Through the years, music and singing together have been an enormous blessing. But I also have learned that it is important to hear the music in another person's soul.


That's not always easy to discern even in close relationships. And that is where listening, quieting your own soul, and not looking only at your own interests come in.



Salvation is God's gift of redemption and reconciliation to Himself and is offered freely to all who accept, by faith alone, Jesus Christ as God's only son and receive Him as Lord and Savior. 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The Inspiring Word

Moving forward through Romans, we leave the Bible's doctrine of Justification and move to God's wrath. A considerable leap indeed. Paul challenges the Church to not only understand God's wrath but to use it as encouragement in their walk with God and sharing the gospel with the unsaved. Let's look at our scripture this month, from the book of Romans chapter one, verses eighteen through twenty-five



18 "For the wrath of God is revealed from heaven against all ungodliness and unrighteousness of men, who hold the truth in unrighteousness; 19 Because that which may be known of God is manifest in them; for God hath shewed [it] unto them. 20 For the invisible things of him from the creation of the world are clearly seen, being understood by the things that are made, [even] his eternal power and Godhead; so that they are without excuse: 21 Because that, when they knew God, they glorified [him] not as God, neither were thankful; but became vain in their imaginations, and their foolish heart was darkened. 22 Professing themselves to be wise, they became fools, 23 And changed the glory of the uncorruptible God into an image made like to corruptible man, and to birds, and fourfooted beasts, and creeping things. 24 Wherefore God also gave them up to uncleanness through the lusts of their own hearts, to dishonour their own bodies between themselves: 25 Who changed the truth of God into a lie, and worshipped and served the creature more than the Creator, who is blessed for ever. Amen." [Rom 1:18-25 KJV]

God doesn't hide the fact of his wrath. After studying the doctrine of God's righteousness, we find ourselves face-to-face with the study of unrighteousness. Think of this. No one can fully appreciate the righteousness of God until we realize and understand our unrighteousness before him. The gospel is an announcement to all people as universally under the indictment of God and exposed to His wrath. Sadly, people today are not concerned about the gospel. I believe that is because we do not understand the law of God. R.C. Sproul has this to say.

If people were sensitive to the manifestation of God's anger toward them, they would be so moved by enlightened self-interest that they would flee as fast as they could to hear the gospel, but their necks have become so hardened, their hearts so calcified, that they have no fear of God.

Many preachers and teachers today tell people that God loves them unconditionally, leading people to falsely believe that God has no wrath against sin and the unrepentant sinner. On the contrary, our scripture tells us that the wrath of God is revealed from heaven. If God wrote this through Paul and gave it to us through His word, why would we feel it didn't apply today?

The Greek word Paul uses for "wrath" is orgai. The English word that derives from orgai is an orgy. When we think of an orgy, we think of participation in unbridled sexual behavior and eroticism with reckless abandon. Our scripture is not exclusively talking about sexual sin. It vividly describes unrighteousness and what it does when left in an unrepentant condition. Too often, this scripture is used to pick apart sins, and I am sure there is a time and place for that.

The context of the passage is the condition of the soul. Understanding the wrath of God is a shock and awe to the soul, a wake-up call if nothing else. Has the gospel been planted in your heart? Is the Holy Spirit moving gracefully in your heart? Examine yourself under the word of God and accept his grace today. Accept the gospel. Accept Christ as your LORD and savior. Christian, and I am speaking to the truly repentant born-again Christians. We too must examine ourselves daily to avoid unrighteousness in our lives. We are saved sinners, nothing more. Let's not allow unrighteousness to slip into our lives and stain the testimony of Christ's gospel. We, too, must understand how the wrath of God applies to us. My time has come and gone. Until we meet again, in print or person, may God bless you is my prayer.

These days, since the powers that be have extended the NFL regular season, the most-watched event of the year falls in the month of February. February 12th to be exact. We know it as the Super Bowl. And attached to each year's Super Bowl is the roman numeral that we use to count them. This year it is Super Bowl LVII. If you want to go in person



to the Super Bowl this year, which is being played in Glendale, Arizona, you will need to shell out close to \$5000.00 a seat. A VIP seat would cost you close to \$80,000.00.

Of course, most of us stay home or gather with friends and have a Super Bowl party to watch it on our big-screen televisions.

I suppose the majority watch the Super Bowl for the game itself. Many watch the Super Bowl to see the Halftime Show. I'm told the Halftime Show performer is Rihanna this year. In the Bible, Jesus shares an illustration about watchfulness. "It is like a man going to a far country, who left his house and gave authority to his servants, and to each his work, and commanded the doorkeeper to watch. Watch therefore, for you do not know when the master of the house is coming--in the evening, at midnight, at the crowing of the rooster, or in the morning--lest, coming suddenly, he finds you sleeping. And what I say to you, I say to all: Watch!" Mark 13: 34-37 Watchfulness is a constant admonition of scripture. Evidently, we are pretty good at watching Super Bowls but not so good at watching ourselves. The job to conquer self and constantly cooperate with the Holy Spirit is a 24/7 vigil. To watch our steps, our mouths, our eyes, and our thoughts, that we may be winning the struggle and allowing God to work in us His purpose, should be our desire. The religion of Christ transforms the heart. It makes the worldly-minded man and woman, heavenly-minded. Jesus reminds us that we are to be branches of the Living Vine, but that it will require our watchfulness in our battle with ourselves. I hear that three-part call: Watch, Pray, and Work. These three words remind me of a hymn and its first verse: "Watch ye saints, with eyelids waking; Lo! the powers of earth are shaking; Keep your lamps all trimmed and burning, Ready for your Lord's returning."

I suppose what makes it challenging to watch ourselves is that it is just so daily. May you and I keep a watchful eye on our own hearts as we live for Christ and as He prepares us to be ready for when He returns.

The current advertising campaign for the healthcare system features the tagline, "Love to the Rescue." Give and you will receive a free "Love to the Rescue" blanket.

One very heart-touching commercial asked a very specific question to young children with various health-related conditions. That question is, "What is Love?" These children reply with numerous answers which go as follows.


- Love is calling the Love Doctor.

- Love is when you make people laugh.
- Love is being able to stand.
- Love is dancing.
- Love is being independent.
- Love is a new smile.
- Love is a new prosthetic leg.
- Love is jumping up.
- Love is candy.
- Love is puppies.
- Love is playing checkers with my mom.

Then the commercial concludes by saying you can call or go online to send your love to the rescue. It's a heart-moving commercial but it really doesn't answer the question, "What is Love?" The answer to this question is found in John 3:16. "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believes in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life." We use the word love in so many ways today. "I love my wife." "I love my family." "I love peanut butter and jelly sandwiches." "I love to hunt." "I love football." However, the word "Loved" used here indicates love to the highest degree. It's a love that never ceases. What God says in Jeremiah 31:3 helps us get a glimpse into this love. 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

Imperfect People Following A Perfect God

Life is messy. And as believers, it's a relief to say those words, and admit that is how the world is. (As a pastor I can admit that church work is messy too!)

More people would visit our church services on Sundays or try out our Bible studies during the week if we admitted that life is messy. If they knew that they could

come as they are and not have to be perfect, they would more likely visit us. If they knew they didn't have to present the perfect image or let everyone know they have it all together, then they would be more likely to become part of our faith communities.

The apostle Paul had arrived in the city of Corinth after a discouraging experience in Athens (Acts 17:15-33). He was also probably anxious about the believers he had just left in the city of Thessalonica (Acts 17:1-14). When he arrived in the city of Corinth he saw sin, wickedness, prostitution, and drunkenness. Paul's arrival in Corinth only added to his anxiety that started in Athens and Thessalonica.

Paul wrote about this messy life to the believers in Corinth, "And when I came to you, brethren, I did not come with superiority of speech or of wisdom, proclaiming to you the testimony of God. For I determined to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ, and Him crucified. I was with you in weakness and in fear and in much trembling, and my message and my preaching were not in persuasive words of wisdom, but in demonstration of the Spirit and of power, so that your faith would not rest on the wisdom of men, but on the power of God." 1 Corinthians 2:1-5 (NASB)

In these five verses I believe Paul gives us three principles we can follow that will help people (both inside and outside the church) understand that we don't have everything figured out.

First, share our story. Tell others about what we've been through; about the good and bad decisions we've made, as well as what we have learned through the process.

Second, know Scripture. Through our story, we see how God has worked in our lives and provided for us. Including Scripture shows others how God was working through us and our circumstances.

Third, let God do His work. There is only so much that we can do and control in our lives. At some point can release control of our circumstances and our desired outcomes. Instead of trying to create what we want, we can let God work in our lives.

