

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
Signature Struggles Life's Uncertainties

"Humble yourselves therefore under the mighty hand of God, that He may exalt you in due time:'

"Casting all your care upon Him; for He careth for you." 1 Peter 5:6-7

we know deep down this is an empty compromise.



Invisible pain. In one way or another, we all have it. Whether it is pain from a chronic illness, relational baggage, fresh grief, or trauma from many sources, we are all marked by pieces of our stories unseen to others. When I give into my signature struggle, my mind echoes: How can God use you when you keep going back to what you can't change? It makes me feel like a failure. What is the use in trying?

We are not to give the enemy that victory. Instead, we are to embrace the grace that God has given us, that is what transforms us, that which brings us out of hiding in that messed up struggle that life itself has dealt to us. Embrace the grace that gives us the courage to keep trying. It is the superpower that defeats our struggles. God can use the places where we have experienced the most hurt, pain, and shame to bring Him glory. In our weakness, His strength is ever so present. If you have given in to a messed-up Signature Struggle, let me resound, to myself as well: We are still loved. Who we are in Christ, hasn't changed. We will rise above our earthly mess-up if we humble ourselves and accept God's mercy and grace. God moves before us with power. Be still in Him. Follow His leading direction in daily living. The battle is not ours, but God's. As believers, we never have to worry about how to engage our conflicts, because they all belong to God. And in being His have already won. Our responsibility is to obey His directions whatever He instructs us to do and trust in Him to show us His triumph way in which we should live. Praise to God paves the way for a deep relationship with God and victory in our circumstances. When we begin to exalt Him, we become aware of how completely able He is to help us.

It doesn't matter if God's commands don't make sense – obey them anyway. The Lord has already won our battles for us, and His interest in involving us is to build our faith. That is why He will often command us to do things that seem unreasonable – to see if we will trust Him. (Reference 2 Chronicles 20:15; 20:20). Our lack of understanding and clarity is evidence that God is beyond anything we can ask or imagine. When we see no clear answer or direction, that is OK. God has the answer. God is the answer to all our struggles, circumstances, doubts, and questions. He is close; He is watching; He is caring. His knowledge is too wondrous and His sovereignty too great for us to fully grasp, but God invites us into a larger deeper faith. We learn to trust God in the face of life's uncertainties. Faith proves to our hearts the very thing we are unsure of, and amid difficulties and uncertainty, this is what we need. Those characteristics that we don't understand in our minds and leave us at a loss to understand – are precisely the reasons we can and must trust God.

BCPS Annual Food Drive Yields 45,050 Pounds Of Nonperishables By Chris Shuffler Burke County

Burke County Public Schools wrapped up its eighth annual Souperintendent's Souper Bowl Canned-Food Drive on Feb. 14. After taking a year off due to the pandemic last year, the district resumed its annual drive this year for local food pantries. District-wide, schools collected 45,050 pounds of food with five local charities benefiting from the food drive: Burke United Christian Ministries, Glen Alpine United Methodist Church, East Burke Christian Ministries, Abernethy

Memorial United Methodist Church in Rutherford College, and East Burke High School's own food pantry.

The school system's food drive starts each year the week students return from Christmas break and runs until the week after the Super Bowl. Schools decorate their collection barrels and staff, students, and the community is invited to fill them with non-perishable food items.

Burke County Public Schools Superintendent Dr. Mike Swan said, "I am very impressed with the amount of food our schools

collected. The schools had fun with the drive and kudos to our principals for finding creative ways to incentivize students and staff to donate. While Salem, Ray Childers, Mountain View, George Hildebran, and W.A. Young elementary schools were our top collectors, the real winners are the people of the community who depend on our local food pantries during times of food insecurity. This canned food drive started in 2014, and now I am so proud to be able to continue the legacy of this great cause."

Over the past eight years, the drive has collected 189,817 pounds of food for local food pantries.

The Forces That Are Against Us

Ephesians 6:12 says: "For we wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places."

We have already considered our arch-enemy who is Satan

himself. Now we move into the instrumentality through which he works. There is no indication that Satan is omnipresent (everywhere present) like God is, but he does have means through which to work in order to accomplish his evil purposes.

It is encouraging to know that even though we encounter battle after battle in life, victory can be experienced by those who know the Lord in the full pardon and forgiveness of sins. If a person lives in defeat, it is not because God has failed to give him resources to live a victorious Christian life.

There are opposing forces who would like nothing more than for God's people to put up the white flag of surrender and be in a state of retreat. Though that be the desire of our enemies concerning us, we cannot surrender in the face of hostile forces

Very few people like to be involved in a battle. If it is left up to us, we had rather experience peace and calm. However, the Bible calls us soldiers.

2 Timothy 2:3 says, "Thou therefore endure hardness, as a good soldier of Jesus Christ." Soldiers are trained for battle. They all go through something we call boot camp. There they learn the basics of combat and learn offensive and defensive measures to fulfill their role as a good soldier.

William Barclay says, "No soldier who is on active service entangles himself in ordinary civilian business; he lays aside such things, so that by good service he may please the commander who has enrolled him in his army."

According to 2 Timothy 2:3-4, three definite things are required of a good soldier

- 1- A good soldier must endure hardness, which is a requirement to succeed in battle.
- 2- A good soldier must not be entangled with the affairs of everyday life.
- 3- A good soldier must please and obey his commander.

There are too many who have been called to be soldiers who are AWOL. Those letters stand for Absent Without Leave. That could definitely be called dereliction of duty. Many have left the front line of combat and have retreated into a comfort zone.

Our Struggle

Notice what it is. It is interesting to notice the Apostle Paul uses the word "wrestle." This term is used to indicate the Christian's struggle with the powers of evil. Normally when we think of wrestling, we think of a contest between two people in which each attempts to throw one another down on a mat and hold his opponent down until the count is over. The Apostle Paul probably thinks of the Greek games and the matches that took place in some of those events. The word "wrestle" speaks of a struggle, a fight, and combat.

We are in a war, in a struggle, and fight with the bastions of evil in this world. Here is some insight on the word "wrestle." It is present tense which gives reference to an ongoing wrestling event. While we are in this world, we are continually in conflict with the things Satan uses, remembering that the conflict Paul speaks about is not a temporal conflict.

Notice what it is not. It is not "against flesh and blood." Too many times we make other people our enemies. Our real enemies are found in the unseen. If you have an earthly enemy, it should not be you making them your enemy, but rather they chose to make you an enemy.

Let's see what Jesus says about our enemies. Jesus said in Matthew 5:44, "But I say unto you, Love your enemies, bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate you, and pray for them which despitefully use you, and persecute you." Again, I remind you that our enemies are found in the unseen spirit world. They do attempt to work through people to accomplish their ends, but the real enemies are the unseen forces that are behind them, influencing them and moving them to stand against God Himself and His people.

Warren Wiersbe says, "We are wasting our time-fighting people when we ought to be fighting the devil who seeks to control people and make them oppose the work of God."


Our Unseen Enemies

As the Apostle Paul lists enemies in the verse before us, that is how we will approach and study them.

The first of the enemies are principalities. It seems certain the evil spirits are what is pointed to in this verse, they are chieftains or principle rulers. Colossians 2:15 says, "And having spoiled principalities and powers, he made a shew of them openly, triumphing over them in it." The powers Paul refers to in this verse are the evil spirits that are in the atmosphere around us. Since there is no way to calculate how many of them there are, we can rightly say they are made up of a part of the 1/3 of the angels that fell from Heaven, after they joined ranks with Lucifer.

Ephesians 1:20-21, "Which he wrought in Christ, when he raised him from the dead, and set him at his own right hand in the heavenly places, far above all principality, and power, and might, and dominion, and every name that is named, not only in this world, but also in that which is to come." Another reference is given here to the powers that are mentioned in our text verse.

The Lord Jesus has defeated them through His substitutionary death and his glorious resurrection. Satan and all his cohorts will never ultimately win, no matter how vigorously they try.



Another example is the condoning of lifestyles that are against the natural use of the body. God says in Leviticus 18:22 "Thou shalt not lie with mankind, as with womankind: it is abomination." In the same chapter down a few verses the Bible says in Leviticus 18:24-25, "Defile not ye yourselves in any of these things: for in all these the nations are defiled which I cast out before you: and the land is defiled: therefore I do visit the iniquity thereof upon it, and the land itself vomiteth out her inhabitants."

God calls what happens in Leviticus 18:22 an abomination. In a Biblical sense, an abomination is anything that offends the spiritual, religious, or moral sense of a person and causes disgust, hatred, or loathing. Some of the abominations mentioned in the Bible are sexual transgressions (Lev.18), the adoption of dress of the opposite sex (Deut.22:5), and the practice of witchcraft, magic, and spiritism (Deut.18:9-12). It is unfortunate our government, the powers that be which are often influenced by unseen spiritual powers, do not see many things through the eyes of the Word of God.

Most of the Hebrew words translated "abomination" have the meaning of impure, filthy, and unclean. That suggests something is foul-smelling and objectionable to a holy and righteous God.

Third, we battle against the rulers of the darkness of this world. Satan is called the "god of this world" in 2 Corinthians 4:4. He blinds the minds of people who are unbelievers, to hinder the light of the glorious Gospel of Christ shining into their hearts. The present world system is moved and guided by evil personages and wicked principles. Satan rules over the dark domain, the world system that is all around. People who are without God, according to the Scriptures, are considered as being in darkness. Evil rulers affect many earthly rulers.

Fourthly, we battle against spiritual wickedness in high places. There are wicked spirits that move and operate between the earth and the stars. Dr. John Gill writes, "This refers to the aerial heavens, where the power or posse of devils reside, and where they are above us, over our heads, overlooking us, and watching every advantage against us; and therefore we should have on our armor, and be in a readiness to engage them."

Our Reaction

Since all of this is true that we have considered thus far, it behooves us to resist evil power and wicked influences because of several things.

Realize the Lord is coming back (Jn.14:1-3). Since He is, we should not be ashamed of his coming because of being influenced by things that are evil.

Live a pure life. God says, "Be ye holy for I am holy" (1 Peter 1:16). We should not act and react as lost people who live around us. God tells us to "touch not the unclean thing and I will receive you" (2 Corinthians 6:17).

Stand against all Satan and his powers. They attempt to ruin your life but don't allow them to succeed (2 Thess. 2:15). Evangelist Billy Sunday expressed it well. He said, "Listen, I'm against sin. I'll kick it as long as I've got a foot, I'll fight it as long as I've got a fist, I'll butt it as long as I've got a head, and I'll bite it as long as I've got a tooth. And when I'm old, fistless, footless, and toothless, I'll gum it till I go home to glory and it goes home to perdition."

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
High County Prison Ministry

The verse that I shared at the beginning of this article is important if you want



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
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

No Shadow of Turning

We are by nature fickle and feckless. With a few artfully twisted sentences, the serpent convinced Adam and Eve to exchange the perfection of God's intimate presence and His garden of delight for the dubious accomplishment of knowing evil first hand. That epic tale is still being written. Famous chapters with names like Golden Calf, Delilah, Bathsheba, Jezebel, and Judas are seared into our collective consciousness. Accounts of the ways you and I have failed God are, thankfully, more obscure but no less dramatic. Like that famous sand foundation, we tend to distort with every spiritual wind or freshet.

