Kevin was early for his shift at the big box store Thursday morning. His wife, Janelle, of just five years, had made him a surprise breakfast in bed. It wasn't his







I have the answer, I also have some words of encouragement for you, please keep reading!

First, understand that you do not have what it takes to overcome the pitfalls of life. The pitfalls of life come from sin and within each one of us is a sinful nature. Maybe you have never heard of that. Simply put we are born separated from God because of the sin of Adam and Eve. We are told in Romans 3:10 "*As it is written, There is none righteous, no, not one:*" and again in Romans 3:23 "*For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God;*" we cannot within ourselves overcome the sin nature within us.

Second, there is a consequence or penalty that comes with sin. Every one of us is headed for this penalty. Notice with me Romans 6:23 "For the wages of sin is death; but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord." Sin has a death penalty. This death penalty is an eternal death, a death beyond our heartbeat. That isn't very good news to begin a New Year with, is it? If we stopped right there we could find no hope and have no confidence moving into 2024, but the Bible continues so let's continue in it! God has a gift. A payment for the penalty (consequence) of sin, a payment that doesn't mean an eternal death. God offers eternal life as a substitute for eternal death.

Third, the eternal life that God offers was provided by Jesus Christ! Jesus paid the penalty for our sins. Romans 5:8 "*But God commendeth his love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us.*" Commendeth is an old English word that simply means God shows or displays, in this case, His love. Even while we are living with a sinful nature embedded in our lives and having no hope, Jesus died for us! He did this to prevent you from dying an eternal death. All the pleasures you may find in sin; for example, indulging in drinking, drugs, *immorality, greed, lying, and cheating.* They are short-lived pleasure, short-lived because the end is death. It's important to understand, that we are not sinners because we sin, we sin because we are sinners! Jesus is the salvation of sinners.

Fourth, how does Jesus remedy our sinful nature? I'm glad you asked! Your Bible tells you in Romans 10:9-10 "*That if thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved. (10) For with the heart man believeth unto righteousness; and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation.*" Simply put, confess and believe! Confess that Jesus and only Jesus can save you. There is no other person who can take the place of Jesus Christ as your savior. You must be willing to confess that. To confess Jesus as your savior you must believe that God did raise Jesus from the dead. That's right, it's no fairy tale. Jesus' resurrection is a reality you must accept by faith, then by that same faith confess Jesus as the only forgiveness of sin, your sin!

This miracle is called being born again! Having this new life in Jesus Christ gives you His presence daily. That's right, Christ lives within you. That fact is the strength you need to fulfill your New Year's resolutions. Whatever they may be with Jesus in your life they will be the right decisions made with the presence of godly strength and you will have the faith to let God lead you to success His way in 2024! Until we meet again in person or in print, may God bless you is my prayer.

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
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Marlene's Meditations

Understanding the Significance of Life By Marlene Houk

"Mary Magdalene came and told the disciples that she had seen the LORD, and that he had spoken these things unto her. John 20:18



each disappointment and wild joy, each goading and angry jab thrust at me – is to call me to the Lord. Sometimes I run to Him, tears streaming from the jagged wound in my soul. Often, I stomp around in circles, fuming and ranting, slinging bullets of truth to the nearby stones and trees and wishing my enemies stood in their places. But, my spirit belongs to my Savior, and He calls me gently to remember our relationship. Eventually, I tuck myself under His wings and rest in His Word.

Mary Magdalene, whose story of cleansing from devil possession and discipleship to Jesus, appears in all four gospels in the New Testament. She met many people on the road of her life. But the One who transcended all others was Jesus. He delivered her from a prison of torment and led her into the light of His presence. As I follow her trail 2,000 years later by reading her story over and over, her significance unfolds in a breathtaking panorama of truth. As I age, both physically and spiritually, my heart soars within my despair as truths from her life transform my thinking.

Mary Magdalene herself was significantly prominent in the Gospels. Writers of the first four books of the New Testament, inspired by the Holy Spirit, recorded her actions and words in 1,544 words.

Beyond her story, the frequent reader may gradually gather a list of Mary Magdalene's significance in being first from several perspectives.

1) first in the list of the women who beheld Jesus on the cross afar off Matthew 27:55-56

2) first listed at the tomb after the stone was rolled into place Matthew 27:60-61

3) first at the tomb on resurrection morning, Mark 16:1

4) first person Jesus appeared to after His resurrection, Mark 16:9

5) first person to tell the news of Jesus' resurrection, Luke 24:10

I love Mary Magdalene's divinely appointed place of firsts in the Gospels because she illuminates Jesus. The reflection of His glory in her helps me to know Jesus better. Her reactions to Jesus' healing and her devotion to Him shed light on how He treats women, and, by inference, how he treats me. He granted her the honor of being the first to tell the disciples of His resurrection. She, who had walked with Him and the other disciples through life shows me today how Jesus honors those who walk with Him.

But her walk often led through the valley of the shadow of death as King David describes in Psalm 23. The Gospels mention sepulcher 30 times, and one of those times describes Mary Magdalene crying at the tomb. She had misunderstood the significance of the empty tomb and was crying over her lost expectations, over her idea of a better life, and over her dreams. We do that too. What is Mary telling us about changing our mindset when reality does not meet our expectations? Understanding the significance of Mary Magdalene's messages to us includes her directive to change our definition of success, fulfillment, joy, and reality. We follow her as she walks through the new definition by realizing three things.

First, God is in charge of our successes, failures, fulfillment, joy, and reality. How ironic that the entire Roman government, who ruled the known world at that time, fell helpless at the mighty power of God to resurrect Jesus. Reality became subject to God. Women walked into the empty tomb while hefty soldiers lay immobile. The Holy Spirit blew the wind of understanding the significance of the empty tomb, and the rush of truth dried her tears. When we understand Who reigns, no matter the iron grip of enemies, our soul calms and truth dries our tears. We may feel as Herbert Lockyer described Mary Magdalene after the miracle of her devil cleansing, "Her deranged and nerve-racked mind became as tranquil as the troubled lake Jesus calmed."

Second, Jesus redeems our disappointments. He turned Mary Magdalene's wailing into worship and her confusion into commitment. She sat, utterly hopeless and defeated by the empty tomb, believing the distorters of truth—the Roman government—had stolen His body. But, when Jesus appeared, the truth dawned in her soul, and she ran to tell the disciples the amazing news of His resurrection. Her disappointment turned to delight, and she learned a tremendous spiritual lesson to look beyond life and understand the significance of her experience at the empty tomb. When life tumbles us into the pit of despair, look up toward the light of His truth to be delivered from misunderstanding current events.

Third, no matter how significantly earthly storms dominate our lives and seem to be immutable and unsolvable, eternity brings closure. Mary Magdalene saw the empty tomb and collapsed in helplessness. But, just beyond her thinking the brilliant light of Jesus' resurrection catapulted her into a glimpse of glory as she realized she would be with Jesus for all eternity. How her heart must have leaped in joy as the truth of 2 Corinthians 4:17 radiated throughout her soul, "For our light affliction, which is but for a moment, worketh for us a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory."

Prayer: Dear Jesus, in this new year, please help me to understand that the significance of my life events—whether sad or happy—point to you. Amen.

A Pastor's View

Putting God First

In Matthew 6:33 Jesus said we are to "*seek FIRST the kingdom of God.*" The single greatest problem in many of our lives as Christians is that we don't really give God first place. We give Him "a" place, but not always FIRST place. So as we begin this new year let's look at some ways we can give Him "FIRST" place this year:



1. Give Him the first part of every day

Psalm 5:3 says: "In the morning, O Lord, You will hear My voice; in the morning I will order my prayer to Thee, and eagerly watch." Here David says, my first act of the day will be to seek my God. He gave God the first part of his day in prayer.

We see that commitment in the life of Jesus too: Mark 1:35 is the best example: "And in the early morning, while it was still dark, He arose and went out and departed to a lonely place, and was praying there." The Father definitely had first place in Jesus' life — and He SHOWED it by giving Him the first part of His day in prayer.

What has first place in your life in the morning? What's that thing you just can't leave home in the morning without doing? For some people it is exercise. For others, it is putting their makeup on — NO WAY they'd leave home without it (and perhaps some of us shouldn't!). All of us probably have something we just HAVE to have or do before we get out for the day. God says I want to be that one thing: more important than your exercise; more important than your coffee; more important than whether your pants are ironed — more important than any other thing.

When I pastored in Tulsa there was a woman in our church who enjoyed reading the newspaper, and she wouldn't leave home without reading it. But she realized she was putting her newspaper ahead of spending time with God in His word & prayer. So she made a new commitment: "No Bible; no newspaper." She would not read her paper until she'd been with the Lord first. Some of us need to make a similar commitment as we start this new year, that NOTHING else will take priority over our time with God in the morning. Make a commitment like David to say: "In the morning O Lord, You WILL hear my voice" — and give God the first part of your day.

2. Give Him worship on the first day of each week

Our commitment to worship on the Lord's Day is one tangible way of showing whether we are really putting God first in our lives.

We show by our schedules what our priorities are. When I pastored in North Carolina, I soon discovered that they thought NOTHING about scheduling church activities, sporting events, and all kinds of get-togethers during times when the University of Oklahoma was playing football! That was just unheard of where we came from! The first thing you do before you plan anything is check the OU football schedule — weddings, funerals, it doesn't matter! But for some reason, they just didn't do that in North Carolina!

All kidding aside, what we prioritize in our schedule says a lot about what's really first in our lives. One of the best ways to put God first in your life this new year is to give Him the first day of the week and make worship THE priority item on your schedule. Let your family know: we ARE going to worship this Sunday, and every Sunday this year. Don't ask me IF we are going to church Sunday — we ARE going! Plan now to give God the worship He deserves on the first day of the week. 3. Give Him the first tenth of your income

The principle of giving to God first is found in the Bible:

— Prov. 3:9 "Honor the Lord from your wealth, and from the FIRST of all your produce".

- Ex. 23:19 "You shall bring the choice first fruits of your soil into the house of the Lord your God"

— Ex. 34:20 "The first offspring ... belongs to Me, and all your male livestock, the first offspring from cattle and sheep ...".

Israel was commanded to give God the first of everything: the first of their fruit, the first of their vegetables, the first of their cattle, the first of their dough – the bottom line is that they were to give the Lord the FIRST of everything that He gave them.

The reason such giving is important is because it shows our heart. When my father passed away a few years ago, my sisters and I shared some stories we remembered about him. One of my sister Erin's favorite memories of Dad was one time she asked if he had \$5 so she could eat pizza with the youth group after church. Dad reached into his wallet and gave her \$5. She didn't know until later, when my mom told her, that we were on a pretty tight budget just then, and Dad had set aside that \$5 to eat out one day that week, something he really enjoyed. But he gave that up for her. Erin never forgot that, and she never will. It wasn't just the money; Dad showed by that sacrificial gift how important my sister was to him.

It's the same when we give to the Lord. It's not just about the money. The way you spend your money reveals your heart. When we give God back the first 10% of what He gave us, it shows in a real, practical way the place that He has in our hearts. Conversely, when we do NOT give that 10%, it is a very practical giveaway sign that something else has displaced God in your life: that you wanted a house or car or boat or something else more you wanted to honor Him. Our lack of giving shows that God does not have first place in our hearts.

A lack of giving is like a "warning light" for your spiritual life. When a warning light comes on in your car, you know that something is wrong, that needs attention. In the same way, when you aren't giving to God, you need to see that "the lights are flashing" — there's something wrong in your heart before God. It's NOT just a financial problem; it is a heart problem: you're putting something ahead of God. Your

lack of tithing is just the "warning light", of what's going on in your heart!

Many of us evaluate our budgets as we begin a new year. Plan to put your money where your heart is — or where it needs to be — by giving God the first 10% of everything He gives you this new year.

4. Give Him the first consideration in all your decisions

Matthew 6:33 says: "Seek first the Kingdom of God ...".

- Each of us considers certain things when we make decisions: $H = -\frac{1}{2} H d^2 = 0$
- How will this affect me financially?
- How will this affect my family?
 What will people think about me if I do this?

And so on.

You will undoubtedly have many decisions to make this coming year — what factors will you take into consideration as you do?

If you're a Christian, the #1 factor for every decision you make this year should be: What pleases God? What advances His kingdom? What does His word say?

One of the biggest mistakes you can make this year is to do something without seeking God first. In Joshua 9, the Gibeonites tricked Israel into making a covenant with them, something God had forbidden. The key phrase is found in:14, where it says they "*did not ask for the counsel of the LORD*." They didn't check with God first — and they made a bad agreement with the Gibeonites, which became an albatross around their neck and cost them for years to come.

