

- You can't climb the ladder of success with your hand in your pocket.


Focus on Father



A Pastor's View

"Tolerating The Intolerable"

A Christian parent asked their 15-year-old daughter: "What is a name that kids in your school do NOT want to be called? But the answer was very revealing: his daughter said, "The worst thing you can be called at our school, is 'Intolerant." That says so much about where we are as a society right now, doesn't it; call me anything else, but don't call me intolerant!



Toleration can be a good thing; but tolerating in the church of the Lord Jesus Christ, what God has forbidden, is taking it too far. This is the message Jesus gave in Revelation 3 to the church at Thyatira: "The Church That Tolerated The Intolerable."

As He did with most of the churches, Jesus initially commended the church at Thyatira for some things: their "deeds, and love and faith and service," and so on. But then He says in:20 "But I have this against you, that you tolerate the woman Jezebel, who calls herself a prophetess, and she teaches and leads My bond-servants astray so that they commit acts of immorality and eat things sacrificed to idols."

The word "tolerate" here means "permitting, allowing." Jesus used it in Matthew 3, when He told John the Baptist, "permit it at this time, to fulfill all righteousness." But what they were "tolerating" in Thyatira was the woman Jesus calls "Jezebel," undoubtedly not her actual name, but comparing her wickedness to that of evil Jezebel of the Old Testament.

What was this woman doing that was so wicked? Jesus said, "she calls herself a prophetess, and she teaches and leads My bondservants astray." There were two aspects to this "Jezebel's" heresy:

- false teaching: "She teaches and leads My bondservants astray" including teaching on "the deep things of Satan" as:24 says!
- immoral practice: "acts of immorality."

Many have speculated that the false teaching and practice in Thyatira had to do with the trade guilds that flourished there. They were known for their manufacture of purple cloth. But if you wanted to work, you had to be part of the trade guild, and when these tradesmen got together they would offer sacrifices to false gods and eat the meat from the sacrifice, and the worship often involved cult prostitution as well. This "prophetess" may have taught that these things were ok for Christians to participate in. But whatever form it took, this "Jezebel" taught that immorality was ok for Christians.

There have always been those throughout church history who have tried to excuse immorality in the church — and that continues today:

— A few years ago there was a singles church group that taught that it was ok to commit immorality as long as you weren't married. (A pretty convenient teaching for a singles group!) But it was obviously contrary to the teaching of the New Testament. — Many in America today are seeking to justify homosexual practice for professing Christians. They assert that what the Bible prohibits is just "homosexual prostitution," NOT a "loving, committed gay relationship." Others teach that if you condemn homosexuality because of Leviticus, then you can't eat shrimp either, because they both are Old Testament commands. This is a very common argument today. But the New Testament later specifically declared all foods clean — so you CAN eat shrimp despite what Leviticus says! — but the Bible NEVER reverses its ban on homosexual practice. In fact, the NEW Testament in Romans, I Corinthians, and I Timothy, specifically teaches that homosexuality is STILL a sin and prohibited by God.

These are the same kinds of things this "Jezebel" taught in Thyatira: that immorality was ok for Christians. Jesus had harsh words against that in this letter. Tolerating in the church what God has prohibited is NOT a virtue!

Now, we should understand that there are things we may tolerate in our society as a whole, that we do not tolerate in our churches. A certain level of tolerance is necessary for us to have a pluralistic, democratic society as we have here in America. John Newton, the author of Amazing Grace, wrote: "I am glad of liberty to worship God according to my light, and therefore am willing that others should have the same liberty." (Letters of John Newton, Josiah Bull, ed., p. 371). We have a pluralistic society in America, with people of many different beliefs. In order to facilitate that, we have to exercise a degree of tolerance towards those who disagree with us:

- You may be a Republican politically, and may strongly disagree on issues with someone who is a Democrat. But you don't go out and shoot someone because they are a Democrat! You tolerate their right to exist in a pluralistic nation like America. In fact, as the old saying goes, I'll disagree with you, but I'll die for your right to disagree!
- In the same way, Christians strongly disagree with Muslim doctrines about God and Jesus, but we don't go around burning down Muslim mosques. We tolerate their existence in our society.
- Likewise, we disagree with homosexual practice but we don't go out and beat up homosexuals we see in the street.

We tolerate these groups, just as we wish to be tolerated when WE are in the minority. Tolerance to a point is a good thing and is needed to have the kind of society we enjoy in the United States of America today.

But tolerance in the church of the Lord Jesus Christ is an entirely different thing. The church is not a pluralistic democracy. The church is the Kingdom of the Lord Jesus Christ, and His word is our rule of faith and practice. We are not free to believe and practice anything we desire in the church of the Lord Jesus Christ:

- A person can support abortion in our society today. But in the church of the Lord Jesus Christ, His word says He knits us together in our mother's womb, and the life of the unborn child is precious.
- A person is free in America today to believe that Allah is the one God, and Mohammed is His prophet. But you are NOT free to believe that in the church of the continued on page 9

"O, that the woke crowd would go to sleep and the asleep would wake up."

I am constantly amazed at the news events of the day! When I think I have heard it all, something new is reported. Dr. David Jeremiah wrote a book on the subject in 2011 entitled "I Never Thought I'd See the Day!." He subtitled it, "Culture at the Crossroads." In the book, Dr. Jeremiah detailed the current events of that day and how they were so shocking. May I say that we have moved a long away from that level of morality and decency in these past 12 years?

- * The Flood in Noah's Day was because man's mind was evil continually.
- * In Lot's day God sent down fire upon Sodom and Gomorrah (for the same type of evils we see today!).
- * In 722 BC Assyria defeated Israel and took possession of their share of the Promised Land.
- * In 605 BC Babylon defeated Judah, took so many captive, and destroyed Solomon's Temple.
- * In 70 AD Rome slaughtered almost a million Jews and tore down the 2nd Temple

Defeat the Lies That Torment Your SoulBy Joyce Meyer

Deception is a dangerous problem and something Jesus warned us about in the Bible. In Matthew 24:4, He said, "Be careful that no one misleads you [deceiving you and leading you into error]" (AMPC). There are other places in Scripture where we're warned to watch out and be alert because we have an enemy who is trying to deceive us.



When you're deceived, you believe a lie. This is dangerous because when you believe a lie, even though it's not true, it becomes your reality.

For example, I used to believe I would always have a second-rate life because my father had sexually abused me throughout my childhood and I was "damaged goods." This lie made me insecure, bitter, hard to get along with, and absolutely miserable.

But when I discovered the truth in God's Word, that He would heal my soul and pay me back for the shame of my youth, I had hope that I could move forward in His plans and purposes for my life. I began growing in my relationship with Jesus, learning how to trust Him to restore my mind and emotions—my heart—and how to live according to the wisdom in His Word.

Breaking Free from the Torment in My Soul

A major key to overcoming the wrong mindsets I'd lived with for many years was learning to obey God's command to walk in love and forgive everyone who had hurt me. Luke 6:27-28 says, "Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who mistreat you" (NIV). And Romans 12:21 urges us, "Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good." I realize that choosing forgiveness is one of the most difficult things God asks us to do, especially if we believe that whoever hurt us is in the wrong and doesn't deserve to be forgiven. But staying mad won't help you either; the truth is it actually causes you more hurt and misery if you refuse to get past the offense.

I remember the day I was praying for God to show me someone I could help and He spoke to my heart about my parents. At the time, they were older and needed help with the activities of their daily life. I felt that God wanted me to move them close to where my husband, Dave, and I lived and take care of them until they died.

At first, I resisted this idea because there was nothing in me that wanted to see them, much less spend money on them and meet their needs. But I told Dave what I was thinking, and he said if God was telling me to do this, we should do it. It wasn't what I wanted to hear, but he was right, so we moved them into a house near us and took care of them until they died.

This was one of the hardest things I've ever done, but I can honestly say now that it is one of the greatest decisions I've ever made. God honored my obedience and gave me the grace to do the right thing, and before he passed away, my dad asked me to forgive him and he accepted Christ as his Savior.

The reward of forgiveness has far outweighed the pain I lived with for so many years. It has literally changed my life, and I firmly believe it was one of the hardest punches I could ever throw at the enemy!


Choose the Truth

The Inspiring Word

Romans 2:1-3 "ITherefore you have no excuse, O man, every one of you who judges. For in passing judgment on another you condemn yourself, because you, the judge, practice the very same things. 2 We know that the judgment of God rightly falls on those who practice such things. 3 Do you suppose, O man—you who judge those who practice



such things and yet do them yourself—that you will escape the judgment of God?" Studying this article, I discovered the story of a brilliant Christian apologist who argued so well during debates with his opponents that he reduced them to ashes, and afterward, it was said, he would dust off the spot where his adversaries had stood. That apologist reminded me of Paul in Romans chapter 2. Paul has just finished giving an indictment on all people. How long will he continue with the law and our sins before he gives us some relief? Jonathan Edwards preached one of his stirring sermons on the judgment of God and the threat of eternal damnation in hell, someone in attendance cried out, "But, Mr. Edwards, is there no mercy with God?" Edwards reminded the people that they had to wait till the following Sunday before they got that part of the message. The same is true here as we begin Romans chapter 2. If we hope to get that good news now, our hopes are in vain, because the apostle is not finished with the bad news yet. Before we get to the gospel, we must be brought before the holy standard of God's law so that we might be convicted of our need for the gospel. Paul continues his indictment of our sinfulness: Therefore, you have no excuse, O man (v. 1). In light of all that he has just spread out before us of man's rejection and suppression of God's self-revelation, which everybody knows with clarity, and in light of God's eternal power, deity, and holiness, the sins people practice is worthy of death. Yet, people not only continue to practice these sins, but they encourage others to do so. Therefore, man is without excuse in the presence of God.

Hypocrisy? Every one of you who judges, for any reason you judge another you condemn yourself; for you who judge practice the same things (v. 1). The sin of hypocrisy is in view here. Paul is chastising his kinsmen for their judgmental attitude toward the Gentiles. He is basically saying, "Who do you think you are? You condemn the Gentiles yet practice the very same things they do." That is the essence of hypocrisy. It is a particular threat to any preacher or teacher who dares to stand and correct sinners because he is also a sinner and risks the liability of condemning others for doing the very things that he does. Even though these words are addressed specifically to Jews, there is a universal application of the text. What was true for Israel is true for us today—if we condemn other people for doing the very things that we do, then, by our condemning them, we are showing our awareness of the wrongness of certain activities, and we are in effect condemning ourselves. Be sure to understand there is a difference between the sin of judging and the reality of calling out sin and God's promise to judge it.

However, we know that the judgment of God is according to truth against those who practice such things (v. 2). R.C. Sproul said "We see judgments made and verdicts rendered in courtrooms, and we ask, "Was justice really done here, or was this simply a show of a titanic struggle between able attorneys, and to the victor go the spoils?" Somewhere, amid the argument between prosecution and defense, justice can and has become lost. People are persuaded by elever arguments; as a result, justice is not always served in the courtroom or in the decisions we make in our community and church and even in our family. The one thing we can be confident in is that the just judgment of God is always according to the truth. That is what Paul is saying when he writes that the judgment of God is according to the truth. Nobody can stand before the judgment seat of God with the complaint, "That's not fair." Our consciences tell us that every last person, at some point, will be held accountable before his Creator—believer and nonbeliever alike. Even though the believer passes from condemnation, he will still have to stand before God and be judged, and that judgment will harbor no secrets. It will be perfect and accurate because it will be according to the truth.

