

What We Believe

Here are some of the essential elements of our faith at the Blue Ridge Christian News:

God

God is the Creator and Ruler of the universe. He has existed eternally in three persons and chooses to manifest Himself in these three ways: as God the Father, as God the Son, and as God the Holy Spirit. These three are co-equal and are one God

(Genesis 1:1, 26-27; 3:22; Psalm 90:2; Matthew 28:19; 1 Peter 1:2; and 2 Corinthians 13:14)

Jesus

Jesus Christ is the eternal Son of God, who is fully God and fully human in His incarnation. He lived a sinless human life and offered Himself as the perfect sacrifice for the sins of all humanity by dying on a cross. He arose from the dead after three days to demonstrate His power over sin and death. He ascended to heaven and will return again to reign as King of Kings and Lord of Lords.

The Holy Spirit

The Holy Spirit is the very Spirit of God, fully divine, manifested in the life of every believer from the moment of salvation. He is equal with the Father and the Son as God. He is present in the world to make men aware of their need for Jesus Christ. He provides the Christian with power for living, understanding of spiritual truth, and guidance in doing what is right. The Christian seeks to live under His daily control.

(2 Corinthians 3:17; John 16:7-13; 14:16-17; Acts 1:8; 1 Corinthians 2:12; 3:16; Ephesians 1:13; Galatians 5:25; Ephesians 5:18)

The Bible

The Bible is the divinely inspired, authoritative, infallible, living and active Word of God to all men. It was written by human authors under the supernatural guidance of the Holy Spirit. It is the ultimate source of truth for Christian beliefs and living. In it we find a guideline for right relationship with God and God's creation, and a blueprint for personal, emotional, and spiritual growth.

Humanity

Humanity is designed and made by God in His image. We have been created as cognitive, moral, ethical, and physical beings and have been equipped by God for both relationship with Him and with one another. Both male and female are gifted by the Creator with characteristics which equip them for the purpose for which they have been created: relationship, dominion, and responsibility. Although God designed us to have fellowship with Him, we became alienated from God through disobedience. As a result, all human beings are born with a sinful nature and choose to sin against God. We are incapable of regaining a right relationship with God through our own efforts.

Eternity & Eternal Security

Our soul, the essence of our being, was created by God to exist forever. That forever is spent in one of two places: eternally present and in union with God because of His forgiveness and salvation or eternally separated from God because of sin and unbelief. At the moment that our physical body dies, those who are saved are immediately taken to heaven. Those who have rejected God's gift of salvation will spend eternity separated from God in hell. Because God gives man eternal life through Jesus Christ, the believer is secure in that salvation for eternity. Salvation is maintained by the grace and power of God, not by the self-effort of the Christian. It is the grace and eternal power of God that gives this security. (John 3:16; 5:11-13, 10:29; 1 John 2:25; Romans 6:23; Revelation 20:15; 2 Timothy 1:12; Hebrews 7:25; 10:10-14; 1 Peter 1:3-5)

Salvation

Salvation is God's gift of redemption and reconciliation to Himself and is offered freely to all who accept, by faith alone, Jesus Christ as God's only son and receive Him as Lord and Savior. We can never make up for our sin with self-improvement or good works. It is only by trusting in Jesus Christ as God's offer of forgiveness that you can be saved from sin's penalty. Eternal life begins the moment you receive Jesus Christ into your life by faith.


Luke2:8-12 KJV



"I need to meet with you and the guys from our Bible study today" my friend urgently said on the phone. Tears streamed down his cheeks as my friend told the four of us how he started using cocaine, again. After six months in a rehab facility and more than a year of sobriety after that, he was back on drugs.

The tears continued to drip as he told us how it all happened. It started with stress as he approached his wedding day. He started drinking alcohol to help him relax. Then a coworker offered him marijuana and he accepted. He progressed to stealing and selling his wife's beloved family heir-looms to get the money needed for cocaine highs. Eventually, his wife noticed

All of this was occurring while the four of us met for Bible study each Wednesday. If there was one safe group for him to have shared his struggles, it would have been with us. But he didn't. He hid his struggles from his family and from the guys he was supposed to share his struggles with when he needed to.

Shame, embarrassment, and guilt were already there. He didn't need any more of that from us. He knew he messed up. He needed assurance we were there for him and he needed a reminder that we are all fighting our own battles.

Paul told the believers living in Corinth, "Therefore, my beloved brethren, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that your toil is not in vain in the Lord" (1 Corinthians 15:58, NASB).

In 1 Corinthians 15, Paul talks about the resurrection of believers and our hope for the future. That's the source of hope for the future and the incentive for service in the present. As Paul approaches the end of this glorious chapter on the resurrection he reminds the believers to keep strong in their daily walk with God.

There will be setbacks in our Christian life. We will have times when we struggle with temptation, say the wrong things at the worst time, and fail to follow through on commitments we make to others. But it's important not to get bogged down with the struggles, but to strive to live faithfully to God and continue in ministry. We can't earn God's gift of salvation. But once we accept that gift we don't sit on it. We actively serve God in ministry.

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Revelation Chapter 19: The Marriage of the Lamb and the Joyous Celebration of the Bride

Marriage ceremonies are celebrated in diverse ways around the world. The institution of marriage between a man and a woman transcends cultural boundaries and eras. Throughout history, it has been marked by grandeur, tradition, and unique customs, each reflecting the love stories and backgrounds of the couples involved.



Few events capture the world's attention and imagina-

tion the way royal weddings do. I feel fortunate, (as I'm sure many others feel the same) to have witnessed three royal weddings in my lifetime: the regal wedding of Prince Charles and Lady Diana Spencer to the modern-day unions of Prince William and Catherine Middleton, and Prince Harry and Meghan Markle. Each of these royal weddings was filled with magnificence and majesty, reflecting the times and the unique personalities of the couples involved.

All three amazing wedding ceremonies were held at iconic historic venues. The brides wore gowns made by the finest bridal designers. The guest list included royalty, world leaders, celebrities, and dignitaries. Each wedding was an international and highly anticipated high-profile event. Millions and millions of people worldwide watched by television or some other media coverage. Following the wedding ceremonies, the couples embarked on carriage processions through the streets. Each of these weddings was noted for their incomparable splendor and significance.

However, as Clarence Larkin says in his book, The Book of Revelation:

"There have been many royal weddings of international interest where the invited guests and spectators witnessed a spectacle magnificent in its appointments, and rejoiced in a union that bound together different nations. But the wedding of the Lamb and his Bride will surpass them all, for it shall unite heaven and earth in a bond that shall never be broken."

Revelation chapter 19 prophesies this future event – the Marriage of the Lamb. The Scriptures say:

"Then I heard again what sounded like the shout of a vast crowd or the roar of mighty ocean waves or the crash of loud thunder: 'Praise the Lord! For the Lord our God, the Almighty reigns. 7 Let us be glad and rejoice, and let us give honor to him. For the time has come for the wedding feast of the Lamb, and his bride has prepared herself. 8 She has been given the finest of pure white linen to wear.' For the fine linen represents the good deeds of God's holy people. 9 And the angel said to me, 'Write this: Blessed are those who are invited to the wedding feast of the Lamb.' And he added, 'These are true words that come from God' (Revelation 19:6-9).

Henry Halley of Halley's Bible Handbook says that at the start of Revelation chapter 19 there are essentially two hallelujah choruses.

"The first chorus (1-5), expresses heaven's joyous celebration over the destruction of Babylon," says Halley. "The second chorus, in a swell of voices like an ocean's roar and the roll of distant thunder, announces the Marriage of the Lamb to his true bride."

The Marriage of the Lamb is not just something symbolic but a highly anticipated literal event in biblical prophecy that will take place in heaven, and signify the culmination of God's redemptive plan and the union of Christ (the Lamb) with his bride (the Church).

There are no widely recognized celebrations today that directly mirror what makes up the Marriage of the Lamb. Nevertheless, we know something about what weddings were like in Jesus' day and what they represent in the coming marriage of Christ and his Church. Warren Wiersbe, in Be Victorious, explains most succinctly:

"Jewish weddings in that day were quite unlike weddings in the Western world. First, there was an engagement, usually made by the parents when the prospective bride and groom were quite young. The engagement was binding and could only be broken by a form of divorce. Any unfaithfulness during the engagement was considered adultery.

"When the public ceremony was to be enacted, the groom would go to the bride's house and claim her for himself. He would take her to his home for the wedding supper, and all the guests would join the happy couple. The feast could last as long as a week.

"Today, the church is 'engaged' to Jesus Christ; and we love him even though we have not seen him (I Peter 1:8). One day he will return and take his bride to heaven (John 14:1-6; I Thessalonians 4:13-18). At the Judgement Seat of Christ, her works will be judged and all her spots and blemishes removed. This being completed, the church will be ready to return to earth with her Bridegroom at the close of the Tribulation to reign with him in glory (see Luke 13:29; Matthew 8:11). Some students believe that the entire Kingdom Age will be the 'marriage supper.'"

Larkin goes even further in detail, addressing questions that often arise about the identity of the bride – questions related to the differences between Israel and the Church, which some people confuse. He writes:

"We must not forget that there are 'two brides' mentioned in the Scriptures. One in the Old Testament, and the other in the New. The one in the Old Testament is Israel, the Bride of Jehovah; the one in the New Testament is the Church, the Bride of Christ. Of Israel, it is said, ['For your Creator will be your husband' Isaiah 54:5-8]. Because of her whoredoms, Israel is a cast-off wife, but God, her husband, promises to take her back when she ceases from her adultery. (Jeremiah 3:1-18; Ezekiel 16:1-63; Hosea 2:1-23; 3:1-5). She will not be taken back as a vir-continued on page 14

It's Who You Know

Pastors who have attended seminary typically own a set of books on Systematic Theology. These volumes cover homiletics, hermeneutics, Christology,

epistemology, demonology, angelology, soteriology, eschatology, church history and so forth. The details vary according to denominational perspective, but the headings are remarkably similar.

What is missing from all of these collections is the largest single item covered by the Bible: the Nation of Israel. Israel's history, her covenants, her mission, her rebellion, her dispersal, and her role in end time events make up at least eighty percent of the Bible. The one topic to which the majority of Scripture is devoted is not deemed worthy of much study. For this reason, few Christians understand, appreciate, or live according to God's plan for redeeming sinful mankind.

Our Creator called and set apart One Nation so they might carry out His Holy Purpose. Israel's mission had two primary components. The first was to receive, record, and preserve God's Holy Word. Second, they were to be the vehicle for bringing this world a Savior.

Israel succeeded in both of these assignments, but she failed miserably to achieve a third, lesser know task. They were supposed to conduct their lives as shining examples of how God wants His people to live—a beacon to the nations. They chose instead to rebel against God and His instructions for living. Their rebellion was so consistent and so long term that God eventually abandoned them to their enemies and ejected them from the Land of Promise.

The exclusion of Israel's story from Christian theology is rooted in ancient Rome. The Roman Church insisted that "faith in Christ" has no connection to Israel. They proclaimed loudly and forcefully that Israel's Messiah did not come to earth to fulfill the many promises God made to Israel. They insisted that He came instead to start a new religion. A new religion which Roman Church leaders defined and enforced. A new religion that mostly survived the "protestant reformation." A new religion that is present in every modern denomination.

Most Christians are part of this new religion. That fact is nowhere more apparent than in the attitudes of most believers toward Moses. If not for a floating basket, a burning bush, and Charlton Heston, Moses might be forgotten. Many believers blame Moses for what they call the "burden of the law." Few are aware that the Bible ascribes to Moses the role of second-most-important person who ever lived. Only Jesus is greater. Ironically, the Church places Paul in the number two spot. They do so because they misuse Paul's words to contradict Moses.