Thankfully, the Bible insists that God never changes. Numbers 23:19 tells us that God is not man, that he does not lie or change His mind, and that He will fulfill His every promise. Psalm 102:27 says that He will be the same for eternity. Genesis 17:7 says that the covenant He made with Abraham is everlasting. Deuteronomy 7:9 says that God will keep covenant and maintain steadfast love with a thousand generations of those who love Him by keeping His commandments. 1 Chronicles 16:15 says the same. Isaiah 46:9-10 says that only God can declare the end from the beginning, that His counsel is unchanging, and that He will accomplish all His purpose. Matthew 24:35 says that heaven and earth are temporary, but God's Word is eternal. Hebrews 13:8 says that Messiah is the same yesterday, today, and forever. Titus 1:2 says that God never lies. Revelation 22:13 insists that Messiah is the beginning and the end. These references are too numerous to list. They are perhaps best summarized by Psalm 89:34, "I will not violate my covenant or alter the word that went forth from my lips." With God's absolute unchangeability established, how is it possible that many Christians are taughtand apparently have no trouble believing—that God changed?

God promised in Genesis seventeen that Abraham would be "exceedingly fruitful." He would father a "multitude of nations." In verses seven and eight, God says that His covenant with Abraham and his descendants will be "everlasting." He promises to give the land of Canaan to Abraham and his offspring as an "everlasting possession." The word translated "everlasting" is olam. It means "without end." Scripture is clear that God never changes and that His covenant with Abraham's descendants is everlasting. Why, then, do most churches teach that God broke His covenant with Abraham, that Abraham's descendants no longer play any role in God's plan, and that Israel no longer has a claim to the land of Canaan?

These false teachings form the core of "replacement theology." This noxious heresy teaches that Messiah did not come to earth to fulfill the many promises God made since the garden. We are told that Jesus took human form so that He could start a new religion that "replaced" the covenant made with Abraham and detailed at Sinai. We are told that God "violated His covenant and altered the word that went forth from His lips." This perspective makes God a liar and unworthy of trust. Replacement theology claims that He did what is impossible for Him to do—change.

Many churches accept these lies without acknowledging that they violate God's character. We are told that the "church" is now "spiritual" Israel. Every time the so-called new testament uses the term "Israel," it refers to the blood descendants of Abraham's grandson, Jacob. We are told that Jesus lived and died to save "Gentiles." He claimed that He was sent only to the "lost sheep of the House of Israel." (Matthew 15:24) We are told that "Christians" have no obligation to follow or even understand the first three-fourths of the Bible. Jesus said that the "Law and the Prophets" will be in full force for as long as heaven and earth remain. (Matthew 5:7-9) Revelation 14:12 defines God's people as those who "keep the commandments of God and their faith in Jesus." We are told that "Christians" need not follow God's instructions for living revealed through Moses. In Matthew 7:23, Jesus condemns "good church people" because they are "lawbreakers."

Jesus is the Word who was with God from the beginning. It is He who revealed and preserved that one, marvelous story which is the Bible. The story tells that Almighty God chose a man named Abraham to father a nation which God would fashion into his own holy possession. Abraham's family was separated from the rest of the world for a holy purpose. God made wonderful promises to Abraham, and He will fulfill them. The best part of this story is that we who were not born into Abraham's family can be adopted through faith. Jesus explained faith in His famous sermon. "Those who hear and obey my words are wise."

Israel learned the consequences of foolishness. They chose disobedience and were expelled from Canaan. The Bible is filled with God's promises to restore His family to The Land and establish them in perfect stability upon the Rock of Ages. You may have been taught otherwise, but He WILL keep His promises. "The grass withers, the flower fades, but the word of our God will stand forever."



Temple Veil Rent in Twain

Imagine three hours of darkness over all the land [earth-G1093] as an earthquake broke up the ground and fragmented the rocks. The graves were opened and bodies arose. Our glorious Savior of mankind, Jesus Christ the LORD, on the cross of crucifixion, cried with a loud voice to His Father in heaven. The Holy Spirit departed



from Jesus as he "yielded up the ghost, and behold, the veil of the temple was rent in twain from the top to the bottom", Matthew. 27:50, 51.

Jerusalem where the temple is located was known as the holy city. The temple contained the ark of the testimony, a wooden chest which contained the tablets of stone on which were written the Ten Commandments. The temple symbolized the Old Testament ceremonial laws which were observed by the congregations of Israel. Exodus 24:12," and the LORD said unto Moses, come up to me in the mount [mountain], and be there: and I will give thee tablets of stone, and a law, and commandments which I have written; that thou mayest teach them."

The temple building which contained the ark represented God Almighty. At the entrance to the temple was a veil [curtain] separating the court from the holy place. For ease of clarification let's call this veil curtain #1. A second veil curtain #2, separated the Holy place from what was known as the "Holy of Holies". Through the veil of curtain #2 was the Holy of Holies; the most holy place in the temple where the ark was located covered by the mercy seat. Only a high priest could enter through the veil into the "Holy of Holies" once a year to make an atonement (to cover, pardon for obtaining forgiveness of sin).

The high priest would sprinkle the blood of a lamb on the mercy seat of the ark. The blood represented Christ's blood of being washed from our sins. Revelation 1:5, "and from Jesus Christ who is the faithful witness, and the first begotten of the dead, and the prince of the kings of the earth. Unto him that loved us, and washed us from our sins in His own blood."

When the Holy Spirit departed from Jesus, God ripped the veil from top to bottom exposing the most holy place, the Holy of Holies. The Holy of Holies suddenly became a place that was no longer holy. That act by God of tearing the veil in twain opened the fellowship of God to anyone seeking his redemption and forgiveness of sin. The priestly duties in the temple ended forever. A priest was no longer needed to worship God Almighty. The death of Christ put an end to all of National Israel's ceremonial laws. The temple was no longer a holy building, Jerusalem was no longer the holy city. The era of National Israel ended as God's official representation of the Kingdom of God on earth.

Symbolically equal to the space within the veil, the Holy of Holies, embodies heaven as the house of God. Also, figuratively the body of Christ "through the veil" is figuratively Christ's flesh. Hebrews 10:20, "by a new and living way, which he [Christ] hath consecrated [to renew-dedicate] for us, through the veil, that is to say his flesh."

The coming of Christ Jesus began the development of the Christian church congregations. When Christ Jesus was crucified, and the veil was rent in two, the world entered into the era of the New Testament church age.

The Comforter is God the Holy Spirit which departed from Christ "when he yielded up the Ghost". After Christ had risen from the dead, before returning to his Father in heaven Christ speaks to his apostles in John 16:7 & 8; "Nevertheless I tell you a truth; it is expedient for you that I go away: for if I go not away, the Comforter will not come unto you.; but if I depart, I will send him unto you. And when he is come, he will reprove the world of sin, and of righteousness, and of judgment."

At Pentecost in 33 A.D., 3000 souls were saved from eighteen different nations. Those saved individuals went back to their fatherlands and started the New Testament Christian Church of God. They were no longer identified with the temple in Jerusalem or the synagogues.

The church of the living God, all of those washed by the blood of Christ, Jews and Gentiles, people out of every nation, kindred, and tongue, are those identified with the Jerusalem above. Galatians 4:26 "but the Jerusalem which is above is free, which is the mother of us all." The new holy city coming down from God is spiritually constructed with living stones (1 Peter 2:4) chosen by God and are precious. Revelations 21:1, 2, "and I saw a new heaven and a new earth: for the first heaven and first earth were passed away; and there was no more sea. And I John saw the holy city, New Jerusalem, coming down from God out of heaven, prepared as a bride for her husband."

In times past, Christ was hidden behind the veil written on tablets of stone, worshiped by ceremonial laws. Now the salvation of Jesus Christ is written on the fleshy tables of the heart. 2 Corinthians 3:3.



God's Word Always Knows

There was a saying in our house when I was growing up that my dad, sister, and I often quoted to each other: "Momma always knows."

Moms have unparalleled intuition. Whether lying about grades we receive on a test, coming home after curfew, not being honest about who we are spending our time with, pretending to do homework when we are

actually playing video games, or finding shortcuts to do our chores, moms always know.

Like my mom, God's Word always knows what is going on in our hearts, intentions, and feelings.

The author of Hebrews tells us, "For the word of God is living and active and sharper than any two-edged sword, and piercing as far as the division of soul and spirit, of both joints and marrow, and able to judge the thoughts and intentions of the heart. And there is no creature hidden from His sight, but all things are open and laid bare to the eyes of Him with whom we have to do" (Hebrews 4:12-13, NASB).

How does God's Word know this? As Christians, we believe God superintended authors to compose and record without error the words in the Bible. That inspiration of Scripture has its source in God who is everywhere and knows everything.

We call this his omniscience. God is all-knowing. He knows all actual and possible things, and God is everywhere. We call this God's omnipresence. He is everywhere and his word extends that omnipresence.

There are several things we should notice about God's inspired Word in verse twelve. It is "living and active." This means it seeks out, is energetic, and it is powerful. It doesn't wait for us to go to it, instead, it seeks us out. God's Word is also "sharper than any two-edged sword." You can't fool God's Word or lie to it. In that way, it is "piercing as far as the division of soul and spirit, of both joints and marrow, and able to judge the thoughts and intentions of the heart." God's Word goes deep through us and it is quick to discern what is going on in our lives.

The Greek scholar, AT Robertson, says the picture painted here is of a surgeon who observes what's going on and instantly knows what to do. The surgeon, like God's Word, carries a bright and powerful light he uses to illuminate every dark crevice that might need work. And the surgeon carries a sharp knife for the removal of what he sees needs attention.

In verse thirteen the author says "there is no creature hidden from his sight." We cannot hide from God's Word. He concludes by saying, "all things are open." Under God's microscope the smallest sin, doubt, trouble, or insecurity is revealed. When it says all things are "laid bare" it is using the picture of someone bending back the neck as the surgeon does the operating.

Like my momma who always knew what was going on, God's Word always knows what's going on with us.

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The Importance of Sheer Silence

How often when we think of "worship" do we think of "silence?" If you are like me, I tend to picture worshiping God as an active event – a time of verbal praise. However, over the years, I have realized worship does not always mean activity. In fact, I have learned that silence is equally important – and often, more so. I am convinced that God is honored and worshipped when I spend time with Him in silence.

Let us look at "silence" in scripture:

- Most of us will immediately think of Psalm 46:10, "Be still (silent), and know that I am God." Our silence honors His holiness.
- Likewise, most of us are familiar with Habbukuk 2:20, "The Lord is in His Holy temple; let all the earth keep silence before Him." Often used as a call to corporate worship.
- Jeremiah reminds us of the importance of silence in Lamentations 3:28, "Let him sit alone in silence when it is laid on him." A call to obedience by sitting in silence.
- Of course, one of the most quoted Bible references about silence is Elijah's encounter with God as he was hiding from Queen Jezebel after killing her 300 prophets of Baal. 1 Kings 19:11-13 (NKJV) "11 Then He said, "Go out, and stand on the mountain before the Lord." And behold, the Lord passed by, and a great and strong wind tore into the mountains and broke the rocks in pieces before the Lord, but the Lord was not in the wind; and after the wind an earthquake, but the Lord was not in the earthquake; 12 and after the earthquake a fire, but the Lord was not in the fire; and after the fire a still small voice. 13 So it was, when Elijah heard it, that he wrapped his face in his mantle and went out and stood in the entrance of the cave..."

While we agree a "small still voice" is not silence...we often think that is how God speaks to us. Interestingly, Biblical scholars recognize this Biblical translation, here in the New King James Version, is inaccurate or at best, "lazy." Other versions use, "whisper," "gentle blowing," etc., still less than accurate.