Every time we read biblical descriptions of judgment before the presence of God, we see the human response is always silent. Every mouth is stopped. Debate is futile. The discussion is over when God renders His verdict, for we know that His judgment will be according to the truth. And do you think this, O man, you who judge those practicing such things, and doing the same, that you will escape the judgment of God? (v. 3). The deepest hope harbored in the hearts of corrupt humanity is that somehow, we will escape. As W.C. Fields lay in his hospital room on his death bed, a friend came to see him and was shocked to find Fields reading the Bible. Fields was not known for his devotion to God. When Fields's friend asked him why he was reading the Bible, Fields replied, "I'm looking for loopholes." Everyone thinks there is going to be a loophole, a way of escape from an omniscient, holy, righteous God, but there is no way to escape the judgment save through the way that the holy God has given to the world, which is the way of the cross. We do not want that way; we want to find a way to escape, yet there is none. With the image of the Cross, I will conclude June's article. I urge you to trust in the Lord Jesus Christ as your savior. Christians we cannot be too close to God's word or hold to the Cross too tightly. Until we meet again in person or in print may God bless you is my prayer. Works cited.

Freedom Life To Extend To Yancey County

"The thief cometh not, but for to steal, and to kill, and to destroy; I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly." John 10:10

Leaving incarceration often means leaving with no job, nowhere to go, no home, and no friends. Freedom includes the tough task of figuring out how to create a new life.

"You have to learn how to create a life that you don't want to escape from," said Cassie Burleson, a grateful believer in Jesus. She gives all the glory to God for her recovery. As a mother, wife, daughter, and friend, she touches lives and leads others to restore faith. She advocates for Celebrate Recovery and shares that program with women in the county jail, and now she's an advocate for Freedom Life.

"I still remember the first day I felt free. In prison, I felt free for the first time, free of the drugs and the despair," said Cassie Burleson, a member of the executive committee. "I heard the Lord whisper that now I had a second chance."

Freedom Life, a faith-based organization that helps people who have faced or are facing incarceration, eases the transition into the community by providing life direction development, fellowship, and faith opportunities.

In moments of worry, all alone, the voice of God can rise into the stillness: "Be strong and courageous. Do not fear or be in dread of them, for it is the Lord your God who goes with you. He will not leave you or forsake you." Deuteronomy 31:6

Freedom Life supplies events, mentoring, and practical daily support. The organization began in 2012 in McDowell County and now plans to extend ministry to Yancey County and Avery County. Danny Hampton, executive director of Freedom Life, worked more than 20 years in church pastoral ministry and was a prison chaplain at the Marion Correctional Institution in McDowell County.

"Freedom Life gives a second chance at life and assists with spiritual needs, housing, vehicles, and jobs while holding the individuals accountable," said Yancey County Sheriff Shane Hilliard. "It's another tool we can utilize to help our citizens battling with addiction. Freedom Life will help everybody."

Practical obstacles can feel overwhelming. Many justice-involved individuals struggle with drug problems, and in the carceral setting, it can take six, twelve, or eighteen months for the mind to clear from contamination from drugs, Burleson said. There's diarrhea, shaking, and aching. And after all, when the time comes to return to community life, sometimes it's hard to know how to create a life without drugs.

"There needs to be someone who can help when your brain lies to you, and it isn't enough to advocate for abstaining," Burleson said. "It is the most selfless love, to help people get what they need, instead of giving them what they want."

Freedom Life plans outreach that includes a youth program for children with incarcerated family members, and a pre-release plan so that people can have driver's licenses, Social Security cards, a place to live, and jobs when they walk out of incarceration, said Lauren Wright, executive administrator. They work with people who have been incarcerated within the last two years.

"God has called us to do this," Wright said. "We only have thirty volunteers now, down from 150 before Covid. We help with transportation, making doctor's appointments, and getting them to rehabilitation. We get them to where they need to go and help them navigate how to get car insurance."

"And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another-and all the more as you see the Day approaching." Hebrews 10:24-25

Almost half of all Americans have a family member who's been behind bars, according to a study by FWD.us and Cornell University, and one in seven Americans have a family member who's been incarcerated for more than a year. Families lose time together, and they also find themselves with all kinds of court fees, bail, and fines to pay.

"I have watched as Freedom Life has connected not only with individuals but with their families," stated McDowell County Sheriff Ricky T. Buchanan. "This ministry has shown that it takes more than just an individual. It takes a community to partner together to really make a sustainable difference. Sometimes it takes a plan and a dedicated partner to hold one accountable, but people can change. I do not doubt that Freedom Life will be a great community partner to Yancey County the way they have been to McDowell."

"If I had not had my family and my church, I would not be alive today," Cassie Burleson says. "I emerged a great believer in Jesus. Every day I pray. I looked into the mirror and did not recognize myself, but I heard the Lord say quietly, 'This is your chance."

Marlene's Meditations

Repetition Soothes the Soul

Isaiah 40:1 "Comfort ye, comfort ye my people, saith your God."

My friend, Michelle Medlock Adams, scattered repeated phrases throughout her little board book called, How Much Does God Love You?

During a conversation with my daughter, an elementary teacher, she helped me connect the repetition in

Isaiah 40:1 and the repetition in children's books with a simple yet profound social/emotional principle.

In her job, my daughter interacts with about 100 children every day. Sometimes, adverse childhood experiences blindside these children. (And, many of us, like them, wade through traumatic tragedies at least once in our lives.) How do teachers access trauma-informed resources?

Educational leaders encourage teachers to learn trauma-informed strategies, and books about the trauma-informed classroom abound. When I researched the books available on Amazon, there were 12 pages of book titles. Also helpful are the school counselor, behavior specialist, social worker, and exceptional children's teachers to help the classroom teacher recognize emotional issues and offer support to their students.

In addition to school specialists, blogs (internet articles) shed much light on understanding why traumatized children behave in certain ways when they need security and reassurance.

Jamie Finn, who blogs at, http://www.fosterthefamilyblog.com, answers questions about being trauma-informed. A follower asked her: Do children ask questions they know the answers to for attachment?

The answer is yes because their need to form healthy attachments includes felt needs for security and safety.

My jaw dropped. Isaiah 40:1 immediately came to mind. God repeats Himself when assuring His people. The idea of repetition presents a practical yet powerful way to reassure others of God's truths to hold us steady in the storms of life.

When life falls apart everyone needs reassurance that God will comfort us. Even though we've heard the truth a myriad of times, our souls find security and safety in repetition.

Verses like the following underscore this principle.

- 1. Psalm 23:4 "...thy rod and thy staff they comfort me."
- 2. Psalm 119:50 "This is my comfort in my affliction: for thy word hath quickened me"
- 3. Matthew 9:22 "...Daughter, be of good comfort; thy faith hath made thee whole."
- 4. 2 Corinthians 1:3 "...Blessed be God, even the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of mercies, and the God of all comfort;"

I thought of how many times God repeats the truth in the Bible and how He comforts us with these repetitions.

When we answer the same question over and over we are actually using a trauma-informed method that comforts the person we're talking to.

I encourage you to try this when you're answering someone upset. They may already know the Bible verses about Jesus being the light in their world or Jesus who is the way, the truth and the life. They (and we) just need to hear the truth again to be comforted.

A Prophetic Dream

In the early morning hours of January 20, 2019, I had a very profound and prophetic dream. I normally write my dreams down in my personal journal but on this occasion, I felt a press to publicly share what I believe the Spirit of God is trying to say to the Body of Christ in this hour. This is the first time I have publicly spoken about this dream, although



it took place four years ago, I believe it proves to be very relevant for this current time!

I dreamed that my wife and I visited a church for their morning service. At this church, they kept focusing on "building and adding on" to their current edifice, even taking part in the service to walk the congregation outside to see cleared land. I became angry at this point and said to my wife, "Let's go!" The dream then transitioned to a large church, which looked like a church I have visited before. During this service, a lot of elements were directed towards "entertainment and singing" rather than a focus on Scripture. At a point during the service, a gentleman called some of the former leaders of that ministry to the stage to honor them. One leader – whom I know personally – stood out to me among the other leaders because he had a very hurt and disappointed look on his face. It was as if what he was seeing greatly vexed his spirit. This time, my wife became angry and said to me, "I ain't got time for this!" Another transition within the dream took place, this time I was standing on a platform in front of a large crowd, proclaiming the Gospel message. I began to tell the crowd about how the church's focus has become materialism, entertainment, and "feel-good" messages rather than the truth of Scripture. While I was speaking, many (not some, but MANY) of those in the audience began to get up and leave. As they were leaving, I said to them, "Although you may get up and leave, you are still held accountable for this word!" There were only a handful of people left in the crowd and I made an appeal to them saying, "How many of you can say that if you were to die today that you would go to Heaven?" I asked them to raise their hands, and if their hands were raised, I asked them to come down. A small crowd of about 30-40 people came down to receive salvation, many of them crying and praising God. I had other individuals who were present gather the people in small groups to minister to them and to pray with them the prayer of salvation. As I began to pray with my group, I woke up from my dream still praying!

I believe the message of this dream is crystal clear. The scripture declares in 2 Timothy 4:3-4, "For the time is coming when people will not put up with sound doctrine, but having itching ears, they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own desires and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander away to myths." The Body of Christ has placed too much of her focus on building buildings, but not building and edifying people. A focus upon entertainment, events, and even songs that stir and motivate our emotions rather than glorify Christ; and sadly, a desire and appetite for "hyper-grace" motivational messages that hinge upon achievement, advancement, blessings, and prosperity rather than the unadulterated truth of the Gospel, which challenges us to become like Christ, by taking up our crosses and following Him daily! Many within the Body become angry and offended when the truth of the Word (in proper context as revealed by the Holy Spirit) is presented to them! The truth of God's Word convicts our hearts of sin, exposes us to the unconditional love of Jesus, brings about healing, transformation, and deliverance from the yokes of bondage, and compels us to share the Good News of Jesus Christ with others. The truth of God's Word properly balances the desire for achievement, advancement, and prosperity according to God's divine purpose and plan for our lives (which is to ultimately reach the lost)! The truth of God's Word tears down religious traditions and practices and challenges us to conform to the principles of the Kingdom of God that Jesus has established within our hearts! However, there is a remnant as 1 Kings 19:18 says, "...who have not bowed down to Baal and whose mouths have not kissed him." Some will hunger for the truth of God's Word and be transformed by its power to become true disciples of Jesus Christ!

Father in the name of Jesus, I pray that you would cause Holy Spirit to rise within your people, to transform us to the likeness of your dear Son so that we would no longer show the world a fragmented Jesus, but rather the Jesus revealed by holy scripture. In Jesus' name, I pray...Amen!

What is the relationship between this unhurried Christian life and the baptized imagination that enables us to experience our particular and peculiar places as bethels? Watching and waiting. We watch the world around us, with eyes wide open to the world we inhabit to develop the habit of not merely seeing but perceiving heaven on earth.



A hurried life is declaring war on time itself. It is trying to outpace time by getting things done and done quickly. But time marches forward, beating the drum of tic, toc, tic, toc, like an alarm clock waking us up to fears of failure, fears of living inefficiently and thus ineffectively. The lie believed is that "I am what I do." If I am what I do, I must do and do so efficiently. The church has believed this lie in becoming programmatic. The programmatic church is a parasitical church that sucks the nutrients from the rest of the Body. It believes people encounter God by doing and doing, not being. The parasite of programs slithers like a snake whispering the lie of justification by works. "You are what you do," it says. "You can become like God if you do more," it says. The American church believes this lie, and imbibes this lie by "plugging people in." This is how the church has waged a war against time that leaves Christians anxious, beaten up, and burnt out. We have raced time, but now we are out of breath.

So Jesus says "Blessed are those who are out of breath, for theirs is the kingdom of God." There is good news in that Jesus has come to give us mouth-to-mouth CPR. To breathe in us again. To restore our spirit by giving us His Spirit. This is what the church needs. We need to feel our loss of breath in the deep depths of the harrowing hell of hurry. We need to repent. We have had our eyes fixed on justification by works for so long. We need to slow down. We need to stop. We need to rest.

