The Great Commission at Twenty-Three

"Then he said to his disciples, 'The Harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out the workers into his harvest field." - Matthew 9:37-38

App State: A few years ago, a young college sophomore concluded that he wanted to be a Christian preacher.

His name was Regin Larson, and he was at UNC-Charlotte.

"My sophomore year I re-dedicated my life to Jesus," Larson said. "That is when I really had a burden in my heart to preach the gospel. Like Paul, 'Woe to me if I do not preach the gospel.'

"I started hopping on my phone and printing out the Gospel on Instagram," Larson added.

His enthusiasm is still palpable.

Then he started making Gospel podcasts.

He was a Business Marketing major that turned into an evangelist.

"I grew up in a Christian home and attended a Christian school," Larson added. "So, I knew the apologetics."

Now Larson works for Ignite Campus Ministry, a Christian organization that's goal is to enter and plant churches on college campuses.

Or as Larson puts it. "To awaken a generation to the reality of the Gospel. I think college fields in America are white unto the harvest."

Now 23 years old, Larson is a full-time evangelist at Appalachian State [App State]. This is the first time he has been full-time in the ministry. He was a student leader for Ignite for three years and did an internship at his home church in Charlotte – Vision Church.

Larson grew up in Charlotte with two older brothers.

"Some of my friends from Ignite started a worship night at App State and needed a leader on Campus," he said. This is Ignite Ministry's first year on the App State campus.

On Sunday now they have 50 to 60 students in attendance and have Bible studies and prayer meetings during the week.


"In the first three weeks of this semester, we had 11 people saved!" Larson proclaimed. "We are celebrating what the Lord is doing. Every day... every week.

"We had 8 saved the first gathering, then one the next week and two the following!"

A brave feat to preach the gospel to college students at 23.

When asked if he is ever mocked, Larson said, "Well, obviously we have backlash and comments, but we are doing what the Lord has called us to do. The joy outweighs the hardship!"

Larson has an intern and a handful of volunteers on his staff and Ignite is



In addition to Sunday service, Bible studies, and prayer meetings, the App-State-Ignite staff also does evangelism on campus.

This too helps bring students in. Larson pointed out that they were in

their sixth week of the semester and had up to 60 students at their Sunday service.

For their on-campus evangelism, Larson said, "We go on campus with a white billboard with questions on it. What are the core longings of humanity? Who is Jesus? Where are you going when you die? [Etc..] Then conversations we have lead to the gospel and saving lives."

They do this 2-3 times a week. Their services are at the student union, so they are in the thick of student activity.

"On Sunday, we have fellowship, worship, and then preach the gospel," Larson said. "And then we ask people to surrender their hearts to Jesus."

Then Larson brings up Matthew 9:37. "The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few."

Later Jesus says to pray for workers to come. Those last few words had a profound effect on young Larson.

"Matthew 9:37-38 is an invitation to participate in the eternal mission of Heaven: To win souls and make disciples. It's in a place of prayer that our hearts start to get aligned with Jesus' heart, and we no longer pray for the Lord to send out laborers and we actually become an answer to the prayer. "And we say, like Isaiah, "Here I am Lord, send me!"

Larson then added, "We get to partner with God in His mission, in his Harvest. As the Lamb that was slain receives the reward of his suffering."

Larson and others in his generation are reaching out to others their age in a way the older generations cannot. No wonder revivals are popping up all over the US and the world.

"Jesus here am I, send me!" - Young Hearts around the World

The Holy Spirit is the very Spirit of God, fully divine, manifested in the life of every believer from the moment of salvation. He is equal with the Father and the Son as God. He is present in the world to make men aware of their need for Jesus Christ. He provides the Christian with power for living, understanding of spiritual truth, and guidance in doing what is right. The Christian seeks to live under His daily control.

The Bible


Eternity & Eternal Security

Our soul, the essence of our being, was created by God to exist forever. That forever is spent in one of two places: eternally present and in union with God because of His forgiveness and salvation or eternally separated from God because of sin and unbelief. At the moment that our physical body dies, those who are saved are immediately taken to heaven. Those who have rejected God's gift of salvation will spend eternity separated from God in hell. Because God gives man eternal life through Jesus Christ, the believer is secure in that salvation for eternity. Salvation is maintained by the grace and power of God, not by the self-effort of the Christian. It is the grace and eternal power of God that gives this security. Salvation

Salvation is God's gift of redemption and reconciliation to Himself and is offered freely to all who accept, by faith alone, Jesus Christ as God's only son and receive Him as Lord and Savior. We can never make up for our sin with self-improvement or good works. It is only by trusting in Jesus Christ as God's offer of forgiveness that you can be saved from sin's penalty. Eternal life begins the moment you receive Jesus Christ into your life by faith.

(Romans 5:1; 6:23; Ephesians 2:8-9; John 1:12; 14:6; Titus 3:5; Galatians 3:26)




Life Lessons

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

When Jesus Shows Up

"Jesus saith unto them, Come and dine. And none of the disciples durst ask him, Who art thou? knowing that it was the Lord." John 21:12

Many of us attend churches that come together weekly for worship, and we gather desirous of seeing God move and experience His presence in our lives. In John 16, Jesus had spoken to the disciples and promised them the coming of the Holy Spirit, but the Comforter would not come until



This record of Jesus' appearance has considerable encouragement for the weary in the heart. Much can be said about Jesus' timing... which is always perfect! He knew exactly when these discouraged disciples needed this miracle. We can also benefit from looking at those to whom He appeared on this day. Simon Peter was present; the one who had denied that he ever knew the Lord. You will also find Thomas there, the same one who had doubted the Lord and demanded proof of His bodily resurrection. Nathaniel was also present, the same one who asked in John 1:46 "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?" The Scripture here also records the presence of James & John, who had earlier caused a commotion by arguing over their seat in Jesus' kingdom. All these were present that day, along with two other disciples who remain unnamed. This may not sound to us like a prime list of suspects for Jesus to appear and speak to, but that is the beauty of this passage! This ragtag band of disciples who had, by all accounts, let Him down and failed Him... were the very ones to whom He spoke and chose to spend time. They were downcast, doubting, and discouraged, and at Peter's leading, they had turned back to life as usual, yet Jesus chose to abide with them and invite them to "come and dine" with Him (v. 12)

I encourage you to take a few moments and read the account of this story in John 21:1-14. In reading this, three simple thoughts stand out to me and encourage my heart. First, verse four tells us that Jesus stood on the shore. Notice that He was watching over them, just as a caring Father does. They may have thought that He was gone and felt far away from His presence, but He was there! We can rejoice in the fact that He knows our situation and what we are going through and so He knows when we need Him to "show up!" Secondly, v.5 tells us that He spoke to them. At this point, they had not recognized Him as Jesus yet, but He certainly knew them and called them "Children." It is striking to me that He still called them "children." Even after the denials, the arguing, the desertion, and their combined failures, He did not forsake nor abandon His children!

Lastly, notice that He invited them to come and fellowship with Him, and He fed them there. Jesus calls these tired, hungry, discouraged fishermen to come and dine with Him! Not only did He feed them there... but they enjoyed rest and fellowship with the Master around the fire. The Gospels teach us that Peter had warmed his hands with the enemy's fire while Jesus was being tried and questioned during his trial. How fitting that gathered around a fire kindled by the Lord God Himself, Peter and these other men would be allowed to fellowship with the Master and Peter would be allowed to declare His love for the One he had denied. I pray that we will respond to His still-standing invitation to "come and dine." Discouraged hearts will be warmed, fed, and encouraged when Jesus shows up!

about where we are going and what we are doing. Every one of us, if we are honest with ourselves, have sinful thoughts, if not actions. We have earthly desires and lusts that would be frowned upon by our Lord, at least I freely admit that I do! 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Foundation Forward

John Paul Jones

This article is an educational moment in American history about those who made a difference during the Revolutionary War era and how they served our country.

Ironically, a great American patriot was born in Kirkcudbrightshire, Scotland, on July 6, 1747, and educated at the

Kirkbean Parish School. John Paul would explore all parts of the ships at the local Port of Carsethorn. He and his friends would talk to the sailors about their adventures and imagine being at sea with them. Paul would bark out orders to his friends, pretending to be the ship's captain in battles.

At 12, John started his naval career as a cabin boy working for the Younger Shipping Company. His first voyage was on the Friendship, which allowed him to see his older brother in Virginia. Younger Shipping soon went bankrupt, and John worked aboard slave and cargo ships. By 19, Paul earned the first-mate rank from the knowledge and experiences he acquired.

In parts of the United Kingdom, Paul was known as a kidnapper and a pirate. In 1773, John Paul found himself in a problematic situation: while sailing in the West Indies, he killed a mutinous sailor. Even though John claimed self-defense, he knew that he would not be believed in an English court.

Disgusted with slavery and his current predicament, he hurried to America. John Paul added Jones to his last name, as an alias, to conceal his identity. John's seamanship and his new identity put him in a position to become a Revolutionary War hero and a gallant naval officer.

Arriving in Philadelphia, Jones joined the Navy and was commissioned as a first lieutenant on December 7, 1775. Mentored by Commodore Esek Hopkins, the first commander of the American Navy, Jones received his own ships and gained victories over and possessions from British frigates. In June 1776, Congress appointed Jones as the captain of the Ranger and introduced him to Benjamin Franklin. During the next two years, John captured and destroyed British vessels. These encounters earned him the command of the French-built ship, Duc de Dures, which he renamed Bonhomme Richard to honor Benjamin Franklin. On September 23, 1779, John Paul Jones led history's most famous naval battle. Aboard the Bonhomme Richard in the British Isles, Jones and a small flotilla blocked a British convey. During a several-hour barrage with the British ships Serapis and the Countness of Scarborough, the Bonhomme Richard started sinking. With the Bonhomme Richard burning, British Captain Richard Pearson commanded Jones to surrender. Jones replied, "Surrender!? I have just begun to fight!". At battle's end, Jones and his crews captured the British ships. The American flag was transferred to and hoisted on the Serapis with John Paul Jones in command, as the Bonhomme Richard sank. With the event at Yorktown and the Battle of Chesapeake bringing the Revolutionary War to an end, the Continental Navy was dissolved.

As an admiral, Jones served Empress Catherine the Great in the Russian Navy for a year after the war. His leadership and experiences had a significant role in capturing the Ottoman (Turkish) fortress at Ochakov and in the Black Sea campaign. After these battles, Jones then relocated to Paris in 1789.

"In June 1792, Jones was appointed U.S. Consul to treat with the Dey of Algiers." However, at age 45, on July 18, 1792, he died from a brain tumor and kidney problems before he could begin his diplomatic duties. All, including his adversaries, remembered Admiral Jones. He was buried in an untended cemetery for foreign-born Protestants in Paris and forgotten.

In 1905, Jones' body was relocated to the United States Naval Academy and laid in an ornate sarcophagus. Despite his troubled times in the U.K. and Russia, John Paul Jones was honored during his life with many accolades and awards, including the title of the Father of the United States Navy.

Love the Lord, Lose the Bitterness

Psalm 119:165 "Great peace have they which love thy law: and nothing shall offend them."

"She called me a cream puff." a student wailed from the other side of my classroom. Is that a bad thing? I wondered inwardly. A cream puff sounds pretty good right now. I

smothered my smile and turned to address the situation. While talking with the offended student I realized she needed the sweetness of love to dilute the bitter insult from her friend.

This comical classroom conundrum reminds me of a verse I read recently - Psalm 119:165 which says "Great peace have they which love thy law: and nothing shall offend them." Psalm 119 includes many synonyms for God's Word such as law, statutes, and commandments. When we love God's Word, we can exchange the bitter taste of offense for the sweetness of peace as we notice His love for us.

Offense often tastes like rejection from family and friends, poor customer service, or ignored relationships. As I contemplated Psalm 119:165 I wondered how the Bible defines the word offend.

Here's how I satisfied my spiritual appetite. Because the Bible is its own dictionary we can read all of the verses in the Bible containing a particular word to help us define it. I visited BibleGateway.com and searched for the word offend. Note: You could broaden your search to include other forms of the word such as offending, offender, or offense but for the purpose of this study I focused on the root word offend and the word offended. Twenty-three verses in the Bible use the word offend and twenty-four verses use the word offended. I skimmed them, noticing patterns as I read. Many verses mentioned relationships, breaking the law, and wronging others. And, of course, I noted the famous passages in the gospels teaching us to cut off something that offends us. (See Matthew 5:29-30, Matthew 18:8-9, Mark 9:43, 45 & 47.)

Through considering each letter in the word offend a definition formed in my mind: Offense comes through the open door of a relationship. It is formed by actions and words that engage the senses. How do we react? We say no to the things that bring us down. We cut them off.

Feast on the following verses to expand your spiritual palate. Allow God's Word to tantalize the taste buds of your understanding about the word offend as you dine on His Word.

