
#### **Eternity & Eternal Security**

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#### A Pastor's View

#### Accept God's Direction To Wait

Acts 1 tells us that just before Jesus left earth after His resurrection, He gathered His disciples together and commanded them "not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait for what the Father had promised …".

Significantly, Jesus commanded His disciples to WAIT. Maybe they were thinking about leaving because they

weren't from there, or maybe they even wanted to go and begin the mission work Jesus told them they would be doing. But for whatever reason they were thinking about leaving, Jesus told them, don't do it. Stay where you are. "WAIT for what the Father had promised."

Of course, in Acts 1, Jesus wanted them to wait for the coming of the Holy Spirit, but the Bible is full of similar commands from God for His people to wait on Him:

- Jesus told the disciples here, "WAIT for what the Father had promised."
- Psalm 27:14 says, "WAIT for the LORD; be strong and let your heart take courage; yes wait for the LORD."
- Psalm 37 is a great Psalm of trust in the Lord; it says in:7 "Rest in the LORD and WAIT patiently for Him;":9 says "those who WAIT for the LORD, THEY will inherit the land;":34 says, "WAIT for the LORD and keep His way, and He will exalt you to inherit the land." Psalm 37 continually encourages us: "WAIT FOR THE LORD"!
- Psalm 130:5-6 says, "I WAIT for the LORD, my soul does WAIT ... My soul WAITS for the Lord more than the watchman for the morning; indeed more than the watchman for the morning."
- Isaiah 40:31 famously says, "They that WAIT on the LORD shall renew their strength  $\dots$ "

Over and over the Bible indicates there are great blessings for us when we wait for the Lord. But it can be hard to wait, can't it? So many times we find ourselves in situations where we feel like nothing's happening, and we're "just tired of sitting around," and we feel the need to get out and just "do something." Sometimes we ourselves may feel that way — but sometimes it is other people who are pressuring us: "You need to do something!" They may or may not know what it is we should do, but they just think you should "do something"!

The problem is a lot of times when we just "do something," that "something" we do ends up being wrong. We see an instance of that in I Samuel 13 when King Saul was at war with the Philistines. The prophet Samuel had told Saul to wait until he came and made the sacrifice for them before the battle, but Samuel was late. Verse 8 says "the people were scattering" from Saul, so:9 says that Saul, who was not a priest, went ahead and made the burnt offering himself. But "as soon as he finished offering the burnt offering, behold Samuel came." Samuel said, "What have you done?" Saul told him, well you hadn't come, and I saw that the Philistines were gathering for war, and our people were scattering, "So I forced myself and offered the burnt offering." Samuel told him, "You have acted foolishly." And he told him, "Your kingdom will not endure." The Lord seeks a man after His own heart, who will obey Him. Saul felt that pressure; everybody wanted him to "do something." He gave in to that pressure, didn't wait on the Lord, and it cost him the kingdom.

Sometimes the best thing we can do is just wait. On November 21, 1960, the new U.S. space program attempted to launch a Redstone rocket, but when all the smoke from the launch had cleared, the rocket was still standing there! The parachutes had deployed, and the "umbilical cord" that held the rocket had come off. Now, what were they going to do? They had a rocket they had no control over, which could be knocked over by the wind, and it would be dangerous for any technicians to approach it.

NASA flight director Chris Kraft listened intently to his crew as they desperately searched for a way out. Then one of the test conductors came up with a plan that made sense: "The winds are forecast to remain calm, so if we wait until tomorrow morning, the batteries will deplete, the relays and valves will go to the normally open condition. ... then it will then be safe to approach the rocket.' Kraft nodded and growled at his controllers, "That is the first rule of flight control. If you don't know what to do, don't do anything.' .... 'Doing nothing' worked: by early the next morning, the batteries were depleted, the system disarmed, and the pressure relieved." (Gene Kranz, Failure Is Not An Option, pp. 31-32)

Waiting overnight solved the problem. They just needed to wait.

That's a good lesson for many of us today too. Sometimes the best thing we can do is just wait. You don't always just need to "just do something." Make sure you are doing WHAT God wants you to do WHEN God wants you to do it. If you don't, that "something" you do will end up being wrong, and it will cost you, and likely hurt others as well. So don't "just do something." Wait until you know what God wants you to do, and for His timing for you to do it. We need to learn that obeying God not only means GO when He calls us to go, but WAIT when He needs us to wait!

So what does that look like?

- Sometimes "waiting" on God literally means just to wait. Don't do anything yet; don't make any decisions now; just wait on His timing.
- But often in scripture, "waiting" on the Lord means seeking Him in prayer and His word. So don't just "sit there and wait;" actively seek what God has to say to you in His word about your situation. Don't "stick your finger in the Bible" looking for a miraculous word, just do your normal daily Bible reading, but watch for what God might say to you about your situation there.
- Don't make the mistake that Saul made: don't just decide because everybody

else thinks you should. You wait and make sure that you have peace that this is what God wants you to do and that it is when He wants you to do it.

- Don't just marry "somebody;" WAIT for the right one God has for you!
- Don't just go to any college; go where God is really leading you.
- Don't just take off in "some" direction; wait for God's clear leadership first.

Make sure you are doing WHAT God wants you to do WHEN He wants you to do it.

Jesus told His disciples: don't just head out of here and go "somewhere." Wait for the promise of the Holy Spirit. He may be saying the same thing to some of us today. Don't just do "something." WAIT for the Lord!

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

#### Don't Become Complacent Stay Focused on God

"Remember therefore how thou hast received and heard, and hold fast, and repent. If therefore thou shalt not watch, I will come on thee as a thief, and thou shalt not know what hour I will come upon thee." Revelation 3: 3

Christians are to be attentive, to stay alert and focused on things of God, the One who is perfect in all His fullness. In Revelation 3 verse one the church at Sardis had a good reputation in the community, but they had lost the power of God – He was no longer being glorified. Just as this congregation lost its connection with God, Christians today sometimes lose connection with God and become complacent exchanging a personal relationship with God for a superficial form of Christianity, but not having an intimate, personal relationship with Jesus Christ, a form of godliness, but denying the power thereof or turning away. Becoming complacent is feeling so satisfied with one's own abilities or situation that the attitude is, you don't need God. You are content with where you are in life. This complacent attitude ignores the reality of God's guidelines of having eternal life. We can't afford to be complacent about our eternal security.

Christ Himself bestows the Holy Spirit on His followers. A displaced Spirit and misplaced confidence can lead to our being complacent in our Spiritual Journey. We are to stay alert and focused on things of God and the return of Jesus Christ. Don't become overly content, that being one with the world. Don't become marked by self-satisfaction. Don't become satisfied with your own abilities. Without Christ, we can do nothing. If we stay focused on God, we have got to include the things of God in our daily lives! A complacent attitude ignores the reality of the time, becoming satisfied with current worldly situations and unconcerned with changing their current state of living, to the point of being proud and pleased with themselves.

Easily one distraction after another hinders staying focused on our individual worship time with our God, our Heavenly Father. We need someone whispering in our ear to stay "Focused on God". We are not to become complacent in our daily walk with God. We are to make sure to preserve our own faithfulness. In Revelation 3:3 people who have become complacent with self in worldly matters are urged to go back to what they first heard and believed, to get back to the basics of our faith. It is important to grow in our knowledge of the Lord our God and to deepen our understanding through careful study. But no matter how much we learn; we must never abandon the basic truths – God's Truth. No new truth we learn through Scripture will ever contradict these Bible teachings.

Don't become complacent in your wealth and worldly comfort. Don't let your self-satisfaction cause you to die Spiritually and stop growing in your Spiritual faith. Don't lack compassionate service to others or unity of love. Are you watchful and alert? If God has given you a place of responsibility to teach, lead, or serve, use that position to encourage those around you to be Spiritually awake and morally prepared to meet Jesus Christ at His return. Be the whisper that others hear to stay focused on God. Christ Himself bestows the Holy Spirit on His followers. We are to be "clothed in white raiment" which means we are to be set apart for God, signifying purity, righteousness, and sanctification in Him (Psalm 51:7; Isaiah 1:18; Revelation 7:14; 19:14). Don't give the appearance of being alive, but being actually dead to Christs' teachings. God can look below the surface of one's heart and mind, He knows if your works are ineffective. Don't be a Christian in name only while your works remain incomplete for the Kingdom of God. Our work will not be complete until Jesus Christ returns.

Jesus said in John 15:1-11, "Abide in me." He repeated that in two other ways in John 15:5-8 while also providing a stark warning and a vast promise: "I am the vine, ye are the branches: He that abideth in me, and I in him, the same bringeth forth much fruit: for without me ye can do nothing. If a man abides not in me, he is cast forth as a branch, and is withered; and men gather them, and cast them into the fire, and they are burned. Herein is my Father glorified, that ye bear much fruit; so shall ye be my disciples."

Staying focused on God requires abiding in Him. If you create the discipline to spend the first minutes of your day reading the Word of God and talking to Him about the day ahead, you will have a greater focus on Him throughout the day. If you don't know where to start, try reading John 15:1-11 each morning for a week. Listen to what God has to say.

Becoming smug in satisfaction with oneself or one's achievement causes them to become overly content with themselves which in return causes them to feel they do not need to do anything about their Spiritual situation, They become too complacent to make changes even though their situation may be uncertain or dangerous and often without awareness. We can't afford to become complacent about God in our lives and our Spiritual well-being. We simply can't become complacent about our future. (Reference Revelation 1:3)

As long as the presence of doubt is detected, neither faith nor knowledge can ever be complacent.

#### No To-Do List

I get stressed out when my to-do list reaches double digits. But the to-do list for the Israelites in the Old Testament was 613 items!

One of those items was the Sabbath. It started where Genesis 2:21 says that God "rested on the seventh day" (NASB). The word in Hebrew is shabat which means to "repose" or "cessation" from exertion.



The Sabbath was one of 613 laws instituted as a way to help the Hebrew community trust God, to bind the Israelite people together closely, and to keep them separate from the rest of humankind. But we now live in what's called the "age of grace." Paul tells us about the grace we receive by writing, "Therefore, having been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom also we have obtained our introduction by faith into this grace in which we stand; and we exult in hope of the glory of God" (Romans 5:1-2). We no longer are bound to the "to-do" list of the 613 laws of the Old Testament.

We enjoy a constant state of Sabbath rest based on grace. Works are not required for this rest we enjoy. Later in Romans Paul writes, "The wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 6:23). We enjoy the free gift of eternal life because of our faith in Christ, not because of our works. Therefore we have rest from works.

This rest from works is discussed in Hebrews 4:9, 10, "So there remains a Sabbath rest for the people of God. For the one who has entered His rest has himself also rested from his works, as God did from His." These two verses don't tell us we are supposed to take a Sabbath Day rest (but I do believe that is important for us to do). The author of Hebrews uses the Sabbath as an illustration to explain his big idea of the entire book: Christ is better. Throughout the book, the author says that Christ is better than the prophets (Hebrews 1:1-4), better than the angels (Hebrews 1:5-2:18), better than Moses (Hebrews 3:1-4:13), better than the Levitical priests (Hebrews 4:14-10:18), and better than the priest Melchizedek (Hebrews 7:1-8:13).

Just as God ceased from His creative activity on the seventh day (Hebrews 4:4) now believers cease from working for their salvation. This is because believers enter God's rest through faith. "Truly, truly, I say to you, he who hears My word, and believes Him who sent Me, has eternal life, and does not come into judgment, but has passed out of death into life" (John 5:24).

