



#### We Are Not Saved

Jeremiah 8:20 "The harvest is past, the summer is ended, and we are not saved."

As this article is read, most likely school will be back in session, the vacations of summer will be over and we will be getting ready for the upcoming fall and winter seasons. As this time of the year comes, I always remember the above verse. It is burdensome. Consider the setting



Jeremiah was a prophet whose ministry was to the nation of Judah. His ministry began around 626 BC and concluded after 587 BC. At the beginning of his ministry, he saw the nation turning away from God. Judah was acting like the nations around them. They were worshipping other gods, sacrificing their children, and so forth. He knew the Lord would not put up with that kind of behavior from His own people. And so he preached, prayed, and wept before God for the sins of his people.

The unthinkable began to happen in 605 BC as God allowed Babylon to come into Judah and take many of its citizens captive. It happened again in 597 BC and yet again in 587 BC. After the third time Babylon came into Judah, their soldiers tore down the temple Solomon built, damaged the walls, and took more of the Jews into captivity. The nation was decimated!

This takes me to the verse above. Jeremiah was marking time in Babylon. He was a captive along with so many other Jews. Year after year passed and the people were still not being "saved". Judgment from God had fallen upon the Jews and there seemed to be no end in sight. Thus, Jeremiah marks the time by harvests and summer. He laments "And we are not saved."

This is so eerily reminiscent of what is happening in America. I know no one has hauled us off to another nation or into captivity as Judah was, but we are in captivity. We are losing freedoms! We are falling from within! Look at all of the divisions in our country. What is even worse is that we are seeing a lessening of people truthfully, faithfully worshipping our Lord. A fewer percentage of our population is attending houses of worship than ever before in our lifetime. And all the while evil is taking such a hold in the U.S.; I see it so clearly! I pray you see it too and are praying as I am.

Our current national leadership has taken us into a level of debt that we cannot support or sustain. Other economies are getting so much stronger than ours, and

foreign military powers are flexing their muscle. In addition, we are seeing so much depravity and debauchery paraded before us from within with no shame in doing so whatsoever! What the Bible calls sin is being promoted and encouraged even to our youngest. We all have recently seen drag queens reading to children in libraries, the curriculum in public schools that have no business being there, to shows promoting and normalizing wicked behavior and so much more!


Judah's hope in Jeremiah's day was for someone to set them free from Babylon's grasp and allow them to go back to Judah. It would happen when the Medes and Persians defeated the Babylonians. Finally, after such a long period, they returned to their homeland. They returned to find the destruction of the Temple. But, at least, they were finally able to go home.

What is the hope for America? The Lord! A return to Him! Our hope is not in the White House, Senate, or in our Governors. It's in the Lord! If only America would return to Him in brokenness, humility, and repentance, He would work on our behalf. He would move mightily in our midst.

If the only hope for America is the Lord, we must pray, repent and humble ourselves before the Almighty! We must claim Scriptures such as 2 Chronicles 7:14 "If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves, and pray, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways; then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin, and will heal their land." We must practice the disciplines that will always invoke the mercies of God and grant us the power of God in such overwhelming situations.

Let us join together in prayer at this critical point in time. Pray privately. Pray corporately. Claim the above promise that God will hear our prayers, forgive our sins, and heal our land. Thank You!

# What We Believe

Here are some of the essential elements of our faith at the Blue Ridge Christian News:

#### God

God is the Creator and Ruler of the universe. He has existed eternally in three persons and chooses to manifest Himself in these three ways: as God the Father, as God the Son, and as God the Holy Spirit. These three are co-equal and are one God

(Genesis 1:1, 26-27; 3:22; Psalm 90:2; Matthew 28:19; 1 Peter 1:2; and 2 Corinthians 13:14)

#### Jesus

Jesus Christ is the eternal Son of God, who is fully God and fully human in His incarnation. He lived a sinless human life and offered Himself as the perfect sacrifice for the sins of all humanity by dying on a cross. He arose from the dead after three days to demonstrate His power over sin and death. He ascended to heaven and will return again to reign as King of Kings and Lord of Lords.

(Matthew 1:22-23; Isaiah 9:6; John 1:1-5; 14:10-30; Hebrews 4:14-15; 1 Corinthians 15:3-4; Romans 1:3-4; Acts 1:9-11; 1 Timothy 6:14-15; Titus 2:13)

#### The Holy Spirit

The Holy Spirit is the very Spirit of God, fully divine, manifested in the life of every believer from the moment of salvation. He is equal with the Father and the Son as God. He is present in the world to make men aware of their need for Jesus Christ. He provides the Christian with power for living, understanding of spiritual truth, and guidance in doing what is right. The Christian seeks to live under His daily control.

(2 Corinthians 3:17; John 16:7-13; 14:16-17; Acts 1:8; 1 Corinthians 2:12; 3:16; Ephesians 1:13; Galatians 5:25; Ephesians 5:18)

#### The Bible

The Bible is the divinely inspired, authoritative, infallible, living and active Word of God to all men. It was written by human authors under the supernatural guidance of the Holy Spirit. It is the ultimate source of truth for Christian beliefs and living. In it we find a guideline for right relationship with God and God's creation, and a blueprint for personal, emotional, and spiritual growth.

(2 Timothy 1:13; 3:16-17; 2 Peter 1:2-21; Psalm 119:105, 160; 12:6; Proverbs 30:5)

#### Humanity

Humanity is designed and made by God in His image. We have been created as cognitive, moral, ethical, and physical beings and have been equipped by God for both relationship with Him and with one another. Both male and female are gifted by the Creator with characteristics which equip them for the purpose for which they have been created: relationship, dominion, and responsibility. Although God designed us to have fellowship with Him, we became alienated from God through disobedience. As a result, all human beings are born with a sinful nature and choose to sin against God. We are incapable of regaining a right relationship with God through our own efforts.

(Genesis 1:26-28; Psalm 8:3-6; Isaiah 53:6; 59:1-2; Romans 3:23; 5:22; Colossians 1:21; 2 Corinthians 5:17)

#### Eternity & Eternal Security

Our soul, the essence of our being, was created by God to exist forever. That forever is spent in one of two places: eternally present and in union with God because of His forgiveness and salvation or eternally separated from God because of sin and unbelief. At the moment that our physical body dies, those who are saved are immediately taken to heaven. Those who have rejected God's gift of salvation will spend eternity separated from God in hell. Because God gives man eternal life through Jesus Christ, the believer is secure in that salvation for eternity. Salvation is maintained by the grace and power of God, not by the self-effort of the Christian. It is the grace and eternal power of God that gives this security. (John 3:16; 5:11-13, 10:29; 1 John 2:25; Romans 6:23; Revelation 20:15; 2 Timothy 1:12; Hebrews 7:25; 10:10-14; 1 Peter 1:3-5)

#### Salvation

Salvation is God's gift of redemption and reconciliation to Himself and is offered freely to all who accept, by faith alone, Jesus Christ as God's only son and receive Him as Lord and Savior. We can never make up for our sin with self-improvement or good works. It is only by trusting in Jesus Christ as God's offer of forgiveness that you can be saved from sin's penalty. Eternal life begins the moment you receive Jesus Christ into your life by faith.

(Romans 5:1; 6:23; Ephesians 2:8-9; John 1:12; 14:6; Titus 3:5; Galatians 3:26)

#### The Lord our Righteousness

There are seven redemptive names of God scattered throughout the Old Testament. They are:

- 1. Jehovah-Rapha, the Lord our Healer
- 2. Jehovah-Nissi, the Lord our Banner (or Refuge)
- 3. Jehovah-Shammah, the Lord (who) is Present
- 4. Jehovah-Tsidkenu, the Lord our Righteousness
- 5. Jehovah-Shalom, the Lord our Peace
- Jehovah-Jireh, the Lord our Provider
- 7. Jehovah-Ra'ah, the Lord our Shepherd

All of these names point to Christ. He is our healer, our refuge, ever-present, our righteousness, our peace, our provider, and our shepherd. In this lesson, I am going to focus on Jehovah-Tsidkenu, the Lord our Righteousness.

"Behold, the days are coming," says the Lord, "That I will raise to David a Branch of righteousness; A King shall reign and prosper and execute judgment and righteousness in the earth. In His days Judah will be saved, and Israel will dwell safely; now this is His name by which He will be called: THE LORD OUR RIGHTEOUSNESS." (Jeremiah 23:5-6)

Jehovah-Tsidkenu is "the Lord our Righteousness" in Hebrew.

In my experience as a pastor, many people get confused about the subject of righteousness. When they think of righteousness they usually think of righteous behavior. Now righteous behavior is important; we should all try to live right and treat others as we want to be treated. But righteousness and righteous behavior are two different things. It is righteousness that will be the focus of this lesson.

I believe that a lack of understanding about righteousness holds many Christians in bondage. Not understanding righteousness will affect how we view ourselves, others, and God. It will affect how we believe God sees us, how we serve God, how we worship, how we pray, our expectations when we pray, and many other things as well. Our understanding of righteousness is pivotal to our Christian experience.

Hebrews 5:13 says, "For everyone who partakes only of milk is unskilled in the word of righteousness, for he is a babe." If we don't understand righteousness, we will never grow past the baby stages of Christian living. Many Christians today are not sure what they believe about righteousness, and that is why I wanted to encourage you with this lesson.

The first thing we need to understand is that there are two kinds of righteousness. There is the righteousness of God and the righteousness of man. The righteousness of God is referring to His holiness and perfection. The righteousness of man is referring to our behavior or works.

The Word of God says our righteousness is like a filthy rag (Isaiah 64:6). Romans 3:10 says, "There is no one righteous, not even one." These verses are referring to our righteousness or self-righteousness. Self-righteousness is man's best effort to try and be good enough before God, which is impossible for any human to do.

Therefore no one will be declared righteous in God's sight by the works of the law; rather, through the law we become conscious of our sin (Romans 3:20 emphasis mine).

The best law keeper ever will not be declared righteous in God's sight by his good works. Our good works may look righteous in man's sight but never in God's. There is no way for us to obtain the right standing with God by obeying the law or doing good works. If we lived a million years, we could not do enough good to earn the right standing with God. However, there is a way to receive the right standing with God, but it is not through our works.

But now the righteousness of God apart from the law is revealed, being witnessed by the Law and the Prophets, even the righteousness of God, through faith in Jesus Christ, to all and on all who believe. (Romans 3:21-22)

Paul is saying here that there is now a way for us to become righteous by faith in Jesus Christ and not by our works of observing the Law. So, the truth is there is a way to become righteous, but it is not through our own works and effort.

How do we become righteous? Romans 10:10 says, "For with the heart one believes unto righteousness and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation."

Romans 5:17 further explains, for if, by the trespass of the one man, death reigned through that one man, how much more will those who receive God's abundant provision of grace and of the gift of righteousness reign in life through the one man, Jesus Christ?

From these verses, we learn that: 1) with the heart, we believe unto righteousness, and 2) righteousness is a gift to be received.

Righteousness means right standing with God. Therefore, our right standing with God is a gift. Today, we have a right standing with God not because of anything we have done or ever could do but because of what Jesus Christ has already done for us. We become righteous by believing unto righteousness and receiving the gift of righteousness.

2 Corinthians 5:21 says, "For He made Him who knew no sin to be sin for us, that we might become the righteousness of God in Him." Praise God, Jesus Christ became sin. He took all our sins and the consequences of our sins upon Himself. When we place our faith or our belief in Christ as our source of righteousness, we become righteous; we receive the gift of right standing with God. So, it is true that there is no one righteous, not even one, who can obtain the right standing with God by their own effort. But when we put our faith in Jesus and His finished work on the cross, we receive the gift of righteousness—the gift of right standing with God—and we become the righteousness of God in Him.

But now the righteousness of God apart from the law is revealed, being wit-

nessed by the Law and the Prophets, even the righteousness of God, through faith in Jesus Christ, to all and on all who believe. (Romans 3:21-22)

Recall Jeremiah 23:5-6 that we began this lesson with: "Behold, the days are coming," says the Lord, "That I will raise to David a Branch of righteousness; A King shall reign and prosper and execute judgment and righteousness in the earth. In His days Judah will be saved, and Israel will dwell safely; now this is His name by which He will be called: THE LORD OUR RIGHTEOUSNESS."

Has this day come? Has the righteous branch come through the lineage of King David and the lineage of Judah? Yes. Who was that verse referring to? Jesus. And what was His name in which He was to be called? The LORD our Righteousness. Jesus is our righteousness. He is our right standing with God. He provided our right standing with God through what He did not by anything we could ever do.

When we place our faith in Jesus and His finished work on the cross, we inherit the gift of eternal life and right standing with God. Praise God! If you are born again, you are the righteousness of God. You are righteous. You received this position as a gift. You didn't earn it, so it is not self-righteousness. It is the gift of righteousness.