O - Offense oozes through the open door of relationships.

When we form close connections with others we have more opportunities to be offended by them. Proverbs 18:19 tells how an offense can affect our relationship with our brother. It says, "A brother offended is harder to be won than a strong city: and their contentions are like the bars of a castle.'

FF - The two Fs in offend form a disarming duo of actions and words which can turn a sweet union into sour discord.

James 3:2 reminds us how our words and actions affect others. It says, "For in many things we offend all. If any man offend not in word, the same is a perfect man, and able also to bridle the whole body.'

E - Offense engages our senses by opening up a palate of emotions.

Matthew 24:10 says "And then shall many be offended, and shall betray one another, and shall hate one another." This verse highlights how a bite of acerbic offense leaves a bitter aftertaste of betrayal and hatred.

How do we sweeten the bitterness of offense? The last two letters of the word offend answer.

N - We say "no" to the offense.

Instead of focusing on the offense we concentrate on the Bible's big goal which is to share the feast of gospel peace with others. Mathew 11:5-6 seasons our meal with truth, "...the poor have the gospel preached to them. And blessed is he, whosoever shall not be offended in me."


D - We cut off the rottenness of offense which threatens to bring us down. Matthew 18:8 defines this process. It says, "Wherefore if thy hand or thy foot offend thee, cut them off, and cast them from thee: it is better for thee to enter into life halt or maimed, rather than having two hands or two feet to be cast into everlasting fire."

"I'm sorry for calling you a cream puff." offered the offender with a sweet smile. The offended student realized the love her friend showed was more important than remaining offended over the gooey insult. The next time the aftertaste of offense flavors your day, remember my "cream puff" labeled student and sweeten the bitterness of offense with the love of Jesus, the Living Word.

The Bloated Christian: Reimagining the Church Experience

Imagine if you will, sitting in the fellowship hall of your Church during a potluck lunch after service. Think about how loud the atmosphere is and how many different conversations are taking place at the same time. Your table might have eight people with four different

conversations going on and you're only able to catch a little bit of each due to the difficulty of hearing so many things at once.

In marketing, we use what we call the "rule of 7's" which states that a consumer must see a message at least 7 times before it makes an impact on them or they take action. Essentially, we utilize the same marketing messaging repeatedly so the prospect hears the same thing over and over again making it much easier for them to not just remember our messaging but also so it makes an impact on them.

You may be asking how does that relate to the Church? Many of us probably have a similar schedule to what is below:

- Sunday morning bible study
- Bible study on a singular topic
- Sunday morning worship
- The pastor is doing a 12-week study on the Beatitudes
- Sunday night bible study
- Here you're in a 12-week marriage study with your spouse
- Monday night discipleship training
- You're going through the entire New Testament in one year
- Wednesday night bible study
- You're going through a bible study on a different book of the Bible
- Thursday nightlife group
- This could be a 16-week Revelations study
- Throw in a Tuesday night men's coffee outing or dinner to discuss spiritual growth
 This type of schedule creates a culture of information overload where people can't effectively learn and retain the message because the message is constantly being diluted.

Robby Gallaty calls this "The Bloated Christian" and states that every time you learn something new that week, the original message retention is cut in half. With that said, if you take the weekly schedule above, you can only retain 1/64 of the information you consumed at the Sunday morning bible study because you attended seven different sessions over the week.

How do we move from the model of Church consumers to true disciples? What if we took a moment and reimagined the way we experience Church? What if each of those seven opportunities were built upon one another? The messaging we receive is valuable, life-altering, all-consuming. What if we treated it that way?

We should be setting ourselves up for success not failure. Only being able to retain 1/64 of what we learn each week is not a recipe for success, especially considering that we probably spent ten-plus hours in those seven different sessions.

I'm in no way, shape, or form saying that consuming too much of God's word is bad, I encourage everyone to be in his word daily, but we need to create a culture of understanding God's word, slowing down, taking time to digest what we have learned and apply it to life?

So, you might be saying, what does that look like? An optimal Church experience might look like something I have outlined below:

- Sunday morning bible study
- All groups do HEAR/SOAP journals and review them on the past week's sermon, pick 3-5 verses to do a HEAR/SOAP journal on and share with the group, groups to broken down by age
- Sunday morning worship
- Typical worship service with a 20–30-minute sermon
- Sunday night bible study
- Extended deep dive study into the worship topics from that morning, reiterate what was discussed but take a deeper dive into the content and context
- Tuesday night discipleship training
- A concentrated practice to transform into true disciples with a focus on Sunday's message
- Wednesday night
- NO bible study, local missions focus to help bring the word of Christ to your neighbors, create prayer cards, welcome baskets for new homeowners, community mission work and projects, discipleship in action, be the hands and feet of Jesus

There may come a time in the future when we can't gather together as frequently as we do now. We will have to know God's word inside and out, to hide the word in our hearts because Churches might be closed and Christians will have to gather underground due to persecution.

This makes it all the more important that we ensure the messaging is impactful and easily digestible. A message that is heard repeatedly over time and touches multiple senses is more likely to stay with you; you will hear God's word, and understand God's word, therefore you will live God's word.

In my personal life, I recently spent 500 hours obtaining my Firefighter certifications. Each class would focus on just one or two core topics and be broken down this way to ensure students are not overwhelmed with information overload while learning critical skills that are literally life and death. We would repeat the same drills over, and over, and over again, not until we got them right but until we couldn't get them wrong. The same concept needs to apply here, we need to repeatedly stay in God's word, the same word over the week so we hear it, understand it, and live it.

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A Word

Many years ago my family decided to travel to the Linville Falls picnic area for an evening of grilling out and hiking to the overlooks to see the falls. My boys loved going to places where they could run, jump, and explore the woods. The evening had been wet from a strong storm which had passed through that afternoon but was gradually clearing. We were able to grill our hot dogs and enjoy our



evening together despite rain dripping off of the trees. The weather cleared and we left the picnic area and traveled across the Blue Ridge Parkway to the visitors' center to park and began walking the trail to the overlooks.

There were only a couple of other vehicles in the parking lot. I guess the earlier rain had kept most people away that evening. There was a small group of people that walked passed us as we were getting ready to start across the bridge and continue out the trail. We had only been walking for a minute or two when we heard someone franticly calling out a name. Being parents, I and Michelle both knew by the way the woman was screaming out the name what was going on. A mother had been separated from her child and was searching desperately for him. We immediately turned back and started toward the voice and saw her running across the bridge toward us.

She told us that she thought the boy had gone to the restroom and had been waiting for him but he never came out. You can imagine what must have been going through her mind. There was a ten-year-old boy in the woods by himself close to a river and high cliffs all around, not to mention thinking that there could have been someone who took him. As a parent, I could tell by the look on her face with the tears flowing down her cheeks how distraught and helpless she felt. I asked the boy's name, age, and description of what he was wearing. I told her to go back where he was supposed to be and we would search along the trail. While we were searching, we could hear the mother's voice screaming and calling out in anguish the boy's name, hoping and praying for a response. I whispered a prayer, "Lord, please help us find this boy!"

We walked out the trail, keeping my boys close, and I began to call out the child's name. Thankfully, in just a few minutes, I saw a young boy peering around a bush beside the trail that matched the description the mother had given. Though I knew his name, he was a little reluctant to respond to a stranger's voice. I introduced myself and my family and told him his mom was searching for him. A look of relief came across his face. As we came across the top of a hill where I thought his mom could hear me, I cried out loudly, "We found him!" She immediately came running and the boy ran to his mom and what a wonderful reunion we witnessed. It was such a blessing to see them both together, with tears flowing down their faces, so relieved to be together. My wife was holding back tears and I was holding back from shouting! The boy had simply taken the wrong trail.

Through this experience, the Lord reminded me of a parable that He gave in the scriptures. In Luke 15:1-7, Jesus spoke of how if anyone had a hundred sheep and one was lost, that man would leave the 99 and search in the wilderness until he found the lost sheep. When he finds that lost sheep, he lays it on his shoulders, rejoicing. When he returns home, he even calls his neighbors together and says, "Rejoice with me; for I have found my sheep which was lost". Jesus teaches in verse 7, "I say unto you, that likewise joy shall be in heaven over one sinner that repenteth, more than over ninety and nine just persons, which need no repentance."

Friend, if you are lost without Jesus, if you are on the wrong trail in life, I want you to know that He is searching for you. Unlike that child who was reluctant to respond to a stranger's voice, when you hear Jesus calling, you will immediately recognize Him. My plea is that you will respond to Jesus, repent of your sins, place your faith in what He has done on the cross, and follow Him as a sheep follows a shepherd. He is waiting for you to answer Him back in faith so that there will be joy in heaven when that announcement is made, "Rejoice with me, for I have found my sheep which was lost!"



What Happens When We Sin?

One day I was speaking to a lady in our community about salvation. She believed that we are initially saved by grace through faith, but it was our job to maintain our salvation through good works. Therefore, if our good works outnumbered our bad works, we would be saved. However, if our bad works outnumbered our good works



Growing up I was taught that we could lose our salvation, so I had very little confidence or assurance of my salvation. I remember one day while I was at a youth conference, I was speaking with a young lady during one of the breaks. I mentioned in passing that I had probably been saved 100 times. She looked stunned and said, "You can't get saved 100 times. Either you're saved or you're not." I walked away thinking, that girl didn't know what she was talking about. But after much study, I believe that she did.

So, what happens when we sin?

1 John 3:9 says, "Whoever has been born of God does not sin, for His seed remains in him; and he cannot sin, because he has been born of God." And 1 John 5:18 (NAS) says, "We know that no one who is born of God sins; but He who was born of God keeps him and the evil one does not touch him." These verses make it sound like Christians can never sin again. However, we know from experience and from other verses that sometimes we do. For example, 1 John 2:1 says, "My little children, these things I write to you, so that you may not sin. And if anyone sins, we have an Advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous." So here we see two verses implying that Christians will never sin again and another saying that if we do sin, Jesus will speak to the Father in our defense. So how do we rectify the two as they seem to contradict one another? One way to rectify them is by adding the word "practice." A Christian doesn't practice sinning anymore. I think this is fair and accurate, but I also believe there is more in these verses.

Notice in the second half of 1 John 5:18, "but He who was born of God keeps him and the evil one does not touch him." This is referring to Jesus being born of God, and He keeps us. The word "keeps" means to attend to carefully, to take care of, and to guard. This says that Jesus carefully attends to us in such a way that He guards us and protects us so that the evil one cannot touch us. But we have all been touched in one way or another at some point by the evil one, so what does this mean?

2 Corinthians 1:21-22 says, "Now He who establishes us with you in Christ and has anointed us [is] God, 22 who also has sealed us and given us the Spirit in our hearts as a guarantee." Ephesians 1:13 says, "In Him you also trusted, after you heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation; in whom also, having believed, you were sealed with the Holy Spirit of promise." Notice you were sealed, past tense, when you believed.

Imagine that I had you over for dinner one evening and I offered you a nice big, juicy piece of steak. But then I told you I had previously dropped it in a mud puddle and before I had a chance to pick it up, my dog took it and ran off with it. I chased him all around the house and finally caught him in the driveway. The steak had gravel, hair, and dog salvia all over it, but I washed it off. Would you still want to eat this steak? I think most people would say no. Now if the same scenario happened but the steak was vacuum sealed in thick plastic most people would still eat it.

That is what happened to our born-again spirit. It has been vacuumed sealed by the Holy Spirit and sin cannot penetrate our spirit again. Jesus keeps us safe and the evil one cannot touch our spirit. When Adam sinned one time he died spiritually, and his nature changed. He now had a sinful nature and was totally contaminated and defiled. When we sin today, because we have been made righteous, because we are born again, with a divine nature, because we have been sealed by the promised Holy Spirit as God's purchased possession, the evil one cannot touch us. He cannot get to our perfected forever spirit. He cannot change our divine nature. Just like this meat or a bottle of jam that has been preserved until the day we want to eat it, so we have been preserved.

So, are we only sealed until the next time we sin? No! Ephesians 4:30 (KJV) says, "And grieve not the holy Spirit of God, whereby ye are sealed unto the day of redemption." Our spirit is sealed until the day of redemption, until the final day of judgment. That is why 1 John 4:17 says, "Love has been perfected among us in this: that we may have boldness in the day of judgment; because as He is, so are we in this world." We can have confidence, boldness, and assurance today of our salvation because our spirit has been sealed, protected from sins contamination, never to be touched by the evil one again. We are saved and Jesus keeps us safe in Him.

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


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A Man Named Jabez

We live in a society where many want to blame their bad behavior on the dysfunctional family they grew up in. One well known pastor says he is sick of hearing the term "dysfunctional family" as a way to explain away bad behavior. He also said he grew up in a dysfunctional family and is presently the leader of a dysfunctional family. I believe we would all have to admit that we come from families with varying degrees of dysfunction and



From the very beginning God wanted us to function according to His guidelines, but when sin entered the human race dysfunction also entered. Man has been trying to do things his way ever since the fall, leading to the problems we see in ourselves and others and will continue to see until He comes to deliver us from these bodies of death in which we presently dwell.

