articles about him, or even write such articles. If you're in a dark cave and the tour guide has the only flashlight, the Martin Luther King Jr.'s profound prayer

Please join me in praying fervently for the kidnapped missionaries in Haiti and their families. As we pray for their safety, let's also join their organization's call to "pray that the gang members will come to repentance and faith in Jesus Christ."

And let's emulate the missionaries' courage with our obedience. When last did God call you to pay a price for your faith? Will you follow his light today wherever he leads, whatever it takes, whatever the cost?

Martin Luther King Jr. prayed, "Use me, God. Show me how to take who I am, who I want to be, and what I can do, and use it for a purpose greater than myself." What purpose will your life serve today?

WAMY Community Action, Inc Accepting Applications for Essential Single-Family Rehabilitation Program By April Beck *Mitchell County*

WAMY Community Action, Inc. is currently accepting applications for the Essential Single Family Rehab (ESFR) program, administered through the North Carolina Housing Finance Agency (NCHFA). Funding from ESFR will assist with essential and critical repairs to single-family homes that are owned and occupied by lower-income households. These repairs help veterans, seniors, and persons with disabilities stay in their homes, saving on health care and long-term care costs.

Qualifying units must be located in Mitchell County and be owner-occupied, having a full-time household member who is an older adult (age 62+), disabled or a veteran, or a household with a child under the age of six whose health is threatened by the presence of lead hazards. Site-built, off-frame modular units and manufactured homes on permanent foundations will be eligible for consideration; all homes served must be considered as real property. The gross household income (before taxes) cannot exceed 80% of the area median income for Mitchell County (see chart). The cost of rehabilitation cannot be less than \$5,000, nor exceed \$30,000 and the property cannot have been repaired or rehabilitated with public funding of \$30,000 or more within the past 10 years.

ESFR is an interest-free loan secured by a Deed of Trust, forgiven at the rate of \$5,000 per year until the principal balance is reduced to zero. No loan payments are required from the homeowner unless the house is sold or transfers ownership.

Typical repairs supported by the program might include roof repair/replacement, door/window replacement, plumbing/electric, accessibility improvements for individuals with disabilities, and other general improvements related to health and safety. Applications are available by calling WAMY Community Action, Inc. at (828) 406-4705.

Applications should be returned as soon as possible, but no later than 5 PM on December 31, 2021. The selection of units will not be completed until February 15, 2021.

Last month, the Republican-led General Assembly passed Senate Bill 191 – The No Patient Left Alone Act, after nearly a year of deliberation. I co-sponsored this bill to ensure that sick loved ones being cared for in healthcare facilities can have a visitor present while fighting for their lives.

Lockdowns and visitation restrictions due to COVID-19 resulted in many patients coping with serious illnesses or medical treatments without the presence of a family member or friend. Even worse, many of these patients died alone. This is truly heartbreaking for those who died without the comfort and care of a loved one, nor the opportunity to say a final goodbye. It is equally heartbreaking for those loved ones who were denied a visit with their dying family member or friend. This legislation ensures that these situations never happen again.

The No Patient Left Alone Act creates mandatory visitation rights for patients in nursing homes, combination homes, hospice care facilities, adult care homes, special care units, and residential treatment facilities, and requires those facilities to follow federal guidelines for visitation. The Department of Health and Human Services must assess a \$500 civil penalty against a facility for each violation on each day a facility violates a visitation right.

Nineteen House Democrats were the only legislators who voted against The No Patient Left Alone Act. The bill became session law on October 15, 2021, and will become effective November 1, 2021.

Two important bills protecting patients' and nursing home residents' rights have become law. Both bills were introduced by NC House members in an effort to address threats to those rights arising out of the way the state has previously reacted to the Covid pandemic. One bill is known as Clifford's Law and the other as the Jeff Rieg Law.

Many will recall heart-wrenching events at the height of the pandemic in which nursing home residents who had Covid were denied visitation by family members or anyone else and died alone. This caused extreme distress for all involved. Clifford's Law directs the NC Secretary of Health and Human Services to establish visitation protocols in times of declared disasters and emergencies that will provide visitation rights for patients in nursing homes, combination homes, and adult care homes, including family care homes. The bill would allow each resident to receive a visit at least twice per month from one preapproved visitor or preapproved alternate visitor.