Believers who read the Bible with an open mind discover the truth about Moses. Part of that truth is proclaimed in the last Bible chapter before the book of Matthew. Malachi Four summarizes God's plan. These six verses assure us that God's people will eventually "tread down the wicked... under the soles of your feet." "For you who fear my name, the sun of righteousness shall rise with healing in its wings."

Most Christians are in favor of the glorious prophecies conveyed by Malachi, but they have no problem ignoring the pivotal instruction found in verse four. "Remember the law of my servant Moses, the statutes and rules that I commanded him at Horeb for all Israel." This verse reminds us that God promised salvation only to Israel, and the terms of that salvation were conveyed by God through Moses.

Jesus' attitude toward Moses is key to understanding all of the Apostolic writings. In Matthew 5:17-20, He tells us to not even consider the possibility that He came to abolish the Law or the Prophets. Both will be in full force for as long as heaven and earth remain. We must follow the teaching of Moses until heaven and earth are replaced. I have yet to encounter a "teacher" who can explain how it is possible for Paul to contradict the Son of God on this point.

Another glimpse into Jesus' opinion of Moses is found in Matthew 23. Verses two and three have always troubled me. "The scribes and the Pharisees sit on Moses" seat, so do and observe whatever they tell you," The context is that Jesus views "Moses' seat" as the legitimate source of authority. However, His instruction for us to do and observe whatever the Pharisees tell us makes no sense. His every encounter with, and statement about, the Pharisees make it clear that He has no respect for their actions or their teaching. It is impossible for Jesus to tell us to obey the Pharisees.

The answer to this dilemma is found in several ancient manuscripts of Matthew written in Hebrew rather than Greek. Those documents read, "The scribes and the Pharisees sit on Moses' seat, therefore do whatever he tells you." Somewhere along the way, a scribe misread the text and misquoted Jesus. Of course Jesus would tell us to obey Moses because Moses taught The Word of God.


Jesus' respect for Moses and his teaching is hammered home in John five. The Pharisees condemned Jesus because He healed on Sabbath. They promoted themselves as experts on everything Moses, but Jesus challenged that claim. The last three verses of the chapter form a blistering accusation. "Do not think that I will accuse you to the Father. There is one who accuses you: Moses, on whom you have set your hope. For if you believed Moses, you would believe me; for he wrote of me. But if you do not believe his writings, how will you believe my words?" (John 5:45-47)

On the Great Day when each of us stands for judgment, ignorance of God's Word will not be an excuse. We are each responsible for knowing what the Bible teaches. Simply put, everyone who wants to know Jesus must first know Moses. As He did with the Pharisees, Jesus still asks each of us, "If you do not believe Moses's writings, how will you believe my words?"

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
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Why are 1 & 2 Samuel and 1 & 2 Kings Categorized as part of the "Prophets"?

In last month's article, we examined the categorization of the Old Testament into five sections by Christian scholars:

- The Pentateuch Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, Deuteronomy
- Historical Books Joshua through Esther
- Poetic Books Job through the Song of Solomon
- Major Prophets Isaiah through Daniel
- Minor Prophets Hosea through Malachi

Plus the fact that Jewish scholars categorize the Tanakh (Hebrew Bible – the Old Testament) into three sections:

- The law Genesis through Deuteronomy
- The Prophets Joshua, Judges, 1 & 2 Samuel, 1 & 2 Kings, Isaiah, Jeremiah, Ezekiel, Hosea, Joel, Amos, Obadiah, Jonah, Micah, Nahum, Habakkuk, Zephaniah, Haggai, Zechariah, Malachi
- The Writings Psalm, Proverbs, Job, Song of Solomon, Ruth, Lamentations, Ecclesiastes, Esther, Daniel, Ezra, Nehemiah, 1 & 2 Chronicles

And how both include all 39 books of the Old Testament.

When looking at this categorization by the Jewish sages many have wondered why the books of Joshua, Judges, 1 & 2 Samuel, and 1 & 2 Kings are not included as part of the "Writings" rather than the "Prophets" After all they are the historical stories of ancient Israel, not predictions, aren't they? To answer this question we first need to take a look at the word "prophet." I would say that often times the first thing a person thinks of when they hear the term "prophet" is "one who predicts the future" or "one who interprets the Bible concerning future events." The key word is "future." The most commonly used Hebrew word for "prophet" in the Bible is navee (pronounced nah-vee, the word "prophets" would be pronounced ne-vee-eem).

Of the most significant passages in determining its basic meaning is in the book of Exodus. The situation in Exodus 4:10-16 is where God calls Moses to return to Egypt to approach Pharaoh. Moses hesitates, reminding God of what he called inadequate speaking abilities. To this God first responded by reminding Moses that He (God) made man's mouth and vocal cords so He can enable Moses in any fashion He wants, including his speaking. Moses still objects and God says that he will instruct Aaron, Moses' brother, to speak for him. God emphasizes this by adding, "He (Aaron) shall speak for you to the people, and he shall be your mouth, and you shall be as God to him." (Exod. 4:16 ESV). So there was to be a relationship between Moses and Aaron similar to that between God and a spokesman for him. And then in chapter 7:1 God speaks of Aaron, and his relationship to Moses, by saying, "and Aaron thy brother shall be your prophet (navee-spokesman)" (ESV).

Another text in this regard is Amos 7:12-16. Here Amos is at Bethel in Israel speaking against the false altar which Jeroboam, the divided nation of Israel's first king, had erected. Amaziah, the Bethel priest, encounters the prophet and says, "Go, flee away to the land of Judah, and eat bread there, and prophesy there, 13 but never again prophesy at Bethel, for it is the king's sanctuary, and it is a temple of the kingdom" (Amos 7:12-13 ESV).

To this, Amos replies in verses 14-15, "I was no prophet, nor a prophet's son, but I was a herdsman and a dresser of sycamore figs. 15 But the LORD took me from following the flock, and the LORD said to me, 'Go, prophesy to my people Israel." The point concerns the significant usage of the word "prophesy." Amaziah urges Amos "not to prophesy" anymore at Bethel, and Amos in response says that God had sent him to Israel to prophesy. Thus what he had been doing at Bethel, and motivated Amaziah's rebuke, was prophesying, or speaking God's message. These two passages provide a good indication of the meaning of the term "prophet" as being "a spokesman." Therefore, a prophet of God is a "spokesman for God." Further study indicates that a true prophet of God will not only "speak" for God but will "speak fervently" for God.

So a prophet can be much more than just one who foretells future events. A prophet acts as a "spokesman" for someone else. A prophet of God is one who acts as a spokesman for God, providing God's word accurately to others. This could involve God's word about the distant future, the near future, warning people of their need for change, or even commending people for doing right.

With this background, next month I will explain why the Jewish people categorize the books of Joshua, Judges, 1 & 2 Samuel, and 1 & 2 Kings into the "Prophets" grouping.

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Divine Intervention

This story is emotional for me, but from Nana's heart, I want to share this miraculous story about our grandson Gaige's journey through open heart surgery. We forever want to give glory to the mighty God we serve! I could never begin to know Gaige's feelings and thoughts completely as he traveled on this journey, but this story is written from his point of view as I saw it; he has read and permitted to share...



The doctor says, "It's time for intervention." The word "intervention" can sometimes create havoc in one's life. I was born with aortic valve stenosis, which is a narrowing of the heart's aortic valve. Left untreated aortic stenosis can be fatal. In addition to the stenosis, I have leakage in another heart valve. Regular visits to a cardiologist for EKGs and echocardiograms have been a routine part of my life, with the underlying expectation of the doctor announcing the necessity of surgery.

Aortic stenosis has imposed limitations in my life regarding strenuous activities, especially with contact sports. My cardiologist explained a direct hit to the chest could result in death and contact sports increase this possibility.

Intervention first came in 2014 at age 13 when Dr. Ashok Mehta, my pediatric cardiology specialist in Johnson City, TN spoke frankly to my mom in stating he wanted to send my records to Vanderbilt University Medical Center in Nashville, TN for a consultation regarding a balloon catheter procedure on my heart.

Mom has always been my advocate in researching the best treatment, facility, and doctors and doing everything possible in my best interest regarding this lifelong concern of aortic stenosis. The trip to Vanderbilt was her focus as she began to educate herself and me each step of the way. With tremendous prayer support at home, we departed for Nashville.

Upon arrival, Dr. J, a Pediatric Cardiologist at Vanderbilt, walked us through the planned procedure. A huge concern in this procedure was the size of the balloon catheter; too large and the leak in my heart valve could be worse and cause additional problems; too small and the inflated balloon would not help the narrowing issue in the aortic valve.

Seeking God's guidance, protection, and will in treatment was a priority. My family prayed the surgeon would be a man of God. The Lord answered our prayers! Dr. J held my hand and prayed with me, Mom, and my Nana before surgery. He told us he always prayed before surgery.

We knew God was in control and His assurance came in the first words of Dr. J's prayer. The morning of the surgery, Nana woke me up singing a hymn "This is the Day the Lord Has Made I will Rejoice and be Glad in it," based on Psalm 118:24. The first words of Dr. J's prayer were "Lord, this is the day you have made, let us rejoice and be glad in it."

The balloon catheter procedure was successful in opening the narrowing in the aortic valve giving me four years before open heart surgery became reality. In 2017, the echocardiogram began to show the stenosis was increasing and visits to the cardiologist became more frequent. In discussions with Dr. Mehta, it was evident surgery was on the horizon during the summer break of 2018. Mom began to research surgeons and facilities. Cleveland Clinic in Ohio was the hospital of choice.

Surgical options were researched and discussed with Dr. Mehta and Cleveland Clinic doctors. In the end, the Ross procedure was determined to be the best option for my situation. After opening the heart, if the Ross procedure did not appear to be the best option, we were informed a mechanical heart valve was an alternative.

My family was concerned about what I would be facing. Family, friends, church family, and total strangers heard about my pending surgery and began to pray. Word spread and many people we did not know were praying for me. My Papaw anointed me with oil and he, along with two of my great uncles, prayed over me asking God to guide the surgeons and to give me the best possible results from surgery. This journey was truly covered in prayer. Mom continued to answer my questions to the best of her ability and encouraged me to address my concerns to medical professionals. Overall, I was calm and would often say, "My Mom and Nana are more nervous than I am!"

Arriving in Cleveland on the evening of July 4th, we checked in to the Inter-Continental Hotel adjacent to Cleveland Clinic. We settled in and set about orienting ourselves to where we should be the next morning for preliminary testing and instructions for scheduled surgery on Friday, July 6th.

Thursday morning dawned and we made our way to the clinic for a scheduled EKG, echocardiogram, consultation with doctors, and preliminary preparations. Dr. P, one of the two scheduled surgeons, met with us reviewed my history, and explained again the planned Ross procedure and the alternate mechanical valve procedure. In the back of our minds, we knew this, but when facts are laid on the table, the actual words can bring unpleasant thoughts and questions about the long-term effects.

Dr. P and Dr. S were the two doctors Mom had prayed for during her research. When Cleveland first contacted Mom regarding the surgical team, Dr. P was not on the original list. My Nana told Mom to give it time, God may work it out just as you have asked. Work it out He did! Dr. P's schedule cleared, and he was assigned to my surgery team. Dr. P is a heart valve repair specialist as well as a Ross procedure specialist! God is so good!