Books have been written; many sermons have been preached about the life changing power of the prayer of Jabez. We will look at the elements of the prayer later but right now I would like for us to look at the man the prayer was named after. As we think about this man it is intriguing to note that there is something we don't see in this story that makes what we do see so significant for us, i.e., no mention of a father.

Three chapters of genealogy, two verses about Jabez, and then the genealogy starts again. Nothing else is said about Jabez. Enough begats to drive most Bible students up the wall, but as usual, God has a purpose for what He does. With no mention of a father, it's almost like the two verses about Jabez are out of place. Nothing else is mentioned about Jabez in the entire Bible. As we study the lives of the great leaders from Adam through Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob we also see what would be called in today's vernacular "great dysfunction".

1st Chronicles 4:9-10

"And his mother called his name Jabez, saying, Because I bore him with sorrow." Jabez was no different than his ancestors in the fact that he was born into this dysfunctional line of humanity. His name means "to grieve; sorrowful." Could it be that he was raised by a single mother that faced the daunting task and all the frustrations of being both mother and father? The word "name" in the Hebrew means "a mark or memorial of individuality." How would you like it if every time your name was called you were reminded of grief and sorrow? How many of us heard our parents say "good grief" when we did something wrong. Some may have heard them say "I'm sorry you were ever born." It is quite possible that Jabez grew up with a lot of verbal abuse from his peers, maybe even from those closest to him.

"And Jabez was more honorable than his brothers."

Jabez could have blamed his parents for naming him with such a degrading name. He could have played the blame game for the rest of his life; however, it is apparent that he chose to turn from everything his name represented to choose the higher path God had in store for him. His name may have reminded him of grief and sorrow, but God's Word reminds us that he chose a more honorable path than his brothers.

"And Jabez called on the God of Israel"

"Israel" means "he will rule as God"; "to prevail: -have power; "strength." If Jabez was a student of history, he would realize that the God of all strength had always blessed and used mankind in His eternal plan in spite of all their weaknesses. Maybe God was teaching Jabez the principle taught in Joel 3:10 "Let the weak say, I am strong."

When we are faced with a difficult situation, we will either call on man with all his weaknesses or God in all His strength. Needless to say, when we call on man (or call up from our sub-conscience mind some wrong programming of our past) many times we will be disappointed with the advice we receive and the direction the advice will take us. But, calling on His Name changes everything, "For whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved" (Romans 10:13). God is eager to hear from us so that He might respond to us and save us out of any trouble we get ourselves into. The choice is always ours.

"Oh, that You would bless me indeed"

The words "bless" and "indeed" come from the same Hebrew word that means "to kneel; by implication to bless God (as an act of adoration)."

It seems like Jabez was declaring, "You, God of all strength, bless me, bless me." Maybe Jabez never had a daddy that ever blessed him, but He knew God was eager to do just that.

The Apostle Paul declares the same thing about the same God in Eph 3:20-21 "Now to Him who is able to do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think, according to the power that works in us, to Him be glory in the church by Christ Jesus throughout all ages, forever. Amen." In fact, the greatest blessing of all is to discover our true identity in Christ and the benefits we have as depicted in the three chapters preceding this declaration by Paul. We receive the power of God and the subsequent blessings of God the same way Jabez received them, i.e., by calling on the God of all strength.

"and enlarge my coasts"

"Enlarge" means to increase...abundance; be in authority.

"Coasts" means properly a cord (as twisted), that is, (by implication) a boundary; by extension the territory inclosed.

As joint heirs with Christ, God wants us to see ourselves as a people of His authority; the same authority that Jesus has, over the boundless territory He has given us, especially the territory of our minds.

Jabez was expressing in his prayer something that our Heavenly Father wants

every one of us to get down into the innermost recesses of our being, i.e., THINK GREATER, SPEAK GREATER, PRAY GREATER, EXPECT GREATER. After all, He has promised us to "make a way in the wilderness, rivers in the desert" (Isaiah 43:19) and as mind blowing as it is He has also promised that we would do greater works than Jesus did (John 14:12-14).

"and that your hand might be with me"

"hand" means a hand (the open one indicating power, means, direction). With the possibility of much dysfunction in his life it might be that Jabez never had anyone in his life to empower or direct him. But somehow, he knew to call on the One that could give him the power, the means, and direction he needed to fulfill his dream of being blessed despite any setbacks he had encountered.

"and that you would keep me from evil"

"keep" means "to do or make". Obviously, Jabez had come to the realization that his God could help him become who he wanted to be, but he realized also that he had some enemies that only his God could overcome for him. Those enemies were the devil and his sub-conscience mind that had probably been programmed with some very dysfunctional junk. In fact, one of the definitions for "evil" is "to make or be good for nothing." Do you think Jabez might have ever thought "I'm good for nothing"?

"that it may not grieve me"

"Grieve" means to carve, that is, fabricate or fashion; hence (in a bad sense) to worry, pain or anger. Many have allowed grief and pain to fashion them into angry adults that continually blame their dysfunctional family lives for their lack of success. They continually look at themselves as good for nothing. However, Jabez called on God to change all that. He knew from where his help comes and continued to call on his God to rescue him.

The apostle Paul knew this same God when he called on Him as recorded in the seventh chapter of Romans. Keep in mind that he was not a novice in the faith but a man that had walked with the Lord for years, had written a majority of the books in the New Testament, and one who had been through hell on earth for what he believed. He declared "For the good that I would I do not: but the evil which I would not, that I do" (sounds like the great apostle Paul had a problem with dysfunctional thinking). Also, he found himself declaring, "Oh wretched man that I am". But the last verse is the most significant as Jabez would attest to, "I thank God through Jesus Christ our Lord." The apostle Paul was still struggling with the old programming of his flesh that reduced him to thinking of himself as a wretched man (a man of great dysfunction, if you will), but he was still recognizing and calling on the God of Israel as his source of deliverance. Two thousand years later we still have the same struggles but most importantly, we have the same source of deliverance. He, Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, and today, and forever (Hebrews 13:8).

"And God granted him that which he requested"

"Granted" means "to go or come." Our God is a God of action, especially when His children cry out to Him. He empowers us "to go" and "comes" to us when the challenges of going get tough.

All this talk about dysfunction in Jabez' life is speculation on my part. It could have been true about Jabez, or I might be totally off base. But, let me share with you a story about a young man named "Jackie."

He grew up in a family of great dysfunction. Jackie's father never knew his father and never had a Godly influence that taught him how to love. Jackie's father died when he was twenty-two years old. He never heard his daddy say, "I love you son" or "I'm proud of you". In fact, he never heard much of anything from him unless he messed up.

Because of his feminine sounding name, he suffered a lot of verbal abuse from his male peers, but worse than that was the intense sense of worthlessness he carried within himself. He never felt worthy enough to be loved or accepted by anyone.

He fought back by developing some very destructive habits "just to prove what a man he was." He walked in those ways for many years until God and His Church intervened by sharing the good news that Jesus loved him and wanted to save and deliver him from who he was.

Then he called on the God of Israel and everything changed. Some things changed immediately, others took some time, some things he is still working on. That's been almost fifty years ago, and Jackie has realized many of the blessings of God, especially the blessing of realizing how unconditionally loved and accepted he is by His Heavenly Father.

Unfortunately he finds himself declaring the same thing brother Paul declares in the seventh chapter of Romans, i.e. "the evil I would not do I find myself doing" and is even reduced to feeling like a "wretched man" from time to time, but he also continues to call on the only One, his only Source of deliverance, Jesus Christ his Savior.

P.S. I shared with you in a previous story how Satan used this sense of worth-lessness to almost destroy me and how God and His Body intervened to save me from the destructive programming of this flesh. My prayer for you is that you will turn from believing Satan's lies if he has you entrapped in this "worthlessness" prison and call on the One that loves you just the way you are and loves you too much to leave you the way you are. You are of great worth to Him!

God's Word reminds us of three very important facts about Jabez' and Jackie's God that we find applicable for our lives today:

Jabez chose a higher path, the path God wanted for him; He called on the God of Israel; God listened and responded to him.



Thanks for the Solitude

Inside the ancient farmhouse, the family had gathered. Some were familiar faces, while others, having traveled from distant locations, were new. All were part of that annual joyous occasion of gathering together to give thanks. From the outside, the warm glow emanating from the windows conveyed the soothing sound of voices that drifted upon the aroma of turkey baking in the oven. Yet, the happiness was



too much. The lad had to escape for some crisp fall air. He wasn't used to that many bodies being under one roof at a time. His world, the place most often he found himself, was alone with the Creator and his creation. So, for a short time, to give himself a moment to repose, he escaped to that familiar place far from the others.

Before him, a seemingly endless field of tall golden grasses swayed in the late autumn breeze. Waves of lightness washed across the expanse as if a mighty hand was pushing the blades aside, living pulsating, the breath of life unseen. The heads of seed atop each stalk were like tiny tufts of an abundant sacrament that tickled beneath his open palms. Walking along, arms slightly outstretched, he appreciated the feeling of God's creation on his skin. Alone in the world, yet not alone, he welcomed the quiet even though his world had yet to become consumed by the rush of humanity. The gray clouds of winter weren't far away. Later in life, he would return to this place, if only in his mind, to reconnect to that feeling of appointed isolation. There would always be a welcome Spirit within his soul that embraced solitude – loneliness became his friend only because he felt deep within, through the pain of longing to be with others, that there was one there with him no matter the depths of despair, no matter the pain of illness, nor through the darkest anguish of hurt that the world could inflict – he was never truly alone.

There was no early teaching about how to seek that being that hid with him beneath the shroud of darkness - no direction on how to adequately ask of Him that offered the peace of understanding and love. He did not comprehend what it was to pray. It was only through those multitudes of experiential torments that he came to learn that there was something there that he could not see, something beyond the end of the hospital bed that stood watch, healing and comforting the small heart within the chest of the tiny form that would speak to him, and he to it. Somehow, without evidence of direction, as if the clouds overhead could guide one along their way, he was led on a journey that would eventually bring him closer to the One.

"He hath shewed thee, O man, what is good; and what doth the Lord require of thee, but to do justly, and to love mercy, and to walk humbly with thy God?" Isolation – a two-edged sword; chosen of our own accord, it can be a time to pray and reflect, something quite rewarding; imposed, it can be an eternal hell, a pain so deep that our entire being longs for the companionship of another soul – anyone, anything. Christ's separation from the Father on the cross became his hell on earth. For those few hours of his earthly presence, Jesus faced the ultimate anguish – being removed from the presence of God.

Throughout our lives, we chase after the longing to be part of a community. In that pursuit, our fear of becoming isolated, we often find ourselves in unintended, uncomfortable, or irrational relationships. Those consequences of interaction push us to do things that usually feel wrong or unnatural to our moral compass. Those interactions create indifferences within our spirit that displace God's will, revealing our true nature and creating in us a false sense of being. When we finally separate ourselves from these unhealthy situations, whether purposefully or by irrevocable actions, we find ourselves standing alone, put aside. Misunderstanding the result of the need to separate from that which causes discomfort, we again pang for the longing to be with others, someone, anyone who will truly understand us for who we are and not for what we should become. For some, this cycle of longing, misguided relationships, and expulsion from said associations can never end. College campuses are full of students searching for identity, seeking community, often turning away from their church upbringing to 'find' themselves. What they don't see is that the background they spurn came from a divine covenant, which, left in the hands of humanity, became twisted and impure. Fleeing what they call 'church trauma,' they feel justified in their search for anything that provides a sense of belonging regardless of how unholy or sinful it appears – oftentimes, the more so, the better. Ultimately, they are left abandoned because what they seek cannot be found in manufactured realities.

Then, what to me is probably the worst loneliness becomes abandonment. If you've ever visited a Nursing Care Facility, you will be familiar with that term. There, often tossed aside like the dinner dishes, the elderly are left to die alone. Families unable to care for their loved ones put them there, assured that they will be cared for and properly medicated. Those residents, most suffering terminal illnesses, spend their days trapped in a body that can no longer function, which, in a sense, becomes their final earthly imprisonment. Some, having spent their lives without purpose, face a bleak and weary end. But for those who knew Christ, their last days are one of continual worship, unafraid of the next chapter in their lives. Seeking finality, if their minds allow, they pray for the end to come – their seclusion becomes a willing imposition refining their relationship with God.

As many of you will remember, during the bleak times of Covid, the forced solitary confinement we found ourselves in for some created a nightmare scenario. The rates of suicide skyrocketed as we say many were unable to face the torture that being alone created. In their self-identity, whether it was from society or their life's ambitions, all were mere shells of individuality. They had nothing beyond that noble cause they called career.