Christian people do this all the time today: they make decisions without checking with God first, and it costs them:

— They go out and buy a car on a whim, without really seeking God, and end up with monthly payments that strangle them for years to come.

— They get entangled in a relationship with a guy or gal, without really asking if this is who GOD has for them, and it ends up dragging them down spiritually and emotionally and causing much pain.

— They just do something because it "seems like the right thing to do", or because it's what they did last year — but they miss something better which God had planned for them.

Don't do that this year. Don't decide without seeking God first: in His word, in prayer, and by getting wise counsel from the most godly people you know. "Seek FIRST the kingdom of God" — give HIM the first consideration in every one of your decisions this year.

These are four specific areas in which you could put God first in your life as we begin this new year. But maybe it's something else in your particular case. Spend a moment and ask the Lord: "What do I need to do, to really put You FIRST in my life this year?"

Why are 1 & 2 Samuel and 1 & 2 Kings Categorized as part of the "Prophets"?

Two months ago we looked at the categorization of the Old Testament as divided by Christian and Jewish scholars. We saw how Christians divide the O.T. into five categories – The Pentateuch, Historical books, Poetic books, the Major Prophets, and the Minor Prophets while Jewish scholars divide the O.T. into three categories – The Law, the Prophets, and the Writings. We also saw that the books of Joshua,



Judges, 1 & 2 Samuel, and 1 & 2 Kings are included in the "Prophets" category by Jewish sages. Then in last month's article, we examined the word "prophet" and saw that the meaning of this noun is to be a spokesperson for someone else and therefore, a prophet of God is a spokesperson for God. One who relays God's word accurately and with enthusiasm.

So the question remains, why are Joshua, Judges, 1 & 2 Samuel, and 1 & 2 Kings included as a part of the "Prophets" instead of the "Writings?" These books are all stories of the successes and failures of ancient Israel, aren't they? Our goal today is to gain an understanding of why these "historical" books are placed in the group known as the "Prophets."

Let's look at it from a slightly different perspective. After Judah realized their final defeat by Nebuchadnezzar in approximately 586 B.C., the nation was left in ruins and her population was decimated. Many of her people were in exile, whether per force in Babylonia or voluntarily in Egypt and elsewhere, and many others must have died amid the horrors of warfare. Large parts of the country were depopulated, so much so that the Edomites had no difficulty in over-running much of Southern Judah.

The temple was destroyed, and its longstanding traditions and rituals were brought to an end. Above all, the throne had perished. David's family, who had held that throne through all the upheavals and changes that were often unwelcome and unpleasant over more than 400 years, were now deprived of royal status. The story of Judah did not of course terminate at this point. The exiled would return, Jerusalem and the temple would rise again, the Jewish faith would revive, and in the future, another sign of David's line would be born, the king of a realm "not of this world".

Yet, the ancient biblical authors of these books (Joshua, Judges, 1 and 2 Samuel, 1 and 2 Kings) did write the stories. We cannot imagine that it gave the writers any pleasure to recount the grim details of their country's downfall. What was the purpose of these writings then? A careful study of these books reveals that these books constitute an examination of the causes of the decline and fall of God's ancient people.

In my years working for a large Fortune 500 company, one of the key activities involved when things went wrong was called "Root Cause Analysis." Evaluating past processes and activities to see what caused the problem and to make changes when improvement dictated them. If the future were to mean anything, the survivors of 586 B. C. must be able to ascertain and analyze those causes, for the lasting benefit of future generations. And this is the lesson for 21st century followers of Jesus as well.

Thus, while we are familiar with the term "Kings" as a title for two Old Testament books, we should not overlook the truer perspective of those ancient Jewish sages who recognized that the books of Joshua, Judges, Samuel (1 & 2) and Kings (1 & 2) belong collectively in the category "the Prophets." These books are speaking to us from God. Telling us not to forsake Him, and the extreme importance of not seeking after or following idols, of any kind. After all, if we don't heed the warnings of the prophets to ancient Israel, we are likewise destined to fall into the same traps and eventually to destruction.

In next month's article, we will look into why Daniel is considered by Jewish sages to be part of the "Writings" instead of the "Prophets." Baruch Ha Shem – Praise the LORD Shalom Shalom

Enjoying Everyday Life

The Secret to Your Best Life

One of the greatest lessons I've learned is that you can't be both selfish and happy. I know this is true through my own personal experience, but more importantly, the Bible has some things to say about the attitude we should have about "self."



1 Corinthians 13:5 says love "*is not self-seeking*." In 1 Corinthians 15:31, the apostle Paul said, "...*I die daily [I face death and die to self]*" (AMP), which basically means he was not self-seeking but instead focused on doing what God called him to do with his life.

Some scriptures teach us the importance of having self-control. Galatians 5:23 lists self-control as a fruit of the Spirit, and 2 Timothy 1:7 says that in Christ, we have a spirit "of power and of love and …personal discipline [abilities that result in a calm, well-balanced mind, and self-control]" (AMP).

If you've lived very long, you realize that not being selfish requires self-control, because we're all born with a selfish human nature. Think about how babies act: they are only concerned with what they need and usually cry when they don't get their way.

Thankfully, when we experience new life in Christ, we die to sin (Romans 6:11). But even though we die to sin, sin does not die. That's why we have to continually make the decision over and over again to choose to do the right thing on purpose. And we have what it takes, in Christ, to do what's right—whether we feel like it or not.

As Christians, we're destined to be molded into the image of Jesus Christ (Romans 8:29). Jesus is the greatest example of what it means to love others and not live a selfish life. First John 3:16 (NIV) says, "*This is how we know what love is: Jesus Christ laid down his life for us. And we ought to lay down our lives for our brothers and sisters.*"

This scripture shows us that Jesus gave everything when He demonstrated His love for us. And we are to follow His example.

December dies a quick death, filled with laughter, joy and celebration, and most lethal of all, hope. There is no "killing time" in December. There is only giving "life to time" by singing Christmas carols, furnishing evergreens with lights, popcorn, and swarming memories re-presented on swinging



popcorn, and swarming memories re-presented on swinging bibelots. December is brimming with children because at Christmas we all become children. Perhaps it is because Christmas is the season when we remember our childhood the most; we remember that one snowstorm where the power went out and we stayed up all night playing Monopoly and Isaac, the youngest, actually won and we all went crazy; we remember sitting in a chair by the fire drinking hot chocolate while momma read us a story about a man named Scrooge and transformation that overflows into a eucharistic life-a shared life; we remember the year dad lost his job and so we decided to participate in the economy of creativity and frustration and make our own gifts; we remember that one year when grandpa died and momma was depressed and we all tried our very best to make her happy. December is filled with a great and holy remembrance. Remembrance is the avenue to growing young. "Truly I tell you, unless you change and become like little children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven." We need to become small again. We need to run again, not because it is healthy or trendy but because we experience a rapture—a thrill of emotion. We need to laugh again, not because it is

polite but because of the overabundance of joy that dashes from our lungs to our tongues in joyful laughter. We need to learn to clap and cry and tell the perpetrator that they hurt our feelings. We need to learn how to grow young.

But December has died and it's January now. The Christmas tree wilted, the stockings packed and the Christmas presents giddily unpacked. If I am honest with myself, Christmas sickens me. I pick up germs like a first grader eating gum from under his desk. We Christians are the most unsanitary of all. We never wash our hands while singing the ABCs or take our immune support vitamins. We skip our flu shots and touch our faces and spread all of our germs almost as though we are trying to sicken in the world. But we're not. We just have the ruthless germ of hope. Just as Christmas haunts us with flickering childhood memories, it also haunts us with the memory of the Spirit hovering over the womb of Mary to create something out of nothing-ex nihilo, where God knits together sinew and ligament, lung and scapula. This knitted creation was born out of a virgin teenager with DNA, 46 chromosomes, eyelashes, and Jewish blood. We remember the Christ who came out screaming bloody murder like the rest of us while the angels swooned the shepherds singing "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace to those on whom his favor rests." It is a coruscant phantasmagoria charged with hope because God entered into what Karl Barth called a "holy mutability" by assuming flesh.

Athenasius, a fourth-century theologian who defended trinitarian orthodoxy and helped form the Nicean creed, brilliantly wrote: "The Word of God came in His own person, that, as He was the image of the Father, He might be able to create humankind afresh after the image." God the Son recreates humanity by being the true image of God void of evil, so that our evil might be transformed into good. Jesus becomes the perfect image and makes us into the perfect image. Our spirit and soul, body and blood, and all made new. Jesus assumes flesh, defeats death, and promises that what happened to his body will one day happen to our body! The body that could walk through walls, conceal and reveal, disappear, and delight in creation by eating broiled fish will become our body. What hope!

But it is January now and I don't feel so good. The hope of Christ returning and the New Creation feels abstract and aloof. We go back to work. We take out the trash. We smother the wick of celebration with a lick of the fingers and a quick pinch. Can the joy-charged hope of God lying in a meager manger transfigure this rugged monotony? With discipline, yes. Some people are optimists and some people are pessimists, but no one is instinctually hopeful. The conditions for the hope of New Creation germinating and growing are less than ideal in this world. There are wars and rumors of wars. There is cancer, skinned knees, earthquakes, and bee stings. Hope is a native of heaven and is a transplant to us here. It is used the "higher elevations". For hope to grow in the harsh climate of evil and brokenness, we must fertilize it with faith that knows Jesus is coming again to make all things new (whether I believe it or not). We must water it with the Word of God. It is in this sense that hope is a discipline. Hope is something we decisively march towards rather than fall into. So, when the temperature is cold and the day dreary, hope. When apathy creeps in, hope. When you return home from visiting loved ones and feel alone, hope. When Hope is a discipline; it is something that must be decisively intended before it becomes an impulse. Against all of the harshness and hurt, monotony and mundane, I dare you to hope.

"The Bread of Life"

As we begin the brand-new year 2024, let us turn our attention to the most important things. What things, you may ask? According to the inspired writings of the wisest king Solomon,



we should "Fear God, and keep his commandments: for this is the whole duty of man. For God shall bring every work into judgment, with every secret thing, whether it be good, or whether it be evil." (Ecclesiastes 12:13–14 KJV). For us to do it we should study the word of God carefully and live according to His Word. Jesus responded to Satan in the wilderness with the words from the book of Deuteronomy: "Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God." (Matthew 4:4 KJV; Deuteronomy 8:3 KJV).

Let us consider these words more deeply. Man does not live by physical bread in itself, but by the life-giving Word of God, by which bread was created and which is contained in the bread and does not deny man's need for his daily bread. The context of these words, taken from the book of Deuteronomy, refers to the manna that God fed the people of Israel during their journey through the wilderness. So, the Lord met the physical needs of people. Jesus, quoting this expression during the temptation of hunger, showed his attitude towards the physical needs of man. In the pages of Holy Scripture, one can clearly see the compassion with which God treats the poor and hungry. He condemns those who have much "not to deal thy bread to the hungry" (Isaiah 58:7). Man, like any other living creature, constantly needs food. Moreover, this food is much more extensive and multifaceted than we usually think. It comes to us through several channels at once, which makes it possible to maintain the necessary healthy balance of power. Today, we will understand the importance of complete, balanced, and high-quality physical nutrition, which is the key to our healthy existence. In addition, we know that the health of our body does not depend only on what we ingest. We still need air, water, sun, and much more. The question is: do our needs end at this level? The Scripture answers: no!

The words spoken by Christ in the wilderness are clearly addressed to the crown of Creation — humanity. We know that not a single creature on earth, except humans, experiences a spiritual form of hunger. The reason for this is that man was created "*in the image and likeness of God*." (Gen.1:26.) Man, first of all, has a Spiritual Origin, he is a spiritual being! In addition to physical strength, we were also endowed with spiritual and moral potential. Just as we need constant restoration of our physical strength, we also need restoration of our spiritual strength. Our physical health depends on the variety and quality of food we eat. The state of our spiritual and moral principles also depends on what we feed our souls.

The uncontrollable growth of mental and emotional disorders in our society is, first of all, the result of spiritual hunger, although people often do not realize this. Weakening of morality, ethical and moral standards, selfishness and pride, intolerance, and bitterness - these all link to one long series of spiritual problems. Today, humanity is gripped by hitherto unprecedented crises: economic, social, political, environmental, moral, and religious. A hungry, tormented, tired of the struggle of life, completely bankrupt soul can be satisfied only with the Bread that came down from heaven - the Word of God. The Lord says: "*I am the bread of life*." (John 6:35). Through His Word, God not only restores His image in us but also reveals Himself and His will to people." *His inspired Words are:* "... be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is

that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God." (Romans 12:2 KJV). Dear Reader, may the Lord feed you and heal you physically, emotionally, and spiritually as you come to Him in prayer for the Bread of Life! God Bless You!