For us to minister to others we don't need to brag about "how clean our lives have become because of Christ." We can instead show others how "God still accepts us when we are messed up" because life is messy.

Onesimus

This is an American history educational moment of those who made a difference during the Revolutionary War era and how they served our Country.

During the American Revolutionary War, George Washington fought two enemies: The British and smallpox. British troops were reasonably healthy due to herd immunity and

voluntary inoculation. Herd immunity included the Redcoats sailing in close quarters from Europe. Nonetheless, when the British resigned from Boston in 1776, it was partially due to the smallpox epidemic.

America was suffering from smallpox, a gruesome and life-threatening contiguous disease. It caused excruciating misery manifesting as bumps, crusty blisters, high temperature, blindness, and likely death.

The dawn of relief came from Onesimus, an enslaved African, and Reverend Cotton Mather, a Puritan minister. Onesimus explained to Rev. Mather that while still in Africa, he underwent variolation. Variolation is a simple procedure of transferring diseased matter, via a thread, from a smallpox-infected individual to a small incision on a healthy person's body.

Rev. Mather asked questions about variolation and learned it was also practiced in Turkey, China, and elsewhere. A physician, Zabdiel Boylston, was intrigued with Onesimus' and Mather's information and conducted his own medical treatment inquiry. Dr. Boylston learned that people who were not variolated were almost six times more likely to die from smallpox. Thus, Dr. Boylston inoculated two servants and his six-year-old son, which produced positive results. During the following year, Dr. Boylston inoculated 242 people, and only six died from smallpox.

These results led George Washington to order all recruits to be inoculated immediately upon enlisting into the Continental Army, along with being issued their uniforms and equipment. This mandatory procedure continues in the military and elsewhere.

Undoubtedly, the prosocial and pioneering actions of Mathers, Washington, and mainly Onesimus, helped save a generation and beyond, eventually eradicating smallpox. Onesimus' achievement was historically ignored for decades. Yet, in 2016, he was celebrated as one of the most outstanding 'Bostonians of All Time' by Boston Magazine.

The Impact Of God's Love
Jesus Modeled Perfect Love On The Cross

No other can match the supremacy of Christ's holiness. Jesus is uniquely distinct from all creation. He is set apart! He is not one of us. Our world today has a lot to say about love. It is preached to us to love more. But let me interject here;



heaven forbid we are not to love in the wrong aspects of LOVE! Since Adam and Eve ate from the forbidden tree, we were all born separated from God our Creator because of sin. But God didn't abandon us. Look at John 3:16, "For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that who so ever believed on Him shall not perish but have everlasting life." Jesus modeled for us what real love is. He is the only One who has ever perfectly displayed what real love looks like. To understand the LOVE of God and who we are – compared to Him; Reference Romans 3:23-26. We are justified freely. Declared not guilty. When God forgives our sins, all charges are removed from His record. Our record is wiped clean as though our sins never happened. Christ is our sacrifice of atonement. God declares Christ's death as an appropriate, designated sacrifice for our sins. He stands in our place, paid the penalty of death, and completely satisfies God's demands for forgiving our sins. His sacrifice on the cross brings to those who accept Him; pardon, deliverance and freedom. Paul shows that God forgave all human sin at the cross of Jesus.

God didn't abandon the world by turning away from our perfectly made creation. God loved the world in this way: He gave His only Son so that everyone who believes in Him and follows His teachings will not perish but have eternal life. God loved us so much that He made a way for us to be with Him in His eternal glory. This is done through the death of His own Son on the cross. To fully understand the impact of God's love and what Jesus Christ did for us on the cross let's look at Isaiah chapter six verse one where we see a glimpse of God's absolute holiness. Isaiah's lofty view of our Lord gives us a sense of God's greatness, mystery, and power. Isaiah sees our Lord sitting upon a throne and the whole earth is filled with God's glory.

Scripture in the Bible specifically records Isaiah's calling. People in that day and time needed hope, they needed assurance that God was with them and had not abandoned them. It is during this time of national insecurity that the Lord asks, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us" and Isaiah responds, "Here am I, send me" (Isaiah 6:8).

In contrast, to king Uzziah's pride in the presence of God almighty, Isaiah humbles himself before the throne, and the seraphim (angels) attend in repentance and acknowledge his sinfulness. Isaiah's sins are then purged taking away his iniquity. (Read this full account in Isaiah 6:1-11). This is a clear picture of the atoning sacrifice of our Savior Jesus Christ. We are purged and made clean with the precious blood of Jesus Christ shed on the cross at Calvary.

The throne and the One seated upon it were magnificent and the robe He wore was special because of its train. Kings wore scarlet robes with a train attached because it symbolized strength and security. When the king of one country conquered the king of another country, the conquering king would have some part of that king's robe sewn onto his own robe. Picture Isaiah's vision of our Lord's massive train in Isaiah 1:1.

At a time when believers had given up on God, God makes a promise that His Son is coming to earth in the flesh – Jesus Christ. What Isaiah anticipated to come in God's timing: we look back on – the Birth of Jesus Christ the Baby in the manger. Isaiah prophesied the Messiah would provide a way to have our sins forgiven and that has now been fulfilled. Reference Isaiah chapter 9.

Does God ask who will go for me and make a way for sinful men to be saved? And Jesus the Son of God says, I will go send me. The Father continues: Son you will have to take on human flesh and die a sacrificial death; you will experience pain and suffering of the flesh in agonizing torment, and I will forsake you in your darkest hour. You will pay a sin debt and satisfy my wrath against all sin. Jesus removes His royal robe in exchange for grave clothes. God spoke His Word and sent Jesus into the world. God's Word always brings about life; just as in Genesis chapter 1.

Jesus modeled perfect love when He went to the cross for us. We can get the work of Christ applied to our own lives. We are saved by grace through faith, not from our works. It is God's gift. We are saved through faith in Christ Jesus alone. We need only to ask His forgiveness. As we move into the New Year, we can feel secure even though our world appears in turmoil. We must focus on the fact that our powerful God is in control of all. Jesus our Savior is the One True King who can free us from our sins. When we commit our lives to Christ Jesus, we can experience His forgiveness and have security that even if our circumstances don't turn out the way WE want them, they will turn out the way God has planned for our good and His glory!

Old Man or Peculiar Person?

How marvelous and merciful is our LORD that turns the Old Man into a Peculiar Person. The symbolic state of being an "Old Man" can be a reference to young men and women too, who can spiritually be an "Old Man". Many Christians regret not putting on the "new man" at a younger age. (KJV) Ephesians 4:22-24, "That ye put off concerning the former conversation the old man, which



is corrupt to the deceitful lusts; And be renewed in the spirit of your mind; And that ye put on the new man, which after God is created in righteousness and true holiness".

In private conversations with trusted Christian brothers and sisters, numerous Christians will confess at one time in their lives, they were a slave to sin. The agreement comes forth by all that being a slave to sin, best defines the nature of the old man. See BRCN "The Pit".

In many countries, the elderly are highly respected individuals within the community. Elders are sought out for their years of experience in various subjects. Unfortunately, however, as we age it can become more difficult to make necessary corrections; "bad habits die hard". Proverbs 19:20, "Hear counsel, and receive instruction, that thou mayest be wise in thy latter end". Job 32:9, "Great men are not always wise: neither do the aged understand judgment". Proverbs 15:10, "Correction is grievous unto him that forsaketh the way: he that hateth reproof shall die".

God Almighty takes over with His conversion of the Old Man which requires instruction for all of us who were once old men. God proclaims, Titus 2:2-7, "aged men be sober, grave, temperate, sound in faith, in charity, in patience. In all things shewing thyself a pattern of good works: in doctrine shewing uncorruptness, [honor purity] gravity, sincerity."

Romans 6:6, "Knowing this, that our old man is crucified with him, that the body of sin might be destroyed, that henceforth we should not serve sin".

A very interesting mystery can take place in our former old man disorder. Things that can be known of God are written on the heart of every old man.

A friend of mine is a major university professor of mathematics. His god is the science of numbers, enough said! He hikes the high peaks of the Rocky Mountains. With a beautiful blue-sky horizon, a windless and cloudless day on one summer's climb, he reached the summit of a 7000-footer. Pondering his success of the ascent on top of the mountain, within minutes he broke down and cried like a baby; to this day he can't explain the reason he wept so freely.

Romans 1:20, "For the invisible things of him from the creation of the world are clearly seen, being understood by the things that are made, even his eternal power and Godhead; so that they are without excuse".