Friday, July 6th, the day of "intervention" had arrived! Dr. S did not meet with us until the morning of the surgery. He quickly reviewed the process, explained what to expect, and asked if I had any questions. I had one ... "Could I get pic-

tures or a video?" He said, "Gaige, I don't think we can get a video, but pictures, yes, even if I have to take them with my cell phone." We all enjoyed a good laugh! After Dr. S's visit, nurses, anesthesiologist, and each surgical team member assured me and my family that this procedure was their top priority.

The next time I was aware, I was in the ICU with tubes, wires, and an anxious Mom and Nana at my bedside. It would be a couple of days before I understood the details of what had happened. Doctors and nurses were in and out and I could remember bits and pieces of conversation. I was vaguely aware that the Ross procedure had not been the surgical route completed, but I did not fully understand what had happened.

Mom told me when I was more alert about the miraculous valve repair and the sharing of good news with family and friends at home. So much rejoicing and happy tears. Text, phone calls, and emails were flying, and praise was abundant! Repair of my aortic valve had not been a part of the pre-op discussions. God is amazing!!!

The next day, Dr. Z, a consultant cardiologist came by my room. Mom had talked with him by phone several times during pre-op consultation and he was a friend of my local cardiologist, Dr. Mehta. He spread his arms, smiled, and said, "Gaige, this is fantastic!"

My surgeons, Dr. P, and Dr. S, had explained in detail to my mom that the repair of the aortic valve had been possible. Dr. S said, "Gaige, in most cases with aortic stenosis, the valve looks like chewed-up beef jerky! This was not the case with you. We were able to trim the stenosis, reattach the valve, and go forward." The procedure that we expected to last eight-plus hours was completed in less than three hours with totally different results. Dr. S laughed and said, "Gaige, things changed so quickly that I did not have time to pull out my cell phone, but we do have a camera in the OR and I will see what I can do about pictures!"

It was necessary to remain in Cleveland to revisit the hospital in three days. Thursday arrived and we returned to have a chest x-ray and, in the words of the doctor, "a beautiful picture." We learned more about the surgical procedure in that the sternum was wired together and the wire would eventually be absorbed into the bone as it healed; stitches inside would dissolve, and the incision was glued. Amazing technology!

Restrictions were thoroughly explained for the upcoming weeks and a bit tough for a teen who had been driving to school, working a part-time job, going to the gym, and doing normal activities. A small price to pay to have all my own heart parts and be the recipient of a true miracle.

A follow-up visit with Dr. Mehta on July 17th was encouraging. He was thrilled and said, "Gaige, it is a miracle! It is the best of the best of the best!" He had been in phone consultation with Cleveland surgeons.

When school started, an unexpected side effect of the surgery involved my vocal cords and my ability to sing. I had been involved in school chorus and drama all during high school. During my recovery period, the time came to audition for the East Tennessee Chorus and my voice was not strong enough to qualify. This was concerning as auditions were approaching for a musical scholarship for entering East Tennessee State University in the fall of 2019. Once again, God blessed me with Mom securing a voice coach to help me regain vocal strength and qualify for a music scholarship for college and to qualify for East Tennessee Chorus the second time around. With my voice stronger, I was able to make a more joyful noise! He is always in the details of our lives!

Continued follow-up with a cardiologist will always be necessary and future procedures are possibilities. However, at the age of seventeen having the valve repair leaves the door open for other options in the future. Also, medical technology changes continuously. It is obvious, that my heart's desire would be for this surgery to last my lifetime, but that is in God's hands.

By the way, I did see pictures! To God be the glory!

My husband, Larry and I reside in Kingsport, TN and are members of Buffalo Ridge Baptist Church in Gray, TN. We grew up in Fall Branch, TN and were both saved at a young age. We have two children, Jonathan (Tammy), and Kala and one grandson, Gaige. I am a retired Administrative Assistant and have enjoyed serving in various Children and Ladies Ministries through the years.

Should Israel Seek A Cease-Fire With Hamas? By Jim Denison

Israeli forces made a major advance overnight toward Gaza City, marking their deepest push into Palestinian territory since they entered the strip last week. An Israeli soldier who was kidnapped by Hamas on October 7 was freed overnight during ground operations as well. Meanwhile, in a rare news briefing, Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu ruled out a cease-fire in Israel's conflict. He was answering calls for such action from the United Nations and



answering calls for such action from the United Nations and Amnesty International among others.

Critics of Israel's continuing military action against Hamas are responding to reports from the Gaza Health Ministry that the death toll among Palestinians has already passed eight thousand, mostly women and minors. Many doubt the veracity of this organization's numbers since it is run by Hamas, but the pictures of devastation in Gaza tell a tragic story of their own.

We should all grieve the loss of life in this conflict. However, Israel's military must contend with the fact that Hamas has hidden weapons under hospitals, schools, and mosques while disguising its fighters like civilians. Their strategy is intended to escalate Palestinian deaths and provoke an international backlash against Israel.

Hamas's strategy appears to be working. So, should Israel seek a cease-fire with Hamas?

"The next round of war will be inevitable"

As I have followed reporting on this conflict from a wide variety of sources and viewpoints, I found a New York Times guest essay by Dennis B. Ross to be especially informative. Mr. Ross served in the State Department under President George H. W. Bush, was the special Middle East coordinator under President Bill Clinton, and has served as a special advisor for the region as well. His article is headlined, "I Might Have Once Favored a Cease-Fire With Hamas, but Not Now." His central thesis: "It is clear to me that peace is not going to be possible now or in the future as long as Hamas remains intact and in control of Gaza. Hamas's power and ability to threaten Israel—and subject Gazan civilians to ever more rounds of violence—must end."

Ross notes that if Israel agrees to a cease-fire now, Hamas's military infrastructure, leadership, and control of Gaza will remain intact. As it did after conflicts with Israel in 2009, 2012, 2014, and 2021, the terrorist group will almost certainly rearm for the next conflict. It will be able to add to its system of tunnels running under the area as well.

As a result, he warns, "the next round of war will be inevitable, holding both Gazan citizens and much of the rest of the Middle East hostage to Hamas's aims." What makes this conflict different from those in the past? While the atrocities of October 7 have understandably heightened Israel's outrage and justify a much stronger military response than in previous conflicts, there is more to the story. "If we do not defeat Hamas, we cannot survive here"

As I have been reporting throughout this conflict, the aim of Hamas and Hezbollah, both of which are backed by Iran, is to eradicate Israel and reclaim the area for Palestine. However, these groups acting alone or in concert do not possess the military means to defeat Israel in a conventional war. Nor does Iran, even if it were to engage directly with the Israel Defense Forces.

But what they can do, as Ross notes, is to make Israel unlivable and thus drive Israelis to leave. This seems to be their clear goal now. Ross points to predictions by Ali Khamenei, Iran's supreme leader, that Israel will not survive another twenty-five years. And he quotes an Israeli commander who said after October 7, "If we do not defeat Hamas, we cannot survive here."

I understand the commander's sentiment in a way I would not if I had not led more than thirty study tours to Israel over nearly thirty years. Israel is a tiny country, approximately the size of New Jersey. Iran continues to arm Hamas and Hezbollah with ever more sophisticated technology now capable of launching missiles in such numbers that Israel's Iron Dome defenses cannot protect all their civilians in Tel Aviv, Jerusalem, and across the country. And the October 7 invasion shocked the Israelis, who believed their sophisticated military intelligence and powerful defense forces would protect them from such atrocities.

Israel's previous wars were fought by their soldiers against the soldiers of their enemies. Never before have so many civilians been slaughtered or taken hostage. All this to say, in the new world created by the October 7 invasion, if a cease-fire is declared and Hamas survives, Israelis will know that they and their families will be in danger in ways unprecedented in the nation's seventy-five-year history. "Be strong and courageous"

This fact is crucial to the calculus because so many Israelis live in Israel by choice. Theirs is one of the best-educated, most skilled workforces in the world. Every Israeli I have met would be imminently employable in any nation in the Western world. They have chosen to live in the State of Israel to secure a future for the Jewish people.

If the nation can no longer defend itself, its very reason for existence is in question. And the willingness of its citizens to risk their lives and their families could come into question as well, perhaps leading to an exodus of Israelis from the nation.

As a consequence, through a combination of more advanced weaponry and brutal terrorist attacks, Hamas and its allies have raised for the first time the specter of a world without the State of Israel as we know it. This is why my friends in Israel have said since Hamas's horrific October 7 invasion that these terrorists must be defeated. They understand firsthand what I have attempted to explain today: the future of the nation is now in the balance.

This fact leads me to conclude this Daily Article by asking you to join me in urgent, consistent intercession for Israel and her people.

- Pray that they will heed God's instruction to the military general who first led them into their promised land: "Be strong and courageous. Do not be frightened, and do not be dismayed" (Joshua 1:9a).
- Pray for Israeli forces to defeat the terrorists who threaten the future of their nation
- Pray for the protection of Palestinian and Israeli civilians in this conflict.
- And pray that all will turn to the one and only Prince of Peace (Isaiah 9:6) so they can testify, "The Lord God is my strength and my song, and he has become my salvation" (Isaiah 12:2).

Will you join me in such intercession right now?

But it is a virgin that the Lamb (Christ) is to marry. So, the wife (Israel) of the Old Testament cannot be the bride (virgin) of the New Testament. Again, the wife (Israel) is to reside in the earthly Jerusalem during the Millennium, while the bride (the Church) will reside in the New Jerusalem. These distinctions make it clear that Israel cannot be the 'Bride' of Christ. We must remember that John did not call the bride – [his]wife, until Revelation 21:9, which was after the marriage, when she was no longer a bride but a wife.

"The Bride of the Lamb is from a disowned and outcast race, made so by the disobedience of the head of that race in the Garden of Eden, but the bridegroom saw her and loved her. To redeem her he came from his own lovely home in heaven to her sin-cursed home on earth, where he was rejected by members of her family, seized and subjected to a mock trial, and nailed to a cross as a malefactor, where he laid down voluntarily his life for her, thus demonstrating his love, and opening up the way for her redemption from the law that held her in bondage. He then left her to return to his Father's house to prepare a home for her, and during the period of her betrothal he left her with his own family, simply sending the Holy Spirit to teach and protect her, and fit her for the day of her marriage, when he will descend into midair to meet her on her way to the bridal halls of heaven (I Thessalonians 4:16-17)."

What is described here is a sacred tapestry of divine love woven throughout both the Old and New Testaments. These two narratives are like two bright glistening stars in the vast cosmos of God's word.

The wife of the Lord, Israel, is characterized by her unfaithfulness, her infidelity. But her husband, the Lord, stands as a testament to enduring covenantal love. He pursues her relentlessly despite her harlotries. One day, in the latter days, he will win back her heart and she will come home to him.

The height and depth of the husband's love for his wife, Israel, is a poignant reflection of the divine grace that perseveres through the worst of human frailty and betrayal, promising a future where the flowers of reconciliation and restoration will bloom in the desert (Isaiah 35:1-2), streams will flow in the wasteland (Isaiah 45:2), and desolate land will be turned into a fruitful one (Ezekiel 36:35). God will restore Israel to himself and ultimately keep all of his promises to Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob.

In contrast, the Bride of Christ – that radiant assembly of believers from Pentecost to the Rapture – exemplifies the unspeakable redemptive and transformative power of Christ's sacrificial love, where he, the Lamb of God, voluntarily and substitutionally laid down his life to redeem and purify his beloved. These two extraordinary love stories, one from ancient times and the other from the dawn of the New Covenant resonate with the timeless message of God's passionate pursuit of sinners alienated and separated from him.