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

I think it's great that God made an animal that laughs. After all, laughter is the best medicine, right? All of us need more laughter in our lives. This animal not only giggles but laughs out loud. Do you know what it is?



A spotted hyena is the only hyena out of the four different types that laugh. It is often called a "laughing hyena." The spotted hyena's vocal repertoire is unique. This repertoire allows it to make laughing and giggling sounds. However, it only makes these sounds when it is nervous or uncertain about something. Not because it finds something funny. The spotted hyena is also able to make a whooping call at night that sounds like a wolf's howl. Some scientists think that this hyena can make up to 28 different vocalizations.

Spotted hyenas are the largest hyenas. They are brown with black spots. The females are larger than the males and therefore dominate the clan. They are also more aggressive and stronger than the spotted males. Their leader is the most dominant female in the clan. The clan is made of as many as 130 members, mostly females. They live in a "fusion=fission" society. This means the entire clan is hardly ever all together. Most of the time each hyena is on its own or stays in small groups but every so often the whole clan will meet. These hyenas also only

mate with other clan members to protect their gene pool since each clan is usually made up of their kin.

Although spotted hyenas look like large dogs they are not. They are not related to dogs at all. These carnivores can kill much larger animals than themselves, including giraffes and cape buffalos. They are very successful hunters and can chase their prey up for several



miles and up to or until the other animal wears out. Their power bite is 1100 psi. The average psi of a person is 150-200 psi. Their jaws can break 2 1/2 inch bones so they can eat bone marrow which is found only inside bones.

Their pups are born with completely black fur. They are born "precocial" which means they are born more advanced. They already have open eyes, teeth, and muscles when they are born.

These carnivores are very intelligent. They can count how many members opposing clans have. Young males will always join the clan that has the least number of other males in it.

Even though laughing is good for the soul there are times when laughing is not nice. Can you think of some examples?

As we speed closer to end times. There are and will be more people who will laugh at you for being a Christian. Yes, that is right, people will make fun of you for believing in God and Jesus. They will laugh, and call you names. Unfortunately, I'm seeing this already. Jesus warns us in the scriptures that this will happen if we are a believer and stand up for Him. Are you ready to stand up for Jesus and your faith?

Ben & Jerry's Israel Boycott Sparks Divestment Measures in North Carolina By L.A. Williams

Boycotting Israel? Then don't look to do business with the state of North Carolina. That's the message sent to Ben & Jerry's Homemade Inc. by N.C. Treasurer Dale R. Folwell this week. His office issued a press release Thursday announcing the addition of the popular ice cream brand to the list of companies subject to divestment and contract restrictions as a result of their boycott of Israel. The action includes Ben & Jerry's parent company, Unilever PLC, and Unilever subsidiaries, according to the release.

"We have policies in place per state law that dictate how we should proceed on any holdings in the retirement system of companies that boycott Israel and their affiliates. We will follow our policies and the law," said Folwell. He has ordered the divestment of \$40 million in Unilever assets and has dispatched notices to local governments and state agencies prohibiting them from contracting with either company. He said the action was particularly important in light of recent atrocities perpetrated against the Israeli people.

"There is no place for antisemitism in this state or this country," Folwell said. The state's retirement system provides benefits and savings for more than a million members, including teachers, firefighters, police officers, and other government employees. Folwell's office manages the pension plans' investments which total \$117.9 billion.

The Rev. Mark Creech, executive director of the Christian Action League, said league supporters rejoice in Folwell's action.

"We thank God that our great state has a good statute on the books such as this one," he said about the North Carolina Divestment From Companies Boycotting Israel Act of 2017 (Gen. Stat. § 147-86.81).

Creech outlined the spiritual connection that Christians share with the Jewish people and their land.

"As a conservative evangelical Christian, I firmly believe in the biblical covenant that God established with Abraham and his descendants, which promises them land and blessings as an unconditional and eternal covenant. Israel holds a central place in God's economy, being chosen as His special people to demonstrate His faithfulness and fulfill His purposes. This divine choice is not based on any merit or superiority on Israel's part but is part of God's sovereign plan," he said, pointing out that Israel's significance is deeply rooted in messianic prophecy.

"The Hebrew Bible contains prophecies that find their fulfillment in Jesus Christ, and we anticipate His return, which will involve the restoration and blessing of Israel. The authority of the Bible is paramount in our faith, and we interpret it literally, including prophecies concerning Israel. We view the words of the prophets and the apostles as divinely inspired and relevant today, shaping our understanding of Israel's unique place," Creech added.

He said Christians look to the future in anticipation of the fulfillment of eschatological purposes when Christ establishes His Kingdom on Earth.

"In this scenario, Israel plays a pivotal role, with Jerusalem as the capital of Christ's Kingdom, and Israel fully restored and blessed," Creech said. "Our faith in these promises guides our unwavering support for Israel and her people."

North Carolina is far from alone in standing up for the Jewish people. At least 35 states have passed bills and executive orders designed to discourage boycotts of Israel. New Jersey, Arizona, and Illinois are among those states that have divested from Unilever. Florida stopped buying shares of Unilever in October of 2021.

Ben & Jerry's is one of 10 companies on North Carolina's recently updated "Divest and Do Not Contract" list. The company, which prides itself on social activism, announced in 1998 that it would not purchase water from an Israeli company in the Golan Heights. In 2009, it changed its "Chubby Hubby" flavor to "Hubby Hubby," as an endorsement of same-sex marriage. Its decision to halt sales in the West Bank made headlines in 2021, and it sued Unilever shortly thereafter when the parent company contracted with Israeli sellers against its wishes under the brand name Blue & White Ice-Cream Ltd. The case was settled out of court late last year.

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



I think my mother-in-law has a serious credit card problem. Do you have any advice?

Dear Dave,

I think my mother-in-law has a serious credit card problem. She can't afford stuff, but she shops anyway, chalks up more and more debt, acquires more credit cards, and

thinks she'll pay for it all later somehow. Her ex-husband has bailed her out a few times, but he's unwilling to help anymore. My wife and I, and my wife's sister, want to address this issue, but we're all worried about her reaction, and we don't know where to start. Do you have any advice? Randall

Dear Randall,

First, everyone involved should understand they're likely to receive an angry response from this lady if she's confronted over her actions. Sometimes people get ticked off when they hear the truth, especially when it's connected to their own misbehavior. It may even be a good idea for your wife and her sister to get some advice from a family counselor beforehand. Really, what we're talking about here is an intervention.

Also, you need to stay out of the discussion. This is something for her daughters to handle. Support your wife and her sister through it all, but if you're in there asking questions and probing around, you're liable to come off as the evil son-inlaw. And you folks don't need to add any more problems to the mix.

They need to sit down with her in a quiet setting, one where there are no interruptions, no television, and no one else. Start with the fact that they love her and care about her deeply. That's very important in a situation like this. But they also have to walk through what's really going on and let her know they're tired of watching her destroy herself, and her finances, with her irresponsible behavior. If she had a drinking problem, you'd want to try to make her see how alcohol was hurting her and the relationships she has with her family. In this case, she basically has a credit card addiction. And it's wreaking havoc on her financial well-being and the people who care about her.

So, show as much love and understanding as possible. But someone needs to say something soon. -Dave

My husband won't cut up our credit cards but wants to keep them locked away in case of emergency. What should I do?

Dear Dave,

We're following your Baby Steps plan, and we've paid off all our credit cards. But when I talked to my husband the other day about cutting up the cards and closing the accounts, he said he would rather keep the accounts open, and the cards locked away in a drawer for use as an emergency fund. He says this will help us have an emergency fund in place quicker than saving for one. I think there's more behind his reasoning, though. He grew up in a very poor family, and I wonder if he's not afraid of somehow ending up in that kind of situation again. What can I do to convince him to follow your advice? Ramona

Dear Ramona,

I think you're a very perceptive lady. You said your husband grew up in poverty, right? So, what I'm hearing is the cards represent almost a security blanket for him—a financial security blanket. I get that, but here's the thing. If you had a fully funded emergency fund of three to six months of expenses sitting in the bank, I'm talking about hard cold cash, you'd have the security of knowing that the expense

> of a new air conditioning unit or transmission for the car would only be a minor inconvenience. And, you'd be able to cover it easily without going back into debt.

Instead of actively trying to convince him of something, a better route might be to sit down together and talk through the whole thing. Explain to him you think you know why he feels the way he does, and that it's understandable. Then, ask him if there's a reasonable amount you two could have in the bank that would help him stop worrying. Discuss it, agree on an amount, and then agree to cut the cards up and close the accounts when you reach that figure. Remind him, too, that you'd still have your debit cards in hand in the event of an emergency.

Above all, Ramona, make sure you work together. Be patient and understanding. If he has recognized the wisdom of getting rid of debt and taking control of your finances, he's moving in the right direction! — Dave

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Lessons I've Learned From "The Man With Half A Brain."

Lesson #1; Witnessing is simple

My younger brother was born in 1954, had a normal childhood, popular in school, and seemed to have everything going for him. Then at age seventeen Doug was stricken with encephalitis. After two brain operations in thirty days and a large part of his right brain removed he was reduced to something like a wild



beast. He was left with very limited short-term memory and significant paralysis on his left side. We are grateful for all the people that God has brought into his life to help him along the way but in the initial days after bringing him home from the hospital we thank God and a loving mother for helping him progress into the gentle and loving person we know today.

He went home to be with the Lord on July 18th, 2019 at age 65. About 7 years before his passing a brain scan was performed on Doug and the doctors discovered he had about sixty percent function in his left brain, so we are talking about a man that was literally operating with about half a brain. The following stories will fill the span from 17 to 65 but the thing that amazes me to this day is the fact that God continually used this man with half a brain to remind me of things that I should not need to be reminded of and even taught me truths from God's Word that have helped me in my personal walk with the Lord. I hope that as you read these stories you will be reminded that the mind of Christ is alive and well whether we have a fully functioning brain or not.

The first lesson, witnessing is simple.

As I have shared with you in previous stories I grew up struggling with a total sense of worthlessness. My life was permeated with fear, anger, and hatred for any kind of authority. During my teenage years, I developed the attitude that nobody was going to tell me how to run my life, not my parents, not my teachers, and especially not God. I didn't need Him or anyone else, I had all the answers. As I entered young adulthood I considered myself "my own man," had the world by the tail, and continued living the facade of not needing anybody. I lived the "tough guy" routine, doing anything to show others how "bad" I was, not realizing I was just a scared little kid who just needed to be loved and accepted.

God allowed me to live this way until He decided to get my attention in January 1975 when my father died of a massive heart attack. I was almost twenty-three at the time. Though we weren't close at all, when someone in your family dies at the age of forty-six it tends to get your attention. Some things were said at his funeral that made me think about the brevity and uncertainty of life and how important it is to know we have a personal relationship with God.

It wasn't long after the funeral that I got involved in my self-centered existence again and forgot most of what was said. But God had other plans. I had no plans of going to church or having anything to do with God's people so He started sending them to me. In the year following my daddy's death, there were five or six different times that someone from the church would drop by to "witness" to me. Some shared God's Word with compassion, some were like a bull in a china shop, and one told me I was a snake in the grass (never figured that witnessing technique out), but they all had the same message, "You're a sinner in need of a Savior."

Then it happened, I met the greatest soul-winner I have ever known (actually I had known him all my life but never in the capacity that God was about to use). There is one characteristic about Doug that makes what he did in my life so interesting i.e., most of the time he won't initiate a conversation with anyone. If you talk to him he will answer but very seldom will he initiate the conversation.

We were at our aunts' house in Hickory for a family gathering the Christmas before my conversion in February. For some reason, I volunteered to take Doug back home. Looking back on that I realize how unusual it was for me to volunteer to do anything for anyone but when God sets His sights on you there is nothing you can do to control the circumstances He engineers. We had been riding in silence for about thirty minutes, I was probably listening to the radio, you know, in my own little world, when "out of the blue" (or 'from beyond the blue') thirteen words were uttered that would impact my life for all eternity. Doug said, "I cussed Mama the other day but I asked Jesus to forgive me". Thirteen words, then silence.

In the ensuing days until my conversion a couple of months later, there was nothing but silence in my heart and mind. At some point, during this time I remember thinking "Here I am, acting like I have the world by the tail, have all the answers, but this guy, with part of his brain gone, has more sense than I do, i.e. he knows where forgiveness comes from". I am grateful for all the times people came and shared God's plan of salvation with me. I don't remember the details of what they shared but I do remember the thing that stands out in my mind about what they told me was I was a sinner in need of a Savior. The thing that God said so emphatically to me through Doug was "I want to forgive you of all your sins". This simple thirteen-word sermon, delivered in about ten seconds, did more to get my attention than all the other things that were said to me in the months leading up to my life-changing encounter with God.