What's this "Peculiar Person" all about after God removes our old man? Sounds like some strange odd kind of change. Well, if you're a peculiar person, "then you shall be a (possession-property), a peculiar treasure" to the LORD, above all other people and nations on earth; chosen by the LORD as sinners that shall be (converted, turned back) to Him, see Psa. 51:13.

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

Law Keepers or ...?

Is God's Law an impossible burden? Is it too difficult to follow? The Church has taught this idea for so long that no one recalls a counter perspective. The "impossible law doctrine" is based on popular misinterpretations of some of



Paul's teachings and a few passages in Acts. One supposed proof text is Peter's comments to the Jerusalem Council in Acts 15:10: "Why are you putting God to the test by placing a yoke on the neck of the disciples that neither our fathers nor we have been able to bear?"

The group whose demands provoked this Council insisted that keeping the law is necessary for salvation. The leaders of the Mother Church in Jerusalem affirmed that salvation is a gift of God by grace through faith. Speaking on behalf of the Council, Peter makes it clear that keeping the law is not required for salvation. It is absurd, however, to conclude that Peter refers to Torah as an impossible burden.

To do so would be to claim that God delivered His Chosen People from slavery in Egypt and immediately placed them under a different sort of bondage. Psalm 19:7 says that Torah is perfect and restorative. The same chapter also describes Torah as: sure, right, pure, and clean. Romans 7:12 says, "The law (Torah) is holy, and the commandment is holy and righteous and good." The longest chapter in the Bible, Psalm 119, is an extended hymn of praise for the benefits of the Torah. Nowhere does the Bible claim that Torah is a burden. The Church takes the position that Jesus died so that believers could be "delivered" from what they view as an insurmountable barrier between God and man.

What Peter condemned before the Jerusalem Council was the man-made regulations Jewish leaders had long imposed on people wanting to lead Godly lives. Jesus addressed these made-up rules in Mark 7:8, "You leave the commandment of God and hold to the tradition of men." The Judaizers of Acts 15 wanted more than for followers of Jesus to be law keepers. They also wanted believers to comply with the vast body of Jewish tradition contained in the Mishnah and the Talmud. Peter and the other leaders of the Jerusalem Church opposed this foolishness.

The rest of the findings of the Jerusalem Council were articulated by James the brother of Jesus. He gives the famous four requirements in Acts 15:20. New Believers should abstain from all forms of idol worship. They should avoid sexual immorality. They should not consume meat from any animal that had been strangled. They should not consume blood.

Christians are taught that these are the only aspects of the law that God expects His followers to keep. If that is the case, then murder, slander, bribery, human trafficking, theft, and a host of other actions that the Bible defines as "sin" are acceptable. This is ridiculous. In a culture steeped in pagan worship—which included ritual sacrifice and temple prostitution—these four items were a starting point for new believers. All four requirements are from The Law.

v The only way to conclude that Acts 15 is a rejection of The Law is to stop reading at verse 20. Verse 21 says, "For from ancient generations Moses has had in every city those who proclaim him, for he is read every Sabbath in the synagogues." After giving new converts the starting point for their conversion from paganism to following God, James tells those new believers that they need to be in Synagogue every Sabbath so they can learn the rest of the Law of Moses. That is the way to lead lives that please God. Both Peter and James teach in their Epistles that followers of Jesus should be law keepers.

So does Paul. Everyone who teaches that Christians are exempt from keeping God's Law loves to quote the Book of Galatians. The problem is that they cite only parts of the book. In Galatians 5:19-21, Paul presents a list of actions that he calls "works of the flesh." Each of these behaviors is a violation of the Torah. Paul states that people who do these things, "will not inherit the kingdom of God." Paul can't abolish The Law early in Galatians and insist later that violations of The Law will keep believers out of the Kingdom. Paul taught believers to be law keepers. Acts 21:24, Acts 25:8, and Acts 28:17 all insist that Paul was a law keeper all of his life.

b bb The most significant encouragement for keeping God's Law is the teaching and example of Jesus. He calls us from sin to righteousness. 1 John 3:4 says that sin is breaking the law. Righteousness is presented in Scripture as a core attribute of the Holy God. He can do no wrong. He gave us His Law to show us how we can reflect His life. Deuteronomy 6:25 presents this summary, "And it will be righteousness for us, if we are careful to do all this commandment before the LORD our God, as he has commanded us." Jesus said that blessings accrue to those who "hunger and thirst after righteousness."

b b Every believer is convinced that Jesus is not talking about them in Matthew 7:21-23. He prophesies that many will approach Him on Judgment Day insisting that they are due eternal life because they lived "religious lives." They prophesied and cast out demons and did mighty works in His name. He responds that they should instead have done the will of His Father. That will is that we live according to God's instructions—The Law. His final word is, "Depart from me you law breakers."

The choice is ours. Salvation is by grace through faith. Living for Christ, however, comes with responsibility. We either cultivate a hunger and thirst for righteousness, or we willfully violate God's Law. All of us are either law keepers, or we are lawbreakers.

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
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

In addition, the ministry will have carbon-monoxide alarms to provide in homes with appliances that burn fossil fuels as well as a limited number of Lifetone alarms for deaf/hard-of-hearing individuals.

I believe Solomon in the Old Testament had it right when he said, "Children's children are the crown of old men, and the glory of children are their fathers." (Proverbs 17:6).



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

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
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Tim's Treasures

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

Those words sent the father into enough panic to call the pastor. The pastor immediately went out to the home and was informed of the desperate situation. The father said, "Please, pastor, we need you to pray." The pastor said, "Very well" and then started his prayer.

He prayed, "Oh wise and all-knowing Father, we thank Thee for Thou hast sent this rattlesnake to bite this young man to bring him to his senses. He has not been inside the church house for a long time now, and it is doubtful that he has in all that time felt the need for prayer. Now we trust that this will prove a valuable lesson to him and that it will lead to genuine repentance."

As the father and the other two sons listened to the pastor's prayer, they were surprised by the bluntness of it. What they didn't know was that the pastor was about to get even blunter. No loving, right-thinking parent enjoys disciplining a child. We'd much rather see our kids display obedience. God understands this better than we do, and that's why He is in the business of disciplining His children.

Tell me, are you at a loss as to how to pray for a wayward Christian? Is there someone close to you who is legitimately saved but just as legitimately backslidden? If you have such a person in your life, do you love them enough to pray for God to send some "rattlesnake" to afflict them? We're talking about the final card in the deck here, a "last straw" request, tough love administered to a sizable degree. Nevertheless, such chastisement is necessary in extreme cases. You see, as unsettling as it is for us to contemplate, sometimes it takes a "rattlesnake" to get a person's attention and bring them back to God.

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

Many of us have been captivated and moved to tears throughout each episode of the life of Christ movie series entitled, The Chosen. Each episode has given us an intimate look at Jesus as He calls together a band of disciples



who will be the foundation for both the beginning of the church and the spread of the gospel. The third season has just begun and the first episode begins with the "Sermon on the mount." Jesus' amazing sermon began with what we have come to call "The Beatitudes." I have already shared several articles following the "blessed are" declarations that Jesus made that day to a huge crowd that had gathered on a little hillside up from the Sea of Galilee. Jesus, speaking of the Kingdom of God, declared that blessed are those who: are poor in spirit; mourn, are gentle, and hunger and thirst after righteousness. The fifth "blessed" statement that He made was, "Blessed are the merciful, for they shall receive mercy" (Matthew 5:7)

When Jesus spoke these words to the multitude, there was no doubt that He could see in His heart and mind's-eye that moment in the not-so-distant future when His final act of mercy would allow God's redemption to take place. Christ's willing sacrifice on Calvary's cross was a supreme act of mercy!

I invite you to see mercy through the image of the Son of God, who came to offer broken, sinful, and separated mankind God's supreme gift of mercy. He came to suffer and die! He took upon Himself all of the sins of humanity and became the suffering servant of whom Isaiah prophesied in Isaiah 53:3-7, "He was despised and abandoned by men, A man of great pain and familiar with sickness; And like one from whom people hide their faces, He was despised, and we had no regard for Him. However, it was our sicknesses that He Himself bore, And our pains that He carried; Yet we ourselves assumed that He had been afflicted, Struck down by God, and humiliated. But He was pierced for our offenses, He was crushed for our wrongdoings [inequities]; The punishment for our well-being was laid upon Him, And by His wounds we are healed. All of us, like sheep, have gone astray, Each of us has turned to his own way; But the Lord has caused the wrongdoing of us all To fall on Him. He was oppressed and afflicted, Yet He did not open His mouth; Like a lamb that is led to slaughter, And like a sheep that is silent before its shearers, So He did not open His mouth."