N.T. Wright writes "If the Spirit is the one who brings God's future forward into the present, worshiping in the Spirit of God who raised Jesus from the dead means standing in the overlap between heaven and earth and also at the place where past, present, and future are mysteriously held together."

We need to breathe deep the Spirit of God that raised Jesus from the dead so that we can see the heaven-earth-ness of now as the future and past piercing this present moment as we harken heaven and herald the resurrection life through the Spirit of God. How do we stand in the overlap between heaven and earth? We wait and watch.

Watching requires waiting. It requires waving the white flag of surrender on the war we have waged on time. We announce the kingdom by renouncing hurry. Rather than race time, we must inhabit time. We speak about time as though it is something we own. "I spend my time...I use my time...I have free time" as though time could be haggled, bartered, or possessed. We cannot possess time. Time possesses us. The poet Malcomb Guite uses the phrase "timelessness resounding into time." This encapsulates what the Christian life is about. The future and past pierce this moment which is a movement simultaneously within and toward eternity. How do we get in on this movement of eternity that is both now and not yet? By running the pace of the kingdom. It is a slow pace. Before Jesus announces the kingdom in pithy parables, he says

"You will be ever hearing but never understanding, you will be ever seeing but never perceiving."

We are after "listening creation into speech" as kingdom people. This requires us to listen to understand, which requires pondering. Slowly turning over each word that worms its way into our souls. Words that whittle us like wood to kindle wonder with the kindling of worry burned, buried, and carried to our roots to nourish our bones and branches, sap and marrow. The listening that Jesus is inviting us into is a listening that requires slowing down and pondering in such a way as to allow each word to seep into our soul and settle our soul by turning our worldview upside down (right side up) to view the kingdom. To view the kingdom requires a different kind of seeing. It requires perceiving. Perceiving the pied goodness that covers creation as the waters cover the seas. It requires a waiting that leads us into watching. This perception is what it means to be filled with the Spirit and stand in the overlap between heaven and earth. This perception is also what it means to stand at the place where "past, present, and future are mysteriously held together."

Our confession is "Jesus is Lord" and "there is no other name under heaven, given among men, by which we must be saved." Muslim teaching is not tolerated in the church of the Lord Jesus Christ.

— Similarly, a person is free to have whatever relationships our nation's law allows — but one is NOT free to live immorally in the church of Jesus Christ. Followers of Jesus are bound by His word, which says sexuality is to be confined within the boundaries of marriage, and between a man and a woman. To believe and practice outside that standard is not acceptable in the church. To teach and to practice what God has prohibited in the church, is to tolerate the intolerable.

The Apostle Paul wrote to the church in I Corinthians 5 and said: "It is actually reported that there is immorality among you, and immorality of such a kind as does not exist even among the Gentiles, that someone has his father's wife. (:2) You have become arrogant and have not mourned instead, so that the one who had done this deed would be removed from your midst."

The Corinthians actually boasted (:6) about how "tolerant" they were: "Why, we're so tolerant we have people living in blatant immorality among us!" Paul says this boasting is not good! He said in:2 you should remove these people from your midst. You can't blatantly break God's moral commands and still be a member in good standing of the church of the Lord Jesus Christ.

Tolerating the intolerable in the church is not a virtue. It is a sin against God. Jesus says in Revelation 2 that He will not overlook those things, but He will powerfully judge them.

Now, let's be clear: there is a difference between forgiving a sin someone has repented of and tolerating a sin when someone has no intention of repenting of it. As Christians, we should be VERY gracious to anyone who knows they have sinned and who is seeking to repent of it. Who among us has not sinned? The Bible says: "All have sinned and fall short of the glory of God." None of us are saved by how good we are. We are all only saved by the grace of God in Christ Jesus and His death on the cross for us. So as Christians, we should be the FIRST people to forgive anyone, and we should be the LAST people to ever look down on anyone who has sinned. The first step to even becoming a Christian is to admit our sin! So we can't look down on sinners!

But this is entirely different than tolerating, and even approving, blatant, immoral behavior from which a person has no intention of repenting.

And this is just what many today are demanding: that Christians accept their immoral, unbiblical behavior just as it is, in the church — and not only tolerate it, but also approve of it, and consider them to be Christians in good standing. This is exactly what Jesus says in Revelation 2 that we must never do in His church, or we will become exactly the kind of "Jezebel" that He will judge. Allowing blatant, unbiblical immorality and teaching in the church, is to tolerate the intolerable.

His Artwork in His Nature

At the beginning of this new millennium, it was a joy to teach Creation Science in both my church, for ages 5-high school, and at the large Christian School where I was a kindergarten teacher for several years. Teaching Creation Science to over 300 students at my school and 20+ at my church put me



on a journey that I still enjoy today. A radio program in the county and writing for two local newspapers let me reflect on His Word and His goodness to us all. In the very beginning of the Bible, God lays out his plans for us. The beauty of His order begins with;..." In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth!" He gave us seven days weeks from the first chapter of Genesis. Each of the first six days was significant in His progression of creating the heavens and the earth. In all of His creation, there is beauty. I call His artwork, because of the weaving in and out of the skies and universe, the planets, a sun, and a moon, all to keep us in loving control! Yom is the Hebrew word for a twenty-four day. It always has been and will be until the new heaven and the new earth.

His artwork is evident everywhere from the deserts to the highest mountains, in the lakes, rivers, seas, and outer limits of the universe. The stars have a very interesting pattern as twelve houses in the sky travel around the earth. There are many constellations and we have eight planets that circle the sun with us and a tiny one that is considered a swarf planet-Pluto. In the northern hemisphere, these twelve houses have stars that are the story of our world. The lion, called Leo, represents the Lord, a group called Virgo for the Virgin Mary, and Capricorn is called The Goat, mentioned in The Old Testament as a scapegoat. Ursa Major is also called The Bear of The Big Dipper.

The six-sided snowflake is never duplicated. Each one has its own design within those six sides. Can you imagine all the snowflakes sent from God's warehouse to the earth for millennia? Other interesting natural occurrences in His Artwork include Star Fish. Their five arms stretched out resemble the basic star pattern used when creating a simple star.

The seas have other representations of His pattern and design. Baby's Foor, is a small, off-white, with light pink in the middle of it. There is a tiny pale foot shape in it as well. They are so fun to find among the beaches of the Gulf of Mexico. Whale kind each have a different blow from the top of their heads to designate what they are! Sand Dollars are a 4" wide lazy circle, white, that when carefully broken open has 5 small-like shapes inside. They are separate, not stuck together. The pattern is obvious in all of his Creations. No matter what part of the world you live in, they will be found because He loves giving us His presents!

Rocks are mentioned in the Bible. In Job, God shares His love of His jewels hidden inside the earth. Crystals, including diamonds, amethyst, and rubies are just a few examples of the jewels beneath the earth that God loves. Rocks are so unusual as well. When my husband and I first moved here, we found heart-shaped rocks all over our property. Some were very large; most were less than an inch wide. Children delighted in them. What a present to receive from our Lord when moving into a new place.

Trees are very informative. When sliced to create a circle, there are rings found inside most of them. The rings can be added up for age, drought, and fire can also be written within their history. 

Eternal Life

The most famous verse in the Bible is probably John 3:16. We see this verse posted on billboards and signs at large sporting events. But many people, even in the church, do not understand what it really means.

John 3:16 says, "For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life."



What does this mean? Does this mean that if we receive Christ, we will never die? Obviously, we know this is not the case. Even the great Apostle Paul died a physical death. Besides that, Hebrews 9:27 says, "And it is appointed for men to die once, but after this the judgment ..." Unless we experience the rapture of the church, we will all die eventually.

So, what does "everlasting life" or "eternal life" mean? If you remember, in the Garden of Eden before Adam and Eve sinned, they were eternal, meaning they would live forever. They would still be around today if it was not for the fall. There was no such thing as death. Death was not a part of God's original design and plan. God told Adam that if he ate of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, he would surely die. When Adam and Eve disobeyed God by eating from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, they stopped being eternal. Death entered them, and they started to die physically. It took many years, but they gradually died. Eternal life was gone. Adam and Eve actually experienced two deaths. They physically died over time, and they spiritually died instantly. When they ate from the wrong tree, sin, and death entered the world and would impact every person who would ever live.

Not only did Adam and Eve die physically and spiritually, but they gave their dominion and authority over the earth to the devil. When they ate, all authority they had received from God was transferred to the devil. We can see this in Luke 4:5-6, "Then the devil, taking Him up on a high mountain, showed Him all the kingdoms of the world in a moment of time. And the devil said to Him, "All this authority I will give You, and their glory; for this has been delivered to me, and I give it to whomever I wish ..." All authority that belonged to Adam and Eve was delivered over to Satan when Adam and Eve disobeyed God and obeyed the devil.

Now, if you remember, the Tree of Life was another tree in the Garden of Eden. The Tree of Life is a type of Christ. When God removed Adam and Eve from the Garden, He placed an angel to block the way back to the Garden and eternal life. This was actually an act of mercy because God did not want them to eat from the Tree of Life and live forever in their fallen, sinful condition. Death was, in fact, an act of mercy until sin could be officially taken care of.

John 3:16 reintroduces the thought of everlasting life that has been forgotten about since the days in the Garden. But what is everlasting life, and when does it begin? Does it begin after we receive Christ or after we die? To answer this question, let's first define "eternal life." Jesus said in John 17:3, "And this is eternal life, that they may know You, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom You have sent." Eternal life is not living forever on this earth, or even in heaven. Real eternal life is knowing the only true God and His Son, Jesus Christ. This is not a "knowing" like you would know of a famous person or having intellectual knowledge of something. This is knowing in the way Adam knew his wife (see Genesis 4:1). This is an intimate knowledge of Father God and Jesus Christ. We now have the privilege of intimately knowing God.

So, when does eternal life begin? Is it after we go to heaven or right now? According to John 3:16, when we believe in Christ, we receive eternal life. Eternal life is knowing God. Since Jesus paid the penalty for sin, those who have faith in Him for their salvation have eternal life. Life begins the moment we place our faith in Christ. We read in 1 John 5:11-12, "And this is the testimony: that God has given us eternal life, and this life is in His Son. He who has the Son has life; he who does not have the Son of God does not have life."

Praise the Lord! Christ died not only to forgive us of our sins but to bring us back to the Tree of Life, back to the place of intimate fellowship and relationship with Him, back to the original place where there is no death but only life in Him.



Worthless Words

For most of our history, the foundations of the American education system were straightforward. We learned to add, subtract, multiply, and divide. We were



encouraged to think clearly and logically. We were exposed to fundamental concepts in several sciences including biology, physics, and mechanics. We were introduced to world history with special emphasis on American history. Most importantly, we were expected to master proper use of the English language. The goal of this educational paradigm was to produce "good citizens."

We have no shared understanding of "citizenship." Those still interested in the concept refer to behaviors including voting, paying taxes, donating blood, displaying the flag, and reciting the pledge of allegiance. One of the classic expectations of a "good citizen" is willingness and ability to be a net contributor to society. Teddy Roosevelt spoke of "pulling one's own weight" while "respecting the rights of others."

Actions are important, but with the perspective of age, I more than ever view citizenship—good or bad—as the inevitable expression of core convictions. People who think life is meaningless, or that they are owed reparation because they belong to a particular group, or that God or "fate" has cheated them, are not likely to devote themselves to the notion of "the greater good." On the other hand, those who are grateful for their existence and grounded in what we have long understood to be "morality" will probably behave in ways that support strong families and communities. For at least 1500 years, the building blocks of both morality and sound social structure in Western Civilization have been gleaned from Judeo/Christian tradition.