Witnessing is simple; if your sins have been forgiven just tell them where forgiveness comes from.

I look forward to sharing other lessons I've learned from him in the ensuing months.

Suffering For Others

An 80-year-old man still talks about a miscarriage he and his wife had when they were in their twenties. It was painful and hurtful. It was devastating to them. But to this day, more than 50 years later, he knows that experience has helped him comfort others. In his words, "I would never be able to comfort others experiencing the grief of a miscarriage if I had not myself been through



the pain of a miscarriage." But that man's sentiment is not new. Paul wrote something similar to the believers living in the city of Corinth.

"Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of mercies and God of all comfort, who comforts us in all our affliction so that we will be able to comfort those who are in any affliction with the comfort with which we ourselves are comforted by God" (2 Corinthians 1:3-4, NASB).

Let me, if I may, point out a few important things in these two verses. Notice Paul tells us that God comforts us in "all" of our afflictions. Every emotional thought and every painful tear involves God's comfort. A boyfriend cheating on us, a job taken away from us, a marriage that slips away from us, or a time of good health that alludes us. He is with us through each and every painful experience we endure.

Let's also notice that there's a purpose Paul describes in the comforting that occurs in affliction. Paul writes that God comforts us in our affliction "so that" we may be able to comfort others in their affliction. I know that it might sound cliché that we are in affliction and comforted in that affliction so that we can comfort others. While suffering and difficult experiences cause us severe pain, we must remember that those experiences often serve a purpose later to comfort others.

Pastor Tony Evans writes about these verses, "If anyone assures you that you can avoid suffering like health problems, mental anguish, relationship difficulties, or financial straits—provided that you have enough faith—they're not telling you the truth. Paul was a visible and verbal follower of Christ who stood head and shoulders above other Christians in terms of faithfulness. And he suffered great-ly—not despite his faith but because of his faith in and obedience to Christ. Paul's suffering and ours is directly related to God's purpose of using us to minister to others."

I know most of us reading these words right now are going through tough times of suffering. But God's message to us in 1 Corinthians is that God will comfort us at this time during our affliction, and He will give us plenty of opportunities in the future to comfort others as they experience similar afflictions that we've already endured.

IDF Soldiers Lighting Hanukkah Candles in Gaza: A reflection on the Path to Transforming Peace By Jim Denison

President Biden hosted the annual White House Hanukkah Party last night; invitees included Holocaust survivors and leaders from across Jewish religious denominations. However, I'm thinking today of different ceremonies held recently in dark places: some eight hundred menorahs from Israeli children who were evacuated from the area around Gaza were delivered to IDF soldiers fighting in the Gaza Strip. As they lit these candles on the front lines, families

of Israeli hostages held by Hamas held their own Hanukkah observance in Tel Aviv.

Meanwhile, in another moving act of solidarity, German Chancellor Olaf Scholz lit the first candle on a huge menorah in front of Berlin's iconic Brandenburg Gate. "I wish that the candle of Hanukkah will shine far beyond this square and much longer than just for the eight days of Hanukkah," he said while wearing a black velvet skullcap.

As Jews around the world grieve the atrocities of Hamas's October 7 invasion, global solidarity with them both as a people and as a nation is vitally significant.

However, there's a problem with conflating the two, one we urgently need to understand in our conflicted day.

When one day of oil lasted eight days

Hanukkah originated in the second century BC when Greco-Syrian rulers took over the Jewish temple and outlawed Judaism. Judah the Maccabee led his fellow Jews to defeat one of the mightiest armies on the earth, drive them from the land, and reclaim the temple. However, when they sought to light its menorah (the seven-branched candelabrum), they could find only a single cruse of olive oil that had escaped contamination by the Greeks.

Miraculously, when they lit the menorah, the one-day supply of oil lasted for eight days until new oil could be prepared under conditions of ritual purity. To commemorate and publicize this miracle, Jewish leaders instituted the festival of Hanukkah (meaning "dedication" and pointing to the rededication of the temple). Jews around the world are observing that miracle this week. Some are deeply devout, living daily by the 613 laws of Judaism. Others are less so. Still others are secular, identifying with Judaism as their race rather than their religion. But all are united in their commitment to their people and to the tiny nation that was founded to ensure their survival.

This conflation of race and religion is typical for other religions as well. Most Muslims were born into Islam. The same holds true for Buddhists and Hindus. Their religion is a component of their family origin and, likely, their racial demographic.

Unfortunately, many think the same is true for Christianity—including many Christians.

What people don't understand about Christianity

Do you ever wonder why so many wars are fought in the name of religion? The present conflict in the Middle East is one example: Hamas is convinced that Allah intends them to have the same land Jews are convinced Yahweh promised to them. Skeptics often point to religious wars waged across human history as evidence that religion does more harm than good.

Here's what they're missing: true Christianity is not a religion about God but a deeply personal, transformational relationship with him.

Jesus was adamant: "Unless one is born again he cannot see the kingdom of God" (John 3:3). When a person places their personal faith in him as their personal Redeemer, they become a "new creation" (2 Corinthians 5:17). Peter said of



this experience: "According to [God's] great mercy, he has caused us to be born again to a living hope" (1 Peter 1:3). When we ask Christ to forgive our sin and become our Lord, he makes us into the "children of God" (John 1:12).

Now, when we submit our lives to his indwelling Spirit (1 Corinthians 3:16; Ephesians 5:18), the Spirit makes us more like Christ (Romans 8:29) by manifesting his character in and through our lives (cf. Galatians 5:22–23). As we worship, pray, study Scripture, and live biblically, we grow in grace as the new people of God (2 Peter 3:18).

Such people love their enemies and pray for their persecutors (Matthew 5:44). If they are walking in the Spirit, they do not initiate conflict but seek to advance justice and peace (Micah 6:8; Matthew 5:6, 9).

What "hinders our spiritual life more than anything else"?

You knew these theological truths before I recounted them. However, we must beware of the same temptation that adherents of religion face.

I define religion as the human attempt to please and secure the blessing of God (or the gods). We choose to attend services at a church, synagogue, temple, mosque, or shrine and to invest money and time in religious activities. All of this is on our terms, done as we wish. All the while, we hope that God (or the gods) will reward our religiosity with benefits that outweigh its costs.

Since 85 percent of the planet's population identifies as "religious," I just described nearly seven billion people. How is transactional religion working for the world?

Oswald Chambers observed, "The characteristics of individuality are independence and self-assertiveness. It is the continual assertion of individuality that hinders our spiritual life more than anything else." This is why, as Dietrich Bonhoeffer noted in The Cost of Discipleship, "When Christ calls a man, he bids him come and die."

During this Advent week of peace, if you would know true peace, trade a transactional religion about Jesus for a transforming relationship with him. Submit all that you have and are to him as a "*living sacrifice*" (Romans 12:1). Ask him to take away anything that is not his best for you and add anything that is. Ask His Spirit to make you more like Jesus than you have ever been before. And know that he delights to answer your prayer, to the glory of God.

Watchman Nee said, "A born-again person ought to possess unspeakable peace in the spirit."

Do you?

If not, why not?

Violence In Schools And What Parents Can Do To Help. No Regrets Family

As I think about the new year it would be easy to write one of those feel-good articles about change and being the better you. We all like those warm fuzzy feel-good articles. And to be honest with you, they

are much easier to write. We tend to have a problem tackling the more difficult subjects like sin and repentance. The Bible warns us about those who have itching ears. 2 Timothy 4:3–4 "3 For the time will come when they will not endure sound doctrine; but after their own lusts shall they heap to themselves teachers, having itching ears; 4 And they shall turn away their ears from the truth, and shall be turned unto fables."

"Itching ears" in this context refers to those who want to tell people what they want to hear as opposed to preachers or teachers confronting sin and depravity. It is by no means a joy of mine to address these issues of moral decay but that is where the Spirit of God moves me. It is not that I like to bring the subject up, but I cannot but speak the truth in love.

In October I wrote on the subject "Are we abounding in sin?" illustrating an obvious decline in respect for human life. Citing a recent hit and run by two teens in a car laughing about striking a retired police officer riding a bicycle resulting in his death. The two teens had zero compassion for the man they hit. They were not sorry for what they had done, only sorry they had gotten caught.

We can reference many disturbing and almost unbelievable news articles about the sinfulness of man. However, journalists and reporters will not use the word sin or depravity. The New York Post December 16, 2023, opinion article written by Naomi Riley writes It is time for a 'broken windows' policy for schools referring to a 1990s policing strategy in New York where low-level crimes were prosecuted with high penalties. The policy deterred crime by showing would-be criminals that law enforcement was serious about crime and people would think twice about committing a crime.

Riley draws our attention to the unprecedented rise in violence in our public schools. In North Carolina crime and violence spiked twenty-four percent as, new data was presented on March 1, 2023, to the N.C. State Board of Education. (Carolina Journal; Crime and violence spike 24% in NC public high schools, March 3, 2023, by David Bass) Sadly, we are losing good teachers in our schools because of a lack of discipline. Whatever happened to a good butt-busting? Riley shares recent acts of violence in our public schools. The most horrific and disturbing is 16-year-old Jonathan Garcia. Garcia attacked his teacher in her classroom at Eldorado High School. The brutal attack lasted for an hour and a half and details of this act of violence are so disturbing I will not write about them here. Garcia was sentenced to 16 to 40 years in prison.

We have replaced stern disciplinary actions with counseling sessions and hugs. When I was a child, and I did something wrong I did not get a counseling session, I got a spanking. Many educators blame COVID restrictions as the reason for the uptick in violence in schools. Society always finds a way to avoid and blame our sinful actions without going to the root of the problem. We know the root of the problem is sin. Sin is the reason for the breakdown of the family and the root cause of violence in our nation. Until we get to the root cause of the problem, we will not see the necessary change.

True change starts with repentance from sin. We are never told to reform, but we are told to "be transformed by the renewing of our mind that we may prove, what is that good and acceptable, and perfect will of God." Most people approach problems in our society by trying to reform. But we cannot reform sin. Sin must be crucified and die in ourselves. Romans 6:1–2 "What shall we say then? Shall we continue in sin, that grace may abound? 2 God forbid. How shall we, that are dead to sin, live any longer therein? A person who is dead to sin will want to live for the Lord."

As a Christian parent, what can we do to help? We can pray and repent asking God to bring revival to our sinful nation. We can be proactive in our children's school and be supportive of teachers. Show up to school activities and introduce yourself to your child's teacher. Elect Christian school board representatives. Reach out to families who are struggling with the good news of Jesus Christ. Be inclusive of those families who do not seem to fit in. Invite them to church and include them in community events. Showing the love of Christ will go a long way in preventing problems. Vacation Bible schools and Christian youth groups are a wonderful way to introduce a child and his family to Jesus Christ.

We know that the Gospel is the power of God unto salvation, and salvation is the only true deterrent to sinful actions. So where do we start? Start with your friends and family. A heart that loves the Lord wants to please the Lord. Happy New Year

Fulfill Your Calling! As many of you may know, at the end of August last year, my ministry as pastor at Mine Creek Baptist Church came to a close. For approximately 8 years, God gave me the privilege of pastoring this wonderful church family. They certainly took my family in and loved us like



we had always been there. I hope that God used my preaching and ministering to be a blessing to Mine Creek. God told me to go there and simply help and He had shown me that I fulfilled what He wanted me to do there. We certainly grew to love that church family dearly and miss being with them. God had richly blessed over those years and leaving was hard, especially when the ministry of the church was going so well. However, something I have learned over the years is when God speaks to your heart about something, you better listen. He is leading us for a reason, even if we don't necessarily see what that reason is at the time.

While it is hard to not have our own church family to worship with, the last few months have been a blessing. There's only been a couple of weeks where God has not allowed me the privilege to preach somewhere. We've traveled to several counties filling in for pastors who were away from their churches and also for churches without a pastor at this time. My prayer since August has been for the Lord to show me where He wants us to be next. While He doesn't always show us right away where He is leading, I know we can trust Him that when we get there, He WILL reveal it to us.

That being said, there has been something burning in my heart over the last couple of months that I want to share. Several of the churches I have preached at are without a pastor/preacher, some for over a year. One of the recurring statements that I have heard is this, "Preacher, we've asked several men who have been called to preach to just come fill in for us awhile and none seemed to be interested." This statement has me somewhat puzzled and troubled.