In dying as the suffering servant, Jesus' sacrificial death appeased Holy God's demand for righteousness and set you and me free from the penalty of sin. That's called mercy! In other words, God didn't give us what we truly deserved! He accepted Jesus' sacrificial death as our propitiation or replacement for the guilt of our sins.

I am quite certain that when Jesus opened His mouth and declared, "Blessed are the merciful, for they shall receive mercy," He had the agony of the cross on His mind. For it was the mercy of the Lord which drove Jesus to offer Himself for your sins and mine! It was God's great grace driven by love that moved Him to offer His life a ransom for yours!

Again, mercy is when God doesn't give us what we do deserve! We do deserve death—for every one of us has sinned and turned away from God. We deserve eternal punishment because our sins have separated us from our loving Creator. We deserve nothing! God's mercy, however, gives us everything! May His grace and mercy be poured out upon you today!

The Folly of Fickle Feelings

Some people in this world are extremely reliable. You can count on them for just about anything and somehow, they'll always come through. However, I've found that many people are not very reliable.

Maybe you know someone who is a nice person, but if you ask them to do something, you're just not sure if they're going to follow through. In other words, they're unreliable.

I've discovered that feelings are a lot like unreliable people—we can't depend on them to be what we want or need them to be all the time. Not only that, they aren't necessarily interested in what's best for us. And they always want to have their way.

Feelings get us excited about going shopping when we really don't have any money to spend. They entice us to eat cheesecake when we're trying to avoid extra calories and lead us to stay up late working or watching TV when we need to get up early the next day. Then after the damage is done, we have to deal with the consequences.

Our feelings are fickle—they change like the wind. Yet it's amazing how much we let them have their way in our lives. But as believers in Christ, we have something much better and more dependable to follow than our feelings—and that's the Word of God.

Conquering Confusion with the Truth

When we feel strongly about something in our hearts, it's not always easy for us to determine whether or not we're really in agreement with God (see Jeremiah 17:9). Thankfully, God's Word doesn't leave us lost in confusion.

Hebrews 4:12 says that the Word of God is "sharper than any two-edged sword…exposing and judging the very thoughts and intentions of the heart" (AMP).

So, if we really want to rise above our feelings, we must let the Word of God be the final deciding factor in our decisions. There will be times when we can't find a verse for the specific issue we're dealing with. But we can always pray and ask God for wisdom (see James 1:5).

In the meantime, we need to trust Him, be patient, and keep on praying. Remember that God is always available to help us live beyond our feelings and do what pleases Him.

Set Your Mind to Do What's Right

The first step toward managing our emotions is found in Colossians 3:2. It says, "Set your mind and keep focused habitually on the things above...not on things that are on the earth..."

There are many things in this world that could easily affect our minds and emotions—and we need to learn how to rise above them all. When negative thoughts are building up and trying to take control of your emotions, take a few minutes to set your mind on God and His Word.

It also helps to speak positively about whatever is bothering you. Here are a few examples to give you an idea of what I'm talking about: "My family may not be everything I'd like them to be, but I am thankful I have a family. My house is not as nice as I would like it to be, but it's still a nice place to live. I don't see how I'm going to get through this painful situation, but Jesus is with me and He will help me overcome it!"


How to Win a Spiritual Tug-of-War

Temple Maintenance

The CDC is distributing 3.2 BILLION dollars to state and local health departments with the goal of "strengthening public health initiatives". Apparently, the public has been disappointed with how the whole pandemic issue has been handled and according to a Pew Research Survey



in 2020, only 52% of Americans felt that health officials were doing an adequate job. Dr. Walensky of the CDC said that an overhaul of the CDC was needed to modernize the agency and rehabilitate its reputation.

It seems the majority of that money will be going to just that. Not a single mention was made of funding efforts to educate the American public about good nutrition and healthy lifestyles or other risk factors for preventing serious health issues. There are no plans for promoting regular physical activity, controlling high blood pressure, quitting smoking and vaping, or reducing obesity, all of which are proven strategies for improved health outcomes. These are the things that I would call "Temple Maintenance".

My wife and I were discussing on our date night recently how we have seen a surge of patients with shingles. Shortly after that conversation, I ran across a research study done in Germany that found statistical evidence for an association between the COVID vaccine and Shingles. The study involved over 18 million people across 19 countries and found that the vaccinated group had a 20% chance of coming down with shingles. The COVID virus itself is known to cause shingles but the unvaccinated group had only an 11% chance of having shingles. The shingles were most prevalent with those getting the messenger RNA technology. Shingles come from a herpes virus that lies dormant in our bodies until it is reactivated. People over 60 are more likely to get it. About 20% of those who recover may suffer from what is called post-Herpetic neuralgia which is a painful condition lasting from months to years. Those are the ones we end up seeing because it usually responds very well to laser therapy which we offer at our clinic.

There is a lot of good research behind "cold" therapy being good for our heart and circulatory system. Recently during our recent cold spell, I put it to the test by doing a polar plunge in the Toe river. The ice was 6-8 inches deep in sections and the water was 31 degrees, quite refreshing to say the least. Although I can't say that I saw any improvement in my heart or circulation after that, it wasn't all that bad, and felt good after warming up by a nice fire I had prepared. While I don't necessarily recommend you jump into a cold river regularly, you can end your tub or bath by regularly getting under a cold shower for a few seconds. Once you get used to it you will definitely feel more energized during the day.

For The Love of God (Part 1)

Jesus said in John 14:15, "If you love me, you will keep my commandments." Then Jesus also went on to explain throughout his ministry Matthew 5 is a prime example, that to love God involves our thoughts and actions.



When the Hebrew language is explored two verses explain the way we love beautifully: Exodus 20:7- actions, and Psalm 19:14 - thoughts. The Hebrew text shows a deeper meaning than what has been translated into English and these two verses complement the teachings of Jesus regarding thought and action.

Exodus 20:7: "You shall not take the name of the LORD your God in vain, for the LORD will not hold him guiltless who takes his name in vain" (Exod. 20:7 ESV).

My initial thought when reading this verse is not to swear using God's name, although I maintain that the Hebrew language goes much farther than this. The first point to mention is that there is more than one "negative particle" in Hebrew. A "negative particle" is a word that makes part of a sentence or an entire sentence negative. Throughout the ten commandments there is one negative particle used, the word lo, which refers to a "permanent prohibition." Never to use "the LORD's name in vain."

In my opinion, the Hebrew text here contains three keywords. These three words translated into English are.

- 1. Take
- 2. Name
- 3. Vain

The first word above, "take," comes from the Hebrew tisa, which comes from the root verb nasa. This verb means, "to lift, lift up, raise high, carry, bear, support, take (A Concise Hebrew and Aramaic Lexicon of the O.T., William Holladay used throughout for definitions).

The second keyword is "name." This comes from the Hebrew shame, which is a noun meaning "name, reputation, authority, standing, renown."

And the third keyword in Exodus 20:7 is vain. This noun comes from the Hebrew LaShav. The Hebrew root word here is shav, which refers to being "worthless, vain" or "emptiness." The la prefix provides the word "in" (in vain).

Now, before we proceed let me say that "You shall not take the name of the LORD your God in vain" is a great translation. I am not saying it is wrong. But what I would like us to do is to think of a couple of possible alternate translations for these three "keywords" to see if this adds to our understanding. Please don't feel that I am adding to or taking away from scripture, I am just helping in our understanding of the scripture.

First, let's consider alternate meanings (as defined above) for the Hebrew la shav – translated as "in vain:"

- You shall not take the name of YHVH-the LORD your God as worthless
- You shall not take the name of YHVH-the LORD your God as empty
 Now let's add alternate meanings for the Hebrew noun shame translated as "name:"
- You shall not take the reputation of YHVH-the LORD your God as worthless
- You shall not take the reputation of YHVH-the LORD your God as worthess
- You shall not take the authority of YHVH-the-LORD your God as worthless
- You shall not take the authority of YHVH-the LORD your God as emptiness Now think of alternate definitions for the Hebrew verb tisa – translated as "take:"
- You shall not lift up the name of YHVH-the LORD your God as worthless or emptiness
- You shall not lift up the reputation of YHVH-the LORD your God as worthless or emptiness
- You shall not lift up the authority of YHVH-the LORD your God as worthless or emptiness
- You shall not carry/bear the name of YHVH-the LORD your God as worthless or emptiness

By taking into consideration the additional meanings of the Hebrew definitions for the three words ti-sa (to take, lift-up, carry, bear), la-shav (in vain, emptiness, worthless), and shame (name, reputation, authority), much broader applications to the third commandment can be appreciated than is commonly thought of. This speaks of action – being sure that what we do is with complete respect for God as our Supreme Creator and not treating Him or carrying His name or His word as vain, empty, or worthless.

