Dr. Don Wilton served as senior pastor of the First Baptist Church of Spartanburg, South Carolina from 1993 – December 2022. He also served as president of The Encouraging Word television ministry. This ministry reaches thousands of homes through the regional CBS affiliate, WSPATV, and millions of homes both nationally and globally through the broadcast of The Encouraging Word. Dr. Wilton's messages are also available online.

Dr. Wilton's preaching and teaching are hallmarked by his uncompromising presentation of the life-changing truth of God's Word that points people to Jesus. He

challenges and encourages people to become all that they can be for Christ, emphatic in his belief that "evangelism is incomplete until the evangelized become the evangelists."

He has written and published many manuals, articles, and reviews for the Southern Baptist Convention, Preaching, and Decision magazines, as well as other publications. The Holy Spirit

The Holy Spirit is the very Spirit of God, fully divine, manifested in the life of every believer from the moment of salvation. He is equal with the Father and the Son as God. He is present in the world to make men aware of their need for Jesus Christ. He provides the Christian with power for living, understanding of spiritual truth, and guidance in doing what is right. The Christian seeks to live under His daily control.

The Bible

The Bible is the divinely inspired, authoritative, infallible, living and active Word of God to all men. It was written by human authors under the supernatural guidance of the Holy Spirit. It is the ultimate source of truth for Christian beliefs and living. In it we find a guideline for right relationship with God and God's creation, and a blueprint for personal, emotional, and spiritual growth.

Humanity

Humanity is designed and made by God in His image. We have been created as cognitive, moral, ethical, and physical beings and have been equipped by God for both relationship with Him and with one another. Both male and female are gifted by the Creator with characteristics which equip them for the purpose for which they have been created: relationship, dominion, and responsibility. Although God designed us to have fellowship with Him, we became alienated from God through disobedience. As a result, all human beings are born with a sinful nature and choose to sin against God. We are incapable of regaining a right relationship with God through our own efforts.

Eternity & Eternal Security

Our soul, the essence of our being, was created by God to exist forever. That forever is spent in one of two places: eternally present and in union with God because of His forgiveness and salvation or eternally separated from God because of sin and unbelief. At the moment that our physical body dies, those who are saved are immediately taken to heaven. Those who have rejected God's gift of salvation will spend eternity separated from God in hell. Because God gives man eternal life through Jesus Christ, the believer is secure in that salvation for eternity. Salvation is maintained by the grace and power of God, not by the self-effort of the Christian. It is the grace and eternal power of God that gives this security. (John 3:16; 5:11-13, 10:29; 1 John 2:25; Romans 6:23; Revelation 20:15; 2 Timothy 1:12; Hebrews 7:25; 10:10-14; 1 Peter 1:3-5)

Salvation

Salvation is God's gift of redemption and reconciliation to Himself and is offered freely to all who accept, by faith alone, Jesus Christ as God's only son and receive Him as Lord and Savior. We can never make up for our sin with self-improvement or good works. It is only by trusting in Jesus Christ as God's offer of forgiveness that you can be saved from sin's penalty. Eternal life begins the moment you receive Jesus Christ into your life by faith.

Foundation Forward

George Clymer

This is an American history educational moment of those who made a difference during the Revolutionary War era and how they served our Country.

George Clymer was born in Philadelphia on March 16, 1739, and was orphaned at seven. He was adopted and edu-

cated at home by his aunt and uncle, Hannah and William Coleman. Growing up, George was in socially prominent circles while working in his uncle's business. During this era, he became acquainted with notable political and patriot leaders.

Clymer did not serve in the Revolutionary War. However, he did command a company of voluntary militiamen in the early 1770s, known as the Silk Stockings. Later, working in politics as the Continental Treasurer, he used his acquired business acumen, leadership, and financial skills. He also served on councils supporting the troops as a member of the Continental Congress during the Revolutionary War (DSDI, 2023).

Questioning British taxes and business restrictions sealed George's prosocial outlook toward independence. George was a member of the Pennsylvania Safety Council and headed a committee that forced out the overseers of Britain's Tea Act. While serving in the Continental Congress, Clymer served on committees dealing with commerce, financial, and military affairs. The British announced a reward for his capture because of his expert work in the militia, Congress, and improving the army. During military hostilities, when Clymer's colleagues were unwilling, he made in-person battlefield evaluations to ensure the soldiers received their needed warfare matériels, food, and other supplies.

Because of a bounty being offered for him, Clymer moved his family to relative safety in the countryside. George continued working in Philadephia with a few colleagues, knowing the British were advancing (NPS, 2004). Believing Clymer was at home, the British changed course and went to Chester County, Pennsylvania, to apprehend Clymer and his family, and destroy their home.

Surviving the War, George continued in public service until his death in January 1813. Among his positions after the Revolutionary War were president of the Philadelphia Bank, president of the Philadelphia Academy of Arts, and vice-president of the Agricultural Society of Philadelphia.

In addition to being a visionary, George was the quintessential statesman. As a judge, Clymer promoted reform of the penal code, including eliminating the death penalty. He was only one of six Founding Fathers to sign the Declaration of Independence and the United States Constitution.

In Clymer's honor, a Navy attack transport ship was named after him. The U.S.S. George Clymer, APA 27, saw operational campaigns in the Pacific, and Atlantic theaters during WWII, then in Korea and Vietnam. The U.S.S. George Clymer was decommissioned in 1967 and sold for scrap metal.

George Clymer was a fervent patriot. It was said of him that "his dearest wish was for independence."

Billy Graham's 'My Answer': Does God Really Love Me

Many people don't believe they can be loved, or they have the wrong view of what love is. Maybe that's you or someone you know. You feel you're unimportant, unworthy, and unlovable. In this 'My Answer,' Billy Graham gives an explanation of God's love for us that could change your view of it all:


Q: I have a hard time believing God loves me. I know you'll say He does, and sometimes I believe it, but most of the time I don't (although I wish I did). If you knew all the bad things I've done, you'd understand why I can't believe God loves me.

A: If God treated us the way we treat other people, then you'd probably be right. If someone insults us or hurts us, we usually don't want anything more to do with them. We may even want to strike back at them and hurt them in return.

But God isn't like this! Even when we ignore Him or insult Him by the way we live, He still reaches out to us and wants us to come back to Him. He doesn't love our sins—but He still loves us, and He still yearns for us to love Him in return. The Bible says, "I have loved you with an everlasting love" (Jeremiah 31:3). How do we know God loves us? Listen: If He didn't love us, He never would have sent His only Son into the world to die for us. But Jesus Christ did come into the world, and He did die on the cross for our sins. Why did He do this? The only possible explanation is because God loves us. The Bible says, "This is love: not that we loved God, but that he loved us and sent his Son as an atoning sacrifice for our sins" (1 John 4:10).

Don't trust your emotions; they can deceive you. Instead, trust Christ and what He has done for you. Invite Him to come into your life today, and then thank Him every morning for His unchanging love for you.

'SIT DOWN"

The concept of rest has become synonymous with idleness. In our modern society and even in our churches, we've been consistently taught to work! We've been taught to work in our natural lives as well as our spiritual lives. How often have we heard many saints say – including our own selves - that "I'm laboring for the Lord" or "I gotta get busy for Je-



sus." We have definitely heard the phrase "Idle hands are the devil's workshop!" In essence, we have been taught that "doing something" or being "busy" equates productivity. Actually, what we have done, especially in the Body of Christ is confused LABOR with work! There is a huge difference between labor and work when we look at the very beginning of Scripture. When we look at Genesis 2:15 which states, "And the LORD God took the man, and put him into the garden of Eden to dress it and to keep it", we see that it was God's original design and intent for mankind to work. At this point, man was in perfect harmony and union with God, therefore man's work was first and foremost with the MOTIVE to please God and secondly, man's ability to work flowed out of the PRESENCE and POWER of God! I would go on to say that in the beginning, man's work was following his PURPOSE, therefore work was a JOY and a DELIGHT unto mankind as well! Everything Adam did, he did with the heart and mind of God since he simply operated on who God created him to be and what he was ASSIGNED to do; WORK is PRODUCTIVE and brings forth FRUIT! However, all of this changed after the disobedience of man and the entrance of the curse of sin into the Earth's environment.

Part of what constituted the curse of sin is found in Genesis 3:17 when God said to Adam, "... cursed is the ground for thy sake; in sorrow shalt thou eat of it all the days of thy life;" The NASB translates this verse as saying, "Cursed is the ground because of you; With [a] hard labor you shall eat from it All the days of your life." The word used here for labor (KJV says "sorrow") comes from a root Hebrew word which means: pain, grief, OR to SHAPE, FORM, OR WORSHIP! In other words, because of sin, work changed to LABOR because of man's disconnection from the PRESENCE of God! Man was forced to LABOR out of his own strength and sweat rather than the power of God and even would go so far as to shape or form something that would become an object of worship above the LORD! Does this sound like any of us? How often have we labored in something out of our own strength and wisdom rather than WORK in the realm God assigned us? Labor can also be defined as SELF-EFFORT which ultimately leaves to SELF-WORSHIP; the place where our focus becomes what we can do or what we have done, failing to give God the glory and the honor! Holy Spirit shared something very simple yet profound with me several weeks ago; He said, "To launch out and do something outside of my wisdom and guidance is just as bad as doing nothing at all!" Very sobering yet truthful words!

This brings us to our scripture texts for this morning: we often forget that fact that in the Gospel of Matthew and the Gospel of Mark, the writers record two instances where Jesus fed a multitude of people, with some noticeable differences yet a major similarity we often overlook. In the first account – which we're most familiar with – Jesus fed a multitude of 5,000 men in addition to women and children, making the congregation significantly more than 5,000. In my study I found out that the particular location of this miracle – according to archeological evidence where an early artistic depiction of this miracle was found on a mosaic in this area – took place on the eastern edge of the Sea of Galilee outside of a city called Hippos in a DESOLATE and SOLITARY PLACE. How many of you know that some of the greatest miracles are performed in a DESERT PLACE?! It is also important to note that many came from the comfort of their cities (including Hippos - which was a very prosperous Greco-Roman city) to follow Jesus out to the wilderness! It is in this setting that Jesus manifested one of his most well-known miracles. Often we focus on the miracle itself but fail to realize a very important command, Jesus issued BEFORE the miracle could take place; verse 19 says, "AND HE COMMANDED THE MULTITUDE TO SIT DOWN ON THE GRASS..."

When we jump to the second account of Jesus feeding a multitude in Matthew 15, this time it was 4,000 men in addition to women and children. This time the setting is on another side of the Sea of Galilee but yet in a solitary and desolate place! We also note where the text says that in this instance there were "a few" fish and "seven loaves of bread." There is significance in the number seven, which means COMPLETION. Before I get to the key point here, I noticed something else: in verse 33, Jesus' disciples yet again asked Jesus, "Where could we get enough bread in this remote place to feed such a crowd?" Now the disciples just ran into the SAME situation in the previous chapter, had they forgotten so quickly what Jesus could do? How often do we forget what God can do when we face similar situations that He's delivered us out of previously?! This is why the Scripture tells us in Hebrews 2:1 (NIV), "We must pay the most careful attention, therefore, to what we have heard, so that we do not drift away." This goes beyond weekly church attendance to developing a WORD based lifestyle, where we continually flood our awareness with the Word of God which I will discuss shortly. The point I want to emphasize is that in this account of Jesus feeding the multitude, one aspect remained exactly the same as that in chapter 14: verse 35 of this account says, "And he commanded the multitude to sit down on the ground." Yet again we see the motif of SITTING DOWN! This is the posture that God is calling for us as believers...to simply SIT DOWN! Before we can experience a manifestation from the Lord Jesus, the proper posture is necessary!

