Habakkuk did. He experienced many struggles and they just seemed to keep getting worse as time went on.



God

The Holy Spirit

The Holy Spirit is the very Spirit of God, fully divine, manifested in the life of every believer from the moment of salvation. He is equal with the Father and the Son as God. He is present in the world to make men aware of their need for Jesus Christ. He provides the Christian with power for living, understanding of spiritual truth, and guidance in doing what is right. The Christian seeks to live under His daily control.

The Bible

The Bible is the divinely inspired, authoritative, infallible, living and active Word of God to all men. It was written by human authors under the supernatural guidance of the Holy Spirit. It is the ultimate source of truth for Christian beliefs and living. In it we find a guideline for right relationship with God and God's creation, and a blueprint for personal, emotional, and spiritual growth.


Eternity & Eternal Security

Salvation is God's gift of redemption and reconciliation to Himself and is offered freely to all who accept, by faith alone, Jesus Christ as God's only son and receive Him as Lord and Savior. We can never make up for our sin with self-improvement or good works. It is only by trusting in Jesus Christ as God's offer of forgiveness that you can be saved from sin's penalty. Eternal life begins the moment you receive Jesus Christ into your life by faith.



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Obedient Heart Fellowship

Wrong Question

One of the more enduring Christian fads is an implication of the question: What Would Jesus Do? W.W.J.D. appears in many formats, especially bracelets. During the years just before and after the turn of this century, those bracelets were everywhere.

I am in favor of believers aligning their lives more closely with that of the Son of God and communicating that intention. I question, however, any need to ponder how Jesus might respond to circumstance. Rather than speculating about what He might do, our time would be better spent learning what He has already done.

First, Jesus devoted Himself to implementing God's plan. His mission is clear: "For I have come down from heaven, not to do my own will but the will of him who sent me." (John 6:38) "For I have not spoken on my own authority, but the Father who sent me has himself given me a commandment—what to say and what to speak." (John 12:49) "Father, if you are willing, remove this cup from me. Nevertheless, not my will, but yours, be done." (Luke 22:42)

In a way that I do not fully understand, the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit are One. The Hebrew word for this unity is "echad." Despite being One, each of God's revealed forms has different roles. 1 Corinthians 11:3 says, "But I want you to understand that the head of every man is Christ, the head of a woman is her husband, and the head of Christ is God." In the work of redeeming mankind, the Son is subordinate to the Father. Jesus did what He had been told.

A second focus of Jesus' life is His knowledge of Scripture. Of course this was less of a challenge for Him since He is divine, and He wrote the Book. Through a Spirit-fortified intimacy with God's Word, we are enabled to rebuke the demonic power which surrounds us. "Man shall not live on bread alone but on every word that proceeds from the mouth of God." (Matthew 4:4)

During His temptation, Jesus resisted the devil by quoting scripture. Many Christians believe and teach that the majority of God's Word is no longer relevant. They claim to be "new testament" believers and that "all that Law stuff" does not apply to them. Jesus demonstrated a radically different perspective. When confronted with the most significant temptations satan ever conveyed, Jesus responded three times by quoting the book of Deuteronomy. When accused by the Pharisees of "eating with sinners and tax collectors," He quoted Hosea 6:6, "I desire steadfast love and not sacrifice." (Matthew 9:10-13) Jesus said that the Law and the Prophets will be in undiminished effect for as long as heaven and earth remain. How can we who claim to follow Him ignore three-fourths of the Bible?

Jesus also devoted Himself to prayer. The Gospels contain many references to Messiah's prayer life. These include Matthew 14:23, Mark 6:46, Luke 3:21, and John 16:26. He prayed before many of His miracles. Luke 5:16 says that He often slipped away to the wilderness to pray. In Matthew 26:53, He affirmed the power of prayer by telling His disciples that He could ask the father for an army of angels. At the climax of His existential crisis, He fell on His face at Gethsemane and prayed for hours. While He was being slowly tortured to death, He prayed for those who tormented Him. Both Hebrews 7:25 and Romans 8:34 say that Jesus still prays on our behalf in His role as High Priest. One of the most powerful and least understood aspects of Jesus' prayer life is revealed in Hebrews 5:7, "In the days of His flesh, He offered up both prayers and supplications with loud crying and tears to the One able to save Him from death, and He was heard because of His piety."

Here is the key to understanding both what Jesus did and what He expects us to be doing. His prayers were effective because of His piety. Piety is obedience to God's instructions for living. Piety is the opposite of sin. 1 John 3:4 says that sin is breaking God's Law. The only way to keep from sinning is to obey God's Law. He hears our prayers when we devote ourselves to living according to His holy standards.

The Bible tells us that Jesus is both our guide and example. He obeyed God's instructions for living, and so should we. Do not make the mistake of thinking that we love God and others by attempting to project nebulous "warm thoughts and feelings." Biblical love is not about feelings. Biblical love is about action. Do not be deceived by the false doctrines which claim that "grace" makes obedience unnecessary or that grace and Law are incompatible. See Revelation 14:12. Scripture teaches that our job is to live as Jesus lived among us. 1 John 2:3-4 says that the only evidence of a saving relationship with Jesus is our sincere attempt to keep His commandments. That passage goes on to say, "Whoever keeps his word, in him truly the love of God is perfected. By this we may know that we are in him. Whoever says he abides in him ought to walk in the same way in which he walked."

Religious graffiti will never convince anyone that we belong to the one who died for us. The only way to stand out from the members of this lost world is to live like Jesus lived. We never need to wonder what He might do. We have the powerful, unambiguous example of His life. The only legitimate question is, will we be imitators of Him, or will we decide that our own priorities are more important. Thank God that salvation is by grace through faith, but lives to which Holy God calls us are devoted to obedience.

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
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Dave Says

Dear Dave,

I'm beginning to feel some bitterness and resentment towards my parents for their recent decisions and financial irresponsibility. Fifteen years ago, while I was still in school, they left good-paying jobs to enter the ministry. They both took pay cuts when they made this decision, and they've been regularly asking for money for living expenses from my husband and me ever since.



Sometimes, they even try to make us feel guilty if we can't give them the amount they ask for. My mom, especially, constantly brings up their call to the ministry, adding that we should want to help them. We believe in their calling, but we also feel they knew they would have to live on less money, and they're being irresponsible with the money they make. What should we do? Abigail

Dear Abigail,

What I'm hearing is giving money to your parents isn't necessarily a financial hardship for you and your husband, but that by consistently giving or loaning your parents money you're losing respect for them. This is not a healthy situation. Your relationship has become strained, and that's a tough thing for anyone to deal with—especially in a parent-child scenario.

Make no mistake, going into the ministry with the right heart is an admirable thing. However, in the Bible, Paul made tents while he conducted his ministry. I'm paraphrasing, of course, but his line was to the effect of, "If you don't work, you don't eat." He had a job. So, I don't think suggesting your folks think about working outside the ministry while trying to do God's work is unfair in a situation like this.

I'm sure your mom is a good person, but no one should do this to their child. On top of it all, she sounds like a travel agent for guilt trips—like she's working you over while implying it's all really for God. That's not only toxic, it's just plain wrong.

It's going to be hard to unravel it all and turn this into a respectable situation where they're not constantly asking for money, and you're not feeling pressure and falling victim to the guilty feelings that enable this behavior. I hope all of you will consider sitting down with a reasonable, objective third party and talking things through. I also hope you'll take some time to read a book called Boundaries by Dr. Henry Cloud. It will open your eyes to a few things.

Dear Dave,

I'm 32 and debt-free, except for my house. My grandmother passed away a couple of months ago, and her will has caused problems for my family. I was her only relative living in the same town as she got older, so I looked in on her and helped take care of her because she didn't want to go into a care facility. In her will, she left everything — her house and property, along with about \$300,000 — to me. Some of my relatives said they deserved something. Two have even accused me of wanting everything she had and turning my grandmother against them. I don't like what's happening, but I'm not sure what to do. I never asked her for anything. Jeffrey

Dear Jeffrey

I hate it when things get ugly between family members, especially at a time when everyone should be pulling together and supporting each other. I'm sorry you're going through all this.

Let me ask you a question. Did you love your grandmother? It sounds to me like you did. A lot! It takes a special person to step in and help the way you did. I think it's pretty obvious she loved you, too.

When a person dies, they can give their belongings to anyone they choose. It was your grandmother's stuff, so it was her decision. Period. She could've spread it around among you and the rest of your family, but she didn't do that. She had her reasons, and her final wishes were just that—her final wishes. No one in your family, even you, deserved anything from her.

I know this is a hard position for you to be in, Jeffrey. This has probably crossed your mind, so I'll go ahead and say it. Generally speaking, it's possible to transfer part of your inheritance to someone else even if it's not specified in the will or trust. Keep in mind, that you might need to seek court approval for such a transfer, depending on the jurisdiction and specific family circumstances.

Or, you can let anyone who has a problem with your grandmother's decision contest the will. Of course, one possible outcome of that is you might have to spend the money she left fighting them in court. The lady left what she left. There's no more. It was her house, her property, and her money. The others aren't entitled to what she had just because they're relatives or they want it.

If you go to church, I'd advise you to spend some time talking to your pastor about the situation. You've got a lot of folks mad at you right now, and I think you might benefit from a few kind words and an objective point of view. I'd also recommend sitting down with a good financial planner—someone with the heart of a teacher—and talking about how to best handle your newfound inheritance. Regardless of your decision, it's always best to have a plan and be prepared.

In the meantime, don't beat yourself up over this, son. You haven't done anything wrong.

What Jesus Left Behind

"Peace I leave with you, my peace I give unto you: not as the world giveth, give I unto you. Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid." John 14:27

Recently, after decades of lying in the shadows of obscurity, my cousin sent me an original family letter from over sixty years earlier. What a treasure to see the words! My older sister had written to my mom's sister-in-law, and her daughter had preserved the envelope, postmarked in 1963.



The letter confirmed what I had told my children about one of my childhood diseases and offered a birds-eye view of life when I was a pre-teen. How precious was that rediscovered letter? The words my mom had dictated to my fourteen-year-old sister (written in cursive) about family life, brought memories rushing back to my mind. I'm glad the letter returned to us because the words on lined notebook paper record my life and family culture, a valued relic from my past.

Often, in my spiritual life, earthly circumstances parallel spiritual analogies. When I understand how God is speaking to me through my life, I grow in grace and knowledge of Jesus (See 2 Peter 3:18.) As I thought about the reclaimed letter, I wondered about what Jesus left behind in His earthly life. While we find no proof of His writing—other than His writing in the sand (See John 8:8.)—He did leave us the Bible. Often, when a famous person dies, their possessions rise swiftly in value and significance. What tangible possessions and even invisible legacies such as influences did Jesus leave behind when He ascended to heaven? Let's consider a few.