The third commandment, "Thou shalt not take the name of the LORD thy God in vain" is rich in meaning. I feel that any of these definitions discussed can apply. In our next lesson, we will examine Psalm 19:14 and show how the Hebrew text adds additional dimensions to our thought process.

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Tim's Treasures

Strings of the Soul

In a corner of the Spiritual Retreat is an instrument wall – a place where my stringed instruments hang from hooks made specifically for each type of instrument. They are kept there for ease of access, for one never knows when the "mood" might strike when that feeling of creativity and inspiration combine into a single thread wanting to intertwine into a melody.



While these pieces of wood and wire are built to make beautiful music, my budget for said devices has never been of the highest priority. That being said, they are worth far more in sentimental value than anything else. One does one's best to maintain them, but with time, things age and dry out. So, it was the other day that that "mood" had struck, and as the fiddle was taken down, it quickly became apparent that the strings had loosened. With a violin, that is to be expected. Of all the instruments, it is held together by opposing forces. The tension of the strings holds up the bridge, which is supported from within by the sound post. If one of these components weakens and gives out, the entire function of the device is compromised. In this alone, there is a lesson, but for another day.

So, as I looked over the old "Ole Bull," it was quickly discovered that all but one string was significantly out of tune. Working through the pattern J.W. Parsons taught me so long ago, I began to tighten each of the four strings. When it came to the "G" string, the lowest of the four, the tuning peg made an odd sound as it was being turned. The wooden peg began to crack and disintegrate as it was turned, literally crumbling in my fingertips – it was gone, useless to hold a string taunt. Distraught but not overwhelmed, my original song of inspiration had long ago escaped my thoughts. Now, there was a new challenge. What songs could be played on only three strings? From there, the fiddle and I walked down memory lane, discovering what could and could not be found in the limited number of wire strands. My fingertips were forced to find comforting notes in places they had seldom touched. It wasn't pretty.

This morning, as my mind reflected upon yesterday's encounter, it occurred to me how life and aging emulate the strings on my old violin.

The aging aspect comes from the memory of that entry-level Electrical Engineering class I took back at the University of Florida so many years ago. Dr. O'Malley, a tall, thin, white-haired elderly gentleman, then well past retirement age, walked in and began the first day's intro quite unlike any that I had heard heretofore. "You will start today with 100 points," he told the class looking over his wire glasses at a lecture hall full of beginning students. "From this point on, you will only lose points. It is up to you how many you lose. You will never gain them back," he continued. In his eyes, you could almost tell there was more he wanted to say. Something about time, about life, lived. His words really hit hard. It was a thought that was truthful yet profound, and like it, life in the natural world was so much a parallel.

Many times in this journey, we find we are faced with a potential game-ending dilemma – either give up or adapt. Sometimes these are forces that are not of our doing. Illness, age, or accidents, to name a few, can take away our ability to function as we once were capable. Like that fiddle with now only three strings, we learn that if we are to go on, we must learn new ways to play that old song. Those finger positions on the strings that were once foreign, we are now forced to learn. A broken arm or hand of your favored limb makes writing almost impossible. But almost always, those who suffer learn to adapt and begin writing, albeit barely legible at first, and overcome their setback.

Likewise, when we step out of our comfort zone in faith and go to places or mission fields that we once thought foreign, they test our ability to adapt and grow. Jesus never told his disciples to stay put in Capernaum and make each other feel good. No, he told them to go out and spread the good news. "and he sent them out to preach the kingdom of God and to heal the sick." He told them: "Take nothing for the journey--no staff, no bag, no bread, no money, no extra tunic. Whatever house you enter, stay there until you leave that town." It was painful. Not only were they trying to cope with the thought of not bringing any bedding and food, but they also had to remember what they had, in some cases, only recently learned. Jesus knew this would test them, but in the end, it would force them to grow stronger in their faith. Scripture tells us that through life's trials, we will only become stronger and persevere, "My brethren, count it all joy when ye fall into divers temptations; Knowing this, that the trying of your faith worketh patience. But let patience have her perfect work, that ye may be perfect and entire, wanting nothing." ...But we glory in tribulations also: knowing that tribulation worketh patience; And patience, experience; and experience, hope..."

There are those who, once they've learned to play beautifully on just the three strings in life, suddenly find that another string is taken away, leaving only two. It is then, the more challenged we become, the more we must not lean on our own understanding. Many give in to the feeling of being overwhelmed. They never knew Jesus as their Savior, so life, when it becomes unbearable, feels hopelessly lost. They seek answers in the life around them, but nothing can ease that emptiness and despair that is part of this world – no bottle is deep enough, no drug strong enough, and no emotional escape capable of breaking that spiral of pain and death. Only when the distraught and lost truly seek God is when they find hope.

Eventually, in some cases, those broken strings are restored. After the soul that had learned to dance upon the instrument with fewer strings finds a restored octave or more, their appreciation for what once was becomes all the more remarkable. So, it is with those who are reborn in Christ Jesus – their apprecia-

tion for things of God's creation is from a new perspective. Their soul is restored. They learned in that absence, in that trial, through the fires of tribulation how much more they were capable. Their strength and faith are renewed. They become a new creature. "Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new." What was once uncomfortable or unknown becomes possible because something caused us to lean not on our own understanding.

Many return from mission fields, whether abroad or local, and find something about the world around them is not the same. Call it an awakening or a new awareness. Either way, when we learn to seek Him, we too find these peeling



away layer after layer of blindness to what we once could not see. We can understand something about God a little more. With each step, we learn. With each blunder or mistake, we grow. During those painful endeavors, we sometimes feel like we will not survive. It is then we grow the most.

When the mood strikes, seek that thing that allows you to revel in your soul's ability to thank God. When you find a string missing in your daily walk, press on toward the mark and let it not hinder your pursuit of the way, the truth, and the life.

Psalm 103:4 "Who redeemeth thy life from destruction; who crowneth thee with lovingkindness and tender mercies;"

Gazing at the fleecy robe nestled in the giveaway bag, I remembered the coziness that enveloped me on a rainy wintry day. I retrieved the buffalo plaid and draped the garment around a hanger.

Restored. Recovered. Redeemed. What thrilling words that gather defeat and fling it to the farthest corners of the universe. Like my recovered robe, we, as Christians, are rescued, released, delivered, and retrieved from our failures. No longer a slave to our own minds or the whims of others, we dance to the pulse of His love, throwing back our heads and laughing with the sheer joy of freedom. Christ is our Redeemer, for "in him we live, and move, and have our being" according to Acts 17:28. He redeems us from destruction as Psalm 103:4 shouts triumphantly. Trees Tell Tales

Observation of God's work leads to a cosmic conversation, between heaven and the earth—God and us. A conversation where awe and abdication are wed in beholding a Creator God who paints self-portraits on mountains and mirror-like lakes.



Read the scriptures of creation! God speaks in the snow, rain, river, and sand. See the "trees clapping their hands" and the "hills skip like lambs" as the rocks cry out "Hosanna, hosanna in the highest! Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord!" For creation cries, where our boredom dies in the deep sighs of breath breathed in, and out. Out and in—for in new life we breathe again. We rise again, keenly observing the visible whirling world, spinning upward and outward, spitting out 'Word,' God's Word. Jesus the Word.

Take it in. Breathe it in. Inhale its goodness. Psalm 19 begins with a similar exclamation.

"The heavens declare the glory of God; the skies proclaim the work of his hands"

The Psalmist has his Ph.D. in the hermeneutics of creation. He is an expert in the exegesis of hummingbirds humming, and trees budding and bursting with beauty. He is an intellectual of the night. A scholar of the sun. "Learn the liturgy of the morning," he says " and join the vigil with the stars, saints, and angels, praying Maranatha in the womb of the pregnant night."

Psalm 19 implores us to pay attention. Take it in. Breathe it in. Inhale its goodness. Interestingly, the Psalm ends with "May these words of my mouth and this meditation of my heart be pleasing in your sight, Lord, my Rock, and my Redeemer." The French author Anthelme Brillat-Savarin writes "tell me what you eat, and I will tell you what you are." We become what we bite. We are fashioned into what we devour. We are conformed to what we consume. For example, porn feeds lust, so that lust thrives. Paradoxically, porn starves lust, so that lust clamors and claws, like a baneful beast screaming "feed me!" Junk food whets the appetite for empty calories that demand more empty calories. Soon you will find your belly full and your body famished.