Mary exemplified this posture in Luke 10:39. When we sit down, we are

to sit as she did and sit at the feet of our Lord Jesus Christ! Sitting at someone's feet symbolizes a place of SUBMISSION and FELLOWSHIP! Additionally, the Scripture says that she just didn't sit at Jesus' feet idle, but she, "HEARD HIS WORD." In Greek, the verb "heard" is in the imperfect tense, which can also be translated like this: "[She] KEPT ON HEARING His Word." This signifies a continual and repeated action on Mary's part of attentiveness to what Jesus was saying! Sitting at Jesus' feet brings us back into alignment with God's original intention for mankind in Eden: to operate out of the character and nature of God! When we keep on hearing the Word of the Lord at His feet, our inner man is changed, our minds begin to AGREE with God's Word, and our actions will follow suit. This took place with sister Mary when we look at John's Gospel account of this supper. In John 12:3 the Scripture records that at this supper – likely after the time Jesus finished his teaching and reclined to eat, after Mary sat at his feet listening - she took very costly ointment and anointed Jesus' feet. During Biblical times, it was customary to anoint the heads of guests (which she most likely did as well), which was an act of honor. However, Mary's response to sitting at Jesus' feet was to anoint His feet, which was an act of DEVOTION. We then move from laboring out of our own efforts to WORKING out of the power of the Spirit of God. Sitting down at Jesus' feet is a place of rest, which Hebrews 4:10 describes: "For all who have entered into God's rest have rested from their labors." Resting in Jesus is the greatest posture of submission, fellowship, and honor we experience in Him. Sitting before Him is the most EXCELLENT way to shift from the category of "busy Christian" to "FRUITFUL KINGDOM CITIZEN!"

As I close, this is a time and an hour in the Body of Christ where the LORD is calling us to SIT DOWN! It is time for us to cease from our own efforts and works and sit at His feet. We've become so consumed with DOING that we neglect BEING! BEING in the posture of submission and fellowship with the LORD where we crave His very voice and presence. It is in this place that we receive wisdom and guidance necessary to do the WORK He's assigned to us. This is also where we learn to even disconnect from LABOR that God never intended us to undertake! The old saints had a song that they sang that applied to eternal rest, but I believe that it can apply to resting in the LORD while we live: "Sit down servant, sit down and rest a little while!"

Have A Deeper Connection With God

Make a daily habit of confessing your sin to God, our Heavenly Father. Our biggest hindrance to being close to God in relationship to Him is our sin! When sin is a barrier in our relationship with Father God, our confession of our sin to Him removes that barrier. God promises to forgive



us when we confess our sins before Him, and that forgiveness is what restores a relationship that has been strained with our Heavenly Father.

Asking God to forgive you of your sins and trespasses simply isn't enough! In the request for forgiveness, the sin needs to be stated specifically. It is the heartfelt feeling of a remorseful conscience and of those who recognize that their sin is offensive to our Holy God, realizing that their sin is what nailed Jesus Christ to the Cross at Calvary. "God I am sorry for the sin(s) I committed," simply is NOT ENOUGH! Get serious about your condition in sin and seek, truly seek God's promise of forgiveness.

1 John 1:9

Confession of your sin should free you to enjoy a restored fellowship with God our Father. It should ease your conscience so you can focus on a deeper relationship with our Heavenly Father. Confessing our sins does not mean a shallow reciting of misdeeds and transgressions. It means owning up to your wrongdoing and bringing your life into alinement with God's goodness and commandments, into a right relationship and deeper connection with Him. God can forgive and cleanse anyone from their transgressions and the most terrible of any sins. Many Christians do not understand that God wants to forgive people for their sins. God allowed His beloved Son to die a cruel and agonizing death on the Cross at Calvary so He could pardon our very sins. We are still of this human body and we fall short of the Glory of God daily, therefore we are to continue confessing our sins daily. Our salvation in Jesus Christ is secure. It is we confess our sins so we can enjoy maximum fellowship with our God, our Heavenly Father.

Psalm 32:5

The confession of our sin brings us relief because God forgives the immorality of that sin committed. The guilt that is felt while in the depths of sin is not a subjective feeling but a liability for punishment in a legal sense. It is not the mere removal of the guilt feelings from sins committed since God brings the conviction on us. Forgiveness is what is needed and required. What is confession? To confess our sin is to agree with God, to acknowledge that He is right to declare that what we have done is a sin and that we are in the wrong to desire to commit the sin. It means affirming our intention to abandon sin to have a deeper connection with our Father God, and to be faithful to His leadership.

Acts 3:19

Peter called on his audience to repent and be forgiven based on who Jesus Christ was and is today, how He was treated by the Jewish people, and how God had vindicated Him by raising Him from the Dead.

John the Baptist had prepared the way for Jesus by preaching repentance. The first step leading to God's forgiveness is to confess your sin and turn from it completely. "Repent ye therefore, and be converted, that your sins may be blotted out, when the times of refreshing shall come from the presence of the Lord; and He shall send Jesus Christ, which before was preached unto you." (Acts 3:19). The apostles' call to salvation also included repentance. "Then Peter said unto them, Repent, and be baptized everyone of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost." (Acts 2:38). When we repent, God promises not only to wipe away our sins but to bring Spiritual refreshment to us. Seek a deeper connection in your relationship to and with God and He will give you a better way.

James 4:8

Submit to God – is self-humbling. Resist the devil – is an active resistance against temptation. Following is a list of 5 statements for how you can have a deeper connection with God by drawing nigh (close) to Him.

- 1) "Submit yourselves therefore to God," (4:7). Realize that you need His forgiveness. Be willing to follow Him.
- 2) "Resist the devil," (4:7). Don't allow him to entice you into temptation.
- 3) "Cleans your hands, ...and purify your hearts," (4:8). Lead a pure life. Be cleansed from your sin. Replace it with God's purity.
- 4) Let there be tears, sorrow, and sincere grief for your sins. Don't be afraid to express deep heartfelt sorrow for those sins. (Reference 4:9)
- 5) "Humble yourself in the sight of the Lord and He will lift you up," and draw you nigh unto Him. (4:10; 1 Peter 5:6).

Let Freedom Ring

The 4th of July, also known as Independence Day, is an annual American holiday that falls on, you guessed it, the 4th of July. Now you may be planning a trip to see the best fireworks in your area or shopping for great sales that the stores often promote over the 4th of July, but the day should remind us about freedom. One of the greatest freedoms our found-



ing fathers put down on paper is the freedom to worship as our own conscience dictates.

On one occasion, Jesus got into an intense exchange with the Scribes and Pharisees. Jesus and the Scribes and Pharisees are discussing fatherhood. The better statement would have been, when have you not been in captivity? Talk about selective memory. The Scribes and Pharisees suggesting that they have never been captives are downright laughable if it had not been so pitiful.

Now Jesus basically gives them a pass on their selective memory and goes to the main point. Jesus states that your captivity is deeper than you know. Jesus says gentlemen you are free, the Son shall make you free indeed. And the Scribes and Pharisees respond with what do we need to be free from, free from what. You and I understand that the Lord is trying to show how they are captured in the sin problem.

The Jews thought, because of their birth and all their laws of traditions, that they were not really in that bad of shape when it came to the sin problem. They had come to believe, falsely, that in the waters of sin, they were in the shallow end. Their sins were so shallow that the Jews believed that their elaborate righteousness by works system actually saved them. When Jesus tells the Jews of His day in Palestine that He has come to save them from sin, they respond, but we are not drowning in sin, we are not in the deep end of sin, we are in the shallow end and so we can be our own lifeguards. I would hope we know better. I would hope that freedom from the bondage of sin is something we understand that we can not save ourselves from. We need that Redeemer Lifeguard to save us.

As you and I celebrate America's Freedom, may we also celebrate that Jesus promises us even greater freedom. The Son, He has made us free!



The Trifecta

It's like a Jeopardy game show question: "What are the three reasons most often given as to why people with a drinking problem cannot get sober?"

What is too Young, as "I'm only (__) fill in the blank, years old."

"How can I possibly be an alcoholic, I'm too young?" "Yes, my mother and father drink too much and are probably alcoholics but they are in their mid-seventies."

"Not me, I'm too young to be an alcoholic."

The undeniable truth is that alcoholism affects both men and women of all ages. What is too Smart, as "I have a degree from a good school and have received excellent grades throughout my entire academic career. I thought only high school and college dropouts could be alcoholics."

"Not me, I'm too smart to be an alcoholic."

The undeniable truth is intelligence is no more a factor in who may be an alcoholic than the day of the week they happened to be born.

What is too Rich, as "I don't live outdoors, I didn't spend last night under a bridge. I have an excellent paying job, a home in a nice neighborhood, an investment broker, a trust fund, and a BMW in my garage."

"Not me, I'm too well off financially (rich) to be an alcoholic."

The undeniable truth is that money and an individual's wealth play no role in who may or may not be an alcoholic.

My personal and professional experience in the Christian rehab, recovery, and treatment industry suggests it is either one, two, or all three of these reasons why people believe they cannot have a drinking problem.

In my own case, it was all three reasons, "the trifecta" as I like to refer to it, as to why I could not possibly be an alcoholic.

I was 38 years old, a college graduate, and a successful, small business owner who attended Church each Sunday. How could I possibly be an alcoholic? Besides, I had a lot of friends and especially relatives that spilled more alcohol than I ever drank.

I used to say, 'My only problem is when there is not enough to drink.'

The craving started most workdays between 1:00 p.m. and 3:00 p.m. It was at this time daily I would begin romancing the idea of having a few cold, "Tall Boys" on the drive home. Winter or summer, hot or cold, it made no difference. Stopping each late afternoon at the local convenience store or "packy" as we say in New England and purchasing what I considered my just reward for completing yet another day at work became a daily ritual.

I had become like Norm on Cheers. How else was I to make my way home through the late afternoon Boston traffic? Besides, I worked hard each day and deserved a few beers on my way home, didn't I?

I had always believed alcoholics were dirty, lived outdoors, and drank cheap wine from screw-top bottles.

Arriving at home each day before taking my jacket off, I would routinely reach into the fridge for yet another of my trusted friends, my Bud.

Oftentimes I would proceed to have several additional ice-cold beers in arm's reach while taking a hot bath or sitting in a bubbling jacuzzi.

Just one or two more before supper and I'd have captured once again the illusive beer buzz, I so craved at the end of each day.

I thought I could stop drinking any time it became necessary. The simple truth was I was living a lie and had a secret I could not share with anyone. I knew deep down inside I was not able to stop or even control my drinking.

I began to worry that it was just a matter of time before I hit what I had heard referred to as a "bottom" and lost everything. I discovered there are two "bottoms" an alcoholic usually experiences. There are what are referred to as High "bottoms" and Low "bottoms."

Examples of an alcoholic's Low "bottom" include DUIs, divorce, child-related custody, bankruptcy, job loss, hospitalization, and jail.