Mary, Jesus' mother must have cherished any of His clothing and pieces He had fashioned as the earthly child of a carpenter. Perhaps she treasured his family cup from which he drank often, or maybe she tenderly stored the swaddling clothes from His birth. But, most of all, we know she kept His words and memories of her life-altering experiences. Although still a mystery to her, she remembered her amazing part in Jesus' earthly life. Luke 2:19 says, "But Mary kept all these things, and pondered them in her heart."

Along with Mary, we can ponder the things Jesus left for us. We have Jesus' letter to us, preserved in His Word. In the treasures of the Bible, we, like my family letter, find ourselves totally absorbed by looking into the mirror of the Scriptures. The divinely inspired words offer life in abundance, strength to live for the Lord, and the promise of eternal bliss in His presence.

Another treasure that Jesus left is the Holy Spirit. He bequeathed us His presence in the person of the Spirit. A myriad of books have enumerated the vast legacy of His gifts, and His multiple purposes in our lives which include:

- Guaranteeing us eternal life with Jesus (2 Corinthians 1:21-22)
- Teaching us in the things of the Lord (John 14:26)
- Giving us the words to say to introduce others to Christ (Matthew 10:19-20)
- Gifting us with practical abilities to help other Christians (Romans 12:6-8)
- And many other gifts that will keep us occupied until we meet Jesus (Ephesians 2:7)

Rather than taking us home to heaven immediately when we accept Him as Savior, Jesus allows us to continue living our earthly lives. However, our new lives as Christians are transfused with the light of Jesus, and our new focus on Him shines out to others. As Christians, we can help others come to Jesus and then disciple and minister to others, both believers and nonbelievers.

To help us, Jesus instituted the church as a rich resource for Christians to refresh themselves along their earthly journey. He also imbued His church with a structure to encourage, teach, and extend the Kingdom of God.

The above sample list of treasures Jesus left behind—His Word, the Holy Spirit, other Christians, and the church—becomes more and more precious to us as we journey toward heaven. Like my family's letter, the spiritual value of Jesus' legacy to us as Christians rises to incredible significance in our daily lives. We join with Mary, Jesus' mother, in treasuring the resplendent inheritance Jesus left behind when He ascended to heaven after His resurrection.

Like the letter from my past that delighted me with every word, I exult in every word of Jesus, preserved in the Bible. My worthy goal of being a Christian focuses on having the mind of Christ. He left heaven to turn us from darkness to light and let Himself be known to us (See Acts 26:18.) I'm grateful Jesus loved me first before I turned to Him. He made me significant in His sight enough to die for me and be resurrected so that I could live with Him eternally. This is hope!

Trust the Slow Work of God

Following my article from last month which began to follow Paul's Mediterranean Sea journey to Rome, this article is a followup to last month's. After Paul had completed two successful missionary journeys, Luke gives



an account in Acts 21-28 (and specifically in Chapters 27-28) of Paul's trials and faith on display during his final journey to Rome. This story is a compelling story of faith amid adversity. It is the story of Paul's Mediterranean Sea journey to Rome. He was sent as a prisoner of Rome from Caesarea in Israel to Rome to stand trial before the higher courts of Rome. Though a Jew, Paul was a Roman citizen and he had the right and privilege, as a Roman citizen during a provincial trial, to "appeal to Caesar." Festus, the Roman procurator at Caesarea, granted that appeal and sent him under guard by an Augustan cohort named Julius to be delivered to Rome. They were placed aboard an Adramyttian ship and set sail for the regions along the coast of Asia. During this difficult voyage, Paul would continue to find God's promises, guidance, and provisions along each step of the Journey. That is, indeed, what the Lord desires for us to glean from these important set of lessons or Med Sea Rules. Today, consider a second Med Sea rule: Trust the slow work of God.

The great New England preacher, Phillips Brooks, was noted for his poise and quiet manner. At times, however, even he suffered moments of frustration and irritability. One day a friend saw him feverishly pacing the floor like a caged lion. "What's the trouble, Mr. Brooks?" he asked. "The trouble is that I'm in a hurry, but God isn't!"

History bears out the fact that some of the greatest missionaries of all time devotedly spread the seed of God's Word and yet had to wait long periods before seeing the fruit of their efforts. William Carey, for example, labored 7 years before the first Hindu convert was brought to Christ in Burma. Adoniram Judson toiled 7 years before his faithful preaching was rewarded. In Western Africa, it was 14 years before one convert was received into the Christian church. In New Zealand, it took 9 years; and in Tahiti, it was 16 years before the first harvest of souls began.

James, the half-brother of Jesus who did not accept the claims of Jesus until He appeared to him after the resurrection and who joined others in waiting for the coming of the Holy Spirit on the day of Pentecost, would write in James 1:2-6, "Consider it all joy, my brethren, when you encounter various trials, knowing that the testing of your faith produces endurance. And let endurance have its perfect result, so that you may be perfect and complete, lacking in nothing. But if any of you lacks wisdom, let him ask of God, who gives to all generously and without reproach, and it will be given to him. But he must ask in faith without any doubting, for the one who doubts is like the surf of the sea, driven and tossed by the wind."

As Paul embarked on this "next" part of his "God journey"—a difficult journey that would take him on a long voyage to face the imperial power of Rome, He did so with courage and faith. He did so, knowing that the Lord would guide him and protect him. He did so, realizing that he still had much to learn from God and about God and His goodness. Paul didn't have any idea how long nor what would or could happen along the way. But the one thing that he knew was that his Savior and Lord would walk along with him. And because the Lord was with him, he could trust the slow work of the Lord in his life.

Paul trusted the slow work of God because:

1. God knows what He is doing! God had a plan and a purpose when He placed Paul on that cargo ship. Packed into the ship, Paul and the other prisoners set sail, traveling northward up the coast of Israel. Their first port was Sidon. Paul had friends in Sidon and the Roman cohort, Julius, under whose care he had been entrusted, allowed Paul to disembark and visit his friends for comfort and care. There were some brothers and sisters in Sidon who needed a visit from Paul much more than he needed their care. Don't miss this! God interrupted the voyage to attend to specific needs. Don't you think God knows what He is doing when He interrupts your day and gives you a specific and intentional opportunity to pause, stop what you are doing, and attend to what God needs? Paul could have said, "I'll just stay on the boat. I have an appointment and I don't want to be late." But that's not what he did! And what Paul did is exactly what the Lord Jesus expects that His disciples are going to do. What is that? Trust that God knows what He is doing when trials and temptations come; when interruptions occur; and when God shows you need and opportunities. Here is what you do—get off the boat! Get out of your house and off your pew and get going toward God's specific sending. 2. He cares for you!—The Lord knows what's ahead! And He always prepares for whatever obstacles are in the way. He desires that, like Paul, every one of His children of faith (disciples) will trust His divine plans and Sovereign power to accomplish those plans. He cares for you! As Paul boarded the ship again (v. 4), the ship "sailed under the shelter of Cyprus because the winds were contrary. The Lord knows your every need. He knows your struggles and temptations. He knows your heart, mind, and soul. And He is working to bring you under the shelter of His wings. The Psalmist wrote often about taking refuge in the shelter of God's wings (as in Ps. 61:4). He is, of course, referring to the strong arms and strong hands of Almighty God-who has all things under His Sovereign reign and care. His dominion is everlasting and even the storms of life are at His command. Storms are going to come! Will you trust in His care—for He cares for you, as Peter wrote "casting all your anxiety on Him, because He cares for you." (1 Peter 5:7)

3. He knows the destination!—When the ship weathered the storm, it continued continued on page 12

The gecko lizards in the desert in the SW part of our country are interesting because they don't have eyelids (despite the GEICO commercials). Yet they live in a place with lots of dirt and sand. So how do they stay clean? God gave them a really long tongue which they actually use to clean their eyes.

So what can we learn from the animals? We too should have an innate desire to be clean.

Yet when it comes to the heart of man, we allow corruption and pollution to affect us internally (much like the Temple above). Therefore our cleansing needs to be carried out daily. How? If we confess our sins, "He is faithful and just to forgive us our sin and to purify us from all unrighteousness." (1 John 1:9)

How often should we do this? Just think of your cat and do it every day. We can't avoid the pollution of this world that sticks to us daily. But we can still stay clean daily (or even moment by moment when prompted by the Holy Spirit) confessing our sins before the Lord. Think of it as that nice feeling you get after taking a refreshing cool shower after a hot sticky August day.

Lessons From an Assassin's Bullet

In the aftermath of the attempted assassination of former President Donald Trump, Americans are left wanting answers surrounding the tragedy. One brave father present at the rally, Corey Comperatore, died protecting his family from a stray bullet. Two other attendees, James Copenhaver and David Dutch, suffered critical injuries but are now recovering in stable condition.



The near miss on President Trump was nothing less than breathtaking. Had the Republican nominee not turned his head at precisely the correct moment, the sniper's murderous intent would have been realized. Had the position of the bullet been just one inch to the right, the course of American history would have changed forever in a Pennsylvania field. One cannot come closer to death and emerge unscathed.

While we commend the brave men and women who shielded the president amidst the chaos, questions about the ordeal remain. How was a building just 130 yards from the rally's stage left unsecured? Why was our 45th president allowed to begin his speech while a twenty-year-old killer was simultaneously evading authorities? How could witnesses identify the shooter on the roof a full two minutes before his first shot and nothing be done? Why were there no countermeasures before the assassin's first shot fired?

Hopefully, in time, we will have answers to questions like these to hold those responsible for such deadly blunders accountable. While we wait, I'd like to answer a question of a different sort that, admittedly, not as many people are asking. What spiritual lessons should we learn from the near death of Donald J. Trump? What does the incident teach us about ourselves? Or about the God we serve? Let me suggest three important takeaways.

First, the former president's near demise exposes how fragile we are. Though every human is made in the image of God, possessing an eternal soul, each of us is but a single catastrophe away from passing into eternity. Because the treasure of God's imprint is in earthen vessels, everyday men and women of all ages die (2 Cor. 4:7). Despite the great feats of humanity, the Bible says we spring up like a flower and wither away like a fleeting shadow (Job 14:1-2). The number of our days is but a handbreadth, a mere blip on God's eternal radar (Ps. 39:3-5). Truly, we are here for a moment and then we vanish away (James 4:14).