Interestingly, the more complete Hebrew meaning is "a thin silence." And those who sew will easily recognize the additional English meaning of "sheer." My wife hangs "sheers" in the front window. So, while I tend to think of something "sheer" as enormous – the "sheer magnitude of the issue," it also means "thin silence." What is "thin silence?"

What I like about "thin silence" is it speaks to silencing two senses – auditory and visual. In the 21st century, I think we deal with as much "visual noise" as audible noise. And in many respects, today's visual noise is probably more onerous, damaging, and dangerous than what we hear. There are far more biblical references to sins of seeing than those of hearing:

- "The eye is the lamp of the body." (Matt 6:22, Luke 11:34)
- "I will not set before my eyes anything that is worthless." (Psalm 101:3)
- "Why do you see the speck in your neighbor's eye, but do not notice the log in your own eye?" (Matt 7:3)
- "If your right eye causes you to sin, tear it out and throw it away." (Matt 5:29)

To achieve visual and auditory silence means I need to "unplug" from the variety of devices that bombard us. If I want to achieve sheer silence, I must turn off my mobile phone and shut off the television and computer. While I may appreciate the convenience of scripture on my iPhone, it is too easy for it to become a distraction – an old-school, printed Bible presents far fewer distractions.

Picture Elijah in a dark cave after witnessing a mighty wind, an earthquake, and a fire, and I suspect most of us would be as frightened as he was – but we need to reflect on his response. He went immediately to the mouth of the cave so the Lord could speak directly to him with specific instructions. And isn't that what we all are seeking from God?

Of course, the perfect example of someone who always desired to hear from God, His Father, was Jesus. He sought solitary silence with His Father daily and often more than once per day. Let us learn from Jesus. He modeled the spiritual disciplines of Relax, Detach, and Listening.

I suggest it is in the solitude of sheer silence we are best able to follow Jesus' example. There we can relax because it is just the two of us. We can detach from the world around us. And once relaxed and detached we are available to listen to what He has to say to us and only us.

In my March article, "Reflections on a Secret Place," I wrote, "In 2011, I was blessed to hear "Mama Maggie Gobran," founder of Eygpt's Stephen's Children, and often referred to as the "Mother Teresa of Cairo," speak." She closed her message that morning by sharing her steps to help experience sheer silence, and she admitted, "It is not easy!" I agree, while it is relatively easy to find solitude and a quiet atmosphere, it is far more difficult to experience "sheer silence." That morning I wrote down the steps she shared, and I still find them helpful:

- Silent your body to listen to your words.
- Silent your tongue to listen to your thoughts.
- Silent your thoughts to listen to your heart beating.
- Silent your heart to listen to your spirit.
- And silent your spirit to listen to His Spirit.
- In silence, you leave many to be with the One.

 My prayer is you, too, can experience the Secret of Sheer Silence. Be blessed.

Tiny Blooms of Hope

Psalm 43:5 "Why art thou cast down, O my soul? and why art thou disquieted within me? hope in God: for I shall yet praise him, who is the health of my countenance, and my God."

When we follow the LORD through His paths in the Bible, we discover a delightful corner tucked into the 13th book of the Old Testament where He pauses

in leading us. He seems to say, "Let's rest a minute in the second chapter of First Chronicles, and I'll show you a lovely little spring garden blooming with hope. The tulips, jonquils, and hyacinths open their petals in an alcove of my Word that will enchant you in days to come when I seem far away."

First Chronicles chapter two is like a tiny garden, tucked away in the forest of His words, beckoning to all who wander the holy paths of Scripture. As we look closer at verses, details begin to emerge. God Who planted the garden creates significant but tiny details in each flower of hope. Glorious colors of the many buds of hope spring to life in this chapter among 1,189 chapters. The women of 1 Chronicles 2 gently display hope through their stories, each one unique and stunning. Wandering around, we gaze at the rare orchids of women who were the great, great (14 generations) earthly aunts of the Lord Jesus Christ, born 4;000 years before Him. We inhale the fragrance of their importance as being in the earthly royal line of Christ, King David's sisters. The petals of Abigail and Zeruiah's lives in verse 16 wave gently in the Holy Spirit's breeze, and we realize that names are important to God.

Your name is important to God. The King of Kings names each one of us, counts the hairs on our heads, engraves our names on the palms of His hands, and treads our daily lives. Understanding dawns as we realize that we will never fade into insignificance in His heart for He sings over us (Zephaniah 3:17), and His thoughts toward us are constant (Psalm 40:5). He has prepared a place for us where we can be with Him for eternity (John 14), and He will never leave us (Hebrews 13:5)! The Lord weaves our stories into His plan for us as He places us at the crossroads of critical decisions. It is significant to note that God treats women individually, respectfully, and yet challenges them to fulfill His destiny for them. We influence others as we point them to the Lord.

And hope lifts her colorful head, slowly following the wind's trail as she looks toward the sky. The women in I Chronicles 2 gather around this rarest of flowers, imitating her by looking beyond their present circumstances toward the rainbow of God's promises. Their stories are made immortal as they help us grow above our troubles. And we too can look beyond the ugly stalks of sadness in our lives, knowing that God grows glorious colorful hope in our lives, causing our suffering to create survival guides for others.

Listed below are some of the varied ways in which these 14 women in I Chronicles 14 bring hope to us:

- 1) Some names are repeated. Ephrath/Ephratah .vs. 19, 50. Repetition is an important learning tool in the Bible. Like the repetition of their names, our lives show forth His glory as multiple delicate petals repeatedly point to Him.
- 2) In some verses, the woman's relationship is mentioned first, then her name. vs. 21 and vs 24 (Abiah), vs. 26 (Atarah where the relationship of a wife is mentioned first) Our Redeemer has carefully chosen roles and responsibilities for women that lift us above the common life and elevate our lives to a holy significance.
- 3) Some verses just mention the relationship. vs. 3 The Lord's ways and thoughts are high above ours, and we rest in His choices.
- 4) Sometimes, the feminine is only implied such as vs. 26 which uses the word, another, to suggest an additional wife. The economy of His words and yet the generosity of God's repetition attract our attention. Whether small or great, God is aware of every tiny detail of our lives, and we can rest in His wisdom.
- 5) Sometimes, as in verse 29, there is an extended explanation of the wife. It is especially important to follow the flow of words as they diminish and expand in a Scripture passage. Whether our lives seem small, or whether we're in the spotlight, God's messages to others through our stories are the most important part.

In all 14 women, hope wafts its perfume of significance, of purpose, and focus. Jesus brings eternal importance to our lives with His good plan for us (Jeremiah 29:11). He fills our daily lives with purpose and satisfies our longing to know Him. His beams of Sonlight warm our hearts with radiant hope!

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

April is Second Chance Act Month, and for many of us – we call it Reentry month. What is reentry?

Reentry refers to the transition of offenders from prisons or jails back into the community.

Reentry programs are designed to assist incarcerated individuals with a successful transition to their community after they are released. Improving reentry is a critical component of President Obama's Strategy to reduce drug use and its consequences.



For nearly 30 years, the number of people in prison in the United States has steadily increased. At the end of March 2021, there were nearly 1.8 million people still incarcerated in the United States, down only 2 percent since June 2020there was a 9 percent decrease in the prison population, but that was offset by a 13 percent increase in the jail population. The vast majority of prisoners will return to their communities at some point in their lives. Reentry activities and programming are conducted to prepare prisoners to return safely to the community and to live as law-abiding citizens.

Some ex-offenders do return to prison, however. The most recent study on recidivism found that within five years of release, three-quarters of ex-offenders released in 2020 had come back into contact with the criminal justice system, and more than half had returned to prison after either being found guilty of a new crime or for violating the terms of their release. When compared with the average American, ex-offenders are less educated, less likely to be gainfully employed, and more likely to have a history of mental illness or substance abuse, all of which are risk factors for recidivism.

There are three phases associated with offender reentry programs:

- 1. Programs that take place during incarceration, which serve to prepare offenders for their eventual release;
- 2. Programs that take place during offenders' release period, which seek to connect ex-offenders with services they may need;
- 3. Long-term programs that take place after ex-offenders permanently reintegrate into their communities, seek to provide offenders with support and supervision.

There are many types of offender reentry programs, and their range, scope, and methodology differ widely. Research in the offender reentry field suggests the best programs begin during incarceration and continue through the release and reintegration process. Despite the relative lack of highly rigorous research on some reentry programs, an emerging "what works" literature suggests that programs focusing on work training and placement, drug and mental health treatment, and housing assistance are effective.

At Freedom Life, our goal is: to help justice-involved individuals discover new and transformed life that expresses themselves in the ability to make positive and productive contributions to their families and their community, and also have the opportunity to learn how to walk in healthy authentic relationship with God.

At Freedom Life Ministries, commitment to Christ, His love, and His Word is an integral part of who we are. As we work with current and formerly incarcerated men and women, we seek to help them step into and sustain the commitment required for them to know the true potential of their lives and fulfillment of all the needs that God can meet amid all the challenges they face. We believe we have been called to be for justice-involved individuals what Christ was for us when it comes to living out what true commitment is, the cost that it requires, and the amazing new life capacity that it can bring.

The federal government's involvement in offender reentry programs typically occurs through grant funding, which is available through a wide array of federal programs at the Departments of Justice, Labor, Education, and Health and Human Services. Freedom Life receives several grants from these funding streams. However, these finds are many times just a small part of what is needed. Many organizations like Freedom Life, depending on community support of prayer, funds, support, volunteers, and involvement. We could not function without the supper we receive from individuals, churches, businesses, and organizations.

This month we are challenging our community to help raise \$10,000 for Reentry and Second Chance Act month programming at Freedom Life. you have sorrow now, but I will see you again, and your hearts will rejoice, and no one will take your joy from you." John 16:22 ESV Bibliography



Checking the Blind Spots

Several years ago while traveling Interstate 26 between Hendersonville and Asheville I witnessed a car accident. Thankfully no one was injured. However, the accident could have been avoided altogether had someone checked their blind spot.

Most of us know that when you are driving, especially on the interstate, there is a certain spot when other

cars are passing us that they cannot be seen. You must either lean forward and check your mirror or glance over your shoulder to be certain it is safe to change lanes. It's not only our own lives we can put at risk, but also those who are passengers with us and other drivers on the road. So many accidents are caused by carelessness. Drivers are often distracted by phones, by passengers in the car with them, or in my case, looking for deer in a field sometimes (my wife fusses about that one). The point is, many could have been avoided and many turned out tragic and didn't have to, especially the accidents caused by not checking that blind spot. While no one is intentionally sneaking upon us to hide in that blind spot, spiritually speaking, there is an enemy that is always looking to hide in it!

The Bible says in 1 Peter 5:8-9 "Be sober, be vigilant; because your adversary the devil, as a roaring lion, walketh about, seeking whom he may devour; Whom resist steadfast in the faith, knowing that the same afflictions are accomplished in your brethren that are in the world."

We as Christians have a formidable enemy, the devil. He is our adversary. He hates God's church and God's people and is constantly on the prowl like a hungry predator, just looking for an opportunity to devour someone who isn't paying attention! When a Christian becomes complacent, lazy, unconcerned, or in a place in life they shouldn't be, that's when he will sneak up in that blind spot and pounce!

If this is true, who came up with it and how did they get to this conclusion? I can't remember any day in my life when I spoke 7,000 words. At least out loud. I probably thought that many words, but they didn't all touch my tongue.

The Gracious Mistress of the Parsonage is a different story. As long as we have been married, I have never tried to count how many words she spoke on any single day. So keeping up is very difficult for someone like me. In its use.