We enjoy rest in Christ because our faith in Him saves us, not our to-do list.

"And it came to pass, when the time was come that he should be received up, he steadfastly set his face to go to Jerusalem," (Luke 9:51)

There are many lessons available to the student willing to invest time and energy in the exercise of the disciplines presented to 'would be' disciples of the Lord Jesus during the 40 days of Lent. Lent is the season of the Christian year (beginning Ash Wednesday and culminating on the



Saturday before Easter-calculated minus the Sabbaths) wherein individuals and churches focus on the painful truths of the substitutionary atonement of all humanity through the suffering and death of God's only begotten Son, Jesus Christ. The first and perhaps most misunderstood of these disciplines is seen through the determination and commitment of Jesus to the call of God, no matter what suffering and pain He might experience.

Rare is the person today who will willfully deny themselves the usual pleasures of life. Rarer still is the human being who will sacrifice their own comforts on behalf of another. To do such would require an exceptional level of intestinal fortitude! Or to put it another way: Living determined lives and demonstrating a commitment to faithfulness to God... takes guts!

Our Lord demonstrated such for us as He began His journey to Jerusalem for the last time before He would face rejection, ridicule, and even death at the hands of those He had come to redeem. Luke records his understanding of Jesus' obedience to God's Will that He experiences the horrors awaiting Him by "setting His face" to go to Jerusalem. The Greek word sterizo (pronounced stay-rid'-zoh) meaning 'to turn resolutely in a certain direction' indicates that the two aforemen-

tioned disciplines are on display for anyone paying attention.

Nothing would keep Jesus from experiencing what He most surely knew would be a level of suffering beyond anything we can imagine.

Thus, Ash Wednesday and the forty days of Lent present anyone who desires



to gain new insight and motivation in living as a Christian with the challenge of practicing determination and commitment. Imagine the hope born from an incarcerated individual when reflecting upon these things. Jesus Christ, the only begotten Son of God, was determined and committed to becoming the sacrifice for all of our sins! He would suffer the cruelest form of execution to purchase our redemption!

As Chaplain, it is my joy to witness those who 'set their faces' turning towards the future and face rejection, ridicule, and suffering as a result of their allegiance to God in Jesus Christ! I report with great enthusiasm that some resist the temptation to just survive the days of their confinement and choose instead to thrive on the spiritual path upon which their faith has placed them! I love encouraging them to realize that they are not alone and that they have what it takes to follow Jesus. Their number might be limited, but one can literally see in their eyes above their masks that they are choosing the attributes demonstrated by their Savior in their daily walk. Granted this challenge has been even greater during the long season of COVID we have endured. But in my interactions with many I see, hear, and understand that they've got the guts needed to get to their destination. Do you?

The phrase, "What would Jesus do?" often abbreviated to WWJD, became popular particularly in the United States in the late 1800s after the widely read book by Charles Sheldon entitled, In His Steps: What Would Jesus Do. The phrase had a resurgence in the US and elsewhere beginning in the 1990s as a motto for Christians who use the phrase as a reminder of their belief in a moral compass to act in a manner that would



demonstrate the love, character, and deeds of Jesus. "What would Jesus do" is indeed a good motto to imitate Christ.

And indeed, Jesus was not getting baptized because He needed cleansing from sin. Not at all! This is why John was reluctant. But as the fulfillment of Daniel's prophecy and as an example for all, Jesus convinces John to perform the valuable and important task.

There in Mark's Gospel in the 1st chapter and the 10th verse we read: "And immediately, coming up from the water, He saw the heavens parting and the Spirit descending upon Him like a dove." Interesting. Jesus came up out of the water. The form of baptism that Jesus did, is what is known as baptism by immersion. If one wants to do what Jesus did, and I hope we all want to do what Jesus did, then we would be baptized by allowing our bodies to be put under water thus showing the death of the old and the rebirth of the new man.

Jesus, as He concludes His time on earth when for a few weeks following His resurrection, He shares closing instructions to His followers before returning to Heaven. 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

#### NIV Bible Corruption

"Ye shall not add unto the word which I command you, neither shall ye diminish ought [word or thing] from it, that ye may keep the commandments of the LORD your God which I command you;" Deuteronomy 4:2.

The Authorized King James Bible is God's word to mankind and contains the Masoretic Text which is Hebrew and Aramaic, and Textus Receptus the received Greek. These



For 600 Years leading up to the Authorized KJV Bible Acts 3:26 is translated the same way. Along comes the NIV, which adds and removes words, deletes complete verses, and changes many scriptures. Countless other examples of changes made to God's Word could be shown to prove why the NIV is a corrupted bible. Acts 3:26 is just one example of this corrupted NIV bible scripture.

Authorized KJV Bible - Acts 3:26, "unto you first God, having raised up His Son Jesus, sent him to bless you, in turning away every one of you from his iniquities." "His Son Jesus" (Removed from the NIV bible) NIV Acts 3:26

NIV Bible - Acts 3:26, "when God raised up his servant, he sent him first to you to bless you, in turning away every one of you from his iniquities."

Moses was a servant (1Ch 6:49); Paul was a servant (Tit 1:1); James was a servant (Jas 1:1), and many others. Acts 4:12 "Nor is there salvation in any other, for there is no other name under heaven given among men by which we must be saved". That would be The LORD Jesus Christ, The Son of God.

Pastor Cooper Abrams, Calvary Baptist Church, Utah, USA, comments on corrupted bibles. "I bring to the table over ten years of formal study and three earned degrees in Bible, the last being a Ph.D. with a Bible major. The English Revised Version of the Bible, (1885) was based on only two Eastern Greek texts, the Greek Sinaiticus (Aleph), dated 340 AD, and the Codex Vaticanus (B) dated 325-50 AD. Both of these manuscripts plainly show they have been changed and tampered with making them a corrupt and inaccurate text. It is important to realize these changes are part of all the modern versions such as the NIV, ASV, NASV, RSV, and all other modern versions. Another thought to consider is who benefits from corrupting God's word? The answer is obvious. Satan, as he directs false teachers, churches, and cults which bring confusion to God's saving word". (End)

A severe warning from God Almighty directed to those who deliberately remove or add words to the prophecy of the Bible. Revelations 22:18 19; "For I testify unto every man that heareth the words of the prophecy of this book, if any man shall add unto these things, God shall add unto him the plagues that are written in this book. And if any man shall take away from the words of the book of this prophecy, God shall take away his part out of the book of life, and out of the holy city, and from the things which are written in this book."

This NIV Bible corruption is part of the fiery trial which is to test every professing Christian. Give a warning to them; Ezekiel 3:17 "Son of man, hear the word at my mouth, and give them warning from me." 1 Peter 4:12, "think it not some strange thing happened to you concerning the fiery trial which is to try you."

The NIV test is an open book test requiring no memory of bible verses. A 6th-grade reading student knowing nothing about Bible Scripture would have no problem taking the test. You will need an NIV bible to look up each verse outlined in the test. Using the New International Version (NIV) Bible, answer the questions. Do not rely on your memory. As the Bible is the final authority, you must take the answer from the Bible verse (not from footnotes but from the text). Finally, you will need The Authorized King James Bible as a comparison study. Take the test here; https://bible-truth.org/NIVtest.html

I have sworn by myself [God Almighty], the word is gone out of my mouth in righteousness, and shall not return, that unto me [God Almighty] every knee shall bow, every tongue shall swear." Excellent Bible Study tools to assist anyone with the study of the Authorized KJV Bible are available. J.P. Green Interlinear Hebrew, Greek, and English Bible is tied to the coded Strong's Concordance and is one of many excellent Bible study tools. Also, the LITV, a Literal Translation of the Bible. The English Hexapla provides a historical record of 600 years of the 6 most important English language translations, along with the original Greek text after Scholz leading up to the world's most accurate English translation, the Authorized KJV. Also, the "Blue Letter Bible" online is a very helpful Bible Study Tool.

Luke 12:2; 'for there is nothing covered, that shall not be revealed; neither hid, that shall not be known.'



Read: Isaiah 11:6-9" The wolf will live with the lamb, the leopard will lie down with the goat, the calf and the lion and the yearling together; and a little child will lead them." Isaiah 11:6 What a beautiful picture! Here is the time when the dreams of men will be fulfilled, when all the longings that re-



flect themselves in peace demonstrations and cries for disarmament will find their fulfillment. There is a deep hunger in mankind for this kind of world, although we do not know how to achieve it. Another one is like a great bear; he swallows you up as you come into contact with him. Another is like a leopard—sneaky. And here was I, a meek lamb in the midst of them! Our elders' meetings sometimes give that impression, but when we would look to the Lord He comes among us as a great lion tamer. Then the lion lies down with the lamb, the wolf and the leopard dwell together, and everything works out. This is what our Lord has the power to do in human hearts today. He can heal controversy and bring peace among men. But I also believe this is literal. There is coming a day when the curse will be removed from the earth. Paul sings about a day when creation shall be released from its bondage (Romans 8:19). Then the curse will be removed and the whole earth will break into a verdant blooming, the likes of which we have never seen; when the desert shall blossom like the rose, as Isaiah describes it in Chapter 35. The animals lose their ferocity and even the carnivores return to eating grass, as in creation before the Fall.

Father, I look forward to the fulfillment of these gracious words, when even the animals shall lose their enmity one with another and lie down together, and a little child shall lead them. Grant that I may discover the reality of these words in my own life. Both peacemaking and peacemakers are God's business. As we anticipate its final fulfillment, are we seeking to be authentic messengers of His peace day by day?

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

#### Testament Trauma

"Old Testament." Pop Theology lauds the superiority of "grace" over "law." We are told that divine assurances given to the Patriarchs were revoked when Jesus died and that the Sinai covenant was a stopgap intended to be canceled by Paul. Supposedly, God now ignores His promises to redeem Israel, and He transferred His focus to something they call the "Gentile Church." Popular teachers claim that "Gentile Christians" were never intended to keep "The Law of Moses." Some insist that the Prophets could not "see" the Church.

None of these claims hold up in the full light of scripture. It would be impossible to hold convictions that fly in the face of what the Bible teaches without first pretending that the book is divided into two sections: the "good stuff," and the "old, mean-spirited, irrelevant" part. Replacement Theology owes its existence to the fantasy that God's Word is a house divided against itself.

The terms "Old Testament" and "New Testament" are not found in the text of the Bible. They have been forced onto God's Word by fallible humans. Specifically, that division is the legacy of a Second Century, heretic named Marcion of Sinope. Marcion devoted his life to proclaiming a strict separation between the "old god" and the "new god." According to Marcion, YHVH was bloodthirsty, evil, and ruthless. No amount of human devotion could appease him. He was never satisfied until people were destroyed or dispersed.

The new god, however, is a benevolent, loving savior who came to oppose and offset the mean god. Marcion taught that creation is a trap by the old god to force the universe into physical, rather than spiritual, form. He said that Jesus is unrelated to, and came to free us from, the old god. He claimed that Jesus was not Jewish and did not have a physical body. He said that Hebrew Scriptures have no authority over Christians. Marcion's heresies present an almost one-to-one correspondence with Modern Church theology. The promotion of his lies would have been impossible had he not taken the brilliant, tactical step of dividing the Bible into artificial sections which he labeled "old testament" and "new testament."