The events of last weekend were an unwelcomed reminder of how quickly we can, and will, lose everything. Life can end in an instant. History can change in a moment. The disease may ravage our bodies. The decline may swallow up our achievements. The design of others may steal away the time we have left. Every single day, weakness swallows up those who were once strong. These realities do not leave us hopeless, however. Our temporary frailties reveal the eternal strength of our God like nothing else (2 Cor. 4:8-11).

Second, the miraculous intervention that saved Donald Trump's life reminds us that God is sovereign over all things. Some might chalk it up to luck or random chance, but you will never convince me that God did not spare the life of Donald Trump on July 13. God's sovereignty speaks to the fact that He rules over heaven and earth. The Lord has established His throne and He rules over all (Ps. 103:19), including human history (Ps. 66:5-7). We exist because of God's providential care, whereby He creates us, establishes our boundaries, and sustains each breath we take (Acts 17:26-28).

Thus, we can live with confidence that the God who knew us in the womb has written down all the days prepared for us (Psalm 139:16). We cannot add nor take away one moment He prepares for each of us (Job 14:5). Our ways are before Him, and He watches all our paths (Prov. 5:21). I do not pretend to understand all the reasons why God spared the life of President Trump, but I am confident that He will bring it to pass just as He has planned. The same is true for each of us. Finally, our greatest problems are not political, nor are the solutions our world needs. The wickedness required to eliminate your political enemies using assassination is undeniable. Ironically, even those typically hesitant to speak of matters in terms of right and wrong cannot deny the moral repugnancy of last weekend's cowardly act. Only God can help us find our way again. Politics are not insignificant, but neither are they ultimate.

Perhaps this is the moment we need to humble ourselves before the Lord. May we heed the counsel of the psalmist who said, "Let all the earth fear the Lord; Let all the inhabitants of the world stand in awe of Him. For He spoke, and it was done; He commanded, and it stood fast. The Lord nullifies the counsel of the nations; He frustrates the plans of the peoples. The counsel of the Lord stands forever, The plans of His heart from generation to generation. Blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord, The people whom He has chosen for His own inheritance." (Ps. 33:8-12).


Now that's encouraging!



"Are All Prophets?"

The gift of prophecy is given by God for building up His church and the common good of all. This gift is given by the Holy Spirit. Third, true prophets always practice what they preach. "Beware of false prophets, which come to you in sheep's clothing, but inwardly they are ravening wolves. Ye shall know them by their fruits." (Matthew 7:15–16 KJV).

Fourth, anyone with the prophetic gift always glorifies God! "Howbeit when he, the Spirit of truth, is come, he will guide you into all truth: for he shall not speak of himself; but whatsoever he shall hear, that shall he speak: and he will shew you things to come. He shall glorify me: for he shall receive of mine, and shall shew it unto you." (John 16:13–14 KJV).

Finally, all prophecy about the future comes to pass as proof of the genuineness of the gift! "The prophet which prophesieth of peace, when the word of the prophet shall come to pass, then shall the prophet be known, that the LORD hath truly sent him." (Jeremiah 28:9 KJV).

One of the most prominent co-founders of the Seventh-day Adventist church, Ellen G. White, demonstrated the gift of prophecy and also met the criteria of the above tests of a prophet. Lampstands

"Write, therefore, what you have seen, what is now, and what will take place later. The mystery of the seven stars that you saw in my right hand and of the seven golden lampstands is this: The seven stars are the angels of the seven churches, and the seven lampstands are the seven churches." Rev 1:19-20 In Chapters 2-3 we have remarkable letters to the seven



churches. Many people would like to skip these letters and get on into the juicier sections of Revelation where the great upheavals of the last days are interpreted. It is a great mistake to do that. Our Lord set his church amid the world and it is his instrument to control and determine human history. The church is expected to exert tremendous influence in the world's affairs. It is a mistake to pass over these letters. Here we see our Lord correcting things within the church, encouraging and teaching it how to live influentially in the day in which it is called to live. As we come to these letters we must ask ourselves: Why are there only seven churches, and why these particular seven? The only good answer is they represent conditions that will exist throughout the whole period of church history from its beginning to its end. In other words, there are only seven types of churches that exist at any one given period. Here these churches are called lampstands. They are not the light themselves, but they hold or bear the light. The light is the truth as it is in Jesus. Many truths are unknown to man in his natural state. No university, important as it may be, has knowledge of the truth which the church is given to tell the world. That is the moral and redemptive light that the church is called to reflect to a dark world. It is the business of the church to tell the truth to the world. We are not simply to make our way through this difficult world as best we can, coming together in little holy huddles to survive until the coming of the Lord. We have an influence to exercise, and these letters to the seven churches marvelously reflect that fact. Each letter is addressed to the angel of the church. Some have seen this as a reference to the pastor of the church. That is not likely, since in all the churches of the New Testament you never find a single human leader. Leadership is always in the plural — elders and pastors of churches. The word angel appears many times in the book outside these seven letters, and in every case, it refers to a heavenly being — what we normally think of as an angel. It suggests that each church has a heavenly being responsible for it. The angel of the church is the one responsible for helping the human leaders of the church to know the mind of the Lord. In Hebrews, we are told that angels are ministering spirits, sent forth to serve the heirs of salvation (Hebrews 1:14 KJV). It seems likely that in those invisible realms, which are very real but which we cannot see, there are angels assigned to each church to help the leaders and the congregation know what is on the heart of its Lord. 




The Inspiring Word

The book of Romans has many divisions, the first one deals with the doctrine of the gospel, found in chapters 1-8. These chapters comprise three themes: sin, salvation, and sanctification.





We begin with verses eighteen, nineteen, and twenty. Where we read, Romans 1:18-20 "For the wrath of God is revealed from heaven against all ungodliness and unrighteousness of men, who hold the truth in unrighteousness; (19) Because that which may be known of God is manifest in them; for God hath shewed it unto them. (20) For the invisible things of him from the creation of the world are clearly seen, being understood by the things that are made, even his eternal power and Godhead; so that they are without excuse:"

As we look at this passage Paul opens with the wrath of God being revealed. Wrath is one of those words that grab your attention as soon as you hear it. Thayer defines Wrath as "The ὀργή attributed to God in the N. T. is that in God which stands opposed to man's disobedience, obduracy (especially in resisting the gospel) and sin and manifests itself in punishing the same: John 3:36; Rom. 1:18; 4:15; 9:22a; Heb. 3:11; 4:3; Rev. 14:10; 16:19; 19:15; absolutely." Humanity has created for itself an artificial and imaginary comfort zone. We often live as if we can impress God by showing that I am not as bad as so-N-so! Paul tells us that all ungodliness and unrighteousness of men draw the wrath of God. This knowledge should terrify us. Verse nineteen describes our awareness of God and everything that may be known of God. It is inside us; God has shown it to us. Even the invisible things from creation. I like to think of it as we all have a spiritual DNA. We know God exists in three persons. We know we are sinners being separated from God from the fall of man and suffering from our depravity. We know that Jesus Christ came to save his elect, the church, and that if called by the Holy Spirit to repent, then upon our submission to this call will be redeemed from God's wrath. Notice from verse twenty that even creation understands wrath and redemption. How sinfully twisted is humanity that we will believe we are somehow on a level above any of God's other acts of creation? We are all without excuse. Paul does an excellent job of describing the condition of the human soul. Regardless of whether we are Hebrew, Heathen, or Hypocrite. We all will face God on his terms, and nobody will have an excuse. I want to encourage you to take time over the next few days, weeks, or even the month ahead to examine yourself under the microscope of scripture and the Holy Spirit. Until we meet again in print or person may God bless you is my prayer.



Aubrey's eyes shone with determination as she told her mom, "Make sure our Disney trip is not the week of Camp BAM. I will not miss that!" A rising high school senior, this was Aubrey's 4th Camp BAM as part of "IMPACT Community Youth" – a unique group

part of "IMPACT Community Youth" – a unique group comprised of churched and unchurched teens from Stanly and Rowan counties.

Juan, another camper from IMPACT, was just as determined not to miss Camp BAM 2024. He worked his required 30 hours at Food Lion in just three days in order not to miss a single day of his third Camp BAM.

The zeal of these young campers may lead you to think Camp BAM is packed with thrilling adventures like ziplining, kayaking, and evenings around a campfire. While campers are offered pool time each evening, their days start early with breakfast at 7:30, morning devotions, and arriving at their work sites by nine o'clock sharp.

The fourth annual Camp BAM took place June 19-23 on the Mills Home Campus of Baptist Children's Homes (BCH). Hosted by North Carolina Baptist Aging Ministry, (NCBAM), this intergenerational camp allows volunteers to serve aging adults by building wheelchair ramps, installing smoke alarms, and completing other projects. Thirty-eight campers from IMPACT and 11 from FBC Concord participated. They constructed five wheelchair ramps; installed two handrails; mowed, trimmed, and cleaned three yards; moved two tons of durable medical equipment; and served four BCH ministries.

IMPACT volunteers Billy and Monica Talbert have attended Camp BAM each year. Interacting with the kids in care at Baptist Children's Homes was a highlight for Monica. "I love how these kids grew over four days. They learned new strengths, how to work as a team, and how to come out of their shells. They used tools that some of them had never laid eyes on. They built new friendships, gained confidence, and taught me things as well!"

NCBAM's Austin Decker (north central regional director) returned as camp director for the second year. "Camp BAM is about more than fun, although we have a ton of that! These teenagers and adults get to see the impact they can have, build friendships, and grow closer to Jesus. It's powerful!"

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The Crude and the Eloquent

The Bible is a stage crammed with complex characters whose actions are motivated by desires and dreams, hopes and hurts, expectations, and miscommunications. The Bible is a stage stuffed with stories that are coarse and crude, eloquent and beautiful.



Abraham, motivated by paralyzing fear, gave his wife away to another man to save his own skin—twice. Laughing Sarah exiles Hagar out of cruel jealousy for her husband's attention, affection, and heart. Jacob and Esau scramble and tussle to earn their father's favor; the actions of both brothers drip with the desire to hear Isaac say "My son, I am proud of you, I love you." Potipher's wife, driven mad with frustrated desire, has Joseph wrongfully condemned "to the pit". And all this takes place in the bible's first book.

The Bible sets the table, inviting us to inhabit the world we live in. The Bible is a bad host; it does not sweep the dirt under the rug or stuff the clutter into the closet. It tells the dirty truth about living life on earth: murder, rape, fear, political injustice, national tension, racism and prejudice.