"A good man brings good things out of the good stored up in his heart, and an evil man brings evil things out of the evil stored up in his heart. For the mouth speaks what the heart is full of." ~Luke 6:45

Stock the shelves of your heart with ridged rocks, where God has left His fingerprints like a criminal wanting to be caught. Fill the shelves of your heart with the silent sound of revelation. Sunset revelation. Moon rising revelation. Rainstorm revelation.

"They have no speech, they use no words; no sound is heard from them. Yet their voice goes out into all the earth, their words to the ends of the world."~Psalm 19:3-4

The Hebrew word for voice, (Kole, לוֹק) is used for the first time in Genesis 3:8. "Then the man and his wife heard the sound (Kole, לוֹק) of the Lord God as he was walking in the garden"

It is here that we are struck with the silent sound of God walking in the garden. You must first pay attention. You must first listen. Do not hide. Be dis-covered, naked, and exposed, so that you may discover the heart of God.

Adam and Eve ran and hid. They were clothed in naked shame. They buried themselves in the bushes of life on their terms. You and I hide every day. We hide from God by living hurried lives. We distance ourselves from God by living distracted lives. Bustling lives bury us in the ground of busy business because we do not take the kingdom of God seriously. We live in a whirling world. A waring world vying for our attention. We think we are consumers, but in reality, we are being consumed by sin. So, we spit out sin with our words, proving ourselves quite fluent in grunts and grumbles, and a few curses sprinkled in here and there. Maybe you are more fluent in letting the proverbial punch line (as in line meant to punch) fly into your spouse, parent, or child. Stop speaking. Stop running. Stop hiding. Let the sacred silence purify your heart, preparing you for the "Kole" of God.

God is always speaking. The "Kole" of God is always filling up this wild and wonderful world.

Stop. Be still. Silent. Listen. Pay attention.

Run from God by living a crowded life; a busy life, and you will believe you are god. Gorge yourself in the glory of God. Fatten yourself on fields fashioned with forget-me-nots, and you will find yourself wrapped up in gospel goodness crying out with the rocks "Hosanna! Hosanna in the highest! Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord!"

The story has been told among the alpinists in the Mountain area of Crimea, Russian Federation. There was a day when alpinists of Crimea were going to claim the top of the local rough mountain. One alpinist with the approach of darkness was almost



successful in reaching his goal for that day, as all of a sudden, he slid into the dark cave. He got hanging on the rope between heaven and earth. Because of the sunset time and the thick darkness of the cave, he could not determine the distance away from the ground. According to his audio-recording device, he heard the voice telling him: "Cut the rope and let it go!". It was repeated in his head several times. With deeper panic and awful fear, he was responding: "I can't". Several days later, when the rescue team found his body, it was hanging only 36 inches from the ground!

The Bible speaks a lot against fear. Here are only a few passages that express God's Voice toward His children. Isaiah 41:10 KJV: "Fear thou not; for I am with thee: be not dismayed; for I am thy God: I will strengthen thee; yea, I will help thee; yea, I will uphold thee with the right hand of my righteousness." 1 John 4:18 KJV: "There is no fear in love; but perfect love casteth out fear: because fear hath torment. He that feareth is not made perfect in love." Luke 12:32 KJV: "Fear not, little flock; for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom."

Today, in a world of darkness and gloom, we are enslaved by the fear of death (Hebrews 2:15). People do anything to escape doom. Lots of humans by attempting to reach their goal, fall into the deep dark cave of their life. They are still hanging in that darkness. Like that alpinist, they are hanging between heaven and earth, and only a few are willing to cut that rope and let it go.

We thank the Lord that there is a voice in the darkness of life constantly appealing to everyone today: "This is the way, walk ye in it, when ye turn to the right hand, and when ye turn to the left." Dave Says

Our deceased neighbor left us his home, car, and money in his handwritten will. What do we do? Dear Dave,

Our next-door neighbor was an older single man with no family, and my wife and I always tried to look out for him and help with things. He died recently, and in his will, he left us his home, his car, and the money he had in his bank account. The will was handwritten, and it said



the house was worth around \$350,000, with \$150,000 left on the mortgage. The car is worth about \$10,000. Officials at our county office building said the money in the bank account wouldn't have to go into probate since I was listed as the beneficiary, and I was given a check for that amount. We've just never handled anything like this before, and my wife and I were hoping you would help us navigate things. Steven

Dear Steven,

There are a couple hundred thousand dollars in equity involved here. The fact that the will is handwritten doesn't necessarily invalidate it, but it does increase the possibility of encountering some bumps down the road.

I'm not a lawyer, so the first thing I'd do is talk to a couple of probate attorneys in your county. Find out what they'd charge to handle things. I wouldn't spend thousands of dollars to get this done, but I would pay \$500, maybe \$1,000, to let someone who knows what they're doing handle things. If your county affairs people are right and everything's straightforward, it's not a lot of legal work for an attorney.

On top of that, if the attorney you work with knows folks at the courthouse and is familiar with how things work there, then it's kind of like traffic court, you know? It's almost automatic. I mean, we're only talking about three assets here — a bank account that's already been handed off, a car, and a house that's mortgaged. For me, it'd be worth a little money to have someone on my side who knows the path through the woods.

I'm sorry to hear your friend and neighbor passed on, Steven. But I hope I've been able to help. — Dave

Our attorney said we should file bankruptcy on a \$3,000 loan my husband cosigned 4 years ago

Dear Dave,

My husband co-signed a loan for an old girlfriend four years ago. Apparently, she hasn't made a payment in almost two years, and a collection agency called him last week wanting the balance of \$3,000. We make about \$80,000 a year combined, and an attorney we spoke with recommended we file bankruptcy. Is this really the best thing to do? Scarlett

Dear Scarlett,

If you have the money, and you can pay it off without putting yourself in a bind financially, do it. That's the right thing to do, both morally and legally. If you don't have that kind of cash on hand, try haggling with them. See if they'll agree to settle for \$1,500. At this point, they might even take less. But if they go for the idea, do not give them electronic access to your bank account. Make sure you get the agreement in writing, too, before sending them a penny.

Here's the deal. This collector bought the loan for pennies on the dollar. It's an old debt, and that means the expectation for collection is very low. At the same time, your husband did co-sign for the loan. They'll probably threaten to sue and whatnot, but my guess is you can work something out. It might take two or three weeks — and a little patience — but that's a small price to pay if it saves you a bunch of money.

Oh, and the attorney you talked to? He doesn't sound very bright. A bankruptcy stays on your record for years. Trashing your financial life over \$3,000 would be stupid. Good luck, Scarlett!



Revelation Chapter 6: The Rider Death on a Corpse-Colored Horse, with Hell Following After Him

Recorded in the book of Exodus is the true story of how God judged Egypt and set the Hebrews free from slavery. God sent disaster and pestilence. The land was plagued with frogs, gnats, and flies. The livestock died of disease. Egyptians were covered with boils.



A hailstorm killed people and animals, as well as destroyed their crops. Swarming locusts destroyed all the vegetation throughout the land. Darkness was sent so thick the people said they could feel it. Finally came the death of every firstborn son in Egypt. With each terrible catastrophe, Pharoah was allowed several opportunities to acknowledge God and repent. However, the Bible says he hardened his heart and spurned each chance he was given.

Melody Rossi, in May I Walk You Home? has written:

"It is heartbreaking to watch someone we love suffer from illness. Sometimes it raises difficult questions for us and can even make us feel angry with, or abandoned by, God. Though we can't always know why he chooses a certain path for us, we can trust him based on what we know of his character. If the situation seems unbearable, [we should] reflect on what these hardships are purchasing... No matter how deep the suffering, the cost is nothing compared to the joy that will be experienced if your loved ones come to know Jesus through this ordeal." In Revelation chapter 6, the apostle John is permitted to see how God intends to wrap up human history. The apostle has seen Christ given a scroll with seven seals, the title deed to the earth. Each seal broken on the scroll reveals an action God plans to take.