The ban imposed on visits also prevented clergy visits. The North Carolina legislature deemed this clergy ban an unnecessarily cruel and inappropriate stance. Indeed, both in the case of Clifford and Jeff Rieg, the bans that were previously in place appeared clearly detrimental to both the mental and physical health of the affected patients and nursing home residents left totally isolated. Worse, these isolated individuals often may have had reduced ability to understand why family and others seemed to have abandoned them. The Jeff Rieg Law was crafted to protect a patient's religious rights in times of disaster or emergencies. It requires a hospital to allow clergy members to visit admitted patients who wish to be visited by a clergy member.

Show me a nation's energy policies, and I'll show you the future of that nation. It's the lifeblood of any country; it fuels our direction and defines our foothold on the world stage.

When I filled up my truck in Hendersonville last week, I paid \$81. That's a lot of money but had I filled up at one gas station in California, it would have cost me \$200. That's because one town has been forced to charge \$8 per gallon, nearly three times what North Carolinians are paying. But soon, nationwide gas prices could inch closer to California's numbers, and Americans will all be left shouldering the burden.

It's not just gasoline that's leaped in cost – coal, natural gas, and oil are all spiking under President Biden. Gas prices alone have jumped 42% under his administration. What's caused this drastic shift in prices? The Biden administration has declared a war on fossil fuels in the name of destructive, progressive energy policies, and the American taxpayer is footing the bill. Energy production has sharply decreased under Biden's administration, and less supply has led to a higher demand for energy essentials.

Under President Trump, our energy independence carved out our standing in the world. We augmented our national security through America First energy independence, not foreign reliance, and we took our rightful place among the nations as a global leader in energy dominance. America was leading the world.

The United States transformed into the world's number one producer of oil under President Trump. We also solidified our position as the top producer of natural gas. Joe Biden's energy policies have destabilized a vital statewide industry; they are a direct assault on the livelihoods of people in North Carolina and NC-11.

The Biden administration needs to completely reverse its energy strategy. There is no legitimate reason to continue on this path – it's unsustainable. This is not a seasonal problem, it's the consequences of a fundamental policy failure. My constituents, many still reeling from pandemic layoffs and lockdowns, are struggling to make ends meet. Chaplains Serving in Flooded Birmingham Suburb

The Billy Graham Rapid Response Team (BG-RRT) is ministering alongside Samaritan's Purse to Pelham, Alabama, where more than 80 people were rescued after floodwaters submerged vehicles and homes earlier this month.

The National Weather Service said central Alabama experienced as much as 13 inches of rainfall, causing streams and creeks to overflow. These floodwaters inundated entire vehicles, caused a

landslide, and left many drivers with no other option but to climb out their windows after their cars stalled. Four people died, including a 4-year-old girl and an 18-year-old woman in swept-away vehicles.

"The destruction caused by this flooding is significant and our prayers go out to all of those who were impacted, especially those who lost loved ones," said Josh Holland, BG-RRT's assistant director. "Our crisis-trained chaplains will be there to listen as people share their stories, and to share God's love and hope that is found through Jesus Christ."

Alabama resident John McGuire is heading up the team of chaplains, addressing the emotional and spiritual needs in the area. He served in Pelham earlier this year when a tornado hit the town in late March. While Samaritan's Purse volunteers work on mudding out people's flooded homes, BG-RRT chaplains are taking time to get to know homeowners, offering prayer and helping them process the recent disaster.

The Alabama deluge took place around seven weeks after over a dozen people died in catastrophic floodwaters in Tennessee. Nineteen BG-RRT chaplains offered emotional and spiritual care to the devastated region. Please keep all those affected by these floodwaters in your prayers.



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Value of current manufactured home trade in toward purchase of a new manufactured home is determined by resale values in your area and final evaluation determination by home center manager. Deposit funds in addition to trade in may be required.

Freedom Life has hired a Program Director for the McDowell Substance Use Coalition (MSUC) funded by Kate B. Reynolds Trust. The MSUC Mission is using advocacy, education, and empowerment to ensure McDowell County is a community where substance use prevention, treatment, and sustainable recovery are possible.