The Bible is earthy and "dirty" but the Bible also reveals the stuff of heaven, the stuff we long to be true yet cannot prove to be true; the stuff we cannot taste, touch, or feel; the stuff we cannot comprehend through reason or logic; the stuff that we can only apprehend through metaphor and myth, through legend and imagination.

C.S. Lewis writes "The heart of Christianity is a myth which is also a fact. The old myth of the Dying God, without ceasing to be myth, comes down from the heaven of legend and imagination to the earth of history...by becoming fact it does not cease to be myth: that is the miracle."

The Bible uses the vehicle of myth to subvert our expectations, confound our cynicism, and communicate what could have never been predicted—God assuming 46 chromosomes and ignorance, wrapping himself in an amniotic sac and flesh, suffering hunger and "middle school", receiving splinters and mothering lectures, stubbing his big toe and hitting his funny bone. All of this is the stuff of myth, the stuff of legend, and the stuff that descends from heaven and unfolds in history as fact.

For too long the church has attempted to tidy up the bible, sweeping the dust under the rug and stuffing the clutter into the closet. This is partly because we don't know what to do with the "dirty stuff". Is Samson a good guy or a bad guy? Is Solomon a good guy or a bad guy? Samson and Solomon are easy compared to addressing Israel's slavery and attempted genocide. Here is the problem that arises when we fail to address these parts of the bible: when we mute the bible's complex and crude stories we inevitably mute the bible's myth that materializes in Jesus Christ, and therefore mute the breadth of redemption. We must hold together the crude stories with the eloquent myth so that we can know the breadth of God's redemption through Jesus Christ.

Historically, the church has used the clearer parts of scripture to interpret the more opaque (hazy) parts of scripture. The gospels (which tell the gospel) are considered to be the most clear parts of scripture; they tell the story of Jesus, who is the bible's living center, the Word of God incarnate. For example, how do we use the gospel to interpret God's one-time command to commit genocide?

It is not simple. We must know that these crude stories are complex. We must read, teach, and preach these stories in a way that acknowledges their complexity. If we don't, we run the terrible risk of oversimplification which is often disguised as sophistication. Remember, God will speak in these stories, not because of your sophisticated bible-reading or ingenious interpretation, but through the power of his Spirit. Paul writes in 1 Corinthians 2:9-10 "What no eye has seen, what no ear has heard, and what no human mind has conceived"—the things God has prepared for those who love him—these are the things God has revealed to us by his Spirit." Neither common sense nor brilliance is sufficient to understand these stories. We need the Spirit of God to illuminate and reveal the story's substance, and content. When we know that God will speak, despite our brilliance, we can say "I don't know...but look to Jesus!"

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

The Obedience of Faith

Gen 22:9 "And they came to the place which God had told him of; and Abraham built an altar there, and laid the wood in order, and bound Isaac his son, and laid him on the altar upon the wood."

Sacrifice... what comes to mind when we hear that term? Many of us will automatically think of our great country and the sacrifice of so many for the freedom that we enjoy today.



I hope that you will take time to at least read verses 1-14, of this remarkable chapter which gives an account of Abraham's journey. We are told in verse one, that the Lord chose to tempt Abraham. The Hebrew word used means "to test or to try." We might say that the Lord chose to "put Abraham to the test." Of course, we have all been tested, with various things, but not to this extent. Some tests are major, some are minor and the consequences range in severity. Perhaps God has "tested" you to try your faith. This chapter is also interesting in that we see several "firsts" in Scripture. Notice the following list of terms, that are mentioned for the very first time in Scripture: Tempt (v.1), Lovest (v.2), Offer (v. 2), Worship (v. 5), Lamb (v. 7.) It certainly becomes evident to us that Abrahams sacrifice was an act of worship!

In this chapter, we see Abraham, a man of faith, doing what seems impossible, but we must also remember the words of Luke 1:37 "For with God nothing shall be impossible." In this story, we are shown something of the nature and character of Abraham. The Lord called Him, and he did not run, hide, or quit. Abraham did not ask for a substitute or ask God to look elsewhere. We know that Abraham obeyed God, but we are not told of his internal struggle to obey...surely it was a heart-wrenching thought to sacrifice his beloved son! Warren Weirsbe has said: "Our faith is not really tested until God asks us to bear what seems to be unbearable, do what seems unreasonable, and expect what seems impossible." What was the basis of Abraham's unwavering obedience? His faith was based on a sincere desire to worship God. This is what he told his companions in v.5 "... I and the lad will go yonder and worship, and come again to you." Abraham's act of obedience didn't only affect himself, but his people. Not only was Isaac his son, but he was also the heir that was promised. God's covenant with Abram in Gen 15 declared that his descendants would be innumerable. So not only was Abraham sacrificing his son, but also seemingly the promises to his people.

Why did God ask Abraham for his son? Abraham LOVED Isaac, and as his father, he would have been willing to be the sacrifice in his place. But God did not necessarily want Isaac; God wanted more of Abraham! God will often use the things closest to us to try and test our faith. Abraham knew that his worship was going to cost him something, and this worship caused Abraham to surrender both himself and his son. In faith he trusted God as he took his son... the wood... the knife... and the fire and started towards Mt. Moriah. There, Abraham learned in a very real way, that that God would provide for all his needs because Abraham was exactly where God wanted him. Moriah means "chosen by Jehovah" but Abraham called this particular place Jehovah Jireh in v. 14... which means "the Lord will provide." If Abraham had not gone through this, he would not have known God as "Jehovah Jireh." Are we willing to worship through obedience and faith in God's abundant supply?

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
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
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Foundation Forward

Daniel Boone

This vignette is an educational moment in American history. It is about those who made a difference during the Revolutionary War era and how they served our country.

Squire and Sarah Boone came to America from England for religious freedom. Their son, Daniel, was born in Penn-

sylvania on November 2, 1734, and grew up in the Oley Township of Philadelphia. Daniel received a basic education while exploring the local backwoods. These experiences honed the skills that would serve him well as an explorer and a soldier

Due to religious differences with other parishioners, the Boones moved to North Carolina when Daniel was about 15. During his youth, Daniel discovered that being a long hunter was his forté. Over the years, he went on adventures that had mixed outcomes.

Though others had preceded Boone in exploring the territory of Kentucky, he was the first to find a shortcut using the Cumberland Gap. In the early 1770s, Boone led others to Kentucky on a hunting expedition. It was a fruitful expedition in terms of documenting much about the regions of Kentucky and Tennessee. In 1773, Boone led settlers to Kentucky. During the trip, the group was attacked by Indians. "Two of the party, including Boone's son James, were captured, tortured, and murdered, whereupon the survivors turned back."

In 1775, Boone was commissioned as a captain in the Virginia militia due to his frontier skills and leadership abilities. The Transylvania Purchase of 1775 authorized Boone to explore the Cumberland Gap in Kentucky, and a small base camp became known as Boonesborough. Settlers soon followed to escape the violence of the Revolutionary War. Unfortunately, battles continued in the new land; as Native Americans had sold or given away their land, violent conflicts emerged between them and colonists over the issue of establishing settlements.

An unexpected event at Boonesborough happened on April 24, 1777. Two men who were getting their horses were assaulted just outside the garrison gate by several Shawnees. One colonist was killed and scalped, while the other escaped. Following this, several settlers, including Boone, encountered 50 Shawnee. During this clash, Boone was shot in the foot. As his attacker was about to give Boone a last blow, the assailant was shot and killed by another colonist.

In January 1778, Boone led an expedition of 30 men from Boonesbrough to find salt for curing food. While hunting at Licking River, Boone was captured and taken to Shawnee Chief Blackfish. Instead of fighting back, Boone and his men surrendered to the Shawnee on February 8, 1778.

Taken to Chillicothe, Ohio, they were made to run the Shawnee's gauntlet. Boone and his group, who demonstrated bravery and endurance, were adopted by the tribe. Boone and the others gained the Indians' confidence by taking on assigned duties. Boone was to repair the Shawnees' muskets. Unbeknownst to his men, Boone sabotaged the rifles. During this time, Boone could not tell his group that the repairs were a way to defeat the Shawnee and save Boonesbrough.

While with a hunting party of his captors, Boone escaped and returned to Boonesbrough and learned his family had returned to North Carolina, believing he was dead. Soon thereafter, Boone's life would change as he could have never imagined.

Though Boone's actions saved Boonesbrough and its residents, he was charged with treason. Colonel Callaway and Captain Logan filed the charges. They claimed Boone acted illegally by surrendering and plotting with the Indians and British. The officers also envied his increasing fame, which overshadowed them. A court-martial would revoke Boone's commission and ruin his reputation. Military officers were the judges and jurors. Callaway presented the charges, and Boone defended himself. The court-martial quickly ended with Boone being acquitted because of his testimony about his strategy while in captivity. Because of Boone's leadership and tactical actions, the court promoted him to a major. Boone's popularity came from various media sources. Boone, a noble patriotic frontiersman, was vital in forming America. Over the years, Boone was also a sage, statesman, and sheriff. Additionally, Boone was a soldier reaching the rank of colonel. Boone died at Defiance, MO, on September 26, 1820; unfortunately, his final resting site is unsure.

Daniel Boone has many landmarks and towns named in his honor, most notably Boone, NC.



The LORD/YHVH

Every word of the Bible is meant to bring us closer to Jesus/Yeshua. The personal name for God in the Old Testament – YHVH – does just that. Let's take a look at it.

Before there was a Hebrew alphabet, Hebrew was originally written with a pictographic script similar to Egyptian hieroglyphics. This is what is known as an ideogramic language, where pictures or symbols, known as pictographs,



One of the most interesting, telling, and powerful demonstrations of the original Hebrew ideogramic language are the pictographs for:

Yod-He-Vav-He – LORD in all Capitals –YHVH – pronounced as Yah-weh or Yehovah.

The name YHVH is spelled with the four Hebrew letters Yod-He-Vav-He and is always translated as LORD (all capitals) in the English Bible Old Testament. Strong's concordance provides the following primary definitions for YHVH – LORD: 1. Self-Existent or Eternal. 2. Jewish national name for God, 3.The Lord. The Brown Driver Briggs Lexicon adds, "Proper name of the God of Israel, the one bringing into being, life-giver, giver of existence, creator, the one who is, absolutely unchangeable, I am He who I am." (A Lexicon is a volume that provides Hebrew words, as written in Hebrew, and their definitions in English.) One thing both have in common is "the name of God."

Just the letters Yod-He-Vav-He and the name LORD (all caps) themselves bring to mind power, majesty, and glory. Certainly, God's name is nothing to be taken in vain, or as empty, or worthless. But is there even more to this great name that we may not have considered?