Usually, when she has something to say she says it and it turns out to be true.

A friend of mine once told me that in his church many years ago, he had a woman he described as someone who never entertained an unspoken thought. I'm sure she was a delight to be around. I might know some people just like that.

If I, for example, spoke 7,000 words on any given day, I would be exhausted by the end of that day. So what in the world would I use those 7,000 words to say? And, to whom?

If I spoke 7,000 words a day, that would be about five words a minute for 24 hours. I'm not sure that's something I could ever do.

Most people have a lot to say, but what they say doesn't mean a lot. And, not just politicians.

My maternal grandfather was very selective when it came to speaking. It took him quite a while to get a sentence out, and he never used a word that wasn't necessary. I sometimes couldn't understand what he was saying, but he would never repeat himself. But when I asked him to repeat himself, he would just look at me and smile one of his grandfatherly smiles.

Having something to say is very important. The trouble is most of what people have to say isn't important.

There's the other side to this: sometimes what I say gets me into trouble. I may be meaning one thing, but the person listening may understand it entirely differently. This has been my trouble throughout the years.

When I'm silent, I rarely get into trouble. When I open my mouth and start speaking, I get into trouble. Sometimes speaking is automatic, and I don't realize what I'm saying out loud. Keeping my thoughts to myself has been a hard discipline for me throughout the years.

Recently, The Gracious Mistress of the Parsonage was coughing a little bit, and finally said to me, "My throat is very sore today."

Not realizing that my mouth was open and expelling words, I said, "That's strange because my ears are sore today."

Looking at me, I realized I had said that out loud. I said it out loud so that she could hear it, but I didn't want her to hear it. Her stare taught me a valuable lesson at that time.

I was now in trouble, and it was because of the words I said out loud.

After being married for over 50 years, you would think I would have mastered the skill of thinking but not speaking. I'm still working on that.

There is also the situation where you don't get enough words out.

The Pennsylvania Dutch have a saying, "Throw Papa down the stairs..." then they pause for a moment and finish it by saying, "... his hat."

If you don't get the last part of that sentence, you may end up throwing Papa down the stairs, which is not what that sentence is all about. I have trouble hearing the whole sentence at times, and because of that, I can't remember how many Papa's I've thrown down the stairs. (Sorry about that, Papa.)

I have noticed there doesn't seem to be a direct connection between my thoughts and my tongue. If only they could get together and stay on the same subject, I would not get into so much trouble.

So, when The Gracious Mistress of the Parsonage is exercising her 20,000 words per day, I can only process 7,000 of those words. So the problem I face is, which words am I going to process?

I have trouble with my 7,000 words a day. I can't imagine how anybody of the opposite gender can manage 20,000 words a day every day of the week.

To choose the right words, I have to listen to the words that have been coming my way. I don't always get it right. I try, and I'm getting better at it, but I still fail.

While thinking about this I was reminded of a very important passage of Scripture. "27 He that hath knowledge spareth his words: and a man of understanding is of an excellent spirit. 28 Even a fool, when he holdeth his peace, is counted wise: and he that shutteth his lips is esteemed a man of understanding" (Proverbs 17:27-28)

According to this, the more a person knows the less he speaks. This has been rather an important assessment of people. It's the people who are silent most of the time that probably know more than the people that are talking most of the time

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

Medical Marijuana? Compassion? Balderdash! Our Youth Will Suffer.

Narconon Ojai, a center located in California which helps people overcome their addiction to alcohol and other drugs, tells Andy's story on their website.

Andy was a young man who was "a bright spot" among his friends and family because of his great sense of humor. But marijuana use would eventually eclipse his bright side with suicidal thoughts and



One Colorado study showed nearly 74% of teenagers receiving addiction treatment in that state said they used medical marijuana, which was recommended by someone else.

Senate Bill 711 - N.C. Compassionate Care Act is the latest legislative proposal in the Tar Heel state to approve marijuana as a medicine.

Medical marijuana? Compassion? No one who has thoroughly studied this issue and understands it believes such balderdash.

Peter Hurst in Weeding Out the Cannabis Myths rightly charges:

"Medical marijuana is medical in name only, but nevertheless it has served a useful purpose for the pro-Cannabis cause by helping to launder the image of a drug linked to a range of differing harms...The very existence of 'medical marijuana' (whether it is clinically efficacious as a therapeutic or not) has helped to create the impression that Cannabis is a benign drug & in conjunction with several other factors – including the cultural lag in the realization that the rise in Cannabis potency over the last few decades has considerably increased the range/severity of harms associated with Cannabis use, not to mention widespread marketing, advertising & also the spread of deliberate misinformation – makes warnings of the dangers of Cannabis legislation seem less believable to many. Simply put, the mythic halo surrounding Cannabis, which creates the impression that it is benign (or at least non-malign,) obscures and obfuscates the reality that Cannabis is a potentially dangerous drug linked to a range of different harms...."

Back in August of last year, when SB 711 was considered by the Senate Health-care Committee, Sen. Ralph Hise (R-Madison) astutely pointed out:
"This is not about patients and receiving treatment. This is about placing North Carolina on a path that will make it more acceptable to legalize marijuana."

Hise suggested that once the measure was passed, the list of qualifying illnesses would ultimately be broadened to the point almost everyone would be eligible.

Hise questioned the wisdom of the state embracing marijuana after years of trying to eradicate tobacco use when both are harmful carcinogens, and he pointed out the double standard of endorsing the use of a substance that doesn't have FDA approval while at the same time touting the need for the FDA to approve the Covid vaccines.

Hise was right, and it's not only the Covid situation that shows us something about the way things can go south when politics and medicine aren't kept separate. We've seen it even before.

In his book, Going to Pot, America's first drug czar under President H.W. Bush, William J. Bennet, warns about the serious dangers of "medicine by vote." Bennet says that in the 70s, Laetrile, which was made from apricot and peach pits, was promoted as a cure for cancer. The FDA never approved Laetrile, yet it was sought by many. In fact, some 20 U.S. states voted to approve its use, but to no real therapeutic avail, and several people died of cyanide poisoning as a result of its use.

What was done with Laetrile was undoubtedly done with good intentions, argues Bennet, just as many so-called medical marijuana proponents' intentions are also good. Nevertheless, what happened was still a terrible injustice because it gave people false hope. Furthermore, it created a distraction from pursuing scientifically researched standardized approved drugs to treat cancer.

Most are probably unaware that this author did some short-term missionary work in India during the 80s and 90s. It was a surprise for me to learn that an alternative medicine promoted in that country is touted for helping with as many as 70 to 80 incurable diseases, including cancer and diabetes. The people of India swear by it. Its use there has a long history of more than 5,000 years.

Limited research indicates this natural substance may have a limited positive effect on diabetes. Still, overall, health experts are not enthusiastic about its alleged curative properties for many diseases. In fact, a couple of years ago, 500 Indian scientists asked the Indian government to withdraw a call for research proposals on its efficacy as medicine, arguing that it was "unscientific."


The parallels are striking. The North Carolina medical marijuana bill still waiting for consideration by the full Senate lists several debilitating illnesses and conditions for which marijuana supposedly works as a treatment. Proponents zealously argue Cannabis has been positively used for thousands of years. The anecdotal evidence for its alleged curative properties is seemingly countless. Yet, the official positions of the nation's top medical associations and science community say smoked marijuana is not medicine, and its use can harm one's health.

So, declaring smoked marijuana to be medicine by legislative fiat, based on limited research and anecdotal evidence (as is the case with medical marijuana) while ignoring the experts' official statements, legitimizes marijuana use for similar reasons my friends in India give for drinking cow urine.

There is one significant difference, however. Drinking cow urine as a treatment for some ailment is not likely to destroy someone's life. On the other hand, marijuana masquerading as medicine and its ultimate legalization for recreational use, over time, will undoubtedly destroy much of our nation's youth, as well as many other lives.

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
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Never More Than We Can Bear

While trying to figure out the coffee pot at my new job, up walks a man grinning from ear to ear. While projecting a friendly demeanor, David Hutson, "Hut," introduced himself to me with an iron grip from a hand about the size of Montana. His infectious smile and booming voice, which endeared him to the entire planet, soon made us fast friends.



We often worked together in our high-pressure job of taking X-Rays. Any human body parts, suspected of being broken, twisted too far, or clogged up were fair game. We dealt with convicts from federal prison, after they fell up some stairs, to drunks who just kissed a baseball bat.

Family took center stage in Hut's life, and it wasn't long after we met that the one thing a parent isn't prepared for hit Hut's household. Hut and Trudy's toddler daughter, Hillary, suddenly and unexpectantly died from a birth defect, rocking him to his core. Following the funeral Hut, and his wife Trudy, while devastated by the tragedy, soldered on with life. Despite the expected sadness, I detected a strengthening that could only be explained by the Comforter's presence in his life.

About six years after losing Hillary, a stick of dynamite named Henry blessed the Hutson household and that changed everything! While interviewing Hut for this article, he told me, his son Henry, turned out to be his "do-over". After being blessed with another child, I noticed in him additional strength and resolve. This "renewal" soon led to more involvement in church activities. One notable example included me playing drums and Hut singing bass in small rooms to a coliseum. That newfound strength also projected itself in the form of him taking Bible courses. This dedicated study confirmed the source of strength that lifted him through the darkness of his daughter's death.

Meanwhile, Hut's Daddy, a man who naturally commanded respect, started to show his age. Hut loved his Daddy, who got him through those "totally worthless" teen years, without sending him to a "deserted island somewhere." While hospitalized, where we both worked, Mr. Hutson simply "gave out" and slipped away when the angel came to pick him up one Sunday morning. The first thing that same day, my duties found me on the way to the Intensive Care Unit. I pushed my portable X-Ray machine into the elevator Hut and his sister, Mary was getting off. Mary's presence and their solemn expression told me; something had happened. Hut calmly said; "Daddy just passed on". Following hugs around, and despite the bad news, strength from these Christian warriors filled the air as they walked toward the exit.

Hut's Momma followed her husband into glory a few years later and this loss signaled the beginning of Hut 's wife's, decline. David and Trudy had enjoyed a thirty-six-year marriage, when suddenly, she started showing multiple symptoms that seemed to be cured, only to return with a vengeance. For six long years, they battled through bad times of doctor office visits, running tests, hospital stays, and endless un-explained painful symptoms. They rejoiced in the good times, hoping a cure had been finally found, only to have their hopes dashed with more mysterious symptoms. Transfers between specialists and hospitals ultimately found Trudy being considered for an organ transplant. During this lengthy process, a trial that drew on the accumulated strength Hut had gained, his wife went into a comatose state. Just under a week later, surrounded by family, Trudy joined Hillary at the feet of Jesus.

I have known Hut for over thirty years. During this time, I watched him grow in Christ into the mighty warrior he is today. I believe much of his character and abilities come from the trials he had to overcome. During our interview process, he stated, "I gained enough strength from one crisis, to survive the next." In explanation of that statement, he added; "I would never have made it through losing Trudy if I had lost her right after Hillary died."

Hut is always quick to say; "I am nothing without God." He is doing well and will always have "something to hold onto" while finishing his time on planet earth. Faith tells him; soon enough, he will be rejoining the family whose separation is temporary, in a place where aging, pain, and suffering are no more.





Dear Dave: Do you think I should get a new hybrid car to save money on gas? A lot of my friends have done this, and with the rise in gas and oil prices lately, they're telling me I should, too. According to them, I'll save a ton of money, especially since I have a bigger car and a longer drive to work. What are your thoughts? — Daneen



Dear Daneen: I get lots of questions about these kinds of scenarios, and how it plays into people's budgets. Many folks wonder if it would be better to go out and get a new vehicle with better gas mileage. Well, do you really want to lose more money?