First, let me get something out of the way. Every man who feels called to preach by the Lord must pray and seek God's will on where the Lord may lead and in what capacity he feels led to serve. These are things that each man must search out personally. If a man is genuinely called by God to preach/pastor, God will certainly show him when and where. One thing I have noticed is that many young men I know who have surrendered to preach, often never go too far beyond their home church. They may preach here and there on occasion, but for one reason or another, seem reluctant to commit to serving a church. I've had several churches tell me that they have asked a few young men who have answered the call to preach but have declined to just fill the pulpit every week. Again, I realize every man must pray and seek where God may lead. However, when this becomes a recurring theme, it personally causes me concern.

There are quite a few churches in our region that are without pastors/preachers. Some are small churches, some bigger churches. Some churches have been through struggles and are having a hard time. In some cases, a pastor has gone on to be with Lord and a church needs a preacher. Churches are struggling to find someone just to bring God's Word to them while they search out God's direction for the future. The point is, there is a great need in our churches!

If you are a young man whom God has called to preach, this message is for you! Fulfill the call of God! Stop allowing fear and doubt to hinder you. Every seasoned preacher started somewhere. Every preacher had a first interim, first pastorate, first baptism, first revival, first everything. If you are called, you need to fulfill what you promised God you would do. There are churches out there that will give you an opportunity. They are hungry for the Word and just need a man of God who is willing to love them and preach to them. When God has a church for me and my family, He will show it to us. But I have to be willing to step out on faith and follow His lead. You must do the same. You must fulfill the promise you made when you surrendered to His call. You must fulfill your calling!

He was born Dimetrios Georgios Synodinos in 1918. He is better known as Jimmy "the Greek" Snyder and was an American sports commentator and Las Vegas bookmaker. He was a regular contributor to the CBS program The NFL Today. Snyder predicted the scores of NFL games, which sports bettors used to determine the point spread.




But it was a wager Snyder made, long before he was Jimmy the Greek when he was 30 years old in 1918 that put his name on the map. Snyder bet on the 1948 Presidential election between the challenger, Thomas Dewey, and sitting President, Harry Truman. All the predictions said that Dewey would win in a landslide over Truman. Snyder recounted that he decided to vote for Truman to win because he had determined that women were distrustful of a politician with a mustache.

The odds were set at 17-1 for Dewey to win the election of 1948. Snyder put a \$10,000.00 wager on Harry Truman to win. On election day, November 2nd, 1948, Harry Truman shocked the world and won another term and Jimmy Snyder had turned a \$10,000.00 wager into a \$170,000.00 payday. We would consider that a very good exchange. Seventy-five years later in today's value, Snyder's winning total would be over 2 million dollars.

Now I must admit that I don't gamble. I don't even play the lottery which actually means my chance of winning a jackpot is just about the same as someone who does play the lottery. But I am aware of what Jesus said about a very important wager. "For what will it profit a man if he gains the whole world, and loses his own soul? Or what will a man give in exchange for his soul?" (Mark 8:36, 37) What is the exchange rate for eternal life through faith in Jesus? What on earth would we be willing to exchange for eternal life? The answer is obvious. There is nothing worth forfeiting eternal life in Christ Jesus. There is no adequate answer to the question proposed.

As we begin a new year, may you and I make sure that we are not gambling with our eternal future? May we realize that the lifestyle that scripture promotes is not only best for us here on this earth today, but it's also what's best for receiving God's wonderful gift of eternal life.

Foundation Forward

Robert Treat Paine

This vignette is an educational moment in American history. It is about those who made a difference during the Revolutionary War era and how they served our country. Robert Treat Paine was a Founding Father known for



having a complex personality and earned the nickname "The Objection Maker." Born in Boston in 1731, Robert was known as "Bob" and was destined to become a servant-leader. He was a gifted student educated at Boston's Latin School and graduated from Harvard at 18. Bob studied religion; his family expected him to follow their history and become a minister, but he chose instead to be a schoolteacher. Paine taught school but realized that teaching was not his

strength. In the mid-1750s, Robert was the provisional chaplain of the Assault of Fort Saint-Frédéric, Crown Point, New York. Living at the fort turned out to be an awakening and helpful experience for Bob in the future. This involvement gave Paine a valuable taste of military life and its requirements. With life's lessons combined with his poor health, Bob chose to work as a merchant marine, hoping outdoor work and the salt air would aid his health as he sailed along the East Coast and to Europe.

After returning to America, Paine studied law and became an attorney. He prosecuted British soldiers who murdered defendants from the Boston Massacre. Being the prosecutor in this trial began Paine's political involvement and the quest for democracy. During the 1770s, Bob had several joyous events: In 1770, he married Sally Cobb, and they went on to have eight children.

Paine was elected to the Massachusetts legislature in 1773 and soon was assigned to the Continental Congress. Some of his duties included acquiring gunpowder for the Continental Army and signing the Olive Branch Petition to England. As Paine objected to all Congressional proposals except his own, his peers called him "The Objection Maker." During this time, Paine chaired the Committee on Ordnance. Most importantly, he signed the Declaration of Independence.

After his return to Massachusetts, Robert was the first attorney general (1777-1790) and later helped create the constitution of Massachusetts (1780). Also, in 1780, owing to his interest in astronomy, he became a charter member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. Paine led the prosecution of insurrectionists involved in Shay's Rebellion, an uprising in the Massachusetts countryside during 1786-1787; a debt crisis brought it on at the end of the American Revolutionary War.

This great American patriot accepted an appointment to the state's supreme court in 1790 and remained a justice until his retirement in 1804. Robert Treat Paine died on May 11, 1814, at age 83 and was buried in the Granary Burying Ground, Boston, Massachusetts.

Measuring Up To God's Holiness God's Message Coming Down Through The Ages By Glenda Ward McDowell County

Some people carry their sins around with them. But those sins become a burden that wears people down. Before you find yourself worn out and useless, turn to the One who promises to take away your burden of sin and replace it with

Spiritual Rest that is a joy to fulfill (see Matthew 11:28-30). When people do not carefully observe the distinction between evil from good, destruction soon follows. When you make excuses for ungodly actions, you break down the distinction between right and wrong. If God's Word, in Scripture, is not taken as your standard, soon all moral choices appear vague and disillusioned, and contradiction of beliefs will soon leave you feeling lost and disconnected. Without God, we are left without hope and headed for a breakdown and much suffering. It is sad today to see so many people searching for meaning in life while tossing aside God's Word. In Isaiah 5:24-25: "...because they have cast away the law of the Lord of hosts, and despised the Word of the Holy One of Israel. Therefore is the anger of the Lord kindled against His people, and He hath stretched forth His hand against them, and hath smitten them: and the hills did tremble, and their carcasses were torn in the midst of the streets. For all this His anger is not turned away, but His hand is stretched out still." Avoid the error of destruction by making not only just reading the Bible a part of your day, but also understanding and obeying it, making this a high priority in your life.

Israel's people suffered because they disregarded God's Law. People were searching for meaning in life while tossing aside God's Word. Isaiah 5:26-30 describes what God said He would do if the people disobeyed Him, (Deuteronomy 28). The country of Assyria began to torment Israel during the reign of King Ahaz (735-715 B.C.). Note: Remember the years count down to 0 before Christ Was Born. This powerful aggressor destroyed the Northern Kingdom of Israel in 722 B.C. and scattered the people throughout its own empire. Sin has consequences and this judgment was not immediate. Eventually, Israel was punished. It is during this time of anxiety and political unrest that God calls the prophet Isaiah to deliver His message of hope to the few remaining groups of believers. In God's Word when He calls something evil, it is evil. When He labels a thing bitter, no multitude of religious authorities can make it sweet through their solemn declarations. Isn't this where our country is today? God is our only and absolute authority!

We have just come through the most glorious season imaginable, celebrating the Birth of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. It is my prayer that during the past month of December Christmas Day was observed and served as a reminder of the true reason for the joyous season of Christmas.

God's Message Coming Down Through the Ages

In the Old Testament Isaiah 6:1-4; Isaiah had a lofty vision which was his call to be God's messenger to His people. It was important for Isaiah to see God in all His Holiness. Holiness means morally perfect, pure, and set apart from all sin. It was in this Scripture that Isaiah saw the Lord sitting upon a throne, high and lifted up, and His train filled the temple as a symbol of glory and splendor, triumph, and victory. This was the greatest recognition for a King that He was victorious and was signified. It was in Old Testament times; that the length of a king's robe would be a sign or indication of his greatness. The longer the robe, the more victories he had won, and the more kings he had defeated. Isaiah's statement conveys the magnitude of God's glory compared to any earthly king. The glorious robe that fills the temple signifies:

1-His Absolute Authority. There is no room for anyone else in this high-exalted place. God is all in all.

2-His Divine Perfections. There is No one else who is all-powerful, all-knowing, unhindered by limitations of time and space, and perfectly just, merciful, and righteous in all He does.

3-His Incomparable Splendor. The revelators Isaiah, Daniel, and John, gave us glimpses of their heavenly visions. They saw a high exalted throne encircled by an extremely delicate and light rainbow seemingly too perfect for this world. Isaiah saw Seraphims (angelic beings belonging to the highest order serving as a throne guardian of God, having two or three pairs of wings), standing above the throne and one cried unto another, saying Holy, holy, holy, is the Lord of hosts and the whole earth was full of His glory. And they saw lamps blazing, lightning flashing, thunder rumbling, ground shaking, and angels and saints worshiping.

Isaiah 6:2 is the only place in the Bible where Seraphims are mentioned. They functioned as God's agents in commissioning Isaiah. Isaiah could understand them when they spoke to him and when they praised God because they hovered around God's throne. Isaiah also sees God's Son clothed in a royal robe. The King of Kings and Lord of Lords, sitting upon a throne seven hundred years before the birth of Jesus Christ. In Isaiah 6:5-13 Isaiah realized he was common and unclean before God, with no hope of measuring up to God's standard of Holiness. Read this account of the prophet Isaiah and how he was forgiven and cleansed by God, and he in response submitted himself entirely to God's service ... for he said "Here am I; send me." Isaiah brought a message of hope to the house of David. "Therefore, the Lord Himself shall give you a sign. Behold, a virgin shall conceive, and bear a Son, and shall call His name Immanuel;" (Isaiah 7:14). Jesus's name Immanuel means, "God with us". And so, some two thousand years ago the prophecies of the Old Testament times came to pass.

The Virgin Birth is important to our Christian faith. Jesus was born without the sin that entered the world through Adam. He was born Holy, just as Adam



was created sinless. In contrast to Adam, who disobeyed God, Jesus obeyed God and was able to face sin's consequences in our place which makes us acceptable to God (Romans 5:14-19). Jesus Christ, God's Son had to be free from the sinful nature passed on to all other human beings by Adam. God's Word came as a baby born of a virgin. He was a human being; but as the Son of God, Jesus was born without any trace of human sin. Jesus is both fully human and fully divine. God sees into eternity the plight and disease of a man struggling in sin, having no hope and doomed to despair and darkness. God asks who will go for me and make a way for sinful men to be saved. And Jesus the Son says, "I will go send me". The Father continues, Son you will have to take on human flesh and die a sacrificial death, you will experience the pain and suffering of the flesh, and I will forsake you in your darkest hour. You will pay a sin debt and satisfy my wrath against the sin of the people. Royalty, the King of Kings, and Lord of Lords comes to earth as a baby wrapped in swaddling cloths and lying in a manger. God removes the Royal Robe in exchange for grave clothes. God spoke His Word in sending Jesus, the Messiah into the world who brings about life eternal! God's Holiness, God's living Word. THANK YOU JESUS!

The Place To Begin

And so John came, baptizing in the desert region and preaching a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. Mark 1:4 John announced this great word: that repentance is the way people come to God, and the result is the forgiveness of sins. The greatest blessing people can experience is to



have their sins forgiven. This is what the people who streamed out of Jerusalem to listen to John were looking for, and this is what they found. They found forgiveness of sins, and it came by way of repentance. That is why the prophet Isaiah said John's message would be like a great bulldozer, building a highway in the desert for God to reach the isolated stranger amid the wilderness. Without a road, you cannot drive out into the desert to help somebody. You must have a road, a highway in the desert. John was God's bulldozer to build that highway. You know how roads are built—exactly as Isaiah describes in chapter 40: Every valley shall be raised up, every mountain and hill made low; the rough ground shall become level, the rugged places a plain (Isaiah 40:4).

That is what repentance does. It brings down all the high peaks of pride that we stand on and refuse to admit are wrong. It takes the depressed areas of our life, where we beat and torture and punish ourselves, and lifts them up. It takes the crooked places, where we have lied and deceived, and straightens them out. And it makes the rough places plain. Then God is there at that instance of repentance. John brought people to Christ the only way they can come—through acknowledgment of guilt. When people come this way, God meets them, cleanses them, and forgives them. John demonstrated that by the baptism he performed. But there is a greater baptism—that of the Holy Spirit. And on the day of Pentecost, when the Spirit of God came, Peter stood up and offered people two things: forgiveness of sins and the promise of the Spirit.