Let's combine a passage in the book of Exodus with the original pictographs and see if there is an even deeper meaning to this name.

Exodus 3:15: "And God furthermore said to Moses, "Thus you shall say to the sons of Israel, "The LORD [YHVH], the God of your fathers, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, has sent me to you." This is My name forever, and this is My memorial-name to all generations" (Exod. 3:15 NAS).

Now let's pause for a second and consider the phrase, "My memorial-name to all generations." This makes me think of something to be remembered, discussed, and spoken of in conversation, often. Moses was being told here that YHVH – the Hebrew letter - Yod He Vav He —is the name by which God is to be remembered by for all generations. Let's look at the etymology (description of where a word came from) of this mighty name to see if there is possibly another dimension that we have not considered.

YHVH is spelled with four letters in Hebrew: Yod (English pronunciation – yode), He (hay), Vav (vav), He (hay)). The following table shows the original associated "pictograph" and representation of each letter.

Hebrew Letter	Pictograph	Representation
•	yod	Hand – action, doing
π .	he	Raised arms – revealing, showing
1	vav	Hook, Nail, tent stake - establishing
ה	he	Raised arms – revealing, showing

- By its pictograph, Yod (the first letter) which looks like an apostrophe (first column), represents a hand, which implies doing something.
- He (second letter) represents raised arms which imply action or revealing, showing, or looking.
- The third letter, Vav, by its pictograph, is a hook, nail, or tent stake, implying establishing something.
- The word closes with He (raised arms) once again, which implies action, showing, looking, or revealing (a second time)

I maintain that God could very well have been telling Moses over 1,440 years before the physical birth of Jesus, that His name would be remembered by the meaning of these four letters.

And when we put the meaning behind these pictographs together, we have an amazing message for us today which shows the link between the O.T. and the N.T. Once again, the representation of these four letters, summarized is: Hand, Reveal, Nail, Reveal. If we add a little text to these four letters and start in the middle, we have the message for us:

Our Savior has been revealed (He – letter #2) to us personally – Jesus Christ. We have been allowed to get to know Him! Jesus nailed (Vav – letter #3) to a cross and He died a brutal death to take on the sins of humanity. The hand (Yod – letter #1) and power of Jesus will deliver us from slavery, both physical and spiritual. Jesus has been revealed (He -letters #2 & #4) a first time and He will be revealed (He - #4) a second time as King of kings and LORD of Lords.

This is the name, YHVH, that God told Moses He is to be remembered by forever, over 1,400 years before the birth of Jesus/Yeshua as flesh and blood. The representations of each Hebrew pictograph/letter fit perfectly, especially the use of "He" twice" – which is a picture of raised arms and represents revealing – Jesus has been revealed physically once as a man, and will be revealed again to us in all power and glory. Talk about a prophecy!

Conclusion

Our LORD YHVH has told us that His name is to be remembered by the four letters - Yod, He, Vav, He - which in the ancient Hebrew language were pictures of a hand, raised arms/revealing, a nail, and raised arms/revealing.



"Eat This Scroll"

Our mouths get us into trouble. You "open your mouth" and voice an opinion at a meeting and suddenly you've become the chair of the committee. We've all heard the admonishment that we "engage our brains before we open our mouths to speak"!

Yes, our mouths can get us into trouble, causing us to commit to more than we are really able to accomplish, to make promises that we fail to keep, and often; say things that we later regret.

As Christians we are called by God to, however, use our mouths, our voices, to proclaim the word of God and be a witness to others at all times. Yet, how many times have you been in a discussion about your faith and felt you didn't know enough to really present your side of the argument effectively?

The prophets of the Old Testament serve as examples of how we can present our mouths to God as living sacrifices, acceptable to His purpose. The prophets were forth-tellers – that is what the word literally means. Forth-tellers who felt an obligation to speak out and who lived their lives fully committed to God. One of those prophets was Ezekiel who got his start with the vision of a scroll and in this vision, God commanded him thus: "And He said to me, "Son of man, eat this scroll that I give you and fill your stomach with it." Then I ate it, and it was in my mouth as sweet as honey." Ezekiel 3: 3. Then God told Ezekiel that He was sending him to his own people – people who understood his language, people he knew, his own people. The message to Ezekiel also is for us – we are to be witnesses to those around us – our own friends and neighbors. But, as He told Ezekiel, they will resist, that won't listen, they won't hear you – so you need to be prepared so "swallow this word", "eat this scroll", and then go to the house of

Just as food nourishes our body, sustains our being, triggers growth, and enables us to function, God's Word provides our spiritual being with the same elements of nourishment. When we eat natural food we receive it into our body and when we eat spiritual food, the Word of God, we receive it into our hearts. So "eating the scroll" prophetically represents our receiving the Word of God into our

Those prophets of the Old Testament presented their mouths to God and proclaimed his message vigorously and effectively. How do we do that today? Ezekiel provides us with the first clue: Swallowing the Word of God. Just as God warned Ezekiel that he would meet with resistance to his message, we, too, meet and will continue to meet with resistance and so the way to prepare and be able to confront this hostile and resistant world: eat God's Word. Consuming everything we can of the Word gives us the confidence and ability to speak God's truth.

"Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God." (Matthew 4:4) This statement by Jesus is a quote from Deuteronomy 8:3. The subject is the provision of God for His people. He has provided more than earthly food. He has also given us His Word in the Scriptures. There are three elements involved in eating the Word – understanding, believing, and surrendering. We eat the Word when we read and study the Bible, when we listen to a sermon, and when we surrender our hearts to the message of God.

John 15: 16 reads: "You did not choose me, but I chose you and appointed you so that you might go and bear fruit." Jesus reminds us in this verse that we are chosen to go into the world and testify of our Hope in Him. It is not optional. We are chosen to take every opportunity presented to us to testify – and to do this we must be prepared. Eat this Scroll! The choice is ours.

The Public Reading of Scriptures By David B. Sable Watauga County

In the first church I was in as a Christian in the 1970's those who preached modeled a healthy pattern that always stuck with me. The speaker would read loudly, slowly, and reverently the passage of Scripture they were about to talk about. They attempted to honor Paul's directive to Timothy, "Until I come,

devote yourself to the public reading of Scripture, to exhortation, to teaching" (1 Timothy 4:13).

As I traveled through different churches in my lifetime, robust public Scripture reading was something I missed. The rushed reading in some services felt more like an intro or a setup for the main attraction of the pastor's sermon. At other times, Scriptures flashed by on PowerPoint as mere footnotes to the relevant topic talk the pastor was giving to attract new seekers.

Historically, the public reading of the Scriptures was part of the lifelong formation of members of the church. This portion of the liturgy is to increase our capacity to hear the Word of God respectfully, fully, and patiently as it is outlined in wide, varied, and generous doses.

In an Anglican service, a Psalm is read together in the congregation though technically this is not a reading. Rather, the Psalms are recognized as the prayer book of the church and read in the congregation (often in unison) as a kind of prayer. This, I admit, is a practice I'm not fully formed in – to read the Psalms with the elated praise, the profound wonder, the deep sadness, the sense of abandonment, and even the angry hatred that the Psalmist expresses.

For the readings, there is an Old Testament reading, a New Testament reading, and a reading from one of the Gospels. Throughout the three-year cycle, it gives the church exposure to the entire breadth of Scripture. It forces the much-neglected Old Testament to carry equal prominence.

Of course, we can't cover the entire Bible even in three years of Sundays, so it is assumed that in each parish (or more likely in this day in age) each individual is also carrying the same practice into their personal life or family. The Daily Office (see www.DailyOffice2019.com) includes a similar pattern of Scripture reading morning and evening: reading the Psalter and two lessons from the Scripture (generally the Old and New Testament).

Interestingly, these Scripture readings are called lessons instead of readings. It is as if to say that just the act of reading out loud--slowly, reverently, and with the heart engaged--becomes a formation in itself instructing and sanctifying even those who lack the mental acuity or giftedness to teach a Bible study or delve deeply into inductive questions. This isn't to say that there is no place for teaching, expounding, study, and memorization. But to engage our hearts in the serious public reading of Scripture – whether as part of our church service or in our morning and evening prayer— is formative in and of itself.

If we take the place of humility and say as Samuel, "Speak, Lord, for your servant hears", it will save us from the self-defeating expectation that we have to understand or assign meaning to every single thing that is read. Instead, we meditate throughout the day and night on what was clearly understood and convicting and turn this into prayer. At other times, teachers, sermons, commentaries, and books can give insight and enlarge our understanding. But during the public reading of Scripture corporately or individually, it is much better to stand in awe and receive the very word of God and not get sidetracked as if it were a Sudoku puzzle to be conquered, a crystal ball to divine our next move, or a maintenance manual to solve all our problems.





Partner Prerequisites By Christopher L. Scott Moses Lake, Washington

A pastor of a growing church was approached by a rock concert promoter who had an idea that he proposed: "I'll build a new concert location and you can build your new church on an adjacent property that I will donate to you. We can share the parking needs that we both have. If you allow our concert attendees to use your parking at night you can use our concert stadium on Easter Sundays."



But the conversation stopped when someone reminded the pastor of a few brief verses from the apostle Paul in 2 Corinthians 6:14-18,

"Do not be bound together with unbelievers; for what partnership have righteousness and lawlessness, or what fellowship has light with darkness? Or what harmony has Christ with Belial, or what has a believer in common with an unbeliever? Or what agreement has the temple of God with idols? For we are the temple of the living God; just as God said, "I will dwell in them and walk among them; And I will be their God, and they shall be My people. Therefore, come out from their midst and be separate," says the Lord. "And do not touch what is unclean; And I will welcome you. And I will be a father to you, And you shall be sons and daughters to Me," Says the Lord Almighty. (NASB)

Paul makes it clear believers should not enter into close partnerships with unbelievers. The prohibition is a formal long-term contract-based relationship. The phrase "bound together" in verse 14 comes from the word for yoking animals together as they plow a field. There are three areas in which we as Christians should avoid partnering with unbelievers in ministry, marriage, and business.

In ministry, there is a focus that we need to have on separating from false teachers troubling the church. We as believers should partner with Christian churches that agree with us on the core doctrines of orthodox Christianity.

In marriage, a Christian should not marry a non-Christian. But what does it mean to not be "bound together" with an "unbeliever" (v. 14)? Let me put it this way, if you find the person you are dating is "tolerating your faith" or "supports you and your faith" then you are bound together with a non-Christian.