But times change. Nothing I have said to this point any longer applies to "American life." Over the course of an astonishingly few years, traditional educational goals, traditional morality, and long accepted standards of citizenship have been discarded. In their place we find a revolting mishmash of perverse, self indulgence; idolatrous, pagan worship practice; repudiation of constitutional liberties and responsibilities; and the aggrandizement of hatred. I am not alone in believing that this wholesale erasure of every value which long defined what it means to be an American is rooted in "spiritual wickedness in high places." We are face to face with the unmistakable agenda of one who was long ago labeled the "father of lies."

My opinion on "how" our society has been so quickly corrupted is less widely supported. I am convinced that we fell to the rapid onslaught of depravity partly because we failed to achieve one of those traditional, educational goals. We did not devote ourselves to mastering proper use of the English language.

In proper English, words have meaning. Those skilled in the language will always be able to define "man" or "woman." They will recognize the value of "innocence of youth." They will understand essential concepts such as "freedom of speech" and "right to bear arms." They will know that people who do not share their opinions are not necessarily "racists." Those who use the language properly will never claim that certain ideas or political candidates should be suppressed because they would be "bad for democracy." Proper use of the language promotes public discourse. Wholesale censorship replaces language skill with universal suspicion.

Proper English facilitates the awareness that unnecessary words obscure or subvert effective communication. I was taught by masters of the language that any word which does not expand or clarify one's point should be dropped. As example, I offer one of the most common sentence structures in modern English: "What I'm gonna do is I'm gonna paint the house." To what purpose is the phrase, "what I'm gonna do is?" Those words are redundant and obfuscating. The sentence should read, "I'm going to paint the house."

One of the earliest and best examples of unnecessary words used to dismantle effective communication is found early in the Bible. In Genesis 2:16-17 God says to Adam, "You may surely eat of every tree of the garden, but of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil you shall not eat, for in the day that you eat of it you shall surely die." A few verses later we read, "But the serpent said to the woman, 'You will not surely die. For God knows that when you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil." The serpent established his argument on half truths. He twisted God's words in ways which caused doubt and led to disobedience.

Adam and Eve did not cease breathing the moment they disobeyed, but they embraced the inevitable conclusion of entropy. They learned the difference between good and evil, but that knowledge came at an unimaginable and unpayable cost. We should not be surprised that the father of lies is still a liar. He told Eve exactly what it took to make her suspect that she was missing out on something important. He tells each of us those same lies. He is the master of using worthless words to encourage worthless actions.

Through His Holy Word, God always tells us exactly what we need to know. Exodus 31:13 is a prime example. The Hebrew text says, "Above all you shall keep my Sabbaths for this is a sign between you and me throughout your generations." Many modern believers prefer to follow manmade traditions rather than God's clear teaching. They obscure God's Word with worthless words including "just for the Jews" or "nailed to the cross" or "the Lord's day." Similarly, Jesus told us in Matthew 5:17 that He came to demonstrate perfect obedience to the Law and the Prophets. Many believers insist that He said He came to abolish the Law.

Worthless words are only useful for hiding truth or promoting lies. Anyone who is interested in recognizing and proclaiming truth should learn the subtleties of proper English. Not all of us need to be students of Hebrew or Greek, but every believer should learn to recognize word fraud.

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A Jealous God?

In Exodus chapter 20 we read of God divinely revealing the Ten Commandments to Moses on Mount Sinai. In verses 4-6, the third commandment is stated, "You shall not make for yourself a carved image, or any likeness of anything that is in heaven above, or that is in the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth. You shall not bow down to them or serve them, for I the LORD your God am a jealous God, visit-



ing the iniquity of the fathers on the children to the third and the fourth generation of those who hate me, but showing steadfast love to thousands of those who love me and keep my commandments" (English Standard Version).

In common usage, jealous is not a virtue and God being jealous is a concept that is difficult for some. The Hebrew word used for jealous in this instance is ka-nah. This Hebrew word is translated as simply "jealous." Logos Bible software adds a "sense" to the definition of this word as, "fiercely protective and unaccepting of disloyalty."

Looking at the English language definition of the word jealous we have, "1. Hostile toward a rival or one believed to enjoy an advantage, 2. Intolerant of rivalry or unfaithfulness, 3. Disposed to suspect rivalry or unfaithfulness, 4. Vigilant in guarding a possession" (Webster's Dictionary).

God is jealous in that He is intolerant of rivalry – there is no true rival to God. God commands our complete loyalty as there is no competitor. He is also jealous in that He is vigilant in guarding a possession – that possession being His chosen people. God has great energy and enthusiasm toward mankind worshiping Him only, not fake, phony, or impure idols of any kind. God is enthusiastic about us doing right!

To paraphrase verse 5 (1st half), "You shall not worship them or serve them; for I the LORD your God am a jealous God, vigilant in guarding my people, fiercely protective of them. I have great energy and enthusiasm in pursuit of their righteous behavior and salvation, and that they worship me only."

God, thank you for being a jealous God. Thank you for giving us a set of instructions that lead to peace and happiness in the pages of the Bible. Thank you for giving us insight into your truth. Thank you for your grace and mercy. Thank you that you will protect us from the evil one. Thank you for sharing your Holy Spirit with us so that we can have the power to do right and resist evil. Thank you for being vigilant in guarding your possession – your people.


Second Half of Exodus 20:5

Another question some have with this verse arises with its second half, "Visiting the iniquity of the fathers on the children to the third and fourth generations of those who hate Me, but showing lovingkindness to thousands of those who love me and keep my commandments."

At first glance, this sentence sounds kind of harsh and to be in contradiction with other passages in the Bible such as Ezekiel 18:20 which says, "The soul who sins shall die. The son shall not suffer for the iniquity of the father, nor the father suffer for the iniquity of the son. The righteousness of the righteous shall be upon himself, and the wickedness of the wicked shall be upon himself." The seeming discrepancy here will be the subject of next month's writing.

"Leading The Way"

Deuteronomy 6:7 "And thou shalt teach them diligently unto thy children, and shalt talk of them when thou sittest in thine house, and when thou walkest by the way, and when

thou liest down, and when thou risest up."

This month we will celebrate Father's Day; a time to remember and celebrate all that our fathers are, and all that

they contribute to our lives. If you did not grow up with a father in the home, then perhaps you had a male role model such as a special uncle or grandfather, or someone who set an example for you to follow. This godly influence is needed now more than ever in our society. We are in desperate need of young fathers who will set an example for their families and lead the way for them to follow. In our text above, we find that Moses had already received the commandments from God in the previous chapter and had given the children of Israel instructions in v.32-33 to walk in the ways of the Lord. Now in chapter six, Moses not only exhorts the people to hear and obey God but also to pass these truths along to their children. These men of Israel were not only to tell but to be an example and show their children the ways of God. It was their job to lead the way!

We notice the word "diligently" in the verse above and understand that if we are going to lead the way for our families, it will involve a CHALLENGE. Moses lets them know that they are to teach them diligently... conscientiously, thoroughly, attentively, carefully, and persistently. This was not to be done half-heartedly or recklessly but was to be treated as a matter of importance! We should take time and seriously consider how much diligence we are using when we teach our children about the ways of the Lord. After all, we are earnest about many other things that we teach them such as sports... school... friendships... jobs... education... hobbies, and other interests. But do we promote this same diligence to the Word of God? Can our children quote and apply Scripture and use it to distinguish right from wrong? This world is teaching them 24/7... about themselves, family, the government, Creation, and their definition of God. They are certainly being diligent... but are we? This is not something that we can take lightly or minimize the importance of in our daily lives. Moses knew that there would be a challenge for these families in seeking and following the Lord and that they would need someone to lead the way... and we still need that today!

Not only is there a CHALLENGE involved, but there should be a CONSIS-TENCY involved in leading the way for our families. Moses exhorted them to lead the way in the house and the "way", and to do so when awake and even when asleep. The first two verses of this passage name the commands, statutes, and judgments of God as being the subject of this training so that they might fear the Lord and have a full and long life. Most parents will agree that leading the way consistently is a true challenge! When we speak of consistency, it does not mean that every parent will parent the same way, but rather have the same goal in what we are teaching our children and leading them in the ways of God.

In what ways are you teaching and leading your children? Proverbs 22:6 reminds us to "*Train up a child in the way he should go: and when he is old, he will not depart from it.*" This simple verse reminds us that there is only one way that we should be leading our children and families, and that is the way to salvation. The training of a child should be "upward", and we should always do things that will point them toward the things of God. Beyond telling them what is right and wrong...we need to show them. This example that they put forth was to be continuous and eternal. Their lives were meant to be a legacy to tell their children. Fathers... men... parents... are we setting a challenging and consistent pattern of godliness for our children to follow... Are we leading the way?





Hebrews 10:14 "For by one offering he hath perfected for ever them that are sanctified."



His goal has always been to make us complete, or one with Him and the Father, and He was willing to bear our griefs and carry our sorrows (Isaiah 53:4-5) as a way to make us complete in Him. You can't get any more perfect (complete) than God. Adam and Eve initially started in a perfect state finding their completion in the One that created them in His own image (Genesis 1:26). They lost that perfection when they disobeyed God and passed that same incomplete image down to all mankind, but God had a plan in place already for our redemption and restoration to that perfect state when we turn to Him in simple child-like faith and receive His Son as our Savior (Revelation13:8).

The definition of "creature" in 2nd Corinthians 5:17 means "original formation" and also "(through the idea of the proprietorship of the manufacturer); to fabricate, that is, found (form originally): - create, Creator, make."

Praise God, He recreates us into the image of His Son, Hallelujah, Hallelujah, Hallelujah! I'm far from perfect but I discovered the perfect love of my Heavenly Father when, in simple childlike faith, I received His precious Son as my Savior and when I did He perfected me forever. We are perfect in our Daddy's eyes!

Five times in John 17:21-23 He uses the word "one." Just hours before Judas betrayed Him Jesus was praying for us that we might be one, that we might be made perfect with Him and the Father.

God the Father gave His One and only Son that we might be made one with them, no more separation because of our sin but a sweet oneness, completion with Almighty God. When our Savior died He won back for us what Satan stole from Adam and Eve, their completeness with the Father.

Should we give Him our best? Absolutely, or better yet we should follow His instruction in Romans 12:1 and give Him ourselves and allow Him to bring out His very best through us (Galatians 2:20).

I've heard it said, "We should strive for perfection, we will never attain it, but we should strive for it." Misguided thinking like that can lead us into the bondage of perfectionism that can rob us of the freedom that has already been won for us. Perfectionism creates the "paralysis of analysis," and can destroy our closest relationships. His Word commands us to "be perfect," (Matthew 5:48) not strive for it, He then fulfills His own command to us by declaring us "perfected forever" the moment we receive His Son as our Savior (Hebrews 10:14). He does for us what we cannot do for ourselves, so why not learn to rest in Him and allow Him to accomplish through us what His heart desires for us (Galatians 2:20).

One hot summer day while my son and I were trout fishing our Father taught me a valuable lesson about resting in Him. The day started out with comfortable temperatures but as the day progressed so did the heat as it rose well into the nineties. We found a still pool of water away from the current of the river and when we simply laid down it met the need for relief from the heat that we so desperately needed. Then I realized, we were already standing in the source of our relief, all we had to do was lie down in it and enjoy the refreshing rest from the heat. Jesus so lovingly tells us in Matthew 11:28-30 if we find ourselves laboring, striving, just come to Him and He will give us rest. He is our source, when we have Him we have everything we need.

Try to live perfectly and endure all the frustration that brings to ourselves and others, or receive the promise that we are "perfected forever" and live in the wonder and the grace of the One that declared that promise over us, realizing how deeply He loves us.

My dear friend Rick told me he thought the "perfect love" mentioned in this scripture was all about that simple faith and love of a child. Our children love us

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unconditionally and aren't afraid to approach us about anything. As I considered that I realized that type of faith is so rooted in the love of Almighty God that we should not hesitate to approach Him about anything and believe that He will meet any need that we bring to Him, a faith that recognizes that our Daddy can do anything, and so can we (Philippians 4:13 "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me").