Let's say you drive a vehicle worth \$10,000 that gets 15 miles per gallon. There's a \$25,000 hybrid you're thinking about buying that gets 25 miles per gallon. That's a \$15,000 price difference just to get 10 more miles a gallon. If you drive 100 miles a week, that's about a \$10 difference a week. That would be about \$40 extra you're spending a month in gas if you are stuck with the current car. A monthly car payment is a whole lot more than that! In short, the math doesn't work. You'd have to drive to the moon and back to make it worthwhile.

There are a lot smarter things you can do to cut down on your fuel bill. Have you thought about trading for something smaller? If you're driving a gas guzzler, trade it in on another car worth no more than your current car's selling price. This means better fuel efficiency without a car payment. Carpooling is an option, too, even if you split the driving just a few days a week.

If you want to get a little more radical with the money-saving ideas, you could think about moving closer to work. Spend some time doing the calculations and looking at the specifics to see if it makes sense in your case. Finally, and this may be a last-ditch effort, you could consider changing jobs. No one's forcing you to work where you do, especially if you're spending a lot of time and money on the road just getting to and from your job. If you're really spending a ridiculous amount on gas each month, it might even be time to look into ideas you may have once had to start your own business.

But don't use better gas mileage, or bad advice from your friends, as a rationalization for buying a new car. It's just not worth it. — Dave

This month we conclude our verse-by-verse exposition of the fiftieth Psalm. Join me as we explore verses eight through twenty-three this month.

Gods perfect righteousness demands that sin be judged. This judgment leads to death. Notice Romans 6:23 "For the wages of sin is death; but the gift of God is eternal life



through Jesus Christ our Lord." During the Old Testament days, a person could bring an animal as a substitute for themselves. The persons' faith in God was symbolized through the death of their animal sacrifice to take the place of their own death. However, people had become so accustomed to the ritual and ceremony of the sacrifice they had forgotten the significance of faith in their personal lives. The act of sacrifice showed they remembered their covenant to follow God wholeheartedly. But their hearts had drawn far from Him. From Psalm 50:8-23 we read; "I will not reprove thee for thy sacrifices or thy burnt offerings, to have been continually before me. I will take no bullock out of thy house, nor he goats out of thy folds. For every beast of the forest is mine, and the cattle upon a thousand hills. I know all the fowls of the mountains: and the wild beasts of the field are mine. If I were hungry, I would not tell thee: for the world is mine, and the fulness thereof. Will I eat the flesh of bulls, or drink the blood of goats? Offer unto God thanksgiving; and pay thy vows unto the most High: And call upon me in the day of trouble: I will deliver thee, and thou shalt glorify me. But unto the wicked God saith, What hast thou to do to declare my statutes, or that thou shouldest take my covenant in thy mouth? Seeing thou hatest instruction, and castest my words behind thee. When thou sawest a thief, then thou consentedst with him, and hast been partaker with adulterers. Thou givest thy mouth to evil, and thy tongue frameth deceit. Thou sittest and speakest against thy brother; thou slanderest thine own mother's son. These things hast thou done, and I kept silence; thou thoughtest that I was altogether such an one as thyself: but I will reprove thee, and set them in order before thine eyes. Now consider this, ye that forget God, lest I tear you in pieces, and there be none to deliver. Whoso offereth praise glorifieth me: and to him that ordereth his conversation aright will I shew the salvation of God.'

God opens by reminding His people that He doesn't accuse them of neglecting the outward duty of worship, it is the condition of their heart God sees as repulsive. This very thing the Lord Jesus Christ confronted the Pharisees of His day with. Remember Christ addressing the Pharisee's outward observance of washing hands, pots, pans, and utensils. How about their paying of tithes and the encouragement of children to dedicate portions of their income to the Temple and not care for their parents' needs.

God reminds His children that He has no personal need of their sacrifice. He created everything, and that same everything belongs to Him. The act of sacrifice was enacted for the benefit of man, not the benefit of God. It was an act of worship and it was required the worshipper sacrifice with a repentant heart seeking forgiveness for their sin and trespass.

God does not have needs like the pagan gods do. They require sacrifice to provide food. The one true God requires no food, He is spirit and not flesh.

He reminds His children to call upon Him. God is there for them if they come to Him properly. That is seeking forgiveness and atonement for their sins. God requires the same from His children today. We risk falling into the same pattern if we participate in religious activities such as tithing or church attendance out of habit or conformity. God desires our worship, our conviction to tithe and attend church from heartfelt love and obedience to Him by Grace and through Faith in Jesus Christ. God still desires righteousness, that righteousness comes today by believing and accepting Jesus Christ as our Lord and Savior.

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A Pastor's View

"God-Given Skills for God's Kingdom Work"

Jack Sorenson, the Texas artist, is known for his western paintings, including this one of Santa Claus riding a horse. W.F. Strong, in his book, Stories From Texas, tells us that Sorenson once said: "I've always been able to draw, sketch and paint anything I put my mind to. I didn't just discover it

one day. I've always had it. God blessed me with a gift, and I try to honor that gift as best I can, in every painting." (p. 119)

Sorenson is not wrong. The artistic gift that he has, came from the Lord. We see that in Exodus chapters 31-38 where it repeatedly refers to Bezalel, a man to whom God had given skills in craftsmanship.

This passage shows us that God is the source of all the different skills that we possess, and we need to realize that we are responsible to Him for what we do with the gifts He has entrusted to us.

I. GOD is the source of all our skills.

In Exodus 31:2-3 God says: "See, I have called by name Bezalel, the son of Uri, the son of Hur, of the tribe of Judah. I have filled him with the Spirit of God in wisdom, in understanding, in knowledge, and in all kinds of craftsmanship." The Lord says here that the skill that Bezalel had, was given by Him.

But God also said went on to say that not only did He give Bezalel this skill, but:6 also goes on to say: "In the hearts of all who are skillful I have put skill." That is a very significant verse. God says there that every person who has a skill, HE has given it to them. "In the hearts of all who are skillful, I have put skill." This means that there is no such thing as a "natural talent" or ability; there is no such thing as a "self-made man." Whatever gift or ability anyone has, God, says, it

Once I spoke at a church and while I was there I met a young man who was adept at mechanical things and working with his hands. He said he felt like God had gifted him with this ability. I had just "happened" to read this chapter in Exodus in my quiet time that morning, so I shared this verse with him and told him that he was right. According to this scripture, every ability we have has been given to us by the Lord.

Now many of us are familiar with the concept of spiritual gifts. When are saved, we receive spiritual gifts from the Lord. This is part of the Gospel. God made us to love and serve Him, but we rebelled against Him and decided to serve ourselves instead. This is what SIN is. And the Bible says that "all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God." But despite our sin, God showed His "compassion" to us, and was "gracious" to us, as we talked about last week, which is the essence of His character, and sent Jesus to die on the cross and pay for our sins, so that we could be forgiven of our rebellion against Him, and return to Him as our Lord & God. When we turn back to Him, He forgives us of our sins, and sends His Holy Spirit into our lives, putting His "seal" on us as belonging to Him. And the New Testament repeatedly teaches that when the Holy Spirit comes into your life when you are saved, that He gives you a "spiritual gift" — a God-given ability to serve Him in the church: preaching, or teaching, or encouraging/counseling, or leading, deeds of mercy, and so on. We all have one of these gifts.

Now, throughout my generation there has been the attitude that these "spiritual gifts" are from the Lord, for service in the church, but then we've acted like we also have these "natural abilities" and talents that we just happen to have, that doesn't have anything to do with God or spiritual things. But what we need to understand is that it is not only "spiritual gifts," but EVERY gift and ability is from

- Like Bezalel, if you are a craftsman, that is from the Lord.
- Like Jack Sorenson, if you can paint or draw, that's from the Lord.
- Like Eric Liddell, the Olympian in "Chariots of Fire," one of my favorite movies, if you can run fast, that is from the Lord.

One of the things the Bible shows us in this passage is that every gift and ability we have has been given to us by God.

C.S. Lewis said our talents are given to us by God when He created us. He said we have no more right to be proud of our abilities than we are the color of our hair. They were GIVEN to us. And He said the way to deal with the temptation to pride about our abilities is "NOT to depreciate the good things we are tempted to be proud of but to remember where it comes from." (C.S. Lewis, Yours Jack, p.


Lewis is saying, you don't have to put on a "fake humility" when someone compliments you about some ability you have, and say, "Oh I am not very good" when you KNOW you are! — instead, he says, just humbly remember where it came from. It came from GOD, not YOU! Don't cut down what God gave you. Just acknowledge that it came from Him.

The Bible shows us here that this is true of every talent, gift, and ability we have. It is all from the Lord. Thank Him for it. Tell others you know it came from Him. As the old song says, "Praise GOD from whom all blessings flow"! GOD is the source of all our skills.

II. WE are responsible to use our skills to further God's Kingdom.

In Exodus 36:1 the Lord added: "Now Bezalel and Oholiab, and every skillful person in whom the Lord has put skill and understanding to know how to perform all the work in the construction of the sanctuary, shall perform in accordance with all that the Lord has commanded."

Those words, "shall perform" are key here. It's not enough that a person like Bezalel or Oholiab is given skill and understanding by God; He says they are then responsible to PERFORM what He asks of them, USE those God-given abilities He granted.



international peace conference. Attending along with him was the Secret Service agent E.W. Starling, who faithfully served several presidents. Starling wrote of the conference: "From what I could gather a great was said and very little was done. On January 15 I wrote in my diary: 'As we were leaving ... it fell to my lot to put a lap robe on the President's knees, and be said to me in an undertone, 'I am glad to get away from them. It is nothing but a talk shop." (E.W. Starling and Thomas Sugrue, Starling of the White House, pp. 126-127)

President Wilson was frustrated because that international conference, which could have made a difference in the world, did not. All they did was talk. "It was nothing but a talk shop." But here's the thing: can the same thing be said of many of our churches? We talk about the gospel; we talk about missions; we talk about how Jesus is Lord; we talk about the importance of serving Him. But are we DO-ING it? Are we going? Are we serving? Are we sharing? Or are our churches just "talk shops"?

Each of us should apply this personally as well. Do we just talk in church about the gospel, or do we ever share it with anyone? Is missions something we say we "support," whatever that means — or are we personally really giving, praying, and going on a mission? Is God's Kingdom work something you are DOING personally, or is all this just a "talk shop"?

God can use whatever gifts He has given you, in His kingdom work. On a recent mission trip, the local missionaries said there were needs for people to teach English to high school students, those who can serve children at a special needs camp, businessmen to train local entrepreneurs in business practice, someone to help local teachers with budgets — even fishermen to fish at a local lake and build relationships with the local population! This shows us that there are SO many different gifts you can use to help share the gospel with the nations.

And it's not just about missions; it's the same in your local church too. For a church to function effectively, EVERY person must use the abilities God has given them to serve in some way: praying, serving in the nursery, giving, teaching, on and on. There's something you can do. Remember, God never intended for this church to be a "talk shop;" it's to be a WORK shop; where we are all using our gifts and abilities to serve God.

In fact, you are accountable to God for what you do with the skills He gave you. In Matthew 25 Jesus told a parable of the talents, where a master gives his slaves a talent, a measure of money, to invest until he returned. They each invested their money, but one slave was given only one talent, not as much as the others. So he thought he'd just bury it in the ground until the master returned. But when he did come back, the master rebuked that slave for not doing anything with what he had been given. He wasn't reprimanded because he only had one talent; he was reprimanded because he didn't do anything what he HAD been given.