How could I be an alcoholic? I was only 38 years old; a college graduate and owner of both a sailboat and a BMW.

It wasn't until Super Bowl Sunday on a late afternoon during the winter of 1992 that my wife provided an ultimatum including a choice between drinking or losing my marriage and children. I gave up, finally surrendering as I was, lonely, desperate, and sick and tired of being sick and tired.

It was in taking a friend and former prep school classmate's advice and attending twelve-step meetings that allowed me to acknowledge I had become powerless over my alcohol, that my life had become unmanageable including the loss of my health, job, wife, children, home, boat, and car.

The tough love extended to me included attending ninety 12 Step meetings in ninety days. In hindsight, this tough love saved my life. The gratitude I have today stems from the fact that I did not lose everything, that I succumbed, surrendered, and acknowledged my alcoholic disease.


Something to Think About



Sports Gambling's Legalization: Nothing to Celebrate with Smiles and Applause By Rev. Mark Creech

Sports gambling is now legal in North Carolina. Gathered around Gov. Roy Cooper in Charlotte at the Spectrum Center, lawmakers and stakeholders smiled broadly and applauded with glee as he signed the legislation into law.

But a lot of us aren't smiling. Instead, we are grieving because we know our State, like Esau in the Old Testa-



For those who say, "Well, we can have both," they would do well to remember the words of Jesus, who said: "No one can serve two masters, for either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and money" (Matthew 6:24).

Some argue the times are changing, and we may as well embrace sports gambling. Yes, the times are changing, but we should at least hope for the better.

During the Nineteenth Century, many sports were created: Baseball, Basketball, American Football, Boxing, Tennis, and Wrestling, to name a few. During the Twentieth Century, these sports and others became widely popular and attracted huge crowds. This period was also characterized by the rise of superstars, including athletes such as Babe Ruth, Jim Brown, Muhammad Ali, Michael Jordan, and Jackie Joyner-Kersee.

The media has played a significant role in the expansion of sports, with sports events broadcast near and far on radio and television, making it a part of the very fabric of American life.

Still, it hasn't only been the entertainment value of sports that has traditionally made it such a grand thing through the decades. More importantly, it has been the morality it inspired. It's been a means for physical and mental development, building team spirit, shaping character, and instilling discipline. Athletics has enabled people to rise above their circumstances and become winners.

Sports have served a significant function in our culture, bringing us together, creating a sense of community and identity. It has been used to promote social harmony and political unity, particularly during wartime.

However, with the legalization of sports gambling in the Tar Heel state, along with the other twenty-five states that already legalized it, the goodness of sports will slowly but surely be supplanted by a culture of avarice and selfishness among players, coaches, and fans. Instead of focusing on the values of teamwork, fair play, and sportsmanship, people will become more concerned with winning bets and making profits. This will lead to the deterioration of the integrity of sports and a loss of respect for the games.

We can expect sports gambling to create an element of corruption and cheating. When large sums of money are at stake, individuals are more prone to bend and break the rules. Match-fixing, point-shaving, and other forms of cheating will erode the honor of the games.

Over time, sports gambling will diminish the role of sports as a source of inspiration and moral guidance for youth. Instead of inspiring them to work hard, demonstrate determination, and chase after their dreams, sports will become substantially associated with gambling and quick fixes.


The result? The generations to follow will be more focused on making money than developing a vision in life or advancing in decency and respectability.

Sports gambling also creates confusion about role models for today's youth. Pete Rose was banned from baseball for betting on it. He bet on his own team, the Cincinnati Reds when he was their manager. Was Rose the unfortunate victim of an overly moralistic Baseball Commissioner, A. Bartlett Giamatti? Or, is Rose now someone to be emulated? How is it possible to have clear role models in the field of sports when it's no longer about who wins on the field but who wins off of it? When it becomes about money, how can we be confident anymore about what's real and what isn't?

Governor Cooper and the Republicans who drove this legislation insisted sports gambling was already happening. But it wasn't happening to the extent it will, as gambling had not been authorized by the state government to become an integral part of sports culture, thereby virtualizing an old vice and empowering it to corrupt and weaken the real virtues of sports.

That's nothing to celebrate with smiles and applause.

Spirit Of Love

Did you know that there are animals that show love to one another and sometimes to other animals and humans? This month I thought we would talk about a predatory animal that shows love. It's hard to think of a predator that eats other ani-

mals being capable of showing affection. Can you guess what this animal is? A wolf. There were once 26 wolf species, 24 of which are now extinct, all that is left is the gray and red wolf. Wild red wolves can now only be found in North Carolina.

Gray wolves are not only gray but can be black, tan, and white.

Wolves are extremely social pack animals that mate for life. Their pack is a family, made up of parents and their offspring. Juveniles live with their parents sometimes until they are three years old, or when they are mature, sometimes they are younger. Juveniles will then leave that pack and start their own. A pack can have as many as thirty members but the usual number is between five and eight.

Wolves only mate once a year. Pups weigh one pound and are deaf and blind when they are born. They are very dependent on their mothers. Older pups often help raise and take care of the new pup liters. New liters usually consist of four to six pups. These pups grow quickly and are big enough to start exploring on their own at three weeks. By ten months old, they are as big as an adult wolf.

Adult wolves can reach as much as 6.5 feet in length, 32 inches tall, and weigh as much as 145 pounds (sometimes more). Their lifespan in the wild on average is 6-8 years but can be as much as 13.

A wolf's footprint can span up to five inches long. They have four toes with claws that form an oval shape. Wolves can run up to 38mph in short lengths. They usually travel at a sprint of 5mph. Wolves run on their toes, not the pads of their feet.

Wolf packs travel up to thirty miles a day. Their territories can be as large as 1000 square miles.

Wolves have forty-two teeth with a jaw-crushing power of 1500 pounds per square inch! In comparison, a Rottweiler's jaw-crushing power is 328 pounds per square inch. A single wolf can eat up to 20 pounds of meat a day. They mainly eat small critters but have been known to also eat ungulates (hooved mammals). Supposedly wolves don't consider humans prey and won't attack something that is not moving. However, I'm not willing to test out that theory!

A newborn's eyes are bright blue (even though they are born blind) as they grow their eyes turn yellow. They then glow. They have a see-through covering, called tapetum lucidum, that causes them to glow. It also gives them the ability to see in the dark. Our eyesight is actually better than theirs when it comes to color and distance. Wolves' eyes, however, are better than ours when tracking move-

Wolves communicate in several ways. Silent body language is one they use while hunting. They may give a "gaze signal" during a group hunt to coordinate what to do without the prey hearing their presence. Other body language is eye contact, facial expressions, and posture.

Scent is another form of communication. Wolves have over 200 million scent cells. They communicate through urination markings, scratchings, etc.

Howling is another form of communication. Wolves can hear other wolves' howls up to 10 miles away. Each wolf has its own unique howl. Howling is their way of sending messages to other pack members. It helps them assemble their pack, scare off non-pack members, locate lost pack members, and defend their territory from intruders.

Wolves howl out of love when a member of their pack is missing. They will howl more that night than other nights so the estranged member can find their way back home.

When a wolf howl is followed by a bark, this is an alarm to other members. Sometimes wolves stand together, touching each other in a line, and howl together. Their tails are raised and quivering at the very tip.

Growling, barking, and whining are some other types of communication.

Wolves also show affection by rubbing noses when they see each other, and delivering "wet noses," (licking faces) to another's face. They also groom one another, nip, lick, and bite to show love. Snuggling and curling up together when they are asleep are other examples of affection.

A wolf's saliva has healing properties and can heal wounds, fight bacteria growth, and encourage new tissue growth.

Showing affection and love to each pack member gives them a strong bond and eeps their pack strong instead of vulnerable.

Wolves take care of each other in their family, even when they are hurt or sick. They educate and raise their young. They also love to play with one another. When wolves are raised by humans they show these same traits when showing love to their human pack members, but not every human is considered a pack member.

According to Oxford Dictionary, love is an intense feeling of deep affection. Can you find all the ways in this article that describe how wolves show love and affection?

Can you think of ways that love was demonstrated in the Bible? I immediately think of God giving us His only Son that was sacrificed so we could be saved. I also think of Jesus washing the disciples' feet out of love. Another example is when Jesus performed a miracle and feed the 5000 with 2 fish and 5 loaves of bread. Esther also demonstrated love when she put her life at risk to save her people. Moses's mother showed love when she put him in the basket and sent

him down the river to save his life. Pharaoh's daughter showed compassion and love by saving Moses and raising him as her own. There are many examples of love in the Bible. Can you think of any others?

What are ways you can show love to others?

Dear Lord, I pray that You will help us react lovingly and show love



to others so they may see You. I pray that we will remember all the examples of love in the Bible. I pray they will help us in our daily life. In spite of world-wide drought, Western North Carolina is embracing her children in greenery. Wildflowers delight the eye and the mind. Gardens



approach full production. Blackberries ooze purple nectar. Clover bloom graces most roadways. The ancient sacrament of converting summer growth to winter feed reminds us that all flesh is grass. None of these miracles would be possible without the blessing of showers.

Rain is a gift. Paul and Barnabas once healed a man crippled from birth. Residents of Lystra attempted to worship these messengers of the Gospel. While explaining whom they should worship, Paul said, "(God) did not leave himself without witness, for he did good by giving you rains from heaven and fruitful seasons, satisfying your hearts with food and gladness." (Acts 14:17) Similar teaching is found in Isaiah 55:10-11, "For as the rain and the snow come down from heaven and do not return there but water the earth, making it bring forth and sprout, giving seed to the sower and bread to the eater, so shall my word be that goes out from my mouth; it shall not return to me empty,"

I cannot read what the Bible says about rain without wondering why we are not experiencing a nation-wide drought. The Bible links blessing to obedience. Part of the litany of curses which accrue to disobedience is found in Deuteronomy 28:23-24, "The heavens over your head shall be bronze, and the earth under you shall be iron. The LORD will make the rain of your land powder. From heaven dust shall come down on you until you are destroyed." God says that He will reward disobedience with curses. By that standard, our once-great nation is rushing toward destruction.

Our President recently hosted a celebration of perversion. The Chief Executive addressed an assembly of men pretending to be women as "the bravest and most inspiring people I've ever known." In one sentence, he lauded a range of sexual deviance which the Bible labels "abomination" and also insulted millions of soldiers, policemen, firefighters, and others who have demonstrated legitimate bravery throughout our nation's history.

This national disgrace on the White House lawn was a celebration of "pride." According to the Bible, pride foreshadows an inexorable antecedent. "Do not be deceived: God is not mocked, for whatever one sows, that will he also reap." The promise of Galatians 6:7 is that divine retribution is assured. All of us will be judged and repaid: good for good, and evil for evil. When faced with the evil which has commandeered our national agenda, believers may be tempted to despair. We cannot afford that luxury. Our marching orders are still clear, and our work is more important than ever.

Paul prophesied our modern culture of perversion: "For the time is coming when people will not endure sound teaching, but having itching ears they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own passions, and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander off into myths. As for you, always be sober-minded, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, fulfill your ministry." This familiar instruction to Timothy has achieved surreal poignancy. Those who promote "pride" will not stop until every American is forced to endorse their depravity. We who recognize and revere the path of Christ-like humility have much to do

Jesus instructed His followers to make disciples of all nations, to baptize them in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, and to teach them to observe all of His commandments. The only means God's children have to counter the devil's onslaught is to faithfully and prayerfully fulfill the Great Commission.