Angela Grubb began her position on October 4, 2021, and has experience in public health, public health research, mental health, child protective services, and grant writing/grants management. Ms. Grubb has spent the last 10 years at Wake Forest School of Medicine but also spent many years working with communities to address public health priorities in Stokes County.

Ms. Grubb believes that substance misuse is a public health crisis and that all of us are affected by it in some way. Having worked in mental health and social services, Ms. Grubb has seen how families are affected by substance misuse and

hopes to encourage the community to support each other as we address this public health crisis. Those who live with the struggle of using substances need to know that it is ok to seek services and that we care for them as a family, friend, or community neighbor. Ms. Grubb says "the stigma associated with seeking substance misuse services or mental health services should be non-existent, but unfortunately that is not the case". MSUC has been busy for nearly 9 years discussing community needs surrounding substance misuse issues. Now, with a Program Director, it can be possible with organizational development and capacity building to establish the coalition as a 501c3 nonprofit corporation. Being a nonprofit will open doors to the funding needed to address the goals and priorities for the McDowell Substance Use Coalition.

Ms. Grubb encourages everyone to remember

loved ones who struggle with substance misuse problems and sees MSUC as an opportunity to get involved with their community to address this public health crisis. Substance misuse can be related to mental health issues, unemployment, food insecurity, domestic violence, suicide, and relationship problems. Based on data and just looking around to those you live with, play with, and work with; it is easy to see the need to get involved!!

MSUC believes that recovery is possible and believes in (1) the power of diverse backgrounds, perspectives, and ideas; (2) the power of collaboration, community, and connection, and (3) whole-person solutions to substance use-related challenges. MSUC values: (1) building and fostering inclusive environments, (2) open-mindedness and communication, and (3) leading with compassion, always.

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

God Is Great...God Is Good By Toby Crowder Mitchell County

"Great is the LORD, and greatly to be praised; and his greatness is unsearchable."

"The LORD is good to all: and his tender mercies are over all his works." PSALM 145:3 & 9



folks' minds when they read the title of this article. Even though many of us grew up learning (and teaching to our children) that modest prayer of blessing, how many of us have ever considered the immense truth that is contained in these simple words? Even though I only included verses three and nine of Psalm 145, I encourage you to read the entirety of this Psalm and consider the goodness and greatness of God as we enter this season of Thanksgiving.

When studying the Psalms, we learn that several of them seem to have a repetitive nature or a consistent theme. The entire thought of this particular Psalm is one of praise and thanksgiving to God. Many times, in Scripture, the themes of prayer and praise seem to blend together. Even though the preceding four chapters deal largely with prayer, there is no petition or request involved in this Psalm. It is simply a beautiful declaration of praise as the writer ponders the limitless glory and goodness of God.

As we enter the month of November, we often take time to look towards Thanksgiving and reflect upon our blessings, even though we are blessed all throughout the year! As a result, our lives should praise God daily... in all that we do. Certain people may vocally praise God while others do not. Some folks have their eyes fixed upon Him and cannot help but appreciate His goodness while others are self-absorbed, and live a life focused on their own desires. When God is the center of our life and being, we cannot help but praise Him. I am sure that this Psalmist was not perfect, and neither was His life... but he found reasons to praise God.

The Psalmist begins his chorus of praise by focusing on the greatness of God. We read about "great" men of History and Science, but God is greater than them all! If He is going to be God, He must be greater than anything else in our lives. Even though God's greatness is immeasurable, we consider that He is great in His person AND His works. In verses 4-5, the Psalmist speaks of God's wondrous works and terrible acts. In verse five he mentions the majesty of God. Majesty refers to that for which a person is admired or extolled. As we consider this word, we realize that everything about God is glorious...His name, His works, His ways, and all that He does is truly worthy of our praise and thanksgiving. The Apostle Paul knew God as few men ever have and yet he said in Romans 11:33: *"O the depth of the riches both of the wisdom and knowledge of God! how unsearchable are his judgments, and his ways past finding out!"*