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# Repentance

The apostle Peter told us in Acts 2:38, "Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins, and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit." Clearly, repentance, which is commonly thought of as "being sorry for our sins" is a necessary step toward forgiveness and the receipt of the Holy Spirit. Is "being sorry for our sins" all there is to repentance?



The word repentance comes from the Hebrew verb shuv, which means to "turn back, return, bring back, go back, turnabout, turn oneself." In 1 Kings 8:48 and 2 Chron. 6:38 the word is translated as "repent." In Isaiah 58:12 a different conjugation of the verb shuv is translated as "restorer." So we can see that to "turn back," "return," or "restore" are all related to the term "repent."

Now consider, turning, returning, turning back, or restoring requires action. For us to "turn" requires that we make a change. If we are heading in one direction and we make a 180-degree turn, we need to stop, re-orient our thinking and our path of travel, turn around, and go in the other direction. We don't just stop, pause, and head back on the same path as before. We literally and physically make a change in direction. And this is the crux of repentance, change.

Now, I'm going to make a statement here that I think we as believers in Jesus will all agree with. "We all want to follow Jesus as much as possible and we want to do what is right!" In the rest of this article plus next months I would like to remind us of what has been considered as the six elements that constitute full repentance. The kind of repentance we all are trying to achieve. The six elements

- 1. Recognition of one's sins as sins
- 2. Remorse-sorrow
- 3. Confession
- 4. Desisting from sin Stopping the sin
- 5. Forgiveness
- 6. Restitution where possible

The first element, "recognition" of one's sins as sins is an act of one's intelligence, moral conscience, and relationship with God. It involves knowing that certain actions are wrong and sinful. Recognizing that such actions are not according to the teachings of God and analyzing one's motives for these sinful actions as deeply as one can. In the business vernacular, this would be called "root cause analysis."

For example, stealing must be seen not only as a national crime but also as a sin against another human and a violation of God's eternal commandments. It also involves realizing that such acts are motivated by some of the darkest elements in our being, elements that we need to root out. The first element is that we recognize sin as sin. Recognize that it is wrong and that if we are participating in it, we are not following our God, and our actions are wrong!

The second phase, "remorse" or "sorrow" is a feeling. It is composed of feelings of regret and of failure to maintain one's moral standards. It may also encompass feelings of being lost or trapped, anguish, despair at our sinfulness, and a feeling of being alienated from God and our own deepest spiritual roots. Although, after repentance, we do our best never to participate in such actions again, these negative feelings need not remain. After we have recognized that what we have done was wrong and that we have not followed the teachings of God we will be sorry for our wrong actions. The second element of full repentance is having remorse, being sorry.

"Confession," the third element, has two forms: James 5:16 tells us to "Confess your sins to one another and pray for one another, that you may be healed. The prayer of a righteous person has great power as it is working" (James 5:16 ESV). There is also an individual confession of our sins to God. Psalm 32:5 tell us, "I acknowledged [confessed] my sin to you, and I did not cover my iniquity. I said, I will confess my transgressions to the LORD, and you forgave the iniquity of my sin" (ESV).

Psalm 51 is David's prayer of repentance after his sin with Bathsheba. In verses 1-4, David cries out, "O God, according to your steadfast love; according to your abundant mercy blot out my transgressions. Wash me thoroughly from my iniquity and cleanse me from my sin! For I know my transgressions, and my sin is ever before me. Against you, you only, have I sinned and done what is evil in your sight, so that you may be justified in your words and blameless in your judgment" (Psa. 51:1-4 ESV).

1 John 1:8-10 tells us "If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. [But], if we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness. If we say we have not sinned, we make him a liar, and his word is not in us" (1 John 1:7-10 ESV). The more specific the confession, the better. The third element of full repentance is confes-

We have covered three elements of repentance: recognition, remorse–sorrow, and confession. In next month's article, we will review the last three and discuss how they all tie together and result in "full repentance.":

Acts 2:38, "Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins, and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit.' Shalom Shalom everyone.

#### Off the Clock?

I recently spent twelve long minutes at the counter of a fast-food restaurant. During that time, an employee came within three feet of me on his way to the rest-

room. He faced straight ahead. He stared at the floor. He never spoke. He never looked my way. I was astounded. A few minutes later, he came back. Not a word. Not a glance. It was bizarre.

When I could stand it no longer, I walked behind the counter. This forced the person working the drive-thru to notice me. He eventually came to take my order. I asked about the employee who ignored me. Twice. I was told, "He doesn't work the register. He couldn't take your order."

"No problem," I responded. "But surely he could have acknowledged my presence and told me that he would get someone to serve me."

"No, he couldn't do that either," I was told. "He's off the clock."

By this point in my "dining experience," my frustration and disbelief turned to shock and elevated blood pressure. I wanted to ask the young man about training programs and customer service policies. My long-dead father screamed inside my head that employees owe loyalty to those who write their checks. Pure self interest should encourage every employee to make a habit of assisting customers. If nothing else, ignoring a fellow human in need of assistance is a gross violation of something once called "common courtesy."

All these things flooded my mind as I stared in disbelief across that cash register, but I realized that further conversation would be wasted effort. The young man who told me that his coworker was off the clock had no interest in my opinions. I placed my order without additional comment. Over the next few days, however, I found myself obsessing over the disastrous results of something called compartmentalization.

Psychology Today defines this term as: "A defense mechanism in which people mentally separate conflicting thoughts, emotions, or experiences to avoid the discomfort of contradiction." When our actions are inconsistent with our convictions, we experience something called "cognitive dissonance." To avoid resulting pain, we often resort to denial, repression, projection, and other mind games.

Most believers experience times when the inconsistencies between our convictions and our actions are almost unbearable. One of the most popular mechanisms for coping is pretending that we are "off God's clock." Perhaps these interludes when we convince ourselves that God is not watching should be labeled "time off for bad behavior."

This approach stands in contrast to one the most beloved verses in Scripture. Psalm 19:14 reads, "Let the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be acceptable in your sight, O LORD, my rock and my redeemer." My treatment of this verse is indebted to the work of Hebrew scholar, Tom Thorne.

Through technical analysis of the Hebrew text, Tom makes the case that King David's supplication for acceptability is more than a platitude or flippant prayer to offer when we want to convince God that we are "being spiritual." Hebrew syntax is different than English word arrangement, but in this case the difference adds even more emphasis to a powerful set of ideas. Tom's literal translation of Psalm 19:14 reads: "Let these be for pleasure, goodwill, acceptance, liking, and favor: the words of my mouth and the thinking, meditation, planning, talk, music, and even the playing—of my mind, my character, my disposition, my inclination, my loyalty, my concern, my intention, and

The next two Hebrew words proclaim David's desire that all these aspects of his person and character would qualify to stand the scrutiny of Holy God's most intimate focus. David is not content to merely put on his best suit and shine his Sunday shoes for a once-a-week trip to "meet with God." Instead of pretending that he could hide certain parts of himself from all-knowing God, David pursued the opposite of compartmentalization. His core desire was that God would grant him the grace of purifying his every thought and action. Rather than hold back a few "secret rooms" in his psyche, David wanted to shine the light of holiness into every nook and cranny of his existence.

The next-to-last word in this verse can be translated "large rock" or "boulder." Hebrew thinking recognizes this as an image of God because it represents both an unshakable foundation and an unassailable defensive position. When we make our stand in God's mighty shadow, we need never fear the devil's slings and arrows. David wanted every aspect of himself to be protected.

The last word in David's prayer is "redeemer." A redeemer reclaims ownership by paying a debt. Every human owes a debt to Holy God because He cannot abide the presence of sin. Thanks be to God that He sent his own Son to pay the debt that we could never pay. Long before Christ was born, King David knew that God is in the redemption business.

David's prayer is that every aspect of his life—even his pleasures, his recreations, his secret plans and ambitions—might stand the test of God's closest scrutiny. It is part of one of the most magnificent chapters in Scripture. Psalm 19 is a thrilling hymn of praise. Most Christians are convinced that God's law is flawed and burdensome. David says that Torah is perfect and that it revives the soul. We are taught that the instructions for living God gave through Moses represent some counterfeit of faith. David said, "The rules of the LORD are true and righteous altogether."

The Nineteenth Psalm sprang from David's recognition that a life worth living is devoted to righteousness. He wanted nothing more than to abide in God without the baggage of his sinful nature. At a time when many "Christian leaders" insist that sin no longer matters, King David shouts across the centuries that those who earnestly desire to live every moment in the presence of Holy God are never off the clock.

"Have You Forgiven God?"

That title is not a misprint. I'm guessing that you've heard a lot of preaching about God forgiving you. For that matter, you've probably also heard a lot about you forgiving others. But when was the last time you heard anything about you forgiving God? "Never," you say. Then pull up a chair and let's talk about it.



Maybe a spouse died. Maybe a child died. Maybe a test result came back bad. Maybe the surgery didn't produce the desired results. Maybe a marriage never happened. Maybe one ended in divorce. Maybe a job was lost. Maybe a business went bust. Maybe a terrible injustice occurred. Maybe a dream turned into a nightmare. Whatever it was that happened (or didn't happen) to you, all you know is that you prayed your guts out for God to come through for you but He came up small, very small. At least that's your assessment of what happened.

And you've heard the well-intentioned advice of family, friends, and colleagues. "You need to get over this." "You have to move on with your life." "You've dwelt on this long enough." "It's time to let this go." For your part, though, such words fall upon deaf ears. Why? Well, allow me to suggest that you just flat out aren't ready to move on. Furthermore, let me also suggest that you and your situation have unfinished business, some of which involve you forgiving the God whom you think failed you.

If you do feel disappointment or anger toward God, the chances are that you've expressed it by attempting to get back at Him. Basically, you've tried to hurt Him the way you believe He has hurt you. Such attempts at revenge usually take the form of quitting church, failing to pray, letting dust collect on your Bible, and purposefully engaging in some sin or all of the above. These things (and some others I didn't list) are your way of saying to God, "Hey if You didn't care about doing what I wanted You to do for me, why should I care about doing what You want me to do for You?"

One of the great problems with the thousands of "Christianity lite," "health-and-wealth," "prosperity," and "self-help" sermons that pass for preaching these days is that they only convey one side of God's nature. These sermons tell you over and over that God can do exceedingly, abundantly above all that you can ask or think. They tell you that He is an all-powerful God who never met a problem that He couldn't fix. They tell you that your miracle is on its way. What they don't tell you is that God being able to do something doesn't mean that He will do it, and His having the power to fix a problem doesn't always translate to Him fixing it. And as for your miracle being on its way, well, let's just say that some miracles evidently get lost in the mail.

I'm talking now to the person, even the Christian, who had faith that God was going to save your day, only to discover that He opted not to do it. Mary and Martha received their miracle when Lazarus was resurrected, but you didn't get yours. Jesus walked on the water to keep the chosen 12's boat from sinking, but you rode yours all the way down to the bottom. David felled his Goliath, but your Goliath body-slammed you, put his foot in the middle of your chest, raised his sword in victory over you, and has been enjoying the accolades ever since.

I truly believe that God has you reading this right now because He doesn't want you to abort the work He is doing inside you in the aftermath of your traumatic event. While He's not asking you to put on a fake smile and act like nothing happened to you, He does want you to stick with Him. Rather than burying your disappointment/anger toward Him and cutting off all communications, He wants you to acknowledge that disappointment/anger and convey your emotions to Him by way of prayer. His offer to you is, "Let's talk about what you are feeling toward Me, and in so doing begin the process of bringing you out the other end of it.

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Of course, it's along about here that someone might say, "But who are we to second-guess God? He is the Creator and we are mere dust. He doesn't have to explain Himself to us. And since He cannot sin, He never makes a mistake and therefore never needs to be forgiven."

My comeback to that is that a person (or God) can disappoint someone or anger someone without actually committing a sin or making a mistake. You see, disappointment or anger occurs within the mind of the person who considers himself or herself the victim. So, even as God remains authentically innocent of any charges the person might level toward Him, He is gracious enough not to take offense at the charges. Even more, than not taking offense at them, He's loving enough to actually come to the person and say, "Let me help you take what you're feeling and weave it into a deeper experience with Me than you've ever had."