The first component of our Commission is to make disciples of every nation. Many churches talk about "disciples" and "discipleship," but few believers appear to understand the concept. A disciple is not someone who merely knows a great deal about the Bible. A disciple lives and acts and thinks like Jesus. Discipleship is built upon an intimate knowledge of God's word. Jesus said that the Law of Moses, the Prophets, and the Psalms are all about Him. (Luke 24:44) Everyone who ignores the first three quarters of the Bible chooses willful ignorance of our Lord and Savior. The only way to learn how to live and act and think like Jesus is to pick up the Bible and read it from the beginning. "Whoever says he abides in (Jesus) ought to walk in the same way in which he walked." (1 John 2:6)

The second part of our commission is to baptize disciples in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Jesus did not tell us to argue about baptism or its purpose. He did not tell us that we have the option of refusing to baptize or be baptized. He said that every believer must be immersed in water.

Finally, our Commission states that we must teach disciples to observe His every command. This instruction is related to the first. Hebrew thought employs repetition for emphasis. By telling us the same thing twice, Jesus is underscoring the importance of living as He lived. Those who insist that Jesus only gave two commandments—love God and love others—invariably define "love" as some vague, warm feeling. Godly "love" is an action verb. Details of "how" to love are found in the first five books of the Bible.







God of Mercy and Judgment

In last month's article, we started to examine the second commandment from Exodus 20:4-6, "You shall not make for yourself a carved image, or any likeness of anything that is in heaven above, or that is in the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth. You shall not bow down to them or serve them, for I the LORD your God am a jealous God, visiting the iniquity of the fathers on the children to the third



and the fourth generation of those who hate me, but showing steadfast love to thousands of those who love me and keep my commandments (ESV)." We showed that God being "jealous" comes from the Hebrew ka-na and refers to God having great energy and enthusiasm in pursuit of the righteous behavior and salvation of His people.

The next part of this verse, "visiting the iniquity of the fathers on the children to the third and the fourth generation of those who hate me" also has posed a question for some. At first glance, this sentence sounds kind of harsh and in contradiction with other passages in the Bible. For instance, Ezekiel 18:20 clearly states, "The soul who sins shall die. The son shall not suffer for the iniquity of the father, nor the father suffer for the iniquity of the son. The righteousness of the righteous shall be upon himself, and the wickedness of the wicked shall be upon himself (ESV)."

So what is meant by "visiting the iniquity of the fathers on the children to the third and fourth generation?" Are these two sets of verses in contradiction with each other? Over the next two articles, we will examine this phrase to see if we can gain a little more understanding of these seemingly contradictory verses. Exodus 34:5-7 is one of the remarkable passages in the Old Testament where the LORD shows His glory and proclaims the name "the LORD/YHVH." This set of verses has very similar wording regarding "visiting the iniquity of the fathers..." Before we examine this phrase, let's review its precursor Exodus 34:5-7.

"The LORD descended in the cloud and stood with him [Moses] there and proclaimed the name of the LORD. 6 The LORD passed before him and proclaimed, "The LORD, the LORD, a God merciful and gracious, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love and faithfulness, 7 keeping steadfast love for thousands, forgiving iniquity and transgression and sin, but who will by no means clear the guilty, visiting the iniquity of the fathers on the children and the children's children, to the third and the fourth generation" (ESV).

Let's examine some key points in this verse:

- 1. First, the Hebrew for "the name of the LORD" is "B'shem YHVH." The word shem, translated as "name" is referring to His reputation and authority as well as what He is called.
- 2. The words in these verses are the LORD's/YHVH's revelation of His character. His character defines His relationship with His people. Yes, that included 15th century B.C. Israel but it also includes 21st-century believers in Jesus as well as those in between.
- 3. The Hebrew word for mercy in verse 6 is rahum. This word refers to deep mercy and compassion that is similar to a mother's gentle love for her children.
- 4. The word gracious, hanun, according to Hebrew scholars and authors Practico and Van Pelt1 is only used in reference to God and in most cases, it appears in combination with the word rahum (mercy). This is a degree of graciousness and compassion beyond human ability.
- 5. Grace is that aspect of God's character that gives what is not deserved, whereas mercy withholds what is deserved. God, in His great grace, gives us redemption. He buys us back from sin, the ways of this world, and the deceiver, even though we don't deserve it. He saves us, even though we deserve the opposite.
- 6. The term for "slow to anger" erek afyim is a Hebrew idiom for "longsuffering" "patient" or "slow to anger." This is referring to God's remarkable and outstanding patience. His patience is demonstrated principally concerning His mercy. 7. Abounding in steadfast love and faithfulness. The Hebrew words are chesed and emeth. God's steadfast love (chesed) is a divine love that is forgiving, re-
- and emeth. God's steadfast love (chesed) is a divine love that is forgiving, redeeming, and relentless in pursuit of those to whom it is to be given. God wants to and is willing to forgive everyone. God's truthfulness and faithfulness (emeth) carry with them the certainty that the divine attributes of this self-revelation will last forever. They will never fail.

Let's review the descriptive phrases in these verses: merciful, gracious/compassionate, slow to anger, abounding in steadfast love and faithfulness (KJV-abundant in goodness and truth), keeping steadfast love for thousands, forgiving iniquity, forgiving transgressions, and forgiving sins; yet He does not leave the guilty unpunished, and the results of sin may be felt until the fourth generation. Pause and think about what we have just covered. God is a God of mercy, and He is also a God of judgment.

By the way, I count, I add up to nine phrases related to mercy and forgiveness and only two related to judgment. Although, these last two, those that appear to be related to judgment, can also be considered acts of divine compassion. For example, God does not leave the guilty unpunished. To have a stable and safe society the guilty cannot be left free to do whatever they please. Being corrected is necessary for a person to realize his or her mistakes. If a person doesn't realize right from wrong, the chances are he or she may never mend his or her ways.

The holiness and justice of God are part of His goodness and love toward all of His creation. God does not allow sin to dwell within His camps. This is an act of kindness

Now consider the phrase, "visiting the iniquity of the fathers upon the children,

and upon the children's children, unto the third and to the fourth generation." This will be explored further in next month's article.

You did a good job getting all those animals in the ark, "said Noah's wife to her husband, "but I really think you should have put the termites in a jar."



A Pastor's View

Coming Back to the Father

In a state prison in Hominy, Oklahoma, was an area called the "pig slop" pit, into which animal renderings and other food wastes were thrown into big barrels. Every so often, a vendor hauled the barrels away. One day, one of the inmates climbed into one of those barrels. The truck took him away, but when he climbed out of the barrel at a service station,



someone reported him, and he was re-arrested and sent back to prison.

In Luke 15 Jesus told the story of another man who found himself in pig slop: the Prodigal Son. The tale of the young man and his father is well-loved, as it is very much "the story of us all", picturing the relationship we each have with our Heavenly Father.

We have all left the Father

:13 "the younger son gathered everything together and went on a journey into a distant country, and there he squandered his estate with loose living."

The young man undoubtedly envisioned how great it would be to leave his father and live in that far country, and it WAS great — for a while! But he ended up impoverished, in the pig slop, longing to be fed with the pig's food.

This is mankind's story from the beginning. Tempted by Satan, Adam and Eve ate the fruit God had forbidden them. As a result, they were cast out of the Garden and the presence of God. In their choice to sin, they left the Father.

Each of us since has done the same thing. "For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God," Romans 3:23 says. Isaiah 59:2 says, "Your iniquities have caused a separation between you and your God." All of us have left the Father as Adam & Eve did.

When I was 6 years old, at Christmas time, my sister had a big red balloon in the shape of a bear. I was so jealous, that at one point I took a fork, and popped it, pretty much ruining Christmas Eve! That's the first specific memory I have of choosing to sin.

Someone might say: "That was not some great sin!" – but it's not the MAGNI-TUDE of our sin that matters; but the FACT of it. I knew the right thing to do but did wrong instead. All sin separates us from God.

The story of Adam & Eve and the Prodigal Son has been repeated in every one of us. We've all left the Father. Some have gone into a "far country" in a sense, like the Prodigal Son. Others just went "down the road" a little, comparatively speaking. But the distance doesn't matter as much as the fact: whether near or far, at some point or another, all have left the Father's house. We've all sinned against God

We are all loved by the Father

:20 "But while he was still a long way off, his father saw him, and felt compassion for him, and ran and embraced him and kissed him."

In the pig slop, the Prodigal Son decided to return to his father. He didn't know how he'd be received. But the Bible shows the father always loved his wayward son. It says he was watching ... waiting ... longing. "And while he was still a long way off ... his father saw him ...".

When my daughter was young, she was invited by a friend to her house one Friday afternoon. Libby waited all week to go. Finally, Friday came, and there was Libby, 2 hours beforehand, bags packed; standing with her nose to the glass door, watching to see if Rachel's car might be coming around the corner!

That's the father's attitude in this story — and it's God's attitude towards YOU! He loves you; and although you have left Him in your sin, He still loves you, and longs for you to come back to Him. The greatest sign, however, that God wants you back, is the cross of Jesus Christ. At the cross, God made history's greatest sacrifice. With the blood of Jesus, He paid for your sins so you could be forgiven, and be restored to a relationship with Him. At the cross, God said powerfully and finally: "I love you, and I want you back!" Just like the son in this story, you are loved by the Father!

We must all return to the Father

Verse 17 says: "But when he came to his senses, he said, 'I will get up and go to my father'...".

The young man finally changed his mind and returned to his father. This gives us a picture of "repentance." Repentance is a change of mind, that leads to a change of direction. It means you were going one way – away from God – and you think better of it, and come back to Him.

A few years ago, we took a "Field Trip Friday" to visit unexplored areas of the state. At one town, we took the old main street through a little downtown area — but suddenly, the main street just ENDED, at the foot of a plateau! If we were going to go anywhere else, a U-turn was absolutely required!

Salvation is that way too. A "U-turn" is "absolutely required" to be reconciled with God. You've been going in the wrong direction, away from God; so to be saved, you must turn around and come back to Him by turning from your sins and accepting Jesus as your Lord & Savior. You must personally respond to God.

When we lived in Tulsa, I preached a message on the Prodigal Son. I shared how a few years before, a dying woman had written a letter to God, asking Him to save her in Jesus' name. I said that in the same way, each of us must make our own personal response to God. A little boy sat with his parents in the church that morning. Jason was a typical child; he had done things he shouldn't have. But as he heard the message that day, he responded by writing his own letter to the Lord, in the form of a prayer, which his mother later showed me:

"Dere Lorde I know I hav send. Ples Pogev me. I love you, God. Ples come in to my horet that is all I wonte. God you are the greatest God. And in your name amene. Love, Jason."

Significantly, Jason decorated his letter with a hand-drawn cross: the cross I'd preached about, where Jesus showed His love for him by dying on the cross for his sins. Jason knew he had sinned, and he asked God to forgive him, responding to Him with that letter.

Jason's story is a precious reminder that we must each personally respond to God. It's not enough to merely read this story, or understand what it says. You must respond to it, and personally repent and return to the Father. If you've never done it before, why don't you write your own letter to God today, asking Him to save you, in Jesus' name?