Some find a way to eventually escape this tortuous treadmill. C.S. Lewis put it this way, "And even where the planners fail and someone is left physically by himself,

the wire-less has seen to it that he will be—in a sense not intended by Scipio—never less alone than when alone. We live, in fact, in a world starved for solitude, silence, and privacy, and therefore starved for meditation and true friendship." As Cicero attributed to Cato, who is often cited as saying, "never is a man more active than when he does nothing, never is he less alone than when he is by himself' (Numquam se plus agere quam nihil cum ageret, numquam minus solum esse quam cum solus esset).

When our isolation is an option we choose, the circumstances change drastically. What was once a painful experience becomes a time to grow and an opportunity to find that still-small voice. Jesus often stole away to be alone with his Father, taking a break from the crowds and those ever-questioning disciples.

"And when he had sent the multitudes away, he went up into a mountain apart to pray: and when the evening was come, he was there alone."

Finding that with God, we are never alone and that all along, even when we realized it least, He was there with us, guiding, directing, and comforting us without our recognition of him or our appreciation for him, we escape this cycle of anguish. But as is often the case, we can only find the way out by first putting ourselves into solitary confinement, so to speak – finding a place where we can be alone with God, lifting our voices to honor and Glorify His Holy name. He became flesh so that we might have a personal relationship with him, not impersonal, but very much becoming someone to whom we could go in times of struggle. It was a revolutionary approach, as John described in his gospel, how the Word, Logos, became flesh and dwelt, Tabernacled, among us. No longer was it the High Priest alone who could enter into the Holiest of Holies, but by the blood of Christ, we were afforded the ability to have a mighty Counselor at the right hand of the Father, who grants us access to the Father, by prayer and supplication. We are given the ability to have a personal relationship with God, a concept unlike any other religion in the world. In this connection, we are never separated unless it is by our choice, not His.


Eventually, the little boy found his way back into the hospitable abode. Most hadn't noticed his absence, but the keen eye of the grandmother realized he had gone, spying him through the draped window shortly after he departed. In her grandmotherly sense, she knew that he needed a moment alone. Upon his return, as he meekly snuck in the back door, her heart was blessed to see him return. As he came near, she warmly pulled him in and brought him close, thankful that God had placed this tiny being in her life.

The boy, embraced by the love of his grandma, was once more reminded that he was not alone.

In his heart, he sighed the words he always thought but never said out loud, "Thanks be to God."

May you find peace and solitude, if you choose, this Thanksgiving, and remember, you are never truly alone. Pray for those who are alone. If possible, welcome them into your home, or make an extra plate and share the season's abundance with those in less fortunate situations. And as always, let us say together as one, "Thanks be to God."

In minutes, I was called to go in, and one of the dentist's assistants took me to the room to prepare me for the process. There was a long process, and she did everything but throw me over the moon.

Finally, she finished her work, and the dentist came in. I had three teeth that needed to be worked on. The first thing he did was to give some numbing shots in my mouth, and everything went numb. Then, he was ready to do the work.

I sat in that chair for maybe an hour with my mouth open and the dentist on one side of me poking in and his assistant on the other side doing what she was supposed to do, and it was a long process. The dentist talked to me, but I was in such a position that I couldn't answer back.

His assistant on my left side was doing an excellent job, at least I think so, but my mouth was so numb I wouldn't have known otherwise.

Finally, the process was over, and the assistant, a very nice young lady, asked me, "How do you feel now?"

I didn't have to think, but I responded immediately, "I feel like a woman."

The assistant looked at me with wonder and said, "What?"

"I feel like a woman because my mouth has been open for such a long time." It took a while for her to get it, and she did not think it qualified for laughter. I tried to laugh, but my mouth was so numb I could hardly talk.

Later that day, I was reminded of what the Bible says. "A merry heart doeth good like a medicine: but a broken spirit drieth the bones" (Proverbs 17:22).

Much of our problems can be dealt with through a merry heart. We look for artificial medicine that does not get to the heart of our problems.

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

The Resurrection Remodel

In a recent trip to Barnes and Noble bookstore, I was reminded how large the "mystery" section of bookstores normally is. Several bookcases with five shelves per case were packed with eye-catching art and edgy titles designed to elicit wonder and draw me into the content.

While our culture is intrigued with the "mystery" genre of books, the Bible contains mystery as well.

Mystery is defined as "a religious truth that one can know only by revelation and cannot fully understand."

Two parts of that definition relate to the passage I'm about to share with you from 1 Corinthians. First, religious truth is only revealed by God. The Bible is God's inspired Word to us. It reveals God's character, the truth about our world, and principles for Christian living. Second, we cannot fully understand it. Some parts of Scripture and doctrine are not as clear as we would hope.

The apostle Paul describes some of the "mystery" of the end times when describing the rapture and resurrection in 1 Corinthians 15:51-52:

"Behold, I tell you a mystery; we will not all sleep, but we will all be changed, in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trumpet; for the trumpet will sound, and the dead will be raised imperishable and we will be changed."

The mystery that Paul is describing is the resurrection of believers when Jesus Christ returns to the earth. What Paul was telling the believers in Corinth was that when Christ returns all the dead believers will have resurrected bodies.

But what about the believers alive when Christ returns? Those alive when Christ returns will be transformed and changed. This is called the rapture. Our new body at the resurrection and rapture will be unlike the one we have now. It will be "a Spiritual Body partaking of the nature of God's own Heavenly Glory."

When Christ returns we will be raptured (if still alive) or resurrected (if dead) and taken away to spend eternity with God. We should look forward to the rapture and resurrection with hope and positive anticipation. Our physical pain will go away. Our emotional strain will disappear. And our spiritual sufferings will be gone!

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

Personal Quiet Time A Time To Still Your Heart To Hear From God

with God. Your beliefs, motivations, and principles should not all remain unchanged when you still your heart and listen to God speaking to you. One should undergo internal change over time. This is a change that should be apparent to people you interact with in your daily life. God's original creation intent: It was where He walked and talked with Adam and Eve regularly.

With a journal, Bible, and reference books in hand, settle down and take time to place yourself in a space that is conducive to encountering an experience with God. Prayer – a devotion to a relationship, encounter, and conversation with God – prayer is the root of all we do. Directionless lives are given meaning in a relationship with God! This relationship is grown by establishing and developing a personal devotional life. Just as Adam and Eve walked with God in the coolness of each day, you can grow a relationship with Him through the practice of quiet time specifically to tune into God through prayer, reading of God's Holy Word, and reflection. This is a time not only for you to speak to God but also to ask God to speak to you. Quiet times are about encountering God. To meet with Him intentionally is the key. In the beginning, God began with a regular intentional encounter in a specific place at a specific time. Humanity's original space for an encounter with God began in a garden.

Imagine Adam and Eve in the garden in the cool of the evening stopping, waiting, and listening for God, stilling themselves getting ready to walk and talk with Him. This is what the original quiet time, as God had planned looked like. God created us to interact with Him and to have an intimate relationship with Him. God desires that we walk with Him daily, enjoying the rich fellowship that He offers.

In Genesis 3:8 – Two humans trying to hide themselves of their sin from an all-seeing, all-knowing God. How could they think they could actually hide from God? But yet we do the same thing when we try to hide from God the things we have done. Correctly we are to share all we do and think with God and not try to hide. To hide from God – It can't be done. These verses in 8 and 9 show God's desire for our fellowship. Sin had broken Adam and Eve's fellowship with an all-loving God. God longs to be with us. He actively offers His unconditional love. When we sin, our natural response is fear because we can't live up to His standards. But if we recognize His love for us, regardless of our brokenness, it will help remove that fear so we can draw close and have the right relationship with God our Father.

The power of the Bible is a guide for our feet in our daily walk with God: and a light on our path as we journey through life. "Thy Word is a lamp unto my feet, and a light unto my path" (Psalm 119:105). For an effective quiet time, the Bible is an essential tool to commune with God. The Bible must be approached with prayer, and you must approach prayer with the Bible. The order doesn't matter, but your Bible should always be at hand when you pray. We need to allow what we read in the Bible to challenge, inspire, and shape us and the way we live our lives. As we meditate on the Scriptures we read we are to take a stand in respect for what God has given to us written within the pages of the Bible. We are to meditate on the Scripture day and night. You can learn how to follow God by meditating on His Word. Meditating means spending time reading and thinking about what you have read: asking yourself how you should change so you are living in God's Will. Knowing and meditating on God's Holy Word are the first steps toward applying God's instructions to your everyday life. The more you delight in God's presence, the more fruitful you will be. God provides whatever you need when you live in submission to Him. God moves out ahead of us, preparing our way, and bringing us into good and pleasant places. He does not promise a lack of trials but does promise eventual victory. We will be perfectly secure because He is our eternal shelter. To achieve anything worthwhile, we must have God's Word in our hearts. (Reference Psalm Chapter One). Stop to meditate and absorb the full flavor of what you are reading. Biblical meditation is not an emptying of one's mind, but a filling of one's mind and thoughts with the Word of God.

Committing verses from the Bible to our memory is to hide God's Word in our hearts. It takes the Word of Scripture from the page into our souls, from our head to the heart. Bible verses that you have memorized will sustain and strengthen us throughout life. "Thy Word have I hid in mine heart, that I might not sin against thee" (Psalm 119:11).



I run a small business with about a dozen employees. I became a Christian about two years ago and I want to run my business according to Christian principles but I'm not sure exactly what that means. Any suggestions?

A:

I'm grateful for your concern, and I wish more Christians who are in business shared it. When Jesus

Christ comes into our lives He wants to influence everything we do — including our jobs or business.

Certainly, one principle the Bible gives us is to do everything with honesty and integrity, both in our business and in our personal lives. "Use honest scales and honest weights," the Old Testament law declared (Leviticus 19:36). Don't cheat or take shortcuts in your business; keep your promises; be truthful in all you do. Not only will it help your business in the long run, but it will bring honor to Christ. The Bible says, "The Lord detests lying lips, but he delights in men who are truthful" (Proverbs 12:22).

In addition, treat your employees the same way you would want to be treated. The Bible says, "Masters, provide your slaves with what is right and fair, because you know that you also have a Master in heaven" (Colossians 4:1). 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



Billboard Theology - Not So Simple - John 3:16

"For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life", John 3:16.

Does this verse enable everyone to love the world, if they believe in Jesus?

John 3:16 is extensively used to promote a false narra-

tive that God loves all men and the world. His Son, Jesus Christ, died on the cross and took upon himself forgiveness of all the world's sins. All of mankind now has to make a simple decision. Believe in Christ, accept his gift of eternal life, or refuse to believe and suffer eternal death.

Jesus prays Not for the World. If God loved the world, is it not valid for believers to love the world?

Again, the Lord Jesus commands, 1 John 2:15-17. "Love not the world, neither the things that are in the world. If any man love the world, the love of the Father is not in him. For all that is in the world, the lust of the flesh, and the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life, is not of the father, but is of the world. And the world passeth away, and the lust thereof; but he that doeth the will of God abideth for ever".

Praying to His Father in heaven, the disciples hear the Lord Jesus as He prays in John 17:8,9. "For I have given unto them the words which thou gavest me; and they have received them, and have known surely that I came out from thee, and they have believed that thou didst send me. I pray for them: I pray not for the world, but for them which thou hast given me; for they are thine".

John 17:9, Jesus prays for "them which thou [the Father] hast given me". The elect (them) are chosen out of the world by the Father. The chosen are hated by the world. John 15:18,19, "If the world hate you, ye know that it hated me before it hated you. If ye were of the world, the world would love his own: but because ye are not of the world, but I have chosen you out of the world, therefore the world hateth you." Luke 21:17, "And ye shall be hated of all men for my name's sake."

"For God "So" (Strongs, # G3778/G3779 "So") in this manner, thus) Loved the world", [in this manner], that he gave his only begotten son for the world God loved. God's gift of giving his only begotten. Son is the manner by which God shows His love for the world. God loves only those who have been redeemed by the blood, (death) of Christ. The Scriptures clearly show God does not love all men. "The World" as defined by various scripture contexts includes the whole human race. Those of all the unsaved who have ever lived in the world, and all the elect, those chosen by God who have ever lived in the world. Parallel verses of the world, John. 1:29, 3:17, 4:42, 12:47.

Psalm 11:5, "The LORD trieth the righteous: but the wicked and him that loveth violence his soul hateth". Two types of mankind in the world. Those tried and righteous; Strongs # H974 trieth, "to examine and prove the heart of man". Strongs # H6662 righteous, "justified and vindicated by God" Psalm 26:2, "Examine me, O LORD, and prove me; try my reins and my heart". Psalm 11:5, "the wicked and him that loveth violence his soul hateth".