When the first seal was broken, John saw a rider on a white horse representing a great world leader who would deceive the nations. When the second seal was broken, John saw a rider on a red horse who was given the power to take peace from the earth. When the third seal was broken, John saw a black horse rider carrying a pair of scales, bringing great famine. When the fourth seal was broken, this is what John said he witnessed:

"When the Lamb broke the fourth seal, I heard the fourth living being say, 'Come!' I looked up and saw a horse whose color was pale green. Its rider was named Death, and his companion was the Grave. These two were given authority over one-fourth of the earth, to kill with the sword and famine and disease and wild animals." (Revelation 6:7-8)

This rider is on a pale, or what might be deemed a 'livid,' greenish horse – a horse the same color as a corpse. Its rider is named "Death," and "Hell" or the "Grave" follows him. Behind Death, the Grave acts like a street sweeper that follows behind the carnage, sweeping masses of souls who have died without knowing Christ into the pit of Hell.

The rider on the corpse-colored horse rides throughout the earth and destroys one-fourth of the world's population with war, famine, pestilence (disease), and wild beasts. This event is more significant and intense than anything this world has ever experienced. Millions, even billions, will die from disaster and disease. Interestingly, when the late Dr. H.A. Ironside wrote his classic Lectures on the Revelation and described the fourth horseman, he said it was a picture of "pestilence," which "always follows war and famine." Then he added, "We have known something of that in this last year, but the complete fulfillment awaits a not far-distant day."

What was Ironside referencing? A footnote in his lectures says, "The reader will understand" [his lectures on Revelation] were "delivered during the armistice year, and while the influenza plague was still in progress."

Here's what the National Archives and Records Administration says about that particular worldwide pestilence, the influenza epidemic:

"The influenza epidemic that swept the world in 1918 killed an estimated 50 million people. One-fifth of the world's population was attacked by this deadly virus. Within months, it had killed more people than any other illness in recorded history.

"The plague emerged in two phases. In late spring of 1918, the first phase, known as the 'three-day fever,' appeared without warning. Few deaths were reported. Victims recovered after a few days. When the disease surfaced again that fall, it was far more severe. Scientists, doctors, and health officials could not identify this disease which was striking so fast and so viciously, eluding treatment and defying control. Some victims died within hours of their first symptoms. Others succumbed after a few days; their lungs filled with fluid, and they suffocated to death.

"The plague did not discriminate. It was rampant in urban and rural areas, from the densely populated East coast to the remotest parts of Alaska. Young adults, usually unaffected by these types of infectious diseases, were among the hardest hit groups, along with the elderly and young children. The flu afflicted over 25 percent of the U.S. population. In one year, the average life expectancy in the United States dropped by 12 years."

Of course, like Ironside, we have known something of this kind of pestilence, most recently. The Coronavirus worldwide epidemic is an ongoing crisis. According to the World Health Organization, the most current statistics show the virus has been contracted by nearly 652 million people and killed over 6.5 million globally. But the epidemic hasn't just affected world health; it's also demonstrated the fragility of our entire system of public health, food production, delivery, and labor. The social disruption has had the means to destroy millions of enterprises and exacerbate the problem of extreme poverty. Lockdowns have presented their

own serious challenges, preventing people from earning wages and, therefore, being unable to purchase food or forced to buy less food or nutritious food. This is to say nothing about the profound negative impact of the epidemic on mental and emotional health worldwide.

Something that has puzzled Bible scholars is John's account of the fourth horsemen's authority to kill "wild animals." Dying by the sword, famine, and disease are easy enough to understand, but what is meant when the Scriptures prophetically describe a period of mass death by "the beasts of the earth," as some translations render it, or by "wild animals"?

It isn't easy to nail this down, but it could be referring precisely to what it says. Perhaps there is such chaos at this point societal controls are primarily broken down, and God puts it into the heart of predatory animals ferociously hungry to hunt and kill humanity. We might be looking at something akin to a real-life scenario of Alfred Hitchcock's movie, "The Birds," except it would probably include other animals, too.

Perhaps what's being foretold is a future when humankind, which has been such a poor steward of the planet and corrupted it so severely by sin, the animal world rebels against its master in the same way man has rebelled against his master, God. Animals are permitted with divine authority to slaughter people everywhere.

It could be, however, that what is being conveyed is something more natural such as disease-carrying vermin like the rat. Science says rats carry as many as 35 different diseases. The fleas from rats spread the bubonic plague during the 14th Century, killing anywhere from 75 to 200 million people.

It should be remembered the Coronavirus has allegedly been connected to horseshoe bats in China. Zoonotic diseases are illnesses that can be transferred from animals to humans, but they are rare.

Still, another possibility is that the text or the phrase "wild animals" describes bestial persons who rise under the power of the anti-Christ to plague the nations. It might be that they use biochemical warfare.

These scenarios are admittedly conjecture but not necessarily beyond the realm of possibility. Much of life's experiences seem to make such circumstances entirely plausible. Moreover, nothing is impossible with God. He can do whatever he desires.

Now let's revert to the subject matter or theme of the first two paragraphs of this commentary.

In his marvelous book, Approaching Hoofbeats, the late Dr. Billy Graham provides a word of clarity regarding all of this. He asks, "Why would God allow such suffering to take place?" He continues:

"John's vision is consistent with ancient biblical pictures describing what happens when God sends his wrath upon men who disobey him. William Barclay, the late great Scottish professor at Glasgow University, warned that 'at the back of it all there is the permanent truth that no man and no nation can escape the consequences of their sin.' And Lynn Howard Hough explains that Death, here, does not bring meaningless destruction 'but destruction which serves the purposes of the justice of God. [Death] is part of the divine administration. A fourth of the earth feels his power that the rest may see and have the opportunity to repent'...It was not God's intent that any should perish, but man defiantly refused God's plan, the consequence of his disobedience being that he followed the way of death. Now, as the rider on the pale horse, Death is only taking his due...Still, in this vision, God reaches out in love. He [God] demonstrated his great love by giving his Son to die on the Cross – the most horrible death a person can die. God hopes that through this evidence of love and this warning of the fourth horseman before the final judgment, the rest of the world might see the wages of sin, turn from their sinfulness, seek God's forgiveness, and be saved from the jaws of Hell."

An old saying often quoted by Christians of yesteryear claims, "Sometimes God has to knock you flat on your back to get you to look up." It's very true. It's then we are often humbled and feel the need for him.

Calamity, tragedy, catastrophe, wars, famine, and disease are sometimes how God troubles the waters to push our boats safely to shore. In these situations, there can be an opportunity for reconciliation with him. And, "[n]o matter how deep the suffering, the cost is nothing compared to the joy that will be experienced if" we "come to know Jesus through" the "ordeal."


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A Renewed Commitment

As we embark upon the journey of a new year, it is often customary to enter with a list – whether a physical list or a mental list – of new goals or commitments. Some prefer to make new year's resolutions – something I am not a fan of doing because they normally flow out of pure human willnower – that on average by the end of January are usu-



God. Holy Spirit searches our hearts and reveals the deep and hidden areas and

will simultaneously bring His Word to our remembrance concerning those things!

This brings us to a verse found in the second chapter of Jeremiah and the thirteenth verse; this verse states, "For my people have committed two evils; they have forsaken me the fountain of living waters, and hewed them out cisterns, broken cisterns, that can hold no water." To give a little background on Jeremiah's ministry, he began his prophetic assignment during the reign of King Josiah. If you know your Bible, you know that King Josiah was a righteous king, who did what was right in the eyes of the Lord. Most notably, his reign is marked by major reforms in the worship of the people of Israel after the book of the law – which scholars note as the book of Deuteronomy – was found by the high priest in the house of the Lord. Josiah tore down the idols that the people of Israel constructed to idol gods and reinstituted worship prescribed by the Law of Moses. Although Josiah set himself to seek the Lord with his whole heart, his reforms did not capture the HEARTS of the people he governed. The people of Israel only had an external response to God's principles, but not from the heart. In other words, they said "Amen" with their lips but not with their hearts, much like we do today! Therefore, the basis of Jeremiah's ministry was a call for Israel to repent. In the first verse of scripture read into your hearing, Jeremiah is issuing a "covenant lawsuit" to the people of Israel as he charges them with two evils: forsaking the living fountain and building broken cisterns. Looking at the first clause, the word "forsake" in the original Hebrew language means to depart from, or to let LOOSE. A departing from the ways of God isn't an abrupt departure, the result of a gradual "loosening" of our devotion. Someone once said, "Collapse in a Christian's life is seldom a huge blowout, but rather a slow leak." Let's look at the comparison Jeremiah makes with the living fountain versus a cistern. The living fountain (a metaphor for the LORD) is divine, a cistern during Biblical times was man-made as workers were required to dig deep pits into the earth. The living fountain is self-sustaining, but a cistern requires regular maintenance and inspection as there was always a danger of its walls drying up, forming cracks, and allowing water to leak out (which is why Jeremiah called them "broken cisterns"); frequently the walls of cisterns had to be plastered to add a protective layer against leakage. The water of the living fountain is never stagnant, water in cisterns can become stagnant over time. The living fountain is self-producing, with cisterns, one had to wait on the rain to fill them. The living fountain has a limitless supply, cisterns water supply was limited! Overall, the cistern metaphor here represents man's departure from God and using his own efforts to provide for and do for himself in a manner inferior to the ways of God! How often do we take it upon ourselves to

do things that we haven't been led by God to do, resulting in unnecessary labor and sweat to maintain it?! Just like Israel, we will formulate idols that reflect our own nature and desires rather than the nature and desire of our Savior!