What's Behind the Obvious?

The large room echoed the painting's vast feel of King Solomon's court as the Queen of Sheba presented herself. I felt drawn inward to join the others of the court, gaping at her beauty and the treasures she presented to the wisest man who had ever lived.

When I peer into a list of named Bible women, I feel the same way. Catching fleeting patterns, I pause to consider their impact and walk away, stunned at the messages rising to the surface of my understanding. Hidden in a list of named Bible women, secrets to our success in living a Christian life rest on the surface of the ancient pages of the Bible. Here are three secrets to whet your spiritual appetite.

1. Our names can point others to Jesus and His saving power. God considers names important because they define, reveal, and describe people and things. Newly discovered stars receive names from astronomers and scientists. Parents honor their newborn babies with names chosen after much thought. And, God revealed His own name in His Word. When we become His children, He even writes our names on the palm of His hand. As we live for the Lord, our names become synonymous with His character, and others notice. God makes Himself known to others through our actions and words as our names bear influence for Christ. God allowed the named women in the Bible to reach out to us through their divinely-told drama with messages of wisdom and practical solutions. The same problems they experienced we encounter today, and the crises remain basically ageless: relationships, emotions, and actions. Their names become the same with caution or encouragement. Jezebel warns us about anger and craving for control. The Bible equates Her name with a sinister evil. Mary, the mother of Jesus, reminds us, simply by her name, to be gentle and kind, ignoring the taunts and threats of others to focus on Jesus, our Savior.

Our names possess power in the sense of influence. The purpose of the power of our names exists to point others to Jesus.

- 2. Our godly community can lead us closer to each other and Christ. One of the patterns in the list reveals another secret—the power of community. Looking at the Bible references reveals that a whopping 75% of the list of named Bible women have close or exact references. Their stories could not be extracted from each other. We need both of their stories to complete the messages that God wants us to know from their crises. God wants His people to be in community—encouraging, teaching, giving, serving, discerning, guiding, and showing compassion to others. Together, we are stronger. As we support other Christians, and they provide resources for us, living for Christ emerges as a reality, not just wishful thinking or theory.
- 3. Legacy leaves a lasting impression on the Gospel. Legacy wafts through our minds with a wisp of lavender buds or maybe yellowed lace, rich with memories. Likewise, Bible stories we cherish form spiritual legacies within our hearts. Sarah, Abraham's wife, begins her faith journey in the Old Testament in Genesis and closes with God's final honor to her in Hebrews 11:11. We can trace Sarah's journey from acknowledging God in the Old Testament—stumbling through doubt, and poor choices, and fighting barrenness—to being in the Hall of Faith in Hebrews chapter eleven. Her story finally ended after millennia as God called her a woman of faith. What a legacy she leaves us of how to travel through life, toward faith, trusting in the promises of God!

Other secrets lay hidden in the list. Search for them. They contain treasures untold to enrich and enlarge your Christian life.

In his painting, Tintoretto depicted the Queen of Sheba as she visited King Solomon. As I ponder the spiritual analogy of the hidden hat some fifty years later, as revealed by the light of the curator's tool, I realized a simple yet profound truth. A list of named Bible women, seen through the light of God's Word, uncovers discoveries of God's vast love and infinite care for His children.

Education Foundation Awards Grants To Classroom Projects

The Burke Education Foundation, Inc., recently awarded \$3,000 in funds to three Burke County Public Schools teachers for classroom projects. Table Rock Middle School science teacher Angela Happoldt received \$2,371 for flexible seating; Patton High School

science teacher Will Singley received \$379 for a device to collect weather data; and Anna Koon, a kindergarten teacher at Glen Alpine Elementary School re-

ceived \$250 for garden planters. Foundation Board Chair Chasity Poteat Rice said, "Congratulations to these three innovative teachers for proposing these meaningful projects for their students. The Foundation received 23 requests during our open grants period, and the board had tough decisions to make regarding funding. All of the project requests

were intriguing, and we appreciate the time and effort that went into the teachers

describing their projects and making their submissions."

Happoldt said her project seeks to incorporate blended learning models and flexible seating in her seventhgrade science classroom. She said, "Blended learning has many benefits, such as increased instructional time and personalized learning opportunities for students. They both promote student empowerment and engagement with collaborative learning opportunities that are student-paced



and student-led. I feel this project would help students feel comfortable in my classroom to be able to collaborate and work with teams when needed." Happoldt explained that blended learning covers many types of models, and its main goal is to combine active, engaged learning online with active and engaging learning activities in the classroom to provide students control over the time, place, path, and/or pace of learning. She said, "Blended learning offers a range of models that free us from the front of the room and allow us to work directly with individuals and small groups of learners."

Singley plans to use his grant to purchase a weather science kit to collect weather data right outside his classroom. "A tempest weather station, handheld weather meter, and activity cards can be used to collect data used in Earth/Environmental Science classes. It will open conversations about atmosphere and weather units. Beyond the classroom, coaches and trainers can use it to detect incoming storms and make sound decisions regarding outdoor practices and games. This brings technology into the classroom and provides an interdisciplinary experience, as the data can be used to show trends, look at averages, create graphs, and plenty more that align with math courses."

Koon plans to incorporate garden planters into science, technology, engineering, and math lessons for her kindergarten students. Koon said, "Gardening is a great introduction to STEM projects, and kids love to learn about nature and the life cycles of plants. The planters will allow my students the opportunity to get their hands dirty and encourage responsibility. It will also provide kids the opportunity to gain a better understanding of where our food comes from. I have also discovered that oftentimes kids are more willing to try different herbs and veggies when they play a role in growing them."


Burke County Public Schools Superintendent Dr. Mike Swan said, "We are appreciative of the Burke Education Foundation and its efforts to support our teachers and students. Congratulations to Mrs. Happoldt, Mrs. Koon, and Mr. Singley for these opportunities to expand classroom experiences in creative ways for their students."

Past gifts of the Burke Education Foundation have included assisting with a mindfulness classroom at East Burke Middle School, contributing to the needy children's fund of all 26 schools, and donating to the Burke County United Way backpack program.

Let's Love Like Jesus!

I met Mary during my first months with NC Baptist Aging Ministry, and have not forgotten her. She was living with her son and his wife. They had isolated her to one part of the house—the basement. She never went outside and no one ever saw her. Her basic needs were not met. Her daughter-in-law was abusive to her. And while Mary suffered this abuse, she was also suffering from cancer.



Mary lived in sight of a church but was out of sight. Sadly, her situation is not unlike many aging adults in our communities—and churches. Without hope, they suffer alone, weep in silence, and have no one to lean on.

But with more awareness, we can help the "Marys" around us!

As many as five million elders are abused, neglected, or exploited each year in the United States. We may think these types of abuse are happening somewhere else, far away. Not here in North Carolina, not in my community, and not in my neighbor's house. But they are.

Studies suggest only one in 24 cases are ever reported. Older adults are often reluctant to report mistreatment or admit it when asked. Neighbors are unaware-or think they should "mind their own business."

Mary was one of the lucky ones. A daughter, who lived out-of-state, came for a visit and saw her mother's mistreatment. The daughter reached out to a local nonprofit who then reached out to me. I connected Mary's daughter with a local church and turned the whole situation around for Mary. Someone knew of a trailer for rent; the owner got the utilities turned on; the church paid for the utilities and a few months' rent; they helped Mary and her daughter move into the trailer; and furnish it with household items. All before dark on the first day!

- What are the warning signs of elder abuse?
- Bruises, burns, cuts, scratches, sprains, fractures, dislocations
- Untreated medical condition(s) or not receiving prescribed meds
- Isolation
- Sudden changes in a will, power of attorney, or financial situation
- Mental anguish and distress
- Repeated requests to the doctor or pharmacy for prescription refills
- Hesitation to talk openly; withdrawal from normal activities
- Strained or tense relationship with family members or caregiver
- Unsafe or unsanitary housing

What can you or your church do?

- Pray for God's guidance. And move!
- If you suspect abuse, neglect or exploitation, make a report to your local Department of Social Services.
- Visit the elderly in your community. Listen with your ears, eyes, and heart.
- Give a caregiver a break! Provide respite, run an errand, help with the laundry, take dinner to them.
- Visit those who live in isolation. See what they need. Show them that God loves them, and that you do, too.
- Encourage your church to partner with your local Department of Social Services so that you can offer help or resources.

Like Moses, he lived like a king in Egypt then he spent 40 years in the desert tending to a bunch of sheep, little did he know that this was getting him ready to lead a multitude of Israelites people out of Egypt to the Promise land. Moses didn't see it coming. I hate to say it but many of us are like Dorothy in the Wizard of Oz. She dreamed there was someplace like "Over The Rainbow" where troubles would melt away like lollipops and gumdrops. She was sure that there was a trouble-free place that she could go. But on her way to that destiny, Dorothy encounters a whole lot of troubles; Evil Witches, a Scary Forest, Mean Flying Monkeys, and an Overbearing Wizard.

In the Christian Life, you can be sure that God has a Plan and a Purpose for our lives. And you can also be sure it is not always the shortest route or the easiest way to get there. See all the challenges that we face in life are maturing us and equipping us for God's big plan in our lives. Seldom does God take us from Point A to Z in life without causing us to stop at L, M, N, O, P, along the way. When I was a little fellow my mom and dad bought me a punching bag and boy it was fun. You could take out a lot of frustration on it. The foundation of the punching bag determined that it was going to come back up each time. I can guarantee you that somewhere down the line, some things are going to go boom in your life and you're going to hit the ground with a bang. But if you're on the right foundation you will come back up and be able to stand on your feet. Even when you don't see it coming. That's why we need to keep our spiritual foundation strong, so we will always rise back to our feet from the challenges that knock us down.

Av is a month on the Jewish Calendar. This year it falls on the evening of July 26th through the evening of July 27th. It's an important day in the Jewish calendar and we should keep an eye on it every year. God seems to plan prophetic events around the Jewish calendar. - 1. The spies returned from canvassing the promised land and the people said "We won't go in!" This led to 40 years of wandering in the desert and the death of that entire generation of Jews beginning on—the 9th of Av.
- 2. After years of disobedience, in 586 BC, the armies of Babylon destroyed the first Temple and massacred thousands of Jews—on the 9th of Av.
- 3. Because Jesus was rejected by the Jews, in AD 70, the second Temple was destroyed, again with numerous deaths—on the 9th of Av.
- 4. About 100 yrs later, the Romans crushed the Jewish city of Bethar killing over 100,000 Jews—on the 9th of Av.
- 5. The Crusades of the middle ages, which killed thousands of Jews began on Aug. 15th, 1096—the 9th of Av.

Are you getting the picture that this is not a happy anniversary for the Jewish people? But it's not over.

- 6. In 1290, all Jews were expelled from England—the 9th of Av.
- 7. In 1492, all Jews were expelled from Spain—the 9th of Av.
- 8. WWI began in 1914. This would lead to WWII and the holocaust in which 6 million Jews would be exterminated. It all began on—the 9th of Av.

This July 26th and 27th, let us keep our Jewish friends in prayer. Their unfaith-fulness to God and their rejection of Messiah seem to be the reason for their suffering. Pray that they recognize Jesus as the true Messiah, for it is He alone who can break this curse.