From that time on, God has made these things available to any man or woman who will begin at the beginning—the place of repentance. Have you ever repented? Have you ever changed your mind, stopped defending yourself and trying to blame everything on others, and said, No, Lord, no one else is to blame, only I? This is the way I am—and I need help. That is where God will meet you. He always meets humans at that point, washes away guilt, cleanses, and forgives. That is where you will find forgiveness of sins. If you have never repented before, I urge you to do so now. God will meet you right there. In the quiet of your own heart, where God alone hears, you can say to Him, Lord, I repent. Lord, send me the Holy Spirit through Jesus. And He will. Lord, thank You that You promise to meet me in this place of repentance. I come to You now on that basis. A New Year can begin with the liberating gift of forgiveness. Have we understood and embraced how this blessing may be known?

The 12 Days of Christmas

• 5 Golden Rings = The first 5 books of the Bible.

• 6 Geese a Laying = The 6 days of creation.

• 7 Swans a Swimming = The 7 gifts of the Holy Spirit (Wisdom, Understanding,

Counsel, Knowledge, Fortitude, Piety, and the Fear of the Lord).

• 8 Maids a Milking = The 8 beatitudes Jesus taught from the Sermon on the Mount found in Matthew 5:3-12.

• 9 Ladies Dancing = The 9 fruits of the Spirit (Love, Joy, Peace, Kindness, Goodness, Patience, Faithfulness, Gentleness, and Self-Control).

• 10 Lords a Leaping = The 10 Commandments.

• 11 Pipers Piping = The 11 faithful disciples.

• 12 Drummers Drumming = The 12 points of the Apostles' Creed (a summary of the teachings of the Apostles written in the early church but widely read today).

Though our Christian brothers and sisters many years ago may have had to devise elaborate codes to share their faith, aren't you glad that we don't have to now? Though our Christian faith is being confronted on many fronts, still here in America we enjoy the freedom to tell others about Jesus. So, since we can, let's do what we can! As we enter a New Year, may we have boldness and joy in sharing our faith in Jesus? SO, go ahead and sing "The 12 Days of Christmas" all year long!

The Integrity of God's Word By Ryan Bridgeo Avery County

In Matthew 5:18 Jesus says, "For assuredly, I say to you, till heaven and earth pass away, onejot or one tittle will by no means pass from the law till all is fulfilled." "Jot or tittle" is a phrase that means a very small amount. Jot comes from the Greek letter iota which is the smallest



letter in the Greek alphabet. A tittle is a small dot or mark that helps identify one letter from another, similar to the dots in our i's or j's or an apostrophe in English. Jesus is saying in this text that everything will be fulfilled right down to the smallest, finest detail, even things that appear to be insignificant.

Henry Liddon, an English theologian said that in the Old Testament, there are 332 distinct predictions (prophecies) which were literally fulfilled through Christ. Amazingly, these scriptures were written 400-1000 years before Jesus was even born. In this lesson, we will see the wonder of this by looking below at a mere 15 of the 332 prophecies.

Prophecies about the Birth of Jesus

Isaiah 7:14 "Therefore the Lord Himself will give you a sign: Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a Son, and shall call His name Immanuel." Hosea 11:1 "When Israel was a child, I loved him, and out of Egypt I called My son."

Psalm 72:10 "The kings of Tarshish and of the isles will bring presents; the kings of Sheba and Seba will offer gifts."

Prophecies about the Life of Jesus

Psalm 78:2 "I will open my mouth in a parable; I will utter dark sayings of old." Isaiah 35:5-6 "Then the eyes of the blind shall be opened, and the ears of the deaf shall be unstopped. 6 Then the lame shall leap like a deer, and the tongue of the dumb sing. For waters shall burst forth in the wilderness, and streams in the desert."

Zechariah 9:9 "Rejoice greatly, O daughter of Zion! Shout, O daughter of Jerusalem! Behold, your King is coming to you; He is just and having salvation, Lowly and riding on a donkey, A colt, the foal of a donkey."

Prophecies about the Betrayal of Jesus

Psalm 41:9 "Even my own familiar friend in whom I trusted, who ate my bread, Has lifted up his heel against me."

Zechariah 11:12-13 "Then I said to them, "If it is agreeable to you, give me my wages; and if not, refrain." So they weighed out for my wages thirty pieces of silver. 13 And the LORD said to me, "Throw it to the potter"—that princely price they set on me. So I took the thirty pieces of silver and threw them into the house of the LORD for the potter."

Prophecies about the Flogging and Crucifixion of Jesus

Isaiah 50:6 "I gave My back to those who struck Me, and My cheeks to those who plucked out the beard; I did not hide My face from shame and spitting." Psalm 22:16 "For dogs have surrounded Me; the congregation of the wicked has

enclosed Me. They pierced My hands and My feet."

Psalm 34:20 "*He guards all his bones; Not one of them is broken.*" Psalm 22:18 "*They divide My garments among them, and for My clothing they cast lots.*"

Psalm 22:7-8 "All those who see Me ridicule Me; They shoot out the lip, they shake the head, saying, 8 "He trusted in the LORD, let Him rescue Him; Let Him deliver Him, since He delights in Him!"

Psalm 69:21 "They also gave me gall for my food, and for my thirst they gave me vinegar to drink."

Psalm 22:1 "My God, My God, why have You forsaken Me? Why are You so far from helping Me, and from the words of My groaning?"

This doesn't even include Isaiah 53.

Peter Stoner, M.S. Chairman of the Departments of Mathematics and Astronomy at Pasadena City College, and Robert Newman, Ph.D. in Astrophysics, Cornell University, also Professor of Physics and Mathematics, wrote the book entitled Science Speaks, Scientific Proof of the Accuracy of Prophecy and the Bible. In this book, they took eight of the 332 prophecies fulfilled by Christ and determined the odds of one person fulfilling those eight. The results were amazing! They calculated the odds to be 1 in 10 to the 17th power or 1 in 1.7 sextillion. Dr.Stoner said, "Suppose that we take 1017 silver dollars and lay them on the face of Texas. They will cover all of the states two feet deep. Now mark one of these silver dollars and stir the whole mass thoroughly, all over the state. Blindfold a man and tell him that he can travel as far as he wishes, but he must pick up one silver dollar and say that this is the right one. What chance would he have of getting the right one? Just the same chance that the prophets would have had of writing these eight prophecies and having them all come true in any one man, from their day to the present time, providing they wrote using their own wisdom."

Well, that is what Jesus did. Except Jesus didn't fulfill only 8 prophecies, or 15, but over 300. The odds of one man doing all of these would be almost incalculable.

God honors His Word right down to the smallest jot or tittle. This should give us great assurance and comfort to know that the God who was faithful over these 332 prophecies will be faithful over every Word and promise that He has ever made. We can have confidence in the integrity of God and His Word. For God truly does watch over His Word to carry it out until completion (Jer. 1:12).

"Resolution or Repentance?"

Little Johnny's mother plainly told him not to eat any cookies before supper. As soon as her back was turned, though, Johnny ate some cookies. When the mother discovered what he had done, she asked him, "Didn't you know it was wrong to eat those cookies?" Johnny answered, "Yes,



mamma, and the whole time I was eating them, I was asking God to forgive me." Sadly, this story sums up how many of us — including many of us Christians deal with our sinful conduct. We keep on sinning and keep asking God to forgive us. Over and over again the pattern repeats itself: sin – ask for forgiveness $-\sin$ - ask for forgiveness - sin - ask for forgiveness. It's like we're stuck in a loop, one that will never result in any real change.

Genuine repentance, on the other hand, is much more serious. The Greek verb that gets translated as "repent" in our English translations of the Bible is "metanoeo." Interestingly, this verb doesn't primarily involve actions. Any change in action only comes at the end of the process. First and foremost, the verb involves the mind. In his Word Studies in the New Testament, Greek scholar Marvin Vincent explains that "metanoeo" is the combination of a preposition that means "after" or "with" alongside a verb that means "to perceive." Thus, he says, "...the whole compound means to think differently after." We find this same basic definition in Vine's Complete Expository Dictionary of Old and New Testament Words, which defines "repent" as "to perceive afterward."

The point is that there is a distinct process that works itself out regarding repentance. First, you sin, either once or a hundred times. Second, somewhere along the line after you have sinned, you realize that what you did was wrong and you are actually sorry that you did it. Your sorrow shows that you are now thinking differently about sin and seeing sin as a problem. Third, now that your thinking has changed concerning sin, you have the inner motivation necessary to stop sinning.

By understanding this process, you can understand why repentance has been defined as "a change of mind that leads to a change of action." Also, you can understand why the apostle Paul said, "For godly sorrow produces repentance..." (2 Corinthians 7:10, N.K.J.V.). Admittedly, the specific context for those words from Paul has to do with salvation, but the link between feeling sorry for your sin and repenting of that sin always applies.

This explains why high-pressure tactics, threats, and even emotional pleas don't produce repentance that lasts. If someone badgers, threatens, or begs you enough to get you to stop committing a particular sin, but deep inside your mind you don't feel sorry for having sinned in the first place, you will almost certainly eventually return to the sin. Why? It's because your repentance was not produced by a change of mind and what Paul calls "godly sorrow."

I've always loved that illustration about the little boy who was told to sit down but wouldn't. Finally, his mother walked over to him and manhandled him by picking him up and plopping him down into a chair. As the little fellow sat there stewing, he said, "I may be sitting down on the outside, but I'm standing up on the inside!" That, my friend, is why so much so-called "repentance" doesn't last in our lives. Even as we are outwardly doing the right thing about the sin, inwardly we are still thinking wrongly about it. We are rationalizing it, minimizing it, or attempting to explain it away. Like that little boy, we are still standing up on the inside, mentally. And what will that mean in the long run? It will mean that at some point, sooner or later, we will run back to the sin. It's virtually inevitable.

Therefore, as we begin this New Year let me say that repentance is infinitely better than resolution. While resolutions are typically barely skin deep, repentance goes way deep, penetrating even to the inner recesses of the mind. Accordingly, show me a person who says, 'I've got to change my way of doing," and I'll show you a person whose attempts to stop committing his pet sin won't go the distance. On the other hand, show me a person who says, "I've got to change my way of thinking," and I'll show you a person who has an honest-to-goodness chance of laying a pet sin in the dust once and for all. You see, the battleground is the mind, not the body. If you can get the mind turned around, the body will naturally follow.

With the start of the new year comes the time to turn our attention to the slate of candidates for local, state, and national offices. The primary election will be held on March 5, 2024, and the general election on November 5, 2024.

North Carolina may be an important swing state in the presidential election. This is also the state's first year with 14 congressional districts, having gained an additional seat due to a population increase as recorded in the 2020 U.S. Census. North Carolina does not have a U.S. Senate seat open this year.

At the state level, 2024 will bring elections for all 170 members of the General Assembly (elected every two years) along with all executive branch Council of State positions (elected every four years).

The Council of State is constituted of 10 elected officers, including the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, Attorney General, State Treasurer, State Auditor, Superintendent of Public Instruction, Commissioner of Labor, Commissioner of Agriculture, and Commissioner of Insurance. Republicans currently hold six of the 10 state-wide offices.

I have filed to run again to serve District 47 in the state Senate. If elected, this will be my 8th term, having been first elected in 2010. It has been an honor to serve the people of western North Carolina for 13 years, and I hope to continue serving my district.

Some important, but often overlooked, races in 2024 will be for our state judges. There are four judicial elections in 2024, including one seat on the state Supreme Court. These positions are of the utmost importance. Activist judges threaten the integrity of our system of checks and balances by legislating from the bench. Instead, we should elect jurists who respect the Constitution by seeking to apply it fairly and correctly.

In a purple state like North Carolina, every vote counts. Statewide races are sometimes decided by narrow margins. It is important to be an educated voter and select candidates that best align with your values as well as encourage people who share those values to vote.

New Sewer and Water Projects Coming to Burke County

North Carolina's newest budget appropriates \$2 billion for a variety of water and sewer infrastructure projects across the state. As a result, several Burke County municipalities will receive sizeable allocations for those purposes. The biggest project funded in the new budget involves a total of \$24 million for upgrading the water facilities of the Town of Valdese, linking it to the City of Lenoir's water grid to provide for the growing water needs of its customers. Valdese has existing, excess water capacity. With the upgrades to its system and an extension of water piping across the Catawba River to connect to Lenoir's system, Valdese will be able to sell water to Lenoir. Those substantial new water sales, in turn, are expected to help Valdese significantly spread the town's water operating costs to the new customers, thereby taking some pressure off costs to the town's existing customer base. Of the total project cost, \$7 million is allocated to Valdese with the balance going to Lenoir for its new lines and connections.