But God's Word is not divided! It is one story from beginning to end. It is impossible to understand the last fourth without first understanding the first three-fourths. One key for understanding the Gospel accounts is found in the book just before Matthew—Malachi.

This powerful, prophetic proclamation was written about 100 years after Judah's return from captivity. That return, led by Ezra and Nehemiah, was accompanied by great expectations. The returnees planned to rebuild the Temple and their lives and then see the fulfillment of the great prophecies. Messiah would appear. He would reunite Judah and Israel, rule over the nations and establish universal peace and justice. That might have happened had the people who repopulated Judea not proven to be as rebellious as their ancestors. Instead of utopia, they experienced poverty, injustice, and corruption.

Malachi indicts Judah for several specific sins. He does this through a series of disputes between God and the people. God proclaims His love for His covenant people despite their rebellion. He accuses the people of defiling the new Temple by presenting inferior sacrifices. The Priesthood is complicit in this defilement. God blasts Judean men for turning against Him and their wives through a wave of divorce and remarriage to Canaanite women who import their pagan gods.

The people deny these charges. Beginning in 2:17, they accuse God of injustice. He replies that they have failed to bring Him their tithe to support the Temple and the Priests. Beginning in 3:13, the people claim that serving God is useless. They say that He allows wicked people to prosper and does nothing about it.

God responds to these disputes by saying that He will send a messenger who will appear as a purifying fire. He will remove all vestiges of idolatry and those who practice it. Only God's faithful will remain to see His plan completed. This remnant is made up of people who fear God and devote themselves to serving Him and encouraging others to do the same.

Many church leaders love to invoke Malachi 3:10 and its instruction to bring in the full tithe. Seldom do they mention the call in 4:4 to "remember the Law of my servant Moses." They teach that tithing "opens the windows of heaven," but they do not point out that God does not change and that our job is to keep His statutes. Malachi wraps up his prophecy with an ode to the Law and the Prophets. They remind us of the history of God's gracious outreach to His children. They point us to the glorious resolution He will bring in the end. The wicked can only dread the Day of the Lord, but the Faithful will greet that Day with joy and thanksgiving.

The links between Malachi and the Gospels are stunning. Malachi gives us the context for the genealogy of our Savior, the role of John the Immerser and the work of Messiah. Malachi 4:2 is one of the most glorious passages in scripture. "But unto you that fear My name shall the Sun of righteousness arise with healing in His wings." In Matthew, the book that immediately follows, we learn who the Sun of Righteousness is and how His healing is applied. More importantly, all the Gospels and the Epistles teach that Jesus fulfills the promises made to Israel.

"Putin Has Just Launched A Full-Scale Invasion Of Ukraine" By Jim Denison

Russian forces invaded Ukraine by land, air, and sea overnight in the largest attack by one nation against another in Europe since World War II. Ukrainian Foreign Minister Dmytro Kuleba said on Twitter, "Putin has just launched a full-scale invasion of Ukraine. Peaceful Ukrainian cities are under strikes."



According to European Union affairs chief Josep Borrell, "These are among the darkest hours of Europe since the Second World War."

In a televised declaration of war, Russian President Vladimir Putin said he had ordered "a special military operation" to "strive for the demilitarization and denazification of Ukraine." He added that "Russia cannot feel safe, develop, and exist with a constant threat emanating from the territory of modern Ukraine."

Then he claimed in true dictator fashion, "All responsibility for bloodshed will be on the conscience of the ruling regime in Ukraine."

"This is a grave emergency"

As CNN's Stephen Collinson reports this morning, "Decades of peace between nations on the European landmass ended with loud blasts in multiple Ukrainian cities. . . . thunderous explosions soon loomed over the capital Kyiv as air raid sirens wailed, heralding a dangerous new crisis for a world already rocked by turmoil."

Shelling and missile strikes have been reported across the country. Russian-backed separatists launched attacks in the breakaway regions of Luhansk and Donetsk to the east, while Ukrainian officials said Russian troops have also attacked to the north from Belarus and to the south from the Black Sea.

According to an adviser to Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy, about forty people have been killed so far in the Russian attack and several dozen wounded. President Zelenskyy said at a briefing, "The Ukrainian military is waging hard battles, repelling attacks in Donbas and other regions in the east, north, and south."

Global financial markets have plunged and oil prices are soaring. The Associated Press reports that Russia's actions "could cause massive casualties, topple Ukraine's democratically elected government and upend geopolitics and Europe's post-Cold War security balance."

US Ambassador to the United Nations Linda Thomas-Greenfield stated, "This is a grave emergency." President Biden said the US and allies will be "imposing severe sanctions on Russia" later today. Mr. Biden said he spoke with the Ukrainian president, who asked him "to call on the leaders of the world to speak out clearly against President Putin's flagrant aggression and to stand with the people of Ukraine."

What does this mean for America?

CBS News reported yesterday that gas prices had already hit eight-year highs; they are now surging even higher. Sanctions or export controls against Russia could make semiconductor shortages even worse, while restrictions on wheat or metals "could drive the fiercest bout of inflation in decades to climb even higher." Russian cyberattacks that continued yesterday against Ukraine could be directed at the US as well.

And this invasion could spark a wider war directly affecting American military personnel. William Taylor, former US ambassador to Ukraine, predicted, "If the Russians succeed in establishing a sphere of influence or of dominating Ukraine, it won't stop there. They will continue. The Poles and the Romanians, the Czechs will be very concerned as they see Russian tanks coming west from Russia into Ukraine toward them, and they will ask for reinforcements from the United States."

American military families are already understandably concerned. Chris Brooks, one of my favorite radio hosts, told our listeners yesterday that he was especially praying for our military and invited them to call into our conversation with specific prayer requests. One person who responded asked us to pray for a Marine and his wife, who is expecting their child any day. I cannot imagine what these days must be like for them and so many others like them.

"We must be global Christians"

The day after 9/11, the French newspaper Le Monde announced, "We are all Americans." Queen Elizabeth II sang the American national anthem at Buckingham Palace's Changing of the Guard. In Brazil, Rio de Janeiro put up large billboards showing the city's famous Christ the Redeemer statue embracing the New York City skyline.

What the billboard depicted is more than symbolism.

The renowned theologian John R. W. Stott used to say, "We must be global Christians with a global vision because our God is a global God." Because God is the king of the universe, every dimension of the universe falls within his care and compassion. He loves Ukrainians just as much as he loves Americans and Russians just as much as he loves

This is why, one day, all the nations of the world "shall beat their swords into plow-shares, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war anymore" (Isaiah 2:4). It is why in heaven we will join "a great multitude that no one could number, from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages, standing before the throne and before the Lamb" (Revelation 7:9).

And it is why our Father calls his children to "love your neighbor as yourself" (Leviticus 19:18; Matthew 22:39). Lest you think your "neighbor" is limited to your local geography, remember that Jesus' story of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25–38) identifies your neighbor as anyone who needs something you can provide. If you can intercede with compassion for the besieged people of Ukraine today, they just became your neighbor today.

If you had loved ones living in Ukraine, how would you feel about this crisis? That's precisely how God feels about it.

Let's join him. Today, we are all Ukrainians.

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

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

#### "Temptation's Wreckers"

As a lifelong resident of North Carolina, I'm interested in historical tidbits of information about my state. Somewhere along the way, I picked up an old legend about Nags Head, a town located on the Outer Banks of eastern North Carolina. This legend has never been officially verified, but it sure makes for a good

The legend has it that in the 1700s Nags Head was home to a group of ruthless land



In the morning, the "wreckers" would come along and gather up the timber from the wrecked ship to sell it and make money. The timber was used in everything from building new houses to making kitchen utensils. It was all a thriving business. Even now visitors to Nags Head are shown old houses that were supposedly built and furnished with the material taken from these shipwrecks. They're also told that it's very possible that Nags Head took its name from the practice of hanging the lanterns around the necks of the "nags." Estimates say that over 2,000 ships perished off this coast during that time period.

Nags Head is now a tourist town of around 2,700. If it ever was a haven for land pirates, those days are long gone. This doesn't mean, though, that there aren't still some "wreckers" out there that need to be avoided. A "wrecker" is anyone or anything that causes another to sail into dangerous water. For example, a seductive man or woman can wreck a marriage, a bottle of booze can wreck a life, a dirty business deal can wreck a career, and a church leader who doesn't follow the Lord can wreck a church.

The key to avoiding a "shipwreck" is to accurately recognize a wrecker for who or what it is. Don't fall for just any light on a dark night. Don't be misled by a false reality. Don't be so quick to trade the known for the unknown.

Most of us have heard the old saying, "God won't put more on you than you can handle." I even had a friend once call me and ask me where that verse is in the Bible. Even though the saying's principle is a sound one, I had to tell my friend that no Bible verse specifically supports the saying. The verse in question actually has to do with temptation. It is 1st Corinthians 10:13, and it says:

"No temptation has overtaken you except such as is common to man; but God is faithful, who will not allow you to be tempted beyond what you are able, but with the temptation will also make the way of escape, that you may be able to bear it." (N.K.J.V.)

Please note the teaching of this verse. God will never allow you to be tempted beyond what you can withstand. On the contrary, whenever you get close to your breaking point, He will provide you with an escape hatch out of that temptation. His job is to provide the way of escape; your job is to use it.

I don't know what's going on in your life right now, but could it be that you are considering sailing off toward some strange light? Are you just about to change your course in life simply because you think this light will lead you into safe waters? Friend, beware the wrecker! If God really wanted you to chart that course, the way would be much clearer and more sure. The night wouldn't be so dark and the light wouldn't be so questionable. Therefore, rather than turning yourself toward that light, you need to start looking around for God's way of escape from that temptation. Based upon 1 Corinthians 10:13, that way will be there, and if you use it, it will keep you from a disastrous shipwreck.

#### Reflections on A Secret Place

At the January 11th CBMC\* meeting, Gene Kirby led a study on our Secret Place. "But when you pray, go into your room and shut the door, and pray to your Father who is in secret. And your Father who sees in secret will reward you." Matthew 6:6 (ESV) Gene referenced Caron Cline's January BRCN article, wherein she encourages readers to set "Getting to a Secret Place" as a worthwhile New Year's resolution. This is a Bible study and article that quickened my spirit and challenged me.

Since then, I have been reflecting daily on those Words from God and recalling my "Secret

Place" experiences down through my 73 years. How have they impacted my life? How have I followed through? Where did I succeed? Or more painfully, where did I fail? What have been the results of success or failure (there are positives to both)? Beyond asking forgiveness for my failures, can I still follow up or -through them? What has God taught me – from either outcome? Thanks, Brother Gene, for kicking off these moments. And, "Thank you, Caron," for reminding us of the importance of spending time in our Secret Place.