Actually, the Bible provides us with numerous examples of people who became disappointed/angry with God. Here are a few names from that list:

- 1. After patiently waiting for years for God to give him and his wife Sarah a child, Abraham finally expressed the disappointment/anger he was feeling toward God about the delay. (Genesis 15:1-3)
- 2. After Moses had been leading the Israelites for a while, there came a time when he expressed his disappointment/anger toward God because of all the problems that were associated with leading such a group. He even told God, "If you are going to keep treating me like this, please kill me now." (Numbers 11:10-15)
- 3. David got mad at God for striking Uzzah dead when Uzzah touched the Ark of the Covenant as it was being transported to Jerusalem. (2 Samuel 6:1-8)
- 4. Jonah got mad at God for sparing the citizens of Nineveh. He got so mad that he asked God to kill him. (Jonah 3:10;4:1-4)
- 5. Jeremiah once reached an emotional low point in his ministry and expressed his disappointment/anger toward God by asking Him, "Why is my pain perpetual and my wound incurable, which refuses to be healed? Will You be to me like an unreliable stream, as waters that fail?" (Jeremiah 15:18)
- 6. John the Baptist became disappointed that Jesus hadn't ushered in the glorious Messianic Age for Israel yet and even openly questioned whether or not Jesus truly was the Messiah. (Matthew 11:1-3)
- 7. When Jesus first told the chosen 12 that He was going to Jerusalem to be put to death there, Peter took Him aside and actually rebuked Him for saying it. (Matthew 16:21-22)

If you think that all of these servants of the Lord didn't have to work through these complicated feelings they were feeling toward Him, you don't have the first clue about human nature. It's not that these men didn't understand that God is sovereign, holy, and doesn't make mistakes. The problem they all had was that their emotions didn't ask for permission to pop up inside them. This is how we humans are wired. Instinctually, we feel what we feel, and even though self-control can prevent us from expressing those feelings or acting upon them, what self-control cannot do is change the feelings themselves.

This is where the admittedly strange idea of forgiving God comes into play. Staying disappointed in Him or mad at Him is your choice, but that mindset will never get you to a better place spiritually. At some point, you're going to have to enter into some uncommon times of prayer with Him, prayers in which you vent all that toxic stuff that is bubbling inside you. Trust me, God can take it. If He took it from Abraham, Moses, David, Jonah, Jeremiah, John the Baptist, and Peter, He can take it from you. Then, once you are finished with your venting — and that might require numerous rounds of prayer — you and God can begin to rebuild the fellowship between the two of you. Afterward, once that fellowship has been rebuilt to an adequate extent, the two of you can start to rebuild your "fellowship" to walk hand in hand with your fellowship.

Am I saying that any of this process is easy? Certainly not. The truth is that it's so hard that many people never complete it and consequently spend the rest of their lives disappointed/angry with God. Others try to race through the process like it's some kind of speed course and consequently fail to glean its full benefits. Neither outcome is desirable.

But then there are those precious few who slowly, carefully, methodically put in the time and effort to max out the course and in so doing reach an intimate fellowship with God that is deeper and more multilayered than any they ever planned to have with Him. These are the people who understand God as fully as He can be understood, and they incorporate that understanding into ministry. In particular, they can counsel others who find themselves disappointed/angry with God. I won't close this post by asking you to become such a counselor — that would require you to first become disappointed/angry with God, and I wouldn't wish that on anybody — but I will close it by asking you to become such a counselor if you've lived firsthand what I've described in the preceding paragraphs. In case you haven't figured it out yet, I myself am in that group, and so what I've written here has been my attempt to be that kind of counselor. As for how God uses all this in the lives of others, I guess I'll just leave that to Him.

## Fruit of the Spirit

In my grandson's preschool last year, one of the key things they covered as growing children was the Fruit of the Spirit. This foundational knowledge of what God develops in us is key to our growth as believers in Jesus. After we come to know Christ as our Lord and Savior, we are filled with the Holy Spirit who begins to mature these in us. "But the fruit



of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. Against such things, there is no law." Galatians 5:22-23 shows us clearly the gifts that God grows in us—and while we need to impart to our children and grandchildren, it is vital for us adults as well. Assessing these in ourselves as well as those we disciple can help us identify our strengths and weaknesses, rejoice or repent, surrender to our Lord in the areas we see the fruits of our lives withering, and prioritize growing in what the Holy Spirit is doing in us.

Also, when you look at the life of Jesus, you see every one of these qualities. If you'll devote yourself to Him, you'll look like He does! If you're walking close to the Lord, you'll see the Fruit of the Spirit in your own life; and these traits will help you become an effective witness for Jesus. Now, you may think, "How can I share the Gospel using the Fruit of the Spirit?" That's what we will look at in today's blog. Think of each one and use them in your actions and speech. Let your intentions be out of love, speak with joy, share His peace, and be patient with those you share with. So without further ado, let's look at each and see how they can impact us as growing Christians who are commissioned to offer these things to those who do not know Jesus through the Gospel!

#### LOVE, JOY, AND PEACE

Have you heard the old song, "I've got the joy, joy, joy, joy down in my heart?" Well, if you know Jesus then you can experience true joy! And you can spread it, too. When you placed your trust in Jesus alone, you've experienced the love of God; and there is true joy and peace in knowing where you'll spend eternity. Love, joy, and peace are God-given characteristics to lead people to saving faith in Him.

Pio, who learned to share his faith, told us that before his brother led him to Jesus that he struggled with immense anger. Now that he knows Jesus, he says his heart is full of peace and joy and that he can now share love and forgiveness with others. And if we have put our trust in Jesus alone, we have a Godly love for others.

Jesus is recorded saying in Mark 12, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength.' The second is this: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' There is no commandment greater than these." And that is exactly what the Spirit grows in us. Let's live our lives as a testimony to what Christ has done in us and share the love, joy, and peace we have with others through the Gospel.

#### PATIENCE, KINDNESS, AND GOODNESS

Isn't God good? All the time! All the time, God is good. We also know that He is kind...and He is patient. Bill had been praying for decades for his sister-in-law to come to saving faith in Jesus. He patiently prayed for her heart to be softened, and she finally accepted Jesus as her Lord and Savior. Talk about a celebration! Bill's testimony shows us God's kindness and goodness, and His patient pursuit of our hearts. The Lord gave Bill the patience to pray for his sister-in-law and the words to speak the Gospel to her. Romans 2:4 says, "Do you show contempt for the riches of his kindness, forbearance and patience, not realizing that God's kindness is intended to lead you to repentance?" #### GENTLENESS AND FAITHFULNESS

As easy as gentleness and faithfulness seems, I would contest that these two are some of the hardest to cultivate! And yet, these two are clearly aspects of God's character, and as His children, we should prioritize their growth. Even though God is all-powerful, glorious, and holy, our amazing and strong Father—Creator of the heavens and the earth—is exceedingly gentle with us. And He is faithful from generation to generation! But many times—especially with these particular Fruit of the Spirit—we place them on our "Christian To Do List"...as merely another box to check off or aspects we show and do when we are at church. What I take away from this is, when I keep silent about my age, there other things that are going to give away my secret.



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# Marlene's Meditations

Copy and Paste for Christians

Proverbs 3:6 "In all thy ways acknowledge him, and he shall direct thy paths."

From the days of onionskin copies to today's "copy and paste" option, the ability to duplicate has exploded. In the early 1970s, I remember carefully sandwiching the translucent brownish

paper between delicate black carbon sheets, inserting the packet slowly into the ancient manual typewriter, and producing so many copies that they gradually faded into barely discernible words. Sometimes, the last copy was almost indecipherable because the pressure of the keys was insufficient to make a solid impression. Today, with a few delicate clicks on the computer keyboard, a myriad of materials can be duplicated in just seconds, including text, pictures, clip art, and other graphics. Voilà! With no bells or whistles, your copied material lands quietly in your own personal file. Copying someone is easy.

The simple process of copy and paste reminds me of a spiritual parallel. Bible heroes climbed impossibly difficult mountains in their dramatic stories of faith, and they've left a GPS map for us. It is this: just as it is easy to highlight the material to be copied in today's computer age, so our faith journey becomes clearer when we highlight the paths of Bible heroes. Abraham, Sarah, King David, and Paul the Apostle, to name a few heroes, encourage us to copy their spiritual truths, and "paste" them into our lives.

For example, in Hebrews 11:11, the Bible records that: "Through faith also Sara herself received strength to conceive seed, and was delivered of a child when she was past age, because she judged him faithful who had promised." Sarah was 90 years old when she had the baby that God promised to her and Abraham. How did she accomplish the impossible feat of delivering a baby at 90 years old?

The Bible says that she received strength through faith to conceive Isaac. She physically remained married and faithful to Abraham. This enabled her to fulfill God's will for her which was to conceive Isaac.

One of the ways that we can "copy and paste" Sarah's faith into our own Christian lives is to keep physically doing the things that we know are God's will for us. Faith is the link between God's plan for us and our physical ability to fulfill that plan. It is then that God will strengthen us, like Sarah, to conceive the spiritual seed of His will that seems impossible for us to deliver.

For example, working with non-believers who doubt our faith seems challenging, but the Lord directs our path when we acknowledge Him in all our ways (See verse above.) We continue to physically work each day, to focus on the Lord rather than react to their taunts, and to refuse to be polarized. God then uses our willingness as a sign of our faith that He will do as He promises to "work all things together for good" (Romans 8:28). The seed of the Gospel may be conceived in their non-believing hearts and new life in Christ delivered into their lives.

We can copy King David's earthly tenacity (because we, like him, believe God is faithful) into our own spiritual goals. As we "paste" his pattern of physically continuing to do that which God commands, others recognize His working in our lives. God promises—we believe—faith becomes stronger—we receive the strength of body, soul, and spirit—we physically act in the direction of God's will—miracles happen—God gets the glory.! Here are the instructions to "copy and paste" the wisdom from Bible giants of faith into your life:

- 1. Highlight their actions by studying their stories in the Bible.
- 2. Press the "CTRL" (Control) key and the letter C in your life by copying their wisdom.
- 3. Open the document of your life.
- 4. Press the "CTRL" (Control) and the letter V in your life, applying the wisdom from your Bible study.

Try it! You can "copy and paste" the spiritual lessons Bible characters teach you into your life. Watch God duplicate His glory in you through faith!




# Dave Says

#### Dear Dave,

Is there any flexibility in your rule about not spending more than 25% of your take-home pay on rent or monthly mortgage payments? I live downtown in Washington, D.C., and I'm finding it's pretty hard to do here. I make about \$90,000 a year, but I'm spending a little over \$2,000 a month in rent. Rent is my largest expense by far, and I don't spend a lot of other money, so I'm still

#### Dear Tanner,

True, I advise people to spend no more than 25% of their take-home pay on housing. Math still works in every city and state in the country. You don't get a pass on math just because you live in Washington, D.C., even though Congress and a lot of other people there think you do.

But there's really nothing magical about 25%. The purpose behind it is, I don't want you to be house poor. If you find yourself still able to save and invest because you keep other financial aspects of your lifestyle so low, then you're okay. The problem with most people starts when they've got a high cost of housing, and those payments put a real squeeze on their budgets. It doesn't leave them enough room to save up to buy the next car, so that car becomes debt. The same thing happens with Christmas and vacations and everything else. They don't have enough extra money to save for things because a huge chunk of their income is flying out the door every month wrapped up in rent or a house payment.

Now, you're telling me your situation works for you because you've made room in your budget and live a very frugal lifestyle by choice. That's cool. I'm not mad at you about that. But here's the thing: Whatever you spend on rent disappears. And the more money you burn, the less you've got on hand for other things.

I'm not exactly sure how you adjust that in your situation. Maybe you move outside the city and commute, or perhaps you add a roommate into the equation. Or, maybe you're fine with how things are and that's the way you want to live. That's okay too. But my reasoning behind the 25% figure—which is actually more of a guideline than a rule—is so you don't become house poor. I want you to be able to save, invest and give generously. Plus, I want you to own your own home one day.

And you won't be able to do that if everything you make is going toward big payments!

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

"Who in the World Are the Remnant People?"

What? Remnant people? Who are they?

As you have probably heard, the term "remnant" is the Bible term, and it refers to a group of people who remain loyal to the Lord God after a time of hardship. The Bible tells us who will make up this end-time remnant:

"... the dragon was wroth with the woman, and went to make war with the remnant of her seed, which keep the commandments of God, and have the testimony of Jesus Christ." (Revelation 12:17 KJV). The universal church is composed of all who truly believe in Christ, but in the last days, a time of widespread apostasy, a remnant has been called out to keep the commandments of God and the faith of Jesus. This remnant announces the arrival of the judgment hour, proclaims salvation through Christ, and heralds the approach of His second advent. This proclamation is symbolized by the three angels of Revelation 14; it coincides with the work of judgment in heaven and results in a work of repentance and reform on earth. Every believer is called to have a personal part in this worldwide witness. So, the Bible is full of stories where God calls His chosen people out of dangerous places or destructive company for their own safety. One of those stories is in Genesis chapter 6 - the story of Noah. Just see the narrative: "... GOD saw that the wickedness of man was great in the earth, and that every imagination of the thoughts of his heart was only evil continually. And it repented the LORD that he had made man on the earth, and it grieved him at his heart. And the LORD said, I will destroy man whom I have created from the face of the earth; both man, and beast, and the creeping thing, and the fowls of the air; for it repenteth me that I have made them. But Noah found grace in the eyes of the LORD. ... Noah walked with God." (Genesis 6:5–9 KJV). Noah found grace in the eyes of the Lord because he walked with God.