The elect of God is saved by His grace, which requires no action on the part of mankind whatsoever. Strongs # G5485 Grace, loving-kindness, favor by which God exerts his holy influence upon souls, turns them to Jesus Christ. Spiritual discernment by the Holy Spirit must be given to understand the spiritual nature of God's Word. John 6:44, "no man can come to me, except the Father which hath sent me draw him: and I will raise him up at the last day." To Draw (G1670 to drag by the inward power of God Almighty).

Only the Work of God can give the ability for an individual to "believeth in Him", (Christ). John 6:29, "and Jesus answered and said unto them, this is the work of God, that ye believe on him whom he hath sent". To believe and accept are verbs that require a work of action to produce a desired effect or result. Believing is "not of yourselves", we must be chosen by God to believe his gift of grace.

The statement of believing, without recognizing an individual must be chosen of God to "believeth in Him" John 3:16, fits perfectly with Romans 11:6. "And if by grace, then is it no more works: otherwise grace is no more grace. But if it be works, then is it no more grace: otherwise work is no more work".

The Scripture declares the following; John 15:16, ye have "not chosen me, but I have chosen you"; 1 John 4:19, we love him, because "he loved us first". Mathew 22:14, "for many are called but few are chosen". John 3:27 "A man can receive nothing, except it be given him from heaven".

Two worlds are in view in the scriptures. The world God loves includes His chosen elect, who are "chosen out of the world to believe in Him". The world God hates, are those who love the world. "Any man loves the world; the love of the father is not in him".

The prophecy of scriptures was written and recorded exactly as God intended them to be. 2 Peter, 1:21 "not in old time by the will of men, holy men of God spake as they were moved by the Holy Ghost". Understanding the (hermeneutics) of scripture study demands the following discipline 1 Corinthians 2:13, "comparing spiritual with spiritual, [that's comparing scripture with scripture] which the Holy Ghost teacheth". 2 Timothy 3:16, "All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness".

Billboard Theology, displays a single scripture verse (John 3:16) to show God's love for the world and all men; that's a half-truth, which is a whole lie. Billboard Theology - Perhaps John 5:39?

JOHN 5:39

"Search the scriptures; for in them ye think ye have eternal life: and they are they which testify of me"

The Waldensian Trail of Faith

Burke County

VALDESE — The Waldensian Trail of Faith in Valdese will light up again this year in shining holiday splendor.

The annual "Lighting of the Trail" ceremony will take place at 6 p.m. Tuesday, Nov. 21, 2023, at the Waldensian Trail of Faith located at 401 Church St. NW, Valdese.

The Trail of Lights features more than 100,000 LED bulbs fashioned into favorite Christmas scenes displayed throughout the outdoor museum. All of the scenes relate to the history of the Waldensian people, but the most important thing is that the displays are focused on Jesus, according to former NC Sen. Jim Jacumin, Trail of Faith founder and president.

Founded in 1993, the Trail of Faith portrays the history of the Waldensians dating back to the time of the biblical apostles, according to the museum's website, waldensiantrailoffaith.org. The Waldensians were a pre-Reformation religious group who translated scripture into their own language. They were excommunicated in the 12th century by the pope and moved to the Cottian Alps between France and Italy, where they resided for many years and were under fierce persecution. A group of Waldensians immigrated to America and founded the town of Valdese in 1893

The Trail of Faith property features 15 buildings and monuments that detail the history of each phase in the Waldensians' journey. The museum tour brings to life the struggles they faced, pays tribute to their sacrifices, and celebrates their successes and triumphs.

"The Waldensians were considered to be people who lived by Scripture and were tortured, exiled, and martyred, and still the faith that drove them from the Alpine Valleys of Italy to the foothills of North Carolina survived," said Sheryl Tron, office manager at the Trail of Faith.

Volunteers at the Trail of Faith, also known as "trail friends," begin testing the lights and setting up the Christmas scenes a month in advance to prepare for the lighting ceremony and nightly viewing. Tron said the event relies entirely on volunteers, and the ceremony would not be possible without their help.

The lighting ceremony on Nov. 21 will feature holiday music performances by students from the Morganton Day School in Morganton, led by teacher Amethyst Stark, and Marty Jacumin reading the biblical Christmas story.

"It's important for us to share the Christmas story with the kids because the kids are what this event is really about," Jim Jacumin said. "Children play an important role in Christmas, and it is important for us to pass on what we know."

As in years past, three students will be chosen to turn on the lights at the end of the ceremony, marking the traditional lighting of the trail.

Guests at the lighting ceremony and nightly viewing are encouraged to stop by the visitor's center to enjoy hot chocolate, hot apple cider, and other refreshments.

The Trail of Lights will be open 6-9 pm daily from the November lighting ceremony through Dec. 24. The visitor's center will be closed Thanksgiving, Christmas Eve, and Christmas Day for concessions. There will be no lights on Christmas Day, but the lights will be on during Thanksgiving and Christmas Eve. The Christmas display attracts a steady flow of traffic through the museum, generally averaging 40 to 50 vehicles a night to enjoy the lights display, Jacumin said. "We love having families bring their children, walk the trail, and enjoy the Christmas carols and the hot drinks," he said. "We have visitors that come all the way from Charlotte for our lighting ceremony and to see the Trail of Lights. Each year, we have between 7,000 and 8,000 visitors. The whole event really reminds us what Christmas is about, and that is giving to others. It enriches the building blocks of society, and it's a joy to be able to give back — and that's a big part of community."

The Trail of Faith Inc. is a 501©(3) nonprofit group funded by donations from guests. There is no admission fee to the Christmas lights display, but the Trail of Faith will accept donations to help fund December's utility bill.

He has made 98 studio albums and 14 live albums while collaborating on a couple dozen more. He is 90 years old and has led a life of highs and lows. Something that he said about his life has stuck with me. Nelson said, "When I started counting my blessings, my whole life turned around."



The practice of "counting your blessings" is backed up by the scriptures. In Psalm 18: 1 we read, "O give thanks to the Lord, for He is good! For His mercy endures forever."

And the practice of counting your blessings is backed up by science, which makes sense since it is God who is in charge of science. Counting your blessings can help you improve your well-being, performance, sleep, relationships, blood pressure, and stress levels. When we count our blessings, we take time to appreciate the good that we have experienced, are experiencing now, and will experience in the future.

Unfortunately, scientists tell us that we seem to have a "negativity bias" that causes our brains to prioritize, seek out, and lock on to negative information in the world like a heat-seeking missile. I've noticed that negative emotions seem to hang around longer than positive emotions. At times when I get home at the end of the day, I'm more likely to mull over the one negative comment someone made about my work and ignore the many positive comments I received from others. Why do our brains do that? I suspect that negativity bias is helpful in many ways, but the key to maintaining good mental health is to find balance. So, what can we do? Make it a regular practice to count your blessings.

One way we can fight negativity bias is to work each day to find good in people, places, and life events. When I think back, I can see that many of the biggest blessings in life come through little moments. It's easy to let those little moments pass by in a blur if you don't count your blessings.

One thing I try to avoid is taking things for granted. Maybe it's the time you get to spend with your kids, spouse, or friends. Perhaps it's your health or good weather. Maybe it's the technology that you have that allows you to connect with others far away.

My wife and I live in a two-story home that has a separate heat and air system for each floor. The unit for downstairs went out last week and we will need to pay to have it replaced. I would consider this a very negative event. But my wife and I looked at the temperatures on the 10-day forecast for our hometown and saw that we are going to be in a warm trend for the end of October. Praise God that we would have probably not even needed much heat with the temperatures each day reaching into the 70s!

I want to make gratitude a priority in my life. I have seen how practicing gratitude enhances my spiritual fitness, mental health, and performance. I think the psalmist was on to something. "O give thanks to the Lord, for He is good! For His mercy endures forever." So, go ahead and count your blessings! Like Willie Nelson, you may see that counting your blessings can turn your life around.



I'll keep it brief, but here are a few stats for you! 2022: We served 39 womes

I'll keep it brief, but here are a few stats for you! 2022: We served 39 women and 8 men and had 190 total visits to the center. 2023: We've served 82 women and 22 men and have had 386 total visits to the center. We knew we had been busy, but these numbers show just how quickly things are growing! Bigger numbers don't necessarily mean better, but every single person; every single visit represents an opportunity to share the love of Jesus and strengthen families.

The bulk of our visits have been for physical resources such as diapers and strollers, parenting classes, and ultrasounds. Being pro-life doesn't end when a woman gives birth, it's only the beginning, and we are committed to walking with women and their families for however long it takes!

We are not seeing many abortion-minded clients reach out for help though. Roe v Wade being overturned is nothing short of a miracle. The decision was given to individual states, and NC recently dropped from a 20-week to 12-week abortion ban. While it's a step in the right direction, we know women are still having abortions, and we are not seeing many come through our doors right now. Chemical abortion is on the rise, and women are having abortions earlier than ever. Before COVID, chemical abortions were being utilized, but during COVID-19, chemical abortions accounted for as much as 50% of abortions performed. Now in 2023, they are accounting for around 70%. This means less time for women to carefully consider their options and less time for us to reach them. We are diligently seeking God for wisdom about new ways to let them know we are here to help and would appreciate it if you prayed about this as well!

As 2023 starts to wind down, we continue to serve more women and families. Each one has a unique story and a variety of needs. Statistics may be boring, but the people they represent definitely aren't!

Thanksgiving

We so often hear folks complain about how quickly Christmas merchandise begins to appear on the shelves of our stores. Almost, it seems, as soon as we've celebrated July 4th advertising for Halloween (and soon afterward Christmas) begins to appear. Lost between the two, Thanksgiving Day has become a time for economists to measure the national economic health.

From Macy's Thanksgiving Parade (which had its inauguration back in 1924) to today's Black Friday and Cyber Monday shopping, whether in person or online, is watched closely. And, let's not forget the plethora of football games (around which the timing of the Thanksgiving Dinner must be planned).

That small company of men, women, and children, who landed at Plymouth Rock and laid the foundations of a new nation, those survivors of the Mayflower who were summoned together on that day in 1622 to come together and praise God for their first harvest - the first tangible sign that their pilgrimage had divine approval and that "God was not ashamed to be called their God" established for us a time set apart to take a "time out" and be thankful for God's faithful watchcare over our lives.

Of course, we know that, over time, this idea disappeared from our national life for a long time and it took the ravages of the Civil War and Abraham Lincoln to bring a day of Thanksgiving back into our national focus.

America, as any community, requires traditions and celebrations to bind it together and our social glue is becoming increasingly thin. The fact that America's origins lay in a people who acknowledged their dependence on God has become an embarrassing fact to many in our world today. We may speak publicly of "what" we are giving thanks for, but not to whom we are offering thanks.

In Luke 17: 11-19 we read the story of the ten lepers who were healed by Jesus. Most of us have never seen a leper or know much about the disease, but had we lived in those days we would have known a great deal about it for leprosy was the most feared disease in the world, it was deadly, incurable, and hopeless. Those even suspected of having the disease were banished from society. To be cured of leprosy was like being raised from the dead. Here in this passage of scripture we find a colony of 10 lepers who encounter Jesus as he is traveling to Jerusalem. The passage says that they "stood at a distance and lifted their voices saying "Jesus, Master, have mercy on us." If you are familiar with the story you know that Jesus told them to "Go, and show themselves to the Priest," and, while they were going "they were healed".

So they were healed. It is a marvelous miracle, but it is not the end of the story. When one of the lepers saw that he was healed he immediately turned back praising God with a loud voice and fell on his face thanking Jesus. Then Jesus answered, "Were not ten cleansed? Where are the nine?"

Ten men were healed that day and only one came back to thank Jesus. Are we as a nation, as individuals, with the nine – or with the one? Far too many of us take our blessings for granted.

Praise is a choice. We can be thankful or we can be bitter. We choose the way we live. The one leper who returned to give thanks chose not to forget what Jesus had done for him. May we choose this Thanksgiving Day – and every day – not to forget what God has done for us.

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Dave Says

When you're paying off debt, what do you recommend for 401(k) contributions?

Dear Dave,

I'm currently on Baby Step 2, and I have about \$7,000 in debt to pay off before I can move to bulking up my emergency fund in Baby Step 3. When you're paying off debt, what do you recommend for 401(k) contributions? Rae



Dear Rae,

I recommend putting a temporary stop to investing while you're getting out of debt. Lots of people are shocked by this advice, and some disagree with it because they're afraid of missing out on their employer's match or the wonders of compound interest. But before we go any further, let me emphasize one thing. The key word here is temporary.

Baby Step 1 is to save \$1,000 as a starter emergency fund. Baby Step 2 is paying off all of your debt, except for your home, from smallest to largest using the debt snowball plan. During this time you're attacking your debt with incredible intensity, and putting every penny you can scrape together toward paying it off.

Working my plan, the average person can pay off all their debt, except for their home, in 18 to 24 months. Some folks can do it faster, and for some, it takes a little longer. But during this time I want your financial focus to be on nothing but getting out of debt. Once that's done, you'll find you have a lot more control over your biggest wealth-building tool—your income.