Other significant state funding is going to the City of Morganton. It will receive \$13.56 million for various water projects designed to expand the capacity and efficiency of its water and sewer systems, both renovating dated facilities and allowing for expansion to meet new service demands. The Town of Connelly Springs receives \$2.548 million to construct new water/sewer lines in currently unserved areas of the town. This expansion by Connelly Springs is intended, in particular, to open up new areas to help meet the county's major housing needs.

Finally, Burke County itself was granted \$500 thousand to study and map existing water/sewer infrastructure in the eastern part of the county. One of the impediments to housing or other development is inadequate information on proximity to available infrastructure in that area of the county. This study and mapping will hopefully put county and municipal officials in a better position to make decisions on sewer and water need that obviously impact our citizens in such significant ways.

Happy New Year! I hope that each of you has experienced a peaceful and blessed Christmas holiday filled with family, fellowship, and remembrance of all our blessings. As we move forward into a new year, I am reminded of how quickly it seems that time passes. It was fourteen years ago, in late 2009, that Lydia and I decided together that I would seek to represent the citizens of Burke and Caldwell counties in the NC Senate. As I look back on the past fourteen years, I am thankful for all the wonderful people that I have had the opportunity to meet and work with in our district, in the NC House and Senate, and all across state government. Even more rewarding has been the opportunity during those years to serve (at different times) those living in Avery, Burke, Buncombe, Caldwell, Cleveland, and McDowell counties, and to work with the local elected leaders of those counties and their municipalities. I truly consider it an honor to have worked with you, and for you, to improve our communities. 2023 saw several important pieces of legislation regarding faith and family.

This month I would like to highlight two bills signed into law by Gov. Cooper near the end of 2023. House Bill 8 was signed into law on October 2, 2023. This bill had a very long journey through the General Assembly and ended up being a vehicle for many different changes in education law. However, Section 3 of HB 8 deals creates a new Article in the General Statutes, "Pornography Age Verification Enforcement Act." This new law will require age verification tools for commercial publications and distribution of material harmful to minors. If a commercial entity, including a website or phone carrier, neglects to verify the age of a user, the entity is subject to civil action by individuals or by class action. Hopefully, this provision will add a layer of protection for children and parents against harmful electronic content. A related bill, SB 579 Prevent Harm to Children, was also signed into law on October 2nd. This new law creates a Class H felony for any adult or business entity that promotes the sale or delivery of printed materials, dances, or other performances that are considered obscene under the definition of obscenity found in NC law. This law will also allow a court to grant restitution for injuries and damages to children who are victims of sexual exploitation.

As the new year 2024 begins, I hope that it will bring new and renewed friendships, cooperation, and bipartisanship across all levels of our state and local governments as we face new challenges and opportunities that are sure to come. I'll conclude with this thought: We are all at the beginning of a new year. What plans do you have for yourself in the year to come? And how will you choose your goals for this year? Scripture guides in answering those questions: "*Trust in the Lord with ALL your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in ALL your ways acknowledge Him, and He shall direct your paths.*" (Proverbs 3: 5-6). If we can understand and apply God's definition of the word "ALL" in this passage, we will surely begin the year on the right path. May He bless and prosper you and your family in 2024.

Christian Voters By Laura Macklem

The primary season for the 2024 election has started, and during this time you will hear many candidates in Republican primaries claim to be conservative. But as Christians we need to look beyond the talking points and slick ads to answer the question--will this candidate stand up for Biblical values?

After redistricting, candidates rushed to declare their intentions to run in newly drawn districts with a conservative bend. In some primary races, up to 10 candi-

dates are jockeying for the top spot to face off in the general election, including Congressional District 13 and Lt. Governor. The abundance of candidates does provide the advantage of choice but can also confuse, especially when conservative candidates are proclaiming their commitment to family values.

We should be aware that professed Christians don't always vote for Biblical values. In the North Carolina General Assembly, we have two pastors who vote with the abortion lobby and against parental rights, along with other Christian members. Cabarrus County's Representative Diamond Staton-Willims (HD 73) said she consulted with her pastor and Christian church, and having an abortion was the right thing because another child would disrupt her family's opportunities and schedule. In Wake County, School Board member Monika Johnson-Hostler said her Christian faith guides her, but she fights to keep pornography in schools. Don't look for labels, look for fruit.

Christian voters can make informed decisions by referencing trusted organizations for endorsements, voter guides, and candidate surveys. The Christian non-profit policy group NC Values Coalition partners with iVoterGuide, a free Christian digital voters' guide available on your phone or computer. iVoterGuide rates candidates conservative to liberal, based on a questionnaire they send out on candidates' positions, issues, candidates' endorsements and voting records, donations, and public comments. This year iVoterGuide will have a new red 'thumbs up" feature indicating North Carolina candidates thoroughly vetted and endorsed by NC Values. Included in the survey is a direct question about faith. NC Values also just produced a Legislative Scorecard indicating how NC General Assembly members voted for family values. Voters interested in a more hands-on critique can attend candidate forums, do online research, follow social media, and contact contestants directly. The responsibility of voting isn't just on election day or during early voting, it begins with research and prayer. Share your research with friends and family and encourage your socially conservative friends to vote.

According to the group Christians Engaged, "Americans who call themselves born-again Christians only vote on average 2% more than the general public." For a demographic whose values are under daily attack, we can do better. Election after election I see races called by razor-thin margins demanding recounts, proving that every vote does count. This past session lawmakers passed a prolife bill limiting abortions, legislation to prevent males on female school sports teams, protecting minors from medical gender transitioning, and upholding parental rights. None of these pieces of important legislation would have been possible if Christians stayed home on election day, but the reality is that we need more pro-life conservatives in the General Assembly. While conservatives have a super-majority, it's too close for comfort without a vote to spare. When Christians decline to vote, it's another vote for the radical left. We have to increase our numbers as voters.

North Carolina conservatives have the opportunity to increase the conservative super-majority by 7 seats, elect another conservative to the Supreme Court, three more justices to the Court of Appeals, 11 conservatives to Congress, and Council of State members including the Governor, Lt. Governor, Attorney General and also President of the United States. Don't forget the school board races where decisions are made about curriculum and parental rights.

The left is motivated now more than ever. They are organized, militant, and well-funded, but their values aren't in line with most North Carolinians. When Christians are committed to voting for candidates with Biblical values, they are voting against the spiritual war waged against families. They are protecting the unborn, parental rights, truth, justice, and religious freedom. As committed, informed Christian voters, we can make change for God's glory and the future of our state and nation.

"Imperatives For The Christian In 2024"

2 Chronicles 15:4 "But when they in their trouble did turn unto the lord god of Israel, and sought him, he was found of them."

Welcome to the New Year! If you are like me, you are still writing the date as 2023 and wondering where the last year has gone. For some, the New Year is time for a "fresh start," and can also serve as a time to ponder the past year and prog-

ress in our churches. It is a joy to know that God has always used His people to help accomplish His plans that God still has a plan for this world of ours, and that He has a part for you to fulfill while serving in your local church body! You have a part in the future of His church... In its success.... Or its failure.

This time of year, most people will make some sort of "resolution" either publicly or privately. To resolve means "to make a decision or to solve a difficulty." We often think about resolutions or things that we can intentionally improve including our weight, our finances, or our social calendar. Rather than focus on a resolution, which we may or may not keep, (remember that unused gym membership from 2021?) I would like to offer to you some "imperatives" that I believe are critical to our church bodies. By using the word "imperative," we need to think about vitally important things; they are not just suggestions but are absolutely necessary. The word imperative means: critical, crucial, or essential. Humanly speaking, some imperatives for us are food... water... physical activity... etc. These are not only suggestions, but they are considered critical to our health and well-being, and without them, our bodies will eventually not be able to function and perform as they were designed to do.

May I recommend to you reading 2 Chronicles 15 and the example set forth by Asa. We learn in v. 3-4 above that they had been outside the will of God for some time, and in their distress, they returned to God after a period of decline. Without some particularly significant changes, they would be unable to serve and follow God as they should. The Bible is as relevant to our lives today as it was when it was written, and we can still apply these principles to our lives and churches in the coming New Year and see God move among His people.

Firstly, there was a RETURN of God's people to Him. Verse four tells us that they turned to God and sought Him. Friend, that is a plan that has always worked! When we turn to God and seek Him, that is the first step in giving Him the place that He deserves in our lives and our churches. Before God will send revival and heal our homes, our churches, and our land, there must first and foremost be a return to God of His people. If we want to make the most of 2024, we must follow the example of Asa and realize as God's people, that whatever we strive to do.... We need Him!

Secondly, there must be a REMOVAL from our lives of all the things that do not honor God. If you read v.8 of this chapter, you will find out that Asa "put away" all of the abominable idols of the land and made a conscious decision that they would only honor and serve the one true and living God. For Asa and the people, it was the idols and the high places that induced them to follow other gods. We only need to take a quick look at our society today to see that there are many "idols" that come between us and the service of God.

Lastly, in v. 8, we see that they "*renewed the altar of the Lord*." If you continue to read this entire chapter, you will find that they renewed several things including an offering, their covenant, their worship, their praise, and the list goes on. True sweeping change is what will happen when revival comes, and revival comes when we make a conscious decision to RETURN to the Lord. This return is imperative for God's people in 2024! I pray that God blesses you, your family, and your church in this New Year.



One of those insights is his astonishing ability to sow doubt. Unchallenged, doubt bears the fruit of confusion, redefinition, and rejection of truth.



Our culture is awash in satanic doubt. One of our Supreme Court Justices cannot define the word "woman." A startling number of professing Christians attempt to blend the religion of evolution with the worship of Creator God. "People of faith" consider marriage optional and same sex relationships acceptable. "Freedom in Christ" is an excuse for sinful practices which the Bible labels abomination. Some Christians endorse the murder of unborn babies. None of these heresies would be thinkable had not the ancient adversary been able to instill doubt in the minds of well-intended people.

This rejection of Biblical truth is blatant in the widespread misunderstanding of what constitutes "worship." Modern Christians believe that "worship" is about singing or listening to other people sing. The Bible teaches no such thing.

The Hebrew word for "worship" is shachah, Strong's 7812. It means "to bow down." In traditional Eastern cultures, the act of prostrating oneself before another is an acknowledgment of inferiority. The one being worshipped is affirmed as greater, stronger, and more significant. Hebrew worship always includes sacrifice. Implicit in the Hebrew act of "bowing before" is a commitment to absolute obedience. Nowhere in the Bible is worship defined as "singing to" or "singing about" someone.

Unquestioning obedience is evident in Abraham's response when he was called to sacrifice the son of the promise. The word shachah occurs twice before. In Genesis 18:2, Abraham bowed before three visitors to his camp. In 19:1, Lot bowed before two angels at his home in Sodom. The first account where the definition of shachah is fleshed out through action includes Genesis 22:5, "*Then Abraham said to his young men, 'Stay here with the donkey; I and the boy will go over there and worship and come again to you.'*"

Abraham's example provides startling perspective on the nature of worship. God told him to take the long-awaited son of promise, travel to Mt. Moriah, kill the boy, and offer his body as a burnt offering. His response leaves no doubt that worship is unquestioning obedience. Also, worship never involves arguing with God.

"But God, you promised us this boy. We waited a long time. We're too old to have another. This is going to break his mother's heart. Surely you don't expect me to kill my own son. You've never before asked for human sacrifice."

None of these natural reactions were included in Abraham's response. Instead, he devoted himself to the details of carrying out what he had been told. He rose early, saddled his donkey, selected two servants to assist, split wood for the sacrifice, and set out for the assigned destination. When they arrived, Abraham told his servants that he and Issac were about to worship.

But how was that possible? They had no choir, no stage, no keyboard, no electric guitar or bass, no microphone, no amplifier, no drum kit, and no laser lights. The closest thing to a smoke machine was a simple altar and some firewood. Who could worship under those conditions? When Abraham bound his only son with a rope and placed him on the altar, no one sang. No one waved their hands. No professional musicians presented a concert. The worship Abraham offered was nothing but obedience.

All of us come to God with a sinful nature. He expects us to change. He demands that our every desire be to honor Him by following His Son's example. Jesus walked in perfect obedience. Many churches tell us that all we have to do is nod our head and repeat a little prayer. Jesus says that we must hunger and thirst after righteousness. He says to every disciple, "*If you love me, keep My commandments*." Grace does not mean that we are excused from obedience. Grace is what covers our human frailty when we fail in spite of sincere effort.