Later on, Jesus refers to the Flood when He said in Matthew 24:37 (KJV): "But as the days of Noe were, so shall also the coming of the Son of man be." So, in the last days, right before Jesus returns to earth to take His followers to heaven, a Noah-like situation will happen again. In the book, which tells about the last days events - the book of Revelation, Satan is depicted as a raging dragon, while God's church and His people are symbolized by a woman which the dragon seeks to destroy. Revelation 12:17 (KJV): "... the dragon was wroth with the woman, and went to make war with the remnant of her seed, which keep the commandments of God, and have the testimony of Jesus Christ." So, the remnant people of God have a distinguishing mission! Rather than hiding their faith, they are commissioned to share the gospel and tell others about who God is and what He has done. # The Righteousness Of God Vs. the Wretched Man

A friend of mine sent me a text recently in which he described the continual battle he has between enjoying the fact that he is "the righteousness of God in Christ Jesus" (2nd Corinthians 5:21) and all the benefits that go with that, and the sobering fact that he walks sometimes in unrighteousness and dealing with the guilt that goes with that. The Lord reminded me of some

things because I need to be reminded of them once again myself and continue to speak them to myself and others whether they make sense to these finite human minds or not.

First of all, we find ourselves in some pretty good company. The Apostle Paul found himself in the same predicament as you and I, "For I do not do the good that I desire; but the evil which I do not will, that I do. But if I do what I do not desire, it is no more I working it out, but sin dwelling in me"..... "O wretched man that I am! Who shall deliver me from the body of this death? I thank God through Jesus Christ our Lord!" (Romans 7:19-20; 24-25).

Paul felt like a wretched man because he was acting like a wretched man, but in God's view, he made a big mistake when he spoke out loud that he was a wretched man, because two verses later he declares "There is therefore NOW no condemnation to those who are in Christ Jesus." At the very same moment that Paul declared himself a wretched man, God said "I ain't buying it (well maybe He didn't say ain't). What could possibly happen in a few verses that would change Paul's perspective so profoundly—the answer is found in the middle of these three verses, he had a come to Jesus meeting "I thank God through Jesus Christ our Lord."

That is the only answer we have or need, we just keep coming to Jesus and He will give us rest (Matthew 11:28-30), that is His promise to us even when we find ourselves laboring about our wretched behavior.

Something else He reminded me of was the power of a friend, "Confess faults to one another, and pray for one another, that you may be healed." (James 5:16). When we get brutally honest with each other we can pray, encourage, and help each other be all that God wants us to be, therefore bringing about the healing that our Savior wants to bless us with. First and foremost our confession should be to Him, but He also says we need the help of someone in the Body of Christ to overcome persistent sin that continues to rear its ugly head. Expect His healing today in every way, Hallelujah!

Another interesting thing He reminded me of was His patience with us in how often we come to Him in repentance, "Take heed to yourselves. If your brother trespasses against you, rebuke him. And if he repents, forgive him. And if he trespasses against you seven times in a day, and seven times in a day turns again to you, saying, I repent, you shall forgive him" (Luke 17:3-4).

If the same person sins against me seven times in a day and they keep coming back just "saying I repent," I'm going to wonder whether they are sincere or not. Satan wants to pull the sincerity card on us when we willfully sin against our Savior, we might even fall for His lie and start believing "I said I repent, but did I really mean it," and dwell in the condemnation he is speaking to us.

"But God" has a totally different perspective on it. Seven is the number of completion in God's Word. In verse 4 he uses the term "turns again to you," just keep turning to Him again, and again, and He will give you rest. Just keep turning from our sin and turn to Him "saying I repent" and He is faithful and just to forgive and cleanse all trespasses (1st John 1:9).

Hosea 14:2-4 says "Take with you words, and turn to Jehovah...... I will heal their backslidings; I will love them freely." Satan wants us to dwell in doubt, our wonderful gracious Daddy always gives us the benefit of the doubt.

Finally, we need to do what Clebe McClary says to do in his book "Living Proof" and sic FIDO on our enemy as he uses our fleshly minds to keep us bound. Forget It Drive On

FIDO is a Biblical principle. Just as in the story of Job, Satan is constantly accusing us and is so bold as to go before God about us (Job1:6 and 12). When we confess our sins God chooses not to remember them (Hebrews 10:17). In essence He says "I choose not to remember them so why should you," and He always wants us to continue on (Philippians 3:12), not wallow in the guilt in which Satan loves to entrench us. When Satan comes with his condemnation over sins that have been confessed I need to speak out loud "Henry, (put your name in the blank) Forget It and Drive On." Call it silly, call it whatever you want but using this simple little phrase will result in walking in the freedom in which He wants us to dwell. Why does it work? Because "faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the Word of God" (Romans 10:17), as we hear ourselves (and it is imperative we speak it out loud) declaring this profoundly Biblical phrase we are obtaining the faith to believe that I don't have to listen to this mind of flesh, or my enemy and can walk in the freedom my Savior says I have.

We all have regrets over past failures, but a child of God should never say "I regret" because when we verbalize them we are bringing up something that God chooses not to remember about us. Our Father has always been adamant about us not dwelling in the past (Isaiah 43:18).

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

People also often develop ways of protecting themselves, especially if they have been hurt in the past. I say it like this, "Hurting people hurt people." And sometimes, our methods of self-protection come across as very odd to the people who are dealing with us. For example, a person who has been hurt may be extremely defensive and think they are being rejected when that is not the case at all. Or, they may argue all the time, striving to be right in every situation because that is the only way they can feel good about themselves.

I happen to know a few people like this, and you probably know some too. I call them "porcupine people." They are difficult to be around because you are likely to get hurt. If you get close to them, you will see their flaws and quirks, and likely experience them. It would be so nice if we could just place an order for the kind of people we would like to have in our life, but people come "as is" and we either take them as they are or end up alone.

God takes us the way we are and helps us become all that we should be. The question is: Are we willing to do this for other people? My husband, Dave, did it for me, and had he not loved me unconditionally, I probably wouldn't be in ministry today. You see when Dave prayed for a wife, he asked God to give him someone who needed help, and God certainly answered his prayer because I needed a lot of help.

Growing up, I experienced sexual abuse from my father. And because of that past abuse, I ended up becoming a porcupine person too. Dave said he knew the first night he met me that I was the girl for him. As it turned out, he was right, but he had to be willing to love someone who was very hard to love for a very long time before he had a wife who was loveable.

Now I pray regularly to be good to people and make them feel good when they are around me. It's not always easy, and sometimes I still stick out my quills. But God is working with me, and I always want to be willing to work with the porcupine people He puts in my life too. We may sustain little wounds from time to time as we walk through life with other people, but we are much better off having relationships than living in isolation.

#### We All Need to Be Loved

Despite their prickles, I don't believe there is a person on the planet who doesn't want to be loved. As a matter of fact, most people who are hard to love are the way they are because they have never experienced real love. They are dissatisfied and looking for something to fill the emptiness they feel, but often they don't know what they are looking for, so they search for it in all the wrong places. Each time they think they find what they have been longing for, they end up disappointed, and it only makes their behavior more challenging for those around them.

But we can make a difference. When we have God's love in our hearts—His peace, kindness, mercy, forgiveness, joy, and many other blessings—we can let it flow through us to other people. Loving people who are hard to love will be difficult on most days, but God never asks us to do something without His help. And all things are possible with Him (Matthew 19:26). So don't listen to the lie that it is just too hard. You can do it because God is with you and He will love others through you. Even the prickly ones.



Far More Americans Believe in Angels than believe in Hell: Cafeteria Religion and The Joy of Living "Coram Deo" By Jim Denison

Nearly 70 percent of Americans believe in the existence of angels, according to a recent Associated Press-NORC survey. The same percentage believe in heaven, though even more (72 percent) believe in the power of prayer. (I wonder: If there's no heaven, why pray to the God who lives there?)



However, only 58 percent believe in hell, and even fewer (56 percent) believe in the existence of the devil.

I can understand why we would favor this cafeteria-style religion. Most of us want to think our prayers are heard, angels exist to help us, and heaven is our future. Fewer want to worry about the alternatives.

But ignoring reality makes it no less real.

Is another "tripledemic" coming?

According to Axios, "existential threats to humanity are soaring." The article cites climate change, artificial intelligence, and Russian and Chinese nuclear arsenals. Health experts are warning of another "tripledemic" of COVID, flu, and RSV this fall; the US Surgeon General has identified an "epidemic of loneliness and isolation" in our society.

We can tell ourselves that the Russians and Chinese are our friends, that AI and climate change pose no threats, and that viruses and loneliness are problems for other people. But those who downplay geopolitical enemies often make them worse (as British Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain's appeasement of Adolf Hitler tragically demonstrated). Ignoring technological, climate, and physical and mental health dangers only makes them more dangerous.

As C. S. Lewis noted in The Screwtape Letters, Satan wants us to discount his existence so he can act in a world that is ignorant of his devilish schemes. He especially wants us to reject the existence of hell so he can convince us that we do not need to be saved from it.

How can Christ's followers make a difference in a lost society that doesn't believe it's lost?

"The great problems call for many small solutions"

In Losing Our Religion: An Altar Call for Evangelical America, Russell Moore tells of the time poet and novelist Wendell Berry met with a group of environmental activists. He told them that the worst obstacle to their effort was the idea that their solutions should be as large-scale as the problem they were addressing. Instead, he said, "The great problems call for many small solutions." This must start with the honesty to name things as they are, he explained, and the imagination to see that it doesn't have to be this way. This is frustrating, he acknowledged: "Some will find it an insult to their sense of proportion, others to their sense of drama."

Dr. Moore observes: "You cannot change the human condition, and you cannot change the technological or cultural ecosystem in which you live and move and have your being. But you can be changed. And you will need to be" (his emphasis).

Jeremiah would have agreed: "I know, O Lord, that the way of man is not in himself, that it is not in man who walks to direct his steps" (Jeremiah 10:23). God agreed with his prophet: "Cursed is the man who trusts in man and makes flesh his strength, whose heart turns away from the Lord. He is like a shrub in the desert, and shall not see any good come. He shall dwell in the parched places of the wilderness, in an uninhabited salt land" (Jeremiah 17:5–6).

Is America "cursed" today?

By contrast, "Blessed is the man who trusts in the Lord, whose trust is in the Lord. He is like a tree planted by water, that sends out its roots by the stream, and does not fear when heat comes, for its leaves remain green, and is not anxious in the year of drought, for it does not cease to bear fruit" (vv. 7–8).

Is America "blessed" today?

The joy of living "coram Deo"

Now let's get personal. Living in a secularized, post-Christian, even anti-Christian culture, why would you and I trust in God more than we do and in ourselves less than we do? The answer transcends the intellectual: we can believe that heaven, angels, hell, and the devil exist, but such rational assent changes nothing in our lives or our world.

As the Protestant Reformers noted, notitia (the content of our faith) must lead to assensus (believing our notitia is true), but this must then lead to fiducia (entrusting ourselves to the God who is Truth). No doubt, you have taken the first two steps.

Why do you need to take the third today?

Pause for a moment and ask your Father: "What part of my life is not fully yielded to your Spirit? What is my next act of fiducia?" Then ask him to help you take this step now. If you lack the faith to do so, pray for the faith to have faith (cf. Mark 9:24).

Life is best-lived coram Deo ("before the face of God"). Such holistic, joyful holiness changes us and changes our culture, one soul at a time.

Scooping the ocean with a thimble

The philosopher Peter Kreeft introduces his personal website with this story: "Augustine tells of a vision of seeing a little boy at a beach scooping up the ocean thimbleful by thimbleful and emptying it out on the sand. Then he sees an angel who tells him that this boy will have emptied out the entire ocean long before Augustine has exhausted what can be said about God."

What was true of the greatest theologian after Paul is certainly true of you and me. But we can experience our omnipotent Lord in ways no words can capture. When last were you awed by God?

In a recent interview, NASCAR driver Jimmy Johnson revealed his "secret sauce" for his racing success. In his career when he won five straight NASCAR championships and later won two more which tied him with Richard Petty and Dale Earnhardt Sr. But Jimmy had a "secret sauce" that he and his crew chief followed that led to their success.



It was testing. Jimmy and his team would drive to racetracks during the week and test their cars for hours at a time. They'd try different shocks in the car springs, different air pressures in the tires, or adjust the suspension higher or lower. He describes those testing trips to different race tracks as the "secret sauce" that led to his success.