Trying to accomplish too many things at once diminishes the ability to focus. And when you spend all your time nickel-and-diming everything, the result is that nothing at all gets done very well. You need to really move the needle and see results because personal finance is 80 percent behavior and only 20 percent head knowledge. It's not so much a math issue, because if you'd been doing the math all along you wouldn't have a bunch of debt.

That's why, for a short period, I want you to concentrate with laser intensity on knocking out debt. Once that's out of the way, you can pour even more money into investing, saving, and giving!— Dave

What is your position on preplanning for a funeral versus prepaying? Dear Dave,

I'm 67, and I've been wondering what your position is on preplanning for a funeral versus prepaying. Is one a better idea than the other, or should you do both? Shannon

Dear Shannon,

This is a great question. I wish more folks would think about these kinds of things ahead of time.

Preplanning a funeral is truly a gift to your family. But if you prepay, it's a gift to the funeral home. Doing the legwork and setting things up ahead of time so your family doesn't have to make a lot of financial decisions in the middle of an emotional situation shows them respect and consideration.

When you buy a prepaid plan, you could be years or decades away from needing it. Plus the inflation rate on funerals is about 4%, so in essence, you'd be making 4% on your money. And, of course, you're locked into everything at that point. If you took the cost of a funeral and invested it at age 30, instead of 4% on your money, you'd get an actual investment return. By the time you're 80, you'd have about \$600,000. So prepaying in your 30s or 40s is mathematically ridiculous. Now, if you're in your 60s, like you and me, there aren't as many years for that money to grow. You wouldn't see a huge return on investment, but it would still provide a nice service.

Believe it or not, it took me a while to figure out that the funeral world is an industry—an extremely profitable industry. And like with many things, when you add on stuff like financing or prepayment to a purchase, you're adding to their profits. Most funeral providers make as much money on prepayment plans as they do in actual margin on the goods and services that go along with this kind of thing.

That being said, I've got no problem with a business or industry making money. If they treat their customers well, no one's taken advantage of, and a quality product or service is provided, it's all good. But when it comes to funerals, I tell people to preplan. Don't prepay.— Dave

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

How the Old Testament is Categorized

Christian scholars generally categorize the Old Testament into five parts. The Jewish sages categorize the Hebrew Bible (which is the writings of the Old Testament) into three parts. In my article today I want to describe the divisions used by Christians as well as the Jewish people.

At the beginning of an English Bible, before the text begins, there will be a table of contents, showing the names



- The Pentateuch includes the books of Genesis through Deuteronomy. The word Pentateuch is formed by two Greek words, pente (five) and teuchos (books). The word means "five vessels," "five containers," or "five-volume book." This is a total of 5 books.
- Historical books: Joshua through Esther 12 books
- Poetic books: Job through the Song of Solomon 5 books
- Major prophets: Isaiah through Daniel 5 books
- Minor prophets: Hosea through Malachi 12 books

The one "exception to the rule" is the book of Lamentations, which is included in the major prophets division and comes between Jeremiah and Ezekiel. Lamentations is not a major prophet, in the sense of the words used. It only has five chapters and is a poetic book. I believe that the reason Lamentations is included among the major prophets is because it was written by Jeremiah, it deals with his lamentation for the fall of Judah, and it may have been felt that Jeremiah's writing/speaking should not have been sub-categorized.

The terms "major prophets" and "minor prophets" were mentioned above and must be clarified. The distinction between "major" and "minor" prophets has nothing to do with importance, but rather the size of the book. The major prophets (except for Lamentations) are generally larger books with more written content (for example, Isaiah has 66 chapters and Jeremiah has 51) whereas the minor prophets are shorter writings. Cases in point are Hosea, which has twelve chapters, Joel which has three, and Obadiah with only one. Indeed, smaller in length, but by no means lesser in importance.

Now let's take a look at the division of the Hebrew Bible by the Jewish sages. The Hebrew Bible contains the 39 books that Christians recognize as the Old Testament. It is also known as the "Tanakh." The word Tanakh is spelled with the three Hebrew letters: "tav," "nun (pronounced as noon)," and "kaf." Tav has the sound of a "t" in English, Nun sounds like an "n," and Kaf sounds like a "k." The three Hebrew letters of the word "Tanakh" can f be used as abbreviations for the three categories of books included in the Hebrew Bible/Old Testament.

- The first Hebrew letter, Tav, with the "t" sound can be thought of as representing "Torah" (To-rah). This Hebrew word designates the first five books of the Bible and the word itself means law, instruction, or direction.
- The second Hebrew letter, Nun, with the "n" sound, stands for "Neviim (Nevee-eem). The word in Hebrew means "prophets."
- The third letter, Kaf, with the "k" sound, represents "Ketuvim" (Ket-oo-veem). This word means "writings."

The Jewish division of the Hebrew Bible (Old Testament) is as follows:

- The Torah (law, instruction, direction) consists of Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, and Deuteronomy (5 books)
- The Neviim (Prophets) include Joshua, Judges, 1 & 2 Samuel, 1 & 2 Kings, Isaiah, Jeremiah, Ezekiel, Hosea, Joel, Amos, Obadiah, Jonah, Micah, Nahum, Habakkuk, Zephaniah, Haggai, Zechariah, Malachi (21 books)
- The Ketuvim (Writings) is made up of Psalms, Proverbs, Job, Song of Solomon, Ruth, Lamentations, Ecclesiastes, Esther, Daniel, Ezra, Nehemiah, 1 and 2 Chronicles (13 books)

So let's do a little math. The Torah/Law contains five books, the Neviim/Prophets contains 21, and 13 books make up the Ketuvim/Writings. 5 + 21 + 13 = 39. There are also 39 books in the English Old Testament.

Some questions remain though. Why are the books of 1 and 2 Samuel as well as 1 & 2 Kings called part of the "Prophets"? Aren't they historical books that would be better classified as part of the "Writings?" Why is the book of Daniel considered part of the "Writings" instead of the "Prophets?" What, specifically, is meant by the phrase "prophet" or "to prophesy?" Are the books of the Bible in chronological order by either activity or time of writing? These are subjects for the next couple of articles.

"Sacrifice thank offerings to God, fulfill your vows to the Most High." Psalm 50:14 What does God want from us? He does not want mere hymn singing, although that is fine. Nor does He want only prayer, although that too is fine. He does not simply want our attendance, although that is fine. What



He wants, first, is a thankful heart. That is what He seeks, a thankful heart. Each one of us is to offer to Him the sacrifice of thanksgiving. A sacrifice is something into which we put effort; it costs us. Have you ever asked yourself why the Scriptures stress Thanksgiving so much? Both the Old and New Testaments emphasize that above everything else, God wants thankfulness. "Give thanks in all circumstances, says the apostle Paul, for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus" (1 Thessalonians 5:18).

Why is this? It is because thanksgiving only comes as a result of having received something. You do not give thanks until you have received something that comes from someone else. Therefore thanksgiving is the proper expression of Christianity because Christianity is receiving something constantly from God. Of course, if you have not received anything from God, then you have nothing to thank Him for. Though you come to the service, you really have nothing to say. God is a realist. He does not want a fake Thanksgiving. I know there are certain people (and they are awfully hard to live with) who think that Christianity consists of pretending to be thankful. They think it means screwing a smile on your face and going around pretending that troubles do not bother you. That is a most painful form of Christianity. God does not want you to go around shouting, Hallelujah! I've got cancer! But there is something about having cancer to be thankful for. That is what He wants you to see. There are aspects of it that no one can possibly enjoy, but there are other aspects that reveal purpose, meaning, and reason. God wants you to see this--what He can do with that situation and how you can be thankful.

Thanksgiving is the first thing He wants in worship. The second thing is an obedient will. Fulfill your vows to the Most High. Notice the kind of obedience it is. It is not something forced upon you; it is something you have chosen for yourself. A vow is something you decide to give, a promise you make because of the truth you have seen. You say, I never saw it like that before. I really ought to do something about it. God helping me, I'm going to do such and such. That is a vow. God says I'm not asking you to do things you have not yet learned are important. But when you have vowed something, then do it. Act on it. Obey it. Lord, I offer to You right now the sacrifice of thanksgiving. Thank You that You are at work for good both in me and through me. Grant that I might obey your truth out of a heart of gratitude. We can expend much energy complaining, blessing no one. How can we re-focus our thoughts so that we have an attitude of gratitude no matter our circumstances?

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

As this legislative-long session draws to a close, it is a time of reflection on what we have accomplished for North Carolina this year. Lower taxes, expanded school choice, funding key infrastructure projects – I am proud of our Republican supermajorities for the policies we've advanced that will make North Carolina a better place to live and do business.

Some of the most impactful legislation of the session, though, was the policies and funding we passed to protect the rights of the unborn and support expectant mothers in our state.

This spring, the General Assembly passed legislation limiting most abortion procedures to 12 weeks of pregnancy. State law previously allowed abortions for any reason up to the 20th week of pregnancy. That bill also includes increased funding for childcare centers, paid parental leave for state employees, increased penalties for domestic violence or attacking a pregnant woman, regulations aligning surgical abortion clinic standards with those of other surgical centers, and more.

This fall, the state budget provided increased funding for crisis pregnancy centers and other programs that support expectant mothers and help them choose life for their unborn babies.

For example, the Carolina Pregnancy Care Fellowship received a recurring funding increase of \$6.25 million to provide grants to pregnancy centers for services, equipment, training, and instructional materials, as well as to support the CPCF Circle of Care program. This increase brings the organization's total appropriation to \$6.8 million.

The Human Coalition, a pro-life nonprofit, received a nonrecurring appropriation of \$1.5 million to support their Statewide Continuum of Care Program.

Carolina Maternity Home Association, Inc., a nonprofit in Greensboro, received \$1.56 million to support their work providing housing and services to single pregnant women and single mothers.

Tides, Inc. received a \$500,000 grant to provide outpatient services to pregnant women with opioid use disorder.

These funds are part of a larger acknowledgment that strong families are critical to our society. We have made important steps in this legislative session to cultivate a culture of life in North Carolina through both policy and funding.

There are a few new changes this year on how elections are to be carried out in North Carolina. I wrote in July about the newly effective voter-ID provision. To reiterate, North Carolina's voter-ID law was approved with a constitutional amendment in 2018 by 55% of our state's voters. However, actually putting it into effect was stalled in the courts by Democrat-party activists and allies who opposed the voter-approved constitutional amendment. Nevertheless, voter ID was finally allowed to go into effect by new court rulings early this year. As a result, it is now being implemented in municipal and local elections being held this fall. Voting at the polls with a photo ID is now a requirement. So, keep this in mind whenever you vote in the future. A list of acceptable ID cards is on the State Board of Elections website here: https://www.ncsbe.gov/voting/voter-id

In addition to voter ID, the legislature passed two other laws intended to increase public confidence in the integrity of elections across the state. Although both bills were vetoed by Democratic Governor Roy Cooper, both vetoes were overridden by the legislature. They are in effect for coming elections, though further lawsuits by Democrats are almost guaranteed whenever there are efforts to strengthen voter confidence in our elections. Under the new law, one change to be aware of is that mail-in absentee ballots (except for military and overseas ballots) must now be received by the county board of elections no later than the time polls close on election day. Please plan accordingly if you mail your ballot. Do so well ahead of election day to ensure your vote will be counted.

The old rule that allowed mail ballots to be counted if received as much as three days after election day is no longer in effect. The idea is that voting should not be held open after all other votes are counted and announced on election night. The hope is to bring greater certainty to the election outcome in a timely manner. We also hope to eliminate opportunities for anyone to try to manipulate outcomes with "late" ballots.

Other changes affecting future elections, for instance, clarify the rights and duties of poll observers and elections judges. Observers for both political parties are intended to help keep an eye on the process to ensure its integrity. Election judges are responsible for ensuring that rules at the voting places are followed to allow privacy for individual voters and to avoid intimidation of or interference with voters casting their ballots.

At the statewide level, the State Board of Elections makeup is changed. Presently the Governor, through his appointments to the state board, controls not only the state board but also all 100 county boards of elections. The state board oversees, regulates, and provides guidance to the 100 local boards. The new law creates a state board with eight members, four Democrats and four Republicans. The intent is to ensure that some bipartisanship will be required for state board actions. The model for this new board is essentially that of the Federal Elections Commission which also has equal numbers of Democrats and Republicans. While perhaps not a perfect solution because of the potential for tie votes, we hope to remedy the persistence of clearly partisan decisions designed to help one party or hurt the other based on one party controlling the state board and all 100 county boards.

The majority of the 2023 legislative session business has concluded with 5 veto overrides and votes on new redistricting maps for Congress as well as for the state House and Senate. The conference budget has now become law and our office was pleased to award several special appropriations and directed grants for the 2023-2025 biennium. Multiple non-profit organizations, educational institutions, and municipalities in Burke, McDowell, and Buncombe counties received grant funds to serve our communities and for infrastructure and special project needs.