And the same thing is true for us. You may say, I didn't get very much talentwise from the Lord. I'm not a great soloist, or preacher, or teacher, or some of these gifts churches often value. You are not responsible to God for gifts and talents you did not receive. The question is: are you using what God DID give you in some way?

- So you can't preach; can you watch kids in the nursery?
- So you can't sing; can you help mow the grass?
- So you can't teach; can you visit a homebound person?

The question is not what CAN'T you do, but what CAN you do? You are not responsible to use a gift God didn't give you. What you ARE responsible for is what God DID give you. Use whatever He DID give you, to serve Him and help advance His kingdom here on earth. THAT is what you will be answerable to Him for one day, just like in Matthew 13. Did you bury the time and ability God gave you, or did you use it?

Every one of us should answer the question: "How will I use the gifts, skills, and time God has given me, to further His Kingdom here on earth?"

Remember: God doesn't want His church to be a "talk shop." He wants it to be a "workshop" for His kingdom.

And God doesn't want YOU to be a "talk shop" Christian, who talks a big game about things you aren't really DOING anything about. He wants you to USE whatever gift or talent or ability He has given you, to advance His kingdom here

And this gospel of the kingdom shall be preached in all the world for a witness unto all nations; and then shall the end come." – Mt. 24:7-14

What you are about to read is based on a true story. The name of the mission and its members have been changed or omitted for safety's sake. May the Lord speak to you through this message.

The men walked with their families, wives, children, and the elderly. Some held hands with their loved ones. Others carried babes in arms, cherishing the last moments that would forever be etched into their hearts. As they approached the border crossing into Poland, they could see up ahead the checkpoints created to secure those passages to freedom, to safety, a place beyond the horror of war that they had just escaped. Yosef could feel the lump in his throat grow as he watched those with him become ever more anxious. Everyone knew that when they reached the border, Yosef would have to return to their village, leaving them, possibly forever.

Each able body man was asked to return from escorting their family to the border to fight for their country, their freedom, their life. Yosef was no different. He knew that he could not escape with the women and children, that he and the other survivors of his village would do all they could to defend their country, their homeland, and their faith. Standing up for what is right was easy back in their town when they still had a home. But now, the shelling and destruction forced them to abandon all they knew and loved. It seemed that all they had left of their former life was their faith, for everything else had been stripped away.

Yosef and his brother Caleb had both worked with missionaries from America, training to become evangelists in Ukraine. Their work was to seek out others and share the gospel of Jesus Christ. Although they had worked regular jobs during the day, their eventual goal was to become full-time evangelists traveling around their country and becoming missionaries in their own way. But weeks before Russia attacked Ukraine, the American mission teams were asked to leave for safety's sake. The missionary leaders and their families were as heartbroken as were their trainees, but everyone knew it was for the best. Besides, it would just be a precaution, and they would all be back together continuing their ministry before they knew it.

That was over a month ago. For Yosef, it seemed like an eternity.

It was Friday morning, the day before Sabbath, and Yosef could remember getting ready to go to work. The small hospital where he and his brother worked continued treating patients even though the attack on their country had begun. Yosef and Caleb were only orderlies, but due to the recent influx of war injuries, they were asked to help bandage and care for the less severe wounds. He was just about to go out the door when his daughter rushed up to him and begged him to come back and help her put on her boots for school. "Mommy's busy with little brother," she said, pointing to the back room of their small but modest home, "I need you to help me, Papa." Yosef knew his wife, Evette, was busy with their newborn son, so he was happy to oblige.

"It's okay, baby. Papa's got you covered."

She smiled as he knelt down to the ground, pulling the boots up as she pressed her little feet into the pink unicorn galoshes. Her hand rested on his back, and he could feel the tender touch of her sweet disposition, warming him through and through. When he finished, he lifted her up and gave her a big hug as she wrapped her little arms around his neck, returning the embrace.

"Now, I am off to do God's work. You be a good little girl and have fun at school. You hear me?"

"Yes, Papa," she smiled ear to ear, waving as he turned to walk out the door. Across the street, near the newly constructed apartment complex, Caleb waited in his car. He and Yosef always rode together, and today was like any other. Although Caleb was always there, always on time, he hated being late. So, when he saw Yosef emerging a second time from the house, he waved toward him as if to say, "C'mon, we're going to be late."

Yosef smiled and waved back. It was all too funny. His brother could never relax, even when they were witnessing to others. He seemed to never be content with just learning the verses their mentors had asked them to memorize. No, Caleb had to push himself, learning entire chapters that contained those verses. He was always driven to give his all. It was just who he was. It was this thought of his dear brother that remained when the flash of light suddenly erupted before him.

A Whale And Resurrection

"So the Lord spoke to the fish, and it vomited Jonah onto dry land," so it says in Jonah 2:10, NK IV

Phew! That would be an experience never to be forgotten. The vapors surrounding Jonah as he was expelled from the whale told a graphic story.



Imagine what it must have been like in the belly of the great fish that God had prepared to swallow Jonah? Think of all that the whale had eaten, the digestive juices at work, and the enclosed, suffocating cavity of this great fish. Then think about spending three days and three nights in there.

Easter Resurrection

My wife, Shawn, and I had the privilege of serving the Lord as Southern Baptist missionaries in Gaza and in Nazareth, Israel for fifteen years. Although that was many years ago, we will never forget the times that we would



travel to Jerusalem for the week surrounding Easter. We would join pilgrims from all over the world and walk the Palm Sunday walk from the Mount of Olives into the old city of Jerusalem. And then a week later, we would join upwards of 1200 believers from all corners of the globe and crowd into every nook and cranny of the Garden Tomb site to experience the Easter sunrise service. We would, of course, arrive in the early morning pre-dawn hours in the darkness and excitedly wait for the first rays of the sun to split the eastern sky. And when the morning dawned, we all saw exactly what Mary Magdalene, the other Mary, Peter, and John saw—the huge stone that Joseph of Arimathea and other disciples had used to seal the crucified Lord Jesus in the tomb was rolled away. And as the light of the morning sun filled the place and slowly crept into the open tomb, it illuminated the fact that His body was not there. You see, that once sealed grave was not opened to let Jesus out, but to let all adoring women, men, and children in! When we look into that rock-hewn tomb, we find, just as all who venture to draw near and look inside—that He is not there!—He has risen! He has risen indeed!

That day in Jerusalem as hundreds peered inside the tomb, a great shout of "alleluia" filled the air. "He is risen! He is risen indeed!" was shouted out in language after language. Tears of joy were streaming down each face and that great multitude of believers broke out in praise and adoration to the Risen Savior, Jesus Christ. From the time of those extraordinary Easter Sunday mornings, Shawn and I have never failed to repeat that wonderful declaration of faith. In Arabic, we say, "Huwa Qaam!"(ماق وه)—"He is Risen!" And then, we reply, "Haqqan Qaam!" (ماق وه)—"He is risen indeed!"

Wherever you find yourself on Easter Sunday morning, Christians will repeat these phrases in their own languages, just as their families and ancestors have done year after year for generation after generation. It is an age-old affirmation of the most fundamental truth that sets Christianity apart from all other religions—Jesus rose from the grave. His death on the cross secured our salvation. By His death, we are reconciled to Him because He gave His life as a ransom, a propitiation for our sins. Paul declares in Romans 5:8, "But God demonstrates His own love toward us, in that while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us." And in Romans 5:9-10 he declared, "Much more then, having now been justified by His blood, we shall be saved from the wrath of God through Him. For if while we were enemies, were reconciled to God through the death of His Son, much more, having been reconciled, we shall be saved by His life." He has secured our salvation and reconciliation to God through faith. And His death secured our eternal destiny.

The resurrection of Jesus Christ our Lord and Savior declares and affirms it to be true! When Jesus rose out of that tomb early on that Easter morning, He testified for all time and for all humanity that He has defeated sin and death. And through His resurrection, our redemption is made complete. May the joy of Christ's resurrection fill your hearts as you celebrate the death, burial, and resurrection of our Lord.

"Easter's Surprise" By Russell McKinney Mitchell County

New Year's Day is January 1st. Valentine's Day is February 14th. Independence Day is July 4th. Halloween is October 31st. Christmas is December 25th. But Easter? Uh.....

Easter is that rare holiday that is unpredictable in regards to when it falls on the calendar. At least it's unpredictable to anyone who doesn't keep up with the moon. For the record,

Easter falls on the first Sunday after the first full moon of the spring (vernal) equinox. That setup goes back to the Council of Nicaea in A.D. 325.

The thought process the Council of Nicaea used to arrive at that annual date was centered around the yearly Jewish Passover. That first full moon of the spring (vernal) equinox is also known as the Paschal (Passover) moon because that moon was the date of the Passover in the Jewish Calendar. Well, the Bible tells us that Jesus ate the Passover meal with His chosen 12 disciples the night before His crucifixion. That was the famous "last supper" in which He instituted The Lord's Supper as part of the meal. Okay, since the Bible also tells us that He was crucified the next day, the following Sunday must have been resurrection Sunday, the Sunday we now call Easter.

Getting back to the lunar side of things, the word "equinox" means "equal night" and is a reference to the fact that the spring (vernal) equinox is the yearly date when night and day are nearly the exact same length all over the world. This means that Easter can fall anytime between March 22nd and April 25th. The last time it fell on March 22 was 1818, and the last time it fell on April 25th was 1943.

Of course, it doesn't help that some parts of the world use the Gregorian calendar and other parts use the Julian calendar. Those calendars differ by thirteen days. This has created the concepts of a Western (Gregorian) Easter and an Eastern (Julian) Easter. Typically, Western Easter and Eastern Easter are one week apart, even though there are certain years where the holiday falls on the same Sunday.

The interesting thing about all this is that Easter basically becomes something of a surprise each year in that we common folks have to check the calendar to find out exactly when it falls. In this way, we are like the apostles and all the rest of Christ's followers. That first Easter was certainly a surprise to them.

Even though Jesus had forewarned them that He was going to be put to death and then resurrect, they really didn't believe any of it. Even when the part about Him being put to death occurred, they still didn't believe that the other part would happen as well. Early on that glorious Sunday morning, however, the process of convincing them officially began. We might say that the empty tomb was Christ's way of saying to all of them, "Surprise!"

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

Get Free from the Burden of Stress

It seems that stress is the disease of the century. Products and programs to manage stress are a multibillion-dollar business, whether the "cure" is medicine, counseling, books, seminars, or classes. But I've discovered that God's way of managing stress is the most effective way to live.



Jesus says in John 14:27 (AMP): "Peace I leave with you; My [perfect] peace I give to you; not as the world gives do I give to you. Do not let your heart be troubled, nor let it be afraid. [Let My perfect peace calm you in every circumstance and give you courage and strength for every challenge.]'

I know what it's like to live under the burden and pressure of stress, and I know what it's like to have God's peace. I can honestly say that I will do whatever I have to do to have God's peace in my life because it is not God's will for us to live with stress all the time.

It's easy for us to feel like we can't avoid being stressed out because it's just the way the world is today. But the truth is just because stress is a disease of our culture, it doesn't mean we have to adopt the ways of our culture and live the same way.

We have two options: We can continue to be stressed out until we fall apart, or we can learn how to receive the peace Christ gives in every circumstance, rather than letting stress get into us.