As believers, we too have a secret sauce. Ours does not deal with practice in race cars. Ours is about love for others. Paul describes that love in the thirteenth chapter of 1 Corinthians:

"Love is patient, love is kind and is not jealous; love does not brag and is not arrogant, does not act unbecomingly; it does not seek its own, is not provoked, does not take into account a wrong suffered, does not rejoice in unrighteousness, but rejoices with the truth; bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things" (1 Corinthians 13:4-7, NASB)

When someone says something mean, we respond in love by being kind (even when we want to say something mean back at them). When someone fails to follow through on a commitment, we respond in love by offering them another chance (even when we want to explain how much the person disappointed us).

Last week I arrived at a coffee shop in which I had prearranged (and prepaid) for a large batch of coffee to be prepared for me to take to the public school staff next to our church. When I arrived at the coffee shop the coffee was not ready, I waited fifteen minutes for them to gather the coffee, cups, lids, stir sticks, creamer, and sugar together. All that stuff was supposed to happen before I arrived. When the young barista handed me the coffee fifteen minutes later I smiled and handed her a five-dollar bill as a personal tip. Love!

Love is our secret sauce that leads to our success as believers when we interact with the world and our community of believers.

The month will be busy, applely tasty, and fun with something for all ages. The music and dancing. The grill (open





following a list of rules. But that's not what the Bible says at all. Instead, Jesus tells us to abide in Him to produce spiritual fruit.

When we truly have gentleness and faithfulness in our life, it pours into every moment, second, and hour. It's shown in how we treat our spouses. It is displayed by how we parent our children. It's the response we have to an upset neighbor or the way we interact with our coworkers. And faithfulness is loyalty to our Father in heaven and our promises—just like He is faithful to us. When we answer a person, we let our yes be yes and our no be no. We follow the leading of the Holy Spirit, and we are faithful to the commands and commission that Jesus told us, "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age" (Matthew 28:16-20).

Lamentations 3 says that because of the Lord's great love, we're not consumed – His mercy is new every morning, and great is His faithfulness! The Lord is so gentle with us and faithful to us. Let's be the same to our Lord and Savior and others by sharing the greatest gift we can with them: the Good News of what Jesus has done for us.

#### **SELF-CONTROL**

Finally, let's talk about self-control! The Oxford Dictionary defines self-control as "the ability to control oneself, in particular one's emotions and desires or the expression of them in one's behavior, especially in difficult situations." Wow. Talk about a tough part of our character to grow! But Jesus is our ultimate exampleespecially in this area. It reminds me of His time in the wilderness for forty days when Satan came to tempt Him. Jesus was starving and weak. It would have been easy to accept the enemies' promises of food, provision, and power. But the enemy was doing what He did best—imparting false promises. As discussed above, our great God is FAITHFUL and KEEPS His promises; and at that moment, Jesus depended on His Father and displayed enormous self-control. Jesus spoke the Word of God right back to Satan: "It is written: 'Man shall not live on bread alone, but on every word that comes from the mouth of God" (Matthew 4:4). There are two key ways to grow self-control in our own lives. The first is to depend on Scripture. It's like the psalmist so beautifully wrote to God: "I have hidden Your Word in my heart that I might not sin against You." We can walk in the footsteps of our Savior and use the Bible to defeat the enemy's temptations in our life. Secondly, we can rely on God through prayer. When our first reaction to temptation and sin is to run to God and seek Him, He will answer. He will help us through. As Peter wrote in 1 Peter 5, "Cast all your anxiety on Him because He cares for you." God is our Rock and our Salvation. What then shall we fear? And through our self-control, we can show others the power of Jesus in our lives. We can share how God delivers us day-to-day as vulnerable and real testimonies to our friends and power. In our weakness, we can show Jesus' strength and the power of the Holy Spirit in our lives.

So let's get growing! Let us cultivate the Fruit of the Spirit in our own life and outpour what Jesus is doing by reaching out to others. And may God richly bless you as you prioritize this in your life.

Others choose to go deeper, up to their knees. Our knees are a picture of prayer, we fall on them and pray for others.



#### Faithful in the Little Things, Faithful in Much

Jesus told many parables during His public ministry. Most were easy to understand because the Lord used simple stories about well know things, issues, or objects to illustrate moral, ethical, or spiritual lessons. They were



usually very effective in exposing sinful human choices and behavior and speaking and revealing the truth about Kingdom principles. This allowed Christ Jesus to engage and connect with listeners and teach eternal truths. There were a few of His parables that were, however, difficult and confusing to understand by both the disciples and those who were also listening. One of those was the "parable of the unjust servant" found in Luke 16:1-17. Immediately after Jesus told the parable of the prodigal son (Luke 15), He followed that simple parable with a more complex story that is both complicated and confusing.

In the "parable of the unjust servant," a rich man is told that one of his stewards, a man who had been hired to manage or oversee the owner's property or business, has been wasting his money. The owner summons the manager to fire him. He has made up his mind. He needed managers/stewards whom he could trust completely. And this man had proven himself untrustworthy. When the steward stands before the owner and learns of his fate, he begins moaning and groaning about not being able to get work anywhere else. "I'm not strong enough to dig and I am ashamed to beg," admits the steward. Unmoved by the excuses, the rich man fires him. But before the steward packs up and leaves, he shrewdly calls in some of the rich man's debtors and offers them huge discounts on their debts. Owe 600 gallons of oil, take your bill and quickly write down 300. Owe 70 bushels of wheat, write down 40. Upon learning of what the steward has done, the rich man actually praised and commended him for his shrewd and clever move. He has succeeded in "one-upping" the master. Although it didn't save his job, it appears that this sharp-witted and clever former steward had gotten the last laugh.

Jesus uses this story and the characters in this parable to illustrate how shrewd and self-centered the workings of the unrighteous are. Jesus is not commending the actions of the steward. Rather, the Lord Jesus is driving home a point about the hearts of those who do not seek after the Kingdom of God and His righteousness. He is pointing out and contrasting the way the world approaches money and riches with the way God wants His followers and disciples to use the resources that He has so richly given them.

Notice that every one of the characters in the story is unjust and unrighteous. They are corrupt and dishonest and know how to get what they want. Jesus knew that the Pharisees were listening as He told this parable to His disciples. And He wanted to lay down two important spiritual principles about true, genuine, and God-centered faithfulness and service.

The first lesson (found in verse 10) has to do with how believers faithfully deal with the resources that God has given. Jesus said, "He who is faithful in a very little thing is faithful also in much; and he who is unrighteous in a very little thing is unrighteous also in much." The lesson for those who trust in the Lord and live their lives surrendered to and under His Lordship and ownership is: We are to faithfully sow into the Kingdom rather than into the world. Wisdom, discernment, honesty, and integrity are required if we are to be entrusted with the eternal and spiritual things of God.

The second lesson (found in verse 13 speaks about sincere and undivided service to the Lord. Jesus declared, "No servant can serve two masters; for either he will hate the one and love the other, or else he will be devoted to one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and wealth." The lesson for those who desire to really make a spiritual impact in this dark, evil world is: We cannot serve God and ourselves at the same time!

As Joshua gathered the people of Israel at Shechem and demanded that they present themselves before God, he said (Joshua 24:14-15), "Now, therefore, fear the Lord and serve Him in sincerity and truth; and put away the gods which your fathers served beyond the River and in Egypt, and serve the Lord. If it is disagreeable in your sight to serve the Lord, choose for yourselves today whom you will serve: whether the gods which your fathers served which were beyond the River, or the gods of the Amorites in whose land you are living; but as for me and my house, we will serve the Lord." This is the same message that Christ Jesus has for every one of us. Choose for yourself today whom you will serve...but as for me and my house, we will serve the Lord. Let that be your confession and declaration today!

Breathing a sigh of relief and accepting that we were going to be late (again) I glanced into the rearview mirror at their little faces. Some of them still needed a little cleaning and there was still hair that needed brushing, but a few crooked ponytails and dirt-stained cheeks were not going to keep us from church.

During those years, getting my young family to church was hard enough but then one day I read this scripture in Deuteronomy 6:6-7(NAS) "These words, which I am commanding you today, shall be on your heart. And you shall repeat them diligently to your sons and speak of them when you sit in your house, when you walk on the road, when you lie down, and when you get up" I remember feeling so overwhelmed by that verse. Does God really want me and my children to talk about Him all of the time? I could hardly get shoes on their feet or keep them out of the mud long enough to get them to church on time, how in the world was I going to fulfill this scripture in their lives? It seemed so hard and all I could do was ask God for help.

As I pulled into the driveway that night the Lord reminded me of the scripture in Deuteronomy. Then He nudged my heart "You're doing it." The command in that verse was happening! Then I recalled all of the years we had traveled to church as a family. We had been doing the same thing! We had spent a lot of the ride talking about church, scriptures, lessons, and God. But it didn't happen just because I required it. I did not force us to talk about God. All of those years, God was doing something too. He was writing His Words on their hearts. Through those church services my children fell in love with God and they could not help but share that love with others. All I did was simply ask God for help. To this day God is still fulfilling that scripture in their lives as they take their own families to church. I know they have the same frantic moments with lost shoes and messy faces. But I continue to tell them to "....have those kids in church every chance you get" and when it all seems too hard just ask and God will help.

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
# The Inspiring Word

#### Goodness of God

Romans 2:4 "Or despisest thou the riches of his goodness and forbearance and longsuffering; not knowing that the goodness of God leadeth thee to repentance?"

From chapter two verses one through three the Bible asks if we who commit sin and point out the sin of others do so thinking we will avoid judgment. We



Romans 2:5-11 "But after thy hardness and impenitent heart treasurest up unto thyself wrath against the day of wrath and revelation of the righteous judgment of God; Who will render to every man according to his deeds: To them who by patient continuance in well doing seek for glory and honour and immortality, eternal life: But unto them that are contentious, and do not obey the truth, but obey unrighteousness, indignation and wrath, Tribulation and anguish, upon every soul of man that doeth evil, of the Jew first, and also of the Gentile; But glory, honour, and peace, to every man that worketh good, to the Jew first, and also to the Gentile: For there is no respect of persons with God."

Our Bible describes a person with a hard and impenitent heart as someone who is calloused against God and does not have any sorrow for their actions or behavior. This can be a religious person who has spent their entire life in church attendance and service. Or it can be someone who has never darkened the door of a church. God is not speaking to the act of an outward appearance. He is speaking to the condition of their heart. The Pharisees looked good but many if not most of them had a hard and impenitent heart. That is why they refused to accept Jesus and their Messiah. We are told specifically that these people have a revelation of the righteous judgment of God. Revelation is the revealing of secrets and them becoming known. Each one of us will have the secrets of our hearts revealed by God's righteousness and sovereignty. Those who seek the glory of God, his honor, and eternal life. And, those who are contentious, obeying unrighteousness, indignation, and wrath. The Westminster shorter catechism offers this. "What is the chief end of man? A: Man's chief end is to glorify God and enjoy him forever." 1 Corinthians 10:31: "So, whether you eat or drink, or whatever you do, do all to the glory of God." How often do we seek to glorify ourselves or others? We can stand with some of the mightiest men preaching and teaching the Bible but if we do not stand to glorify God we are failing him. Finally, we are told God is no respecter of persons. Our family name, finances, influence, years of church membership, or the people who know us do not impress God. # What Seeds are Dropping from Your Leaky Seed Basket?

My Mom is 90 years young, and though not physically able to plant and tend a large vegetable garden, she planted a row of beans in her flower garden this year. She is not even a great fan of green beans but enjoys preparing and sharing them with others. In recent years, her canning schedule included 70 to 100 plus quarts of green beans! Working the soil and reaping the fruits of her labor gives her joy. The family jokes that Mom could put a



stick in the mud, and it would grow. She has always been quick to give the Lord credit for the fruitfulness of her garden.

Memories of the gardens of my youth had endless rows of vegetables always needing tending. Much of my summertime growing up, as the oldest of five, was spent gathering and working the vegetables in Mom's garden; breaking beans, shucking corn, pepper, okra, onions, tomatoes, and other veggies Mom grew to feed a hungry family. A friend visiting from South Carolina once ask, "Why are your potatoes so dirty?" She was a city girl and had never seen freshly dug potatoes! A row of beautiful flowers in the garden was an added delight and helped deter insects and encourage pollination.

If you planted vegetable seeds this past spring, the fresh food of your garden is probably coming to an end, weeds are plentiful and ready to be cleared and tossed by the wayside. Fall is around the corner, and harvest is drawing nigh. Perhaps you have preserved the fruits of your labor for enjoyment this winter, or perhaps you have a friend that will share some dirty potatoes and green tomatoes!