What I most appreciated about Gene's teaching is what I call his "List of Secret Place Attributes." He suggested nine of them. Here are some of my reflections on each:

- Discipline Without a question, a key component of a Secret Place experience. I know when my obedience and discipline are strong, SPs happen. And when I recall periods where there were few or none, I can usually pinpoint a lack of discipline. I treasure my early morning quiet times, but also acknowledge the impending day often detracts from my focus. I have observed most of my SPs occurred when I disciplined myself to purposefully set aside a block of time to be alone with Him.
- Darkness When Gene initially listed this attribute, I'll admit I found it difficult to associate "darkness" with our God. While I know He creates and allows both, and there are lessons to be learned in Light and Darkness, how do I associate a Secret Place with darkness? Gene suggested, "Dark places, which we all have, can be places of fear, confusion, uncertainty, and seemingly loneliness. Yet, ironically and truthfully, we are always His, always in the light and 'just under the shadow of His wings." "He will cover you with his pinions, and under his wings you will find refuge; his faithfulness is a shield and buckler. You will not fear the terror of the night, nor the arrow that flies by day, nor the pestilence that stalks in darkness, nor the destruction that wastes at noonday." Psalm 91:4-6 (ESV)

As I ponder this further, some of my "darkest" times are when I have experienced a Secret Place. Our 25 years of prayer until God delivered our son from addiction provided several SP experiences. "Therefore I tell you, whatever you ask in prayer, believe that you have received, and it will be yours." Mark 11:24(ESV)

- Reverence Without a doubt! In a true SP experience, there is an undeniable reverence "revering God Almighty." Unfortunately, today's "church" rarely, if ever, allows, provides, or encourages a sense of reverence. Far too often, the focus is on the music, the production, the technology, and a subtle acknowledgment of peoples' uncomfortableness with reverence. My point is simply, "it's uncomfortable because we fail to teach and show people how to experience the blessing and benefit of "being reverent" in God's presence."
- Awe Hands down, many of my SP experiences have occurred in the beauty of God's creation! He made this for me! Wow! Having grown up in the Colorado Rockies you needed only to open your eyes but I've also been at the ocean, even sitting on the deck in my backyard. God's gift of creation is everywhere a playground of children, an elderly couple walking hand-in-hand, a baby's simple smile.

In my past, I was a solo backpacker – spending time in the mountains and canyons surrounded by God's Masterpiece. Never is there a doubt when I'm totally alone in these settings that I can be filled to overflowing with "Awe." "The earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof!" Psalm 24:1

- Intimacy Yes, no one knows us like God. There are no secrets good or evil He does not know see Psalm 139:1-16. Becoming comfortable in that knowledge is sometimes difficult, but understanding He knows everything about me is a freeing realization. Caron's article reminded us that "Intimacy is God's desire for every child," and in our SP we come with vulnerabilities that allow us to uncover secret sins and irrational fears, and to deepen our relationship with God. I can be myself in my SP no airs necessary!
- Consecration Secret Places are definitely places of consecration sacred places and times. When we experience a true SP, it always becomes a consecrated moment. SPs in my living room to moments in the mountains have always been "sacred."
- Revelation In a word, the real benefit and blessing of SPs. From my Kansas farmhouse living room to a youth ministry in Florida from my singleness to marriage. These were all moments of revelation. God has plans for us...they are frequently revealed in our Secret Place. It's important to go there often to learn His plan for our lives.
- Silence Ah, often this is the attribute many people find most difficult and sometimes scary. We live in a world that bombards us with sound 24x7...and when we find ourselves surrounded by silence we can immediately become

ill-at-ease. In today's technology-filled environment, it is far too easy to fill the silence with noise. "My music calms me... helps me concentrate... drowns out the background... I just need the TV on to give me company..." I've heard so many "reasons" to avoid silence and sometimes used the excuses myself.

Still, I'm someone who can travel miles in the lonely silence of an automobile. Some of that is due to my years as an OTR truck driver – miles alone with the Lord are always a blessing. The point is I often seek silence and I testify to the power of silence as a powerful prelude to, and perpetuation of, SP experiences. "Be still, and know that I am God." Psalm 46:10

• Glory <just a glimpse> – Herein lies what I consider the most memorable gift of Secret Place experiences. Like Moses, who wanted to see God's Glory, Exodus 33:18, while we may not seek it, we too can be blessed by catching a glimpse of His Glory in our SP. Our "cleft-in-the-rock" experience may take place in our Secret Place – or perhaps as we are obedient to the plan He reveals in our SP. It's available to us all – and often manifested in the "Silence" of a "Secret Place."

In 2011, I was blessed to hear Mama Maggie Gobran, founder of Eygpt's Stephen's Children, speak. She said, "The Silence is the Secret." Her life, while intimidating, is an awesome example of how to regularly have Secret Place experiences. Mama Maggie rarely chooses to participate in social evenings, a discipline that allows her to get a good night's sleep so she can arise at 3:00 a.m. every day to spend several hours alone with her Heavenly Father. Yet, even as the leader of a huge ministry, she purposefully sets aside one week every two months to spend at a monastery in total Silence.


My prayer is we all grow by experiencing our Secret Places.

#### The Inspiring Word

James 1:26-27 'If any man among you seem to be religious, and bridleth not his tongue, but deceiveth his own heart, this man's religion is vain. (27) Pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this, To visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction, and to keep himself unspotted from the world.'



James, the Lord's half-brother writes to the church in his epistle. He covers many topics, but this month look with me at two verses from chapter one. These two verses challenge us to mind our mouths. Let's visit these two verses.

The word or term religious is very popular and yet it is a word people very seldom think about. Exactly what does it mean to be religious? This question can be answered using many different approaches, for our study I will be using the text above. The word James uses is the Greek word thrace'-kos and it means a proper demonstration of respect to the only deity.

This is fine; however, it does raise another question: What is proper respect and devotion to the deity? That depends on who or what the deity is. Pagan gods are seen as selfish, greedy, and unpredictable. When we consider these, proper devotion may take the form of a sacrifice that is nothing more than a bribe or protection money. A religious person who shows honor to a pagan god hopes the god will be pleased and not cause a disaster.

However, the one and only true God that is revealed in the Bible has nothing in common with pagan gods. God as revealed through our Bible is just, righteous, and good in all things, He is generous and forgiving. God's wrath does burn against evil, but His grace is abundant for those willing to receive it. Our Bible teaches us that God takes the side of the weak and helpless – those who recognize their great need for what only He can give.

Therefore, proper respect for the one and only true God is behavior that reflects who God is. This behavior involves being obedient to His will while upholding His standards of justice, mercy, grace, and forgiveness. Respecting God means acknowledging God's supreme authority in what we say and do.

According to our passage, all of this begins with how we use our tongues. Speech that honors God is speech under control, for illustration, the way a horse with a bit and bridle is under the control of its owner. The speech of a God-honoring person will follow the path that God establishes; he or she will use speech that is filled with love, grace, and forgiveness but tempered by righteousness and justice.

Verse 26 dealt with words and their importance in the life of a godly person. Verse 27 considers the deeds which validate our speech. Here James further explains proper devotion to God with a shortlist of representative actions. In James' day, these were very familiar to Christians of Jewish background.

The Old Testament often names the widows and fatherless as special objects of Gods attention. They are typical of those in a position of weakness. God is their only hope for help. Those who know God will reflect His mercy by responding to this need.

James pairs generosity to the helpless with being unspotted by worldly corruption. Knowing that God is good, just, righteous, and merciful the world which is in rebellion against God is anything but these things. If we allow the world to influence us, we end up bearing the attitude and behavior it produces. What exactly illustrates this attitude and behavior well let's see; selfishness, violence, hatred, and vindictiveness just to name a few. The individual with a God-honoring life contrasts with and stands out from the world. The life of that individual reflects God Himself rather than the world that runs and hides from Him.

In closing pure...and undefiled is the kind of devotion we seek when we see ourselves and our situation correctly. If we try to split the difference between God and the world, we reveal that we are holding onto sin and not embracing our salvation. Grasping the truth of God's word impels us to end the world's kind of life and pursue God's kind.

Until we meet again, in print or person may God bless you is my prayer!

#### Dear Dave,

We have \$15,000 in credit card debt. My husband works very hard, but only makes about \$25,000 a year. We're also living in a very old trailer right now, and I stay at home with our newborn. My dad told us he is willing to pay off our debt if we agree to get financial counseling together, and show that we are serious about doing better with our finances. What should we do? Harper



Dear Harper,

I wouldn't accept the money from your dad if it's going to be a loan. If you really want to ruin family events, have a debt to your parents. It twists you up inside. And it'll be especially hard on your husband. No matter what anyone else says, the borrower is always a slave to the lender.

If it's going to be a gift, meaning there's no expectation of repayment, that's a different story. Still, I think your dad has a great idea in making the debt payoff contingent on you two going to some kind of financial counseling, and making a proactive effort to change things, get out of debt and save money — for your child's future and yours. I'd probably do the same thing.

It doesn't sound like you're being crazy with your money, but it's tough to provide for a family on that kind of income. You and your husband need to sit down together, develop a monthly budget and a realistic five-year plan to improve his earning potential. Make it a date night. Hold hands, do something inexpensive you both enjoy, and let him know he can be anything he wants to be. Then, help him decide exactly what and where he wants to be in five years. What does he want to be making, and what feasible steps can he take educationally or in terms of job training to get there?

If you want to go to work at some point when your baby is a little older, that's fine. I completely understand the desire to be at home with a brand new baby. But hard work alone just isn't enough these days. You've got to boost your brainpower and value in the marketplace, too. God bless you guys!— Dave

My husband and I are 30, and we are on Baby Step 2. He wants to go back to school and become a social worker. He currently makes about \$20,000 a year as a teacher's assistant, and he wants to take out student loans to do this. He already has an associate's degree, which wouldn't mean four years of loans, but the idea scares me a lot. I have a good job, so how can I still support him and his desire to further his education without agreeing to go deeper into debt? Britney Dear Britney,

So, it's kind of a situation where you're working the Baby Steps and he's not. On top of this, he wants to go into debt to do social work. Does he know what social workers make these days?

This guy obviously has a heart for helping people. That's a great thing. But I've got to believe there are ways to expand his options. Social work is one path, but there are probably several paths he could follow to get involved in what he loves about the idea of social work.

I'm guessing he has a passion for counseling and advocating, too. Finishing a four-year degree would put him in a position where he could potentially move into a guidance counselor role or something along those lines, considering his background. But taking out loans isn't necessary. He just needs to be patient, and wait a little bit while you two buckle down on the Baby Steps and get out of debt. He could get a second job for a while nights or weekends, and then you'd be able to pay off your debt faster and avoid those stupid loans thanks to the cash you set aside. Plus, there are millions of dollars in scholarships out there for traditional and non-traditional students.

Sometimes when people feel stuck in a job, they automatically default to the idea they need a degree. What your husband really needs right now is a clear idea and direction. Then, you determine if a degree is necessary to get there. Don't misunderstand me — I'm not against social work. But I've talked to so many people who went six figures into debt, only to wind up making \$38,000 as a social worker for the state. That's crazy!

You two need to sit down together and talk all this out. Tell him why you're worried, and point out that borrowing a bunch of money isn't the only way — and definitely isn't the smart way — to make this happen. If you really want to support him, Britney, you need to help him see there are steps he can take to pursue his dream without it turning into a financial nightmare for both of you. — Dave

Jesus did not merely commission us to take the Gospel and make converts. He commissioned us to go and make disciples. The prayer of salvation is the first step in our life-long discipleship journey. God seeks those who are willing to grow in their faith and knowledge of Him. So, as we lead others to faith in



Jesus, it is important to do all that we can to not to leave them stranded.

Think back to your first steps as a believer. What questions did you struggle with? Did someone walk beside you? Or did you learn in a group from a teacher? For many of us, our faith grew because someone invested time to teach us. We have the same opportunity to invest that time into someone else.

When possible, one-on-one discipleship usually works best. Offer to meet with them once a week to share prayer requests and study the Bible. Share more about your testimony and launch into deeper discussions about questions they might have. Not only will we grow stronger in our faith, but we develop deep, lasting friendships in the process.