"Put it in your pocket and when you feel tempted, touch it and rub it." That was the common advice our addiction recovery small group leader would give people when he gave out the sobriety tokens.

Recovery is a life-long battle. And as a pastor I can verify that some folks who get off drugs, stop drink-



But Paul's words to the Corinthian church give us hope when we battle temptations. This verse is a tool we can have in our toolbelt. It equips us for the battle against our struggles and trials that appear often in the form of temptations. Paul tells the Corinthians:

"No temptation has overtaken you but such as is common to man; and God is faithful, who will not allow you to be tempted beyond what you are able, but with the temptation will provide the way of escape also, so that you will be able to endure it." 1 Corinthians 10:13 (NASB)

What a great source of hope this verse provides us! God will not let us be challenged beyond what we can handle. He will not let us get in over our heads. Charles Ryrie says when this verse describes a "way of escape" it means "power to be able to bear testing" (Ryrie Study Bible, p. 1423).

How do we do this? It will look different for everyone. We need to have a friend we can rely on that we can call at any time to say, "Hey, I'm struggling right now. Can we talk?" We need a small group that we can send a text message to and ask them to pray. We need a Scripture to memorize that we can quote in our mind when we feel tempted. We need a pastor we know we can call and organize a coffee or lunch with to discuss our struggles.

While facing temptation will look different for each person, the outcome is always the same when we rely on God. We will be able to endure them!

Still A Dream...Or A Nightmare?

"Mommy, Mommy, help!"

Between soothing words, warm hugs, and a prayer for peace...maybe even a song...my child returned to sleep peacefully. But, at that particular moment between sleep and wakefulness, his fear was palpably real. Upon awakening, he could see the truth.



July 4 commemorates the birth of our nation. We remember truths from our heritage. It's a patriotic day of fun get-togethers and celebratory fireworks. We're wowed by the radiant bursts of light illuminating the sky and the accompanying boom in our chests.

With thanksgiving, let's honor God who bestowed his bounty on our nation. The American dream is still hope for all citizens of this great land. But, if we don't wake up soon and recognize that we're turning our backs on what made us great, we may be caught in a nightmare from which we can't awaken.

When the fifty-six courageous men signed the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776, they declared by solemn oath to firmly rely on the protection of Divine Providence and pledged to each other their lives, their fortunes, and their sacred honor.

These men were well-respected prosperous, wealthy landowners who took a huge step of faith together. Freedom meant more to them than their possessions. 
Tim's Treasures

An Ancient Oven and the Body of Christ

"And Jesus said unto them, I am the bread of life: he that cometh to me shall never hunger; and he that believeth on me shall never thirst." – John 6:35

It was a rainy, overcast Saturday when in the moment of time, I found myself leading a tour at the Trail of Faith in




As I shared how the bread was made, describing the oven's use in that process and attempting to convey what it was to taste that freshly baked loaf of succulence after it was just pulled from the hot coals seemed wholly insufficient. There was just so much behind the story that one couldn't know until it was experienced. In many ways, it has a very close correlation to how we come to know the Gospel of Christ – what seems delectable becomes ever more so when one understands the effort and struggle that went into bringing that morsel into being. Many have died to preserve the Word of God. That representation of God in the flesh was as to us as manna from Heaven. Jesus said, "I am the bread of life: he that cometh to me shall never hunger; and he that believeth on me shall never thirst."

Once upon a time, when I was the Director at the Trail, it occurred to me that the experience, the idea of bringing the Waldensian story to life, would be made even more realistic if we actually baked bread in the outdoor oven. After all, the replica was designed distinctly after one that existed in the Waldensian Valleys. Now, one of the most challenging parts of this endeavor had already been accomplished. The oven at the Trail was beautifully crafted. The stone masons had created a work of art using the field stones from the Burke County area. The replica was a fitting tribute to its predecessor. Now all that was left to do was to figure out how to bake bread in it. But there was one small catch – there were no directions. As in our search for Jesus, trying to go it alone can often be difficult, if not impossible. We need a guide. Jesus told his disciples that he would send a Comforter to guide them. And it is through the Holy Spirit and the Word that we are led. Yet, many still fail to follow the guide even reading God's word. Many attend church expecting the preacher to spoon-feed them every word instead of seeking it themselves. When you genuinely want to know something, you must seek it. As Jesus told the woman at the well, "But the hour cometh, and now is, when the true worshippers shall worship the Father in spirit and in truth: for the Father seeketh such to worship him."


As in the case of our oven and how we were to use it - something that had been passed down from generation to generation had all but been lost. Then there were the physical challenges; our replica also had no door for the opening, and there were no temperature gauges or controls. There was much to learn before that first loaf was ever made. My search for understanding led me to several dead-ends, most of which were the locals in Valdese that hadn't ever actually used a working oven like ours – the ancient style. Again, another parallel. Unlike those ancient Waldensians, many, but not all, of their descendants cannot even begin to compare their commitment to faith as were their ancestors. Their faith had not been passed down from one generation to the next as in the days of old. Yes, it's easy to say you would die for your belief in God, but to find yourself burning at the stake, quoting scriptures from the heart as the flames tore into your very being, melting the flesh from your bones, is a different story. There is seldom any comparison between most modern believers to those of ancient times.

To know one's destination, one has to find it. Seeking something you want to reach without a map can be troubling, if not irritatingly frustrating. When we have nothing to read or study, we have to search for clues, for aspects of that goal which we want to achieve possibly left behind by our predecessors, or someone that successfully reached that special place, leaving hidden gems of knowledge for us to use. Imagine trying to find God without the Bible or anyone that knew anything about Jesus. You can honestly say it would be very difficult, if not impossible.

The oven itself was a semi-circular-shaped dome with a flue just outside the door. Years before I arrived, it had been used during an event with the help of an elderly couple that had used one like it back in the original valleys. Sadly, they had passed. All that was left were the traces of smoke residue and the tools they had used to control the fire and remove the ashes. But from what I could discover



Again, the search for instruction on how to make the old hearth work is much like the unbeliever's search in today's world, looking for answers about God. There are places on the internet, others who can be sought out for understanding, and there can be traces as the smoke on



It took several hours of trial and error before we eventually found the proper process to produce that first golden loaf. But that was not even the start of our challenges. Before we could begin the first fire, we had to find firewood. So, gathering as much help as possible, we were provided the forest to find the trees, but we had to go and do it physically. This meant cutting the trees, hauling the wood, then stacking it near the oven. There, by the oven, we began splitting the wood by hand. In all, even though we hadn't built the oven ourselves, we soon learned that to bring a single loaf to life, there would be a lot of work behind the scenes, much like ministry.

Although someone might find their way to Christ alone, usually, there is a concerted effort made by a group or outreach organization to make it happen. There may be years of study, worship, and devotion behind those souls who go out and share the Good News of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. It is most assuredly never the "add water" version of evangelism. Even in Christ's time, many misunderstood his mission. As Jesus quickly found, after the feeding of the five thousand, they came looking the next day for more food. He marveled that they saw the miracles, but their spirits were not filled, only their bellies. He told them, "Truly, truly, I say to you, you are seeking me, not because you saw signs, but because you ate your fill of the loaves. Do not work for the food that perishes, but for the food that endures to eternal life, which the Son of Man will give to you. For on him God the Father has set his seal..." In other words, just eating the right food isn't going to save you. Living right isn't going to send you to heaven. There is an effort that must be made to find Him and to receive Him into your heart. We are saved by Grace and not by works alone.

Now, through all of this, the gathering, cutting, and splitting of the firewood, there was a component of the struggle that uniquely, unexpectedly incorporated the help of several people, all of whom were attracted to the idea of making bread in an ancient outdoor oven. As time would tell, that camaraderie of effort soon turned into a fellowship of sharing the Gospel. You see, even though we had a destination in mind, there were hungry souls to be fed along the way. As we worked, we talked about the implications of sharing the bread on the Trail and how it might be perceived. We talked about how Jesus was the bread of life and how folks would receive this as part of their tour experience. This drew many discussions, which increased the awareness, and the reality of scriptures, bringing them to life before we even baked the first loaf.

While that group of young people listened to me describe how we made the fire in that ancient chamber of stone, they had no idea of the extent of time that would go into that moment. When we would pull out a golden brown, delectable-smelling loaf of bread from that oven, there would be countless hours of work, but even more rewarding, of fellowshipping with all who made that moment possible. It is no wonder that even the group that day had no idea of the beauty, the smell, or the inexplicably gratifying image of seeing the representation of the body of Christ being pulled from the hearth on a spatula fitting for an ancient oven to behold the Glory before you.


There are almost no words with which can adequately form the impression that we found the day that the first loaf was placed before the unsuspecting tour group. As we fed them the hot, fresh bread and said, "This is the body of Christ broken for you," there was no wonder, and without expectation, as tears began to flow from the guests and, soon, those servers as well. We never realized the impact that all that had been done would lead to that moment when the Holy Spirit would come down and join us. This scene would repeat itself again and again, as we found that there was something beyond exceptional at the ancient outdoor oven. When the Gospel is given genuinely, without pomp or circumstance, in the original form for what it is, as Christ died for our sins, and that we can remember him each time we break bread in fellowship with one another, it is no wonder that when we do as He taught, we cannot help but be amazed at what the Holy Spirit can do through us. Alone, we are nothing. But when we receive the power from

"Change" By Russell McKinney Mitchell County

In her newspaper column on gardening, Jan Riggenbach gives us a good word on how to plant bedding plants. She

"Giving new bedding plants some rough treatment at planting time may be the best thing you can do to help them survive in the garden. When I was new to gardening, I tried to set tomatoes, petunias, and other bedding plants in the garden without disturbing their roots at all. Nowadays I am much more ruthless...If the plant has been growing in its pot so long that the roots are circling the bottom, I jab my finger into the bottom of the soil and pull down to untangle the roots...If the whole pot is filled with circling roots, I have to be merciless. I don't worry if I break some of the roots; that's better than allowing the roots to continue to circle when the plants are growing in the

I think Riggenbach's gardening advice about breaking up encircled roots can also be applied to life. Oftentimes, the worst thing that can happen to a person is to continue to live the same life year after year after year. Such a circling of roots doesn't lead to health and growth. Instead, it leads to stagnation and rot.

Yes, change can be a good thing, a healthy thing. God told Noah to build an ark (Genesis 6:5-22). That was a change. He commanded Abraham to leave his home in Ur and journey to a land that He would show him (Genesis 12:1-3). That was a change. He commanded Moses to leave the safety of Midian, go back to Egypt, and lead the Israelites out of bondage (Exodus 3:1-10). That was a change. He commanded Amos to leave Tekoa and go prophecy to the northern kingdom of Israel (Amos 7:14-15). That was a change. Jesus commanded Matthew to leave his job as a tax collector and follow Him (Matthew 9:9). That was a change. Peter was instructed to eat meat that wasn't kosher (Acts 10:9-15). That was a change. These are just a few of the numerous, similar examples found in the Bible.

One of my favorites comes from the life of Jacob. Through an incredible series of events, Jacob came to the point where he was prepared to load up his large family and sizable holdings and move the whole show from Canaan to Egypt. You might ask, "Why would he even consider doing such a thing?" The answer is that he had learned that his long-lost son, Joseph, was now second-in-command of Egypt and wanted Jacob and the family to join him there.