Many years ago, while playing with my son and his friends in our yard, I decided to participate in a ramp jumping contest the boys had started. They built the ramp out of a cinder block and a piece of plywood and were jumping their bicycles over it. I made the tragic mistake of saying "I can do that," so I straddled that twenty-inch bicycle with my six-foot-three frame, and off I went. I peddled up to my neighbor's drive, and even told my neighbor and her sister-in-law "Watch this," (we males never get over trying to impress the ladies). I quickly formulated what I thought was a good plan that in my mind consisted of building up all the speed I could, hitting the ramp dead center, sailing over it, and landing. I was standing up on the pedals of that bike and the last thing I remember before the ambulance came was hitting the ramp dead center. The next thing to hit was the front tire, and subsequently the right side of my forehead. After the impact, I slid on the right side of my face in the pea gravel that our street was made of.

Later on in the ER, the doctor picked gravel out of my wounds for thirty minutes before he could stitch me up and while he was working on me he said "Mr. Henry, if you decide to have plastic surgery you might want to get it done in the next six months." I thought to myself "What kind of mess have I made of myself."

Becky even told me that in the dim light of the hospital room, I looked like Freddie Krueger. If you can imagine raw hamburger meat that is what the right side of my face looked like.

When I got home the next day our pastor came by to check on me and I told him I wouldn't be attending church on Sunday for fear of scaring the kids. He told the congregation that he saw me and it scared him.

My daughter Jessica was about four at the time and when she came home from her grandparents the next day I asked Becky to prepare her for what she was about to see. When Jess came into the room she looked at me and in the sweet tone of a four-year-old she said "Hey Daddy," and crawled up in my arms as if nothing was wrong or out of the ordinary. She just loved her Daddy and wanted to be with him. Joy flooded this Daddy's heart when he realized his little girl was not afraid of him, no matter how he looked.

I share this story for those of you that didn't have that loving relationship with your earthly father, for those of you that are still tormented by excessive punishment that was inflicted upon you, and maybe are projecting the image of that scary, imperfect father onto your heavenly Father, a Father that just wants to show you His unconditional love and grace. Please, let me encourage you to study the scriptures to discover who He really is and allow Him to perfect your love for Him until you can crawl up in His lap like a little child, and permit Him to lavish His love on you. It will make His day and yours too.

Here are a couple of scriptures that will help you on your journey.

Matthew 11:28-30 "Come to Me all you who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take My yoke on you and learn of Me, for I am meek and lowly in heart, and you shall find rest to your souls. For My yoke is easy, and My burden is light."

1 Peter 5:6-7 "Humble yourselves therefore under the mighty hand of God, that He may exalt you in due time: Casting all your care upon Him; for He cares for you."

According to Oxford Languages Dictionary, kindness is being friendly, generous, or considerate. Kindness is one of the fruits of the spirit. Did you know there is an animal that shows extreme kindness? This animal is kind to the senior

citizens that live in its group, called a pod. They also take care of the injured, sick, and young in their group. Most of the time their pod consists of members of their family of no more than fifteen. Most of all, they are kind to those that are not in their family. They love to play with each other and even people. This compassionate animal has been known to rescue humans from sharks and has helped stranded or lost whales get back to sea. Of course, you should still take precautions around this animal or any animal because they are wild and can still hurt you. Do you know what this animal is?

Dolphins! Dolphins rank second place as the friendliest, most caring, and most intelligent animal. The first place is humans.

Did you know that dolphins are mammals like us? Do you know what a mammal is? A mammal is an animal that has a spine, is warm-blooded, has hair, gives live births, and feeds their babies with milk. Yes, even dolphins have a few wild hairs on their face that quickly fall out when they are born.

Dolphins are incredible swimmers. They can reach speeds of 20mph and are able to dive to 1000 feet. Our lungs have only one layer of capillaries for holding oxygen while dolphins have two layers. Their lungs enable them to hold their breath underwater for as much as 15 min-



utes. On average, a person can hold their breath underwater for up to 2 minutes. However, Budimr Sobat holds the world record at a whopping 24 minutes and 37 seconds!

Dolphins are team players. They will work together when hunting for food. Sometimes they will even pair up with other pods to capture a meal.

Baby dolphins are usually two to seven feet long and will stay with their mother or grandmother for up to six years.

Most dolphins are gray or dark gray and have smooth rubbery skin. Except for killer whales which are black and white. Yes, killer whales are in the dolphin family.

The epidermis layer of skin is very thick and constantly peels off just like ours. This layer is up to 20 times thicker than other animals. Even though their skin is so thick it is very delicate and easily damaged. But thankfully it heals very quickly from injury. Dolphins do not have sweat glands like we do.

Dolphins are carnivores and eat fish, squid, octopus, crustaceans, cephalopods, and other marine life. They have two stomachs. One is used for food digestion and the other one is used for food storage. Their teeth are only used for catching their food. They then swallow it whole.

The average length of a dolphin is 8 ft however the smallest dolphin is three feet long while the largest dolphin is 30 feet long.

The average lifespan of these gentle creatures is 17 years, but some have lived up to 50.

Dolphins have large brains. When they sleep only half of their brain sleeps. The other half stays awake. This keeps them breathing and safe while they are asleep.

We can learn from these kindhearted creatures. What are some examples of kindness you have shown to others?

It is important that we also take care of the injured, sick, widowed, orphans, and senior citizens in our life or community. In fact, God wants us to do these things. He also wants us to take care of the needy and poor.

If there was one word to describe Jesus it would be He was kind. Can you think of examples of how Jesus was kind to others? Jesus purposely sought out the less fortunate, even when he was exhausted. When Jesus was on the cross, he prayed to God and asked Him to forgive and spare the lives of the people who had hurt Him, and who were going to ultimately kill Him. Jesus was the perfect example of kindness when He was here, and He still shows kindness today! No matter what you have done or are going to do, He will forgive you. All you must do is repent. In His eyes, all sin is the same.

"The Lord is righteous in all his ways and kind in all his work." Psalm 145:17

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

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

Last year our church had its first-ever "Harvest Party" event on October 31. After announcing the event a few times during our church service, a couple of people expressed concern that we were doing a church event on October 31st. They were afraid we were endorsing Halloween and celebrating that holiday.



I appreciated people sharing their concerns with me because it meant I had poorly communicated the purpose of us starting that annual event. As a result, I started telling those people and our church that we were doing a Harvest Party on October 31st as a way to engage our community. It was a way to have families come to our church so we could get to know those living nearby our church. While it often is hard to invite people to attend our church, doing an event on October 31st where we organize games and give away candy to kids was a way to have people come to our church.

The apostle Paul modeled this "engagement" of the community around him as described in 1 Corinthians 9:19-22, "For though I am free from all men, I have made myself a slave to all, so that I may win more. To the Jews I became as a Jew, so that I might win Jews; to those who are under the Law, as under the Law though not being myself under the Law, so that I might win those who are under the Law; to those who are without law, as without law, though not being without the law of God but under the law of Christ, so that I might win those who are without law. To the weak I became weak, that I might win the weak; I have become all things to all men, so that I may by all means save some." (NASB)

The apostle Paul traveled more than 3,000 miles by foot and boat to share the gospel with anyone he could get an audience with. He went to Jewish synagogues, he went out to people on the river (Acts 16), and he discussed religion with the philosophers (Acts 17).

Paul used people's cultures and backgrounds as an entry point to talk with them about the gospel. He used their history and culture to draw those people into a relationship with God. And that same principle that Paul used for ministry can be used by us today. We can take national holidays or local events and use them as entry points to draw people close to God.

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


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

Facing Fear In Marriage

"Search me, O God, and know my heart: try me, and know my thoughts:" Psalm 139:23

When we cannot understand ourselves or comprehend our feelings, God invites us to take our internal struggles to Him and ask Him for insight. He understands what we do not and

knows what to do when we don't. For better or for worse, Marriage. Will you get out of your marriage all you hoped it would be? If you wake up one day and realize the reason you got married has forever been taken away from you, can your marriage survive that? Yes, with faith, it can.

We live in a world where physical, relational, financial, emotional, and healthrelated situations are inevitable. When any one of these or other circumstances arise in a marriage it can take time to accept the situation. Usually, one spouse will deny it while the other worries and is preoccupied with the reality of the situation. This stems from the fear of the outcome. Fear unaddressed can cause any number of secondary emotions. Facing issues like these in marriage takes a high degree of learning to adjust to meet the needs of the couple, focusing on the 'how' of personalized learning. It is an active process in which spouses define themselves to each other. It requires the risk of being open to growth and being honest not only with your spouse but also with yourself. It is a way of thinking and learning in your relationship taking in the content of the issue, its impact within the marriage, defining your fears, how to process the situation in reality, being accountable for actions, and learning to survive the environment within the marriage. This is being able to set appropriate personal boundaries and the process of development from the simple relationship to the more complex issues arising in marriage without feeling guilt or shame. You must be willing to understand and bear your spouse's frustration and disappointments without making it about you - even though it feels like it has everything to do with you.

Couples need to deal with their fears openly because fear unaddressed becomes a relational sore in a marriage. Facing your fears in marriage and talking about those fears is helping your spouse understand you so the two of you can face your situations and disappointments together. Denying your fears doesn't make them go away! Take a reality check; if you need some encouragement, draw on Spiritual resources. This is a key principle for facing the moment when your marriage dreams seem beyond reach. One spouse needs to face reality in situations that affect the marriage and one spouse will need to embrace their hope and faith.

Christian transformation: "And be not conformed to this world: but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God" (Romans 12:2). Many people accept Jesus Christ as their Savior and never learn how to live a life that honors Him. In full trust and worship, we commit to obeying Him, knowing that the Lord knows how to best lead you – no matter what the circumstances. Transformation begins with our thinking and with consciences that are committed to listening to and obeying God. We do not merely try hard to sin less. Our minds are renewed as we study His Word, and our hearts are changed as we submit to Him. We learn to depend upon Him, observe His commands, and trust Him to mold us into people who discover how awesome it is to live in the center of God's Will because it is life at its very best – and there is nothing in this world that compares to it.

To face your own disappointments, you need to be enlightened. You need the courage of David to pray: "Search me, O God, and know my heart: try me, and know my thoughts: And see if there be any wicked way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting" (Psalm 139:23-24). You need to seek the truth, not just believe the truth, because God needs to show you what lies hidden. In life's disappointments, if faced with the proper attitude, couples will be prompted into reevaluating who they are, who their spouse is, what God offers, and what they actually need to grasp reality and redirect the situation of circumstances of the marriage into something good and becoming a witness to God's truths in life. The Christian practice of surrender is the humble acknowledgment that life is about conceding to and accepting God's agenda and Will over your own. After you reset your own expectations, you need to reset the expectations you have for your marriage. To get to the place of surrender, you need divine intervention: God's Grace.

If you want to be strong, you must glory in your weakness. Brokenness is God's requirement for maximum usefulness. This is because it is when you are truly helpless and without resources that you must count on God's provision. His power enables you to triumph, and all the glory belongs to Him. If you want to drive the pride from your character, embrace the hardships and struggles that God allows into your life. The Lord's loving-kindness is more than sufficient to help you when you're at your weakest. This is where pride cannot survive – and you are genuinely able to receive God's Grace. (Reference 2 Corinthians 12:9-10).

God cares for those who trust in Him. "The Lord is good, a strong hold in the day of trouble; and He knoweth them that trust in Him" (Nahum 1:7).