Grant recipients included: The Outreach Center, Burke Law Enforcement Assistance Foundation, Burke and McDowell County Sheriff's Offices, Foundation Forward, Burke River Trail Association, The Industrial Commons, Burke County Fire Departments, McDowell Technical Community College, McDowell County EMS, Friends of Fonta Flora State Trail, McDowell Pregnancy Care Center, Mission Ministries Alliance, McDowell LFAC Foothills Food Hub, Live Like Megan Foundation and Freedom Life Ministries. One of the most notable appropriations to our district was to Burke Partnership for Economic Development/BDI for the acquisition of a large tract of land to develop a western NC mega site. This site will be over 1,000 acres and will be set aside for the recruitment of a large industry within the next decade. The General Assembly has now adjourned for the month of November so that legislators can be in their districts more and celebrate Thanksgiving with their families. Thanksgiving is still that wonderful time of the year when we can gather with friends and family to enjoy fellowship and express our thankfulness to God for the blessings He has given to us.

I'm personally thankful to be your representative in the North Carolina Senate and will continue to work to protect the values that have always made our state a great place to live, work, and raise a family. Let's begin with the Bible verse where Jesus states that "with God all things are possible" (Matthew 19:26 KJV) and that "with God nothing shall be impossible" (Luke 1:37 KJV). To clearly understand the subject, let's briefly zoom in on Jesus' promotion of unity among His followers and what unity truly means. Also, let's look at unity through the model of the Body of Christ and why such unity is necessary.

The Bible makes it clear that the church is one body with many members, called from every nation, kindred, tongue, and people. (Romans 12:4-5; Ephesians 2:13-16; 4:3-6, 11-16). In Christ, we are a new creation; distinctions of race, culture, learning, and nationality, and differences between high and low, rich and poor, male and female, must not be divisive among us. We are all equal in Christ, who, by one Spirit, has bonded us into one fellowship with Him and with one another; we are to serve and be served without partiality or reservation. 


The Emptiness of Sound: Silence

"The Mighty One, God the Lord, speaks and summons the earth from the rising of the sun to its setting." \sim Psalm 50:1

The movement of the mouth is like that of a mouse escaping the clutches of the hawk that is knowledge; the mouse runs in anxious hurry, scurrying into the mouth of a gopher



I attended a high school football game. The announcer asked for a moment of silence. In this brief moment I stood observing, listening to the sporadic low hum of murmurs throughout the stadium. Out of boredom, perhaps anxiety, they spoke. Silence makes us anxious because silence is revelatory, and so we strangle silence in anxious chatter. We grip silence at the throat with our fist of pocket-sized smokescreens, television, and blundering babble. We kill silence within and without. In our cars we turn on music. At the dinner table we turn on the TV. At the dentist we pull out our phones.

Silence becomes awkward at best and anxious at worst. Why? Because silence is revelatory. Silence is animated by time and suffused in space. It existed before the creation of the cosmos. It has been before our existence and will continue to be after we mingle with the dust. We need silence just as we need sabbath, for silence is the sabbath of the mouth, where we cease making sounds and know our sounds do not sustain the cosmos; we do not speak into existence something out of nothing.

When we believe we are gods and glorify our speech to make things happen, we manipulate, coerce, control, and beg; in all of these, humanity's dignity is lost in one way or another. In the sabbath of silence, we remember our dustiness; we remember that we are not gods. In sabbath we remember that the weight of the world is not upon our shoulders, but on God's. Silence is emptiness. In silence we enter emptiness knowing and trusting that in emptiness the Spirit will hover over the waters, springs will puncture the cracked desert ground, and gardens will garnish the microcosm of the soul.

God will use the raw material of emptiness to form us out of dust and fill us with Spirit and make us New Creations. The metaphorical mud is silence, out of which God shapes humans and breathes the breath of life in our nostrils. Just as we return to dust, so we return to silence, the thing that has been and will be after we return to it. If one was painting the milky way, there would be a generous amount of darkness which provides the context for the color. The color inhabits the darkness. The color plays off the darkness. Without darkness the painting would be an unintelligible mass of brightness without depth, breadth, or beauty. Darkness gives depth by offering the color a context to live.

God is an artist who paints on the canvas of time and space. Colors clothe the canvas. Darkness is the emptiness of sound that gives context for the color. Thomas Merton writes, "The world and time are the dance of the Lord in emptiness." Out of the Lord's mouth mountains spring. Out the Lord's mouth creation sings. All of life relies on the utterance of God in the emptiness of sound. All our praise and prayer relies on the utterance of God summoning our speech and sound. Thus, silence is not mere silence but rather the "simple stillness of the individual under the Word of God," as Dietrich Bonhoeffer said. Silence has a trajectory. Listening to God. Coming under the Word of God. Knowing God and knowing ourselves by knowing God. If we do not spend time in the emptiness of sound, our sound will be empty.

As a child of Asaph, otherwise known as worship leader, it is my God given vocation to make sound and help others make sound. It is my hope that my sound is summoned by God's speech and suffused with God's speech through the time I spend in the emptiness of sound; for in the emptiness of sound God's Word resounds. So, when you get up, spend 3 or 30 minutes in silence where your attention is turned to God. When you drive your car, rather than listen to a podcast or music, turn your attention to God. When you are sitting in a dentist's office, don't reach for your phone but turn your attention to those around you, because silence always has the trajectory of vertical and horizontal connection with the great hope of communion.



Why Do So Many People Hate The Jews? By Jim Denison, PhD

One of my dearest friends was born in a kibbutz two miles from Gaza. His village was able to evacuate when Hamas launched its murderous assault last Saturday. However, a neighboring kibbutz called Kfar Aza was targeted by the terrorists.

Yesterday, my friend forwarded to me a survivor's description of what happened:



An Associated Press reporter quotes an Israeli army general who stood amid the wreckage of the village: "You see the babies, the mothers, the fathers in their bedrooms and how the terrorists killed. It's not a battlefield. It's a massacre." Harvard students blame Israel

The Israeli death toll has passed 1,100 at this writing. President Biden confirmed yesterday in his address to the nation that fourteen US citizens were killed in the conflict and that Americans are known to be among the hostages held by Hamas. And yet...

- A coalition of thirty-four Harvard University student organizations signed a statement that they "hold the Israeli regime entirely responsible for all unfolding violence" and added that "the apartheid regime is the only one to blame." A Columbia University student group also celebrated Hamas's "historic" massacre of Israeli civilians.
- A pro-Hamas rally held Sunday in Manhattan's Times Square praised the slaughter of Israeli civilians.
- Demonstrators in London launched fireworks in the direction of the Israeli embassy and British student groups praised the attacks as mobs around the UK cheered One demonstrator called the attacks "beautiful and inspiring."
- Crowds in Germany celebrated the terrorist raids.
- The United Nations Human Rights Council held a moment of silence for the "loss of innocent lives in the occupied Palestinian territory and elsewhere," nowhere mentioning the Israeli victims who were slaughtered.
- Horrifically, a group gathered in Sydney, Australia, to celebrate the attacks chanted, "Gas the Jews."

From Egypt's genocide in the time of Moses to the devastation by ancient Assyria, Babylon, Greece, and Rome, to Hitler's "Final Solution" and its slaughter of six million Jews, the scourge of antisemitism has persisted for millennia.

Why do so many people hate the Jews today?

"Bad ideas have victims"

About Hamas's terrorist attack on Israel, three explanations are relevant. First, as I explained in my book, Radical Islam: What You Need to Know, and in my latest website paper, Hamas and their fellow jihadists would answer by claiming that the State of Israel stole its land from the rightful Palestinian owners and that its citizens are complicit in this "theft" by participating in their democracy. They believe they are required by the Qur'an (2:190, 192) to defend Islam by attacking Israelis and destroying Israel. Many have become convinced that Jews are in fact hostis humani generis, the enemies of mankind itself.

Second, those influenced by Critical Theory (which includes the Harvard and Columbia students and many of the West's intellectual, academic, and cultural elites) would answer that Israel is a majority oppressor of the Palestinian persecuted minority. They claim that the only answer is for the oppressed to reverse the equation by oppressing their oppressor.

Third, many of Iran's leaders believe the existence of Israel constitutes the "greatest barrier" to the reappearance of the Mahdi (a messiah-like figure). They therefore seek the eradication of the Jewish nation to hasten his arrival.

These are three tragic examples of a statement by my friend John Stonestreet that I quote often: "Ideas have consequences, and bad ideas have victims." In this case, the victim is Israel.

"There can be no appeasement with ruthlessness"

In this battle for the future of Israel, we are called by Scripture to "pray for the peace of Jerusalem" (Psalm 122:6) and to "seek [her] good" (v. 9).

This means that we repudiate the sin of antisemitism, a plague that is rising in the US and Europe today. It means that we pray for Israel's leaders and people to be safe from their enemies and resolute in defending their country. It means that we seek practical ways to support those in Israel and around the world devastated by these atrocities, knowing that our God "comforts the downcast" (2 Corinthians 7:6) and calls us to do the same (2 Corinthians 1:3–4).

And it means that we do all we can to lead everyone we can to the only One who can truly heal our broken world.

When Christ is our Lord, we serve only one master. We serve him and not ourselves, whatever the cost to ourselves. We serve him by serving others whether they serve us or not. And we serve out of love for the One who first loved us (1 John 4:19).

John Piper was right: "Faith in Jesus Christ frees you from the slavery of sin for the sacrifices of love."

Justified by Faith

The Apostle Paul's letter to the Roman believers has come to be considered as both one of the greatest theological books of the Bible as well as the most systematic presentation of doctrine in the Bible. The Book of Romans



is the longest of Paul's letters, possibly because Paul was attempting to introduce himself, the Lord he served, and the gospel mission to which he had been called. He wrote this letter so that the believers at Rome, and all Gentile believers throughout the Roman Empire, would specifically understand and accept the scope and magnitude of his apostolic calling by the Lord Jesus and his mission to the Gentile world. Although Paul was not intentionally writing a theological document, in God's ultimate plan, he has provided us with an extraordinary definition of the purpose and plan of God.

In the introduction to Romans, Paul establishes his claim to speak with authority as an apostle of Christ Jesus. His claim, however, is not based upon a claim to rule, but rather a claim to serve as a servant of the Lord. Paul reveals that he is under obligation to preach the gospel to the whole world—to Gentiles, Greeks, the uncircumcised, the wise, and the foolish. Paul declares that he is not ashamed of the gospel—an answer to the prevailing view immediately after the crucifixion of Jesus. For the Jew, the gospel message merely represented a historical event when a Nazarene rabbi, who was accused of blasphemy, was put to death. But Paul, himself a rabbi of high standing, knew that Christ's sacrificial death was the power of God for salvation for all—not only for the Jews but also for Gentiles.

Today, I desire that you consider what Jesus' death accomplished for all of mankind. Paul writes in Romans 5:1-10 (NASV), "Therefore, having been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we also have obtained our introduction by faith into this grace in which we stand; and we celebrate in hope of the glory of God. And not only this, but we also celebrate in our tribulations, knowing that tribulation brings about perseverance; and perseverance, proven character; and proven character, hope; and hope does not disappoint, because the love of God has been poured out within our hearts through the Holy Spirit who was given to us. For while we were still helpless, at the right time Christ died for the ungodly. For one will hardly die for a righteous person; though perhaps for the good person someone would even dare to die. But God demonstrates His own love toward us, in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us. Much more then, having now been justified by His blood, we shall be saved from the wrath of God through Him. For if while we were enemies we were reconciled to God through the death of His Son, much more, having been reconciled, we shall be saved by His life."

Notice that Paul begins with the transitional word, "therefore." He is pointing backward to all that he has written before. Paul had already declared that all have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God and that as a result, we are deserving of spiritual death and eternal separation. He had already proclaimed that because of God's amazing gift of forgiveness, redemption, and reconciliation, we have been declared innocent of all sin. Because of what God has done in Christ Jesus on Calvary's cross, we have been justified ("set free from the penalty of sin"), and believers stand to receive a precious gift from our awesome creator. Here in verses 1-10, Paul goes on to outline what we will receive as a result of the work of salvation accomplished by Christ. We have: (1) been set right with God; (2) peace with God; (3) joy in all circumstances; (4) deliverance from the judgment of God upon the separated.