In business, we also need to avoid close partnerships with unbelievers. Does this mean we make sure the clerk at Winco is a Christian before we allow him to ring up our groceries? Of course not, the partnership Paul restricts is a closely bound long-term mutual relationship that involves a contract.

The pastor of that growing church turned down the rock concert promoter's offer. It was hard for him to do that, but he knew he had to as a believer committed to following God's Scripture. A short time later God provided a new location and new opportunity for him that worked better for his church than the original location the non-Christian concert promoter had suggested.

When you hear the name, Ebenezer, what is your first thought? Is it Scrooge, the grouchy miser from Charles Dickens's Christmas Carol? Charles Dickens describes Ebenezer Scrooge as "a squeezing, wrenching, grasping, scraping, clutching, covetous, old sinner! Hard and sharp as flint... secret, and self-contained, and solitary as an oyster." The familiar story in the end reveals Ebenezer Scrooge's change of heart as he becomes a more generous man.



This story is not about Ebenezer Scrooge, but the stone named Ebenezer set by Samuel between Mizpah and Shen as a memorial saying, "*Thus far the Lord has helped us.*" I Samuel 7:12

"Samuel had cried out to the Lord on behalf of Israel to save them from the hands of the Philistines. Samuel took a suckling lamb and offered a burnt offering to the Lord. As Samuel was offering up the burnt offering, the Philistines drew near to battle against Israel. But the Lord thundered with a loud thunder upon the Philistines, and so confused them that they were overcome before Israel. The men of Israel went out of Mizpah and pursued the Philistines and drove them back as far as below Beth Car. Then Samuel took a stone, set it up, and called its name Ebenezer." 1 Samuel 7:7-12

We read earlier in Samuel chapters 4 and 5 about the defeat of Israel by the Philistines and the capture of the Ark of the Covenant because they disobeyed the Lord. The placing of the Ebenezer stone was a memorial to God's faithfulness and provision; God's intervention and support; God's presence and deliverance. The Ebenezer stone reflected the reversal in Israel's behavior as they turned back to God. "Thus far the Lord has helped us."

Here's my heart; O take and seal it;
Seal it for thy courts above.

The ultimate Ebenezer is the cross of Calvary where Jesus gave HIS life's blood for you and me. Jesus gave HIS life on Calvary, was buried in that cold, dark tomb, and arose on the third day to live forevermore. He offers the gift of eternal life by HIS grace. We have free will to accept or reject HIS gift of eternal life by our faith in HIM. Our hearts are prone to wander, prone to worldly attractions. "Thus far the Lord has helped us!" He will lead us safely home if we trust in HIM.

May we constantly give thanks for God's faithfulness in our lives. Ebenezer could be closely related to gratitude...acknowledging the power and presence of God in our lives. We raise our Ebenezer for others to see when we share what Jesus has done in our lives. (https:// nsjonline.com/article/2024/05/summa-parental/) Notice, the geographical locations considering this action are here in North Carolina; not New York, California, or some other far away area.

Yet, the Bible prophesied all this would take place before the Lord came back for His Church. Imagine, you and I could very well be taken to Heaven in what is known as the Rapture of the Church VERY SOON. Stress and worry are a thief of our time. We all experience stress and worry in our lives. We have times when we feel out of control and unable to balance our lives. We try to figure out how we can resolve a certain matter or problem,

sometimes without going to our sustaining source first. When worry and stress overwhelm us, it robs us of the joy and energy we need for living. God is aware of what we need to live well and He has plans to provide them. We cannot achieve anything by worrying. Remember, when you are worrying and stressed-out God loves and cares about you. God knows of the desires of our hearts as well as our

How can we influence a lost and searching world if we live our lives worrying about the same things as those who don't yet know God? We are to relinquish our worrying. God will look after the rest if we live following His ways. He will provide all we need. We shouldn't worry and stress about the future. God knows the plans He has for us, and if we confide in Him, trusting in Him, that will be all we need. Remind yourself that God has the plans for your life. We are to rest in that promise. Therefore, "...seek ye first the Kingdom of God, and His righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you." (Matthew 6:33).

Because of the ill effects of stress and worry, worrying may (1) damage your health, (2) cause the object of your worry to consume your thoughts, (3) disrupt your productivity, (4) negatively affect the way you treat others, and (5) reduce your ability to trust in God. There is a difference between worry and genuine concern. Worry immobilizes, but concern moves you to action. We are to turn to God first for help. Let Him fill your thoughts with His desires, take His character for your pattern, serving and obeying Him in everything. It is our responsibility to actively choose to give God first place in all areas of our life.


Planning for tomorrow is time well spent. Worrying about tomorrow is time wasted. Careful planning is thinking ahead about goals, steps ahead, schedules, and trusting in God's way. Planning, when well done, can help alleviate stress and worry. The worrier, on the other side, is consumed by fear and finds it difficult to put trust in God's promises. Worrying lets your plans interfere with your relationship with God. Don't let worry affect your relationship with your Heavenly Father! God is a leader who encourages and stirs us to move ahead in the tasks He has given us and will be with us all the way. He equips us so we can accomplish the tasks He assigns to each of us. He knows our future, and His plans are full of hope. As God goes with us and we fulfill his mission through Jesus Christ, we can have boundless hope. This does not mean we are without pain, suffering, or hardship, but that God will see us through a glorious conclusion. "For I know the thoughts that I think toward you, saith the Lord, thoughts of peace, and not of evil, to give you an expected end." (Jeremiah 29:11).

God knew we would face stress and worry in our lives. He did not leave us to worry alone but gave us a process to follow instead. He does not leave us helpless. He provides us with a written plan. In Philippians 4:6-7 we actually have a formula to help us overcome worry in our life. It is written right into the Scripture. Worry + Prayer = Peace. Our needs plus Thanksgiving to God = Peace in life. Pray and Thank God for what He has already done for you in your life. Once you have prayed and thanked Him, then submit to Him your needs and allow the peace that only God can provide to wash over you. Be patient, it may not come immediately but pray earnestly and truthfully without ceasing and it will come! God has promised it. This is the best following to take in overcoming stress and worry, go to God first. Don't go sharing your problems and worries with other people in your life. There is a time and place for that after seeking God's face first. Going to God first not only blesses Him, but it keeps us from allowing our worries to increase. God cares. He wants us to come to Him first. And we can apply this recipe or formula anywhere, anytime. Don't allow the enemy to rob you of the joy and peace that today holds.

Turn your worries into prayers. If you want to worry less, then pray more! Real peace comes from knowing that because God is in control, our citizenship in Christ's Kingdom is sure, our future is set, and our victory over sin is certain. Take your cares to Jesus. Allow Him to fill you with wonderful peace. "Be careful for nothing; but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God. And the peace of God, which passeth all understanding, shall keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus." (Philippians 4:6-7).

Did you know that not carrying your worries, stress, and daily struggles to God shows that you have not trusted God fully with your life? It takes humility to recognize that God does care. Admit your need(s) to Him. When we turn to God in repentance, He will bear the weight of those struggles. Letting God have your worries is active, not passive. Don't submit to circumstances, but go to the Lord who can control those circumstances. "Humble yourselves therefore under the mighty hand of God, that He may exalt you in due time: casting all your care upon Him; for He careth for you." (1 Peter 5:6-7).

It has been established that the best for us is not to worry. We are to cultivate a life of peace and live with a peaceful heart. The antidote to our worrying is prayer, which produces peace. We are to do all we can to live in peace with everyone and that includes ourselves. The good news given by God, the ultimate Gift-Giver is to Cultivate a life of Peace, live Righteously, and live Wisely. The end result of the Holy Spirit's work in our lives is deep and lasting peace. This is a kind of peace that produces confident assurance in any circumstance. With Christ's peace,



When worry comes knocking, remember that God has gifted you peace and this gift of peace cannot be taken from you. "Peace I leave with you, my peace I give unto you: not as the world giveth, give I unto you. Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid." (John 14:27).

III. You learn what you can, and can't rely on!

Isaiah 36 says the nation of Israel "leaned" on Egypt to deliver them from invading Babylonians. But it says Egypt was like a "broken reed." They trusted it, but it couldn't save them.

In a crisis, we discover that a lot of things we trust are just "broken reeds."

- Hurricane Beryl showed us that forecasts can go wrong; and that the internet we so rely on, can be taken away.
- Many folks had invested thousands of dollars in a generator system they could trust during a crisis like this. But more than one told me their generator went out, a couple of hours into the storm. It was a "broken reed" of sorts to them! Crises reveal a lot of "broken reeds" that aren't worthy of our trust.

But they also remind us that we CAN put our ultimate trust in the Lord:

- God's power never goes out!
- His living water never runs dry.
- His mercies never fail.
- His lovingkindness is everlasting.
- We can absolutely rely on Him in our worst crisis.

Psalm 46:1-2 says: "God is our refuge and strength, A very present help in trouble. Therefore we will not fear, though the earth should change.

And though the mountains slip into the heart of the sea."

The whole earth may change: the mountains — which we consider so permanent and immovable — may one day slip into the sea! But he says despite all that, we will not fear. WHY?

- Because we have a comfortable, air-conditioned home?
- Because we have cars we can drive anywhere?
- Because we have so much money?

No; Psalm 46 says "Therefore we will not fear" because "GOD IS OUR REF-UGE AND STRENGTH."

If Jesus is our Savior, then during the darkest moments of our crisis, we can still walk with God, and know that He is with us; comforting us, leading us, empowering us to serve, learn, grow, and glorify Him. And even if our life is taken away, we know we'll go straight to eternal glory with Him in heaven!

But make certain that you are truly relying on Him for your salvation. Don't trust how good you are, or any good works you've done. Like the song says: "In Christ ALONE my hope is found." Trust what JESUS did on the cross to save you. Lean on HIM. Rely on HIM. Make sure your trust is in JESUS ALONE to save you, and to carry you through your crisis hours.

So "don't waste a good crisis." Make sure you learn and do everything God has for you in it. And especially make sure that "In Christ Alone My Hope Is Found"!

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

"God's Aquarium"

"I know that you can do all things; no purpose of yours can be thwarted." (Job 42:2, N.I.V.)

This verse begins Job's apology to God after he has challenged God's wisdom and justice in allowing him to suffer so much tragedy. Call it a confession or call it repentance,



but the verse signals the end of Job questioning how God was running the universe. The God the verse describes is big enough to bring His thoughts, purposes, and plans to pass right over the top of all objectors. Job is saying that God is an irresistible, all-powerful deity who can plow His will straight through any resistance it might encounter. He's saying, "Lord, if You want to do something, no one can stop You from doing it."