Jesus gave us the ultimate example of mentorship. After teaching to the crowds, He often pulled His disciples aside to answer their questions privately and share deeper spiritual truths so they could grow in their faith. Jesus invested time in His disciples to equip them for ministry, so that they could, likewise, invest time in others.

But Jesus didn't stop there. He also modeled to His disciples how to share their faith with others. Witnessing is a vital part of our spiritual growth – just as vital as worship, prayer, reading the Bible, and fellowship with other believers. Our faith grows as we step out in faith and watch God at work in the lives of other people around us.

Mentoring new believers (or even not-so-new believers) in sharing their faith is part of ongoing discipleship. Take someone with you the next time you plan to talk to someone about your faith. Allow them to watch and observe how you break the ice and transition into a deeper spiritual conversation. Take time to answer their questions afterward and share your experience in sharing the Gospel. If you don't know how to share ask someone from your church to mentor you!

Discipleship is a life-long process, but so is the process of making disciples. As we continue to grow spiritually, we can help others grow in their faith by investing in their lives through mentorship. Who will you invest time in this year?



I can't tell you how many years I tried to get my husband, Dave, to stop watching sports. But it seemed the more I tried, the worse it got. One Saturday afternoon, I walked into the family room to find him shining his golf clubs while he watched one game on TV and listened to another game using his headphones. I thought, Joyce, your plan is just not working!

The truth is I wanted Dave to do what I wanted to do—I wanted him to be more like me. But trying to change him wasn't accomplishing anything, and it left me

I love what Romans 12:16 (AMPC) says: "Live in harmony with one another; do not be haughty (snobbish, high-minded, exclusive), but readily adjust yourself to [people, things]....

It's impossible to be selfish and have healthy relationships. If we truly want to live in peace and harmony, it's going to require some give and take. At times, we'll have to adjust our lives to accommodate someone else's needs or desires.

Sometimes this simply means being patient and understanding with those who don't share your own strengths. For instance, have you ever noticed yourself getting irritated with someone who takes more time to make decisions than you do? Or maybe they don't catch on to things as quickly as you would like.

If we allow ourselves to get into prideful thinking, we can hurt people by acting out of our own self-importance and selfish interests. The Lord doesn't want us to have a lowly opinion of ourselves, but He certainly doesn't want us to think we're better than anyone else!

First Corinthians chapter 12 provides the perfect illustration. It says we are all part of one body, each with our own distinct and important role to play. Verse 25 (NIV) tells us "there should be no division in the body, but that its parts should have equal concern for each another."

We all need each other, and when we learn to recognize and appreciate each other's talents and abilities, it develops respect that can strengthen and heal our relationships.

Let's make this practical. When I'm having a hard time accepting someone's differences or agreeing with others, there are a few things I try to do to maintain

- Be respectful, even if the other person doesn't agree with your opinion.
- Listen with an open mind. Be willing to pray about what they say.
- Look for things to agree about, instead of focusing on your differences.
- Use positive body language and voice tones, and choose every word with care. There will be times when you won't find a thing to agree on, and in those circumstances, the best thing you can do is trust God, let it go, and become an expert

Yes, some things are very important and you need to stand your ground, but there are so many things in life that just don't make a difference.

The bottom line is you won't always agree with your spouse, family, or friends, but you can still respect and appreciate them. 
Her pursed little lips gave way to a heartmelting smile that revealed new white teeth with a space between the front incisors. She was interested in two main learning centers: art and writing!



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
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
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The Nut Cat

This animal is usually mostly gray in color however they have been found with red, black, brown, and white fur. In fact, you can find white ones in Brevard,

North Carolina. Do you know which backyard critter I'm talking about?

Tree Squirrels!

Tree squirrels have four teeth that continually grow. They have to gnaw to keep their teeth the correct size and shape. I was shocked to find out that tree squirrels are omnivores. Not only do they eat, nuts, flowers, buds, bark, seeds, roots, they also eat eggs, baby birds, insects, and caterpillars!

Their front feet have 4 long fingers plus a short stubby thumb. Their back feet have 5 toes. They have bald soles and their ankles are very flexible which gives them the ability to lay their hind feet flat against the tree while climbing it.

Squirrels have several predators. When these predators are around, tree squirrels use a buddy system. They will alert each other with a whistle and bark



that a predator is nearby. Every time they bark, they will flick their tail. Squirrels also snort, screech, and make all sorts of other sounds for communication.

#### Rusting in Peace By Tracy Jessup

"Blessed are those who trust in the Lord, whose trust is the Lord. They shall be like a tree planted by water, sending out its roots by the stream. It shall not fear when heat comes, and its leaves shall stay green; in the year of drought it is not anxious, and it does not cease to bear fruit." (Jeremiah



On April 2, 2007, a devastating earthquake in the western Solomon Islands caused a tsunami that killed 52 people. Reefs were pushed up an estimated 10 feet and exposed a World War II torpedo boat that had rested on the ocean floor for over 60 years. Only the hull with its deadly cargo of explosives remained intact. According to JayWaura of the National Disaster Management Office, "a Solomon Islands Police Force bomb disposal unit was be sent to the island to safely detonate the explosives."

Decaying military wrecks from World War II are believed to be scattered across the coastline of the Solomon Islands, including the torpedo patrol boat commanded by John F. Kennedy. Commenting on the discovery, Waura said, "We were amazed by this finding, as previously this wreckage had long been sitting under the sea and rusting in peace without anyone knowing about it" ("Quake brings WWII PT boat up from ocean floor," 4/27/07).

"This wreckage had long been sitting under the sea and rusting in peace without anyone knowing about it." Jeremiah, often called the weeping prophet, was no stranger to suffering, and he reminds us that we are offered two options in the face of adversity and the wreckage we sometimes encounter in life. Everything hinges on the object of our trust and where our hearts are. "Cursed are those who trust in mere mortals and make mere flesh their strength, whose hearts turn away from the Lord" (v. 5). On the outside, things may appear to be fine, but spiritually, there is "wreckage...rusting in peace without anyone knowing about it." Their life is a spiritual desert of thirst and loneliness apart from God (v. 6).

But there is an alternative to trusting in mere mortals. "Blessed are those who trust in the Lord, whose trust is the Lord. They shall be like a tree planted by water, sending out its roots by the stream. It shall not fear when heat comes, and its leaves shall stay green; in the year of drought it is not anxious, and it does not cease to bear fruit" (Vv. 7-8). This does not mean that the one who trusts in God never encounters adversity. Jeremiah recognizes that drought and heat will still come, but because our trust and strength are in the Lord we will endure the difficult conditions. As a matter of fact, rather than "rusting in peace," we will thrive spiritually – "not ceasing to bear fruit" (v. 8).

God can be glorified in our suffering when we bear fruit amid the wreckage of life. But first, we must resist the temptation to trust in ourselves or others and place our trust in God and God alone.

Prayer: Lord, we do trust you, but we ask for grace to trust you more.

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

In Mark 10:46-52, we read about an interesting encounter that Jesus had with a blind man. Mark reported (v. 46), "Then they came to Jericho. And as He was leaving Jericho with His disciples and a large crowd, a blind beggar



And then, all of sudden, Jesus stopped. He had heard the man's cry, even though the noise of His own thoughts and emotions, even while the Savior's mind was focused upon the horror of the impending events. And when He heard the cry for mercy, Jesus knew He could do something about it. Jesus called for him to come close. And then the Master asked, "What do you want Me to do for you?" Bartimaeus replied, "Rabboni [Master], I want to regain my sight." Immediately, Jesus commanded him, "Go; your faith has made you well." The blind man was immediately healed by the word of the Lord Jesus activated by the faith of the one who placed his faith in the mercy of the Lord.

How did Mark know the formerly blind man's name? The answer is found in the second part of verse 52, "... And immediately he regained his sight and began following Him on the road." Bartimaeus received his sight, beheld the Messiah, and followed Him.

Perhaps as you read this devotional, you find yourself identifying with the blind man. Maybe you have experienced the debilitating effects of illness, loss, fear, anger, or any number of paralyzing experiences. I urge you to cry out to the Lord for mercy and healing. He will hear your cry and act upon your faith according to His will and way.

But there is another aspect of this story that I want you to see. The interesting thing about following the Master, is that although He was focused upon a specific plan, purpose, and destination ahead, Jesus was always attending to the unexpected needs and opportunities that were along the way. Jesus heard the cries of the blind, desperate, unclean, and helpless.

He offered them mercy, grace, love, and salvation.


There is, quite likely, a "blind man" (woman, son, daughter, neighbor, or friend) sitting by your pathway. They are begging for your attention, your time, your presence—and perhaps you don't even see them or know that they exist. 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

He sat daily in the splendor of the Tabernacle, in the gate called Beautiful, yet he was destitute. This man was daily in the temple, but not to offer worship... he was simply trying to provide for himself. His circumstances were tragic to him... but we all have circumstances that we would change if we could. While we may be whole physically, other situations are beyond our control...possibly a failed or failing marriage or relationship, or trauma from a past event that happened. Maybe it is an addiction that no one realizes... a sin that has its grasp or a situation that makes us feel bound by our circumstances.

Even though he asked them for alms...they replied with a strange request... "Look on us." Notice that Instead of opening a purse and dropping a few coins towards the man, Peter said..." Silver and gold have I none;" ... When the beggar heard this, I am sure his heart fell as once more his plea was being ignored. 

#### What Many Women Desperately Need to Hear from the Pulpit

It was "Sanctity of Human Life Sunday" at this church; I was a guest speaker for the morning worship. The pastor invited me to come and preach on the very controversial subject of abortion. The message I gave addressed not only the wanton destruction of human life but also addressed any woman who might be considering an abortion, as well as any woman who may have already had one.



Afterward, a woman came up to me and said with an expression of tremendous gratitude how glad she was my message spoke to women who had had an abortion. She never divulged whether she ever had an abortion or not, and I didn't ask. But she said to me with great emotion: "Thank you for telling women that God will forgive them for their abortion. Sometimes I think we give them the impression they are automatically damned to hell. They need to hear that Christ will forgive them of anything."

Another lady who overheard our conversation then chimed in and interjected, "Yes, but some women say they have no regrets and are happy they had an abortion." To which the first woman replied, "You know, I think most of them are just projecting. The guilt can be profound."

That short conversation impacted me like never before of an additional reason for speaking from the pulpit about abortion. Women who suffer the emotional pain of having destroyed the life in their womb need to hear there is healing and reconciliation.

Too often, the blood-guiltiness of the willful destruction of human life in abortion is vilified (and rightly so), but without emphasizing God's offer to be cleansed and forgiven. Abortion has two victims – the child and the mother.

According to Live Action, in June of 2020, a poll on the abortion pill demonstrated 77% of women regretted their abortions. The study found:

- 83% of the women said they were changed by their abortions, with 77% saying the change was negative.
- 77% said they regretted their abortions.
- 60% reported feelings of isolation and alienation.
- 38% reported problems with anxiety, depression, drug abuse, and/or suicidal thoughts as a result of the abortion.
- 50% said the baby's father or other family members "used negating language as a means to justify a woman's need for an abortion."

A few years ago, I was trying to recruit a woman to run for a seat in the North Carolina General Assembly. I knew her background well and thought she would make a sensational candidate. While we talked, she suddenly and unexpectedly burst into tears. The grief in her voice was severe and distressing. She said: "Perhaps I should run for office. Because of what I did, I need to give back something of what I took away." She had had an abortion when she was younger and still bearing the anguish many years after.