Freedom Life

Freedom Life Ministries Reentry Intensive Program Success Story

Freedom Life Ministries (FLM)—a faith-based, rural organization in Marion, North Carolina—is supporting reentry initiatives and helping individuals who are involved with the justice system successfully reintegrate into their communities. Reverend Danny Hampton, Executive Director of FLM and chaplain for the Marion Correctional




Institution State Prison, works with a large population of individuals who are incarcerated, as well as those referred by probation and parole officers. In collaboration with local organizations and agencies, FLM provides evidence-based programming to individuals preparing for reentry. The program's objectives are to provide necessities (e.g., food, clothing, housing resources), support services, mentorship, and life skills to prevent recidivism.

Unfortunately, when the COVID-19 pandemic hit, Rev. Hampton no longer had access to the jails or prisons. Similarly, recruiting recently reentered participants into the community also proved challenging because probation and parole offices were limited in operational capacity and suffered staffing shortages due to COVID-19. Despite these challenges, program leaders worked with their Second Chance Act technical assistance coach to find solutions to increase enrollment and ensure participants could access resources and support services. For example, FLM collaborated with the Sheriff's Department in McDowell County to meet virtually with pre-release residents within the jail. Staff also kept their doors open to meet faceto-face with community participants while observing COVID-19 safety protocols. FLM's willingness to adapt program implementation helped them achieve program objectives and impact the lives of participants in McDowell County positively. "Never lose sight of why you do what you do. Program participants are not just numbers-they are people who matter ... The program process should never determine participant value and potential; the value and potential of the participant should determine the program process."

Lessons Learned

FLM staff believe a strong, faith-based orientation bolsters the belief that the lives of men and women impacted by the justice system matter deeply. Grounded in their faith, FLM staff is committed to doing everything possible to support the men and women who are involved in the justice system, despite obstacles like COVID-19.

What worked?

Treating participants with value, respect, and individuality, and having a systematic process for identifying individual needs and effective case planning

Building consistency and flexibility into program engagement

Balancing goals with flexibility during program implementation

Planning, in collaboration with the Second Chance Act technical assistance coach, around community engagement and adapting curricula

- Connecting program participants to community resources to create a robust community networking and support process
- Implementing Motivational Interviewing with prerelease individuals, resulting in an immediate, significant increase in program enrollment and engagement among those referred from probation and parole officers

What did not work?

Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, FLM could not recruit and train the full number of mentors needed to be effective in providing participant support, which hindered program potential. Case managers were required to play a dual role of case manager and mentor, which created stress on the case managers and program process and impacted their effectiveness.

What's next?

FLM will continue to work with local agencies, organizations, and stakeholders to coordinate reentry services. FLM has grown substantially in financial capacity and sustainability. The program currently has multiple funding streams and is continuing to cultivate new financial growth, sustainability, and capacity. It plans to expand the pre-release jail engagement to include additional counties and fund a community liaison to help bridge gaps, engage, and more effectively serve Black and Latinx populations and increase outcomes related to racial equity within reentry.

Be-attitudes: Peacemakers.

During the Korean conflict, a chaplain crawled through enemy fire to care for a seriously wounded soldier. The chaplain dampened his handkerchief, wiped the man's face, gave him water, held his hand, talked, prayed, and waited with him until the medics arrived. "Sir," the soldier asked, "Are you a follower



of Jesus?" "I try," replied the chaplain, "but sometimes I fail." After a few silent moments, the soldier said, "I'm not a Christian, but if following Jesus makes you do what you've done for me, then I want to follow Him too."

There are a lot of problems in this world, wouldn't you agree? Wars are raging and have been raging since the dawn of mankind. Fear, hatred, hostility, ill will, and ill feelings abound! Nations stand against nations and family members against one another. People bow up against anyone and everyone who disagrees with them or makes them feel threatened. And it really doesn't matter who is in the White House or controls Congress—the political fighting never ceases. War, conflict, hatred, and hostilities continue over and over with never an end in sight. Even church members find themselves pitted one against another. And perhaps that is one of the greatest tragedies—for the Word of God insists that followers of Christ must "not love with word or with tongue, but in deed and truth" (1 John 3:18) and that the world will know us by our love.

In such a world of conflict, no one comes out unscathed. All experience the trauma and the wounds of conflict and war. Sin, selfishness, and pride produce such pain and devastation. Truly, all are left with gaping and serious wounds. And amid such horror and travesty—our world needs some peacemakers. Our world, our nation, our community, and God's church needs some of Jesus' kids who are willing to crawl through whatever threat or danger exists to wipe the face of a wounded stranger, give him/her water, talk with, pray with, and stay with them until help comes. "My help comes from the Lord," David wrote in Psalm 121:2, "Who made the heaven and the earth."

None of the world's problems are new, of course! Our fallen world has been shattered under the weight of sin—and that has produced hatred, animosity, and contempt. The world's solution to the conflict is usually to remove the source or the cause of the problem. But the world's only real solution is God's offer of Jesus! Jesus offered the only solution to mankind's mortal threat of death. He came and died! He left His home in glory and took upon Himself the flesh of humanity. He lived as fully God and fully man—and then He gave His life as a sacrifice or ransom for our sins. He rose victoriously alive from a brutal, horrifying physical

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death. And when He did, He proved Almighty and Eternal God's power over both sin and death. Having secured your forgiveness and redemption, Jesus offered you and me new life—new life in Christ.

Jesus declared (Matthew 5:9), "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God." Do you hear the Savior's call? To a world broken and shattered by evil and hatred, Jesus calls forth His children to be peacemakers. Peacemaking can only truly be successful when we place our eyes on the Lord—for apart from God, peacemaking doesn't work! Apart from God, nothing works! N.T. Write said, "When God wants to create peace, He doesn't send tanks, He sends the meek." Rick Love (Peace Catalysts: Resolving Conflict in our Families, Organizations, and Communities) noted that unfortunately, "Well-meaning Christians sometimes push back on such a statement by quoting Jesus' statement from Matthew 10:34-36. Jesus said, "Do not think that I came to bring peace on the earth; I did not come to bring peace, but a sword. For I came to turn a man against his father, and a daughter against her mother, and a daughter-in-law against her mother-in-law; and a person's enemies will be the members of his household."

We must be careful not to misinterpret and then misuse Jesus' words here! Jesus doesn't bring evil and conflict into the earth! Mankind brought this upon themselves through sin. Christ, the sinless One, did not come to cause harm or create evil, pain, suffering, or wounds! He didn't bring a sword to the battle—He brought Himself! He came to bring eternal life and salvation. So, what the Lord is actually declaring here was that His actual coming (incarnation) into this world would create the kind of an effect where "a man would turn against his father, a daughter against her mother," etc. Amid that kind of carnage, the Lord came to bring peace to a world that was devoid of peace. He came to bring love to people who were empty of love, care, or compassion.

Please don't miss the rest of Jesus' message from Matthew 10:37-42, which holds the key to understanding His plan for bringing peace. To paraphrase: our Savior warned humanity, "Unless you take up your cross and follow Me, unless you lose your life for My sake, and unless you are willing to humble yourself and give a cup of cold water to the dregs of society or even to the littlest ones, you will not taste of the great rewards of heaven." Herein is the command! Deny self, follow Me! Deny self, follow My way! Deny self and live out my love before all men. The Psalmist urged on behalf of God, "Seek peace and pursue it" (Psalms 34). Robert Kopp claims, "But seeking peace apart from God is absolute lunacy. And that's what is happening in our homes, churches, communities, country, and world." He continues, "We aren't seeking peace through God. We're pursuing peace but we're not doing it the right way: through Him!"


Consider these two important spiritual truths about peacemaking: (1) peacemaking without God doesn't work, and (2) Jesus calls all of us to the work of reconciliation and peacemaking. And when we do it His way, it works!

What does peacemaking look like? First, it is undergirded by the love of Christ. We celebrate the grace and mercy of God alive in us in Christ—and we live as new creatures.

Secondly, we dedicate ourselves to living out the character of Christ in our lives. Our perspective becomes the perspective of Christ Jesus. And His perspective was always driven by love and a desire for redemption, reconciliation, and peace.

Thirdly, we choose Christ's way! We choose to live at peace with all men, as much as possible. That includes speaking the truth to brothers and sisters out of love. The motivation for peacemaking is always love. And the desired outcome of peacemaking is to bring another closer to Christ. It is never to tear down or cast someone aside. It has been suggested that the pillars of peacemaking include: taking responsibility, lovingly reproving, accepting reproof, asking for forgiveness, and forgiving others. You see, the love of Christ alive in you and me makes that seemingly impossible task possible in Jesus. Peacemakers are a rare breed! They are those who strive to keep the peace and make peace amid strife and division—all because they love the Lord Jesus. Today, choose to be a peacemaker and live as children of God.

"Across our region, you'll find families with surnames that harken back to those early times in these mountains. 2023 is just the beginning. We hope to grow this event over the years and have it be the welcoming of heritage music every first Sunday in June."

In addition to the music and the exhibition, woodworker Steve Duncan will show his intricately hand-carved walking sticks, themed for the event—Scottish Highlander, Leprechaun, and mythical Celtic. The Historical Society will on the premises to discuss their work in preserving the region's heritage. And, all are urged to donate a non-perishable food item to Neighbors Feeding Neighbors, a local community food bank that will be set up.

Orchard hours are 10 am to 5 pm, Saturday/Sunday, through May 28th; then through October, Wednesday-Sunday. 

Murmuring and complaining are contagious - it does not stop with one person. It spreads all over and it has no mercy!

So, how does God look at the problem of complaining?

There are lots of negative examples in the Bible about complaining and murmuring. The Holy Book always condemns this kind of behavior. For instance, in the book of Exodus, chapter 16, we can read how much damage murmuring can do and how offensive it is to God. Right after the children of Israel experienced their great deliverance from the slavery of Egypt, and saw the amazing miracles of God, they began to murmur. The Bible says: "... the whole congregation of the children of Israel murmured against Moses and Aaron in the wilderness..." (Exodus 16:2 KJV). The whole congregation! It was very offensive to God. The Lord by His great mercy did not destroy them all. He was showing them miracle after miracle revealing His great Character of mercy and love.

Even though, the Lord mercifully dealt with His people, not everyone appreciated it. According to Numbers 13 and 14, Moses by the commandment of the Lord, sent twelve men (one from each tribe) to spy on the land. As a result, ten of them returned with complaining and murmuring, while two of them had courage and faith. Based on the report of ten spies the whole congregation began to murmur and the Lord had to intervene. Eventually, all who murmured in the wilderness died there, except two courageous persons of that generation - Joshua and Caleb. They inherited the Promised Land.

Dear reader, is there something in this life that you feel to complain about? Perhaps, it is something related to your family, politics, religion, or this whole world. Please, let it go! Do not let complaining and murmuring ruin you! The Lord wants to save and deliver you so that you will spend Eternity with Him. Take this promise of Philippians 4:4–7 KJV:

"Rejoice in the Lord alway: and again I say, Rejoice. Let your moderation be known unto all men. The Lord is at hand. Be careful for nothing; but in every thing by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God. And the peace of God, which passeth all understanding, shall keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus." Amen!

John Trumbull

This is an American history educational moment of those who made a difference during the Revolutionary War era and how they served our Country.

Most people do not recognize his name, though they are familiar with his paintings. John Trumbull was born in Leba-

non, Connecticut, on June 6, 1756. He was the sixth and youngest child of Jonathan and Faith Robinson, a family considered American royalty. After graduating from Harvard in 1773, John worked as a teacher and a topographer.

John sketched American and British military fortifications that gave George Washington's Continental Army critically needed details. In appreciation, Trumbull was commissioned as an officer in the Army and assigned to General Washington as an aide-de-camp. Trumbull later resigned from the Army to study art and paintmaking. This decision took him to England to study at the Royal Academy of Arts with Benjamin West.