Not only does the Psalmist recognize that God's greatness is immeasurable, but he also recognizes that God is good! God is the culmination of the two traits... goodness and greatness. If God was only great but not good, He may not manifest His love to us in the ways that He does. On the other hand, If He were good, but not great He would be incapable of being our God! And so, we rejoice today in the fact that God is both great and good! God does not will anything evil for His children. We are reminded of this in James 1:17: "*Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, and cometh down from the Father of lights, with whom is no variableness, neither shadow of turning.*" God's goodness is abundant (v.7), compassionate (v.8), and universal (v. 9) which inspires the Psalmist to lead a universal declaration of praise in v.21: "My mouth shall speak the praise of the LORD: and let all flesh bless his holy name forever and ever."

As we consider the simplicity of this message and prayer, let us not forget the necessity of thankfulness during this holiday season. Truly we can say together with the writer of this Psalm... "God is great, and God is Good!"

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Marlene's Meditations

Shift Your Weight of Worry

Philippians 4:6-7 "Be careful for nothing; but in every thing by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God. And the peace of God, which passeth all understanding, shall keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus."

My husband reached for our sleeping child, completely relaxed on my shoulder. Gently lifting the chunky

thirteen-month-old weight from my sagging shoulders suddenly lifted me up. Instantly, I felt enough energy returning to settle my son for the night and finish small chores.

Relieving burdens. Shifting six bags of groceries to the kitchen counter. Carrying things to a moving van and hearing the satisfying clunk when they slide off our backs. Sensing a weightless surge of relief when we transfer our load to someone or something reminds me of spiritual truth in Philippians 4:6-7.

Adding thanksgiving to our requests results in peace that guards and keeps us. The spiritual effect of thanksgiving exhilarates the children of God. The encouragement phrase in these verses, "*Be careful for nothing*;" or, simply put, don't worry about anything, opens the door to enjoying the use of prayer and supplication. But, like the armor described in Ephesians, prayer operates as the key to using the armor. Similarly, thanksgiving shifts our weight of worry to Jesus who longs to bear our burdens of life.

We often color our problems in life with emotions, honoring them with first place in our reactions. But this verse implies that we possess the privilege of lifting those emotions in our many requests to our God who hears His children at any time of the night or day. With a simple letter, s, He invites us to talk with Him about multiple troubles that plague us.

In the act of thanksgiving, Jesus gently untangles the limbs and body of the weight of our worry to Himself. Like a guaranteed inoculation against disease, the next verse injects our spirits with peace—protection against soul pain. Somehow, the simple act of adding thanksgiving to the voicing of our worries invites Jesus to rescue our sagging strength by exchanging His peace for our problems. What a relief that we can instantly discern the difference between the lonely responsibility of things we can't change to the certain knowledge that our Savior can direct circumstances and change people to His will.

Thirty years later, I still feel the refreshing relief of my sleeping son's heavyweight sliding from me as strong hands took care of him. My memories remind me that Christ's command to simply add thankfulness to my requests during prayer adds the protection and power of peace to my daily life.

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

A Pastor's View

"Winning Over Worry" (Philippians 4:4-9) By Shawn Thomas

Angleton, Texas

In Amor Towles' A Gentleman in Moscow, a Russian count was exiled within the confines of a hotel which he could not leave at the risk of his life. At one point, the Count is consumed with worry: "Sleep did not come so easily to our weary friend. Like in a reel in which the dancers ... come skipping brightly down the aisle, a concern of the Count's



would present itself for his consideration, bow with a flourish, and then take its place at the end of the line so that the next concern could come dancing to the fore." (p. 267)

Some of us have basically have had that same experience: one worry after another takes its place in our minds! That is NOT the state God desires for His people. But how do we deal with worry? Philippians 4:4-9 shows us:

First, it encourages us to REMEMBER THE LORD. It begins "*Rejoice in the Lord always* ..." and adds: "*the Lord is near*." Many of us who worry need to consciously remember that God is with us, and rejoice in HIM. There's an old expression: "glance at your problem; gaze at God." We don't need to "stick our heads in the sand" and pretend problems aren't there. But we shouldn't obsess over them either. "Glance" at that problem — but GAZE at God! And rejoice in who He is in your life.