No wonder the Marriage of the Lamb and the tremendous celebration that follows it, the Marriage Supper, is announced with mighty praises, gladness, and exuberance!

Larkin adds, "If there is joy in heaven over one sinner who repents (Luke 15:7), and that joy is the joy of the Father, how much greater will be the joy of the Father when he shall behold the consummation of his plan for his Son in his marriage to his Bride, the Church."

It is also notable that Jesus began his ministry by attendance at a wedding – the most joyous occasion in Jewish life. What does this say about the Lord's relationship with joy and happiness? It suggests that both, including their accompanying synonyms, are God's great desire for his people, the Church.

Something the late James Montgomery Boice, once pastor of the renowned Tenth Presbyterian Church in Philadelphia, said about Jesus' attendance at the wedding in Cana is truly a breath of fresh air and a departure from ordinary thought

Boice asked, why do you suppose Jesus was invited to the wedding? His answer? "Jesus was always welcomed among those who were having a good time." There you have it. Jesus enjoyed a wholesome good time and he enjoyed it when others were having the same.

Delight, elation, gladness, thrill, exultation, glee, jubilation, gaiety, and merriment, are at the heart of the Christian experience, and there is every reason for this to be the case. The believer's sins, past, present, and future are completely covered and forgiven by Christ's atoning blood. The Spirit of God is always present to comfort, instruct, and lead. Everything bad that comes into the child of God's life is seized by God's grace and overruled for good. Any meaningful loss suffered shall be overturned at the resurrection. There is the assurance of heaven's bliss and the glories of eternal life. What joy!!!

Someone once summed it up, saying, "If you are without Christ, you have nothing, if you have Christ, you have everything you need and more."

The Psalmist said, "You will show me the way of life, granting me the joy of your presence and the pleasures of living with you forever" (Psalmist 16:11). Jesus expressed his desire for his disciples to experience his joy and for their joy to be complete through their relationship with him. He said, "I have told you these things so that you will be filled with my joy. Yes, your joy will overflow!" (John 15:11). The apostle Paul said the fruit of God's Spirit working in someone's life is joy (Galatians 5:22-23). Paul admonished, "Always be full of joy in the Lord. I say it again—rejoice!" (Philippians 4:4)

Boice continues: "I am afraid that if some Christians I know were the pattern, there would be very little to expect of true happiness or good times in the Christian life. Some Christians go around with grim looks and long faces. If they ever find themselves in the company of someone else who is having a good time, they immediately suspect that the cause of the fun is either illegal, immoral, or fattening. Jesus was not like that. He did not condemn those who were enjoying

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themselves, and he was not jealous of them. As a result, he was welcome at their gatherings...I believe, of course, that there may be environments from which most Christians should stand free. Yet we often apply that thought adversely and forget to be cheerful. Charles Spurgeon once wrote to his students: 'Sepulchral tones may fit a man to be an undertaker, but Lazarus is not called out of his grave by hollow moans.'"

Christians who make up the Bride of Christ should be characterized by cheerfulness. The Marriage Supper of the Lamb, which follows the Marriage of the Lamb and is in the future of every lover of Christ. It's going to be the biggest, most extravagant, fun-filled, joyous party and celebration known to humanity. So, whatever is happening, no matter how bad, for the believer it's not going to last and the best is yet to come! Oh, happy day!

Here comes the bride, said the apostle John. She "has prepared herself. She has been given the finest of pure white linen to wear. For the fine linen represents the good deeds of God's holy people" (Revelation 19:8).

Lady Diana Spencer, who became Princess Diana upon her marriage to Prince Charles, made extensive preparations for her wedding in 1981. Her wedding gown was the most memorable. It was fashioned with ivory silk taffeta and featured a fitted bodice, a voluminous skirt with layers of tulle and lace, a 25-foot train, and puffed sleeves. It was adorned with thousands of hand-sewn pearls and sequins. Her gown was a masterpiece and Lady Diana, the Bride radiated an ethereal and timeless beauty that left the entire world spellbound.

In the days of old, a bride would make her own wedding garment. The idea of the bride preparing herself suggests the preparation and sanctification of believers. It implies that followers of the Savior have actively participated in their spiritual growth and readiness for his return. The fine linen of the bride's gown represents the righteous acts of God's holy people. These righteous acts are an important aspect of the believer's life and preparation for the Marriage of the Lamb.

In Exploring Revelation, the late John Phillips wrote: "During his earthly pilgrimage, the believer prepares himself for this day. The garments that beautify the bride are said to be given to her because any good work, any righteous deed, any praiseworthy act we do is the work of the Holy Spirit in us. 'Work out your own salvation,' says Paul; then he adds at once, 'It is God which works in you both to will and do of his good pleasure' (Philippians 2:12-13). The righteous acts of the true church, performed while on earth and from which the world benefits more than it knows, becomes the fine linen, clean and white in which the bride is arrayed to go forth to meet her groom."

The late Charles C. Ryrie, in his book Revelation, has added the bride is the bride because of the righteousness of Christ, the bride's wedding gown will be made up of the righteous deeds that she has done in life.

Revelation, apocalyptic literature, doesn't speak directly about the Judgment Seat of Christ, which is a judgment of believers. This teaching is explained, mostly by the apostle Paul, in other New Testament passages.

The believer's judgment takes place in heaven before the Marriage of the Lamb and the Marriage Supper (I Corinthians 3:10-15; I Corinthians 4:5; II Corinthians 5:10).

The Judgment Seat of Christ will sort everything out. The bride must be made ready and prepared. All of her works must be judged as to their purity. She must be purged of works done in the Lord's name which were of mixed or tainted motives, only what was done wholly for the glory of God will be left to adorn her on that blessed day when she and her beloved are forever joined.

Yes, indeed, as the angel proclaimed with excitement, "Blessed are those who are invited."

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

Q: Why do so many intellectuals have a hard time trusting the Bible? It seems all they can do is tear it down and suggest that anyone who believes its truth is anti-intellectual.

A: From the writings of the Rev. Billy Graham

The Gospel is not anti-intellectual. It demands the use of the mind, but the mind is affected by sin, whether that mind is of superior intelligence or average. A person may be intellectually brilliant, but

spiritually ignorant. "A natural person does not accept the things of the Spirit of God; ... and he cannot understand them, because they are spiritually discerned" (1 Corinthians 2:14, NASB).

An intellectual mind can be turned into a first-class mind when Christ penetrates the heart. Some years ago, one of the most brilliant men in the world was reported to have an IQ of 208 with over 140 patents with a world-leading company. He even attempted theoretically to reconstruct the human brain. He became completely bewildered and shaken, however, when confronted with the complexity and utter impossibility of such a reconstruction. He didn't know what to do or where to run. His choice was twofold: either the human brain came about by a fantastic chance or by intelligent planning. When faced with the alternative he knew he had only one choice, and he became a believer in God as it was revealed to him through Jesus Christ, whose intellect he could not surpass.

Many people of great intelligence will not accept Christ as their Savior because they cannot prove His existence, yet the plain truth is that God cannot be proved by intellectual arguments alone. If the human mind could fully prove God, He would be no greater than the mind who proves Him!

We may not understand everything in the Bible, but God will give us faith to believe. We must allow faith to go beyond our intellect, receiving His words as the inspired Word of God.

Joint Statement From Burke County Board Of Commissioners And Burke County Board Of Education Regarding School Funding And Teacher Supplements


MORGANTON, NC – With the passing of Senate Bill 68 into law (SL 2023-143), Burke County Public Schools plans to increase supplemental pay for teachers.


The Burke County Board of Education and the Burke County Board of Commissioners came together in early September for a joint resolution to repeal 40-year-old legislation that restricted funding streams for Burke County Public Schools. Under the previous law, certain sales taxes in Burke County were restricted to school capital projects. Now that the old legislation has been repealed, the school district has the choice to use the funds for operational expenses. With the help of Burke County Commissioners, \$1.5 million can now go toward teacher supplements, which will impact the recruiting and retention of qualified educators. Both boards worked together diligently to research and repeal the decades-long law now aligning Burke County to fund schools as most other counties in the state.

Burke County Board of Commissioners Chair Scott Mulwee said, "By reconciling differences and working together to re-establish local control of school funding, we can now move forward and do what is right for teachers by increasing their supplements and students by increasing per pupil funding."

Burke County Board of Education Chair Wendi Craven said, "We appreciate stakeholder feedback during the process and for county commissioners providing the opportunity to the school board to make this decision that will benefit teachers and our schools for decades to come. We would also like to thank Senator Warren Daniel and Representative Hugh Blackwell for their work in getting this action swiftly through legislation and repealing the decade's old laws."

So, Send I You

"For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish, but have eternal life. For God did not send the Son into the world to judge the world, but that the world might be saved through Him." (John 3:16-17, NASB)



That wonderful and powerful message is the foundation of the gospel of Jesus Christ. It is a story that is recounted not only during Christmas but throughout the year. The story of Christmas begins, out of necessity, with this proclamation of a God who loves us so much that He sent to us a Savior, One who would save us from our sins. Loving Father God sent us a redeemer and deliverer, One who came not to judge, but to set us free from the yoke, penalty, and burden of sin. God sent His Son! And although this seems to imply that God is far off, nothing could be further from the truth. Almighty, Sovereign, and Creator God is constantly present. He is, by His own nature, omnipresent and omnipotent; that is, He is able to be present at all times and places and He is able to know and perceive all things. Almighty God is also all-powerful. He is, after all, the Alpha and the Omega, the beginning and the end. He has, according to the compelling stories written throughout the Word of God, always been present and has always sent His love and care to mankind. God is not far off! He has always been present in the world that He created! Mankind's problem is that we are separated from Him by our sins. The sending of a Savior reminds us that God broke through the lines of separation and offered sinful humanity salvation, reconciliation, hope, and love. He sought after broken mankind.

Why did God come seeking after us? Because we were lost in sin and without hope! Why did God desire to save or redeem us? Because God loves His crowning and most cherished creation—even when we became darkened by evil and separated from Him by sinful rebellion.

Remember what happened with Adam and Eve. They fell for Satan's lies and were tricked into rejecting Sovereign God's presence and eternal love and care. The result was sin, separation, and spiritual death. However, in the right time, God's time, our great, powerful, and loving God was willing to do what no one or nothing else could do—redeem and save His creation from eternal separation and sin. To accomplish that, God, the Father, SENT His presence in visible human form into this lost and dark world of humanity to seek and save us.

It is crucial to note that the very same Sovereign God who loves and provides salvation for his creation also judges them for their sin and rebellion. The Word of God warns (Romans 3:23), "For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God." Romans 6:23 declares, "For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord." God's creation, separated by their sin, needed a Savior—for they could not save themselves from the pronouncement of judgment stamped upon them by sin. And they could not, by any means or devices, span the spiritual distance created as a result of their rebellion. Only God could! And out of His love, He drew near! He broke through, bridging the gap, visiting the down and out, speaking out His love and care to all who were lost and separated from the Father by sin. He came and dwelt among His very own creation. And in order to accomplish this, God took on human flesh. His name, as prophesied by scripture, would be Jesus. The name Jesus means "One who saves." He was called both "Son of man" (indicating the essence of His existence as fully man) and "Son of God" (indicating the essence of His existence as fully God). How could that be: fully God and fully man? The essence of the makeup and character of Jesus could only be accomplished by an eternal, powerful, sovereign, and loving Creator God.