Over the next decade, John traveled to and from America and Europe. During a trip to London in 1780, Trumbull was jailed as a political prisoner for revenge because British spy Major John André was hanged in Tappan, New York. Trumbull was paroled after eight months and continued painting. He was appointed commissioner to John Jay for implementing the Treaty of Amity Commerce and Navigation, commonly known as Jay's Treaty.

Congress commissioned John to paint murals for the new federal government. After being shown as a traveling exhibit, these now-famous pictures have remained on the walls of the Capitol's Rotunda. The Declaration of Independence painting is actually "the presentation of a draft of it to Congress" in June 1776.

Other pictures Trumbull created for the Capitol are of General Burgoyne, Lord Cornwallis, and General Washington Resigning his Commission. Trumbull's portrait of Alexander Hamilton is on the ten-dollar bill. John's most famous representation is the signing of the Declaration of Independence on the two-dollar bill, among

Because of discrepancies, John's group paintings received petty criticism. The variations are because his paintings are montage composites describing pivotal events in American History before the camera's advent. Nevertheless, Trumbull's works in the Capitol captivate all viewers and crystallize their memory with "the most cherished [artwork] ever painted by an American artist."

Though blind in one eye from a childhood accident, John Trumbull was a peerless and devoted patriot. Turnbull applied his artistic gift by documenting the birth of modern democracy! His legacy continues in the Capitol, Yale, and other notable





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
One Or The Other

This is how we know who the children of God are and who the children of the devil are; "Anyone who does not do what is right is not a child of God; nor is anyone who does not love his brother." I John 3:10 Someone has said that people may be divided into two classes, the righteous and the unrighteous,



and the classifying is always done by the righteous! Certainly, humanity is indeed divided into two classes—not three, as we often fondly imagine. We would like to think there are the children of the devil, the children of God, and then a vast group in between who are morally neutral, neither devilish nor godly. But the Bible never sustains that idea for even a moment. These words of John are the echo of the words of the Lord Jesus Himself when He said to certain Pharisees of His day, "You belong to your father, the devil, and you want to carry out your father's desire" (John 8:44). This is what the phrase children of the devil means. It does not mean that the devil created them, but it means that they reflect the nature and characteristics of the devil. All of this is in harmony with the scriptural view of humanity. People, the Bible says, are vessels. They do not have power in themselves, nor do they have life in themselves. They are made to contain life. They are made to hold someone, designed to contain and express the life of another. In the original intention of God, that life was to be the life of God Himself. People were made for God. The philosopher said there is in every person a God-shaped vacuum that only God can fill. We were made for God. But because of humanity's fall in the garden, people today are no longer containing and expressing the life of God but are expressing the perverted, twisted life of the devil. Every one of us was born into the family of the devil. We were born children of the devil because we are part of the fallen race of Adam. The tendency and proclivity toward sin, that twisted perversion, is passed along to us from our forefathers, along with the color of our eyes and all other physical features. We are born with a bent toward evil. You need to live with only a few babies to see this demonstrated. How utterly self-centered babies are! In their thinking, everything exists for them. The whole world is there only to serve their particular need, and that, in essence, is the expression of the life of the devil. It is only by new birth that we become children of God. This is why Jesus said to that cultured, honored, respected leader of his own day, Nicodemus, who came to him by night. "No one can see the kingdom of God unless he is born again" (John 3:3) All your knowledge, your education, your morality, or your religion is of no value here. Unless you are born again, you are still part and parcel of the family and kingdom of Satan. The whole thrust of the gospel is always in this direction. In a major win for life, the North Carolina General Assembly passed legislation to protect the unborn by limiting most abortion procedures to 12 weeks of pregnancy. State law previously allowed abortions for any reason up to the 20th week of pregnancy.

Governor Roy Cooper vetoed the bill. Thankfully, the legislature now has Republican supermajorities in both chambers and was able to override the veto, allowing the bill to become law.

Senate Bill 20, the Care for Women, Children, and Families Act, is an omnibus bill dealing with many major issues facing the state today. Although the abortion law changes got the majority of the press coverage, the bill also includes increased funding for childcare centers, paid parental leave for state employees, increased penalties for domestic violence or attacking a pregnant woman, and more.

North Carolina was empowered to tighten its restrictions on abortion following the Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization decision from the U.S. Supreme Court last June which overthrew the previous precedent of Roe v. Wade.

The abortion regulations in Senate Bill 20 are far from the "extreme bans" that many opponents of the bill claim. The bill allows exceptions up to the 20-week point in cases of rape or incest, and up to 24 weeks for certain fetal anomalies that would limit the life of the baby. There is no limit on abortions when the life of the mother is at risk. It also regulates abortion clinics under the same regulations as other centers that perform surgeries.

This bill is a thoughtful compromise that takes a stand for life while also providing reasonable parameters for extraordinary circumstances.

One question that Gov. Cooper and legislative Democrats have yet to answer is what restrictions on abortion, if any, would they support. They claim that Senate Bill 20 goes too far, but refuse to provide a public statement on what they would do instead. Do they support abortion for any reason up to the moment of birth? Voters deserve an answer.

USE OF MARIJUANA MEDICALLY IS QUESTIONABLE

Now pending in the North Carolina legislature is legislation to legalize the use of marijuana as a medicine. The NC Senate has passed such legislation. It currently awaits consideration in the NC House of Representatives. The bill, if finally approved, would authorize marijuana prescriptions across the state for "medical" purposes. For a number of reasons, I am skeptical that such authorization would be wise. I suspect that significant numbers of other House members share my concern.

A beginning and major problem is that there appears to be no such thing as "medical" marijuana as far as many doctors, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA), and numerous studies are concerned. By that, I mean that marijuana has never received the sort of scientific testing necessary to be considered medicine. Moreover, if legalized in North Carolina, it would be the only prescription drug in North Carolina that has not been FDA-approved. Furthermore, appropriate testing and trials have not been carried out to verify that marijuana is an effective treatment for particular conditions. At present, I would say that the lack of studies testing specific dosages of the drug against specific illnesses for specific lengths of time, with beneficial outcomes versus identified, adverse side effects, makes legalization ill-advised.

Given the lack of testing to define precisely for whom and for what conditions marijuana can be effectively and appropriately used, we could end up with it being over-prescribed and over-used either for the well-known "highs" it can provide or just out of desperation on the part of particular individuals who have been unable to find effective medication for their particular conditions. The potential for misuse is a particularly pointed problem for marijuana because there is substantial evidence that it may initiate or worsen mental illnesses such as psychotic, personality, and substance-abuse disorders. The lack of creditable testing and the known potential for abuse and disorders are almost certainly a principal reason that marijuana distribution, possession, and use continue to be illegal under federal law.

I am highly sympathetic to those who have chronic conditions for which they sincerely seek to find effective relief. However, I believe the best recourse at present is for them to persist in seeking legal medical treatment. Once appropriate tests, some presently being conducted, have run their course, and if they demonstrate benefits outweighing adverse consequences, then would be the time to reconsider things.

On the night of May 16th, Republicans in the North Carolina Senate voted to override Governor Roy Cooper's veto of Senate Bill 20 – The Care for Women, Children, and Families Act, placing into law a bill that will save thousands of unborn lives every year and provide resources and support for women and families facing unplanned and crisis pregnancies. A primary provision of the bill will reduce the legal timeframe for most abortions in North Carolina from 20 weeks of gestation to 12 weeks. The 46-page bill contains a myriad of other important provisions and will go into effect on July 1st. After more than an hour of debate Tuesday night, the North Carolina House followed the Senate and voted to override the governor's veto. The Senate passed the override with a 30-20 vote. The House vote was 72-48, a three-fifths majority which was needed in both chambers to override the veto. All Republicans in both chambers voted for the override while all Democrats were opposed.

Additionally in May, Lydia Daniel, Senator Daniel's wife, had the privilege of attending the 2023 North Carolina Peace Officers' Memorial Day ceremony at The Shepherd's Church in Cary. The event commemorates those law enforcement officers who have given their lives in the line of duty while serving the citizens of North Carolina. Families of the eleven fallen officers, current officers, retirees, and members of the public were present. The ceremony included guest speakers AG Josh Stein and NC Supreme Court Chief Justice Paul Newby, other notable dignitaries, a 21-gun salute, choral tribute, and a caisson team. Senator Daniel and several of his Senate colleagues purchased the NC flags and flag display cases presented to the families of our fallen heroes.

Therefore, my prayer is that as we seek to know him better through Scripture, that He would strengthen our unity, and, Lord willing, increase our numbers as well."

Although Cooper and Hannah have not been here long, they have already formed some strong impressions of the area; "the thing that has most surprised us in our short time here is the genuine kindness and love of the people at Fellowship, both for one another and Christ. We have had a wonderful welcome and feel that Crossnore is already our home. It is a joy to see strangers who are kind and even excited to see our kids. Believe it or not, some communities are not happy to have kids around. We have really enjoyed our time at the gym, Mike's Coffee in Newland, and Miracle Grounds in Crossnore. Even the driving here is wonderful. We get to see Grandfather and Roan Mountain almost daily"

What do fathers pass down to their children today? What picture of God do dads show their families?



The Sword of the Spirit

Eph 6:17 says, "And take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God." In this study, we are going to focus on the words, "The sword of the Spirit which is the Word of God."

For English-speaking people, the Word of God is the King James Version of the Bible. Its source is the Textus Receptus or the Received Text. That Greek Text was widely used in the seven churches of Asia Minor. The purpose of this study is not to give all the many reasons why I make the statement in the opening sentence of this paragraph. That study would be too long to include in this study on Christian warfare.

We are going to look at three different avenues of study in this article. We are going to see the value of the sword, the involvement of the Spirit, and the indispensability of the Word of God.

The Value of the Sword

"the sword"

Today a literal sword is considered a primitive weapon in these days of assault rifles and other sophisticated weaponry. Its history goes back as far as 3300 B.C.

In early Bible days, they fought with swords, spears, and bows. The word sword is mentioned 424 times in our King James Bible. Since it is mentioned so many times, it was a very important weapon in the early Bible days.

A sword was a piercing or cutting weapon, with which a warrior might stab or slash an enemy. Some swords were designed to pierce, others to slash. All swords had two parts, a handle or hilt, and a blade. The blade was usually straight, but one unusual variation was the sickle sword. This weapon featured a curved blade with a sharp edge on the outside. Swords were the basic weapon of a Hebrew soldier. The Biblical phrase that identified a man as a soldier was that he "drew the sword" (2 Kings 3:26).

It was used for defense. Today many people carry small pistols that are compact and easily hidden for defensive purposes. If someone attacks you, you need some way to defend yourself. It would look odd today for you to walk around carrying a long sword from a scabbard on your belt. In Bible days the best weaponry they had was the sword. We have an enemy called Satan from which we need to defend ourselves. Jesus used the Word of God in the wilderness temptation to overcome Satan. Three times Jesus said, "It is written" in handling the onslaught of the Devil. Since it worked for Jesus, it will work for us as well. He demonstrated what we are to do when tempted by Satan. Just use the Word of God as a means of defense.

It was used for offense. I just completed teaching a 24-week course on Bible Geography. One thing is obvious all through history. A man was seldom ever satisfied with what he had regarding land, territory, and power. Warriors had to go on offense with swords and spears to conquer another nation's territories, taking many lives while using the sword.

It was used with two edges. Most swords have two edges. If it was sharpened on both sides, it could penetrate and cut at every contact point and with every movement a warrior may make. If a blade is sharpened on individual sides, it can be thrust more quickly and deeply. It can cut much more easily after being sharpened on both sides.

Double-edged swords are also more effective at penetrating through armor than single-edged swords. However, this is more of a side benefit from the fact that double-edged swords are better for thrusting attacks. During the Middle Ages, European warriors would use thrusting attacks with double-edged swords to penetrate through their enemies' armor.