The first thing to make sure of is that Jesus IS the Lord your life. You can't rejoice in Him always if you've never really committed your life to Him. The gospel is that we sinned, and separated ourselves from God. But Jesus came to die on the cross and pay for our sins, to reconcile us with God. When you repent of your sins and trust Jesus as your Lord & Savior, He forgives your sins, sends His Spirit into your heart, and promises you a home in heaven with pleasures that are literally "out of this world"! With that kind future ahead of us, a person who belongs to Christ can ALWAYS find something to rejoice in! When you're tempted to worry: "Rejoice in the Lord"!

A second way to alleviate worry is to PRAY CONTINUALLY. Verse 6 says: "Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God."

This could be summed up: "Worry about nothing; pray about everything." That's easy to remember, and makes sense — but the thing is DOING it! Many things in life we "know" to do — but we just don't DO them!

I'll be honest: there have been situations in my own life when I began to worry about something, and only later thought: "You really need to PRAY about this — PASTOR SHAWN!!" We've all probably been in that situation. We get so caught up worrying that we forget to REALLY pray. We "know" to, but we don't always DO it as we should. And like everything in Christianity, the power is not in the "knowing" of it; but in the DOING of it.

So every time you're tempted to worry; PRAY. Put this verse on a card in your pocket or tape it on your mirror; memorize it; and each time you're tempted to worry, quote it, and pray. How many times do you need to do that? AS MANY TIMES AS IT TAKES! 500 times a day if need be. This is the spiritual battle. Don't give in to worry. "*Worry about nothing. Pray about everything.*." If you'll do that, God's peace will guard your mind, and you will win the victory over worry.

Third, WATCH YOUR INPUT. The old adage is, "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure." That applies to worry as well. It's no coincidence that:8 says: "Whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is right, whatever is pure ... let your mind dwell on these things." Why would God say that, right after He spoke to us about anxiety? Because what we "feed our minds" has a big impact on how we think and feel. At least SOME of the anxiety we experience is a result of what we watch, read, and listen to.

Sometimes the media seems to THRIVE on making people anxious, so they'll stay tuned:

— we have to see if that storm develops!

- we have to know if that riot gets worse! And so on.

Several people have told me over the past months: "I'm turning the news off; it's making me too anxious." And that's legitimate. Not that we should "bury our heads in the sand" and ignore what's going on in the world, but we also don't need to watch the news 24/7 — especially if it increases our anxiety. Again, a good prescription here would be: "glance at the news, and gaze at God." Give God more attention than you do the media.

We should evaluate all our input by Philippians 4:8: "*Is this 'true'? Is it 'hon-orable'? Is it 'right'? Is it 'PURE?* ..." If it's not, we shouldn't read it, watch it, or listen to it. Many of us would worry less if we better guarded what we feed our minds.

And it's not just what we DON'T watch or listen to, but what we DO. We need to fill our minds with godly books, music — and especially the word of God.

A doctor grew up in England in the 1800s, with a widowed mother and several siblings. It was hard for her to provide for them. But he said whenever his mother was discouraged or worried, she would sit down and quote Psalm 20, and it would give her peace. So the kids called Psalm 20 "Mother's Psalm."

Find a scripture that will become "your Psalm," and turn to it whenever you're tempted to worry. God's Spirit will use that to help you trust Him. But that scripture won't just "magically" appear in your mind — you have to make the effort to memorize it. But replace your anxious, worrisome thoughts with God's words that are true and right and pure; and it will make a difference in your attitude. Each of us should ask ourselves:

- What input should I cut out, that causes me to worry or stress?

— What input can I ADD to my life that will help? Start with daily Bible reading. Memorize scripture. Listen to Christian music. Cut OUT what drags you down; add IN what helps you trust God. It will make a difference. What you feed your mind matters.

Verse 9 says: "*PRACTICE these things, and the God of peace will be with you.*" You can have the peace you're looking for. You can win the battle over worry. But he says you have to "PRACTICE these things." You must DO what he shows you here. But if you will, you CAN win the battle over worry.

"PRACTICE these things — and the God of peace will be with you"!