Despite Jacob's legitimate concerns about making such a monumental move, he pulled up stakes and headed out for Beersheba. Beersheba, you see, was pretty much the southern edge of Canaan, which made it the jumping-off point to Egypt. This brings us to the best part of the story. While Jacob was camped at Beersheba, he offered sacrifices (Genesis 46:1) as a way of rededicating himself to God and saying, "Lord, I am about to make a major change in my life, and I want to know for certain that this change is Your will." Wasn't that a perfect thing for him to do at that time of his life? And God must have thought so as well because He gave him the assurance he needed by saying to him that night, "I am God, the God of your father, do not fear to go down to Egypt, for I will make of you a great nation there." (Genesis 46:3).

Getting back to my opening illustration, what God was doing in all this was breaking up the encircled roots in Jacob's life. He was replanting Jacob in brand new soil by commanding him to make a radical change. Certainly, it was a scary time for Jacob, even painful, but the change would produce incredible blessings and fruit that simply would not be produced if Jacob stayed where he was.

Perhaps God is dealing with you right now about a major change that He wants you to make. If He is, I encourage you to follow Jacob's excellent example. Before you officially make the change, have your time at "Beersheba" by rededicating yourself to God completely and letting Him know that you don't want to do anything that isn't His will. Then, if He gives you the assurance and peace that the change is of Him, don't be afraid to launch out with Him. Putting it simply, don't let your fear of the unknown keep you from your land of Egypt and all the blessings that God has for you there.



But he said, I stood there on the bridge of the ship and I grasped the railing. I felt the throbbing of the engines deep down inside the hull. The storm, the wind, and the waves seemed to be saying to the ship, 'You cannot come, you cannot come.' But I heard the answering throb of the engines saying, 'Yes, we shall; yes, we shall; yes, we shall.' And so we do. That is the way we overcome the world. In 1996, North Carolina was the last state in the nation to grant veto power to the governor. Since then, 116 bills have faced a veto. Some of those have gone on to become law when three-fifths of the legislature voted to override the governor's veto.

Governor Cooper has issued nearly 70 percent of the gubernatorial vetoes in North Carolina's history – more than double the number of vetoes by his three predecessors combined.

Six of those vetoes have happened this legislative session. The North Carolina Senate has voted to override all six. The first two included bills to limit abortions to the first trimester of pregnancy and remove the state's Jim Crowe-Era pistol purchase permit. Both chambers of the legislature voted to override those vetoes along party lines, allowing those bills to become law.

The four bills most recently vetoed each had bipartisan support when they originally passed the legislature but largely failed to maintain that support for veto overrides.

Senate Bills 299 and 331 each passed the Senate unanimously. Senate Bill 329 passed with a 34–9 vote, with nine Democrats supporting the bill. Senate Bill 364 passed with a 34–14 vote, with four Democrats supporting the bill.

Nearly every Democrat flipped their votes to remain loyal to Gov. Cooper. Senator Mike Woodard from Durham was the only Democrat to maintain his original positions on all four bills.

Sen. Jim Perry (R-Lenoir), the primary sponsor of Senate Bills 329 and 331, said, "After voting to support these bills, Democrats have decided that loyalty to their party leader is more important than good policy. At the end of the day, Democrats have a constituency of one — Roy Cooper."

I hope that Governor Cooper, instead of pandering to his leftist base, would set aside his veto pen in favor of what's best for North Carolinians



In April, the North Carolina Supreme Court reversed a prior state supreme court ruling that had held unconstitutional the photo ID state constitutional amendment approved by North Carolina voters. The new court ruling allows the requirement for voters to show a photo ID before voting to be implemented in the next election. That election will be certain municipal and local elections this fall. I am confident that photo ID requirements provide a critical mechanism to enhance confidence in the integrity of elections across the state.

Previously, in November of 2018, more than 55% of North Carolina voters voted in favor of the constitutional amendment. After the amendment was approved by state voters, the legislature enacted laws to actually implement the amendment's requirements. So, in December 2018, the legislature approved legislation to do so. That law included such things as the forms of photo ID that are acceptable, along with a list of reasonable exceptions dealing with such things as natural disasters and theft which might prevent a qualified, registered voter from being able to produce an ID. Governor Roy Cooper, who had all along opposed any requirement for voters to show a photo ID before voting, then vetoed the bill in an effort to prevent actual implementation of the amendment. When the legislature successfully overrode the veto so that the implementing legislation could take effect, the governor and his political allies began a process of tying up the actual use of photo IDs by filing lawsuits in both federal and state courts. Thus, despite voter approval of the photo-ID amendment and the veto override, Governor Cooper and his allies successfully prevented the use of photo IDs for voting until the April decision of the current state supreme court ruled the law can be implemented.

Although we expect the voter photo ID law now, at long last, will go into effect, there remains another effort by Democrats and their allies to kill the legislature's effort to build confidence in the integrity of our voting process. Thus, the attempt to stop photo IDs continues in the federal courts. In the still-pending federal lawsuit, however, the US 4th Circuit Court has already overruled the Greensboro federal district court's handling of the case once, finding that the facts of the case do not support a claim of racially discriminatory intent by the legislature. Indeed, the 4th Circuit said that the voter-ID legislation "contains three provisions that go out of their way to make its impact as burden-free as possible". Based on their preliminary rulings, we expect that the district court will strike down the voter-ID law but that a quick appeal to the 4th Circuit from the district court ruling will result in the court again being overruled and that voter ID will be upheld as courts have done in multiple other states.

Happy Independence Day! Since its founding, America has been and continues to be, a beacon of hope for people across the world who yearn for freedom. As President Reagan once said, "If we lose freedom here, there is no place to escape. This is the last stand on Earth." As you celebrate the 4th of July, take time to be thankful for the hard-won freedoms we enjoy in this country. A few legislative highlights from the month of June include the passing of an election integrity bill that establishes election day as the deadline for accepting absentee ballots. It also prohibits private donations from being used for election administration. A second bill restructures the North Carolina State Board of Elections by splitting the appointments between the majority and minority leaders in the General Assembly. The new structure would ensure that one party does not have control of the State Board of Elections and the county boards. Take a look at SB 747 and SB 749 on ncleg.gov for details.

Additionally, the NC Senate successfully overrode 4 of Governor Cooper's vetoes including bills with Democratic support, and two that passed unanimously. Nearly every Democrat flipped their vote on the override attempts to fall in line with their party leader. The vetoes now go to the House of Representatives for consideration. Finally, the Senate and House have both passed versions of the 2023-24 budget, and conference committee members are negotiating a version to present to the Governor. I expect the final budget to be passed by the end of June and hope to be able to provide all the details in the August edition

Bible Briefs

Eternal Torture or Eternal Annihilation for the Unsaved (Part 2)

This opening paragraph is the basic summary of (Part 1) BRCN if you missed it last month.

So convinced of my previous position, now un-sealed proves superstition. A common worldwide delusion, "O LORD, let me never be put to confusion", Psalm 71:1. The universe of all cultures, including myself, have been

deceived by The Mythology of Plato, (Mith-Fairytale-Ology-the study of Greek gods by academics). Hade's kinship god of Zeus, defeats his father's generation of gods and rules the underworld domain of eternal torture for the unsaved soul.

If God Almighty does not have total and complete control over mankind's soul, who does? Genesis 2:7, "And the LORD God formed man of the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostril the breath of life; and man became a living soul". Mathew 10:28, "And fear not them which kill the body, but are not able to kill the soul: but rather fear him which is able to destroy both soul and body in hell" [Gehenna H1067grave, everlasting punishment]. Ezekiel 18:20, the soul that sinneth, it shall die.

The Rich Man and Lazarus is a "Parable"; (Strongs # G3850, "an earthly story with a heavenly meaning. Also, G3850; a narrative, fictitious but agreeable to the laws and usages of human life, by which either the duties of men or the things of God, particularly the nature and history of God's kingdom are figuratively portrayed".

Incorrect study of this parable has led many to the false beliefs that the unsaved soul and body, have some form of eternal physical awareness in their grave after death. Remember, God knows the heart of every individual by "the fruit of his doings", Jeremiah 17:10. Strongs # G4145 defines a "rich" man perfectly, "wealthy to be rich, abounding in material resources, contrary to being rich in Christian virtues and eternal possessions".

The rich man is contrasted with Lazarus, a beggar, both have died. The rich man is in his grave. Lazarus and Abraham are in heaven, life eternal with the LORD. The rich man requests Lazarus. Luke 16:22-31, "And he cried and said, Father Abraham, have mercy on me, and send Lazarus, that he may dip the tip of my finger in water, and cool my tongue: for I am tormented in this flame". The Rich Man, symbolically alive in his grave, wants to take hold with his finger, the Word of God, the Gospel, Strongs # 5205, "that which refreshes and keeps alive the soul is likened to water".

The rich man now recalls his conversations of cursing, pride, and lying against God Almighty. James 3:6, "and the tongue [is] a fire, a world of iniquity: so is the tongue among our members, that it defileth the whole body, and setteth on fire the course of nature; and it is set on fire of hell" [Gehenna: G1067]. Symbolically, the rich man is in full-blown spiritual torment. 2 Thessalonians 1:8,9, "Those that know not God, and refuse to obey the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, will be punished with everlasting destruction in flaming fire from the presence of the Lord and the glory of his power." Hebrews 12:29, "For our God is a consuming fire".

There is a great "Gulf Fixed", a permanent chasm of eternal space and time dimension. Nothing about the Gospel of our Lord and Redeemer Jesus Christ can ever pass between us. Luke 16:26, "Abraham said, and beside all this, between us and you there is a great gulf fixed: so that they which would pass from hence to you cannot, neither can they pass to us, that would come from thence".

"Unquenchable fire" is a parabolic language for Hebrews 12:29, "God is a consuming fire" which destroys everything with complete and total destruction. Everlasting eternal hell fire for whatever is in view. Complete and total Annihilation, everlasting punishment for the body and soul is in view in Mathew10:28, "fear him which is able to destroy both soul and body in hell" [Gehenna of fire] H1067grave, everlasting punishment].


The literal Gehenna of fire was an unquenched fire pit of destruction in the valley of Hinnom, south of Jerusalem. The dump site fire was never put out, or quenched; it was a symbol of the wicked and their future destruction. Corpses, dead animals, and filth were cast out into the pit and burned. Maggots' eggs continually reproduce as worms (dieth not) fed on filth and decay. The dump was a continually burning smoldering pit referred to by Jesus several times. Mark 9:48, "where their worm dieth not, and the fire is not quenched".

Also, the LORD said in Isaiah 66:3-24, "Those souls that delight in their abominations, and did evil before the sight of LORD, will not see the New Jerusalem above, the new heaven and earth He will make". Those who worship and love the LORD "shall go forth, and look upon the carcasses of the men that have transgresses against me: for their worm shall not die, neither shall their fire be quenched; and they shall be an abhorring unto all flesh". "The abhorring shame and contempt that these individuals are under is the fact that they remain perpetually under the sentence of God's wrath for eternity, even though they are annihilated both in body and soul". Luke 12:34, "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also".