In a small and powerful 59-page book titled, Spiritual Reflections of a Pro-Life Pilgrim, Michael T. Mannion explains how critical it is for the pulpit to speak to this aspect of the abortion issue. Please forgive the long quote by Mannion, but it's worth it. He most eloquently writes:

"[M]any women who have had abortions...are presently suffering in a painful, lonely and silent world of guilt...looking for a way out. Each Sunday, they might listen intently for one word – one phrase – one motion of compassion that tells them that their church or congregation is open to help heal the pain – that there is a way back. These women need to hear the words of Jeremiah being personally spoken to them: "There is hope for your future, says the Lord'.... (Jer. 31:17)

"The guilt and loneliness felt by a woman who has had an abortion are more often than not accompanied by a sense of worthlessness, inadequacy, and inability to help others, let alone herself. These feelings present a unique faith opportunity to the person in the pulpit. As we begin our homily or sermon, we can seek a spiritual and emotional affiliation with that woman in the pew. We can ask her to pray for us as we speak, that our words might help heal and console her, that our words might help prevent some of her sisters in distress from making the same tragic mistake. We can speak out with honesty and compassion, without betraying either [the mother or the unborn child], and show there is hope for the future – for the woman who has had an abortion, for the woman facing the decision.

"We can speak of our church's desire to be an instrument of the Lord's healing by welcoming her back to wholeness and reconciliation and of the need for her prayers for women facing the decision she once faced. We must speak out. The harvest of pain and the destruction of life will be too great if we don't.

"We can tell her that we all, in one way or another, abort God's will in our lives, perhaps not as dramatically as in a physical abortion but certainly spiritually through selfishness, greed, anger, pride, and resentment. For all these 'spiritual abortions,' we all must seek forgiveness, for they have helped to create a world where the physical abortion is common and promoted."

Yes, let us speak boldly from the pulpit against abortion, let the laity courageously speak out too. Abortion is a cruel practice in our culture, and it must be stopped. But let us also say with equal tenderness there is room at the Cross for anyone – no matter how egregious the sin. "If we confess our sins, he [Christ] is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness" (I John 1:9).

It's a message from the pulpit many women desperately need to hear.

#### Red Pill or Blue Pill

In C.S. Lewis' work, "The Weight of Glory," he asks a very pertinent question that we seem to be facing more and more each day in that, "How do we decide what is good or evil? The usual answer is that we decide by conscience. But probably no one thinks now of conscience as a separate faculty, like one of the senses. Indeed, it cannot be so thought of. For an autonomous faculty like a sense



cannot be argued with; you cannot argue a man into seeing green if he sees blue. But the conscience can be altered by argument; and if you did not think so, you would not have asked me to come and argue with you about the morality of obeying the civil law when it tells us to serve in the wars. Conscience, then, means the whole man engaged in a particular subject matter.

But even in this sense, conscience still has two meanings. It can mean (a) the pressure a man feels upon his will to do what he Thinks is right; (b) his judgment as to what the content of right and wrong are. In sense (a) conscience is always to be followed. It is the sovereign of the universe, which "if it had power as it has right, would absolutely rule the world." It is not to be argued with but obeyed, and even to question it is to incur guilt. But in sense (b) it is a very different matter. People may be mistaken about wrong and right; most people to some degree are mistaken. By what means are mistakes in this field to be corrected?"

Then, when we contrast Lewis' words to the account in the Gospel of John, when the Scribes and the Pharisees brought the woman caught in adultery and placed her before him, planning to accuse him of judging, we see how the conscious can be a powerful force. It is a crucial aspect that many overlook.

"So when they continued asking him, he lifted up himself, and said unto them, He that is without sin among you, let him first cast a stone at her. And again he stooped down, and wrote on the ground. And they which heard it, being convicted by their own conscience, went out one by one, beginning at the eldest, even unto the last: and Jesus was left alone, and the woman standing in the midst."

Why did they depart beginning at the eldest? Were there mistakes they realized that needed to be corrected? When we read this line of scripture we get the feeling that the older Pharisees immediately recognized their own sin and, in so doing, were shamed into dropping their figurative stones of accusation and leaving the temple.

But again, I ask, "Why did the old men leave first and not the young?"
When presentations to an audience are given, it is widely known that the younger the general age of the listeners, to a point, the quicker and more amplified is their reaction to what is being delivered. So, how was it that those who usually took longer to respond would leave first? Should they not have spent time trying to recall all those years of living in sin? Or were they deciding upon the options

— fleeing would be dropping the charges on a slam-dunk case, essentially saying that this unlearned teacher was right? Saving face must have been another reason

cusatorial questioning.

To answer these questions, we must look deeper into scriptures and understand what those Pharisees would have known and to consider that the power of the Holy Spirit was indeed at work.

not to exit because doing so was only confirming the speaker's own reversal of ac-

We start at the beginning, when God commanded the man, saying, "Of every tree of the garden thou mayest freely eat: But of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, thou shalt not eat of it: for in the day that thou eatest thereof thou shalt surely die."

Up until that point, man's consciousness was only aware that he was alive, awake, and able to tend to the garden of Eden. There was no need to understand beyond what God knew. This freedom of will, the ability to choose between obeying a simple command, was man's gift – to do with it as he pleased. But when they partook of the tree, "Seeing that the tree was good for food, and that it was pleasant to the eyes, and a tree to be desired to make one wise," they suddenly became aware of their nakedness, "And the eyes of them both were opened, and they knew that they were naked; and they sewed fig leaves together and made themselves aprons."

Not only had they now broken God's commandment but they also became the cause of the first physical death. God made the first blood sacrifice to cover their sins when he provided them "coats of skins, and clothed them." As the natural man develops, we can now see how one physically matures. In children or childlike nature, we see innocence. The desires of the flesh are not understood until the age of puberty. When the growth hormones kick in, and suddenly our childhood playmate, sweet little Susie, has curves we men never noticed before, and something inside us starts to smolder, like kindling that was dry and brittle, waiting for the spark to ignite. A beautiful body, free of cumbersome coverings God had made, and with it, a place of such beauty and profound richness that man could have literally lived forever. They were fully mature and with a knowledge probably far exceeding that of today's man. They understood that God's command came with a price, for he didn't simply say "Do not eat of the tree," but rather, he told them the consequence that would occur if they did, "You will die." Yet, the disobedience, that choice to decide to go against God's will, his one and only rule, brought forth retribution for all mankind.

It would take the Grace of God to save us from ourselves.

Those Pharisees who had cornered Jesus in the temple that morning were suddenly made aware of their own judgment of the flesh. The simple statement, "He that is without sin among you, let he first cast a stone at her," reminded them of

their mortal shortcoming. The adultery, the sin of the flesh, brought about an accusation based on the Mosaic law, yet those who judged were no better. A sudden conviction of their own conscious shook them to their core. Alone, a conviction of one's conscious can be



humbling, but when that sense is in the presence of God, it becomes enhanced, amplified to a level that must have been unbearable.

Now, let's focus on the younger men who were with the accusers. Were they lingering longer because they had less sin to fear? Or were they following the lead of their elders? Or was it possible that the next generation doesn't have enough consciousness to know when to leave or stay?

"What do you mean by that," you might ask?

1 Cor.8:7-12 "Howbeit there is not in every man that knowledge: for some with conscience of the idol unto this hour eat it as a thing offered unto an idol; and their conscience being weak is defiled. But meat commendeth us not to God: for neither, if we eat, are we the better; neither, if we eat not, are we the worse. But take heed lest by any means this liberty of yours become a stumbling block to them that are weak. For if any man see thee which hast knowledge sit at meat in the idol's temple, shall not the conscience of him which is weak be emboldened to eat those things which are offered to idols; And through thy knowledge shall the weak brother perish, for whom Christ died? But when ye sin so against the brethren, and wound their weak conscience, ye sin against Christ."

Think about how the world is trying to reshape consciousness. From the video game addictions to just how we are being controlled through social media, we are constantly being bombarded by the growing presence of AI. The movie "The Matrix" has an almost cult following among our youth. In it, humanity exists as a level of consciousness connected by a supercomputer, plugged into every human so that their collective consciousness is one. Our youth have already begun to question if the reality we see is really the real thing – red pill (reality) or blue pill (to live in the fabricated world of The Matrix)?

Which pill do we choose?

When left to the powers of their own natural instinct, men are carnally minded and think in linear terms. They follow their "gut" instincts, allowing the world to influence their decision-making. We can predict from their past behaviors what their future actions will become. Artificial Intelligence (AI) is based on this assumption. The Oxford Languages definition of AI is "the theory and development of computer systems able to perform tasks that normally require human intelligence, such as visual perception, speech recognition, decision-making, and translation between languages."

Does the next generation have enough consciousness to know when to leave or when to stay? Those in the temple that day tarried. Did they lack the same level of conviction? Are they representative of our youth today? What will be the driving consciousness to the next generation? Will they rely on AI to give them the answer?

Rosalind Picard of MIT warns, "The greater the freedom of a machine, the more it will need moral standards."

Left to our own devices, we will find comfort in those images, songs, and pages of information that AI will feed us. Unfortunately, the more we allow the input, the more we go down that path, being led to a destination that is less than desirable. We become like an opioid addict, requiring more of what the world has to offer until we diminish the very consciousness meant to govern our will.

We need to wake up and realize that we must make our own decisions and not be led as an animal is to slaughter. We've been given the means to know the truth, for it is by the Word of God that we can find comfort, hope, and truth. The Bible is one of the most precious gifts we have. We must not let the world change that.

God created man in his image so that being human is more than just having knowledge wisdom, but the conscious sets us apart from his other creations. Through our consciousness, we can do his will. Through this God-given capacity, we are capable of knowing right from wrong because each of us is a free moral agent.

Which pill will you choose, red or blue?

When those Pharisees turned and left the temple that day, had they experienced the power of the Holy Spirit, and were they suddenly and completely awakened to who Jesus really was, the Son of God?

"I say the truth in Christ, I lie not, my conscience also bearing me witness in the Holy Ghost,"

Someday, we shall know the answer.

What can YOU do to help celebrate ANY form of recovery? Let me share some powerful yet easy program ideas that can make tremendous impacts and connections.

This past month – Freedom Life and Catawba Valley
Baptist joined together to hold a Celebration of Recovery Concert. During this
concert, Heart Cry (the music ministry of Freedom Life) shared songs of recovery and inspiration. Regional Community Resources Agencies set up booths in
the Family Life Center and the cake was served by the church. This was a very
uplifting event and many community connections were made.

#### Creative ways to Celebrate

- 1.Cardboard Testimonies. This is a simple way that individuals can share their struggles on one side, and flip it over to show their progression in recovery. Songs you can play during this time for people to walk forward and share: Chain Breaker, Let Me Tell You About My Jesus, and I am Redeemed.
- 2. A Chalkboard Ministry for the month. You can place a large chalkboard or even designate a bulletin board for this purpose. On one board, you can have people write their struggles and on the other their progress. It can become a focal point of prayer and connection.
- 3. A StoryBoard. Ask members of your group to write their story/journey in recovery and board it on the board for all to see and read. Maybe high light stories in your newsletter throughout the year to keep recovery at the forefront of people's minds.
- 4. Social Media Video Post. Have community members share their testimony of recovery in a short video. They can



send it to you, and you can post a new story weekly or monthly in celebration of what God is doing!