A couple of years ago, I was privileged to attend a Bible Study, Pullin' Weeds Plantin' Seeds, Maintaining Your Spiritual Life, by Crystal L Ratcliff. This study often comes to mind when I read in God's Word the parable of the sower. This parable is recorded in three of the four Gospels, which would emphasize the importance of the lesson concerning the condition of the heart when the seed of God's Word is planted. Matthew 13; Mark 4; Luke 8.

- Seeds planted by the wayside serve as feed for the birds, quickly snatched up and gone. Consider the hard, packed earth on a well-used path. God's Word is heard but there is never any belief; the heart is hard.
- Seeds planted in rocky ground sprout quickly but develop no roots and soon die. Mom would say "That ground is slate rock, and nothing will grow." God's Word is heard but there is no root to sustain it; the heart is shallow.
- Seeds planted among the thorns are soon choked out. Have you pulled sticker weeds in your garden that have roots as long as your arm? Plants would soon be consumed. God's Word is heard but worldly activities consume the heart, and the things of God are choked out; the heart is crowded.
- Only seeds planted in the good soil that has been softened and tended by the work of
  the gardener sprout, develop roots, grow, mature, and produce fruit. When God's Word
  is planted in a receptive heart, eager to learn, grow and serve, as it is guided by the
  Spirit and encouraged by others, the heart is fruitful.

So, are our hearts hard, shallow, crowded, or fruitful? Perhaps, at times, we may have experienced all these heart conditions, but the good soil of our hearts should be eager for the latter. A fruitful heart is always pulling away weeds of life that seek to choke and crowd out God's Word and continue planting seeds of His love along the journey. Never perfect but continually striving to overcome the weeds and produce fruit.

As we work and cultivate our vegetable garden, it is a gentle reminder of cultivating our hearts to receive and share God's word. Our lives are a leaky seed basket. Do we drop seeds of love, friendship, encouragement, trust, listening, kindness, helpfulness, forgiveness, humility, and other attributes of a fruitful heart? These seeds have the opportunity to fall on receptive hearts and reflect God's love. Is the opposite true in that our leaky basket drops weeds in the form of bitterness, worldliness, fear, selfishness, pride, and other attributes of a barren heart? Questions to ponder as we travel this journey. God looks upon the heart; is it fruitful or barren?

May your heart basket be filled with fruitful seeds and dead weeds and may you reap the harvest of a bountiful garden in God's love. Happy weedin'!

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




How do we respond when we are ridiculed or scorned? What is a better way to respond than in fear, anger, hurt, or defense?



Pastor Johnny and his wife, Berry Serafini, arrived in early August 2023 to begin his ministry at Landis Orthodox Presbyterian Church as the Landis Presbyterian celebrates its 100 years of ministry to Marion and McDowell County. The Serafini family is composed of

eleven children. They are Johnny, Jr., Markie, Harley, Angela, Eslie, Anna, Luke, Katie, Levi, Evelyn, and Madeline.

Johnny's ministerial journey began when Johnny's parents enrolled him in a Christian American school in São Paulo, Brazil. Johnny came to know the Lord through this school's Christian teachers, Bible classes, and Friday assembly meetings that often featured the preached Word of God.

After earning a degree in Agricultural Engineering, Johnny went to work with an evangelistic mission in the city of São José dos Campos as part of a Reformed Baptist congregation from 1989 to 1990. In 1991 he continued his education by attending Clemson University, earning a Master's degree in 1993. Returning to Brazil, Johnny served as Youth Director at Grace Baptist Church, São José dos Campos, Brazil, from 1993-1995.

In November 1995, Berry and Johnny were married. Berry is the daughter of Mr. Harley and Mrs. Margaret

Davis. Harley is from Alabama, and Margaret is from Morganton, NC. The Davis family has conducted an agricultural ministry in the Amazon Basin over the last sixty years. Berry, therefore, grew up in the North Brazilian Amazon Basin, assisting with the missionary work started by her grandfather and continued by her father and mother today.

In 1995 Johnny became the Pastor of Grace Baptist Church, São José dos Campos, Brazil, where he served until 1997. After ministering in São José dos Campos, Johnny's father-in-law, Mr. Harley Davis, invited Johnny to help him in his ministry as an evangelist while Johnny considered seminary studies. Johnny and Berry moved from the city to the jungle, where they lived

for eight years.



Johnny and Berry moved to Grand Rapids, Michigan, in 2005, where Johnny enrolled at Puritan Reformed Theological Seminary. 

#### SBC Sunday School Lesson Provided Great Opportunity to Address Neglected Topic

My wife, Kim, and I attend a small Baptist Church in the metropolis of Eureka, North Carolina. I'm being facetious about Eureka's size because actually, it's a town in Wayne County with a population of about 200. Our pastor is stupendous and the congregation of Mount Nelson Baptist Church are some of the sweetest and most faithful saints I've ever known. We drive 30 minutes from our home in Smithfield to be with them.



Because of my speaking schedule, I am not in attendance most of the time. However, I committed to teaching Sunday School at Mount Nelson every Fifth Sunday. I look forward to it with great anticipation, and the members of the Sunday School class always indicate they are very eager to hear me explain God's Word to them.

Last Sunday, it was my day to teach and the passage was from Jeremiah 35: 4-19. Southern Baptist Sunday School literature titled the lesson, Worthy.

The primary point of the lesson was that God commended the faithfulness of the Recabite clan as an example for the wayward people of Judah. Despite being commanded by their ancestor Jonadab to never drink wine or build houses, the Recabites faithfully adhered to these instructions for generations (approximately 300 years). God contrasts their obedience with the disobedience of Judah, emphasizing the value of the Recabites' faithfulness and promising them a continuing presence before him.

As I shared with the class, I explained that I thought it providential that this particular lesson had fallen to me. As the executive director of the Christian Action League, I have addressed the subject of alcohol for 23 years and have encouraged followers of Christ to abstain.

I acknowledge the complexity of the subject and admonished the class that if people want to understand the topic from a sound Christian worldview, they'll have to do more than accept cursory arguments in favor of drinking, such as: "Well didn't Jesus turn the water into wine." Or, "The Bible doesn't forbid drinking but only condemns getting drunk." Such a shallow understanding is indicative of failing to dig deep enough to discover what the Bible actually says.

I qualified my remarks by arguing that I understood the primary point of the text had little to do with alcohol. But because there has been a significant decline in abstinence among evangelicals in recent years, Jeremiah 35, and its story about the Recabites' vow not to drink wine, provides a great opportunity to revisit the subject of alcohol use. Something that must not escape our notice is God's endorsement of the Recabites' decision to follow abstinence.

It is my prayer that you will find this Sunday School lesson of help to you and your family.


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# Foundation Forward,

William Paca

This is an American history educational moment of those who made a difference during the Revolutionary War era and how they served our Country.

William Paca (pronounced "Pay-Ka") was born October 31, 1740, in Abingdon, Maryland. William's earlier educa-



While practicing law, William and Samuel Chase formed an enduring friend-ship, even though they were ardent adversaries in the courtroom. Paca and Chase became formidable patriots as they railed against the royal (British loyal) governor regarding taxes. Unlike Chase, who gave spirited public speeches, Paca inspired people by writing compelling newspaper articles for independence. Paca and Chase formed the Annapolis Sons of Liberty as the relationship between the colonies and England deteriorated.

Paca became an influential patriot serving as a delegate from Maryland to the First and Second Continental Congresses. At first, Maryland was hesitant to allow him to support independence. While waiting in Philadelphia for a decision from Annapolis, Paca received authorization to vote for independence. Paca and Chase signed the Declaration of Independence next to each other. They proudly signed "immediately under the bold and famous flourish of John Hancock."

In 1787, Paca, like others, was disappointed in the new United States Constitution because it did not embrace fundamental human rights. William suggested covering freedoms of religion and the press and seeking "legal protections for citizens accused of crimes." Paca continued his patriotic contributions in many ways. Two respects were to help frame the Maryland constitution and serve as a Maryland state senator.

Like others during the Revolutionary War era, Paca did not realize the impact of not stopping slavery. However, he was an altruistic and patriotic soldier serving in the militia and enthusiastically supported benefits for veterans. During his lifetime, he held numerous crucial positions: State senator, superior and appellate court judge, United States district court judge, and governor of Maryland. Other undertakings that Paca pursued and accomplished were supporting the separation of church and state, and helping draft Maryland's state constitution. William also assisted in establishing Washington College in Chestertown, MD, in 1782.

Having witnessed success and disappointment, William Paca died in the mansion on his Wye plantation just before his 59th birthday on October 13, 1799. At his death, William was lonely and depressed. However, he was described "as a man beloved and respected by all who knew him—considered at all times as a sincere and honest man."

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# Tim's Treasures

#### A Three Day's Walk

Driving up the mountain the other morning, I prayed that God would speak to me, giving me the words to follow for the day. No more had the prayer been finished than the words, "Walk with Me," came. About this time, after my car broke through the clouds that sheltered my home down below - the most brilliant sunrise beckoned.



It was one of those moments when you felt the Lord speaking to you through his creation. The scripture in Psalm 91 seemed to fit, "He who dwells in the shelter of the Most High will abide in the shadow of the Almighty. I will say[a] to the Lord, "My refuge and my fortress, my God, in whom I trust."

As my thoughts pondered the "Walk with Me" command, my car notified me of an incoming message. One of my young brothers in Christ, Joe, asked if I was going to go to the Local Lion for coffee. Now, earlier, I had contemplated what to do with the morning - to get coffee before work, to sleep in, or eat breakfast and then go straight to the office. It wasn't until after the answer to my prayer did the images and messages began to roll in, so of course, I responded, "I'm on my way."

There, sitting on the porch of the Local Lion with Joe, we talked about "Walking" in scripture and what it could mean. Joe immediately brought up the three days that Abraham walked to sacrifice Isaac as God had commanded. Imagine walking with your son, who doesn't really know your intentions, that you are about to offer him to God as a living sacrifice. We pondered over the scripture in Genesis, thinking about the correlation to Christ's sacrifice on the cross. For most, if not all of us, giving up our only son would be extremely difficult, if not impossible. But Abraham was not your typical father. In Genesis 17, God spoke to him, saying, "I am God Almighty; walk before me and be blameless. I will confirm my covenant between me and you and will greatly increase your numbers."

So, for argument's sake, let's take a walk with Abraham.

[Day 1]

Abraham rose early, long before sunrise, preparing for their journey. Meanwhile, Isaac slept in. And why not? He was a teenager after all. Yet, before the sun had hit the horizon, Abraham already had the wood split and the donkey saddled. His servants had breakfast waiting as he shook Isaac gently by the shoulder. "My son, get up. We have to go." Jacob's questioning, sleepy eyes must have wondered what was at hand. "God has told me that we have to go to the land of Moriah to make an offering.

"Why do I have to go?"

"God has spoken to me once again, but this time, I need your help to fulfill God's plan."

So, begrudgingly the teen arose and ate breakfast with his father. Isaac had heard the stories of how God had spoken to his father and mother and how he was conceived in their old age. He expected that his father's need for him to go was divinely directed, so, for that reason, he was happy to help, but this early morning business wasn't what he had in mind. Meanwhile, Abraham looked upon Isaac as they sat before the fire, eating. The words from God kept running through his head, "Sarah thy wife shall bear thee a son indeed; and thou shalt call his name Isaac: and I will establish my covenant with him for an everlasting covenant, and with his seed after him." He knew that sacrificing Isaac would be counterintuitive to what God had commanded, but why? Regardless, he had to obey. He had come too far in his life's journey to do otherwise now.

The dread that must have hung over the countenance of Abraham was comparable to those disciples who sat in the shadow at the foot of the cross. As the Roman soldiers prepared to lower the blood-stained post upon which Christ's limp body hung, their hearts must have been torn. "It wasn't supposed to end this way," they thought to themselves.

The sun was barely breaking over the distant mountains when Abraham, Isaac, and two men-servants departed home with the donkey loaded with firewood in tow

The disciples watched with heavy hearts as they lay the body of their Savior in the tomb.

The long shadows that hung across the valley before them were merely a precursor to what awaited.

[Day 2]

The doors were locked. The questions abounded around the table where the disciples had gathered in the upper room. Would the Jewish authorities come for them next? What were these last three years about if this is how it ends? So many doubts and fears.

Yet, as Abraham walked with the three other traveling companions, his mind reflected on all the encounters with God and how they led up to this day. What inner turmoil he must have faced. The memories returned again and again of God speaking to him, saying, "Look now toward heaven, and tell the stars, if thou be able to number them: and he said unto him, So shall thy seed be ... Unto thy seed have I given this land, from the river of Egypt unto the great river, the river Euphrates "Then there was the visit by the three men in the plains of Mamre. Again, the Lord spoke to Abraham and Sarah, telling them that even in her old age, she would bare a son. Hearing this from the door of their tent, Sarah laughed in herself. God immediately answered her, saying, "Is there anything too hard for the LORD? At the time appointed I will return unto thee, according to the time of life, and Sarah shall have a son."