The Second Chapter of Hebrews offers us this challenge: "*Pay much closer attention to what we have heard, lest we drift away from it.*" Our old enemy's demonstrated goal is to trick us into paying attention to the wrong things. His plan is working. Jesus left us to carry out the most important work in history. He assured us that He will return to finish the job. He commanded us to gather each Sabbath to be instructed and encouraged so that we might do a better job. How did the devil convince us that our job is to show up on Sundays for entertainment and emotional catharsis? How did he distract us from the fact that "worship" is what we do the rest of the week?

Hebrews 11:6 teaches that "Without faith it is impossible to please God." Most Churches claim that "faith" is something you think. The Bible teaches that "faith" is what you do. Here is that lesson in James 2:21, "Was not Abraham our father justified by works when he offered up his son Isaac on the altar?" Saving faith always leads to a sincere attempt to live in obedience. An obedient life is an unending act of worship.

The ancient deceiver led Eve down that garden path to rebellion. The cost of the first sin is unimaginable. Now he has redefined "worship" as "singing." When we gather as believers, we should sing joyfully and loudly. Singing helps focus and express our delight and devotion to the One who died in our place. But singing is not worship, and "Church" does not exist merely to meet my needs. Hebrews 11:17 says that, "*By faith Abraham, when he was tested, offered up Issac.*" We could sing nonstop for the next hundred years and never scratch the surface of that level of commitment.

Making a Difference By Our Relationship to the Scripture By Dr. Tom Walker McDowell County

2 Tim 2:15 says, "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth."

There is a famine of Bible study in these days. Due to

people being occupied with lesser important things, there is a deficient knowledge of what the Scriptures have to say to our generation. It is about time we wake up and realize how important the Word of God is to our daily lives.

One of my greatest treasures is my Dad's old KJV Thomas Chain Reference Bible. Many of its pages are worn, not from abuse but rather from use. The most damaged pages in his Bible is the book of Ephesians. My dad would not have lived the quality of spiritual life he demonstrated if he had not been a diligent student of the Bible.

So much is said in the Bible about the importance of the Word of God in our lives. Here are a few examples from God's Book, looking only at one chapter in the Bible, referring to Psalm 119:

Psalms 119:9: "Wherewithal shall a young man cleanse his way? by taking heed thereto according to thy word."

Psalms 119:11: "*Thy word have I hid in mine heart, that I might not sin against thee.*"

Psalms 119:16: "I will delight myself in thy statutes: I will not forget thy word."

Psalms 119:25: "...Quicken thou me according to thy word."

Psalms 119:28: "...Strengthen thou me according unto thy word."

Psalms 119:38: "Stablish thy word unto thy servant..."

Psalms 119:42: "...I trust in thy word."

Psalms 119:50: "This is my comfort in my affliction: for thy word hath quickened me."

Psalms 119:67: "Before I was afflicted I went astray: but now have I kept thy word."

Psalm 119:74:"...I have hoped in thy word."

Psalms 119:101: "I have refrained my feet from every evil way, that I might keep thy word."

Psalms 119:105: "*Thy word is a lamp unto my feet, and a light unto my path.*" Psalms 119:133: "*Order my steps in thy word: and let not any iniquity have dominion over me.*"

Psalms 119:140: "Thy word is very pure: therefore thy servant loveth it."

Psalms 119:148: "*Mine eyes prevent the night watches, that I might meditate in thy word.*"

Psalms 119:162: "I rejoice at thy word, as one that findeth great spoil."

Psalms 119:169: "Let my cry come near before thee, O Lord: give me understanding according to thy word."

Psalms 119:172: "*My tongue shall speak of thy word: for all thy commandments are righteousness.*"

Let's go back to our text found in 2 Tim 2:15, which says, "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth."

The Command

Notice the word "study." That word is translated to other places in God's Word as "do diligence, be diligent, endeavor, and labour." It can imply using speed, making an effort, or being prompt and earnest." It suggests we are to exert ourselves for something beneficial or valuable.

Word studies are very beneficial. There are several truths we can learn from examining the verb "study" in our text. It is a singular verb, which may tell us there is a benefit to doing personal, private Bible studies. Although we give that emphasis, it in no way takes away from or discredits the value of studying the Scriptures with other people.

It also is a orist tense, which gives reference to doing something at a certain time. We need to allot specific times to study the Word of God. If we do so, we mustn't let circumstances around us steal the time we have set aside for laboring in Bible study.

It is an active voice. No one else can do this for us, it is our responsibility to be motivated to actively spend time seeking an understanding of what the Word of God has to say. No one can do this study for you, because you must dig in and do it for yourself, knowing how beneficial it will be to your Christian life.

It is in the imperative mode. In simple form, that means it is a command, not just a suggestion. God specifically and purposely inspired the use of the imperative mode in expressing the action involved in studying.

Consider a verse in Ecclesiastes 12:12: "...Of making many books there is no end; and much study is a weariness of the flesh." A diligent scriptural investigation is tiring, but the benefit is well worth the effort exerted.

The Objective

The Bible says in our text verse the objective of our Bible study is to: "*Show thyself approved unto God.*" It is too often that we do what we do to obtain the approval of others.

What God thinks about what we are doing is far more important than what other people think about what we are doing.

2 Timothy 2:4 says, "No man that warreth entangleth himself with the affairs of this life; that he may please him who hath chosen him to be a soldier."

In Galatians 1:10 the Apostle Paul asks a couple of questions and then gives

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his own response to those two questions: "For do I now persuade men, or God? or do I seek to please men? for if I yet pleased men, I should not be the servant of Christ."

God is very pleased when we set aside time, and give diligent effort, to spend valuable time in searching the Scriptures.

Pleasing God should be of supreme importance in our lives. Here is what we must not forget; one day we will have to stand before Him. If a person is lost, he or she will stand at the Great White Throne judgment, where degrees of punishment in Hell will be decided. The Great White Throne judgment will occur after the tribulation and the thousand-year millennial reign of Christ is completed. Saved people will stand at a separate judgment, the Judgement Seat of Christ, right after Jesus comes to rapture His bride, the church. Jesus said in Rev.4, "*My reward is with me.*"

Pleasing God will never be regretted. Those who possess regrets will be the ones who have little or no concerns about pleasing or gratifying God. Saved people want to delight the heart of God; we want Him to take pleasure in the way we daily conduct our lives.

Pleasing God will reap eternal benefits and rewards. Jesus said if a person gives a cup of cold water in His name, that person would in no wise lose their reward (Matt.10:42). We are wise if we live not just for the present, instead we should live with eternity in view.

The Courage

Our text verse says, "A workman that needeth not to be ashamed." The more thoroughly we know the Bible. The word "ashamed" speaks either of the frame of mind of the Bible student or the way it is presented.

Many people should be ashamed of the way they interpret the Bible. Any doctrine can be taught when you take the Bible out of its context. There is a whole Bible context, a book context, a passage context, and a verse context. For instance, if one tried to prove one can lose his or her salvation from Matthew 7:19, which says, "*Every tree that bringeth not forth good fruit is hewn down, and cast into the fire*" is a false interpretation. To try to say that is a believer, who is cast into the fire, would violate the context, or the surroundings of that verse; plus, it would contradict many other passages that prove a genuine, born-again child of God can never be lost (Rom. 8:38-39; John 3:16; Heb.7:25 and many others).

In attitude, we should never be ashamed of the Word of God. We must realize it is settled in Heaven (Ps. 119:89). We need to handle the Scriptures carefully because it is God's settled, eternal truths.

In presentation, we must compare Scripture with Scripture as found in its context. To fail to do so is to err in Biblical presentation and proclamation.

The Goal

Consider the words- "*Rightly dividing the Word of Truth*." We should interpret the Bible with the view to discover what God is seeking to say to us. We are to handle the Word of Truth rightly and correctly. Since the Bible is God's truth, it is a serious matter to misrepresent what the Scriptures are telling us; that is what the people who are not born again do.

Interpreting the Bible correctly is so important, we have a warning in Revelation 22:19—"And if any man shall take away from the words of the book of this prophecy, God shall take away his part out of the book of life, and out of the holy city, and from the things which are written in this book." To use this verse as proof that once a person is saved and born into the family of God, he or she can lose the free gift of salvation, is to take this verse out of context. This passage assumes a child of God will not tamper with the Scriptures. He may not understand all that is written in the Book of Revelation, but he will recognize it as a declaration of hope that has been assured to him in grace through salvation in Christ.

You can make a huge difference in life if you have the right attitude and relationship to the Scripture.

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

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

Losing Your Worldly Identity and Finding Your Path to Christ

My Off-Course Church Friend

"I don't think I want to go to church anymore," my new friend said, shortly after getting into the passenger seat.

"What?" I asked bewildered. "Did something happen at church?" My new friend, whom I will address as Emily, is in her early 20's. She recently moved to the area with her husband, whom I will call Derrik. A few days before, she had called me intoxicated and asked for some advice about her marriage. The conversation quickly turned into a long tale of background abuse and her sinful addictions and struggles. Emily and Derrik have been married for only a few years, and as the conversation continued, what was presented was a lot of infidelity, hurt, and unforgiveness.

I took a deep breath and recommenced my question: "Is it because of the past or a current situation that has happened?"

"It's everything Elkanah. I believe in God, but I feel so lonely. I go on social media – and I download these apps, and the compliments I receive feel good. I then have a few drinks, and I end up calling Derrik and confiding in what I had done or threatening him on what I will do. I know he regrets marrying me. Why is God not helping me? I don't want to continue to cheat on him." Her face became red with frustration and sadness, and she began to cry.

Childhood Chaos

As we continued to talk, I learned that she didn't have a stable upbringing, and she encountered a lot of spiritual abuse and abandonment. She confessed she was looking for love and attention. She admitted she just couldn't get enough affection. Additionally, she was lost in her identity. I could sense she was looking for something more out of life. Her unhealthy coping skills didn't help her mental state of mind, nor did the unresolved regret and shame she was enduring.

I paused as we stopped at a red light, and I put my hand on her shoulder. Then I said something she didn't anticipate: "Everything you've expressed to me; in some capacity, I have had to deal with. I too have regret and shame. I too have said or done things I wish I didn't do. You are not alone. We all try to find our identity in the world – but the world will not fill us. It will provide a big side dish of sin and consequences."

"It doesn't feel that way...It seems like your life is perfect. I walk into church, and everyone's life seems like they just have it all together. Even when I pray, I just have a brain full of muffled voices. I have gone through so much over the years. My pain became my birthright to sin. The more I tried to bury my hurt, the more my struggle with bad habits and ongoing affairs continued. I do feel bad for what I do, and sometimes I can't even look in the mirror. Yet – I just keep doing it."

Choosing to Care

After a brief moment, I continued. "I am so sorry for the things you went through when you were younger. I can't fill that deep hole. Derrik can't fill that deep hole. And your addictions will only dig the hole deeper. But you know what? God can not only fill the hole but fill it to the top, where there is no longer a pit for you to fall in."

We stopped at our destination, a local hiking trail, and headed for our walk. I then shared my struggles with regret and shame, and how all God's children struggle with sin. I advised her that we just need to hand over our lives to God. I passionately dived into a few scriptures I memorized. One of these scriptures is in Isaiah 1:18 (KJV) which says, "*Come now, and let us reason together, saith the Lord: though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they be red like crimson, they shall be as wool.*" I explained to Emily that although we do commit sins, God does not look at us the way that humanity looks at us. It doesn't matter what we have done, if we submit ourselves to the Lord, He will wipe our slate clean. I also continued to remind her that a father will correct his children. In Hebrews 12:6 (KJV) it says, "*For whom the Lord loveth he chasteneth, and scourgeth every son whom he receiveth.*"

Being a Christian does not mean we are going to be perfect. On the contrary, as Christians, we will experience temptations and struggles.

A New Creation in Christ

It is wrong to want to please God for the wrong reason. Many people hope they can somehow get God to like them. They think they can earn God's love by being a good person. Then there are others—far too many—who sin

ing a good person. Then there are others—far too many—who simply ignore God or don't care what He thinks about them. The Bible urges us to "*please [God] in every way: bearing fruit in every good work*" (Colossians 1:10, NIV).

No matter how good we think we are, we can never earn God's love because God's standard is perfection. Even one sin—just one—would be enough to keep us out of Heaven. The Bible says, "*For whoever shall keep the whole law, and yet stumble in one point, he is guilty of all*" (James 2:10, NKJV).

This doesn't mean that God will never love us. It doesn't mean that we cannot be saved. No human is perfect. But Jesus in His perfect righteousness came to forgive mankind their sins and make us part of His family forever. He did this because He loves us and wants us to be in Heaven with Him for eternity. 