But hold on a minute. Isn't the Bible filled with stories involving people who actually did prevent God's purposes, plans, and will from being done? It all started with Adam and Eve. If God's plan was for them to continue endlessly in sinless perfection, they certainly thwarted that plan, didn't they? Then along came Cain. If God's plan was for him to bring the right kind of sacrifice and love to his brother Abel, we know what became of that plan. Furthermore, following Cain's murder of Abel, he went out and fathered an entire line of descendants who were all rebels regarding God's purposes, plans, and will. In the end, all of that rebellion culminated in the entire human race, except for Noah and his family, being killed off by way of the great flood.

The point is, that we can't even get through six full chapters of the Bible without encountering millions of people who never conformed to God's plans for their lives. This shows us that an individual's free will does factor into the equation of God's dealings with that individual. The only other conclusion to be drawn is that God actually willed Adam and Eve to eat that forbidden fruit, willed Cain to murder Abel, and willed the human race to reach a state of depravity worthy of almost complete annihilation. That alternative conclusion, of course, cuts completely against the hundreds and hundreds of Bible passages that teach that God is a God of holiness, love, compassion, mercy, and grace.

So, how exactly should we interpret Job 42:2? Well, if God is dead set on doing something and nothing can change His mind about it, He can do that something anytime and in any way He wants to do it. I mean, He's not GOD for nothing!!! What's fascinating about Him, though, is the fact that He desires voluntary submission so much that He not only builds a spiritual/moral free will into each individual but actually allows each individual to exercise that free will arbitrarily. Even if that individual uses free will to thwart (restrain, stop, prevent, undermine) His will, God won't recreate or rewire that individual to produce obedience. As the classic line goes, "God doesn't want robots who have to obey Him."

The illustration of a home aquarium has always been helpful to me when it comes to understanding this balanced relationship between God's sovereignty and man's free will. Imagine an aquarium that sits on a stand in the living room of a home. This aquarium is filled with water and within all that water the fish swim around in a world created especially for them. This world includes gravel, rocks, plastic plants, a miniature sunken ship, a small treasure chest resting beside the ship, and a beautifully painted background. The aquarium also features an air pump, a filtering system, a light, and a heater.

Sometimes the fish in the aquarium get along with each other, but other times they fight and chase each other around. Sometimes the bigger fish even eat the smaller fish. Through it all, though, the owner of the aquarium is never threatened in any way. Regardless of what goes on among the fish inside the aquarium, he remains sovereignly aloof and in charge. He can do whatever he wants to do concerning the aquarium because the whole operation belongs to him and he's the one who keeps it in operation.

Do you see how this illustration can be applied to God's relationship with individuals? Even when people refuse to voluntarily submit to God's plans, purposes, and will, He always remains in charge of the universe in which those individuals live. 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


Have you offered all you are as a living sacrifice to God? If not, don't put it off.



With the conclusion of the Republican National Convention in Milwaukee, Wisconsin last month, former President Donald Trump is officially the Republican nominee for the 2024 presidential election. As your state Senator, I am committed to safeguarding the democratic processes that are foundational to our society. One of the most pressing issues we face today is ensuring that only U.S. citizens have the right to vote in our elections. This principle is exactly what House Bill 1074 (the Citizens Only Constitutional Amendment) seeks to address by amending our state constitution to explicitly state that only U.S. citizens may vote in North Carolina's elections. HB 1074 was passed by the General Assembly and was ratified on June 28, 2024. In November, this Amendment will be on the ballot and you can let your voice be heard on this issue. This matters now because there are places in the United States where noncitizens can vote in elections. For example, in the District of Columbia, noncitizen residents can vote in local elections for the offices of Mayor, Attorney General, DC Council, State Board of Education, and Advisory Neighborhood Commissioner, and can vote on initiative, referendum, recall, or charter amendment measures. Similarly, three cities in Vermont, including the state's largest city and the state's capital, allow non-U.S. citizen residents to vote in local elections. In San Francisco, noncitizen residents can register to vote in local school board elections. Although a New York City law that would have allowed about 800,000 noncitizens to vote in local elections was struck down, noncitizens can still cast ballots in at least 14 municipalities in states that do not explicitly ban noncitizens from voting. After the city of San Francisco enacted its noncitizen voting policy, the city was sued over the law by the conservative organization U.S. Justice Foundation. One of the arguments made by the city was that California's constitution does not state that "only" U.S. citizens may vote. In a brief supporting the noncitizen voting policy, a UCLA professor wrote, "By declining to state that 'only' U.S. citizens 'shall' vote, California's voters anticipated that the Legislature could, and should, expand the franchise to others who 'may' vote." In the Court of Appeals decision upholding the law, the judge wrote that California's citizen voter provision "does not, by its terms, preclude the expansion of the franchise to noncitizens. The City notes the provision could, but does not, state, 'only' a United States citizen . . . may vote." If the California state constitution said "only" a U.S. citizen may vote, the noncitizen voting law may have been unconstitutional. The new language we are proposing is stronger and better suited against any future statutory changes or legal challenges. The threat to NC is it's only a matter of time before Democrats try and find ways to allow noncitizen voting in North Carolina. North Carolina Democrats in Congress representing Raleigh, Durham, Chapel Hill, and Charlotte already voted to keep the law allowing noncitizens to vote in Washington, DC's elections. In Charlotte, noncitizens are already allowed to serve on city boards and commissions. This is exactly why we need to be proactive now rather than waiting for liberal groups to push for noncitizen voting in our state. Our nation is being overwhelmed with noncitizens crossing the border, and since President Biden took office, there have been more than 7.8 million encounters at the Southern border. Nearly 2 million known gotaways have evaded U.S. Border Patrol under this administration, and President Biden's embrace of an open borders policy is having devastating consequences in North Carolina through the illegal drug trade. We don't need this problem also affecting our elections. North Carolina needs to do its part to protect our republic and keep U.S. elections only for U.S. citizens. The best legal and statutory defense we can have against noncitizens voting in our elections is a constitutional amendment with specific language clarifying that only U.S. citizens can vote in North Carolina's elections, and this November the voters of our state will be able to amend the state constitution to make this crystal clear. While none of our municipalities in North Carolina have yet tried to allow noncitizens to vote, we shouldn't give them any room on this issue. If Democrats regain control of the General

Assembly, they could change the law to allow it to happen. In that instance, we need our state constitution to be as strong as possible. So this November when you go to vote, I urge you to support the Citizens Only Constitutional Amendment. By doing so, we will take

a significant step toward ensuring that our elections remain the exclusive right of U.S. citizens.

ONLY CITIZENS SHOULD VOTE

In 1996, the United States Congress passed a law prohibiting noncitizens from voting in federal elections. This law covers only federal elections for the president, vice president, U.S. House of Representatives, and U.S. Senate. The law does not extend to state and local elections. As a result of the law being limited to elections for federal officials, several localities around the country are allowing non-citizens to vote in elections for state or local officials. I agree with those who see this as a serious threat to our country. First, I would argue, that it is a major factor in maintaining our freedoms and rights that those eligible to vote have some significant awareness of and allegiance to our federal and state constitutions. There is absolutely no assurance that a noncitizen has even the awareness, much less allegiance, to our foundational documents. Moreover, though the current jurisdictions allowing such noncitizen voting are limited in number, it is almost certainly a case of the "camel's nose under the tent". If the practice is allowed to get a foothold, we must expect it to spread to wider and wider areas of the country. This, in turn, will contribute to ever more divisive politics because of the growing lack of shared principles among those allowed to vote.


In 2022, the New York City Council passed legislation allowing non-citizens to vote in its local elections. This city action was ultimately struck down by the state's supreme court as a violation of the New York State Constitution which only permits citizens to vote in state and local elections. Illinois bars noncitizens from voting in state and federal elections but does not prevent them from voting in local elections. California, Maryland, Vermont, and the District of Columbia allow non-citizens to vote in local elections but leave it up to the localities to decide whether to actually permit non-citizens to vote in their elections.

The limitation of federal law to federal official elections only and the above New York City and state examples highlight the urgency of acting to protect against spreading noncitizen voting to North Carolina elections. As a result, I am pleased that the North Carolina General Assembly approved a proposed amendment to our state constitution specifically stating that only United States citizens may vote in state and local elections in North Carolina. For the amendment to become effective and a part of our constitution, the state's voters will have to approve. Thus, North Carolinians will vote in the upcoming November election to determine whether the amendment will become part of our constitution. We join South Carolina, Oklahoma, Missouri, Kentucky, Idaho, Iowa, and Wisconsin in including such an amendment on the ballot come November.

It is true that North Carolina currently has a law requiring citizenship to vote in state and local elections. However, that law can readily be altered by any session of the state legislature. By making the citizenship requirement part of our state constitution, future legislatures will not be able to get rid of the requirement without repealing the constitutional provision. Repeal would require approval by voters. I believe this issue is one of such importance that it should be part of our constitution, not just a state law changeable at any time by the legislature. If North Carolinians agree in November, the amendment will help secure our elections and ensure that basic level of commitment to shared ideals that are critical to maintaining our freedoms and rights as Americans.

Years ago, I was truly one of the most critical and judgmental people I knew. It was my "default" setting.

I got the point! The truth is, we can be pretty quick to recognize what's wrong with other people and see all of their issues. However, even though we may have some of the same problems ourselves, we usually have good excuses to justify them.

Look at what Jesus says in Matthew 7:5: "You hypocrite, first take the plank out of your own eye, and then you will see clearly to remove the speck from your brother's eye" (NIV).

I love this—it's so practical. Jesus is basically saying, "You love to point out everyone else's faults, but you should really begin with yourself. Until you get yourself straightened out, you can't really even help anyone else!"

We need to forget about what everyone else is or isn't doing, present ourselves before God, and let Him do a work in us. The truth is, that the more we allow God to change us, the less we are bothered by the faults of others.

Our circumstances may never be perfect, and the things we don't like about our family, friends, or co-workers may not change, but God can do something even better: He can change us.

These days, if there's something about my husband, Dave, that I think needs to

change, I will pray and ask God for help. But even then, my attitude is completely different than it used to be.

Now, I'll pray something like, "Lord, if it's Your will, I ask You to help Dave

change in this area. But first, if the problem is really me and not Dave, please show me. Show me if there's anything I need to change."

Sure, there are times when we may need to sit down and talk with a friend or family member about their weaknesses or faults for the health of the relationship, but even then, it should be done with humility and love. Our motive should always be to help them.