One thing was absolute: Abraham believed in the Lord with all his heart. Knowing this, God "Counted it to him for righteousness." Yet, Abraham was only human - indeed, he would still have doubts. Before he laid down that second night to sleep, he prayed for God to comfort his soul and softly whispered, "As I lay here in silence, Lord, I search my heart and my ways. The light of Your face shines forth on me as You fill my heart with gladness. In peace I lie down and sleep tonight, for You have made this dwelling a sure and trustworthy abode." That night, unlike the many nights before, Abraham slept a peaceful sleep.
[Day 3]

"Then on the third day, Abraham lifted up his eyes, and saw the place afar off. And Abraham said unto his young men, Abide ye here with the ass; and I and the lad will go yonder and worship, and come again to you. And Abraham took the wood of the burnt offering, and laid it upon Isaac his son; and he took the fire in his hand, and a knife; and they went both of them together. And Isaac spake unto Abraham his father, and said, My father: and he said, Here am I, my son. And he said, Behold the fire and the wood: but where is the lamb for a burnt offering? And Abraham said, My son, God will provide himself a lamb for a burnt offering: so they went both of them together."

When they reached the place that God had told Abraham about, Isaac began to worry. There was no lamb, no other animal for which they could sacrifice. His heart began to race as the realization came to him, it was he who would be sacrificed. Sensing his anxiousness, Jacob bound Isaac and placed him upon the altar of wood. Isaac watched in horror as his father raised the knife. He closed his eyes, already preparing for the shock of the blade in his heart. But then there was nothing. Silence.

Raising the knife about to drive it into Isaac's heart, the angel of the LORD called to Abraham out of heaven, "Abraham, Abraham."

He stopped, hand still raised, clutching the blade, and replied, "Here am I." Eyes still closed, Isaac heard the bleating of an animal nearby. He opened his eyes as his father lifted him from the altar, untying and hugging him. Tears of relief filled his eyes as he watched his father retrieve the ram from the thicket nearby. The joy of knowing he had been spared, saved from certain death, filled his soul. In that fateful moment, hand raised, ready to drive the knife into his only son's chest, God spared Isaac. He declared that Abraham had shown himself worthy, having not withheld offering up his only son as a sacrifice. The ram became Isaac's substitute. Yet, it was Christ who, for us, became the ram in the thicket, the propitiation for all our sins. God gave his only son so that we, the Isaacs of the world, would not face death but that we would be spared.

Fearing the end was near, the disciples huddled in that dark room behind locked doors. Their fears were dashed away forever when Jesus suddenly appeared in the midst of them. Their souls were restored when he said to them, "Peace be unto you."

He had risen indeed.

Death was not the end of the story.

As we walk through our daily lives, we, too, will have doubts and fears. It is when we finally give them over to God that we are truly free of the bondage of sin. As Jesus told his disciples, "Peace I leave with you, my peace I give unto you: not as the world giveth, give I unto you. Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid." Many people feel that the harder they work, the longer they try, and eventually, they will clean off that plate of things to do and achieve that magnificent goal the world had taught them that they need to accomplish to be successful. It is when we finally realize that the rat race never ends, that we cannot do it alone, and that there has to be a better way. Then, we can truly realize our purpose and fulfillment in this life.

As we go through life's journey, many struggle with giving it all over to God. Many don't care to come to know their Savior until it's too late. But having the faith to accept Christ into your life is a close correlation to Abraham's experience at that sacrificial altar. He placed everything he had been promised upon the altar. The lineage and seed of his future generations lay before him. When it seemed he was about to drive the knife into his only son's chest; God spared Abraham's son. Likewise, many find themselves down and out; in their deepest darkest moments, they finally give it over to God, only to discover that He had been there with them all along, simply waiting for them to ask.

As you go about your day, try to focus on your walk with God. Listen for that still small voice and be prepared to act when the answer finally comes - you'll be amazed at what He can do.

And always remember, "Thanks be to God."

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



# NC Senate District 47

While work on the state budget continues, the General Assembly convened in August to handle some outstanding business from the legislative long session. At the top of the list was holding override votes for six bills recently vetoed by Governor Roy Cooper.

Veto overrides require a three-fifths majority of the members present in both chambers of the legislature. We successfully overrode all six vetoes on a variety of issues, bringing this session's veto override count to 14.

Senate Bill 49 – Parents' Bill of Rights, of which I was a cosponsor, became law by a vote of 27-18 in the Senate and 72-47 in the House along straight party lines. This new law codifies that parents have ultimate control over their child's education. This encompasses a variety of rights, including the right to be made aware of any changes to a child's name or pronouns used by school personnel or in school records. The bill also ensures age-appropriate instruction in our public classrooms by prohibiting the inclusion of gender identity, sexual activity, or sexuality in the curriculum for grades K-4.

A companion bill to Senate Bill 639, Youth Health Protection Act, which I filed in the Senate, House Bill 808, Gender Transition/Minors, prohibits medical professionals from performing harmful surgeries or prescribing life-altering hormone treatments and puberty blockers for minors. Our society has long acknowledged that children are not mature enough to understand the long-term consequences of their choices. This bill protects children from undergoing medically unnecessary and potentially devastating treatments. The bill passed the Senate along party lines but obtained a bipartisan vote of 74-45 in the House.

I also cosponsored the Senate companion bill to House Bill 574, Fairness in Women's Sports Act, which ensures that biological males are not allowed to compete on girls' teams for high school athletics in North Carolina. There are obvious fairness and safety issues for allowing biological males to impede on spaces and contests designed for women and girls. Female athletes deserve the common-sense protections provided in House Bill 574. The override vote for this bill mirrored the numbers in House Bill 808.

Two of the other vetoed bills made changes to how the state governs charter schools, while the final bill dealt with regulations to building codes at the local level. All six bills have now become law.

Last year's theme was "25 Years of Safety – Past, Present, Future" and the conference had 724 participants from across the state. I am looking forward to this year's conference having even more participation. Our Recognition Program staff and the Carolina Star Safety Conference Board of Directors put in a lot of hard work to make this conference the success that it is.

Later this month, I will also be attending the Occupational Safety and Health State Plan Association (OSHSPA) meeting in Saratoga Springs, NY. There are 29 states and territories that are an OSHA-approved state plans, and this meeting provides an opportunity for those state plans to meet and discuss what is going on in their states and to also talk with Federal OSHA. #### Positive New Laws Enacted Legislature Overrides Six Cooper Vetoes

On August 16, 2023, North Carolina's legislature successfully overrode six significant bills previously vetoed by Governor Roy Cooper. In this article, I would like to highlight five of the six bills overridden.

First, we overrode the veto of a bill I introduced to delay until an individual is at least 18 years old the use of gender transition surgeries and the prescribing of puberty blockers and other hormones for the purpose of "transitioning". We should all be keenly aware that such "treatments" are highly likely to have permanent, life-changing consequences. The nature of minors is to change their minds about all manner of things as they grow older. Moreover, medical "transitioning" is still deeply experimental and potentially dangerous. In fact, many European countries that once led the push for such therapies are turning back and severely restricting them. In the circumstances, it seems clearly wise to delay such decisions until the individuals affected are 18 or older.

We also overrode the veto of the "Fairness in Women's Sports Act". This bill addresses the problem created by those classifying themselves as "transitioned" women, whether by surgeries/hormones or by simple self-identification, who wish to participate in women's sports. When biological men, born with the genes for superior muscle mass and larger frames characteristic of males, compete in women's sports with a resulting competitive edge, it can clearly result in both physical harm and unfairness to biological women. Legislative health committees heard testimony from female athletes directly affected and seeking reform. These women included both those injured and those unfairly penalized. Currently, school districts and the High School Athletic Association determine what is allowed. The new law prohibits those born as men from competing in female sports in our schools.

A third veto overridden was one declaring parents to have certain rights with respect to their children. The rights mentioned in the bill relate primarily to the education of children and, to some extent, children's medical care. Under the bill, schools are prohibited from presenting sexually explicit content before 5th Grade. Though I voted for the override, in my opinion, it is a weak bill because it does not give parents much in the way of recourse in the event their rights are not respected by government officials. It continues broad exceptions to parents' rights in both education and health matters and it fails to address parents' rights in other areas where the government interacts with their children. It does, I hope, represent at least a first step in the right direction.

Two other bills passed over the governor's veto relate to increasing educational choices for students. Simply put, the two bills loosen restrictions on charter school growth. Charter schools are public schools but, because they are intended to give more leeway from the more regulated traditional public schools, they may be viewed by parents as offering a better "fit" for students whose parents make that choice. One of the overridden bills reorganizes the advisory board for charters to strengthen that board's decision-making authority and to alleviate the potential for decisions being left to individuals hostile to charters success. The second school choice bill, which has now become law over the veto, gives charter schools more flexibility in terms of admissions and creates the option for local government to aid charters with capital improvements. State and county governments currently provide all capital needs for traditional public schools while public charter schools receive no government funds for their facilities and capital equipment. Instead, the public charter schools must raise privately all funds for their capital needs. Thus, the second bill, in this instance, opens up the option should a local county wish to assist with charter schools' capital expenses.

# NC Senate District 46

Wednesday, August 16, was a momentous day at the NC General Assembly. Members of both the NC Senate and the NC House gaveled in to take decisive action as six of Gov. Roy Cooper's vetoes were overridden, ensuring the bills became law despite his objections. While the Senate votes were along party lines, several of the six overrides received bipartisan support in the House. These legislative overrides enjoy broad support among North Carolina's citizens. The bills are as follows: 1) SB49 The "Parents' Bill of Rights" strengthens the rights of parents regarding the education of their children. The bill also ensures age-appropriate material is being taught to the youngest students, and keeps parents informed on the well-being of their children. A Washington Post poll shows 77% of adults think it's inappropriate for teachers to discuss trans identity in public schools with students in K-3. 2) HB574 The "Fairness in Women's Sports Act" bans biological men from competing in women's sports. A recent Gallup survey found that 69% of Americans say transgender athletes should only be allowed to compete on sports teams that conform to their birth gender. 3) HB488 addresses housing affordability issues across North Carolina. It removes unnecessary requirements that greatly inflate the cost of new home ownership. 4) HB618 gives more authority over charter schools in North Carolina to the Charter Schools Review Board. 5) HB219 "Charter School Omnibus" allows the proper growth of charter schools so they can accommodate ever-increasing demand. 6) HB808 "Gender Transition/Minors" bans gender-reassignment surgery, puberty blockers, and cross-sex hormones for minors. A Washington Post-KFF poll results reported that 68% of adults oppose children ages 10-14 having access to puberty-blocking medication under medical supervision. In summary, there have been 14 vetoes in 2023. All 14 have been overridden by the legislature. Election legislation was also passed to the Governor's desk on the 16th. Both chambers approved bill language the House proposed to SB747 Elections Law Changes. 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
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# NEVER2SCARRED

We are an in-house Christ-centered ministry for helping women to recover from addictions to drugs and alcohol. Our program is a 6-month intensive healing and heart res-



They receive teaching WHO LOVE is, How to show love, and express love in a Healthy way. How to have and make healthy relationships, how to take care of themselves, hygiene, healthy cooking, cleaning... They have One-on-one Christian Counseling and basic education skills ...GED, how to get a job, pay bills, save money, and social skills.

We officially opened for residents on April 16, 2022. Our ladies began to come on April 16th and we now have seven ladies living at the Hope House at this time. Including our full-time night manager, Susan Davis, a recent graduate of the program, and our weekend manager, Ange Meade also a graduate of the program.

They also have praise and worship with Debbie Forb, Bible studies with Dr. Rocky Branch, Barbara Macomber, Shirley Marsh, Linda B. Pitman, and Janice Branch They also attend Celebrate Recovery on Thursdays. Tanya Phillips and Debbie Forb teach cooking, life skills, and nutrition weekly.

Anyone who is interested in becoming a volunteer can go online, fill out an application, and read all the rules and regulations to become a volunteer.

We begin Family Day at the Hope House on September 13th, 2022 which allows those who have been at residence for at least 30 days to have their family attend. Family Day is scheduled for the 2nd Saturday of every month. Refreshments and/or meals are provided for everyone in attendance. Several days have had meals donated by a family person.

The ladies are involved with the organization, "Sewing Seeds", a ministry that makes dresses for girls and shorts for boys in foreign countries. Our ladies have been participating in sewing these once a month at Bear Creek Baptist Church. It has been a very rewarding experience for them all.