5. Invite Freedom Life to YOUR community meeting or church and allow us to celebrate in SONG and Testimonies. We would love to worship along with you!

Addiction is real. Addiction is hard. Addiction damages families. Addiction ruins lives. But there is HOPE! There is hope in Jesus and the power to overcome. Moving forward one of the best things you can prepare your community group or church for is HOW to identify and in a healthy way- walkthrough addiction with those struggling. We can turn a blind eye to things we are not comfortable with or do not want to deal with because the struggle can be extremely difficult. Special focus events such as recovery rallies, community accountability groups, special times designated for awareness such as Alcohol Awareness month, are all designed to reduce the stigma associated with alcoholism and addiction. Alcoholism is a chronic, progressive disease, genetically predisposed and fatal if untreated. However, people can and do recover. There are many reasons to quit, and the decision is a major milestone. So, here are five reasons to quit drinking and make a life-changing choice.



#### Remembering Billy Graham: Heaven Is Home

As it is written: "Eye has not seen, nor ear heard, nor have entered into the heart of man the things which God has prepared for those who love Him." -1**CORINTHIANS 2:9** 

My grandfather was one of the most heaven-focused people I've ever met.

Though Bible verses such as 1 Corinthians 2:9 make it clear that we have no understanding of the magnitude of "the things which God has prepared for those who love Him," for my grandfather, heaven was not a distant and inaccessible

Especially in his final years on earth, heaven was just as real as the house in which he lived. It would be his new home where he would reside once his journey here was complete.

Long before he slipped quietly into eternity on February 21, 2018, my grandfather made the following proclamation about his own passing:

"One day you're going to hear that Billy Graham has died," he said, somber and serious, but also brimming with hope and peace. "But don't believe it! For on that day I will be more alive than ever before. I will have just changed addresses!"

You see, my grandfather spent decades proclaiming the reality of heaven and

the narrow road that leads there. Just as an ambassador promotes his home country and pursues its best interests in a foreign land, my grandfather traveled the world as a representative of Christ, sharing and promoting the hope and glory in the heavenly realm for those who call upon the name of Jesus.

I believe heaven became increasingly real to him as he aged well into his nineties. The things of this

world—especially his beloved wife (my grandmother, Ruth, who made her own final journey to heaven in 2007) and most of his friends—had already gone on ahead of him. He once joked that he had lived so long that his friends in heaven would In many ways this world was no longer home and heaven was clearly where his heart resided, even before the glorious morning when he passed from this broken realm into God's presence.

I assume that most of you who are reading this are younger than my grandfather, but you may be dealing with a terminal disease. You may have lost a loved one recently. You may be clinging to the hope of heaven as your anchor in the

If this is you, bless you. I pray that you're finding the peace of God as you walk

In addition to focusing on the hope of heaven, I would encourage you to cling to the reality of heaven as well. Like my grandfather, understand that heaven is a very real place where you will reside for eternity with your Savior.

But it's not just a different address. This very real place will be something so far beyond what our human minds can begin to comprehend. There will be no mourning or pain, hunger or thirst. There will be a place specially prepared for you. The old will be gone, and all things will be made new!

If you've surrendered your life to Jesus as your Savior, don't fear death. Instead, anxiously anticipate heaven and the promise of eternity with Him.

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


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#### Poem

#### Burnsville Cross Shines On Through Conflict

A cross glows in Burnsville, greeting anyone who looks toward Phillips Knob Lookout to splendid light. It's a beacon of hope and has eased the pain of many a heart in these troubled times. Some say it first stood there since the 1940s, and others say it got fixed up by the Jaycees in 1973 – but for a while, the light went out, and then last year, the cross, more than a hundred feet in height, glowed to life again over Burnsville



Protests began, calling for that light to be extinguished, and supporters answered with a petition to Keep the Cross. Vanessa McIntosh started the petition at https://www.change.org/p/county-commission-general-public-keep-the-burns-ville-cross

"Last year we saw the long-awaited return of the cross on top of the mountain," Vanessa McIntosh said on the petition site. "It has been enjoyed by most and sends a testament to this amazing county. Recently there has been a group "created" to take it down. Why? Because they say it's an eyesore. Contrary, we need Jesus more than ever these days. Let's come together and keep our cross."

Within the first two days, the petition had 2500 signatures, and that number has grown to 3000. Many citizens are flabbergasted to think that anyone could have any objection to the cross and its message of hope and redemption.

Tasha Rigsby wrote, "The cross has been a blessing to me and my family it always makes us get on conversations about how good GOD has been to us. Please don't remove the cross. I can't even believe it is up for debate."

Marla Robinson agreed, saying, "It's part of my hometown heritage. I love living in a town where the symbol of who and what we are still shines."

Some of the protesters maintained that the cross caused light pollution. Burnsville is home to the largest public telescope in North Carolina at the Bare Dark Sky Observatory at Mayland Earth to Sky Park.

Mayland Community College President Dr. John C. Boyd issued a statement, saying, "During the last couple of years, we have lived in very strange times. Maybe the historic lighted cross in Burnsville will help bring a little normalcy and hope back to our community. We believe that the cross will only add to our community and are not in conflict with it."

The protesters changed tactics then, saying that the cross ought not to be there at all. "Plain and simple this is a violation of church and state and a violation of the rights of the people of this county and state," says the group Turn Off the Burnsville Cross that is On State Land. "The fundamental laws of this country provide us with the right to practice, or not practice any religion as we please. It also gives us the right to not have this infringed upon by county, state, and federal governments, as well as the right to speak up when we see violations as such occurring."

In fact, the land briefly belonged to the state but reverted to ownership by C.M. Bailey. The argument got heated, but for the most part, disagreement has been civil. Some folks see it as new people coming to town and trying to change traditions or interfere with longtime Yancey County history and culture, while others say that if the cross deserves respect, then symbols of all religions need to be supported in town.

"If the county wants to have their symbols then they should include ALL that want to be included....until the rights and beliefs of all are respected, it has to be removed," protesters contend on their Facebook site.

The 3000 petition signers in support of the cross respectfully disagree with the

Amanda Webb added her signature, and noted, "I'm signing because of what the cross represents. It brings hope and comfort. It's never been more needed in the dark days we are living in. To those who do not know Christ, it is can serve as a gateway to hearing the gospel. A conversation starter. It represents the love of God and what He did for us. To whoever is reading this, GOD LOVES YOU. He wants you to put your faith in Him. There is nothing He will not forgive. To my fellow believers, are we representing our Father as He would have us to? Remember, you cannot fight evil with hateful words. God's love reflected through us will prevail."

Yancey County Manager Lynn Austin has stated publicly that no county funds currently go to support the cross, which is on private land. Local fundraising efforts have begun.

Michaela Woody Isaac began making t-shirts that say, "Let Your Light Shine," and "Burnsville #Shine On," for \$20 apiece, with \$5 going to support the maintenance of the cross, at https://www.facebook.com/shipwreckapparelnc. Shine On -- Burnsville also has started selling Shine On decals for \$5, with \$3 going to the fund to support the cross.

Madison Shuford, at https://www.facebook.com/search/top?q=shine%20on, has started fundraising for maintaining the cross, and the fundraiser states, "These funds are being raised to assist with any maintenance, upgrades, tree clearing, or any other necessary needs that may arise in keeping the Burnsville, NC lighted cross on Phillips Knob lit and visible. Some trees need to be cleared, which due to the communication equipment in the area have the potential to be very difficult to remove and not damage the equipment that is in place. Because of this for the protection of the equipment and the person(s) doing the tree removal, the individuals who take on this task will need to be insured. Many have had questions about the accountability of the funds being raised. Any money will be run through an account set up by a local church . . . . We hope this cross continues to be a symbol of hope and togetherness within our community. We would appreciate it if anyone

who donates would share what the cross means to them. Thank you and God Bless."

Supporters also take heed of Isaiah 2:2-4: 2 "And it shall come to pass in the last days, that the mountain of the LORD's house shall be established in the top of the mountains, and shall be exalted above the hills; and all nations shall flow unto it. 3 And many people shall go and say, Come ye, and let us go up to the mountain of the LORD, to the house of the God of Jacob; and he will teach us of his ways, and we will walk in his paths: for out of Zion shall go forth the law, and the word of the LORD from Jerusalem. 4 And he shall judge among the nations, and shall rebuke many people: and they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruninghooks: nation shall not lift up sword



 $against\ nation,\ neither\ shall\ they\ learn\ war\ any\ more."$

In February, the North Carolina General Assembly passed SB 173 – Free the Smiles Act. This bill essentially makes masks optional in K-12 schools and early childhood programs across the state, allowing parents to make their own decision to mask their children or not.

Over the past year, I have heard from parents and students all over North Carolina and these folks have all been telling their school boards the same thing, that masks should not be required anymore. I agree. The decision of whether a child will wear a mask to school should be made by the child's parents.

Since the beginning of the pandemic, we've known that school-aged children are at a lower risk for severe COVID-19, yet these children are the ones who continue to bear the brunt of the masking requirements. As Democrat-run states begin lifting mask mandates, they're still requiring young students to continue wearing masks in schools. But the truth is that many studies are beginning to show that masks are having detrimental effects on the social and emotional development of children.

Previously school boards had to vote on their masking policies every 30 days, but that requirement is repealed in this bill. The bill does not supersede any federal requirements for masking on school buses. Schools are prohibited from treating students differently – academically or otherwise – if they do not wear a mask.

I am glad that this bill received bipartisan, veto-proof majorities in both the state Senate and the state House of Representatives. But as of this update, Governor Roy Cooper has not said whether he will sign the Free the Smiles Act. While there is currently enough support to override a veto, there has been precedent in the past for Democrats to reverse their positions when the Governor issues a veto. I truly hope that Governor Cooper will take this important bill to heart and quickly sign it into law. North Carolina's children deserve better.

These employees are responsible for the upkeep and maintenance of town streets and sidewalks, stormwater services, sanitation, and many other critical, but potentially hazardous jobs. I commend the town for pursuing the SHARP, which indicates a collective commitment to the safety and health of town workers!

On Feb. 22, I was honored to host an event with N.C. Home Builders Educational and Charitable Foundation to officially sign the Be Pro Be Proud contract. Be Pro Be Proud is a workforce development initiative changing the perceptions around technical careers through a mobile workshop tour that features virtual reality simulations that allow students to step into a life of a technical professional. Be Pro Be Proud began in 2016 as an initiative of the Arkansas State Chamber / Associated Industries of Arkansas. The effort to bring Be Bro Be Proud to North Carolina will increase the visibility of technical careers and training in the state and will prepare our state's workforce for the future. The program will be administered by the Foundation with oversight from NCDOL.

The March calendar is filling up quickly. I look forward to attending N.C. Association of Agricultural Fair's annual convention during the first week of the month. More than 35 agricultural fairs are held throughout communities in North Carolina each year and are a beloved part of each town's culture. These fairs highlight the great agricultural heritage of our state and offer fun, affordable, and family-friendly environments. It's never too early to begin planning your trip to the fair!