Why is this study important? Without question, we know God Almighty has unlimited mercy as proclaimed by the scriptures, "For His mercy endureth for ever". This combination of words occurs 254 times in the KJV bible. God Almighty does not torture the unsaved in their grave with eternal fire! He has eternal contempt and disdain (scorn) for those that are evil-doers and dishonors His name. Psalm 31:17, "let the wicked be ashamed, and let them be silent in the grave".

Imagine having a loved one, a non-believer, someone with a focused evil



A consuming fire of punishment completely destroys the body and soul, Hebrews 12: 29, "for our God is a consuming fire." Psalm 22:29, "All they that be fat [Strongs #H1879 figuratively rich] upon the earth shall eat and worship: all they that go down to the dust shall bow before him: and none can keep alive his own soul." Job 7:9, "as the cloud is consumed and vanisheth away: so he that goeth down to the grave shall come up no more."


The elect of God must be drawn (John 6:44) by the Father to Jesus Christ. Only Christ can regenerate a man's soul to salvation. When the redeemed of Christ suffer death, their soul instantly goes to heaven to be with the Father and the Son. They will receive a future new perfect sinless body and will be part of the new heaven and earth creation. They will have life eternal.

The unsaved sinner who bears their own sin, the unrighteous of God, will remain lifeless for eternity in their grave. Their corpse will decompose and deteriorate. An earthly sleep metaphor, it's forever 2:00 O'clock in the morning. "They shall not awake nor be raised out of their sleep".

The second death (Rev. 21:8), when Christ Jesus returns a second time, the earth and everything in it, all unsaved dead souls and bodies in the grave will be burned up with fire and brimstone in the lake of fire. Complete annihilation, everlasting eternal destruction, eternally forgotten as if they never were. 1 Th. 4:14-18, "Those alive at the return of the Lord and believe Jesus died and rose again, will be caught up to meet the Lord in the air, and so shall ever be with the Lord". 2 Timothy 2:15, "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth". Pray for the hope of eternal life, and trust in the faith of Jesus Christ; for there is no 20/20 hindsight correction or possibility to repent in the grave.



The Weapon of Prayer

Our text says in Ephesians 6:18: "Praying always with all prayer and supplication in the Spirit, and watching thereunto with all perseverance and supplication for all saints."

We have been considering the weapons of our Christian warfare both offensive and defensive. It should never be

forgotten that we are in a battle with Satan. His forces not only include fallen angels, but also human beings. There are some people the Devil uses to get his hellish ways carried out in this world. While the Devil does seem to win some skirmishes, we know from the Word of God who is going to win the battle. What a blessing to know we are on the Lord's side and He is on our side!

We now move to the last weapon the Apostle Paul refers to in this important list of weapons, of which he has already referred. Because prayer is listed last, does not mean that it is the least important of all the other weapons previously mentioned. Prayer is extremely important because Jesus had much to say about it. Here are some references you might want to consider.

Matthew 26:41---- "Watch and pray, that ye enter not into temptation: the spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak."

Mark 11:24----"Therefore I say unto you, "What things soever ye desire, when ye pray, believe that ye receive them, and ye shall have them."

Jesus valued prayer to the extent he gave specific guidelines to our prayer in Matt 6:9-13—"After this manner therefore pray ye: Our Father which art in heaven, Hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done in earth, as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil: For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever. Amen." Christ did not give these words to constantly be the word-for-word content of our life of prayer. These are guidelines from which to pattern our petitions to God. We are to praise His name, to pray for His coming, to pray the will of God be done, for the Lord to forgive us and that we might forgive others, for us not to be led into temptation, and for the Lord to deliver us from evil.

As we consider this vital weapon in our Christian walks, let us look to a simple outline. First, the frequency of our prayers; second, the scope of our prayers; third the purpose of our prayers.

The Frequency of Our Prayers

He starts verse 26 by saying, "*Praying always*." On the surface, it sounds like we are to pray twenty-four hours a day. Remember, Paul, is not putting prayer above putting on the armor. He has given the equipment of the Christian soldier, so now is stressing how important it is to pray and seek the Lord. When the Grecian armies went to war, they offered prayers to their false gods to make them successful in battle.

Praying to a god that does not exist is clear-cut foolishness, but spiritual warriors depend upon the Captain of our Salvation. We are to always be ready to pray whether we are in public, in private, within our own spirit, or spontaneously if we are asked to pray—on all occasions.

When the enemy attacks, we must be ready to pray and be alert. We are to pray continually in the Spirit of God and the power and sphere of the Spirit.

Jude 20 states: "But ye, beloved, building up yourselves on your most holy faith, praying in the Holy Ghost." That brings up the question, what does praying in the Holy Ghost suggest? It certainly does not indicate praying in an unknown tongue. Here is what I believe it means.

- * to pray under His guidance and influence, under His energy and power
- * that we ask and seek His divine help as we come to the throne of grace
- * that we focus our minds and concentrate upon the Holy Ghost to help us to pray in dependence on His divine help
- * that we ask and depend upon the Holy Spirit to cleanse our requests and make sure we are asking according to the will of God
- * that we walk in the Spirit from day to day, offering unbroken prayers to God all the day long
- * that we set aside time every day to wrestle in prayer before God and for the need of loved ones and for the needs of God's people and others.

Certainly, we cannot pray too much. Most people could be convicted for not praying at all or not praying enough.

The Bible says in I Thessalonians 5:17, "Pray without ceasing." Prayer is God's ordained way for man to receive things from Him. God moves, acts, and responds to prayer. Prayer is a law that He has established throughout the universe. Why? Because prayer stirs fellowship and communion with God and brings about a greater knowledge and understanding of God. It causes a person to learn more and more about God and stirs more trust as well as worship and praise of God. Prayer stirs and causes every good thing imaginable between God and man. This is the reason God destined prayer as the primary way for man to communicate with Him. This is the reason for this exhortation.

What different interpretations can one make of I Thessalonians 5:17?

- 1- Praying without fainting as in the parable in Luke 18:1
- 2- Praying with strength as in Romans 12:12
- 3- Praying in everything as in Philippians 4:6
- 4- Praying in any season of life whether things look good or bad.

The Scope of Our Prayers

Note the words "praying with all prayers and supplication." The word "praying" speaks of a general conversation with God. It involves praises to God for who He is and for the blessings received. "Supplication" is a more intense word

that points to making a request or asking God for something specific. James puts it this way (5:16), "*The fervent, effectual prayer of a righteous man availeth much.*" It is important to notice the word "fervent." It speaks of an energetic prayer and one that wholeheartedly zeroes in on specific requests.

Someone said there are four forms of prayer. There is adoration, which acknowledges the greatness of God and the smallness of man. In addition, there is the prayer of contrition and repentance. Also, there is the prayer of thanksgiving and gratitude. Finally, there is the prayer of supplication, petition, and intercession.

The Assistant in Our Prayers

Think about the words, "In the Spirit." Rom 8:26 tells us about the involvement of the Spirit in prayer and how He assists us when we pray. "Likewise the Spirit also helpeth our infirmities: for we know not what we should pray for as we ought: but the Spirit itself maketh intercession for us with groanings which cannot be uttered."

Your prayers may seem weak and you may feel like a failure in prayer. But, take heart, be encouraged, because the Holy Ghost assists you in your prayer life if He dwells within you.

The Caution in Our Prayers

Note the words--"Watching thereunto with all perseverance and supplication for all saints." We should watch, stay awake, be attentive, and be ready as we seek the Lord in prayer and supplication. According to the Bible, it is of the utmost importance that we do not go to sleep in the spiritual battle in which we find ourselves.

Because of the urgency of the hour, we must persevere. To persevere is to be persistent, or keep on doing something, despite difficulty or delay in achieving success. The Bible teaches persistence in prayer if we are going to get the help we need (Matt. 7:7-8).

We are to keep on asking and keep on knocking before the Lord in the petition. We need to supplicate because many others need our specific prayers for their needs. Don't be too general in your praying; get specific if you want to get help for others or yourself.

Hurry, A Harrowing Hell

What is the relationship between this unhurried Christian life and the baptized imagination that enables us to experience our particular and peculiar places as bethels? Watching and waiting. We watch the world around us, with eyes wide open to the world we inhabit to develop the habit of not merely seeing but perceiving heaven on earth.

A hurried life is declaring war on time itself. It is trying to outpace time by getting things done and done quickly. But time marches forward, beating the drum of tic, toc, tic, toc, like an alarm clock waking us up to fears of failure, fears of living inefficiently and thus ineffectively. The lie believed is that "I am what I do." If I am what I do, I must do and do so efficiently. The church has believed this lie in becoming programmatic. The programmatic church is a parasitical church that sucks the nutrients from the rest of the Body. It believes people encounter God by doing and doing, not being. The parasite of programs slithers like a snake whispering the lie of justification by works. "You are what you do," it says. "You can become like God if you do more," it says. The American church believes this lie, and imbibes this lie by "plugging people in." This is how the church has waged a war against time that leaves Christians anxious, beaten up, and burnt out. We have raced time, but now we are out of breath.

So Jesus says "Blessed are those who are out of breath, for theirs is the kingdom of God." There is good news in that Jesus has come to give us mouth-to-mouth CPR. To breathe in us again. To restore our spirit by giving us His Spirit. This is what the church needs. We need to feel our loss of breath in the deep depths of the harrowing hell of a hurry. We need to repent. We have had our eyes fixed on justification by works for so long. We need to slow down. We need to stop. We need to rest.


N.T. Wright writes "If the Spirit is the one who brings God's future forward into the present, worshiping in the Spirit of God who raised Jesus from the dead means standing in the overlap between heaven and earth and also at the place where past, present, and future are mysteriously held together."


We need to breathe deep the Spirit of God that raised Jesus from the dead so that we can see the heaven-earth-ness of now as the future and past piercing this present moment as we harken heaven and herald the resurrection life through the Spirit of God. How do we stand in the overlap between heaven and earth? We wait and watch.

Watching requires waiting. It requires waving the white flag of surrender on the war we have waged on time. We announce the kingdom by renouncing hurry. Rather than race time, we must inhabit time. We speak about time as though it is something we own. "I spend my time...I use my time...I have free time" as though time could be haggled, bartered, or possessed. We cannot possess time. Time possesses us. The poet Malcomb Guite uses the phrase "timelessness resounding into time." This encapsulates what the Christian life is about. The future and past pierce this moment which is a movement simultaneously within and toward eternity. How do we get in on this movement of eternity that is both now and not yet? By running the pace of the kingdom. It is a slow pace. Before Jesus announces the kingdom in pithy parables, he says "You will be ever hearing but never understanding, you will be ever seeing but never perceiving."

We are after "listening creation into speech" as kingdom people. This requires us to listen to understand, which requires pondering. Slowly turning over each word that worms its way into our souls. Words that whittle us like wood to kindle wonder with the kindling of worry burned, buried, and carried to our roots to nourish our bones and branches, sap and marrow. The listening that Jesus is inviting us into is a listening that requires slowing down and pondering in such a way as to allow each word to seep into our soul and settle our soul by turning our worldview upside down (right side up) to view the kingdom. To view the kingdom requires a different kind of seeing. It requires perceiving. Perceiving the pied goodness that covers creation as the waters cover the seas. It requires a waiting that leads us into watching. This perception is what it means to be filled with the Spirit and stand in the overlap between heaven and earth. This perception is also what it means to stand at the place where "past, present, and future are mysteriously held together."