Psalm 51:6 (AMPC) says, "Behold, You desire truth in the inner being; make me therefore to know wisdom in my inmost heart."

And Ephesians 4:15 (AMPC) says, "Let our lives lovingly express truth [in all things, speaking truly, dealing truly, living truly]...."

God wants to reveal the truth to us. He desires for us to face anything that is coming between us and Him...things that are holding us back from His good plan and purpose for our lives.

I've learned to ask God regularly, "Show me truth. And help me to face the truth You show me...especially what You show me about myself."

Can I tell you something? All of those days when I was constantly judging and criticizing others...I wasn't happy. First, I wasn't walking in love with people, and I was also sowing seeds for others to judge and criticize me.

When I look back at all of the years I pestered Dave and pressured him to change, it's almost comical! And now that I have allowed God to change me, I can truly say that I love and enjoy my husband for who he is...and there's freedom in that.

Let God begin with you. I encourage you to pray, "Lord, please show me the truth about myself. Please change me so I can better help the people around me."

As you do, the Holy Spirit—the "Spirit of Truth"—will start to show you things about yourself...and help you walk in new levels of freedom.

Jesus Christ sure could ruin a good funeral! "What?" you may exclaim. Search the scriptures and you will discover that there is not a single recorded deathbed or funeral, that He attended while walking on this earth, which did not overturn. Let us look at the passage record in Luke 7:11-16, in which we find a funeral procession heading out of the city gate. Imag-

ine, if you will, that you are in one of the crowds...either in the funeral crowd heading out of the city, or the joyful, lively crowd with Christ heading into the city.

As is the custom here in the South, is to honor the group of mourners by giving way. But that's not what happened. Let's visualize the scene by imagining the thoughts going through the mourner's mind.


Suppose we are one of the mourners following the widow, whose only son lay dead on the Bier (stretcher). When our sad, weeping procession of death meets Christ's joyful, lively group at the narrow passage of the city gate. We would expect the lively group to step aside, and in silence, let us pass. Instead, the One leading the joyful group tells the widow, who is on the way to bury her only child, "Stop Crying." Now being in the group of mourners, we are probably getting upset at this One. First, he wouldn't step aside, then He tells the grieving mother to "Stop Crying".

What He did next most likely has us ready to pick up a rock to throw. Because that One, who is blocking our way, touched the Bier, halting its movement, and spoke to the dead body. He said, "Young man, I say unto you, Arise!" Now, keep in mind that in those times, and in that culture, a widow without children was pretty much destitute. She relied on the kindness and mercy of others.

She won't have to face a life of begging for her next meal because her son who was dead obeyed the One and sat up! Alive! He began to talk. Now, this passage doesn't tell us what he said after being made alive. But I know what I said. I, who was once dead, gave my testimony, praising my Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, the One who gives life. When death meets life, death is defeated, giving way to life.

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




A Pastor's View

"Don't Waste A Good Crisis" (Hurricane Beryl, Texas 2024)

While we may not agree with them politically, there is a legitimate application to make spiritually. We all experience various crises at times, and when we do, we shouldn't "waste" them. God always has something good He wants to accomplish through a trial; some lesson for us to learn.

Many of us in south Texas experienced a crisis recently, with Hurricane Beryl. None of us will ever say again: "Oh it's just a CAT 1" hurricane! It hit us hard: no power/water; no air conditioning in this Texas heat. Many are like our neighbor, with a tree on the roof of their home. It's been a crisis week for many of us.

Yet in all of that, we need to remember that God has a purpose: something for us to learn; something for us to do. So what are some things we can learn, and not "waste" this Hurricane Beryl Crisis?

I. We have much to be thankful for

James 1 says "every good thing bestowed, and every perfect gift is from above." But God has given us SO much, especially here in America, that we often take His blessings for granted, and forget to thank Him for them.

Well, some of the things that we take for granted, weren't granted to us this last week! They were taken away. And we were reminded of just how much we really do appreciate them!

In the middle of the outages, one of our ladies wrote on Facebook: "Sitting here with no power or running water really makes one stop and reflect on the things we take for granted daily." Isn't that the truth? Do you realize how much "we take for granted regularly"? Just think of the water we drink, which most of us never give a second thought.

In Robert Caro's biography of Lyndon Johnson, he wrote about how Texas women used to draw water from a well for their homes. He interviewed one lady who showed him how hard it was to draw just one bucket of water. Then he discovered a 1940 government bulletin which indicated the average family then used 40 gallons of water per person, per day. So a family of 5 needed 200 gallons of water per day — all of it hauled BY HAND from a well — and usually by the wife!

Yet most of us today can just stroll into the kitchen, and get as much water as we want — COLD! Or with ice. Or crushed ice! It's one of so many blessings we just take for granted.

But the greatest blessing we have isn't just one of the "modern conveniences," but the eternal salvation God's provided for us in Jesus. He died on the cross and paid for our sins, so that we could be totally forgiven by God, and saved. THAT is the greatest blessing we have — don't take it for granted!

What if you only had, today, the things that you thanked God for yesterday? Let's get in the habit of starting our day, by reading a Psalm, and then thanking God for all the blessings He gave us the previous day. It's a great way to start the day! "Don't Waste a Good Crisis"! Let your trial, whatever it is, remind you to thank God for all the blessings He's given you!

II. There's always an opportunity to minister.

Acts tells us the Apostle Paul was imprisoned on a ship that was wrecked in a storm. But the whole time, Paul witnessed and ministered to the other passengers. He always looked for an opportunity to minister — even amid his own crisis.

That's a good lesson for us, too: even in our own times of crisis, watch for opportunities to witness and minister what the Lord gives you.

The Samaritan's Purse Disaster Relief team here in south Texas can tell you: that a crisis is actually a really good time to minister, because people have needs, and it gives us an open door to help meet those needs and show God's love to them.

A crisis is a good opportunity to show that you care for people. One of our members told me that about 15 people had called or texted to check on him! I jokingly said, Larry, I didn't have that many people check on ME! But a crisis is a great time to reach out and let someone know you care.

- This week one of our men and his boys were busy with their chainsaw helping people. At one of our senior ladies' houses, they cut up a huge piece of a tree that had blown down.
- Our youth leader took out a group of students to pick up debris from some of our senior adults' homes.
- Our church opened up a cooling station and had dozens of people come by, to cool off, get ice, or a cold drink, and recharge their electronics. At least one family stayed at the church since their home had been damaged, and they had no power.

This week was a good opportunity for our church to minister. We didn't "plan" to minister in these ways — but sometimes God plans the best ministry opportunities in ways we never expected, through some of the worst tragedies.

For example, there is no situation in life worse than Corrie Ten Boom being sent to a Nazi concentration camp. But even then, she used that experience to start a Bible study, and she led countless other women to the Lord, who would never have been saved otherwise.

This just reminds us that there's always an opportunity to minister, even in the worst situations we face. So "Don't Waste a Good Crisis." Watch for how God wants you to minister in the midst of it.

Growing up one of my favorite birds was the Bob White. I have never seen one in person but I always knew they were around by their call. Growing up, we did not have air conditioning so the majority of the time the windows were open. I remember sitting on my bed and just listening to Bob White's

call. They lived in the woods behind our house. The call was very distinct and it sounded just like the words "Bob White." Most of the time a mate in a nearby tree or a relative far off in the distance would answer the call. What I enjoyed the most was a lot of the time I was able to fake the call myself by whistling. Some of my calls were good enough to get an answer back from the real bird and that pleased

A few months ago, my husband and I were talking about birds we no longer hear here that we heard all the time when we were growing up. The top bird we both missed was the Bob White. According to research, they have had a huge decline, (85%). They figure most of this is due to habitat loss and certain pesticides that are fatal to them. Also, Bob White's life span is only 6 months to 5

years in the wild. They are a very popular game bird for hunters as well. Nevertheless, I miss

Some of the Bob White's habitats are tall grassy fields, farmlands, and pine tree thickets. They can be found in the eastern part of North America, South America, and Mexico.

The Bob White is

also known as a partridge or a Virginia quail.

Through Spring and Summer, the Bob Whites pair off with their mates. In the Fall and Winter, they stay in groups called coveys. Each covey can have as little as 3 birds and as many as 20 birds.

These birds are ground birds, meaning they prefer living on the ground than in the trees. However, they can fly on short flights to escape predators. They will peck and scratch the ground like a chicken for food. They also roost on the ground at night. When they are in the covey, they will gather in a circle with their tails facing the center, with their heads pointing outwards. This is to help them stay warm since they do not migrate and to also help them see potential predators com-

Most of these quails eat vegetation like leaves, grass, seeds, berries, etc. But at different times of their lives, they will need protein and will eat insects like grasshoppers, crickets, beetles, and such.

A single couple of birds can produce 2-3 broods of offspring a year.

There can be as many as 16 eggs at a time in the nest. Both parents will incubate the nest. The nest is made from a scratch on the ground covered by leaves and grass strands. The female will usually weave an arch of grass strands to go over the nest to camouflage it.

When Bob White babies hatch, they are what is called precocial. Precocial means the babies come out of the nest already covered in down feathers with their eyes open and can already walk. The hatchlings leave the nest not long after hatching however, the parents still care for them and feed them for several months out of the nest.


If a predator comes close to their nest the parent will perform the "broken wing act" to lure the predator away. They do this to protect their chicks, it gives the impression to the predator that their wing is broken and that they can't fly away making them look vulnerable and an easy meal for the predator.

Bob Whites are hardly ever seen but are heard because their call carries a great

Bob Whites reminds me of God. God is always there even though we don't see Him. Sometimes we know He is around by the miracles He performs on our behalf. Sometimes we hear Him speak to us through our conscious. Sometimes you may not feel like God is around because you are going through a hard time and it feels like He is not there. Maybe you are waiting for Him to answer questions, open up a door to a problem, or resolve a problem and you feel helpless and like He is ignoring you. I can assure you this is not the case. He is there, listening, working on your behalf, and waiting when the time is right to help you. Sometimes He may not answer prayers the way we want Him to. For instance, I waited for 13 years for a prayer to be answered before it was, and when it was answered it wasn't exactly how I wanted it answered but He revealed to me then why it was answered the way it was and why it took so long to answer it.

So don't give up on your prayers, pray them without ceasing, He will answer them in His perfect time and He is always there even though we can't see Him. He is still out there just like the Bob Whites are even though I haven't seen them or heard them in many years. I find comfort in the fact that one day when we get to heaven, we will get to see Him and Jesus and I hope one day in the future I will be blessed by hearing the call of the Bob White once again!





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
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