Now we come to another verse found in chapter three and verse fourteen of Jeremiah, where the Lord – through Jeremiah – issues a call to Israel with these words: "Turn, O backsliding, children, saith the LORD; for I am married unto you: and I will take you one of a city, and two of a family, and I will bring you to Zion." The nature of this call is perhaps one of the most significant calls the Lord made to Israel to repent due to the way He reveals Himself to them. In this verse I want us to look at three specific points: (1) God's call to Israel as a FATHER, (2) God's affirmation to Israel as a HUSBAND, and (3) God's promise to Israel concerning their future. In the first clause of this verse in the KJV the text states, "Turn O backsliding Children..." The call to turn in the Hebrew signifies a desire to RESTORE, REPAIR, AND REFRESH. Repentance is twofold, it involves the exercise of our will to turn back to God and it also involves our Father restoring, repairing, and refreshing us! Looking further at the term "backsliding", we normally associate this with a believer that suddenly reverts to some sort of worldly behavior, practice, or belief. Again, I reiterate what I mentioned earlier...collapse is seldom a blowout but a slow leak. Backsliding is more than what we've labeled it in church! Looking at two other translations of this verse, the word backsliding is translated as "FAITHLESS". Why is this? The Hebrew word shobawb here specifically refers to rebellion in the HEART. Anything that arises in our hearts that divides our fellowship with God leads us OUTSIDE of the FAITH OF JESUS CHRIST! The scripture declares in Hebrews 3:12, "See to it brothers that none of you has a sinful, UNBELIEVING heart that turns away from the living God." When we allow conditions of the heart to go unhealed and "un-delivered" by God, we have already entered a backslidden state. It is just a matter of time until we have turned away! Romans 14:23 also records very simply, "For whatsoever is not from faith is sin." Notice I said that issues of the heart can move us outside of the faith OF Jesus Christ, I did not say faith IN Jesus Christ...there is a difference. We have placed faith IN Jesus Christ when we professed Him as our Lord and Savior. Because of this, we are called to operate in the FAITH OF JESUS CHRIST which is a SACRIFICIAL WALK! The apostle Paul stated in Galatians 2:20, "I live by the faith OF the Son of God, who loved me and gave Himself up..." As Father, He wants to restore, repair, and refresh us because it is He and He alone who created us in His image, placed us in the earth and gave us an assignment. As a Husband in this verse, the LORD affirms his everlasting COVENANT with them. This is the same way the Lord deals with us as believers, being that we as the church are his bride and He is our husband. The word here for husband signifies LORDSHIP as well. In this portion of the verse, God reaffirms to Israel that He is and should be their only LORD because of his covenant. In our covenant with Him through the shed blood of Jesus, He is calling us to surrender to Him as our husband/Lord. Finally, Jeremiah shifts this verse to another aspect of who God is...a promise keeper. The final clause of this verse states, "...I will bring you to Zion" which contextually speaking refers to the gathering of the people of Israel in the promised land under Messianic rule, which we know will be the New Jerusalem under Jesus Christ! This is significant because, despite Israel's current state of mind (and heart) in the text, the INTEN-TION and PLAN God has for His people has not and will not change! Even if we have entered a backslidden state, have become loose or lax in our walk, or have allowed heart issues to pull us out of fellowship with God and other believers, know that God's mind concerning us does not change!

As we begin 2023, I encourage all of us to allow Holy Spirit to do a deep dive into our hearts. When He highlights certain things to us, let us endeavor to heed His call as a Father to restore us, submit to His Lordship as a Husband, and be encouraged, uplifted, and motivated to run this race with diligence by the awesome promises He's made to us concerning our future!



"Youth Pastor, Teacher Among 46 Arrested In North Texas Prostitution Sting"

My local newspaper, the Dallas Morning News, broke the story reported by this headline yesterday. According to authorities, the men had arranged online to meet at hotels in our area intending to pay

Officials have not divulged the names of those arrested. The article reports that a high school teacher, a football coach, and an operations director of a large

hospital network were among those arrested. However, the paper chose to headline its coverage by reporting that a "youth pastor" was arrested.

When I saw the headline, my first thought was that the paper focused on a church leader in a way that is unfair to my faith. Why not lead with the hospital administrator or someone else? I assumed that this will only fuel anti-Christian animosity in our secularized culture.

Then I had to reconsider my reaction. If a youth pastor has indeed been engaged in prostitution and sex trafficking, this is heinous beyond description. Is this a one-time crime? Has he been abusing youth in his church? Consider the pain and grief his youth group, their parents, their congregation, and their pastor must be feeling.

The ancient Greek philosopher Anaximander (610–546 BC) made the first map of the known world. He depicted the city of Miletus at its center. That's because he was living in Miletus at the time.

Wherever you are, you are the center of the world, so far as you can see. Therein lies my point today.

"Prince Harry's Pagan Progress"

A Wall Street Journal op-ed on Prince Harry's memoir, Spare, describes his disclosures regarding his religion as "Prince Harry's Pagan Progress." It notes that Harry is not religious but he is "spiritual": he tried therapy and self-medication with psychedelics; then, encouraged by his new girlfriend Meghan Markle, he took up yoga and visited a medium.

We can see Harry's rejection of his childhood church tradition as a rejection of our faith. Or we can view him and the generation he represents as the op-ed writer does: "Solitary and syncretic, inward travelers with no direction home." And we can do what we can to help them find the direction their souls are seeking.

Here's the problem: most people who are spiritually lost don't know—or believe—that they are truly lost. From their point of view, their map of the world is all the world there is.

It's a simple fact that we don't know what we don't know. But this doesn't make what we don't know less relevant or even less dangerous for us.

"Zombie viruses" are being released by thawing permafrost in the Arctic how real is the risk for public health? A "new wave of mobilization" by Russia may be on the way—will this heighten the risk of a new world war? Will artificial intelligence "steal your high-paying job"? Will ongoing protests and new sanctions against Iran's government lead to welcome regime change or spark even greater aggression against Israel and the West?

If you didn't know about these stories before you read about them just now, that fact makes their potential threat no less real.

"Our heart is restless until it rests in you"

Christians are not immune from Anaximander's self-centric map drawing. Even though we sing, "I once was lost, but now I'm found / Was blind but now I see," we are not yet home. There is much we do not know that we do not know about our Lord and his purpose for our lives.

However, like lost people who do not know they are lost, we can think that because we are "found," we know all we need to know. The truth is, like a newborn baby, those who are "born again" (John 3:3) have only begun the journey before

And when we walk our journey well, our changed lives attract the lost people we know to the One we follow.

Paul testified: "We all, with unveiled face, beholding the glory of the Lord, are being transformed into the same image from one degree of glory to another. For this comes from the Lord who is the Spirit" (2 Corinthians 3:18). "Beholding" translates a Greek verb meaning to "contemplate" as an ongoing action. When we spend such time in the glorious presence of God, we are "transformed" (literally metamorphosized) into "the same image" as the One we worship as we are "conformed to the image of his Son" (Romans 8:29).

Others see his image reflected in us: his love in our compassion, his strength in our courage, his truth in our witness. And even if they do not know what they do not know about the One whose image we reflect, St. Augustine's prayer is nonetheless their story: "You have made us for yourself, O Lord, and our heart is restless until it rests in you."

"The golden rule for your life and mine"

Oswald Chambers noted: "The golden rule for your life and mine is this concentrated keeping of the life open towards God. Let everything else—work, clothes, food, everything on earth—go by the board, saving that one thing. The rush of other things always tends to obscure this concentration on God."

Will you allow the "rush of other things" to obscure your concentration on your Lord today? Or will you behold his glory and be transformed into his image?

You can draw your map around yourself, or you can draw it around Jesus—but you cannot do both. C. S. Lewis: "Look for yourself, and you will find in the long run only hatred, loneliness, despair, rage, ruin, and decay. But look for Christ and

you will find him and with him everything else." Will you "look for Christ" today?


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