The Gospels make it absolutely clear that Jesus, the Son of God came to redeem and to save. "...that whoever believes in Him will not perish but have everlasting life. For God did not send the Son into the world to judge (condemn) the world, but that the world might be saved through Him.'

The Gospels also make it abundantly clear that this same Jesus who was sent, also himself sends. That's where you and I come in. We, who are redeemed and saved from the penalty of our sins; we who have been reconciled to Holy God by the blood of Jesus and have been claimed as spiritual sons and daughters of God; we who have been filled with His Holy Spirit and have been placed together in the Body of Christ—we too, like God's Son, are sent to this dark and lost world with the wonderful message of a love so great that our God was willing to pay our price for sin.

God is still sending! When the resurrected Lord appeared to His disciples who were hunkered down and filled with fear, He spoke these words, "Peace be with you." And then He said (John 20:21), "Peace be with you; as the Father has sent Me, I also send you." A disciple of Jesus Christ has a divine calling as a messenger of this gospel. You and I are sharers of the message of Jesus Christ. Our message to the world is God's message. It is the message that God came into this world to redeem and to save! God drew near! That is the message of Christmas! God sent His Son (God in flesh) into this world to both: walk among us demonstrating the genuineness and power of God's love, and to lay down His human life as a propitiation or sin offering. Only as Christ laid down His life as the perfect, sinless Lamb of God would the sufficient price be paid for all of the sins of all of

But there is a catch! Only those who see Him as God's Savior, Redeemer, and Lord, will receive the gift of forgiveness and be reconciled to God. And those who do trust in Jesus are then sent out to share the wonderful news of a Savior. Just as Isaiah captured this truth, so must the spiritual children of God respond to His

God's question and command. "Whom shall I send and who will go for Us? We answer the Savior and declare, "Here am I, send me!"

Should Your Church Start a School?

In recent decades, both churches and youth have faced significant challenges. Across the board, church attendance has seen a concerning decline, particularly among young people. Additionally, many teens who do attend church often drift away after graduation.



It is not surprising that the decline in church attendance parallels the worrisome decline in adolescent well-being. The prevalence of social media platforms, celebrity idol worship, drugs, alcohol, and pornography simultaneously connect and isolate our youth.

Furthermore, research indicates that religious children often lose their faith while under the supervision of parents who believe they are effectively transmitting their religious values.

Many churches are struggling to attract and keep youth engaged. Denominational leaders and church growth consultants have been promoting various "revitalization" ideas, with varying degrees of success.

This disheartening situation calls for a proactive response to shape future generations with culture-transforming, Christian worldview thinking.

To prevent the next generation of Christian children from falling away, we must create an environment that allows them to be educated in alignment with Christian values

It is no longer sufficient to rely solely on the brief hour or two spent at church on Sundays to counterbalance the influence of secular school culture during the remaining 35 hours of the week.

Outsourcing the education of our children to the state is no longer the best option, as it often fails to prioritize the values of the church and the home.

So, what can a church do? Is starting a school within the church an option worth considering? Is it an affordable option?

Fortunately, there is good news. The North Carolina General Assembly has made religious schooling economically feasible by significantly expanding the Opportunity Scholarship Program. This program now offers tuition assistance to all students in the Tar Heel state.

Scholarship amounts are determined based on family income, with low and middle-income families receiving the largest awards. This expansion benefits parents who previously could not afford private school tuition for their children.

For the 2023-2024 school year, students are eligible for scholarship grants from \$3,246 to \$7,213.

Since the advent of North Carolina's voucher program a decade ago, numerous churches across the state started schools while others expanded existing schools. Private school enrollment has surged and has significantly outpaced the percentage of growth in traditional public schools.

Most of the scholarship money already goes to religious schools. Statewide, more than two-thirds of private school students are now attending religious schools.

The State Education Assistance Authority (SEAA) oversees the distribution of scholarship funds, which are paid directly to the schools.

Private Christian schools maintain their own academic, religious, and admission standards; and their First Amendment rights are fully protected. The state respects the autonomy of non-public schools in terms of religious and educational philosophies

Many church buildings remain underutilized during the school week, offering potential space for classrooms, food service facilities, and recreational areas. Remodeling or constructing additional facilities to accommodate more students is an option, as is sharing space with nearby churches or leasing additional space.

Private schools have the flexibility to determine class sizes, and research suggests that smaller class sizes lead to better academic outcomes.

With the availability of the Opportunity Scholarship Program, churches should seize the opportunity to invest in a Christian school and extend their reach into the community.

Christian education offers numerous benefits, including better academic outcomes, lower costs, and the development of discipline and moral foundations that have become scarce in public schools.

With the monopoly on public education funds held by government-run schools, parents often find themselves ineffective in influencing curricula and values. By utilizing the scholarship vouchers, parents can choose schools that align with their beliefs and more effectively pass on their faith to their children.

To address the crisis faced by struggling churches and youth, establishing a Christian school within your church can be a powerful solution. Education plays a significant role in shaping children's beliefs and identity,

Starting a Christian school allows churches to actively engage and educate youth in alignment with Christian values. It is a valuable investment that aligns with the mission of the church and provides a much-needed alternative to secular education.

The Coming One

"A shoot will come up from the stump of Jesse; from his roots, a Branch will bear fruit. The Spirit of the Lord will rest on him — the Spirit of wisdom and understanding, the Spirit of counsel and might, the Spirit of the knowledge and fear of the Lord — and he will delight in the fear of the Lord."



Isaiah 11:1-2. It is not difficult for us to see that this is a clear prediction of the Lord Jesus. Here in these opening verses is a hint that the Messiah will appear in history in a very obscure way. That is suggested by this word; a shoot will come up from the stump of Jesse. Like a great tree that has been cut down, the ancestry of Jesus represented in David and his father Jesse has been reduced to obscurity and insignificance. But out of that lowly stump will arise a shoot, a single sprout, a man who will, as the prophet goes on to say, be filled with the Spirit of God and who will do a great work in the land. When our Lord is referred to as the son of David in the gospels, it is always in terms of royal glory, but when he is called the stump of Jesse, it is a reference to his humble beginnings. The prophet not only sees the ancestry of Jesus, but he sees him in his Spirit-filled ministry. The Spirit of the Lord shall rest on him, he says.

That Spirit consists of three pairs of characteristics. As you observe these pairs more closely, you can see that they describe Jesus of Nazareth. The first pair, the spirit of wisdom and knowledge, speak of his amazing insight into human affairs. Wisdom is the knowledge of the nature of things, while understanding is the awareness of the differences between them. How clearly Jesus reflected these in his ministry! One of the symbols of our age is the therapist's couch. Therapists have their patients lie on a couch and ask them questions to understand their problems. But our Lord never used a couch for he never had to ask questions. John's gospel tells us that Jesus didn't need any man to tell him what was in man because he knew man. The second pair, the spirit of counsel and might, speak of authority. Counsel is the ability to give good and right advice, while might is the ability to help carry it out. This is described even more fully in the words in verse three, He shall not judge by what his eyes see, or decide by what his ears hear... What a wonderful description of Jesus as he met with people. He spoke of the truth that you can never find out by human powers. He described how the angels live, what happens after death, how prayer works, and how the devil works. These he described with full authority. He did not have to study reference books but rather spoke so that men hearing him said, "No man ever spake like this man." (John 7:46) The third pair, the spirit of knowledge and the fear of the Lord, speak of our Lord's intimate relationship with the Father. Out of that flows the marvelous serenity of his life. He is never taken by surprise. He always seems to be a master of the occasion. This grows out of his full awareness of the mind of God. He said on one occasion, "You do not know Him, but I know Him" (John 8:55). He came to reveal to us the mind of the Father, the graciousness, compassion, truthfulness, and faithfulness of God. All grew out of his knowledge of the Lord and his fear of the Lord. Gracious Father, I thank you for these amazing words from this ancient book. How accurately they picture One who has come to mean more than all else to me. I thank you for the confirmation of the Spirit to my own heart that these words can be fulfilled in me as well In profoundly awesome humility Jesus came as one of us to make us one with Him. Are we learning that His power is perfected in our weakness?

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Making a Difference

By Beginning a New Life

2 Corinthians 5:17 says, "Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new." Since we are living in perilous times, we need some people who can make a difference in this sinful and wicked time in which we find ourselves.



Everything in the spiritual realm begins with personal salvation. There are several things we know about salvation from the Scriptures. Let me give you some of what the Bible reveals about our personal redemption.

It is a free gift. Ephesians 2:8-9 says: "For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: not of works, lest any man should boast." "Grace" is God giving man what he does not deserve or merit, while "mercy" is God holding back what mankind actually deserves. It is clearly evident that God delights in mercy because Micah 7:18 says, "Who is a God like unto thee, that pardoneth iniquity, and passeth by the transgression of the remnant of his heritage? he retaineth not his anger forever, because he delighteth in mercy."

It is a satisfying gift. Psalms 107:9 reminds us, "For he satisfieth the longing soul, and filleth the hungry soul with goodness." The word "satisfieth" has this meaning: it is something that satisfies you; it gives you something that you want or need. Since there is so little satisfaction found among people today, that makes satisfaction a rare and important matter. Too many folks today are failing to be satisfied since they are looking in the wrong places for what will not satisfy their longing soul.

It is a permanent gift. Romans 6:23 states, "For the wages of sin is death; but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord." The only life God offers to the believing sinner is "eternal" life; He has no temporal life to offer in the spiritual realm. One day the believer may die physically, but since he has eternal life, he cannot die spiritually. What a precious and wonderful salvation we received from a generous and loving God! We are going to take a few minutes to think about what becomes new according to 2 Corinthians 5:17.

New Position-In Christ

The Bible says, "If any man be in Christ." It would help us greatly and thoroughly bless us if we understand what it means to be in Christ.

It involves how God sees us. We need to remember how God looks at us. Since we have believers, He sees us clothed in the righteousness of the Lord Jesus Christ. Remember in the Garden of Eden how our first parents, Adam and Eve, sinned against the Lord. As a result of that sin, God clothed them in animal skins, which is a picture of Christ shedding His atoning blood at Calvary so we might be freed and released from our sin (Genesis 3:21). Animal skins were provided for Adam and Eve after they had sinned. God has made provision to set all sinners free who would come to Him for release and forgiveness from them.

It also involves what we have done with the Gospel. Christ made salvation possible for all men who would repent and believe (Jn. 3:16). He makes an offer of salvation and gives every man a degree of light who comes into the world. John 1:8-9 reveals: "He (John) was not that Light but was sent to bear witness of that Light (Jesus). That was the true Light, which lighteth every man that cometh into the world." Every person born into this world is given a degree of light. What he does with it will be determined by how much additional light a person receives. The more light you respond favorably to, the more you are given. We either receive Christ or reject Him; man does have a choice in the matter.

It involves a switch. Suddenly, when we were born again, we were hidden in the righteousness of Christ. It is only when we are in Christ that the sin debt we had is canceled, our relationship with God is restored, and our eternity is secured. John 20:31 declares, "But these are written, that ye might believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and that believing ye might have life through his name." New Person in Christ

Notice the words "a new creature." The word for "creature" is also translated in our KJV as "creation". "Creature is translated creation in five verses in our New Testament (Mk. 10:6; Mk.13:19; Rom.1:20; Rom. 8:22; 2 Peter 3:4; Rev.3:14). In each instance, it speaks of the creation of the creating ability of God. Fabricating and founding in original form is what is expressed.