Our prayer request at this time is for the transition house plans to move forward and become a reality for the ladies who finish the recovery program. At this time our biggest need is a 16-passenger van to be able to transport all the ladies to appointments, outings, and church services and monitory donations for expenses.

# The Defoliated Worship

Before the reformation, the Lord's Supper was framed as a sacrifice. Scholars date the genesis of this theology to Ambrose of Milan of the fourth century. This theology germinated in the soil of time until it slowly bloomed in the Middle Ages as a dramatic re-enactment of the upper room



accounts in the synoptic gospels. It became a drama observed by the peasants and participated in by the priests but once a year. When a crumb of bread fell onto the ground, the people were struck with "the fear of the Lord", for they believed this Lord would strike them all dead as a consequence of such an atrocious act of accidental irreverence. It became a sacrificial ceremony observed with awe in which the bread and wine (if the rituals were done correctly) transformed the materials into Jesus' body and blood. The rituals and reverence crowded out Christ in their extravagance. The reformers were appalled by the extravagance and sought to simplify. They thought that the extravagance supplemented substance. They tried to wed simplicity and substance according to the solemn vow that is the scriptures. They went back to the scriptures to re-form their theology of the Lord's Supper.

Why tell this dusty and dirty story? Because extravagance has defoliated the tree of simplicity and substance in the American Church. This defoliation has taken place in making our theology into a theory. Theology and theory sound quite similar, but they are distinct. I might theorize that Christ died, was raised with the Spirit of God, and ascended to heaven to be seated at the right hand of the Father where, as Gerard Manley Hopkins said well, "plays in ten thousand places". Though that may be my working theory, my theology might be that God died and that it is my responsibility to incarnate Christ here and now; by eloquent speech that gently coaxes people into repentance, or coercive speech aimed at guilting the church into discipleship, or flamboyant and flashy worship aimed at entertaining the church into revival. These things assume the death of God and that my responsibility is to play the role of God.

Theology is ideas earthed in the material of relationships, temptations, and marriage. It is the big ideas grounded in everyday life. The theory is the hot air balloon of theology whose tether was cut by cunning questions and platitudinous answers.

The American Church often occupies theory in worship. We say we believe Christ is present and on the move, every time two or more gather, but our worship services are compensating our unbelief with an extravagance. We say we believe in the Holy Spirit, but we decorate our gatherings with seductive songs that sing out like sirens beckoning us into the sea that is ceaseless stimulation. We do not need stimulation but simplicity. We need the stimulation to get out of the way to transform our whole selves (including the heart) into a soul that is in perpetual praise of God.

In the last article I wrote, I addressed the name dilemma worship leaders are in. I submitted that we worship leaders need new names besides music minister, worship leader, or even the more biblical title, choirmaster. We need a biblical name. Asaph was a leader of worship. I proposed (lightheartedly and playfully) that we call ourselves children of Asaph. Noncoencedentally, there are twelve poems/prayers/songs by Asaph. One of the notable themes in each of these Psalms is simplicity. Simplicity obscures ambiguity and illuminates the substance of truth. We need the truth told simply. Flashy lights, dim rooms, and loud music are a profligated way of worship. We need to go back to the basics of Worship and live out our theology of Christ's resurrection and ascension. I am going to begin writing about Asaph's first Psalm which is Psalm 50, trusting that the Holy Spirit is on the move and that the Word of God does not need extravagance to compensate for its beautiful simplicity. We, children of Asaph (worship leaders), need a reformation. We need to go back to the scripture to discover the part in this play that is God's

story. Then we need to learn our lines by chanting them like a creed. As we chant Psalm 50 we will find ourselves transformed.

#### A Pattern Of Commitment

Acts 1:14 "These all continued with one accord in prayer and supplication, with the women, and Mary the mother of Jesus, and with his brethren."

I read a statement some time back that said, "In order to make an impact, you must be involved." With all due respect to the author of that statement, I would like to offer a somewhat revised version and say that "in order to make an impact, you must be COMMITTED!" Some people take commitment very seriously, while others find

commitment to be a challenge. Churches today are struggling to operate due to a lack of committed members and servants. Are you being committed to the person of Jesus Christ, and the things of God? To help answer this question, may I recommend that you consider the pattern of your lifestyle?

We all have days and times that we are committed, and thankfully so. Without some level of commitment among Christians and church members, it would be difficult to accomplish many of the tasks of the local church. In looking at the many examples in Scripture, I noticed the commitment of Mary in Acts chapter one and began to ponder her presence there with the disciples and other dedicated followers of Christ, after His ascension. She had been a young Jewish girl when she is introduced in Scripture, and now we see her decades later still gathered with the body of believers that had been left behind to await His promises.

Change comes with life, and change came for young Mary when we first meet her in Luke's Gospel. When the angel told her that God had a plan for her life, Mary was faced with a decision... would she follow God's plan for her life, or would she rebel against Him? Mary had found her purpose early in life, and it became her reason for living. Our purpose in life sets the pattern for every decision and action we make. By submitting her life to God's plan, she set the standard for the remainder of her life and actions. Notice all the times in Scripture that Mary is present simply because she followed God's will and committed herself to Him in service. She was present at the wedding in Cana of Galilee... she was often present throughout the Gospels... and at Calvary. Her actions show that she was committed to God's plan and that dictated the patterns of her life.

Many times, when faced with a conflicting decision, the patterns of our life are revealed. If our first thought is "What Will It Cost?", then money is the pattern, and money can be taken away. If we ask, "How Long Will It Take?", then time is the pattern, and it will always run out. If we ask, "How Will I Feel?" then pleasure is the pattern and will soon diminish. How often do we ask ourselves "What will others think?" When we allow that answer to control our decisions, then popularity is the determining factor, and the opinion of humanity is fleeting at best. What we should be asking are questions such as: "How will this affect my relationship with God?" ... "Will this bring honor and glory to the Lord Jesus Christ?" ... "Will humanity and those without Christ benefit from this decision?" Consider the pattern of Mary's life from the first time we learn of her in Scripture. She was young, single, and scared, yet she was obedient and faithful to God's will. Consider all that Mary had been through in her life as she watched Jesus grow from a baby into adulthood. She saw Him perform miracles. She watched firsthand as He healed the sick, fed the needy, and raised the dead. She watched Him be unjustly accused, condemned in a mock trial, and later receive the death sentence. She watched Him carry the cross where He was spat upon and crucified. She followed her son to the very end, but Luke tells us in Acts 1:14 that she followed Him farther than that. Mary knew and believed the words of our Savior and was faithful as she waited with the other followers for His promise to be fulfilled. Will we follow her example of commitment as we await His return?

# A Pastor's View

John 6:27 "Will Your Work Perish, or Last?" By Shawn Thomas Angleton, Texas

During the great economic crash of 1873, Theodore Roosevelt's father wrote to his wife that he felt especially sorry for a Mr. Clews, who had made business his whole life. He'd told Roosevelt not long before that he never even took a vacation. Now, Roosevelt told his wife, everything this man spent his whole life on, has been "swept away ... in a day."



Could this happen to you? It matters what you're working for. In John 6:27 Jesus tells the crowd: "Do not work for the food which perishes, but for the food which endures to eternal life." Jesus told the multitude: you can either spend your life working for things that will perish — OR for things that will last for eternity. And the same thing is true for us too.

In John 3:16 Jesus set before us the single most important question about anyone's life: will they perish, or will they have eternal life?

When President Eisenhower was on his deathbed, he called for Billy Graham to come and visit him. Eisenhower said to him, "Billy, tell me again how I can know that I have eternal life; nothing else matters now." On his deathbed, nothing else in life mattered to Dwight Eisenhower more than knowing for sure that he had eternal life.

But there's never anything more important than knowing that you have eternal life. How can you know? The Bible says God created us to experience eternal life with Him. But we all sinned against God, and our sins cause us to "perish," separated from God in hell. This is what John 3:16, is all about: "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only Begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish, but have eternal life." Jesus died on the cross, paying for our sins so that if we trust in Him, He will give us eternal life. THE most important question of your life is: have you put your faith in Jesus' death on the cross to forgive your sins, make you right with God, and give you eternal life?

Then the next question is: will the work you do in life perish or last? In I Corinthians 3:12-15, Paul wrote: "Now if any man builds on the foundation with gold, silver, precious stones, wood, hay, straw, each man's work will become evident; for the day will show it, because it is to be revealed with fire, and the fire itself will test the quality of each man's work. If any man's work which he has built upon it remains, he will receive a reward. If any man's work is burned up, he will suffer loss; but he himself will be saved - yet so as through fire."

If you are a Christian, then on the foundation of Christ you can either build with "gold, silver", etc. -- things that will last, OR with "wood, hay, and straw" -- things that will perish. Some Christians will be like a man who ran out of a burning house and lost everything. They themselves will be saved, "yet so as through fire." They won't have anything to show for their life; it was spent on things that wouldn't last.

A young person once lamented over how they'd worked all summer but had nothing left to show for it. They'd spent everything as they went along! But how much worse to spend your whole LIFE with nothing to show at the end of it! To avoid that, must consciously invest our lives in things that will matter for eternity.

How do you decide what to do with your life? Many ask: "How can I make the most money?", or "What will make me famous?" Instead, we should ask, "What can I do to glorify God, that will last for eternity?" Choose to invest your life in serving God and others.

Even in a "secular" career, you can still invest some of what you make in eternity. When you are paid for your job, you've basically traded those hours of your life for the money you received. So on what are you spending your money — for which have you traded your life? We must all spend some on what Jesus calls "food which perishes." But are you also investing at least some in "the food which endures" — in things that will bring you an eternal reward?

Years ago a Texan did very well in the oil business, and he gave a large sum of money to a Baptist ministry here. But not long afterward, he lost everything in an "oil bust." One of his friends said to him: "Now I bet you wished you didn't give all that to that ministry!" But he said "Not at all. If I hadn't, I would have lost all THAT, too. As it turns out, all I kept is what I gave away." That's true for us too. All we really "keep" is what we give away. If we really believe in heaven and eternal rewards, then we should be investing our income in eternity.

And how much of your time is spent on things which perish, versus things that endure? Most of us have to work, but what do you do with the time you have left? Don't just watch to and go to bed and get up the next day to do it all over again. Jesus encourages us here: don't waste your life by spending it all on "food which perishes." Instead, invest your time in things that will last: worshiping God, and reaching, teaching, and caring for people in Jesus' name. Are you doing some things like that personally, or through your church or a ministry? How much of your time are you investing in eternity? Get specific: what will you do THIS week, which will not be wasted, but will last for eternity?

I once visited a senior adult couple who told me about a woman they knew years ago. One day her home caught on fire, and she panicked, and began running around, trying to decide what to save. In her panic, she grabbed a huge block of ice she'd purchased for her ice box, and with a tremendous deal of effort, dragged it out to her front yard. It was the only thing she was able to bring out of her house before it burned to the ground. She stood there, watching her house burn, while all that she "saved," was a block of ice — which quickly melted away.

The thing is, that's a picture of what many are doing: spending their whole life on things that won't last but will just melt away into nothing, for all eternity. Jesus calls us to something better than that, to examine our lives, our habits, our money, and our commitments. And He says: "Do not work for the food which perishes, but for the food which endures to eternal life."

Maybe we've let our health go down and we choose to change our eating and exercise habits. Sometimes a car we've had for years keeps giving us trouble and costing us repairs all the time, so we choose to invest in a more dependable one. We can often choose to change where we live. These kinds of changes are the ones you and I have control over. We tend to like these kind because we are in charge. No one else or circumstances we come into is forcing us to have to change. We get to make the decision ourselves for what we feel may be our best interest, so we change!

Lastly, as a Christian, I believe there is the change that God initiates. There's a couple ways this may happen. First, God through the Holy Spirit may convict us there is something in our lives that needs to change, or He wants to change. This may happen through the conviction of the Holy Spirit. Let's say we read the Bible or hear a sermon preached that convicts us of a sin or habit that is displeasing to the Lord and detrimental tor our spiritual welfare. Obviously, this is where God is initiating a needed change that we should follow through on.

Next, under God initiated change, is that God is leading us in a different direction in life. This has nothing to do with something wrong or sinful, but He is pointing us in different direction in ministry or life in general. The situation we are in now is not bad, nothing is wrong, but God begins to deal with our heart that there is something else He has for us. The work we have been doing is coming to an end and as brother Toby Crowder preached in that message, "God is turning the page to another chapter for us."

Even in those questions, there is peace. How can one have peace with so much uncertainty? Well, because when there is change that God is calling us to make, we can rest assured it's for His glory and our blessing. This isn't the first time God has called us to a change and I'm almost certain it won't be the last! Pray for our family as we seek God's direction during this time of change. Change is hard, God is good!

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

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

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