The Cure for Stress

For many years, I lived with constant stress. I was sexually abused by my father throughout my childhood. Then when I left home at the age of 18, I married the first man who came along because I was afraid no one else would want me, and that led to five years of misery. He ended up abandoning me.

By the time I was 23 and met Dave Meyer, I was a mess! I was worried, full of fear, insecure, and had a poor self-image. So I tried to find value in what I did and became a workaholic.

Over time, I developed physical problems, like frequent headaches and backaches, and had problems in many of my relationships because I was unhappy and hard to get along with. I finally came to the place where I decided that I would not live that way any longer. Whatever it took, I was going to have God's peace and live a peaceful life!

James 1:21 says, "... With a humble spirit receive the word [of God] which is implanted [actually rooted in your heart], which is able to save your souls." Although I was a Christian during this time of my life, I needed to "get saved" in my soul-my mind, will, and emotions. I needed to renew my mind with the Word of God so I could know the Truth and be set free from the root issues of my stress.

Here's how it works: When we study God's Word—reading it, meditating on it, getting it deep down in our hearts—it changes the way we think. This causes us to change the way we talk, which changes our attitudes, and then our behavior changes. At this point, the things around us—our circumstances—can't control us anymore.

Get to the Root of Your Stress

Being set free from the pressure of stress begins with God's Word, but we also have to understand that if things are going to change in our lives, we will have to take responsibility to change them with God's help. So the first thing we need to do is pray and be willing to hear what He has to say about the real root of our problem.


If you're already doing your part, then be determined to trust God to fix things. But if you're not walking in wisdom or you're doing things a certain way just because that's the way everybody else is doing it, then follow the direction He is speaking to your heart to make a change.

We must pray and obey! This means we commit not to live based on the culture around us but by the leading of the Holy Spirit, who lives in us as born-again believers in Christ. Our mindset should be: With God's help, I'm ready to make a change. Then as we do what He shows us to do (or what He shows us not to do), we'll be able to live in peace.

Pursue the peace Jesus is offering you today. It's not the kind the world gives the kind you have as long as your circumstances are the way you want them to be. The peace Jesus gives makes you calm and undisturbed on the inside, in your soul, no matter what's going on around you.

Study other scriptures about peace, like Philippians 4:6-7, Colossians 3:15, and 1 Peter 3:11. Put your trust in God completely and enjoy the life Jesus died to give you. Through Christ, you can learn how to manage the stress of this world, instead of letting stress manage you!

A little over ten years ago, North Carolina was in dire straits. We faced double-digit unemployment, out-of-control spending, and some of the highest tax rates in the Southeast under Democratic leadership in Raleigh. In 2011, Republicans assumed leadership of the General Assembly promising to balance the state budget, save and plan responsibly for the future, reduce the tax burden on North Carolinians, and strengthen our public schools. I am happy to report that ten years later we have kept those promises.

In fact, just this past year, in my role as Chairman of the Senate Appropriations/Base Budget Committee, Republicans were able to pass a balanced budget that grows the Rainy Day Fund to \$4.25 billion, sets aside \$6 billion in cash to fund infrastructure projects, and provides \$1 billion to expand broadband to some of our most rural areas. These investments are sound, basic strategic planning initiatives which will benefit our state far into the future.

On top of these strategic spending goals, our budget also updated our burdensome and outdated tax code. After the state of North Carolina collected a record amount of taxes during the pandemic, we aimed to lower the personal and corporate income tax rates, increase the standard deduction for individuals and families, broaden the sales tax base, and eliminate as many loopholes from our bloated tax code as possible. That is exactly what we accomplished in our budget. We cut the personal income tax rate from 5.25% to 3.99% by 2027, eliminated all state income tax on military pensions, phased out the corporate income tax starting with 2.25% in 2025 and dropping it to 0% by 2030, increased the zero-tax bracket to \$25,500, and increased the child tax deduction by \$500 per child. I truly believe these reforms will allow North Carolinians more flexibility to plan and save for their families while also making our state attractive to additional investment.

Lastly, our budget made significant investments in our public schools. My goal as Chairman of the Budget Committee was to ensure that our children and students had the resources available to succeed. We invested an additional \$1.5 billion in K-12 education, included a 5% pay raise for most state employees and an average 5% pay raise for teachers over the biennium, and increased the amount spent on school capital projects to \$2.6 billion over the next seven years. These are significant increases that will benefit children and teachers across the state. On top of this, we invested \$100 million in recurring funds for a new state-funded teacher salary supplement focused on low-wealth counties. Attracting well-qualified teachers is an obstacle many low-wealth counties face, and it is my hope this new fund will help them compete with many of the wealthier counties to attract well-qualified candidates to teach our children.

The Republican-led North Carolina legislature is often accused of underfunding public education, including teacher salaries. But, as former State Board of Education Chair, Phil Kirk, recently wrote in the Salisbury Post, the facts tell a different story. Kirk points out that the legislature has increased funding for public education every year since Republicans became the majority party in 2011. Indeed, the recently passed budget increases spending for K-12 public education by \$1.5 billion. The UNC system and our community college system each received more money than they originally requested.

Here are a few facts Kirk cites: When Republican Gov. McCrory took office in January of 2013, North Carolina teacher pay ranked 47th in the nation. Thereafter, Republican budgets saw that teacher pay rank rise to 29th in the country only to subsequently slip back to 33rd because of Governor Roy Cooper's budget veto. In the current budget, teacher salaries averaged increasing by 6.7%. On top of that increase, each teacher (except those already over \$70,000) received an additional \$2,800 bonus. On top of those increases, \$100 million was divided among 111 out of 115 state school districts for them to use to further increase teacher pay. Raises were also provided to support staff.

As Kirk notes, recognizing the importance of reading and the shortfall in many of our students' reading abilities, the legislature has appropriated millions of dollars for implementing the Science of Reading in every school. Record investments in science, technology, engineering, and math in K-12, community colleges, and the UNC system were approved. Funding for need-based scholarships increased, and more than \$2 billion was appropriated for capital needs across the UNC system. Although yearly tuition increases were the standard previously, for the last six years in a row UNC tuitions have been kept the same for each entering student for his or her four years of college.

As Mr. Kirk concludes, to say that the Republican legislature has not been robust in funding public education ignores reality. First of all, we are continuing to pray for the people of Ukraine. This is a critical time for people of faith to unite with one voice in asking the God we serve to lead and guide during these perilous times. The General Assembly recently wrapped up its long session for the 2021-22 biennium and will return to Raleigh in May for the 2022 short session. In between sessions, the General Assembly goes into "oversight" mode in which committees receive reports from agencies that give updates about how they are spending funds and carrying out the mandates of the people's representatives. Topics have included agriculture, education, Medicaid, healthcare, energy, and public safety. Oversight committees are important to ensure our state stays on its decade-long path of reducing the state debt, controlling spending, and ensuring strong fiscal health. State Treasurer Dale Folwell recently reported the state debt has been reduced by 73% over the last decade due to the prudent fiscal policies put in place over that same period by the Republican-controlled state legislature. 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Silent Witness

"He was oppressed and afflicted, yet he did not open his mouth; he was led like a lamb to the slaughter, and as a sheep before its shearers is silent, so he did not open his mouth." Isaiah 53:7 Scripture preserves carefully the sinlessness of Jesus himself. He was without sin, but He bore the sins of others. That is why He did it in silence. He had no interest in defending himself, so He never



spoke in His own defense. It is a striking thing that in the gospel accounts of the trials of Jesus he never spoke up on his own behalf or tried to escape the penalty. This amazed both Pilate and Caiaphas. When our Lord stood before the High Priest, He was silent until the High Priest put Him on oath to tell them who He was. When He stood before Pilate, He was silent until to remain silent was to deny His very Kingship. Then He spoke briefly, acknowledging who He was. When He was with the soldiers, they smote Him and spat on Him and put the crown of thorns on His head, yet He said not a word. Peter says, When they hurled insults at Him, He did not retaliate. (1 Peter 2:23). When he went before contemptuous, sneering Herod, He stood absolutely silent. He would not say one word to him. He was returned at last to Pilate because Herod could find nothing wrong with Him, It is very apparent to anyone reading the gospel accounts that the trials that Jesus went through were a farce. The Jewish trial before the High Priest was illegal. It was held at night, which was contrary to the law. Pilate several times admitted that he could find no wrong in him, and yet he pronounced upon him the sentence of death. How true are these words in v. 8, "by oppression and judgment he was taken away."

Remember that as the crowd was crying out, Crucify Him, crucify Him, they added these significant words, Let His blood be upon us and upon our children. Thereby they acknowledged who He was. But when at last the deed was done and He cried with a loud voice, "It is finished" (John 19:30), and His friends came to take Him down from the cross. No enemy hands touched His body after His death, only those who loved Him. As they removed His bloody body, the dear lips were silent, the wondrous voice was stilled, the light had gone from His eyes, and the great heartbeat was no more. But instead of throwing Him on a rubbish heap, as the authorities intended, they made His grave with the rich, just as Isaiah had predicted years before the event. Joseph of Arimathea, a rich man, offered to put the body of Jesus in his new tomb that had never been used. Someone has put that rather remarkably, He who came from a virgin womb must be laid in a virgin tomb. It is with awe and wonder, Lord, that I reflect upon all that you went through to secure the salvation of your people. Thank you, Lord. Jesus was silent before all His accusers since He had no sin to confess. He bore unimaginable punishment for our sin. How can we do less than confess our sins and worship the One who paid for our forgiveness?

The Dangers of Self-Sufficiency

Our culture in America is an extremely materialistic culture. We are constantly seeking out things that are new, better, and faster. The advancements of technology have undoubtedly improved efficiency, though I am admittedly not sure that we are better overall. The materialistic mindset of our culture has crept into our churches today, creating the mindset that God's blessing can be measured exclusively by material possessions.

The state of the s

This unbiblical concept of God's blessing fails to consider the immaterial blessings that far exceed the material and also creates an improper standard by which things are measured. To be clear, God also does bless in tangible ways, though not exclusively.

Shortly before Israel was to enter the Promised Land under the leadership of Joshua, Moses gave them his final words before dying. These words are recorded for us in Deuteronomy where Moses repeatedly urged them to obey God and keep Him first.

It is in Deuteronomy 6:10-16 (paralleled in 8:10-20) that we find a warning given to the children of Israel. Moses knew that the land God promised them was a land of abundance. Moses knew that God would grant them a victory, for He had promised to do so. This passage indicates that they would enter a land in which they could dwell immediately. Houses will have already been built, cities will have already been developed, and fields and vineyards will have already been planted. Entering such abundance, Moses cautioned them, "Then beware lest thou forget the LORD, which brought thee forth out of the land of Egypt, from the house of bondage" (Deuteronomy 6:12). Moses recognized a danger we all face with God's blessing: the danger of self-sufficiency.

Moses recognized that the abundance of God's blessing could actually produce a sense of self-sufficiency by causing them to no longer be conscious of God, His deliverance, or even His blessing. When we become self-sufficient, we are no longer God-conscious. Our focus shifts from rejoicing in the person and work of God to finding ourselves complacent and secure in the things He has given us. It takes a determined effort to remain conscious of God at all times.

Deuteronomy 8:17 adds another danger of self-sufficiency by stating, "And thou say in thine heart, My power and the might of mine hand hath gotten me this wealth." This is a natural result of not being God-conscious and fails to give God the praise for provision. Such a mindset regards provision as nothing short of hard work and saving; it tragically fails to consider God as the true source from whom all our blessings flow.