The result of having placed our faith in the God who raised Jesus from the dead, who has died for our sins, and who has been raised from death is that we

have been justified with God by our faith. Justification is, of course, only the initial stage of God's dealings with us for salvation. But before we may experience the fullness of God's grace and mercy, we must be justified by God. We cannot be justified by any other means nor by any other person—it is only God who has the right and power to "declare us innocent." And that is exactly what He did! That is precisely what He does! He declares you and me innocent! That's what justification means. But how can that be? You and I are guilty! There are no excuses. How could a holy, righteous God offer such a gift and accept us and receive us back into full fellowship? The answer is simply our response of faith to the finished work of Jesus on Calvary. Romans 10:9 says "...that if you confess with your mouth Jesus as Lord, and believe with your heart that God raised Him from the dead, you will be saved." In other words, we who are dead in our trespasses and sins "abandon ourselves to God." We offer ourselves to Him. We throw ourselves on the mercies of God and by simple child-like faith, place all of our trust in all of His goodness and love. At the same time, we submit to His claim and authority upon our lives and we obediently offer to sacrifice our old selves—to lay down and give up all of the layers of self-survival that we have learned throughout our lives—and begin to fully and wholly trust Him at His Word. It is then that we live victoriously over the flesh as we yield ourselves to God's Holy Spirit at work in and through us.

May the peace and joy of your freedom in Christ and deliverance from the penalty and bondage to sin rest in your life today and forever more. Amen!

"Let Your Light So Shine"

In 2007 an old dusty box sat in an auction house in Chicago, Illinois waiting to be opened. The only thing known about its contents was that it held numerous old negatives and photographs. The box was placed in a blind auction and purchased by the president of the Historical Society of Chicago's Northwest Side. His name was Mr. John Malloy. After his purchase, he decided that most of the negatives were unusable and so once



again the old box was closed and placed in storage. Several years later he pulled it out again. This time he began to scan the negatives one by one into his computer. Soon the beautiful works of Vivian Maier began to display. It became apparent to John that he had purchased the photos of a great photographer. His research of the unknown author had begun. His discoveries led to more boxes of photographs done by this mystery artist. Unfortunately, Vivian had already left this world and there was no indication that she had become a known photographer. Apparently, she had been secretly taking photographs for 50 years and placing all of her work in storage since 1949. Throughout her years on this earth, very few of her photos were made into prints and none of her works were published publicly. However, after a search by Mr. Malloy and two other collectors, it was discovered that she had taken over 150,000 photos and hid all of the undeveloped film away.

Since then, most of her work has been obtained by the collectors and deemed to be of great talent. There now have been many portfolios published and she has become a famous street photographer in the photography world. Her obvious talent has inspired other photographers, and many have claimed to have learned from her without having heard a word of her instruction and only observing her photos. Vivian Maier's works went on after her passing and accomplished the very thing that great photographs are intended to do, to inspire, to teach, and to display.

I have a Christian friend who reminds me of Vivian Maier. No, she isn't a photographer or any kind of artist. However, her hands are always at work touching lives and inspiring people in the Lord. She isn't sounding a bell or publishing the things she does, but I have known her a long time and she is always doing something for others. She is modestly out praying, helping, and ministering to hurting people in her own silent and secret way and I am sure that the evidence of her works is being stored up by the number.

I want to be like them both. As a photographic "hobbyist" the story of Vivian Maier intrigues me. I don't know why she secretly hid her photography from others, but her photos were done with great skill and are touching enthusiasts and collectors to this day. Of course, I want to reach that same level of expertise in the hobby that I love.

In comparison, my friend is doing just what the Lord has required from all of us when He said, "Let your light shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father who is in heaven". I know my friend's motive to help others is not to gain notoriety or have her works "published" in any way. Like Vivian, she is too modest for that. Growing in Christ - Little by Little

I often teach on a variety of subjects, but I believe my primary calling is to help Christians grow up and mature in Christ and really begin to enjoy the great life He has in store for them.

As a young woman, I went to church for years, but I really didn't know much about spiritual maturity. I loved

God with all of my heart, but I wasn't changing—I was still as critical, judgmental, and rebellious as ever. And even though I knew my life should be getting better, I was still miserable from dealing with all of the same problems.

I believe this is one of Satan's greatest strategies. If he can't keep people from hearing the Gospel and accepting Christ, he will do everything he can to make sure they never grow spiritually and experience the peace and joy that's promised to them in the Bible.

You see, when we're born again, the Holy Spirit comes to live in our hearts—God plants a seed of everything He is in our spirit. He instantaneously deposits inside of us everything we need to live a great life.

For instance, Galatians 5:22-23 (AMPC) says, "The fruit of the [Holy] Spirit [the work which His presence within accomplishes] is love, joy (gladness), peace, patience (an even temper, forbearance), kindness, goodness (benevolence), faithfulness, gentleness (meekness, humility), self-control...."

Did you know all of these things already exist on the inside of you? You may wonder, Well, if that's the case, then why aren't I experiencing any of it in my life?

Well, when it comes to the maturity process, we have a part to play. Our part is to cooperate with God to cultivate and develop His character in our lives so we can grow and become more like Him. How do we do that?

It all begins by spending regular time in God's Word. Hebrews 4:12 (AMPC) says, "The Word that God speaks is alive and full of power [making it active, operative, energizing, and effective]...."

When we spend time in God's Word, we are spending time with God. His Word changes us—it changes how we think and how we act. It changes how we see God, ourselves, and the world around us.

Romans 12:2 is a great scripture that shows us how we grow spiritually: "Do not be conformed to this world (this age), [fashioned after and adapted to its external, superficial customs], but be transformed (changed) by the [entire] renewal of your mind [by its new ideals and its new attitude], so that you may prove [for yourselves] what is the good and acceptable and perfect will of God..." (AMPC).

God has a "good and acceptable and perfect" plan for our lives, but we must renew our minds with His Word before we can experience it.

It's important to remember that growing spiritually is a process. When I first began to read and study God's Word, I immediately saw things I needed to change. For a while, I felt guilty and condemned that I wasn't "measuring up."

However, God helped me to understand that He never shows us these things to condemn us and make us feel guilty. He convicts us of our behavior in order to help us grow and come up higher in that area.

For example, I was extremely rebellious in the early years of my marriage. Because my father sexually abused me when I was growing up, I had developed a distrust of men. I vowed that no man would ever again push me around.

But as I learned God's Word, I saw that my behavior toward my husband, Dave, was wrong. The Lord was asking me to walk in love with Dave in my speech, attitudes, and actions. This was easier said than done! But God always gives us the grace to do what He is asking us to do. He doesn't expect us to do it all on our


So, little by little, by God's grace, I began to change. The Lord transformed me from being rude, critical, harsh, and rebellious into someone who has real peace, love, and joy. But it was a process—it didn't happen overnight.

Look at 2 Corinthians 3:18 (AMPC). It says we "are constantly being transfigured into His very own image in ever increasing splendor and from one degree of glory to another...."

The Lord changes us a little at a time. None of us will ever be perfect until we get to heaven, and that's okay. But as long as we're here on this earth, God desires for us to continually cooperate with Him to learn and grow.

As we do—as we continue to grow spiritually and change "from glory to glory"—we will experience the incredible peace, joy, and fulfillment that only God can give us. And we will show the world around us what God is really like.

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





Armor Before Peace

"O God, the nations have come into your inheritance; they have defiled your holy temple; they have laid Jerusalem in ruins. They have given the bodies

The opening verses of Psalm 79 were penned 2600 years ago, but they articulate a modern horror. How did Hamas terrorists catch Israel napping? What caused the failure of a legendary intelligence and defense network?

To make matters worse, cities across the US and Europe are witnessing jubilant crowds praising the slaughter. Thousands of Australian citizens paraded around the Sydney Opera House shouting "gas the Jews." Some Americans proclaim that black lives matter, but Jewish lives do not. Our so-called journalists blame Israel for every problem in the Middle East. The U.S. House of Representatives is tainted by this rot. How did we come to this?

The stifling atmosphere of world politics has become even more laced with threats and insults. Any voice of reason is obscured by the clatter of rattling sabers. Our president talks about "unwavering support for Israel," but he is attempting to hand over one hundred million dollars to Hamas. Does he believe they will buy rice and beans? No force on earth can prevent the war that will eventually resolve this ancient enmity. The Bible tells us what will happen. The only unanswered question is when will the final battle begin?

This struggle began as sibling rivalry in the home of Abraham. Descendants of older brother, Ishmael, insist that their ancestor is the legitimate heir of the Abrahamic Covenant. Genesis 16:12 describes Ishmael, "He shall be a wild donkey of a man, his hand against everyone and everyone's hand against him, and he shall dwell over against all his kinsmen." Ishmael's descendants are called Arabs. The founding of Islam was an Arabian attempt to lay claim to the Covenant. Muslims insist that they worship the God of Abraham. They do not. Allah is no different than baal, molech, or chemosh. The phrase "God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob" distinguishes the Creator of All from the host of pagan impostors.

Younger brother Isaac is the true heir. "I will establish my covenant with Isaac." (Genesis 17:21) Isaac's family is the nation of Israel. The heart of the "Middle East Conflict" is the fact that God chose for Himself a people. He separated Israel from everyone else for His purpose. In the final battle of this age, every nation on earth will join forces to attack Israel. They will lose.

Between now and Armageddon, the spiritual battle will rage. "Powers and principalities, and spiritual wickedness in high places" stand fanatically opposed to Messiah and His family. Matthew 24:21 says, "For then there will be great tribulation, such as has not been from the beginning of the world until now, no, and never will be." During that tribulation, everyone's allegiance will be discovered. Many Christians think they will be removed before the tribulation. When that does not happen, some will lose their faith. The only way to survive the horrors foretold by scripture is to trust Jesus and become intimate with His Word.

Never has it been more important for God's people to prepare for battle. That preparation involves putting on His full armor. We must first gird up our loins with truth. God's Word is truth. Read it! Start today. Read every word over the next twelve months. No excuses.

Put on the breastplate of righteousness. You may have been taught that Christ's righteousness is miraculously applied to you and that your righteousness is like "filthy rags." These are both lies. As you immerse yourself in the truth of Scripture, you will learn how to live righteously.

Shoe your feet with the Gospel of peace. One of satan's favorite tricks is infecting us with worry. We cannot "stand firm" if we are terrified about what "might" happen. Knowing God's truth and devoting ourselves to righteous living will help us stand securely on the peace of Christ.

Take up the shield of faith. When we are convinced that God will always keep His promises, our enemy has no chance of defeating us. If we choose to believe the popular lie that God reneged on His many promises to His people, Israel, then we are doomed. As you read the Bible, you will discover that He did no such thing.

Put on the helmet of salvation. When we turn to Jesus in faith, repentance, and baptism, we begin a process which must be worked out with "fear and trembling." Salvation represented by a helmet is a powerful image. It is in our minds that temptations and distractions take root. Let us surround our minds with the assurance that those who endure to the end will live eternally in God's presence.

The last item in our armor is "the sword of the Spirit which is the Word of God." (Ephesians 6:17) Our preparation for Spiritual battle begins and ends with God's Word. Not with a devotional book. Not with watching or listening to someone talk about the Word of God. All of us will be judged based on what we do in this life. The only way to discover how God wants us to live is to read His book.

I do not know if the current war is the beginning of end time events, but I am certain that every person on earth has been given a wakeup call. Satan still holds incredible power over this world. Everyone will be forced to choose sides. Will you stand with the prince of darkness, or will you arm yourself and serve the King of Kings? No third option is available.



Animals That Like To Work?

Did you know that there are animals that work? Most love their jobs and look forward to working every day. Some even get excited about it. Some animals that have jobs are Beagles, hawks, doves, mules, Great Pyrenes, Rottweilers, Clydesdales,



Their greatness was a little intimidating to me at first, but I soon realized they were gentle giants who were excited to see me, get some pets and scratches behind the ears. I would love to own one of these magnificent horses one day!

This horse is called a Percheron. Have you ever seen one? Percherons originated from France in the 732AD. Then they were used as warhorses. They were spirited, steady, and strong enough to carry full armored knights.



Now they are used for farming, pulling logs, farm machines, and even carriages. They are great in parades and other public gatherings because they are so mild-mannered and calm. They are not scared easily. Their temperament is why people say they are "cold-blooded" horses. Even though Percherons have high energy and endurance they are also easygoing and love to please.

In 1915 Percherons were known as the largest horse in the world. Today the largest population of Percherons is found in the United States.

Most Percherons are black, gray, chestnut, or bay colored. Their bodies and fur are sleek and shiny. They do not have long fur on their legs around their hooves like other draft horses. Their mane and tail are very thick, and a lot of times are wavy.

Percherons can live to be in their 30s. They can weigh as much as 2600 pounds, but the average is 1900 pounds. They are usually 16-17 hands high. This large horse eats 30 pounds of hay along with 5 pounds of grain daily.

It is important also for us to work and have a job, it makes God happy and pleased. Sometimes it's hard to enjoy our job. My husband pointed out that if you do your job to the best of your ability (whether you like your job or not) and do it for the glory of God, then it makes going to work much easier. In other words, we should work to please God and to bring Him glory. I'm not talking only about adult jobs but also jobs that you may have like chores. We don't always get paid for working but we can always do everything we do with a joyful heart for the Lord. Sometimes this is very hard. Sometimes I don't like some of the jobs I have to do either.