The end of March will kick off our Safety Awards Banquet season. I will travel to 30 banquets across the state over the next three months and I look forward to meeting those of you who qualified for one of our workplace safety awards. Friends, this month I wanted to share some history and some exciting new updates on the progress of the North Carolina School of Science and Math's campus in Morganton. In 2013, the North Carolina General Assembly commissioned a feasibility study on expanding NCSSM with a western campus, directing that specific consideration be given to a location in Morganton, in Burke County. The study examined several options, including building a western school on the UNC Research Campus in Kannapolis or other locations or merely expanding the current campus in Durham. Rep. Hugh Blackwell and I worked very closely with our other western legislative delegation members--including Sen. Ralph Hise (an alum of NCSSM), Sen. Andy Wells, and Rep. Mike Hager-- as well as with local businesses and stakeholders, to convince a majority of the members of the General Assembly that Morganton should be the western campus location. We felt that it was time for the State to have an NCSSM location in western NC for several reasons, including 1) To double our student capacity and provide more educational opportunities, 2) So that students in the far western parts of the state could have a closer campus to travel to, and 3) So that students all across the eastern half of the state would have the opportunity to experience life in the foothills and mountain portions of NC.

During its 2015 legislative session, the General Assembly approved the concept of a Western NC School of Science and Math, selected the Morganton location, and included the initial funding as part of the Connect NC bond referendum. In 2016, North Carolina voters passed the Connect NC bond package which included \$58 million to build a second campus of the North Carolina School of Science and Mathematics in Morganton (NCSSM-M). In the bond package, the school was originally called the Western NC School of Technology and Engineering, adding the "T" and "E" of S.T.E.M. to complete the "S" and "M" currently used in the Durham campus of the NC School of Science and Mathematics. During the planning process, other names were considered, and the name was ultimately changed to NCSSM-Morganton. I prefer to think of it as the Western NC School of Science and Mathematics because I think that name is more representative of the fact that it belongs to all of Western NC, not just to Morganton. Construction planning for the new school commenced in late 2016 with the hiring of an architectural firm, educational program design consultants, and a planning director. Even though construction and first-year timelines had to be adjusted due to construction delays and, more significantly, Governor Cooper's veto of the 2019-21 state budget, I am pleased to announce that NCSSM will open its second campus this fall with an initial enrollment of 150 students (11th graders) in the residential program, representing all parts of the state from the mountains to the coast. The inaugural class at NCSSM-Morganton will learn of their selection alongside all other NCSSM admission decisions on April 7, 2022. In some ways, the opening of NCSSM-Morganton feels like we're nearing the end of a long journey to open the doors of this state-of-the-art campus. There were times when Rep. Blackwell and I wondered if it would ever come to fruition. Now that it has, it is definitely a milestone worth celebrating, but it is only the beginning of an incredible new journey for our students, our region, and this great state.

FAF's mission is to keep the community afloat. It is because of great individuals like them that our community continues to flourish. #### **COVID, Masks, and Parents: Finally Common Sense Prevails**

On Thursday, Feb 17, the House Education K-12 Committee, which I co-chair, advanced legislation introduced by Speaker Tim Moore of Cleveland County that recognizes the authority to decide whether their child should wear a mask in school resides in the parents. Under the bill, parents do not have to justify the choice not to have their child wear a mask. Further, students who choose not to wear a face mask shall not be treated differently than a student with a face covering by the public-school unit in any way.

The bill was presented on the floor of the House Thursday afternoon, February 17. The bill passed with a bipartisan vote of 76 to 42. The Senate passed the bill 28-17. It is now on the governor's desk.

#### George Taylor

This is an American history educational moment of those who made a difference during the Revolutionary War era and how they served our Country.

There is little information about George Taylor, known as the "Mystery Man". George was born into poverty in 1716 in Ireland.

At age 20, he traveled to America as an indentured servant to Samuel Savage. When Mr. Savage died, George took over Savage's furnace business and married his widow, Anne. The Warwick Furnace Company thrived in making war matériels, and the couple

Taylor was his own person, as he demonstrated when he openly censured Benjamin Franklin. Taylor believed Franklin did not rebuke Britain strongly enough at the beginning of the trans-Atlantic problems. Starting in 1764, Taylor held many public positions. George was consecutively elected to Pennsylvania's provincial assembly and helped draft the guidelines for Pennsylvania delegates to the First Continental Congress. Later, he was appointed to replace a Pennsylvania delegate who refused to support Independence, and he also served in Congress through 1777. Taylor did not arrive in time to vote for Independence; he did sign the Declaration of Independence on August 2, 1776. Later, George was voted to the Supreme Council of Pennsylvania and served only six weeks as he became ill and died in 1781.

Ironically, Mr. Taylor was one of three from Ireland to sign the Declaration of Independence and one of two Declaration signers who are hardly known. This is unfortunate, as there are historical clues that George Taylor had "one of the most interesting lives of the 56 signers".

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

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

#### The Ultimate Winning Team

Have you ever seen or known a team that never loses at any competition? Does such a team exist? Yes, it does, and the most influential book in the world tells us about unity like this.

#### First, here is the story of Jesus.

#### Balances of Speech

Words have a unique power, the greatness of which is seldom considered. In fact, the power of words far exceeds a person's physical strength. The irony of the power of words is that the physically weakest individual is capable of the greatest damage by the words he uses and the manner in which he uses them.

At times, we read of examples in which words were chosen wisely and made a tremendous impact upon

the hearers. At other times, words were not chosen wisely and made a negative impact upon the hearers. This reality is evidenced throughout biblical and secular history.

Often, a person who embraces extreme positions errors. This is true theologically as well as practically. One of the areas that must still be properly balanced is our speech. Sound speech properly balances three tensions.

To begin, sound speech balances the accuracy of content with the spirit of delivery. Titus was instructed by Paul to exemplify "sound speech, that cannot be condemned" (Titus 2:8a). In this particular verse, Paul did not address the content of the message. The focus of verse 8 is on how the message is communicated. Paul states that the word is to be sound. In other words, the method of communication is to be healthy so that it might make its desired impact.

A person can be right in the content of his message and still be ineffective in his communication of that message. Lest you think this only applies to preachers, you most likely know someone who is unsaved. You know the content of what needs to be said; but if you wish for that message to truly be effective, you must learn to communicate that content with the proper demeanor. Accuracy of content is of little value without a proper demeanor of delivery.

Sound speech also balances the graciousness of character with the perception of need. Colossians 4:6 teaches, "Let your speech be alway with grace, seasoned with salt, that ye may know how ye ought to answer every man." Since this is to be done at all times, the clear expectation is that God never permits even a single moment of speech that is ungracious. Nowhere does the Bible ever permit an individual to vent, fly off the handle, or say whatever comes to mind. Each of those exhibits a lack of self-control, something that should never characterize us. Gracious speech is to characterize us at all times.

Finally, sound speech balances the issues of the temporal with the reality of the eternal. The latter part of Colossians 4:6 establishes the reason for sound speech: "that ye may know how ye ought to answer every man." If our speech is not characterized by graciousness and is not seasoned with salt, we are a hindrance to the spread of the gospel. Our mouth contradicts what we claim to believe about Jesus Christ and the transformative power of the gospel of Jesus Christ.

Unfortunately, much of our speech is focused on the wrong thing. We would rather make our point than disciple a believer. We would rather be right than be certain someone is right with God. We would rather give them a piece of our minds than the message of salvation. We would rather prove our point than demonstrate God's love.

Let's determine to choose our words carefully to make the greatest impact for God.

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#### Marlene's Meditations

#### Whole Body Listening

His steps quickened. His heart pounded. The smoke swirled around him as he approached the cause of the fire. Highly combustible and flammable, the sawdust collector at the furniture plant exploded in flames. Supervisors scurried to the

furniture plant exploded in flames. Supervisors scurried to the scene. The plant manager bolted from his chair, darted through the door and into the smoke. And the corporate accountant, my supervisor, raced to help. Fortunately, most of the employees had left, but some remained. How many needed rescuing? How many were injured? Would more sawdust explode?

Standard operating procedures for emergencies exist for almost every company. Many employees practice scenarios and produce manuals intended to save lives, encourage working together, and promote the corporate mission.

I wonder if commerce realizes how closely they follow biblical concepts? The Bible teaches preventive procedures in great detail, and the story of Abigail offers a story of a divine drama that trains the Christian to prepare for issues that may arise. In this true story, Abigail teaches us how to defuse anger and support leaders.

Abigail, an intelligent woman is front stage in a drama of life and death played out in this biblical chapter. Using whole body listening, she prevented the future King David from allowing his anger to control him, saved dozens of lives, and gently reminded the man after God's own heart of his place in God's will.

Abigail's husband, Nabal, owned a large sheep operation close to Carmel. David had relocated close to Nabal's vast acreage after the prophet Samuel died. King Saul sought for nine years to kill David because he was a threat to Saul's kingship. When David moved close to Nabal, he and his 600 soldiers protected his shepherds, shearers, and thousands of sheep for months. David instructed his men to treat them with respect and honesty. In return, the culture of that area would call for a reward for protection.

But. when David's men asked Nabal for anything that they wanted to give, he rebuffed them with scorn, accusing David of treason. David, anointed by God to become king, exploded in anger, promising to kill every male in Nabal's clan. Abigail heard about it from one of the servants and hastily commanded her servants to load up a donkey with prepared food. She told her servants to hurry to meet David, and she would follow on another donkey.

Hidden in the drama of unfolding scenes, we discover wisdom for defusing anger. Abigail, a woman of great understanding, used a method that teachers use yet today. Called Whole Body Listening, the method is a checklist of the way students are encouraged to listen in class. Some of the questions to ask themselves are:

- 1. Am I making eye contact?
- 2. Does my body language indicate interest?
- 3. Are my words incendiary or peaceful?
- 4. Do I try to restore pre-frontal cortex thinking and a sense of perspective? Abigail used Whole Body Listening. She used her body, soul, and spirit to

respond to a potentially lethal situation with grace, courage, and wisdom. Physically, her body language indicated great concern, a plan she quickly enacted, and a path she knew would collide with David and his army. When she sees David, she hurriedly dismounts and throws herself at his feet. She used her prefrontal cortex instead of allowing her emotions to control her.

Abigail used her soul when she met David. She accepted responsibility for the situation (reflected in today's customer service when the company's representative apologizes for your trouble). She empathized with him. (1 Samuel 25:25) She found something to be thankful for. (1 Samuel 25:26) She offered a gift much like a company would refund the money or give away a free meal. (1 Samuel 25:27) She complimented him. (1 Samuel 25:28)

All of these offer support and encouragement in the heat of the battle of controlling our emotions. Abigail used her mind, her will, and her emotions, i.e., her soul, to convey to David her concern for him.

Then Abigail used her spirit to discern how best to gently guide David back to using his thinking brain rather than being controlled by his emotions. She reminded him that God had a plan for him. (1 Samuel 25:29) and he shouldn't do something to mar that plan. (1 Samuel 25:31)

We should react to the fire of our friend's anger with the same urgency that Abigail piled 5 dressed sheep, 2 bottles of wine, 200 loaves, 100 clusters of raisins, and 200 fig cakes on one donkey and raced away on another toward the thundering sounds of 400 soldiers determined to kill her loved ones and those in her responsibility.

Abigail used Whole Body Listening and encourages us to see amazing results when we follow her steps to defuse anger. We listen with our body language. We listen with our soul. We use our spirit, guided by the Holy Spirit, to discern what support they need to decide to release their anger. Judgment, condemnation, or harsh words add fuel to the fire. Gentleness, love, and concern pour the cooling water of the Holy Spirit on their rage.

The sawdust collector fire gradually diminished, and normalcy returned. Everyone breathed a sigh of relief, more prepared for the next time.

Use Whole Body Listening—body, soul, and spirit—when defusing the fire of anger in your friend or a leader.