Twice in the Bible, there is a reference to a "new man". Ephesians 4:24 commands us: "And that ye put on the new man, which after God is created in righteousness and true holiness." It is God when we are born from above that creates a new man and a new nature inside of us. Due to what God does within us, it should not surprise us that we take on a whole new person. The old person is still there, but there is a new man created by God on the inside, producing heavenly, godly desires in us.

The other reference to the new man is found in Colossians 3:10 where the Bible says, "And have put on the new man, which is renewed in knowledge after the image of him that created him." The new believer has a new man to put on (the new self). The new self is constantly being renewed (present-continual tense) in order to keep it victorious over sin. The new self was created to be like God. We become more and more like the Lord as our new natures are refreshed, as we yield to the sanctifying work of the Holy Ghost.

III. New Passings In Christ

Note the words "Old things are passed away." What do those five words suggest to us?

The words "passed away" means go away or to go by. What has passed away in the one who receives new life from Christ?

Old thoughts have passed away. I am not saying we never have evil thoughts, but they are not welcome to stay in the life of a true child of God. We do not submit to them like we did before our conversion. We are told what to think about in Philippians 4:8: "Finally, brethren, whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report; if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these things." What you think will determine what your life will become.

Old principles have passed away. As new creatures, we have principles that govern our lives that are so much different than before we were saved. To accurately define a principle, we know it is a basic rule about what is right and morally good. Our values drastically change when we receive a divine nature (2 Pet. 1:4). For instance, the Apostle Paul, before he met Christ on the Damascus Road, had no problem with persecuting Christians. He even delivered them to their deaths. Values changed after he met Jesus and he began to love those whom he once hated. He poured out his life to propagate the Gospel of Christ that he once hated.

Old companions have passed away. Instead of running with people who would tear down our faith if they could, our companions become people who love the Lord and His Word. Due to the change in Paul's life, his companions became Gentiles who loved the Lord. Paul felt like David as seen in Psalms 119:63: "I am a companion of all them that fear thee and of them that keep thy precepts." That is exactly how Paul the Apostle felt.

Old aims have passed away. Once we really know the Lord. We aim to do all we do to the glory of God. Paul said, "Whether therefore ye eat, or drink, or whatsoever ye do, do all to the glory of God" (1 Cor. 10:31). Before conversion, we lived to gratify ourselves instead of glorifying God.

Since the old things have passed away, new practices have entered into our lives. What was not true of us before our salvation experience, is true of us now. We love the church and want to attend it; we love the Bible and want to study and obey it; we love sinners and want to see them saved; we love the Lord and want to wholly follow Him.

If you make a difference in this ungodly society, that will begin at the time of your salvation, after you have repented of your sin and trusted Christ as your personal Savior.

Under the Old Cherry Tree

Under the Old Cherry Tree one weekend, several years ago, we had some of the worst wind we've had in a while here in these mountains. As the old saying goes; "Sounded like a freight train coming through the valley!" The loud gusty winds kept many awake through the night hours and many folks lost power due to downed trees.



My brother called me on Sunday morning that weekend to inform me that a tree had fallen on my parent's house. We made plans to meet there after church to assess the damage it may have done. Fortunately and by God's grace, only the top of the old cherry tree was lying upon the house. If the tree had fallen a little to one side or the other it could have caused some significant damage either to the house or a tool shed. Daddy and Mama got quite a rude awakening around 2 a.m. that morning. We all are very thankful that everyone was kept safe.

It's been a while since I had looked at the old tree. It stood on the bank above my parent's house at the edge of my grandmother's old home place (That's Mammie's house for those of you who knew her). We were surprised at how large the tree had grown. Thinking about the old tree back in the days of my youth brought back many memories.

Mammie had placed an old large milk container in the forks of the tree for a little laying hen. The little hen would only allow Mammie to get the eggs. She would reach in and pick up the hen and cradle it in one arm. While she talked to the hen to calm it down, she gently reached in and retrieved the fresh eggs inside. The little hen never fussed much at all.

One fork of the tree grew out to the left and upward. We managed to get a rope swing on the large limb. There was a wooden board for a seat. Though the limb itself was only 10 or 12 feet off the ground, to a young boy it was very high! All of us grandchildren spent many hours playing and swinging under that cherry tree. Personally, I remember many times around dusk dark in the hot summer days, swinging slowly and letting my feet drag in the dry, dusty ground underneath the swing.

Not only did we swing in the old tree, but we climbed a lot too. In those days telling a boy not to climb a tree was like trying to tell a bear not to sleep in the woods. Boys and tree climbing were like peanut butter and jelly, they just went well together! The challenge each time we climbed was to see if we could get higher than we did the last time. The fear of being so high also brought the satisfaction of knowing you had conquered that fear and reached higher than ever! I still remember having trembling hands and a nervous stomach after climbing down. Even so, the next time we would try again.

In the years when the frost didn't kill the bloom, the tree yielded some of the best-tasting cherries. When the cherries ripened we would climb and pick some to eat while playing. We helped Mammie pick cherries for cobblers and pies. The smell of those baking in the oven was one I'll never forget. We often ate too many of the fresh cherries and got the "belly ache", if you know what I mean! When it was about time for the cherries to start ripening, Mammie would sit on the porch with a shotgun and blast the blackbirds to keep them from getting her cherries. I don't think she ever realized she was probably blasting more cherries out of the tree than blackbirds!

The old tree had provided food, shade in the summer, and a playground for us grandchildren. Now it will provide some firewood to Daddy and Mama after it seasons out. As we were cutting and cleaning up some of the old tree, I have to admit that a sad feeling sort of came upon me. Sad because the times that have passed can never be visited again except in our memories. It's sad also that a lot of the family who made those memories so special aren't with us now. Even though it's sad in a way, God also reminds me to be thankful. Thankful that I had a family to love and that loved me. Thankful that we had a Godly grandmother to set such an example of faith for us to follow. Thankful we have a Savior who gives us the hope of being reunited one day.

On the way over that day, I shared with my boys many of the memories I have of the old cherry tree. It's amazing how God uses things from our past to bless us in the present. He even uses the memories that happened under an Old Cherry Tree.

Rampin' Up and our other outreaches demonstrate that NCBAM, along with its supporters and partners, remain in "full force"— and will continue to impact lives for years to come.

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
A Man of Few Words

It's Linus quoting verbatim the K.J.V. of Luke 2:8-14 in response to Charlie Brown's frustrated cry, "Isn't there anyone who knows what Christmas is all about?"

As many times as you've watched Linus give that speech, have you ever noticed a particular thing that he does as part of it? Immediately following his voicing of the words, "Fear not" he drops his trusty blanket and doesn't pick it up again until he has finished the speech. It's as if he instinctively understands that you don't need a security blanket when you know that Jesus is on the scene.

Charles Schulz, the creator of the Peanuts series, converted to Christianity after returning home from serving in World War II. He read theological commentaries the way other people read popular novels, and he taught Sunday School at the churches he attended. He even led one class through a study of the entire Old Testament. He never became the hardcore fundamentalist type and no doubt he would have been labeled "too liberal" by many Christians, but he was never shy about lacing his daily comic strip with references to God and scripture. According to one online article, 560 of the nearly 17,800 Peanuts strips contain some type of religious, spiritual, or theological reference. Schulz himself once said, "I preach in these cartoons, and I reserve the same rights to say what I want to say as the minister in the pulpit."

"A Charlie Brown Christmas" first aired on December 9, 1965, and the fact that its climatic moment was a speech that simply quoted a portion of the Biblical account of the birth of Jesus was downright shocking for the time. Other holiday specials, especially those aimed at kids, were content to major upon Santa Claus, reindeer, Christmas trees, presents, family, etc. But not only did "A Charlie Brown Christmas" present the story of Christ's birth, it also condemned the crass commercialism of Christmas. Let's face it, that was pretty radical stuff for the time. For that matter, it still is today.

So, let me encourage you to go to YouTube, call up Linus' famous speech, and watch for the precise moment when he purposely drops his blanket. You can view the whole scene in under two minutes, and it will be time well spent. Even more importantly, I would encourage you to drop any worldly security blankets to which you are clinging and instead place your complete trust in the Savior of whom Linus speaks. Just as that angel of the Lord wanted the arrival of Jesus to dispel all fear from the hearts of those shepherds on that night so long ago, fear and Jesus shouldn't coexist in your heart, either. I'm not saying that the world isn't a scary place that is filled with frightening things and frightening people, but I am saying that you don't need a blanket in your hand when you truly have Jesus in your heart.


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

The True Nature of God

It is hard for people to relate to God when they don't know what He is like. Many people have opinions about Him. They think He is angry, that He is hard to please. They say things like "God's going get you" as if He is looking for a reason to punish us. They think that God is violent. They think He is a God who wants to send judg-



ment. They think He causes storms, hurricanes, and floods. They think He sends sickness and disease to punish people or to teach them a lesson. They believe that He causes everything to happen in their lives due to His sovereign perfect will. But they do not understand the true nature of God.

Some people also look at the wars in the Old Testament and think that God is angry and that He likes punishment and death. But that couldn't be further from the truth. Let's think about the USA for example. As a nation America is approximately 239 years old. Research shows that as of 2015 the USA has been involved in war 222 years out of its 239 years of existence. This means that for 93% of its existence, America has been at war. More than 1.1 million American lives have been lost in these 239 years.

If you were to judge America by those numbers some people might conclude that Americans love to fight and kill and that they are angry and mean. People from other countries who do not know or understand the culture, constitution, or reasoning behind some of these wars, may think that we are money-hungry, greedy, evil people who should mind their own business. But I believe that those people would be getting a totally wrong impression of the USA as a whole.

It is the same way with God. We are judging events that happened over 4000 years (not 239), that happened in different countries, in different cultures, and under different covenants. We read these stories through our outside perspectives and judge without a full understanding of the people and God. We read these stories and instantly concluded that God is mean, cruel, angry, hateful, and hard to please.

I believe that in the same way that people can have a wrong impression of America and Americans, people, even good church-going people, can have a wrong impression of God. These misunderstandings have marred people's view of the true nature of God.

The most important relationship is our relationship with God. How you perceive Him, you will receive Him. Who He is to you, is who He will be through you. So, understanding His true nature is pivotal to our relationship with God.

Psalm 86:15 (NIV) "But you, O Lord, are a compassionate and gracious God, slow to anger, abounding in love and faithfulness."

Psalm 106:1 "Praise the Lord! Oh, give thanks to the Lord, for He is good! For His mercy endures forever."

From these two verses alone, we can see that God is compassionate, gracious, slow to anger, abounding in love, faithful, good, and merciful. This is the true nature of God.

In Hebrews 1:3 (NIV) we see that "*The Son is the radiance of God's glory and the exact representation of his being."* This means that Jesus the Son is exactly like Father God. If you want to know what God the Father is like, look at the life of Jesus. Jesus came to reveal the Father's heart of God towards mankind.

"Our goal is to help people who have struggled with addiction and faced the impact of incarceration overcome the inner and outer barriers they face and build a brighter future for themselves and their families." "There is nothing better than seeing people discover the value God's love has for them as they become positive contributors to their families and the entire community."

The Yancey County reentry office will offer a variety of services, including:

- Basic needs: Staff and volunteers will provide immediate needs such as food, clothing, shelter, hygiene, etc.
- Case management: Staff and volunteers will work with individuals to develop a one-year personalized life plan that addresses every short-term and long-term need they have.
- Employment assistance: Staff and volunteers will help individuals find and secure employment.
- Housing assistance: Staff and volunteers will help individuals find and secure housing.
- Legal assistance: Staff and volunteers will provide referrals to legal services.
- Substance use/mental health treatment: Staff and volunteers will provide referrals to substance use/mental health treatment programs for individuals who need them.
- Community support system development: Staff and volunteers will work with churches, community organizations, and community addiction support resources such as Celebrate Recovery, AA, and other programs to help individuals build new and positive support systems into their lives.