A third benefit of the double-edged design is that it prevented a warrior's enemy from grabbing the blade. With a single-edged sword, an enemy could potentially grab the dull edge of the blade. This isn't possible with double-edged swords, however. With both edges featuring razor-like sharpness, there's no safe edge to grab. If an enemy attempted to grab a double-edged sword, he would likely sustain a serious cut.

The Involvement of the Spirit

"the sword of the Spirit"


The sword we use finds its origin in the Spirit of God. 2 Peter 1:21 says, "For the prophecy came not in old time by the will of man: but holy men of God spake as they were moved by the Holy Ghost."

The word "moved" (phero) is an extremely interesting word. It is translated into several words in our KJV Bible: bring, bear, carry, and other ways. The word "carry" is a very good way to express how we were given our Bible. It suggests normally either force or speed. It can be used as a gust of wind or of persons being carried in a ship over the sea.

The men who penned down the Bible did not just sit down one day and decide they were going to write just another book and call it the Bible. Holy men of God, chosen by God, were carried along and inspired to write the Bible. The wind of the Spirit moved upon their minds and hearts and carried them along to give us the Bible we have today.

The Spirit inspired it. There is another important verse found in 2 Timothy 3:16. It says, "All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness." The word "inspiration" means "God-breathed or the breath of God."

God's words were given through men superintended by the Holy Spirit so that their writings are without error. This fact was virtually taken for granted by the Jews. Then Paul asserted the "usefulness" of the Word. For each aspect of



The Spirit does not contradict it. He works in harmony with and does not contradict the Word He inspired. A fellow who claimed to be a Christian years ago told me the Lord led him to drive a beer delivery truck for a living. In light of what the Bible says about alcohol, I could not understand that to be true. Habak-kuk 2:15 says, "Woe unto him that giveth his neighbour drink, that puttest thy bottle to him, and makest him drunken also, that thou mayest look on their nakedness!" How could the Spirit of God direct someone to do something contrary to the Bible? He will not and cannot.

The Holy Ghost works with it. Before a person is saved, he hears the Word of God. Then, the Spirit of God goes to work. The Spirit uses the Word of God to bring conviction to the sinner. There must be a convincing of sin before a person can be saved.

When the Holy Ghost convicts of sin, He skillfully uses the Word of God to bring about salvation. The Spirit of God using the Word of God can bring the sinner to the point of salvation from sin.

The Indispensability of the Word of God

"the Word of God"

There is power in the Bible. Hebrews 4:12 says, "For the word of God is quick, and powerful, and sharper than any twoedged sword, piercing even to the dividing asunder of soul and spirit, and of the joints and marrow, and is a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart."

The Bible pierces. It reaches the innermost heart and judges the thoughts and attitudes of the heart as well. It can distinguish in man what is spiritual and what is merely soulish or natural. The inner life of a believer is often a mixture of emotions, some being spiritual and others being merely human. It takes the penetrating, discerning agent of the Word of God, to expose what is spiritual and what is of the flesh.

It is quick. God's word of promise is not a lifeless letter and is not just paper and ink. His Word and His promises are living. They are a living reality. It is always alive and active. It is always working and quickening its message to the human heart. It is living and full of life to the believer.

The Word of God makes dead sinners living Christians; it makes souls dead in trespasses and sins alive unto God. The Bible conveys life and spirit to the repentant, believing sinner. 1 Peter 1:23 states, "Being born again, not of corruptible seed, but of incorruptible, by the word of God, which liveth and abideth forever."

It is powerful. It has great power as it is administered by the Holy Ghost to the life of a child of God. It has the power to convict, convert, comfort, and condemn. That is why God called preachers to preach the word; it is so unparallel and powerful in its operation.

It is sharp. The Bible pierces. It reaches the innermost heart and judges the thoughts and attitudes of the heart as well. It can distinguish in man what is spiritual in man and what is merely soulish or natural. The inner life of a believer is often a mixture of emotions, some being spiritual and others being merely human. It takes the penetrating, discerning agent of the Word of God, to expose what is spiritual and what is of the flesh. It has two edges, signifying how thorough it is in its operation.

Since we have the Sword of the Spirit, which is the Word of God available to us in our daily battles, let's utilize it to drive back and resist the forces of Satan.

Eternal Torture or Eternal Annihilation for the Unsaved? (Part 1)

So convinced of my previous position, now un-sealed proves superstition. A common worldwide delusion, "O LORD, let me never be put to confusion", Psalm 71:1. The universe of all cultures, including myself, have been deceived by The Mythology of Plato, (Mith-Fairytale-Ology—the study of Greek gods by academics). Hade's kinship



god Zeus defeats his father's generation of gods and rules the underworld domain of eternal torture for the unsaved soul.

The scriptures proclaim "for His mercy endureth forever". This combination of words occurs 254 times in the KJV bible. Will God keep the unsaved soul alive burning in torment, in the lake of fire, suffering the flames of hell fire forever, eternal torture? No, absolutely not! What about loving your enemies, and doing good to them that hate you? Proverbs 21:27, "the sacrifice of the wicked is abomination [disgusting]; how much more when he [mankind] bringeth it with a wicked mind?"

Mixing the myth of fairytale gods in Greek mythology, without the metaphorical truth parables as found in God's Word, the Bible traps the Christian into spiritual superstition. 1 Timothy 1:4, "neither give heed to fables and endless genealogies, which minister questions, rather than godly edifying which is in faith, so do!"

Read the following verse very slowly, perhaps several times. Notice, destroy the soul comes first! Mathew 10:28, "And fear not them which kill the body, but are not able to kill the soul: but rather fear him which is able to destroy both soul and body in hell" [Gehenna H1067grave, everlasting punishment]. Ezekiel 18:20, the soul that sinneth, it shall die.

1 Co 15:24-26, "The Father, when he shall have put down all rule and all authority and power. He shall reign, till He hath put all enemies under his feet. The last enemy destroyed is death".

Ecclesiastes 9:5 & 6; "for the living know that they will die: but the dead know not anything, neither have they any more a reward, for the memory of them is forgotten. Also their love, and their hatred, and their envy, is now perished; neither have they any more a portion forever in anything that is done under the sun." Psa. 6:5 "for in death there is no remembrance of thee: in the grave who will give thee thanks?" Psa. 115:17; "the dead praise not the LORD, neither any that go down to silence." Job speaking about death; 3:17, "there the wicked cease from trouble, and there the weary be at rest. But man dieth, and wasteth away: yea, man giveth up the ghost, and where is he? As the waters fail from the sea, and the flood decayeth and drieth up: so man lieth down, and riseth not: till the heavens be no more; they shall not awake, nor be raised out of their sleep"; Job 14:10-12.

Mathew 10:28, "fear him which is able to destroy both body and soul in hell". We cannot now redefine the word destroy to imply something else. Destroy/destruction is found in over 300 verses in the KJV bible. Christians must trust in the faith of Christ to avoid the destruction of both their body and soul in their earthly grave. "Only through Jesus Christ our Saviour, not by works of our righteousness, but according to his mercy he saved us, by the washing of regeneration, and renewing of the Holy Ghost", Titus 3:5,6.

2 Thessalonians 1:9, "who shall be punished with everlasting destruction." 1Thessalonians 5:3, "when they shall say peace and safety; then sudden destruction cometh upon them." 2 Peter 3:16, "some things hard to be understood, they are unlearned and unstable wrest, [torture language falsely], as they do also other scriptures, unto their own destruction." 1 Timothy 6:9, "foolish and hurtful lusts, drown men in destruction and perdition" [destruction of eternal life].

From Bible Ministries International, www.bmius.org "That which is "Abhorring" (shamed to eternal contempt) "to Repulse". Abhorring Strongs #H1860 to repulse, an object of aversion, abhorring, contempt. Besides Genesis 42:38 and Genesis 44:31, there is only one other verse in the entire Old Testament that contains these two Hebrew words, "death" (H4191) and "the grave" (H7585) together, and that is found in 1 Samuel 2:6, which underscores God's power and to kill and to resurrect on a physical level, as well as spiritually during the day of salvation".

1 Samuel 2:6; "The LORD killeth [muyth; H4191] and maketh alive: he bring down [yarad; H3381] to the grave, [sheowl; H7585] and bringeth up [alah: H5927]."

Some might look at Samuel 2:6 and say, "You see, this matches what we find in Daniel 12:2, when God (brings up, or awakes) the non-elect who have previously died".

Daniel 12:2; "And many of them that sleep in the dust of the earth shall awake, some to everlasting life, and some to shame and everlasting contempt."

Those who hold to this concept argue that whatever is left of these individuals will be reconstituted by God so that they can "stand for judgment", and then upon hearing the guilty verdict, will be confined to the "lake of fire" for eternity. The term, "contempt" only appears again in Isaiah 66:24, as, "and they shall be an abhorring".

Isaiah 66:24; "And they shall go forth, and look upon the carcasses of the men that have transgressed against me: for their worm shall not die, neither shall their fire be quenched; and they shall be an abhorring unto all flesh."

The abhorring shame and contempt that these individuals are under is the fact that they remain perpetually under the sentence of God's wrath for eternity, even though

they are annihilated both in body and soul. Mathew 10;28 "And fear not them which kill the body, but are not able to kill the soul: but rather fear him which is able to destroy both soul and body in hell [Gehenna H1067grave, everlasting punishment]". (End) Bible Ministries International.

The faulty eternal torture doctrine of mankind's unsaved soul is of great offense to God Almighty. Again, God gets blamed for something he never considered to happen in His creation. The worship of the god of Baal and Molech, caused the children of Israel to pass through the fire (Jeremiah 32:35); "[God proclaims] neither came it into my mind".

The Unbiblical doctrine of Purgatory, a place of sin cleansing, is not found in the Bible. During man's lifetime on earth, the elect of God must be drawn (John 6:44) by the Father to Jesus Christ. Only Christ can regenerate a man's soul to salvation. Upon the death of the elect of God, their soul instantly goes to heaven to be with the Father and the Son. They will receive a future new perfect sinless body, and be part of the new heaven and earth creation.

The unsaved sinner who bears their own sin, the unrighteous of God, will remain lifeless for eternity in their grave. Their corpse will decompose and deteriorate. An earthly sleep metaphor, it's forever 2:00 O'clock in the morning. "They shall not awake nor be raised out of their sleep".

At the second coming of Christ, the earth and everything in it, all dead souls and dead bodies in the grave, will be burned up. Complete annihilation, eternally forgotten, everlasting destruction, "in the lake which burneth with fire and brimstone; the second death", Revelations 21:8.

Many times, atheists ask Christians, why does your merciful loving God torture un-saved persons with unquenchable everlasting fire? Now you have the answer. God Almighty does not torture the unsaved sinner! Unquenchable fire symbolically represents eternal everlasting punishment for the unsaved. Mat. 25:31-46, "And these shall go away into everlasting punishment: but the righteous into life eternal". Heb 12:29, "God is a consuming (Strongs G138 destroy) fire". The total destruction of body and soul in the grave for eternity will never cease.

As a tourist, you can take a hike to the plateau summit of Mount Sodom in Israel overlooking the dead sea. The area has many salt pits; remember Lot's wife, Gen. 19:26? The cities of Sodom and Gomorrah did get destroyed with brimstone and fire, but they are not still burning with "eternal fire". KJV Jude 1:7, notice "set forth as an example" is a reminder of God's judgment to the wicked, a never to cease verdict of everlasting punishment. Jude 1:7; "Even as Sodom and Gomorrah, and the cities about them in like manner, giving themselves over to fornication, and going after strange flesh, are set forth as an example, suffering the vengeance [Strongs # G1349 condemnation] of eternal fire".

Eternal Annihilation or Eternal Life? Nothing is more important than what God Almighty will do with man's soul! 

"I'll agree to that, too," the doctor seconded.


Everyone in the room laughed at the last.