We are living in an extremely affluent culture, though times are indeed difficult. We must not allow our prosperity to cause us to become self-sufficient and thereby lose a mindset of God-consciousness. We dare not conclude that we are responsible for what we have, for God can take it away suddenly. Avoid the dangers of self-sufficiency.

In the spring of 2021 COVID vaccines had been available for several months, but their distribution was uneven. Pharmacies and providers didn't know who had which vaccine. Some had none while others had an abundant supply that they were willing to share. It was in this spirit of cooperation that the Bring Summer Back Committee was born, initially coordinated by Blue Ridge Regional Hospital. Healthcare providers in Mitchell and Yancev counties began meeting in

providers in Mitchell and Yancey counties began meeting in the early morning by Zoom in a kind of Swap Shop for vaccines. The hospital invited Mountain Community Health Partnership, the Mitchell and Yancey Health Departments, PATH, SEARCH, the YMCA, the two Boards of Education, and the Blue Ridge Partnership for Children to join them. Almost a year later the group has grown to over a dozen organizations. and is administered by SEARCH with the help of staff member Allison Edge, board member Ed Seel, and moderator Karin Rolett. And their range of activities has broadened well beyond supplying


At about the same time The N.C. Department of Health and Human Services came out with a well-stocked toolkit called "Bring Summer Back" (BSB) to inform and influence targeted ages. Our local group named itself after this tool kit, which included posters, flyers, and other printable messages along with boxes of free materials such as masks, Frisbees, sunglasses, and informational flyers to raise COVID awareness. These were distributed by community groups and schools throughout the two counties. Working with Mountain Community Health Partnership, SEARCH adapted a flyer with local images, had it printed in English and Spanish, and delivered it to middle and high school students who were newly eligible to be vaccinated.

The BSB Committee followed up by posting that flyer on their own websites and Facebook pages. SEARCH created a half-page newspaper ad that showed three generations of two Yancey County families all getting vaccinated, and MCHP put together a multi-generational billboard featuring four members of one Mitchell County family who had proudly been vaccinated. Their picture became the centerpiece of a tent card placed in local restaurants. Committee members contacted churches, schools, and sports camps to host vaccine clinics. Hispanic groups were quite responsive to having vaccine clinics, especially when Spanish-speaking staff members from the YMCA and Asheville groups were involved. When it became apparent that the public needed to be able to find testing and vaccine sites, SEARCH volunteered to maintain an updated list with this information and to get it to the BSB participants. The list was also printed for distribution at summer fairs and festivals like the Rotary Bar-B-Que and Bluegrass Festival in Spruce Pine and the Mt. Mitchell Crafts Fair in Burnsville.

Another way of educating the public about COVID has been through videos and on the radio. Ellie Hoover, MCHP's new public media editor, has been film-

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Since March of 2020 WKYK has generously provided air time and radio host Bruce Ikard to interview people about COVID-related topics on the program "M-Y Health Matters." In recent months these interviews have featured Dr.

Steve Kimmel talking about vaccines for children and Dr. Philip Mitchell updating the public on the latest CDC guidance. Doctors talking about the virus have aimed to be informative and not judgmental, recognizing that even though some people are hesitant about getting vaccinated, they can take precautions to prevent infection.

For those unfortunate people who did contract COVID, Blue Ridge Regional Hospital was able to offer an infusion of monoclonal antibodies when they became available. While not a cure, during the Delta spike and up until the Omicron variant emerged, for those who qualified it was a way to lessen the severity of the virus. BRRH was an early leader in Western North Carolina to offer this and patients traveled from a distance to get the infusion. More recently Chris Day, the head of the pharmacy at BRRH, has also kept BSB informed about where the Merck and Pfizer oral antiviral pills could be obtained when they were approved in early 2022 for use for people who had contracted COVID.

The advent of these pills was welcome news when the Omicron variant hit and caused a shortage of hospital beds throughout the state. In the face of patient resistance to being vaccinated there was at least something that doctors could prescribe to people who met the criteria for the medications.

Another helpful tool came from the federal government in early 2022 in the form of highly effective test kits, available to every household. The Mountain Community Health Partnership ordered the maximum amount allocated to them (a truckload) and made them widely available, through the schools, churches, nonprofits, and the Mitchell and Yancey Health Departments, along with generous supplies of high-quality masks.

Members of the Bring Summer Back group recently asked themselves what they've accomplished to date and their answers suggest why people are willing to start their day with an 8:00 a.m. Zoom meeting every other week. They say that the information provided to the different health care agencies has helped counter vaccine disinformation. The meetings have been an effective way to coordinate the sharing of scarce resources and redirect them where they could do the most good. And on a personal level, participants say the meetings make them feel like they're "not in this fight by ourselves."

They also noted that Bring Summer Back was very successful in improving collaboration among all healthcare entities, including several non-profits that served children and families. And though the actions of the Bring Summer Back group may not have changed many people's minds about getting the COVID vaccine, the group agreed that if they were able to save one life, then they were successful. Our local Bring Summer Back group will continue to follow the evolution of the virus and how it impacts our local communities, hoping to build on what has been learned to help our communities to find ways to deal with such matters as the need for rehab services for people with Long Haul COVID and the effects of the pandemic on young people.

Thaddeus Kosciuszko

This is an American history educational moment of those who made a difference during the Revolutionary War era and how they served our Country.

On February 4, 1746, Thaddeus Kosciuszko was born in eastern Poland. He studied in a Warsaw academy, then was a civil

and military engineering student in Paris. When Thaddeus learned that the American Revolution needed engineers, he crossed the Atlantic, surviving a life-threatening voy-

Shortly after arriving, Thaddeus read the Declaration of Independence and was overcome by patriotic emotions. Discovering that Jefferson was its leading author, he made a point of meeting him. This introduction began their lifelong friendship. In addition, Jefferson oversaw Kosciuszko's appointment as a colonial engineer to protect forts and

Kosciuszko built and improved defenses. His designs stopped Burgoyne and his troops at the Battle of Saratoga, leading to a turning point in the Revolution. He was also responsible for developing and defending forts and using cheveaux de frises (protruding spiked logs), to protect important sites and locations such as Philadelphia and West Point.

He also designed flat bottom boats for Nathaniel Greene and could carry them overland. Thad's boats and scouting maneuvers led to surmounting Cornwallis in the famous Race to the Dan River. Kosciuszko chose the Guilford, North Carolina, battleground to array defenses. Though Cornwallis technically defeated Greene there, Thad's strategies all but shattered Cornwallis' army, contributing to Cornwallis' surrender at Yorktown.

Returning to Europe, Kosciuszko led troops against Russia and Prussia. As the Polish commander-in-chief, Thaddeus offered perks to encourage citizens to join the military. The incentives angered the nobility, but Kosciuszko continued. As a result, he was wounded and became a prisoner of war. Eventually freed, Thad reunited with Jefferson and Washington.

Thad again returned to Europe to fight with Napoleon's army but soon realized that Napoleon was insincere. Returning to America, Kosciuszko received his military back pay and was given acreage in Columbus, Ohio.

Brigadier General Thaddeus Kosciuszko died in 1817 in Switzerland. Towns, streets, and buildings in America are named for him. Thad willed his military accountments to Jefferson. Perplexed by slavery in America, Thaddeus left instructions for his assets to pay for the freedom and education of the enslaved.

Washington revealed that Kosciuszko was a true patriot and involved in creating liberty. Jefferson described him as supporting freedom for all.

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

Wanting an Exit

"Seek the Lord while he may be found, call upon him while he is near; let the wicked forsake their way, and the unrighteous their thoughts; let them return to the Lord, that he may have mercy on them, and to our God, for he will abundantly pardon." (Isaiah 55:6-7)

In his book The Examined Life: How We Lose and Find Ourselves, psychoanalyst Stephen Grosz shares the story

of how Marissa Panigrosso survived the 9/11 attacks on the World Trade Center. When the plane first hit the north tower, she was on the ninety-eighth floor of the south tower, talking to two of her co-workers. "She felt the explosion as much as she heard it. A blast of hot air hit her face as if an oven door had just been opened. A wave of anxiety swept through the office. Marissa Panigrosso didn't pause to turn off her computer, or even to pick up her purse. She walked to the nearest emergency exit and left the building.

The two women she was talking to...did not leave...In fact, many people in Marissa Panigrosso's office ignored the fire alarm, and also what they saw happening 131 feet away in the north tower. Some of them went into a meeting... In Marissa Panigrosso's office, as in many of the other offices in the World Trade Center, people did not panic or rush to leave. 'That struck me as very odd,' Marissa said."

Grosz continues, "What struck Marissa Panigrosso as odd is, in fact, the rule. Research has shown that when a fire alarm rings, people do not act immediately. They talk to each other, and they try to work out what is going on. They stand around. This should be obvious to anyone who has ever taken part in a fire drill. Instead of leaving the building, we wait. We wait for more clues – the smell of smoke, or advice from someone we trust. But there is also evidence that, even with more information, many of us still won't make a move" (pp. 121-22).

Today's passage issues a call for repentance and emphasizes the choices we face in the course of our lives. God issues an open invitation to be part of his redemptive purpose. This invitation – this hope – is extended even to the wicked and unrighteous. If we call upon the name of the Lord in repentance and return to God, God will freely forgive us and include us in the plans he has purposed all along. The question is this: Do we want an exit from every weight that slows us down and the sin that so easily trips us up (cf. Hebrews 12:1)?

Grosz states that he is not surprised at people standing around, unwilling to make a move. "We resist change. Committing ourselves to a small change, even one that is unmistakably in our best interest, is often more frightening than ignoring a dangerous situation...We want to know what new story we're stepping into before we exit the old one. We don't want an exit if we don't know exactly where it is going to take us" (p. 123).

The season of Lent has a way of reminding us of aspects of our lives in which we need an exit. Rather than continuing to be stuck in our fears and complacency, we need to "seek the Lord" and "call on him," taking the steps of repentance that lead to the exit, restoration, and renewal God offers to each of us.

Prayer: Lord, we seek you, cry out to you, and forsake our wicked ways. Thank you for being the exit from our sin, guilt, and shame.

The steps of a good man are ordered by the Lord (Psalm 37:23-24) We plan our days but determine what will happen (Proverbs 16:9; 19:21). We pridefully assume we can control our time and often say to someone we will do such and such tomorrow or the next day as if we controlled our future (Proverbs

11:2). God says He is in control and we should not pridefully presume what we will do tomorrow (James 4:13-14).

So when we make commitments we should humbly qualify them by adding the qualification "if the Lord wills" we will do such and such (James 4:6,15). This is so because God's plan for our lives (Rom. 8:28; Eph. 1:11) often includes such unanticipated things as:

- --delays caused by such things as sudden health issues and the hindrances of sinful people (Genesis 50:20; Psalm 22:8; Prov. 21:1),
- --disasters, accidents, slowdowns, and break downs (Isaiah 45:7),
- --interference by Satan that God allows and uses to further His own plan (Job 1:1-2:7; 42:1-17; Psalm 115:3; Proverbs 16;4; Luke 10:17-20; John 13:2,27; I Thess. 2:18).

So let us pray over our ideas and plans and humbly look to God to allow them to be fulfilled (Psalm 37:5). Let us qualify our plans for tomorrow to be qualified with the caution "Lord willing I will do such and such" (James 4:15). We have no guarantees for our future except for God's promises in His timing (II Cor. 1:20; II Peter 3:9;). That is why going into debt for depreciating items is very risky because we have no guarantee that our income will continue at present levels (Proverbs 22:7; Romans 13:8).