The office will also offer support groups and workshops for individuals and families impacted by incarceration.

"We believe that everyone deserves a second chance," said Linc Vance, Yancey County Reentry Coordinator. "Our reentry office is a place where people who have faced incarceration can find the support and resources they need to succeed in life."



Linc Vance, a native of Avery County, and his family have lived in Yancey County for the past 24 years. Linc recently retired from the Department of Adult Corrections where he served as a corrections officer for 9 years and a probation officer for 20 years. Upon his retirement this year, Linc felt led to apply for the position of Yancey County Reentry Coordinator. "I feel like God has spent the past 20 years preparing me for this mission field," said Linc Vance. We are very excited to have Linc as the Yancey County Reentry Coordinator.



New Budget Targets Behavioral Health

For longer than I care to remember, North Carolina has had significant, unmet needs in behavioral and mental health support. Those needs continue to be one of our most serious circumstances and the area also continues as a serious focus of mine. Although clearly much remains to be done, especially in the area of policy on how to effectively and best deal with those with behavioral or mental health needs, the new state budget does place renewed focus on such concerns. Especially if you, family, or friends may be troubled by such issues, here are some highlights that we must hope will move us in the right direction over the next two years:

- \$50 million dollars to incentivize healthcare workers to serve rural counties such as those in the West, by offering education loan repayment and salary bonuses.
- \$20 million to expand the Innovation Waivers program to an additional 350 people who are currently on the waitlist. I have been advocating for the expansion of this program to additional persons on the waitlist and will continue to do so. However, I am told that a lack of caregivers keeps us from including more.
- \$120 million to increase hourly rates for Direct Care Practitioners who work with those, generally living at home, who already have a slot in the Innovation Waiver program. Hopefully, this will help to increase the supply of caregivers, thereby allowing for more waiver slots to be granted.
- \$130 million to increase rates for Medicaid providers working with substance use disorder, mental health, and intellectual/developmental disabilities. This is an effort to encourage more providers to participate in Medicaid where there is a long-standing shortage, too.
- \$15.6 million to expand the Transitions to Community Living program that provides Innovation Waiver-type services to the mentally ill. Given our persistent lack of inpatient options for the mentally ill, a community treatment setting with proper medical oversight may offer promise.
- \$40 million for signing and retention bonuses for state-operated hospital staff positions at facilities such as Broughton Hospital and the J. Iverson Riddle Center, both severely understaffed at present.
- \$80 million to provide support for families with special needs children and to strengthen specialized behavioral health treatment.

Dear Dave,

My husband and I want to do a live-in and flip real estate purchase. The idea is to buy a fixer-upper and rent out the basement to help with the mortgage payments. How do you feel about ideas like this?



Dear Erin,

In a situation like this, you need to do a basic business analysis. You've got to have a plan in place, and you've got to figure out the worst-case scenario. Part of this is determining whether you can survive if things fall apart. In this case, the worst case is that you can't get a renter, and the house doesn't sell. It puts your family in jeopardy, so to me, it's not an option.

Want my honest opinion? I think you've both got a case of house fever right now. The possibility I just mentioned isn't a rare occurrence. Lots of people have had the same idea, with the best of intentions, and still wound up in a big mess. I love real estate. I mean I really love real estate. And I've flipped more than a few houses in my day. But the particulars of this deal make me a little nervous. If you and your husband are willing to accept the possibility of things not working out as you planned—and the fact you might have to take additional jobs for an unknown length of time just to make ends meet—then it might be a play. But for me? Nope. I don't like putting myself into these kinds of situations.

When I was much younger, I was willing to do all kinds of dangerous stuff and ignore the risk. But going broke decades ago knocked that kind of thinking out of me in a hurry. Any deal that runs the risk of leaving you bankrupt, or the victim of a foreclosure, just isn't worth it, Erin.

Dear Dave,

I read that you recommend saving 15% of your income for retirement. Should I count my employer's contribution to my retirement plan as part of that 15%? Carlotta

Dear Carlotta,

That's a great question. Employer contributions do not count toward the 15 percent I recommend setting aside for retirement. It's great if you work for a company that offers perks like that, but I want you to put 15 percent of your money into retirement. Whatever your company matches, whatever its pension may be, or even having a military retirement package, none of that enters the equation. I want your money in your name.

Baby Step 4 of my plan says to put 15 percent of your income into retirement accounts. The first thing you should put money into is a matching retirement account. If you've got a 401(k), a Roth 401(k), or a 403(b) and your employer offers a match, you should do that up to the match before anything else.


Let's say your employer will match three percent. Since the goal is 15 percent, that still leaves you with some work to do. You've got three percent of your own money already retiring, so then you could look at a Roth IRA. If the Roth, plus what you invested previously to get the match doesn't equal 15 percent, then you could look at a 403(b), or go back to your 401(k) to hit the 15 percent mark.

And remember, if you're going to reach your retirement goals, you can't do it alone. King Solomon, one of the wisest men who ever lived, wrote: "Where there is no counsel, the people fall; But in the multitude of counselors there is safety" (Proverbs 11:14 NKJV). That's why you need a quality financial advisor—one with the heart of a teacher—to help you navigate complicated financial issues, and guide you toward the kind of retirement you want.

Do you see what I'm saying here, Carlotta? I want you—not the company you work for—to control your financial destiny. I want you to be able to retire with dignity and enjoy life after working hard and saving. The responsibility for making that happen falls to you!

Reaching Jesus

"And, behold, there was a man named Zacchaeus, which was the chief among the publicans, and he was rich. And he sought to see Jesus who he was; and could not for the press, because he was little of stature." Luke 19:2-3

While wrapping my granddaughter's birthday gift, I realized some curling ribbon would add a festive flair.

Glancing around, I spied the cluster of helium balloons tied to the kitchen chair from an earlier celebration. White ribbon dangled in long curls, offering a nifty solution to my dilemma.

As I taped shiny coiled strands snipped from the balloons to the pink sequined ribbon, a soft shuffling noise sounded behind me. Curious, I looked around for the source within the quiet breakfast nook. I followed the last swooshing whisper and looked high above, gaping as the last of the balloons nestled in our dining nook skylight, their short tails high above my head. I laughed and postponed their retrieval.

A few days later, my daughter tried to retrieve the balloons. Her short stature prevented her from reaching them with her hands. Thinking about a solution, she finally found a painting stick with an extension rod. With quick little strokes, she succeeded in pinning them against the sides of the skylight and shimmied them down the wall. Although the helium caused them to float skyward over and over, she managed to retrieve them one at a time without scratching the paint on the wall. Victory!

She rescued my balloons on Friday. On Sunday, one of our pastors described Zacchaeus in Luke chapter two as a short man. I thought of my daughter, too short to meet her goal of grabbing the balloons with her hands but, like the old saying: where there is a will, there is a way, she overcame. Likewise, Zacchaeus determined to see Jesus because he wanted to know more about the famous healer and teacher. What he lacked in height, he made up in determination. In his struggles that ended in feasting with Jesus, Zacchaeus shares with us how to enjoy Jesus' in His role as the Bread of Life.

First Zacchaeus climbed to higher ground. As he scrambled up the tree, his dignity drifted away. Perhaps, a few children giggled to see a man of such importance forsake his façade of political correctness for a glimpse of the famous Rabbi. And for millennia since then, Zacchaeus has urged us to climb upward to see Jesus. An old gospel hymn, entitled "Higher Ground," sings the message well:

The lyrics to the first stanza ask the Lord for something.

I'm pressing on the upward way, New heights I'm gaining ev'ry day; Still praying as I'm onward bound, "Lord, plant my feet on higher ground."

(Oatman, Jr., "Higher Ground," stanza 1, public domain)

May we, like Zacchaeus, climb higher and higher until we see Jesus clearly. Second, Zacchaeus sought Jesus—a simple concept but quite important. He focused on Jesus, forsaking his tax collection. After his transforming talk with Jesus, he diverted his assets from selfish to selfless, becoming tall in faith. Today, like the man of little stature in Luke, we seek Jesus by following His work and joyfully welcoming Him into our lives.

Third, Zacchaeus hurried to meet Jesus, eagerly fulfilling His command. The short man's intense focus radiated in his every step as he turned toward Jesus. Like Zacchaeus, rather than bowing to our goals, perhaps we can hurry to Jesus and embrace His perspective for each task of a new day.

Although his story only fills ten verses, Zacchaeus' message towers above my life as a reminder to seek Jesus with every fiber of my being.

As I carefully folded the now flat (but recovered) balloons, I reflected on my daughter's humorous illustration of the gospel story of Zacchaeus. Whether rescuing balloons or reaching Jesus, we need Zacchaeus' example of climbing ever upward in knowing Him, seeking Jesus daily, and hurrying towards Him.

Dr. Josiah BartlettBy David Streater, Ph.D.

This vignette is an educational moment in American history. It is about those who made a difference during the Revolutionary War era and how they served our country.

Josiah Bartlett was an uncommon person born into a typical colonial family. Josiah was born on November 21, 1729, in Amesbury, Massachusetts. He was Stephen and Hannah's

fourth son and fifth child. As an ordinary family of the era, the Bartletts tended a farm while Stephen also worked as a cobbler.

Josiah attended the town's community school until he was 16. His common school education included Latin and Greek. Bartlett's language courses helped position him to study and learn medicine under his preceptor, Dr. Ordway.

Working and learning the practice of medicine, Barlett became accomplished at compounding drugs, delivering babies, treating injuries, and other medical treatments. After several years of training, practical experience, and apprenticeship, Josiah was announced as Dr. Bartlett. As Kingston, New Hampshire, needed a physician, Josiah moved and established medical and dental practices. During his 45-year medical career, Dr. Bartlette developed a "stellar reputation among his colleagues and patients as a man of independent thinking and keen understanding."

Bartlett was elected to the New Hampshire legislature early in his political life. During the Stamp Act uproar, "the Royal Governor [of New Hampshire] attempted to bribe Bartlett into siding with the Crown, but Bartlett 'rejected every overture." During the next several years, Josiah was vital in several positions "as an active advocate against British oppression." He was a commander in the New Hampshire militia and a member of the Committee of Safety.

In the mid-1770s, as a state legislator, "he cast his lot with the Revolutionaries." Dr. Barlett was elected to the first provisional Congress when the Royal Governor dissolved the colonial assembly. In 1775, Josiah was elected to the Continental Congress. As revenge, British terrorists burned his home to the ground, and he could not attend the Congressional sessions.

Josiah was again elected to Congress. This time, he was able to attend, and on July 2, 1776, he voted for independence. "Two days later, he cast the first vote to approve the Declaration." Dr. Josiah Bartlett and John Hancock were the first to sign the document. During the Revolutionary War, Dr. Bartlett treated sick and wounded troops and was also a leading proponent of creating the United States Navy.

During his lifetime, Bartlett was also a justice of the peace, associate chief judge, and chief justice of the superior court. He also promoted the use of science in agriculture, manufacturing, canal projects, and the expansion of roads. Moreover, Bartlett was the president and then governor of New Hampshire. Along with being a signer of the Declaration of Independence, Josiah's other most cherished time was creating and being the first president of the New Hampshire Medical Society.

A year after leaving public service, this endearing and principal Founding Father died at 65 on May 19, 1795. Bartlett, New Hampshire, is named in his honor. Dr. Josiah Barlett was buried beside his wife, Mary, at the Universalist Church in Kingston.


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A Pastor's View

Habakkuk 2:1-4 "The Righteous Will Live By His Faith"

In Charles Dickens's Great Expectations, the central character, Pip, says of his sister, who was married to the kind blacksmith Joe Gargery, "My sister having so much to do, was going to church vicariously; that is to say, Joe and I were going". Dickens was speaking sarcastically, of course, but



Sometimes "little words can make a big difference." There is one of those; the word "his" in Habakkuk 2:4. "The righteous will live by HIS faith." That emphasizes the personal nature of faith. It's not enough for you to be part of a "group" that has faith in God, or be part of a "Christian nation" or a "Christian Church" or a "Christian Family"; YOU must have faith yourself. "The righteous will live by HIS faith." The faith that saves you and the faith that sustains you in life, must be a personal faith. "The righteous will live by HIS (own) faith." So ask yourself today: do I personally have this faith?

First of all, it takes personal faith to save you. Your wife's faith can't save you. Your parents' faith can't save you. Your grandma who loves you so much and wants you to be in heaven; her faith can't save you. You yourself must believe in your own heart. It is the only way you can be saved. "The righteous will live by HIS faith."

Habakkuk 2:4 is one of the most important verses in all of the word of God because it teaches us how to be saved: not by anything we can achieve, or by anything that anyone else can believe for us. Each of us must put our own personal faith in what Jesus did for US on the cross. "The righteous shall live by HIS faith." It must become personal for us.

In the early 1500s, a young man named Martin Luther felt a great burden of his sin before a holy God. So he went to his church leaders for counsel, and they prescribed that he do the works of the church as a cure. So Luther did all the works he could, with a fervor few could rival:

- he fasted until he was so weak he could hardly move
- he spent hours on the cold floor before the altar in prayer
- -- finally, he climbed marble stairs in Rome that supposedly belonged to Pilate, while praying on his knees, hoping to find peace with God. But even as he climbed those steps, he knew his guilt was not being eased. But suddenly the words of Romans 1:17 (which quotes Habakkuk 2:4) echoed in his mind: "The righteous shall live by his FAITH". Suddenly Luther realized that none of these works would make him right with God, but only faith in what Jesus did on the cross. Suddenly Luther finally had the peace with God he had been looking for all of his life! But it had to become real and personal to him. No one else's faith could save him.

It's the same for us today. "The righteous shall live by HIS faith." If you want to be saved, you must come to a time when you admit your sins, and personally put your trust in Jesus as your Lord & Savior.

The great thing is, this can happen in your heart right now! You don't have to walk down a church aisle, be baptized, or perform a bunch of religious works and deeds. NO! By faith, look to Jesus, who died on the cross for your sins. Put your trust in what He did for you. The MOMENT you believe in your heart, without "doing" anything else, you are saved! You can be saved this very moment, as you believe in your heart! "The righteous shall live by his FAITH"!

Habakkuk 2:4 also applies to a person who is already a Christian, and how they will face the trials of life: "The righteous will live by his faith." This was the historical context in which God first gave these words to Habakkuk. The fierce Babylonian army was coming as the arm of God to judge Judah for their sins, and godly people like Habakkuk were about to endure tribulation when it came. How could they survive those incredibly difficult days? God gave him the answer: "The righteous will live by his faith."

- even as violence swallowed up their country, they were to live by faith.
- even if they personally suffered, they were to live by faith.
- even when they couldn't understand what God was doing, they were to live by faith.

Habakkuk 2:4 was given not only to teach us how to live forever but also to teach us how to live NOW in times of difficulty and pain and trouble. "The righteous will live by his faith."

This is how believers persevere in troubled times: despite the pain they endure, the opposition they face, the pressure to compromise, and all the evidence to the contrary, the godly person continues to say: "YET I WILL BELIEVE!" "The righteous will live by his faith."

Job had that kind of commitment. In the depth of his trials, when he didn't understand God, he cried out: "*Though He slay me, yet I will trust in Him*" (Job 13:15) In the darkest hour of his despair, Job still "*lived by his faith*."

Again, this must be PERSONAL faith. "The righteous will live by HIS faith." In your most trying times, your faith gets very personal. No one else can believe for you. When you're walking alone through the valley of the shadow of death, through the battles with your own personal giants in life, nobody else can believe for you. Faith gets real and personal in your most difficult hours: do you really believe, or do you not? You discover a lot about your faith in "the dark hours of your soul"!


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Surprised by Beauty

"From Zion, perfect in beauty, God shines forth." ~ Psalm

It was a normal day, like any other day full of wool, sunshine, and low-grade boredom. Predictable. Secure. Smoth-



looked at as gravity commands the rain to fall down. It was awesome.


Walking up the mountain, Moses saw a bush blushing, burning bright red yet not consumed by flame. In this bush the world of predictability was consumed by the flickering flames, burned up, and offered as an ascension offering, marking the boundaries between night and day. Day and night. The incipient rays of dawn crawl up the firmament, marking something new: A vocation to announce the coming salvation. To command the people of God's liberation. Moses was shocked out of the humdrum sleepy life by the surprise of beauty. God used the beauty of a burning bush to speak. To reveal heaven on earth. It is in surprise that God met with Moses, and it is in surprise that Jesus shocked His disciples with a shalom and a glowing glorified body.

Sometimes God shocks us awake like He did with Moses; we see something beautiful, God calls us by name through that beauty, and we leave transformed with a trajectory and vocation. Other times beauty hides in obscure places, whispering quietly for our attention, but we pass by flustered by all of the bent beauties. Such as pornography which has become America's iconography. Lust cultivates greed, and greed distorts wonder because the beauty that wonder inspires becomes contingent on ownership. These beauties obscure the truth in their extravagance, conceal eternity by cultivating greed, and transform us into baneful beasts always famished and never full. There are whispering beauties all around us. In the poem, "Auguries of Innocence", William Blake writes "To see a world in a grain of sand | And a heaven in a wild flower | Hold infinity in the palm of your hand | And eternity in an hour." This is the holy Christian task: pay attention. To see a world in the smallest of things. Pay attention to the creation, and you will find yourself awake in the dream of angels ascending and descending on the rocks and ridges, trees, and bridges. In fall you will see the blushing bush, burning without being consumed: a place where God calls you by name and you will take off your shoes because it is holy ground. If you pay attention you will find yourself treading through the world with naked feet, because it is all, now holy ground.

"From Zion, perfect in beauty, God shines forth." Zion became the shorthand for Jerusalem, which is where the temple was built. Some believe that Mt. Zion was the Mountain that the temple was built on. The temple was extravagantly decorated. It was ineffable. The beauty of Zion in the temple was to remind the Israelite worshipers that they were in a heavenly place, a place where God dwells. It's important to note that heaven is above all, in Hebrew conception, a place where God dwells. The temple, then, is a place where heaven and earth overlap. Its extravagance ignited the worshipers' imagination so that they could know they were entering a heavenly place. Juxtapose this verse with John 4 where Jesus meets a woman of Samaria who says that the Jews believe the only way to worship Yahweh is by worshiping in Jerusalem, presumably in the temple on Mt. Zion. Jesus responds by saying "Yet a time is coming and has now come when the true worshipers will worship the Father in the Spirit and in truth, for they are the kind of worshipers the Father seeks." The Spirit of God inspires true worship. The time has come when worship is not constrained to Jerusalem because the Spirit of God makes every place a Jerusalem.

Beauty is the engine of wonder. Wonder is the vehicle of heavenly things. It was in the beauty of the blushing bush Moses was seduced in wonder, and into that wonder God spoke. The blushing bush can be metaphorically burned up by the enemy of wonder: predictability. When I assume the world is predictable I will close off my heart to surprise. Kill predictability by paying attention, because in paying attention you will inevitably be surprised. Be surprised by the monarch butterfly burning in the sunlight, yet is not consumed. Be surprised by the singing of the cedar waxwing flinging her song in the waxing morning. Be surprised by the naked trees undressed by the cold, exposing their rough and patterned skin that tenderly whispers of Eden.

The Heart Conditions That Will Set You Free

I have a heart condition—and so do you. I'm not talking about my physical heart. I'm talking about my soul, which is my mind, will, and emotions. This is the heart of our inner life.

Our inner life is more important than anything else because it is based on our thoughts and attitudes, which determine how we live. Real life is the life that's in you, and not your circumstances—like where you live, what job you have, or who you're in a relationship with.

Real peace and joy come from God's Spirit in us, not things or people around us. And when your heart is right with God, it's amazing how peaceful, content, and even happy you can be in the midst of difficult situations and turmoil.

Matthew 5:8 says the pure in heart will see God. And Proverbs 4:23 instructs us to "keep and guard your heart with all vigilance and above all that you guard, for out of it flow the springs of life" (AMPC).

The scripture in Proverbs makes it clear that it's our responsibility to guard our hearts. And we need to do it often because each day there are countless opportunities for something to creep into our heart that is not pure or pleasing to God.

Checking your motives is a good way to determine what condition your heart is in. Motives reveal why we do what we do, which is actually more important to God than what we're doing. If we're really honest with ourselves, most of us will admit that we want to impress people, and this is what's causing us to do what we do.

But I've learned a powerful secret: When we no longer have to impress people and are instead living to please God, we will have real freedom to enjoy life and be who God created us to be.

Think about it. If your schedule is hectic, is it because God is overloading you with responsibility or because you're striving to do what you feel other people want you to do? Have you ever said, "Well, so-and-so expects me to do this, so that's why I'm doing it." Or maybe you were afraid someone would be mad or disappointed with you if you didn't do what they asked. I've done it. And it just made me miserable and even resentful at times.

I also used to do things because I was nosy and just wanted to know what was going on—even at church! I wanted to be involved in some groups because of it. And at one time I even pushed my husband, Dave, to be an elder in the church so he could go to meetings and then tell me what was going on.

As I grew in my relationship with God, He showed me what it means to have a heart like Him. He is a God of grace, mercy, truth, compassion, and generosity. Whatever He tells us to do, it's because it's for our good, not His benefit. He gave His best for us when He gave Jesus, His only Son, to die on our behalf so we could be forgiven of our sins through His shed blood.

No matter what condition your heart is in, if you trust God, He can heal you and make your heart like His.

If you aren't in the habit of checking your heart and really guarding it, I want to encourage you to spend a few hours alone one day and think about what you do and why. If you're honest with yourself, God can help you see the truth about your condition. And the truth will always make you free!



In your darkest hour, if you truly belong to God, there is something inside of you that says: though I don't understand this, though I hurt so much. Still, my prayers aren't answered; at the very core of your being, like Job, your heart will whisper: "Though He slay me, YET I will trust Him." In their darkest, most difficult hours, "the righteous will live by his faith."

"The righteous will live by his faith." How do you need to apply these words to your life today?

- Are you one of those being refined in the "fire" of life's circumstances right now, and your faith is being tested? Tell the Lord: "I believe, help my unbelief"! Ask Him to help you hold on to your faith no matter how hard it is. "Live by faith" in your circumstances today, just like this verse says.
- Or maybe you've never made sure that you personally are saved by faith in Jesus alone. Maybe you've been like Martin Luther: trying to do enough, be good enough and like him, you've discovered that you can't! Today God is saying to you: trust what Jesus did on the cross; put your faith in HIM! "The righteous will live by his faith"

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


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
